## the same things-












# the year had everything








## activities









### catspaw

This was three and a half more than the sixty-seven total garnered by the runner-up A.T.O.'s. The K.A.'s, winning three first places, won the meet despite the fact that the A.T.O.'s won the other eight of the cleven events. The K.A. win is credited to the oversupply of second, third, fourth, and fifth places. Individual honors went to Art Sharbel, the ATO-mic Ilash, for the second straight year. He won the one-hundred yard dash, the two-hundred twenty yard dash, the four-hundred forty yard dash, and was anchor man for the winning ATO relay team, to run up a total of sixteen and a half points. Next in line for honors was the "KA Peach," George Taylor, who had a total of fifteen and a half points coming from a first place in the shotput, a tie for first place in the high jump. and a third in the broad jump and discus. As shown by the totals, this track meet was really a battle between the winning K.A.'s and the runner-up A.T.O.'s, but the finishing order was as follows: first, Kappa Alpha; second, Alpha Tau Omega; third, Pi Kappa Alpha; fourth, Independent Rams and Sigma Alpha Epsilon (tie); and, fifth, Theta Chi.




Cletis Bonds, the A. L.O.'s were hard to beat. The tour-

## football



#### swimming











## swimming


## softball
