







Much Pomp and Unusual Circumstance

The war in Bosnia kept Mirna Zekic's family from attending her high school graduation four years ago. So as she prepares for her commencement May 24, her greatest wish is that her mom be there to see it.

Zekic last saw her parent together in 1991, when she left Yugoslavia to spend her junior year in high school as a foreign exchange student in Sylacauga, AL. By the next spring, civil war had broken out in her native Bosnia-Herzegovina. Her parents and new-found friends in Alabama urged her to stay put, at least through the summer.

But conditions got worse. For a year, Zekic had no contact with her family because phone lines were cut off. She graduated from high school and enrolled in Birmingham-Southern College, where alumni and other sponsors donated funds to cover her expenses.

When communication resumed back home, Zekic learned what the war had done. "People have changed unbelievably," she



says, recalling a letter from a childhood friend who now considers Zekic her enemy. Her parents separated. She spent months arranging for her brother Mladen to come to the USA under a student visa.

She also worked evenings while keeping up an almost perfect academic record(she got one A- in physics). She is now job hunting

and will graduate first in her class, earning degrees in math, computer science, and business. Those who know her marvel at her stamina.

"To be with her, you would not have any sense that her life was in complete turmoil and limbo. She radiates a calm, quiet confidence," says American Government professor Ed LaMonte.

At the time of this article in USA Today Zekic still didn't know whether her mother would be able to attend her graduation. She says, "I think l

would feel more pride in everything just knowing that my mom was there." Oprah Winfrey fulfilled her dream by reuniting the mother with Mirna on her daytime talk show.






