

Foreword.


The Lord has done great things for us, whereof we are glad.—Ps. 126:3

Melanchthon Seminary


Dom ersten Geleucht durch Silberschein zum goldnen Glanz.

Es war in Evansville, Anno 1871, da wüteten sich die Wolken des Zweifels, welche zwei Jahre lang das Proseminar der Evangelischen Synode des Westens vor dem klaren Tage der Wirklichkeit verborgen hatten. Die dämmernde Helligkeit wandelte sich allmäthlich zum Silberglanze und dieser geht nunmehr in das tiefere und reichere Gold über. Wie eine Aurora Borealis hat der Schimmer sehr bald seinen Ort verändert, um dann aber nach Art eines Fürsterns einen festen Stand einzunehmen. In Evansville ist der ursprüngliche Früh-
schein den Augen der Menschen entchwunden, und eine wachsende Lichtfülle hat sich unter ihrem eigenen Gesetze des Strahlendrudes über Elmhurst gelagert, und zweimal hat sie sich zum festlichen Kranz geformt, zuerst im lieblichen Silberschein und nun im prächtigen Goldglanz. Wie eine Erleuchtung war es über die Generalkonferenz der

Fifty Years of Elmhurst

Three dates, all in the year 1871, are important in the history of Elmhurst College. They are the seventeenth of January, the thirtieth of August and the sixth of December. On January 17, 1871, the Proseminar of the "Deutsche Evangelische Synode des Westens" was opened at Evansville, Indiana, with the Rev. Karl Friedrich Kranz as "inspector" and sole teacher. The enrollment at the beginning was nine, to which six more students were added in the course of the next few months.

The opening exercises at nine o'clock in the morning, with the formal reception of nine students by the Board of Control, the members of which were the Rev. C. A. Clausen, G. Müller, A. Schory and Mr. Feldwisch. The nine were G. Stanger, W. F. Gieselmann, H. Walser, H. C. W. Graeper, J. Fink, H. Steller, J. Rausch, G. Appel, and J. Haug, the last mentioned, of whom

Synode des Westens vom Jahre 1869 gekommen: Wir müssen das Predigerseminar bei Marthasville von allen Vorbereitungsklassen entfernen und an anderem Orte eine besondere Vorhöhle für daselbe errichten, die zugleich als Lehrerseminar und als allgemeine Bildungsanstalt dienen soll. Träger des Lichtes in dreifacher Reihe! Am anderen Orte! Und der war Evansville. Und am 17. Januar 1871 wurde bei der feierlichen Gröfzung der Anstalt um das göttliche Segenslicht für den noch dunklen Pfad gefeht. Noch in demselben Jahr hieß es wieder: Au anderem Orte! Denn bei der Beschränktheit des Raumes, der noch dazu nur gemietet war, erwies sich die weite und freundliche Stadt mit dem breiten Silberstreifen des Ohio-Flusses als eine gar kleine und trübe Kämmer, ja als eine starke Heberschaffung für das neue Licht, das im Kreise der Synode aufgegangen war. Und an anderem Orte, in Elmhurst, tat sich ein großer Raum an, der dem Licht keine Schranken zog: ein Areal von 29 Ader, auf dem sich ein gutes Dutzend großer Lichtwerke anlegen ließ. Zwar strahlte hier schon ein anderes Licht von großer Schönheit, das Melanchthon-Seminar der Synode des Nordwestens. Aber da das stärkere Licht des Predigerseminars bei Marthasville den nunmehr vereinigten Synoden diente, so konnte das schwächere Licht erlöschen und durch ein anders geartetes Licht ersetzt werden, durch das Proseminar der gemeinsamen Synode, die bald darauf den neuen Namen „Deutsche Evangelische Synode von Nord-Amerika“ annahm.

Der Anbruch dieses Lichtes in Evansville, beziehentlich in Elmhurst, jährt sich nun zum 50. Male. Die 50 Jahre sind 50 Lichtjahre gewesen. Aber der Weg hat auch durch manches Dunkel geführt. Es geht nun einmal nirgends in der Welt ohne Wechsel des Lichts und der Finsternis. Wo Licht ist, da ist auch Schatten. Schatten der Trübsal, Schatten der Sünde! Und keine menschliche Erleuchtung vermöchte Licht und Schatten genau abzugrenzen. Gelegentlich hat sich wohl auch das trügerische Irrlicht gezeigt. Aber gesucht hat man

did not, however, remain long. Hereupon the board, accompanied by the inspector, the students, Pastors Schrenk, Burkart and Rausch, and members of Zion Church of Evansville and others nearby adjourned to the single class-room for a service of worship. Addresses were delivered by Pastor Clausen, who installed Inspector Kranz, and by the new inspector, who chose for his text Psalm 60, 12: "Through God we shall do valiantly."

Within a few weeks, the following five students entered the new school: W. Reller, R. Haefliger, F. Karbach, C. Müller, F. Schaubert and J. H. Dinkmeier,—S. Speicher entered in the fall.

In the summer of 1871, the officers of the Evangelische Synode des Westens met the officers of the Evangelische Synod des Nordwestens to draw up an instrument for the union of these synods, which was accepted by both bodies in 1872 at a general conference. There was so little doubt, however, that the synods would unite, that the officers of both proceeded at once to effect a merger of the only institutions possessed by each—the theological seminary at Marthasville, Missouri, and the Proseminar at Evansville, Indiana, of the Synode des Westens, and the Melanchthon theological seminary at Elmhurst, Illinois, of the Synode des Nordwestens. It was arranged that the students of the Melanchthon Seminary should be transferred to the older and larger seminary at Marthasville, while the Proseminar was to be removed from Evansville to Elmhurst. This arrangement was completed on August 30, at the Melanchthon Seminary.

On December 6, 1871, Inspector Kranz arrived with fourteen students of the Proseminar at Elmhurst, and before long had established the school as comfortably as possible, in the house that had been the home of the Melanchthon Seminary. The school year was completed in June, 1872, and two of the students were graduated, both as teachers. They were the Rev. J. H. Dinkmeier and W. F. Gieselmann.

immer nur das wahre Licht. Die fünf vorstehenden Väter oder Direktoren, die nachstehend genannt sind, haben sich alle als Kinder des Lichts bewiesen: A. Strauss, Amtszeit 1871—1875; A. Mensch bis 1880; P. Göbel bis 1887; D. Zion bis 1919; H. A. Schieß seit November 1919. Viele andere Kinder des Lichts sind in unsere Hallen eingezogen, um früher oder später mit verstärkter Leuchtkraft wieder in die Welt hinauszuziehen. Die Lehrer, unter welche die Direktoren mitzurechnen sind, haben namentlich auch als Leuchten des Wissens gedient. Ein Stern übertraf den andern an Härte. Zu der ersten Zeit war der Inspektor (Kranz) zugleich das ganze Lehrerkollegium, ein ganzer Kranz. Er hatte allein als wandelndes Prisma die ganze Skala der verschiedenartigen Lichtnaturen zu einheitlicher Lichtwirkung zu vereinigen durch das allen gemeinsame Lichtband der Liebe zur Anstalt, zur Synode, zum Reiche Gottes. Aber die großen und kleinen Lichter der Lehrer und Schüler kommen und gehen in beständigem Auf und Ab. Nur ein Stern hat, freilich als veränderlicher Stern, fast alle die 50 Jahre am Himmel der Anstalt geleuchtet, der Stern Zion. Zudem wie die 50jährige Geschichte der Anstalt an unserem Auge vorüberziehen lassen, wird uns eine lange Reihe rasch wechselnder Wandelsbilder vorgeführt. Wenn die Synode in diesen Tagen den scheinenden Scheinwerfer der intensiven Aufmerksamkeit auf Elmhurst richtet, dann wird die Anstalt ihrerseits sich im Spiegel der Selbsterkennnis beschauen. Sie darf aber auch sagen, daß sie in den 50 Jahren durch sichtbare und unsichtbare Strahlen viel Licht und Kraft in die Synode und bis nach Honduras und Indien ausgesandt hat.

Eine besonders glanzvolle Zeit war die Aera Zion, schon allein

Melanchthon Seminary was first begun as a private institution at Long Grove, Illinois, then removed to Wankegan, and a little later still to Lake Zurich. Here it was in rented quarters, when, in 1865, it was taken over by the Synod of the Northwest. Looking about for a permanent home, the directors were acquainted with an opportunity to buy a tract of about twenty acres, with a large house, in Elmhurst, to which Mr. Thomas Bryan, a public-spirited citizen of Elmhurst, was willing to add as a gift, ten adjoining acres. The offer was accepted, and Melanchthon Seminary was removed to the new home at Elmhurst in the fall of 1869. We have already noticed that Melanchthon Seminary gave place in 1871 to the Proseminar that was removed from Evansville.

Melanchthon House, the first home of the Proseminar stood on the site of the present Dining Hall, from which it was removed in 1895 to make way for the Dining Hall that was built in 1896 as the gift of the Evangelical Synod to Elmhurst on the occasion of its twenty-fifth anniversary.

Imagine the comforts which the old house afforded fourteen students, besides Inspector Kranz and his wife! The "front room" became the class-room, in which the students spent the greater part of the day, reciting by turns and studying at roughly made tables set before long benches. The professor's desk stood back of the double door leading into the rear-room, which was a sort of library and study for the professor. When a second teacher was called, the professors divided the time between them, since there was but one class-room.

The students were given the room on the lower floor of the right wing as a study. The left wing was occupied by the kitchen and dining-room. On the second floor, two front rooms were the apartments of the inspector and his wife. The students slept in the attic, "where the beds stood so close that you could get at them only from the foot. Making beds under such conditions was

Im Jahre 1896 hat man der Anstalt den silbernen Ehrenkranz aufgesetzt. Und auf halbem Wege vom silbernen zum goldenen Kranz wurde Zion Hall in den Kranz der Anstaltsgebäude eingefügt. Das war im Jahre 1912. Die Zahl der Schüler, die von dem Elmhurst Glanze angelockt wurden, hatte sich stetig gehoben, bis sie in dem gleichen Jahre, 1912, mit 175 ihre Höchthöhe erreichte. Ist die Menge der Studenten an sich schon unter Umständen der schönste Ehrenkranz für eine höhere Schule, so hat unsere Elmhurst Anstalt schon anno 1910 noch einen anderen Ehrenkranz dadurch erhalten, daß ihr die Staatsuniversität die förmliche Anerkennung gewährte, und zwar mit einem weiteren Jahreskredit für die Abiturienten in Deutsch, Latein und Griechisch.

Bei dem Übergang von der Aera Zion zur Aera Schief, als eine Einleitung des goldenen Jubiläums, wurde abermals ein wichtiger Schritt vorwärts getan, und zwar durch die Erweiterung des Kursus zu einem sechsjährigen, wovon die ersten vier Jahre auf die Academia und die letzten zwei auf das College entfallen. Eine Fülle neuen Lichtes ist durch die neu hinzukommenden Lehrfächer hereingeströmt: Psychologie, Philosophie, Soziologie, Hebräisch, Trigonometrie (das letzte als Wahlfach). Zum ersten Mal bietet unsere Anstalt nun auch solchen Studenten, welche sich auf andere Berufe als das Pfarramt vorbereiten wollen, die umfassende allgemeine Bildung eines Junior College. Ist die Anstalt jetzt auch in zwei Stufenreihen geschieden, in Academia und College, und der Idee nach in zwei Abteilungen gesondert, Predigerabteilung und allgemeine Abteilung, so ist sie doch eine einheitliche Anstalt in Wesen und Streben, in Licht und Kraft.

Nun prangt die Anstalt im goldenen Glanze. Und als besondere

a difficult art which fell out of use. The windows were few and small, but the ventilation was excellent; in fact, the beds were frequently covered with several inches of snow blown through the cracks."

If 14 students found Melanchthon House none too commodious, we may imagine the predicament of the inspector, when the number rose to 21, and still more applicants sought admission. A new building became absolutely necessary, and what is now called the *Music House* was erected in 1873 at a cost of about \$13,000. The number of students at this time was 34. Fully a dozen of these had lived for a year in a one-room shack that some of their number built.

The pioneer days were over with the completion of the new building, but the continued rapid increase in enrollment soon began to crowd the students uncomfortably. The erection of what has ever since been called the Main Building, was therefore begun in 1878, at a cost of about \$24,000.

The enrollment during the first ten years was: 1871, 14; 1872, 35; 1873, 66; 1874, 52; 1875, 61; 1876, 59; 1877, 79; 1878, 91; 1879, 103; 1880, 85. Now, the curious thing is that, with far more room (almost adequate for those days) to take care of students after the erection of the Main Building, the enrollment did not show a corresponding increase. It stood at about the same figures (about 100) from 1878, when the Main Building was begun and completed, to 1889. In that year, the number rose to 113, and for the decade following, the average attendance did not greatly exceed this figure (the average is about 118).

In 1898 a noticeable decline set in and continued for almost a decade. The average attendance for the period from 1898 to 1906 is what it began with in 1898, viz., 95. This is in spite of the fact that the building of the Dining Hall in 1896 had added appreciably to the comfort and convenience of students.


With an enrollment in the fall of 1906 suddenly increased from 105 to 124, there begins a period of about ten years marked by a steady rise in the enrollment, culminating in the year 1914 with 169. During this period, it became necessary to build Irion

Hall, completed in 1912, in order to take care of the increase. But again, the attendance, after a decade of increase, begins to show a gradual decline to about 135 in 1920. What makes the decrease in numbers less alarming, however, is the fact that the annual new registration, has varied but slightly in all this time, and the graduating classes likewise have not yet decreased in numbers to an alarming extent. A larger proportion of students than formerly is entering higher classes, and therefore remaining fewer years.

As the school grew in numbers, and new buildings were added to take care of the growth, so the faculty grew in numbers.

In the first year, Inspector Kranz was the sole teacher. The next year, the Rev. F. Weygold was appointed "first professor." In 1873, a separate English department was established. In 1876, the Rev. G. v. Luternau was appointed as so-called "second professor," and a department of music was created. The faculty now consisted of five regularly appointed instructors, including the inspector, besides one assistant. In 1882, Professor Brodt began his long term of service as head of the pedagogical department. The faculty now consisted of six. In 1890, Professor Bauer began his work at Elmhurst as the seventh member of the faculty, and in 1892 an eighth member was added as second instructor in music. Since 1896, Professor Stanger has had sole charge of music, but the number of instructors was kept at eight. There it remained until the opening of the Junior College in 1919 made it necessary to add another member to the faculty. Dr. Irion remaining at the same time as professor, while the Rev. H. J. Schiek became the new president, the number of instructors is now ten. The seminary board in 1920 created the position of physical director and registrar, filled by the Rev. R. W. Leonhardt.

May the future years see Elmhurst College and Academy prosper exceedingly and become more and more a blessing for the entire Church, yea the entire world.

In Memoriam.

Die folgenden biographischen Notizen sind dem Andenken derjenigen Männer gewidmet, die längere oder kürzere Zeit am Proseminar als Lehrer gewirkt haben und eingegangen sind zu ihres Herrn Freude.

Inspektor Carl Fr. Kranz wurde geboren zu Grünberg in Schlesien am 31. Dezember 1839 und erhielt seine Ausbildung auf dem Gymnasium und der Universität seiner Heimat. Als Kandidat der Theologie kam er in dies Land und wurde in Indianapolis von Pastor Quinius ordiniert. Sein erstes Arbeitsfeld war Mishawaka,

Ind. Von dort aus wurde er als Inspektor an das neugegründete Proseminar nach Evansville, Ind., berufen. Am 17. Januar 1871 begann er seine Anstaltsarbeit mit dem Worte: „Mit Gott wollen wir Taten tun.“ Im Dezember desselben Jahres wurde die Anstalt von Evansville nach Elmhurst verlegt, wo das Proseminar in den Räumen des früheren Melanchthon-Seminars seine bleibende Heimat gefunden hat.

Inspektor Kranz war ein guter Lehrer und hat als Leiter der jungen Anstalt die äußerst schwierigen Anfangsarbeiten mit Hingabe und Geschick durchgeführt. Ende 1874 legte er sein Amt am Proseminar nieder und trat wieder ins Pfarramt zurück. Er starb am 12. Dezember 1885 als Pastor der evang. St. Lukas-Gemeinde zu Louisville, Ky. Seine früheren Schüler halten ihn in dankbarem Andenken.

Pastor Philipp Friedrich Mensch wurde der Nachfolger von Pastor Kranz im Inspektorat des Proseminars. Er verwaltete das Amt von 1875—1880. Inspektor Meusch war geboren am 17. Juni 1836 und hatte seine theologische Ausbildung im Evangelischen Predigerseminar bei Marthasville, Mo., erhalten. Jahrelang stand er im Gemeindedienst, bis er zum Inspektor des Proseminars ernannt wurde. Er war ein Mann von wahrer Frömmigkeit und tiefem sittlichem Ernst. Unter seiner Leitung gedieh die junge Anstalt zusehends, und die Zahl der Studierenden wuchs von Jahr zu Jahr. Er verstand es, die jungen Leute geistig anzufassen und seelsorgerlich zu beeinflussen. Daher erfreute er sich großer Beliebtheit. Doch waren seine Kräfte nach wenigen Jahren aufgezehrt, und er erlag am 25. Juli 1880 einem Nierenleiden. Seine Schüler bewahren ihm ein ehrendes Andenken, und mancher verdankt seinem Einfluss den Antrieb zu einem neuen geistlichen Leben. Seine Gebeine ruhen auf dem Anstalfriedhof.

Pastor Peter Goebel übernahm das Inspektorat als Nachfolger von Josph. Mensch im Jahre 1880 und führte es bis zum Sommer 1887. Dann trat er ins evang. Pfarramt zurück und wirkte noch jahrelang im Zegen an verschiedenen Gemeinden. Er hat sich durch seine ernste herzliche Frömmigkeit die Achtung aller erworben, mit denen er in nähere Verbindung kam. Seine Pflicht stand ihm stets obenan, und er konnte in der treuen, selbstlosen Erfüllung derselben allen seinen Schülern als Vorbild dienen. Sein Andenken bleibt im Zegen. Er starb am 3. Juni 1905 infolge eines Unfalls unerwartet schnell.

Prof. Wm. A. Sauerbier wurde im Jahre 1875 als Lehrer der englischen Sprache und Literatur ans Profseminar berufen und hat das Amt bis zu seinem Tode im Oktober 1879 mit Treue und Erfolg geführt. Er erfreute sich bei seinen Schülern großer Beliebtheit und genas ihr volles Vertrauen. Prof. Sauerbier war aus Ohio gebürtig und hatte seine akademische Bildung auf der Universität zu Liffin in seinem Heimatstaate erlangt. Er fand seinen Tod bei einer Eisenbahnkollision zu Mamwood, Ill.

Prof. Friedrich N. Wengold, geboren den 6. August 1837 zu Unna in Westfalen, war einige Jahre lang Lehrer im Profseminar zur Zeit des Josph. Kranz. Er war ein Mann von ausgedehntem Wissen und großer Lehrgabe. In seinen jüngeren Jahren war er an verschiedenen höheren Schulen in seiner Heimat, zuletzt im Rathen Hause, als Lehrer tätig gewesen. Ende der sechziger Jahre folgte er einem Ruf aus Lehrerseminar zu Cincinnati, Ohio, und vom Jahre 1872 bis 1874 wirkte er als Professor im Profseminar. Wegen seiner ausgedehnten Kenntnisse war er ein Gegenstand der Bewunderung für seine Schüler. Später nahm er einen Ruf der St. Pauls-Gemeinde zu Louisville, Ky., an und wirkte dort als Seelsorger bis zum Jahre

1897. Dann zog er sich bei sehr geschwächter Gesundheit in den Ruhestand zurück. Er starb am 15. Mai 1909.

Prof. Friedrich A. Henninger entstammte einer alten Professorenfamilie. Er war am 25. Juli 1831 in dem Fürstentum Reuß, j. L., geboren und erhielt seine Gymnasialbildung in dem berühmten Herrnhuter Pädagogium zu Riesig in Schlesien. Zu Gnadenfeld in Ober-Schlesien studierte er Theologie. Hierauf bekleidete er längere Jahre hindurch Schulstellen in Herrnhut und später in England. Im Jahre 1873 kam er nach Amerika und übernahm die Leitung einer Hochschule in Hermann, Mo. Von dort aus wurde er im Jahre 1874 als Lehrer ins Profseminar berufen, behielt aber diese Stelle nur bis Ende 1875 und trat dann ins Pfarramt über. Er bediente nacheinander Gemeinden in Iowa, Illinois und Missouri. Sein Tod erfolgte am 30. Januar 1885.

Professor Friedrich Rauffmann war ein Württemberger und hatte seine Ausbildung auf dem klassischen Gymnasium zu Maulbronn und in Basel erhalten. Als junger Prediger kam er nach Amerika und bediente bis zum Jahre 1866 eine Gemeinde bei Burlington, Ia. Von dort aus wurde er als theologischer Lehrer ans evang. Profseminar bei Marthasville, Mo., berufen. Dies Amt bekleidete er bis zum Jahre 1871. Darauf trat er wieder ins Pfarramt ein. Im Jahre 1876 wurde er Lehrer am Profseminar bis in den Sommer 1880. Dann kehrte er in seine württembergische Heimat zurück und trat dort ins Pfarramt ein. Als Lehrer der klassischen Sprachen und der deutschen Literatur hat er Bedeutendes geleistet. Er hielt gern ein offenes Haus und sah gerne Amtsbrüder, sowie auch seine Schüler in seinem Familienkreis. Auch nach seiner Rückkehr in die Heimat hat er unserer Kirche und Amtstalt ein treues, liebendes Andenken bewahrt und eine ganze Anzahl Jünglinge zur Ausbildung in unseren Anstalten für den evang. Kirchendienst geworben, von denen jetzt noch

viele im Dienste unserer Kirche stehen. Er starb im Jahre 1895. Sein Andenken bleibt bei uns im Segen.

Dr. G. A. Zimmermann war Lehrer der klassischen Sprachen und Geschichte im Jahre 1875. Er war am 20. Oktober 1850 zu Basel, in der Schweiz, geboren und hatte seine Vorbildung in den klassischen Schulen seiner Heimat erhalten. Im früheren Melanchthon-Seminar studierte er Theologie. Darauf fehrte er nach Europa zurück und erwarb sich auf der Universität zu Halle den Doktor der Philosophie. Nach seiner Rückkehr in dieses Land ließ er sich in Chicago nieder und wurde einige Jahre lang Lehrer der Theologie in dem Chicago Seminar. Gleichzeitig war er Superintendent des deutschen Departements der öffentlichen Schulen in Chicago, ein Posten, den er lange Jahre bekleidete. In den neunziger Jahren gründete er die St. Johannis-Gemeinde auf der Nordseite, deren Seelsorger er bis zu seinem am 5. Januar 1905 erfolgten Tode blieb. Dr. Zimmermann war ein sehr fruchtbarer Schriftsteller. Literatur und Geschichte hat er fleißig bearbeitet. Eine dreibändige Geschichte des 19. Jahrhunderts, eine Sammlung von Gedichten deutschamerikanischer Dichter und eine ganze Anzahl ähnlicher Werke haben ihn zum Verfasser.

Prof. Carl Dobschall, geboren am 23. November 1831 zu Breslau, in Schlesien, verdankte seine Vorbildung dem Gymnasium und der Universität seiner Heimatstadt. Einige Jahre lang war er Pfarrer in Schlesien und bediente später die evangelische Gemeinde zu Medaryville, Ind. Von dort aus wurde er als Lehrer ins Proseminar berufen im Jahre 1883. Er blieb nur zwei Jahre in dieser Stellung; dann wanderte er sich wieder dem Gemeindedienst zu. Mit zunehmendem Alter zog er sich vom Amte zurück und ließ sich in Oshkosh, Wis., nieder. Er starb am 19. April 1905.

Prof. Gustav Adolf Ebmeyer, geboren am 16. Januar 1850 zu

Schöthmar, Lippe-Detmold, war ein gründlich gebildeter, besonders auf dem Gebiete der Germanistik tüchtiger Lehrer. Jahrelang war er Lehrer auf verschiedenen Gymnasien Deutschlands. Im Jahre 1883 kam er nach Amerika und war zuerst zwei Jahre in einem Seminar in Rochester, N. Y., als deutscher Lehrer tätig. Von dort aus kam er ins Profeseminar als Lehrer der alten Sprachen, deutschen Literatur und Mathematik. Im Jahre 1890 wandte er sich der Journalismus zu und wurde Redakteur der „Chicago Freie Presse,” später der „Milwaukee Germania” und zuletzt der „Lincoln Freie Presse.” Er starb am 12. August 1908 in Lincoln, Nebr.

Prof. G. Otto, der große Gelehrte und Denker, stammte aus der Lutherstadt Mansfeld, wo er am 7. Januar 1837 das Licht der Welt erblickte. In seiner Jugend besuchte er das berühmte Gymnasium Schulpforte, hernach die Universität zu Halle. Nach beendigtem Studium war er einige Jahre als Lehrer in den Frankfurter Stiftungen in Halle tätig und wanderte im Jahre 1867 nach Amerika aus, um in den Gemeindedienst einzutreten. Aus diesem wurde er im Jahre 1870 als Professor an das Predigerseminar bei Marthaville berufen. Im Jahre 1880 gab er die Stelle auf und übernahm wieder eine Gemeinde. Im Jahre 1890 kam er als Lehrer der alten Sprachen, der deutschen Literatur und der Geschichte ans Profeseminar. Nach 14jähriger Tätigkeit zog er sich vom Lehramt zurück nach Columbia, Ill., und war von da ab hauptsächlich schriftstellerisch tätig. Er starb am 10. Juli 1916 im Alter von nahezu 80 Jahren. Prof. Otto war nicht bloß ein großer Gelehrter, sondern auch ein deutscher Christ, trotz seiner kritischen Veranlagung. Ein großer Kreis von dankbaren Schülern hält sein Andenken in Ehren.

Prof. Gottfried von Luternau war am 29. November 1842 im Kanton Bern, in der Schweiz, geboren. Seine Ausbildung erhielt er auf verschiedenen Hochschulen seines Heimatlandes. Einige Jahre


lang war er Offizier in der schweizerischen Armee, doch lebte er sich danach, in den Kirchendienst einzutreten. Deshalb wanderte er nach Amerika aus und trat in das evang. Predigerseminar ein, um Theologie zu studieren. Nach beendigtem Studium übernahm er eine Gemeinde. Im Jahre 1876 wurde er als Lehrer der Mathematik und der Naturwissenschaften ins Professinar berufen. Nach sechsjähriger Lehrtätigkeit trat er ins Pfarramt zurück und wirkte noch jahrelang im Segen an verschiedenen Gemeinden. Zuletzt war er in Iowa Park, Texas, tätig, wo er am 13. Januar 1913 eingehen durfte zu seines Herrn Freude. Seinen Schülern hat er stets durch sein ausgebreitetes Wissen und seine aufrichtige Frömmigkeit imponiert.

Prof. Johann C. Nahn, Professor der Musik von 1886—95, war am 17. Februar 1833 zu Oberlahmen, Hessen-Darmstadt, geboren. Seine Ausbildung erhielt er in dem Lehrerseminar zu Friedberg. Er besaß eine große Fertigkeit auf dem Piano, und als bedeutender Organist war er in weiten Kreisen bekannt. Im Jahre 1870 war er eingewandert und wirkte lange Jahre als Lehrer und Organist in

der St. Pauls-Gemeinde in Chicago. Von dort wurde er ans Professinar berufen. Neun Jahre lang diente er der Anstalt als Musiklehrer. Im Jahre 1905 zog er sich vom Amte zurück ins Privatleben. Sein Tod erfolgte im Jahre 1905.

Prof. Hermann Brodt, geboren am 15. Februar 1855 zu Beflin, b. Stolp, in Pommern, als Sohn eines Lehrers, erhielt seine Ausbildung im Lehrerseminar zu Bitow. Im Jahre 1878 kam er in dieses Land und fand Anstellung als Lehrer in der Schule der St. Peter-Gemeinde und später in der Zions-Gemeinde in Chicago. Im Jahre 1882 wurde er ins Professinar berufen als Professor der Pädagogik und des Deutschen, eine Stellung, die er etwa 36 Jahre lang innehatte. Im Jahre 1918 zog er sich vom Amte zurück. In Methodik und Schulfunde ist er einer großen Zahl seiner Schüler vorbildlich geworden, und besonders die Methodik des Religionsunterrichts fand bei ihm sorgfältige Beachtung. Damit hat er sich den Dank seiner Schüler redlich verdient. Er starb am 19. Oktober 1919.

Der sprachliche Unterricht.

Was den sprachlichen Unterricht anbetrifft, so hat unsere Anstalt, deren Hauptaufgabe es bis vor kurzem war, junge Männer für den Eintritt ins Predigerseminar vorzubereiten, immer großes Gewicht auf die Erlernung von Sprachen gelegt, indem sie von der ohne Zweifel richtigen Voraussetzung ausging, daß für Theologie Studierende nichts wichtiger und wertvoller sei als vielseitige und gediegene Sprachkenntniß.

Hierbei handelte es sich zunächst um die für das theologische Hochstudium nötigen Sprachen, um die griechische und lateinische, sodann um die deutsche und englische Sprache, mit deren Hilfe sie später das Wort Gottes zu verkündigen hatten. Den tatsächlichen Verhältnissen Rechnung tragend, wurde in den ersten vierzig Jahren ihres Bestehens dem Deutschen ein höherer Spielraum auf dem Stundenplan eingeräumt als dem Englischen.

Als dann, aus allgemein bekannten Gründen, das Verlangen nach englisch-redenden Predigern immer lauter und dringender wurde, sah man sich genötigt, mehr Zeit und Fleiß auf die Erlernung der Landessprache zu verwenden.


Wenn man dabei in Betracht zieht, daß die Studenten sich jetzt im täglichen Verkehr ausschließlich der englischen Sprache bedienen, und daß die Zahl derjenigen unter den neuintretenden Studenten, die sich noch im Deutschen auszudrücken vermögen, immer geringer wird, so wird man verstehen, daß das Deutsche einen harten Stand hat.

Wie sich nun auch in Zukunft die Dinge gestalten mögen, man wird hier bei denen, die sich später dem Studium der Theologie widmen wollen, nach wie vor, auf gründliche Erlernung der deutschen Sprache dringen. Die deutsche Sprache ist und bleibt nun einmal für unsere Kirche die Sprache der Reformation.

Nunmehr ist aber unsere Anstalt völlig umgestaltet worden, und wir haben es hier von jetzt an noch mit einer anderen Klasse von Studenten zu tun, mit solchen, die nur eine allgemeine „College“-Bildung suchen. Da liegt es nun auf der Hand, daß es, um diesen gerecht zu werden, Sache der Behörde und Fakultät sein wird, für den sprachlichen Unterricht in dieser Abteilung ganz andere Bestimmungen zu treffen.

Während in der zum Eintritt ins Predigerseminar vorbereiteten Abteilung das Griechische, das Lateinische (Hebräische) und das Deutsche wie bisher obligatorisch bleiben werden, so dürfte in der anderen Abteilung nur das Lateinische als eigentlich obligatorisches Fach anzusehen sein. Das Deutsche dagegen würde hier neben einer oder zwei anderen modernen Sprachen, etwa dem Französischen oder dem Spanischen, unter die fakultativen (wahlfreien) Fächer eingereiht werden müssen.

Zum ganzen wird wohl die Hauptarbeit im sprachlichen Unterricht in der Akademie getan werden müssen, während im „College“ die speziell wissenschaftlichen Fächer in den Vordergrund treten werden.

The Memorial Library

The library is a threefold memorial. When in 1912 the library of the Meusch Society was taken over by the faculty, Meusch Memorial Library was the official name agreed upon for the new institution, in commemoration of the Rev. F. Philipp Meusch, President of Elmhurst College from 1875 to 1880. This collection of books now amounts to over 5000 volumes. An almost equal number, now known as the Bryan Memorial Library, has accrued from the estate of the late Honorable Thomas B. Bryan of Elmhurst. The third memorial is about to be erected by the Evangelical League, in commemoration of those of our denomination who have fallen in the World War of 1914-1918. This building, which is to house both memorial libraries, will itself be a memorial to those who have made the supreme sacrifice to their country.







Music at Elmhurst



In this Golden Jubilee Year of our school we are also celebrating the Golden Jubilee of Music at Elmhurst. Not only has that fine art always been fostered here; not only have those who were able to play or sing when they entered always had an opportunity to make use of their talent in concerts and at social gatherings, but music has been a part of the curriculum from the beginning on, and rightly so. Some musical accomplishment is necessary to round out a general education. Especially do our students need it, as most of them enter Eden Seminary after graduating at Elmhurst, and eventually find their sphere of activity in the ministry, where their musical ability stands them in good stead. Many of them will find it necessary to elevate the standard of music in their churches. Many will be called upon to train their church choir. If an organ is to be installed, the pastor will naturally be on this committee to plan it and select the firm to build it. He will find it necessary to help arrange programs for church concerts and the musical part of Young People's entertainments, and in many other ways will he be able to make good use of his musical knowledge and ability.

Our institution is endeavoring to prepare its students for such work. All are expected to learn to play the piano and the reed or-

gan. If they are sufficiently advanced in the senior year of the Academy, they will receive instructions on the pipe organ. All take part in the vocal instructions given in the first and second years of the Academy, and are expected to sing in the choirs, consisting of third and fourth year Academy and first and second year college students. Anthems are sung at the services in the local church, and part songs and cantatas are rehearsed for the annual spring concert. In this Jubilee Year a special effort has been made in this direction, the cantata "The Voyage of Columbus" by Dudley Buck having been learned and successfully sung at the concert on April 12th. An orchestra of about twenty pieces also takes part in these events, and a brass band furnishes the music at the annual outdoor festival, and renders many a program in the open.

The college owns and puts at the disposal of the students for practice purposes twelve pianos, five reed organs, two pipe organs, a set of band instruments, and some of the instruments used in the orchestra.


Music answers a twofold purpose here. It makes life more interesting and enjoyable for our students at Elmhurst, and gives them part of their equipment for their profession.

1. Chemical Laboratory — 2. Physical Laboratory — 3. Botanical Laboratory


Mathematics and Science



This change is in the right direction, it is real progress. It is a serious mistake to call the amount of mathematics and science taught in Elmhurst at present "much mathematics and science." A minister certainly needs a broad education, a sympathetic understanding of the marvellous achievements of science in our modern times. It has done so much for the betterment of mankind that this age is beginning to think there is no need for a spiritual force. We are said to live in a materialistic age. Our young men must be trained so that they can explain these material forces as God's laws. They must be able to show there is no real conflict between science and religion. How can they do that if their knowledge of science is extremely limited? Is not a study of the material world, God's handiwork, worthy of the theological student? To understand how the rays of light have been separated in producing a beautiful sunset; to be familiar with the biological laws that produce the delicious apple or the fragrant rose; to know something of the laws by which God holds the infinite heavenly bodies in their course; or to know how the mountain and the valley are made, is not sacrilegious. No study except that of the Bible, God's word, can compare with the study of science in its ability to reveal the infinite power and love of God.


May the Department of Science enter the Forward Movement with more vigor the next fifty years than it has done in the past.

3. Old Chapel in Main Building





They increase the efficiency of the student in the class-room, for if the body is sound and healthy the mind will work so much clearer and faster. And, last but not least, athletics play a great part in the building of character. They develop those characteristics in the youth which are so necessary to the man in later life, among which are the following: close observation, quick, accurate thinking and acting, self-control, courage and determination, a sense of fairness and consideration for the next man, even tho he may be an opponent or rival.

There has always been athletics of some kind at Elmhurst, as there necessarily must be in any institution where so many healthy and active young men live together as one large family. Still athletics were restricted to interclass games or just games among the students themselves. No contests with teams from other schools in the vicinity were held. In the year 1902, however, a number of the students, after having obtained permission from the proper authorities, organized the Athletic Association of Elmhurst College. By means of annual dues from each member the necessary funds with which to purchase the necessary paraphernalia and outfitts for the different sports were raised. From this time on games and contests have been held with teams from other schools in the vicinity. At the time the association was organized only three branches of

athletics were represented at Elmhurst, namely soccer football, baseball, and track and field events. From time to time new sports were added so that now there are, besides those named above, basketball, rugby and tennis. Elmhurst has a fine record in all branches of athletics. Altho a comparatively small school and only an Academy and Junior College, Elmhurst is scheduling and holding contests in all branches of athletics with many of the full-fledged colleges and universities in the vicinity, and is making a good showing.


An attempt is made to get every student to take part in some form of athletics thru interclass games and games among the students themselves. Besides this, however, there are regular gymnasium classes in which every student must take part unless the house physician advises to the contrary. In these classes the students are drilled in marching, calesthenics, exercises with the indian clubs, dumb bells, wands and on the different apparatus, parallel bars, horizontal bar, horse and buck, ladder, and flying rings.

Entrance to College Campus







household sewing, mending garments for students, and performing such deeds of helpfulness which the House Committee may have in store for them.





Thus sang the Elmhurst Summer Training school students of the summer of 1915, 1916 and 1917. In their memory she stood, dear old Elmhurst College, with the familiar gymnasium, its dormitories and the great dining hall. No one ever forgot the beautiful campus, the whispering Elm and the big council fire. And yet, something was missing which E. S. T. S. enthusiasm was ready to supply.

"Why not present the College with a real flag pole from which 'Old Glory' might daily wave?"—someone said. "Old Glory hasn't a real chance at Elmhurst. It is true there is something like a flag pole on the administration building, but that doesn't do justice to Elmhurst College."

Hardly was the thought expressed and a letter mailed by the Sunday School Board to former E. S. T. S. students and the beautiful gift of the eighty-five foot steel flag pole was made. During the Summer School session of 1918 it was erected and with impressive ceremony dedicated and presented to the College. At the base of the pole there were placed, sealed in a metal tube, the names of the 219 donors.
