AN OLD TIMER.

1850.

The above is looking from Pleasant St. (at Dr. Sanborn's residence, formerly Whitmore,) towards Lynn or Salem. At the left will be noticed the land tub engine house, the old Marblehead, Thomas Webber, was the captain at the time. Mr. Elias Blaney doing business on Nicholson St., has a peg board for card playing in his possession, that came from the old house. At the extreme left is the old Joe Bassett house, which then stood where the Blallo building was. Probably one of the most interesting scenes is the old Shawmut, where the lads and lasses spent many a jolly evening, dancing on the hours. The reader will notice the tree, the Mugford monument now fills this space. Also the old Omnibus which in those days made two trips a day going and coming; Mr. Benjamin Pierce was the driver. We have in the place of the old bus, the Lynn and Boston Electric system. It is about safe to say that one can ride to nearly all parts of the globe in the electricies at the present time.

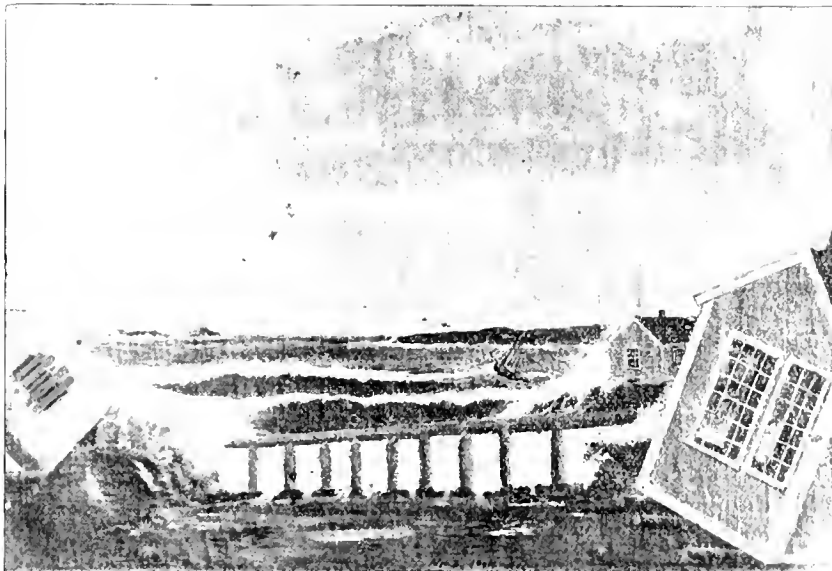

The Storm of Nov. 3d, 1852, when Minot's Ledge Was Washed Away.

At the terminus of the Lynn & Boston Electric Railroad is the scene above. The small lobster shop on the left was then looked after by Aaron Thompson, on the right by Peter Martin. A shoemaker's shop, managed by Benjamin Orne, stood at the extreme right. A huge wave, mountains high, struck the Thompson shop, completely demolishing it. A gang of fishermen were handy at the time, who procured rollers and moved the Martin shop far up the street. The buildings in this vicinity at the time were few and far between.

OLD HACKER.

At duty's call the "Eighth" did go,
Amid a drenehiug rain and snow;
Nobly they marched to live or die,
And "Hacker" was their rallying cry.

Railroad and bridges they repaired,
And on hard bread long time they fared;
And as each hardship was passed by
"Hacker" would be the rallying cry.

The road to Annapolis was secured;
Fatigue and hunger they endured;
Yet upward went their voices high,
And "Hacker" was their rally cry.

The "Constitution" did they save,
And took her out upon the wave—
Had rusty pork to grease their cracker,
But still their rallying cry was "Hacker."

Our far-famed capital was saved,
And nobly all the "Eighth" behaved;
They knew no fear, but onward rolled,
While the cry of "Hacker" ne'er grew old.

Old "Hacker" was a familiar name,
And in the Eighth he gained a fame;
For as each company went to dine,
On pans and plates they'd "Hacker" chime.
Aug. 13th, 1861.

The following is taken from the Essex
Register of June 4th, 1817:

Died, at Marblehead, on Friday last,
Capt. John Selman, aged 73, of apoplexy.
A man of great integrity, uncommon in-
dustry, and inflexible patriotism. He dis-
tinguished himself early in the American
Revolution, and was one of the first ad-
venturers upon the ocean. Of the two
schooners which first sailed for the gulf of
St. Lawrence, Capt. Selman commanded
the one and Capt. Broughton the other.
From the beginning, after the severest
losses and the greatest privations, he never
had a doubt of the duty he owed his coun-
try. In Marblehead he has been often one
of the selectmen and a representative of
the town, and he always behaved in a
faithful, conscientious and disinterested
manner in every trust reposed in him. In
the fishery he has been active, and was
well acquainted with all its concerns. In
private life he had the utmost confidence
and respect, and gave his presence and
favor to every useful and social and relig-
ious institution. He possessed a firm con-
stitution of body and mind and an ability
to endure the severest labors, and never
desisted till the last stroke took him at
once from life and usefulness. It seldom
comes to our lot to speak of a more valu-
able man, or more truly the opinion of all
our good citizens. He has left a worthy
family to feel this bereavement. The
funeral procession amply proved the inter-
est his fellow-citizens had in this event.

Two British Frigates chasing the Constitution into Marblehead
Harbor in 1814.

In the year 1814 John Goodwin of Marblehead was keeper of the light house at Marblehead Neck. In those days the yachting season was not up to the standard as it is today. Fort Sewall was then on the lookout for the enemy, should they happen to make their appearance. Signals were often passed between Keeper Goodwin, of the Lighthouse and the old fort. One day Mr. John Bailey of this town was standing at the flag staff of the old fort when he noticed something unusual in the vicinity of half way rock, he immediately gave the warning, and obtaining a glass found that it was the Constitution being chased into the harbor by two British Frigates. The time being Sunday, many people had availed themselves of the chance of attending meeting. While the church bells were ringing, the cannon at Fort Sewall boomed out a challenge to the Frigates either to show that they were hospitable or fight; the Jenon and Tenedos immediately hove to, and made themselves scarce. A good story is told in connection with a family getting the usual wash tub ready for Monday morning wash, the husband who was chopping wood in the yard at the time heard the signal from the fort, and in his excitement he threw the ax through the window which so frightened the wife that she fell into the tub it being full of water at the time. The party who is in years laughed heartily at the time, as she told the writer of the circumstance. It is said that the Constitution was disabled at the time, the two Frigates no doubt taking advantage of the fact.

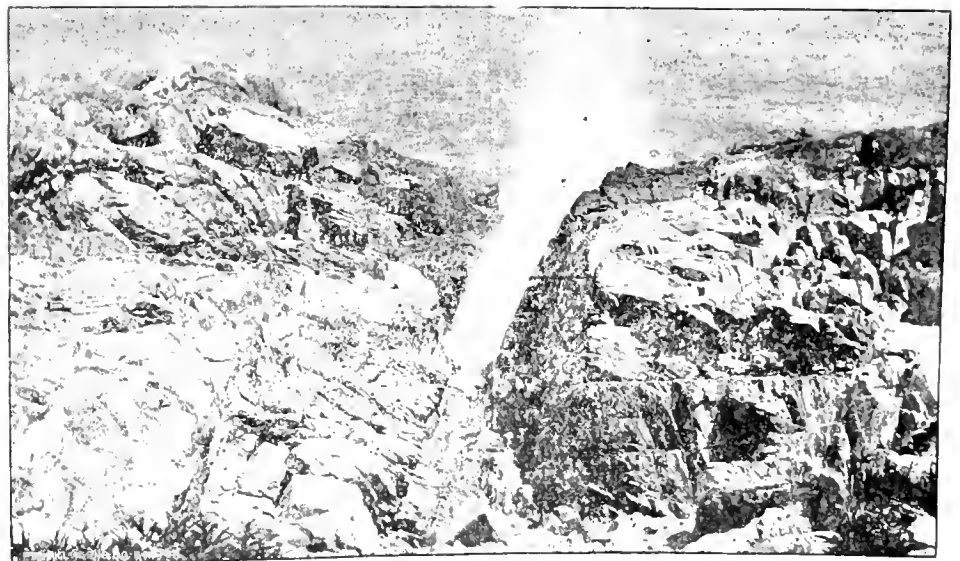
Road Leading to Naugus Head from the Three Sister Rocks on Green Street.

The following is a clipping from the Advocate of Feb. 16th, 1855, which will no doubt be of some interest to those who can remember the circumstance:

Friday afternoon, Feb. 16th, schooner Golden Rule, Capt. Welsh, of Gloucester, while coming from George's Banks, ran into Ipswich Bay in a thick fog, and anchored about a mile and a half from shore. Two of the crew, Thomas Doliver and Andrew C. Wadden, Jr., belonging to Marblehead, persuaded the captain to let them go ashore in the boat, taking with them a compass. Not returning, the captain became alarmed, but the fog was so thick he could do nothing to find them. He lay there until Saturday, when the fog lifted, and not being able to find either the boat or the men, he immediately sailed for Gloucester. Upon his arrival he started for Ipswich by land, where he ascertained that Wadden's body had been found on Plum Island. Doliver's body has never been recovered. It is thought that in nearing the shore they got into the surf before they were aware of it, and the boat upset. Circumstances go to show that Wadden swam ashore, and afterwards died from cold and exhaustion. He was a young man, of moral character, temperate habits, and of a cheerful disposition, upright in all his dealings. He was buried under arms in Marblehead by the Sutton Light Infantry, of which he was a member. Detachments of the Glover Light Guards and Lafayette Guards acted as pallbearers. The slow tread of the soldiers, the sound of the muffled drum and the shrill tones of the fife were very impressive. His funeral was attended by the Essex Engine Company and the Columbian Society, of each of which he was a member. His age was twenty-one years. Doliver's age was twenty-two.

Church Suppers.

Church suppers of all kinds have been the rage the last winter. In a certain town in this state one church has held a meeting and supper every two weeks. They have had everything—oyster supper, chicken supper, corn supper, turkey supper, pink teas, 5 o'clock teas, and others. At the church the other evening a meeting was held to see what the next supper was to be. After considerable parleying, they decided to have a milk supper. The committee was appointed and the work picked out for them. Some were to furnish this and some that. After the business was over they commenced to disperse, when the chairman of one committee announced that all the ladies who could give milk would please stay. After being counted they retired to their homes.

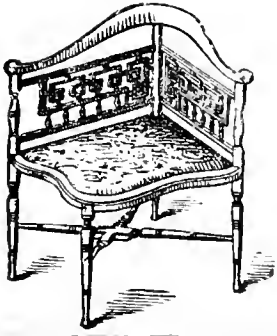

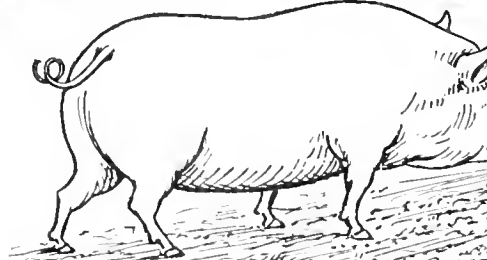

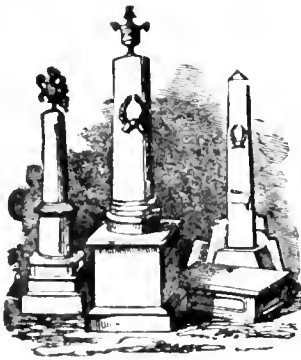

Notes of Interest.

April 12th, 1861, Fort Sumter was fired on.

In 1868 graves of soldiers decorated for the first time.

June 20th, 1865, reception to members of the 10th Mass. Battery.

Departure of Mugford Guards for the seat of war, June 24th. 1861.

Arrival home of three Marblehead companies from war. Aug. 1st, 1861.

Capt. Knott V. Martin leaves for seat of war, having recruited a company November, 1861.

April 15th, 1863, town appropriated \$4000 for the repair of Fort Sewall.

First horse cars to Lynn June 25th, 1884; first cars from Salem Aug. 18th, 1884; first horse cars from Franklin street Aug. 4th, 1885.

Second great fire Dec. 25th, 1888; loss, \$700,000 or thereabouts; 100 families rendered homeless and 2000 thrown out of employment.

Marblehead has one local newspaper, the Marblehead Messenger, and the famous Marblehead Cod, which is issued July 4th of each year, the price of which is 5c. a copy

June 25th, 1877, first great fire, destroying 76 buildings; loss, \$500,000. Ninety families made homeless and 2000 people thrown out of employment.

Bassett's Hall and Gen. Glover Engine House were destroyed by fire Jan. 29th, 1880. They were then located at the easterly end of the burned district.

The Darling House, on Darling street, and now owned by Alfred Aiken, and occupied by Aiken Bros., was built about 1775 by Ebenezer Martin, he being a cabinet maker. It is said without doubt that the first meeting the Methodists held in town took place in this building. Mr. Martin, returning from a trip to George's Banks, attended the meeting, with the crew.

The shore front, according to the information gained, was nearly up to where now stands the old bakehouse of Francis Boardman, on State street.

Would you go to a graveyard for humor? Hardly. An epitaph writer makes this bull: "Sacred to the memory of three twins of Mrs. Smith."

In a churchyard lies the body of the victim of a stage coach accident, with this epitaph on the tombstone:

"Weep, stranger, for the father spilled
From a stage coach, and thereby killed.

Slain with three other outside passengers."

Hallelujah, Hallelujee,
A-B-C-D-E-F-G!"

under call of President Lincoln for 75,000 mi-
litia.

April 25th, 1874, the Columbian Building was

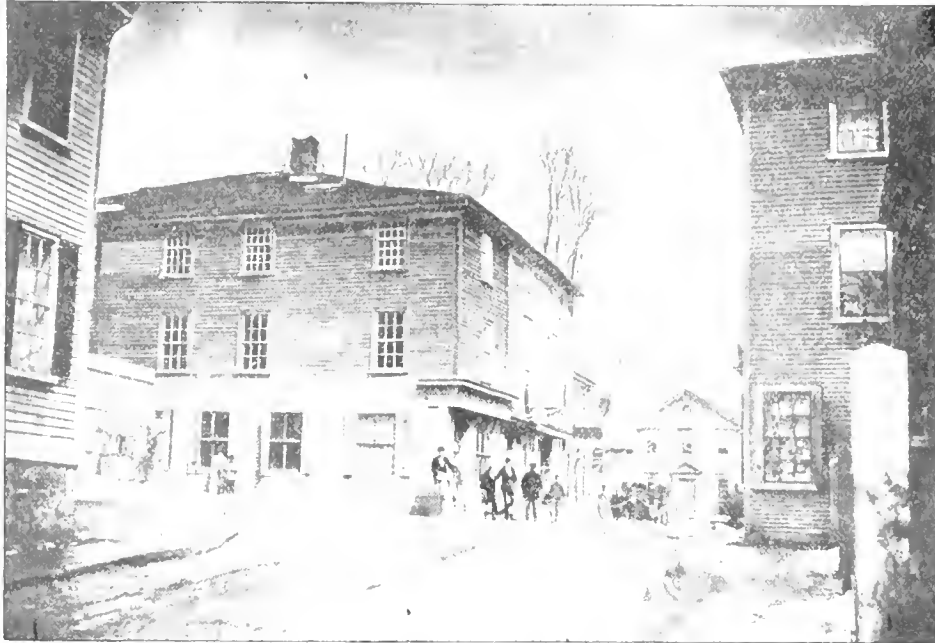

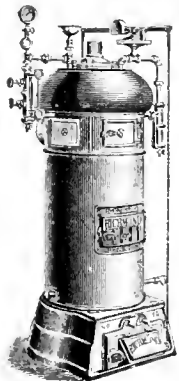

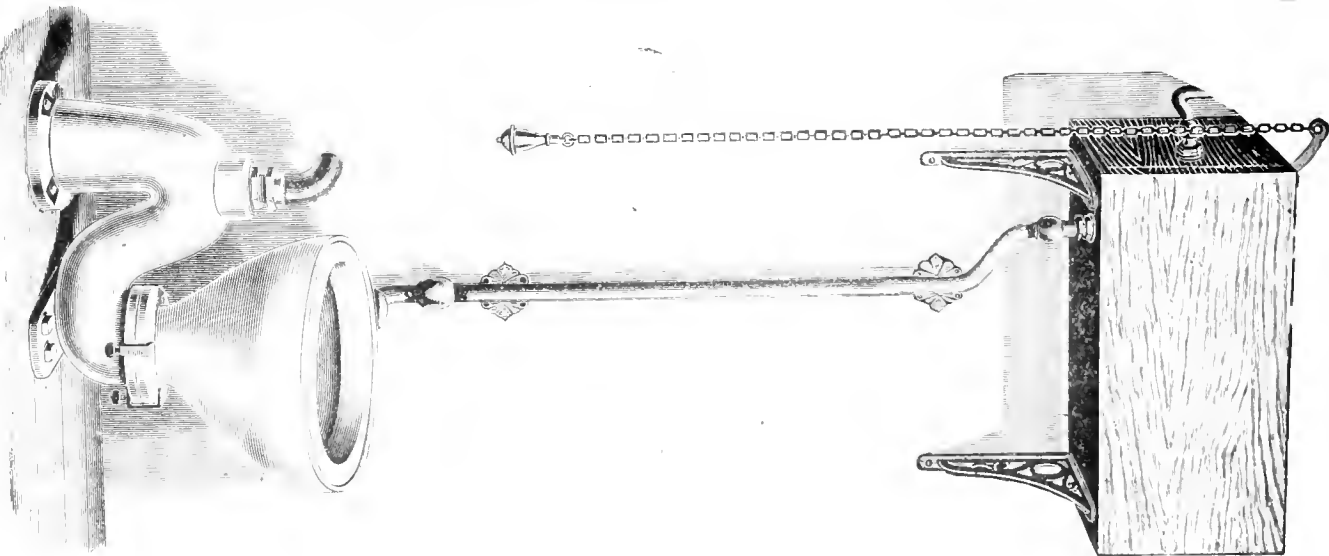

THE OLD HINKLEY BUILDING AS IT STOOD IN 1840.
The old Hinkley Building, of which many can remember, stood on the spot where now stands the Grader Building cor. of Pleasant and Washington Streets; at the left were stores kept by George Wetman and George Prime, the Young Men's Association and P. B. La-key, also have done business in the buildings. The Granite Post, which the reader will no doubt notice is at present at the Towns Farm, it serves as a head way to the house. Dr. Whittenore, who was a practicing physician in town at the time, left home one dark night to answer a sick call, he walked into the post, striking his knee pain. It is said that this was the immediate cause of his ill health, which shortened his days. The building opposite was then occupied by Harris Silver as Stove dealer and Tinsmith. Messrs. E. C. Doane and Harris Langley, grandson of Harris Silver do business in the building, at the present time, Mr. Doane as Stove dealer and plumber. Mr. Langley, Meats, Provisions, Etc.

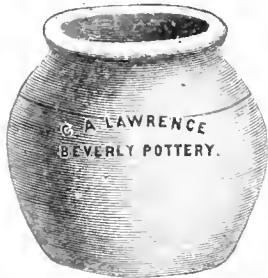

HOW TO BAKE BEVERLY BEANS.



Take one quart of beans, parboil them until skin cracks, or soak them over night, then add one pound of salt pork, or fat corned beef, one teaspoonful of mustard, one of molasses; bake them nine or ten hours.

The mustard and molasses is not necessary but preferred by many people.

Please do not use the water the beans were parboiled in, or soaked

in, for it will make the beans taste strong. Add more water if needed when baking.

N. B. A new bean pot should be put into cold water and boiled for two or three hours.

The First Depot.

On the page opposite the reader will notice the first depot that Marblehead was favored with. Mr. Stephen P. Hathaway was the first ticket-master, (now called station agent), serving from Dec. 1839 until the spring of 1849, when he resigned. Mr. Russell Bailey being appointed in his place and served until the time of his death, which was Oct. 28, 1848. Nov. 1st 1848, Benjamin Thompson was transferred from the Marblehead Branch train, being conductor at the time, serving until April 24th, 1869. Mr. John C. Adams was then appointed station agent and was held the position up to the present time. The trains from Marblehead to Salem in those days were few and far between, the last train to leave Marblehead for the Witch City was 2.15 P. M. returning at 5.15 P. M. This depot or shed was moved to the old freight yard on rollers up the track one Sunday in September. The old engine Tiger being utilized for the occasion. In those days many a good laugh was had about the old chimney on the engine house which run from the turn table. It was considered a remarkable size. Mr. John Harris was conductor and John C. Adams, now station agent, was the baggage master. No brakeman was employed on the train. On Nov. 2nd 1848 a torch light Parade was held in Salem, owing to some misunderstanding a collision took place between the down train from Boston and the special to Marblehead, the place being near the old Atlantic car works, (one track was used for both trains at that time). The killed were Henry G. Trefry, Samuel Manning, John Stevens, Nathaniel Roundey, John Cross and John C. Russell. Francis Courtis, Thomas Clothey, Edmund Glover and Asa Hooper were wounded. Mr. Benjamin F. Brown was maimed for life having both legs broken. Mr. Jeremiah Prescott was the general superintendent of the road, then the old eastern. D. W. Sanborn has now charge of the whole system which is styled the Boston & Maine.

This depot is a drawing by Lieut. Chas. H. Snow of this town, being furnished by the popular station agent Mr. John C. Adams, who has served in this capacity 25 years.

ABBOT HALL.

The ground for this building was broken in the spring of 1876, the corner stone being laid June 25th of the same year. It was a gift to the town by Mr. Benjamin Abbot, who was a cooper, doing business in Boston, he was born in Marblehead, 1793; his death occurred in September, 1872. The various town offices are held in this building. The cost was \$75,000.

EXPLANATION OF CAUTIONARY AND STORM SIGNALS.

A red flag with a white center, displayed at stations on the Great Lakes, indicates that the winds expected will not be so severe but well-founded, sea worthy vessels can meet them with out danger.

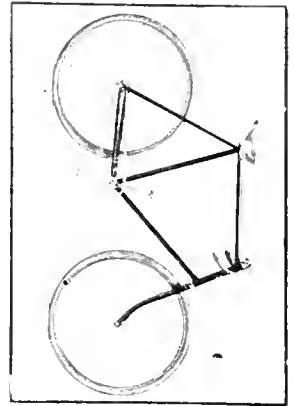
A red flag with a black center at stations either on the Lakes or on seaboard indicates that the storm is expected to be severe.

The pennants displayed with the flag indicate the direction of the wind; red, easterly from northeast to south; white, westerly from southwest to north. The pennant above the flag indicates that the wind is expected to blow from the northerly quadrant; below from the southerly quadrant.

The Information Signal consists of a red pennant, and indicates that the local observer has received information from the central office of a storm covering a limited area, dangerous only for vessels about to sail for certain points. The signal is intended to be a notification to shipmasters that valuable information will be given them upon application to the local observer.

By night a red light will indicate easterly winds and a white light above a red light will indicate westerly winds.

The system of weather, temperature, and rain signals displayed throughout the country is distinct from the cautionary and storm signals; the latter being principally for the information of mariners' interests, and are displayed at the principal ports of the Great Lakes, and on the Atlantic, Pacific, and Gulf coasts.

Notes of Interest.

The Bartlett house that stands between the Marblehead Messenger Office and the residence of Dr. J. J. Martin on Washington st. has certainly passed through a curious fate in regard to fires. The dates of the two great fires which Marblehead was so unfortunate to have, occurring June 25th, 1887, and Christmas night, Dec. 25th, 1888. We thought we would make a mention of this fact as this building stood the test of both when everything around it was burned to the ground.

The large tree on Washington st. opposite the grocery store of Winthrop Brown is said to be the first to bloom in town, and the last to lose its leaves.

It is claimed that Joseph W. Collyer was the youngest person to leave this town for the seat

of war. Mr. Collyer resides at the present time on Read's Hill and is a member of John Goodwin, Jr. Post 82, G. A. R., of Marblehead. He was in Co. B, 23rd Regiment. His age was 14 yrs., 6 mos.

We wish to take this space to thank Mrs. H. M. Sinclair of Salem for the Ode to Marblehead which can be found on page 3.

Edmund Chinn, Frank Rathburn, James Goodwin and James E. Brown enlisted in the first Mass. Regiment from this town and served until the close of the war. They were the first men to enlist for the call of troops from this town.

It didn't take an electric car to push this along. The business men pushed it.

After going to press, we were handed an interesting document which dated back some 80 years. On this account we were unable to use it. We will endeavor to, should we ever publish again.

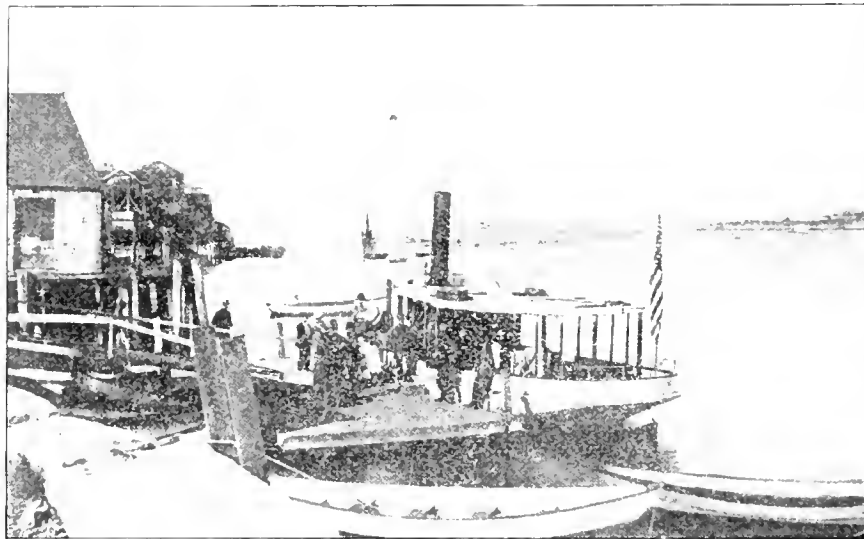
