


RON ENGLISH


Comments on SAC:

The St. Andrew's College Dramatic Society put on its first annual musical revue this year, the 1960s musical Godspell. It was a small cast, but it was enjoyed by all.




























Springfest 2001





















Housemaster Robert Giel says:

Mrs. Giel and myself will take away many fond memories of our five years in Mac House.








Housemaster Bob Perrier says:

Fall Term Athletic Assembly

Wednesday November 22, 2000

The school gathered to celebrate its sporting achievements for first term in Ketchum Auditorium. Here is Mr. Reid's speech:

"It is with great pleasure that I stand before today as we honour the accomplishments of our athletes and coaches from the fall term.

"Although I have only been at St. Andrew's a short while, I have already developed a deep sense of pride in the quality, integrity, and accomplishments of our athletes and coaches.

"While it is true that championships are always desireable, what is more desireable than winning championships is being a winner. Dr. David Chambers, former NHL coach and Director of Coaching Programs at York University, best describes what it truly means to be a winner.

Winner vs. Loser

- 1. When a winner makes a mistake, he says, "I was wrong"; when a loser makes a mistake, he says, "It wasn't my fault."
- 2 A winner credits good luck for winning, even though it isn't good luck. A loser blames bad luck for losing even though it isn't bad luck.
- A winnerworks harder than a loser and has more time; a loser is always too busy to do what is necessary.
- 4. A winner goes through a problem; a loser goes around it and never past it.
- 5. A winner shows he's sorry by making up for it; a loser says, "I'm sorry," but does the same thing the next time.
- A winner knows what to fight for, and what to compromise on; a loser compromises on what he shouldn't and fights for what isn't worthwhile fighting about.
- 7. A winner says, "I'm good, but not as good as I ought to be"; a loser says, "I'm not as bad as a lot of other people."
- 8. A winner would rather be admired than liked, although he would prefer both; a loser would rather be liked than admired, and is even willing to pay the price of mild contempt for it.
- A winner respects those who are superior to him, and tries to learn something from them; a loser resents those who are superior to him, and tries to find chinks in their armour.
- 10. A *winner* feels responsible for more than his job; a *loser* says, "I only work here."

11. A winner never quits! A quitter never wins!

"Lastly, if you all strive to be winners, in whatever you do, you will ultimately be Champions in Heart, Body, Mind, and Spirit. You will be a man of which the Andrean community can be proud."














Harry J. Addison Memorial Awards






Not too long after the defeat the young SAC team, many of whom are returning next year, set their sights on the upcoming season with an optimistic and enthusiastic view.












U16 Football

In the second half the Ridley offense managed only two first-downs - a spectacular defensive battle in which the red & white offense managed to get two touchdowns to ensure that we meet Appleby once again in the playoffs. The first ever U16 Football playoffs took place on a warm October 25th, and for the first half it looked as if the Saints were going to pull off an upset against Appleby. With a 14-7 lead at the half in what had been a brilliant demonstration of passing and rushing your Saints knew that they might have what was needed to go all the way. Appleby however were not to be denied and went back to the one part of their game that was working - the power ground attack. Driving up the middle for play after play they wore down both the clock and the red defense. By the middle of the fourth quarter they had produced four unanswered touchdowns - earned 5 yards at a time - and it seemed to be all over. A lovely quarterback draw saw Jeff Johnstone sprint 40 yard for the major score, then Adam Hoffman's short kickoff was recovered by Kyle Beatty, but it was not enough and your Saints bowed out 33-21, satisfied that they had been beaten by a bigger if not better team on the day. 



















Winter Term Athletic Assembly




U16 Hockey

Eighteen years is a long time between championships for the First Hockey team but the 2000-2001 Saints finally brought home the Conference of Independent Schools' Athletic Association trophy. The game was played in front of a packed house at Upper Canada College with the Saints earning a well-deserved 2-1 victory.


In the year in which the School decided to withdraw from the local York Region Athletic Association (thereby foregoing any chance at qualifying for the Ontario Provincial play-downs) the Saints compiled an impressive 11-4 regular season record in the tough C.I.S.A.A. schedule. Three of four defeats were at the hands of Upper Canada - the other against eventual semi-final opponent St. Michael's College School. S.A.C. won its best of three semi-final series against St. Mike's in two games posting victories of 6-0 and 3-1 and followed with a thrilling victory at UCC to capture the School's first Independent League championship since 1983. The team entered four tournaments to round out its schedule.

The Ridley College Early Bird Tournament is where the team truly came together as a unit playing inspired hockey and finishing in second place behind Culver Military Academy. At the start of the Christmas break the team travelled to Massachusetts

to compete in the Barber Tournament. Despite a lengthy 12-hour bus ride the Saints won their opening match vs. Thayer Academy in overtime. Unfortunately the team peaked too early losing its next two matches. The team redeemed itself with a strong showing at the Nichols Tournament going 2-1 in round-robin play with victories over Culver Military Academy and Pennsylvania-based LaSalle College Prep. The MacPherson was perhaps our best tournament showing. The team captured a bronze medal (en-route to a 4-1 record) in what is arguably the most competitive high school hockey tournament in Ontario.

On-ice leadership came from Captain Paul Perrier and alternates Adam O'Meara, Ross Marshall and Jack Popiel. First-year senior Jeff Ovens was instrumental in the team's success as were Grade 12 students Jimmy Healey and James Gideon. The loss of our six seniors will be felt next year but the team returns a solid core of players. This year's team had great character and played with intensity, intelligence and creativity throughout the season finishing our 36-game schedule with an overall record of 24-12. Best of luck to departing seniors Perrier, Ovens, O'Meara, Marshall, Popiel & Mancini.

Our league, the Ontario Fencing Association Challenge Circuit, operates all year at the Cadet, Junior, and Senior levels. This year we competed in 6 major competitions rather than our usual 8, because SAC's change in academic scheduling in December and January precluded our competing in the other two. We began our season at a Senior OCC at Ryerson University in September and another in Newmarket in October, where Kurt Schmick picked up a third place Bronze medal. 
1st Rugby



It began with considerable optimism because of the large number of returning players, including Captain Josh Delmas, Richard Khoury, Matt Fullerton, Scott Simmons, Jason McKenzie, Zoheb Saleem, John Patton, Dominic Sacher, Armughan Chisti and Warren Chang and a new group of dedicated players, including Tim

Thwaites, Mitch Myers, Ryan Foreman and Mark Robinson. It ended yesterday with a last over dramatic victory against Ridley with Mitch Myers and Ryan Foreman providing the winning runs. With the win, the team's 5th in a row and 10th victory in the last 11 matches, S.A.C. claimed its second consecutive CISAA Championship.

Somewhat like baseball, a Cricket team needs "pitchers, aka bowlers and batters". S.A.C. was blessed this season with numerous bowlers who stymied the oppositions' strongest batters. Zoheb Saleem claimed the most wickets, 17, while Warren Chang, Armughan Chisti, Tim Thwaites, Josh Delmas, and Matt Fullerton did their part as well, taking a combined 37 wickets.

In terms of batting, the story is quite simple. Without our version of Carlos Delgado, we would not have been "in the running" this season. The most

challenging responsibility for a Cricket batsman is to "open", which means facing the best and fastest bowlers on the opposing team. Scott Simmons individual match scores were against UCC -56 runs not out, and 37 runs caught out, against Ridley 36 & 12 runs bowled out, against TCS 36 runs & 3 runs LBW bowled out. These scores represent 196 runs or 28% of the entire team batting total. His two half-centuries are a considerable achievement because of the poor weather conditions he played in and the unevenness of the wickets. Undoubtedly, he is one of the finest batsman ever to represent S.A.C. in Cricket.

Other strong batting performances were given by Armughan Chisti, the team's other opener, Jason McKenzie, Josh Delmas, Matt Fullerton, Warren Chang, Mitch Myers and Ryan Foreman. The most improved player award could go to two or three individuals who played key roles in the team's success, but upon careful comparison of last year's and this year's statistics, it is clearthat Jason McKenzie is this season's MIP.



"Yet to all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God."






Senior Debating Society

The last thirty-five years have seen Rupert Ray bestride St. Andrew's College, stamping his voluble imprint on so many aspects of school life.

Among the independent schools we are unique in our Scottish factor. When Lloyd MacPherson retired in the early eighties Rupert inherited the tam, spending countless hours organizing the clans and counting points for the Hockin & Housser trophies. Who can forget him on St. Andrew's Night? Bedizened in jabot and claybeg, yellow stockinged and cross-gartered, he would address the haggis in Robbie Burns Gaelic before hacking it to gleeful death.

In preVCR days he led a stimulating Sunday night film club, shipping movies up from Toronto at a rental of over \$100. He managed parcheesi competitions during his thousand hours on Mac House duty, and ran the backgammon club. He coached the junior soccer teams and led them into battle in the national tournaments across the country. After a sabbatical year at Indiana U he returned as a Hoosier aficionado and always regretted he was too busy to coach the firsts. He was make-up chief for a succession of school plays and musicals. The list goes on. Outside the school he has been an Elder of Aurora United Church

for many years, chairing various committees, and he showed his acting skills in plays like Private Lives and The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie.

For he was always intent on the academic and personal development of the Andreans in his care. He led morning chapel with clear authority, spreading the Christian message while inspiring boys of different faiths. He spent a myriad hours in Room 32. A skilled and articulate teacher of English, he celebrated the troubles of the Ancient Mariner and Malvolio and opened the doors to Biblical mysteries. His room was a community with all students taking their parts, often marking each other's work. After the last period the room stayed busy as Rupert guided individuals towards essay success. He combined diligence with a wonderful sympathy as counsellor and confidant: a host of boys chose him as their tutor/advisor, many retaining this friendship after graduation.

This abiding helpfulness was the key to Rupert's proprietorial success as Head of Debating, a most labor-intensive responsibility for every team comprises different personnel and the debating season never closes. Public speaking is reckoned to be our most prevalent phobia, yet Rupert persuaded dozens of boys every year to speak out on school teams travelling across the country and even to Bermuda. He has promoted the art as Director of both the Ontario and Canadian Debating Unions, and last year he was honored as Head Coach of the Canadian team at the World Championship in Johannesburg.

All Andreans know that Rupert is a man of many words. Just as Nature abhors a vacuum, he hates a white page. On a report card some years ago he covered nine lines with his English comment, ending with an asterisk to indicate "letter to follow." One day he will follow Peter Ustinov's famous dictum that everything would be better for being shorter!

The Ray family will be missed on campus. Many Andreans have appreciated Kay's perceptive tutoring, while the beautiful daughters Jessica and Amanda are already set on their own careers. Health and blessing to them all! Rupert is prospecting his options – calligraphy at Ryerson is a possibility until the next world championship in Singapore in January 2002. He has a library of thousands of books to read and recordings to hear, with a hundred friends to cultivate by internet magic.

Congratulations to all ranks for one of our finest years and best wishes for an enjoyable and productive summer.









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































Never Will I Forget



HEADMASTER'S PRIZE DAY SPEECH JUNE 2001

I would like to dedicate my address today to Mrs. Robyn Magee, an exceptionally dedicated member of the Ladies' Guild Executive, who is courageously battling the effects of multiple serious injuries suffered in a recent automobile accident. We wish she was here today to celebrate with us the graduation of her son, Dustin. We send to her our best wishes and our prayers for a speedy recovery.

Mr. Chairman; the Mayor of Aurora, Mr. Tim Jones; Ladies and Gentlemen: It is my pleasure to welcome all our guests to this 102nd Prize Day at St. Andrew's College. This must be one of the largest gatherings in the history of the School. We are very appreciative of the fact that many parents have travelled a long way and made a considerable effort to be with their sons on this special occasion.

I would like to focus my remarks today on three important issues.

The first is the theme of this school year which has been "integrity".

Usually defined as "uprightness of character", or, a "just, frank and kindly heart", as the famous French playwright, Moliere, put it, integrity, has been a unifying force in all school activities this year. From the Opening Academic Assembly on through to today, the Faculty in both the Middle and Upper Schools have encouraged the boys to respect the three elements of the School's Honour Code; personal honesty and truthfulness; academic integrity and respect for the person and property of others.

I believe we have made considerable progress. In virtually every area of School life, the boys have held true to this principle and acquitted themselves well. We would not have had such a good year without the strong leadership skills displayed by the Prefects. Integrity is the linchpin of leadership. Led by Head Prefect Mike Craig, this outstanding group of young men impressed everyone who came in contact with them. They represented the student body admirably

and maintained the highest standards of

personal integrity.

The Graduating Class of 2001, who we honour today, have also been superb role models for the younger students and set a very high standard of personal conduct - with the possible exception of the new Club Link course they established a few weeks ago in Dunlap Hall! Obviously, others share my confidence in their character. Collectively, the class has received 274 offers to Ontario universities; 22 offers to other provincial universities; 33 offers to U.S. colleges and 4 offers to universities in the U.K. They have been offered a total of \$1,200,000 in scholarship and bursary awards. This total includes Entrance, Scholar and Distinction scholarships; some of the major winners - the Chancellor's Scholarship at Queen's University won by Andrew Flavelle Martin; the Millennium Scholarship awarded by the Federal Government won by

Michael Craig; the Descartes Scholarship at the University of Waterloo won by Chris Chui; and significant all-round scholarships were won by Paul Perrier, to State University of N.Y. at Oswego and Ali and Olivier Manigat to Columbia University.

Other exceptional academic achievements by members of this class include:

Jonathan Cheng's Advanced Placement International Diploma - never before won by an S.A.C. student for his outstanding grades on four AP exams. Cameron Steed, Michael Campbell and John Lyons finished in 1st place in the 9th Annual Canadian National Conservation Video Contest on Climate Change. Their technical and performance quality, creativity and factual content separated them from 80 other national submissions. Jon Cheng and Andrew Flavelle Martin have been awarded National Biology Scholar certificates for their scores in the $University \, of \, Toronto's \, National \, Biology \, Competition. \,\, Chris \, Chui \, and \, Roger \, Chau$ have been awarded University of Toronto's 'da Vinci' Engineering Contest Scholar certificates. The first-ever S.A.C. Robotics Team would never have finished in the top 10 out of 35 schools and 1st among new entrants, without the commitment and expertise of members of this graduating class. Danny Mak, Chris Chui, Roger Chau, Jonathan Cheng and David Zhou finished 15th out of 238 schools in the Canadian Mathematics League, sponsored by the University of Windsor. This marks the 9th time in the last 11 years that S.A.C. has finished in the top 20. In the Descartes Contest, our team of Joshua Lim, Vincent Leung and Kenneth King ranked 18th nationally out of 631 teams. Josh Lim, our top scorer ranked 697th out of 10,000 students. Just in from the University of Waterloo Sir Isaac Newton Physics contest is Chris Chui's 62nd place out of 3,663 entrants. A very impressive list of academic achievements gentlemen; congratulations.

On the diplomatic front, Jackson Lau, represented S.A.C. at The Forum for Young Canadians and Josh Kelson and Jason Wong performed the same function at The National Commonwealth Forum in Ottawa.

Exceptional contributions to various areas of school life were made by Devon Ajram (Bagpipes);

Warren Lowe and Austin Ball (Drama); Jason Wong, Gord Birkett and Andrew Flavelle Martin (Cadets); Dustin McGee (music); Richard Khoury (art); and David Richardson, Jackson Lau, Charles Long, Kurt Schmick, Kenneth King, and Tom Haney (House leadership)

> Other academic highlights of the year include the extraordinary achievement of our DECA team (Distributive Educational Club of America) winning 1st place in the Ontario Championships and then a Bronze Medal at the DECA Quiz Bowl competition in Anaheim, CA. Coached by Mr. Rob Giel, our team of Kevin Fullerton, Jeff Ginou, Patrick Harris and John Lyons competed against 48 teams.

As you know, our boys excel in more areas than just academics. CISAA Championships were won at the First Team level by our Hockey, Badminton and Cricket teams. Led by Sammy Lam who won his 5th straight OFSAA A-Flight gold medal, First Badminton also won the York Region Championship. Other S.A.C. championship teams include U-15 and U-12 Soccer; U-14 Volleyball; U-16 Hockey; U-16 Squash; and U-16 Rugby.

Individually, our athletes received con-

siderable media coverage. Jimmy Healy, Tyler Hurst and Paul Perrier in hockey; Peter Vogel in swimming; Sam Lam in badminton; JP Suddaby in track Charles-Etienne Bergeron in air rifle; Scott Simmons and Josh Delmas in cricket and Kurt Schmick in fencing.





The second issue that I wish to mention is the uniqueness of this school year in terms of the amount of 'inspection' and 'introspection' which occurred. St. Andrew's was thoroughly inspected in October by the Ministry of Education for Ontario; our academic records were scrutinized by the Fraser Institute for the National Post's Secondary School Report Card feature story and a comprehensive Parent Satisfaction Survey was conducted by a consulting firm. I am pleased to report that we came through all evaluations with 'flying colours'. In fact, your overwhelming support on the Parents' Satisfaction Survey — a 4.2 ranking out of 5 — the highest score from other surveyed schools being a 4.3 — has insured my employment for another year!

In terms of introspection, four important reports were prepared by Faculty Task Forces on areas vital to the School's future; the Double Cohort of 2003; Residential Life; Recruitment and Marketing and the Advisor Program. The recommendations from these reports will constitute to a large extent the School's Strategic Agenda for the next few years. I would like to thank sincerely the members of these committees for their tremendous contribution to the future success of St. Andrew's College.

The Campus Master Plan, which the Chairman has already alluded to, is a very exciting document which deals comprehensively with the need for new academic buildings and the upgrade of existing facilities. The plan, which responds to the new ministry curriculum requirements provides for the addition of a new Middle School building, a new Atrium space at the heart of the campus, renovations to Ketchum Auditorium, as a first class drama and music facility and the conversion of Dunlap Gym to a two-story art facility. St. Andrew's campus, already one of the most beautiful in Canada, will be greatly enhanced as a result of these changes. I am most grateful to the Board of Governors, Trustees

of the S.A.C. Foundation and friends of the School who, over the past twelve months, have demonstrated their strong financial backing for these ambitious

The third and last issue I wish to address today is the issue of a vision for St. Andrew's College. Doing the right things for the School, implies a goal, a direction, an objective, a dream, a vision. We, at St. Andrew's feel, we have created a compelling vision for the future which will stimulate, guide and nurture our students in this era of profound transformation. We hope that you will support this vision as it begins to unfold in the months to come.

Mrs. Helen Younder is leaving the Health Centre after 16 years as Assistant Nurse. She will be accompanying her husband, Joe, who many of


you know, to Italy where Joe will teach English at the Canadian College Italy. Thank you, Helen, for your dedication to the health of our students and best of luck.
