The 1978 First Football Team must be ranked as one of the best all-round teams ever produced at St. Andrew's. Blessed with outstanding running, fine passing, excellent receivers, and a solid defense, St. Andrew's was not seriously extended in any of its league games.

The offense, led by the running of Greg Baun with nineteen touchdowns, and the equally adept ball carrying of Dave Calverley was never seriously challenged in any game. When the opposing team massed to try to stop the run, quarterback Geoff Scott passed to our receivers Mike Sifton, John Bailey, Paul Devillers and Phil Marsland.

Much credit must be given to our fine offensive line led by three year veteran John Pitts at guard ably aided by Jerry Johnston. Mike Edwards at centre and Peter Moreira and Geoff Hall at the tackles.

With the offensive averaging five touchdowns a game, our defensive team might have relaxed, but showing great pride and toughness, they allowed but twenty three points in five league games. The two touchdowns were both given up late in the fourth quarters. This fine unit was led by veterans Ron Schmidt, Joe Heit, Lindsay Errington, Steve

Bagworth, Tim Horton, Dave Johns, and Gary Hatt.
Many other players contributed greatly to our success such as George Edwards, a fine receiver, Dave Cudmore, injured in our first game, and Scott Rowntree, out for the season with a knee injury after catching two touchdown passes in his first game as a tight end.

Underclassmen, too numerous to mention, also played an important part in our championship march. I expect them to lead us to victory next year.
The coaches cannot go without mention. Linecoach Aubrey Foy did an outstanding job in replacing Jack Mulchinock, who returned to help us out all season long. Brian Eyers, our fine quarterback on the undefeated 1975 team, came back and worked with our offensive backfield. These men helped mold an outstanding group of players into champions.

A coach seldom has the opportunity to work with the type of young man St. Andrew's was blessed with this year. In twenty seven years of coaching. I don't think I have enjoyed a season more.

The opening game against Ridley was a great disappointment for us, but it did seem to bind the team together. In our first encounter with U.C.C., the defense controlled the game to the point where two defensive touchdowns were scored. The offense also came into their own by being able to move the ball at their will.

The final two games were critical since we had to win both to become sole champions. We had lost our first and only game to Ridley by only two points and therefore had two reasons to win. This game was one of the most demanding since the opposition had the advantage of home field, and as well had won in the first game against us. Every member of the team was tested, but we all passed as scholars with a final score of Ridley 10, S.A.C. 22.

In our final encounter with T.C.S., we realized the all or nothing nature of this particular game. If we were to lose this game, we would end up as cochampions with both Ridley and T.C.S. In a decisive victory of 33 to 6 , we became the Second Football champions for four straight years!

## VOLLEYBALL

This year was the first that St. Andrew's has had a competitive volleyball team. As originally planned, we met with our rookie coach: Mr. Wilkie. Going into the final week of I.S.L. play in early March, prospects were not bright for St. Andrew's to win an unprecedented fourth consecutive First Hockey title. In order to accomplish this, S.A.C. had to defeat U.C.C. and Lakefield and had to rely on Ridley upsetting Coach Proctor's Blues. Ridley came through on the Tuesday of the final week with a 6-5 decision over U.C.C., setting the stage for Saturday's big game at Aurora between S.A.C. and U.C.C. Inspired by an enthusiastic home crowd, the Saints came up with their finest effort of the year as they blanked a very fine Upper Canada team 3-0. Two days later in another "Must Win"' situation, we edged a greatly improved Lakefield team 4-3 thus retaining the Jim Wright Trophy by a one point margin over Upper Canada and Nichols. In overall I.S.L. play, the team record was 11-2-1; the losses coming at the hands of U.C.C. and Nichols, and the tie coming against St. George's.

In Georgian Bay play, once again it was St. Andrew's and Almaguin in a best of three series with S.A.C. winning in two straight games. In the Ontario Senior playdowns, we were eliminated by Kitchener's Grand River High School, an exceptionally fine all-round team that went on to win the All-Ontario title.

In tournament play, the Firsts were runners-up in the U.C.C. and the Lawrenceville tournaments while at the Loyola of Montreal tournament, we were eliminated by the host team in the second round.

This 1978-79 First Hockey team was basically a veteran team and these veterans demonstrated real leadership and inspiration throughout the year. Some experts will tell you that goaltending is $75 \%$ of hockey - Dave Calverley gave credence to this theory not only this year, but all through his four years with the First team. He is a truly gifted athlete and his value to the team was
acknowledged by his election as Most Valuable Player for 1978-79. Captain Greg Baun and Assistant Captains Dave Johns and Paul Bedard all had fine seasons and, what is equally important, performed their duties in a very valuable and a very real way. our late season surge to the title, and finally Jack Stanborough who had the unenviable job of being back-up to Dave Calverley but who was an integral part of this team through his loyalty and dedication.

Next year should be a rebuilding year, but the nucleus is solid - Ken Marshall, Ed Parker (who will be playing his fourth year), John Sedgewick, Dave Plaxton (who has completed two years at First team level), Alex Robertson, and Jamie Willoughby (M.I.P.) should all be returning. These and the addition of several promising members of the Seconds and possibly one or two from Mr. Stuart's competitive team. Everyone connected with First Hockey during the past two years hopes that Manager Mike Nutbeem will continue with these duties for another year. Mike, along with Official Scorer Blair Hadley did another exceptional job this season.

Tennis is on the bounce, and this was the strongest team ever fielded (courted?) by SAC. The actual scores are deceptive, for in several matches we sat (set?) out one or two of our best players in the interests of keener competition. The only school to come close to us was UCC; we lost to them 3-4 in a league match, and then tied them 2-2 in the final tournament.

In the ISL Semifinals we scored a maximum 12 points; in the Finals, which we had to host at Mayfair West because of rain, we scored nine out of a possible twelve just like last year - and just like last year UCC sneaked in with ten.
At \#1 Paul Bedard was very powerful and tenacious. Down 3-7 to UCC's Robert Gordon in the final match, he fought back to $8-8$, only to lose the tie-breaker 5-7. He and Steve Dewis at \#2 have set a lofty standard for the last three years, losing only ten sets in that time against all comers.

Below these two, the ebullient John Sedgewick dashed round the court, improving every match; Bernie Ruhl used his reach to advantage - they
beat the UCC pair 9-8 on a tie-breaker. Scott Mortimer showed many winning shots; Michael Bedard had the best record of all (16-2); Bruce Bayley with a bit more zest would be unbeatable; and Brian Eby was the MIP, playing a steady, stylish game.

Over a dozen players turned out for the second team, producing many shots but not many victories. Next year we will have to fix the team early and practise to produce some winning pairs. Arnie Cargill showed real potential; Kris Bickenbach was lethal at the net; Jeff Long and Doug Cooper wielded mean if erratic racquets; and the old firm of Kirk and Mark have seen valient service over the years.
And on the rise are some keen juniors: Dave Dunkleman, Brad Gilliland, John Tyner, Brooke Bell and Rob Shanks. These will be winning sets in the future.

The story of this year's Track and Field season is one of startling performances and painful reversals.

Only 25 athletes made up the "squad" and inspite of the "superstars", we slipped to 4th place in the ISAA competition and remained 2 nd in the Georgian Bay meet.

Individual efforts of note include an 8.54 in the 3000 meteres and a 6.12 in the 2000 m . steeplechase (both records) by Murray McEachern a 50.8 in the 400 m . by Colin Earle, a 4.14 in the 1500 by Graham Hatt, a 14.10 metre in the shot by Paul Bedard and a 45 m in the Javelin by Lindsay Errington.

A shade off the above include Sid Karalis' 51.5 in the 400 , Tim Houlton's victories and in the 800 m and the 1500 m , Stu Pound's sprints and Mitchell Zuckerman's high jumps.

Awards for best overall performances in the SAC Track and Field day went to John Bailey, Tim Houlton, John Tyner and Philip Lovell.

Our thanks to the many masters who helped at our various meets and a special word for Mr . Lunn whose support was invaluable.

The Senior Debating Society
Owing to the election of a strong executive this year, the Senior Debating Society operated efficiently under the auspices of the following people:

Peter Moreira, President; Ron Schmidt, Speaker; Kirk Brierley, Deputy Speaker; Chris Wong, Secretary; Rob Hepburn, Interhouse debating; Jerry Johnston, Sergeant-at-Arms; Mike Sourial, Playing-coach.

Following a narrow defeat at the hands of Havergal on their home ground, we placed very respectably at the St. Clement's tournament.

At the first Fulford Trophy Tournament of the year, held at Appleby College in November, we learned that we should prepare ourselves better for the new Fulford format. Another defeat inflicted upon us at home in December by three splendid Branksome debaters further convinced us that we must look to our laurels and do our homework. At the second Fulford tournament held at T.C.S. in early January, Mike Sourial distinguished himself by being chosen best debater, but we were only able to finish fourth in the tournament.

We made a creditable showing at Lawrence Park's first-ever tournament and then a return match with Havergal yielded us a victory that raised our spirits appreciably.

At Ashbury College, Mike Sourial was again acclaimed best debater in a controversial debate apparently won by both teams! (Only Stephen Leacock could resolve this issue!)

After a very respectable performance at the Havergal tournament we entered the MetroToronto Regional finals.

Mike Sourial was named to the championship team that contested the Provincial finals held at the University of Western Ontario at the end of March. There Mike was chosen top debater in Ontario and proclaimed Captain of the Ontario team destined to compete at the National finals to be held at St. John, New Brunswick in May. As Ontario's Captain he was named custodian for
one year of the prestigious "Debating Sword of Ontario." presented each year to the Ontario team by Trent University. At the National finals Mike finished second, one point behind the eventual winner from New Brunswick. In another photofinish, his Ontario team also finished second.

The third and final Fulford Trophy tournament was hosted by St. Andrew's on April 21. Our senior team, consisting of Derek Apple, John Mortimer, Fred Omstead and Jack Stanborough won the tournament for S.A.C. and retrieved for us our own Invitational Trophy.

Early in May, Doug Crawford and Mark Oliver represented us with distinction at the Upper Canada College International Debating Tournament. While they were not the eventual winners, they brought much credit to themselves and the school.

At our tournament (or so legend has it) Branksome's three "flowers of the forest" - two Carolyns and a Mirabel - challenged our three gallants - Jack, John and Mike - to "a great debate' to be held at St. Andrew's in late May. Probably the best attended and most exciting debate held at S.A.C. in years, it ended in a very narrow victory for the home side. (Those of us that are gentlemen would have declared it a draw).

All in all, it has been a stimulating year in debating and with returning veterans supplemented by able juniors cum seniors groomed by Mr. Ray and Mr. Robinson, we should fare well next year. Thank God for Mr. Ray and Mr. Robinson!

Needless to say, Mike Sourial won the Brooks Cup and Peter Moreira the President's prize. To the splendid debaters of Upper Canada College we offer our heartiest congratulations. Under the tutelage of their celebrated coach, Mr. Marshall Webb and with the inspirational leadership provided by their President, Mark Yakabuski, they most deservedly won the Fulford Trophy.

As usual Junior Debating provided a valuable experience and a challenging outlet for a good many boys. As a result of last year's pilot tournament, the Fulford Cup league embarked on a new structure of competition which proved to be rewarding for the Juniors as well. There were three major tournaments at which all eight schools were represented by teams of four junior debaters as well as the four seniors. The theme topic of each tournament was the same at both levels enabling boys to work together as never before. For the first time it was established that junior eligibility should include not only those in grades up to grade ten as in the past, but also novice grade elevens. This was a constructive move enabling many grade elevens "to get their feet wet" in debating without being plunged into the deeper, more intimidating senior waters. In addition we enjoyed having teams from the various girls' schools come to visit us for friendly competition, and for the first time Mr. Ray sponsored an extensive program of clan debating within the school for boys in grades seven to nine.

The first major tournament was held at Appleby College and discussion centred on whether Canada needs the Queen. Our junior team consisting of Mike Ogryzlo, Paul Stanborough, Steve Suarez and Andrew Wilson had a dry-run the week before against St. Clement's when they argued over whether fat is beautiful! The teams that night consisted of members of both schools mixed together and this added to the fun. At Appleby itself our Juniors did very well indeed placing three of our four contestants in the top twelve overall, with specially high scores going to Steve Suarez. My thanks to Mr. Robinson for preparing and sponsoring this team while I was at another seminar being held on that same day. Towards the end of the first term S.A.C. opposed the Branksome Hall resolution that dogs are better than cats. A team consisting of Steve Ardill, Kevin Freer and Clive Rowe - the latter in grade seven and a bright hope for the future - were successful in their mission.

Early in January, when weather conditions were anything but clement, we struggled down to T.C.S. for the second major tournament. The central resolution was challenging for the juniors, that technology is a threat to the freedom of the individual; however, they received valuable advice and material from our senior team under the leadership of Mike Sourial. The team consisted of Angus Elliott, Dave Matheson, Jeff Long and Bernie Ruhl. The latter individual, who was
hardest to cajole into participating, ended up garnering the highest scores of anyone on our team. This time we had a back-up man in Albert Harding, who travelled with us expecting to be an interested spectator, but who found himself a part of the Appleby senior team when one of their members had to be taken to hospital with appendicitis. Albert acquitted himself well. Later that term another team of grade elevens accepted a challenge from Havergal to defend the resolution that Newton is more important than Shakespeare. The team consisted of Warren Stoddart, Dave Lawrence and Andrew Gregg with Harry Stroud as back-up man. Our formal presentations were most persuasive, but we lost a close decision on the grounds that the less experienced members did not do enough rebutting. Only team leader Warren Stoddart proved himself capable in this crucial aspect of debating.

The focal point of term three was both participating in and hosting the final tournament of the year. The resolution put forward by our senior debating society was that television is detrimental to the wellbeing of youth, and representing S.A.C. at the junior level were Steve Ardill, Andrew Harman, Chris Ives and Terry Webb. Our team did very well indeed standing second from the top with special plaudits to Terry Webb. Back-up man on this occasion was Willy Zeiger. Our thanks to the many boys who helped to make the day such a tremendous success. Our enjoyment as juniors was hardly diminished by seeing our senior team come out on top, and be seeing another S.A.C. boy presented with the sword as best debater in Ontario. We have much to be proud of. In interclan competition at the MacDonald House level, two clans established their superiority after one complete round-robin series of debates during the spring term: Wallace and Montrose. The latter was ably organized by Steve Suarez and it was my pleasure after consultation with Mr. Robinson, to select Steve as the first winner of the new Brian Mitchell prize to be awarded annually from now on to the top junior debater of the year. My thanks to all those who took part in junior debating this year. We discovered some really promising talent in the lower echelons of the school which should stand us in good stead for the future. In as much as I shall be away on sabbatical leave next year, I pass on the torch of junior debating to Mr. Robinson and to many enthusiastic lads knowing they will hold it high.

Now all here who met her have a special interest in her works, and we eagerly await her next novel. What is it about? This was the one question she refused to answer. A most invigorating visit!

## MARGARET LAURENCE

## END OF THE LINE FOR FILM SOCIETY?

In an interview after school on Tuesday with our reporter Scott Hadley, Mr. Ray - who has been sponsor and advisor to our film society for the last twelve of its fifteen year existence - discussed the critical situation facing it at present. The problem quite simply is this: can the society continue to pay its own way?

Throughout its history it has made available to interested students each year a varied program of films representing the range and history of the world's cinema. Despite unusual and attractive programs, it must be conceded that over the past three years or so there has been a slow but steady erosion of popular support. As a supplement to the school's cultural life and as a way of filling in dreary Sunday evenings after chapel, it has always drawn enough members whose fees would enable Mr. Ray to book during the preceding summer a season of about ten feature films, and for the society to remain financially self-supporting. At this point fewer students than ever before have expressed a desire to become members and the film society is faced with a shortfall of more than $\$ 150$.

It might be useful to examine this year's statistics. Right now there are 99 members; the highest membership ever recorded in one year was about 140 and the number necessary at today's prices to break even according to Mr. Ray is about 120. This year then: Grade ten: 26 members or about $50 \%$ of the available boarders; Grade eleven: 40 members or close to $80 \%$; Grade 12: 24 members or just over $40 \%$ and Grade 13:9 members or less than $20 \%$. The two areas in which there has been a real drop-off are Grade 10 where membership usually proves very popular and Grade 13.
It $v$ ould seem that there are several alternatives open to us in order to resolve this problem. Number one, we might increase the cost of membership by another $\$ 1.50$ per person, but Mr. Ray refuses to do this. Number two, we could cancel one or two films, but understandably the membership is reluctant to do this either. Number three, we could look to the Headmaster for a donation from the school's already over-extended budget. Although some support might be forthcoming, we would sooner not have to ask for help. Number four, we could come up with another couple of dozen members. Film Society isn't for everyone certainly, but it could be that there are boys who just didn't bother to join up to now, but who would happily do so on second thought.

Last Sunday after the showing of an amusing colourful musical comedy, SINGIN' IN THE RAIN, about twenty concerned members met with Mr. Ray to discuss the situation. Why the drop-off? There are a number of conditions, not all of them easy to alleviate. There are now more activities functioning in direct competition with film society for your

Sunday night support: football home movies, the World Series on television, and test/term paper pressure on students who have more and more often been away from the school all weekend. Secondly, it was suggested that we had become too slack on door checks for membership cards. A significant number of boys apparently feel that they can sneak in for the couple of films each year that they badly want to see without the expense of joining. In fairness to those who have become full members in good faith, we will attempt to discourage this practice. The rule of thumb at the door of the Science Lecture Hall from now on will be what the Chinese laundryman said to his customers' '"No tickee - no shirtee"! Unless you can prove you are a member, you will not be admitted.

Some would claim that they don't like the films. In answer to this charge the record must speak for itself: two years ago a retrospective of the thrilling career of Alfred Hitchcock, last year a survey of American westerns and Marx Brothers comedies, this year a combination of five of the greatest adventure films ever made and five of the best musicals. Where else can you see LAWRENCE OF ARABIA, A HARD DAY'S NIGHT (with the Beatles), GONE WITH THE WIND and BEN HUR for an average of 75 cents apiece? Mr. Ray is resolute in not compromising the standards of what a film society program would consist of something just a little different and more challenging than what is available on Saturday night. At the same time he would like a committee to work with him in running the activities of the society and in planning future bookings if the club is to continue. Please volunteer if you are interested in becoming involved. Furthermore it was agreed last Sunday that we should do a better job of publicizing the upcoming films to stimulate greater attendance by those who do belong, and that we should launch a low-key membership campaign. If you would like to belong, see Mr. Ray; the price is now $\$ 6.50$ for the remaining eight films, an amount that may be billed to your parents' account. Really hurts doesn't it?

This then is the serious situation facing us. Even if we do manage to cover this year's deficit by one means or another, it remains to be seen whether the S.A.C Film Society is going to continue in its present form after this year, or whether we have reached the end of the line.

The above article says it all. We did break even thanks mainly to the fact that Ben Hur did not arrive and we showed The Guns of Navarone which happened to be available at the time free of charge. My thanks to Alex Robertson, Larry Dill, Mike Elliot, Trevor Juniper, Ross Morrow and several other enthusiasts. The future is up to you!

## PREFECTS AND HOUSE CAPTAINS



## MACDONALD HOUSE



One of the most frequent questions that has been asked of me since I became a resident of Mac House over three years ago has been : what is it like to live in Macdonald House? I am grateful to be able to respond to that question in this space.

Because it is the largest residence ( 96 boys) at St. Andrew's, the potential for social friction and disruptive behavior is great. One can't expect to throw together boys between the ages of 11 and 14 with differing temperments, peculiarities, characters, and backgrounds without experiencing some fireworks. There are bound to be schoolboy pranks and scuffles that erupt from time to time and this year was no exception.

Fortunately the melting pot of S.A.C. is tended and monitored by a watchful and wise Housemaster. Students are pampered and sometimes scolded by a group of dedicated duty masters, encouraged by enthusiastic house captains and nurtured and reprimanded about tidiness by a concerned and helpful Matron.

To say that there is never a dull moment here is an understatement. Indeed the house is a dynamo of crackling energy. Music, laughter, and war cries rebound in the halls until the very bricks seem to resound with the noise of the inhabitants. So accustomed is one to the kaleidoscope of life here that the sound of silence speaks of suspicion. The building is bewitched by boys, and only the end of term breaks the spell, leaving the building silent and lifeless.

Generally morale is high and the spirit of friendliness and co-operation is abundant. The Mac House triangle provides a place to let off steam, to mix and mingle and to share the togetherness of a game of shinny hockey or football. Frustrations, or perhaps just the chance to escape the confines of one's room can be left behind as students channel their energies in friendly sport upon the triangle.

The house has its share of unhappiness too. Not all the problems here have been resolved satisfactorily. Some boys haven't been able to cope with the demands of boarding school life. Despite encouragement and patient, sympathetic counselling from concerned staff, not all boys have strengthened relationships, and found and developed their inner strengths. Stated simply not all boys are suited for boarding school life. This too has been a part of learning experience for those within the House.
