One of the final announcements on Prize Day is the winner of the Housser Trophy for inter-clan competition. This year the winner was Fourth (now Sifton) House, the members of Stewart clan. How, you might wonder, did this one come about?

The winning clan is the one which amasses the greatest number of points on a per capita basis when every aspect of participation is taken into account, evaluated and tabulated: academic performance, participation in our representative sports program, involvement in the myriad extra-curricular activities. The weight is approximately one third each for these three. No matter what your grade, no matter whether you make the most prestigious teams, just your willingness to get involved and to do your best helps your house's chances immensely. If your average is low, if you're not doing very much outside the classroom, then you are pulling your house's average down. There are in addition the big days such as those of the cross country and the track and field meet, but these don't carry nearly the same weight as the aspects already mentioned

This year as I've indicated above Stewart clan ended up in first place by a significant margin, followed by Ramsay, with MacPherson very close and Buchanan bringing up the rear. When one examines the results in detail it isn't hard to see why Stewart for the second year in succession finished up on top. Academic accomplishment (calculated on a scale of 10-6-3 points per term for an average of $80-70-60 \%$ or above): first, Fourth with 17.06 points per member; second, Ramsey with 15.46; third, Flavelle with 14.62; and fourth, Memorial with 11.63. Participation in sports over the whole year: first, Fourth with 18.56 points per member; second, Flavelle with 15.13 ; third, Ramsey with 14.73 ; and fourth, Memorial with 13.74. It's interesting to note that certain houses excel in particular sports int particular seasons. Memorial's best showing across the board was in the winter term. Ramsey, after two strong terms, clearly was not nearly as involved in the final term

As far as individual sports particularly at the first team level of competition we learn some striking facts. Ramsey House was singularly well represented in 1st soccer, 1st hockey, tennis and cross-country skiing. Fourth House made dynamic contributions to the personnel of 1 st football, swimming, alpine skiing and senior rugby. Virtually all our first cricketers were to be found in

On the extra-curricular front the following observations can be made. Most significant leadership in Cadets: Ramsey followed by Fourth. Greatest participation in theatre: Flavelle, closely followed by Fourth. Greatest involvement in other musical areas such as the jazz and military bands: Flavelle followed by Ramsey. Greatest involvement in inter-school debating: Ramsey way out in front, followed by Flavelle. Greatest involvement in service and social committees: Fourth followed by Memorial. Where else did Memorial shine? In staffing the Review, and in caring for the seniors who came to the school in wheelchairs -- thanks to Robert Caldwell here.

As far as the special head-to-head competitions go, these were some of the results which you will remember having witnessed or taken part in. The Senior Cross-Country: Fourth followed by Ramsey. One-Act Play Competition: Flavelle, the best play, other houses receiving additional awards. Clan Debating: a tie between Flavelle and Ramsey. Track and Field Day: Ramsey first, narrowly defeating a very plucky Memorial team. Greatest number of clan awards and colours presented at the St. Andrew's Day Banquet and at the final assembly: Fourth followed by Ramsey.

Two other major trophies were presented on Prize Day. The MacDonald Medal, for the member of Upper Sixth most distinguished in studies and athletics taken together, was awarded to Michael Stuempel. The Laidlaw Trophy for the boy in Upper Sixth who has won for his clan the greatest number of points during his last two years at the school was awarded to David Faulkner. Over his four years in the senior school David earned for his clan better than 400 points, a magnificent achievement. Both these young men it should be noted were members of Stewart Clan. In view of all the above, it should be no surprise which house captured the coveted Housser Trophy. In the final event, however, it is the individual contribution of each and every resident that cumulatively makes your house a winner to be part of. I look forward to the next year of competition and thank you all for your enthusiastic participation.

## BRUCE - DOUGLAS - MONTROSE -WALLACE

Our junior clan competition culminates in the awarding of the Hockin Trophy which for the second year in a row was won by Bruce Clan, this time with 3626 points. Captain of Bruce was Nick Tsioros assisted by Nigel Dunlap. Runners-up with 3194 were the members of Douglas Clan under Ron Reardon and Chris McElroy. This was an impressive recovery after their fourth place finish a year ago. Next came Wallace with 3040 and Montrose with 2882 . At the moment each of the four clans contains an even mix of Macdonald House boarders and dayboys who now proudly bear the name of Laidlaw House. The fact that Ron Reardon, Jason Leggett, Bob Skinner and Stephen Timms were elected to positions within their clans indicates the significant contribution made by our Laidlaw dayboys. In addition to the names so far mentioned as leaders should be included Anthony Reid. As was the case with the senior clans, it isn't difficult to unravel the reasons why the standings finished as they did.
Most distinguished in academic pursuits was Bruce followed by Wallace. Most involved in our athletic teams was Bruce followed by Douglas. Representation in extra-curricular activities and other competitions was very much even across the four clans. The Junior Crosscountry Classic as won by Bruce followed by Douglas. In debating at the grade nine level Wallace won the most decisions followed by Montrose; in grades seven and eight debating Bruce was dominant followed again by Wallace. Douglas compensated for their lack of success in debating by staging a major offensive on Track and Field Day. Much to Mr. Whitehead's dismay, and Mr. Halstead's delight, Douglas out-organized and outperformed every one else and walked off with top honours, leaving Bruce and Montrose to fight over second place a good way back. On Prize Day the Grant Trophy presented to a specially deserving new boy went to William Hill of Wallace, and the King Trophy for the boy living in MacDonald House who excels in studies, games, deportment and character was presented to Nick Tsioros. ## HERALDRY AT ST. ANDREW'S COLLEGE By L.C. MacPherson

The Great Hall at St. Andrew's College at Aurora, Ontario, has a fine display of heraldic paintings done by R. G. M. Macpherson, F.H.S.C. The works extend over a long period of time. The first items were 4 clan badges painted in the Spring of 1963. They are the badges of the 4 clans which the school formerly used for clan competition and are respectively from left to right, the badges of Bruce, Douglas, Graham of Montrose and Wallace. These clans were selected in the 1940's as a basis for intramural competition. In 1973, school reorganization made the former clans inappropriate and the prefects of that year selected as the clans which would be used henceforth Buchanan, MacPherson, Ramsay and Stewart. In 1977, the artist produced the new series of 4 Shields and these were installed above the earlier badges.
From its earliest days St. Andrew's College had used an Achievement of Arms but no official Grant seems to have been given. The first reference comes in the Minutes of the Board of Governors for June, 1900 where the Headmaster reported on the "new crest" for the school and the prospectus for the year 1901-02 shows the design on the front cover
The last Headmaster of St. Andrew's College, Dr Thomas A. Hockin, felt it appropriate that the Arms as used be officially granted and after a considerable amount of correspondence with the Lyon Court a petition was made to the Lord Lyon for the granting of Arms. On January 10th, 1978 the Lord Lyon issued his Warrant for Arms as follows:
'Azure, on a saltire Argent between in chief a maple leaf and in base a thistle Or, an open book proper, binding Sable and fore-edges Or." and, upon the issue of the Warrant, the final Shield in the whole display was prepared and set in the space which had been left for it, so giving St. Andrew's College a very fine collection of the work of the heraldic artist.
The Greek motto is translated: "Quit ye like men, be strong





## EXCERPT FROM PRIZE DAY SPEECH

 GIVEN BY THE HEADMASTER - JUNE 1984This day belongs to many people. It belongs to our prize winners, to the boys who gave their best in the classroom and on the playing fields, to an involved and caring staff, to the members of the SAC Association and Foundation, to the dedicated women of the Ladies' Guild and to the ever supportive Board of Governors.
But in particular, this day belongs to our graduates and I have no hesitation in directing my remarks to them. Having had an opportunity of perusing some of the comments made by the members of the graduating class for our yearbook, I was struck by the recurring phrases, thanks to my parents; thanks to my teachers; thanks to my friends.
As Mr. Meagher so ably put it in his address to the Ladies' Guild at their last meeting, the school is an extension of our parents, their wishes, their expectations. Regardless of their position in life, parents make noble sacrifices to send you here. They
would much prefer to have you with them, to be able to grow with you, to be part of your everyday activities . . . but they have chosen to turn you over to a group of people whose task it is to prepare you for what lies ahead.
Even though you came together from different parts of the world, different backgrounds, with different abilities and different aspirations, you must have believed that you were in real danger of losing your individuality, that you were placed in the same mould as your neighbours, that you were expected to conform in thousands of ways.
But this was not so!
Here at St. Andrew's there is a place for the individual, for the believer, the nonbeliever, the strong, the weak, the rich, the poor.

But how can this be true, you ask, when everyone is told to get up at the same time, eat the same food, attend the same classes, follow the same routine!

The answer lies in the fact that at St. Andrew's we strive to instil genuine respect,
to show tolerance, and to recognize acceptance of differences as a way of life. In such a setting, it is possible to form lasting friendships, to appreciate the goodwill and dedication of the leaders, to be grateful to those who have placed 'you' in such surroundings.
I hope that this is the place for steadfast relationships, where individuality is respected, where one is allowed to progress at one's own pace and where success is measured in relation to abilities.
I hope you realize it is a place where emphasis is on communicating skills, where humanity, honesty and respect take precedence over the more superficial values.
And your comments in the Yearbook showed that you thanked those who made this opportunity possible.
Next you gave thanks to your teachers, for you know, as we know, that a school is only as good as its teachers. Our staff has tried to hold the mirror up to the very best in nature: we hope that you have been able to bask in the reflected truth and that you are better for it.

Finally, you gave thanks to your friends. You said "friends", not "acquaintances", nor "pals". Lucky is the person who has ONE true friend, one human being who will respect him, not for what he can get out of him but for what is solidly within him. The

FRIENDS you made here, we hope, will be with you the rest of your life.

Being your own man NOW and staying that way can be two different things. It is difficult to cling tightly to truths and ideals when most of those around you are settling for the easy way. "Getting by" seems to be good enough for many. It's not good enough for you. "Not getting caught" seems to be good enough for many. It's not good enough for you. "Not making waves" seems to be good enough for many. It's not good enough for you.
When you stand tall and live out the code of excellence which your school has tried to teach you, you run the risk of incurring the same ridicule which greeted the man who dared to claim that just maybe the earth was not flat, or the men who dared to suggest that maybe one could get a piece of machinery off the ground and through the air.

Finally, I hope that you are really grateful that you have been given the chance to go UP the DOWN staircase. Certainly, it's frightening to feel that people are depending on you to give your very best. But you should know that you never have to do it alone.
You are here today because special people were willing to make sacrifices for you. They were not content to let you be part of a big parade; they wanted you to be yourself and no one else.

## FIRE IN MEMORIAL HOUSE

This past term at 2 a.m., a fire caused all of Upper School to vacate the houses, to wait behind Flavelle until the OK was given to return. Smoke was seen coming from the basement TV room of Memorial House when the alarm was pulled. Through the presence of mind of Prefect Rob Caldwell, the fire was contained in the Memorial TV room until the fire department arrived. Damage was limited to less than $\$ 100$. The cause of the fire is attributed to a careless, illegal smoker throwing a cigarette into a garbage bin. On a related subject, the school will be installing a new smoke alarm system in the residences for the fall of 1984. These new smoke detectors will be powered by the commercial power supply as opposed to batteries. All the smoke detector units will be attached; if one alarm is activated, all the others will sound too. An enunciator panel will be installed to determine the source of the alarm. These new detectors are being installed largely because of the inefficiency of the older, battery-powered alarms. The old alarms were sensitive to high humidity and were activated when the atmosphere was very close. As well, the new alarms will not lend their batteries to students searching for a power supply for radios or electronic games.

## DINING HALL CHANGES

As part of the changes being affected in the Great Hall this year, the kitchen prepared various new meals on a trial basis, including lake trout in the latter days of Term Three. The addition of new meals as well as the deletion of various unpopular ones are moves by the administration to improve the food in the dining hall. Mr. Bedard believes that it had been the presentation of the food, not the quality, that had been lacking. The food has undergone testing for its nutritional value, and has passed with a clear margin. Innovative ideas will continue in the upcoming year to improve this longawaited change, and a possible floor-plan change is being considered.

## RAIDS

In the past, this school has had its share of raids: a rival school painting our goal posts, we returning the favor with our famous pUCCasso painting; a pyramid of tables in the dining hall; the masters' common room being perfectly reconstructed on the quad. Usually, the grade thirteens leave a 'going-away' present for the school and this year wasn't an exception. The students woke up one early, rainy day in May to find the trees on one side of the quad decorated with three strings of shoes, all tied together. Some benevolent person took the liberty of relocating all these shoes to the Fourth House TV room, where some remained well into the summer vacation months. ## LET'S GET PHYSICAL!

Over the summer of 1983, many physical changes improved the SAC campus, some big, some small, but all important. The area between the Upper Fields and Skid Row (a.k.a. Master's Row) has been cleared of the tall grass and replaced by new sports areas. Part of that area was used to add two new tennis courts to the existing four, these courts being operational for the 83/84 academic year. In preparation for 1984/85, the rest of the space is being reserved for either a soccer or cricket field, making the area which was for so long useless, now worth having. A new garage was also constructed behind the Memorial fields. It houses many of the large school tractors and trailers, to prolong their life during the harsh winters. Inside the residences, money gained by the Foundation/Association from parents continues to help refurbish the houses, the old wooden furniture being replaced by new, white, modern furniture. This refurbishing is part of an ongoing programme which to date has met with good support by the parents. Changes in the individual houses are also worth noting. Flavelle House completed construction of their new TV room, a product of the labours of the members of that house. As well, a new pool room and pool table are part of the changes modifying Flavelle under, the housemaster Mr. Foy. The students of that house each contributed for the acquisition of a house video tape machine, available for use this coming year. Memorial House, too, had its changes, the most notable being the redesigning of their common room. A general face lift of painting and new furniture is helping to improve Memorial House.

## LITERARY VALUES IN THE EDUCATION SYSTEM

Today's society is breeding a generation of literary cripples, and careful, pre-planned yet immediate changes must be affected if the serious wound is ever to heal. Unfortunately, the malady is not an easy one to remedy; most students don't realize, or if they do they don't care about the gravity and implications of this problem.
At a high school level of education, various works of literary merit are intensely studied, often for periods in excess of four weeks. Unfortunately, appearances suggest that this studying is, in reality, a dissection. The education system, and those who carry the responsibility of its operation must remember, or be reminded, that the purpose of education is not, necessarily, to fill a student's head with erudite knowledge, but to teach a way of thinking that will be useful in later years. The most common example, at the high school level of splaying a work open and torturing it so that it can never be sewn up again, is Shakespeare. His works are often over-taught and over-learned that the reader is forever discouraged from reading Shakespeare on their own, which is the real tragedy. Because the book is examined in such nauseating detail, students often lose interest in the book, as well as, any work done by that author. This does nothing except ingrain upon the student's impressionable mind that all reading of Shakespeare must be painful, and, because generalizations are so common, all classical literature is labelled with dark ink. Is this then not actually impeding the implementation of the purpose of education instead of enhancing it, as it should?

As a result of this dissection, the student will almost assuredly groan when faced with the revelation that Shakespeare or Chaucer is on the course, and that he will have to suffer for the better part of the term with the book. This is why poetry has such a blackened name among students, and it is these same students who shall grow up, convinced that Shakespeare serves no essential purpose except for torture. In turn, this impression may be imparted to their children.
Yet, this detrimental "over teaching/over-learning" has another crippling effect. Works such as More's UTOPIA, Goethe's FAUST, or Machiavelli's THE PRINCE are being rapidly usurped by such contemporary 'greats' as FAMILY FEUD, THREE'S COMPANY and THE 'A' TEAM, and little attention is being given by society's youth to books which have stood the only real test, the test of time.
As a remedy. Shakespeare's works, and the like should not be drilled into the student's head. The book-report method, if faithfully completed by the student, has infinite benefits, but only if the book-report was comprehensive. This last point emphasizes the need to write, and the only way to improve written work is by constant practise. By setting a pace for the students, they may examine, given the proper impetus, and I stress the last point, works which they will have the opportunity to learn from, so that books, the tap to the well of knowledge and wisdom, will not sit collecting dust on a shelf, but be read with enthusiasm, and with the reader's choice. At any time, the student knows that if he does not like a book, he can write a detailed report as to why, and he won't have to suffer an excruciatingly painful term for nought with a book he hates.

If this system were adopted, and the proper impetus applied, hopefully, the generation who intimately knows comic books, television and video-machines, will graduate to possess a knowledge of the great writings of the past and present without leaving a bad taste in their mouthes. But definitive, decisive action is required, and it must start today.

The plays came of age in this their fifth year with lively performances by all four Houses and no sign of a flop. The directors did their job with intelligence, the actors knew their lines, the stage crews made sure the curtains opened on time, and our new lighting system shone.

Flavelle staged the non-round table conference TOP TABLE to show how a couple of cleaners can sort out world problems better than diplomats. This play was cast with distinction, for each actor was able to portray peculiar national traits. Chris Martin surprised us all with his deep south American drawl, Shawn Pudsey was a red commissar, Andrew Schofield played a Thatcher, whilst Matthew Stewart, David Craig and Roger Lam were right at home in native costumes of India, Africa and China. Mr. Ken Lloyd, our adjudicator, picked this as Best Play, with Best Directors, Mike Lank and Shawn Pudsey for its skilled production of good entertainment.

Next, Fourth House adapted Mark Twain's CANNIBALISM IN THE CARS: The title suggests how the travellers were able to survive on a train stranded in a snowdrift in the middle of nowhere. This is, by its nature, a rather static play but David Faulkner, the Director controlled the characters skillfully and the actors offered strong and individual vocal styles. David Baird and Wayne Wong held the stage,
the latter winning an Acting Merit Award.
Thirdly came ESCAPE FROM LUFT STALAG 112B by the infamous Monty Python and Memorial House. This was good, clean fun, and its similarities with boarding life at SAC made it an instant audiencegrabber. Max Gundy, Phil Wood and Matt Dynes led the pack of incarcerated Grade Thirteens. Farce isn't easy to perform, and perhaps this show needed another few days of incisive rehearsal. But we all enjoyed it. This won the Best Design Award.

Ramsey House always seems to handicap itself by the choice of play, and COPY was certainly the toughest of the evening. It is set in a newspaper office with constant telephoning (The effects worked!) and bustle. But among the cynical pressmen there bursts a problem of life and death involving the editor's family; the solution satisfies the editor, but not perhaps a modern audience. This play demands powerful acting, and Ramsey, (Comfort, Cowles, Ogden, Lawson and Smithyes) did a creditable job. In particular, Tim Garden held centre stage as Editor, and as his assistant, Chris Andrews surprised himself by winning the Best Actor Award.

## S.A.C. HOUNDS NOTRE DAME

The 1983-84 season was a bittersweet one for the First Hockey Saints. Their hopes of repeating as ISAA champs were shattered when they lost the first two games of the season, both at home, to Lakefield and Nichols. As it was, a fore-shortened season deposited the Saints in third place behind the two teams mentioned, with an 8-3-1 record.
In tournament play, the team had perhaps their best season in many years and yet were unable to bring home any gold. At the highly competitive Milton-Nobles tournament in Boston, the Saints lost only one game, but had to settle for a bronze medal. Also during the Christmas break, at the T.C.S. International Tournament, First Hockey ran headlong into the muscle and skill of top U.S. schools like Kent and Culver Military Academy, and needed an exciting overtime win over U.C.C. to secure another bronze.
During the February mid-term break, the team travelled for the first time to the Northwood Tournament in Lake Placid. Again the competition was excellent and the big Olympic ice required plenty of adjustment. Perhaps it was a little too bewildering as the Saints lost in the final to a Junior B team from Montreal - Sud-Ouest. A full day of skiing at Whiteface Mountain served to lessen the pain of that defeat.
A novelty of this season was the St. Andrew's Lloyd C. MacPherson Tournament. A smattering of ISAA teams joined the Hounds of Notre Dame from Saskatchewan, the New Hampton Huskies from New Hampshire, the Moncton Purple Knights and our own team in an experiment - the school had never before hosted a tournament of this kind.
In a very proud moment for our school, a near capacity crowd turned up at the Aurora Community Centre to witness the polished pageantry of the S.A.C. Pipes and Drums in the opening
ceremonies, followed by a thrilling hockey classic. It was our Saints versus the legendary Hounds of Notre Dame - a rekindling of a year old rivalry which began when First Hockey defeated the Hounds 2-1 in the overtime final at their tournament in Saskatchewan. The Saints burst out of the starting gate scoring 3 goals in rapid succession before the game was 5 minutes old. However, the hysteria gradually gave way to concern as the Hounds fought their way back to tie the score at 4 by the end of regulation time. As if no other ending was possible, Mark Murphy scored the overtime winner for the Saints on a breakaway with just over a minute left to play. In a collective, euphoric, sigh of relief, 400 Andreans poured out on the ice to congratulate the players and to share in this special moment. However, the gold proved to be just as elusive on the home ice as the Saints lost in a fiercely contested final to a very strong New Hampton team.
To round out the season in the ISAA, the Saints gave greater credence (a $10-4$ drubbing of the previously undefeated Lakefield team in the return game was the first indication) to the notion that the best team had not finished first, by out classing Nichols (6-1) and U.C.C. $(8-3)$ to win the ISAA tournament at Lakefield in March.
For the second straight season First Hockey were unable to live up to their billing at the OFSAA Provincial finals, where S.A.C. represented the GBSSA region. A loss in their very first game to eventual champion, Monarch Park, virtually eliminated the Saints from contention.
Although the loss of 9 graduating players, the like of which included Tom Hussey to Renselaaer Polytechnic Institute and John Archibald to Michigan Tech, leaves quite a hole to be filled for the coming season, with good potential on the Second and Under 16 teams, the future looks bright.

"1984. A vintage year for debating. The year seems replete with successes, but I shall limit myself to the discussion of two events in the calendar. During the first term Hugh Scanlon, Shawn Pudsey, Clive Rowe and I had the privilege of attending the National Public Speaking Tournament held at St. Johns-Ravenscourt School in Winnipeg. Debaters and speakers from all over Canada attended making it a truly national competition. In remarkable illustration of their capabilities Shawn and Clive propelled themselves to the upper strata of the standings. Shawn came in a magnificent third place overall, earning him the right to travel to England, and Clive stood second in the debating category. A little less successful, but no less spirited, was the debating tournament held at McGill University just at the end of our Expansion Week. We were well represented by four two-man teams; new to this style of debating were Andrew DePiero, Simon Glynn, Garret Ippolito, Ivan Lavrence and Greg McGinnis, in addition to stalwarts Marcus Lem, Hugh and myself. Despite the rollicking setting of the city of Montreal, the teams resisted its charms and plunged vibrantly into work. Simon and Marcus were our most convincing team; Greg and Ivan showed they could hold their own against older, more experienced opponents. Each of us had an excellent chance to experience and enjoy the tournament format, and will apply his recently acquired knowledge well. In my tenure of office we have seen an interesting phenomenon, a resurgent S.A.C. Debating Society. You should be able to deduce from the glowing tone of my comments above that we have an inspiring pool of talent from which to draw, one which can propel us to new heights! We have every reason to look forward to next year's endeavours. May I thank all those who served with me on the executive this year, and on behalf of all who took up the opportunity to debate for St. Andrew's, thank Mr. Ray for his unflagging patience and enthusiasm.

This year's written report will concern itself to a large degree with several achievements which don't occur very often, and in which we take great satisfaction. But in addition to these, and just as important, are all the other experiences which can't be mentioned individually. There were few tournaments to which we didn't send a team, often made up of debaters in whom we place much confidence for the future. We maintained a full schedule of social debating relationships with our sister schools and these yielded both fun and friendships. On the home front, thanks in particular to the efforts of Jeremy Pierpoint and Shawn Pudsey, we conducted six afternoons of hotly contested clan and house debates. These are important and we appreciate the efforts of those who took part, especially those not regulars in the Debating Society for whom this was a first such experience.

## ASP on Public Speaking in England

'Following our trip to Winnipeg it was my good fortune to be one of those invited to represent Canada at the International Public Speaking Finals held in May at the American Embassy in London, England. Mr. David Hicks of the English Speaking Union brilliantly coordinated our twelve day stay, and he organized many events for us including a visit inside Buckingham Palace, a weekend stay at Oxford, punting and playing croquet as well as taking tea at the Union. The English style of public speaking is much different from our own. In the International Finals a chairman speaks for approximately one minute, introducing the speaker as well as briefly summarizing the speaker's interests. The speaker is then invited to talk for about four or five minutes on a topic of his or her choice. His speech is followed by a vote-of-thanks proposed by a member from an opposing team. Mr. Hicks of the English Speaking Union hosted both the British Finals and the International Competition itself while we were there. The main aim of the E.S.U. is to promote good will between England and the other English-speaking countries. I was teamed with Elaine Russell of Bishop Strachan School and served as the chairman of our team, introducing the speaker whose talk was entitled "In Search of the Mounties", an amusing look at the misconceptions other countries believe to be true about Canada. Although the Canadian teams that entered the competition didn't bring home prizes, Mr. Hicks did admit that the judging had been more difficult than in any other year owing to the high quality of the public speaking. The twelve days in London were very enjoyable, topped off by an entertaining evening of public speaking. Next year the event from which students are chosen to go to England is moving east from Manitoba to Ontario. The International Public Speaking Finals afforded me the opportunity to see many of the sights of
glamorous London, as well as to get to know and speak with some of the best public speakers in the Commonwealth.

In addition to being members of the Ontario Student Debating Union, we are founding members of the Fulford originally five schools, then ten, then twelve, next year to be fifteen with the inclusion of Pickering. Trafalgar Castle and Bishop Strachan. To this level of competition we endeavour to send our very best debaters. In Round One at S.G.C. we were represented by Jon Barker. Tim Garden and Clive Rowe, with the latter standing fifth out of all competitors. To Round Two at Appleby we sent Mark Chin, Steve Pitel and Shawn Pudsey. All three boys placed in the top seven with Mark leading the way in second place, and S.A.C. as top school in the tournament. A showing like this put competition for Fulford honours. Round Three took place at Ridle and we sent Joseph Lee, Jeremy Pierpoint and Richard White to be our standard bearers. No team worked harder in advance, but the results were disappointing. Nonetheless over the year we finished up in third place out of the twelve member schools, our best standing in several years. Our congratulations to U.T.S for finishing up so strongly and for wresting the trophy away from U.C.C. There were at least half a dozen other excellent debaters whom I would have liked to see have the Fulford experience this year. It's tough when there are only nine places, but we shall look to some of you next year. Our best intermediate Fulford debaters and joint winners of the Mitchell Trophy on Prize Day were Ivan Lavrence and Greg McGinnis. They both had a very busy year and matured as speakers in a very pleasing way

There is no higher honour in debating in Canada than to progress through the rounds of regional and district competition. Only one person from each district, ours being Suburban Toronto and HaltonPeel, may attend the National Seminar. This year that honour went to Clive Rowe. Along with debaters from North Toronto Collegiate and Toronto French School, Clive made up the trio that retained for Ontario the trophy presented to the top provincial delegation. In view of this achievement, unparalleled in the past five years at S.A.C., Clive was deservedly the winner of the Brooks Cup for this year. I have asked him to share a few of his impressions.
