

THE HEADMASTER'S PRIZE DAY ADDRESS

As you may have surmised, this has been an exceptional year. The credit must be shared among many.

May I begin my remarks with a few words of thanks and praise.

N.B. - Due to space limitations, those portions of Mr. Bedard's speech which refer to people or institutions represented elsewhere in the book have been excerpted to the a ppropriate pages.-Bd.

For their devotion, far beyond the call of duty, to matters academic, para-academic and extra-curricular, on behalf of the Governors, on my behalf and on the behalf of our 450 students, may lexpress my deep gratitude to our 40 teachers.

And now a look at this year's salient events, its gains, its losses and its accomplishments.

This past year our students were exposed to a number of cultural events, including performances by the Young Peoples' Theatre, the Ontario Ballet Company, the National Tap Dancing School, the Hamilton Philharmonic Brass Band and the Epic String Quartet. We intend to continue with this programme and some bookings for the coming year have already been finalized.

1987-88 saw the rebirth of the SAC Choir under the direction of Mr. Stephen Harper. We are very encouraged by its progress and confident that it will grow in importance.

This year's school musical, under the direction of Lee and John Clements was, as usual, a resounding success.

Our Head of Debating, Mr. Rupert Ray, was re-elected Vice President of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Student Debating Federation. I should like, publicly, to thank Mr. John Morrissey, one of our parents, for the help he gave in preparing our debaters for several of their tournaments.

At the risk of taxing the attention span of some of our youngsters, I would like, for our graduates, to briefly refer to 1899 and to examine with them the St. Andrew's College of 1988. We are so caught up in our daily activities and so intent on preparing for the next class, the next event, the next year, that we seldom take time to examine our roots or to reflect upon the original expectations of St. Andrew's College's founding fathers.

In 1899, the founders of this school declared, and I quote:

"S.A.C. has been founded because it is believed that it will meet the want felt by many in the past by offering advantages that cannot be very well secured under the ordinary school system. Realizing the necessity of being well to the front in the quality of instruction given, no effort will be spared to maintain a high standard of efficiency in all branches of scholarship and teaching. In such a college as 5t. Andrew's, be individual can be better recognized and brought into more direct ontact with his masters, and thus reap considerably more benefit."

The legacy that St. Andrew's has inherited is a duty not only to foster academic excellence, but to minister also to the whole child in all aspects of his being, to instill a particular code of ethics and a set of values. That was the cornerstone of the school's purpose and function. Eighty-mine years ago, IK. MacDonald, the first Chairman of the Board, stated clearly, and Iquete, T is by no means enough that a boy be intellicitually trained. Most important of all is the most welfare and growth of the lad fast approaching to makindo."

Prom the start, athletics was viewed as a central part of the educational process at St. Andrew's, which encouraged games and sports as instruments of character formation and morality. The first college prospectus declared that "If the work of life is to be done under the stress of modern conditions, the body must be cared for in youth, and every precaution taken to develop and maintain constitutional strength."

With these precepts in mind, St. Andrew's College was launched in 1899, at Chestnut Park, in Rosedale, Toronto.

One of the original teachers, Dr. Percy Robinson, a staff member who remained as classics master for nearly half a century, recalled "In that Scotch-Canadian soil of Chestmut Park, St. Andrew's flourished and took root like a thistle in a plowed field. In a surprisingly short time it meant something to be a St. Andrew's boy."

And now, class of 1988 - what does it mean to you to be a St. Andrew's boy? What of the present St. Andrew's College, with its location in Aurora?

Let me ask you graduates:

"Do you realize fully the importance of learning?"

"Have you developed lasting friendships here?"

"Can you think of another setting more conducive than this one - where such deep-rooted friendships could have been fashioned?"

"Have you learned to live harmoniously with people of different backgrounds, different traditions?"

"Have you learned the importance of keeping fit?"

"Have you learned to give orders; have you learned to take orders?"

"Do you appreciate the sacrifices your parents have made, financial sacrifices as well as the sacrifice of allowing you to be away from home most of each day and much of each year?"

"Do you have a sense that your school has provided you with a focal point that will remain for the rest of your lives?"

"Will you want to come back here? We hope so."

"Has the school taught you to seek excellence in all you do? If you really seek excellence, no one will ever strip you of your accomplishments, and of your personal growth."

"Have you acquired a sense of responsibility, a sense of fair play, a sense of right and wrong? It is our prayer that you have."

Living as we are in the middle of a second technological revolution, clearly, the academic life of a school must be of the soundest. We hope yours is, and that it will remain so. But the acquisition of knowledge is not an end in itself, for education is, as it has been said, what survives when what has been learned has been forgotten.

What is important is that you and your school should never lose sight of your basic raison d'erre. All this elaborate provision for the "moral, mental, and physical development" of a 5t. Andrew's gentleman rots ultimately on a spiritual foundation, the conviction that in the minds of teachers and students, knowledge, fair play, responsibility and above all, service to others, have their own standands of integrity.

It is enough that the chapel spire of St. Andrew's Collge may long continue to look down on a constant procession of young men seeking truths upon which the good of society must ultimately be founded.

Graduates, you are ready. Now go out there and show them.








The school community was saddened this year by the death of Loyd McPherson. Loyd served as a trusted and devoted teacher, Housemaster and Assistant-Headmaster over a span of 25 years. Loyd was honoured at a memorial service in our Chapel on April 17 in a fitting farewell to this great Andrean.

LLOYD MACPHERSON, ESQ.

It would be difficult to find an area around the school which does not bear his mark. He counted spats in the cadet store, beakers in the science wing, beds in Fourth House, credits in the office, spotlights on stage, and boys everywhere. He revealed the history of the school to three thousand new boys on Day One. He filled out thousands of timetables and university applications. He was the voice of S.A.C. on the PA. system and at Cadet Inspections. Headmasters may come and go, but as Head of Science, first Housemaster of Fourth House, Member of the Board of Governors, and Assistant Headmaster, he was Mr. S.A.C.

At the age of forty came the kind of revelation that happened to St. Paul on the toad to Damascus - L.C.M. found Scotland! He lost his hair under a tam; his girth increased to fill a kill; he intoned himself with Gaymore and Claybeg, Crummock and Jabot, Schist and Schlager. He visited Scotland a score of times, becoming chairman of Clan MacPherson and celebrating many wassails.

At S.A.C., he embellished the Scottish Fact, with clans and pipes and drambuie, pritomized by the new boy's traumatic indoctrination to the haggis on the annual St. Andrew's Night dinner.

And anyone finding E.R.'s tough should be thankful he wasn't pushing a convertible around the quad, with the Laird stabbing the brakes every now and then to offer resistance.

Away from the school his interests were wide and curious. He was a man of the Church in three ways: in name (Son of the Parson), as an elder of the United Church, and as the owner of two residential churches.

LCM, was always interested in protocol and ceremony, ancestry and heraldry; he knew all about lions couchant and bars sinister, he had his own family crest, and he was responsible for the school gaining its legitimate coat of arms. One of his delights was the stage. He theatre hopped in Stratford, Toronto, New York and London. Appearing in many shows himself, he was an expert in stagecraft and prop making. On the school, he had a string of directing credits.

From all Andreans, we revere the memory of the Spirit of S.A.C., the Laird of Pottageville, our own 49th Highlander, Lloyd Campbell MacPherson.



BOARD OF GOVERNORS



Chairman Peter D. G. Harris, The Honourable Lincoln M. Alexander, Mrs. Anne Bedard

The authority of the Board of Governors flows from the Special Act of the Ontario Legislature under which the College is incorporated.

In that Act, the Governors are charged with responsibility for the operations, properties, and finances of the College.

Essentially, the "Corporation" can be seen as a perpetual trust dedicated to maintaining a school of excellence, a school of distinctive character. The Governors, then, are really the trustees of this trust, committed to its long term interests.

"Educating" imposes a profound responsibility. To be done well, it requires practitioners with the highest levels of professional competence. It is not a game for amateurs!

The Board of St. Andrew's is solely and absolutely responsible for the selection of, and the support of the Headmaster. That in any school is absolutely the critical decision! In the long run, the school will be as good as, or as weak as that appointment. In that appointment and in that support, lies the Board's control of the quality, the direction, and the character of the school. The Board must understand these operations, and yet stand away from them. Board Involvement in eduational decisions is the certain road to turmoil. Board involvement in the finances, properties and long range thinking, is the proper fuffilment of its obligations.

ST. ANDREW'S COLLEGE ASSOCIATION

The St. Andrew's College Association began as the Old Boys Association in 1904-1905 under J.L. Ferguson, its first President. Current President is W. S. Marshall '67 who is General Manager of SLH Transport Inc, a subsidiary of Sears.

The Association now also includes parents and past parents, plus friends of the school. Representatives from each group are appointed to the S.A.C. Association Council, which meets periodically throughout the year.

Year representatives are appointed from each graduation class and they are primarily responsible for keeping contact with the school, helping with reunions and other functions of the Association.

The Association Council co-ordinates Homecoming in the Fall and the Association Dinner in the Spring. As well, the SA.C. Business Club was launched in 1986 to provide Andreans with a forum to meet and exchange ideas with Andreans in similar or vastly diverse careers. The Business Club Luncheons are presently held three times each year.

The Association also co-ordinates various Old Boy participatory sports events throughout the year.

Jim Herder '64 is currently Secretary-Treasurer of the Association, a post he took up in September 1985. He was President of the Association 1979-82, a position which was also filled by his predecessor, Jim Hamilton '33, between 1948 and 1950.

In the Spring term, Kevin Worry won the right to go to the annual Provincial Debating Seminar in Toronto. At the same time Head of Debating Rupert Ray was attending the National Seminar in St. John's, Newfoundland. Here he was re-elected as Vice-President of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Student Debating Federation.

Happily, a great many of our members gained in experience and skill during the year and there were bright new discoveries. 


GREASE





CHAPEL

For a good many years what has happened around the chapel of St. Andrew's has been synonymous with the presence of Robert W. Meagher. Midway through the summer we learned we were to lose his leadership. Thank you''R-Dub'', as I affectionately liked to greet you daily, for all that you did, for your dignity and for your fine sermons. At that time, the Headmaster asked me to co-ordinate chapel activities for this year during which we would search for a permanent chapitani. I didn't know the scope of what I was agreeing to at the time, but I am not sorry that I accepted this unique opportunity. My appreciation of the committee which supported me throughout, to the chapel boys, and to Bruce Somerville and the Headmaster who shared with me in the leading of morning services.

There isn't the time or space here to recount what happened week by week, but some significant trends emerged which are worth noting. First we rediscovered the role of choral music in our services thanks to the rebirth of the choir under the direction of Stephen Harper with assistance from Julian Greenwood. We looked forward keenly to their anthems and to visits from other choirs. We continued to thrill to the organ voluntaries provided by our skilled organists Aubrey Foy and John Clements, and we learned some fine new hymns.

Second, we were fortunate to hear a variety of messages from guest preachers - about fifteen of them, both men and women, both ordained and non-ordained. Included were former students and staff members, a parent, heads of brother or sister schools and their chaplains and two services of religious drama. About eight services were generated from within our school community both by students and staff. Particularly memorable was the service of Remembrance in November with its guided tour of our Memorial Chapel led by David Timms. The highlight of December was our annual Carol Service at St. Pau's Church.

In addition, there were moments of sadness which will live on in my memory. Early in the year I had to share with the school the untimely death of John Aspin, husband of our much loved school nurse, Mrs. Irene Aspin. Later in the year I worked closely with family and friends to plan the memorial service which took place in our chapel for former student Mark Wigston who died at the age of 33. Finally, all of us were drawn together again in April to commemorate a man who loved our chapel deeply, Lloyd C. MacPherson, who passed away in Nova Scotla during the March Break. Each of these services whas an occasion of celebration and thanksgiving, which is as it should be.

Morning by morning our school day began with its brief service of dedication in the chapel. By dint of relocating the choir and seating everyone tightly elsewhere, we were able to accommodate the full school body and not have to exclude one house per day. It seemed regretable to me that our main service of the week on Stunday evening could only be experienced by our boarding population, so in the latter half of the year we experimented with having some of our main services on Saturday morning. It seems that there is much to commend this option, not least because it allows those on leave to have a less rushed dinner at home before returning to school.



At the time I invited him to address one of our weekend services in the late fall. I had no idea that this might transpire. This year marked another fine year in Flavelle House. Every member seemed to have contributed in his own special way to the extent that this was a most enjoyable place to live.



All in all a great year in Flavelle House.






SECOND RUGBY
























HONOUR GUARD

SKI DAY


