N. B. Of the above it appears there has been paid about \$4,820 of debts due in former years, \$1,000 at the Phoenix Bank, and \$640 Salaries.

The board has appropriated, per vote of the Town, the old dwelling house, on the Almshouse lot, for the accommodation of the children of the establishment.

The necessary repairs at the Almshouse (including slating roof, copper gutters, &c.) have amounted to about \$1,400 more than ordinary.

The whole amount of Expenditures (including repairs) have been about 12,282 45, that is: \$9,282 45 paid, and about \$3,000 outstanding claims.

There are collectable accounts against towns and individuals amounting to about \$600, and \$1,432 15 in the hands of the Chairman, so that there will be a deficiency of about \$1,000.
