

Even though the team lost first round, they did significantly better than last year's team, which had several upper classmen. The team this year answered more questions, and competed against a much larger university, that in itself speaks volumes about the quality of education Union College Psychology students are receiving.



germanial instruction (SI) at Union College is adapted from the program at the University of Missouri at Kaneas City. This model of student academic assistance helps etudents in historically difficult classes master course content while they develop and integrate learning and study strategies. There is no remedial stigma attached to SI since historically difficult courses, rather than high disk students, are targeted. The Supplemental instruction process begins on the first day of class. Students are asked to complete a brief survey to determine the best time for SI review sessions. Each session is conducted by a student (SI Leader) (that has successfully taken the class under the instructor and obtained a grade of "A" or "B". They will attend all class sesstons and prepare review material from class lectures while evaluating their content with the instructor. The SI Leader then prepares three scheduled one-hour study sessions per week.

- utoring is available free of charge, by appointment only, to all students via trained peer tutors through the Academio Resource Center. All tutoring sessions are held in the ARC and are designed to be flexible in order to meet both personal and academic needs.



I'd log significant events through the day on computer, file special events, and monitor radar. I worked 12 hour shifts, 7 days a week. I wore my uniform for a year over there. It made me dislike it. 


Whitney Bundy:

"I'm in the National Guard and ROTC at Union. I did basic training in Fort Jackson, South Carolina. The thing I was most afraid of was the gas chamber. They take a big group of us inside with gas masks on. You start to feel your neck burn from the C.S. gas. When they ask, you have to pull your mask up and say your name and social security number. Then your face starts to burn and it hurts to breathe.

You put your mask back on and clear it to breathe regularly again. Everybody in the room then has to take their mask off and say the Soldier's Creed. It makes your eyes water and your nose run. It wasn't as bad as I thought it was going to be."




Barbourville is very different from California. There I was 30 minutes from the beach. Here it is always raining. A bit!" (She laughs)







his year was a milestone for the Union Men's Soccer Program. The Bulldogs finished in third place in the Appalachian Athletic Conference, their best finish since their inception into the AAC in 2002. With a record of 10 wins, 5 losses, and 4 ties, the Bulldogs secured their third consecutive 10-win season. Continuing to prove Union is a tough place for opponents to play, the Bulldogs reopened Bulldog Field this season after a year-long absence with a strong win against Georgetown College and went 6-3-1 at home this season. The Bulldogs proved they could contend with the best in the country when they defeated #22 Milligan College with a fantastic 1-0 overtime win. This year's team was loaded with talent from all classes, as senior captain Danny Bartlett, and junior captains Jon Shaw (goalkeeper) and Jon Sutton (midfielder) led the Bulldogs with incredible play and vocal leadership. Shaw had another strong year in goal for the Bulldogs, coming away with his second NAIA Player-of-the-Week Award to add to last year's award. Freshmen Chris Elliott (midfielder) and Dominic Scheele (forward) came in and gave the Bulldogs strong attacking options immediately. Sophomore Chris Riley (midfielder) continued to be a mainstay in the Bulldog lineup. Junior Aaron Miller (defender) once again anchored the backline for much of the season. The efforts of the team did not go unnoticed as 7 players landed on the AAC All-Conference team. The team's efforts were apparent outside of the soccer pitch as well, as 6 players made the AAC Academic All-Conference team. Bartlett and senior goalkeeper Nathan Koebcke earned NAIA Academic-All American Awards. This is Bartlett's first All-American award, while Koebcke earned his second to go along with his 2008 award. Head Coach Tyler Brock is looking forward to the 2010 season, "With only a few players graduating, there is no reason 2010 shouldn't be an ever better season than this last one. We have added some quality players to our roster and there is no reason we shouldn't be contending for a trip to the national tournament in 2010." Coach Brock also spoke very highly of this year's seniors, "Our seniors have done a tremendous job of helping to build this program into one that they can be proud of, and one that is now better than when they came in as freshman. They are now ready to pass the torch to a group of players who will continue to improve the program and take it to new heights." Assistant Coach lke Onyeardor echoes "Our players are excited about what this program is capable of doing, and the players are working harder than ever to achieve some very high goals next year." With several players playing semi-professional soccer this summer and everyone working hard towards next year, 2010 will be a very special year for the Union Men's Soccer Team.




What a year for the Lady Bulldog Volleyball team! Along with individual national honors and multiple conference athletic and academic awards, the women went on to finish their 29-5 run (the second highest wins record in program history) as Appalachian Athletic Conference Champions in tournament and regular season.

This is the second time Union has taken the regular season championship. It is the first time in program history that our volleyball team has won the ACC Tournament Championship and won a berth to the NAIA National Tournament.



In the 2009-2010 season Union volleyball exceeded all other records in program history with a .853 winning percentage; the previous best being a .703 in 2003. At one point the team went on a 15 match winning streak. Whitney Elam can now claim a .771 winning percentage in the last two years as head coach of the Lady Bulldogs.

 ${f T}$ he Union College softball program took home eight All-Conference nods as the Appalachian Athletic Conference announced its awards for the 2010 season.

Earning AAC All-Conference honors for pitching was senior Sarah Driver (Hopkinsville, Ky.). This is the third time she has been named to the All-AAC team. During the season, Driver has amassed a 12-7 record in 19 starts, while compiling a team low 1.81 ERA to go with her 115 strikeouts in just over 127 innings pitched.

Also earning the All-Conference nod at catcher was junior Gina Loflin (Salisbury, N.C.). Loflin earns the honor in just her first season of action in the AAC. For the 2010 campaign, she carries a batting average of .358, leads the team with 26 runs scored and is tied for the team lead in RBI's with 28. Loflin has also been a model of consistency, starting every game this season (36) behind the plate for the Lady Bulldogs.

Taking home the All-Conference and All-Academic nod at first base was senior Bethany Outland (Hopkinsville, Ky.). The award is the second straight All-Conference team honor for Outland, while the All-Academic honor is the first such honor in her

career. In 2010, Outland has amassed a career high .364 batting average while driving in 15 Lady Bulldogs on the season. Starting all 36 games at the corner position, she earned a fielding percentage of .991, the highest of any Lady Bulldog in 2010.

Earning the last of the four All-Conference honors, at the Utility position, was sophomore Abby Sears (London, Ky.). The All-Conference honor is her second straight All-Conference selection. On the season she carries a team high .387 batting average while also leading the team in homeruns (5), is tied for the team lead in RBI's (28) and leads the team in slugging percentage at .575. Sears started in every game on the campaign, splitting the 36 starts between right field, third base and the pitching circle.

Also receiving conference honors were Jennifer Burke (Ewing, Va.), Lee Davis (Lexington, Ky.) and Christie Day (Outfield) as all three players were named to the 2010 AAC All-Academic team.

Davis has played and started at second base in 27 games on the year. So far in her senior season, Davis has amassed a .307 batting average to go along with her .413 slugging percentage.

Jennifer Burke has seen action in 17 games, starting in two of those contests, while Christie Day has made four starts on the year and has seen action in 15 games in the outfield.

The team went to the NAIA World Series--lost in game 3 of pool play.

Fall Convocation

A Smilax, Ky., native and Union College graduate who now works on college access issues across the nation returned to his home state to help Union kick-off the academic year. Billy Hensley, Ph.D., a 1998 graduate of Union College, returned to campus September 3 to give the address at Fall Convocation.

Originally from Smilax, Ky., Hensley graduated from Leslie County High School in 1993 and from Union in 1998. He earned a Master's in education from Union in 2001, and in 2009 completed a Ph.D.



in educational studies at the University of Cincinnati. Hensley's dissertation, "Seeking Safe Spaces: The Impact of Campus Climate on College Choice," has been nominated for the Garvin Dissertation Award given to the outstanding dissertation of the year in the College of Education, Criminal Justice and Human Services at the university.

As a college access professional, Hensley has worked with the Ohio College Access Network and the KnowledgeWorks Foundation and has given keynote addresses around the country, including a presentation to the Ohio State Legislature in 2006. His work in Ohio helped increase the number of college access programs by designing sustainability plans for programs in Appalachian and urban communities. Over the course of his career, he has helped secure state and federal grants for college access initiatives totaling more than S35 million.

Hensley is also active in social justice issues and has served on several boards, including the Urban Appalachian Council of Greater Cincinnati, the Youth Council of the Southwest Ohio Workforce Policy Board and the Diversity Council of the University of Cincinnati. He has served as trustee of Emmanuel Fellowship Church in Akron, Ohio, and as a class agent for Union College. Hensley received the Exemplary Service Award from the Southwest Ohio Secondary Teaching Academy in 2007 and the Union College Rising Star Award in 2003.

Hensley now practices as an educational consultant in Denver, Colo.

Spring Convocation





Spring convocation is held each year in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The event highlights Dr. King's legacy by featuring guest speakers who address issues related to social justice, civil rights, non-violent protest and the spirit of the late leader's message.

This year's spring convocation speaker is Bertice Berry, Ph.D. Berry is a sociologist, author, lecturer and educator. She was the host and co-executive producer of a nationally syndicated talk show, hosted "USA Live" on the USA Cable Network, and has appeared on "The Oprah Winfrey Show," "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno" and ABC's "20/20." Berry is the best-selling author of ten books and winner of the Comedian of the Year Award from 1991 through 1994.

Berry is known for using humor as a way to address difficult subjects such as racism and sexism, and has earned several awards recognizing her as a gifted speaker and comic with a serious message. Her busy schedule includes over 200 appearances a year.

Tommy Ruth has produced the orientation and Welcome Weekend videos since 2006 when he produced a music video. On January 12, Haiti was hit by a magnitude 7.0 earthquake, causing terrible devastation. Haiti is a Caribbean country, on the island of Hispaniola. Over 50 aftershocks hit the survivors. Perhaps 230,000 people were killed, and a million left homeless. Houses, the presidential palace, the capital's cathedral and the UN mission were damaged or destroyed. For days people were digging in the rubble to find survivors.

Communication systems, transport links, hospitals, and electrical networks had been damaged by the earthquake, leaving the western hemisphere's poorest country unable to cope with this awful disaster.

The world responded with planes and ships full of aid and rescue workers. Here at Union, students, staff and faculty spontaneously created our response, which centered on a basketball game we called Hoopin' 4 Haiti.





Dr. Linda Silber gathered tributes from those who knew her. This is what people say, when they recall Marsha Banks:


Dr. Linda Silber:

Mahlon Miller

Union's longest-serving president passed away on Dec. 19. Mahlon Miller led the college from February 1959 through 1982. He first came to Union in 1955, and last returned in 2005 to attend President de Rosset's inauguration (left). His building program transformed the campus: housing for faculty in College Park, Robsion Arena, the Patridge Campus Center, a new section of College Courts, Lakeside Hall, Lakeside Athletics Complex and the Mahlon Miller Science Center were all constructed during his tenure.

Miller also doubled and tripled faculty numbers in several departments.

Student enrollment grew to 1,190 students, a number only surpassed in 2005.

Miller launched the graduate education program in 1960 to meet the needs of regional teachers. It has grown and celebrates its 50th anniversary this year.

President de Rosset says that much of Miller's estate has been bequeathed to the college, with instructions to "assist students at Union who need financial aid."

"Union College was my life and remains my life," Miller wrote. "Union will always be in my blood."

Abigail E. Weeks

The Alma Mater is sung regularly at most official functions. According to documents released by the President's Office, there have been three different versions of the Alma Mater used here at Union College.

The words and original arrangement were written by Dr. Abigail E. Weeks who served at Union from 1906-1931 as a faculty member, and as the Head Librarian from 1924 to 1931. The original words included the phrase "we shall masters be." The present day wording is "we shall victors be."

The arrangement was later adapted by Dr. Randall Sheets, who served as the Choral Director at Union for many years. In his change, he wrote a new arrangement of the Alma Mater using the original tune, but changing the harmony and lowering the key so it could be more comfortably sung by untrained singers.

The last and final change to date was by Dr. Sarah Webb Phillips, College Minister and Dr. Ed Phillips, Professor of Religion. They changed the words from "faith in God and in our brother," to "faith in God and in each other" to make the anthem more inclusive.











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
