SUMMER SESSIONS 1974

INDIANA UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA

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Indiana University of Pennsylvania will offer three sessions in the summer of 1974, two of three weeks each and one of six weeks. The pre-session will begin on Monday, June 3, and extend through Friday, June 21. The main summer session starts June 24 and extends through August 1. The post-session begins August 5 and continues through August 23.

In the pre and post sessions a student may enroll in a **maximum** of **either** one course **or** three semester hours of credit. In the main session a student may enroll in a **maximum** of **either** two courses **or** six semester hours of credit, **plus** a one credit physical activity course.

Indiana University of Pennsylvania is committed to affirmative action to assure equal opportunity for all persons, regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, or sex and welcomes qualified students, faculty and staff from all such groups.

OBJECTIVES OF THE SUMMER SCHOOL

The summer school program at IUP is designed to meet the needs of many students. Courses, workshops and seminars will be offered in the liberal arts, in teacher education, and in other fields of study.

Regular university students, including newly admitted freshmen, who wish to **accelerate** their program of studies will find both general education and special courses in all fields of study.

Indiana students who were freshmen during the school year 1973-74 are given until the end of the main summer session of 1974 to achieve their required quality point average of 1.8. If a student attains good standing by the end of post-session, he may apply for readmission around November 1 for attendance in the spring semester. Upper classmen who were in attendance during the school year 1973-74, likewise are given to the end of the main summer session 1974 to attain their required quality point average of 2.0.

Students from other colleges and universities may take courses at IUP which is accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. Its credits are recognized by other accredited colleges and universities. Students from other colleges who attend IUP in the summer should request our Registrar to send a transcript of the credits they earn to their respective institutions.

Teachers-in-service will find courses in the summer program to serve their varied needs. They may take work to qualify for permanent certification, take refresher courses in their field of specialization, or take courses for the purpose of extending their certification to a new field.

Veteran Benefits. Veterans, and sons and daughters of veterans who are eligible for education benefits should complete the



proper forms in the office of the Veterans Counselor, Pratt Hall 203, at the beginning of the summer session.

Individuals other than the foregoing will be admitted to summer school to take any of the courses offered and participate in the workshops and seminars. However, they are not considered as a matriculating student.

PROGRAM FOR HIGH SCHOOL JUNIORS

Honor students who have completed the junior year of high school with at least a B average in all college entrance subjects taken in the sophomore and junior years may preview University life and earn regular college credit by enrolling in 2 or 3 lower division courses. Students seeking admission to this program should write to the Registrar for further details.

ELIGIBILITY AND ADMISSION

Admission to the Summer School program in **no way implies assured admission toward a degree** at IUP. Credits taken in the summer months, however, are applicable toward degree programs and are transferable to other institutions. Acceptance of summer credits at other institutions will depend upon the consent of these institutions. High school graduates not officially admitted to IUP may take summer work as a special student with the understanding that it would constitute college credit but not acceptance as a degree candidate.

READMISSION POLICY

Indiana students who had been dismissed for academic reasons and who were not in attendance during the academic year 1973-74 are required to apply for readmission to Indiana as a regular student. This application must be filed with the dean of the university school in which they were enrolled by **April 1, 1974**. The attainment of the **required quality point average** for readmission **must be completed** by the end of the main summer session 1974 in order to qualify for readmission status for the 1974-75 academic year.

*In Pre and Post sessions the **first** class will be held on the same day as registration but at a special time. Classes which normally meet at 8:00 a.m. will meet at 1:00 p.m. and those which normally meet at 9:30 a.m. will be at 2:00 p.m. on day of registration only. Saturday classes have been discontinued during the summer session, **EXCEPT** as noted in the schedule of courses.

interests and needs. All courses listed in the Class Schedules (pages 8-14) will be offered if there are ten or more students enrolled. Additional sections of a course will be opened if the need indicates. Descriptions of most of the courses listed in the Class Schedule may be found in the 1973-74 Undergraduate Catalog.

Receipt of the Course Request Cards will assure you a place in the summer school, provide the Director of Housing with your desired meal and housing requirements, and serve as the basis for assessment of your fees.

Please return the Course Request Cards to the Scheduling Center, John Sutton Hall, IUP, by **May 9, 1974** if you will begin in the **Pre-Session**; by **May 30, 1974** if you will begin in the **Main Session**; and by **July 11, 1974** if you will attend only the **Post Session**.

Students who submit a Course Request Card or cards before the above deadlines will receive **final scheduling materials and fee statements in the mail at their home addresses before each session begins.**

FEES (Subject to change)

Contingent Fee:

All Schools: \$31.00 per semester hour. (Minimum contingent fee for each session \$93.00).

Out-of-state students: \$46.00 per semester hour of credit. (Minimum contingent fee for each session \$138.00.)

Other Fees:

Degree Fee: to be paid only by those who graduate at the end of the summer session, \$5.00.

Approximate expenses for books: \$10.00 to \$30.00.

Room and Board Fees: The fee for room and board in university housing is \$27.40 per week. Housing fees for private dormitories vary.

Late Registration Fee: A student who registers after the date officially set for registration will pay an additional fee of \$1.00 per day until the student is in regular attendance. Even with the payment of a late fee **no registration will be accepted after the second day of the pre and post sessions and after the fourth day of the main session.**

Activity Fee: The activity fee for the regular summer session is \$10.50 and \$5.25 for the pre and the post session.

How to Pay Fees: All fees, except the degree fee, are to be paid at the time of final scheduling.

Change in Fees: The foregoing fees are subject to change without notice.

FINAL SCHEDULING AND FEE PAYMENT

All students are required to attend final scheduling at the Memorial Field House on the following dates, according to their assigned appointment times:

Pre-Session — Monday, June 3, 1974

Main Session — Monday, June 24, 1974

Post Session — Monday, August 5, 1974

Students must be prepared to do the following at final scheduling:

1. Process their schedules.
2. Arrange for meals and housing if not previously assigned.
3. **PAY ALL FEES IN FULL.**

All questions pertaining to fees, class schedules, and room assignments must be settled at final scheduling so that classes may operate on a full time basis the following day. Those wishing credits evaluated should see the dean of the school in which they are enrolled.

Bad Check Charge: Students making checks payable to "Indiana University of Pennsylvania" which are not acceptable to the bank because of insufficient funds will be charged \$10 for each bad check.

FINANCIAL AID

A limited amount of financial aid may be available to full-time summer session students. Any student interested in this possibility should contact the Director of Financial Aid, First Floor, Pratt Hall, for further information. Deadline for filing applications is April 1, 1974.

Only students who have attended IUP on a full-time basis one semester prior to summer school and freshmen students who have been admitted under the Summer-January Program will be considered for financial assistance.

WITHDRAWAL—REFUND POLICIES

A student may withdraw from a course or courses within the time periods specified for each summer session provided he completes an appropriate withdrawal form (available in departmental offices) for each course. In each case a grade of "W" will be assigned by the instructor on the grade card submitted at the conclusion of the session. Appropriate withdrawal does not guarantee a refund of fees paid.

No portion of summer school fees will be refunded.

HOUSING

All freshmen must reside in university residence halls and take meals in university dining halls. Students who have completed at least two full semesters at the university may select living quarters in town. Those students may contact the Housing Department in John Sutton Hall for available accommodations. Sophomore, junior and senior students may live in university housing and any student regardless of residence may take meals in university dining halls.

During arena registration, students will be expected to register their addresses and telephone numbers. Any changes must be reported to the Director of Housing (John Sutton Hall) immediately.

MEALS

All students living in a residence hall are required to take meals in university dining halls. Students residing off campus may contract for meals in university dining halls at arena registration.

ROOM RESERVATION

Room reservations will be made from your Summer Course Request Cards. Please indicate a choice of roommate on your Course Request Card if you have a preference as prospective resident students will be assigned a roommate. Notification of room assignment will be enclosed with the scheduling appointment time notice and fee statement which you will receive before the session begins.

Residence halls will be open for students on the Sunday before the session begins at 2:00 p.m. Report directly to the Residence Manager of the building where you have been assigned. The residence halls will be open for students on June 2, June 23, and August 4 for the three summer sessions respectively.

STUDENT ADVISORY SERVICES

All regular students attending the summer sessions, or those students who enrolled in the summer sessions and who have been admitted as degree candidates to IUP are requested to consult the deans of their respective schools if their department chairmen and/or advisers are not available during the summer. Advice and counsel should be sought in regard to the following matters: planning summer school program; revising summer school program; determining academic standing; determining graduation requirements; making a request for refunds.

Summer-January entrants will be assigned advisers on the basis of the department they will enter. These advisers will function on a temporary basis during the summer until the January semester of the freshman year. It is the responsibility of the Summer-January entrants to meet with their advisers on each of the "Meet Your Adviser Days" so designated on summer calendar bulletins, etc. All Summer-January freshmen are required to attend all activities sponsored by the university for entering Summer-January students.

UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS

All rules and regulations of the university apply during the summer sessions.



CLASS HOURS

During the pre and post sessions some classes will begin at 8:00 a.m., run to 9:30 and then resume at 11:00 and run to 12:30 o'clock. Others will begin at 9:30 a.m., run to 11:00 and then resume at 12:30 and run to 2:00 o'clock. In the main session classes begin at 8:15 a.m. and close at 2:25 p.m., each period being 85 minutes. Some laboratory periods, field trips, practice periods for musical organizations, and similar activities are conducted in the afternoon. Each student should make certain that he can adjust his time to these periods as arranged before making his schedule. The time followed will be that of the Indiana community.

RELAXATION AND RECREATION AT INDIANA

A pleasant environment and a favorable summer climate makes IUP an ideal spot for summer study and relaxation.

Plans for the summer of 1974 call for the continuation of the Summer Theatre Guild program in Fisher Auditorium. This university-community theater will present six plays each for four nights a week. Students of the main session will receive tickets to all six of these plays on their activity cards.

An exceptional summer lecture series is another feature of IUP summer sessions.

The recreation program developed by a student-faculty committee is ample and varied. Tentative plans for the 1974 sessions include continuation of the Saturday night dances at the Union, outdoor concerts and the regular Monday night Feature Film Series. There will be picnics, outings, steak fries, informal parties and hikes at the University Lodge. On the campus proper, the Field House will be open for swimming and athletic activity.

AUTOMOBILES

All students, graduate and undergraduate, are required to register their motor vehicles at the Housing Office, first floor John Sutton Hall. They must present their validated I-card, driver's license, and owner's registration card when applying for a parking decal. Failure to register the automobile may result in fines and towing.

STUDENT CHILDREN'S CENTER

The University Student Children's Center is a new service on campus. Set up by the university to care for the children of students, faculty, and staff, for a nominal charge, while they attend classes, do library work, etc., it is run by professionals trained in the area of child development. During the day the children participate in planned indoor and outdoor activities, they receive a mid-morning and mid-afternoon snack, and milk to go with the lunches they are asked to carry. INFIRMARY

Slight illnesses are cared for in the IUP Infirmary without charge for a period of three days. After three days, a charge includes the regular nurse and medical services, but does not include special nurse or special medical service. All students living off-campus and not taking meals in the dining halls are charged \$3.00 a day from the first day.

SUMMER GRADUATES

Students who plan to graduate in the summer must have completed all requirements for graduation by the **end of the main summer session, unless prior exception be made by the school dean.**

The responsibility for graduation rests upon students. All students who plan to graduate in the summer of 1974 should write or call at the office of the dean of their respective schools to secure application forms for graduation. These forms properly filled in must be returned to the office of the deans of these schools not later than June 1, 1974.

There will not be a summer commencement ceremony. Summer graduates may participate in the May 1975 commencement ceremony.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

AEROSPACE WORKSHOP

3 cr.

This workshop will be conducted as a seminar with a number of visiting aerospace authorities. It deals with the atmosphere and space environment; history of flight and flight problems; satellites and space probes; manned orbital and space exploration projects; propulsion; communication, and remote sensing. Computer and system analysis and problems of teaching and bibliography will be considered. An indoctrination flight and flight training in a small craft is offered. Field trips to air age installations and projects fortify learning. This group will be limited to 25 persons because of air flight arrangements and field trip preparations.

This course may be taken for graduate (Geog 522), undergraduate (Geog 422) credit, or as a non-credit course.

ARGENTINE SEMINAR

6 cr.

The university cooperates with the Regional Council for International Education in sponsoring an Argentine Seminar program in Buenos Aires during the main and post sessions of summer school. Six semester hours credit may be earned: 3 credits in conversational Spanish and 3 credits in Social Science Special Studies.

The basic cost of the program in 1973 was \$595. This included the cost of transportation, room and board. University fees depend on the number of credits elected by the student. Applicants must have completed the intermediate sequence in Spanish.

DRAMA WORKSHOP

3 to 9 cr.

For the past 23 summers the university has conducted a highly successful drama workshop, which has attracted widespread attention. Sets, makeup, the making and collecting of properties, publicity and ticket distribution are among the duties in the day's work for those in the workshop. Six full-length Broadway plays with entertainment value of good quality, given during the main session of summer school, offer opportunities for acting, working on technical crews and assisting in many phases of production.

The workshop is actually a theatre practicum which offers from three to nine credits for the practical experience in connection with Theatre-by-the-Grove, the university's semi-professional summer theatre. Three credits are offered in the pre-session and six credits in the main session. Students should be forewarned that they will be involved most of the day in the pursuit of their assignments.

The drama workshop uses university facilities in Fisher Auditorium, and is an integral part of the Summer Theatre Guild, the sponsoring organization of Theatre-by-the-Grove. The Sunday edition of the **NEW YORK TIMES** regularly carries the weekly offerings on our schedule. The entire theatre project embraces people from the community, faculty, imported actors, technical specialists, enrolled students and all others who have a genuine interest in theatre activities.

HOME ECONOMICS STUDY TOURS

The School of Home Economics expects to offer two study tours during the summer of 1974. Miss Patricia Bell, Home Economics Education Department, will conduct a child development tour in Europe during the pre-session. Mr. Allen Woods, Food and Nutrition Department, will lead an educational foods tour to the U.S.A. west coast and Hawaii during post session.

These tours are available for graduate or undergraduate credit or they may be taken non-credit. For further information, contact the tour directors.

HOME ECONOMICS EDUCATION WORKSHOP FOR IN-SERVICE TEACHERS

"Developing Independent Living Skills for the Physically Handicapped" is the focus of a workshop to be held for in-service vocational home economics teachers June 10-21, 1974, under the direction of Mrs. Ruth Browning and Miss Lois Rupert of the Home Economics Education Department. Consultants will conduct various sessions and two field trips are planned.

Those desiring graduate credit must be admitted to the Graduate School. Deadline for submitting a Graduate School application is May 1.

EDPA Part F funds are expected to cover the cost of the workshop as well as most expenses of the participants. Enroll-

ment is limited and eligible applicants will be admitted in the order applications are received. For further information and details concerning registration contact either of the directors.

BISHOP SEWING WORKSHOPS

The School of Home Economics will sponsor non-credit Bishop sewing workshops conducted by Mrs. Fay Hammer-schmitt. These workshops are open to all interested persons.

Basic tailoring will be held in the morning from 9:00 – 12:00 the week of July 8–12. Tailoring fur, leather, ultra suede and double faced fabrics as well as special techniques will be topics covered in the evening course to be held from 7:00 – 10:00 during the same week. The morning course for the week of July 15–19 will focus on men's jackets; the evening course will be devoted to men's and women's slacks.

Registration is \$30.00 per week per course or \$55.00 for two courses taken during the same week. Lodging is available in campus residence halls. For further information about courses, registration or lodging, contact Mrs. Betty Wood, School of Home Economics.

SCHOOL FOOD SERVICE INSTITUTE

The sixteenth annual summer institute for school food service employees will be held June 24–28, 1974. Sessions are scheduled from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. daily. No college credit is given, but every effort is made to meet the needs of employees in all positions. Expenses include a \$55.00 registration fee plus lodging and evening meals. SOCIAL SCIENCE FOREIGN STUDY – ARGENTINA 2-6 cr.

INDIA: A NATION IN TRANSITION

6 cr.

Eight and one half weeks of study will be conducted in India related to economics, culture, geography, politics, and personal experience in a non-western culture. It will include living with individual Indian families, visits to industrial and agricultural areas, experiences related to non-western religion with visits to a limited number of shrines, examination of contributions of Indian culture and changes taking place, a look at Indian urbanization, etc. Prerequisites: (Enrollment for graduates and undergraduates, juniors and seniors, by permission only.) Undergraduates must major in one of the social sciences. Graduates must major in one of the social sciences or be a teacher of one of the social sciences in elementary, secondary, community college, or college level, curriculum director or administrator of public schools. Families will be discouraged.

A recreational sports program for children from 7 to 15 will be offered by the Dept. of Health and Physical Education during pre-session (June 3–21). Children from the university and community eligible to participate. Activities conducted Mon. through Fri., 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Each participant will become involved in team and individual physical activities designed to promote maximum physical, social and emotional growth.
