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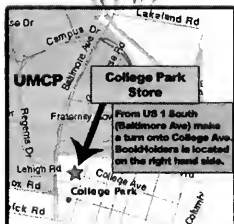
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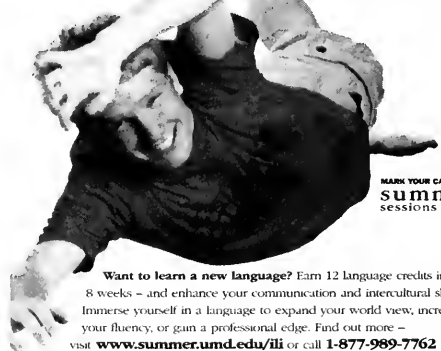

Current students note that annual student permits purchased during the 2004-2005 academic year with an expiration date of August 20, 2005 are valid during the summer sessions. These permits, regardless of the lot designation shown on the front of the permit, are valid in parking area(s) 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 11, and 16.

Permit Applicants Review the following

information before applying for a permit. The on-line application form will be available in January (date to be determined).

1. The parking fee is \$42.00 for commuter students and \$85.00 for resident students. The fees will be charged to your student account.
2. The parking registration fee is a non-refundable fee.
3. You may not register for a parking permit in your name for another person.
4. You will be issued one permit which may be transferred to other vehicles. Applicants who have a vehicle with a canvas top or who have a motorcycle may choose to register one of these vehicles by indicating this on the application. You will receive a decal for this vehicle. If you need to register a third vehicle you will have to pay the full summer school parking registration fee.
5. You must select to have either your permit mailed to your home address or to pick up your permit at the Department of Transportation Services (DOTS) office. Permits will be mailed and also will be available for pick-up on May 13, 2005. If you do not make a selection then the permit will be mailed to you. If you register on or after May 13th you must allow three working days to process your application. The last day the DOTS can mail your permit is May 23, 2005 for Summer Session I and July 1, 2005 for Summer Session II.
6. All persons associated with the university including those displaying a State disabled permit or tag must purchase and display a DOTS hanging permit for the current year.

THE YOUNG SCHOLARS PROGRAM

July 10-29, 2005

The University of Maryland's Young Scholars Program is designed for highly motivated, successful, rising high school juniors and seniors who love to learn, explore, and excel.

This highly selective three-week summer program gives you the chance to:

- Pursue academic interests
- Discover potential career paths
- Experience campus life first-hand
- Get a jump on your college career by earning three college credits
- Develop new study skills and ways of learning.

As a Young Scholar, you'll choose one 3-credit class from a selection of challenging, college-level courses, which introduce you to a particular field of study and give you the chance to explore possible careers. You'll learn alongside the best and the brightest in a dynamic classroom environment, supplemented with field trips and guest speakers.

Classes generally meet every day, Monday-Friday, for the three-week session. Because of the rigorous course work, prepare to spend several hours each day working on projects, reading, or studying for exams. The program extends beyond the classroom, with evening seminars on college admission and scholarship application strategies; outings to nearby Washington, DC; and movie nights, bowling parties, and campus recreation events.

STEP 1:

DETERMINE YOUR ELIGIBILITY

The application process for summer sessions is quick and easy. If you are currently enrolled at University of Maryland, College Park for the spring 2005 semester, are a newly admitted graduate or undergraduate College Park student for fall 2005, or are a current University System of Maryland Graduate student you can register for summer 2005. Go to Step 3

Note: If you are a graduate student at another University System of

Maryland institution, you do not need to apply, but must submit an inter-campus registration form, available at your school. It must be authorized by your home campus and by the University of Maryland, College Park Office of the Registrar.

All other students must complete the appropriate application for admission and be admitted to the university. (see below) **Please contact SPOC with any questions.**

Visiting College Students, College Graduates and High School Graduates

If you are a student from another college or university, you must be in good academic standing at that institution to be admitted to summer sessions. It is your responsibility to ensure that the courses you take at the University of Maryland, College Park may be transferred to your degree program at your home institution. If you are a college graduate, you may enroll in undergraduate courses without further clearance or advising. If you are a high school graduate, you must have earned a grade point average of 2.0 or better to be admitted to summer sessions. It is recommended that you submit your registration form with your application materials.

Visiting Graduate Students If you are a graduate student at a university or college outside the University System of Maryland, you are considered a visiting graduate student. Transcripts are not required, but a letter stating you are in good academic standing and that the courses taken at the University of Maryland will be transferred to your home institution must be signed by your dean or registrar's office and submitted via fax, surface mail or in person.

Current High School Students (Concurrent Enrollment, The Arts! at Maryland or the Young Scholars Program) You must be entering your junior or senior year in Fall 2005 and must have earned a grade point average of 3.0 or better. High school students applying to The Arts! at Maryland or the Young Scholars Program will complete The Arts! at

Maryland and Young Scholars Program application available at www.summer.umd.edu/forms. High school students who are not registering for either program cannot register for 3-Week Sessions I-A, I-B, II-C and II-D. Complete the application for concurrent admission status for 6-week sessions I and II.

*Please note that applications for either The Arts! at Maryland or the Young Scholars Program will not be evaluated until transcripts, the letter of recommendation, and applicant essay are received. Applications for The Arts! at Maryland or the Young Scholars Program can also be printed and mailed to SPOC.

ADMISSION AND REGISTRATION

Golden ID Students The University of Maryland Golden Identification Program makes courses and services available to persons who are 60 years of age or older who are legal residents of Maryland and who are retired (not employed more than 20 hours/week). Apply for undergraduate courses by completing a Visiting Undergraduate Summer Student Application 2005, indicating in question 11 that you are applying as a Golden ID student. Submit it to SPOC with your non-refundable \$50 application-processing fee.

After your application has been processed, you will receive instructions on how to register. You may begin registering on the first day of classes, and may register for up to two courses per session, when space is available. You must meet all of the course's prerequisites and co-requisites. Golden ID students are not eligible for consortium classes. Tuition charges are waived, but you are responsible for the mandatory fees. Your Golden ID registration entitles you to use the libraries and certain non-academic services. For more information, please contact the Golden ID Coordinator, 1113 Mitchell Building, 301-314-8219.

Former University of Maryland, College Park Students If you are a former Maryland student who attended in a prior term as a visiting student, you must re-apply for admission as a visiting student and pay the application-processing fee.

If you attended Maryland in a past fall or spring semester but did not attend spring semester 2005, contact the Office of Reenrollment, 0117 Mitchell Building, 301-314-8382.

Prospective Degree Students The University of Maryland formally admits undergraduate students for the fall and spring semesters only. If you have not been formally admitted to a degree program at Maryland and wish to take a course during summer sessions, follow the instructions for visiting students. If you have been formally accepted into a degree program at Maryland for the fall 2005, you are eligible to register for summer without applying for admission to summer sessions.

Institute Students Institute students must comply with requirements stated in the literature published about the institute in which they are enrolling.

Advanced Special Students (non-degree seeking, post-baccalaureate students) If you wish to earn graduate credit without enrolling in a degree program and do not qualify for admission as a visiting student, you must apply (checking the "Advanced Special Student" box on the application), pay the non-refundable \$50 application-processing fee and meet one of the three following criteria (verifiable by an official transcript):

- Hold a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited institution with an overall "B" (3.0) average.
- Hold a master's or doctoral degree from a regionally accredited institution.
- Hold a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited institution and, within the last five years, have taken either the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) (required minimum score: 1020 on the combined Verbal and Quantitative sections), the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT) (required minimum score: 500) or the Miller's Analogies Test (MAT) (required score: 51). Original test scores must be attached to the application or sent from the testing agency to the Office of Graduate Admissions.

If you have previously enrolled as an Advanced Special Student, your graduate application is valid for five years from the semester or Summer Session for which you originally enrolled. Otherwise, you must submit another application, although you are not required to pay another application-processing fee.

ADMISSION AND REGISTRATION

STEP 3: MAKE ADVISING APPOINTMENT IF NECESSARY

Advising is required for some students and highly recommended for all students. Prior to registering, advising is mandatory for students in certain majors, students on academic probation or dismissal, student athletes, AAP students, IA students and students who need to fulfill fundamental studies requirements. Set up an appointment to see an advisor as soon as possible. For financial blocks contact the Financial Services Center in Room 1135 Lee Building; 301-314-9000 or 888-313-2404. All blocks must be cleared before you will be permitted to register.

STEP 5: OBTAIN SPECIAL PERMISSIONS

Some courses have specific requirements, prerequisites or require special permission. All special permissions and advising requirements must be met prior to registering. Colleges and departments can grant special permissions electronically; however, after receiving permission, you must still officially register for the course.

REGISTRATION POLICIES, CANCELLATION, WAITLIST INFORMATION

STEP 8: AFTER YOU REGISTER

Purchase text books: Check www.summer.umd.edu, locate the course and then click on books for a list of required texts. Books can be purchased at the University Book Center in the Stamp Student Union, at the Maryland Book Exchange or BookHolders in College Park, or at any other textbook store or online vendor.

Receive ID Card: ID cards are mailed to students who register prior to May 15th. Students registering after this date may pick up a summer ID card at the Office of the Registrar customer service counter on the first floor of the Mitchell Building.

Purchase Parking Permit: Current students note that annual student permits purchased during the 2004-2005 academic year with an expiration date of August 20, 2005 are valid during the summer sessions. These permits, regardless of the lot designation shown on the front of the permit, are valid in parking area(s) 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 11, and 16. **Students who do not have a permit should visit www.summer.umd.edu/forms for permit application and parking fee information.**

Cancellation of Registration

Students who register and decide not to attend summer sessions must cancel their registration in writing prior to the first day of classes to receive a 100% refund. Cancellations must be received in writing by SPOC (first floor Mitchell Building) by the dates listed below. Failure to cancel registration will result in a financial obligation to the university even though the student does not attend class. Note that cancellations are not permitted after the first day of classes. Withdrawals can be processed after this time, and a percentage of tuition is assessed. Late Registration A \$20 late registration fee will be assessed for registrations initiated on or after the first day of classes for each summer session. During late registration, all tuition, fees and outstanding balances must be paid at the time of registration.

"Non-Standard Course" Registration

During the normal registration periods for each session, you may register for courses that vary in beginning dates from summer sessions' starting dates. Courses varying in length from the regular summer session will have late registration, schedule adjustment and other dates adjusted proportionately to the length of the course. Withdrawal from the University

Students who wish to terminate their registration (withdraw from all summer courses) after the first day of classes, must process a withdrawal from the university. WAITLIST

The waitlist is a roster of students waiting for a seat to become available in a closed/filled course. The waitlist stores names in order of request and allows access to seats as drops are processed. If a waitlist is available, it will be offered when you attempt to add a closed course. If you select the waitlist option, you will be placed on the waitlist for a closed section and for up to five additional sections if they are available.

- Not all departments offer waitlists. It is the decision of the department whether to offer a waitlist.
- To be eligible for the waitlist, you cannot be registered for any other section of the desired course.
- You may select to be waitlisted for up to six sections of a course. The first section to become available will be assigned to you. Since you will then be registered for a section, your name will be removed from all other waitlisted sections of the course.
- Time conflicts and excessive credit load violations that might result from receiving a course from the waitlist must be resolved by the student.

- Once you are registered in a course for which you were waitlisted, it becomes part of your schedule and you become responsible for the tuition charge.

Waitlist Check-in:

Check-in is required on the first day of classes and each day thereafter until the waitlist closes.

Students can check their waitlist status in two ways:

1. On the Web: www.testudo.umd.edu Select "Records and Registration" and then "Waitlist Check-in." Keep your confirmation number for your records.
2. In person: Visit SPOC at the Registrar's Customer Service Counter, Mitchell Building, First Floor, Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

Hold File

The hold file is a roster of students who do not meet the departmental restrictions of a particular course. The course may have seats available, however students who do not meet the criterion established by the department for that course must be placed on the hold file. In courses with a hold file, students on the waitlist receive priority consideration over those on the hold file, because these students meet the department requirements for the course. Students will not be considered for placement into the course until the first day of classes. At this time, if space is available, the students will be moved into the class when they check-in on the waitlist. If no space is available, the hold file will be placed on the end of the waitlist. Students on the hold file must check-in on the first day of classes, and then daily, to remain on the hold file. Students may check their hold file progress by visiting www.testudo.umd.edu and selecting "Records and Registrations", then "Waitlist Check-in".

TO COLLEGE PARK STUDENTS:

The University of Maryland has begun a new tradition, and you can help shape it. Students at many leading institutions—including Princeton University, the University of Virginia, and Vanderbilt University—sign honor pledges on tests and major homework assignments. They do so to affirm the quality and integrity of their work, and to build a tradition of trust on their campuses.

Maryland has a student-initiated Honor Pledge, approved two years ago by the University Senate and the Student Government Association. The Honor Pledge is a statement undergraduate and graduate students are asked to write by hand and sign on examinations, papers, or other academic assignments not specifically exempted by the instructor. The Pledge reads:

I pledge on my honor that I have not given or received any unauthorized assistance on this assignment/examination.

Honor Pledge statements are printed on University examination books and "scantron" sheets. We urge you to write and sign the Pledge deliberately and thoughtfully, as tradition you and generations of Maryland students will remember with pride.

—If you are registered for more than one term, your tuition payment will be due in full according to the deadline established for the earlier term. One example: if you are registered for Summer Session IA and Summer Session II, your tuition for both terms is due in full by May 27th, 2005.

Financial Eligibility

Students who register for Summer Sessions 2005 are expected to remain financially eligible. Once registered, it is the student's responsibility to make payment by the appropriate due date. Failure to make payment by the due date will result in a finance charge and may jeopardize your continued enrollment. Students who decide not to attend must notify the Office of the Registrar to request cancellation of enrollment by appropriate deadlines to avoid charges for summer courses. Failure to attend does not waive the financial obligation incurred with registration.

Late payment fee

Students who fail to pay the full balance due on their account are subject to a 1.5% finance charge each month. A finance charge of 1.5% will be added to all accounts that have not been paid by the payment due date.

Delinquent Accounts

You will not be able to register unless you are in good financial standing with the university. Students are encouraged to avoid registration delays by assuring that charges for library fines, parking violation assessments and other penalty fees and service charges, are paid in full.

Upon registering, you incur a financial obligation. Failure to make payment by the due date will result in a finance charge and may jeopardize your continued enrollment.

In accordance with state law, the university must refer delinquent accounts to the State Central Collections Unit in Baltimore for collection and legal follow-up. Collection charges will be billed to the student. Collection costs are 17 percent of the bill, plus any attorney and/or court cost fees. Maryland law allows the Central Collections Unit to block issuance of Maryland state incomes tax refunds to individuals with delinquent accounts. In addition, State of Maryland policy stipulates that unpaid parking tickets issued on state property could result in the withholding of motor vehicle tags until paid. The university will not confer any diplomas or certificates or issue a transcript of record to a student who has not made satisfactory settlement of her or his account.

REFUNDS

In order to receive a refund from your student account you may submit a written refund request to our office. This can be done by either visiting the Financial Service Center in Room 1135 Lee Building and completing a refund request form, by visiting www.testudo.umd.edu/apps/saracct and completing an online refund request, or by sending a letter or fax requesting a refund. The fax number is 301-314-9098. Upon verification by the Refund Unit, refunds are processed in the same manner in which you originally paid. Refund checks are made payable to the student and are mailed from the Bursar's Office. Credit balances attributable to payment made by personal check are subject to a 30-day hold to insure that the check clears the bank before a refund is issued. All refund checks are mailed to the permanent address of record.

Credit balances attributable to payments made originally by credit card must be refunded back to the card originally charged. Credit card refunds are processed electronically and take about a week after the credit appears on your student account. To assist us in processing your refund request as soon as possible, be sure to include your credit card number and expiration date on your refund request. If you mail your request to our office, a receipt verifying that the refund was processed will be sent to you.

SUMMER FINANCIAL AID

In general, summer financial aid is very limited. The university does not receive separate allocations of grant, work-study or loan funds from the federal or state governments for summer financial aid. To be eligible for any summer aid, you must register for a total of at least six credits or 24 graduate units.

If you have not used all of your Pell Grant or Stafford Loan eligibility from the 2004-2005 school year, you may be eligible to receive your remaining eligibility during the summer.

To request summer financial aid, you must have submitted a 2004-2005 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and all other requested documents to the Office of Student Financial Aid (OSFA). Once you have registered for summer, your eligibility for financial aid will be determined and OSFA will mail or email a summer financial aid notification to you.

Credit Hours

The semester hour is the unit of credit. During summer sessions a three-credit course may meet five times a week for six weeks, with each class period meeting for 80 minutes. Courses that meet two or three times a week will have longer class sessions.

Degree seeking University of Maryland, College Park students will be given credit toward the appropriate degree program for satisfactory completion of summer courses. Students are responsible for determining the applicability of courses selected, and are urged to consult with an academic advisor prior to registering for summer courses.

Academic Dishonesty

Academic dishonesty is a serious offense that may result in suspension or expulsion from the university. The normal sanction for academic dishonesty is a grade of XF, denoting "failure due to academic dishonesty," recorded on the student's transcript.

Audit

A student may register to audit a course or courses if space is available. Tuition and fees are the same as if the course is taken for credit. The notation "AU" is recorded on the transcript for each course audited. Courses taken for audit are not included in the calculation of full/part-time status.

Pass-Fail Option

Undergraduate students who have completed 30 or more credit hours with a GPA of at least 2.0 (15 of which must have been completed at the University of Maryland, College Park) may register on a pass-fail basis if this option is offered. Only one course per semester or summer session may be taken pass-fail. For further information on the pass-fail option, see the undergraduate catalog or www.testudo.umd.edu/soc/passfail.html

Visiting students are typically not granted permission to take courses with a pass-fail grading option. Those who are interested in taking a course pass-fail should contact their advisor from the home institution. Many institutions will

not accept transfer courses from another institution if they were completed on a pass-fail basis.

The pass-fail grading system is a grading option for undergraduates only. However, a graduate program may, in certain cases, allow a graduate student to use the pass-fail option for any 100-300 level courses that a student takes. Graduate credit may not be earned for these courses. For further information on the pass-fail option, see the graduate catalog.

Code of Academic Integrity

All students are expected to adhere to the provisions of the Code of Academic Integrity as published in the undergraduate and graduate catalogs. Copies of the code may be obtained from the Student Honor Council in Room 2118 Mitchell Building. Call 301-314-8450 for more information.

Degree Candidates

Students who expect to complete requirements for degrees during the summer must apply for graduation with the Office of the Registrar no later than Friday, July 15, 2005 for degrees to be awarded as of August 2005. August graduates are invited to participate in the December 2005 commencement ceremonies, and will be listed in that commencement program. Diploma applications can be processed in two ways.

1. Use Testudo on the web at www.testudo.umd.edu. Select *Records and Registration Services*, then *Apply for Graduation*.
2. Complete an application at the Office of the Registrar, Customer Service Counter, first floor lobby, Mitchell Building.

Final Examinations

All final examinations must be held on the last day of class for each summer session. No final examination shall be given at another time without permission of the department chair. A final examination will be given in every undergraduate course. Exceptions may be made with the written approval of the chair of the department and the dean.

Full-Time Status

Undergraduate students: During summer sessions, enrollment in a six-week session with courses totaling six semester hours, or enrollment in a three-week accelerated summer session for three semester hours, will be defined as full-time status for that session. Enrollment in six semester hours in each of two summer sessions will be defined as full-time enrollment for the summer.

Graduate students: Enrollment in academic credit totaling 24 graduate units is defined as full-time enrollment for one summer session.

Grades

Grades for Session I and Session II will be available approximately one week after the end of each session. Sessions I-A and I-B grades will be available at the same time as Session I grades (approximately July 18) and Sessions II-C and II-D grades will be available at the same time as Session II grades (approximately August 29). Grades for non-standard courses ending after the regular session in which they begin will be posted after regular session grade reports are posted. Grades can be viewed on line at www.testudo.umd.edu/apps/grades/. Note that grade reports are not automatically mailed, but can be requested via the web. *Official Transcripts* on page 20 for transcript request information.

Transferring UMCP Credits Back to Your Home Institution

It is your responsibility to ensure that the courses you take at the University of Maryland, College Park are transferable and apply to your degree program at your home institution. Be sure to get permission in writing from your home institution's academic advisor prior to enrolling in summer coursework here. Please feel free to use the *Permission to Transfer Credits Form* located in the "forms" section of this publication, if your home institution does not already have one. *Permission to Transfer Credits Forms* are for your purposes only and are not required by the University of Maryland, College Park for summer registration. An official transcript will need to be requested once your summer grades have been posted to have credits transferred to the home institution upon completion of the summer course work at the University of Maryland. Maximum Load

Undergraduate students are not permitted to enroll for more than eight hours of academic credit in Summer Sessions I and I-A or I-B combined, or Summer Sessions II and II-C or II-D combined. Students may register for only one course (four credit maximum) for Summer Sessions I-A, I-B, II-C or II-D. Visiting undergraduate students who wish to request an exception to the maximum load must contact SPOC.

Graduate students should normally not enroll for more than six semester hours in one summer session. Course loads exceeding these maximums require approval of the college dean.

Protection of Privacy (Buckley)

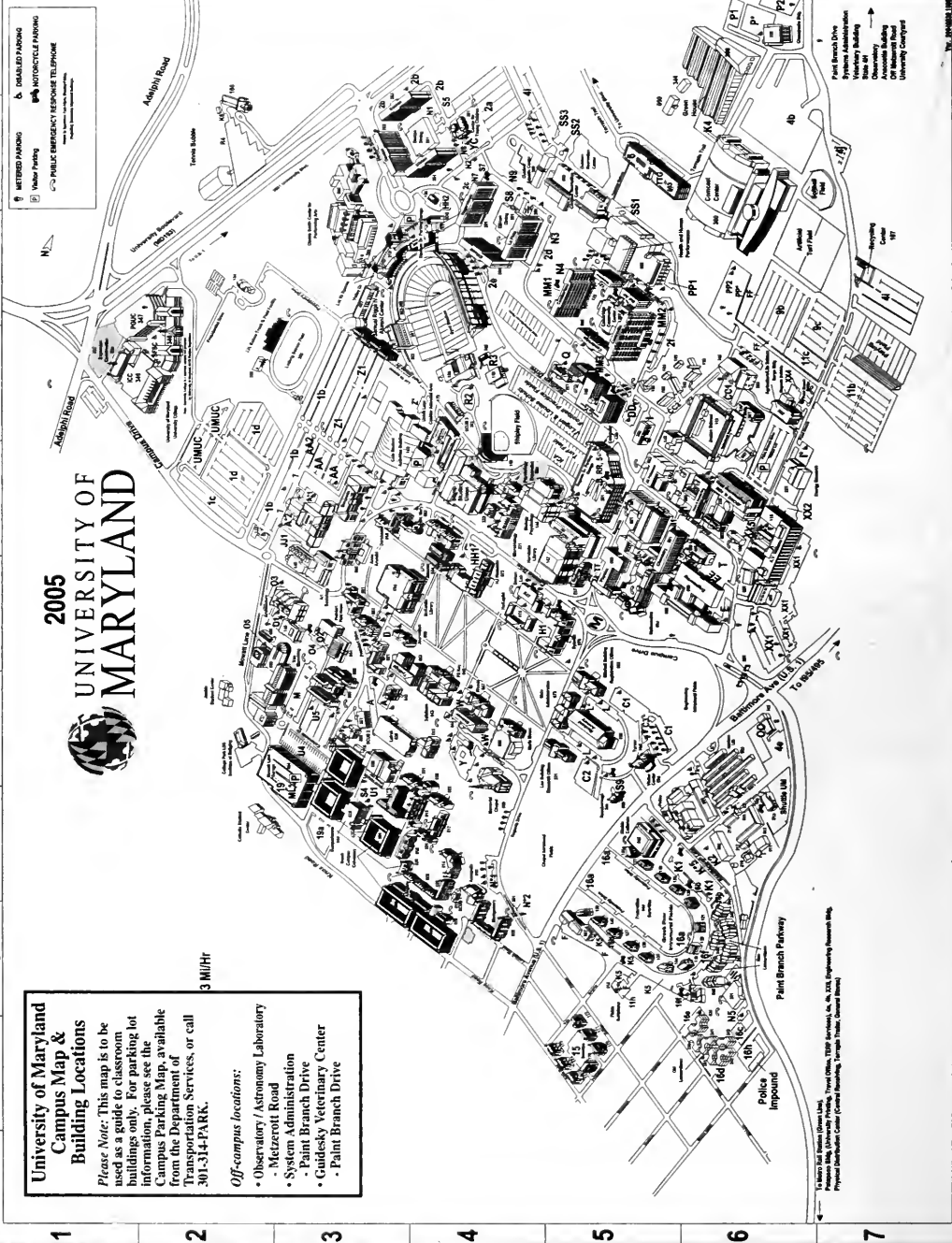
University of Maryland Campus Map & Building Locations

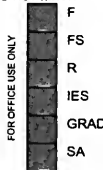
