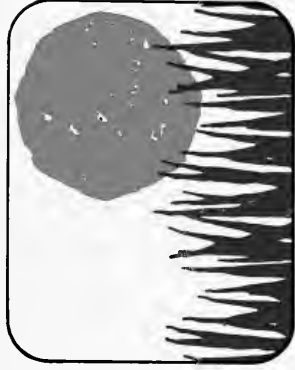

THE SUMMER SESSIONS

The Summer Sessions at the University of Maryland make available educational opportunities for undergraduate and graduate students who wish to fulfill degree requirements in the shortest length of time, who wish to take courses that they cannot fit into their academic year schedules, or who need to make up deficiencies or test their ability to do college work. The Summer Sessions also seek to broaden and vary the instructional program by appointing outstanding visiting lecturers and to stimulate students' interests by providing an academic environment which includes a diversified cultural and recreational program. To meet specific educational needs, the Summer Sessions offer workshops and institutes for school personnel and other groups.

The extensive and varied course offerings, lectures, special institutes, and workshops are planned jointly by the Department Chairmen, Deans, Divisional Chairmen, and the Administrative Dean for Summer Programs. The courses offered are regular University courses taught by members of the faculty or visiting lecturers of outstanding ability.

Fees for Auditors and courses taken for audit are the same as those charged for courses taken for credit at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. Fees for altering academic programs are discussed in the section on Admission and Registration.

LIVING ACCOMMODATIONS AND FOOD SERVICE

Residence hall accommodations are available to students who are enrolled in Summer Session courses or authorized workshops and conferences. When students terminate their academic association with the University they also terminate their room contracts. Listings of off-campus rooms, apartments, and houses are available in the Off Campus Housing Office, Room 1211 Student Union Bldg. (454-3645). The facilities of the residence halls typically include study rooms, lounges, recreation areas, laundry equipment, and public telephones. The typical student room is for double occupancy and is furnished with beds, chests and desks. Students must supply their own study lamp, waste basket, laundry bag, pillow, linen, and other accessories. The Gordon Davis Linen Supply Company, 1620 North 11th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19122, is authorized to offer all residents a complete weekly linen rental service. Additional information may be obtained from the company, or arrangements for linen service can be made after arrival.

All residents are responsible for compliance with University and residence hall regulations.

For your guidance the 1973 room rates are provided below. The Board of Regents is being asked to approve a rate increase. Revised room rates for summer, 1974 were not available when this catalog went to press. For further information, call the Campus Housing Office, 454-2711.

- 28 (Friday)—Last day of classes. Rooms assigned to residents not remaining for second session must be vacated by 7:00 p.m.

Second Session

- 30 (Sunday) 12 noon—Students remaining from first session and students attending second session only may claim second session room assignments.

July 1974

- 1,2 (Monday & Tuesday)—Registration for second session.
- 7 (Sunday)—Room assignments must be claimed by 12 noon.

August 1974

- 9 (Friday)—Last day of classes; second session.
- 9 (Friday)—Residence Halls will be closed by 7:00 p.m.

Residence hall assignments for the summer in no way affect housing assignments for the following academic year. Room assignment is for the summer sessions only. If a student is to be a full-time undergraduate student during the regular academic year and wishes to apply for Campus residence, he must apply through the Office of Resident Life.

The following steps are suggested for shipping baggage: (1) address to: Central Receiving, University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland 20742, (2) be sure all postage, shipping and customs duties are prepaid and, (3) upon arriving at the University, call for luggage at the Central Receiving Warehouse. The University does not make delivery to the residence halls.

Food service is available to all summer students in the University's dining halls. Meals will be served on a cash-pay-as-you-go basis only. During Summer Sessions meals will be served seven days each week, three meals a day with the exception of Sunday evening. For further information call University Food Service 454-4312.

SUMMER CULTURAL AND RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES

As an integral part of its summer program, the University offers to enrolled students an outstanding cultural and recreational program.

The 1974 Summer Fine Arts Festival will offer Campus and community a series of programs in art, dance, drama, film and music. The 1974 program will place special emphasis upon dance and music. Outstanding performers in these media will appear on the College Park Campus. All events are scheduled in the air-conditioned J. Millard Tawes Fine Arts Center. A complete calendar of events will be distributed at registration.

The 1974 Festival promises to be a most exciting one and continues the tradition of offering the summer community a culturally enriched atmosphere in which academic studies may be pleasantly pursued.

The Summer Recreation Program offers a wide variety of leisure time activities for the Campus community. The program includes such activities as recreational swimming, an art workshop, bridge, chess, and bowling tournaments; softball leagues; and a variety of others. The Summer Recreation Office also assists the promotion and coordination of programs offered by other units. Special services such as social hours or special swimming sessions may be requested by any group. Possession of the University of Maryland Summer Activity Card entitles the bearer to all the recreation opportunities of the University as determined by University Policy. A group fee may be charged to cover unusual expenses.

STUDENT HEALTH

The University Infirmary, located on the Campus near the Student Union, provides medical service for students enrolled for summer session courses on the College Park Campus. Students who are ill should report promptly to the University Infirmary. Serious emergencies may be reported by phone to Ext. 3444, or if transportation for emergency is needed, call 3555 on Campus phone or 454-3555 on a pay phone. Doctors' office hours are: weekdays, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; weekends, 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.. Nurses are on duty 24 hours each day, and doctors are on call for serious conditions after regular hours.

UMPORIUM—UNIVERSITY BOOKSTORE

The Umporium, University Bookstore, is located in the basement of the Student Union Building. Members of the University Community may purchase at reasonable rates textbooks, classroom materials, photographic materials, and many novelties, notions and gifts.

AUTOMOBILE REGISTRATION

All students are required to register their automobiles at the time of registration for classes. A student must bring his operator's license and the state or District of Columbia automobile registration card containing the automobile tag number. Parking stickers for automobiles previously registered for the 1973-74 academic year will be honored for the 1974 summer session. For automobiles operated by new students or non-registered cars operated by continuing students, there will be a registration fee (See Tuition and Fees). Vehicles must be registered by the legal operator only.

For use of students, staff members, and employees, several parking lots are provided. Students may park registered cars in lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 7 and 11. All other lots are reserved for faculty and staff members. University Regulations forbid the parking of cars on any Campus road or fire lane. These regulations are enforced by the Campus Office of Public Safety.

LIBRARIES

Libraries of the University are the general University Library (the Theodore R. McKeldin Library), the Undergraduate Library, the Architecture Library, the Engineering and Physical Sciences Library, and the Chemistry Library. The libraries have a total book collection of over 1,300,000 cataloged volumes and currently receive more than 15,000 subscriptions to periodicals and newspapers. In addition, the libraries contain over 730,000 microtexts, over 200,000 U.S. government and United Nations documents, and thousands of phonograph records, maps, film strips, slides, and technical reports. Bibliographical facilities include card catalogs of the British Museum, Bibliothèque Nationale, and Library of Congress, trade bibliographies of foreign countries and special bibliographies of subject fields. Study carrels in the Theodore R. McKeldin Library are available to faculty members and graduate students whose study and research require these facilities. Lockers are available for assignment to graduate students. Facilities for reading microtext materials, for typing, and for copying are also provided. Interlibrary loan service is available.

RESEARCH FACILITIES

The research programs at the University derive their existence and vigor from a faculty comprised of internationally recognized scholars and scientists. It is an advantage for undergraduate students to be aware of the University's research facilities as they plan their program.

In addition to fine library resources and the usual laboratory facilities for undergraduate studies, the University has developed outstanding opportunities for research in the biological, physical, and social sciences. Among the exceptional facilities are the Institute for Child Study; the Natural Resources Institute; a Computer Science Center; a laboratory for basic behavioral research on animals; Van de Graaf accelerators; a training nuclear reactor; a full-scale, low-velocity wind tunnel; a psychopharmacology laboratory; and laboratory models for meteorological phenomena. Collaborative arrangements with many nearby government agencies permit qualified University students and faculty to utilize their research facilities. The University owns and operates the world's longest radio telescope, located in California. A 160 MeV cyclotron for research in nuclear studies is located on the College Park Campus.

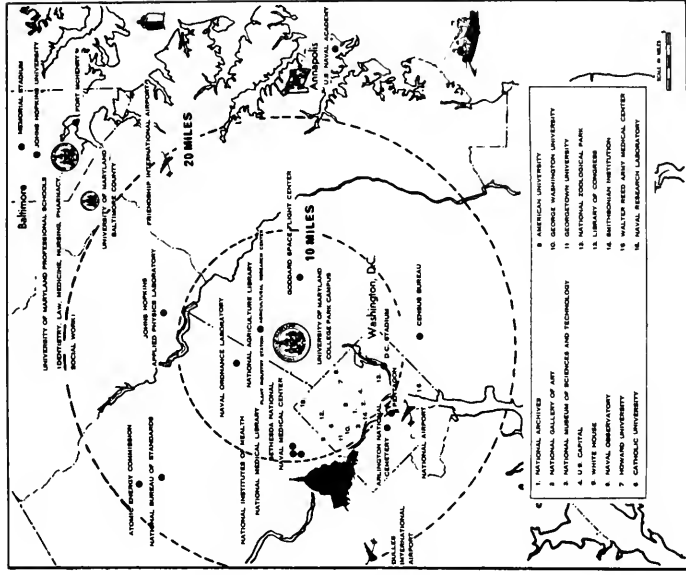
Investigation in agriculture is an important aspect of University research. University farms total more than 2,000 acres. Breeding, selection in farm crops, and soil research are a part of the program. Work in these areas is augmented by X-ray equipment and an electron microscope.

OTHER AREA RESOURCES

ADMISSION AND REGISTRATION INFORMATION

TERMS OF ADMISSIONS

General Statement: The University of Maryland, in all its branches and divisions, subscribes to a policy of equal educational opportunity for people of all races, creeds and ethnic origins.

Undergraduates and non-degree (special) students registered at the College Park Campus in the Spring of 1974 and eligible to return in the fall need only register at the designated time; they do not have to apply for admission to the Summer Sessions. Graduate students in good standing at the University, whether enrolled in the Spring, 1974 or not need only register at the designated time; they do not have to apply for admission to the Summer Sessions.

All Summer Sessions students new to the College Park Campus of the University must be officially admitted. This applies to all non-degree as well as degree candidates.

1. Students *Not Seeking a Degree* at the College Park Campus

UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS: There are two classifications for undergraduate students who are not seeking a degree at the College Park Campus. The Summer Session Only classification is appropriate for students who wish to enroll during the summer session only. Students who anticipate continuing to attend the College Park Campus during the regular academic year as non-degree seeking (special) students should apply for admission as non-degree (special) students. These classifications are discussed below.

GRADUATE STUDENTS: There are two classifications for graduate students who are not seeking a degree at the College Park Campus. The Summer Visiting Graduate Student classification is appropriate for students who wish to enroll during the summer session only. For your convenience, an application blank is in the back of this catalog. Students who are not seeking a graduate degree but who anticipate continuing to attend the College Park Campus during the regular academic year should seek admission on a Non-Degree Graduate Status. Information and application are available by writing to: The Graduate School, University of Maryland, College Park, Md. 20742.

A. Non-Degree (Special) Students Who Wish to Attend for the *Summer Session Only*

This classification is intended primarily for students visiting for the summer from other campuses of the University of Maryland or other institutions and for those seeking enrichment, teacher certification or professional advancement through summer study. You may attend the summer session as a *Summer Session Only* student and enroll in undergraduate courses for full academic credit if you meet the requirements for admission. (See box below).

Please note that admission to summer sessions as a Summer Session Only student does not constitute admission to the University's fall or spring semester or to any degree granting division of the University. Academic credit earned while a Summer Session Only student may, however, be used toward an undergraduate degree at the College Park Campus if you are admitted at some later date to degree status.

Please complete the student data form enclosed at the back of this booklet. A regular application is NOT required of students attending the College Park Campus for the Summer Session Only. You can mail the student data form back to the Office of Admissions prior to May 1, 1974. After this date, bring the completed student data form to registration with you. Students who formerly attended the College Park Campus and who need to apply for readmission or reinstatement may obtain the appropriate forms by coming in person to the Office of Admissions or the Summer Sessions Office, or by writing to: Office of Admissions, University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland 20742.

SUMMER ONLY

If you are a student enrolled at another campus of the University of Maryland or other college or University and wish to attend the College Park Campus for the *Summer Only*

OR

Complete the student data form enclosed at the back of this booklet. You do not need to submit transcripts, however, you must submit *WITH* your student data form a letter from an officer of your present institution verifying that you are in good standing and have the permission of the parent institution to take courses at the College Park Campus.

Students from other colleges and universities are responsible for verifying that credits earned at the College Park Campus will be accepted by their own institution.

New freshmen who are seeking admission for the summer only and who are non-residents will not be permitted to continue in the fall.</p>

Readmission forms should not be mailed back to the Office of Admissions after May 1, 1974. The form should be presented to Admissions personnel at summer registration.</p>
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B. Non-Degree (Special) Students Who Wish To Continue Enrollment During the Academic Year.

This category applies to students who are not seeking a degree at the College Park Campus but intend to continue their enrollment during the academic year. This would include teachers seeking courses for certification. See information in blocks below. Application forms for admission, readmission or reinstatement may be obtained in person from the Office of Admissions or Summer Sessions Office on the Campus or by mail by writing to: Office of Admissions, University of Maryland, College Park, Md. 20742. Please do NOT use the student data form enclosed at the back of this booklet.

Non-Degree Graduate Status: Applicants who qualify for full graduate status, but who are not applicants for a degree at the University of Maryland, may be permitted to enroll in a non-degree status for a limited time. The individual who already has an advanced degree and who wants to pursue a limited course program to gain more background in his original area or in another area of specialization would be included in this category. Such a person is admitted on a "course-work only" basis. Note: Non-Degree Graduate Status is not intended to be used as a qualifying program for full degree status. For full details on this status, see the Graduate School College Park Bulletin for 1973-74, or write: The Graduate School, University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland 20472. If you seek admission on a Non-Degree Graduate Status, DO NOT submit the application at the back of this catalog. Secure an application from the Graduate School.

STUDENTS CONTINUING BEYOND SUMMER

If you are an undergraduate non-degree (special) student who has never attended the University of Maryland, College Park before

You must apply for admission by May 1, 1974.

Students who wish to enroll for courses beyond the summer may need permission from the dean of the college or the division chairman. Students should check with the Office of Admissions to determine those programs which require permission.

The letter of permission must accompany your application for admission.

NOTE: A letter of permission is not required to attend for the summer session *only*. However, the letter is required for students who wish to *continue* for the fall 1974 semester.

If you have previously been enrolled in the College Park Campus either as a degree or non-degree (special) student, but did not attend for the spring 1974 term at College Park (this applies only to students who were not dismissed from the College Park Campus).

You must apply for readmission. Readmission forms should *not* be mailed back to the Office of Admissions after May 1, 1974. The form should be presented to Admissions personnel at summer registrations.

Students who wish to enroll for courses beyond the summer may need permission from the dean of the college or division chairman. Check with the Office of Admissions to determine those programs which require permission.

The letter of permission must accompany your application for admission.

NOTE: A letter of permission is not required to attend for summer session *only*. However, the letter is required for students who wish to *continue* for the fall 1974 semester.

DEGREE APPLICANTS

Students seeking an Undergraduate Degree at the College Park Campus. This section pertains only to students who plan to enter an undergraduate or graduate degree-seeking program on the College Park Campus. Please *pay special attention* to deadlines and other requirements. Application forms for admission, readmission, or reinstatement may be obtained in person from the Office of Admissions or Summer Sessions Office on the Campus or by writing to: Office of Admissions, University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland 20742. Please do *NOT* use the enclosed student data form at the back of this booklet.

LATE REGISTRATION

FIRST SUMMER SESSION—A late fee of \$20.00 is assessed for registration on or after the first day of instruction, May 22. Special permission of the dean or division chairman must be obtained prior to picking up registration materials in order to register on or after May 28, 1974.

SECOND SUMMER SESSION—A late fee of \$20.00 is assessed for registration on or after the first day of instruction, July 3. Special permission of the dean or division chairman must be obtained prior to picking up registration materials in order to register on or after July 9, 1974.

PROCEDURE:

1. Obtain approval of the Dean or Division Chairman for late registration when registering after May 24 for the first summer session, or July 8 for the second session.
2. Pick up Registration Materials at the Registrations Counter on first floor of North Administration Building—between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.
3. Report to each academic department for sectioning into approved courses.
4. Report to Cashier's Office (first floor, South Administration Building) for billing. The office is open from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. If you are paying for on-campus housing, have this charge added to your bill by the Housing Office, 3rd floor, North Administration Building, before you pay the bill.
5. Return to Registrations Counter, North Administration Building to turn in materials and complete registration.

COURSE REGISTRATION IS COMPLETE AND OFFICIAL WHEN ALL FEES ARE PAID AND ALL MATERIALS ARE IN TO THE REGISTRATIONS OFFICE.

CHANGES IN REGISTRATION

CHANGE IN DIVISION OR COLLEGE (Undergraduate Students Only)

1. Division or college changes may be processed at any time, the only restrictions being Board of Regents limitations on enrollment.
2. Forms to initiate a change of division or college will be available at the Registrations Office Counter, 1st floor lobby, North Administration Building.
3. For the purpose of evaluation and acceptance to new division or college, it is necessary to obtain an unofficial copy of the permanent record. Forms for requesting the unofficial copy are available at the Registrations Office Counter.
4. The change form and the unofficial copy of the permanent record should be taken to the Chairman of the new division or the Dean of the new college. The official date for the change will be the date stamped on the form by the new college.
5. The Chairman of the new division or the Dean of the new college will relay the information to the Registrations Office.
6. The divisions or colleges involved will assume responsibility for the appropriate transfer of complete records.

CHANGE IN MAJOR (Undergraduate Students Only)

1. Changes of academic major may be processed at any time, the only restrictions being Board of Regents limitations on enrollment.
2. The forms for this purpose will be available at the Registrations Office Counter, first floor lobby, North Administration Building.
3. The form indicating the change information should be turned in with the registration materials at the time of Registration or turned in to the Registrations Office Counter at a later time during the term.

UNDECIDED ABOUT A COLLEGE AND/OR MAJOR AND WANT TO BE ADVISED BY THE GENERAL UNDERGRADUATE ADVISEMENT OFFICE

Students who wish to change from their current college to undecided should obtain a change of college or division form and an unofficial copy of their permanent records from the Registrations Office Counter, first floor lobby, North Administration Building.

The unofficial copy of the permanent record and change form should be taken to the General Undergraduate Adviseement Office, Room 3149, Undergraduate Library (x2733,3040).

The completed change form should be turned in with the Registration materials at the time of registration or turned into the Registration Office Counter at the time of the change.

The undecided student will be officially registered in the Office of the Dean for Undergraduate Studies and receive adviseement from the General Undergraduate Adviseement Office. These offices and the student's former college or division will assume responsibility for the appropriate transfer of complete records.

CHANGE IN PROGRAM (Graduate Students Only)

A graduate student who wishes to change programs or degree objectives must submit a new application with fee to the Graduate School. Current deadlines for new applications apply.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS PROCEDURE

WHO?

ALL STUDENTS enrolled at the University of Maryland, College Park Campus.

WHEN?

Changes in either local mailing address or permanent address can be processed AT ANY TIME.

WHERE?

Address Change Forms are available at the following places:

Registrations Counter first floor lobby, North Administration Building, 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

COMPLETED FORMS should be returned to the Registrations Counter, first floor lobby, North Administration Building.

WHY?

Since many of the University's Registration procedures will be handled through the mail, it is imperative both to the student and to the Office of Admissions and Registrations that accurate and up-to-date addresses be maintained throughout the time of enrollment in the University.

Currently Registered Students—during the academic year the local address on file will be used for all mailings other than grade reports. All grade reports will be mailed to a student's permanent address.

Students Not Currently Registered—the permanent address on file will be used for all mailings.

DEFINITION OF FULL-TIME STATUS

For those students seeking University certification of full-time student status, the following definitions will be applied:

UNDERGRADUATES

Normally, enrollment in courses totaling six semester hours of academic credit will be defined as full-time enrollment for one summer session. Enrollment for six semester hours of academic credit in each of the two summer sessions will be defined as full-time enrollment for the summer. Four semester hours of academic credit in each six week session constitutes full-time enrollment for Veterans Administration purposes.

GRADUATES

Enrollment in academic credits totaling 24 graduate units will be defined as full-time enrollment for one summer session. Enrollment in academic credits totaling 24 graduate units in each of the two summer sessions will be defined as full-time enrollment for the summer.

Courses in the series: 400-499 carry 4 units/credit hour.

Courses in the series: 600-899 carry 6 units/credit hour.

Research courses: 799 and 899 carry 12 units/credit hour.

MAXIMUM LOAD

Normally, undergraduate students should not enroll for more than eight semester hours of academic credit in one summer session. Normally, graduate students should not enroll for more than six semester hours in one summer session. Variations on these normal maximum loads must be approved by the student's advisor and/or major department.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM

Students entering the University from secondary schools may obtain advanced placement and college credit on the basis of their performance in the College Board Advanced Placement examinations. These examinations are normally given to eligible high school seniors during the May preceding matriculation in college.

Questions about the program may be addressed to the Director of Admissions and Registrations. Additional information is presented in the consolidated catalog. For detailed information about examinations and procedures in taking them, write to the Director of Advanced Placement Program, College Entrance Examination Board, 475 Riverside Drive, New York, New York 10027.

CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES

All students who expect to complete requirements for degrees during the summer should make application for diplomas during summer registration or at the Registrations Office, North Administration Building. Such applications should be filed no later than July 12 for degrees to be awarded as of August 23, 1974.

WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY

Students who desire to terminate their registration from *all* courses in which they are enrolled must *withdraw*. This also applies to the student who is enrolled for only one course.

1. Students withdrawing from the summer session must obtain the necessary form from the appropriate division or dean's office. Once completed, this form should be submitted in person to the Registrations Office, Room 1130A, North Administration Building (454-2734).
2. Withdrawal becomes effective on the date the form is filed with the Registrations Office.
3. Tuition refunds are processed immediately upon receipt of the completed withdrawal form in accordance with the above procedure.
4. Room refunds are computed by deducting ten percent of the charge for the session and prorating the remainder on a weekly basis. No room refunds are issued after the third week of the session.
5. The matriculation fee and registration fee are not refundable.
6. In computing refunds to students who have received benefit of a University granted scholarship, the computation will be made in such a way as to return the maximum amount to the scholarship account.
7. Students who desire to terminate their registration for *all* courses in which they are enrolled and must *not* process drops; they should follow the withdrawal procedure.

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

GENERAL UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS

In order to provide educational breadth for all students, there has been established the General University Requirements. These requirements consist of 30 semester hours of credit distributed among the three areas listed below. (For an exception to this regulation, see the Bachelor of General Studies Program.) At least 6 hours must be taken in each area. At least 9 of the 30 hours must be taken at the 300 level or above. None of the 30 hours may be counted toward published departmental, college or divisional requirements for a degree.

Area A. 6–12 hours elected in the Divisions of Agricultural and Life Sciences; Mathematical and Physical Sciences and Engineering;

Area B. 6–12 hours in the Divisions of Behavioral and Social Sciences; Human and Community Resources.

Area C. 6–12 hours in the Division of Arts and Humanities.

In meeting these area requirements, students may choose from among any undergraduate courses for which they are qualified. Students are urged to consult academic advisors for guidance in determining which courses in each area best fit individual needs and interests.

Demonstration of competency in English composition. Unless the student has been exempted from English composition, at least one course in this subject will be required. Exemption is granted if the student earns an acceptable score on the Illinois Rhetoric Test administered by the Department of English (score announced annually), or a score of 2 on the English Advanced Placement Test, or by satisfactory completion of a similar course at another institution. Students taking a course to satisfy this requirement may apply the credits toward the 30-hour General University Requirement but may not count these credits toward the satisfaction of the minimum 6-hour requirement in any of the three designated areas. Credit for such a course may be in addition to the 12-hour maximum in any area.

Students who entered the University prior to June, 1973 have the option of completing requirements under the former General Education Program rather than the new General University Requirements. Each student is responsible for making certain that the various categories of either set of requirements have been satisfied prior to certification for the degree. Assistance and advice may be obtained from the academic advisor, the Offices of the Dean for Undergraduate Studies, or the Administrative Dean for Summer Programs.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

ACADEMIC CREDIT

The information given below is taken from Academic Regulations, a complete statement of which may be found in the Undergraduate and Graduate Catalogs.

The semester hour is the unit of credit. During the summer session a typical 3 credit hour course meets five times a week for six weeks and requires daily preparation. Each class period is 80 minutes in length.

Students who are matriculated as candidates for degrees will be given credit toward the appropriate degree for satisfactory completion of summer courses. Each student is responsible for the determination of applicability of courses selected to the degree program and is urged to consult an academic advisor.

All students enrolled for credit will receive an official grade for each course.

MARKING SYSTEM

Grading methods are indicated for each course listed in the class schedule. The following symbols are used on the student's permanent record for all courses in which the student is enrolled after the initial registration and schedule adjustment period: A, B, C, D, F, I, P, S, and W. For undergraduate students the mark A denotes excellent mastery; B good mastery; C acceptable mastery; D marginal performance which does not represent satisfactory progress toward the degree. The mark F denotes failure. The mark I (incomplete) is an exceptional grade given only when the student has done satisfactory work but is unable to complete all requirements of the course due to circumstances beyond his control. In order to be changed to a passing mark the work must be completed before the course is offered again. The mark W denotes that the student withdrew from a course in which the student was enrolled at the end of the schedule adjustment period. The W is entered on the student's permanent record but is not used in a computation of the academic average.

For graduate students, the following symbols are used A, B, C, and S constituting superior to passing scholarship; D and F, reflecting failure. The pass/fail option is not available to graduate students.

PASS/FAIL OPTION

Undergraduate students who have completed 15 or more credit hours on the College Park Campus and have a cumulative average of at least 2.0 may register for one course per summer term on a pass/fail basis if the course offers the pass/fail grading option. No more than 20 percent of the credits offered toward a degree may be taken on the pass/fail basis. A complete statement of regulations concerning the pass/fail option is available in the Undergraduate Catalog.

SUMMER GRADUATE STUDY

The Summer School offers a large number of courses at the graduate level particularly in the field of Education for teachers.

A student desiring graduate credit, either as a degree seeker or on a nondegree basis, must have been admitted to the University of Maryland Graduate School. The deadline for application for graduate study for either of the two summer sessions is May 1. This deadline does not apply, however, to visiting graduate students who may apply at any time prior to registration as specified in the next paragraph.

Visiting graduate students from another institution may be admitted in a visitor graduate status by simply completing a graduate application form at the Graduate School prior to registration and submitting it, together with the \$15.00 application fee and a letter signed by the graduate dean at the home institution. The letter must state that the applicant is in good standing in his graduate study. Admission will be limited to either or both of the two summer sessions and will terminate at the close of the 1974 summer sessions. An application blank is available at the back of this catalog. Transfer of the completed credit to the home institution can be effected by requesting an official transcript from the Office of Admissions and Registrations.

A student wishing to enroll in courses numbered 600 or above must be in an admitted graduate status at the University of Maryland.

Graduate students who receive faculty guidance and wish to use the research facilities of the University during the summer must register for an appropriate number of credits. For more complete information, contact the Dean for Graduate Studies and Research. Call 454-5428.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS WORKSHOPS, INSTITUTES AND OTHER SPECIAL OFFERINGS

During the summer months the Summer Sessions offers a number of special educational programs. These programs differ from the regular course offerings in instructional format and frequently in duration. The content of these special programs is usually of interest to a select audience but may also be of general interest to the student or community resident. The admission procedures are the same as those for the regular courses. Special registration arrangements will be made for certain workshops. Details regarding registration may be obtained from program directors. The usual fee schedule applies and there may be added expense to the student as noted.

The descriptions below are intended to indicate the general content only and it is advisable to contact the program director for more detailed information.

ANTH 499 & 699, FIELD METHODS IN ARCHAEOLOGY, 6 CREDITS, SESSION I

Mr. Tyler Bastien, State Archaeologist for Maryland

This course will teach field methods in excavation and will deal with local American Indian populations. Excavation will be within commuting distance of College Park. Participants can utilize summer Campus housing.

ANTH 499 & 699, FIELD METHODS IN ARCHAEOLOGY, 6 CREDITS, SESSION II

Mr. Ivor Gross, Director

Field training in the techniques of archaeological survey and excavation. Course will deal with local American Indian populations. Excavation will be in the Shenandoah Valley area near Front Royal, Virginia. Lodging in the vicinity will be arranged by the field school director.

EDAD 499B, WORKSHOP IN INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIAL, 3 CREDITS, 22JUL—02AUG, MTUWTHF 1—5

Mr. Carl Beckman, Director

This workshop is designed to provide librarians (public, special, government) and school media specialists and those interested in the field opportunity to develop selection, production and utilization competencies relevant to media programs. Consideration is given to all types of media. The main emphasis of the course will be on the production and utilization of instructional media.

EDHD 779, SPECIAL TOPICS IN HUMAN DEVELOPMENT, 3 CREDITS, 17JUNE—28JUNE, DAILY, Center for Adult Education

Mr. J. Gil Sherman and Staff, Faculty of the Center for Personalized Instruction

Enrollment is limited to 30 teachers from two- or four-year colleges or universities, who desire to prepare PSI materials for their own courses. Tuition: \$250. Complete information available from N. EDSE 415, FINANCIAL AND ECONOMIC EDUCATION I, 3 CREDITS, SESSION II, MTUWTHF 8

Dr. Frederick Ricci

The purpose of this course for secondary school teachers and administrators is to develop the ability and interest in teaching personal and family economic factors in existing secondary school courses. Among the topics to be considered are investments, wills, credit, home buying, budgeting, insurance, and similar topics.

**EDSE 460, ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION, 3 CREDITS,
SESSION II, MTUWTHF 11**

Dr. David Lockard

An interdisciplinary course covering the literature, techniques and strategies of environmental education. Emphasis is upon the study of environmental education programs and the development of a specific program which is designed to implement the solution of an environmental problem. The laboratory-field experience is provided as a model for future activities of students. Open to any student who wishes to become actively involved in the process of environmental education program development.

EDSE 488A, SPECIAL TOPICS IN SECONDARY EDUCATION: Bicultural Education for Secondary Teachers, 3 CREDITS, SESSION I, MW 4:15-7P.M.

Dr. Janet Baird

This workshop will emphasize development of comparative cultural materials to enhance study of another people. It will also stress the cultural background of language differences and social patterns, as well as methods of presentation.

EDSE 489A, FIELD EXPERIENCE IN EDUCATION: Home Economics Education for the Disadvantaged, 3 CREDITS, SESSION II, MTUWTHF 11

This course is designed for both undergraduate and graduate students in the area of Home Economics Education. Opportunities will be provided for field trips and class seminars focused on identification of disadvantaged characteristics and resources and teaching methods appropriate for such a population.

EDSE 788H, SPECIAL TOPICS IN SECONDARY EDUCATION: Open Education in Secondary Schools, 3 CREDITS, SESSION I, TUTH 4:15-7P.M.

Dr. E. G. Campbell

This course should be of interest to students concerned with secondary curriculum and instructional strategies. The principal focus will be to explore the origins, nature and prospects for the contemporary concept of "Openness." Appropriate emphasis will be given to both the psychological and physical aspects of open secondary schooling.

FMCD 499 & HOEC 678, SPECIAL TOPICS: Creative Systems in Management, 3 CREDITS, 08JUL-26JUL, MTUWTHF 9-3

Dr. Charlotte V. Churaman, Director

The systems approach provides an analytical tool in personal and family management, as well as a means for helping teachers and change agents to clarify their roles and the information systems applicable in working toward solutions of the managerial problems of families. After examining general systems and family eco-system concepts, workshop participants will work in task force activities on their own interests. For further information contact Dr. Charlotte Churaman, Department of Family and Community Development.

GEOG 380, LOCAL FIELD COURSE, 3 CREDITS, 28MAY-08JUN

Dr. William Dando

A two-week summer field session centered at Salisbury on Maryland's Eastern Shore, to expose students to both the geographer's perspective of a region and field work in geographical research. Individual and group study projects in the area utilize various field techniques and data sources. Enrollment requires permission of instructor. For further information contact the Department of Geography, University of Maryland.

GVPT 399, SEMINAR IN GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS: Politics and the Cinema, 3 CREDITS, 22MAY-12JUN, MTUWTHF 12:30-3

Dr. James M. Glass, Director

The focus of the course will be on looking at films from a political point of view. Discussion will emphasize the question of how a film relates to politics and political ideas. It will be argued that films through their images serve as agents of socialization, acculturation, and political protest and rebellion and that no film can be viewed "objectively" as a cinematic construction without political content, meaning or implication. The format of the course will include seeing two or three films a week, with two sessions a week devoted to discussion. Students may enroll for six credits through combined registration for GVPT 388 and GVPT 399.

GVPT 429, PROBLEMS IN POLITICAL BEHAVIOR: Women and the Political System, 3 CREDITS, 03JUL–24JUL, MTUWTFH 9:30–12

Dr. M. Margaret Conway, Director

The course will examine the legal rights of women, the participation of women in electoral politics, and the opportunities available for influencing public policy. Among the specific subjects to be considered will be the possible effects of the pending Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution, the participation of women in electoral politics in 1972 and after, and the political influence processes in such areas of public policy as consumer protection, product safety, environmental quality, and equal employment opportunities for women.

HLTH 456, HEALTH PROBLEMS OF THE AGING AND THE AGED, 3 CREDITS, SESSION II, MTUWTFH 8

Dr. Sally Althoff

Psychological, physiological, and socio-economic aspects of aging; nutrition; sexuality, death, dying, and bereavement; self actualization and creativity; health needs and crises of the aged.

HLTH 489C, FIELD LABORATORY PROJECTS AND WORKSHOP: Consumer Health, 3 CREDITS, SESSION II, MTUWTFH 11

Dr. Sally Althoff

This course is designed to develop the analytic skills of students in selecting and purchasing health related products and services. Detection of deceptive practices and health quackery is emphasized and current means of consumer protection identified.

HLTH 489R, FIELD LABORATORY PROJECTS AND WORKSHOP: Crisis Intervention, SESSION II, MTUWTFH 8

Dr. Catherine Miller

This class will consist of the experimental and theoretical aspects of crisis intervention. The purpose of the class is to prepare the crisis intervener to deal with the situational crises of death, divorce, sexuality, drug abuse, etc., and, in general, the problems of living as experienced by others.

HLTH 489W, FIELD LABORATORY PROJECTS AND WORKSHOP: Problems of Weight Control, SESSION I, MTUWTFH 8

Dr. Dorothy Girdano

The study of obesity as it relates to health problems, with emphasis on obesity measurement and the background of treatment programs, such as diet and exercise. Biomedical and psychosocial factors of obesity will be explored in order to understand obesity and the problem it presents to American society. Opportunity will be given each student to assess his/her body composition, daily energy consumption, and daily energy expenditure through laboratory experiences.

HSAD 488A, SELECTED TOPICS IN HOUSING AND INTERIOR DESIGN: Decorative Arts in American Homes and Furnishings, 3 CREDITS, 03JUL–24JUL

Dr. Jane Shearer, Director

A study of the interior design of 18th and 19th Century homes. Lectures will be supplemented by prearranged tours of extant homes of historical significance. The expense to the student will include the usual credit-hour and University fees, and the cost of travel and subsistence. For further information contact Dr. Jane Shearer, Department of Housing and Applied Design.

LBSC 499, SCHOOL LIBRARY/MEDIA PROGRAM: Application of Planning Strategies and Techniques, 3 CREDITS, 24JUN–29JUN, MTUWTFHS 9–4:30

Dr. James Liesener, Director

This workshop is designed to give the practicing media specialist a further understanding of planning strategies and techniques applicable to school library/media programs. Opportunity will be offered to develop a basic level of understanding planning models based on PPBS and skill in the actual application of techniques discussed. It will utilize the concepts, processes and materials developed in a project carried out in cooperation with the Maryland State Department of Education, Division of Library Development and Services, and will also provide an opportunity for the further testing and refinement of this process through its application by the participants in their individual school programs. Materials will be distributed prior to the workshop to enable participants to collect data regarding their own programs which will then be utilized as examples during the practicum sessions.

**MUSC 448D & 699D, SPECIAL TOPICS IN MUSIC, The Singers’
Art, 3 CREDITS, 08JUL–25JUL, MTUWTHF 12:30–4:30**

Profs. Kenneth Pennington, Audrey Snapp, Louise McClelland

This three-week workshop emphasizes vocal literature, pedagogy, performance practices, vocal coaching. Centers around the one-week NATS workshop (July 14–18) which is filled with masterclasses, recitals and clinics.

**PHED 489U, FIELD LABORATORY PROJECTS AND WORK-
SHOP: Field Hockey and Volleyball Coaching Workshop, 1–6
CREDITS, 20JUN–03JUL, MTUWTHF 9–4**

Barbara Drum, Suzanne Tyler, Directors

To develop a philosophy of sports competition for women and to disseminate a thorough knowledge of understanding of the basic psychology of coaching. To provide materials and the opportunity for practical application of the techniques of skill and strategy development, and the coaching of field hockey and volleyball on the competitive level.

**PHED 489Y & 689B, FIELD LABORATORY PROJECTS AND
WORKSHOP: Analysis of Teaching in Physical Education, 1–6
CREDITS, 15JUL–02AUG, MTUWTHF 10–12/1:30–3:30**

Dr. Alice Love, Director

This course will look at the framework and the philosophical background of a number of objective instruments for gathering teaching data. A practical application and analysis for each instrument will be provided.

**RECR 454, OUTDOOR EDUCATION WORKSHOP, 6 CREDITS,
24JUN–02AUG, MTUWTHF 9–3/ARR**

Dr. George Eley and James Thompson, Directors

This workshop, jointly sponsored by the College of Physical Education, Recreation and Health (Recreation Department) and the College of Education presents the philosophy, activities, materials and methods recommended for outdoor education practice (and certification endorsement). Course content involves group and individual projects, field trips, development of appropriate audio-visual and curricular materials, and one week in a school camp setting. Specialists and consultants supplement the Workshop staff.

**RLED 487, CONSERVATION OF NATURAL RESOURCES,
3 CREDITS, SESSION II**

Dr. Donald A. Emerson

The College of Agriculture and the Conservation Education Division of the Natural Resources Institute cooperate in offering this workshop devoted to the study of the State’s basic wealth, its natural resources. Basic source information will be available, specimens will be collected, pictures will be taken in different resource regions and teaching aids will be evaluated and effective methods of teaching conservation and natural resources will be studied. The workshop offers six semester hours of undergraduate or graduate credit.

State and federal workers in conservation of natural resources will be used extensively as consultants in their specialties. Field trips will be taken to all the natural regions of the State so that students will be able to observe the resources problems and current practices. Adequate opportunity will be provided for students to analyze problems as a group and develop logical solutions.

The workshop will be held on the College Park Campus of the University of Maryland. Students should register for RLED 487 and 497. Registration is limited to 25 persons.

**SPCH 489, SPEECH COMMUNICATION WORKSHOP: Reader’s
Theatre, 3 CREDITS, 08JUL–26JUL, MTUWTHF 9:30–1**

Hester Provensen, Director

The Reader’s Workshop will explore, clarify and apply the theories and techniques of selection, analysis, arrangement and preparation of scripts, preparation of director’s manual, rehearsal procedures and styles of performance (from the traditional off-stage technique to a full scale performance) using movement, costumes, lighting and multi-media. Particular emphasis will be placed on those styles of performance suitable to class rooms where staging facilities are limited. To provide practical application of the theories and techniques studied, small class units will be assigned scripts to be studied, evaluated and performed. Regularly scheduled coffee hours will round out the learning experience by providing an opportunity for the exchange of ideas with classmates, instructors and visiting lecturers.

The University reserves the right to cancel a course offering if adequate enrollment is not realized. In general, an enrollment of 20, 15 and 10 is required for lower division undergraduate, upper division undergraduate and graduate courses, respectively.

The abbreviation (P-F) indicates Pass-Fail Option.

An "S" before a course number denotes that the course is offered in the summer session only. An "S" after a course number indicates a regular course modified for offering during the summer session. A more complete course description may be found in the Undergraduate Catalog.

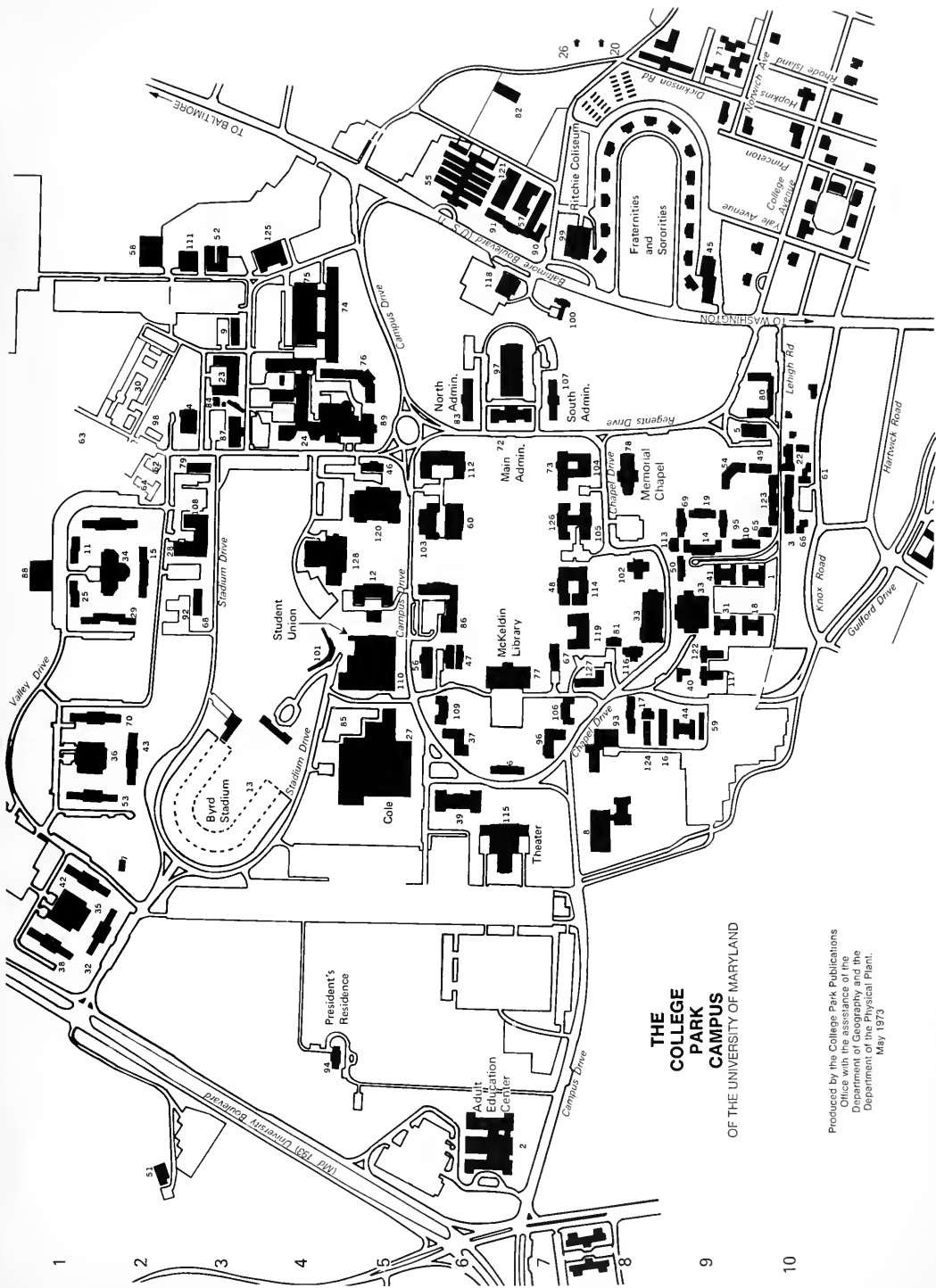
