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PORTUGUESE EAST AFRICA. MOZAMBIQUE PROVINCE.

The import trade of the Province of Mozambique was less by \$900,000 in 1915 than in the previous year. The only port showing increased imports was Lourenço Marques, amounting to \$200,000. The United States received \$58,000 of this increase. The import trade with the United States at each port of the Province shows an increase, with the exception of Quelimane, which shows a decrease of about \$10,000. The increases in round figures are: \$11,000 at Inhabane, \$6,000 at Chinde, and \$32,000 at Mozambique. These increases, although small, are satisfactory, when it is pointed out that with one or two minor exceptions the trade of all the ports mentioned shows considerable decreases with every country, except the United States.

Trade of the Various Ports of the Province.

In the following table is shown the total value (exclusive of coin and bullion) of the trade of the five ports of the Province of Mozambique with the principal foreign countries in 1915. The total foreign trade of the Province in the year 1914 amounted to \$35,144,062 compared with \$28,964,588 for the following year:

American Goods Arriving at Other Ports.

The imports at the port of Inhambane from the United States during 1915 were valued at \$51,320 compared with \$40,807 for 1914; at the port of Chinde, \$18,873 compared with \$12,249; at Quelimane, \$10,513 compared with \$20,913; and at Mozambique, \$47,159 compared with \$15,269. The Transit Trade-American Goods for Transvaal.

An important item in the commerce of the Province is its transit trade, which amounted to \$12,609,642 in 1915 compared with \$19,565,552 for 1914 and \$25,717,231 for 1913. Lourenco Marquez leads in this trade, the imports in transit for the Transvaal arriving at that port during last year being valued at \$11,688,343, of which goods to the value of \$2,332,396 came from the United States. The following table shows these imports and their value:

The Export Trade.

The exports of local produce from all ports were much the same as during the year 1914. There was an increase of \$200,000 in the exports from Lourenço Marquez. This is to be accounted for in the increased shipments of sugar, which amounted to \$256,000 in 1914 and to \$451,000 in 1915.

The value of exports from Quelimane increased nearly \$300,000, of which \$110,000 was for the increased trade in copra and \$130,000 for peanuts. A new export at this port was raw cotton, valued at \$6,868.

The exports to the United States during 1915, according to invoices certified at the American consulate at Lourenço Marquez, were valued at \$490,597. Almost all of this amount was comprised of mangrove bark, which amounted to \$489,162.

The sugar industry is now being developed on a large scale at several points. Stock raising is also becoming an important industry

in the Province.

Public Improvements at Lourenço Marquez.

A bill is before the parliament in Lisbon providing for the raising of a loan of \$500,000, to be financed by the post office from savings-bank deposits. Of this sum it is proposed to spend \$250,000 in improving the Polana Beach, \$60,000 of this amount being for the purchase of a vertical lift from the top of the cliff to the beach.

The remainder of the loan is for the construction of a road to the Swaziland border, some 45 miles distant from the city of Lourenço Marques. This road would enable motorists to enter this Province from the Union of South Africa. At present there is no road leading out of the town which is suitable for motor traffic. It is proposed to connect up a telephone line to the Transvaal, and to lay a telegraph line through the Zambezi district.

Proposed Railroad Construction.

The governor general is also planning for a further loan of \$15,000,000 to be spent on the ports and railways of the Province. A railway is to be constructed from Mozambique, running inland and tapping a magnificent agricultural country. It is also planned to extend the Quelimane Railway to Port Herald and Lake Nyassa; also to continue the Moamba-Xinavane Railway across the Incomati River, through Gazaland, across the Limpopo River, and to connect it with the Inhambane Railway, thus forming the first link in a line extending through the Province and up the coast.

In the town of Lourenço Marques there are public works now in progress, estimated to cost \$500,000, which will reclaim a large area of valuable wharf frontage. This work was started about the middle of 1915 and it is thought that it will take two years to complete it.

The Coal Trade.

In 1915 there were 182,489 tons of coal bunkered and 334,101 tons shipped as cargo, a total of 516,590 tons, compared with 575,680 tons in 1914.

The Government is considering the erection of a coaling plant to supplement the present installation, but its construction will probably be deferred until the conclusion of the war.
