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
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

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# PREFACE.

The present volume has verbally obeyed the Horatian precept—nonum prematur in annum;

vol. ii. bearing date 1890, while this one has the imprint 1899.

The chief advantage gained by the delay has been in the publication of the late Rev. Octavius Ogle's Royal Letters to Oxford, 1892, where several City charters were given in full which otherwise would have had to find place here.

The volume has been prepared under several disadvantages. Absence from Oxford has required that much of it should be drawn up from transcripts, not from Wood's originals. Inability to consult books other than the few in my own study has often caused doubtful statements to be passed over without comment, and incomplete statements to remain unsupplemented. The indexes have been framed in the very irregular and widely-separated intervals allowed by parish work, and must show, in consequence, some inequalities and inconsistencies.

Such as it is, however, the volume completes Wood's treatise on the City of Oxford, and displays the heroic outlines on which he sketched it, as well as the abundance and the frequent intricacy of the materials he had access to. Even where it is very imperfect, as in the earlier part of the Catalogue of Mayors and Bailiffs, it cannot fail to be of use to future students, as the first traveller's chart of an unexplored country serves to arrange and locate subsequent discoveries.

Some other explanations will perhaps not be thought superfluous. In the present volume, I have had to present not even Wood's rough draft of chapters for his City treatise, but his collections preparatory to such a draft. I have therefore taken full liberty to condense, omit,

and even in places to re-arrange. I suppose, for example, that if MS. Wood D. 7 (5), which I have compressed into part of Chap. XXXIII, had been printed in full, it would have filled not less than 200 pages. Wood's own spelling, however, and his jumble of English and Latin, and of Latin regardless of construction, have been retained, as characteristic of his writings.

Wood's spelling of proper names is exceptionally fluctuating. In my work on the degree-records of the University, I observed that Wood very seldom wrote in his transcript a name as it stood in the University Register, and that he did not even use one form for a given name, but changed his spelling from page to page, and even from line to line. The same is true of his excerpts from the parish registers: the register may give Smith but Wood write Smyth, or the register give Smyth and Wood write Smith. I have, therefore, in the index disregarded the minutiae of his spelling.

I have given a list of the more important errata which I had noted in my own copy. Some of them are misprints, some probably errors of transcription, and others slips of Wood himself. All of them have been taken account of in the indexes.

# (CHAPTER XXXIII.)

OF THE TEMPORALL GOVERNMENT OF THE CITY, WITH A CATALOGUE OF THE MAIORS, PROVOSTS, AND BAYLIVES.

(Wood (see i. 38) intended writing for his city treatise a chapter under this heading.

The first part of this design—a statement of the several city offices, with notes of their history and duties—Wood (so far as I have seen) never touched. An outline of what he had in his mind is furnished by the successive charters in Ogle's Royal Letters to Oxford (1892).

- (i) Charter of Henry I (whose existence is inferred from later documents): Ogle, p. 2.
- (ii) Charter of Henry II: Ogle, p. 2. Recognizes the mayor of Oxford as joint-butler with the mayor of London at the Coronation: see Wood's Life and Times, i. 399; iii. 140, 301.
  - (iii) Charter of 1 John: Ogle, p. 5.
  - (iv) Charter of 13 Henry III: Ogle, p. 6.
- (v) Charter of 41 Henry III, 1257: Ogle, p. 8. Allows the newly-elected mayor of Oxford to be admitted to office by the Barons of the Exchequer, in case of the king's absence from London. Formerly the mayor had to be admitted by the king personally.
- (vi) Charter of 3 James I, 1605: Ogle, p. 228. This, for the first time, mentions the city officers, viz. the mayor, two bailiffs, four aldermen, eight 'assistants' (these, with the mayor and aldermen, forming 'the Thirteen'), and other lesser officers and servants, common-council-men, macebearers, etc. These officers, however, were ancient. Under date 1214, Wood (MS. Wood D 7 (5)) notes that the 'ballivi' have already taken their special place as 'servants to the provosts' (i.e. to the mayors): and under date 1255, he notes that 'four aldermen were appointed this year, whereas there were but two before: the number of thirteen magistrates was made up this year.'

The history of the several civic offices thus remains an untouched work for the zeal of Oxford antiquarians.

For the second part of this design Wood made considerable collections, now in MS. Wood D 7 (5), founded on similar collections by Brian Twyne, now in MS. Wood F 26 (O. C. 8502). In old documents the names of the mayor and bailiffs are attached as witnesses; and from these a surprisingly complete list can be made out. Wood's list was never thoroughly revised by him, and in many years the entries are very doubtful, partly from errors caused by confusing the regnal years of the second and third Edwards, partly from the documents naming persons sometimes by surname but at other times by trade or birthplace, and other such causes. I have tried to make as much as possible of it definite, and (with many doubtful places) accurate. My own notes from the archives of Lincoln College have supplied several corrections.

This catalogue of mayors and bailiffs will be found in three sections:—

- A. An earlier part, where, from the absence of dates, chronological order is impossible. The frequent occurrence, however, of a mayor's name, with different bailiffs, suggests several years of office.
- B. Wood's attempt at arranging several of these entries in order of time.
  - C. From 1260, when greater certainty is possible.

Here again is a definite piece of work in Oxford antiquities, which requires to be done *de novo*, and for which the archives of the Colleges and the parish churches, as exploited by Twyne and Wood, afford abundant material.

Perhaps as part of this same chapter, Wood made collections towards a history of the 'governing' families of Oxford at the beginning of its municipal history, Kepeharmes, Burewalds, and others, who filled its offices, laid their bones in its churches, and endowed its chantries and religious houses.

A fragment of these collections ('Index nominum,' Life and Times, iv. 241) has always formed part of the MS. of Wood's city treatise (Wood MS. F 29A), and, therefore, may be supposed to have been placed there by himself. It is printed here, but will be found to be very rough.)

### (Catalogue of Mayors and Bailiffs 1.)

(A. The first portion of this catalogue is a number of uncertain, and roughly grouped, notices, mainly from undated documents.)

Cheneto: but these seem to be rather captaines or lieutenants or governors of Oxon in the warr between King Stephen and Empress Mand.

1141: Robertus D'oilly, praeceptor civitatis Oxon. He died 1142. Him I take to be a martiall governour.

1150(?) circ.: Reimundus, praepositus: V 367.

## (OTHER CITY OFFICIALS.)

(When we remember that Wood drew up for his University treatise lists not only of Vice-Chancellors and Proctors, but of M.P.'s, High Stewards, &c., in Wood MS. F 2, as edited by Gutch, and even of Bedells, Registrars, and Keepers of Chests, in Wood MS. E 5, we may feel some surprise that he did not do the same for his City treatise, and collect lists not only of Mayors and Bailiffs, but of High Stewards, Recorders, Deputy-recorders, Town-clerks, Town-solicitors, and Chamberlains. I have nowhere found in his papers any notes to this purpose. The explanation probably is that the City treatise was practically abandoned by him about 1666, and never formally resumed.

The following brief notes will serve to show the *lacuna*, not to fill it.)

Twyne XXII 245: Laurence and John Kepeharme held Vine hall of the covent of St. Frideswide's before the time of Simon, prior of the same, which Simon was prior anno 12194, as in Twyne XXII 264.—Here Laurence is set before John Kepeharme, which is as much (as) to say that Laurence was father or else elder brother to John.

Laurence Kepeharme and Simon prior cotemporary: liber parvus S. Frid., p. 223. Laurence Keepharme, the son of Benedict, vide capitulum ultimum in libro de miraculis S. Frideswidae.

Twyne XXIV 660: this Laurence Kepeharme was alderman of Oxon anno 1180 or ther abouts, which alderman was then as major is now. In the same charter mention of Radulphus Kepeharme.

# (CHAPTER XXXIV.)

## THE DIVERS LIBERTIES GRANTED TO THE TOWNE.

(This is the heading (see i. 38) of a proposed chapter for Wood's City treatise. Had Wood written it, it would have been the longest. most 'important, and, in many respects, the most interesting chapter in the whole book. In Oxford there is not merely the interest of tracing out the historical differentiation of civic functions, judicial, administrative, commercial; but there is, for century after century, the ebb and flow of the fierce contest for supremacy in these several functions between the rival corporations of the City and the University. In the voluminous MSS. of Brian Twyne (Wood's Life and Times, iv. 202-222) the documents dealing with the City privileges and their relation to those of the University are very numerous, so numerous in fact that their very bulk may have been a reason why even Anthony Wood did not attempt to reduce them to system. The chapter would have been also a stupendous chapter in the record of human folly. Had the money which was spent by the University in the seventeenth century alone on fruitless suits about petty privileges been devoted to the Library, the Bodleian would now be beyond question the first library in the whole world, and the name of Oxford also in other aspects of learning 'trebly great.'

Many of the charters in Ogle's Royal Letters to Oxford (1892) would have been analyzed in this chapter.

Wood, apparently, intended to handle not only the general privileges of the City, but also the special privileges of its separate gilds. At least, such is the conclusion we may draw from the solitary fragment of the chapter which remains to us.

In the Old Catalogue of Wood's MSS., article 56 (fol. 368, 369) of Wood MS. F 29 A is described as 'The incorporation of the company of shoemakers.' This paper, long missing from Wood MS. F 29 A, is now to be found in the present Wood MS. F 31 (Wood's Life and Times, iv. 247), as fol. 126, 127. It is a transcript (in a law-clerk's

hand, not in Wood's hand) of a charter, 4 Edw. IV (1464), which goes back, by inspeximus through Ric. II, Edw. III, Edw. III, Hen. III, to a charter of Henry II. In that charter Henry II confirmed to the 'corvesarii' of Oxon all the 'liberties and customs' they had had in the time of Henry I, viz. that they should have a gild of their own, and that no one should do their work in the city of Oxford unless he was of this gild, and that the 'cordwanarii' should be of this gild. Henry III's confirmation of this was given 'apud Wudestoke, 18 Dec. anno regni 45,' i. e. 1260. Edward II by a charter dated 'apud Yorke, 3 Junii anno regni 12,' i.e. 1318, had extended this privilege so that the 'corvesarii et corduanarii' should control not only the city but the suburbs of Oxon: 'quod nullus... in eadem villa Oxon aut suburbiis ejusdem villae corduanum aut corium tannatum' should handle, unless of the gild: the witnesses are W., archbishop of York; J., bishop of Norwich; J., bishop of Ely (Chancellor); Adomar de Valence, earl of Pembroke; Johannes de Britannia, earl of Richmond; Humphrey Bohun, earl of Hereford and Essex.

A second fragment of Wood's collections for this chapter is noticed in the same catalogue, where article 54 (fol.358) is said to be 'Collections concerning the Jews in Oxford.' This has long been missing from Wood MS. F 29 A, and its present whereabouts, if it still exists, is unknown.)

# (CHAPTER XXXV.)

# THE FRANCHISES, LIBERTIES, OR LIMITS.

(Wood intended (see i. 38) to write an account of the municipal boundary 1 of Oxford, but has nowhere done so. He alludes in one or two places to the special points which the authorities passed when they annually beat the City bounds ('goe their franchises'), e.g. i. 416, 425, 453, 460, 465, 467.

Had the chapter been written in full, it would have been a long one, since there was much controversy about the limits of the City jurisdiction.

References to controversies as regards the boundary of the City are as follows—on the north, as regards Port-meadow, i. 615; as regards North-gate hundred, i. 280, 341; as regards Holywell, i. 280, 377, 378, 380, 381, 385; on the east, as regards S. Clement's, i. 280, 282, 286; on the west, as regards Osney island, and Rewley, ii. 200, 215, 301 (Wood's Life and Times, iv. 180), and Binsey, i. 630. Cp. the idea that on the south the old boundary, i. 416, 418, had been altered, i. 279, 418, 421, 422, 460, 465.

# (CHAPTER XXXVI.)

THE SPIRITUALL GOVERNMENT, FIRST, BY ARCHDEACONS, THEN, BY BISHOPS, WITH A CATALOGUE OF EACH.

(Wood made some collections towards this chapter.

- (i) In Wood MS. E 3 (O. C. 8567) he has-
- A Catalogue of Archdeacons of Oxford. But Hardy's Le Neve's Fasti Ecclesiae Anglicanae renders it superfluous to print that Catalogue here.
- (ii) In his account of the cathedral church he gives what is practically, for his period,—
  - A Catalogue of Bishops of Oxford: see ii. 8-13.

He has nowhere, to the best of my knowledge, any general treatise about the jurisdiction of the archdeacons, and subsequently of the bishops, which would have served for the first part of his projected chapter. For these points the reader may be referred to the Rev. Edward Marshall's History of the Diocese of Oxford.

In place of the missing chapter, I give here a summary of pre-Reformation institutions in the city of Oxford, drawn up by me from transcripts made <sup>1</sup> from the Lincoln Episcopal Institution-books by Mr. Alfred Gibbons. Four points may be noticed in these as being of accidental interest:—

- (i) The extraordinary imperfection of the episcopal registers, the number of institutions unrecorded far exceeding the number given.
- (ii) The pestilence, as I suppose, which swept Oxford of its parochial clergy in 1349.
- (iii) The endeavour made by a newly appointed bishop (see S. Michael's at North Gate, 130?) to secure a modicum of knowledge in presentees.
- (iv) The far-spread and close-meshed net of Papal 'provisions,' which enclosed even small benefices like S. Michael's at North Gate.

I may add also that, besides the entries here given, these papers give institutions to Begbroke, Cowley, Headington, Iffley, Kidlington (Cudlington), Marston, Sandford, Wilcot (Wiuelescote), and Yarnton (Erdington) in Oxfordshire.) They are in the hands of the Committee of the Oxford Historical Society.

### All Saints Church.

The institutions all run 'ad ecclesiam Omnium Sanctorum, Oxon.,' and thus give no warrant for Wood's assumption (ii. 107) that the church was formally made a vicarage. The annual payment to S. Frideswyde's priory was ordered by bishop Hugh Wells, not by S. Hugh of Avalon (ib.).

# (CHAPTER XXXVII.)

THE NAMES AND LIVES OF THOSE WRITERS AND FAMOUS
PERSONS THAT HAVE BIN BORNE IN OXON.

(Wood mentions this, i. 38, as an intended chapter for his City treatise, but adds the note 'not done.' We can, however, from these volumes, and from a run through the Athenae Oxonienses, discover what names he would have included.

The foremost name would have been Richard I, Cœur-de-lion, i. 77, 367; and King John, also, would have been brought in, i. 367. In later politics, there is no name to be inserted till we come to Henry Marten, the Regicide, + 1680.

Of bishops, Wood mentions John de Oxon., bishop of Norwich, 1175, †1200; Maugerus, bishop of Worcester, 1200, †1212; Thomas Cooper, author of the Latin dictionary, bishop of Lincoln, 1571, and of Winchester, 1584, †1594; John Underhill, bishop of Oxford, 1589, †1592; William Peirce, bishop of Bath and Wells, 1632, †1670.

Among writers of early date, place would have been found for Malgerius, i. 77; and for Thomas Wyke, i. 320, the Osney chronicler. Letters of times nearer Wood's own would have claimed Sir William Davenant, Poet Laureate, † 1668; Sir Toby Mathews, the supposed papal agent at the court of Charles I, translator into Italian of Bacon's Essays, † 1655; and 'captain' William Hicks, whose book of Oxford jests found so many imitators.

The representatives of scholarship would have been the Orientalists, Edward Pocock, † 1691, and James Lamb, † 1664; Barten Holyday, translator of Juvenal, † 1661; and Gerard Langbaine the younger, a pioneer in the bibliography of the English drama. Science, in several ages, would have been represented by Edward Wootton, † 1555, the zoologist; Thomas Hariet, mathematician and navigator, † 1621; and Henry Coley, astrologer.

Of contributors to the polemical divinity of his own and the preceding age, Wood notes the preacher of reasonableness, William Chillingworth, + 164\frac{3}{4}, and his frantic opponent, Francis Cheynell. + 1665. And among minor stars of the same class, John Garbrand alias Herks, + 1589, John Prime, + 1596, John Dawson, + 1641, Thomas Coleman, + 1647, and his own brother Edward Wood, + 1655, with Puritan sympathies; and of Royalists, Matthias Prideaux, + 1646, Henry Jackson, + 1662, editor and admirer of Hooker, and Henry Bignell, + 1656, a typical specimen of the genus 'scandalous and malignant priest.'

Sir Richard Holloway, Justice of the King's Bench, in spite of Wood's personal antipathy to him, must have been given a place, because of his part in the trial of the bishops. Benjamin Woodroffe, † 1712, whose project of a Greek college, and negotiations to have his hall (Gloucester Hall) erected into a college, supply a very amusing chapter of Oxford history, just comes into Wood's period. William Lyde alias Joyner, a Roman Catholic, whose friendship Wood found very embarrassing in the Popish plot days (Wood's Life and Times, ii. 427, 433), and some other versifiers and sermon-writers of Wood's contemporaries might have been brought in as 'writers,' though not as 'famous persons.')

# (CHAPTER XXXVIII.)

# (Monumental Inscriptions in Oxford Churches.)

(In the MS. of Wood's City treatise, MS. Wood F 29 A, there is a section (fol. 321-356), of larger paper than the rest, which gives monumental inscriptions in the churches of S. Mary's, S. Aldate's, S. Mary Magdalen, All Saints, S. Michael's, S. Martin's, S. Peter's in the East, and S. Cross (Holywell).

This was at one time part of a separate treatise (cited, ii. 173, by Wood as his 'folio book of monuments'), and was probably inserted by Wood in his City volume as an after-thought when he had used up the other part of it in his Colleges and Halls. It occurs as an integral part of the City volume in the 1697 Catalogue made immediately after the transfer of Wood's MSS. to the Ashmolean Museum. It is therefore printed here.

These records are of some permanent value owing to the destruction of monuments in the fall of All Saints and the demolition of S. Aldate's church.

It may be noted that these Oxford monuments have received, and are receiving, a considerable amount of attention. We have, contemporary with Wood, Matthew Hutton's notes of inscriptions in Oxford churches, MS. Rawl. B 397, made 1659-60. There are also many Oxford inscriptions in Thomas Dingley's History from Marble, written about 1670, published by the Camden Society in 1867. MS. Harl. 964 is Richard Symonds' notes of Oxford city and suburban churches, taken before the Civil War: I have not seen the volume.

For more recent, and more valuable, work, I may refer to the Journal of the Oxford Brass-rubbing Society.

I am indebted to the Rev. John Darlington, M.A., Lincoln College, for transcribing the inscriptions of S. Mary's, S. Aldate's, and S. Mary Magdalen during his undergraduate days.)

# (fol. 321 a.) In S. Marie's Church, Oxon.

In the chancell.

On a fair white marble fastned to the north wall by the high altar is this:—

To the memory of the late most vertuous and truly religious M<sup>ris</sup> Anne Hele, wife of Nicholas Hele, gent. (M.A. of this Universitie), who died in childbed Nov. 6, 1664, being the 25 years of her age, and lyes here interred.

We greive our losse, ble'st soul! and might whole shores Of teares have stayed thee, still thou hadst been ours. Vertue's faire copie, and heavens choice delight, Too good for men's, more fit for angells', sight. In whose unspotted breast, sweet innocence (Exil'd by most) found welcome and defence. Vertue's great triumph, and thy sexes pride, Religion's boast, pure gold in furnace try'de. 'Tis hard within its bounds our greif to keepe: Our softer hearts must with thy marble weepe. Yet listning to thy Halleluiahs, wee Forbeare, and onlie long to be with thee.

#### Satis mihi vixi non aliis.

Armes on this monument are 'five lozenges ermine in bend, a cressant for a difference,' impaling 'two barrs,' by the name of Penne, without colours.

On a brass plate fastned to the wall under the aforesaid monument is this:—

A little below the former is an altar-monument of course marble, above which (against the wall) hath been a white marble table, adorned on its verg with military tokens, as drums, colours, fifes, pikes, swords, &c., carved in fine stone; and on the same white marble (which hath been many yeares since taken away by command

Armes are 'argent, on a fess blue, 3 lozenges or,' quartering, 1, 'ermine, on a fess blue 3 escallops or'; 2, 'gules, a bend argent between 6 martletts or'; 3, 'gules, a saltire vaire argent and blue' [Willington]; but these were set up without colours.

On a black marble table against the said north wall is this:-

(Arms:—) 'barry of six'; without colours. The crest 'a bull's (or ox) head coup'd.'

A little below the former, is this following, on a black marble fix'd to the wall:—

# On the south wall of the chancell:-

At the upper end neare the high altar is a black marble table, with this inscription theron:—

In hope of a glorious resurrection here lyes interred the body of Mrss Joyce Hardinge, wife of Thomas Hardinge, Bachelor of Divinitie, and Rector of Soulderne in the countie of Oxon, daughter of William Stapleton of Lilywood in the countie of Stafford, esq., who was an eminent patterne and example of pietie and charitie towards the poore: she deceased on the 28 of May in the yeare of her age 49 and in the yeare of our Lord Christ 1650.

(Arms:—) 'argent, a dolphin naiant embowed vert, finned or'; impaling, 'argent, a lyon rampant sable.'

The said Thomas Hardinge before mentioned was formerlie as I conceive fellowe of S. John's College in Cambridge, and afterward one of the masters of Westminster schoole, whose proficiency in the Greek tongue was so great, that he was commonlie called The Grecian. He was Rector of the aforesaid church of Soulderne 26 yeares, where he was not onlie eminent for his holy (fol. 322 a) and pious conversation but for his hospitality and charity to the poore. He died 10 Oct. 1648 and was buried in the chancell of Soulderne church, in the time of the great revolution and change of the church and state, living and dying himselfe in the same constancy of obedience, a true son of the church and a professor of the antient Catholique faith. His epitaph is legible in the larg volumes of his workes, especially in a great ecclesiasticall history, which comming into his widdow's hands after his death, and from hers (when she died in Hart hall) to Mr. John Fell, came since into those of Dr. William Lloyd, Deane of Bangor; and 'tis the foundation of that ecclesiasti(c)all History of England which he is about to publish.

A little belowe the former, on a neat white marble, is this inscription following set up to the memory of Thomas Gourney, M.A. and fellow of Brasenose, who dying on the second of July was the same day buried here, anno 1661:—

On a blew marble, laying before the high altar:-

Here lyeth the body of Henry Brett, gent., the son of Henry Brett of Elsfield, esq., who died 29 March 1671.

Armes are 'fess dauncettée, thirteen billets, four and three above, three, two, and one below,' without colours.

Upon a little white stone 2, on the first step leading to the altar:— Nathaniel Butler, commensalis collegii Oriel, obiit Dec. 4, 1628.

He was the son of Nathaniel Butler of Saperton in Gloucestershire, and died in the 19 yeare of his age.

On a marble 3, laying on the said first step, is this:-

On a little white marble fastned to an old stone:— Sir Charles Blount, knight, died June the 1, 1644.

He was of Mapledurham in this countie, and was killed at the north port, by the sentinell, for not standing at his command.

In 1 the middle of the chancell, on an old marble is a certaine french inscription in Saxon letters, of which is onlie legible Walter de Villete. And on another neare to the former, onlie this, Johannes de Delham, the rest woren away by time and treading.

About the middle of the chancell on the north side is this on a flat marble:

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partie, the exact time of his death was forgotten. The armes on it are, 'argent, a file of four points in bend sinister sable, a mullet of 6 points in canton dexter gules.' The crest to it is, 'upon a floure de lize issuing out of a crowne, a man's head' (without colours) and under the coat is written 'Morrien.' There be also three other coats, which I presume do belong to certaine matches of his familie, as first the coat belonging to Rec Ke, secondly that belonging to Val Ke, and thirdly that of Ossen Brock. The blasoning of all which is needless, I suppose, now to repeat 1.

On a brass plate fastned to a marble laying on the ground neare to the chancell dore:—

Orate pro animabus Johannis Staffolde et Margarete consortis suae, nec non Alicie et Agnetis filiarum ejusdem.

This John Staffold died about the yeare 1421 and his widdow Margaret was afterward married to William Offord, a burgher of Oxon.

Neare to the former was another stone (which layd before the reformation of religion neare the altar of S. Thomas) and theron the proportion of a man in a gowne, with a bedell's staff in his hand, and an inscription underneath (severall yeares since woren out) shewing that there was buried John Doo, somtimes Yeoman-Bedell of the faculty of the Law (son of William Doo and Margaret his wife of Fincham in the parish of S. Marten in Norfolke) which John died 7 Nov. 1507 (23 Hen. VII).

The arms on it are 'a bedell's staff, between three does' heads erazed.'

On a white stone:-

Here lyeth the body of Thomas Harris, one of the Aldermen of this citie of Oxon, who was three times Mayor of this cittie, and died the 10 of May 1628.

On another:-

Gulielmus Goulsey, Art. bac. coll. Aenean. obiit 8 Dec. 1622.

On another white stone:-

In April 62. No merits he

Neare to him was buried his widdow, Joane (daughter of Stevenson of Weston on the green, pleb.), who died 18 Aug. 1671, sine prole: the armes of whome with her husband's are impaled on the said stone.

On a blew marble towards the west dore:-

At the foot of the staires leading somtimes to the old Congregation House, and in the place where somtimes stood S. Katherine's altar, is an erected tombe 3 of free stone planked with marble, and over it is a larg peice of brass plates. One of them containeth the picture of a man kneeling in a procuratorial habit and formalitie, speaking

these two verses to the picture of St. Catherine with a coronet upon her head:—

Another containeth the picture of St. Katherine, who stands above him at some distance and doth in answer to his petition direct her speech to the picture of an old man sitting in a chaire above, and at some distance from her, pointing with her right hand (while she speaks) to the supplicant below:—

Obsecro, summe 1 deus, veniam concede precanti Edmundo Croston gloria fine carens.

And a third containeth this epitaph, to the memory of the defunct:—

Upon this tombe (which cost 21i. 2s. 4d.) are crosses with tuns at each end, and upon the tabinacular work over it are tuns ingraven, and at the side is a cross fitched, peircing through a tunne<sup>4</sup>. After this tombe was built, it served for an altar, and the chantry preist celebrated therat, as at St. Katherine altar which stood in the very place as I have told you where this tombe now stands.

On a brasse fastned to the buttress of the steeple:-

builder of the Schooles, who was buried underneath it 11 Sept. 1613. There was no signe left of it as belonging to him, onlie the armes of the freemasons, which I shall mention in S. Peter's church in the East.

There be severall coates about the inscription, no other (I presume) than such that have been matched into the family, which being many I shall now pass them by for brevity sake <sup>2</sup>.

On the east wall is a plate of brass fixt to a marble, and theron is engraven a woman kneeling before a table with a book on it, and behind her are seven sons and five daughters all kneeling, with this epitaph under:—

And also five of her children by her former husband, viz. John, Edward, Christopher, Mary and Elizabeth, who all lye interred within the body of this church.

In memory of John Hopkins and of his two wives Anne and Katherine, and of his son William Hopkins, who by his last will and testament, appointed his executor to erect this smal monument for a memorial of those his deare parents. This monument was erected the 30 day of Sept. in the yeare of our Lord 1682.

The said William Hopkins was an attorney and dying 30 March 1681 bequeathed 300 l. for charitable uses, with which was paved the altar with the steps leading therunto, at the upper end of the chancell of this church, done in Oct. 1682.

At the head of the former and neare to the bottome of the old pulpit staires was this 2 on a brass plate fix'd to a marble:—

This epitaph was made for Doctor Walter Wright, commissarie of the Universitie in the time of King Edward 6, who dying in Exeter College on the 10 May 1561 was buried not where his stone lately laid but in the nave of the church. He bequeathed to the said college a gilt cup or platter weighing seven pound besides 3 li: in money; as also somthing (if I mistake not) to the church of Bampton in this county of which he was somtimes one of the vicars.

On a larg marble stone laying before the lower south dore:—
Here lyeth the body of Thomas Fyfeild, who departed this life the 18 day of October, Anno Domini 1662, aged 53 yeares.

# In the chappell of our Lady 8.

Neare to the middle is a raised monument of free-stone covered with a marble, on which hath been a portracture and inscription on

substituted for in Adam Brom's chappell.' Hutton's note of this chapel is: In a chappell on the north side of

brass, but long since toren off, so that nothing but constant tradition tells us that it was erected to the memory of Adam Brom the first builder of the chappell and first provost of Oriel, who, as I have told you there, died 1332. Here are also 10 flat marbles which hath had inscriptions on them, laid for certaine of the antient provosts and fellows of Oriel College, but their particular names I cannot tell. Such hath been the baseness of certaine people that not onlie these, but more than 18 in the chancell and church hath been most sacrilegiously defaced. I have heard some antient men report, that in the beginning of King James raigne or therabouts a certaine person being taken with some of the brass about him that he had stolen away in the night-time, was set in the public stockes for his punishment with the brass hanging about his neck and afterwards whipt.

(fol. 826 b.) On one of the said old marbles is this engraven:—Anno 1646, Maii 3; H. E. sub spe gloriosa resurrectionis.

These letters were engraven for Henry Eccleston, Bac. of Div., somtimes fellow of Oriel College and vicar of this church, who was buried on the said 3 of May.

On another is engraven S. D. for Samuel Dicus, M. of A. and fellow of Brasenose, buried 19 Jan. 1644.

(fol. 327 a.) M. S. Hic subtus jacet Rogerus Fry in agro Vigorniensi natus qui primă juventute in hac Academia tres annos plus minus togatus egit: dein chirurgiae operam dedit in qua arte per aliquam multos annos sub Anatomiae professore chirurgico Academicus meruit, donec febre correptus quam plurimis amicis desideratus obiit 25 die Junii anno aerae Christianae 1681, aetatis suae 38.

the church, called "the vestry" alias "Adam Brome's chappell," a raised monument: thereon a great marble, the inscription pulled off: but it was for Adam de Brome, who built that chappell, who also was first provost of Oriall College.' Hutton notes these coats of arms:- In the windows of Adam Brome's chappell:-"gules, a chevron between 3 bucks heads cabosed argent," quartering (I) "gules, on a bend ermine a talbot current sable"; (2) "vert, 10 ovalls, 5, 5, in pale or"; (3) defaced.—At the bottom of the pulpit, (i) the archbishoprick of Canterbury, impaling "a fesse between a goat's head rasd in cheife and 3 escallops in base" (Warham); (ii) "a dolphin najant embossed" (Fitzjames); (iii) bishoprick of Salisbury, impaling "fretty."—Above the pillars (i) "a dolphin najant embowed between 3 mullets"; (ii) bishoprick of Winchester.—Over the north west doore, (i) "a dolphin najant imbowed"; (ii) "a crosse ingrailed, in the first canton an eagle displayed."—Over the west doore, (i) the University armes; (ii) New Colledge armes."

Armes are, 'on a chevron between three cressants, an escocheon charged with a lyon rampant.'

On a flat marble 1 stone laying in the middle of the chancell is this engraven:—

Elizabeth, wife unto Sir Richard Bealasyse of Ludford in the county palatine of Durham, kt., sole daughter and heir unto William Sponer of Fishly in the county of Norfolke, esq. who died the 7 of February An. Dom. 1641.

Over all are these arms in a lozenge, viz. 'on a chevron, between 3 fleur de lize, a cressant'; impaling 'a lyon rampant, debruised by two cotizes in bend'; but without colours.

At the head of the former is this on a white stone:—

Here lieth the body of Dorothy, the wife of Cornelius Gascoigne, gent., of Gaunt house and daughter of Esq. Walwine. She departed this life the 12 day of December an. dom. 1652.

Armes are 'three jacks (or pikes) heads (standing upward) cooped'; impaling, 'a bend ermine and hound passant in sinister canton within a bordure ingrailed': without colours.

(fol. 329 b). On the south side of the chancell is a little isle or chappell, built of free stone in the month of October, an. 1674, by John West the elder of Hampton-Poyle neare Oxon, gent.

At the west end are set up the proportions of the said John (in armour), his wife and daughter, to the middle, and all curiously cut out in white marble.

Under his proportion is this inscription on a black marble table:—
In memory of John West, the Elder, of Hampton-Poyle in the countie of Oxford,

esq., one of the gentlemen pentioners in ordinary to his Majestie Kinge Charles the Second; who was a benefactor to this church and the poore of this parish.

Under the wive's proportion is this, on a black marble table also:-

In memory of Mary West, the wife of the said John West, who was the youngest daughter of Jervis Kirke of Greenhill in the parish of Norton in the countie of Darby, Esquier.

Under the daughter's proportion is this, also on a black marble table:—

Here lieth interred the bodie of the truely vertuous Mris Ann West the youngest and dutifull daughter of the said John West the elder esq. and Marie his wife, who having in this life done all that might tend to her future happinesse, she departed in this parish to her eternall comfort the 9 day of October in the yeare of our Lord God 1674.

This Anne West being buried in the churchyard under the south wall of the chancell, the father meerlie out of love caused the said isle or chappell to be erected in all hast over her and to be made but as large as to containe the bodies of him, his wife and the said daughter. Over his head are his armes engraven in white marble, viz. 'ermine, a bend indented.' Over hers in lozenge, 'parted per fess, a lozenge counterchanged, on a canton a lyon couchant, collered and cheined, holding in his 2 pawes a (.' Over the daughter's in lozenge also are the armes of West, all which are without colours. On the south wall of the said isle are the armes of him the said John, impaling those of his wife, in colours, viz. ['ermine', a bend indented sable, impaling, parted per fess or and gules, a lozenge counterchanged of the feild, on a canton azure, a lyon couchant argent, collered and cheined azure, holding in his pawes a ( argent.' Crest to his armes are a boar's \* head cooped or, (not issuing out but laying) on the red cap of a coronet or 4. Crest to hers is an armed arme proper (the hand or) brandishing a sword argent hilted or.]

#### In the BODY OF THE CHURCH.

Neare the entrance into the chancell are the proportions of a man in his gowne, and his wife, engraven on brass plates fix'd to a marble stone 5, and this inscription under:—

a pencil note, in the lower margin, says: 'his benefaction, see foul copie.'

the description of the arms, here placed in square brackets, is on a slip attached to fol. 329 b.

The said Johan was buried here 2 Julie an. 1578:

On a white marble of a diamond square:-

Here lyeth the body of Elizabeth the wife of William Shawe of London wine-cooper who died the 31 of May 1674 aged 30.

(slip to fol. 329 b.) On a white ... stone:—

Here lyeth the body of Anne Yeate, daughter of John Yeate, who died 9 March 1628.

Here lyeth the body of M<sup>ris</sup> Alice Yates the wife of M<sup>r</sup> John Yates who died the 10 of Aprill 1637.

Mr John Yates buried 5 July 1642.

# (Docklington's ILE.)

(fol. 329\*.) South isle, on the south side of the body.

A larg marble with Saxon characters round the verg so obliterated I cannot make any thing of it, in French: quaere whether not for the founder.

Another stone of marble like a coffin, for one of 14 or 16 yeares of age with brass formerly on, long since gon.

In every window this .. \*, '2 fishes argent imbowed face to face in a red feild.'

In the west window hath been bishop Beckington's armes long since defaced, (a) llegist, quaere principall of some hall herabouts: entred.

From the foul copie 4 must come in :-

Epitaph of Thomas Smith—John Wilmote—Oliver, son of Richard Smith—a monument of John Wilmot defaced—quaere quotations in the margin. From these Wilmots are descended those of Berks and from those earl of Roff.<sup>6</sup>

## S. Aldate's Church.

## CHANCELL.

At the upper end in the north wall, an old arch, from the ground middle high, at the bottome an old coffin of stone—for whome made is quite forgotten.

On the north side also (which side seems to be older than the other, the other hath orie(1) window put out for light) are yet remaining five arched seats in the wall, like to stalls in a chapple; the last towards the altar which made up the 6, is made a dore to the old vestrie. On the other side I beleive (h) as been as many but taken away—this church hath been called 'monasteriolum.'

There be mo(re) marble stones, that have had proportions and inscriptions on them in brass but long since gone.

There hath been an old stone with a Saxon character but treading and walking hath quite woren out the letters.

'T.S.' sine dato on a little white stone, by the south dore.

## BODY OF THE CHURCH.

In the body of the church six flat marbles, with the proportions of man and women and children, with inscriptions and armes at each corner (four corners) all on brass plates toren off time out of mind.

Ten also or more with proportions and inscriptions, without armes, on brass plates—all gone.

## In the ILE on the north side of the Body.

In the side of the upper window on the north side hath been the proportion of a man kneeling with sons behind him, also of a woman with daughters behind her, a coat of armes between them, sc(r)ouls going out of the man's and woman's mouth, to the picture of God above, all on brass plate: under the man and woman a brass plate with inscription—all gone time out of mind. Under in the stone two letters, first is obliterated and second is S (s quaere).

(fol. 829\*.) At the upper end of the body of the church, under the north wall, are the graves of the Smiths of this parish, gentlemen, viz. of Thomas Smyth, somtimes Alderman and severall times Mayor of Oxon, buried here 9 July, anno 1601 (43 Eliz.). He was the fourth son of Richard Smyth of Keereley¹ in com. Lanc., son and heire of Robert Smythe of the same place, gent., eldest son of Robert Smith of Polehowse in the parish of Prescot in the said countie; which Robert was elder brother to William Smyth, bishop of Lincolne and founder of Brasenose College in Oxon.

- 2. Of Rose, the first wife of the said Thomas Smyth, buried here 7 Sept., 1582. Shee was daughter of William Buckner of Botley neare Oxon by Dorothie his wife, daughter of Robert Huckvale of S. Marie Magd. parish in Oxon., gent.
- 3. Of Alice, the second wife of Thomas, buried 2 June, 1621, daughter of Richard Mayot of Abendon in Berkshire, gent.
- 4. Of John, Peter, Thomas <sup>2</sup>, &c., sons of Thomas by his first wife: the first (if I mistake not) was buried here 18 May, 1571, the second on the 4 Aug., 1577<sup>2</sup>.

Of Oliver Smith somtimes Alderman and Mayor of this citie, son of Thomas beforementioned by Alice his second wife, buried here 13 April, 1637, aged (53 4).

Of Anne his wife, buried 18 April, 1609, daughter of John Bussey, Rector of Shaldeston in Bucks.

Of Thomas Smyth, Alderman and somtimes mayor, eldest son of Oliver by Ann his wife, who died 20 Aprill, 1646, aged 42. He married Margaret sole daughter and heir of John Wilmot of this parish, gent. His hatchment hangs over his grave. John, his

(fol. 329\*\*.) Of John Smith, third son to Oliver, somtimes mayor (and alderman, quaere) of the citie, and burgess therof for the parliament begun 1640, who died 4 November, 1657, aged 49.

Of Elizabeth, widdow of the said John, daughter and heir of Henry Bosworth of St. Giles parish, Oxford, who died 5 Sept. 1673.

Of Oliver Smyth, son of Thomas, son of Oliver, who died 14 March 1664.

Of (Margaret 1) wife of the said Oliver, buried 1651, daughter of ... Boone, somtimes deputy-recorder of Oxford, by whom he had issue one onlie daughter named (Margaret) married to ... Evans, M. A. of New-Inn, now minister of Twiford in Bucks.

Of John Smith, the younger, of Kennington (neare Oxon) in Berks, son of John, third son of Oliver, who died 16 Dec. 1671. He married Catherine, daughter of Thomas Blagrave of St. Ebb's parish, gent., by whome he had on(e) only daughter named (Elizabeth) buried here 19 July, 1669.

Of Alice, daughter of the said John (third son of Oliver), wife of Richard Holloway of this parish, counsellour-(since sergeant-)at-law who died 7 Sept. 1672.

Elizabeth, a maiden daughter, 15 Jan. 1646.

Charls, an infant son, 21 Aug. 1633.

Henry, another infant, 22 April, 1637.

..., son of Mr. John Smith, 7 July, 1645.

Wigorn., gent., which Tim was borne 5 Aug. 1663, a student in Pemb. Coll. scarce one yeare, died of the small poxe 12 July, 1683—vide Matriculations.

Armes are 'on a fesse nebule, between three estoyles, a cressant for a difference,' She was the daughter of John Hensley of this parish (buried here also) and wife of Samuel Everard of Dudingherst in Essex, somtimes M. of Arts and student of Christ Church.

The Smiths of Keerley (or Cuerdley) beares 'parted per pale or and gules, 3 fleurs-de-luces counterchanged': see in my discourse of William Smith among the writers, 1618.

Mr. Thomas Smith, baker, buried 29 June, 1627 (son of the aforesaid Thomas, quaere).

Alice, the wife of Mr. Thomas Smith, Alderman, buried 2 June, 1621—this may be the second wife of the 1st Thomas.

(fol. 380 b.) In the isle or chappell joyning to the north SIDE OF THE BODY OF THE CHURCH.

On the east wall is fastned a brass plate, wheron are engraven two men kneeling face to face with a deske between them 1, one of which hath a gowne on and the other a cloake, and under them this inscription:-

Neare unto this place lyeth the body of Anne, the wife of Mr. Robert Wilson of Oxon, and daughter to Timothy Doyly of Stadham in the aforesaid county, gent., who departed this life the 3<sup>d</sup> day of January 1652 in the yeare of her age 36. Mother to eight children, four sons and four daughters.

Armes are, in lozenge, 'or, two bendlets azure.'

(fol. 381 a.) In DocLington's ISLE or that isle joyning on the south side to the body of the church, (under most part of which, if not all, is a vault, or charnell house) are these monuments following:—

Under the upper south window is a raised monument of alabaster, and theron is the proportion of a man at length curiously carved out of the same matter, laying on his back, having a wide sleeve gowne on, or rather a surplice, a large hood on his shoulders, with a lesser over it (like to those that our Doctors now weare) and the top of his head tonsured, with this inscription on the verge of the monument:—

Orate pro anima Magistri Johannis Noble quondam principalis aule late porte, et Official. Archidiac. Berks, qui obiit secundo die Junii anno dni. Mill. In the window over this tombe was the proportion of a man kneeling with four children behind him, and by it was written *William Noble*... which William was perhaps father or brother to the aforesaid John.

At the lower end of this chappell layes a larg marble stone with a Saxon inscription theron, but not legible, perhaps for John de Doclington founder therof, quaere.

In the west window hath been <sup>8</sup> this coat viz. 'argent, on a fess azure between three stags (or bucks) heads cabossed in cheif or and three pheons below sable, a miter with labells or <sup>4</sup>.' Boren by Thomas de Bekington somtimes bishop of Bath and Wells, formerly (as I conceive) principall of an old hostle (joynning to Broadgates) belonging to New

College (of which societie he was somtimes a member). The students of which hostles, as of others adjoyning, mostlie conversant in the Civil and Canon law, were wont to celebrat mass in this chappell, or isle 1.

# (fol. 332 b.) St Mary Magdalen Church 2.

In the chancell<sup>8</sup>, commonlie called 'the MINISTER'S CHANCELL.

On the north wall, upon a black marble table, is this written:—

To Posterity. In memory of that excellent matron Mris Elizabeth Baylie wife of the reverend and most worthy Richard Baylie, Dr. of Divinity, Deane of Sarum and President of St. John Baptist's College in this Universitie, daughter of Dr. John & Robinson Archdeacon of Nottingham, neice to the glorious Martyr and assertor of the church of England Dr. William Laud, Archbishop of Canterbury, whose great example and grave precepts she carefully followed, continuing a true daughter of the church of England when it was under persecution, loyall to her soveraigne when he could not give her protection, charitable to the poore when sacriledge had devoured her childrens bread, but she dayly prayed for it and was dayly supplied. She was a great instance of prudence in the government of her family, piety in the education of her children, gravity in her conversation, obedience in her behaviour to her husband, with whome she lived in all conjugall affection 41 years. He went before her July 27, 1667; shee followed September 29, 1668, to the place where there is neither marriage nor giving in marriage.

Armes are 'azure, three doves sergreant argent, crowned or, leg'd and beked gules,' impaling, 'vert, on a chevron between three roebucks passant or, as many trefoyles slipt gules,' which last is boren by Robinson but that name hath no proofe for them.

On another black marble against the same wall is this:-

Rand. Pickering frater unicus superstes H. M. fieri curavit.

On a marble laying on the ground at the high altar is this:-

Here lyeth the body of John Willis, gent., Chapter Clarke of Christchurch and Steward of Eaton college. He deceased Nov. 6, 1675. And also here lyeth three sons and four daughters of his who all dyed yong.

On a brass plate fastned to a marble lying under the communion table was this:—

Here lyeth buried the bodie of Roger Hewet, sometymes Mayor of this citie and Alderman at the tyme of his decease, who deceased the v daye of March An. Dom. 1586.

He was son of William Hewet mentioned in S. Giles church. His first wife was buried here 1564, his second wife Joane (see more of her among the benefactors of University College), the 30 July 1580. So was his brother Mr. Richard Hewet, 28 Feb. 1575. There was one Mris. Anne Hewet that was married to Will. Furness mayor of Oxon in St. Michael's Church 7 June 1584, but whether that Anne was daughter to Roger or widdow to Richard, I know not.

Below the steps leading to the altar is this on a white stone:-

Here lyeth expecting the second comming of Christ Jesus unto the judgment, the bodie of the Lady Yonge the loving wife of Sir Richard Yonge, Kt. and Baronett, one of the gentlemen of King Charles his most honorable privie chamber in ordinarie. She left this world for a better, the 26 of May 1643.

# In the body of the church, commonlie called the south body.

On a black marble fastned to one of the north pillars is this:—

Here lyeth the body of Mr19 Elizabeth Parsons, lately the wise of Dr. Parsons, the Principall of Harthall, formerly the wise of Mr. William Langlie, Master of Arts and one of the Students of Ch. Church. In testimonie of her conjugall affection, she hath dedicated to each of them a marble monument at her proper charge, one unto Dr. Parsons at Barington where he dyed and was interred in the church there, another unto Mr. William Langlie who was buried here. In memorie of her selfe she required (in her life time) that the words following should be engraven at the foot of this marble.

I look to dye, but my Redeemer liveth, and my trust is that in his power I shall rise againe, see my Redeemer with my eyes, and live with him for ever.

The said Mr. Langley was buried here 19 Feb. 1625 and Mriss Parsons 17 March 1654.

(fol. 388 b.) On a brasse plate fastned to one of the south pillars is the picture of a man kneeling before a table, with this under him:—

En jacet hic Smithus praecellens arte magister, Artibus ingenuis qui decoratus erat. Musicus, Astrologus, Medicus, Geometra celebris Hic fuit, hunc vivum credo fuisse σοφόν. Credo fuisse σοφόν, nam cunctas calluit artes, Artes hunc musae perdocuere novem. Mertonensis erat socius cum disceret 2 illas. Inde abiens multis causa salutis erat. Arte ferebat opem, sed artes non clausit in arca Parca sibi, miseris sed bene larga manus. Sic mundo vixit semper moriturus ut esset, Sic vita cessit, vivat ut usque deo. Saxa tegunt corpus gelidum sed mens petit astra. Gloria virtutis funere nulla perit. Qui legis haec discas è terris esse migrandum, Virtutum ac studiis sidera summa petas.

On a marble stone laying in the middle of the body, is the

portraicture of a man in preistly vestments engraven on brass, with this at his feet:—

Testis sis Christe quod non jacet hic lapis iste Corpus ut ornetur, sed spiritus ut memoretur. Quisquis eris si transieris, tu respice, plora, Sum quod eris, fueram quod sis, pro me precor ora!

This was put on the stone for Mr. Robert Abdy somtimes Head or Master of Balliol college, who was buried here about the yeare 1494.

On another, under the pictures of a man and a woman, is this engraven, on brass plates:

Pray for the sowles of Rychard Hamden, esquire, and Alys his wyffe, of whose sowles Jesu have mercy: whych departed An. Dom. 1524.

The said Alice was somtimes the wife of Georg Havell of this parish, brewer, and I think shee lived after 1524.

Note that when the brass (on which the said inscription was engraven) was some yeares ago taken up, I read this French inscription engraven on the other side:—

Qi pur l'alme Margret Holgote cy prye devoutement en ciel done luy soit graunde joye de dieu lomnypotent.

so that by this it shewes that the said brass had been fastned to another grave, but whether it lay'd here or in another church I know not.

On another, under the picture of a woman engraven on a brass plate:—

Pray for the soule of Philip Caxston, wedow; whych died the xxiiii s day of September an MCCCCCXIII. On hir soule God take mercy.

Among the writings of this church is mention made of one Mr. Caxton that was a benefactor therunto an. 1515 or before. I think his Xtian name was Thomas and that he was father to one Thomas Caxston living in this parish an. 1528. The benefaction of the said Mr. Caxston was this:—1, a scarlet gowne fured with grey and coffes of the same, which were somtimes belonging to the

To the perpetuall memorie of John Poole, once servant to New College, who gave to the use of the poore of S. Marie Magdalen parish in the suburbs of the citie of Oxford two messuages or tenements situated and being on the east side of the Theater, and by lease in the occupation of the Universitie, yeilding and paying to the great releif of the poore fourteen pounds by the yeare. Which poore are elected the vicar and churchwardens for the yeare being.

Given in the yeare of our Lord, 1643.

In the parish chancell, or the isle joyning on the north side to the minister's chancell.

On a black marble fastned to the north wall is this:—

Gulielmus Crompton, filius et haeres Thomae Crompnto de Stone (in) comitatu Stafford, armigeri, obiit in aedibus sanctae et individuae Trinitatis Oxoniae die Decembris vii, an. dom. 1620, et hoc sui marmore requiescit in domino.

Armes are 'argent, on a cheif azure 3 pheons or.' The crest is 'a horse's head coup'd within a coronet or.'

On another black marble fastned to the north wall and opposit to the former is this:—

#### H. S. E.

Ricardus Tuder, Thomae Tuder e parochia S. Mariae Magd. in Oxonii suburbiis natu minimus, qui 24 annos natus, et tam ob sanctitatem deo, quam ob pietatem parentibus, et morum suavitate amicis, charus; tandem denatus est 13 Jan. 1661. In cujus memoriam hoc fraterni amoris monumentum flens posuit Thom. Tuder.

On a free-stone laying under the former is this engraven:—

Here lye the bodies of Thomas Tuder and Elizabeth his wife (one of the daughters of Mr. John Holloway of Oxford, Bachelor of Law and register of Berkshire) by whome he had issue 6 sons and 7 daughters, and having lived togeather 58 years (for the most part in this parish) and seen their children's children, departed this life, he Decemb. 12, 1672, aged 76 yeares, shee March the 10, 1669, aged 78 yeares, leaving behind them onlie one son and four daughters &c.

Joan Saunders widow, the relict of John Saunders clerke, and one of the daughters of the said Thomas Tuder and Elizabeth his wife, departed this life 28 Apr. 1674 aged 47 yeares, leaving issue behind her one onlie daughter, Elizabeth, of the age of xi yeares.

Neare to the entrance into the said isle is this following inscription engraven on a brass plate fastned to a free stone:—

Armes are 'a chevron between 3 feathers with their tops flagging,' without colours.

## In the north body of the church.

On a brass plate fixt to the wall at the upper end:-

Here lyeth buried the body of Jane Fitzherbert second wiffe of Robert Fitzherbert of Tissington 1 in the countie of Derbie esquire and one of the daughters of Thomas Basset of Hince in the countie of Stafford esquier, which Jane died 2 the 27 of October in the yere of our lord god 1575<sup>3</sup>.

Armes are 'three lyons rampant, a cressant for a difference': impaling, 'three piles issuing out of cheife, on a canton ermine a cressant'—all without colours'.

Neare to the former was a brass plate fixed to the wall parting the body from the north isle, and on the said plate were engraven the pictures of a man and woman kneeling on either side of the picture of God sitting in a chaire, holding that of Christ hanging on the crosse between his leggs, with the picture of a dove (representing the holy ghost) on his head. Behind the man was engraven the picture of St. Katherine mediating to God for him, and behind the woman the picture of St. Brigit doing the like for her, and under all this inscription:—

Orate pro animabus Johannis Havelde et Johanne uxoris ejus, qui quidem

On a marble at the lower end:-

Here lyeth the body of John Jackson, stone-carver, an ingenious artist, a loyall subject, an honest man and a good neighbour, who died Decemb. 22 A. D. 1663 2, aged 61 yeares.

On a black marble fastned to the wall at the upper end is this:-

Not long since was a faire altar moniment of white marble built in the south churchyard against the south wall of the church, over which was a black marble with these verses engraven theron :-

There was another inscription but taken away long since.

On one side of the said altar-monument was this written:— Here lyeth the body of Thomas Webb gent. who died 14 May 1643.

And on the other side this:-

Here lyeth the body of Georg Fletcher gent., son in law to Mr. Thomas Webb, who died May 22, 1643.

This monument was set up about the yeare 1654, but for the most part stolen away within an yeare or two after, and cried by the common belman for restauration. The remainder I saw in the vestrie anno 1667. Neare to the said monument was also buried Rob. Webb gent. 22 Jan. 1642. (explicit fol. 335 b.)

Here underneath lyeth enterred the body of Sir Edward Wardour knight who departed this life March the 14 an. 1645; and likewise the body of his deare and loving wife the lady Jane Wardour who desired to be enterred here also, who departed this life Jan. 20 an. 1652 and was buried the first of Feb. following.

Armes 2 over it are 'sable, on a chevron between 3 talbots heads erased argent as many fleur de lize azure'; impaling 'argent, two choughs in pale sable in cheif a cressant gules' (Bowdler). The crest 'a fleur de lize gules,' and the motto 'Guardatevi.'

On the north wall at the upper end is this on a black marble table:-

MONUMENTS ON THE GROUND IN THE CHANCELL.

Upon a grey marble is this engraven 4:—

Credo resurrectionem corporis hujus, expecto, Margaret Brooke, Jan. 16 an. 1641.

She was somtimes the widdow of Duke Brook of Temple Combe in the countie of Somerset esq., and a benefactrix to this church.

Below the steps leading to the high altar is a defaced monument, having theron the effigies of a man and woman engraven on brass, but nothing theron shewing to whom it belonged but the two letters. B. F., which are for Richard Frankish of Oxford, free-mason, who died about the 10 of Januar. 1485, and was, with Emm his wife, daughter of John Cayme of Oxon, buried here. He gave a house to the parishioners (opposite to Lincolne Coll.) for the susteining, help, and support of this church, so that they pay 4d. yearly to Lyncoln College. It joyned on the south side to a garden ground belonging to the said parishioners which then yeilded to them an annuall rent of 4s.

On a white marble 3 fastned to an old stone:—

Here lyeth the body of Robert Hughes of Lyncolne College gent. the son of Humphrey Hughes of Swercles in Wales in the county of Merioneth esq., buried Dec. 25, 1650.

On another marble is the picture of a man in a gowne with a bedell's staff in his hand and this inscription under:—

Orate pro anima Johannis Boswell, armigeri, superioris bedelli facultatis Artium Universitatis Oxon, qui oblit xi die mensis Septembris An. Dom. MV° primo: cujus anime propitietur deus amen.

At every corner of the stone are these armses, 'five lozenges in fess and in cheif 3 beares heads erased and musled' without colours. [Edmund Boswell', a secular chaplain and bachelor of Decrees, was sole executor to John Boswell, lately superior bedell, 1501.]

Neare to the former was an inscription on a brass plate fastned to a marble for Roger Folkys, an inhabitant of this parish, who died anno 1444, which, with the armes theron (viz. 'parted per pale, a chevron ingrailed') hath been long since taken away.

On another are the pictures of a man in a gowne between his two wives with this epitaph at their feet:—

Another inscription which was round the verg (but long since toren off) showed that underneath that stone lyeth the body of William Dagfeld, alderman and severall times mayor of Oxon, who died 29 Oct. 1476, and also of Joane his first wife who was buried there anno 1473; but this stone I think was removed out of Our Ladye's chappell, for by his will (in thesaurario Coll. Linc.) he devoted his body to be buried there before the altar. His second wife was Margaret, who was afterward wedded to one Parker's, and dying on Hockmunday anno 1523 was buried as it seems in Faringdon church in Berkshire, for there, as it appeares (in comput. bursariorum Coll. Linc.), were two chaplayns appointed to sing for the health of her soule, and had their wages paid them by the rector and fellowes of Lyncoln College.

(fol. 338 a.) On another marble are the effigies of a man and a woman in winding sheets: out of his mouth is this written in a scroule:—

O blyssyd Trinitie upon oure soules have mercy:

and out of hers, this:-

That by Christ's passion saved they may be.

Underneath is this inscription:—

Off your charite pray for the soules of Thomas Wayte, wex-chaundler, sumtymes baylye of thys towne, and Agnes his wiffe, which Agnes decessed the xxvi day of Julye, the yere of owre Lord god MV°XXI and the said Thomas dyed the . . . day of . . . in the yere of owre lord god MV° . . . <sup>5</sup>

He died about the yeare 1528. Armes on this tombe are a chevron between 3 tapers burning without colours. Elizabeth, daughter of the said Thomas, was buried here also anno 1514; Thomas his son anno 1548. Nicholas Wayte buried here 25 Aug. 1565, and John Wayte, severall times mayor of Oxon. John Wayte gent. anno 1587 (son of J. Wayte); Grace, his wife, 10 March 1585.

On another the picture of a man in a gowne with a bedell's staff in his hand, and his wife 1 by him, with this epitaph:—

Hoc quicunque legis presens epigramma resiste, Et defunctorum nomine funde precem. Hic etiam <sup>3</sup> facilis, lepidus, jucundus, honestus, Insigni morum quam <sup>3</sup> probitate fuit Illa erat haud dubie quam <sup>6</sup> forma, facundia, virtus Ornatam mundo reddidit atque deo.

This epitaph was made on John Page somtimes inferiour bedell of Law who dying in the month of January 1521 was here buried by his wife.

On a white marble is this:-

Hic jacet corpus exanimatum Ferrerii Rugeley filii natu maximi Ferrerii Rugeley generosi, necnon Mariae matris e ejus, Burtoniae super Trent in agro Staffordiensi; qui mortem obiit 4 die Junii decimo nono aetatis suae anno, annoque dom. 1661; alumni Lincolniensis Collegii hac Academiâ.

At the upper end of the chancell did hang not long since the headpiece, sword, banner, &c. of Sir Henry Reeves, knight, who dying in this parish was buried here 8 Nov. 1642. His armes that hung there were 'sable, a chevron between 3 fleur de lize or.'

Against the north wall is this written on a woodden table painted:-

The names of those who have been worthy benefactors to this church:-

Mr. Henry Southam, alderman, gave 40/i.

Mr. John Newton (of Bras. Coll.) gave 10/i.

Mris. Jane Jackson widdow, late of this parish, gave to this parish 5/i.

Mr. Michael Page gave 5li.

Mris. Jane Southam gave 81i.

Mr. Richard Gardner of this parish a phisitian gave for a catechisme lecture 2001i. Susanna baroness Grey of Ruthen gave to this parish one silver flagon.

Armes are 'parted per pale indented azure and gules, a lyon rampant or '; the crest 'a lyon's paw erased or.'

On a marble stone laying on the ground 5 is this defaced inscription on the verge:—

Hic jacent . . . . quondam hujus ville marcator, et Alicia ejus uxor; qui quidem Johannes obiit mortem xxii 6 die Decemb. an. dom. MCCCCXVII et dicta Alicia diem suum clausit extremum anno . . .

On another 7 this 8:-

Hic jacet Agnes Tanfeld<sup>9</sup> quae obiit xxii mensis Junii an. dom. millesimo CCCCXLII: cujus anime propitietur deus amen.

Note that Thomas and John Tanfeld were successively townclerks of Oxon in the raignes of Henry VI and Edward IV, so that I suppose the said Agnes was either sister or wife to one of them.

Towards the lower end of the body is this on a white, fastned to a blew, marble:—

Here lyeth the body of Elizabeth Dennis, the late wife of Thomas Dennis, who departed this life the 12 of November, an. dom. 16372 in the 27 yeare of her age.

On a larg freestone monument (breast high), joyning to the north side of the steple, are these inscriptions on brass plates:—

Here lyeth the body of Henry Southam, alderman and twice mayor of this city, who departed this life the 10 of March an. 1659.

This is put downe false, for he dyed 16 March 1658 (i.e.  $\frac{8}{9}$ ). Armes are 'sable, 3 arrows with their points downward argent.'

Here lyeth the body of Margaret Southam, wife of Henry Southam, who departed this life the 9 Decemb. an. dom. 1626, act. 50°.

Here lyeth the body of Margaret Southam, second wife of Henry Southam alderman of this city, who departed this life the 3 of Novemb. in the yeare of our Lord 1652 4.

Neare adjacent lyeth the body of Jane Southam, the third wife and widdow of the said Henry Southam, who departed this life 28 of Decemb. an. d. 1664.

At the foot of the former monument is a table of black marble <sup>6</sup>, supported with pillars of the same; and on that table lyeth the proportion of a man carved in stone <sup>6</sup> and painted to the life. His body is adorned with armour, and over it is an alderman's gowne. He hath a sword by his side, on the hilt of which are his armes, viz. 'argent, on a bend sable, 3 escallops of the first'; and on one of the pillars that support the table is this engraven:—

In hope of the resurrection here lyes the body of Mr. William Levins, alderman and are times mayor of the citie. Obiit Aprill 12, 1616, actatis 100.

On the other pillar is this:-

With whome lyes interred his beloved wife, Ursula, by whome he had 5 sonns and 6 daughters. Obiit 1573, actat. 43.

On the side of the said marble table is this:-

What others singly wish, age, wisdome, wealth, Children to propagate their name and blood, Cheife place in citie oft, unphysickt health, And (that which seasons all) the name of good, In Levins were all mixt, yet all are gon; Only the good name lasts, that look upon.

The said William Levinz, who was second son of William Levinz of Croke in the parish of Kendall in Westmoreland, and he the second son of Laurence Levinz of Levinz hall in the said countie, married Ursula, daughter of Richard Whittington of Oxford, alderman, by whome he had issue:—I, Humphrey Levinz, who setled himself at Eumeley or Emeley neare Bra(ckley) in Northamptonshire (grandfather to Sir Creswell Levinz, attorney general to King Charles II, and Dr. William Levinz, president of S. John's College, &c.); 2, William, who was buried in this church 8 Oct. 1567; 3, Marie, buried here 17 May 1570; 4, Richard, buried 23 June in the yeare following; 5, (fol. 339b) Martha, who was married to Henry Nicolls of Southam in com, Warwic.: 6. Ellena, the wife of Mathew Harrison, citizen and afterward mayor of Oxon; 7, Eulalia, the wife of Georg Roy, Master of Arts; and, 8, Anne. There were also other sons, as Henry and William; from which last, those of Botley neare Oxford are (as I conceive) descended.

This monument of alderman Levinz was first built between the two upper pillars of the body of the church, neare the place where the pulpit now stands; but when the church was repaired and new seats set up therin (which was an. 1636), then was the said monument removed to the place where it now stands.

In the ISLE JOYNING ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF THE CHANCELL, now called the parish chancell, but formerly 1...

Against the north wall on a black marble table is this:-

Hie jacet Joan. Albert Schack de Wittenau, eques, orator, philosophus, quippe in palaestra tam fortis quam in lycaeo subtilis, et in conversando tam amabilis quam in loquendo disertus, utrobique tam modestus ut sequius duceret nescire quae omnes sciunt quam scire quae omnes nesciunt! ortum in Prussia habuit, occasum oXon. In angLia Ipso sanCtorVM DIe.

This High-German coming to Oxford purposely to live there and make use of the Vatican (as many Germans do to this day) fell sick at his arrivall, in the Miter inne, where dying soon after (on the first

of November 1669) was with great lamentation buried here and accompanied to his grave by his countrimen.

On the south wall is this 1, painted on canvass, within a frame:—

Here lyeth the body of Mr. Jeames Young, esquire, and gentleman of the privie chamber to his majestie, whose wife Mris Mary Young hath given 5 pounds per annum to this parish for ever, that his body might be kept from violation. He departed this life 16 June 1644.

Underneath it, lying on the ground, is a marble and this written on it:---

James Yong: buried 16 June 1644.

On a marble 2 fastned to the said south wall at the upper end is the effigies of a man kneeling in armour, engraven on a brass plate, with two sons kneeling behind him, and out of his mouth goes a scroule, wherin is this engraven:---

O swete Jesu, take me to thy mercy.

Opposite to him is a woman with two daughters behind her kneeling, and out of her mouth comes this:-

O blessed Trynitie, have mercy on us 3.

Underneath all is this inscription:—

Under this tombe lyeth William Freurs and Agnes his wiff, they being thus covered by Edward Freurs theyr sone, who did this worke neither for any vaine glory, but to have their sowles even yn perpetuall memory that every man or woman that this doth reed over, wyll pray to Jesu for to take their sowles to the eternall glory. Amen.

Under the said marble is an altar-monument of the same and upon the verge thereof is this written (fol. 840 a):—

William Freurs, justyce of peas of the cytye of Oxford and for the shyre, and eight times mayor of the same cytye, and departed to almighty god xvi day of July an. dom. MDXLVI.

Armes on it engraven in brass, and somtimes coloured (but woren out), were these:—'or, an eare of barley between 2 humets gules in pale, two flaunches of the second each charged with an eare of barley of the first,' granted to the said William, or at least to his son Edward, meerly upon the account (as I am perswaded) that both of them (as also the father of William) drove the trade of brewing and malting.

The said William, by his wife Agnes Reve of Staunton S. John neare Oxon (buried here also 1558 or therabouts, tempore Mariae reginae), had issue Henry (who died without issue); Edward (who married and had issue, as I shall anon tell you); Frideswyde (the wife of William Jennet of Talton 1, gent.); Anne; and Elizabeth.

On a flat marble laying somtimes neare to the said monument, but afterwards removed to another place, is this inscription under the pictures of a man and woman, all engraven on brass plates:—

Here lyeth buried the bodies of Edwarde Freere esquire and Anne his wife, by whome he had yssue William, John, and Henrye, Anne and Elizabeth: which Edward decessed the xiii of January, in the yere of oure lord god MCCCCCLXV<sup>3</sup>: whose soules wee commend to god.

Armes ' are those of Freere before-mentioned, impaling 'on a fess 3 bustards, between as many roundells, within a bordure ingrailed,' without colours. The said Edward Freere, by Anne his wife (buried here anno 1544) daughter of John Bustard of Adderbury in this countie esquire, had issue (besides the sons, William, John and Henry before mentioned) Anne, who married Henry Baylie Doctor of Physick, and afterwards Richard Culpeper of Greys Inne, which Anne was buried here 21 June, 1568; and Elizabeth, the wife of John Lovelace of Henley in this countie, gent.

A little below the monument of William Freurs is built against the south wall an altar monument of freestone, over which is a canopie supported with pillars of the same, and under it this epitaph 5:—

Pawse (gentle frinde) that passest bye and gaze upon this tombe, Soe maist thou learne both what I am and whence my race is come. But what I am, I doe account a bootless tale to tell For flesh to earth (in time <sup>6</sup>) returnes, as thou dost know full well. But what I am <sup>7</sup> to let the wyte, shall be my chefest care, A Bamfyld borne I was, and eake a Bamfylds name I bare, Half heire unto my fathers landes, but when I woke <sup>6</sup> a wife I matcht with Freere, with whome I led a well contented liffe. Ten tender babes on me he gate, the pawnes of mariage bed; I wysh my fryndes to fare no worse, then was my hape to wed.

And what I am thou plainly see'st, wherto returne thou must.
Noe birthe can barre, no stocke can staye, no gentle line can lette But all that live must dye the death; this law our god hath sett.
The good wee doe shall never dye; but all the rest beside,
Be well assured, the gaping grave and hollow vawte shall hide.
Then leede the lift that vertew learnes, lett fickle fortune gooe,
Thryse happy he that lyveth well, and blest that dyeth sooe.

Armes on it are those of Freere before mentioned: quartering, 1, on a chevron between 3 garters buckled and nowed, a mullet for a difference; 2, on a fess between 3 owles as many cross croslets' (Pimme); and 3, three bells' (Porter)—all without colours. There are also the same quarterings, impaling quarterlie, on a bend 3 estoyles, in sinister canton a cressant' (Bamfield).

The person for whome this monument was erected was Mary, the wife of William (son of Edward) Freere, and one of the daughters and heires of William Bampfeild of Turnworth (fol. 840 b) in Dorsetshire gent. by Elizabeth his wife, daughter of William Lovell of the same countie,—which Mary was buried here 14 July 1573, leaving issue by her husband William Freere (buried here 8 Febr. 1611) two sons, viz. Edward and Bamfeild, and four daughters, namelie Anne, Fraunces, Elizabeth and Mary, the second of which was married to Thomas Brace gent. anno 1588 and Elizabeth (the third) was married to one Toyer.

Here also if I am not mistaken was buried Edward Freere beforementioned (son of William, son of Edward) made a baronet anno 1620, whose atchivement and banners were lately hanging up over the graves of the Freers. He was the same that sold the rich mannor of Water-Eaton neare Oxon to the Lovelaces of Hurley in Berkshire, and the same that married Mary, daughter of John Stafford of Blatherwyke, in Northamptonshire.

Among the graves of these Freers also resteth the body of Henry Baylie before-mentioned, borne at Bradford in Wiltshire, afterwards

fellow of New College, proctor of the Universitie, and the most noted physitian of his time in the Universitie; buried 12 Dec. 1566. He had two wives. The first (whose name I know not) was buried here anno 1556, but what issue he had by her I know not. The second was Anne Freere before mentioned, by whome he had issue Henrie Baylie who dying in the 21 yeare of his age or therabouts was buried by his father 12 Oct. 1586. He had also two daughters, viz. Frideswyde and Elizabeth, the first of which was married to one Edmonds of Stanton S. John, gent., by whome she had issue Ambrose, Elizabeth, and Mary.

On the said south wall at the lower end did hang a table, with this coat of armes 1 on it, 'or, a bend and in base dexter a cross crosslet gules,' and underneath this written 2:—

Here under lyeth enterred the body of Henry Myriell, Bachelour of Divinity, who in the 33 years of his age departed this mortall life the 22 of Aprill and dom. 1643.

At the upper end of this isle is this sengraven on a marble lying on the ground:—

Hic jacet Gulielmus Smith, civis London., qui anno aetatis suae ineunte 33, 18 Apr., expiravit, et hic sepultus est, anno domini 1637.

Upon a flat marble lying in the middle of this isle are the pictures of a man in a gowne between his two wives, engraven on brass, with this inscription under:—

Here lyeth the body of Richard Good, gent., chandler, alderman of this citie and twyse mayor of the same. He had two wives Mary and Frideswide; by the former he had foure sonnes and 4 daughters. He dyed in a good tyme, full of dayes and prayse the 12 of Aug. 1609.

Vota dedisse deo, miseris alimenta dedisse Si bona res, Goodum praebuit esse bonum. Quis neget in coelis igitur requiescere Goodum? Nam Christi vox est sacra 'venite boni.'

Mary his first wife was buried here 28 Sept. 1593. Richard his son, alderman of the citie, buried here also 5 Dec. 1639. William Good, alderman, brother to Richard the son was also buried here.

(fol. 341 a.) In the isle joyning to the body of the church on the south side, somtimes called Our Ladye's chappell.

On a marble lying on the ground, are the pictures of a man and his wife engraven on brasse plates, with this inscription bunder them:—

John de Bereford et Agnes 1 sa premier feme gycent icy, dieu de lour almes eit mercy : qui pour l'alme de dit John priera vi° xx jours de pardoun aura.

In English thus:-

John de Bereford and Agnes his first wife lye here, God on their soules have mercy: Hee that shall pray for the soule of the said John, shall have 620 days of pardon.

You may see by this what care was taken for the saving of the soul of the said John de Bereford, alderman, the prime promoter of, and captaine in, the great conflict, and therfore the occasion that so many lives were unjustly taken away therein, as you may see more at large in the first book <sup>2</sup> under the yeares 1354 and 1355, &c. His second wife was Agnes also, the daughter of John le Peyntour, of Oxon, living 4 Rich. II (1380); but whether shee was buried here I know not.

Over the south dore did somtimes hang this escocheon, viz. 'argent, 10 escallops, 4, 3, 2, and 1, sable, a file of three labells azure, over all a canton gules charged with a mullet or': hung up for ... ... who was buried here in the time of the grand rebellion.

Neare to the place where the former did hang is a wooden table fastned to the wall, having theron these arms depicted: 'argent, a chevron between 3 more '-cocks sable, a file of three labells gules' set up for James Moore, commoner of Lincolne College (son of William Moore of How in Yorkshire, gent.) buried here 18 Oct. 1672, aged 17. (Explicit <sup>5</sup> fol. 341a.)

Walter Bate, preist (M.A.) and commoner of Lyncolne College, somtimes principall of that Whitehall where Jesus College now stands, who died 16 Nov. anno 1478, was buried here, but the brass with inscription on his grave hath been long since gone. He gave a house and garden to Lyncolne College, joyning therunto, for which and other benefaction, the fellowes of that Societie kept his obit or anniversary here on 16 of Nov.

# (fol. 842 b.) In the body of the church.

At the upper end on the south wall is a monument of marble and alabaster, and theron this inscription:-

In hope of a happy resurrection, here lyes the bodie of Mr. James Deane, who departed this life Dec. 14 in the yeare 1677 being aged 89 yeares. As also the body of Mris. Dorothy Deane his wife, formerlie the relict of Mr. Jervais Jones, who departed this life Dec. 6 in the yeare 1661 being aged 88 yeares.

# In the isle joyning on the north side of the chancell, SOMTIMES CALLED NOW THE PARISH CHANCELL.

Against the north wall is an alabaster monument fastned, containing the proportion of a man kneeling in a gowne before a deske or table; over whose head is this inscription:-

In obitum doctissimi religiosissimique juvenis Thomae Crooke, Cornubiensis, alii unici Caroli Crooke generosi, et Collegii Exoniensis commensalis.

Under all is this inscription:—


In the middle of the brass plate is engraven the picture of a table between a man in an alderman's gowne and a woman kneeling, and betwixt them this coat of armes:—'azure, a fess between two fleure de lize or.' The creast is 'a hound sable sitting on a mount vert, collared or, to which hangs a string turn'd over his back, or also,' (slip attached to fol. 343 b) which coat and creast was granted to Ralph Flexney of Oxon gent., by Robert Cook alias Clarenceaux anno 1592, but how that Ralph is kin to the aforesaid Ralph I know not, perhaps his son by his first wife. I find that one Ralph Flexney of this parish was married to Alice Wyckham 27 Sept. 1569. I find also one Ralph Flexney of St. Aldate's parish, butcher, to have been mayor of Oxon 1612 and to be buried in the church there 12 July 1624. His two

wives mentioned in S. Aldate's parish (the first wife he married 1579). The said Ralph Flexney mentioned in the monument gave a scarlet cloak to the city, Twyne IV 316; Thomas, his son, was Bac. of Civil law and registrar of the bishop's office, lived in S. Giles' parish, buried there 1623, whose g(rand) d(aughter) and heir, living by Newbury, was married to . . . . . . gent. (see in notes from Horsman's office 1 p. 20, 22; and notes from the registers of S. Michael's. S. Martin's, S. Aldate's).

At the upper end of the north isle of the church, an escocheon did hang up, viz. 'or, on a bend gules three mil-rinds argent, in canton sinister a crescent sable.'

(fol. 343 b.) In the ISLE JOYNING ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF THE BODY OF THE CHURCH, antiently called . . ., now Jesus College isle.

On the south wall (at the upper end) is a verie faire monument made up of marble and alabaster, containing the proportion of a woman to the middle, holding in her hand a booke: under her is this inscription:—

Virtuti ac memoriae pientissimae foeminae Annae Lloyd, uxoris Griffithi Lloyd peritissimi Legum Doctoris et Coll. In Mr. Hutton's copie 2 I find this following to follow:—

But veiwing the said monument againe, I find no such thing there, therfore this must be put out.

At the bottom of it is this:—

A man and woman with inscription on brass, all defaced.

In the north isle joyning to that alley,

are without doubt severall stones under the seats, for 'tis full of seats.

IN THE CHANCELL.

On a marble table fixt to the wall, in the south east corner, is this inscription for the wife of John West the younger:—

Here adjacent waiteth for a joyfull resurrection the body of Katherine, late wife unto John West of Hampton-poyle in this countie, gent.; daughter and heir unto Richard Seaman late of Paynswick in the county of Gloucester, gent., and Katherine his wife; and grand-daughter unto Martin Wright, late alderman of this citie. Shee departed this life the first day of January an. dom. 1667, aged neare 21 years.

Armes are 'ermine, a bend indented sable': impaling, 'gules, 3 leopards' heads couped argent, langued sable.'

On an old marble lying on the ground at the high altar is this inscription in Saxon letters round the verge:—

Hic jacet magister . . . de Conyngesbye quondam rector istius ecclesie, cujus anime propitietur deus, amen.

Under another stone defaced was buried Thomas Taylor, rector of this church, obiit ... Oct. 1557.

Here in this chancell are the graves of the Wrights, citizens of Oxon, and of their wives and children, viz. of William Wright, goldsmith, somtimes mayor and alderman of this citie, who died the 26 Feb. anno 1635; of Joane Winter his wife, buried here anno dom.<sup>4</sup>... Here is

on a slip attached to fol. 344a Wood notes:—' Joane Wright died about 1616.'

also an epitaph engraven upon a marble stone for Martin their son (a goldsmith also; he was buried in or by the grave of Katherine Mydhop his somtimes wife who died the first of August 1643), running thus:—

Here enterred resteth the body of that worthy citizen Martin Wright alderman and twice mayor of this citie of Oxford. He departed this life May 14 an. dom. 1664 being of the age of 70 yeares.

Katherine 1 Medhop, wife of the said Martin Wright (was) buried here 3 August 1643; Henry, son of Martin, 8 Nov. 1633. Jane, the second wife of Georg Low of Calne in Wilts, gent., daughter of the said Martin, was buried here also: she died 4 Sept. 1655, leaving issue behind her Wright Low, but he died unmarried. Mary, another daughter, who died unmarried 3 Oct. 1671; shee hath an inscription on her grave. Katherine, another, widdow of Richard Seaman (mentioned before in the epitaph of her daughter 2), who died 28 April 1680. Anne, another, who died unmarried 16 of Febr. 1654(1); she hath an inscription over her grave.

Jane daughter of Martin Wryght, bapt. April 21, 1623; Elizabeth, another, March 12, 1624(4).

Here also was buried Christian, the first wife of William Wright (alderman, son of Martin Wright before mentioned), daughter of John Smith of St. Aldate's, gent., 26 June 1656.

Here must follow the epitaph of Richard Croke, son of the recorder, see in the foul epitaphs 3. William 4 Morrell, mayor of Oxon 1678, died 24 August 1679.

Alderman <sup>6</sup> William Wright married to his first wife... daughter of John Smith, alderman of Oxford, by whome he had one daughter named... married to Charles Harris. His second wife was daughter of Banks of... <sup>6</sup>, widdow of Dew of Islip, by whome he had other children.

He was buried neare his father and grandfather in S. Martin's chancell—see afterwards in May 1686 <sup>1</sup>.

# (fol. 344 b.) In the body of the Church.

Among severall monuments that are defaced, and their brass most sacrilegiously stolen away, must be remembred that which is partly lost of that somtimes noted citizen Richard Whittingdon, alderman, who dying the 13 of May 1578 was here buried two dayes after by his son-in-law Thomas Tatham. His armes that were taken away were 'a fess between three annulets' without colours; and the rebus of his name, which is to this day in an house where he formerly lived (inhabited now by a fishmonger) neare Quatervois, is a fish called a whiting on a tun. Ellenor his widdow was buried here 30 Apr. 1587. Thomas Tatham beforementioned M.A. of Lync. Coll. (brother to John Tatham afterwards rector of that hous) who married Ursula daughter of the said Richard Whittingdon was buried here also in the beginning of the yeare 1557 (3 and 4 of Philip and Mary). Here also was buried, if I mistake not, the said Ursula, but when I cannot tell: 'twas before 1587. Also Elizabeth\*, daughter of the said Thomas Tatham, wife of William Marten, 16 Aug. 1634. The said William Marten <sup>8</sup> also, esquire, somtimes Master of Arts of this University, younger brother to Sir Henry Marten, knight, judge of Prerogative Court, 11 Sept. 1631; Whittingdon Martin, his infant son, 7 Aug. 1587; with others of that name.

# (fol. 845 a.) North isle joyning to the chancell.

On a marble monument in the north wall (under the upper window on the north side) are engraven on brass plates a man kneeling, with four sons behind him; from whose mouth on a scroule are these words issuing:—

Sancta Trinitas, unus deus, miserere nobis.

the reference is to his Almanac with diary: Wood's Life and Times, iii. 185.

Matthew Hutton, MS. Rawl. B 397, p. 7, gives the authority for this:—
On a brasse on a gravestone in the middle ally:—

Hoc monumentum pietatis ergo posuit Elisabetha, (neptis) Richardi et Elianorae, filia Ursulae praedictae, uxor Willelmi Marten mariti charissimi, infantis Whittington Marten (mater) (qui) una cum primaevo suo Ricardo jacet conditus sub hoc tumulo: 1589.

Over it were the pictures of severall with their names:—

Richard. Whittington Elianora. Whittington.

Anne, Audrey. Marten Alice. Ursula.

Wood has a note in pencil, which probably refers to William Marten:—

'He was officiall to the archdeacon of Berks.'

Opposit to him is the picture of his wife, with one daughter behind her, kneeling, and this on a scroule from her mouth:—

# A morte secunda salvet me Trinitas Sancta.

Above the said pictures is that of God with a crowne on his head and our Saviour crucifyed in his armes. On one side of the monument 1 is 'quarterlie gules and argent, in the first a lyon passant or,' painted on a brass plate, for Bowdyn. On the other side is 'azure, 6 keys in saltire or, on a cheife gules three dolphins naiant imbowed argent,' which are the armes of the corporation of fishmongers. At the bottome on one side are 'two keyes in saltire' and on the other side 'two arrowes in saltire.' The inscription to shew for whome this monument was erected (engraven on a brass plate also) having been long since taken away, yet I have found out from an obscure note 2 that it was for Raffe de Bowdyn and Alyce hys wyffe, but when they died it does not appeare there, or as yet elswhere. [Ralph 8 de Bowden was bayliff of Oxford, 1506 or 1507; vide Brian Twyne in Catalogo 4 Maiorum]. The said Ralphe was by trade a fishmonger and owner of that tenement called the Red Lyon, opposit to the Gild-hall, in the windowes of which I have formerlie seen the same armes before mentioned antiently depicted, but whether they are there still I know not. They rented also of Merton College Bats Inne, called afterwards the Fleur de luce, joyning to the Red Lyon, 1505 and after, I thinke.

In the window over this monument are the armes of Bowdyn before mentioned, with the pictures of him, his wife, the four sons and one daughter, all painted to the life, kneeling, with the same inscriptions before mentioned comming out of his and her mouth; but these, since my first survey of the monuments and armes in this church, have been broken and quite taken away.

The said monument and window were, as I conceive, set up by William Seman, owner of the Red Lyon, who married Maryon, daughter (I suppose) of the said Ralph Bowdyn, which William and Maryon were here buried in the beginning of Henry VIII, leaving behind them a son named John, who married Elizabeth, daughter of John Ingram by Alice his wife, which John Seman dying in Sept. (or therabouts) anno 1529 (21 Henry VIII) was buried before St. Nicholas his altar in All Saints church. In the aforesaid window I remember I have seen and noted an old imperfect inscription under the pictures

Wood notes in the margin:—'vide Sheldrake, p. 42.'

of Bowdyn, his wife, and children 1, containing 2 the names 3 of John Seman et uxores Maryon et Jone 4.

# (fol. 845 b.) South isle joyning to the chancell.

Between the chancell and this isle is an high monument built of Burford stone, the foot of which joyneth to the wall that parts the altar from the upper end of this isle. About the top of it is an imbossed or convext inscription in an old English character running thus:—

# Dhe miserere, Dhe miserere.

On the south side of it within an arch curiouslie carved, is the picture of a man in a gowne, with four sons behind him kneeling, all engraven on a brass plate; out of whose mouth on a scroule is this sculped:—

Sancta Trinitas, unus deus, miserere nobis.


Opposit to him is his wife, with six daughters behind her, kneeling, and this inscription comming out of her mouth:—

## Sancta virgo virginum, ora pro nobis.

Behind him are these armes engraven on brass also, viz. 'argent, a saltire azure between 4 birds (woodpeckers) proper'; and behind her 'argent, on a fess azure between three men's hearts gules as many escallops or.' Under all was an inscription on a brass plate, which

- on a slip Wood says: 'or querie whether the pictures of John Seman, (his sons), and Maryon and Jone his wives.' Hutton describes the window as having 'a man and woman praying, behind them four children, with a scrole at his mouth Sancta Trinitas, unus deus, miserere nobis.'

that in the window was written under the pictures of Bowdyn, his wife, and children... Johannes Seman et uxores Maryon et Jone. Note that one John Seman was mayor 1476, 1486; occurs alderman 1490; so that I suppose this cannot be John Seman who died 1529, but rather his father's brother. So that the said John may have two wives Maryon and Joane. John Seman, son of William, was ballive 1502; see Brian Twyne Catalogus Ballivorum (i.e. Wood MS. F 26), and his wife was neither Maryon or Joane.



Ralph de Bowden was ballive of Oxon 1507: vide B. Twyne.

having been long since sacrilegiously taken away, and no memory left among posterity to show to whome it once did belong, yet through my curious researches 1 I find that the contents showed that wee were to

Pray for the soule of Edward Wodeward somtimes alderman and severall times mayor of this towne, as also for the soule of Maud his wife: which Edward died xx Octob, anno mcccclxxxxvi etc. (1496).

The said Edward Wodeward was the owner of the inn called the King's Head in this parish (in the windowes of which were not long since the armes of him and his wife, before mentioned); and having severall daughters (besides sons), the yongest of them named Margaret was married to one William Cogan, son of William Cogan, somtimes mayor of Bristow, by his wife the daughter of . . . Vaughan of Wales. Which William and Margaret succeeding Edward Wodeward in the said inne, kept it to the time of their death. But the said William Cogan dying before her, shee took to her second husband Edmund Irysh, alderman of this citie, who, having no issue by her, left her a widdow also. The said Margaret was buried here, by her father's grave, and neare to those of William Cogan her first husband, Agnes Flexney her daughter, and Joane another daughter, in Nov. Shee had issue, by her first husband, Thomas Cogan, her son and heir; and Agnes beforementioned (who was married to Ralph Flexney, afterwards alderman and severall times mayor of this citie); with others.

Thomas Cogan beforementioned, who married Alyce, the daughter of Richard Carye of Wycombe in Bucks, gent., was buried here also 30 March 1588; and Alyce his wife, 14 Oct. 1585.

Edmund Cogan, son of the said Thomas, buried here 5 Aug. 1598; with others following, even to the yeare 1643 (i.e. ?), at what time Thomas Cogan (son of Edmund) was buried here, March 8. Which Thomas, a little before, put up this inscription at the top of the west end of Edward Wodeward's monument:-

Thomas Cogan repaired this monument An. Dom. 1642 to the memory of his ancestors.

Over which, engraven in stone, he put his armes, viz. 'gules', 3 bay or laurell leaves argent.'

But that Thomas having a son 1 named Edmund 2 who was a gold-smith 3 in the parish of S. Clement Danes in the suburbs of London [sold 4 the said inne and] had by (his) wife..., the daughter of ..., one onlie daughter.

From the said Edward Wodeward was descended one Lionell Wodeward of Abendon in Berks (for to his son Lionell the said Edward bequeathed in his will  $xx^{li}$  in money and all his civill and canon law books), who having a son named Thomas that lived at Filkins alias Filknes neare Bampton in com. Oxon. in the beginning of Queen Elizabeth (and) tooke to wife Dorothy, daughter of Thomas Hill of Bampton, by whome he had issue Francis, Thomas, Anne—living unmarried anno 1574.

(fol. 346 a.) On the south wall opposite to Wodeward's monument is another, of marble, wheron was the proportion of a man in armour kneeling before a table (having a book lying theron) and out of his mouth is this issuing in a scroule:—

# In te, Dîte, speravi.

Above it is the picture of God, as before on Bowdyn's monument. The inscription under it which was engraven on a brass plate, having been time out of mind theeved away, I was forced to consult my obscure oracle 6, who in his notes written anno 1574, I find that the effect of it ran thus, viz. that wee were to

Pray for the soule of Willyam Bulcombe esquyre somtimes mayor of the towne of Oxenford, who married Maude the relict of Edward Wodeward, alderman of the same place; which William died the 4 of October an. 1518, being the 10 years of Henry VIII,

etc. . Armes on it have been these: 'a paire of wings expansed, debruised with a fess,' without colours'.

In the north isle joyning to the body of the church is this on a marble table fastned to the wall at the upper end:—

Armes are 'semee de cross croslets fitchee 3 escallops.'

This being put up by a yong poet Charles Davenant, lately gentleman commoner of Balliol Coll., eldest son to Sir William, without any time added, I shall therfore tell you that John the father was buried here 23 April 1622; Jane the mother, 5 of the said month and in the same yeare; John the brother . . . . . (non occurrit in registro), William the eldest son, 12 Dec. 1651; Thomas Hallum, vintner, the brother in law, 1 Oct. 1636; Jane Hallum, the sister, widdow of Thomas Hallum, 27 September 1667; Elizabeth Swift, granddaughter (viz. daughter of Thomas Swift, clerke, somtimes fellow of Balliol College, by Mary, daughter of Sir William Davenant) about 1670; and Elizabeth Bristow, sister, 11 May 1672, which Elizabeth was first married to Gabriel Bridges, somtimes fellow of C. C. Coll. afterwards rector of Letcombe Basset in Berks, and then to Richard Bristow, B.D. rector of Dudcote or Dedicote neare Wallingford in the same countie 1 (explicit 2 fol. 346 a).

### S. MARTIN'S CHURCH.

In hopes of a joyfull resurrection here lyes interr'd the body of William Bayly, alderman, and twice mayor of this citie, who died in the 64<sup>th</sup> yeare of his age, July the 18, anno dom. 1683.

Quaere whether this be in Carfax church.

# (fol. 347 b.) S. Peter's in the East.

#### In the chancell.

Here is neither monument nor inscription; for, there being a vault underneath, the ground is never opened to receive any dead body.

## In the BODY OF THE CHURCH.

At the upper end, on the south wall, is this following, on a marble table:—

Armes on this monument are—'argent, on a pale azure three paire of wings levant of the first, a martlet for a difference or' (Potter), impaling 'or, a chevron between 3 falcons gules, within a bordure azure charged with bezants' (White).

On the said south wall is this inscription on a black marble table:—

Hic jacet (nisi quod ejus supra est) Gulielmus Day, Ricardi Day de Abbots-Langley in comitatu Hartford, generosi, filius: vir bacchante populo, sobriae pietatis; grassante perfidia, subditus fidelis: antiquorum morum cultor severus, in facultate chirurgica quam apud exteros adornaverat arte, cura, et summa in pauperes humanitate, plurimos annos Oxonli celeberrimus, qui hydrope extinctus diem clausit Septembris xxix salutem expectans sibi partam abinde annis MDCLXV anno et actatis suae lxi.

Tantum ut scires, lector, Nicolaus Stratford, S.T.D., consanguineus et ex asse haeres, moerens et memor posuit.

(Arms:—) 'parted per chevron or and azure, three mullets counterchanged.'

This William Day built the larg inne called the Angell in the parish of S. Peter in the East, anno 1662. His widdow, named Anne, died 24 July anno 1667 and was buried by him: without issue.

(fol. 848 a.) On another little table, against the same wall, below the south dore, is this:—

In memorie of Mr. Richard Holland, mathematician and teacher of that art, who died May the first anno Dom. 1677, aged 81.

He was a most usefull person in his generation and taught yong scholars and others in this University geography and mathematicks for the space of neare 50 yeares. He hath written and published (1) Notes how to get the angle of the parallax of a comet. Oxon. 1668 in octavo. (2) Globe notes. Oxon. 1678, in octavo: printed thus the second time—with other things, as I conceive.

Armes on the said monument are 'semie de lize, a lyon rampant': without colours.

At the west end of the body of the church, on the south side of the west dore, is this following on a brass plate fastned to the wall:—

The rest is woren away by time. Yet over it are still remaining the free-mason's armes, viz. 'sable, on a chevron argent a paire of compasses expansed of the first, between 3 castles of the second.' This person also built Merton College great quadrangle.

(fol. 348 b.) Monumentall inscriptions on the ground of the body of the church.

On a marblestone are fastned brass plates, having engraven on them the portraictures of a man and a woman, and this inscription under them:—

Hic jacet Willelmus Robertson<sup>1</sup>, quondam pincerna Collegii Reginae Oxon, et Johanna uxor ejus: qui obiit xx die mensis Junii anno Domini millesimo CCCCLXXVIII: cujus animae propitietur deus. Amen.

Neare to it is a broken marble stone, with this inscription, on a brass plate, without any name:—

On a marble stone laying neare to the former:

(Arms:—) 'a spread eagle with two heads, within a bordure charged with roundells,' impaling 'quarterlie': without colours.

On a white free stone:---

H. S. I. Robertus Smith Art. Bac. ex aula B. Mariae Magdalenae, filius Johannis Smith de Neebley in agro Glocestrens., armigeri, qui denatus est Octob. 20, anno salutis 1672, aetatis suae 21.

(Arms:—) 'on a chevron engrailed 3 flour de lize, between 6 crosses patee fitchee': without colours.

(fol. 349 a.) On another white free stone:—

Hic jacet Radulphus Hyde, e celebri familia Norburiensi in com. Cestrensi oriundus, et nuper ecclesiarum de Billingaley et Sudbury in com. Salopiae rector. Obiit septuagenarius 25 Nov. 1661.

On a blew marble:-

(fol. 349 b.) On a white free stone:—

H. S. I. Henricus filius natu minor Henrici Turbervile, gen., de Mill-crome in comit. Vigorn., Aul. B. Mar. Magd. (heu parum diu) commensalis alumni dilectissimi. Egregius hic adolescens in ipso aetatis vere (malum tamen) ad sedes coeli amoeniores correptus est, amicorum et sodalium lachrymis merito decoratus. Obiit 17 Cal. Apr., aet. 18, anno salutis 1670.

In the ISLE, or chapple, called . . . . . , joyning to the chancell on the north side.

On the walls, and particularly on the west wall, is this:—

Memoriae maximae spei omnibusque virtutibus cumulatissimi juvenis, Godscalci ab Alefeld, nobilis Holsati, quem Ethices, Politices, Historiarum, et Jurisprudentiae, Latinae, exterarum aliquot linguarum foeliciter jactis fundamentis, in ipsissimo aetatis flore, ac medio studiorum et peregrinationis cursu, praematura (proh dolor) mors A.D. Aug. 7 an. CIDIOCXXXV, summo bonorum omnium cum luctu intercepit, cineres Angliae reliquit, animam vero beatissimae Angelorum patriae transcripait, positum.

The armes above it are 'an eagle's wing levant in pale,' impaling, 'barry of six argent and gules.' He was embalmed, double coffined, and not buried here till the 9 of October the same yeare. After which least his reliques should be violated, had a little stone laid theiron, and this written on it:—

Hic requiescit Godscalcus ab Halefeld, nob. Holsat., qui obiit 7 Aug. an. Dom. 1635.

On the east wall:—

Armes over it are 'or, four chevronells gules.' He was buried 24 Sept. 1618.

Under the aforesaid monument is another built of cours marble, brest high, having thereon the proportion of a man in his gowne, between his two wives, curiouslie engraven on brass plates. And at his feet are the proportions also of his five sons and 6 daughters engraven on the same mettall, with this inscription under them:—

Here lyeth the bodie of Richard Atkinson, late Alderman of Oxon, which hath borne the office of the mayraltie five times, and was both justice of the peace and quorum, and so departed out of this transytorie lyfe in the faith of Christ, the last of May in the yeare of our Lord God MCCCCLXXIIII, togeather with his late wife Agnes Atkinson.

The said Agnes was buried here on the 18 May anno 1569, and on the 3 Sept. the next yeare the said Richard married one Joane Barton.

On the east wall neare to the former is fastned a large brass plate wheron are engraven the proportions of a man and a woman kneeling, with this epitaph under them:—

Ricardus Ratcliffe, in medicina Doctor, obiit Jan. 18, an. 1599, sepultus est Jan. 21: actatis suac 54.

Quem probitas, virtus, pietas, doctrina, tueri Non poterat vivum, vel prohiberi mori Conjux chara viro monumentum triste superstes Defuncto statuit, constituitque sibi.

This monument is inclosed with a larg arched fabrick of free stone, having within it a long seat built of the same. And therin doth the Vicechancellour sit, till he, with the Doctors, are conveyed by the bedells to their respective seats to heare the Lent-sermons preached in this church every Sunday in the afternoone, during that time.

On the said east wall, under the arch parting this isle from the chancell, is this inscription on a black marble table:—

(fol. 350 b.) In the S.W. corner of the said isle is this inscription on a brass plate fastned to the wall:—

Hic jacent exuviae terrestres Johannis Stronge, generosi, senis octogenarii, Aulae Cervinae nuper commensalis et quondam ibidem opsonatoris, qui pie in domino obdormivit undecimo die Januarii anno Χριστογονίας 1625.

Gratia magna fuit, quod tot compleveris annos, Quodque tibi tarde contigit esse senem. Gratia sed major, quod tot concluseris annos Morte pia; foelix mors tibi grande lucrum. Exuto senio, jam coelos scande, ubi grata Sola juventa viget, nulla senecta premit.

Neare to the former, in the said corner, is this:—

To the memorie of that venerable and most religious matron Mris. Ursula Sandys, the relict of Emanuel Sandys of South-Petherton in the countie of Somerset, esq., who died the 7 of July an. 1671, aged 69, and lyes here interred in her second son Mr. Samuel Sandys his grave.

(Arms:—), 'or, fess dauncettee between 3 cross crosslets fitchee, gules,' impaling 'argent two chevronells azure between 3 martletts sable,' which last is boren by the name of Hunt—she being daughter of John Hunt of Speckington in Somersetshire, esq., and sister to Henry Hunt, somtimes fellow of Magd. Coll. and proctor of this Universitie.

Her son's epitaph, engraven on a white stone laying underneath the former monument, runs thus:—

Depositum Samuelis Sandys ex antiqua et generosa prosapia in agro Somerset. orti, quem inter medios amicorum amplexus, ardori, quo erga eos flagrabat, superveniens febris corripuit, eumque ex musarum hospite coelestem reddidit civem 7° idium Septemb. anno aerae Christianae 1663, aetatis suae 21. (Arms:—)' or, a bend ingrailed between two lyons rampant gules,' impaling 'paly of 6 argent and azure, on a chief gules a lyon passant or.' This last coat belonged to Elizabeth before mentioned, daughter of Dr. Stephen Lodington or Luddington, an archdeacon, somtimes living at Carlton-Scrop in com. Lyncoln.

Neare to the former was somtimes an inscription for one Robert Parret alias Perot. Bachelaur of Musick of this Universitie, son of Georg Perot of Haroldston neare Haverfordwest in Pembrokshire, gent., which Robert died 20 Apr. 1550. His first wife was Joane . . . . He married Alice Gardiner of the countie of Suffolke, and had by her issue, Simon of Magd. Coll., John, Clement, Mr. of Arts and fellow of C. C. College, and Leonard: also two daughters Elizabeth and Dorothy, who were both married and had issue. The said Alice died in the beginning of 1558, and was buried here by her husband. By her writing (Reg. Coll. Magd. E. fol. 73) dated 16 Feb. 1 and 2 of Philip and Mary, anno Dom. 1554, she gave an 100li. to Magdalen College to purchase land worth 5li. per annum, of which revenew part was to be given to an honest preist of the said College to pray for her soule, the soule of her husband Robert Parret, and for the soules of John Kele, Edmund Kele, Robert Gardiner and Alice his wife, etc., in the chappell (as I conceive) of the said College.

On a tombe of free stone built from the ground close to the north wall is a brass plate fastned and hath theron engraven the proportions of a man in a gowne, with his wife kneeling, hee having 9 sons behind him and shee 10 daughters behind her, in the same posture, with this inscription by them:—

Here resteth the bodies of Simon Parret, gentilman, Master of Arte, late fellow of Magdalen Colledge, and twice proctor of the Universitie of Oxforde, and Elizabeth his wife doughter of Edward Love of Aenowe in the countie (fol. 352 a) of Northampton, esquier, which Simon departed this worlde the xxiiii day of September in the yere of our Lord God MCCCCCLXXXIIII and in the yere of his age lxxi and Elizabeth departed in childbed the xxiiii day of December in the yere of owre Lord God MCCCCCLXXIII and in the yeare of her age xlii.

(Arms:—) 'gules, three pears pendant, with a mullet for a difference, or, on a cheif argent a demy-lyon rampant sable,' impaling 'vert, a lyon rampant or, with a cressant on his shoulder gules.'

On a marble monument fixed to the north wall is this epitaph, made by Dr. Langbane of Queen's College:—

Neare to the former are 3 white marbles of a diamond square, under which lay three children of Dr. Henry Wilkinson, somtimes Principall of Magdalen Hall. The first is for Elizabeth (by his first wife Elizabeth Gifford), who died 16 March 1653. The second for Mary (by Anne, his 2nd wife), who died 13 May 1662, aged three yeares and two months. And the third for James (by the said Anne), who died 18 Nov. 1660. On the first are the armes of Wilkinson, impalyng 'three lozenges ermine in fess' (Gifford of Halsbury in Devon), and on the other two are the armes of Wilkinson also, impaling 'two mullets on a cheife' quartering 'barry of six and a bend over,' all without colours.

Upon another little marble:-

## BURIED IN S. PETER EAST.

Joane, wife of Edward Napier, somtimes the widdow of William Clare the elder of Halywell neare Oxon, buried here 1545.

Edward Napier of Halywell, gent., a yonger son of James Napier of Sweire in com. Dorset, and he the 2d son of Sir Alex. Napier, knight, the son of Archb. Napier the son of Sir John Napier alias Lenox of Markeston and Rosky in Scotland, which Edward Napier was buried here under the upper window 1558, ult. reg. Mariae. After his 1 wife was dead, he married, and she—vide Huckle inter Collect. Coll. Mert. and in Cat. Stewards (?). See Allsouls benefactors. (See Wood's Life and Times, i. 192.)

Here must come in the arms and inscriptions in the windowes of this ile, as in the former ile. Vide Lee's book and my notes. Then Knap's epitaph.

On a white stone:-

Here lyeth interred in hopes of a resurrection to glory the body of Henry Knapp, M. of A. and only son of Henry Knapp of Rawlin in the parish of S. S. in this county, esq., and of Hester his wife, daughter of Sir Edward Clark of Ardington in the countie of Berks, knight, which said Henry departed this life the 18 day of Jan. and in the 23 yeare of his age Anno Dom. 1664.

#### IN THE CHANCELL.

Here, at the upper end, lye buried severall of the family of the Napiers, who lived in the mannour house neare to the church on the north side. But the first of them that lived there, named Edward Napier, somtimes fellow of Allsoules, was not buried in this church, but in that of S. Peter in the East as I conceive.

William Napier, son and heire of the said Edward Napier, by his second wife Anne, daughter of John Peto of Chesterton in Warwickshire, esq., was buried here 2 Feb. 1621:

Elizabeth, wife of William Napier, 7 July 1584:

Thomisina, daughter of Will. Napier and Elizabeth his wife, 26 Aug. 1583.

Edmund Napier, son and heire of William Napier, who hath this epitaph engraven on a white marble of a diamond square, at the high altar:—

Here lyeth the body of Edmund Napier, esq., who deceased the 26 Febr. an. Dom. 1654, aged 75.

Joyce, the wife of Edmund Napier, buried 12 July 1643, sister of Edward Wakeman of Beckford in Glocestershire.

William, son of Edmund Napier, 1 Sept. 1610; Georg, son of Edmund Napier, 7 March 1619; Elizabeth, daughter of Edmund Napier, 1 Aug. 1622; Edward Napier, son and heire of Edmund Napier, 12 July 1643.

On the south side of the chancell, at the upper end, is this on a black marble table fastned to the wall:—

Margaret, the eldest daughter of the said Georg Napier, was married to Henry Nevile of Holt in Leicestershire, esq.: Mary, the second, died a maid 29 (fol. 855 b) May 1672, aged 21, and was buried by her father: and Fraunces the yongest was married to ... Winter.

On a black marble, lying at the upper end, neare the north wall:— Depositum Johannis Snell, Scoto-Britanui, armigeri, qui obiit vi die Augusti anno aetatis 50 salutis 1679.

Armes are 'quarterly or and gules, a cross patonce counterchanged.'

This John Snell, the son of Andrew Snell and Margaret his wife (daughter of John Carnahan), was borne in the parish of Comonnell in Carrick in the sherivedome of Aire in Scotland; bred in the Universitie of Glasgow under the care of Mr. James Darumpley. professor of philosophie; came into England in the time of Oliver Cromwell in a verie meane condition, and, in his journey through Lancashire, calling at the house of the lady Houghton at Walton neare Houghton tower (one of the daughters of Sir Roger Aston a Scotchman, who was first king James his barber and afterwards master of the robes) told the person that came to the dore to give him an answer, that 'he was a poore Scotchman and a scholar, and hearing that a gude lady, his country-woman, lived there, he took the boldness to make himself knowne to her, and to crave some employment in her service,' etc. Whereupon after the lady had discoursed with him, shee appointed him to keep the accompts, wait upon her, and to say prayers in the family. After he had continued there about an yeare he upon the recommendations of the lady Calverly (daughter to the said lady Houghton) was taken into the service of Sir Orlando Bridgman, who having much chamber-practice, (Snell) did write severall conveyances for him and was so diligent a servant to him, and to his lady, that when ever the said knight was afflicted with the gout, he was the onlie person who was trusted to attend him. At the king's restauration when Sir Orlando was made Lord Cheif Baron of

the Exchequer, Snell was made the crier of that court; in which office he continued after Sir Orlando was made Lord Cheif Justice of the Common Pleas; and when he was made Lord Keeper, he was (at the instance of John, duke of Lauderdale) employed to be the seal-bearer. Being thus in esteem he was employed somtimes into Scotland for the duke of Monmouth, and bore the great seal while the earl of Shaftsbury was Chancellour. He married a servant maid in the family of Sir Orlando, named Joane, daughter of Vincent Coventrie, rector of Begbrooke neare Woodstock in Oxfordshire (sister to the wife of Benjamin Cooper, registrarie of the Universitie, in whose house, in Holywell, Snell died), by whome he left issue one only daughter, named Dorothie. At the time of his death he bequeathed his mannour of Uffeton alias Olufeton alias Ulveton (fol. 356 a) in Warwickshire, worth about 450li. per annum, to be employed (after certaine yeares spent and moneys paid thence for the use of his wife and daughter) for the maintenance of certaine Scotch scholars in such College or hall that the Vice-chancellour of Oxon, Provost of Queen's College, Master of Balliol College, and the President of St. John's, for the time being, shall think fit. Their number not to be above 12, or under 5; to be chosen from Glasgow college (from which universitie he received a diploma to be Master of Arts, anno 1662) from the number of such that had spent 3 yeares (or 2 at the least) there, or one or two in some other college in Scotland, etc. They are to enjoy the said exhibition about 10 or 11 yeares, and then they are to returne into their owne native country, to get preferment there.

In the middle of the chancell is this engraven on a brass plate fastned to a blew marble:—

Hic jacent Agnes Hopper, Thomae Hopperi medici, Coll. Novi quondam socii, conjux, quae obiit 30 die Octobris anno MDCXXV et Jana filia ejus quae obiit die 25 Junii an. Dom. MDCXXV. H. M. P. P. Robertus Hopper filius.

Over this inscription are the pictures of two women engraven, praying before two tables, on each of which is a book open.

Here lyeth the body of John Smith of this parish who was servant 40 yeares to the Lord Pembroke<sup>1</sup>. He gave 5 is. to the poore of this parish and dyed July 7 an. Dom. 1680 aged 95 yeares.

On another towards the lower end:-

28 Dec. 1642. Here is interred Mary, late wife of Robert Boune, esq., and daughter of Thomas Astley in the county of Stafford, esq.

The said Robert Boune, who was Deputy Recorder of Oxon, was buried here about 1653, leaving one only daughter behind him named Margaret who was married to Oliver Smith, of S. Aldate's parish, son of Thomas Smith, alderman (fol. 856 b) of the citie of Oxford.

# (CHAPEL.)

On the south side of the body is a chapell standing, which seems to have been built when the present fabrick of the church was erected, but by whom the said chappell was built I find not as yet. There is a neech at the east end of it, wherin hath stood the picture of the Virgin Mary \* (in stone), to which it was dedicated, but taken downe at the reformation of religion. On the south side of it, towards the lower end, hath been a larg brass plate, fixt to the wall, whether for the founder of it, or some other person that was buried there, I know not. It hath been taken away time out of mind, and therefore I cannot imagine for whom it was set up, unless for Andrew Browning, buried there, or in the body, in May 1551.

Against the south wall, at the upper end of this little chappell is a brass plate fixed whereon is the picture of a woman lying in childbed. At the 4 corners of the bed are the pictures of 4 infants in swaddling clouts, by whom is written

Of such is the kingdom of God.

Wood notes, in margin, 'Will. and doubtful.

Philip, earls of Pembroke.'

'Virgin Mary' substituted for 'that

Margaret' is in pencil only, as saint.'

Out of the woman's mouth comes this:—

Thy will be done.

Under all is this engraven:—

Here lyeth Elizabeth Franklin, third wife of Mr. Thomas Franklin<sup>1</sup>, who dangerously escaped death at three severall travells in childbed, died togeather with the fourth July 31, act. 35, an. 1622.

If heaven's inheritors on earth be tryde
That thou art one of them thou need'st not feare
What thou enduredst these dead have testifyde
And thus being tryde a crowne deserv'st to weare.
Let then thy husband's children cease their woe
Thou left'st them only to thine owne to goe.

She was the widdow of Vincent Coventry, rector of Begbroke com. Oxon.

(fol. 357 a.) The tower or campanile, at the west end of the body of the church, was built by Dr. Henry Sever, Warden of Merton College, about 1464.

Here lyeth the body of Elizabeth Hampton, who deceased the 30 of March anno 1661.

Heaven's Hampton-court: heer's but a cell Where putrid bones, ashes, and wormes do dwell. This sacred maid, deaf to the taking charmes Of all ignoble love, immortall armes Are now embracing; and have made, since death, Another virgin queen Elizabeth. Shee needs not us, but dearly miss shall wee Our shee-professor of Divinity.

Shee was a little old crooked maid, and had conventicles in her house in this parish, once or twice in a week, wherin somtimes she spake, but mostly her customers of Magd. and Wadham College. (Explicit fol. 357 a: 357 b is blank.)

(Arms:—) 'fess, between 6 annulets,' without colours. This John Lucas, M.A., (whom I well knew) was borne at Froyle in Hampshire, but whether descended from those of his name living in Suffolke or Essex, I know not. He was made perpetual fellow of New College 1628; left it by resignation when the visitation of the University of Oxon was made by authority of parliament anno 1648. Whereupon receeding to an obscure village neare Oxon called Cassington, for the sake of Mr. Richard Sherlock, curate of that place, lived retiredly there for several yeares. At length upon the coming in of King Charles II anno 1660, the restored members of New College invited him to take his fellowship againe, but refused, because he had lawfully

resign'd it without any force put upon him. About that time he setled in the stonehouse on the north side of S. Giles' Church, where he continued as a sojournour in a most retired and lonely condition to the time of his death, which hapned 27 Aug. 1681. The aforesaid monument and epitaph were put over his grave by his nephew Sir Thomas Millington, Doctor of Physick.

# (fol. 878 b.) (Church not given.)

In hope of a happy resurrection here lies the bodie of Hugh Ellys, who died December 26, 1684, aged 63 yeares. As also the bodie of Thomas Ellys, who departed this life March 12, 1680, aged 20 yeares.

Here also lyeth the body of Mary Ellys, wife of Hugh Ellys, aged 67 yeares, who dyed the 12 of Febr. 1685.

# (Slips on fol. 378: Church not given.)

In hope of a happy resurrection here lyes the body of Mr. Anthony Kearsley 1, who departed this life August the 22 in the yeare 1680, being aged 57 yeares.

On a brasse in the south ile, on the ground, the picture of a man and his wife, a scrole issuing out of their mouths, the inscription pulld of.

On a brasse affixed to a pillar in this ile, the picture of a man kneeling with foure children behind him, & the picture of a woman (behind her likewise four children). Out of his mouth, a scrole; theron [Sancta Trinitas deus meus]; on one at her mouth [miserere mei]. At his head, an escotcheon; thereon a cock.

In a north window of the church:-

- 'Sable, 2 bends argent, a border gules of hurtes;'
- 'Sable, 2 bends argent, a canton gules;'
- 'Sable, 3 bends argent, a canton gules;'
- 'Argent, 2 bends sable.'

## St. Thomas' Church 1.

Against the north wall of the body of the church, a marble monument, with this inscription:—

Enclosed here doth William Tylkok lye, Whose just deserts did cause be chosen Mayre Four sundry times, but now constraind to dye, Of earth compos'd to earth he makes repayre. This world therefore as vaine and fraile dispise, Immortall blisse thinke, hope, to win devise.

In the chancell, a raised stone monument without either armes or inscription.

Hereunder lyeth the body of Thomas Scudamore, son to John Scudamore esq. of Ceinchurch in Herefordshire, who departed this life the 9<sup>th</sup> of August, in the 28<sup>th</sup> year of his age, 1647.

Over it his armes:—'gules, three stirropps leathred, or:' the crest, 'a beare's paw sable, issuing out of a crowne or;' his motto is Scuto amoris divini.

(Note. With this chapter ends Wood's City treatise, Wood MS. F 29 A, so far as written by himself. The present volume and vol. i have also given, from other MSS. of his, Wood's collections for his intended chapters. I have seen, scattered about in various volumes of the Rawlinson and Ballard MSS., stray slips of Wood's writing containing short notes and references bearing on the present treatise, but nothing requiring insertion here.

Wood MS. F 29 A contains a fragment of one draft of Brian Twyne's City treatise—see Wood's Life and Times, iv. 222. This, and Twyne's other draft, in Twyne III and Twyne XVIII (Wood's Life and Times, iv. 207, 213), are in Latin; and a conjecture is

possible that some, at least, of Wood's references to 'Latin copy of churches' may be to these papers of Twyne's.

I have purposely left these sheets of Twyne's unprinted. Twyne's treatises and collections deserve separate publication. His greatness as an Oxford antiquarian is poorly represented by his one printed book.

The sheets are found as fol. 372-376 of the MS., and are entitled:—

### (CHAPTER XXXIX)

REGISTRA PAROCHIALIA CIVITATIS OXON: COLLECTANEA INDE.

(These excerpts were begun by Wood in Aug. 1677 (Wood's Life and Times, ii. 387) in continuation of his City collections, after the composition of the second draft of his University treatise (ibid. ii. 290), and continued at intervals till 1680 (ibid. ii. 476) when his work on the City treatise was again left off for the *Athenae*. Wood's rough copy of them is now in MS. Tanner 456; his clean copy is MS. Wood D 5.

They are here printed as an integral part of his City treatise, and as giving definite information about many names which are found in its earlier chapters. They will also prove useful to compilers of College Registers, and are not without even a national interest. The numerous deaths of officers of Charles I's forces suggest the grievous waste of his army in its Oxford quarters.

Wood's notes appended to the excerpts are enclosed in square brackets [ ]: any notes or names I have thought well to add, in angular brackets ( ), as throughout in this edition.)

Consequent on this assumption, another follows, viz. that they had at one time a mansion inside the wall, at another time outside the wall. ## INDEX II.

## GENERAL INDEX OF PERSONS, PLACES, AND WORDS.

(In this index are brought together all matters not included in Index I, which is a special index for Oxford. Names of persons found in Index I are however brought into this Index II by cross-references. Several merely fictitious names, arising from errors of name or surname on Wood's part, are here indexed; on the ground that they may be helpful to future workers among the Wood MSS.

A list of names, for the most part of obscure people, extending over six centuries of time, drawn from very different classes of society and from very different parts of the country, and embracing many thousand references, requires all the differentiating marks it can get. I have therefore given, in all cases where it was readily accessible, the date, or approximate date, of death, with the mark †. In other cases, the year of first mention, or implied mention, is given. In some few cases, I have been able to give only the century, 11-, 12-, &c. Names which have no mark of time are either very unimportant or very indistinctly mentioned. I have attached their College or Hall to names which are quoted as of Colleges or Halls which became Colleges. For other University names I have used the mark sch., 'scholaris.' The references to the Oxford Historical Society's Register of the University of Oxford, vol. i by Mr. Boase, vol. ii by myself, may save some trouble with many of these obscure names. For citizens of Oxford I have used the mark opp., = 'oppidanus'; and for names of people apparently outside Oxford, the mark extr., = 'extraneus.' Churchmen are marked eccl., unless they can readily be singled out as 'monk' or 'friar,' or by reference to their Oxford benefice, or their bishopric. There are, of course, numerous possibilities of names being found in a double capacity, a graduate of Oxford, e.g., as incumbent of an Oxford parish: but I feel that the marks which I have used are sufficient for practical purposes of identification and distinction.

A number of the names in these volumes belong to the period in which the individual name was baptismal, but the individual was also variously known by birthplace, trade, parentage, and the like. In indexing such names I have followed no one rule, but put them in the place, or places, where I judged they could most readily be found, by appellation rather than by Christian names.)


