What does it take to make a difference in the world?

Lifetime achievements, pioneering leadership or extraordinary acts of courage may be one measure. But at their foundation are qualities such as perseverance, pursuit of excellence, selflessness, and volunteer service - the actions of everyday heroes that impact the lives of their colleagues, families and communities.

Making a difference is not an exclusive contest, but an inclusive alliance. And at Susquehanna, the examples of the bond are easy to find.

They are stories that validate the success of the University's mission: to prepare talented students for lives of achievement, leadership and service - one of the many reasons why prospective students continue to seek out - and alumni to take pride in a Susquehanna education.

Consider David Day, an 1874 graduate of the Missionary Institute, and his wife, Emily, a former student of the Susquehanna Female College, who served as missionaries in Liberia for more than 23 years during which their alma maters evolved into the current Susquehanna University.

Stanford University Professor Emeritus Claude Buss '24, a distinguished career diplomat in the Far East; Roger Blough 25, retired chairman of the board of U.S. Steel; and the Rev. John Garcia Gensel '40, minister to New York's jazz community, are a few more who come to mind. Numerous others have been honored since 1955 with annual awards for achievement and service by the Alumni Association. And they are just a few of the examples.

In recent issues of Susquehanna Today you have read about many more Susquehanna alumni who are also making a difference one day at a time. Just a few are Bob Derr '70 and his million-dollar bear campaign to combat cystic fibrosis; Amy Murphy Nolen '85, co-founder of a non-profit theatre company in Philadelphia; Faye R. Lewis '52, named "Educator of the Year" by the Panther Valley, Pa., Chamber of Commerce; and Harleysville Group Executive Vice President Mark Cummins '78 who is also active in community groups including the North Penn United Way.

honor society for first-year students. Jason Wolfe '99 has joined the staff of EnterpriseWorks Worldwide, an anti-poverty organization, and 18 students, staff and family members recently returned from the University's second international service learning trip to Costa Rica and Nicaragua.

Remembering Gene Urey: Engaging Students with Wit, Insight and Interaction

suppose every student in college has one particular professor they can readily name who made a profound difference in their life. For me, that person was Gene Urey, who recently died as Susquehanna was beginning its current academic year. For the first ume in 35 years, new students at Susquehanna will not have the opportunity – indeed the privilege – to be in Dr. Urey's classes in American Government and be captivated by his wit, humor and insights into our system of checks and balances.

It seems like only yesterday that I was sitting in Dr. Urey's Constitutional Law class in 1966-67. There were only ten students in the first semester; the class increased in the second semester to 15. It is not surprising to me that Dr. Urey produced nine lawyers out of those 15 students in the class. He taught the class by adopting the same process used by the U.S. Supreme Court Justices to decide their cases: he would work his way around the table and engage each student with regard to their position on the case(s) in question, usually posing challenging and thought-provoking queries. It was not a good idea to come to class less than fully prepared! After he was satisfied with the

classroom debate, he would call for a vote and each student would have to explain how he/she reached their final decision. It was high level analysis and discussion, no doubt aided by top flight students like **Sam Clapper ('68)**, who later clerked for a Federal Appeals Court Judge later named to the Supreme Court, **Dick Poinsett ('68)**, and others. Dr. Urey kept the atmosphere competitive, fast-paced, and exhilarating!

I have returned to Gene Urey's classes many times since my graduation. Sometimes it was to talk about legal issues, sometimes to share experiences from my law school years in Boston, or to provide insights and anecdotes from my years on the Senate Judiciary Committee or as an assistant district attorney in Philadelphia. Whatever the reason, it was always an enjoyable experience, and it was always fun to watch Gene interact with his class, as only he could.

This year, like years past, I was looking forward to my next visit to see Dr. Urey – to say hello, hear about the advanced projects the political science juniors and seniors were working on, and to discuss current events with Gene, Dr. Blessing and their colleagues in the office. Regrettably, I won't

get that chance now, but I just want to say, Dr. Urey, you exemplified the very best of the teaching profession during your 34 years at SU. You made a difference in my life and to thousands of other students you taught and advised during a crucial part of our lives. You inspired your students, developed their thirst for knowledge, and simply made learning fun! From my viewpoint, that is the highest compliment any teacher can receive, and Susquehanna and I will truly miss you.

...and Axel Kleinsorg: Friendship and Remarkable Professionalism

xel R. Kleinsorg, who died on Dec. 28 at age 86 in his home on Selinsgrove's Isle of Que, made enormous contributions to the cultural and educational life of the Susquehanna Valley.

The Philadelphia native and Temple University graduate first came to Selmsgrove in 1946 after earning a master's degree from the University of Iowa. He joined the faculty of Susquehanna, teaching courses in drama, public speaking, theatre and business English. He directed dozens of plays and other productions, and was the originator of Susquehanna's annual Shakespearean Festival, performed for periods of 10 days to two weeks and seen by thousands of high school students who came by the busload from numerous communities in central and eastern Pennsylvania. And, he took student performances "on the road," visiting high schools throughout this and neighboring states. When Selinsgrove celebrated its centennial in 1957, Axel Kleinsorg directed its historic pageant, performed outdoors.

He left the university in 1957 to pursue his teaching and directing career at Bensalem High School in Philadelphia until retiring in 1979, when he returned to Selinsgrove and to Susquehanna. He taughtpart time, directed a number of plays, usually one each year, up to and including 1909, and served as an advisor to theatre majors. He also directed plays sponsored by several local Rotary clubs and other community groups – even playing an occasional cameo role. Many recognized him as the dean of local theater directors.

A genial, talented bachelor and consummate host, he made many friends in the Valley and around the world. He was generous to a fault, outgoing and endlessly personable. His character and personality were outstanding. And he influenced positively the development and maturation of generations of aspiring actors. The contributions and friendship of this remarkable professional are remembered and revered by countless persons. His like do not cross our path often.

President Cunningham to Leave Susquehanna

President Joel L. Cunningham, who has led the University for more than 15 years, will leave Susquehanna in July to become vice chancellor and president of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn.

Cunningham began his tenure at Susquehanna as vice president for academic affairs in 1979, serving also as professor of mathematical sciences and dean of the faculty until 1984 when he was appointed acting president. In 1985, he was elected as the University's 13th president.

"We are grateful to President Cunningham for his leadership, dedication and vision which has helped Susquehanna University achieve the level of excellence it enjoys today," said **Samuel D. Ross Jr. '54**, chair of the Susquehanna board of directors.

The Cunningham administration has been marked by steady growth in the academic quality of the institution and the students it serves, increased enrollments, and good financial health. During that time, Susquehanna's endowment has grown from \$4 million to \$90 million, and \$60 million has been committed to new and renovated facilities. Many guidebooks to selective colleges now recognize Susquehanna as one of the best small universities in the Northeast.

The University of the South is a co-educational institution with 1,300 undergraduates and a graduate theological school of 100 students. It is ranked among the top colleges of liberal arts and sciences in the nation. Eocated on 10,000 acres on the Cumberland Plateau in southern Tennessee, it was founded in 1857 by leaders of the Episcopal Church. Cunningham will succeed Samuel R. Williamson who retires in June after serving 12 years.

"It is painful to leave an academic comnumity such as the one that my wife, Trudy, and I have loved at Susquehanna University for more than 20 years," said Cunningham. "But it is also exhilarating to think of being able to contribute to the continued development of excellence, innovation, and community at Sewanee, an institution of very special character and promise."

"As a result of the hard work and gencrosity of many people, Susquehanna is thriving," added Cunningham. "I believe the

University will be able to choose its next president from among an outstanding group of prospects."

Raised in Oak Ridge, Tenn., Cunningham received his B.A. in mathematics and psychology from the University of Chattanooga (now the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga) in 1965. He earned his M.A. in 1967 and Ph.D. in 1969 in mathematics from the University of Oregon and was a mathematics faculty member at the University of Kentucky from 1969 to 1974 before returning to the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga as a faculty member and dean of continuing education for five years. In 1976-77, he served as an American Council on Education Fellow in Academic Administration.

His wife, **Trudy Cunningham**, is in her 21st year at Bucknell University where she is currently associate dean of the College of Engineering. At Sewanee, she will assume responsibilities similar to those she has at Bucknell, including advising students and prospective students.

Nicholas Lopardo '68, Terry March '67, Dawn Mueller '68, Peter Nunn '57, Harold O'Connor, Samuel Ross '54, and Stephen Shilling '80. Lopardo will serve as chair and Mueller as vice chair. Executive Assistant to the President Philip Winger will provide the committee's

administrative staff support.

Susquehanna has retained the services of Educational Management Network, an executive search firm specializing in the education and not-for-profit community, to assist the search committee.

"Everyone who has had the pleasure of working with Joel Cunningham on Susquehanna's behalf recognizes what an outstanding job he's done to help make SU one of the best small universities in the nation," said Lopardo. "Our job now is to move as quickly and thoughtfully as possible to find a successor who will build on that legacy of success. It's no small task, but one that I know the committee and the campus community is well prepared to accomplish."

college guidebook released nationally in the fall of 1999 recognizes Susquehanna University for leadership in the field of student character development. The \$6.7 million facility includes high-technology classrooms, computer laboratories and presentation rooms. The building also includes numerous small group study rooms designed to encourage teamwork and student/faculty interaction. Programs tracked more than 40,000 hours of service, including 19,600 hours by members of Susquehanna's award-winning Project House system. Sorority and fraternity members were active in the community, volunteering approximately 18,500 hours. Three hundred students also earned academic credit in 18 service learning courses.

"We are proud of the many Susquehanna students who are involved in community service," said University President **Joel Cunningham**. "Their volunteer experiences provide valuable help to the community and help shape the students' values and view of the world."

The Degenstein Foundation recently awarded Assistant Professor of Theatre **Pamela Chabora** a three-year, \$55,748 grant to develop a summer theatre program at Susquehanna. The six-week program will benefit children from the community and will also serve as a laboratory for SU theatre and education majors. This project features day camps for children and an evening workshop for University students and selected community members that will result in a summer theatre production of Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet*. "At Susquehanna, we feel it's important to combine theory learned in the classroom with opportunities for hands-on experience," Chabora said.

Chabora is a specialist in children's musical and classical theatre, with a doctorate in theatre from Michigan State University. She has previously developed successful children's theatre and summer theatre programs at the University of Toledo (Ohio) and at the University of Maine at Fort Kent. SU Service Learning Thrives in Central America

essica Daly '03 wasn't planning to join Susquehanna University's second international service learning trip over winter break."I didn't have the money and I didn't want to ask my parents for it." Daly, a freshman music major, says she received an e-mail from

University Chaplain **Mark Wm. Radecke** two weeks before winter break telling her of one more space on the trip to Costa Rica and Nicaragua and suggesting ways to raise money. She decided the trip was meant to be.

It turned out to be a fortuitons decision. Daly learned only days before leaving that a summer trip she had planned to Kenya was canceled. Then, in Costa Rica, she was offered the opportunity to return this summer to establish a church music program. She jumped at the chance.

Daly is one of 13 SU students who participated in the 12-day January trip, which is sponsored and coordinated by the Chaplain's Office and run through the Central America Service Learning/Mission Project. Chaplain Radecke, Administrative Director of Health Services **April Borry-Black**, Director of Career Services **Bill Regester**, faculty spouses **Tami Radecke** and **Nancy Normann**, and Dr. Richard Daly, Jessica's father, a physician from Dallastown, Pa., joined the students.

The group delivered more than \$14,000 worth of donated vitamins, medical and school supplies, and children's underwear to the mission sites. Last year, 14 members of the SU community traveled to El Salvador, Costa Rica and Nicaragua.

The group included a medical team and a construction team, said Radecke. The medical team had a physician, two registered nurses, a certified emergency medical technician, a pre-med major, and a Spanish major serving as translator. They staffed medical clinics in a Costa Rican *precario*, a hospital on Isla Ometepe in Lake Nicaragua, and a remote mission outpost far up the Sarapiqui and San Juan rivers.

"We lived without electricity or hot water, in a hand-made house. It was amazing being able to experience life in those conditions," said Daly. "This experience made me realize how unimportant material things are."

The construction team built a playground, installed new fencing, and constructed room partitions at a church in Aserri near the Costa Rican capital of San Jose. "We worked alongside residents of the community, building relationships with them as we worked together," says Radecke. The team also lodged and worked at an orphanage on Isla Ometepe, shoveling tons of rock and soil to prepare a site for a new concrete patio, and spending evenings with the orphans.

According to **Angela D'Allesandro '00**, a senior Spanish major, that was one of the best parts of the trip. "I will always remember experiencing the overwhelming love given by the kids in the orphanage."

The project emphasizes both service and learning. The academic component included visits to clinics and mission sites, and presentations by professors, pastors and missionaries. Students read two texts, kept a journal, wrote a paper, and did a presentation upon return.

"It is exciting to see the students grow and mature in their perceptions of life, faith, and service as they live and work with people whose hanguage, race, socio-economic status and culture differ from their own," says Radecke.

Bestowed in September during the 40th anniversary celebration of the Mendel University's School of Economics and Business, the medal recognized Rusek's extensive help in curriculum reconstruction and the creation of new programs and courses. While in Brno, Rusek presided over one of the main anniversary events, the conference of Business and Economic Education and the Future of the Czech Economy. In October, Rusek served as a panelist at the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) operational seminar, "Open Road 99 - Exploring Emerging Transnational and Asymmetric Challenges to NATO," in Norfolk,Va.

As part of its 30th anniversary season, the Susquehanna Valley Chorale recently gave two complete performances of Felix Mendelssohn's oratorio "Elijah." Since the founding of the chorale in 1969, Susquehanna University faculty and students have played a significant part in its development and success. The performances of "Elijah" at Zion Lutheran Church in Sunbury featured SU voice faculty members Professor Cyril Stretansky (bass-baritone) singing the role of Elijah and Lecturer Jeffrey Fahnestock (tenor) in the role of Ahab. Stadium Groundbreaking Heralds Start of \$14 Million Sports/Fitness Project

Susquehanna's \$14 million expansion and renovation of sports and fitness, facilities shifted into high gear on November 6 with groundbreaking for the University's new Nicholas A. Lopardo Stadium during the last home football game on the former Amos Alonzo Stagg Field.

Withm six weeks, contractors had completed demolition of the existing stadium and had begun site preparation for the new football and track stadium. The facility, to be located on a new Stagg field, will be completed in time for the fall 2000 football season. A new 51,000 square-foot field house, a new fitness center, and renovations to the existing O W. Houts Gymnasium will follow the stadium project.

Sixty of the 100 top football players for the past 100 seasons (see page 10) were on hand as **Nicholas A. Lopardo** '68 turned the first shovels of earth. Lopardo's wife, Diane, and six-month-old grandson Kyle joined University President Joel Cunningham. Board of Directors Chair Sam Ross '54, Athletics Director Don Harnum, and varsity athletes Karyn Kern '00 and J.R. Reynolds '00 in the ceremony behind the home bench.

The new football and track stadium will provide seating capacity for 3,500 spectators,

a concession stand, a press box, and an eight-lane, quarter-mile track. It will be constructed just northeast of the former stadium on the site of the former baseball field. New baseball and practice fields have been created at the southwest part of campus behind West Hall and will be first used in the spring 2000 season. Relocation of the stadium will also require the construction of three new outdoor tennis courts.

Two major additions and renovations to the O.W. Houts Gym will follow the stadiium project. The Jacobs Fitness Center, to be constructed on the west front of the gym, facing Bogar Hall, is scheduled for completion in November 2000. The new field house and a connecting link will be built on the east side of the gym on the site of the former Stagg Field. It is scheduled to open in August 2001.

A member of the University hoard of directors since 1992, Lopardo played football and baseball at Susquehanna. He is a member of the University's Sports Hall of Faine and the Crusaders Top 100 Players of 100 Seasons Football Team. Recipient of the 1999 Alumni Award for Achievement, he is vice chairman of State Street Corporation in Boston, Mass., and chairman and chief execnitive officer of State Street Global Advisors.

The expansion and renovation is the first major improvement to the University's athletics facilities in 23 years. The project is one of the remaining priorities in the *Susquehanna 2000: The Next Challenge* capital campaign. As of December 31, 1999, gifts and pledges to the campaign totaled more than \$44.9 million on an original goal of \$35 million. Susquehanna is working to meet the terms of a \$1 million challenge grant from The Kresge Foundation of Troy, Mich., to support to the new sports and fitness complex.

"Without Mr. Lopardo's leadership in moving us forward on the sports and fitness complex, we wouldn't have been able to break ground on the schedule we're planning," President Cunningham said. "We are grateful for his substantial financial commitment to this project, as well as the gifts he has made to other campaign priorities, including the new business and communications building." Lopardo's gift commitments to the *Susquehanna 2000* campaign exceed \$1.5 milhon.

The anniversary team honors the top 100 players of the first 100 seasons of Crusader football. The team includes all football players previously inducted into the Susquehanna Sports Hall of Fame plus 27 additional players nominated by alumni, boosters and the sports information staff and selected by the Hall of Fame Committee.

Field Hockey, Football Score Freshman All-Americans

Two Susquehanna freshmen – football cornerback **Antonio Nash '03** and field hockey inner **Leah Bailor '03** – have joined the ranks of all-Americans following outstanding performances in fall of 1999.

Nash, an accounting major from Washington, D.C., is the 1999 Division III Defensive Back of the Year and a First Team All-American by Don Hansen's *Football Gazette*, also earning first-team honors on the Hewlett-Packard Division III All-American Football Team. He was the lone freshman selected to the two All-American first-teams.

A transfer from Division II Cheyney University, the 5-9, 170pounder tied the SU record for single-season interceptions with 10.

"We've had a lot of guys come through here, but I don't think we've ever had any make a bigger impact than Antonio. He did a lot of things for us and is a big reason why we repeated as league champions," said 10th-year head coach **Steve Briggs**.

Bailor is a 1999 AstroTurf/National Field Hockey Coaches Association NCAA Division III Third Team All-American – the first field hockey All-American in school history. She started all 19 games and led the team in scoring with 12 goals, 9 assists, and 33 points, marking the second-most points and assists in a season at SU.

"I'm just really delighted and think Leah is very deserving. Right from the get-go in the preseason, she was just on fire and really opened everyone's eyes," said head coach **Connie Harnum**. "Once the games actually started, she definitely led us offensively and set the tone in many of the games. She's a tremendous inspiration, not just to the other freshmen, but the upperclassmen as well."

A liberal arts major from Richfield, Pa., Bailor helped Susquehanna achieve its best field hockey season in school history. The Crusaders finished 15-4, 6-1 and second in the MAC Commonwealth Conference. They broke school records for wins (15), consecutive victories (7, twice), and goals in a season (44).

Women's Basketball Coach Hribar Winningest Coach in Susquehanna History

Women's basketball head coach **Mark Hribar** became Susquehanna's winningest basketball coach on November 26 with his team's 82-68 victory over Denison – giving him 202 career wins. He passed current Director of Athletics **Don Harnum**, who had 201 wins in his 14 seasons as men's basketball coach (1969-71, '76-87, '88-89).

Now in his 13th-year, Hribar's record includes 11 straight winning seasons, 10 straight trips to the Middle Atlantic Conference playoffs, three MAC championship game appearances, and four NCAA tournament bids.

"I have to give a lot of the credit to the great assistant coaches and players I've had through the years. We've worked really hard around here and the win record was an exceptionally bright moment for me," said Hribar, who coaches part time at Susquehanna, working full time as a reading and spelling teacher at East Juniata High School.

As of February 3, Hribar's record was 211-110 (.657) – directing this season's team to a 12-6 mark despite losing senior tri-captain and star center **Karyn Kern '00** to a season-ending injury in the fifth game.

Samuel Adams **`58**



The Making of a Fulbright Scholar The summer 1999 issue of Susquehanna Today reported on a prestigious Fulbright Award to Kathryn Spence '99, but mistakenly identified her as the University's first Fulbright Scholar. Fortuitously, the story helped us get back in touch with Samuel Adams '58, a non-traditional student who traveled to Germany as a Fulbright Scholar three years after he graduated from Susquehanna.

ALUMNI PROFILE

n 1930, **Samuel Adams '58** decided not to graduate with his high school class in order to pursue a business opportunity. He built the opportunity into a successful locksmith and leather goods business in Sunbury, but his passion was always to teach.

At age 45 Adams enrolled at SU and began a routine of juggling classes and his business, sometimes leaving campus as many as three times a day to tend to work. Four years later, in 1958, he graduated and began teaching science and German at Selinsgrove Area High School and enrolled in the graduate program at Bucknell University. In 1961 received his master's degree in secondary education administration. One month later he was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to study in Germany.

Adams joined German teachers from all over the world at the Goethe Institutes, in Wolfenbuettle and Nirnberg. "It was the most marvelous thing," he remembers. "The only thing we had in common was that we would all have to speak German."

Fourteen weeks later Adams returned home to his wife, Eleanor. Mrs. Adams was, unfortunately, ill for most of their married life and unable to travel with him. His next trip to Germany was in 1971 when he took a group of high school students abroad.

He retired from teaching in 1976. Today, at 87 and in good health, Adams continues to pursue many of his interests, including making his own clothes. He has chronicled his life in a tidy three-ring binder, with plastic sleeves protecting hundreds of newspaper clippings that cover his professional, academic and personal life.

He is an avid volunteer and former president for the Northunberland County Historical Society. He continues to teach Sunday school and is also teaching English to a woman who recently arrived in this area from Germany. The Snyder County Chapter of the Pennsylvania Association of School Retirees recognized his service with an award last year and Adams is currently making plans for a trip to Germany this summer; his third in three years.

Dulcimer Virtuoso: Danville to Lincoln Center wenty-five years ago, a Christmas gift introduced **Alf Bashore '70** to the Appalachian mountain dulcimer. Today, the award-winning musician plays to audiences whenever he can find time away from his job as a critical care nurse in the special care unit at Geisinger Medical Center.

One often finds Bashore at music festivals throughout Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio, and New Jersey, performing and teaching. A top-prize winning performer at the Ole Bull Music Festival in Galeton, Pa., Bashore has earned the Earl Tarbox Award two years running, winning the right to perform in Lincoln Center.

In addition, Bashore writes much of the music he performs, "composing alternative melodies that have injected a little 'oompf" into the nusic," he says. During his June, 1999 Lincoln Center performance he played two original compositions – "The Tapping Tune," which is a contemporary composition using nontraditional techniques, and "Kelly's Waltz," a tune he wrote for a friend. "I played solo. I was very comfortable, it felt like I was at home," he says of his first performance.

Of all the venues he's played, Lincoln Center included, Bashore says his favorite place to perform is the PP&L Montour Preserve, a nature preserve in Danville, Pa. "This year will be my tenth performance," says Bashore. "I play at the Visitors' Center every March." His second performance at Lincoln Center is planned for sometime this spring as well.

In playing, Bashore employs a variety of techniques, including traditional noter style, simple strumming, flat-picking, finger-picking, clawhammer-picking and a two-handed tapping style to evoke everything from delicate melodious tunes to foot-tapping dance music.

A charter member of two dulcimer societies, Bashore attends monthly meetings "to play and share techniques," with other dulcimer musicians. He is most active in The Frosty Valley Dulcimer Friends of Danville, which also includes Professor of Economics **Warren Fisher**. The group performs at community events and private gatherings.

There is a murmur, then a whisper, then silence as 55 young men and women in tuxedos and velvet gowns stride down the aisle and take their positions. Applause, perhaps an introduction, and then Professor **Cyril Stretansky** takes the podium. The Susquehanna University Choir is about to perform.

The audience sees a polished, smiling group of young musicians following a tradition that was begun more than 30 years ago. They don't see the notes scribbled in the music, the expressions on Stretansky's face as he coaxes exactly the right sound from each individual, the hours of rehearsal or the off-stage preparations.

From the first moment of the annual spring-break tour, there is a routine. Students, luggage, programs and recordings travel on a bus, followed by a rental truck with risers, tympani, congas, music stands, a podium, other percussion equipment, and often a keyboard. All first-year members are responsible for making sure equipment is in the right place at the right time.


The long bus rides are relaxed, but once the group arrives at a location, all equipment and luggage is unloaded and set up in a span

of about 15 minutes. The group assembles for a brief warm-up – usually the first opportunity members have to try out the acoustic setting in each location. The height of the ceiling, the amount of sound-absorbing carpeting and upholstery, and even the presence or absence of a balcony can determine which optional pieces will be performed.

The host church serves dinner and spontaneous four-part harmonies are often heard as the group sings a traditional pre-meal blessing. Soon members change from jeans and sweatshirts to tuxes and gowns, and finally, it's time to line up. The choir manager and director both carry walkie-talkies to coordinate entrances and handle any lastminute changes.

As each person steps through the door, an amazing transformation occurs. Gone are any thoughts except those pertaining to performance.

My own thought process usually went something like this: Don't step on Amy's dress. Slow down – Amanda has a bad knee. Match her pace. Smile. Folder in your right hand. Don't drop your music. Watch

out for the cord. There's an alum – (smile, subtle nod). Don't trip on the podium. Still matching Amanda? Don't trip on the risers. Wait, don't open folder. My nose itches. Can't scratch. Can everyone see? Here's Cy. Everyone's clapping, smile. Listen for the pitch. Cy's on the podium. Now open your folder. Watch for the downbeat. Think pitch. Don't take your eyes off Cy.

Sometimes there are unexpected challenges. The Shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa in Doylestown, Pa., has been an annual stop for the past four years. It is beautiful but also very large. Echoes can be a problem and there is a significant sound time delay between the singers at the front of the church and the organ in the back. Staying together is the hardest part, even with the help of a conductor.

In 1999, a snowstorm made for disconcertingly smaller audiences at the Shrine and a concert that evening in Phoenixville, Pa., but the choir continued to perform with its usual enthusiasm. By the next morning, enough snow had fallen to cancel a school performance. The choir spent the morning helping church members shovel out and having snowball fights.

After every concert has been sung, every meal has been eaten, and every good-bye has been said, members pile back onto the bus. There is often a sense of sadness at the end of the five-day tour. Although



Vincent M. Magnotta '02: 1979-1999

The dates are not fair, but, unfortunately, they are correct. Vincent Mark Magnotta '02, unfortunately, died at the age of 20 on November 16, 1999, following complications from adrenal cancer. But the example he set in dealing with his illness continues to provide inspiration to his family, friends and others.

A graduate of Emmaus High School, Magnotta was an information systems major at Susquehanna. He was a member of Phi Mu Delta fraternity and played rugby during his freshman year. He was the son of Vincent and Debbie Magnotta of Wescosville, Pa., who also have two younger children, Lauren, 18 and Zach, 9.

With the help of Susquehanna alumnus **Rich Sutter '99,** Vince started a Web site to share his experiences with his friends. Today the site also includes, "Gifts from Our Angel,"Vince's father's story of his son's illness, including a poem by **Adam Cole '02.** It is one family's candid story of living with cancer – from "the traumas of bad news after bad news," to the laughter shared by Vince, who could joke as easily about his 50-stitch incision as the antics of his pet chinchilla.

Vince's illness began last summer with a broad spectrum of physical and psychological symptoms that eventually led to diagnosis of adrenal carcinoma in September. This cancer overproduces natural hormones, including cortisone, which influence behavior.

Ironically, Vince told his father, "the emotional pain 1 felt during the mental illnesses far exceeds any physical pain 1 have experienced – including the 50-stitch major surgery to remove the tumor." In the last weeks of his life, Vince made a passionate plea for greater understanding and effective medical treatment for people suffering from mental illnesses. He made plans to volunteer in hospitals and talk to community groups about cancer and mental illness. "He wanted to use his experience to help others," writes the elder Magnotta.

It was just one example of Vince's strength and determination in the face of seemingly impossible odds. "He didn't want pity. In fact, he worked hard to keep people at ease," writes his father.

Vince was also able to make a difference as an organ donor - donating his corneas and as the inspiration for a fund that has raised nearly \$6,000 for adrenal cancer research at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. The family has asked that further fundraising efforts be directed to Susquehanna in Vince's memory to the Office of Development, Susquehanna University, 514 University Avenue, Selinsgrove, PA 17870.

The Quest for Feelingfulness

here's a word Susquehanna University Choir Director **Cyril Stretansky** uses to express the result of intense participation in any applied fine art: Feelingfulness.

"It's the humbling of one's self, the complete submission of one's self to the art."

When the art is singing, the result can be sublime for the vocal artists and their audiences. And one of the best ways for Susquehanna alumni and friends to experience the music is through the Choir's annual tour – one of the premier outreach programs for the Susquehanna Department of Music.

This year's tour will take choir members on a six-state trip from St. Johnsbury, Vt., to Harrisonburg in southern Virginia. Along the way the group will perform in 13 different venues, including a firstever performance in the prestigious artist series sponsored by Abington Presbyterian Church outside suburban Philadelphia.

Their audiences will hear a repertoire of religious and secular choral literature composed over the past five centuries. In previous years, the Choir has performed at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., and the Cathedral de Cuernavaca in Mexico, as well as in locations throughout Europe including Austria's Salzburg Cathedral, England's Coventry Cathedral, Notre Dame de Paris, and St. Mark's Cathedral in Venice.

The choir has also been featured nationally on National Public Radio, the Satellite Radio Network and the worldwide Armed Forces Network. Members recently recorded "Aeternain," the 14th volume in the choir's recording series.

The group's accomplishments of the past 28 years have been under the baton of Stretansky. A professor of music and the director of choral activities at Susquehanna, he is widely known in the greater Northeast as well as Canada, Mexico and Italy as a guest conductor, choral music educator, and bass-baritone soloist. He recently completed an extended tenure as music director and conductor of the Susquehanna Valley Chorale and Orchestra.

Currently 55 voices strong, the group ranges in size from 50 to 56 students selected by audition. "Part of what is so exciting about the program is that it exists for everyone – music and non-music majors alke," stresses Stretansky. To allow members to also participate in other arts organizations and activities on campus, rehearsals and performances are deliberately limited – the choir turned down 13 concert invitations this year alone. The group performs at Family Weekend and the annual Christmas Candlelight Service in the fall. Members give up their spring break and two other weekends during spring semester for the annual tour. A hack-to-campus concert wraps up the season each April.

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Choir Manager Mark Yerger 'oo helps load the tour bus. Sharing the experience makes for a tight-knit group. "There's an intrinsic growth to committing yourself to the group and a common objective and then realizing and reveling in your accomplishment," says **Mark Yerger '00**, a business and economics major who is a member of the chamber singers and manager of the choir. "There's also a feeling that you are doing a service for the University."

The annual tour has become a prime way to connect and communicate with alumm. It is also important in helping recruit prospective students who often receive personal invitations to hear the group sing or even join members for a meal on the road. Many choir members and alumni cite tour performances by the choir and Stretausky's frequent appearances as a guest conductor at high school choral festivals as positively influencing their decisions to attend Susquehanna.

And for current students, the tour translates into a very big learning experience, says Stretansky. The challenge is "to be in the actual recreation process – to bring music to life in different acoustic settings and in multiple performances, with the same exacting discipline and commitment," he says. "That's what we're about."

Along the way it can make for some logistics that go way beyond making music. Scheduling, publicity, and transportation arrangements for people and their instrumental accessories are time-consuming necessities. Concert proceeds cover the costs of the annual trip. And for Stretansky, "other duties as defined" have included a 2 a.m. stint waiting for the tour bus to get pulled out of a ditch during a snowstorm. "It's all part of what it's like to be on tour," he says.

Tour host organizations donate meals and lodging for choir members. "Meeting and staying with the host families was definitely a highlight," said **Steve Bishop '02**, who toured with the group for the first time in 1998. "It was great to meet people who were part of the audience and see their reactions to the performance."

Concert goers often include alumni who have sung with the choir in the past. "Sitting in the audience, I always feel very proud," says **Cheryl LeVan '97**. "It tugs at my heartstrings slightly to know that I am no longer a part of it."



AACSB Reaffirms Business School Accreditation

ACSB – The International Association for Management Education – reaffirmed the accreditation of the Sigmund Weis School of Business in April.

"This news enhances the value of a business degree from Susquehanna and carries a message of quality for the entire University," said **James Brock**, dean of the school.

Susquehanna is one of just a few private, undergraduate-only institutions to receive AACSB accreditation, which is based on such factors as quality of faculty, quality and rigor of the curriculum, facilities, financial resources and mission.

The report of the 2000 visiting team specifically commended the:

- outstanding new classroom and office space in the University's \$6 million hightechnology Business and Communications Building opened in 1999,
- energetic and dedicated faculty,
- outstanding leadership by the dean,
- strong and enthusiastic support of the business community,
- · very effective internship program, and

Brock credited the contributions of faculty as well as members of Sigmund Weis School Advisory Board and other Susquehanna alumni who have helped support the school and its students as speakers and mentors, sources of internship and job opportunities, and their financial contributions.

"The two most important things AACSB looks for are programs that are mission-driven and an attitude of continuous improvement," says Brock. "We're proud of what we've done, but this is a milepost, not a destination. There are areas where we can continue to work to improve."

Issues which the AACSB has asked the school to pursue include continued development of faculty publishing in refereed academic publications, assurance that all majors take at least half their work outside the business school, introduction of new programs including the new information systems major, and continued hiring of new business faculty with doctorates.

University Sets 2000-2001 Tuition, Fees

Susquehanna University's board of directors has approved an increase in tuition and fees for the 2000-2001 academic year.

Comprehensive fees for the year – which include tuition and fees, room and board – will be \$26,210. The \$990 increase is 3.9 percent of current fees.

"As the costs associated with providing a first-rate education for our students have risen, we have made every effort to keep tuition increases as low as possible," said University President Joel Cunningham. "Susquehanna University has never been a stronger institution. The past decade has brought steady growth in academic quality, increased enrollments, and enhanced facilities. We are grateful for the outstanding success of the University's current capital fundraising campaign, which is helping to provide valuable new resources for teaching and learning."

Over the past five years, the increase in Susquehanna's comprehensive fees has averaged 3.58 percent annually, which is modest in relation to many other colleges.



Faculty Obituaries

N.J.C. Vasantkumar

Professor of Sociology and Anthropology Nallamotu J. C. "Kumar" Vasantkumar, died January 28, 2000, at his Selinsgrove home following a brief illness. A member of the Susquehanna University faculty for 18 years, he earned his bachelor's degree in chemical technology from Andhra University, India, the master of divinity degree from Princeton Theological Seminary, and the master of arts and Ph.D. in sociology from Princeton University. He was awarded National Endowment for the Humanities grants enabling him to attend programs at Duke and Harvard universities and he received a Fulbright grant to attend a summer seminar in China in 1988. In 1994-1995, he taught at Miyazaki International College in Japan and was a visiting scholar at the East-West Center of the University of Hawau in Honolulu. His scholarly interests included social change, postmodernism, and the social and cultural contexts of humor. Over the years, he also served as advisor to the Sociology Club and was a frequent reader at services in Weber Chapel. Among the survivors are his widow, Joan, and his son, Christopher.

He spent last summer on an internship studying denitrification in wetland soils for the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center (SERC) in Washington, D.C. "The wetland soils that I worked on last summer and will be working on at SERC again this summer are similar in nature to the hyporheic sediments in Australia," says Szuch."My expertise fit very nicely with Dr. Boulton's plans."

"To be funded for a year of independent research as a recent undergraduate is phenomenal," says Szuch. "I will be gaining the ideas and practices of several foreign scientists, as Dr. Boulton has recruited a team of international experts for his project."

Szuch plans to attend graduate school after his Fulbright work, likely for soil science or water resources. "Eventually, I want to work in wetland mitigation and construction. My specific goal is to design wetlands that improve water quality. Such wetlands act as natural filters of agricultural or urban runoff."

Bruce Nary

Professor Emeritus of Theatre Bruce L. Nary, died February 4, 2000, at his Selinsgrove home following an extended illness. He was a member of the Susquehanna University faculty for more than 30 years, before his retirement in 1991. He served in the U.S. Army Air Corps and then earned a bachelor of science degree from Ithaca College, and the master of arts and Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. He devoted his career to advancing recognition of the arts at Susquehanna. He directed scores of theatre productions, including children's theatre productions which toured the Selinsgrove area. Nary also taught "History of British Theatre" in the Susquehanna at Oxford Program in 1977. He was an active member of Susquehanna's Artist Series Committee and the local unit of the American Cancer Society, serving as campus coordinator of "Daffodil Days" each spring. He is survived by his widow, Dorla, and other family members.

Javelin Newcomer Qualifies for Nationals

oaches and teammates alike already knew senior Adam Ressler '00 was one of the best athletes on the Crusader track and field team - one who was going to make a hid to become the school's first national qualifier in the decathalon. Still, Ressler's true event was the high jump, winning the 1999 MAC indoor championship and qualifying for the 1998 NCAA Division III Outdoor Championships as he tied the school record with a leap of 6-9. That WAS his best event - until this season that is. While he's still the team's top high jumper with a season best of 6-6 twice (NCAA Div. III Provisional Qualifying Height: 6-7), he's become the school and one of Division III's top javelin throwers. Ressler broke the school modern era record and automatically qualified for nationals while winning the Javelin on April 8 at the Messiah Invitational with a throw of 206-11. That throw ranks him second in Division III this season - pretty good for an athlete who didn't even throw the javelin for most of his first two years in college, and only threw it in his semior year of high school. He's already won the event twice

this year – also throwing 190-2 to initially provisionally qualify for nationals at the Roanoke Invitational. The national championships will be held Thursday through Saturday, May 18-20, at North Central College in Naperville, Ill.

Caruso '65, to evaluate what such an award truly means."1 think achievement should be measured on a weighted basis," he says "All of us are given varying degrees of gifts. "Maybe 1 haven't accomplished a whole lot in proportion to what I've been given."

Caruso came to Susquehanna from Atlantic City, New Jersey, and found out early on what it was like to be part of a winning team. And Caruso candidly refers to his latest endeavor, Interactive Investor International, as "the best financial web site in Europe." He was a finalist for the New Jersey state Entrepreneur of the Year Award in 1995.



hey were hot, tired, exhilarated, and apprehensive. The last thing incoming class of 1999 students and their parents expected when they filed into Weber Chapel for opening convocation in August 1995 was 51-year-old University President Joel **Cunningham** making his public debut on the cello as an "audio-visual aid" to his welcoming remarks.

But play he did, and the performance has resonated ever since.

In sharing his own experience, "he made it okay for every kid here to take a risk, to try something new," said Dean of Student Life **Dorothy Anderson '62**. "It was pretty bad – he told us it would be

bad," recalls **Abby Byrnes '99.** "But it was the first time I had ever seen him or heard him speak and it was pretty cool. We were wondering if he was going to play at graduation."

FIVE YEARS LATER and a bit more accomplished as an amateur cellist, Cunningham will leave Susquehanna in July to become president and vice chancellor at the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn. His wife, Trudy, who has played her own key role in Susquehanna campus life in addition to being an associate dean of engineering at nearby Bucknell University, will join Sewanee as a senior consultant for admissions and advising. Both will serve as speakers and receive honorary degrees at Susquehanna's 2000 commencement. (See story, page 24)

The move is in many ways a return to roots for the Cunninghams, who have known and loved Sewanee for most of their lives. Joel, a native of Oak Ridge, Tenn., will be at the helm of a nationally ranked liberal arts college with 1,300 undergraduates and 100 graduate students in a theological school affiliated with the Episcopal Church. He will also serve as mayor for the town of Sewanee which encompasses the 10,000-acre campus on the Cumberland Plateau.

"Our twenty-plus years at Susquehanna have been great ones for us and for our daughters," Joel wrote to campus friends. "The choice for us between staying here and going there was a nearly impossible one between strongly attractive alternatives. In the end, we have decided to accept the new challenge." "A University That Knows Itself" The Cunninghams first came to Susquehanna in 1979 when Joel was named vice president for academic affairs and professor of mathematical sciences. He became the University's 13th president in 1984 and has built an enduring legacy in the past two decades.

Under Cunningham's leadership, the University endowment has increased from \$4 million to more than \$92 million, an accomplishment that has involved "friendraising as well as fund-raising," in the words of **Harold O'Connor**, former chair of the University board of directors.

The percentage of faculty holding doctorates has grown from 65 percent in 1985 to 91 percent today. Nearly ten percent of the faculty are members of minority groups and 38 percent are women. The size, quality and diversity of the student body has also grown. In 1985, there were 1,400 students; today there are 1,639. Strategic planning is in place to support and encourage a gradual growth to 1,800 students by 2004.

The period has also seen new academic programs, including the 1999 realignment creating the School of Natural and Social Sciences and School of Arts, Humanities and Communications. The Sigmund Weis School of Business, formed in 1983, has recently had its accreditation reaffirmed by the AACSB - The International Association for Management Education. Library holdings have increased, and new information technology has enhanced teaching and learning. Fully wired since 1994, Susquehanna was among the first colleges of its size to install a campus-wide network. "Joel had a desire to improve the

institution's academic reputation in a way that would be fiscally sound," says Associate Professor of Accounting Jerrell Habegger. "I think he has done the correct balancing of the demands of various constituencies."

Cunningham has led two highly successful capital campaigns, the still unfinished current campaign has already raised more than \$46 million on an original goal of \$35 million. Campaign gifts have enabled the University to invest nearly \$60 million in new and renovated facilities touching virtually every aspect of campus – from academic and residence halls, to a new gallery and theater and a major sports/fitness complex currently under construction. Today Susquehanna is recognized in many guidebooks to selective colleges as one of the best small universities in the Northeast.

"Joel's legacy is a stable, well-established, growing university that is fiscally sound and well-positioned for the future," says O'Connor. "We are a University that knows itself well and Joel really helped to establish that very firmly."

"A Much, Much Better School" "When I graduated in 1978 I felt very well prepared," says Selinsgrove attorney **Karen Hackman '78 Mendonca**. "But I think Susquehanna is a much, much better school today," she adds. Mendonca also expresses pride in the way Cunningham has encouraged close ties between the University and the community with initiatives such as volunteer programs and the annual Latino Symposium.

He has also enlarged the University's visibility to the world with activities including past presidencies of the Society for Values in Higher Education and Sigma Chi fraternity (international), and the establishment of academic exchange programs with Yaroslavl University in Russia and Senshu University in Japan.

Drowning in Mail

"Just the volume of mail alone that comes into the office would be enough to drown most people," says **Philip Winger**, who has served as assistant to the president for the past ten years.

"In the course of a day Joel can go from being a tough negotiator with architects and contractors to speaking at Rotary to chairing a hospital board meeting to giving a eulogy to listening to students' concerns during open office hours to playing the cello with the orchestra," says Winger. "All that after running on the Isle of Que in the morning, eating lunch in the cafeteria, and stopping to pick up trash on his way across campus."

"Allergic to Red Ink"

His reputation for attention to detail and careful planning has paid off. The University has had a balanced budget for 21 years – including several in the early 1990s when the declining pool of collegeage students forced an uncomfortable dip in enrollment. "He established fiscal conservatism," said Hal O'Connor. "We were allergic to red ink."

The approach has led to what many see as one of the hallmarks of Cunningham's presidency. "We haven't had crises," says Phil Winger. "And it's not because we lived in some sort of magical time. It's because it is his leadership style to provide a margin of safety."

Eclectic Activities

The style is enhanced by his precise, articulate communication skills and often selfdeprecating sense of humor. And by Trudy Cunningham, who has embraced the role of Susquehanna's "first lady" with warmth, enthusiasm, and friendship to countless students, faculty, staff and alumni. "She has a way of finding people in need and responding with shelter or food or a kind word," says Winger.

And despite the administrative duties, Joel has "never disappeared from the students," says Dean Anderson. His eclectic activities have included rowing with the University crew, carving turkeys for students at the annual Thanksgiving dinner, crowning homecoming queens, and volunteering in community service with first-year students. Early in his tenure as

president he also continued to teach, and has admitted to personally visiting a residence hall room to wake at least one student late for an 8 a.m. Fundamentals of Math class.

"He is a very good listener," sums up Abby Byrnes, a former student member of the board of directors who is now a graduate student in immunology at the University of Pittsburgh. "When I talked to him, I always felt that he was thinking about what I had to say."

Last April, King captured the Encouragement Award at a New York-based international competition sponsored by the Licia Albanese-Puccini Foundation, which fosters

the talent of budding opera stars, "It's like an honorable mention," explains King, who vied against approximately 300 top-flight vocalists. "This was the third year I participated, and the first time I won anything, so I'm improving. It's a matter of the older you get, the better you get."

King, who took her first formal singing lessons at Susquehanna University, is a member of the Central Florida Lyric Opera, a training company in Orlando, where she also serves as the arts administrator. However, King hopes to leave administrative work behind soon, supporting herself entirely by singing. "Hopefully, that's what I'll be doing full time," she says with determination. "Nothing else."

Singing professionally takes more than talent and persistence, though, King notes. It also requires substantial money for travel to auditions. "An opera singer can live anywhere," she jokes. "As long as it's near an airport." Happily, King says, the Albanese-Puccini Foundation award, a monetary prize, will help further her goals.

She adds that last year's win was not her first major success in competition. In 1998, she placed third at the regional level of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. "That was quite an accomplishment and something that very few singers do," she says, adding that winners at the national level generally secure a contract to sing with the Met – which happens to be King's dream.

Meanwhile, King will continue to practice, compete and, on Sundays, share her talents with a Leesburg, Fla., congregation, as part of her work with the Lyric Opera. Singing in church, King explains, has its own rewards. "It's something I've always done," she says. "It's kind of satisfying."

She has served as advisor to the campus chapter of the Sigma Alpha lota International music fraternity for many years. She received the Alumni Association Award for Service In 1990. The University named Isaacs Auditorium in Seibert Hall in honor of Louise and Larry Isaacs in 1992.

This period of study was covered by my article in the July 1962 issue of the *Susquehanna Alumnus*. I believe that I was S.U.'s first Fulbright recipient.

I have been following the stories about the Fulbright Scholars that have been appearing in *Susquehauna Today* with great interest and thought perhaps you might be ready for another one.

My husband, Leonard Carlson, graduated from Susquehanna University in 1953 with a B.S. Degree in Music. Upon gradnation, he enrolled at Union Theological Seminary, New York City, in the Master of Sacred Music Program. This was a two-year degree program from which Leonard received an S.M.M. Degree in May of 1955.

During his second year at Union Seminary he applied for and won a Fulbright Scholarship to study organ and harpsichord at the Statliche Hochschulefur Musick, Frankfurt-am-Main, Germany.

Upon Leonard's return from Germany he decided to build pipe organs and estabhshed his own company in East Greenbush. New York. In the last 40 years he has built 180 organs, including one in 1999 at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in Shamokin Dam, Pennsylvania.

\$7.5 Million Grant Will Fund New Music and Art Center

he Degenstein Foundation in Sunbury has awarded the University a grant of \$7.5 million, payable over the next five years, for the construction of a new music and art center. According to the foundation, the award recognizes the accomplishments of former President Joel Cunningham, the distinguished career of Professor of Music and Choral Director Cyril Stretansky, and their commitment to bringing the fine arts to Susquehanna students and residents of the region.

In addition to combining music and art programs under one roof, the new center will provide contemporary teaching facilities, room for growing numbers of students, and more flexible practice and performance space, including a new 320-seat concert hall.

Help Celebrate 100 Years of Music at SU

The Department of Music will mark its 100th year with a Centennial Celebration Luncheon at noon, followed by an alummi recital at 1:30 on **Sunday, October 8**, in the Campus Center as part of Susquehanna's Homecoming 2000. For reservations or further information, please call 570-372-4115. The project will include renovation of the core of the current music facility, Heilman Hall, removal of its current practice wing, and the addition of new structures to its east and west sides.

Music courses were added to Susquehanna's curriculum in 1881, and an early emphasis on performance was later complemented by the development of music education programs to prepare public school music teachers and supervisors. First certified by the state in 1928, these programs remain one of the Department of Music's strengths today.

Art was first offered around the turn of the 20th century. The addition of art and art history majors in 1989 and 1990, construction of the Lore Degenstem Gallery in 1993, and ongoing acquisition of gifts to the permanent collection have all helped bring art to a new level of interest and awareness on campus and in the community.

The new center will facilitate collaborations between performing and visual artists and create additional opportunities for community outreach. Art facilities will occupy the east-face addition, providing first-rate space for instruction in photography, graphic design and drawing, as well as art history.

Plans for the Department of Music, which will occupy the west-face addition, include new practice rooms and studios, renovated classrooms and technology labs, and the new performance and rehearsal hall.

Construction of the new facility is anticipated to begin within the next two to three years, and possibly as early as spring 2001.

Campaign Tops \$58.5 Million

The Susquehanna 2000: The Next Challenge capital campaign climbed this summer to \$58.5 million, more than \$16.5 million past its \$42 million goal.

As of June 30, 2000, the capital campaign had raised a total of \$58,545,804, including \$20.6 million for scholarship endowments to bring the University total endowment value to more than \$93 million. The campaign has funded construction of Shobert, Isaacs, and Roberts residence halls and construction of a high-technology center for the entire campus and home of the Signund Weis School of Business and the Department of Communications. On July 20, the building was formally named Apfelbaum Hall in honor of Sidney Apfelbaum, a member of the University board of directors and a long-time friend of Charles Degenstein.

It has also funded an ongoing \$14 million construction and renovation of sports and fitness facilities, including the new Nicholas A. Lopardo Stadium, scheduled to open in September; the Clyde P. Jacobs Fitness Center, set to open in November; and a new 51,000 square-foot field house to open in fall 2001. (See page 6.)

Campaign celebrations slated this fall include the September 23 dedication of the Lopardo Stadium and an October 28 Campaign Celebration coinciding with Family Weekend and dedication of the Jacobs Fitness Center.

Designed to serve both football and track, the new stadium will provide seating capacity for 3,500 spectators, an eight-lane, quarter-mile track, a concession stand, and a press box. The new Clyde P. Jacobs Fitness Center will open in November of 2000. The glass-fronted, 9,300-square-foot, two-level addition to O.W. Houts Gymnasium will feature selectorized weight-training machines and aerobic fitness equipment. It will also include a new student lounge with café dining.

Construction is also underway for a new, 51,000-square-foot field house with a sixlane, 200-meter indoor track, four multipurpose playing courts for basketball, tennis and volleyball, and indoor team practice space for field sports. The facility is slated to open in August of 2001.

Celebrating Another National Champion in the Javelin

Susquehanna senior Adam Ressler '00 became the 2000 NCAA Division 111 national champion in the javelin in May as he set a new school modern record on his second throw of 221-6 to win by nearly 14feet at the outdoor championships at North Central College in Naperville, 111.

Despite not throwing the javelin for most of his first two collegiate seasons, Ressler became the seventh Crusader men's track and field national champion and the school's second javelin national champion in three years. Janée Shaner won the women's title in the event in 1998. Both earned their medals under Jim Taylor, who has been head coach for men's track and field for 22 years, and is also an assistant coach in the women's program.

Former Susquehanna standout **Cris Delbaugh '92** is in his ninth year as the Susquehanna throwing coach and has now coached two national champions and four All-Americans in the javelin. Delbaugh has had men's javelin throwers qualify for nationals in each of the last four seasons.



pilot program to offer children from broken families "a sense of normalcy in their lives" has earned **Barbara Smith '68 Norton** of Brunswick, Maine, the Y2K Achievement citation from the Maine American Association of University Women (AAUW).

The award recognizes her role as co-founder of "Home to Home," which provides a safe place for divorced or separated parents to exchange children for visitation without face-to-face encounters. The project has become a model for additional programs in Maine and other parts of the country.

"It's actually very simple," explains Norton. "We have separate parking lots and separate waiting rooms, fully manned by volunteers who take children from one parent to another."The Brunswick Naval Air Station donates space for the program, which is funded through grants and operates on a "lean and mean budget" with only one paid part-time employee.

The biggest challenge has been the idea that we took a completely new idea and made it work through volunteerism, says Norton. "Watching that happen and seeing' it continue to happen is the reward."

The wife of John A. Norton '67, a senior development officer at Bowdoin College, Barbara Norton has played an active role in cultural, economic and charitable projects in mid-coast Maine for more than 20 years, Her extensive volunteer work includes a term as past president of the Maine State Music Theater. She has also taken her energies abroad as part of a team that built a medical clinic and camp cabin in two villages in Honduras.

Heavily involved with the Home to Home program for its first three years, Norton still assists with grants and fund-raising while she pursues her career as parttime marketing consultant. She is also completing a historic home renovation.

How Campus-Community Connections Enrich the Region and Enhance the Value of a Susquehanna Education

Who would guess the first Saturday of a freshman's college days would be spent helping out at the local food bank, cleaning a homeless shelter or visiting nursing home patients? But this year, as in the previous six, incoming Susquehanna University students will spend half a day during orientation volunteering in Selinsgrove and neighboring towns.

"It helps introduce our students to the community and vice versa right off the bat," says Deborah Woods, Susquehanna's director of volunteer programs and service learning. The day also introduces them to the many opportunities and advantages of volunteering. a philosophy consistent with life at Susquehanna. Typically about two-thirds of the student body participate in community service in any given academic year. Their efforts help to strengthen the ties between the University and the community, and at the same time, positively impact the value of an SU education.

"Volunteering adds a dimension to campus life here that otherwise kids miss out on." savs Brian Bush '02 who was named the University's 2000 Volunteer of the Year for his work with the Computer Consultants and Arts Alive volunteer projects. "It gives students and educational community members the chance to be able to meet people and have experiences that you can't replicate."

A Guiding Value

The experience is consistent with the University's commitment to serving as "a valuable resource for its community and region, but also connected to the larger world," as clearly stated among the guiding values outlined in Planning Priorities for Susquehanna University 1998-2004.

"I don't know how many colleges were founded where the local townspeople built the walkway that connected the first building to the town," says Sara Kirkland, acting president. "It isn't accidental that we still have a pretty strong presence in this community. The feedback we get is that the community appreciates that and welcomes it.'

Susquehanna is also fortunate to have found many strong supporters within the community. Among the strongest is The Degenstein Foundation, which has provided funding for many recent initiatives including development of SU4U, a mentoring and scholarship program

for regional students with substantial financial need who are the first in their families to consider college. The partnership between Susquehanna and the foundation will encourage area middle school students in the pursuit of higher education and provide significant scholarships to five graduating high school seniors each year.

"Part of the reason the foundation is interested in us is because we're interested in this region," stresses Kirkland.

A Learning Resource

Susquehanna is also interested in providing learning resources for audiences other than college students. Continuing Education programs include a variety of experiences designed for children through senior citizens, including non-credit Susquehanna SPEC-TRUM courses. Special initiatives, supported by the Degenstein Foundation and others, provide additional opportunities.

This summer, area students aged 7 to 18 obtained hands-on learning in the arts in three week-long non-residential seminars taught by SU theatre majors. Susquehanna student performers and technicians, selected workshop participants, and others also staged a semi-professional summer repertory performance of *Romeo and Juliet*. The performance featured a cast that included, among others, an area minister and a local high school sophomore.



In another example, the Degenstein Foundation is funding a mobile environmental laboratory that will be used to help elementary, middle and high school students in area school districts study and help preserve the Susquehanna River Basin and the Chesapeake Bay watershed area.

The development of cross-cultural initiatives, such as Susquehanna's ongoing Latino Symposium, is another way the University serves as a resource. The event features an annual series of workshops, panel presentations and performances for area Latino high school students. "It's an attempt to build bridges between the different constituencies and provide a strengthening of ties on campus between Latino and Anglo students," says Associate Professor of Spanish Leona Martin.

Faculty as Service Role Models

Collectively, these efforts help Susquehanna to create and support a community that welcomes, involves and engages students while providing additional opportunities for learning. Many faculty and staff serve in community leadership positions and extend the boundaries of their classrooms into the community, where students explore issues, conduct research, and exchange information.

One of the newest examples is a collaborative study of the extreme environment created by the underground mine fires in Centralia, Pa. Partly funded by a \$95,000 grant by the Merck Foundation, the project involves students and faculty from different scientific disciplines. "The students participating will, by the very nature of the project, be introduced to fundamental relationships between biology, chemistry, geology, and the environment," says Assistant Professor Chris Janzen, head of the chemistry department.

Another group of students, working with Degenstein Professor of History **Donald Housley**, is assisting a local Selinsgrove committee to identify structures of historical significance. "The students do the legwork, driving to the county courthouses to search the deeds of all of the properties," says Housley. "They're getting a lesson in exhaustive research, since Snyder County has gone through four county changes and deed searches must be done at all four county courthouses."

Other Susquehanna students gain experience as they help design and conduct the activities for a highly successful "Saturday Science" program, created by Associate Professor of Biology **Jack Holt** and former Associate Professor of Education **Pat Nelson**. The project encourages parental involvement with their elementary and early middle school-aged children in the science labs on Susquehanna's campus and in nearby fields, streams and woods.

Carrying on the Tradition

Many Susquehanna students carry on the tradition of service after graduation. According to 1997 statistics compiled by the Office of Alumni Relations, 7.7 percent of 13,000 alumni of record make their homes in the Susquehanna Valley. Many take active roles that further strengthen the ties between the University and the region.

"We have deep roots in this region. We're a major employer with valuable resources in people and facilities. We have benefited greatly from the generosity of this region, and we recognize that we have an obligation to share what we have with our neighbors," says Kirkland. "If you're going to be of service it just makes sense to start in your own back yard."



imerudi mpaka Amerika. I have returned to America," writes Kristen Costenbader '92 who recently completed a two-year stint as a teacher in Kenya with the Peace Corps. We're sharing excerpts of a letter from Kristen, who is now teaching in Virginia.

"If you look on a map of Kenya and go west to the shores of Lake Victoria, you'll see where I lived. The village was called Nyang'ande, surrounded by rice fields and mud huts ... My kids ranged in ages from 14 to 23 years of age. They were the children : of either rice farmers or fishermen, so I was always promised a big 'ngege' fresh from the lake and plate of "wali" from the family's farm whenever I had lunch at a student's house. The tribe was Luo - the third largest tribe in Kenya and by far the friendliest (granted, I am a little biased).

'So what made my two years in Africa so wonderful? My students because when I made them laugh, the whole classroom was illuminated by their smiles. The mamas if anyone bothered me, a mama was always there to wag her finger at him and make sure I was okay ... My cat - she killed all the snakes that slithered into my house and the rats that would try to eat my potatoes. The sunsets - you have to see them to believe them. Bike taxis - best transportation in Kenya... Letters from my friends and family back home - thanks to you all. Watching the mzungu (white lady) read her letters outside the village "post office" was a favorite past time for the local children. They especially liked it when I came across something amusing and began laughing - they would join in as well.

Still, I am enjoying being back amongst bagels, Snapple, running water and electricity. I have spent countless hours flipping switches on and off just to watch the light."

Nice Guy with a Guitar A fier wrapping up a world tour with guitar legend Steve Vai, Dave Weiner '98 has two things at the top of his 'to do'' list: getting back to his own band and staying a nice guy. Vai himself reinforced the importance of the latter. "He taught me a lot about touring, how to act around press and how to treat fans and local crews. The whole lesson is to be warm and make people feel appreciated," says Weiner.

Weiner has been playing guitar since he was 8 years old. At age 15, he was determined to attend the Guitar Institute of Technology (GIT) in Los Angeles after high school. His parents, Jane and Meyer Weiner of Wyomissing, Pa., struck a deal: college education first, then GIT. In college, Dave spent a semester abroad studying international finance, earned his SU degree in accounting, and then headed to Los Angeles in 1998.

While interning at an entertainment management firm, Weiner met Vai, who heard the Susquehanna graduate's demo tape and phoned one Friday afternoon. "I'd like you to play guitar on my tour. Show up on Monday with these (18) songs ready and your guitar," recalls Weiner. The tour took Weiner and the band to Japan, New Zealand, and Europe, but perhaps the performance that had the most impact on Weiner was much closer to home. "When I played Philly and my friends and family came and saw I was living my dream, that's when it hit me."

Back in LA, Weiner is focusing on his own band. "My dream now is to hear my own music on the radio, see my own video, make my own record." Songwriting and rehearsing don't pay all the bills so Weiner teaches guitar. And that degree that mom and dad were so insistent on him getting, it seems to be coming in handy: Weiner now also works in the accounting department of Favored Nations Records.



Enrollment sets New Record for Sixth Straight Year

Marking the University's largest enrollment for the sixth year in a row, Susquehanna opened the 2000-01 academic year with about 1,660 fulltime students, topping last year's record total of 1,639. Five hundred twenty-two new students, including 492 first-year and 30 transfers, began Susquehanna's 143rd academic year with a traditional convocation on August 24.

Harry Potter Lessons A Defense Against Dark Arts

The following opinion piece by Assistant Professor of Philosophy and Classical Studies Anne Collins Smith appeared in seven newspapers in four states following distribution by the Scripps Howard News Service.

he Harry Potter books have captivated children, yet can be chilling to adults. Within the context of the stories, magic is real and may be used as a force for good or evil. In the course of Harry's studies at Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry, we read about curses, spells, hexes, and other negative forms of magic known collectively as the Dark Arts.

Adults may take heart in knowing that the Harry Potter books vehemently discourage the darkness they describe. More important, the reference to darkness is actually necessary as an integral component of their powerful moral lesson.

These disturbing elements clearly depicted as evil are necessary because the Harry Potter books are more than just the adventures of a boy studying to become a wizard. They contain an allegorical struggle between the forces of good and evil. In the course of this struggle, the reader learns many things: the importance of loyalty, integrity, and courage; the usefulness of book knowledge, experiential learning and hard-won wisdom; and the power of love. These qualities do not simply make Harry Potter a well-adjusted individual – they save his life.

It is understandable that parents want to shield their children from representations of evil. But children already know very well that there are dark and scary things in this world. They need to hear that these dark and scary things can be overcome. As C.S. Lewis observes, "by confining your child to blameless stories of child life in which nothing at all alarning ever happens, you would fail to banish the terrors, and would succeed in banishing all that can ennoble them or make them endurable." Readers are cheated of the message they need to hear when the hero defeats only a straw man. In order for the message to be effective, in order for the battle between good and evil to be decisive

and convincing, genuine good must conquer genuine evil.

l agree that evil and death are not a necessary component of children's literature in general. The Hundred-Acre Wood does not need a bear-slaying demon, nor do Madeleine and her friends need to fall into the clutches - or cookpots - of Hannibal Lecter. But in a certain class of literature, for a certain age of children, both the presence and the satisfactory vanquishing of genuine evil are necessary. Stories such as C.S. Lewis' Chronicles of Narnia, Lloyd Alexander's Chronicles of Prydain, and Susan Cooper's Dark is Rising sequence draw their power from a battle between good and evil. Because the evil to be defeated is powerful and cunning, the hero must inevitably grow

and become a better person in order to fight it successfully. Thus, while reading an exciting adventure, the reader also absorbs lessons of virtue and maturity. Moreover, it is a common pattern in such books for the hero to be an ordinary person, an Everyman (or, in the cases under discussion, an Everychild) with whom the reader can identify. Thus the abstract message "Good can overcome evil" is enriched and personalized, becoming "Someone like me can overcome evil."

These are important moral lessons for our children to learn and apply to our everyday world. After all, what are Lord Voldemort's weapons? Prejudice, intolerance, and contempt for those who are different; abuse of the weak by the strong; greed, fear, and ignorance. Lord Voldemort's weapons exist in our world as well as in the world of the Harry Potter books. A child who has read the Potter series is not only forewarned against these evils, but better-equipped to handle them.

Fulbright Exchange Teacher

Not as a Fulbright Scholar, but a Fulbright Exchange Teacher, I spent one of the most satisfying periods of my life, the academic year 1987-88, near Glasgow, Scotland. Happily, it was French 1 taught at Loudown Academy, because for the first four months I struggled to understand the pupils' broad Irvine Valley patois. Indeed, a fellow Fulbright Exchange Teacher from the U.S. whom I met during a student field trip to Normandy and Brittany wondered what language my colleagues were speaking. (English!)

After more than 30 years as a high school French teacher and foreign exchange program advisor, I retired in 1993. I spent five of the last seven years as a volunteer missionary (ELCA) at the Theological Seminary in Bratislava, Slovak Republic. My first tour was as lector of English; most recently I served for two and a half years as 'spiritualka,' or spiritual counselor to the seminarians. I returned this past July, needless to say, with rich memories of very special students, with memorable experiences and relationships forged.

SU Named a "Best College" for 7th Consecutive Year New Carnegie Classification May Affect Ranking

s Susquehanna welcomed the largest student body in its history to campus this fall, the University also ushered in another academic year with a top ranking in U.S. News & World Report's "Best Colleges" guidebook. For the seventh year in a row, Susquehanna is ranked number one among regional liberal arts colleges in the northeastern United States. As Acting President Sara Kirkland noted in her Family Weekend address, however, "we're not counting on an eighth year."

That's because the Carnegie classification system upon which U.S. News traditionally has based its ranking categories just underwent a major revision. The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching released the 2000 Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education in the fall. The new classification, which will be finalized in 2004, divides schools by number and types of degrees awarded, while the old system also attempted to include selectivity of admissions for liberal arts colleges. The classifications were developed in 1970 and last updated in 1994.

About 650 colleges and universities

changed categories in the new classification, including Susquehanna University. Susquehanna moved from a Baccalaureate II college in the 1994 edition to the newly named Baccalaureate Colleges-Liberal Arts category (known as Baccalaureate 1 colleges in the 1994 version). The main difference between the two categories is that institutions in the Baccalaureate Colleges-Liberal Arts category award at least half of their bachelor degrees in liberal arts fields while schools in the other category award less than half in the liberal arts.

Susquehanna's situation is unusual. "Because the percentage of degrees we've awarded in the liberal arts over the past few years has been so close to 50 percent, the foundation gave us the opportunity to choose which category we wanted to be in," said Kirkland. "It was a subject of much discussion on campus and with the board. We concluded that Baccalaureate-Liberal Arts is an appropriate reflection of our special blend of strong liberal arts programs enhanced by equally strong professional programs in areas like business, education and communications."



Pine Lawn, the university president's home built in 1929, underwent significant renovation last fall when two, two-story wings were added to create more functional living spaces and additional entertainment space for university events. The home's infrastructure was also upgraded, to include new wiring, telecommunications, plumbing and a new furnace. SU's board of directors began discussing the need to renovate nearly a year before the announcement by thenpresident Joel Cunningham that he intended to leave. The Cunninghams' departure in July provided an opportunity to make the needed changes before the January 2001 arrival of new President Jay Lemons, his wife, Marsha, and their family.

The change in Susquehanna's classification will most likely cause the University to be placed in a different category in U.S. News "America's Best Colleges" guidebook. although the publishers have not indicated how their ranking system will reflect the Carnegie changes. It is possible that Susquehanna will join a larger pool of liberal arts colleges, which in the past the guidebook has ranked as National Liberal Arts Colleges. "It's anybody's guess where Susquehanna might fall in future U.S. News rankings, but we felt it was more important to define the University as it is and expects to be, rather than focus on how it might affect our rankings in a college guidebook," Kirkland said.

There are 228 colleges in Carnegie's new Baccalaureate Colleges-Liberal Arts category, compared to 166 in the comparable 1994 grouping. In addition to Susquehanna, other Pennsylvania colleges in that category include Allegheny, Bryn Mawr, Bucknell, Dickinson, Franklin & Marshall, Gettysburg, Muhlenberg and Swarthmore.

Thomforde Named St. Olaf President

Former Susquehanna University Chaplain the Reverend Dr. Christopher M. Thomforde has been named the tenth president of St. Olaf College, a four-year liberal arts school with 2,950 students in Northfield, Minn., affiliated with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Since 1996, Thomforde has served as president of Bethany College, another ELCA college, in Lindsborg, Kan.

Thomforde earned an A.B. degree in medieval and Russian history from Princeton University in 1969 and a master of divinity from Yale University in 1974. He completed studies for his doctorate in nunistry from Princeton Theological Seminary while at Bethany College.

Thomforde has accepted Susquehanna's invitation to deliver the Baccalaureate sermon on May 13, 2001.

Musical Premiere Concludes Jewish-Christian Conference

ewish and Christian scholars and music lovers converged on the University campus Nov. 8 for a one-day conference on the Hebrew narrative known as the "Akedah" and the world premiere of a Susquehanna-commissioned musical work by well-known Jewish composer, conductor and teacher Simon Sargon

"The Search Unending, Jewish-Christian Dialogue and the Binding of Isaac" explored issues that have inspired and haunted the imaginations of artists and intellectuals for more than two millenia. In the Akedah narrative, told in The Bible's Genesis 22, God asks a father to kill his son, and the father presents himself as willing to obey. The story raises a number of issues for study – God, death, family and sacrifice – that are central not only to both Judaism and Christiamty, but to Islam as well.

For modern scholars and readers, the various attempts to unravel and understand the Akedah have also revealed the differences between religious traditions and between contemporary interpreters of the Bible. Those disagreements have flared recently into sometimes rancorous debate, according to Assistant Professor of English Laurence Roth, coordinator of Susquehanna University's Jewish Studies program, who co-chaired the event with Assistant Professor of Music Peter Dennee.

Conference attendees heard four eminent scholars from Jewish and Christian traditions discuss competing interpretations of the Biblical text. Morning session panelists were Carol Delaney, associate professor of cultural and social anthropology at Stanford University and author of Abraham on Trial: The Social Legacy of Biblical Myth, and Rabbi Reuven Firestone, professor of medieval Judaism and Islam, and director of the Louchheim School of Jewish Studies and the Department of Graduate Studies at Hebrew Umon College-Jewish Institute of Religion, Los Angeles and author of Journeys in Holy Lands: The Evolution of the Abraham-Ishmael Legends in Islamic Exegesis. An afternoon session featured Judith Banki, author and director of special programs at the Tanenbaum Center for Interreligious Understanding in New York City; and Dr. Eric Gritsch, emeritus professor of church history at Gettysburg Lutheran Seminary and author, editor and translator of 20 books including Lutheranism and Martin: God's

Court lester. An open dialogue followed.

University Chaplain the Rev. Mark Wm. Radecke, Assistant Professor of English Karen Bloom and Assistant Professor of Religion Karla Bohmbach served as moderators for the sessions.

The conference concluded with the preimere performance of "The Search Unending," a musical dramatic work for chorus, soloists and chamber ensemble comnussioned by Susquehanna University from Simon Sargon, director of music at Temple Emanu-El in Dallas, Texas, and professor of composition at Southern Methodist University. The text is taken from the Akedah with additional lyrics by the composer.

The 45-minute dramatic scene, performed by the Susquehanna University chorale and chamber ensemble under the direction of Peter Dennee, meditates on the search for understanding and faith that the story of the binding of Isaac continues to incite, Sargon's next composition project is

to be a work based on the Psalms for the 300th anniversary of Yale University.

Funding for the conference was made possible by a generous gift from **Sandra M. Rocks '75**, a member of the University's board of directors, and by the University departments, programs and offices of Academic Affairs; the Chaplain; Philosophy, Religion and Classical Studies; Music; Diversity Studies; Jewish Studies; Genocide-Holocaust Committee; and the School of Arts, Humanities and Communications.



Make Way for the New Caped Crusader

There's nothing like a new mascot to get the fans roaring!

And at Susquehanna, the Caped Crusader is becoming a crowd favorite as students and friends cheer the University's Crusader athletes on to victory.

Susquehanna teams have been without a costumed official mascot for many years, although they have been known as the Crusaders since the 1920s when Susquehanna athletic director, the late Luther Grossman, led a "crusade" to keep collegiate sports on an amateur basis.

Introduced to a very responsive crowd at October's homecoming foothall game, the Susquehanna Caped Crusader is depicted as an orange tiger with black stripes, wearing a maroon cape. A graphic depiction of the mascot also includes a mask and a belt with the Crusader logo.

The new mascot is the brainchild of a student-run organization, the S.U. Ambassadors. Members plan and participate in recruiting efforts as well as alumni events for the University. The group conducted a student poll and a drawing/idea contest for the project. A Crusader tiger was the most popular concept. The group then won approvals for the design from the University's alumni board and administration. The mascot has been launched with the permission of DC Comics, which holds the trademark for the Batman comic book character, a.k.a. The Caped Crusader.

Wonderlick Named Football Academic All-American of the Year

S nsquehanna University senior center Dave Wonderlick of Shenandoah, Pa., has been named the Verizon College Division Football Academic All-American of the Year after earning first-team Academic All-American honors for the second consecutive season from the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

Wonderlick, a two-time Middle Atlantic Conference second-team All-Star on the offensive line, is a public relations major with a legal studies minor and is the topranked student in the senior class with a perfect 4.0 cumulative grade-point average.

He is the second Susquehanna football player to be a two-time first-team College Division Academic All-American, which consists of players from NCAA Division II, NCAA Division III and NAIA Division II. Tackle **Gerry Huesken '77** was a member of the 1975 and 1976 Academic All-America squads, while linebacker **Dan Distasio '82** was named to the 1980 team.

Honors Speak for Themselves

Wonderlick received one of 16 National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Awards at the Foundation's 43rd annual Awards Dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City on December 12.

"What a tremendous accomplishment for a young man like Dave," said 11-year Susquehanna head coach **Steve Briggs**. "I have been extremely fortunate to have had an opportunity to coach him over the last four years, and I can't say enough about his work ethic on the field and in the classroom. The honors that he has received over the last two months speak for themselves."

Wonderlick helped the Crusaders win two consecutive Commonwealth League championships in 1998 and 1999 and helped the Crusaders clinch their 15th consecutive non-losing season this year.

Letterwinner Times Three

The 5-10, 245-pound Wonderlick, a 2000 tri-captain and a three-year letterwinner, was a repeat selection to the MAC Commonwealth second All-Star team as he helped the Crusaders rank second in the MAC in total offense at 391.4 yards per game, third in passing yards per game at 257.4 and fifth in rushing offense at 134.0 yards per contest.

Earlier this season, the offensive line was recognized by D3football.com as members of its "Team of the Week" after Crusader backs gained positive yards on 36 of 39 running plays and sophomore quarterback **Mike Bowman** threw for a then careerhigh 306 yards in a 24-13 win over Dickinson on September 23 in the first game at Susquehanna's new Nicholas A. Lopardo Stadium.

In his first season as a full-time starter in 1999, Wonderlick became one of the top performers on a line which helped Susquehanna finish second in MAC rushing offense (163.5 yards per game) and fifth overall (345.7 yards per game). Wonderlick did not allow a sack in 289 pass plays, giving up just three-and-a-half hurries.

Success off the Field

In addition to his perfect academic record, Wonderlick is a University Scholar and a member of Alpha Lambda Delta, the University's freshman honor society. He is a

four-year recipient of the Ambrose and Ida Fredrickson Foundation Scholarship and in the spring of 2000 became one of the first two recipients of the Gene Urey Scholarship for legal studies.

He is active in the campus chapter of the Public Relations Student Society of America and has been a corresponding sports writer for both *The Pottsville Republican* and the *Reading Eagle-Times*. He was also one of five students chosen for a Susquehanna All-Star team for College Bowl – "the varsity sport of the mind."

The 2000 Susquehanna University volleyball team took on women's volleyball alumni for a reunion game during Homecoming activities. Nine alumni returned to play. The varsity women won, 15-10, 15-8, 15-5. The varsity team returned to the MAC Commonwealth League playoffs for the second time in three years and hosted the first ever Conference playoff game in school history after a successful 17-12 record. Coach Bill Switala was named the 2000 Commonwealth Conference Coach of the Year.



Walkin' the Line

William Ecenbarger '61 earned a 1979 Pulitizer prize as part of a Philadelphia *Inquirer* team covering the Three Mile Island nuclear accident. Recently, he turned his investigating talents on the misunderstood boundary between the North and South in a new book, *Walkin' the Line: A Journey from past to present along the Mason-Dixon*, published by M. Evans and Co., Inc., New York, New York.

A history-travelogue, *Walkin' the Line* interweaves the story of the line's people, legends, and myths while following the progress of English surveyors Mason and Dixon from 1763 and 1768 as they draw one of the most unusual boundaries on earth.

"History is the realm of interesting people, good and evil, and they make fine traveling companions," says Ecenbarger, who spent nearly a year walking the line and collecting stories to illustrate his research.

Reviewers have lauded the result. "A fascinating trip into the past that illuminates the present...A tasty feast of heroes and rascals, myths and legends" says *The Inquirer. Publishers Weekly* cites it as a "well-written and dramatic examination of history, geography and race."

Ecenbarger was a reporter in several bureaus for United Press International (UPI) from 1961 to 1970, including a stint covering the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago from the streets. For the next 10 years he served as Harrisburg bureau chief for the *Inquirer*.

Over the past 12 years, he has written nearly 100 travel articles for newspapers and magazines, and his writing assignments have taken him to more than 40 countries around the world. He was named "Lowell Thomas Travel Writer of the Year" by the Society of American Travel Writers in 1996.

Today, he lives with his wife in Lancaster, Pa. "I've never worked for a living. I've just had fun," he was quoted in an *Inquirer* article about his new book. "If I were independently wealthy, I'd probably do exactly what I'm doing now."

Robert Snyder '67

ome people spend their lives searching for a talent that sets them apart. A fortunate few will even learn that they are blessed with several gifts. Dr. Robert Snyder '67, however, is that rare individual who identified his own special abilities - not one, but two areas of personal expertise - at an early age and made them lifelong pursuits.

"Ever since I was httle," he explains. "I wanted to be a doctor."

Physician/Musician

And by the age of four, Snyder says, he had also discovered a second love. Piano.

"I kept begging for lessons for a year," he recalls. "But I didn't really play until second grade."

Today, Snyder is chairman of the Department of Pathology at Holy Cross Hospital in Silver Spring, Md., and a senu-professional planist who often returns to Susquehanna University to perform four-hand recitals with Professor Emeritus of Music Galen Deibler

"We've been playing together for about 25 years," notes Snyder, who counts among his other musical mentors SU Professor Emeritus of Music Frederic Billman and Tchaikovsky Silver Medalist Susan Starr. He has also performed with former Metropohtan Opera singer Marilyn Cotlow and members of the Philadelphia Orchestra, However, his partnership with Deibler is a special one, he says. "We've performed in Philadelphia, at Susquehanna – every year or so since about 1974."

Their most recent campus performance on Nov. 8 was a memorial to Matthew Baylor '85, an outstanding planist and former student of Galen's, who died in January of 2000. It also recognized the gift from Baylor's estate of a restored sevenand-a-half foot Steinway grand plano, which has been placed in Isaacs Auditorium

"It's a good relationship," says Deibler of his affiliation with Snyder. "I enjoy working with him because he's not one to take it lightly. We have similar musical values and similar goals."

Debler adds that he never tried to steer Snyder away from medicine and toward music during Snyder's time at SU."I never discussed it with him, because he knew what he wanted to do."

Music and medicine are very different, yet complement each other, Snyder adds, "They are two separate parts of my life, but they both require a great deal of care and study. I work equally hard at both of them. When I come home from work and sit down at the piano - I give it the same kind of attention."





SU's 14th President moves in.

L. Jay Lemons

L. Jay Lemons joined the Susquehanna community as the University's 14th president on Feb. I following more than eight years as chancellor of the University of Urginna at IUise, a public liberal arts college with 1,500 students, 225 employees, and an \$18 million budget in southwestern Urginia. Lemons, his wife, Marsha Schone Lemons; and four children. Ohvia, age 8, Maggie, age 6, Thomas, age 3; and Micredith, age 1; took up residence in Pline Lawri, the Susquehanna president's home, on January 15.

sk students at UVa-Wise what they recall about Jay Lemons and you're likely to get three answers.

The way he remembers your name.

His lunches – every student on campus gets invited at least once. For those who accept, the conversation invariably comes around to three questions: Why did you come here? What do you like about the school? And, if you could change one thing about this campus, what would it be?

And then, of course, there's the magic wand.

Liberated from his daughter Maggie's fourth birthday party and everso slightly bedraggled, it is the perfect visual aid to pass around the room during the "If" question.

"A lot of the things students request do actually happen," says M.J. Dixon, student government association president and senior business administration major. "Students are included in some capacity in everything that this college does," says Dixon. "Our voice is really heard and it's a wonderful opportunity."

Accomplishments at Wise

As one of the youngest college chief administrators in Virginia, Lemons led the University of Virginia's only branch campus to redefine the institution's mission and strategic objectives. Under his watch, the college invested \$40 million in capital improvements and raised nearly \$20 milhon against a \$12 million goal in its first capital campaign. He worked with faculty to implement a selective admissions policy, created a comprehensive student life program and worked with the state's governor and legislature to increase faculty salaries more than 40 percent in a four-year period. Lemons also has played a key role in recruiting new faculty and building a faculty support system, including the addition of a subbatical program, says George Culbertson, provost and senior vice chancellor who is serving as interim chancellor at UVa-Wise.



Leader Inspiration Catalyst

"A tough act to follow," says an editorial in the Bristol, Va., *Herald Courier* that cites Lemons as "a leader, an inspiration and a catalyst" in the process that led *U.S. News & World Report* to rank UVa-Wise as the number-two public liberal arts college in the South in 1999 and again in 2000.

The school has also come a long way from its beginnings in 1954 as Clinch Valley College in buildings that once housed the county poor farm. Lemons, a gifted storyteller, frequently shares the thumbnail history. And whether you get the three-minute version or the 30-minute version, you will hear firsthand a tale of extraordinary determination to put a four-year education within the financial and geographic reach of residents in the Central Appalachian Mountains.

Nebraska Native

A native of Scottsbluff, Neb., Lemons

is the son of two educators. As a student at Nebraska Wesleyan, he earned a B.S. in physical education and health education, both with teacher certification, coupled with a B.A. in philosophy. The latter came during the fifth year he spent at the university to compete in varsity track while serving as a full-time employee in student affairs.

He followed up with a master's in education from the University of Nebraska with concentrations in educational psychology and college student development and a Ph.D. from the University of Virginia in higher education and management through the Darden Graduate School of Business.

He gained experience as a hall director at Nebraska Wesleyan; graduate assistant to the director of admissions at the University of Nebraska, area coordinator at Texas A&M University, graduate assistant to the dean of the University of Virginia's Curry School of Education, and an intern at the Curry School Foundation. Then came a three-year term in Charlottesville as assistant to University of Virginia former President Robert M. O'Neil and current President John T. Casteen III.

The assignment and subsequent appointment to UVa-Wise as chancellor provided Lemons with a "crash course in the issues that currently confront colleges and universities," says Casteen. "He has seen recession and recovery, the process by which major capital funds campaigns begin and reach maturity, a series of developments with regard to faculty selfgovernance, various crises involving student behavior and relations between students and faculty, and the means to manage a program of ongoing institutional improvement at the College in Wise."

In both Charlottesville and Wise, adds Casteen, Lemons has emerged "as a friend and champion of faculty interests and has also brought students and faculty closer together than they might have been otherwise." Painting His Way Through College

Lemons, who describes his upbringing as "rich in all kinds of ways, but of modest means," learned firsthand about financial aid and creative college financing when he selected Nebraska Wesleyan, the most expensive institution in the state. "I painted my way through college," he recalls. "During the summer after I graduated from high school, my mother and I worked side by side, probably 60 to 80 hours a week."

At 41-years-old, he is still paying off student loans. "I look forward to retiring that debt, but there's no question that I will never make a more personal investment than those student loans," he says. "For me, at age 18, to sign those promissory notes was a pretty powerful thing to do. I can absolutely, in clear conscience, say that it delivered me to class on some Friday afternoons when 1 may not otherwise have been inclined to participate, and that friends of mine chose to make optional."

A Teacher First and Foremost

From the perspective of both a student and an administrator, he has gathered broad experience at both public and private institutions, large and small and in areas including admissions, development, senior administration, and especially student life. And that student-centered perspective provides Lemons with a background well-suited to a college presidency, says Rick Artman, one of Lemons' earliest student life mentors who is currently president of Siena Heights University in Adrian, Michigan. "Our loyalty wasn't to a discipline, it was to an idea and concept toward the development of the whole student."

"I truly think of myself as a teacher first and foremost," stresses Lemons, who attributes much of the success at Wise to his administration's shared values and trust with faculty in their roles as teachers, scholars and advisors. "While we live in a world of constant change, there are important aspects of the institutional soul that must constantly be murtured, protected, and celebrated," says Lemons. "Faculty members have become the 'keepers' of the flame for the institutional soul."

"Some of my most important experiences were those found in my own undergraduate education at a private liberal arts college," says Lemons. "Frankly much of the fun that I had at UVa.- Wise was making available for our students the educational experiences most often found in private liberal arts colleges but at a public institution."

A Student of Higher Education

A student of higher education, Lemons literally has trouble driving past another campus without stopping to take a look around. He is, in fact, so enamored of academe that he created two courses on the theme. The Academic Novel, a collaboration with a faculty colleague, focuses on fiction and non-fiction writing with higher education as the setting. The Academic Life is a primer in higher education, created partly to encourage students to consider academic careers. "One of the things that I fundamentally see as part of our role is putting a little air under students' wings," says Lemons. And he has seen success with students like Laura Faye Mullins, a recent Wise graduate who began graduate school in education and law at the University of Tennessee this winter. "He challenges you to be the best person that you can be," she says.

Intellect without Pretense

Lemons is a voracious reader whose taste in books ranges from the full gambit of C.S. Lewis to William Bennett's *The Book of Virtues*. "He loves an intellectual discourse," says UVa.-Wise Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs Gary Juhan.

This is also a man who once named his fantasy basketball team The Jeffersonians and yet, who is well known for his lack of pretention. He regularly joined the freshman leadership experience for an off-campus retreat designed to help new students connect with the school and each other. And incoming students who have known him to take an impromptu swim in a cold mountain stream are not surprised to see him volunteer for the wet end of the dunking booth at campus events.

He is also not above a practical joke – even at his own expense – or donning a costume to play a Santa's elf nicknamed "Wahoo" distributing Christmas gifts to staff members.

Leadership Style

"Jay has been so valuable to this college because of the relationship he developed and maintained with faculty. He has served as a leader who truly values each of us - personally and professionally," says Sheila Schmuck, chair of the UVa-Wise faculty senate and an assistant professor of nursing. "He believes firmly in shared governance, and has always included faculty in decision-making processes - academic and otherwise. We did not always agree - but we always shared mutual respect."

Gary Juhan describes Lemons as "extremely in tune to the academic process," and a good example of "grace under pressure" – the latter demonstrated amply during the controversial 1999 name change from Clinch Valley College to the University of Virginia at Wise. Even at a point when it appeared the effort might fail, faculty and staff welcomed Lemons and then-Provost and Senior Vice President George Culbertson at a progress meeting with a standing ovation.

"He's always willing to talk through things," says Juhan. "I don't have any idea what kind of campus culture you have or what kind of environment," he adds. "But I'll guarantee you that in a year it will be better."


"His whole experience has come out of an ethic of care and concern and strong people skills," says Siena Heights University President Rick Artman. "You should feel very blessed that he waited for the right opportunity."

His first day on campus found Lemons attending a welcome reception and several classes with students.



At 6-feet-4-inches tall, Jay Lemons towers over most people, yet he has a way of putting folks at ease – from a young guest who accidently fell in the mud at a recent UVa-Wise sports hall of fame induction to 97-yearold Leila Maude Richmond, number one football fan who, with her two sisters, provided funds for the college's first endowed professorship.

It's even evident when he meets alimin who graduated long before Lemons arrived in 1992. At a recent reunion of classes from the 50s, "by the time he had his first meeting with them, you could just see they were feeling closer ties to campus," says Dawn Gilbert, president of the UVa.-Wise alumni association. "He's one of our best cheerleaders."

A Community Resource

The good will has flowed beyond the campus. Lemons has built UVa.-Wise into a resource for the entire region with projects including the launch of WISE-FM, the first public radio station in southwest Virginia, and providing a campus home for a regional office for Virginia's Center for Innovative Technology. Both Jay and Marsha Lemons have also found time to support community projects such as a new, volunteer-built playground.

The community, in return, has reacted with "genuine love" for the chancellor and his family. More than a few tears greeted the announcement that they would leave in January for Susquehanna. The reactions have ranged from a local service club roadway sign proclaiming, "We Love Jay Lemons," to spontaneous recognitions at events such as a Wise production of *A Christmas Carol*.

"They're good, community-minded people," stresses Joseph Smiddy, UVa-Wise president emeritus. "They just blend right in."

Role Reversal Benefits

The couple has been leapfrogging academic studies and careers in pursuit of graduate degrees since they met at Nebraska Wesleyan. "We have reversed roles on a lot of different occasions in terms of what we've been up to professionally," says Jay Lemons. "What it means for me at this point is a wonderful friend and an astute professional person who I can consult with on a daily basis."

A native of Omaha, Neb., Marsha Lemons earned a B.S. in 1984 from Nebraska Wesleyan University, and an M.Ed. in educational administration from Texas A&M University, where she worked as senior advisor in the student programs office. In 1990 University of Virginia President John Casteen and his wife hired Marsha to manage their household and plan events – a formidable task for an office where a typical academic year includes 140 events – sometimes two and three a day. Later, she put the experience to work at UVa.-Wise where the chancellor's duties

As a governor-appointed member of the Virginia State Commission for the Arts, Marsha Lemons helped to allocate funds appropriated by the legislature. She was also a member of Wise organizations including the Pro-Art board of directors, the UVa-Wise Wesley Foundation Board, and the Hospice Advisory Committee. She has also been treasurer of the local chapter of the American Association of University Women and a member of the Trinity United Methodist Church of Wise Administrative Council.

While at Wise, the busy family tried to break away about once a month or on holidays to a private, vacation retreat in North Carolina, recently sold in anticipation of their move to Pennsylvania. "We love to be outdoors, love to hike. We all love to read," says Marsha Lemons. "Our life is so intense that usually when we go away there isn't a lot of time for hobbies," she says. "We just try to be together whatever we're doing."

Why Susquehanna, Why Now

Originally billed as a "short-term assignment," the nine years Jay Lemons spent at U.Va-Wise have included much time on the road, particularly meeting with the University of Virginia's Board of Visitors in Charlottesville. He has also been astute at lobbying for Wise interests at the state legislature in Richmond – 375 miles from Wise with no easy way to get there. "More often than not, you have a whole new slate of folks every four years," explains Lemons. "I will not miss the amount of time that I have had to spend, if you will, dancing with the bureaucracy."

Though he had been invited to become a presidential candidate by several larger institutions, he finds in Susquehanna what he has been looking for: a small university environment and a strong commitment to liberal arts education. "Bound up in that is really a judgment about what is important to me," says Lemons. "And that is to be in the sort of place where you can get to know your colleagues and students and know them well, a place with a coherent educational philosophy, and a commitment to student life and having the highest quality student experience possible."

"What I really want out of hie is meaningful work, the sense that my work is making a difference, and every now and then a sense of appreciation for the efforts."

hen Terry Bossert '68 was hired as an attorney for the law firm of Eckert, Seamans, Cherin & Mellot in their Harrisburg environmental department in March, it started a chain reaction that uncovered an incredible coincidence. After he was hared, Bossert's biographical information was sent through the office. It was then attorney Tom Isenberg '92 realized they would have plenty to talk about. Because they work together on many cases, they have, over and over again, discussed what Susquehanna was like in the 60s compared with the 90s.

"I like to regale Tom with how priminve the campus was when I was there," Bossert said.

Not long after Isenberg and Bossert connected, Bossert sent an email to Diane Meyers '88, an attorney in the firm's Pittsburgh office, to congratulate her on becoming a partner in the firm.

He said, 'It's nice to see someone from Susquehanna doing so well," Meyers said. "I then kind of realized there were four of us at the firm.'

The fourth is Bonnie Lanzel '91. Lanzel is a legal assistant in the intellectual property department of the Eckert Seamans' Pittsburgh office, the same department Meyers was hired into. During her interview, the chair of the department told Meyers about Lanzel.



Chair Emeritus John C. Horn

John Chisolm Horn, chair emeritus of Susquehanna University's board of directors, died December 7, 2000. He was 85 years old. His 16-year tenure as board chair was instrumental in leading Susquehanna through a period of remarkable growth and development during the 1960s and 70s.

Born in New York City, Horn earned a bachelor of arts degree in 1936 from Cornell University where he later did graduate work in administrative engineering. He began his career as an industrialist at John R. Wald Company, a maker of prison industrial equipment. In 1939, he moved to Prismo Safety Corporation in Huntingdon, Pa., where he served for 30 years, the last seven as president. He was also president of Wald Industries, Inc. from 1951 to 1970. That same year, he founded John Horn Associates, consulting management advisors, and became executive director of Church Management Service Inc. in Huntingdon.

He was very active in professional, civic, education and church affairs, and was a leader in promoting industrial development in the Huntingdon area. He served on the executive board of the Central Pennsylvania Synod of the Lutheran Church in America. He also served on the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America and was president of the United Fund of Huntingdon Country for 10 years.

He was first elected to Susquehanna's board of directors in 1950, and served as vice chair from 1955 to 1962 and chair until 1979. In 1965, he was awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree from Susquehanna and in 1978, he received a citation from the SU Student Government Association in recognition of his service. The executive committee of the board established the John C. Horn Distinguished Service Lectureship in 1979, in honor of his accomplishments as board chair.

Among the survivors are his wife, Carol, and his surviving children, Phyllis, John '64, Eric '68, Thomas, and Dorothy, and their families. Horn's first wife, Solveig Wald, and son James perished in a fire in 1979; sons Stephen and Robert are also deceased.

A gift from the Horn family in memory of son Stephen helped fund the construction of Weber Chapel in 1966 and led to the naming of Horn Meditation Chapel. In 1986, another gift in memory of Solveig and James supported purchase of a pedal organ in the chapel.

Vanguard Founder Will Address Grads and Families at Commencement 2001

ohn C. Bogle, founder of the Vanguard Group, one of the nation's largest mutual fund companies, will be the principal speaker at Susquehanna University's 143rd commencement ceremonies on Sunday, May 13. Three hundred and seventy students will receive baccalanreate degrees and seven will receive associate degrees at the afternoon event.

Bogle, 72, will receive an honorary doctor of laws degree from the University.

Former Susquehanna University Chaplain The Rev. **Christopher Thomforde**, who recently became president of St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn., will deliver the baccalaureate address and receive an honorary doctor of divinity degree.

Sean Matthew Deibler '69, founding artistic director of the Music Group of Philadelphia, will receive an honorary doctor of fine arts degree.

Investment Guru

At Valley Forge, Pa., based-Vanguard, Bogle was chief executive officer from its founding in 1974 until 1996. He served as chairman of the board until 1998 and senior chairman until retiring in 1999. Immediately thereafter, Bogle, a resident of Bryn Mawr, Pa., became president of the Bogle Financial Markets Research Center, where he continues his work on behalf of investors in the fund industry.

Fortune magazine recognized Bogle as one of the four "Giants of the 20th Century," and *Bloomberg Personal Finance* designated him as one of "12 Minds That Made the Market," depicting Bogle as among those who've had the greatest influence on how American families invest today.

His current book, John Bogle on Investing, was published late last year by McGraw-Hill as the first volume in its Great Ideas in Finance series. Bogle's other books are Bogle on Mutual Funds, which has sold more than 250,000 copies, and Common Sense on Mutual Funds.

In addition to having served as the Henry Kaufman visiting professor at New York University's Stern School of Business, succeeding former Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker, Bogle also serves as a director at The Mead Corp., Chris-Craft Industries, and the Commercial General Union insurance companies.

A 1951 graduate of Princeton University, Bogle has been a frequent challenger of the traditional financial establishment and, a heart transplant recipient himself, he actively promotes organ donor awareness.

Former Chaplain

Thomforde followed a ten-year stunt as chaplam at Susquehanna with the presidency of Bethany College, another ELCA college, in Lindsborg, Kan., in 1996. He has also served as a parish pastor at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Dansville, N.Y. Previously he had been an assistant chaplain and instructor in philosophy and religion at Colgate University, Hamilton, N.Y., and taught western languages and medieval European history at Tunghai University in Taiwan.

A basketball standout in both high school and college, Thomforde earned an A.B. degree in medieval and Russian history from Princeton University in 1969 and a master of divinity from Yale University Divinity School in 1974. He completed studies for his doctorate in ministry from Princeton Theological Seminary while at Bethany College.

Conductor and Performer

Deibler, who graduated from Susquehanna as John B. Deibler with a degree in clarinet and voice, earned a diploma in conducting, chamber music, clarinet and voice from the Franz Liszt Academy in Budapest, Hungary.

In 1978, he established the Music Group of Philadelphia, a mixed vocal chamber ensemble dedicated to performing great choral repertory from all musical periods with a special emphasis on new, seldom performed and virtuoso works. From 1982 until 1996 he served as founding artistic director of the 160-voice Choral Arts Society of Philadelphia.

An internationally recognized conductor, performer and lecturer, he is also director of musicianship studies at the University of the Arts in Philadelphia.

In 1998 the Ministry of Cultural Arts of the Republic of Hungary honored him with the Medal Pro Artibus, Artist of Outstanding Merit for promotion of diversified Hungarian music abroad.

Faculty Retirees: Memories and Plans

Join us in sharing a brief snapshot of activities and fond farewells for members of the Susquehanna faculty who are retiring this spring.

A Robust Internship Program

Professor Emeritus of Management and Coordinator of Business Internships **Ken Fladmark** is retiring for the second time. He left in 1992 after 31 years of teaching, then returned in 1994, first to serve as acting dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Business, then as business internship coordinator.

"He taught, mentored, challenged and encouraged literally thousands of SU students," says **James Brock**, dean of the business school. "As the first director of the school's internship program, Dr. Fladmark built the most robust program I've ever seen." While some business schools boast a 20 percent student participation rate in summer internships, Brock says Susquehanna's is nearly 80 percent. "His efforts have made a huge difference in the growth of our students and in the opportunities they face upon graduation."

A Rapport with Students

Retiring, too, this spring is Associate Professor of Mathematical Sciences **Karl Klose**, who leaves Susquehanna after 16 years. Before arriving here, he taught 13 years at Missouri Western State College in St. Joseph, Mo.

A specialist in numerical computing, Klose earned a bachelor's degree from Bucknell; a master of arts, master of science and a Ph.D. from the University of Alabama, and a master of science in computer science from Kansas State University.

"Karl has always had a great rapport with students," says **Kenneth Brakke**, professor of mathematical sciences. "He is very informal – even asking them to address him as 'Karl."

"His solicitude for them even extends to letting a deserving student or two use his office when he is not in. Our students will definitely miss him when he retires."

Blue Highways Beckon

Associate Professor of Political Science Bruce Evans is eyeing the road less traveled.

His list includes Haystack in Oregon, Yellowstone and Acadia National Park. "Not the main park, but Schoodic, because no one's there," he says.

"We like to tramp," he says." What got us into this was *Blue Highways*, a book by William Least Heat-Moon. When he got fired, he got into his van and drove. He avoided interstates and took old county roads. He called them blue highways."

Evans came to Susquehanna in 1967, after teaching two years at Crowder College in Neosho, Mo. He holds a bachelor's degree

from Purdue University and master of arts from Indiana University.

"I won't miss grading. I will miss getting in front of a class and talking," he says. His class on film in politics, for example, is cathartic, he adds. "I'm doing war and movies. One is *Saving Private Ryan.* I wasn't there, but I remember D-Day. I ask, "Who are these people who went in on D-Day? Most were 18, 19, 20 years old. Like you [students] are."

Another favorite class is data analysis. "It's fun when you see things click and I like independent research with kids. That's where you get down to whatever it is you're doing."

Among his favorites is *Wuthering Heights*, which he has taught 15 times, and still finds exciting. "It is important not to be bored. Students are quick to pick up on indifference. I like an emotional as well as an intellectual commitment to what I do," he says. "Students who develop, change and grow np. That's one of teaching's great pleasures."

Klingensmith arrived at Susquehanna in 1965 after earning a bachelor's degree from Princeton and a master of arts from the University of Pennsylvania.

And, even today, he still uses a typewriter. "Students ask what that noise is and they look at it with amazement," he says. "It's a manual Olympia that my mother gave me when I went to Princeton in 1953. I got used to thinking as I type. I am the last dinosaur."

He recalls the department's move from the English Cottage on the site of Apfelbaum Hall. "The offices were cramped. The heating wasn't efficient. It was hot in summer. It was a fun place. But moving to Hassinger Hall in 1993 was like going to heaven," he says. "Suddenly, I had reliable heat, air conditioning and an office where 1 could shut the door. It was marvelous. I had bookcase space."

Writing Ahead

Associate Professor of Mathematics **Robert Tyler** plans travel and new projects after 32 years teaching, but he'll put those plans off for one more year to fill a one-year vacancy in the math department.

"I want to go to Europe. I have a daughter in New Zealand and three granddaughters and I've only met one," he says.

Tyler joined the Susquehanna faculty in 1969 and holds bachelor, master and doctorate degrees from Syracuse University. His retirement plans include trying on a new hat as a writer of children's tales. "I used to tell my kids stories," he says. "One hero was Althea Antlers, a deer. Recently, it occurred to me that female deer don't have antlers. Details. I have Albert Antlers now, with Althea as his wife and 1 am thinking how to put math into it. Victor Vector, perhaps."

Tyler says he has seen many changes in students in three decades of teaching. "They are more worldly. They understand more about life and have questions about values. It used to be easier to teach.

"Math is the thing I like. Students and society are going more toward computers and that's affected mathematics. I teach abstract algebra. The common cry is 'Why do we learn proofs?' Axiomatic reasoning. This is how knowledge is created."

His SU memories include a special campus rock concert: "I'm a broken down drummer and I had the chance to play." he recalls. And, of course, the students: "When students have an, 'ah-ha,' when they're having trouble and they're enlightened, they're big moments.

Throwing Machine Javelin Standout Bound for NCAA Div. III Championships

Susquehanna University sophomore Matt Deamer '03 continues to own the longest throw in NCAA Division III in the javehn this season, with a top throw of 212 feet, 1 inch in a quad meet at Nicholas A. Lopardo Stadium on March 24.

Bound for the 2001 NCAA Division III Outdoor Track and Field Championships at Millikin University in Decatur, Ill., from May 24-26, he is attempting to become the eighth national champion and 33rd All-American for Susquehanna men's track and field Coach **Jim Taylor** in his 23 seasons at the helm of the Crusaders.

Deamer, a business major and graduate of Indian Valley High School in Lewistown, Pa., has surpassed the 200-foot plateau on three occasions this season. He also owns three of the top four distances in Division III during the 2001 season.

He opened the outdoor season with a flourish by throwing 209 feet, 8 inches at the Washington & Lee Invitational on

March 17 to automatically qualify for the NCAA Division III Track and Field Championships, and followed one week later with his Division-III best throw against Gettysburg, Messiah and Juniata. On April 10, Deamer easily won the event in a trimeet against Messiah and Elizabethtown with a throw of 203 feet, 5 inches.

The only other Division III athletes to surpass 200 feet this year are Carroll (Wisc.) jumor Nick Weitor at 203 feet, 10 inches and Middlebury's Bryan Black at 200 feet, 7 inches. The NCAA Division III automatic qualifying distance is 200 feet, 5 inches.

Last season, Deamer was seeded second at the NCAA Division III championships at North Central College after a regular-season throw of 211 feet, 6 inches, but he finished 11th as teanimate **Adam Ressler '00** took home the gold with a Susquehanna modern-record throw of 221 feet, 6 inches.

Susquehanna has qualified at least one athlete in the men's javelin at nationals for five consecutive years, and Deamer will look to become the third Susquehanna national champion in the event in the last four years. Besides Ressler's title last year, **Janee Shaner** claimed the women's national title in 1998 as a freshman.

All three have been coached in the event by former Lewisburg High School and Susquehanna standout **Cris Delbaugh**, who has had four All-Americans in addition to two national champions in his 10 years as an assistant coach.

The bridge over Little Pine Creek on Route 44 in Waterville, Pa., will be renamed in honor of a Susquehanna hero on Saturday, June 23rd.

The first SU casualty of World War II, Army Air Corps 2nd Lt. Michael F. Wolf '41 was wounded in the Battle of Bataan in the Philippines in April 1942. He was captured a month later and miraculously survived the infamous, 65-mile "Bataan Death March," only to lose his life in December 1944 when American forces mistakenly bombed a Japanese ship in Subic Bay. The Japanese had failed to display markings identifying the ship as carrying prisoners of war.

The youngest of eight children and just six years old when his father died, Wolf was the only one of four brothers to attend school past the fifth grade, says nephew and namesake Michael J. Wolf '69, a retired accountant who is currently a tax collector in Riverside, Pa.

Carrie Campbell, the wife of a Sunbury physician who had a summer home in Waterville, recognized his uncle's potential and arranged transportation so he was able to graduate from Jersey Shore High School in 1937. She later enrolled him in Susquehanna and provided an apartment in Sunbury and an old car to drive to classes. A member of the German Club, The Lanthorn staff, and ROTC, he graduated summa cum laude with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

The June 23 bridge-naming ceremony will recognize Wolf's extraordinary accomplishments at home and abroad, says his nephew, who decries the current stereotypical portrayal of men as "bumbling buffoons" in TV commercials and sitcoms. "They do a dreadful disservice to the tens of thousands of men and boys who made the ultimate sacrifice in foreign wars to defend our freedom," says Wolf. "My uncle is a real American hero and truly deserves the honor"



He Sets

the Stage

Some three decades ago, Tennessee resident Glenn Showalter '59 set the stage and began staging the sets for ... the stage. The one that bears his name and is the centerpiece of the Signal Mountain Playhouse, a thriving "family theater" that Showalter helped to set in motion on behalf of the once-idle youth in his suburban-Chattanooga community.

"The kids in our area had time to kill and money and cars, and kept getting in trouble," recalls Showalter, a purchasing manager for Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Tennessee. "A bunch of us tried to come up with different ways to keep them occupied."

Drawing upon his background as an SU art student and set designer for university productions, Showalter suggested recruiting young people to put on a play - The Tortoise and the Hare.

"We did that for a summer," he says. "And the kids came back the next year and wanted to do it again."

Thus was a tradition launched. Today, thanks in large part to Showalter's enthusiastic support, the Signal Mountain Playhouse is a sophisticated - but still volunteer-driven Chattanooga-area institution, staging two plays each year for crowds of up to 600.

"At this year's production of *The Wizard of Oz*, we'll have 150 munchkins on stage in full costume," says Showalter, explaining that casts are often "stretched" to

allow more local children to participate. "We're also going to try to 'fly' the witch and the house. We've come a long way." Showalter, who still designs sets and programs, was recently rewarded by the community he's served, when the playhouse stage was named in his honor. "I thought maybe they did it to get rid of me," he jokes. "But I keep coming back."

Showalter was also nominated by the playbouse board of directors for a J.C. Penney Golden Rule Award, recognizing his long-time commitment to the theater.

"We're getting a region-wide reputation," he adds proudly. "The town likes us."

awn Grigg '68 Mueller insists she was "absolutely floored" at the news she would be this year's recipient of the alnumi association award for achievement. "With all the wonderful SU alums that I know, it's hard to believe I was even a blip on the radar," says Mueller. And this is not a person full of false modesty.

A retired director of neonatal intensive care and associate professor of pediatrics at the Medical College of Virginia Commonwealth University (MCV), Mueller is very matter of fact relaying the details of her involvement in groundbreaking leaps made in her field. She explains that in the early 1980s MCV was one of only five institutions utilizing a then-experimental, but now standard, technique called extracorporeal membrane oxygenation, a type of extended heart-lung bypass used in critically ill infants. She also proudly recalls being involved in the early clinical trials of surfactant replacement therapy, a treatment for premature infants with respiratory problems. The year following its FDA approval, Mueller says the mortality rate for premature infants significantly declined.

Mneller came to SU in 1964 for a fairly common reason. Since the tenth grade she had known she wanted to be a physician and she was looking for a solid science education from a small liberal arts university. She opted for a major in chemistry for a less common reason – to avoid botany. She fondly remembers Professor Bruce Presser's incredible embryology lectures, his colored chalk everywhere, but says it was probably Professor Tom McGrath who had the greatest influence on her pursuing medical school. "I did well my freshman year but struggled the following year with a heavy course load." She adds that McGrath "consoled" her by reassuring her that she probably wouldn't have been a very good doctor anyway. Mueller says that was just the kick she needed. She chose MCV in Richmond, Va., for medical school and hasn't looked back (or anywhere else) since.

She retired in 1998 after a 21-year career and now spends time taking courses in French and photography, continuing to attend medical conferences, and devoting much more time to Susquehanna, her "true labor of love." She adds that she has especially enjoyed catching up on time with her husband, attorney Alan Fleischer. They're planning a trip to Switzerland this summer. While Mueller admits she doesn't miss the stress of her career, she does miss her colleagues and patients and their families. "My greatest sense of satisfaction came from being a support to the parents. I believe I did that well; that's where I feel I made a difference."

Liberal Arts for the 21st Century: Intellectual Toolkit for Life

Susquehanna does both.

A solid Core curriculum provides a broad background of general knowledge and intellectual skills collectively known as the liberal arts. This foundation also enhances strong majors in the humanities, natural and social sciences and equally strong professional programs in areas such as business, communications and education.

Content, Methodology and Engagement

Rooted in medieval university studies of grammar, rhetoric, logic, mathematics, music and astronomy, over the centuries the liberal arts have expanded to include fields of literature, history, science, and, more recently, the social sciences.

But, more broadly speaking, liberal learning is not limited to particular fields of study. What matters in liberal education, according to the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AACU) is "substantial content, rigorous methodology and an active engagement with the societal, ethical and practical implications of our learning."

It is an approach to education most often found at private residential campuses where small class size and close student/faculty interaction are paramount. Susquehanna alumni know firsthand the advantages of such a community of learners. But many prospective students and their parents tend to see liberal arts as synonymous with higher education in general. "The irony is that liberal arts institutions have not done a good job of educating the consuming public," says Dean of the School of Natural and Social Sciences **Terry Winegar**.

Neither Liberal nor Arts

"One of the things that makes it difficult is that the liberal arts are neither liberal nor arts," says Dean of Arts, Humanities and Communications **Laura deAbruña**. As for the arts, she explains, while the study of art history or music literature courses are included in the theoretical, or knowledge-based realm of liberal arts, the practical, hands-on courses in creating art or music are not. And despite the title to the contrary, the "liberal" arts actually represent a "very conservative and traditional approach to what should be taught in institutions of higher education," she says.

Preparing for Change

"Paradoxically, the way you provide the best education for a rapidly changing world is by directing a fair amount of your education toward things that don't change," says Dean Winegar.

Studying the liberal arts offers recognized advantages to do just that. "One benefit is to expand our knowledge and understanding about the world and pass it on to the next generation," says deAbruña. "A second is to provide certain skills that are necessary to understand and interpret that knowledge base." For example, courses in mathematics and sciences foster analytical and reasoning skills. The humanities, including English, history, philosophy and languages, promote critical thinking skills. These and a wide variety of other disciplines incorporate writing and speaking skills used to summarize and present ideas.

Making Informed Choices

While modern technologies have changed many aspects of our lives, the skills and knowledge base required to be an effective employee and citizen remain much the same as in the past. We still utilize the critical thinking skills fostered by a liberal education to understand and analyze information and make informed choices, even though we might be using the Internet instead of a book to gather that information.

And with the U.S. Department of Labor predicting that today's college graduate may work for as many as 12 to 15 companies in as many

as three different professions, the pace of change will demand flexible workers who are good at problem solving – a prime opportunity for liberal arts institutions and their graduates.

Transferable Skills


"The number one skill that employers look for are interpersonal communications skills such as writing and speaking. Who is better trained in that area than the liberal arts graduate?" says John Ryder, director of career services.

Because the connection between the liberal arts and specific jobs is not always as obvious as in more vocational areas such as business, the career center has special initiatives geared towards liberal arts majors. "We spend more time with them individually and make a special effort in the career planning class," says Ryder. "The opportunities are there, but liberal arts majors need to be more proactive, and highlight a little more pointedly their transferable skills on their resumes and cover letters," he adds. is especially important in a global economy," says **Doug Carlson '88**, a vice president at Brown Bros. Harriman & Co. in Boston. "You can leverage that and spark conversations and connections that provide inroads to potential clients." A finance major with an information systems minor, Carlson credits the flexible, diverse background he received at Susquehanna with helping to prepare him for enormous changes in the financial service industry brought by technology and the era of consolidation.

Exploring Ideas and Choices

Meg Finley '85 Flournoy earned a master's degree at Lehigh in counseling and is now an independent college advisor for high school students – a far cry from her



Adding Value

To help students take advantage of those opportunities, traditional liberal arts disciplines such as English, history, and philosophy are adding value with active components such as internships and study abroad. Susquehanna faculty are also increasingly using computer-assisted learning that helps students to develop skills in managing digital information.

Another advantage is created by the integration of liberal and professional studies – the focus of the Associated New American Colleges, of which Susquehanna is a charter member. A new interdisciplinary health care minor at Susquehanna includes courses in human health and disease, medical ethics and a popular business of health care course, along with practical internship experience.

And in the Sigmund Weis School of Business, Associate Professor of Accounting **Rick Davis** adds value to his legal environment class by taking a liberal arts approach – covering not only what the business rules and regulations are, but how they are constructed and how they change over time.

Flexibility in a Global Economy

Today the Sigmund Weis School requires majors to take half their credits outside the business departments. "We want students who can relate to philosophical or cultural or historical aspects of anything that we look at here," says Dean **James Brock**. "Businesses are looking for people who are going to be aware of what's going on in the world, who can communicate, who can think in abstractions and who are not narrowly trained with a limited range of vocational skills."

"Learning about another country's culture or politics or economics



undergraduate major in political science. "I never had an interest in law school or public government work, but I loved reading about political theory and international relations," she says. "And I would still choose political science all over again. I learned so much. And there were so many transferable skills, like debating, that I use today in so many other areas of my life."

The liberal arts choices in the University's Core curriculum also provide the opportunity to explore a variety of disciplines. "Maybe you think you're just a math/science sort of person and you go to

an English class and you really find you get something out of it," says **Kyle Wilson '01**, who will graduate with a double major in English and philosophy after starting as a biology major.

Shifting Career Paths

Associate Professor of Philosophy Jeff Whitman describes himself as a "living example" of the value of a liberal arts background. A graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, Whitman drew upon required liberal arts components of his education to find a new direction after a disability cut his military career short.

"Very few of us have the same career paths in our entire lives," he says. "Even if you start out in a junior management position, as you work your way up in the organization, you become less and less focused on the nuts and bolts and more and more focused with the larger issues, like utilizing the human resources to make a more efficient and better company.

"And there's a lot more to the good life than making money or gaining prestige and honor," he adds. "What makes liberal arts study so valuable is that it helps us to deal with those questions about our places in the universe and our obligations as human beings. It provides students with a context for their work and for their lives."



Tuition Set for 2001-2002


Susquehanna University's board of directors has approved an increase in tuition and fees for the 2001–2002 academic year. Comprehensive fees for next year – which include tuition and fees, room and board – will be \$27,270. The \$1,060 increase is four percent of current fees.

"Recognizing the financial burden that many Susquehanna families face, the board and administration have worked hard to keep tuition increases as low as possible," said University President **L. Jay Lemons**. "This cost-conscious attitude is balanced by the recognition that above all, we cannot sacrifice educational quality. We are committed to continuing the steady growth in academic quality and enhanced facilities that has been achieved over the past decade."

Over the past five years, the increase in Susquehanna's comprehensive fees has averaged 3.6 percent annually, which is modest in relation to many other colleges and universities.

Honoring Judge Arlin Adams New Law and Society Center Announced

new interdisciplinary Center for Law and Society at Susquehanna University will provide a major additional learning and experiential resource for students, faculty, visiting lecturers and the community starting in the fall of 2001.

The family of Sigfried and Janet Weis and the Degenstein Foundation of Sunbury have established the center which will be named for **Arlin M. Adams H'85**, a prominent jurist and long-time friend of Susquehanna University. His distinguished career includes 17 years on the bench of the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and years of involvement in professional, charitable and educational organizations.

He currently serves as counsel at Schnader, Harrison, Segal & Lewis, one of Philadelphia's largest law firms. Judge Adams was a visiting Woodrow Wilson Fellow at Susquehanna in 1981 and in 1985, received an honorary doctor of laws degree.

"The university is honored to attach Judge Adams' name to this center in recognition of his lifetime of achievement and service," said university President **L. Jay Lemons**. "The center will strengthen the intellectual dialogue at Susquehanna by raising issues where there are rich intersections between and across our academic disciplines and important societal questions.

"We hope also that the programs and activities of the center will enrich and inform civic life both here in the Central Susquehanna Valley and in the nation."

The center will strengthen the university's legal studies, pre-law and interdisciplinary program offerings for students. A core component will be a lectureship designed to attract prominent leaders and scholars to speak on topics such as ethics, technology, privacy issues, taxation, constitutional law, and death and dying.

The center will support opportunities for students through internships, field experiences, and independent study research projects m social and criminal justice.

It also will be a catalyst to develop and expand relationships with law schools, medical centers, businesses, courts and social service agencies, while providing students with both experimental and educational exposure to the theory and practice of law.

"Susquehanna's emphasis on undergraduate

liberal arts education and pre-professional studies places it in a strong position to contribute to the understanding of law and its impact on institutions and people," said Vice President for Academic Affairs **Warren Funk**. "The interdisciplinary nature of the center

will make it an excellent resource for faculty, students, visiting lecturers and members of the community who wish to meet, exchange ideas, and take advantage of expanded learning opportunities."

Faculty from the political science, communications, accounting, philosophy, and sociology and anthropology departments are developing programs and activities for the Arlin M. Adams Center for Law and Society. The inaugural lecture is anticipated during the fall semester.

Bob O'Gara led the entire country, *repeat*, the entire country in passing one year and was outstanding in every aspect. Leadership. Toughness. Smarts. He was the whole package.

I have no quarrel with the 100 players who were picked. However, I would strongly recommend making it the top 102 Susquehanna University players of the 20th Century and add Doug Arthur and Bob O'Gara to the group.

They belong. Boy, do they ever belong.

Commencement 2001 Three Faculty Recognized for Teaching, Service

hree Susquehanna faculty members have been named recipients of two annual teaching awards announced at the 2001 commencement ceremonies.

Associate Professor of Spanish Robert Mowry received the John C. Horn Distinguished Service Lectureship. Associate Professor of Biology Tammy Tobin-Janzen and Professor of English Gary Fincke, director of The Writers' Institute, were recipients of the Susquehanna University Teaching Award.

Mowry began teaching at Susquehanna in 1962, having received a bachelor's degree from Oberlin College and a master's and doctorate degrees from Middlebury College.

"He has had a passion from the time he expressed interest in a faculty position here to be a mediator to students, colleagues, and others of the subjects that have been at the heart of his teaching and scholarship for almost 40 years: Spanish language, literature, and culture," said **Warren Funk**, vice president for academic affairs.

Named for John C. Horn, a long-time member and chair of the board of the directors, the award recognizes a faculty member for outstanding scholarship and conscientious service. The recipient offers a public lecture in the following academic year.

Tobin-Janzen joined the faculty in 1994 and holds a bachelor's degree from Cornell University and a doctorate from Texas A & M University.

"Since coming to Susquehanna, she has established a reputation for exciting and imaginative teaching that has earned enthusiasm and accolades from her students and the admiration of her colleagues," said Funk. "Across a wide range of subject matters, unusual in this day of highly specialized research, she has taught effectively and collaborated with student researchers in her area of genetics and also in immunology and microbiology."

Fincke joined the faculty in 1980 and holds a bachelor's degree from Thiel College, a master's degree from Miami University, and a doctorate from Kent State University.

Funk called Fincke a "prolific, working writer, widely recognized among both his author peers and a growing reading public for his poetry, short fiction, and essays."

Founder of the Visiting Writers Series at the University, Fincke is known as a "deeply committed, effective teacher of writers," said Funk. Since 1984, Fincke has published 11 collections of poetry, three collections of short stories and a novel and his poetry has been published in more than 50 venues.

Awards are determined by open nominations from faculty and, in the case of the Teaching Award, also from the Student Government Association.



Sports The Coach's Wife: Stella Stagg Remembered

he new millennium has produced many historical reviews of the great sports figures of the 20th century. From personal experience, let me recall an outstanding football coach of the last century, Amos Alonzo Stagg Sr. More than that, 1 want to give credit to Stella Stagg, the coach's wife for 71 years.



The NCAA has never credited Coach Stagg Sr. with the 21 wins while coaching Susquehanna, because they say he was only an assistant coach under his son Amos Jr.

I know differently, as do the many players who played under him.

My focus in this column, however, is to put the spotllight on Mrs. Stagg. Stella was a co-ed at the University of Chicago when she met Amos Alonzo. He had just become the nation's first full-time collegiate football coach. According to her granddaughter, **Barbara Stagg ('52) Eccker**, a classmate of mine, the young Stella Robertson was a very fine tennis player and an accomplished pianist. They were married in 1894, a union that would last 71 years.

As time went on, Stella got more involved with her husband's program, and they worked almost as a unit. She kept voluminous records, handled correspondence, and was her husband's best press agent. While other ladies of her day may have knitted or crocheted or quilted, Stella learned to diagram plays and attended every practice.

She became Amos Alonzo Stagg's most dependable scout.

In the fall of 1950, I was chosen sports editor of the Susquehanna school paper. This put me in the press box for the games. During the Oct. 28 game with CCNY (City College of New York), who would come and sit down beside me but Mrs. Stagg, then 75 years old! While I made copious notes about every play. Stella Stagg was busy diagramming plays, with the Xs and Os. That day she made a play diagram the first time CCNY ran a different play. If it were a running play, she would indicate the blocking assignments where the running back would go.

At the end of the game, she handed me 12 sheets, representing the 12 basic plays which CCNY used that day. She asked me to post them in the locker room, and the players, in looking at them, could hardly believe that "Stella did the diagrams."

Amos Alonzo Stagg Sr. is the "grand old man" of football, coaching in the collegiate ranks until he was 98 years old, a football genius and legend.

His beloved wife, Stella, often the unsung hero and play designer, needs to be known, at least in this manner, as a one-of-a-kind sports personality of the pervious century.

As everybody who knew her would agree, she was "one great lady."

Susquehanna's Sports Hall of Fame Taps Six

The Susquehanna Sports Hall of Fame will grow to 149 members on Saturday, Oct. 6, with the induction of six new members at halftime of the Homecoming football game vs. Widener.

Jim Hall '68, a four-year member of both the baseball and football teams, was a First Team MAC All-Star second baseman as a junior. He committed just 14 errors in 317 career defensive chances for a .956 career fielding percentage. In football at defensive back, he led the team in tackles during his senior season with 42 (25 solo), and was fifth as a junior with 44 (14 solo).

Baseball standout **Bill Hart '78**, an All-MAC catcher, holds the SU record for career home runs (18) and is ranked among the leaders in career slugging percentage (.575), walks (53) and runs batted in (90). He is the only player in school history to hit five or more homers more than once in his career – and he did it three straight years (1976-78).

A four-year field hockey player, **Kelly MacDonald** '85 helped the 1984 squad post the school record for fewest goals allowed in a season with just five as the team posted its first winning record since 1974 by going 9-3. MacDonald had a microscopic 0.42 goals-against average and stellar .941 save percentage. She also had seven shutouts, a school record at the time, and made the National Field Hockey Festival in 1981, 82 and 83. **Bob O'Gara '51** set football career records for passing yards (2,229) and completions (194) from 1947-49, and still ranks in the top 10 in both categories. He led SU to a 7-7 tie in the snow against Allegheny on November 15, 1947, after tossing a touchdown pass with less than 10 seconds remaining. In 1947, O'Gara ranked fourth in the nation among small college players in passes completed.

A four-year starter in both basketball and softball, Jen Winter '92 led the women's basketball team to back-to-back MAC Northern Division championships and NCAA Division 111 Championship Tournament berths as its starting point guard. She finished her softball career as the school's all-time leading hitter. She presently ranks second in career hits (109), runs (93), batting average (.419) and stolen bases (56) and holds the career record for walks (40).

Rocky Rees served as head football coach from 1985 to 1989, compiling a 36-15-1 record (.701 percentage) in five seasons. He tied an NCAA Division III record for the greatest single-season improvement with an 11-1 mark in 1986 and the first trip to the Division III playoffs in school history. MAC Coach of the Year for 1986, he led the Crusaders to one outright MAC title (1986) and two co-championships (1986 and 1989) before becoming the head coach at Division II Shippensburg University in 1990.

Round-the-World on a Bicycle

illiam Garrett '78 has been around the world – on a bicycle.

ALUMNI PROFILE

Odyssey 2000, a year-long, world-wide cycling expedition, tonk him and 250 other intrepid riders from the U.S., Canada, Europe and South America across six continents and 47 countries.

Garrett, 45, of Hamilton, N.J., cranked more than 18,000 miles on the trip that started Jan. 1, 2000, at the Rose Bowl Parade in Pasadena, Calif., and ended Jan. 1, 2001, at the same parade.

He remembers a trip ad and thinking "only crazy people would do that." But a year or so later, he saw another ad. Intrigued, he started to figure the finances – it cost \$34,000 – and decided, "I'm just going to do it."

An experienced cross-country cyclist, Garrett knew what he was getting into. The tour averaged 79 miles a day. Some days riders would crank out centuries – 100 miles or more.

"It was the trip of a lifetime," he says. "To be able to see so many sights in the world was just a wonderful experience. Experiencing it from the seat of a bicycle, you get a chance to absorb it."

Asia was a highlight. "It's certainly different than what we are used to in the western world," he says. "Wherever

we stopped, the locals gathered around us. They were friendly, open, and curious. That was a unique experience." New Zealand, too, had "just gorgeous scenery and friendly people."

But then there was Costa Raca. It was on the Mountain of Death – a day-long, granny-gear cranking climb that took riders up 7,000 feet in elevation – that he thought, "Lord, what am I doing to myself?" He got off and pushed.

The next day was just as tough and he thought, "I have to go home." But he says, "I got back on the bike. I got through it."

Would he do it again? "For sure. I'm ready to go tomorrow."

His advice to those eyeing a similar trip: "Don't get caught up in the planning. It's a trip that evolves as it goes along. Remember to enjoy the moment."

Garrett is ready to hit the road again. A cross-country trip in 2006 will mark the 20th anniversary of his first cross-country cycle trek.



China Sojot

By Gary Fincke, professor of English and director of the Susquehanna Writers' Institute

Beijing, where our Susquehanna tour group of 15 students and six faculty land, hes on the same latitude as Pennsylvania, yet the temperature on May 16 is in the low 90s. A strong wind carries a steady torrent of grit. The smog is similar to what you'd expect while sitting in traffic inside the Lincoln Tunnel. "Be glad you weren't here yesterday," the guide says. "There was a gale that brought in sand from the desert."

I squint to keep the dust out of my eyes and wonder what wind speed qualifies as a gale. "The Gobi Desert?" I say.

"Yes," the guide says. "We are not far from it."

We are standing in Tian'anmen Square, an open space so large the stone expanse seems to be a man-made desert. I try to imagine tanks and soldiers and tens of thousands of political protestors standing where perhaps a thousand foreign tourists and an equal number of Chinese "vendors" scurry around.

"Hello?" at least 20 vendors have already greeted me. "Postcards?"

They swarm around all of ns. "Hello? You Like?" They hold up stuffed pandas, plastic Buddhas, and cigarette lighters featuring a picture of Mao.

"A million trees," the guide says. "We are planting a million trees each year to stop the erosion and improve the air." The Gobi desert is hundreds of miles away. He raises a powder blue pennant above his head and begins to stride across the square. All 21 of us follow. Twenty-six hours after we boarded a bus at Susquehanna University, our two weeks in China has begun.

That first hour, fortunately, is the low point for me and the rest of the group. The following day we tour The Forbidden City, learn that all the enormous open space inside the walls was constructed to discourage assassins. Our guide discovers I write poetry and takes me aside to say, "We are honored to have you visit our country." When I tell him most people in the United States feel differently about poetry, he thinks I am being modest.

On the 18th, we leave the extraordinary traffic jams of Beijing behind and travel north to the Great Wall. We're accosted by a host of down-on-their-luck farmers who pair up with each of us to act as guides. The old woman who follows me repeats the word "careful" each time the ancient steps turn treacherous. After nearly two hours, she offers picture books, postcards, and scarves ("You like?"), all of which I refuse. I'm supposed to bargam and then buy, and finally I relent, choosing a "Great Wall" cap, paying her 50 yuan (about \$6) instead of her 60-yuan asking price. Nearly everyone in our group is accumulating such bargamed-for souverurs.

Nearly two hours further north, after our bus driver has terrorized all of us by passing repeatedly into oncoming traffic, trusting, apparently, his horn to drive approaching cars onto the shoulder to give us room, we conic to Chengde, which feels like the last outpost before the wilderness takes over. The map confirms it, it's the place where my resolve to try every kind of food placed before me falters When I spit out something so chewy it seems inedible, George Wei informs me I'm

refusing duck's feet. Webbing, I think, and try to carry on. When thick cubes of meat with the fat and consistency of boiled bacon arrive, they become the one thing unanimously refused.

But the food seems irrelevant here. We watch a paper artist create extraordinary designs with a pair of tiny scissors. Three days, it takes her, to cut a replica of the Buddha with 43 arms we've just seen in an active temple, and 1 pay her the equivalent of \$18 for her labor.

The students buy more than the faculty. More important, many of them try to engage the people in conversation. A kind of sign language develops – pointing to things, smiling.

ting Kyle and I know we should exchange one for the other. But when Kyle and I swing our slipper-clad feet onto the bunks, they gesture and chatter.

We slide off the slippers, but moments later, the conductor listens to their complaints, returns with a uniformed man who's joined, shortly after, by another minformed man and George, who's arguing in Chinese. Everything settles down, but George tells Kyle and me we're on a "very Communist train," that the first uniformed man said, in reference to us, "They sent the spy plane."

A few hours after that mild confrontation, we reach the base of Mt. Tai and the cable cars that will dangle us a thousand feet in the air while they haul us more than a mile up to the summit. I'm astonished one of the students is more afraid of heights than I am. She survives and so do the rest of us, and the group applauds her. On the way down, she even glances out the window, a small triumph.

Mt. Tai is thought of as the gateway to heaven, and I can't argue. It's one of those places where you don't want to go to sleep because you'll waste some of the hours you have there. We rise and walk to an overlook to watch the sunrise at 4:50 a.m. None of the students complain. All of us wear the Red Army overcoats supplied by the hotel against the only cold weather we encounter. The monks in the Daoist temples chant nonstop from 6 to 10 a.m. "It's like an Indiana Jones movie here," a student says, and I agree.

In the railroad station, before we reboard for an overnight trip, George leads the students in Tai Chi. It's part of what they are doing for credit, and though for the most part they are awkward and self-conscious, they're game. They listen and learn, discovering, perhaps, what might come of acquiring the rhythm and grace that George demonstrates. This time the train is packed with Chinese passengers who pay us no mind. When I wander away from the group and shoot pool for an hour in Zhouzhuang, every hall I pocket is cheered by the crowd that gathers to watch.

We visit Shanghai University, which is brand new. All of it. Every building for 30,000 students has been erected – for two billion dollars, according to an official – in the past five years. The students are seduced. Word-of-mouth for an exchange program here or in Suzhou, visited two days earlier, will be positive. The administrators we meet at both schools seem open and receptive. The students, when they're paired with their Chinese counterparts, take to

the task of conversing for an hour or more.

That night, in a bar a block from our hotel, a woman slides into a booth beside me. She's overdressed and seems fascinated that I am a teacher. I know, after a few minutes, I'm in the company of what our guide calls "a lady of pleasantry," and I haven't been this socially awkward since my last eighth grade dance. The dean of my school, sitting nearby, keeps track of my embarrassment until I rescue myself by slapping down a tip and heading for the door.

Which is what this trip has been all about – seeing the world new. A student has taken her first plane ride, soaring to China. A student has had her luggage mistakenly shipped to Manchuria and managed to recover. All of us have struggled with strange language, sanitation, customs, and food, yet we have managed, for the most part, to communicate and keep our health. This is education.

ERLE I. SHOBERT II '35: 1913-2001

Erle I. Shobert 11 '35, an outstanding graduate, honorary degree recipient, achievement award winner, benefactor, and chair emeritus of Susquehanna University's board of directors, died May 31, 2001.

Born November 19, 1913, in DuBois, Pa., Erle earned a bachelor of arts degree summa cum laude from Susquehanna. Following graduation, he earned a physics certificate at the Georg August Universitaet in Goettingen, Germany, and a master of arts degree in physics from Princeton University. He married Marjorie Sullivan in 1939, and they had two children, Judith Ann and Margaret. Marjorie passed away three years ago.

Erle's professional career began in 1934 as an engineer with Stackpole Carbon Company of St. Marys, Pa. He continued to serve that firm throughout his career including a term as vice president of technology from 1971 until his retirement in 1979. In 1974, he received the Holm Scientific Achievement Award, and in 1985, the Armington Recognition Award for his significant contributions to the field of electronic contacts aside from thrise involved in engineering and research. A member of numerous professional associations, corporate and scientific boards and advisory councils, he held 25 patents and authored some 50 technical papers and three books.

In 1957, Erle received an honorary doctor of science degree from Susquehanna and was commencement speaker. He was elected to the University's board of directors in 1961 and served as chair from 1978 to 1986 – a tenure marked by a spirit of collegiality enhanced effective planning and decision-making during some challenging institutional times. The board established the Erle I Shobert II and Majorie S. Shobert Scholarship Fund in recognition of their invaluable service to the university Erle was a recipient of the SU Alumin Association's Achievement Award, served as national campaign vice chair for Susquehanna's Window of Opportunity capital campaign and as honorary chair of the Susquehanna 2000 campaign. In 1995, a new residence hall – Shobert Hall – was named in honor of Erle and Marjorie. Township School District and in 1958 became supervising principal and chief school administrator until 1962 when Ashland Area School District was formed. In 1966, he became district assistant superintendent of the newly created North Schulykill School District, returing in 1974. He was married to the former **Dorothy Shutt '40 Kimmel** for 47 years until her death in May 1988. Among the survivors is a daughter, **Ruth Kimmel '79** Snyder.

SU Expects Record Enrollment for 2001-2002

Five Earn Alumni Scholarships

Marking the University's largest enrollment for the seventh year in a row, Susquehanna is expected to open the 2001-2002 academic year with about 1,800 full-time students. The record-breaking incoming freshman class is drawn from the University's largest applicant pool in history. About 570 freshmen and an expected 29 transfers will arrive to kick off Susquehanna's 144th academic year with opening convocation on August 23.

The new class is once again well-qualified academically and includes about 25 students who were valedictorians or salutatorians of their high school classes. Close to 90 percent of the new freshman class represented the top two-fifths of their high school classes.

Five entering members of the Class of 2005 will receive Alumni Scholarship awards for children, stepchildren and grandchildren of alumni.

Loan Consolidation Opportunities Time To Review Your Student Loan Portfolio

The Susquehanna Office of Financial Aid provides the following information for graduates who may wish to take advantage of opportunities to consolidate student loans in times of lowering interest rates.

Each July, the federal government resets the interest rate on student loans. Effective July 1, 2001, rates on Federal Stafford Loans will drop 2.2 percent from 7.59 to 5.39 for loans in an in-school status and from 8.19 to 5.99 for loans in repayment. Federal PLUS loan rates will also drop from 8.99 to 6.79.

If you are already in repayment and have Stafford loans taken out after 1992, or a PLUS loan, your interest rate dropped automatically and should have been reflected on your monthly billing statements from your lender or service provider.

With interest rates dropping, recent graduates should take a good look at federal loan consolidation. If you consolidate within six months of leaving school you could save an additional 0.6 percentage points (the difference between the inschool and in-repayment rates).

Loan consolidation means that you combine all the different federal loans you took out while attending school and collapse them into a single loan at a new interest rate. The interest rate is determined by a weighted average of all of the loans that you are consolidating.

Many lenders and the U.S. Department of Education offer federal loan consolidation. If you consolidate through the government's direct loan program before September 30, 2001, you can receive an additional rate cut of 0.8 percentage points. However, to continue to receive the 0.8 reduction you would have to make all of your monthly payments on-time for the first 12 months.

You may also be able to save an additional .25 percent if your lender provides an incentive for automatically having your monthly payments withdrawn from your checking or savings account.

Some private lenders provide interest reduction incentives ranging from 1.0 to 2.0 percent for ontime payments like the government does.

There is also no penalty for pre-payment of any of your federal student loans, so if you took advantage of loan consolidation, you would still have the ability to pay off your loans earlier than expected which would also reduce your educational debt.

Good Debt to Achieve Dreams

The following opinion piece by Susquehanna President L. Jay Lemons, written in response to the January 2002 Lumina Foundation on Education Report on the accessibility of colleges and universities, appeared in the Harrisburg, Pa., Patriot-News. The foundation's report classified more than 2,800 institutions nationwide according to "affordability" and "admissability," concluding that many colleges and universities – public and private – are "unaffordable." hank goodness the Lumina Foundation's report on college accessibility did not appear when my family and I were making decisions about college. Its conclusion that only a small number of the nation's private colleges are accessible for most families surely would have discouraged, if not derailed, my hopes of attending a private liberal arts college.

A particularly disturbing aspect of the report is the assumption that loans – which help make college affordable for millions of college students – are an evil to be avoided.

Yes, the cost of a college education has risen and has been an increasing concern for prospective students and their parents. Adding to this worry is the federal government's steady shift in its financial aid emphasis from grants to loans. I concur with the authors of the Lumina Foundation report that governmental commitments to keep college within reach of all Americans should be a critical public policy objective.

But significant institutional, state and federal money is available to help most students attend the school of their dreams, and the notion of borrowing to pay for something of value is familiar to most families. While few like the thought of increasing their debt, many wouldn't own their car, house, or even their business without first taking out a loan.

Borrowing money to pay for an education that can allow young people to achieve their career aspirations is a worthy investment. In addition to providing valuable personal benefits, higher education contributes to the public good. College graduates have a higher earning capacity, are less likely to be unemployed, less likely to require government assistance and are more likely to participate as engaged citizens in their communities. As Mort Shapiro, president of Williams College, has said, the only thing more expensive than going to college is not going to college, both for individuals and for our society.

The commitment that comes from borrowing gives students a sense of ownership for their education. It may give them the motivation to care for their investment nuch as they would their first car - making their educational experience even more meaningful.

That was my situation when I left home in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, in 1979 to attend Nebraska Wesleyan University. In that rural, farming community the notion of debt was undestrable. It was a momentous decision for me to borrow to go to school, and yet I could not have gone to my first choice college without student loans.

There was no question that at the age of 18, having the responsibility of signing a promissory note brought me a new level of maturity and purpose. The fact that I had to borrow and work every semester did not detract from my college experience, but enriched it. Having loan responsibilities further motivated me to meet the requirements to graduate.

A cursory analysis of my situation would have concluded that a private college would be beyond my means. Yet, it was at a national liberal arts college similar to Susquehanna University where I now serve, that I found the best fit academically and personally. So, my family and I figured out a strategy to make my enrollment possible – and loans along with governmental grants, institutional scholarships, and campus employment made my dreams possible.

I took out additional loans to complete my graduate degrees. Having just paid off the last of those loans last year, I know personally that the experience was worth the investment.

A young person's dream school should not be dropped from consideration simply because of price and the misperception that

students will have to pay that bill exclusively through loans. At most private schools, the majority of students pay less than the full cost thanks to financial aid that comes through institutionally funded scholarships and scholarship funds established by generous donors. While public colleges appear to cost much less than private colleges, the median federal loan debt for students who graduated from public colleges in 2000 was just \$1,875 less than for students who graduated from private colleges that same year.

Despite the Lumina Foundation's conclusions, America's higher education system remains the envy of the world because of its diversity and its accessibility. It remains one of the best investments any student can make. Equally important, it remains one of the best public policy investments that federal and state governments can make in the future of our democracy.

L. Jay Lemons became president of Susquehanna University in February of 2001. He started making payments on his college student loans in 1986 and paid them off in 2001.

Center for Law and Society Arlin Adams to Lecture March 18



he Honorable Arlin M. Adams will deliver the inaugural lecture at the official March launch of The Arlin M. Adams Center for Law and Society at Susquehanna University.

Adams, a prominent jurist from Philadelphia whose distinguished national career includes 17 years on the bench of the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and lifelong involvement in professional, charitable and educational organizations, will lecture on religion and the law Monday, March 18, at 7:30 p.m. in Degenstein Center Theater.

The center, established in June by the family of Sigfried and Janet Weis and the Degenstein Foundation of Sunbury, with support from The Annenberg Foundation, is intended to strengthen the intellectual dialogue at Susquehanna by raising issues that intersect academic disciplines and important societal questions.

The center complements the university's legal studies, pre-law, and interdisciplinary offerings and serves as a resource to the greater community. As its work becomes known, it is hoped that the Adams Center will grow to be recognized regionally and nationally as an authoritative resource, In delivering the inaugural annual lecture, Adams will set the stage for an ongoing lectureship that will attract prominent leaders and scholars to speak at Susquehanna. His lecture's topic, drawn from a life-long interest in religion and the law, will open an exploration of future issues as diverse as ethics, technology, privacy issues, taxation, constitutional law, and death and dying.

Already, the Adams Center is making a mark on student development and community outreach in the form of funding for two fall- and spring-semester Susquehanna student interns at North Penn Legal Services in Sunbury. The interns work five hours a week and earn two semester-hour credits.

The Legal Services student interns "not only answer the phones, they greet everyone who comes in the door – from scheduled clients to other attorneys to prospective chents coming in off the street," says Pete Macky, the agency's supervising attorney. They gather preliminary information on law-related problems ranging from landlord and employment to child custody and domestic violence issues.

"Many, many people call us," says Macky. "These students really work the front lines. They really see how people are affected by the law. They're in the hot seat all the time."

In addition, the Adams Center and Legal Services are slated to embark on a joint video-dubbing project that will translate a

number of legal "how-to" videos from English to Spanish for the growing Latino population in the Central Susquehanna Valley.

Susquehanna Spanish-fluent students will create subtitled text for the videos and, eventually, record complete voice-overs in Spanish.

"The dubbing will be helpful in this area where Spanish seems to be growing," says Macky. Topics covered by the videos that will be used in the agency's 20-county service area of Northeastern Pennsylvania include domestic violence, mediation, landlord-tenant issues, custody, unemployment compensation, and district justice court.

Adams, who remains active in the law firm of Schnader, Harrison, Segal & Lewis, one of Philadelphia's largest, served as the secretary of public welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. President Richard M. Nixon appointed him to the Court of Appeals in 1968, a position he held for 17 years. He also served five years as an independent counsel for the investigation of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Adams was a visiting Woodrow Wilson fellow at Susquehanna in 1981 and, in 1985, received an honorary doctor of laws degree from the university.

Susquehanna University has announced the establishment of the **Cyril M. Stretansky** Distinguished Professorship in Choral Music, the first chair created to benefit the university's fine arts program.

The endowed chair, which will fund the director of choral activities position, was established through the combined generosity of Cyril Stretansky and his wife, Lee, and anonymous donors who wanted to honor his 30 years of service as professor of music and director of choral activities.

"This gift is an expression of our passion and love for the choral arts and the opportunities Susquehanna has given us," says Stretansky. "Without the contributions of others, this chair would not exist."

The Stretanskys hope that the chair will promote greater awareness and appreciation of the fine arts as studied, created, rehearsed, exhibited and performed at Susquehanna.

Collins, who is senior vice president in charge of the Department of Supervision, Regulation and Credit of the Federal Reserve Bank, serves as an alumni representative. He earned a B.S. in economics and marketing. Collins began his career with the Federal Reserve in 1974 as an assistant examiner, and moved through the ranks, attaining his current position in 1994. He chairs the Federal Reserve System Committee on Staff Development/ Utilization and System Performance, and is a member of the Business Advisory Council of both Villanova University and Susquehanna's Sigmund Weis School of Business

The Rev. Ballard has served as pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Millersburg since 1991. She has been active in the Lower Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and joins the hoard as a synod representative. She has served on the synod's Executive Committee, Synod Council, Leadership Support Committee and the Reference and Counsel Conunittee. She has also served on the board of Lenoir-Rhyne College in North Carolina. during high school. Later, as a student at Union Theological Seminary, he assisted in library acquisitions. "About 40 percent of our budget was spent overseas and 1 spent a lot of time looking up exchange rates," he recalls.

A curiosity in computers in the late 1960s led to his firsthand experience in the technological advances that have revolutionized library science over the course of his career. Online search tools and electronic databases have become the stock in trade to locate, select, and fill requests for materials ranging from electronic journals to out-ofprint texts. "You can do so much more than you could do when you were dealing with paper," he says.

Because Smillie has a longstanding interest and expertise in music – at Haverford, he performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra in a tri-college choir – he also handled the orders for sheet music and recordings. His plans for retirement include a possible relocation, and until then, more time to enjoy the home he shares with his wife, Barbara. One-and-a-quarter acres on the side of a ridge outside Salem, the property has proven an ideal place to enjoy wildlife, *The New York Times* Sunday crossword puzzle, and favorite opera recordings. "I have a tendency to put it on loud enough to hear wherever I am in the house," he says.

They also plan to travel, including trips to California to visit son Benjamin, a graduate student at the University of Southern California, and continue their habit of frequent long weekends in New York City for culture and cuisine. "I will be going to more operas," says Smillie. "I am also planning to expand the repertoire of foods that I cook."

Also on the list: more time to read, and maybe write too, "though not my memoirs," he quips.



Service Learning

Ten SU students, three faculty/staff, and one spouse traveled to Costa Rica and Nicaragua for 14 days in December and January as the University's Central America Service Learning/Mission Team 2002. Coordinated through the Office of the Chaplain, 68 members of the University community have served and studied for two weeks in Central America since the program began in 1999. They have delivered a combined total of more than \$100,000 in materials and contributed at least 3,500 hours of volunteer labor.

Yahoo! Internet Life's online magazine has again ranked Susquehanna University as one of the nation's "most wired colleges."

Susquehanna appears as 45 on a list of the nation's top 50 small colleges with an overall score of 81.80 in a survey conducted with Peterson's educational services.

The 2001 rankings, posted on Yahoo! Internet Life's web site in late December, can be found at www.wiredcolleges.com.

The survey measures six weighted categories – infrastructure, student resources, web portal, teaching and e-learning, technical support, and wireless capability – each consisting of four to 18 factors. About 1,300 institutions participated in the 2001 survey which ranked the top 200 wired colleges, the top 20 two-year institutions, and the top 50 small colleges.

Susquehanna has been a leader among small colleges and universities in providing access to information technology. Its campuswide local area network completed in 1994 connects all residence halls with faculty and staff offices, classrooms, laboratories, the library and other teaching and learning spaces, in addition to the Internet.

New Athletic Complex Named For James W. Garrett

wo Susquehanna alumni who played football in the 1960s under coach Jim Garrett helped pay special tribute to him during Homecoming 2001 with the naming of Susquehanna's new sports complex in his honor.

Richard E. Caruso '65, Ph.D., a member of the Susquehanna Athletic Hall of Fame, founder of the Football Alumni Association and a member of the board of directors, provided the leadership gift. Susquehanna Board Chair Nicholas A. Lopardo '68, also a member of the Hall of Fame, provided additional major support, with other gifts coming from former players and friends. Robert A. Pittello '51, Susquehanna's offensive line coach for 35 years, championed the effort to honor Garrett. Alumni, players and friends also recognized Pittello with the naming of a new football locker room in his honor.

Garrett compiled a 39-11-1 record at Susquehanna from 1960-65, including undefeated seasons in 1961 and 1962; an unbeaten string of 22 games, longest in the country at the time; and a stunning 22-18 win over highly-ranked Division I Temple University in 1963. "They were amazing football teams," Garrett said of his players. "And they were amazing young men."

He later served as head football coach at Columbia University and as head coach of the Houston Texans franchise of the World Football League. He spent 38 years in the National Football League as an assistant coach with the New York Giants, Dallas Cowboys, New Orleans Saints and Cleveland Browns; and as a scout with the Cowboys.

Susquehanna completed a \$14 million ren-

ovation and expansion of athletic facilities in 2000-2001. The James W. Garrett Sports Complex includes O.W. Houts Gymnasium, physical education facilities, and new components such as the Nicholas A. Lopardo Football and Track Stadium, Clyde H. Jacobs Fitness Center, Harold Bollinger Baseball Field, a 51,000-square-foot field house, racquetball courts, new offices and meeting spaces, and a student lounge with café dining.

Goodbye Grass, Hello Field Turf

Football, field hockey and men's lacrosse varsity teams will be able to compete on a new, high- ℓ tech field surface on Susquehanna's Amos Alonzo Stagg Field starting in mid-2002. The field will also be available for intramural and recreational activities as well as a potential practice venue for varsity soccer and women's lacrosse teams.

The synthetic product, called Field Turf, "has proven to be natural in its performance and produces a lower rate of injury than even natural grass," says **Don Harnum**, the University's director of athletics. "The new surface will allow us to have multiple activities on the same or successive days including intramurals and other recreation." The current natural grass field surface will be moved to the Douglas Arthur Practice Field.

The project will also include the addition of lighting that will allow use of the field after dark.

ike their parents, Don '50 and Flossie Barnhart '51 Wissinger, siblings Scott Wissinger '76, Donna Wissinger '78, Jane Wissinger '81 Cornille, and Diane Wissinger '84 Hodgson, planted their collegiate roots at Susquehanna and continue to develop highly successful careers and lives. Today they are a professor of biology, a flunst, a professor of chemistry and a coordinator for international student programs respectively, and all educators. No one can say this family is under-accomplished.

Scott, the eldest and a professor in the biology and environmental science departments at Allegheny College, is currently at the University of Canterbury in New Zealand doing research on the effects of introduced trout on nanve species. The five-month trip is courtesy of a prestigious Fulbright scholarship, one of more than a dozen grants he's received throughout his career thus far. But he says it's not the recognition that makes his job worthwhile.

"Most of my students can teach themselves the book-learning stuff, but the process of discovery is more often kindled by emulation and inspiration, and that is accomplished in my field by working toe-to-toe in the field or at the lab with students"

Concert flutist Donna, of Lutz, Fla., received the 2001 Doris Leeper Award for Arts Education and has been nominated for the Florida Arts Recognition Award. She has been recognized, in part, for dedicating so much of her time to community projects, including serving on the steering committee of the National Arts Marketing Project and writing and receiving a grant from the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay to work with disadvantaged adults and youths. On top of all this, she has recorded a CD and continues to perform for schools, government agencies and *Fortune 500* companies through Creative Leaps International, an ensemble of solo artists acting as worldwide consultants on leadership and creativity.

"Through the example of my parents, I have acquired the integrity of participating in the life of my community," Donna said. "It is my goal to become an eloquent arts advocate and to model the artist as an integral part of the community."

Jane, the organic laboratory coordinator and occasional lecturer in organic chemistry at the University of Minnesota, has been recognized for outstanding teaching and has recently completed a laboratory manual for the organic laboratory course. "SU gave me a solid basis of knowledge and self-confidence to pursue my career." Jane said. "Education is a strong value in or family, and Susquehanna has contributed to that value in so many ways."

The youngest of the four, Diane, was also trained as a scientist, but found a different calling while working at the Southern Illinois University international office during her graduate education in geology. By 1994, she had earned her doctorate in higher education, traveled to Russia and China and presented at conferences for the National Association of Foreign Student Affairs. In 1995, she was invited to coordinate a pre-departure orientation program for Russian graduate students traveling to the United States by the International Research and Exchanges Board.

Since the birth of her first son in 1996, Diane has chosen to stay home and raise her family, what she calls "the most rewarding and challenging of careers," while continuing to volunteer coordinating the international spouses group and other activities at SIU.

"You know the phrase, 'All roads lead to Rome?" she said. "Well, in my family, all roads lead to Susquehanna. Over fifty years ago, my dad, the football player, met a quiet music education major at S.U... Their commitment to a well-rounded education has impacted all of their children. In a few years, we hope there is a third generation finding the value of a solid education."



hese are challenging economic times that we are facing! For our younger alumni this may be the first employment slowdown that you have ever personally faced. I certainly have felt the sting as I had my "position eliminated" while working at Volvo Commercial Finance. The challenge these times present is not in trying to figure out if your company is going to struggle or if your position will be "eliminated." The challenge is being prepared to make a transition either by choice or when forced to do so.

Being prepared to "transition" means conducting what 1 call a Lifelong Job Search. What do I mean by this? Job searching has always been fundamentally about making connections. Each connection opens us up to new opportunities and insights. Often this insight inspires us to acquire new skills, develop talents, or use our current skills and talents in different ways. These new connections can then potentially lead to new employment opportunities. Connections are not "want-ads" but relationships that can be drawn upon during times of forced transition or transitions of choice. 

The Schmidt Family: **EB** Foundation Advocates

hey're not new to parenting, but for the last-one-and-a-half years Sarah Shofran '92 Schmidt and her husband, Eric Schmidt '90 have had to relearn how to dress, pick up and hold their fragile second-born son.

At just three days old, Connor Schmidt was diagnosed with Epidermolysis Bullosa, "EB," a rare incurable genetic skin disorder. Due to a malfunctioning protein in his body. Connor's skin is extremely fragile, causing it to blister with the slightest bit of friction."He gets blisters from his highchair, car seat, bathtub, even a healing blister can cause more blisters," explains Sarah. Even big brother, two-and-a-half-year-old Aidan, knows not to touch Connor's hands or feet when they play. The only treatment is lancing Connor's blisters and bandaging his legs and feet, which has become part of the family's bedtime rourine.

Despite it all, Connor is a pretty typical one-year-old, very active and happy, especially when he's pestering his big brother, says Sarah. He has some stranger anxiety and

while he wants to crawl and pull himself up, the blisters on his hands and feet keep him from doing so without pain.

Because EB is such a rare condition, affecting only 25,000 people in the United States, funding is minimal. The only federal money, about \$3 million annually, comes from the Department of Defense. Sarah explains, "The government believes the symptoms of EB to be simular to what we could expect from chemical warfare, and most of that money goes to the research centered on more severe types of EB."

To aid families dealing with EB, Sarah and Eric are working for passage of a Wound Care bill that would require insurance to pay for all bandages. They also speak at preschools and churches to promote awareness of EB. Advocacy for the Connor T. Schmidt Foundation has become part of their everyday life."When we are out with Connor the questions people ask are, 'Is there a cure?' and 'Will it ever go away?' Unfortunately the answer is a simple 'no,"

The only hope for a cure or treatment for EB is advancement in gene therapy through stem cell research. To learn more about EB visit www.ebinfoworld.com or www.debra.org. > JUST 18 DAYS into their fall semester, first-year students in the class of 2005 faced September 11, 2001 – an event with the potential to define not only their college experience and their lives, but also the lives of the country and

the world for generations to come. "My first thought was, especially for the freshmen, 'How will we ever get through this semester?' "recalls Assistant Professor of Sociology **Simona Hill**. "But the students got back on track. I attribute that to resiliency," she adds. "If they can bounce back, there's hope for us as a society."

Faces and Names

Shock turned into grief as hours and days passed and the enormous tragedy took on faces and names. Though physically insulated by 200 miles, the Susquehanna community lost some of its own: **Colleen Supinski '96**, an assistant trader for Sandler O'Neill on the 104th floor of the south tower, and **Chris Vialonga '93**, who worked in foreign currency exchange at Carr Futures on the 92nd floor of the north tower. Among others with losses we know of: **Diane Mead '86 Wall** lost her husband and the father of their two daughters, Glen, who worked for Cantor Fitzgerald. **Erich Maerz '97** lost his brother, Noel, who worked for Euro Brokers on the 84th floor in tower two.

But there was hopeful news too. Peter Grover '97, who worked at Lehman Brothers, was not in the office that day. Other alumni who worked at the World Trade Center were reported safe: Claudia Calich '88 and Heidi Heikenfeld '00 at Oppenheimer Funds; Peter Kamford '76 and Jill Beachell '98 at Guy Carpenter & Co. Inc., Stacey Peters '90 Lopis at Cantor Fitzgerald, and Kevin McCaffery '87 at Garban PLC.

At Ground Zero

McCaffery, a bond broker, was on the 26th floor of the north tower when the first plane struck. "We proceeded fairly calmly to the stairways," he says, "We had no way of knowing the second tower had been hit, but later 1 figured 1 was probably on about the tenth floor when it did," he adds, "Outside, it looked like a scene from a movie. Because the buildings were so tall, it was still very far away. We were looking up 800 or 900 feet at something surreal and unfathomable."

Steven Rhoads '86, a special agent for the firearms trafficking unit with the Department of Treasury's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF), was at a makeshift command post a few blocks away. His wife, Kara, also an ATF special agent, unraculously survived the collapse by taking cover inside a parked vehicle. "Things went from bright davlight to pitch black – you couldn't see two feet in front of vourself," recalls Rhoads.

Roller Coaster Emotions

Terry March '67, chief executive officer of Midwood Securities and vice chair of the SU board of directors, was in his offices on the 26th floor of One Battery Park Plaza, which faces the World Trade Center site. Midwood's 35 employees, including Terry's wite, Pauline, and son, Edward, came through the ordeal safely.

"But our thoughts immediately were of what happened to the somewhere between 30,000 and 50,000 people who work in the buildings every day," he recalls.

"There was a whole range of emotions, from fear at first, to concern about the safety and security of those in our company and those who we know," says March. "That very quickly went to thoughts of compassion and security and anger as we started to find out what had happened – it was a horrific roller coaster ride of emotions."

Across the globe in China, **Mary Coughlin '82**, chief investment officer for Barnegat Bay Investment Advisors and a member of the University board of directors, and her husband, David Shanker, were eagerly anticipating the atrival of the two-year-old they were to adopt.

"While people on the East Coast were just beginning the workday, we were in the hotel room in bed, because there's a 12-hour difference. The only Englishspeaking station was CNN," says Conghlin, whose mece, Colleen Supinski, was among the missing. "I knew where Colleen was. I was in immediate panic and I made a ton of phone calls and we just waited and waited," she recalls. "To have that much joy and that much pain at the same time was unbelievable."

Counting Blessings

Among those counting special blessings is Susquehanna Board Chair Nick Lopardo '68 who had just been in one of the the buildings the day before the attacks."Fd often been to receptions at Windows on the World in the World Trade Center and would marvel at the private aircraft flying below," he says. "I remembered growing up as a kid on Long Island during the 60s and seeing that building project – how incredible it was right from the start ... and how incredible it felt to fly back recently and not have the two towers there."

A senior attorney and government ethics specialist in the office of the secretary of defense, **Gail Mason '70** was attending a conference in Norfolk, Va., when the plane crashed into the Pentagon. 'It was like the building was wounded,' she says. 'There was this gaping hole.' A civilian, as are most of the people working in the Pentagon, she returned to a workplace that was also a crime scene. 'You were greeted by several military persons with Uzis as soon as you got off the train, then you got to the turnsile and there were more – at every point along the way there were armed guards.''

Familiar Faces

Beth Sullivan '02, a marketing major from Long Island, was fresh from a summer internship at Baseline Financial Services on the 77th and 78th floor at 2 World Trade Center. Four of the company's 250 employees lost their lives. "It hit

me really hard," she says. "A month earlier I was working there, going in every morning at 7:30 or 8-1 didn't know a lot of people or a lot of names, but by going in at the same time every day, everyone's faces on the subway had become familiar."

At hume that morning in Manville, N.J., Red Cross volunteer Lynn Hassinger '57 Askew was assigned by 11:30 a.m. to a Jersey City shelter. "We took two-hour sleep shifts and sat up all mght and watched it burn," she says. But it was a "very different kind of shelter experience" for Askew, a veteran of disaster sites including Oklahoma City and Hurricane Floyd, when floodwaters were literally in her own neighbor's backyard. "I have never seen so many ambulances and first aid vehicles sitting in lines and lines waiting to be used. Of course, they expected a lot more victims to be survivors."

Outpouring of support

"People stepped forward and did what they had to do," says Steven Rhoads. "It showed to not only the people in this country, but the people around the world, that even if something as devastating as this happens you can still pick yourself up and keep going."

On campus, the student hfe staff — especially residence life, the counseling and health centers, Director of Multicultural Affairs **Brian Johnson**, Chaplain **Mark Wm. Radecke**, and Dean of Students **Dorothy Anderson** — were tracking and staying in touch with at least 20 students early on. "We really worked, with help from the computer center, to discover as quickly as possible students who had family and friends in New York City and DC," explains Anderson. Several students were trying to get in touch with parents who worked at the site. One student lost a cousin and had another cousin seriously injured; one lost her future stepfather, a transit policeman; two are related to Mary Coughlin and Colleen Supinski. But on the whole, says Anderson, "We had more good news than bad as the day unfolded."

The days were particularly stressful for Americans of Middle Eastern descent such as **Baktash Ahadi '05** who was just two-years-old when his family fled Afghamstan in 1984 during the Soviet invasion After a harrowing six-day ride over the mountains and six months in a Pakistan refugee camp, the family emigrated to the United States with a sponsorship from St. Paul Lutheran Church in Carhsle, Pa. 'I received so many phone calls on September 11th, asking me if I was okay, letting me know if I had any troubles where I could call,'' says Ahadi. ''I never had even met these people, they were just there.'' For others, carrying on meant continuing with classes and activities. "There is no place I would rather have had our students during the course of this week than in the company of the mature, thoughtful, and wise members of our faculty," said President **L. Jay Lemons** at the service for prayer and remembrance.

Relief efforts blossomed on campus as well. Among them: the football team contributed \$2,560 from the Lycoming game to the disaster fund Alpha Phi Omega and Chapel Council donated profits from a Penny Wars competition to the American Red Cross. Phi Mu Delta hired a bus to transport members to a blood drive in Williamsport. And **Kate Skivington '05**, an elementary education major from Scottstown, N.Y., spearheaded campus efforts to collect funds for President Bush's Fund for Afghan Children. Meanwhile, church pastors and members of Lutheran communities in Costa Rica that benefit from an annual Central American service learning project sponsored by the Office of the Chaplan sent a powerful and moving Letter of Solidarity.

Channeling Hope

By Thursday, Sept. 13, students in Assistant Professor of Sociology Simona Hill's Social Problems class were laying the groundwork for "Voices of Concern," an on-campus forum on the tragedy. "The focus of a liberal arts education is to make sense of events, not only in our everyday lives, but in a global sense," explains Hill. "I am so proud of my students. They took some of that initial panic, dread, fear and uncertainty and channeled it into an academic endeavor."

Seeking his own way to honor his hrother's memory, Erich Maerz trained in just three weeks and ran with his father in the New York City marathon with his brother's race number and picture on the front of their shirts. The two also discussed their family's loss on television shows, "The O'Reilly Factor" and "Dateline."

"You wonder how could God do this?" he says. "But think about how many people stayed home from work that day. How many people went in late or went out to get coffee. How many people got down the steps."

"It makes you realize that every day you have is a gift."

The New Normal

Four months later and just blocks away from the WTC cleanup site, Terry March and his firm are trying to return to what he describes as "the new normal." They have dealt with short-term issues such as air quality and supplies of fire extinguishers, and now face larger, longer-term issues such as adequate insurance and the possible chilling effect on business posed by a threatened urban environment.

"There is a much greater feeling of vulnerability and the security issues that come with that," says March. "But we're going to work here. We're not leaving. We will not be driven away by the barbaric acts of terrorism."

"Some of my attitudes might change," says Gail Mason, recalling reports of people in the World Trade towers who went back to work instead of evacuating. "I'm one of those people who will work through the fire alarms – and wish they'd shut it off! Or I will be the first one back at work," she says. "And I don't think any of us can afford to do that any more. They're not false alarms, nor just inconveniences."

Amid it all is an air of uncertainty succinctly expressed by the University's Director of Computing Services, **Roozbeh Tavakoli**, who had lived under the dictatorship in his native Iran until he emigrated to the United States at the age of 25."I spent the first 25 years of my life living in fear, the next 25 living in times of great opportunity, and now I'm not sure what's next."

More Cautious Travel

For those who travel in the most vulnerable metropoltan areas, longer commutes and security checkpoints are the new order of the day. And many in the Susquehanna community admit to being more cautious in plans for travel, particularly during high-profile times, such as the holidays.

"I spent 15 to 20 years traveling 150,000 to 200,000 miles a year, even on airlines like Aeroflot and China Air," says Lopardo. "Now I have second thoughts about getting on an American Airlines flight."

Five of the 26 students planning study abroad during spring semester postponed or cancelled their plans, according to **Scott Manning**, coordinator of international study programs. But, he adds, interest in study abroad for next year actually appears to be higher than usual, with students citing an increased need to understand the international arena or interest in careers oriented toward government and international issues.

Perspective

The évents have provided fertile ground for discussions on topics from the Islaunc faith and personal freedoms to morality and the meaning of life. "It comes up all the time in quite a few of iny classes," says first-year student Kate Skivington. "Something draws us back to that day."

"I am always looking for new ways to present material, but this is an opportunity that I didn't want," says Simona Hill. "It will change how I teach minoritics," she says. There have also been some calls to focus on issues dealing with Arabs and Jews in the capstone course in diversity studies, which she coordinates. "It is a good sign," she adds. "It's important that we go outside of ourselves," she stresses

In late November, Baktash Ahadi declared a major – psychology with a political science minor – definitely influenced by post-September 11 events. "Psychology is great. People are interacting day in and day out. You ca't get bored. And I think it's the same thing with political science, especially where the two disciplines intersect. Just think about how strong someone's views are that they might strap a bomb to their chest and blow themselves up along with 20 other innocent people for a cause they think is just."

Lessons Learned

From a business owner's perspective, the events have in many ways prompted a renewed commutment, says Terry March. "Each and every one of us will be rechanneling resources – perhaps from increasing efficiency and growing the existing business to improving security and looking at doing business in more creative ways."

"I think the biggest lesson is we've got to have better intelligence in this country, because we should have known about this," feels Mary Coughlin. And Coughlin, a former New Yorker, also stresses the need for better evacuation plans, especially after experience gained from the 1993 World Trade Center bombing.

"We need to be more careful, more observant. The terrorists were here a long nine trying to blend in," says Gail Mason. But, she adds, we also need a careful balance of questioning more without going to the extreme of labeling people. "I was a small child during the McCarthy hearings – some of the rhetoric we're hearing almost reminds me of that. It terrifies me that that could happen again."

Our Part in the Global Community

"This opens Americans' eyes and minds to what the government is doing and to how other people are suffering day in and day out," says Baktash Ahadi. "In this

country we can think about things like life, food, computers, free time and a college education, when many of the people in the world, especially in Afghanistan, can't even read," he says. "All of a sudden, people want to know about these things," he adds. "I feel like I have a moral obligation to help people understand."

"One of the lessons President Bush has learned is that we can't just stand here alone as a nation and think somehow we are self sufficient and everything is going to be just fine," says Associate Professor of Philosophy **Jeff Whitman**. "For better or worse, we're part of a global community and things that happen on the other side of the globe affect us in the United States.

"If we're going to win the war against terrorism, the military effort is going to be the least important part of the equation," he stresses. "We need to change conditions in certain areas of the world that breed terrorism – that's the hard part – that will take sacrifice because it will cost money."

"I have always been an optimist – a glass half full kind of person," says Nick Lopardo. "Unfortunately, there is a lot of good in the world that goes unnoticed while evil gets the attention," he says, urging people to look around and recognize everyday heroes who are making a difference in the lives and institutions around them.

"The lesson that's most important is to be thankful for every day that you're here, even if things don't go right ... In the blnk of an eye, as the Bible would say, those precious days can go by."

Standout SU wrestlers Thomas J. Dodd '92 and Todd Ericson '93 have continued their success on the mat while coaching wrestling together at Eagle Valley High School in Gypsum, Colo.

Meeting the Ironman Challenge

Dave Moretz '94 and Friends FINISH

Dave Moretz '94 shores the following excerpts from his 3,000 word article on conquering the Ironman Triathlon.

've always dreamed of finishing an Ironman, but never thought it possible. It's like retiring in my thirties, opening a coffee shop in a small mountain town, and then taking a few years off to travel the world and mingle with exotic people.

My fascination with the event began at the age of 10, when I first watched the Ironman on ABC's Wide World of Sports. I was riveted ...

After 11 months of preparation, I can honestly say, I trained as much as life would allow. I trained in California, Connecticut, Illinois, Massachusetts, New

York, London, and Calcutta. 1 trained in weather conditions I wouldn't drive in, and covered more miles than some people travel in

their whole life. In total (I started keeping track in mid-September) I swam 108 miles, biked 2,355 miles and ran 771 miles for a total of 3,234 miles in 307 hours of training.

... The race began with a water start ... 1,805 triathletes floated elbow to elbow with a common bond and a common purpose. ... When I exited the water an hour later, I was not far off from the leaders. Unfortunately, the swim is my strongest event. Every race I enter, I always exit the water near the lead, then have to transition to my weakest event and watch biker after biker ride by The Ironman is not a race against others, it is a competition against yourself. It is a battle between you and the course.

... As the miles piled up, my body experienced sensations I could never have comprehended. Every step rocked my body, my legs felt like lead and my thighs burned incessantly. The uphills required more energy than I could muster, the downhills caused more pain than I could handle, but never once did I think about quitting or stopping

... By nule 25, I was in a complete trance.... In one more mile, I would have accomplished a goal that I had always fantasized about, but never fathomed possible. In one more nule, I would do something that no one could ever take away from me. In one more mile, I was going to become an Ironman!



ALUMNI PROFILE

Ryan Szuch 'OO Fulbright Award is Just the Beginning

For many recent college graduates, beginning a masters program is a normal step. But Ryan Szuch '00 is a few steps ahead of his North Carolina State University peers after an impressive year of award-winning research as a Fulbright scholar at the University of New England in Armidale, Australia.

Under the guidance of Dr. Andrew Boulton, Szuch studied subsurface water at the Rocky River near Armidale. Examining subsurface water or the water within riverbed sediments, Szuch deternuned that plant growth was inhibited due to low levels of nitrogen. The Australian Society of Linnology recognized his research with a Best Student Presentation award. Impressed by his work, the Australian Cooperative Research Center for Freshwater Ecology also sent a doctoral candidate to Armidale to observe Szuch's findings.

Szuch was awarded the Fulbright Scholarship after graduating from Susquehanna with a self-designed major in ecosystems analysis. Armudale, a rural city between Sydney and Brisbane, reminded him a lot of Susquehanna's campus. At the University of New England Szuch experienced the same sense of community and personal attention that he loved at Susquehanna.

"However, what most attracted me to Armidale was the opportunity to work with Dr. Boulton," said Szuch. Boulton and Szuch will be collaborating again when they publish their research in the next year.

The Apollo, Pa., native found his Fulbright experience extremely rewarding. Through the grant he was able to experience a new culture. The grant also provided him with the opportunities to travel to various Australian wetlands and natural parks, including one owned by television's "Crocodile Hunter," Steve Irwin. "It was humorous because *The Crocodile Hunter* is such a hit in the United States but only went on Australian TV a few months ago," said Szuch.

Another highlight was the opportunity to interact with the 20 other American Fulbright Scholars in Australia, he added. "In February all the scholars were flown into Canberra for a Fulbright Enrichment Seminar."

Having carned a graduate diploma from the University of New England, Szuch will study soil science, working mostly with wetland restoration, for his master's degree. After two years at North Carolina State University, Szuch intends to continue his education or begin his career in wetland construction and restoration.

Road Show Marks 25th Anniversary Celebrating Chemis Makes You Smile

"Ooh!" and "Ahh!" are usually not the sounds one associates with chemistry, but for the last 25 years, those are the responses that the Chemistry Road Show has been receiving from high school students throughout the northeast.

The 2001-2002 academic year will be the last year for the road show, that, over the years, through entertainment and visual tricks, has tried to demonstrate to young people that science is fun as well as practical. Seeing large explosions and hearing thunderous booms followed by enthusiastic cheers is expected wherever the show makes its stops. The show not only helps to increase awareness about Susquehanna University and its science department but also spreads the message that science was indeed a challenging and fun career path for talented students.

As the show reaches its 25th anniversary, there are probably few people who remember that it originated as a brainstorm of Professor Emeritus of Chemistry **Tom McGrath** in 1976 to help increase knowledge of chemistry in high school students.

In the program's first year, McGrath visited only four schools. Since then, the show has gone on to perform more than 421 times at more than 191 high schools ranging from Pittsburgh to Long Island and Washington, D.C., to Connecticut. The whole chemistry department participated in the program at its start, but McGrath and Professor of Chemistry Neil Potter, who took over the program after McGrath retired, have made the majority of the visits. "By the time 1 retire, 50,000 students will have seen the show," says Potter. "And they all have a better perspective of science and Susquehanna University because of it."

More than 70 students were trained as chemical demonstrators and joined the program as it crossed the country. Of those 70, 60 went on to earn Ph.D., M.D., D.D., or master's degrees. "The students we have had are very accomplished," says

Potter. "Quite a few have said that the program was something that they look back on as one of the most memorable parts of their SU experience."

Jeff Funk '00, currently in a Ph.D. program at Penn State, described the road show program as promoting "a chance to think on the fly, preparing me for the rigors of being a laboratory assistant at both Susquehanna University and Penn State. More importantly, it was a chance to share with others my enthusiasm for chemistry."

Nicole Purcell '96 received her Ph.D. in pathology from the University of Alabama at Birmingham, decided to come to SU after seeing the chemistry road show herself. As an assistant, she says that she felt "lucky to go to the high school and inspire students to enjoy science and not be afraid of it."

"The road show was one of the first times that I felt purpose," recalls **Melissa Martz '91 Figgins**. "I was proud to be spending my spring break bringing science to young people. Looking back, I know my trips did just as much for me as for those students."

Potter can probably best describe the legacy of the program. "I have walked across campus and so many students have stopped me and told me that they remember me coming to their high school and doing the program. Many times, these students weren't even science majors, so you see the scope and effectiveness of the program. It's really amazing."



As a parent of two UVa-Wise graduates, l feel a strong need to tell of my thoughts about Dr. Lemons. My oldest son Bryan graduated from UVa-Wise in 1997, and Dr. Lemons could call him by name!

My younger son Chris began UVa-Wise in the fall of 1997. He had heart problems, including three congenital heart defects. Surgery was done and he received his first pacemaker at age 13. His condition required a new pacemaker at 21. For these last 10 years of his life he had to take a pill every eight hours to keep his heart in rhythm. A possible heart transplant was projected at some point in the future.

Early the morning of Feb. 24, while visiting Snowshoe (W.Va.) Resort with his fraternity brothers of Pi Lambda Phi, Chris went to sleep on the sofa in his older brother's apartment. The physicians feel that about 4:45 his heart just stopped! He was due to graduate in June. He was 23 years old.

UVa-Wise poured out its grief and compassion on all of us in his fanuly. One card in particular raised a few eyebrows when it arrived at our residence. It was from the President's Office of Susquehanna University and contained a short handwritten note of his sorrow for Chris' death. Dr. Lemons took time!

Why do 1 write this? I saw this man in action as a knowledgeable, caring individual who worked well with his students. My sons liked him.

Thank you, Dr. Lemons for the effects you had on my sons' lives. You are truly an "educator!"

Campus News NAACP Chairman to Address Class of 2002 Graduates and Families



ulian Bond, chairman of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), will be the principal speaker at Susquehanna University's 144th commencement

held Sunday, May 12. He will receive an honorary doctor of laws degree from the university.

Susquehanna will also award honorary degrees to **Sam Evert**, a former member of the university board of directors, and Dean of Students **Dorothy Anderson '62**, who will retire this year following 35 years of service to the university. (See story, page 9.) Anderson will deliver the address at the baccalaureate service beginning at 10 a.m. in Weber Chapel Auditorium.

Bond has been a leader in the movement for civil rights, economic justice and peace, founding the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) in 1960 as a student at Morehouse College. As the SNCC's communication director, he played an active role in protests and registration campaigns throughout the South.

He is a veteran of more than 20 years of service in the Georgia General Assembly. Bond was elected in 1965 to the Georgia House of Representatives, but was prevented from taking his seat by members who objected to his opposition to the Vietnam War. A second re-election to his own vacant seat resulted in another unseating. He was seated after a third election and a unanimous decision by the United States Supreme Court.

In the Georgia Senate, Bond was the first black chair of the Fulton County Delegation, which is the largest and most diverse in the upper house. He was also named chair of the Consumer Affairs Committee. He was the sponsor or cosponsor of more than 60 bills that have become law.

Bond also serves as a commentator on America's Black Forum, the oldest blackowned show in television syndication, and has narrated several documentaries, including the Academy Award-winning A Time For Justice and the prize-winning, criticallyacclaimed series Eyes on the Prize. His poetry and articles have also been printed in various publications.

As chairman of the NAACP Board since 1998, Bond heads the oldest and largest civil rights organization in the United States. Founded in 1909, the organization continues to focus on the protection and enhancement of the civil rights of African-Americans and other minorities. The holder of 20 honorary degrees, Bond is a distinguished professor at American University in Washington, D.C., and a professor of history at the University of Virginia.

Sam Evert served as a member of the Susquehanna University board of directors for 14 years, during a time of tremendous growth at Susquehanna. He was elected an emeritus member in 1984. Evert is the retired president of S.H. Evert Company, Inc., the construction company responsible for the renovations to Hassinger Hall and the building of North Hall, Fisher Science Hall, the Degenstein Campus Center and the Weber Chapel Auditorium. Evert's generosity enabled the construction and naming of the Evert Dining Hall in the Degenstein Campus Center in honor of his mother, Dodie.

Enhancing the Writing Program Gift Establishes Janet C. Weis Endowment for Liberal Arts

Susquehanna University has received a \$500,000 grant from the Degenstein Foundation to establish the Janet C. Weis Endowment for Liberal Arts.

The endowment will support new and expanded initiatives such as a Visiting Writers' Residency, which will attract nationally and internationally prominent poets, novelists and essayists for extended stays on campus. Visiting scholars will teach courses, give lectures and hold student conferences. A scholarship fund will be created to recruit and retain outstanding writing majors.

Funds from the endowment will also help enhance three magazines now published by the writing program – The Susquehanna Review, Essay, and The Apprentice Writer. Distributing the publications to a wider audience will increase exposure for students' writing and raising visibility for the program. Funds will also provide opportunities for Susquehanna's creative writing faculty to participate in readings, workshops and conferences across the country.

"We are deeply grateful for this opportunity to commemorate Janet Weis' deep and abiding commitment to literature and the arts," said University President **Jay Lemons**. "The generosity of the Degenstein Foundation will be especially helpful in positioning Susquehanna University's Writers' Institute as one of the best undergraduate writing programs in the country."

Through the leadership of Director **Gary Fincke**, the Writers' Institute has brought more than 100 nationally recognized writers to Susquehanna, including the Poet Laureate of the United States, Billy Collins, along with Pulitzer Prize and National Book Award winners. Students have been accepted to the most highly acclaimed graduate writing programs in the country and have garnered prestigious assistantships and fellowships.

Susquehanna students also publish in national magazines and compete successfully for places in national workshops. The March 15 issue of *The Chronicle of Higher Education*, a national publication covering higher education, featured Susquehanna students and faculty in a lead story about the growing popularity of creative writing as a major across U.S. college and university campuses.

'Science In Motion' Partnership Van Will Offer Hands-On Science for High School Students

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The University recently received a \$320,000 contract with the aid of State Representative Merle Phillips to provide a Science in Motion program to area high schools. A May 10 kick-off is planned at Danville Area High School.

Susquehanna joins 10 other colleges and universities in offering the program through the Pennsylvania Basic Education/Higher Education Science and Technology Consortium, which is funded by the Pennsylvania Department of Education.

Based on a program developed by Juniata College in 1987, each institution in the consortium uses Science in Motion vehicles to visit urban and rural high schools, allowing students access to science instrumentation

University Sets Tuition and Fees for 2002-2003

The university's board of directors has approved an increase in tuition and fees for the 2002-03 academic year. Comprehensive fees for next year – which include tuition and fees, room and board – will total \$28,500. The \$1,230 increase is 4.5 percent of current fees.

"The board and administration worked hard to find the best possible balance between the resources needed to provide a high-quality education and the pressure that fees can place on students and their families," said University President L. Jay Lemons "In the coming year, we will continue to enhance the teaching and learning environment in significant ways. We will hire 12 additional full-time faculty We will increase our commitment to information technology infrastructure, virtually doubling our overall investment in that area. And we will celebrate the completion of the new music and art center, bringing greater opportunities to those programs and to the entire campus?

Over the past five years, the increase in Susquehanna's comprehensive fees has averaged 3.8 percent annually, which is modest in relation to many other colleges and universities. not available in most secondary schools.

The partnership is designed to encourage and improve science education in regional secondary schools by providing the latest technology and a trained, certified secondary science teacher to assist in teaching labs to local high school teachers free of charge.

The project will also offer professional development opportunities to teachers through summer workshops, daylong seminars and dinner meetings. The partnership addresses the three greatest challenges to science education: access to technologically advanced resources, good professional development for teachers and the enhancement of good science curricula.

"It is our goal to provide excellent science education to schools in our region," said **Jan Reichard-Brown**, director of the Susquehanna Science in Motion program. "We are going to expose students to cuttingedge technology in science." The certified secondary teacher for the mobile unit will help introduce students to the use of the instruments by either teaching the classes or assisting the classroom teacher.

One van, to be used for chemistry, has already been donated to the program by Sunbury Motors. It is hoped that a second van may be purchased for biology instruction.

In addition to being outfitted with science equipment, the van will also contain nine laptop computers and a printer for student use in lab work.

Clarion University, Drexel University, Gannon University, Gettysburg College, Juniata College, University of Pittsburgh at Bradford, Ursinus College, Westminster College, Wilkes University and Cedar Crest College also offer Science in Motion programs to their surrounding high schools.

Construction Update

aving a passion for hockey and being a student of the game can take you far in the sport, even if you don't have playing experience. Just ask **Jay Feaster '84**, who was recently named the fourth general manager in the history of the NHL's Tampa Bay Lightning.

For the past three years, Feaster had served as assistant general manager of the American Hockey League's Harrisburg, Pa.,-based Hershey Bears, dealing primarily with player contracts. As general manager, he will oversee every aspect of the hockey team's

operations including player acquisitions and development, minor league affiliations, and the scouting and coaching staff.

Feaster's road into the world of professional hockey began shortly after Susquehanna. He graduated with a law degree from Georgetown Law School in 1987 and began work with the law firm of McNees, Wallace and Nurick in Harrisburg. His role at MW&N required significant involvement with the Hershey Corporation, which he parlayed into a job as the assistant to the president in 1989.

After a year, his path to the NHL would begin as he accepted the general manager position of the Hershey Bears. He held that post from 1990 to 1996 and also served as president of the team from 1995 to 1998. His accomplishments include setting four single-season attendance records between 1992 and 1995, winning the AHL championship in 1997, being named AHL Executive of the Year that same year, and orchestrating an affiliation agreement between the Bears and the NHL's Colorado Avalanche.

Feaster's current role has expanded his duties significantly and for this enthusiastic sports fan, this is a dream come true. "I am both humbled and excited by this opportunity and look forward to helping build and shape our club into a long-term contender."

The Rev. Raymond Shaheen 37



he Rev. **Raymond E. Shaheen '37**, better known as "Padre" to the Susquehanna University community, graduated from Susquehanna in 1937, having paid for his education with the \$600 that his immigrant parents were able to afford. Financial aid made up the difference.

"Susquehanna and the church made my education possible," says Shaheen, the 2002 Alumni Association Service Award recipient."I wanted to repay Susquehanna, not only by supporting it financially, but by giving my time and talent."

And he has been doing just that for nearly 65 years, in his later years even more devoted than before. Recognized with an honorary Doctor of Public Service degree in 1999, he has also inspired several scholarships and endowments to benefit Susquehanna students.

Shaheen came back to Susquehanna after retiring from his 45-year parish career in which he was pastor of Messiah Lutheran Church in South Williamsport, Pa., from 1940 to 1956, and later the senior pastor of St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Silver Spring, Md., from 1956 to 1985. He served without compensation as the interim chaplain at the University from August 1985 to April 1986. For the last 16 years, Shaheen has volunteered as the special assistant to the president,

serving broadly as Susquehanna's "ambassador of good will." From 1990 until 2001, Shaheen also served as coordinator of the Institute for Lifelong Learning, a program he founded that attracts retirees to campus for educational seminars twice a month during the academic year. He also founded and directed a York, Pa., branch of the Institute for a five-year period.

Shaheen's inclination to "settle up" with Susquehanna continues to affect the lives of Susquehanna students, alumni, faculty and staff. He has become somewhat of an icon on campus and is often the first to ask provocative questions at university torunts. He frequently drops by various offices throughout campus to offer amusing anecdotes or gives a word of encouragement to unsuspecting passers-by on the paths through campus.

He traces his history of this type of kindness on campus back at least 17 years. When he was appointed, Rick Kamber, the then acting dean of academic affairs, asked Shaheen what he saw as his role on campus.

"I said to him, I'm here to speak and listen and hopefully do one as well as the other," Shaheen said.



Bonnie Bucks 65 Reece



The Thrill of Imparting Knowledge

here was a time when Michigan State University professor **Bonnie Bucks '65 Reece**, Ph.D., didn't expect to attend college, let alone dare to dream of teaching at the university level.

"In high school, I was a secretarial student, taking courses in shorthand, typing and bookkeeping," Reece says, explaining that no one in her family had earned a college degree.

However, a decision to abandon her original course and attend college would launch a distinguished academic career that includes 20 years on the faculty of Michigan State.

Reece admits that she applied to Susquehanna for practical reasons: the school was Lutheran-affiliated and had no foreign-language requirement for business students, a must since her secretarial coursework had not included language study. The choice, though, was a fortuitous one. "I was extremely happy to be at S.U.," recalls Reece, who credits her Susquehanna experience with helping her succeed in Harvard University's M.B.A. program.

"I applied to Harvard because of its reputation," Reece says. "I assumed when the catalogue said it was co-ed, it really was co-ed. But when I got there, I was one of only 13 women among the 700 students in my class."

While being in the minority was not necessarily easy, Reece rose to the occasion. "At one level, I think it was an additional challenge, but on another level, I was not too intimidated," she says. "At Susquehanna, I was used to having more men in my business classes."

Although Reece dabbled in the business world, working for the Reading (Pa.) Eagle-Times newspaper right out of college and later for the College Board, education always intrigued her. And when an offer to teach summer classes at the University of Michigan arose, something clicked.

It was late in the summer of 1973 that Snyder met and became fast friends with Ventresca. Luke Eddinger '00: Home-Grown Business

While his SU friends were going on spring break, Luke Eddinger '00 went home to the small greenhouse business he ran with his brothers each March and planted 14 to 16 hours a day. When it was time to study abroad with the Sigmund Weis School in London, he worked a little harder to earn money for extra expenses.

Currently an associate manager of investment management services for Prudential in Newark, N.J., Luke is the second son in a family of five boys from Middletown, Conn. His father is a high school teacher with a penchant for outside entrepreneurial projects and his mother is a stay-athome mom who assists with the books and other projects. "My parents told us right from the beginning that we'd be paying for college," says Luke. "But they also gave us the role models and the opportunity to make money."

Inspired by an aunt who had her own yearround floral business, Luke's older brother started a small greenhouse business called Blossoms and Buds. Luke joined in during his sophomore year in high school. Younger brothers got involved and soon there were six greenhouses and a business requiring attention from planting and pricing to sales and hiring.

"Today I'm a business analyst, and I can understand things better because of that experience," says Luke. "If you understand a small business, you can scale it up to anything." And the hard work paid off. He estimates that his share from the venture amounted to about \$12,000 to \$15,000 a year for about three months of work.

He funded his education at Susquehanna with the proceeds combined with a couple of scholarships, a need-based grant, work-study, and loans. He graduated with a total indebtedness of about \$30,000. "I know there's bad debt and good debt and the debt that I have is good debt," Luke says. "It's a low rate and I can pay it off. It won't keep me down."



Chris '88 and Kathleen French '88 Noah: Getting an Early Start

When it comes to financing a college education for their three sons – seven-year-old Derek, four-year-old Justin, and eight-month-old Zachary – Chris '88 and Kathleen French '88 Noah are getting an early start.

The Noahs, who live in Lincroft, N.J., are already saving roughly \$6,000 a year for each of the boys, taking advantage of several new tax-advantaged investment opportunities and allowing time for their money to grow with regular deposits and compound interest.

"I feel like it's my duty," says Chris. "Without a doubt, this will be the single biggest investment we'll ever make in our lives," he adds. "If all three of them go to Princeton, for example, it would be a million bucks."

Chris works for Doremus Advertising in New York City. Kathy is currently a stay-at-home mom. Their parents actually launched college funds for the boys with birthday gifts that the Noahs invested in tax-advantaged Uniform Gift to Minors Act accounts. Chris and Kathy began aggressively adding to the college funds on their own after they learned they were expecting a third child.

Today, Chris purchases \$1,500 of a particular stock for each boy's birthday. The couple also does an automatic checking account deduction every month, setting aside about \$250 for each of the boys. Chris wishes they had gotten an even earlier start, even if only \$50 a month.

Within the past year, Chris has also spent "an inordinate amount of time" researching new state-sponsored 529 plans that allow families to save and prepay for qualified higher education expenses with tax-free earnings. "While they're great, the frustrating thing is the fact that now there are so many states participating, and they're all different," says Chris, who chose a Utah plan administered by Vanguard and the Alaska plan with T. Rowe Price. "You've got to do your homework to decide which is the right plan for you," he stresses.



Wendy Miller '02 Deeben: Three-and-a-Half-Years

Wendy Miller '02 Deeben cut her tuition expenses by finishing her degree requirements in threeand-a-half-years. Juggling 18 credits a semester, summer school classes, and working roughly 30 hours a week at jobs on and off campus, she did it with a 3.5 GPA. She also found time to plan a wedding and get married.

"When you know that you have obligations, you really have to plan your time. You either do it and swim or don't do it and sink," says the religion major who will attend the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg starting in August.

Her accelerated degree didn't come without sacrifice – part and parcel of the work ethic and emphasis on savings instilled in her from childhood. She started saving for college as a freshman in high school, mowing grass at her church to earn money. After living on campus her first year, she moved back home to Sunbury and commuted to Susquehanna. Money was not the only factor in her decision, but the move did cut down on expenses. It also cut down on campus activities – something she made up for by being an active volunteer at her church.

Wendy's mother is a registered nurse and her father is a seventh-grade teacher. The youngest of three siblings, she received a financial aid package that included need-based work study and a grant during the time her middle brother was also still in college. She also received \$3,500 annual Dean's Scholarships and \$1,500 Lutheran Brotherhood campus scholarships throughout her SU career, an Ocker Scholarship for two years, and a one-year Fisher Scholarship.

Stafford loans during her freshman year and junior year plus a small interest-free King loan from the university add up to a little over \$8,000 that she will have to pay back over ten years.

"When I look back at the time that I've spent here, on both sides – as a student, and working – it's well worth it," she says. "I've learned a lot of skills that I can use anywhere."

PLANNING FOR COLLEGE COSTS? PREPARE FOR STICKER SHOCK. BUT DON'T GET SCARED, GET MOTIVATED.

Families have more tools than ever to explore their options, save with tax breaks, and borrow wisely.

Start by assuring yourself college is worth the investment, U.S. Department of Labor statistics for 2000 report median earnings for individuals with bachelor's degrees at \$46,300 – 62 percent higher than the \$28,800 median for those with only a high school diploma. Over the course of a 40-year career the difference amounts to \$700,000. And that's in addition to the immeasurable benefits of social development and intellectual challenge that college provides.

Few know better the value of a small, private liberal arts college than Susquehanna graduates. Recently reclassified as a national liberal arts college by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, Susquehanna is listed as one of the best 218 institutions for undergraduate learning in the country in the 2002 U.S. News and World Report college guide issue.

PRICE VERSUS COST

Susquehanna tuition, room and board total \$28,500 for 2002-2003, a 4.5 percent increase over the previous year. Over the past five



years, the increase in Susquehanna's comprehensive fees has averaged 3.8 percent annually, which is modest in relation to many other colleges and universities. College Board data for 2000-01 puts the average increase for private, four-year institutions at 5.5 percent and public colleges at 7.7 percent.

While public colleges often appear to be priced less than private colleges, financial aid can make a private education more affordable. And the median federal loan debt for students who graduated from public colleges in 2000 was just \$1,875 less than for students who graduated from private colleges.

For many students the actual cost of attending a private college like Susquehanna is considerably less - often thousands of dollars less - than the published price. Only about five percent of families of the university's 1,800 students can afford to pay the full price of tuition, room and board. About two-thirds of SU families qualify for some form of needbased aid in the form of grants, work-study, and subsidized loans. Merit-based scholarships assist many students and unsubsidized loans help families who do not qualify for needbased aid. Last year SU awarded more than \$24 million in aid, including \$16 million in grants and scholarships, \$7.8 million in loans and \$803,000 in work-study.

In 2001-02, about 300 students received institutional or named scholarships, many created by SU alumni who recall their own struggle to pay for college and want to "give back" in return for their own education. And because tuition and fees cover only about 80 percent of the costs of operating the University, all students also benefit from indirect aid, including investment income from the University's endowment of almost \$90 million.

FINANCIAL AID IN CYBERSPACE

Navigating the financial aid waters has become easier for many families with the growth of the Internet, E-mail provides an additional way to communicate with financial aid staffs. Online applications for the two financial aid forms required by Susquehanna and many other schook – the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov and the College Board Profile at http://profileonline.cbreston.org – make it easier for families to apply – and reapply, as required each year.

Web sites help students and parents understand their options, including whether they might be eligible for need-based aid. Online calculators let families enter variables about their income and assets and see what they would be expected to pay at a given college based on a standard formula, explains Helen Nunn, who has been Susquehanna's director of financial aid since 1986."Then they can go back in and see, for instance, what happens in two years when they have two kids in college? What if somebody goes back to work? What happens if someone gets a raise or loses a job?" (You can check one out yourself at http://www.collegeboard.com/ article/0,1120,6-29-0-401,00.html.)

FIRST-GENERATION STUDENTS

Information and guidance from the financial aid staff is especially important to students who are in the first generation of their families to consider college – about 30 percent of Susquehanna students. The University partners with the Degenstein Foundation of Sunbury, Pa., to sponsor the SU4U mentoring and scholarship program targeting first-generation college students with substantial financial need

from Snyder, Umon and Northumberland counties. The Foundation awards approximately \$12,500 each to five new students in each class up to a total of 20 students. This year, three students attended Susquehanna with scholarships from The McKelvey Foundation to assist rural high school seniors demonstrating financial aid need and entrepreneurial spirit. The awards, averaging \$16,000, funded all school costs not covered by federal, state and SU scholarship dollars. A new \$100,000 grant from the William Randolph Hearst Foundation will soon make two more \$1,500 - \$2,500 scholarships available for first-generation students.

PLANNING AND SAVINGS TOOLS

Early planning and systematic saving are important for all families anticipating college costs, stresses Nunn, because they offer the full advantage of the rising value of money invested over time. The latest savings and tax plan options can stretch education dollars for families willing to investigate the advantages, disadvantages and restrictions of each. (savingforcollege.com is a good one.)

The newest options include state-sponsored Section 529 plans that allow families to save and prepay for higher education expenses at public and private colleges and universities. Qualified withdrawals are exempt from federal taxes until 2010, and in some cases, state taxes. The plans are particularly attractive for higher-income families because they provide opportunities to invest substantial amounts and there are generally no limits on income.

Education IRAs, also known as Coverdell Education Savings Accounts (ESA), allow families with earned income of less than \$190,000 married filing jointly and \$95,000 for single filers to invest up to \$2,000 per child, per year and accumulate earnings tax free to cover qualified educational expenses from kindergarten through graduate school.

TAX CREDITS AND DEDUCTIONS

The Hope Scholarship Credit can amount to up to \$1,500 (indexed for inflation beginning this year) per student for the first two years of post-secondary education. The Lifetime Learning Credit covers 20 percent of up to \$5,000 (increasing to \$10,000 in 2003) for undergraduate, graduate or continuing education job-related courses. While both of these credits begin phasing out for families with adjusted gross incomes over \$80,000 and single filers over \$40,000, a new "above the line" deduction will allow married filers with adjusted gross incomes of up to \$130,000 and single filers up to \$65,000 to deduct \$3,000 per year in 2002 and 2003 and \$4,000 annually in 2004 and 2005.

STUDENT LOAN OPTIONS

Families who need to borrow to cover educational costs can do so through a variety of subsidized and unsubsidized loans. Competition among lenders works to borrowers' advantage, points out Associate Director of Financial Aid Carol Handlan. The new KeystoneBEST program in Pennsylvania will offer student loans with a zero percent upfront fee, plus a discount interest rate for unsubsidized borrowers. New loan consolidation programs - check out www.loanconsolidation.ed.gov - also provide significant opportunities for alumni to lower interest rates on previous loans. Tax deductions are also available for loan interest under certain income levels.

An expert in the student loan field who joined Susquehanna last year, Handlan conducts exit interviews with all seniors graduating with college loans to explain their options. The average indebtedness of graduates in the class of 2002 with need-based loans only is \$12,798, which would require a payment of about \$170 a month for 10 years. The average total owed for all loans, including discretionary borrowing to offset the family contribution, is \$18,855.

WORK-STUDY ADVANTAGES

Another source of need-based aid comes through work-study jobs on campus. Such jobs offer students far more than the current \$5.15 an hour pay rate, stress Handlan and Nunn. "Academic year part-time jobs can lead students places that they might not ever have imagined in terms of the experience that they get and the connections that they make," says Nunn."And kids who work on campus get better grades than kids who don't. They budget their nime better, and that's really what it's all about."

FREE SCHOLARSHIP SEARCHES

Financial aid based on merit and not family income is a growing source of assistance at many schools. While many merit scholarships target outstanding academic performance, others reward diverse qualifications from student activities to religious affiliation. Though nearly all scholarship aid comes from the federal and state governments and colleges themselves, outside scholarships available at Susquehanna have increased from \$423,000 in 94-95 to \$696,000 last year. Web-based scholarship searches at sites such as fastweb.org and collegeboard.com provide a fast and free alternative to for-profit scholarship search firms. Most scholarships are based locally within the school district or home community, says Nunn. "So we always tell students to make friends with somebody in their guidance office."

STUMBLING BLOCKS

Throughout the process, one of the biggest mistakes families make is depending on the wrong people for financial aid information and drawing bad conclusions, says Helen Nunn, who encourages students and families to use her office as a source, even if they're not interested in attending Susquehanna. You can log on to Susquehanna's Web site at **www.susqu.edu/finaid** to get ten tips on financial aid, plus some additional Susquehanna advice just for parents.

"We spend a lot of time with families strategizing about how they can pay their share, talking about what are the cheapest options, and how to combine those to make things work," says Nunn.

"Open lines of communication with the school. Don't be afraid to call the financial aid offices directly," agrees **Robyn Schnell** '77, a guidance counselor at Hamilton High School East in Trenton, N.J. "Nine times out of ten, there are happy endings."

Mark Dreibelbis '05: Valedictory Rewards

Though Susquehanna tuition, room and board, and fees amounted to \$27,270 in 2001-2002, high school valedictorian **Mark Dreibelbis '05** and his family paid considerably less for his first year at the University, thanks to a substantial academic scholarship combined with some needbased aid.

A chemistry major from Mifflintown, Pa., Mark is the older of two sons. His father manages three radio stations and his mother is an insurance agent. His Susquehanna financial aid package includes a \$14,000 a year Valedictorian Scholarship plus a \$2,000 annual Lutheran Brotherhood Scholarship, a need-based state grant and a loan. He is also eligible for work study, and this summer will be the fifth year he has worked as a lifeguard at the local pool.

Mark is also a member of the SU track team, throwing javelin for the Crusaders. "I put a lot of effort into my studies and just basic schoolwork," he says. "That takes up so much of my time that I don't get involved in too many other things."

His advice for prospective students: If getting a scholarship for being class valedictorian isn't possible for you, go out there and find information about what is possible. "You might think a \$500 scholarship is small potatoes, but if you get it, that's \$500 you aren't going to have to work for later," he says. "And if it takes an hour to fill out the application, that's \$500 an hour – that's pretty good pay."



Pamela Marino '81 Weiss: Mom Plans a Return to Work

Pamela Marino '81 Weiss, and her husband, Andy, will be turning to human resources – Pam's own – to help finance college for her two sons, Jimmy, 16, and Charlie, 13.

Pam, who has been a stay-at-home mom for the past 16 years, plans on returning to the job force when Jimmy starts college in a few years. Because both boys do well in school, she also hopes they will be in the running for academic scholarships.

A communications/theatre arts and education major at Susquehanna, she studied part-time to later earn a master of arts in theological studies from Moravian Theological Seminary in 1999. She plans to earn a second master's or a divinity degree in the next few years.

Pam and her husband, a graduate of Lehigh University and an engineer at Air Products in Allentown, Pa., will be married for 20 years in November. When they were planning to start a family and buy a house, they chose a comfortable but modest home in the west end of Allentown, not far from the Muhlenberg College campus.

Tuition was the furthest thing from their minds at that point, says Pam. "But we made a conscious decision to be conservative from the get go and to find a house that was based on the premise of one income."

"Andy and I both feel very fortunate in having the option to choose a school," says Pam. "For me, smaller was better – I would have been lost at a big school," she adds. "We feel very strongly that our children should have the same option to choose a school that is right for them.."



Katie Koch '02: Loans Worthwhile

Katie Koch '02 will graduate in May with about \$17,000 in college loans – a monthly payment of around \$200 after a six-month grace period.

"I had a wonderful experience here at Susquehanna, so I think it's worth it," says Koch, a public relations major from Wernersville, Pa. "A lot of doors have been opened for me." She is especially grateful for opportunities to go to Public Relations Student Society of America conventions in California, Texas, and New Orleans; serve as a student member of the board of directors, and have one-on-one help and career advice from faculty.

Katie's father, a director of technology for a data systems network, and her mother, a special education teacher, divorced when she was a sophomore, and coordinating the required financial aid applications and payments has been more complex than usual. Her father paid for tuition and rent, while her mother covered books, spending money and miscellaneous items. Both parents took turns while she was in college to pay the interest on her unsubsidized Stafford Ioan.

Although her family income was too high for a need-based grant, Katie was eligible for work-study for part of her Susquehanna career – she worked as a PR assistant with the United Way.

She also received a \$5,500 extra-curricular activities scholarship from the University based on her outstanding involvement in high school. "I didn't know they even gave scholarships for activities," she says. "It made me want to jump right in at Susquehanna." continued from page 13



- Approximately one-quarter of alumni respondents were interested in employing SU grads.
- A vast majority of alumni (82 percent) felt that the alumni office should continue to publish the Susquehanna Today magazine. Other favorite activities included: an online alumni community (54 percent), regional alumni events (67 percent) and reunions (64 percent).
- A little less than half of the respondents have attended an alumni event. Of the alumni who responded that they have attended an event, 69 percent are current donors to SU.





Who Was Jim Garrett?

I was privileged to be present at the dedication of the James W. Garrett Sports Complex on June 1. Jim Garrett posed this question in his remarks: "What will they say 30 years from now when people ask 'Who was Jim Garrett?" Showing his humility and pointing to his name over the entrance, he said he hopes the answer will give proper credit first and foremost to "the football players and coaches who played for and worked with me."

I would answer this question by saying that Coach Garrett was a leader and a teacher and is well-deserving of the honor. He was passionate and enthusiastic about teaching football and how to win - and from him we learned the lessons of life. Coming to Susquehanna in September 1960 at the age of 30 for his first head coaching job, Coach Garrett took a young and inexperienced team and made us believe in ourselves. I was a senior co-captain on that team, and he managed to bring out the best qualities in everyone, leading us to a successful season during which only 17 points were scored against us in eight games: a school record that still stands. He won 70% of his games from 1960-65, the best winning percentage in the 100+ years of football played at Susquehanna. And he is a member of the SU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Coach Garrett *is* about winning – but not just on the field. He taught us how to be winners in life: how to win and succeed in our relationships with family and friends and in our carcers. When you are honest with yourself, you tend to be honest with others, and that is how Coach Garrett operated. He treated everyone the same on the field. He didn't show favoritism. You had to earn his respect – along with that of your teanimates – by the way you performed. He motivated you to work hard, and if you did, you would most often achieve your goals.

Many of us credit Jim Garrett for instilling these core values in us on the football field. In the end, as we now realize, he turned out to be a great "hfe coach." This is why he is so loved and respected by players and coaches who were with him at Susquehanna in the early 1960s. We still affectionately refer to him as "Coach." And ultimately, this is why the new sports complex has been named for him.

Dedication Misses Opportunity

I was surprised and disappointed when browsing my wife's current issue of Susquehanna Today to learn of the decision to name the new sports complex in honor of former football coach Jim Garrett. Most of us tend to look back appreciatively upon our undergraduate years - often nostalgically. In my experience, recollections of athletes are especially prone to sentimental revisionism. And so, perhaps, it should not surprise me that Board Chair Nick Lopardo has championed naming the new sports complex after Garrett and elected to sweep under the carpet evidence that raises tall doubts about the wisdom of that decision by suggesting that critics are remembering only the notorious Parent's Day incident in 1965 and overlooking the larger impact of Garrett's career at Susquehanna.

1 remember Coach Garrett as a bright, articulate and dynamic individual who ardently urged students to give their best to their studies as well as the playing field. By his energy and intensity of purpose he was no doubt a positive influence. But I also remember how there was a lack of even temperament in his zeal that raised concerns long before October of '65. I recall Dean Reuning's dismay over the sign at the entrance to the practice field beneath which players daily passed, an equation for victory with three ingredients: Pride, Guts, Desire. Embarrassed that the sign was easily observed by anyone in the vicinity, he threatened to remove it himself. An overreaction? Perhaps, but rather than mindlessly visceral by-words, why not ones of deeper meaning and character: Dedication. Courage, Teamwork. No doubt Garrett preferred the passion of his words to ones of greater import. Emotional intensity was a key ingredient for

winning. But like many another zealot, he had trouble stepping back from the thick of matters at hand and allowing himself a reasoned view. His assault on his Quarterback's helmet that Parents' Day was not a unique occurrence. It was a fair representation of the man.

The uniquely personal and powerful relationship that exists between players and coaches has been universally recognized for a long time. Over the years there have doubtless been many coaches at Susquehanna who have demonstrated in their coaching and teaching the highest ideals of the University. Many served loyally in times when salaries were low and facilities inadequate. Through good seasons and bad they more often than not made a profoundly positive influence on those students whose lives they touched. To name the new facility for someone who did not demonstrate the kind of excellence that the university strives to instill in its graduates is a slap in the face of all those coaches who have dutifully and unspectacularly done so.

It is a fine thing that Mr. Lopardo's love for the University and the value of its athletic programs has moved him to make a large gift of naming magnitude. But why spotlight one whose actions and character were not representative of the best that the University stands for? I suggest that instead he reconsider and dedicate the building to all of the coaches who have positively influenced so many students at the University – and that would include Jim Garrett. Why not call it Coaches Memorial Sports Complex?

Record-Setting Enrollment Brings Strong Academic Credentials

or the eighth year in a row, Susquehanna University anticipates opening the new academic year with a record number of students. An incoming freshman class of about 500 students combined with 25 to 30 transfer students is expected to bring total full-time enrollment to approximately 1,850. That compares to 1,821 last year.

"The popularity of our in-Action Days and a strong open house in the fall brought high school students to campus earlier in the admissions cycle," said Director of Admissions **Chris Markle '84**. "The exceptional cooperation from faculty and staff in welcoming students to campus and spending time with them also contributed a great deal to the recruitment effort."

The freshman class will include about 121 early decision applicants whose first college of choice was Susquehanna, up from 110 in the 2001-2002 academic year.

"This will likely be the strongest class in Susquehanna's history, with close to 40 percent of freshmen ranking in the top 10th of their high school class," Markle added. Nearly 90 percent were ranked in the top two-fifths of their high school class. About 20 of the students were high school valedictorians or salutatorians. Even though Susquehanna expects a larger student body overall, the university was more selective in admissions this year. "Last year more students than anticipated accepted our offers of admission, so this year we wanted to limit freshman enrollment," said Markle. "We admitted about 14 percent fewer students and still anticipate meeting our enrollment goal of 500 freshmen in the fall. We look forward to welcoming these new students to the community."

The new class will arrive on campus Thursday, August 22, for a few days of orientation activities before classes begin on Monday, August 26.

Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow Ambassador Will be In-Residence Sept. 23-27

AMBASSADOR JULIA CHANG BLOCH will visit campus for five days this fall as the University's 2002 Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow. An international relations expert with special interests in the areas of Asia and economic development, she has had extensive experience in civil service and the private sector.

Bloch will be visiting Susquehanna from September 23rd through 27th. She will deliver a keynote address on Wednesday, September 25th at 7:30 p.m. in Stretansky Hall, a recently completed performance venue in the University's new Center for Music and Art.

Susquehanna is one of about 55 colleges and universities participating in the Visiting Fellows Program of the Woodrow Wilson Fellowship Foundation. The program promotes "greater contact, understanding and sharing of ideas and experiences between the academic community and the world of practical affairs." The Foundation invites distinguished public figures and scholars to spend a week on campus meeting formally and informally with students and members of the University community.

A native of China, Bloch came to this country at the age of nine and grew up in San Francisco. She volunteered for the Peace Corps in 1964 in Malaysia and continued to work in civil service for the following 25 years. From 1989 to 1993, she was U.S. Ambassador to Nepal, the first Asian American to attain such rank in U.S. history.

For much of the 1990s, she headed Bank of America's Corporate Relations Department and the U.S.-Japan Foundation, a \$100 million grant-making institution. Bloch presently holds positions at Peking University in Beijing and Fudan University in Shanghai and has recently been elected to the American Academy of Diplomacy, a private, non-profit, elected society that seeks to enhance American diplomacy and public awareness of its importance. Since October 2001 she has been ambassador-in-residence at the Institute for Global Chinese Affairs at the University of Maryland.

Past Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellows at Susquehanna have included community activist and philanthropist Stephen G.Vetter, civil rights activist Judi Hampton and the late John Wallach, founder and president of *Seeds* of *Peace*, an internationally recognized conflict resolution program.



performance venue will be available to the Susquehanna campus beginning in the fall of 2002 with the opening of the 320-seat Stretansky Hall. The building was completed in the final phase of extensive renovations and additions to Heilman Hall to create a new Center for Music and Art at Susquehanna. The center will be formally dedicated in February of 2003.

Teaching Awards Honor Martin and Tyler

Two SUSQUEHANNA FACULTY members were named recipients of two annual teaching awards at commencement May 12,

Thomas A. Martin, associate professor of psychology, received the John C. Horn Distinguished Service Lectureship. Robert Tyler, associate professor emeritus of mathematics, received the Susquehanna University Teaching Award.

Martin began teaching here in 1987, having received his baccalaureate degree from Eastern Mennonite College and a master's and doctorate degrees from the University of Nebraska.

"Since his arrival, he has consistently contributed to the life of the university and the broader community through service," said **Warren Funk**, vice president of academic affairs. "His intensive advising work with the students and his conscientious development of highly valuable placements for clinical experience are often mentioned by alumni."

Named for the late John C. Horn, a longtime member and chair of the board of directors, the award recognizes a faculty member for outstanding scholarship and conscientious service. The recipient offers a public lecture in the following academic year.

Tyler joined the Susquehanna faculty in 1969 after earning his baccalaureate, master's and doctoral degrees from Syracuse University. He formally retired from the Susquehanna faculty at the end of the 2000-2001 academic year, but agreed to return this past year in a visiting role.

"A special concern for mathematics education is evident not only in the efforts to refine his courses and improve his teaching and advising, but in his dedication to program oversight and individual directed study for students seeking to qualify for teaching credentials in mathematics," Funk said. "Students know him as someone with a ready smile, a welcoming demeanor, and enthusiasm for learning, and a contagious curiosity."

Awards are determined by open nominations from the faculty and, in the case of the Teaching Award, also from the Student Government Association.

Five Susquehanna Faculty Named Emeriti

The Board of Directors granted five faculty members emeritus status this spring. Tressler Professor of Accounting Ed Schwan and Professor of Religion David Wiley retired at the end of the academic year. Professor of Finance William Remaley will retire effective December 31, 2002. Professor of Management Bill Sauer will defer his retirement for one year. James Smillie, acquisitions and computer systems librarian, featured in the Winter 2001 SU Today, retired in December.

Susquehanna students about finance and investments since 1973, and has helped propel hundreds of them into careers in investment management, brokerage, banking and other financial services," said **James L. Brock**, dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Busmess. "On several occasions highly successful alumni have volunteered to me that Professor Reinaley and his rigorous courses have been major factors in their success. His former students say that they did not dare to go to class unprepared, and that no, the courses weren't particularly fun. In the same breath, however, they talk about how much they learned and how well prepared they were when they began their professional careers."

David Wiley, professor of philosophy, religion, and classical studies, also retired at the end of this academic year after 35 years of service at Susquehanna. He was a former department head and editor of the *Susquehanna University Press*, and was the 1983 recipient of the John C. Horn Distinguished Service Lectureship.

Wiley earned a bachelor's degree from the College of Wooster, a divinity degree from McCormick Theological Seminary, and a Ph.D. from Duke University. He joined the faculty in 1967 and was promoted to full professor in September of 1985. He specializes in the Protestant Reformation and taught courses on the history of religious life and thought as well as in contemporary religious issues.

Women's Golf will Join Varsity Sports

omen's golf will become the 23rd varsity sport at Susquehanna beginning with the 2002-03 academic year. It follows the addition of men's lacrosse in 2000. The addition gives Susquehanna 12 women's and 11 men's sports, all of which compete in Division III of the NCAA. A search for the team's first head coach is underway.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for Susquehanna to attract talented students and athletes to our campus," said Director of Athletics **Don Harnum**. "Susquehanna is the type of school which attracts outstanding female golfers and right now we have no opportunity for them to compete. Our women's sports programs have grown in response to the desire on the part of our female students to have a competitive varsity experience. We are optimistic that women's golf will be another winner in many ways."

According to the March 18 edition of the NCAA News, a total of 37 Division III schools have added women's golf over the past two

years, bringing the number of Division III schools currently offering women's golf as a varsity sport to 135, 2002 also marked the third year of the NCAA Division III Women's

2002 also marked the third year of the NCAA Division III Women's Golf Championship, which has been won all three years by Methodist (N.C.) College. A total of 20 schools were represented at the NCAA Championships, as 10 teams of five players were joined by 10 individuals in the event.

"Just as we are eager to maintain currency in our academic offerings, so too are we eager to enrich co- and extra-curricular offerings at a high level," said Susquehanna President **L. Jay Lemons**. "We believe that the addition of the women's golf team bolsters our commitment to providing a comprehensive broad-based athletics program."

The Susquehanna men's golf program, which has won eight consecutive Middle Atlantic Conference championships and recently made its fifth appearance in the NCAA Division III men's golf championship in the last seven years.

Five Athletes Picked to Enter SU Hall of Fame

The Susquehanna Sports Hall of Fame will grow to 154 with the induction of five new members at halftime of this year's Homecoming football game vs. Albright. The new members will be:

Tom Cole '64 (formerly Tom McCarrick): (Baskethall) – McCarrick was the fifth player in school history to surpass 1,000 points and currently ranks 24th with 1,026 points. One of the tallest players (6-8) in program history at the time, McCarrick averaged in double figures in three of four seasons and was a key member of teams that compiled a 52-15 record from 1960-61 through 1962-63. A business major at Susquehanna, Cole lives in Elmira, N.Y.

Hank DePerro '70: (Football) - A linebacker and lineman, DePerro led the Crusaders to a 6-3 record during his senior season, earning ECAC Division III Small College All-Star honors. He made 17 tackles, including 10 solo stops, as Susquehanna edged Westminster 3-0 in 1969. As a junior, DePerro led the team with 93 tackles (53 solo) and earned the team's Most Valuable Lineman award. A sociology major, he is currently facilities director for the Ford Foundation and lives in New York City with his wife, **Barbara Hitchens '69** DePerro and their children, Anny '94 and Barbara Anne.

Cory Mabry '91: (Football, Track and Field) - A four-year letter winner in both sports, Mabry was a two-time All-American and three-time MAC All-Star at cornerback, and an All-American and three-time MAC champion in the triple jump. Mabry still holds the Susquehanna career record for interceptions (26) and interception return yards (400). In his first season of football in 1988, Mabry tied the school record with 10 interceptions and earned All-American honors. He qualified for nationals in the triple jump in both his junior and senior years. After graduating in 1991, Mabry used his final year of football eligibility to lead the team with five interceptions as the Crusaders advanced to the national semifinals. A mathematics major, he is currently head football coach at Nativity B.V.M. and a teacher at Pottsville Area High School. He lives in Pottsville, with his wife, Megan, and children, Elexa and Raquel.

Paige Malin '92: (Field Hockey, Swimming, Women's Lacrosse) -Malin earned 11 varsity letters at Susquehanna. She set school records in both the 100 and 200 breaststroke and currently ranks third all-time in both events, and competed in the 200 and 400-yard medley relays that also established school records. A four-year starter as field hockey forward, she scored eight career goals. She also played three varsity seasons of women's lacrosse, helping the Crusaders to their first-ever Middle Atlantic Conference victory. Malin shared the Outstanding Senior Women's Scholar-Athlete Award, and served as an assistant athletic trainer for a year after graduating. A marketing major, she lives in Salem, Mass., and is head athletic trainer at Endicott College.

Liz Nicodemus '93 Hoover: (Basketball, Track and Field) - A four-year letter winner in both sports, she earned All-America honors in the javelin as a senior with a throw of 143 feet, 6 inches that remains a school record. She shared the team's Most Valuable Athlete award that year after winning the shot put and placing third in both the javelin and discus at the MAC championships. In basketball, she was a key reserve and spot starter for a program that won three straight MAC Northwest League titles and earned two straight NCAA Tournament berths. She averaged 6.3 points and 3.3 rebounds in 105 games while playing every position but center at various points of her career. A journalism inajor, she currently teaches English in Wellsboro, Pa., where she lives with her husband, John Hoover '95.





Vision, Commitments, Requ A Strategic Plan Takes Root

TURN ALMOST ANY CORNER ON CAMPUS and you will see evidence of the results of the University's last strategic plan: Apfelbaum Hall provides a new business and communications building that serves as a high-tech center for the entire campus. Recreational and varsity athletes share facilities at Garrett Sports Complex. A six-building suite-style Sassafras housing complex has reaffirmed the University's commitment to providing students the benefits of a residential campus.

And the bricks and mortar are just the outward signs of the priorities set eight years ago by members of the campus community who came together to lay the groundwork that would guide University growth and development from 1994-2000.

Record-setting enrollments and the highly successful Susquehanna 2000 capital campaign have broadened the University's resource base. Additional funds are available for financial aid, new technologies, and library tools for current students and future generations through the growth of the endowment. Well-qualified and enthusiastic faculty – about one-half of them new to Susquehanna since 1997 – are engaging students with collaborative learning. The University has moved into a position of competitive advantage with its new status as a national liberal arts college.

So, as Susquehanna sets the framework for its next strategic plan, it begins from a position of strength and momentum.

A MIDDLE STATES OPPORTUNITY

The new plan is evolving as the University prepares for its 2004 tenyear accreditation review by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. The process begins this summer with the launch of a comprehensive self-study. "We've decided to be creative with the self-study and really integrate it into the strategic planning process and the things

that we want to get done as a community," explains Professor of History Linda McMillin who serves as both chair of the Middle States Steering Committee and a member of the planning advisory group.

Approximately 150 faculty, administrators and staff participated in two planning kickoff sessions in late November. Participants produced a list of important qualities that are significant contributors to the success of students at Susquehanna.

BRINGING PEOPLE TOGETHER

"The important thing about this whole process is that it is bringing people together and asking them to think about our future – a future informed by our past," says President **L. Jay Lemons**. "How do we capture the best of what Susquehanna has been? How do we seek to protect elements of the campus culture that are precious, and nurture and encourage other aspects of the campus culture during a period of significant change."

For McMillin, a medieval historian who joined the faculty in 1989, the process is ripe with both possibilities and challenge."We've got to find that balance between moving forward and preserving traditions, between thinking big thoughts and making sure the trains run on time."

To add outside perspective, campus members were invited to meet with four different nationally recognized experts who provided assessments of the higher education environment along with recommendations for Susquehanna: President of the American Association for Higher Education Yolanda Moses, Director of the Center for Higher Education Policy Analysis at the University of Southern California Bill Tierney, and George Kuh, director of the National Survey of Student Engagement and Chancellor's Professor of Higher Education at Indiana University.

Early in 2002, 22 small-group discussions involving nearly 200 faculty and staff produced a collection of hopes and dreams for Susquehanna. Information distilled from those sessions culminated in a draft "Statement of Strategic Vision and Themes" endorsed by the board of directors last May.

A series of Middle States task forces will use the statement as a framework for creating a draft strategic plan by the year's end. After further feedback and review, the board of directors will vote on a strategic plan in May of 2003. The board will approve a full self-study draft in February 2004 prior to the official Middle States visit and review process later in the spring.

COMMUNITY CONTRIBUTIONS TO LEARNING

The Statement of Strategic Vision and Themes includes two key commitments: to strengthen intellectual engagement and to build community. And the inclusive planning process itself was, says McMillin, an opportunity for people to meet each other, to work on a common task, and to share the stories about students who had been transformed by Susquehanna.

The stories they shared came from not only facility, but also from administrators and staff: counselors to groundspeople. "That exercise went far to reinforce this notion that we are a community where everyone contributes to learning," says McMillin.

They were stories that reflect the contributions of people like Lillian Mundo, former secretary to the dean of natural and social sciences and recently appointed assistant registrar, who earned her own associate's degree at Susquehanna in 2000 and is currently enrolled in the baccalaureate program. Mundo, regularly provides after hours support to students who might need advice based on "a little bit more of the personal than just the official" perspective.

Other stories shared in the planning meetings recalled the contribu-

rements:

COMMUNITY RESPONSIBILITY

The contributions to learning also include alumin, who provide mentoring and experiential opportunities for students as well as volunteer and financial support for Susquehanna, points out McMillin

She and Jay I enious discussed the draft statement with a small group of alumin in early June A series of regional meetings hosted by President Lemons, to which ilumin and triends are being invited, will take place this fall (see schedule, page 2). "I want our graduates and others who care about Susquehanna's future to understand and respond to these evolving ideas and really help us think through our plans for the future," says Lemons. "Alumni and friends can be critically important participants in helping us meet many of the commitments we are making, and I hope they will be active with us as we move forward."

"This is a moment where Jay and the board of directors are listening to all sorts of voices," explains McMillin "It's kind of like voting And people shouldn't underestimate their ability to influence this process. Because ultimately, the communitywide plan will bring with it a communal responsibility to do what we want to do to be who we want to be."

Draft Statement of Strategic Vision and Themes

Increased Endowment Spending Will Benefit Campus

Before her death in 1990, York music teacher Beatrice Bowman set up an endowment to benefit Susquehanna's history and literature departments and honor her parents and her brother. **Robert Bowman '47**, "in perpetuity." Little did she know just how much her gift of nearly \$60,000 would accomplish. This year it will do even more, thanks to a recent change in the endowment spending policy.

In the last decade, more than \$20,000 in income from the Bowman Endowment Fund has allowed students to participate in events such as the Plymonth Medieval Forum and trips to the Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C. It has subsidized membership in the American Historical Association, funding for campus speakers, and purchases of films, videos and equipment

In large part due to the rising stock market of the 1990s, the market value of the fund had nearly doubled by June 2001 to almost \$112,000. For 2001-02, the Bowman Endowment generated approximately \$3,800 in spendable income. Under the new policy, the same fund is generating more than \$5,400 to spend in 2002-03.

Intergenerational Needs

The Susquehanna board of directors voted in May to approve the new policy, which limits spending to 4.5 percent of the endowment's market value averaged over the previous three years. The old policy tied spending to investment yield alone, which in recent years produced spendable income in the neighborhood of 3 percent of fund value.

The new policy raised distribution from the University's endowment pool during the current fiscal year to \$3.67 million – approximately \$1.1 million, or 44 percent, higher than \$2.56 million in 2001-02.

The University currently has about 240 endowed funds that will share the increased funds, says Susquehanna Controller **David Wise**. Based on donor specifications, about 40 percent of the total endowment is earmarked for instructional resources with an additional 22 percent for scholarships. Separate funds provide support for the library, faculty development, endowed professorships and facilities. About 23 percent is unrestricted.

The board approved the new policy on the recommendation of its investment subcommittee after extensive research into spending policies at more than 500 institutions. The policy will be reviewed and adjusted, if necessary, on an annual basis.

"One of our greatest concerns was – and is – the preservation of capital in real terms after taking inflation into consideration," says Board of Directors Vice Chair **Terry March '67**, president of Midwood Securities and chair of the investment subcommittee. "We want what donors have contributed for the benefit of students and departments and facilities to be able to buy as much in the future as it is purchasing now." While honoring the wishes of past donors, the board must be attuned to

a "very delicate balance" so as not to deprive the present generation of students and faculty to benefit those future generations, he adds.

Competing on a National Level

Endowment funds are invested to generate a steady and dependable source of income and to help keep the cost of a Susquehanna education within reach of individual students. The size of an institution's endowment is also a factor in outside evaluations such as bond ratings and college rankings.


While the University has had a balanced budget for the past 24 years, the demands on its resources continue to grow. To deliver the quality educational experience students expect – especially with Susquehanna's growing reputation among the ranks of the nation's leading liberal arts colleges – the endowment's ability to support a wide range of people and programs is critical, says Executive Vice President for Administration and Planning Sara Kirkland. Support for better facilities, study abroad opportunities, new program development, and visiting or full professorships are among the many priorities for which endowment-generated income can add significant value for Susquehanna.

Performance in a Down Market

Generous donor support, the flourishing stock market of the 1990s and a conservative endowment spending policy have contributed to the growth of the endowment from \$4.7 million in 1984 to more than \$89.9 million on June 30, 2001. But a recent turndown in the stock market – due to what Susquehanna Board Vice Chair **Terry March** '67 refers to as a "confluence of negative financial events" – trimmed the total to \$82.5 at June 30, 2002.

Susquehanna lost 8.3 percent on its endowment investments in 2002. The result compares with anticipated 2002 losses for university endowments in the "high single or law double digits," according to a source from Commonfund, a nonprofit manager for 1,600 college and private high school endowments quoted recently in *The Chronicle of Higher Education*.

The board's investment subcommittee oversees endowment allocation and spending policies. The University has retained Hirtle Callaghan and Company as its chief investment officer and has a carefully diversified portfolio with an asset allocation aiming for 70 percent equity investments and 30 percent fixed income. The fixed income targets include 25.5 percent investment grade bonds and 4.5 percent high yield bonds. The equity portion targets 38 percent in U.S. large cap stocks, 12 percent in U.S. small cap stocks, 13.5 percent in non-U.S. developed market stocks, 3 percent in non-U.S. emerging market stocks and 3.5 percent in alternative equity.

s the curator and facilities manager of the Peter J. McGovern Little League Museum in South Williamsport, Pa., Michael Miller '97 never knows what awaits him at work each day. It could be working on a new exhibit, developing an advertising or public relations campaign, or setting up a press conference. And that's just the way he likes it.

Miller, who had a dual major in English and history at Susquehanna, has worked at the museum since high school, when he started out as a tour guide. In that time, he has set – and met – many goals, including updating archives, creating new exhibits, and increasing the museum's funding. But it's his love of sports and kids that makes Miller ultimately enjoy his job.

"It can be hard to keep things working," he says. "The museum gets 40,000 visitors each year, and since many of them are kids, things tend to get broken. And things are always incredibly busy during the World Series."

He also enjoys the special opportunities that come with the job – trips to other museums, free tickets to sporting events, and the chance to meet celebrities, including author John Grisham, actors Kevin Costner and Billy Crystal, and the Bush family, just to name a few.

Unlike fans of professional baseball, who cringe at the thought of enduring another players' strike, Miller says that strikes are often beneficial to Little League games, by boosting their attendance and public interest.

The face of Little League is a changing one, according to Miller. Security at this year's world series was increased through a grant from the state because of the threat of terrorism, since the event does have international draw. And after last summer's scandal regarding an over-age player in the series, Little Leaguers can expect more extensive eligibility checks, says Miller. "We just can't take honesty for granted anymore about whether or not a player is eligible," he said. "Playing Little League is the first introduction many kids have to playing a team sport, and it should be all about teaching kids teamwork."



Professor of Chemistry Neil H. Potter died Sunday, August 11, 2002, of injuries suffered in an automobile accident. He joined the faculty in 1966 after earning a B.A. from Franklin and Marshall College, the M.A. from Middlebury College, and a Ph.D. from Pennsylvania State University. He was head of the chemistry department for many years, head men's soccer coach from 1967 to 1980, and kicking coach for the Crusader football team for the past five years. During the past 25 years he enthusiastically promoted Susquehanna and the sciences through the Chemistry Road Show program that took him to over 500 high schools in the northeast. He developed an Alumni Admission Program, was the long-time advisor to the senior class and served as marshal of the faculty for 25 years until 2001

Potter was also active in the community, including posts as president of the Selinsgrove Area Recreation Board, chairman of the Snyder County Red Cross, coordinator of Susquehanna's United Way fund drive, and a member of the Selinsgrove Area School Board. He was an active member of St. Paul's United Church of Christ in Sehnsgrove where he sang in the choir, taught Sunday School, and served as a member of the Executive Committee, Contributions may be sent to Susquehanna University for the establishment of a scholarship fund in Neil's memory.

Conversations, Connections Helping to Shape SU's Future Strategic Planning Sessions Engage Alumni, Parents, Friends

Inspired by the university's new statement of strategic vision and themes, the invitation promised dinner and a "Conversation with the President" to provide comments and ideas to help chart the future course for Susquehanna.

More than 600 alumni, parents and friends responded, making for one of the most successful series of alumni events in Susquehanna history.

They came out to locations in Allentown and Hershey, Pa.; Basking Ridge and Camden, N.J.; Boston; Westport, Conn.; Washington, D.C.; and Sarasota, Fla. Nearly 150 people turned out in Selinsgrove, and several more will have their say when the series concludes with an April event in Johnstown, Pa.

Proposing Strategic Initiatives

"I am struck by the many ways in which the comments from our alumni and friends play on similar themes to those we have heard from the campus community," says Susquehanna President **L. Jay Lemons**. "It's become clear that people who have obtained a Susquehanna degree and those who are creating the present educational experience share an appreciation of the values and tradinon and want to see them carried into the university's future." The off-campus sessions complement the University's campus-wide strategic planning efforts and preparation for Susquehanna's 2004 10-year accreditation review by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. A series of task forces are using the vision and themes statement as a framework for proposing initiatives for a draft strategic plan. The plan will be presented to the board of directors in spring 2003 for their adoption in the fall of 2003.

Graduates from Across Decades

The events provided opportunities for alumni, parents, and friends to interact with faculty and administrators who facilitated the sessions, including the deans of Susquehanna's three schools: Laura de Abruña for Arts, Humanities and Communications, Terry Winegar for Natural and Social Sciences, and Jim Brock for the Sigmund Weis School of Business, plus Professor of History Linda McMillin, Associate Professor of Biology Dave Richard and Vice President for University Relations Ron Cohen.

Alumni and friends shared stories that illustrated their involvement with Susquehanna. Guests were asked to suggest ideas for helping the university meet its goals in the area of building a stronger community: one that, in the words of the statement of strategic vision and themes, "Expects all – students and faculty, staff and administrators, alumni and friends - to contribute to learning."

Strong, Two-Way Connections

The sessions produced several hundred responses. Among the most common themes were:

- establishing stronger connections between the university, the local community and alumni.
- increasing Susquehanna's national visibility,
- encouraging interdisciplinary connections,
- keeping a balance of liberal arts vs. career programs, and
- considering the impact of and maintaining sensitivity to rising tuition and fees.

Among the many suggestions were building on traditional strengths in areas such as music and business and expanding majors for non-traditional students. Some participants urged SU to keep the "small school environment" while others stressed the need for increasing connections to the larger world and promoting the value of diversity. Others offered comments about the university's historic Lutheran heritage and whether it should consider offering graduate programs.

"We are so pleased to have gathered a great many insightful and thought-provoking comments and ideas that are enriching this dialogue," says President Lemons. "Our challenge is to construct a framework of goals and priorities to guide Susquehanna over the next 5-10 years, and I look forward to sharing that framework with alumni and friends so that we can work together to advance our university."

Arlin Adams Center for Law and Society March 13 Dialogue Will Focus on Hate Speech

wo national constitutional scholars, including the president of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), will present a dialogue on hate speech sponsored by the Arlin M. Adams Center for Law and Society at Susquehanna University on Thursday, March 13, at 8 p.m. in the Degenstein Center Theater.

"Hate Speech: What Price Tolerance?" will feature ACLU President Nadine Strossen and Mari J. Matsuda, professor of law at Georgetown University Law Center.

The dialogue will reflect attempts to balance the rights of free speech, as protected by the Constitution's first amendment, and equal protection, as guaranteed under the 14th amendment. Incidents such as racial epithets, radio shock-jocks, cross burnings, cyber hate sites, Holocaust deniers, and anti-gay preaching have posed often-conflicting opinions on the balance.

Gary S. Gildin, professor of law and director of the Miller Center for Public Interest Advocacy at Penn State Dickinson School of Law, will moderate the event.

Adams Center Marks Second Year

The dialogue marks the second full year of the Adams Center for Law and Society at Susquehanna University. The family of Sigfried and Janet Weis and the Degenstein Foundation of Sunbury, with support from The Annenberg Foundation, established the center in honor of prominent Philadelphia jurist Arlin Adams who served 17 years on the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. The center is intended to strengthen the intellectual dialogue at Susquehanna by raising issues that intersect academic disciplines and important societal questions. The center complements the university's legal studies, prelaw, and interdisciplinary offerings and serves as a resource to the greater community.



Nadine Strossen Strossen, who has written, lectured, and practiced extensively in the areas of constitutional law, civil liberties and international human rights, will present the civil libertarian perspective at the dialogue. Elected president of the

ACLU, the nation's largest and oldest civil liberties organization, in 1991, she is also a professor at New York School of Law, and co-author of *Hate Speech*, *Civil Rights and Civil Liberties*.

Strossen graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Harvard College (1972) and magna cum laude from Harvard Law School (1975), where she was an editor of the *Harvard Law Review*. Before becoming a law professor, she practiced law for nine years in Minneapolis — her hometown — and New York City.

Matsuda, co-author of the book Hords that Wound: Critical Race Theory, Assaultive Speech, and the First Amendment, will discuss the challenges imposed by not regulating hate speech.

An expert in torts, constitutional law, legal history, feminist theory, critical race theory,

and civil rights, she holds the J.D. from the University of Hawaii, and the L.L.M. from Harvard.

Before joining the Law Center, she had been a professor of law at the University of California at Los Angeles School of Law and the University of Hawaii School of Law. She has also taught at Stanford Law School and the University of Hiroshima and served as a judicial training consultant in Micronesia and South Africa. She was an associate at the labor law firm of King & Nakamura in Honolulu and was law clerk to the Honorable Herbert Y.C. Chov of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals.

Athletic Director and Field Hockey Coach Don and Connie Harnum Announce Retirements

Longtume Susquehanna director of athletics **Don Harnum** and his colleague and wife, field hockey coach **Connie Harnum**, have announced they will retire this summer. Don will leave after 24 years at his post and Connie will depart after 27 seasons and 195 victories.



Don will reture as athletic director but remain head coach of the Crusaders' men's golf program. Connic will wrap up her tenure as assistant director of athletics and assistant professor of physical education in May. The university will conduct national searches for replacements.

Don Harnum

Named athletic director in 1979, Don Harnum has overseen the growth of Crusader athletics from 16 varsity sports in 1980 to 23 in 2003. During his tenure, Susquehanna teams have won 37 conference championships and 11 different programs have sent participants to NCAA competition.

He helped guide the 1999-2002 renovation and expansion of campus athletic facilities, including the construction of Nicholas A. Lopardo Stadium, the field house, and the Clyde H. Jacobs Fitness Center as part of the James W. Garrett Sports Complex.

Named head men's basketball coach at Susquehanna in 1969, he left two years later to become head coach for the University of Delaware Blue Hens men's basketball team for five seasons. He returned to Susquehanna in 1976 and coached 12 more seasons with the Crusaders, stepping down in 1989 with a record of 201-153 in 14 years.

As head men's golf coach since 1989, he has led the Crusaders to nine Middle Atlantic Conference championships – including each of the last eight – and guided the program to five trips to the NCAA Division III Tournament.

Connie Harnum steps down following her



most successful season, as the team finished with a program-record 17 victories and ranked seventh in the country while earning an at-large bid to the NCAA Division III field hockey tournament. Named head coach in

Connie Harnum 1974, she patrolled the sidehnes for 27 of the next 29

seasons for a 195-159-23 record.

Beginning with the 1986 season, the Crusaders won 10 or more games seven times, including a 14-win season in 1993, a 15-win campaign in 1999 and 17 victories in 2002. Susquehanna was also nationally ranked throughout the 1999 and 2002 seasons.

The Crusaders made three trips to the NCAA playoffs in 1993, 1999 and 2002 under Harnum, earning a victory in 1999 with a 6-1 opening-round win over Gwynedd-Mercy. She coached no fewer than 32 first-team All-Conference players and three All-Americans. She was also the school's most successful head women's tennis coach as she compiled a 95-51-1 (.684) record over 16 seasons.

Bowman Named Academic All-American of the Year



Susquehanna semor quarterback **Mike Bowman** has been named the Verizon College Division Football Academic All-American of the Year after earning firstteam Academic All-America honors from the College Sports Information Directors of American (CoSIDA).

A mathematics major with

a secondary education ninnor, Bowman is the top-ranked student in the senior class with a perfect 4.0 cimulative grade-point average. He is the second Susquehanna football player in the last three years to earn College Division Academic All-American of the Year honors, which is presented to the team member who receives the most total votes. Offensive lineman **Dave Wonderlick '01** received the award in 2000.

From Northumberland, Pa., the 6-0, 184pound Bowman was a two-year captain and a four-year starter, with a career record of 19-16 in 35 starts. He established program records for completions (609), attempts (1,169), yards (8,160) and touchdowns (63), ranking second in Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) history in completions, attempts and yards while placing fifth in career touchdowns.

Bowman has been named to the Dean's List every semester at Susquehanna and earned both Presidential and Pennsylvania Science and Technology scholarships. He has served as a math tutor and has completed two education externships. He has served as a volunteer football and basketball assistant coach at Shikellamy High School.

James Jordan: '75



Critically-Acclaimed Conductor, Author

ames Jordan '75 came to Susquehanna in the fall of 1972 as a biology major. But when he saw Cyril Stretansky conduct his University Choir, Jordan was so taken by the sounds Stretansky produced that he soon changed his major to music with a vocal emphasis. The switch proved to be a life-changing experience. Jordan is now in his 11th year as conductor of the Westminster Chapel Choir and associate professor of conducting at the Westminster Choir College of Rider University in Lawrenceville/Princeton, N.J. He also just published his latest book, the musician's spirit - connecting to others through story. It encourages the use of life stories to improve a musician's performance.

In addition to Stretansky, now professor of music and director of choral activities, Jordan also cites others who shaped his views of music: Professor Emeritus of Music Fred Billman and former Band Director and Dean of Academic Services Jim Steffy, (currently interim president of Muhlenberg University, See page 6.)

Jordan's own theories of the teaching of rhythm and movement are now widely applied in music education for rhythm to children and adults. His four textbooks and several videos on the subjects of group vocal technique, ensemble diction and conducting are used for the education of teachers and conductors around the world. He is also recognized as pioneer in the use of the case study in music as a valid research model. His background in conducting, the psychology of music, dance education and psychology allow him to make poignant observations into the music-making process from the vantage point of a conductor

He is editor of "The James Jordan Choral Series," published by Hinshaw Music. This series contains distinctive choral literature for choirs at all levels. He was most recently honored by renowned American composer Morten Lauridsen, who, in his new edition of Mid-Winter Songs, dedicated Movement III to Dr. Jordan.

The musician's spirit offers practical and inspirational words on courage and visions, the arts of listening and trust, conquering the fear of looking foolish, and the importance of story in teaching. It is the companion book to his earlier work, The Musician's Soul (1999).

"The best choirs are those where all the members have the same awareness and are in the same place," says Jordan. "That's the secret to the Westminster (Choir College) sound. We work hard at the human element - the ability to connect humanity with the music."

He and his wife, Leslie Jarrett '76 Jordan, and their daughter, Elizabeth, 13, reside in Yardley, Pa.



DEDICATION WEEKEND SALUTES New Center for Music and Art

or more than 40 years, Heilman Hall was the heart of Susquehanna University's music program. Its halls echoed the sounds of countless rehearsals and lectures.

Now, the two-story structure that welcomed generations of SU music students has been reborn. Nearly 18 months of renovations and expansions have transformed the building into a dynamic new Center for Music and Art, complete with a showcase performance hall.

Funded by a grant from the Degenstein Foundation, the new center offers enhanced art and music teaching facilities that support both a new collaboration between music and art programs and the University's commitment to expanding its role as a community arts resource.

"This "facility will bring creative events to our local community and sresare students for creative expression when they leave our area and move on to the world of art." "The Center for Music and Art is a firstclass facility that will definitely put Susquehanna University and Schnsgrove, Pennsylvania, on the artistic map. This stateof-the-art facility will bring creative events to our local community and prepare students for creative expression when they leave our area and move on to the world of art," said Michael Apfelhaum, who, along with his father, Sidney, and brother, Jeffrey, manages the Degenstein Foundation.

A Building Transformed

The transformation of Heiman Hall included renovations to the existing building, removal of the music department's previous practice wing and administrative offices, and the addition of structures to the east and west sides. The construction allowed the music and art programs to be combined under one roof for the first time in Susquehanna's history.

A two-story, 8,765-square-foot addition to Heilman's west face gave the Department of Music 32 practice rooms, faculty studios, offices, student lounges and storage space. Occupying a two-story, 8,411-square-foot addition on the east side of the original hall, the Department of Art now has photography and drawing studios, a graphic design studio, slide library, art history classrooms, offices and storage space. A separate art studio building commutes to house painting, printmaking and three-dimensional design studios.

CHAMINCHAM ANA Stretansky Throughout the Feb. 7-9 dedication weekend, a host of musical events were held in the center's feature performance venue, Stretansky Concert Hall. Designed for solo recitals, as well as chamber and ensemble concerts, the 320-seat hall is named in honor of **Cyril Stretansky**, director of choral activities at SU since 1972. Stretansky was a long-time director of the Susquehanna Valley Chorale and

holds the Cyril Stretansky Distinguished Professorship in Choral Music, established in 2001 as the first endowed chair to support fine arts at the university. The hall named in his honor is equipped with state-of-the-art technology, including a modular acoustic system that can be adjusted to suit individual performances.

In the main lobby of the center hangs a portrait of University President Emeritus Joel Cunningham who left Susquehanna in 2000 to become president and vice chancellor at the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn. The Degenstein Foundation grant was made in recognition of Cunningham's accomplishments at Susquehanna, Stretansky's distinguished music career, and their combined commitment to bringing fine arts to the Susquehanna community and the region at large.

A Choral Inspiration

Stretansky attributes his success to the people he has worked with through the years rather than his own talents. "The naning of the new concert hall in the Center for Music and Art

as Stretansky Hall is, in reality, a tribute to the Susquehanna University students and residents of the Susquehanna Valley whose dedication and talent have developed the art of choral music. It has been my honor and privilege to develop and nurture that talent," he sad.

However, former students give Stretansky more credit than he is willing to give himself. "Cy has continued to be an inspiration to me in the choral arts field since his arrival at SU in my junior year, and he has provided an outlet for my composition of choral music since I began composing a few years after graduation," said **Wayne Dietterick '74**, a professional church musician from Gillette, N.J.

Stretansky's leadership also influenced Susan Kees '83 Morgan. She says he taught her to have faith in herself. Her participation in the choir also took her to Europe where she had the rare opportunity of singing at a small basilica in Pisa, Italy.

Interaction Among the Arts

The Center for Music and Art is an essential component to the future of Susquehanna's music program Valerie Martin, associate professor of music and head of the Department of Music, says the center's acoustically designed practice rooms are "critical for the development of our musicians" and Stretansky Hall adds an additional venue for more faculty and student performances.

"Both of these components, along with the renovated studios and classrooms, provide room for growth in the music program, as well as enhanced learning environments for all of the students involved in the department," Martin said.

The same can be said of the center's benefits to the Department of Art, which until now had no permanent home on campus.

Have You Consolidated Yet? Student Loan Interest Rates Are at an All-Time Low

Information from the Susquehanna Office of Financial Aid

Most likely, you have been inundated with solicitations to consolidate the federal student loans that you took out in school. If you have not yet done so, you may want to seriously consider consolidation at this time.

Interest rates are the lowest in the history of the federal student loan programs. For those of you who graduated recently and are still in your six-month grace period, you can really take advantage of the lowest possible interest rate, since in-grace interest rates are .60% lower than in-repayment interest rates. Time is an important factor in your decision as current rates will change on July 1, 2003.

When consolidating your federal student loans, the lender will deternune the average-weighted interest rate of all of the loans that you are requesting to consolidate. You will also be offered a longer repayment term, 15 years instead of the usual 10. It is important to remember that this would cost you more interest in the long-run. However, as always, you are free to accelerate your payments to minimize interest charges. With consolidation your interest rate will definitely be lower than the current rate your loans carry.

Though consolidation may not be for everyone, it is best to contact the lender who currently has ownership of your loans or the loan servicer who acts on your lender's behalf. Their customer service representatives will be happy to answer any questions you may have to help you in your decision to consolidate. 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Gallery, Theater Celebrate 10th Anniversaries French Posters Show "Cognac, Café and Culture"

THE LORE DEGENSTEIN GALLERY kicked off Susquehanna's 2003 Celebrating the Arts Weekend with a lecture and reception for its current exhibition, "Art of the French Poster: Cognac, Café, and Culture."The first event in a weekend series marking the dedication of the University's new Center for Music and Art (see page 20), the show is also the latest in a long line of eclectic exhibitions to grace the 4,500-squarefoot gallery that will mark its 10th anniversary this spring.

Both the gallery and the 447-seat Degenstein Center Fheater, which is also celebrating a 10th anniversary this academic year, are key components of an addition to the Charles B. Degenstein Campus Center designed to put the arts at the very heart of campus life.

"It doesn't take long to realize how valuable the Degenstein Center Theater and the Lore Degenstein Gallery are to Susquehanna University and the surrounding community," said President L. Jay Lemons. "The events featured here consistently raise cultural awareness for students and residents of the Central Susquehanna Valley."

Ten Years of Cultural Riches

Over the past decade, the gallery has shown exhibitions ranging from paintings from the National Gallery of Art and photography through the nucroscope to bead sculpture and ancient ceramics. It has explored the history of Central Pennsylvania, highlighted the atrocities of child labor and the Holocaust, and produced a forum for the discussion of topics such as environmental destruction and the pushing back of Native Americans.

In the same time frame, the intimate Degenstein Center Theater has hosted productions ranging from Shakespeare and student one-act plays and recitals to guest artists such as The Kandinsky Trio and "Salsamba." The theater has also hosted numerous special events, including visiting authors, lecturers, and symposia and a 2000 world premiere of a university-commissioned work by composer Simon Sargon for a Jewish-Christian dialogue conference.


Student and Community Benefits

As such, the theater and the gallery have become learning centers, enriching the lives of students and area residents alike. Students regularly gain experience performing or working backstage at the theater or working with gallery staff on projects such as cataloguing collections and mounting exhibitions. The rich subject material of diverse exhibitions and productions also prompt numerous interdisciplinary classroom activities.

That was exactly what university officials had in mind when the late Charles Degenstein made the gifts creating the theater and gallery, the latter in honor of his wife, Lore.

Gallery Director Valerie Livingston, associate professor of art history and head of the university's Department of Art, said the omission of the word "art" in the gallery's title was deliberate.

"I don't want it to be just a pretty place that shows pictures on the walls," said Livingston. "We planned from the beginning to be a teaching facility and draw upon the curriculum."

Third Poster Exhibition

The gallery's current exhibition illustrates just that. Numbering 1,616 in all, the French advertising posters were donated to the university in 1997 by Joseph and Ann Silbaugh of Shrewsbury, Pa. This is the third exhibition from the collection, representing 90 years of French commerce and culture, from 1890 -1980.

Over the past several years, gallery interns have painstakingly catalogued and photographed each poster. Now, students are taking on the challenge of identifying the posters' thematic issues, artists, printers and publishers.

The opening event included a slide presentation by Livingston and remarks from gallery interns **Diane Clifford '03** and **Jean Silbaugh '04**, the daughter of the poster donors.

Priceless Teaching Tools

Academic applications of the posters aren't reserved to the Department of Art. Lynn Palermo and Scott Manning, both assistant professors of French, were recently awarded a three-year Teaching Innovation Grant from Susquehanna's Teaching and Learning Center to hnk language studies to local sources and resources. Central to their work is the integration of these posters into the classroom.

From a teaching standpoint, Palerino says, the posters are priceless. With advertising topics such as food, clothing, films, festivals and social movements, they can teach students a multitude of things about French culture. "Because these posters cover a broad range of products and events, they can show us attitudes, values and perspectives at different times in history," Palermo said.

Manning agrees. "The posters are very valuable for us because the use of authentic French materials is extremely important in language teaching. The collection covers all kinds of topics and time periods, so they provide many different entries into a variety of cultural topics," he said.

Palermo has used the posters in her French business and conversation courses, and Manning 15 using the current exhibition as the basis for half of the writing in his Advanced French Composition and Grammar class. But according to Palermo, they haven't even "scratched the surface" of the collection's academic usefulness. 2003

Campus News Former Sen. Mitchell Addresses Grads

Promer U.S. Sen. George J. Mitchell delivcred the commencement speech to members of the Susquehanna class of 2003 and their guests at the university's 145th graduation ceremony on Sunday, May 11. To accommodate a growing crowd of family and friends, the event was scheduled to move from the traditional Seibert Green to the university's 3,500 seat Nicholas A. Lopardo Stadium. Four hundred students received bachelor degrees. An additional four students received associate degrees.

Mitchell joined Hazel J. Brobst '51 Brown and William A. Gettig, an emeritus member of the university board of directors, to receive honorary Doctor of Laws degrees at the ceremony. The Rev. Michael L. Cooper-White, president of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, received an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree and served as the baccalaureate speaker.

Next Generation Festival Returns June 14 to SU

The Next Generation Festival is returning to Susquehanna on Saturday, June 14, at 7:30 p.m. in Stretansky Concert Hall in the university's new Center for Music and Art. Sponsored by WITF 89.5, this chamber music concert features internationally known pranist Awadagin Pratt and emerging young musicians in what promises to be an outstanding and exciring program. This will be the fourth year at Susquehanna for the festival, which is celebrating its seventh anniversary. Admission is free but nickets are required. Distinguished Senate Career

Mitchell was propelled into the national spotlight in 1980 when he was appointed to the U.S. Senate, completing the unexpired term of Sen. Edmund Muskie who resigned to become Secretary of State. In 1988, the Maine Democrat took the post of Senate majority leader, which he held until his retirement in 1995. During his 14year career in the U.S. Senate, Mitchell served on the Finance, Veterans Affairs, and Environment and Public Works committees, and was a member of the Select Committee on the Iran-Contra Affair. He led the reauthorization of the Clean Air Act of 1990, authored the first national oil spill prevention and clean-up law, was instrumental in passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act, and led the ratification of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) and creation of the World Trade Organization, as well as the nation's first childcare bill.

Upon leaving the Senate, Mitchell joined the Washington, D.C., law firm of Verner, Lupfert, Bernhard, Mcpherson and Hand. The author of four books, he serves as director of husiness enterprises including the Walt Disney Co., Federal Express Corp., and Xerox Corp. Mitchell is chairman of the International Crisis Group, a non-profit organization dedicated to the prevention of crises in international affairs.

Broker of Irish Peace Accord

In October 2000, at the request of President Bill Clinton, Israeh Prime Minister Ehud Barak and president of the Palestinian Council Yasser Arafat, Mitchell agreed to chair the Sharm el-Sheikh International Fact-Finding Committee to examine the crisis between the Israelis and Palestinians. He currently serves as independent overseer of the Liberty Disaster Fund, a separate, segregated account established by the American Red Cross to assist those affected by the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

Mitchell is also credited for brokering the historic 1998 Good Friday Agreement as chair of the International Commission on Disarmament in Northern Ireland. The achievement earned him numerous awards including the Philadelphia Liberty Medal, The United Nations (UNESCO) Peace Prize and the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest honor bestowed on a civilian by the U.S. government.

Honorary Degree Recipients

A licensed psychologist and certified school psychologist in the commonwealth, Brown is a professor of psychology emerita of Harrisburg Area Community College. Her career has included employment as a teacher, counselor, director of gindance, and school psychologist in the West Shore School District, director of the Division of Children and Youth Services in the Pennsylvania Office of Mental Health, and dean of continuing and community education at Harrisburg Area Community College. A resident of Camp Hill, Pa., she holds the doctorate in education from Pennsylvania State University.

Brown served as a member of the Susquehanna board of directors for six years and she received the university's Alumin Association Award for Achievement in 1998. In 1983, she and her husband, Robert, established The Clarence E. and Grace Ketler Brobst Scholarship Fund to help local students attending Susquehanna.

Gettig of Millheim, Pa., is president and chief executive officer of Gettig Technologies Inc., its divisions, Gettig Engineering and Manufacturing Co., and Gettig Pharmaceutical Co., and its wholly-owned subsidiaries, Stelrema Corp., Beacon Tool Corp., and GPI Aviation Inc. The World War II veteran has been granted numerous patents ranging from electromechanical devices to nucroprocessor-controlled pharmaceutical assembly equipment, including hypoderinic syringe and injector techniques.

Cooper-White is former executive assistant to the presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and director of the ELCA Department for Synodical Relations. He has also served as interim executive director of the Northern California Ecumenical Council and director of the San Francisco Bay Area Urban Coalition.

SU Habitat for Humanity Seeks Construction Funds

The newly re-founded Susquehanna chapter of Habitat for Humanity has launched a \$20,000 fundraising program to underwrite costs of a local Habitat house to be funded and built enurely by the extended Susquehanna University community.

The group is inviting students, faculty, staff, cumpus clubs and organizations, and university alumn to assist in the financing and eventual construction of a house that will be built in cooperation with the Union-Snyder County chapter of Habitat for Humanity.

Cathleen Jones '04, president of the campus chapter, says the group hopes to sponsor one fundraiser a month to raise the \$20,000 start-up fee 'To date, the group has raised about \$2,500 from a variety of projects including a Lego model Habitat house construction contest at 2002 Homecoming, a recent Penny War, and a spring weekend Campus Campout, renting camping plots on the field hockey field.

Assistant Professor of English **Drew Hobbell** is advisor for the campus chapter, which is affiliated with Chapel Council and plans to seek SGA recognition.

Habitat for Humanity is an ecumenical Christian organization that brings families in need together with volunteers to build decent,

University Board Sets Tuition and Fees for 2003-2004

The university's board of directors has approved an increase in tuition and fees for the 2003-04 academic year.

Comprehensive fees for next year – which include tuition and fees, room and board – will total \$29,990. The \$1,490 increase is 5.2 percent of current fees.

"Susquehanna's board and administration worked hard to balance the resources needed to provide a high quality education with the pressure that fees can place on students and their families," said university president **L. Jay Lemons**

"In the coming year we will invest significantly more in information technology enhancements, including additional smart classrooms and network improvements," added Lemons, "We will continue our efforts to offer competitive wages to attract and retain the most qualified faculty and staff, and to cover the umversity's share of increasing health insurance costs. We will also continue our commitment to a financial aid program that is sensitive to the needs of students and families."

Susquehanna's increase in fees for the 2003-04 academic year is comparable to that of many other colleges and universities. affordable housing. Since 1976 the organization has built more than 125,000 houses in 80 countries, including 45,000 in the United States.

Habitat houses are sold at no profit with nointerest mortgages to make them affordable to low-income families worldwide. Homeowners and volunteers build the houses under trained supervision with individuals, corporations, faith groups and others providing financial support.

The campus Habitat project will fund and build a house near the Selinsgrove Speedway in the Wedgewood Gardens housing development, site of a previous house built by the Umon-Snyder Habitat chapter. Once the ground is broken, there will be the opportunity for anyone interested to put in a Saturday toward building the house.

"We want to notify as many members of the SU community as possible, and ask people with an interest in helping out in some way to respond," says Jones.

The campus group currently has 20 active members who have assisted in construction of other Habitat houses in nearby Sunbury in the past year.

Susquehanna a Member Independent 529 Plan Gains IRS Approval

In February 2003 the IRS approved a new 529 prepaid college tuntion plan for a private college consortium of which Susquehanna is a member.

Tailored specifically for attendance at private, independent member colleges, this plan offers a tax-exempt return on investment. The Independent 529 Plan currently has more than 260 member schools nationwide and that number is expected to grow.

Families will have the opportunity to purchase future tution credits at current prices, at a discount of at least one-half percent. Discount amounts are determined by each institution but will not be less than the minimum one-half percent

Participants receive guaranteed protection against future tuition increases, favorable tax treatment and portability of their funds to apply to tuition at any member school nationwide. In addition, the principal can be transferred to another family member if the designated beneficiary does not attend a member school. If the student chooses a public institution, the plan returns the principal, plus or minus 2 percent, depending on the fund's performance.

Families can begin contributing to the plan in the summer of 2003. Assets will be managed by TIAA-CREF Tuttion Financing, Inc

Robert Mowry Retires After 41 Years



With interests ranging from metaphysics to illustrating to music, you could say Associate Professor of Spanish **Robert Mowry** embodies the liberal arts ideal.

Mowry, who received his bachelor's degree from Oberlin College and earned both a master's and doctorate from Middlebury College, retired after 41 years of service at the end of the 2002-2003 acadenic year.

He originally received and subsequently turned down a full scholarship to the Cleveland Institute of Art in order to attend Oberlin College, where he planned to major in philosophy. "I chose Oberlin because they had a course in metaphysics," he says. "I ended up majoring in European History."

The experience was "an interesting object lesson in trying to keep an open mind," says Mowry. "My original goal was to be a cartoonist at Disney and I ended up teaching Spanish!"

In 2001 Susquehanna awarded Mowry

the John C. Horn Distinguished Service Lectureship at commencement in recognition of his outstanding scholarship and conscientious service. In addition to his work in the modern languages department for the last four decades, Mowry has also been involved with the Honors Program since its inception 21 years ago, serving as associate director for the past 10 years. He remembers being "especially glad to have been involved in the Honors Program because of its very distinctive group of students."

Mowry's retirement plans include dedicating more of his time to both creating and appreciating art. "Originally, I did not choose art as my path because I felt that I had nothing to say through my art. Since that time I have become most comfortable in illustrating literary texts."

Sixteen of his brush-and-ink drawings are currently on display in the Blough Weis Library. He created the illustrations to accompany his recently published translation of *Destruction or Love*, a major work by Spanish poet Vicente Aleixandre, recipient of the 1977 Nobel Prize for Literature The Susquehanna University Press published Mowry's translation in 2001.

He is also looking forward to spending more time with family, especially his grandchildren. He and his wife will be moving to Greensboro, N.C., and he is sure there will be some traveling in their future as well

News Journal about the stereotyping of people of Middle Eastern descent; Assistant Professor of Religion Jeffrey Mann wrote an opinion piece on "why so many Muslims hate Americans" which appeared in the Harrisburg Patriot-News. Can the regulation of hate speech be justified in light of the United States' constitutional and principled commitment to the value of free and unfettered speech?

Hate Speech Dialogue Highlights Current Issues

Issues from the headlines and court dockets covering topics from college campus speech codes to cross burnings informed a hvely dialogue on "Hate Speech: What Price Tolerance" sponsored by the university's Arlin M. Adams Center for Law and Society in the Degenstein Center Theater on Mach. 13 President of the American Ciril Liberties Union Nadine Stossen and Georgetown University Professor of Law Mari J. Matsuda were featured speakers at the well-attended event, the second in the annual Arlin Adams lecture series. Gary S. Gildin, professor of law and director of the Miller Center for Public Interest Advocacy at Penn State Dickinson School of Law, seried as moderato.

Matsuda, co-anthor of the book Words that Wound: Critical Race Theory, Assaultive Speech, and the First Amendment, presented the position that hate speech should be regulated. Strossen, professor at New York School of Law, and co-author of Speaking of Race, Speaking of Sex: Hate Speech, Civil Rights and Civil Liberties, presented the avil hibertarian perspective that hate speech should not be regulated.

A sistant Professor of Political Science Michele DeMary, a member of the Adams Center steering committee, introduced the context for the evening's topic. Questions of balance between the free speech right protected by the Constitution's first amendment and the equal protection right guaranteed by the 14th amendment, she said, are central to the challenge of fostering free inquiry in a liberal arts institution like Susquehanna: "How can we create an environment free of hostility and yet promote the kind of open dialogue which is vital to a search for knowledge?"

"What you're about to writness in the next 40 minutes is how true professionals, nationally renowned experts in their field, will in fact vigorously disagree over the substance of their positions but without demigrating or demeaning their adversaries, themselves, or the audience," pointed out Gildm.

Following are excerpts from the dialogue, which was videotaped for distribution to classrooms through the outreach programs sponsored by the Adams Center.

Matsuda: Regulate Hate Speech

When there is no progress on equality, there is no hate speech, no backlash, no Ku Klux Klan.

. It's the assertion of the quality, the demand for personhood, that brings about the tension from which erupts the ugly words. The good news is we have no quietude because our imique status as a country of the many, a country bold enough to travel the road to equality is still mater. The bad news is that it is a very long road.

This is not a debate that we come to as a matter of abstract legal principles. It's a debate that we are brought to meyitably as we move to full

and equal citizenship for all.

. Humans who harm humans operate from a world view under which the harm is valorized. This is why I take speech seriously. It forms the social world that makes harm possible. There is no genocide without supporting propaganda. There is no rape without misogyny; there is no gay bashing without homophobia. There is no lynching without the "N" word This is not a poem; I mean it as a statement of fact. Without the language that says, 'this is not a person,' it is typically not possible for human beings to harm other human beings.

...If people are not heard because structures of racism or sexism or homophobia or poverty make it harder for them to project their voices into the national conversation, we do not have all the ideas we need in the marketplace. If people do not participate because they lack the means, the education, the access to effective self-governance, we have a weakened democracy. Equality promotes speech, inequality limits it.

... I support limited restrictions on hate speech on campus because of what I've learned from students – their right to an education, their right to participation, is infringed when hate speech is considered free speech on college campuses.

Strossen: Do Not Regulate Hate Speech

Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes famously explained if there is any principle on the constitution that imperatively calls for attachment than any other, it is freedom for the thought that we hate This core speech-protective precept of viewpoint neutrality has been hailed by the Supreme Court as the bedrock principle underlying our cherished first amendment freedoms. It means that government may never har speech just because of disagreement with or repugnance at the viewpoint it conveys.

... The reason we do not let government suppress speech m light of these real psychic and emotional harms is that, to quote the old saying 'the cure is worse than the disease.' Both for society as a whole and as individual citizens, having to hear upsetting and offensive expression is the lesser of two evils. Far worse would be empowering government or a majority of our fellow citizens to take away from us our freedom to make our own decisions about what we say and what we see or hear.

... We at the ACLU undertook a critical reexamination of our established hate speech position. However, based on that analysis, the ACLU resoundingly reaffirmed our traditional speechprotective position. And we did not do so because we elevate free speech rights above equality rights – that is an essential point. Rather, we concluded that censoring hate speech would not, in fact, foster equality. And I think it's important to note that point.

... The viewpoint neutrality principle reflects the philosophy that the appropriate response to speech with which one disagrees in a free society is not censorship, but counter speech – more speech, not less. Accordingly, the appropriate response to hate speech is not to censor it, but to answer it

...Censoring hate speech increases attention to, and sympathy for bigots. It drives bigoted expression and ideas underground, thus making response more difficult. It is inevitably enforced disproportionately against speech by and on behalf of members of minority groups.

To the Susquehanna Community: We write this in response to a letter by John Topper, class of '65, which appeared in Susquehanna Today Winter 2003. As persons of tolerance and respect for the protection of fundamental freedoms, we accept the right of others to express their beliefs to the community at large Our purpose is not to censure the beliefs expressed therein, rather, we merely seek to answer the question posed by the letter: "What kind of a slap in the face have you just given to who knows how many loyal alumini by your obvious approval and visual support of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (L.G.B.T.) association?" The short answer, in our opinion, is none at all. In fact, it is our opinion, that approval and support of 1 G B T promotes the mission of Susqueharma and assists in preparing students for success in an ever more diverse world.

Iwo quotations inform our opinion

Susquehanna's mission is to educate students for productive and reflective lives of achievement, leadership, and service in a diverse and rapidly changing world. This concept of a diverse world includes individuals of all sexual orientations. Therefore, in order to fulfill the mission, Susquehanna must educate students on the issues of sexual orientation and help instill tolerance of all Secondly, the 2002-2003 Student Handbook states, "each [member of this community] also is expected to help guarantee the rights of other members of this community to free expression." Lastly, the Student Handbook further states, "all members of the community should be encouraged to participate in critical inquiry and to engage in sustained and independent search for truth Free expression of ideas is of essential importance in this search." In recognition of these statements, it is difficult to see how the recognition of I_G B.1 does anything short of furthering the educational mission at Susquehanna

In response to the suggestion that the "founding tathers" of the university must be "rolling over in their graves," I offer two statements. First, the *Studen Handbook* states, "the Lutheran tradition is a diverse and accepting one – there is no hindrance to the free exploration of ideas." Secondly, the website for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (FECA) contains the following statement regarding sexual orientation. "The ELCA has acted to welcome gay and lesbian people to participate fully in the life of its congregations and to reject discrimination, assault, and harasiment of gay and lesbian persons." Since the ELCA encourages tolerance and acceptance, we believe it is a gross exaggeration to suggest that the approval and support of L.G.B.T. would cause the founders to "roll over in their graves."

In closing we ask the entire Susquehanna Community to heed the words of John Fitzgerald Kennedy. "If we cannot now end our differences, at least we can help make the world safe for diversity."

Men's Golf Takes Ninth MAC Title

The Susquehanna University men's golf team won its unprecedented minth consecutive Middle Atlantic Conference team championship on Sunday, April 27, at the Shawnee Country Club, capturing the top three individual places in winning the title by 33 strokes over Delaware Valley.

The Crusaders finished with a team total of 924, which is believed to be the lowest-ever 54-hole score at the MAC Championships and placed Susquehanna well ahead of the runner-up Aggies (957) and Moravian (961) in the 14-team field

Steve Datt '05 of Mill Hall, Pa., overcame a one-stroke deficit after 27 of the tournament's 54 holes to win the championship by six strokes with a two-day total of 9-over-par 225. His victory is the fifth individual title for Susquehanna in the last six years, joining **Chris Scagliotti '01** in 2001, **Joe Rossi '99** in 1999 and **Hugh Leahy '01** in 1998 and 2000.

Buddy Yarger '04 of Paxinos, Pa., finished second to Datt with a total of 231 despite shooting 81 over the final 27 holes. John Krumpotich '04 of New Market, Md., rounded out the Susquehanna sweep of the top three spots with a score of 232, 16 strokes over par

Susquehanna has won or shared the team title every year since finishing third in 1995, and advanced to the NCAA Division III Championships for the sixth time in nine seasons.

Deamer Qualifies for U.S. National Track and Field

On the strength of his record-setting performance in the Javelin at the March 15 Washington & Lee Invitational, **Matt Deamer '02** has automatically qualified for the 2003 USA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, to be held June 19–22 at Stanford University.

He has also provisionally qualified for the U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials to be held in Sacramento from July 9 to 18, 2004. His outstanding record earned him a spot in the "Faces in the Crowd" feature in the April 21 issue of *Sports Illustrated*.

Deamer, a marketing major from Lewistown, Pa., recorded what is believed to be the third-longest javelin throw in NCAA Division III history with a distance of 236 feet, 1–1–2 inches to shatter his own school record of 226 feet, 1 mch set at last year's Middle Atlantic Conference championships.

His throw surpassed the USA Outdoor Championships automatic qualifying mark of 232 feet, 11 inches and will enable Deamer to compete in the 18-man field on Saturday, June 21.


Deamer, now a four-time automatic qualifier to the NCAA Division III Championships and a 2001 All-American, is in pursuit of the modern Division III record of 242 feet, 6 inches set by Kris Theriault of Fitchburg State during preliminaries at the 1995 NCAA championships.

Men's basketball became a varsity sport in 1901-02, while the women's program was added in 1960-61.

Bob Pittello **'51**



Teaching Young Men the Game of Football or 50 years **Robert Pittello '51** has commuted 60 miles round-trip from Mount Carmel, Pa., to Selmsgrove, yet his home and his job have always been in the same town. Pittello makes that trip not for his career, but for his passion: teaching young men the game of football. And on May 31, the university will reward that passion by awarding Pittello the 2003 Alumni Association Service Award.

Pittello began his studies at Susquehanna in 1948, after serving in the U.S. Navy Submarine Service. He played Crusader football under coaches Amos Alonzo Stagg Sr. and Jr. By maintaining a full course load and attending summer session he graduated in three years. Soon after he married Judith DiFrancesco Pittello, who passed away in 1965.

He began his career in accounting keeping the books at his uncle's business. Mount Carmel Motors and Equipment Company. In 1950 Pittello started his own business preparing tax returns, charging one dollar for a simple return. He has been self-employed as a public accountant ever since. The flexibility of that first job allowed Pittello to say yes when Coach Stagg called and asked him to be an assistant coach for Susquehanna. "And once 1 got started 1 just never wanted to quit," he says.

Since then, Pittello has worked with five Crusader head coaches. "Bob walks into a room and it seems people instantly adore him and respect him," says Steve Briggs, current head coach. "The players and coaches appreciate his experience, his love of the game, his discipline and his humor."

Pittello's athletic accomplishments have led to the retiring of his number, his induction into the Lower Anthracite-based Ed Romance Sports Hall of Fame, and the 2001 dedication of the Crusader locker room in his name. This year's alumni award for service is particularly special to him, because "I'm not often recognized for something that isn't sports related," he says. "It's the icing on the cake."

The award reflects his generosity of time not limited to SU football. He has also been an active recruiter for the Alumin Parent Admissions Network (APAN). He is a member of the American Football Coaches Association, the American Legion and the Sons of Italy, the Mount Carmel Rotary Club and a director of Union National Bank in Mount Carmel. He especially enjoys his work with the Ed Romance Sports Hall of Fame, a chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. "We induct former athletes from the immediate area, and very often it's the first time they've been honored."

At 76, Pittello has no plans for retirement from accounting and certainly not from football."It keeps me young and makes me feel like I'm accomplishing something. I'd like to think I've coached this long because I'm a good coach. Part of that is knowing when to stop. I'll know when it's time."

Helping Shape the University's Future

rank J. Trembulak '69 has enjoyed the distinction of being "recruited" by Susquehanna University two times - first in the mid-1960s to play varsity basketball and then two decades later to volunteer his time and other talents for his alma mater.

Trembulak, who will receive the 2003 Alumni Association Award for Leadership, was approached to serve on his first university committee in the late 1980s. The request would lead to increasing involvement with Susquehanna and ultimately a position on the SU board of directors, of which he has been a member since 1994.

"It's been interesting and a good experience," says Trembulak, who has volunteered for more than a dozen university committees, panels and boards since 1989. Among his many and varied contributions, he has helped to improve the buildings and grounds, searched for an athletic director, and shared his experiences in the business world with SU students.

While he admits that alumni service is time consuming, Trembulak, executive vice president/CEO with Geisinger Health System, says he is glad for the opportunity to "view the university from many different angles."

Trembulak, who divides his time between his primary residence in Hershey, Pa., and an apartment near the Geisinger facility in Danville, Pa., joined Geisinger in 1976 as an audit manager and worked his way to the top. He now serves as the organization's highest ranking non-medical staff member. His public service is not limited to Susquehanna; along with his wife, Elaine, he also worked to develop Geisinger's first Ronald McDonald House in the late 1970s. They are the parents of **Shari Trembulak '93 Mangels**, Susquehanna's director of alumni relations.

"My experience at Susquehanna was well-rounded," he says, explaining that he played basketball, received financial aid, and also worked in the SU cafeteria to help cover expenses while he earned his degree. "I got a good grounding in accounting technique and processes, and living in a university community made me well-rounded socially."

Trembulak adds that he feels an "obligation" to Susquehanna, which he repays by volunteering. As an alumni leader who helps to shape the course of the university, Trembulak says he is pleased to foster the next generation of SU students - even though he never has direct contact with many of them. "It's a chance to give back indirectly to the students by ensuring that they have a school that is fiscally and academically sound," he says.

Michael Collins 73 Parents, Dreams, and a Love of Learning

ichael Collins '73, senior vice president and lending officer at the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia, is celebrating quite a few milestones this spring. He and his wife, Wendy, are celebrating 15 years of marriage; he just welcomed his first granddaughter, Bella Grace; he was elected by the Alumm Executive Board as an alumni representative to Susquehanna's board of directors; and he was recently named an alumm inductee into the university's chapter of Beta Gamma Sigma, a prestigious business honor society. For many of these accomplishments and many more, he will be recognized with the 2003 Alumni

Achievement Award on May 31.

"I think of it as giving back to the university for everything that they have given me," says Collins. Why Study Abroad Remains Popular, Even in Troubled Times

War in Iraq, the threat of terrorist attacks and anti-American sentiments around the world have sparked a fair share of apprehension about overseas travel, but they haven't stopped Susquehanna students from taking full advantage of the university's study abroad opportunities.

The experience, they say, is simply too beneficial to forfeit.

A coording to Scott Manning, coordinator of international study programs and assistant professor of French and Italian, about 25 percent of the student body studies abroad. Their time abroad ranges from two-week travel components of the university's interdisciplinary Focus programs or Central American service learning programs sponsored by the Chaplan's office to a semisster or even a full year overseas. And with hundreds of approved programs in more than 50 countries to choose from, there is virtually no limit to travel itineraries.

This spring, 32 students studied in a dozen different countries. Another 20 studied together through the Sigmund Weis School of Business Semester in London program. In the fall, Manning says, even more students plan to go abroad 35 students in individual programs and an additional 31 students with the business school in London.

When Mamming has talked with students about the possibility of changing their plans in hight of world events, he says, "Almost all have said something along the lines of,





'I think I will probably be safer in some other country, so why would I want to change my mind about going abroad?'

"No one would have ever said that before 9-11, even though it was always true given the violent crime rate in the U.S. compared to the very low incidence of violent crime in all of the countries our students go to," Manning says.

"More than 20 years later, I would still say it was one of the best experiences of my life, just for the multicultural exposure," says **Melissa Vines '83 Cheyney**, a corporate trainer from Rocky Hill, Conn.

A Spanish major and German minor, Chevney spent the fall of 1981 in Madrid, Spain, and the spring of 1982 in Vienna, Austria. She says her language skills developed by "leaps and bounds" while studying in the two countries, and the experience "awakened the travel bug" in her "The entire experience helped me by opening my mind to other points of view," she adds

It's a theme prevalent in many study abroad experiences **Scott Stracka '97**, an asset manager from Arlington, Va., says the semester he spent in southern Spam was life altering. "It really made me realize what different ways of life there are on this planet. It opened my eyes and made me a better person – one that respected differences much more so once my time in Spain was over," he says.

Shawn Lowery '03, who traveled to nine different countries while studying under the business school's London program in the spring of 2002, came back with a similar story."Every trip was full of adventure and learning, the type of knowledge I could never attain from sitting in a classroom. I have grown in my understanding and appreciation for a variety of cultures and histories in many different countries, and I have gained a clearer understanding of foreign perception of American culture," Lowery says.

For some, study abroad defined their career choices. **Elizabeth Dollhopf-Brown '00** of Racine, Wis., director of annual support for Marquette University, spent the fall of 1998 in Hong Kong and China. Along with working as a finance intern for L.L. Bean, Dollfhopf-Brown volunteered to teach English to Indonesian migrant workers.

"They were all women who worked in tough conditions, and while we worked on their English, we tried to build up their selfesteem too," Dollhopf-Brown says.





She says the experience showed her what she wanted to do with her life. "I decided while in Hong Kong that while I was a business major, I wanted to take those skills and apply them to helping others through the non-profit sector. Since graduation, I have worked in higher education resource development and I intend to continue my career in non-profit fund-raising for the foreseeable future," Dollhopf-Brown says.

Christopher Romanosky '02 is another alumnus whose life was defined by his study abroad experience. While enrolled at Susquehanna, Romanosky did an internship in Dijon, France, and upon graduation, returned there to take a job teaching English to French businessmen at a language training school.

Recent strains in French-American relations haven't discouraged him from living in France either. He recently renewed his visa and plans on staying there for quite some time. "The people here have been great, the food even better, and I continue to work on my language skills every day," Romanosky said.

Even if studying in another country doesn't change someone as drastically as it has these individuals, **Mary Hennighan** '03, who spent a summer in Quebec, Canada, another in Mexico, and a semester in France, says it makes graduates more marketable in today's competitive workforce. "Just seeing that someone had the interest and courage to spend time in another country tells an employer that she or he is most likely open for challenges, prepared for curve balls and organized enough to have returned in one piece," she says.

The first curve ball students wishing to study abroad may encounter is affordability, but changes to the international and offcampus study policy and procedures are helping students overcome that obstacle.

Manning says the new policy, implemented for the 2001-2002 school year, is of particular benefit to students who receive significant financial aid to attend Susquehanna. "Whatever they pay to attend SU is what they will pay for study abroad," Manning said. Those studying through universityapproved programs also remain eligible for all forms of financial aid and scholarships, except student employment.

While the new policy is helping make international study more affordable, it is more costly than staying on campus. "The total cost of studying abroad is more expensive," Manning says, "but only by the amount of the airfare and the amount of money a student spends while abroad."

And according to Manning, the benefits of international study cannot be measured by a monetary value. "I think the true benefits of the program are related to developing a greater sense of independence, self-rehance and self-confidence, as well as really getting to know another culture. Even though most of these students could travel abroad later in hife, almost none of them will ever have a better opportunity to spend more than one or two weeks in another country." Manning said.

Dollhopf-Brown expressed similar sentiments about her time abroad. "I learned that I could survive independently, not knowing anyone, in a new country unlike the one I had known for 20 years," she says.

"My education at Susquehanna was wonderful," Dollhopf-Brown adds, but to experience some things, "you just have to take a flying leap and see how far you can go. You might just land in northern China, looking out from the Great Wall."

Emergency Preparedness Off Campus and On: Safety/Security are Top Priority

The safety of students studying abroad has always been of paramount importance to Susquehanna University. University-approved programs are chosen, in part, for their adherence to high standards for both the safety and security of students and emergency contingency plans. As a result of the strong contingency plans they already had in place, none of the university-approved study abroad programs has implemented notable changes to their travel plans and procedures.

Among the hundreds of choices available to Susquehanna students wishing to study abroad, **Scott Manning**, coordinator of international study programs and assistant professor of French and Italian, says he's heard of only one program in Jordan that was cancelled last fall. However, since Jordan typically is not a destination of choice for Susquehanna students, that change has been of little consequence to the university.

Despite this, Manning recently took precautionary action, recommending students enroll in courses at Susquehanna even though they intend to be abroad. "But," he says, "this is a good recommendation at any time since it is harder for students to enroll in August and get the classes they want than it is in March."

In late April, the university announced cancellation of a Susquehanna-sponsored trip to China in light of travel advisories issued by the U.S. State Department, the national Centers for Disease Control (CDC), and the World Health Organization (WHO) on the outbreak of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS). A contingent of facility, administrators and students had been scheduled to depart on May 14 for China as part of an ongoing effort to develop academic exchange programs with Shanghai University. Although daily life in Great Britain remained relatively normal this spring, the Sigmund Weis School of Business London program, the only study abroad program run directly through Susquehanna University, did adjust its existing emergency procedures to conform more closely to current international upheaval.

"I think we're about as prepared as we can be," said **James Brock**, dean of the Weis School, who spent the spring semester as faculty member in residence overseeing the program. "We're keeping a low profile, not overtly identifying ourselves as Americans and being particularly vigilant when we're somewhere other Americans are likely to be such as tourist areas and clubs frequented by Americans," Brock said via e-mail a week after Operation Iraqi Freedom began.

"In the event of some kind of crisis in London, students are instructed not to use the Tube and to get themselves to my flat, which is about 150 meters from the student flats," Brock said. "If it becomes necessary, I'm prepared to bus the students to a relatively low-risk airport and fly them back to the U.S. at a moment's notice."

Students traveling away from the flats overnight are required to file a detailed travel itinerary with the faculty chaperone, including flight or train numbers, the name and telephone number where they will be staying and a copy of the U.S. State Department's travel advisory for the countries they will visit. Similarly, students studying abroad under other programs are strongly encouraged to have routine contact with their parents, advising them of their travel plans.

Current events in the world have also prompted the university to recommend that all students, regardless of whether they are traveling abroad or not, talk with their families about establishing an emergency communication plan. It is further recommended that two or more family members in separate locations be designated as points of contact for providing information to other family members as the need arises.

"The safety and security of the Susquehanna community are of highest priority," said **Richard Woods**, director of pubhc safety and head of the university's emergency management team. Trained to act quickly and appropriately in times of crisis, the team works in conjunction with local, state, and federal authorities to ensure safety for everyone living and working on campus, as well as those visiting the university.

The team works in accordance with the university's emergency management plan, which provides contingencies for various levels of man-made and natural disasters. Procedures on how to react in emergency situations are distributed campus-wide and posted on the university's new emergency preparedness website (www.susqu.edu/preparedness).

In addition, a communication plan is in place to provide parents and other off-campus members of the Susquehanna community with updates should a crisis situation arise. In the event of a catastrophe, emergency information and evacuation instructions would be communicated to the campus community via voice mail, e-mail, the university website, and student hfe staff in the residence halls. The website and Susquehanna's information line (570–372-ATSU) would also be updated periodically to keep parents and others informed during the course of an emergency. from page 13

Balancing Career, Family and Service

udging from his impressive record of service to Susquehanna, one would never guess that **Douglas B. Carlson '88** almost bypassed the school – literally – when choosing a university.

Carlson, whose dedication to Susquehanna has earned him one of two Young Alumni awards to be presented at Alumni Weekend this year, says he was touring several schools in Central Pennsylvania when his mother urged him to stop by SU, which was situated between two other universities he was considering.

Lara K. Primak **'90** M.D.



The Sky's the Limit

s a student and a doctor, Lara K. Primak '90, has trusted her instincts to guide her when the course has been unclear.

Thus far, her intuition has been right on target. In fact, her achievements as a young physician recently earned Primak one of two Young Alumni awards to be presented at the university's upcoming 2003 Alumni Weekend. Primak has three siblings who have also made Susquehanna their college choice: sister **Natalie** '91, brother, **Matt** '01, and younger bother **Luke** '03, who will graduate this May.

Primak, who is currently conducting research in pediatric critical care, says she now realizes that a small liberal arts school is not necessarily the natural starting point for a would-be doctor.

As the first person in her family to pursue an M.D., Primak says she chose SU for its size and proximity to her Mifflintown, Pa., home. Today, she feels her SU experience, while not a traditional pre-med program, set the stage for her successful career in medicine. "I think having a liberal arts education has so many benefits on several levels," says Primak, an SU Honors scholar. "I definitely believe it was the right school for me."

Along with giving her a background in laboratory research, Primak says the SU Honors Program's emphasis on writing has proven beneficial. "I had a lot of exposure to writing and thinking critically," says Primak, who was published in the March 2001 edition of the medical journal *Respiratory Care Clinics of North America* "Being able to write is very important to my line of work."

After graduation from SU, Primak earned her doctorate in medicine from the University of Rochester. She completed her residency at the Milton S. Hershey Medical Center, Hershey, Pa., where she stayed on an extra year to serve as chief resident of pediatrics. In 2001, she earned a "New Investigator" award from the American Academy of Pediatrics, in recognition of her research efforts.

Primak's current research project, undertaken during her four-year pediatric intensive/critical care fellowship at Rambow Babies and Children's Hospital at Case Western University in Cleveland, Ohio, involves testing a medication to determine whether its use can improve heart function after cardiac bypass.

"Just seeing a child get through a life-threatening illness and realizing I had a part in it is really a moment of great pride - and humility," Primak says. "I love kids. It's that simple."

Primak adds that she is close to completing her research fellowship and considering which of many available options to pursue. "I'm trying to feel my way," she says, explaining that she would like to be involved with international child advocacy.

She notes that one of her most rewarding experiences as a doctor was a trip to Ecuador, where she worked in an intensive care unit. "That was one of the most uplifting experiences for me," she says, "It put me in touch with why I went into medicine."

She adds, "Finishing up my research fellowship is giving me a nice opportunity to explore other interests I have. The sky's the limit."

Members register credit cards, debit cards, grocery cards, other affinity cards and telephone number on their accounts. Upromise tracks all purchases made from contributing companies and accumulates the rebates in the member's Upromise account. Funds are automatically transferred to the borrower's AES account on a quarterly basis provided there is at least \$50 in the member's Upromise account for the initial transfer and a \$25 account balance for subsequent transfers.

By augmenting their regular payments with Upromise savings, AES borrowers may be able to pay off their student loans months earlier. For example, if a borrower took nut a \$10,000 college loan at 7% over 10 years, his/her monthly payments would be about \$116. If he/she earns only \$10 each month in Upromise savings, he/she could pay off the loan 13 months earlier. This could also save him an additional \$470 in interest payments.

A week after Operation Iraqi Freedom began, Sigmund Weis School Dean James Brock, who oversaw the London program for the spring semester, remained committed to making the experience as fulfilling as possible for the students.

"We have no intentions to evacuate the students or bring our program to a premature end unless U.S. citizens specifically are told by the U.S. State Department to evacuate, or unless I judge the risk of remaining here to have reached an unacceptable level," Brock said

One peek at Brock's "dean's diary" from the London program, and it's clear why he and the students were so intent on staying in London as long as possible. Here are some excerpts he shared.



DEAN'S DIARY London Experience is 24/7 for Business School

By James Brock, dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Business

Thursday, March 13, 2003

"Today was very long, but full. The coach picked us all up at the student flats at 9 a.m., and we headed directly for Oxford, mother of all college towns. There are 39 colleges that make up Oxford University, and some were founded 800 years ago.

Several of the students joined my wife, Elame, and me at the Ashmolean Museum – the United Kingdom's oldest – for an hour, where we saw works by many of the masters, including Gamsborough. Sergeant, Turner, and Picasso. Then we headed to see the chapel at Christ Church College, which dates from the year 1200.

We met back at the bus at 1 p.m. Everyone had been shopping: Oxford sweatshirts, mostly, but one student found an old cricket bat at an open-air market.

Then it was an hour ride to Warwick Castle where we scrambled on the parapets, cringed at the dungeon, marveled in the Great Hall and saw sections that date from 1068, just two years after the Battle of Hastings!

We were back on the bus at 4 p.m. for a short ride to Stratford Upon Avon. We walked around, saw Shakespeare's birthplace, grabbed a bite to eat, and attended the Royal Shakespeare Company's opening night of *As You Like It*. The bus ride back to London took two hours, and we all had work yet to do for Friday, so I don't think anybody got to bed before 2 a.m."

Friday, March 14, 2003

"Today's class met at the headquarters of ARAMARK UK, on the 28th floor of Millbank Tower, right on the Thames River. Everybody was dressed up and it was a rare sunny day, so we got some group pictures hefore heading up. We enjoyed a 90-minute presentation/discussion with the chief executive officer, Bill Toner, a 40-minute talk from their chief financial officer, David Gerrard, and then had lunch with Bill, David, and several others from the senior management team.

As is the case with many of our field trips and other opportunities here, it was a Susquehanna graduate, **Jim Summers '63**, recently retired chief financial officer of ARAMARK's worldwide operations, who made the connection and, indeed, who made the experience possible. Ordinarily, 20 business students from central Pennsylvania just don't get to spend half a day with the top management of a multi-billion dollar company."



Saturday, March 15, 2003

"We started this day as we do all Saturdays when we're in town, with a quick Tube ride to Portobello Market, where 2,000 antique dealers display everything imaginable. It's a "gentle throng" of thousands of people, and a place where twice we've literally bumped into friends from the states. We were home by noon and had appointments through the afternoon with students scheduling their classes for next year."

Sunday, March 16, 2003

"Church this morning was in honor of St Patrick, and the frish ambassador to the United Kingdom was in attendance. A lot of people wore green. Tomorrow night is a St. Patrick's Day cruise on the Thames River with all the students. We met with more students this afternoon to schedule their courses for next year. Since my apartment is only two blocks from the students, we just turned the dning room table into an office and they trot over for their appointments. I just realized, to my horror, that we return to the U.S. in just seven weeks! There is so much to see and do yet, and so little time remaining"

Samuelson comes to Susquehanna after serving as assistant director of athletics at the University of Massachusetts-Boston since 1998.

"We are delighted to have Pam as a member of the Susquehanna family," said Lemons, "Her extensive experience in a Division III environment and demonstrated commitment to academic and athletic success will be valuable

New Class Brings Academic Strength and Diversity

Total enrollment at Susquehanna for the 2003-2004 academic year is projected at 1,880, breaking last year's total of 1,865 and continuing a nine-year trend of trumping the previous year's numbers. Of the estimated 1,880 stndents who will attend the university this year, about 500 will be incoming freshmen and 30 will be transfer students.

"This was a challenging year for our country. But despite economic instability and a volatile world situation, it's great to see Susquehanna moving forward," said **Chris Markle '84**, director of admissions. "The Class of 2007 is one of the strongest and most diverse classes in Susquehanna's history. A record 29 mcoming freshmen were high school valedictorians or salutatorians," he said

Nearly 90 percent of the incoming freshmen were in the top two-thirds of their high school classes, and 10 percent – another benchmark for Susquehanna – describe themselves as part of an ethnic minority group.

"A diverse campus will produce diverse student learning, At Susquehanna, we look for ways to learn from one another and to acknowledge and appreciate our differences," Markle said. "The fact that we embrace diversity opens doors for many of our students to experience cultures they otherwise would not," he said.

Markle attributes SU's success to the cooperation the admissions office received from faculty, staff, the financial aid office, alumni, and current students and their parents. In particular, the Alumni-Parent Admissions Network has been a great asset in meeting admissions goals. (See page 21.)

"So many of our friends are spreading the word about Susquehanna. That really has been a key factor," Markle said.

In addition to the continued support of SU's friends, another important tool in achieving admissions goals for the 2004-2005 academic year will be the new virtual tour, soon to be launched on the university's website. To experience the virtual tour, go to www.susqu.edu/tour. resources for the entire campus community."

At the University of Massachusetts-Boston, Samuelson has been involved in all aspects of the Beacons' 18-sport program, in addition to sports medicine and sports information programs, academic advising for athletes, the Student-Athlete Advisory Board, and the strength and conditioning program.

"Don Harnum has done an outstanding job of building upon the rich and successful tradition of SU athletics," said Samuelson. "I look forward to the challenge of working with the university community to continue to further enhance the athletic experience of our student-athletes, as well as the recreational opportunities for all students on campus."

Prior to 1998, Samuelson served for three years as director of athletics at Curry College in Milton, Mass., where she oversaw all aspects of the Colonels' 12-sport, Division III program. At Beloit College in Wisconsin, she contributed in a number of ways to the success of its Division III program over a 10-year period. She was coordinator of women's athletics, coordinator of athletic recruiting, director of the sports center and director of intramural sports. As head coach of both volleyball and softhall, she directed those teams to conference championships. She also served as assistant track coach at Beloit.

Samuelson graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan University in 1981 with a bachelor of science degree in business administration and physical education. She earned her master's degree in physical education administration from Chadron State College, Nebraska, and expects to conclude work toward her Ph.D. in higher education administration from Boston College in December.

She is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics as well as the NCAA Woman of the Year Committee and was recently involved with the NewFund Sports Advisory Committee. Samuelson is a member of both the Nebraska Wesleyan University and Lincoln Northeast High School Halls of Fame.



Sassafras Street Athletic Fields

Construction began this summer on a new athletic field complex to be located across the street from the university's Sassafras Housing units. The project will include a softball field, a synthetic surface multipurpose field equipped with lights, and a grass surface multipurpose practice field. The new fields are expected to be ready for use in the 2004-05 academic year.

Eclectic Fall Cultural Schedule Complements Learning Environment

The talents and perspectives of faculty and student performers and writers, alumni musicians, and visiting artists, writers, and scholars unite to create a fall semester rich with cultural programming for the campus and surrounding community.

Chosen to complement Susquehanna's interdisciplinary learning environment, more than three dozen events include a Diversity Symposium, Artist Series concerts, lectures on topics including the Cold War and rap music, and celebration of Dewah, the Hindu Festival of Lights.

On Sept 7, just one week after the start of classes, a trombone concert will kick off the faculty recitals and readings scheduled for the season. Then, on Sept.13, the Lore Degenstein Gallery will open its early fall exhibition, "Rohert Henri and His Influence," which will be on display through Oct. 26.

A program titled "Understanding Muslim-West Alienation: Building a Better Future," presented by author and scholar Arshad Khan and sponsored by the Office of Multicultural Affairs, will be held on September 9. On Sept. 11, the Department of History will sponsor a lecture by Villanova University historian Paul Steege titled "Let Them Come to Berlin: Everyday Life and the Making of the Cold War." The Arlin M. Adams Center for Law and Society will host a taping of National Public Radio's Justice Talking program on Sept. 15, and the first Artist Series event of the year, a concert by the Kronos Quartet, will be held on Sept. 18. The month will close with an alumin recital by flutist Nan Raphael '77 on Sept. 30, preceded by a poetry reading by Ellen Voigt, the first guest of the 2003-2004 Visiting Writers Series, on Sept. 29

More guest artists are slated for appearances in October, including an Oct-2 Artist Series concert by The Alin Trio, an internationally acclaimed chamber ensemble uniquely formed by three sisters from South Korea. The Visiting Writers Series will host readings by nonfiction writer Scott Thybony on Oct. 8 and fiction writer/poet Ana Castillo on Oct. 22. The annual trombone-a-thon, Fall Festival O'Bones, will be held on Oct. 5, and the theatre department's annual musical will be held Oct. 24-26. This year's performance will be On the Tourn, the story of three sailors on a 24-hour pass from the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

Lectures in October will include a cultural program, "Droppin' Science: A Critical Exploration of Rap Music & Hip Hop," on Oct 15, and a discussion on Oct. 29 by Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow Marcia Grant, whose achievements include establishing the first women's college in Saudi Arabia. In addition, an afternoon symposium on Oct. 4, accompanied by an evening recital of rarely performed pieces, will explore the *Hollynwood Songbook*, a collaborative work by composer Hanns Eisler and poet Bertolt Brecht describing the two German Jews exile during the reign of the Third Reich.

Events in November include a Nov. 8 Dewah Festival, recognizing the Hindu "Fall Festival of Lights," and a Nov. 23 guest saxophone and organ recital by Frederick Henike and Douglas Cleveland from Northwestern University. Other highlights of the semester include the Nov. I opening of a 10-year retrospective of the work of Florence Putterman, a Diversity Symposium on Nov. 7, a performance of Shakespeare's *Othello* by the Aquila Theatre Co. on Nov 17, and the Nov. 10 maugural lecture of The Schmidt Lectureship, established by **Edward Schmidt '69** and featuring ethicist Jeffrey Van Duzer.

Faculty Awards Honor Dion, Hill

Associate Professor of Management Paul Dion was awarded the John C. Horn Distinguished Service Lectureship and Assistant Professor of Sociology Simona Hill received the Susquehanna University Teaching Award during commencement exercises on Sunday, May 11.

These awards are determined by open nommations from the faculty and, in the case of the teaching award, also from the Student Government Association. Nominations are reviewed by the Faculty Personnel Committee, which then submits award recommendations to President L. Jay Lemons for confirmation.

Memorializing Dr. John C. Horn, a former long-time member and chairperson of Susquehanna's board of directors, the Horn lectureship recognizes a faculty member for outstanding scholarship and conscientious service to the university. The recipient, in turn, offers a public lecture during the following academic year.

A native of Canada, Dion joined the Susquehanna faculty in 1992. He earned his Ph.D. from the University of Toronto and teaches marketing and marketing research. He frequently publishes research on industrial marketing, purchasing, and marketing logistics.

He has developed a national reputation for his work in the areas of industrial market sales and purchasing performance, marketing logistics, and industrial buyer behavior, publishing articles throughout his career in the top journals in these fields. He has participated on and chaired departmental and school committees, served a term as chair of the management department, directed the Sigmund Weis School of Business London program for two terms, and pioneered the use of information technology by designing web-based instructional tools for his classes and designing an online marketing course for Susquehanna's summer session.

Hill holds the Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania and joined the Susquehanna University faculty in 1998. She teaches courses in social problems, minorities, family and ethnicity. She also supports the women's studies and diversity programs at Susquehanna. Her research interests are in the areas of ethnographic field research, feminist pedagogy, race, gender and ethnicity. She is co-director, with Associate Professor of English Karen Mura, of the Susquehanna University Honors Program. In 2002-03 she served as co-coordinator, with Assistant Professor of English Amy Winans, of the university's diversity initiative project.

"In both her scholarship and in her work with students, [Hill] has sought consistently to demonstrate not only to her students, but also to her faculty and administrative colleagues, the relationship between wanting to know and the obligation to take action that may well follow from what one comes to learn," said **Warren Funk**, vice president for academic affairs, who presented the faculty awards.

Zimmerman Appointed Head Field Hockey Coach

Former Crusader standout **Amy Zimmerman '98** has been appointed head field hockey and assistant women's lacrosse coach following a two-year stint as head coach of field hockey and women's lacrosse at Fairleigh Dickinson University's College at Florham

She succeeds longtime Crusader coach **Connie Harnani**, who retired in December after compiling a 195-159-23 record in 27 seasons. Zimmerman will assist second-year head coach **Kate Scattergood** with the women's lacrosse program.

A four-year letterwinner in lacrosse and field hockey and Outstanding Semior Women's Scholar-Athlete, Zimmerman was a two-time second-team All-Commonwealth Conference selection in field hockey and finished her career with a 1/29 goals against average. In lacrosse, she led the Crusaders to their first winning season in 1998 with a 9-7 record, finishing second in the Middle Atlantic Conference with a 9.19 goals against average.

After earning a degree in elementary education, Zimmerman served as an assistant field hockey coach at The University of Scranton before moving to EDU in 1999.

The Susquehanna Sports Hall of Fame will increase to 159 athletes on Saturday, September 20, as five new members are inducted during the Homecoming football game against Moravian.

The five are Gerry Drabina '70 (football), Scott Gabel '84 (basketball), Jodi Henry '91 (volleyball), Andy Watkins '93 (football/wrestling) and Kristie Maravalli '93 (basketball/track and field).

Drabina was a four-year letterwinner on defense for the football squad and led the team with 95 total tackles (58 solo) as a semior en route to earning Little All-America honors. A three-time ECAC Division III All-Star, he was named to the All-State team following his semior year.

Gabel earned four letters as a forward on the men's basketball team and finished as the sixth-leading scorer in program history with 1,414 points. A two-time MAC North Division first-team All-Star, he helped the team to three MAC playoff berths and the 1984 NCAA Division III playoffs.

Henry, a four-year letterwinner and outside hitter for the volleyball team, received the Outstanding Female Scholar-Athlete Award in 1991 after helping the team to a then-school record 23 victories in 1990. She led the team with 243 digs as a senior while tallying 144 kills and 39 aces en route to earning MAC Northwest Section All-Star honors.

Watkins is a four-year letterwinner in both football and wrestling. He won the Blair Heaton Award in 1993 after earning All-American honors in both sports. An MAC Player of the Year in 1992, he led the football team in tackles three times for a career record of 289 stops and 5 1/2 sacks. In wrestling, he finished third in the nation in 1991 and eighth in 1992 at 190 pounds. A three-time MAC champion, he has a career record of 81-16-1

A four-year letterwinner in both basketball and track and field, Maravalli received the Outstanding Female Scholar-Athlete Award in 1993. She helped the hoops team to three straight MAC Northwest League titles and trips to the NCAA Division III playoffs She is fifth on the school's career scoring list with 1,439 points and is the all-time leader with 293 steals. She set a pair of then-school records in track and field, running 1:02.7 in the 400 meters as a jumor and joining the 4x100 relay team with a time of 51 64 seconds.



A Song in his Heart

n 1976, the year he became president of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, the Reverend **Herman Stuempfle Jr. '45** read a hymn on the back of a bulletin and thought of writing one himself. At the age of 53, he thought it might be a nice creative digression from the administrative responsibilities that come along with being president of a seminary.

While Stuempfle enjoyed the personal satisfaction of writing the hymns, he understood that was only part of the process. "Everyone who writes hymns knows they are stillborn in your notebook. After hearing them performed at a local church and seminary, I sent them to a friend/editor who thought I actually had something worth singing." By the end of the year, Stuempfle will have published more than 550 "somethings." in four volumes of hymns issued by the Roman Gregorian Institute of America.

Stuempfle's love of hymns began much earlier than 1976. Growing up in a parsonage in north central Pennsylvania, he was surrounded and deeply influenced by a broad spectrum of hymnody. "The classic hymns of Sunday morning worship as well as the Gospel songs of Sunday school both had a place in the development of my faith."

Stuemple places his first thoughts of going into the ministry during his high school years. After graduating SU he earned a B.D. from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, an S.T.M. from Union (N.Y.) Theological Seminary and a Th.D. from the Southern California School of Theology at Claremont. He has been a pastor of Lutheran churches in Pennsylvania and Maryland and joined the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg in 1962 as a professor of preaching and remained there until retiring as president in 1989.

He is a widely published author and scholar in addition to his hymn writing. He received an honorary Doctor of Divinity from Susquehanna in 1972 and the alumni association award for achievement in 1982. He and his wife, the former Gretchen Parkinson, have three children.

Most often after writing his text Stuempfle finds an existing tune for it, however he is sometimes sent a piece of music and asked for lyrics. Composer Sally Ann Morris sent him a tune for which he wrote Easter text. "Earth Earth Awake" is one of Stuempfle's most frequently sung hymns and remains one of his favorites. "When Foundations Sure are Shaken" was written in the aftermath of September 11th. While being a reflection of that tragedy in particular, Stuempfle hopes the hymn transcends those events and remains a source of hope for times to come.

Robert Swope Jr. '71



Tall Dogs and Hellcats

obert Swope, Jr. '71 has exercised a passion for history since his boyhood days collecting Indian artifacts in Turbotville, Pa. His career has included time as a teacher and park ranger and more recently as a writer, publisher, and photographer. Along the way he has also become an avid collector of military insignia and memorabilia including a WWII Navy fire truck.

But little did he realize his purchase of some original but unidentified WWII photographs from a fellow antique dealer in 1991 would be the first step in a 10-year odyssey to find the history behind the photographs, the combat photographer, and the Navy's highly decorated Air Group Two.

Although the trail ran cold early on and Swope actually traded the photos for some Navy patches, fate intervened in the spring of 1992 when Swope bought the contents of a delinquent storage unit at auction.

"The method of auction was we open the door, you look in, bid," explains Swope, who had no idea that the unit would include duplicate copies of the photos he had traded away.

Research uncovered the photos as the work of Navy photographer Ted Riddle who flew with Air Group Two aboard the aircraft carrier USS Hornet in the Pacific War in 1944. Swope traveled to USS Hornet reunions throughout the eastern U.S to interview Navy veterans, and gathered personal accounts, diaries, and Navy histories to incover the background of each photograph.

In 2002, he published the fruits of his labors in *Tall Degs and Hellcats, A Navy Photographer's Pacific War.* The book includes more than 300 previously unpublished photographs, says Swope, who is most proud about being able to "ensure preservation of the photos and their history for future generations."

Swope and his wife, **Linda Degrassi '74 Swope**, live in New Hope, Va., in the Shenandoah Valley. Swope is currently working on a series of books on early photo postcards of central Pennsylvania 1907-1930. Many of the card photos were taken by his great uncle, the late Rev. **James Bannen Swope '09**, who used the income from his photography business to finance his education at Susquehanna and later the Lintheran Seminary at Gettysburg.

WITHIN AN HOUR, BURCHELL IS BOARDING A TRAIN FOR THE ONE-HOUR COMMUTE FROM HIS HOME IN ALLENDALE, N.J., TO New York City's trading district and Midwood Securities Inc., the Wall Street firm led by **Terry March '67**, Newly-appointed chairman of Susquehanna's board of directors. These days, Burchell says, he likes to have a good hour of quality research time before client wires start lighting up. The big question on everyone's mind. What will happen once trading begins?

"By 8/30 a.m., things start getting busy By 9:30 a.m., it's chaotic," he says By hunchtime, things slow down a bit until about 1:30 p.m.

"Generally, I'll have enough time to throw a cheeseburger down my neck sometime between those hours. A trading desk teaches you to do things very efficiently and eating is not left out," Burchell says.

The work gets progressively crazier as the afternoon rolls on, and as Burchell puts it, "the end of the world occurs right at 4(00)00 p m."Then the after-hours trading begins.


Once all the trades have been handed over for processing, the workday moves off the desks into informal networking in the city's restaurants and hars. "I'm back in bed by 2 a m or 3 a.m, and before you know it, it's time to do it all over again," Burchell says.

my interest in my major and prepared me for my current job as a business analyst with American Management Systems."

"I am really happy with the internship so far," said Matthew Rose '05, a political science major who interned with the New Jersey Turnpike Authority earlier this summer. "It has given me a chance to learn a lot about the work that the lawyers do on a daily basis, and it has shown me how an organization like the Turnpike Authority interacts with the government," he said.

"For many of them (students), it confirms that they want the career they are interested in and energizes them incredibly," says **Margaret Peeler**, associate professor of biology and faculty intern advisor for students interested in health care careers. "Occasionally, but just as importantly, the opposite happens. A student is able to find out that a career is not well-suited for them."

Daniel Ressler, assistant professor and head of the Department of Geological and Environmental Sciences, agrees. "Some students come back with, 'I learned a lot but I don't want to work in that industry,' and that is an important realization that I cannot convey or emulate in my classes," he says.

Beating the Experience Quandary

"Employers have always looked for experience in candidates. That old story of: They won't hire me because I don't have experience, but how do I get experience if they don't hire me' is addressed by internships," says **Michael Rheiner**, director of the university's Center for Career Services.

Susquehanna offers both credit and non-credit internships under the direction of the career center. Working with a faculty intern advisor, students develop learning contracts that outline the goals of their internship. After completing the internship, their employers meet with the intern advisors and evaluate their work.

And for the motivated student, there is no limit to the internship possibilities. Recent opportunities have included work at the Merck Corp., the Baltmore Aquarium, well-known business names like Morgan Stanley. Merrill Lynch and Oppenheimer, the U.S. attorney's office, the Pennsylvania Court of Common Pleas and news agencies such as CNN, NBC and ABC News.

Students can also opt for a combination of classroom learning and intern-

ship experience through such programs as American University's Washington Semester, the Lutheran College Consortium Washington Semester, and The Philadelphia Center. Beginning this year, Susquehanna will also offer a Boston Semester program through Simmons College.

A School of Business Hallmark

Experiential learning is a hallmark of the Signund Weis School of Business, where internships are considered so important the school has its own internship program – one that has become widely popular among business students.

"The SWSB Internship Program had its best year ever in 2002-2003 with 132 students serving on internships. Over 90 percent of the students who applied actually received internships. This we attribute to the ongoing efforts to increase our sponsor/employer base, and new instructional material to aid students in obtaining internships on their own," said **Ronald Keefer**, director of the business internship program.

Keefer also credits the program's success to the close relationship the school has with its alumni. About one-third of the internships performed last year were obtained from this source, he says.

"Alumni input not only facilitates the placement of students with highly motivated sponsors, but our alums have also provided valuable input to the design and continued development of this important program," Keefer says.

Benefits to Businesses

From a business perspective – as well as a higher education perspective – supporting college internship programs holds many benefits. **Mary Coughlin** '82, principal advisor for Barnegat Bay Investment Advisors in Kenilworth, Ill., says everyone wins when alumni support student interns from their alma mater. "Alumni employers get new ideas from young, erudite students. Students get exposure to interesting industries and firms. And universities get alumni, students and parents who are delighted to have connected with one another," she says.

Edward Barben '78, vice president of private banking at M&T Bank in Harrisburg, Pa., says participation in internship programs also gives employers a good potential employee pool. "You're getting up-to-date technology experience coming into the workforce," he says.

Alumni and ACT Play Key Roles

The Office of Alumni Relations is working to enhance alumni-sponsored internship opportunities and further prepare students for the workforce through an Alumni Career Team (ACT) program. Established in 2000, ACT currently includes approximately 500 alumni who have volunteered to provide support, career advice and contacts for students.

"Career team alumm are dedicating time to offer valuable insight into a career or industry, are able to help with connections to other alumni or colleagues, and are sometimes able to assist with actual job or internship opportunities," says **Shari Trembulak '93 Mangels**, director of the Office of Alumni Relations.

And with the launch of the Online Alumni Community in September 2002, ACT has become an even more dynamic research tool for students and alumni alike. "I have seen many connections made between students and alumni, and as one alumnus has told me, he was thrilled to be able to help a young person as they begin their career path," Mangels says.

On Feb. 7, 2004, the university will further strengthen ties between alumm and current students by holding a career day. The daylong session is being planned, sponsored and taught by alumni, with the Office of Alumni Relations and Center for Career Services providing logistical support, says Mangels. Alumni presenters will cover such topics as interview techniques. internship advice, resume writing, and job search strategies, and the day will conclude with a networking fair. (See page 11 for more information and to find out how alumni can participate.)

Success Across the Schools

Organizers view the event as one more way to support and enhance the opportunities that have resulted in countless internship success stories throughout the university.

"Students report back what a tremendous experience they've had," says **Larry Augustine**, professor and head of the Department of Communications and Theatre Arts, "Some say it was a real eye-opener as to what goes on professionally in these organizations and companies. Others say they feel they have now networked and have contacts they otherwise would never have had."

Michele DeMary, assistant professor of political science and director of the innversity's Arlin M. Adams Center for Law and Society, says the students she supervises return from their internships with two primary reactions, "The first is what we'd expect. They develop a new understanding of the field of work in which they've just participated. Secondly, I think students generally enjov leaving the traditional academic setting and entering the 'real world'. This is in part because it allows them to see what they've studied in actual practice, but it's also because it gives them the opportunity to be treated as an adult and not a student – something they enjoy," DeMary says.

The internship experiences of current Susquehanna students echo these sentiments. **Christina Graber '04**, an environmental science major who is interning with the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection this summer, is doing everything from GIS mapping to stream assessments. "I'm not just doing the same thing over and over, so I think I am getting a good experience," she says.

"While I am using things I have learned in the classroom, I am also learning many new things," says **Phillip Sander '04**, an accounting major who interned this summer in New York City with Kaufmann, Gallucci and Grunner LLP. "I have been given actual client work and been able to apply my course knowledge to real situations. This is the most valuable learning area because you are not able to do this in a classroom."

Marie Burns '92 DeBello



Science and Motherhood Do Mix

en years ago, if anyone would have told **Marie Burns '92 DeBello** that she would be the lead scientist in a large research project and raising two children at the same time, she'd probably have birst into laughter. But today, that is exactly what she's doing.

Her research on retinal rod physiology has earned the support of the National Institutes of Health and the Alfred P. Sloan Research Fellowship. Now, with the support of the E. Matilda Ziegler Foundation for Blindness, Burns is expanding her research. She began studying how rod photoreceptors in the eyes convert light into neural signals while performing a postdoctoral fellowship at Stanford University. She left Stanford in 2000 to become an assistant professor in the Center for Neuroscience at the University of Cahfornia, Davis, and continued researching how rods, or nighttime receptors carrying no neural information about color, turn off their response to light. Now, she is also studying cone photoreceptors and the means by which these davtime receptors convey information about color.

Papers on the research have been published in the journals *Science, Nature*, and *Neuron*. In July, her work was also published in the *Journal of Neuroscience* – the primary journal for this field of study. "It's very exciting It's the first big paper from just my lab," Burns said.

Annd all her professional success, Burns married fellow scientist William DeBello and gave birth to their two children, 4-year-old Peter and 14-month-old Naonn. But what sounds like a dream life was not so perfect a year ago when she was spending countless hours in a hospital watching her infant daughter struggle to overcome a serious heart problem. That's when Burns' juggling act turned into a tight wire walk, but fortunately, Naomi is successfully battling her health problems. "She's doing great," Burn said.

Burns says the four years she spent at Susquehanna prepared her for the hard work she faced over the last decade."I firmly believe that the individual attention 1 got there in science made all the difference in the world," she said. In particular, Burns looks up to Associate Professor of Biology **Margaret Peeler**. "Peggy Peeler was really an inspiration to me. During my college years, she was the only tenured woman scientist 1 knew with a family. Peggy showed me 1 could do it, and now 1 realize that with confidence, commitment and good training, it all can be possible," Burns said.





Many might think college students too young to be concerned about their own mortality and surrounding issues, but for the 18 students who took SU Chaplani Mark Wm. Radecke's "Issues at the End of Life" course this spring, death was a common topic of discussion. A collaborative multi-disciplinary service learning course, "Issues at the End of Life" was offered to Susquehanna students on a pilot basis through a collaborative effort with the Geisinger Health System's Palhative and Supportive Medicine Program.

Radecke says that before taking the course, about half of the class had experienced loss in their lives – one at a catastrophic level.

The Legacy of Flight 800

Kellie Kremser '06 was a seventh grader in the Montoursville (Pa.) Area School District in 1996 when TWA Thght 800 plunged into the Atlantic Ocean m a ball of flames just after takeoff. The doomed flight killed 21 Montoursville area residents, including several of her friends and schoolmates. "Even though it was quite a few years ago, it still affects many aspects of my hfe," Kremser says. "I guess that Elight 800 was one of my driving forces for taking the class because 1 had experienced such large-scale tragedy firsthand."

Some of the topics discussed in class opened the emotional wounds that scar Kreinser and her hometown community but, she says, the course was worth diedging up those memories "We learned that death is not a taboo subject that shouldn't be discussed," Kreinser suid

In fact, she said, death should be discussed long before a loved one is lost "We learned that you should let your loved ones know what you want done" so they don't have to have the stress of guessing about how to deal with that after a death, Kreinser said

Real-Life Issues

Radecke said the students who took the course "looked at the end processes of life in an allencompassing manner." Through presentations by Radecke and 14 different medical professionals from Geisinger, the students learned about everything nom organ procurement and donation issues to advanced directives, funeral practices, physician-assisted death, and virious religions' views on suffering, grieving, and afterlife.

The group discussed related topics as well "There were a number of things done in class to get away from this 'terminal state,' it you will." still Di-Neil M. Ellison, director of Geisinger's palliative care program. "We did things other than end of hfe issues – real-life issues as opposed to end-of-life issues – like breaking bad news, for example," and the art of caring conversation. Ethical issues in medicine, culture and religious

issues, Alzheimer's disease and dementia, mainstream attitudes toward serious illuess and death, and pain management were other topics discussed during the 28 sessions of the course

Creating A Personal Legacy

A field trip to a funeral home complemented classroom presentations. Students were also paired up with community members who are either of advanced age or within the dying process. The students' mission, to create a personal legacy for their newfound friends. Using scrapbooks, photo albums, written narratives, oral histories, songs, poems or other compilations, the students recorded the lite stories of these individuals in ways that are meaningful to each of them and which they will leave as a legacy for family, friends and those who come after them.

According to Radecke, these personal legacies are also a means for students to learn about the generations that have come before them "Too often our young people don't have the opportunity to talk to folks two or three generations older than they are," he said.

Reminders of Special Moments

Some students took the project to an even more personal level. **Emily Moniz '04** did the project with one of her grandparents. Using fabric from her grandparent's clothes, including everything from baby blankets to wedding attire, Monizmade a quilt to represent the personal legacy.

Similarly, Kreinser worked with family friend Jamee Follnier, a 67-year-old Montoursville resident battling terminal cancer. Using various photographs from Follmer's life and transferring the images onto fabric, Kreinser created a quilted wall hanging

The wall hanging is a keepsake reminding Follmer and her family and friends of special moments together. It also reminds Follmer of her heartfelt conversations with Kreinser on those lazy Saturday afternoons in early spring. But Kreinser also walked away with something from those incerings, namely inspiration. "She is such a strong woman. She's taught me that when you face any obstacle, don't give up," Kellie said.

And that is exactly the message Follmer conveys in her life. "I am not the least bit defeated by the thought that I have cancer. Mentally, I keep saying, 'I know I've got to die bit it's not going to be cancer that takes me," she says.

Eacing her illness with grace and unwavering faith, Follmer says, "God takes you to your knees so you learn to look up."

SU Names McMillin Chief Academic Officer



Professor of History Linda McMillin has been named provost and dean of the faculty at Susquehanna, filling the post of former Vice President of Academic Affairs and Professor of Philosophy Warren Funk, who is cur-

rently on sabbatical leave and plans to return to teaching duties in the fall of 2004.

The title of the chief academic officer's position has been changed to provost to be more in keeping with trends in the higher education community and particularly among peer schools, said University President **L. Jay Lemons**

McMillin had served as interim vice president for academic affairs since July 1, 2003. The appointment follows a national search, which brought four individuals to campus for interviews in December. The board approved McMillin's appointment at its winter meeting in February upon the recommendation of Lemons.

McMillin emerged from the search with strong support from the search committee and the campus community "We had an excellent pool of candidates for the provot position," Lemons said, "Linda McMillin is an outstanding person. She has made numerous contributions to Susquehanna, and her voice and influence in American higher education are highly respected. We are delighted that she is taking on these new duites and that she will continue to be part of the Susquehanna family," he added.

McMillin, who holds the B.A. from Loyola Marymount University and an M.A. and Ph.D. from The University of California, Los Angeles, joined the faculty in 1989 and was promoted to professor in 2002. She specializes in medieval history with focused research on religious women in the 12th and 13th centuries.

She has twice held the position of history

department head and has been active in the campus community and beyond. She recently served as a member of the advisory group responsible for the university's newly adopted strategic plan and as chair of the self-study team for the 2004 ten-year accreditation review by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. She also is a former director of the university's Honors Program.

Prior to joining the Susquehanna faculty, McMillin served as a teaching associate at the University of California at Los Angeles, the same institution for which she was an editor within the Center for Medieval and Renaissance Studies.

She has been honored with numerous awards and fellowships, including an American Council on Education Fellowship, National Endowment for the Humanities grants, and a Fulbright-Hays Fellowship/Spanish Government Grant.

Since 1994, she has managed the John Fannly Foundation.

The Alumni Association nominated both Carol Scherb '70 Ray of Parsippany, N.J., and Dennis Willman '65 of York, Pa. Ray holds a master of arts degree from William Paterson College. She is an eighth grade English teacher at the Parsippany Middle School and is active in the university's Alumni Career Team and the Alumni Parents Admission Network. In July 2000, she was elected to the Alumni Association board. She and her husband, **Bob '69**, co-chaired the North New Jersey Regional Campaign Committee during Susquehanna's most recent capital campaign.

Willman earned a B.S. degree in marketing. He is the charman of York Container Company and vice president of Mac Jones Ford, Inc. He has served on the Signund Weis School of Business Advisory Council since 1997 and has been a Weis Partner since 1993 He played significant leadership roles during Susquehanna's last capital campaign as co-chair of the Harrisburg Regional Campaign Committee.

The Rev **Robert L. Driesen** of Williamsport, Pa., and The Rev. **Earl L. Janssen Jr.** of Johnstown, Pa., were nonunated to the board by their respective synods of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Driesen holds the bachelor of science and master of education degrees from Towson University and graduated from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg. Prior to entering the seminary, he was a social studies department chairman in the Baltimore County Schools. Adams Lecture to Address Conflicts Between Liberty and Security

ulitzer Prize-winner and New York Times columnist Anthony Lewis and former U.S. Army Judge Advocate General Michael J. Nardotti Jr. will present a dialogue on "Liberty and Security?: Challenges in a New World Situation" at the third annual Arlin Adams Lecture set for Tuesday, March 16 at 8 p.m. in the Degenstein Center Theater.

Sponsored by The Arhn M Adams Center for Law and Society at Susquehanna University, the dialogue will explore the conflict between protecting individual liberties and ensuring the nation's security, particularly during times of international tension. The focus will include issues involving the detention of American and foreign citizens suspected of terrorist acts and the extent of government powers needed to avoid further acts of terrorism.

"This is a chance to focus on issues which are making their way to the United States Supreme Court, including the cases of U.S. government detainees Jose Padilla and Yaser Handi and the detention of non-Americans at Guantanamo Bay," explains Center Director and Assistant Professor of Political Science Michele DeMary "This topic is also consistent with our broader goal of encouraging a reasoned discussion on complex and multifaceted issues."

Gary S. Gildin, professor of law and director of the Miller Center for Public Interest Advocacy at Penn State Dickinson School of Law, will serve as returning moderator

Anthony Lewis

New York Times columnist Anthony Lewis has twice won the Pulitzer Prize for reporting He



is also the author of Gideon's Trumpet, based on a landmark Supreme Court case that secured the right of counsel for indigent defendants.

A former London bureau chief for the Times, Lewis currently writes an Abroad At

Home column for the Op-Ed page. He joined the Times in 1948 and won his first Pulitzer in 1955 for coverage of the case of a Naval

employee dismissed as a security risk. Following the series, the Navy reinstated the employee.

Lewis won his second Pulitzer in 1963 for coverage of the Supreme Court during the leadership of Chief Justice Earl Warren. He also covered the responses of the Federal Government to the civil rights movement.

A graduate of Harvard College and later a 1956-57 Nieman Fellow studying law at Harvard, Lewis was a lecturer on law at the Harvard Law School for 15 years. He currently holds the James Madison Visiting Professorship at Columbia University.

Michael J. Nardotti Jr.

A decorated combat veteran, retired Maj. Gen. Michael J. Nardotti Jr. is currently a partner specializing in government contracts for the law firm Patton Boggs LLP

Nardotti served more than 28 years on active duty, most recently as the judge advocate general from 1993 to 1997. He has counseled, negotiated, and advocated at all levels within the Army, the Department of Defense, the Department of Justice, and with members of Congress. He has advised senior officials on sensitive, complex, and highly visible legal and policy issues, including criminal and civil litigation and the investigative and senior official misconduct areas.

He was the senior military lawyer on a team of more than 4,000 attorneys responsible for providing legal services to more than one unllion active, guard, and reserve personnel stationed worldwide, plus their families.

A graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point, Nardotti earned the J.D. from Fordham University. He joined Patton Boggs in 1997.

The family of Sigfried and Janet Weis and The Degenstein Foundation of Sunbury, Pa., with support from the Annenberg Foundation, established the Arlin Adams Center in 2001 in honor of prominent Philadelphia jurist Arlin M. Adams whose distinguished legal career includes 17 years on the bench of the 3rd U.S.Circuit Court of Appeals.

Thank you for the article on financing a college education (spring 2002) and the role that Helen Nunn and her staff play in assisting each individual family to achieve their college dreams for their children.

Estarted at Susquehanna in the fall of 1987 following a traumatic series of events. During my senior year of high school my family learned that after [inflicting] years of emotional abuse my father had also lost all our money and our home. My mother had not worked in 27 years.

We moved to Columbus, Ohio, to live with my grandmother. It was an incredibly difficult and confusing time. We made the decision that I should continue with my plans to attend Susquehanna as a "normal" freshman. That summer we traveled to the university for the freshman summer testing day and met with Helen Nunn and explained our new situation. The information my father had originally submitted on the FAF had been inaccurate and did not even begin to correctly describe our new circumstances.

Both my mom and I remember very clearly sitting with Helen in the lobby of Degenstein Campus Center. She assured us that she would help us figure it out. My mother remembers well how Helen said that if anything became a problem, to just call her and she would find another way. There was something in the way she talked and acted. We knew she would live up to her word.

l remember how kind and respectful she was when we described what had happened to us – not condescending, no raised eyebrows, and no attempts to change the subject.

Of all the people we interacted with over the next few challenging years, Helen Nunn is one of those rare individuals who stood out – a person who did not pass judgment and someone who was extraordinarily kind and empathetic. All the way through college I never knew if I would be able to return to school the next semester. Never knew if we would have the money and grants to make it work. But I made it through thanks to Helen and her staff, graduating fourth in my class. Today I have a successful career in marketing and meetings management, and my own home. My mother also owns her own home.

When we talk about Susquehanna we always remember that day sitting in the lobby with Helen. I've written this letter and I hope it conveys our gratitude, but I also feel that there are not enough words to say how thankful we are

ANY ONE who is considering Susquehanna University and is concerned about financing their child's college education should know that they will have a strong and diligent ally in Helen Nunn and her staff.

He was also a finalist for the prestigious Gagliardi Trophy, which is presented to

the outstanding Division III football player.

An information systems major from Sunbury, Pa., Bartosic is a four-time first-team All-Middle Atlantic Conference selection who caught 78 passes for 1,313 yards and 13 touchdowns to lead the MAC in all three categories for the second straight season.

He became the first player in NCAA history at any level to achieve four consecutive 1,000-yard seasons, earning him recognition in such national media as *Sports Illustrated*, ESPN Radio, and the Associated Press. He is tied for second in Division III history with a catch in all 40 games of his career.

Bartosic ended his Crusader career with 275 catches for 4,733 yards and 55 touchdowns to rank second in Division III history in yards, tied for second in touchdowns and sixth in receptions. He also ranks fourth in all divisions in yards and tied for third in touchdown catches and is the MAC career leader in all three categories.

He was also selected as one of 42 NCAA Division III seniors to participate in the Aztec Bowl, which is sponsored by the AFCA and pits a Division III all-star team against the Mexican National Team. An injury forced him to withdraw from the contest prior to the game.

Matt Karchner Appointed Interim Baseball Coach

Former major league relief pitcher **Matt Karchner** has been appointed interim baseball coach for the 2004 season at Susquehanna. Karchner replaces **Tim Briggs**, who resigned recently after compiling a 56–92–1 record in five seasons with the Crusaders.

"We are incredibly fortunate to have someone with Matt's background join our staff. He brings a positive attitude and a unique knowledge of the game to the position," said Athletic Director **Pam Samuelson**. "We also appreciate the efforts of assistant coach **Denny Bowers**, who played a vital role in helping to maintain continuity during the transition period."

"I am excited about the opportunity to begin a new phase of my baseball career here at Susquehanna," said Karchner. "My goal is to maximize the potential of this team and contend for a spot in the conference playoffs."

Karchner, 36, pitched six seasons in the major leagues with the Chicago White Sox and Chicago Cubs from 1995 to 2000, compiling a record of 21-13 with 27 saves and a 4.21 earned run average in 223 relief appearances.

His best season came with the White Sox in 1997, when he went 3-1 with 15 saves and a 2.91 earned run average in 52 games. Karchner's final major league appearance came on June 14, 2000 as a member of the Cubs.

A native of Berwick, Karchner is a 1989 graduate of Bloomsburg University where he was a three-time first-team All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference selection. A third baseman and pitcher for the Huskies who still holds the school career records for home runs with 37 and runs batted in with 165, Karchner was inducted into the BU Athletic Hall of Fame in October, 2003.

Karchner was selected by the Kansas City Royals in the 8th round of the 1989 amateur draft, and played in the Royals' farm system through the 1993 season. In 1994, Karchner joined the White Sox organization and made his major league debut on July 18, 1995 against the New York Yankees.

Women's Soccer Pair Earns Mid-Atlantic Kudos

Jumors Lindsay Nevins '05 and Jess Paulshock '05 have been named to the 2003 National Soccer Coaches Association of America Adidas Division III All Mid-Atlantic Women's Soccer Team by the region's head coaches.

Nevins, a forward, and Paulshock, a midfielder, were third-team selections to become the second and third players in program history to earn All-Region honors, joining **Kim Anderson '02**, a 2000 third-team selection.

They helped the Crusaders set school single-season records for victories with 11 and goals with 52 and earn SU its second straight berth in the Commonwealth Conference playoffs under fifth-year head coach **Jim** Findlay.

Nevins, a public relations major from Basking Ridge, N.J., has been named first-team All-Commonwealth Conference in each of the last two seasons and was a second-team pick as a freshman. She finished the season ranked fifth in the conference with nine goals and sixth with 22 points, both career highs.

A writing major from Pottsville, Pa., Pailshock earned first-team All-Conference honors for the first time after setting school single-season records with 15 goals and 34 points to lead the conference in both categories.

SU Cross Country Gains Second All-American

Senior **Ryan Gleason '04** became Susquehanna's second All-American in cross country when he finished 19th overall at the NCAA Division III championships on November 22 at Hanover (Indiana) College with a time of 25:36.9

By finishing in the top 35, Gleason joined **Greg Pealer '85** (11th in 1983) as the only All-Americans in program history.

Gleason trimmed 19 seconds off his second-place time at the NCAA Mideast Regionals time as he finished 1:02 behind race-winner jumor Josh Moen of Wartburg University. In last year's NCAA meet in Northfield, Minn., Gleason finished 71st with a time of 26:05.2 after coming in 85th at the 2001 championship meet at Augustana, III.

Gleason, a political science major from Johnstown, Pa., is a four-time firstteam All-Middle Atlantic Conference honoree. He was coached by Marty Owens this year after running for three years under Craig Penney.







Alumni Contribute Strong Presence in ELCA

Given the university's long-standing ties with the Evangelical Lutheran Church, it's not surprising that Susquehanna alumni hold key positions in the church. But the variety of activities those positions encompass might surprise you. Writer Mary Cammarata Markle brings us up to date with five educators, clergy, and executives.



Outdoor Ministries 'More than Summer Camp'

What do a teenager from Tanzama and a grandmother from Illinois have in common? The opportunity to share the outdoors, fellowship and the arts through the Outdoor Ministries of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) headquartered in Chicago. As the ELCA's executive director of outdoor ministries, Mark Burkhardt '76 is determined that his program remain strong and diverse, "We are much more than summer

camp with a side of religion."

Campers come to any one of the 145 camps and retreat centers throughout the country. There they experience spiritual growth through music, the arts and connecting with nature. Burkhardt says a particularly popular camp invites grandparents and grandchildren to come and connect or reconnect. Beyond the camps, participants have the opportunity to serve in homeless shelters and soup kitchens. Some travel abroad with Habitat for Humanity and Lutheran World Relief. "One of the great joys of my ministry is our work with the international counselor program which brings 40 young adults from partner churches throughout the world to our camps," says Burkhardt. "We are also currently involved in building some camping programs in Africa."



ELCA Women Tackle Local and Global Issues

The mission of the Women of the ELCA is to mobilize women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ. And Executive Director Linda Post '81 Bushkofsky takes on the job of making it all happen. Also headquartered in Chicago, the organization provides support for women throughout 11,000 congregations, publishes a magazine and newsletter, and orchestrates personal consultations on leadership and stewardship

The group's ministry is dedicated to women and children living in poverty. Many units run thrift shops and latch key programs and often participate in local government to change situations that perpetuate poverty. Involvement in Lutheran World Relief extends the efforts internationally.

The organization also sponsors prayer ministries, bible studies, and book groups in local congregations. Bushko6ky says her experience at Susquehanna, and later practicing law and being professionally involved with the church since 1993, prepared her well for this job." When I heard about the position, I saw it as a call. My passion has always been about the voice and role of women. That, along with my professional experience, seemed to make me the right choice," she explains. "I'd like to grow old in this position."



Leading Seminarians to the Questions

"Reading the Bible is a lot like playing Jeopardy We're given the answers and we just need to figure out the questions," says **C. Lynn Nakamura '78** a professor at Trinty Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio

Nakamura has been teaching the Old Testament to seminarians for 16 years, and, she insists, students do figure out the questions. "The biggest hurdle in covering the Old Testament is to understand the context from which it arises and so much of that is foreign to students. If we believe that Christ interacts with penple wherever they are, then we need to understand those contexts."

Nakamura gauges success with students by how much they have grown in their faith and understanding of the word of God and whether they understand it in enough depth to teach or preach themselves.

Since 1996 Nakamura has also been teaching Learning Technologies at Trimity Beyond the Seminary, she is a facilitator of the Love and Logic parenting approach.



A More Inviting Church

When **Kevin Kanouse** '**75** was elected bishop of the Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana Synod of the Lutheran Church, he described his first order of business as to "listen to the parishes and respond to what I heat." Three years into his service, he shares both stories and responses. "I heard so many stories of congregations losing their young people. These once strong parishes were dwindling and stringgling to keep their doors open. I knew we needed to fulfill the Great Commission; to make disciples of people. We train ministers and lay people to reach out, teaching longtime

Lutherans to recruit." And that, says Kanouse, requires overcoming a significant obstacle. "Lutherans can often be private about their faith and that is not what Christ taught us. It's ok for faith to be personal but not private. We are learning to be a more inviting church, learning how to talk about how Christ saved us, how to go beyond the personal to community. That's the trick." Kanouse adds that he is encouraged by the growth of youth ministry. "Young people are energized and learning that there is a place for them."



Helping Luthercare Focus on Mission

A year-and-a-half ago Foster McCurley '59 was counting the months till retirement. A seminary professor for more than 25 years and author of more than 20 hooks, he was looking forward to more time to write. Then last May, Luthercare, a social service organization operating nine facilities for semior hving and childcare in the Mohnton, Pa., area, convinced him to take on a challenge and become their president.

"For me, being president of Luthercare is a culmination of my experiences in teaching and social ministry," says McCurley. And serving as both theologianm-residence for Lutheran Services of America and president of Luthercare allows him to connect broader issues and local ones regarding health care and the needs of people, he adds, "That's good for Luthercare and for LSA." And though he sets the Luthercare board and staff struggle regularly to carry out their mission while meeting budget demands, McCurley remains hopeful. "I think this management and board have a good sense of why they exist. They are able to weather these times because they keep that focus."

Betsy Van Tuyl '90 Mitchell



She Spies

ne could say that Betsy VanTuyl '90 Mitchell married into the family business. Her husband, Ken, became a private investigator in 1987, working for a group of New York lawyers. Witness interviews

and photographs of injuries dominated much of his work day.

"He also spent a lot of time photographing hazards of all sorts; the kinds of hazards that routinely cause wounds and other injuries – potholes, broken slabs of pavement, uneven sidewalks, toin carpets and grapes on supermarket floors," Betsy says.

"Take one grape, one polished vinyl floor and one misplaced foot, and you have a recipe for disaster and litigation. Ken learned that it is best to purchase and consume grapes only after they are safely liquefied and thoroughly fermented," she jokes.

In 1994, the Mitchells moved to Colorado where Ken joined the Koenig Investigative Agency in Fort Collins. Ken and Betsy bought the firm in 1997, fulfilling Betsy's dream of owning a business. Although she was a communications graduate who worked in sales and management as well as a previous stint in the Susquehanna University Office of Development, Betsy became the other half of Pathfinder Group LLC.

And being a private investigator isn't as dangerously glamorous as portrayed on TV, she says. "The work of a private investigator is invariably misrepresented by outsiders who endeavor to describe it. We do not get pistol barrels jammed in our ribs in dimly ht parking garages, nor do we get assaulted by intruders when we go to the office at night," she adds

"The closest I ever came to risking serious bodily injury happened during a surveillance assignment involving an insurance claimant who had gone elk hunting. While scouting out a location from which to monitor the claimant's activities, we took a short like through the forest (and) lingered a bit too long under a tree with strange gouges in the bark," she explains. "The source of the gouges became clear to us when a mountain lion growled to signal his displeasure at our presence 10 feet below his perch. We made a cautious retreat to our camp, and decided our vehicle and pup tent were more secure locations for getting the video footage we needed."

Education, Opportunity and Positive Role Models

While academics can provide much of the knowledge that students need to enter a career, it's often the leadership skills learned both inside and outside the classroom that can translate that knowledge into success both in school and in life after college.



ust ask **Karli Grant '92**, product manager for Institutional Advancement Solutions at Datatel, Inc., in Fairfax, Va. She

complemented her campus career with positions including Lutheran Youth Day coordinator, photography editor for the campus newspaper *The Crusader* and multiple offices within Sigma Kappa sorority.

The two most critical skills which I use daily are time management and relationship building," says Grant. "As a student, it was balancing a full class load, multiple activities and an on-campus job. Now I manage multiple projects for software and services solutions, while frequently traveling to colleges and universities or speaking at conferences," says Grant. "And relationship building leads to opportunities," she adds. "As a student, I learned how to identify key resource people or tools to assist in the organizations with which I worked. Today I find that building relationships helps me create and better manage employee and client expectations, while still helping identify who and what resources are available, resulting in successful projects."

Growing Leaders from the Ground Up

Making scholarships available to applicants who demonstrate strong academic achievement combined with an outstanding extracurricular record, leadership or volunteer service is just the first indicator of the university's commitment to further develop those qualities in students.

From the moment they arrive as freshmen, students have the opportunity to become meaningfully involved in the SU community. Developed specifically for first-year students, a program called Leaders Inc., formerly known as S.E.L.F. (Susquehanna's Education of Leadership for Freshmen), combines a series of workshops and upper-class mentoring designed to enhance participants' skills.

"We shape the program in the framework of leadership for change. In some ways, we are using the grassroots activism models used by non-profit social justice organizations," explains **David Satterlee**, coordinator of First-Year Programs and co-coordinator of Leaders Inc.

Dean of Student Life **Tracy Tyree** says programs such as this go a long way towards integrating first-year students into campus life, one of the key initiatives of the university's new

strategic plan "Research tells us that engaging first-year students with their peers helps to enhance their likelihood for satisfaction and success in college," she says.

"Leaders Inc. does this and helps students develop their skills at the same time. It also helps broaden students' understanding of leadership as a collaborative process where they can come together around a common interest or project, and work to create change," Tyree says.

When Opportunity Knocks

A complementary program, the Leadership Institute, offers monthly workshops on relevant topics to provide ongoing developmental education. And all students are exposed to more leadership training opportunities through classroom activities that routinely require group study projects, making presentations, and practicing analytical decision-making skills.

"Susquehanna offers a structured academic education, but also leaves a window open for opportunities to learn outside of the classroom through the different activities," says **Katrina Konnick '05**, a mathematics and secondary education major from Falls, Pa She is earning her stripes as president of the SU Neighborhood (SUN) Council, which oversees the university's

Garrett Bissell '01, a new member of the Alumm Association executive board, held roles at Susquehanna including president of the Student Government Association (SGA) and president of Omicron Delta Kappa national leadership honor society. Now he appreciates the experience from the perspective of his graduate studies at New York State University at Buffalo School of Law. "It is the development of character and self-identity that are often the most critical aspects of the college experience," he says.

Opportunity, Role Models, Skills

Many student leaders say the combination of opportunity and positive role models found on campus offer them the tools for success in the "real world."

And with more than 100 student organizations, including 23 Division III varsity sports, eight national social sororities and fraterinities, 24 departmental and university-wide honor societies, numerous intrainural sports activities, and a nationally recognized program for volunteer services, there are plenty of avenues to choose.

"My SU experience was complete by being so involved," says **Meg Johnson '96**, former president of Susquehanna's Student Activities Committee (SAC), who is now placement director for the College of Information Science and Technology at Drexel University in Philidelphia.

"It does not take a lot of effort to find a member of the SU community who is an exemplary leader," says Chapel Council President **Rebecca Enish '04,** an English and secondary

Sarah Lampe '05, a marketing major from St. Marys, Pa., says her role as general manager of Charlie's Coffeehouse and participation in other campus organizations have taught some big lessons. One is that a good leader guides by example. And a second lesson is that the work ethic is "contagious," she says.

Being a leader can also be a humbling experience, says Panhellenic Council President **Melissa Yevitz '04**, a finance major from Clark Summit, Pa.''I have learned that respect has to be earned; it does not come along with the territory of simply being labeled 'executive' or 'president,''' she says.

The chance to develop good communication and interpersonal skills is an additional benefit, according to Smith Hall Head Resident **Amanda Geiser '04**, a mathematics major from Tarentum, Pa. "I supervise a staff of eight resident assistants and together we run the largest residence hall on campus," she says. "We are responsible for enforcing university policies, for paperwork such as maintenance requests, and most importantly for building a sense of community within the hall."

SAC president Laura Baker '05, a finance major from Harrisburg, Pa., says her leadership experiences on campus have provided her with a good dose of reality as well. 'I put 110 percent into the president role, as well as my other activities, and sometimes things don't pan out perfectly. This, to me, represents some of the experiences I will have once I leave Susquehanna. I know that no matter how hard I will work, there will be times that I don't feel like I'm getting anywhere, but also times when I do feel like I've succeeded," Baker says.

Multicultural Leadership Development

While all of the on-campus opportunities help shape who students will be when they graduate, some also help students define who they are as they embark on a Susquehanna education.

Instituted in January 2002, the Multicultural Student Leadership Development Institute (MSLDI) seeks to develop personal and organizational leadership skills for the students in campus multicultural groups.

"By centering on the positive elements and attributes of their cultural identity, students can be empowered and affirmed to bring the best of who they are to the table," says **Brian Johnson**, director of multicultural affairs.

Participation in the university's Diversity Council is another way students of color can affirm their cultural identities and develop their ability to guide others.

Nicole Gray '04, a marketing major from Washington, D.C., was facilitator of the Diversity Council for the fall semester. She says her involvement in diversity organizations has given her a sense of belonging and helped her succeed in college. "My years here have not been easy



Holding a leadership position can also bolster open-mindedness and understanding of differences, points out SGA president **Malcolm Derk** '05, a political science major from Freeburg, Pa, "I have learned to work with a diverse group of unique individuals that teach me about the issues, concerns and values they hold. There is no question in my mind that such interactions will shape my future decision making in any career," he says.

Self-Confidence for the Future

As varied as their experiences may be, the common thread connecting Susquehanna's student leaders is a strong sense of self-assurance.

"I am more than confident that my education at SU has prepared me to be successful in any position, and I can't wait to see what the world has to offer," says Cross Country team Captain Jordan Bolduc '04, an elementary education major from Elkton, Md., who also serves as student liaison to the board of directors

And with alumni examples such as Alan Lovell '70 and his wife, Linda Nansteel '71 Lovell, of Ellicott City, Md., students like Bolduc have every reason to feel assured.

Alan Lovell says his role as SGA president helped him become an effective negotiator and delegator, valuable skills for his current position as chief executive officer of CHI Centers Inc., a Silver Spring, Md., organization that provides services to adults with developmental disabilities.

Linda Lovell gained some of her own experience as editor of *The Crusader* and SGA secretary. "Most importantly," she says, "I developed a genuine passion for working with people." This passion has led her into a career coordinating communication for 188 congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) in two states.

Rob Nickey III '84 of Middletown, Md., vice president and senior commercial lender for Waypoint Bank's Potomac Region, served two years as SGA president. "The interpersonal skills I developed during that time have assisted me in my career, in interactions with chents, employees and management," he says.

Our Source for Chilean Adventure

odd Ericson '93 has been a public relations major, a kayaking instructor, a Susquehanna wrestling coach, and an English and Spanish teacher. Now he does a little of all of these things in his current job as a founder, co-owner and guide of a travel business called Chilean Adventures.

Among the adventures that Ericson's company runs are wine tours, a month-long educational kayaking trip for high schoolers (complete with

tutors and a river ecologist), mountain biking trips, and a collaborative trip with the California Universities System which earns college credit over winter break. Such trips can include Chilean barbeques, volcano hiking, horseback riding, open air markets, and kayaking at a variety of levels of difficulty.

"I actually knew I wanted to explore. I could picture myself swinging in the jungle somewhere," says Ericson of his wanderlust "After teaching for three years in Colorado, I found myself making goals for other people, which was great, but I needed to make my own goals," he says. "I figured I knew a lot more than most people did about Chile. I was a pretty contfortable raft guide and kayak instructor," he added, "I didn't have much business background so I went back and picked that up."

Erroson says he struggled with the Spanish classes he took in college. However, his time in Chile has inspired him to resume the study. The real world experience has made all the difference. "I can remember learning something and thinking, 'that's what they were trying to rell me!' and now I have to say that I feel all but fluent."

Since starting his business with Chilean partner Eduardo Doerr in 2002, Ericson lives half of the year in Chile and half in Idaho. That way he can be available for the North Americans interested in his trips, and recruit customers from trips he guides in South America. He had 30 customers during the popular Chilean summer months of January and February last year.

"It's really special to do these trips and get to see people at their best moments. They want to see stuff that they've never seen before, they want to experience things, smells, sights that they've never seen before," he says. "I originally thought that 12 days was a lot of time for some people, but people ask me if they can stay longer. That makes me happy."

Ben Eiben **'01**



Up Close and Personal with Blue Dart Frogs

en Eiben '01 fearlessly holds a beautiful, but poisonous, blue dart frog as he describes its anatomy and habits to a group of Susquehanna alumni who recently visited the Baltimore National Aquarium on the Inner Harbor in Maryland. Eiben, a herpetologist for the aquarium and resident of Codurus, Pa.,

explains a little known fact about poisonous frogs: when many of them are kept in captivity and fed a strict diet of fruit flies, their toxicity is greatly reduced.

The aquarium houses the largest dart frog collection in captivity in the world and Eiben's job is the general husbandry of poison dart frogs. This involves setting up and maintaining fruit fly cultures and farming crickets to produce food for the frogs. He also tracks all frog offspring and handles exhibit upkeep and renovation. Cleaning cages and managing reproduction are among his least favorite tasks, he admits, though all part of the job he has held since graduation.

Working at the aquarium fulfills "some strange naturalistic voyeurism hang-up," says Eiben. He has always been interested in amphibians, creating terrariums as a child "for the sole purpose of getting as close as possible to the animals and to observe their lives on their turf."

"On some levels, the happenings in the terrarium are much more interesting than what is going on around me in 'the real world,"" Eiben added.

Though nature has always held his interest, repriles and amphibians stood above all else for him. "Because of the interrelated aspects of ecology, I have found that pure appreciation of one group of animals will eventually lead you to a great appreciation of everything else," he said,

He came to Susquehanna with a broad knowledge of reptiles and amphibians, but college study helped hone that knowledge with classes like limnology and invertebrate zoology. He said his senior research project aided him most in solving problems and questions at work.

Etben added that he is often asked, "Why herpetology?" and his reply is generally, "how can someone not be interested in it?"

Saturday School: A Higher Education Epiphany

SHIKELLAMY.

The very word seemed to name a place that did not merit my waking up at quarter-till-nine on a Saturday morning to perform community service for a community 1 did not know. "Aren't college students busy enough *without* out-of-class obligations?" I grumbled to myself as I filed off the maroon-and-orange Susquehanna shortbus with the rest of my classmates in an Honors Program Thought course. Exchanging doubtful glances, we arranged ourselves in a ragged half-circle in the parking lot of Shikellamy State Park and turned our gazes toward our professor.

"One size fits all," he announced brightly, tossing each of us a pair of heavy work gloves, but as we folded our hands into the leathery creases, one thought was fitting every mind as well: why did we have to be *here*?

It is said that great awakenings come from great experiences, but I admit that my most prominent educational epiphany to date stems from the day that I doubted college the most. I didn't graduate from high school just to pick up sticks, I muttered underneath my breath as our Mondays-Wednesdays-Fridays-at-ten Dr Hubbell waved eagerly at the splintered tree branches which scattered the blacktop, "Hurricane Isabel really hit this place hard," he commented, "and the park manager is extremely grateful that we've offered to clean it up." But with his words, all I could think of was that a university experience had not been meant to include mud, mosquitoes, and tree boughs twice my height. Who did Dr. Hubbell think we were?

Two hours of aching backs and increasing frustration passed by slowly. When my group finally finished clearing the parking lot of the debris and graduated to a wood-littered picnic area, the rays of the sun were just beginning to touch the morning mist and a gentle breeze was winding through the trees. I, however, was thick with mud and awash with resentment until something along the horizon caught my eye. Several females in beautiful gowns were climbing from a car and were followed by a woman in billowing white-"A wedding reception!" my class gasped in a single breath. The bride stepped elegantly onto the parking lot with her groom and folded up the train of her skirt to protect it from the mud, and all of them joined the bridal party by the Susquehaima River to pose for weddingalbum photographs. At first, I gazed at the scene with a mean gladness because the reception on our grounds reduced the area that we would have to clear, but suddenly somebody sighed, "Isn't it wonderful that we were here to clean up for them?" I saw for the first time that I was wrong.

It was the naturalist Aldo Leopold who first argued that deeper education, not more extensive education, is necessary for a true understanding of one's surroundings. "Perhaps the most serious obstacle impeding the evolution of a land ethic is the fact that our education...is heading away

from...an intense consciousness of land," he penned in his collection of essays, A Sand County Ahnanac. While his words speak primarily of an awareness of environment, Leopold's deeper, "hands-on" education is also essential to general learning. Just as seeing is believing, acting promotes understanding, and how can a student be expected to comprehend anything if she is not first taught hfe's lessons on the very foundation of doing?

I am often asked why I have not followed in the footsteps of the majority of my high school classmates and enrolled in Shippensburg University, the college of my home town. In every instance, my reply is that I feel I am not an isolated individual and must learn to interact in the world that exists beyond the one which I have always known. But until Shikellamy, I truly did not understand that one's ability to reach out and touch a life is not bound by the location of one's education. Any classroom education, regardless of where it may he, can explain to me the benefits of community service and the concepts of world peace; it is only that true education occurs when I am brought into the world and shown the joy of helping others, getting my hands dirty, and touching a life in a tangible way.

Changing the world is not determined by the breadth of knowledge but by the depth of determination.

I am fully convinced, moreover, that within all mankind there exists an emotional bond to one another that allows such little acts of "helping" to make the larger difference. As Shikellamy is not my home park, it is easy to believe that my presence there could not have affected anything whatsoever, but the very people I saw on those grounds proved to me just the opposite. A biker in full uniform peddled past our work crew with a beaming smile. An elderly man drove his car down a nearby road and waved. A couple with a dog strolled on the sidewalk, and the husband stopped to chat; joggers wound through the freshly-cleared paths with faces of joy. Through these individuals, my work became not just an action of doing but an action of helping, and I saw that all those people were not only the components of my Selinsgrove community but also the instruments of my Susquehanna education.

Since that day of epiphany, I have not ceased to attend class daily, take notes from college textbooks, or listen to the intangible forms of education that my professors distribute through explanations and lectures. No man can dispute that such forms of learning create the foundation of human knowledge-but it is also true that labs and essays and exams only become real learning experiences when they are coupled with the physical world of which a student has learned so much. Shikellamy has shown me that in order to fully comprehend life, one must learn not just a greater range of calculus but a higher scope of doing-and I am proud to say that this is the very type of "higher education" which Susquehanna University strives so hard to offer

COMMENCEMENT 2004 Aerospace Engineer to Address Graduating Class

erospace engineer Donna L. Shirley broke gender barriers to become a pioneer in space exploration, motivating other women to follow their dreams regardless of the obstacles. On Sunday, May 16, she will inspire a new generation of young Americans when she speaks to graduates of Susquehanna University during the 2004 commencement ceremony at Nicholas A Lopardo Stadium.

The ceremony, which begins at 2:30 p.m., marks the close of Susquehanna's 146th academic year. Four-hundred-and-twenty-six students are expected to receive bachelor's degrees and eight will receive associate

degrees Commencement will be preceded by

baccalaureate exercises at 10 a.m. in Weber Chapel Auditorium. The Rev. Mark Wm, Radecke, university chaplain, will deliver the baccalaureate address.

As head of NASA's \$150-million-a-year Mars Exploration Program at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, managed by the Califorma Institute of Technology in Pasadena, Cal., Shirley was in charge of putting a robotic vehicle on the surface of Mars, allowing researchers to virtually walk around and inspect the terrain. This was a first for space exploration. Never before had anyone sent an automated vehicle to the surface of another planet. The rover Sojourner, named after 19th-century abolitionist and former slave Sojourner Truth, accompaned the Pathfinder shuttle to Mars on July 4, 1997.

The goal of Sojourner was to examine rock and soil specimens on Mars, giving scientists the first raw data on the chemical makeup of the planet. The mission was considered an overwhelming success, capturing the attention of the international media and public.

Since the landing of Mars Pathfinder and its rover Sojourner, Shirley has appeared on CNN, ABC, NBC, the Discovery Channel, PBS, and many other local and international television and radio stations. She is the author of an autobiography, Managing Martians. The Extraordinary Story of a Woman's Lifelong Quest to Get to Mars. In February 2004, Shirley was named director of the Science Fiction Museum and Hall of Fame, the world's first science fiction museum scheduled to open this summer in the landmark Frank Gehry Building at the base of the Space Needle in Seattle, Wash. In this capacity, she oversees the museum's creative programs and operations teams. Her life story was recently the subject of a PBS special on the Masters of Technology series.

Shirley joined the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in 1966 as the only female engineer. Over the years, she has held more than 20 different positions including nussion analyst for the Manner 10 Venus-Mercury expedition, which provided NASA with thousands of photographs of Venus and Mercury in the early 1970s, and project leader for a study of Saturn, later used to launch the Cossim mission which in 1997 sent probes to Saturn and its moon Titan, as well as to asteroids and a comet

In recognition of her achievements, Shirley will be presented with an honorary doctor of science degree from Susquehanna University. Industrialist **Spencer H. W'right** will also receive an honorary doctorate during Susquehanna's commencement ceremony.

In 1977 the Harrisburg, Pa., native founded Spencer Wright Industries – a privately held mid-size multinational manufacturer of carpet tufting and textile machines with major subsidiaries in the United States and England. With the acquisition of more companies, including some in Germany and Japan, Spencer Wright Industries became the largest in its worldwide market.

Prior to this, Wright served as vice president and general manager of Singer's worldwide tufting machinery operation. For more than five years in the 1980s, he was chairman, president and chief executive officer of the second largest publicly-held financial institution in the Chattanooga, Tenn., area.

In 1994, he established the Wright-Bentley Foundation to fund scholarships in higher education. The Wright-Bentley Distinguished Student Service Scholarship was the first award established by the foundation, followed later by the Bentley Challenge and Alumni Scholarship Program. To date, 63 Susquehanna students have received awards through the distinguished and alumni scholarships. Wright also established the Pastor Raymond Shaheen Scholarship Endowment, in honor of **Raymond Shaheen '37, H'99**, his former pastor and long-time friend who serves as special assistant to the president of Susquehanna University During commencement exercises, the university will honor Wright with an honorary doctorate of laws.

Departments Collaborate to Introduce New Major in Ecology for 2004

Students at Susquehanna will have the option of a new interdepartmental major in ecology beginning in the fall of 2004. Offered jointly by the biology and geological and environmental science departments, the new major will focus on the mechanisms and makings of ecosystems, and how organisms interact with their environments.

"I am very optimistic that this will become an important contributor to the sciences at SU and ultimately will truly bridge the disciplines," says Associate Professor **David Richard**, head of the biology department.

The new major reflects department capabilities and student interest: at least seven students have created similar programs previously through Susquehanna's self-designed major option.

The major will include new courses such as Ecosystems and Introduction to Ecology, as well as established classes like Systematic Biology, Limnology, Animal Behavior, Field Botany, Wetlands Analysis, Geographic Information Systems, and Sedimentology. The major also requires two semesters of student research.

As with all of Susquehanna's science programs, the ecology major will emphasize handson work with faculty in both the departments of biology and geological and environmental sciences. Professor of Biology **Jack Holt** has been named coordinator.

Students will also be able to gain experience at the new Susquehanna University Ecology Research Center (ERC) conveniently located across Sassafras Avenue within easy walking distance to campus. The 20-acre site will provide an outdoor laboratory for formal coursework as well as independent and collaborative work in the areas of terrestrial, landscape, restoration, and agroecology research.

Students will also have access to the Camp Karoondinha station in Union County in addition to studying several area wetlands, marshes and state parks. It is also likely that majors will contribute to the university's ongoing research at the Centraha nume fire.

even more meaning to me and to Janice's family. I am so thankful that I was able to spend time with her and get to know her before she died. My family also lost another close friend to cancer about two weeks ago. I know that the chaplan's class aided me a great deal in dealing with these deaths. Death shouldn't be feared and discussing death shouldn't be ignored. I am so thankful for the chaplain's class and for everyone involved.

In addition, Bateson serves as president of the Institute for Intercultural Studies. She has written and co-authored many books and articles, and lectured across the country and around the world. Her most recent book, *Full Circles, Overlapping Lives*, was lauded by *The New York Times, The Boston Globe*, and several university presidents and scholars.

Board Sets 2004-05 Tuition, Fees

At its writter meeting, Susquehanna University's board of directors approved an increase in tuition and fees for the 2004-05 academic year

Comprehensive fees for next year – which include tuition and fees, room and board – will total \$31,650. The \$1,660 increase is 5.5 percent of the current fees.

"While we are doing all we can to offer the highest quality educational experience and to control our costs, we know that increases in tuition and fees are a concern," said University President L. Jay Lemons "We believe they are necessary to fulfill our mission, to remain competitive among the leading national liberal arts colleges, and to respond to other external forces, such as extraordinary increases in health insurance costs. We believe that a Susquehama education is an exceptional value."

In the year ahead, Susquehanna will add more full-time faculty positions, begin implementation of a new software information system, make modest increases in compensation for faculty and staff, and begin planning and design work for new building projects.

Three Susquehanna Professors

GEORGE BOONE

Since Professor of Biology George Boone came to Susquehanna as a junior faculty member 43 years ago, graduating biology majors have more than quadrupled, the undergraduate biology honors society Beta Beta Beta has been established, and the number and variety of biology courses offered has broadened significantly – 19 courses were offered in the spring 2004 semester alone.

While instrumental in all of these accomplishments, Boone is reluctant to take credit for any of them. He is, however, obviously proud of what he does feel to be his contribution to SU. "In 1961 the department had four instructors, there are now nine. My greatest reward is looking around the department and seeing all these fine people. The first teacher 1 hired was Jack Holt, followed by Margaret and Tom Peeler, Dave Richard and Tammy Tobin-Janzen. That's my biggest accomplishment."

Boone began a total revamping of the biology program in 1989, resulting in a much more inquiry-based style of teaching. "The students work in teams coming up with questions and conducting the research to answer them," he explains. "It's the process of doing science rather than just listening and being told what to do."

"Dr. Boone's Field Biology class was not only my favorite class at SU, but the class I still feel influences me on a daily basis," says **Joyce Bilger**, a non-traditional student who took a weekend course in field biology from Boone in the early 1980s. "He inspired us to stop and really see the nature around us, to listen to the sounds of the birds. He made us think twice about what we, in Snyder County, do that influences the Chesapeake Bay and beyond."

Another of Boone's off-campus ventures was the development of the Hepner Ecology Laboratory dedicated in 1983. The lab, located at Camp Karoondinha on Penn's Creek Mountam, is a year-round facility for faculty and students in course such as Field Biology, Ecology, and Vertebrate Natural History, as well as courses offered by the Department of Geological and Environmental Science.

In addition to his teaching responsibilities, Boone was department chair for ten years and district director of Beta Beta Beta. He authored numerous articles and reviews and continued his own research in general plant and animal ecology, landscape ecology, and improving science education at the elementary and secondary levels. Two areas of his most current research include natural history of the red-bellied woodpecker in Pennsylvania and the effect of the fragmentation of habitats on small wildlife.

Boone says his retirement plans are to continue bird watching in the many preserves near the cottage he and his wife, Carol, have on Lake Ontario.

His hope of what his influence has been on his students is much like Boone himself, understated, yet significant. "Maybe when they hear a bird sing they'll think a little more about it."

WARREN FISHER



Warren Fisher, the same thing gets said over and over again, "expert on curriculum, vast knowledge of all things Susquehanna, a man whose obvious forté is teaching."

But perhaps the most prevalent sentiment expressed about Fisher is that he is simply a generous and devoted mentor to his colleagues. One beneficiary of Fisher's advocacy is Assistant Professor **Katarina Keller** who came to Susquehanna in the fall of 2002. "He made such an effort to help me understand how things are done. And last fall when I began advising I relied on Warren so much. There were times when asked a question about curriculum I would say, 'Hold just a minute' and run over to Warren's office." She adds, "We all say 'Let's ask Warren' so much it's sort of become a little joke." Keller says that Fisher is always dropping extra copies of anything he thinks might be helpful. Whether it's an involved 3D lesson project or the file folders he came across while cleaning out his office, "Warren shares everything."

Fisher earned his bachelor's degree in accounting from Lycoming College and his master's and Ph.D. from the University of Connecticut. He also taught at the State University of New York at Fredonia and was senior policy analyst and senior economist for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. He came to Susquehanna in 1988 and was part of the team responsible for the accreditation of the Sigmund Weis School of Business. He chaired the economics department for ten years.

"Fisher's interest in students is immense," says current chair of the department Professor Ali Zadeh. "They appreciate and adore Warren's gentle, considerate approach and his great sense of humor." One result for Fisher has been several awards for teaching, including the 1999 Susquehanna University Teaching Award. "I try to do things with relatively little identity involved," says Fisher. "But as I reflect on that award the ego emerges. I'm pretty proud of that one."

As he readies himself for retirement, this confident, competent man finds himself a little uneasy. "It's one of life's changes and it's scary. There's much uncertainty, but 1 want to do it." For the past several years visits with friends and family took a backseat to the hectic family/professional schedule he maintains with his wite, Ann, also an economist and a Penn State faculty member. First on Fisher's retirement agenda is catching up with as many of those people as possible. He hopes to devote more time to his playing and making of folk instruments and plans to work on some original designs. September is reserved for fishing.

Fisher sums up his own sentiments on his past 15 years at SU. "Every experience is a combination of time and money. I hope people think of an encounter with me as a good value."

Join Emeritus Ranks

DONALD HOUSLEY

In the summer of 1967, **Donald Housley**, his wife, Grace, and infant son, David, packed up their '65 Volkswagen Beetle and made their way from State College, Pa., to Susquehanna University where Housley had secured a faculty position in the university's Department of History. Little did he know at the time that he'd be part of the Susquehanna community for almost four decades.

As a new father with a Ph.D. in history, Housley was thinking more about simply having a job than about long-term career commitments. But 37 years later, Housley has built a reputation as both a respected educator and administrator, loved by colleagues and students alke.

"As dean, Don created a living legacy in that he hired a lot of the folks of my generation," said **Linda McMillin**, professor of history and provost/dean of faculty.

"We remain eternally grateful to him for giving us a chance and mentoring us so well. Since our first moments on campus, [Associate Professor of Biology] **Peg Peeler** and I have repeatedly said that when we 'grow up' we want to be just like Don," McMillin said.

Aside from his teaching, Housley has been director of summer sessions, director of faculty and curriculum development, assistant dean of faculty, dean of the School of Arts and Sciences and coordinator of the university's Center for Teaching and Learning. He has served as head of the history department three times, most recently replacing McMillin who was named provost and dean of faculty in February. In 1995, Housley was named the university's Charles B. Degenstein Professor of History. In addition, he has been the unofficial university historian for longer than most people can remember.

Now Housley is retiring, but hke his role as university historian, he'll be returning unofficially in the fall. He says he'll be helping out the department



by supervising some student research projects and likely overseeing internship students.

When asked what he has loved most about his time at Susquehanna, Housley said, "Working with students. That's been great. It's one of the reasons I want to hang around a while."

Beyond continued work with students, Housley is looking forward to enjoying his and Grace's first grandchild and the publication of his book. A Goodly Hentage: Susquehanna University, 1858-1985. He has devoted a decade to researching and writing the comprehensive history of the university, now in the editing phase.

The title for Housley's book was inspired by Psalms 16:6 of the Holy Bible which says "Yea, I have a goodly heritage." As McMillin pointed out, so too does everyone who's had the honor of working and learning alongside Housley.

Jim Taylor to Retire as Susquehanna Men's Track Coach

fter an illustrious 26-year career as head coach of the Susquehanna University men's track and field team, **Jim Taylor** will retire at the conclusion of the 2004 outdoor season.

Taylor has led the Crusaders to 11 Middle Atlantic Conference team championships and coached 32 All-Americans and seven Division III national champions. He has also served as an admissions coordinator for the university's Signund Weis School of Business for the past 13 years.

"I'm leaving here with nothing but good thoughts and experiences," said Taylor. "I have been fortunate to be surrounded by quality athletes and assistant coaches. Susquehanna has been very good to me."

"Jim has had a positive impact on so many people during his career and enjoyed an incredible amount of success at Susquehanna," said Director of Athletics **Pam Samuelson**. "He has been an integral part of our department for many years and we wish him nothing but best wishes."

Taylor came to Susquehanna in 1979 after 16 seasons as head coach at Selinsgrove Area High School, where he led the Seals to six league and five district championships in addition to the 1976 PIAA Class AA state championship and 64 consecutive dual-meet victories.

Following a 3-6 dual meet record in his first season, the Crusaders began a streak of 71 consecutive wins in 1980 that lasted until 1990. Overall, Taylor's teams have posted a 117-14 record (.893) in dual meets.

In 1982, the Crusaders won their first MAC title since 1971 to begin an unprecedented streak of five straight conference championships. Susquehanna added conference crowns in 1988, 1994, 1995, 1997, 1998 and 2003.

The Crusaders have also had a presence at the national level, with no fewer than 42 individuals and nine relays participating at the NCAA Division III championships since 1981.

Among the seven national championships won by Susquehanna athletes



were the four golds captured by **Mike Spangler '86** from 1985 to 1988, as he won the 200 meters as a freshman before winning three straight titles in the 400 meters. **Jeff Walden '88** captured back-to-back championships in the 400-meter hurdles in 1985-86 while **Adam Ressler '00** won the javelin in 2000.

Two events at Alumni Weekend on Saturday, June 5, will commemorate Jun Taylor's 26 years of service to Susquehauna. A 3 p.m. program in Lopardo Staduum in honor of Coach Taylor's athletes will be followed by a one-nule alumni walk/nm in the coach's honor. There will also be a 6 p.m. retirement dunner in the Susquehama Field House. Cost for the dinner is \$10 per adult. James also served as defensive backs coach at Division II Lenoir-Rhyne College (1997-1998) and at his alma mater Bloomsburg University (1995-96).

James is a 1995 graduate of Bloomsburg with a bachelor of science degree in exercise science/adult health and was a four-year starter with the Husky football program. James was a two-year team captain and a two-time All-PSAC selection as well as an All-ECAC pick during his career from 1990-94.

In addition to his football duties, James will serve as an assistant to firstyear head baseball coach and fellow Bloomsburg graduate Matt Karchner.

Performance Uncovers a Women's Track Standout

Freshman Emily Lepley '07 made an impact on the women's track and field team from the moment she ran her first race in December. She is all but assured a trip to the NCAA championships at Millikin University in Decatur, Ill., from May 27-29.

At a December 6 indoor meet at Bucknell, Lepley shattered the SU school record in the 55-meter hurdles and provisionally qualified for the NCAA Division III Indoor Track and Field Championships at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater.

Lepley went on to finish second in the event at the Middle Atlantic Conference indoor track and field championships on February 28 with a time of 8.44 seconds, securing a spot in the field for the NCAA championship meet.

On March 12, Lepley finished 10th with a time of 8.46 seconds and became the first female Susquehanna competitor at the NCAA indoor championship meet.

Just two weeks later, Lepley lined up for her first outdoor meet as a Crusader and promptly repeated her performance from the indoor season, setting a school record and earning a provisional berth to the NCAA Division III Outdoor Track and Field Championships with a time of 14.92 seconds in the 100-meter hurdles.

Lepley has subsequently improved upon that time twice, running a seasonbest 14.69 seconds at the Dickinson Invitational on April 24.

Rebecca Mignot '54



Teaching Abroad, Service at Home

Rebecca Shade '54 Mignot didn't venture far from home to attend college. In fact, the Danville, Pa.-area native says that in her family, it was simply "always understood" that she would go to nearby Susquehanna University. However, Mignot's SU degree in nuisic education helped her launch a globetrotting career that spanned continents and decades before leading her back to Danville – and SU – in her retirement.

Today, Mignot is active on the 50th Reunion Committee and Alumni Parents Admission Network, and has an alumni service record that includes membership on

the Alumni Association Board and Reunion Gift Committee, to name just a few of her affiliations. In 1983, Mignot also established the Alice Pope Shade Fund for use by the university's religion department. The fund honors Mignot's mother.

While always supportive of SU, Mignot says active service was impractical for many years. After six years as an educator in the United States – in Pennsylvania, California and Maryland – Mignot developed an interest in teaching overseas. Hoping to find employment in Asia or South America, she contacted big businesses that operated foreign schools for employees. The result: an offer from Firestone Tire and Rubber to teach in Liberia, where the company operated a rubber plantation.

Initially uncertain about the job, Mignot says that in hindsight, choosing to go was the right decision – and a lifechanging one, at that. "Of all my years in teaching, I was happiest there. Everything was just perfect. I loved the children."

Not incidentally, Mignot also met her hushand, Jacques, in Liberia, where he was working for an airline. The two were married on the Firestone plantation and honeymooned in the African interior at a guesthouse on the Liberian president's farm. "When the president wasn't there, there was no electricity," she recalls. "At 6 p.m. it was pitch dark – we just had a candle. You could hear all the night sounds."

The couple continued their expatriate lifestyle during Jacques' subsequent employment with Exxon; they resided in Libya for 14 years and Saudi Arabia for six years before returning to Danville in their retirement.

Mignot says her alma mater definitely changed during the years she was away; in particular, the rules have loosened compared to when she attended in the 1950s. But she adds that SU continues to offer students a quality education. "I think enough of it that when I see young people who have promise, I try to direct them to the university," she says. "I certainly appreciate what it's done for me, and it's still doing a wonderful job preparing young people for employment – but also giving them principles for life."



Ralph Purpur '66



Leading, Sharing Career Lessons

ver since **Ralph Purpur '66** made his first trip to New York City at the age of 14, he had his sights set on starting a career in Manhattan.

A non-traditional student from nearby Danville, Pa., Purpur was 28 when he enrolled at Susquehanna. But the late start didn't stop him from embarking on a path that has led to the 2004 Susquehanna University Alumni Association award for leadership – an aptitude ably demonstrated in his own career and his generous efforts as a mentor to employees, students, and the internal audit profession itself.

A January graduate, Purpur landed a position on the corporate andit staff for RCA, thanks in part to **Larry Isaacs '43**, then vice president and controller at RCA.

"I've never looked back," says Purpur of the career that has taken him from RCA to Celanese, a chemical and fibers manufacturer, and eventually, in 1979, to Estée Lauder Companies.

He retired from Estée Lander as vice president and chief andit executive in 1997 after 19 years of service during a time when the family skincare

business was evolving into a worldwide cosmetics powerhouse. Purpur found himself and the internal andit staff on the road on average 70 percent of the time, traveling all over the world as Estée Lauder opened up new markets in Asia and Eastern Europe.

"It was very exciting to have the opportunity to bring young people in, get them involved and find out what they wanted to do next," says Purpur. "We had an annual turnover of 25-30 percent – for all the right reasons," he adds.

Later, when Estée Lauder launched an internship program, Purpur used the opportunity to forge connections for Susquehanna students seeking experience in the business world. He has also served as a competition judge for the university's husiness awareness course for first year students.

Purpur, who lives in Valley Forge, Pa., with his wife, Eleanor, is a past member of the Susquehanna Alumni Association executive board. He represented the association on the SU board of directors from 1999 to 2002. He also served on the Signiund Weis School of Business Advisory Council, and is chairman of the New York, Long Island, Connecticut Leadership Development Committee and vice chairman of the Philadelphia Regional Campaign Committee.

He remains closely involved with the Institute of Internal Auditors – a 93,000 member worldwide professional education and training organization that he has served throughout his career.

"At a point when I could have gone in several different directions, I had an idea that internal auditing was going to become a profession into itself, and I wanted to be in on the ground floor," says Purpur.

"My family is really oriented toward following in each others' footsteps," says Spotts, who followed his brother, **Doug '63**, to SU – and subsequently guided his own children, **Kevin '97**, and **Rich '97**, as well other young people, to his alma mater.

hen 16-year-old **Gary E. Baylor '69** took his first job working in his father's farm stand, little did he know that the family business would evolve into Country Cupboard, a Lewisburg area landmark that has been offering coun-

try hospitality since 1973. Today's Country Cupboard encompasses a 750-seat restaurant, a one-acre gift complex selling everything from Pennsylvania Dutch baked goods to fountain accessories, a Best Western Inn, and a soon to be opened Country Inn and Suites.

Baylor, who will receive one of two* 2004 Susquehanna University Alumni Association Awards for Achievement, will be retiring next year as chairman of the board. The time is right, he feels, for succession in this family operation he runs with his wife, Barbara Ann, son Chris, and Gary's sister Carole and her family.

"I got intrigued with the activity that our dad had created, and I fell in love with it.... Business to me was a game, and I enjoyed buying a product, merchandising it, having the customer purchase it and being satisfied with it." Baylor states. "We just kept poking around the edges of things we knew and continued to grow."

And if you ask him, Baylor will tell you he sees achievement as "not only success in your profession, but how you've developed the people you work with." It is, he adds, also a measure of "where have you made investments into society and the community rather than just consuming for yourself."

Along his way, Baylor has found time to devote considerable effort to community, church, and alma mater. He earned the 2002 Community Leadership award from the Boy Scouts of America Susquehanna Council.

He currently serves as treasurer of the Union County United Way and has been a member of the Susquehanna University Board of Directors since 1988. Baylor, whose grandfather was a foreman for the Pennsylvania Railroad, plans to spend more of his time in retirement pursuing his own interest in trains, restoring O-scale models and researching railroad history. "I'm not a model railroader, but a railroad modeler," he adds.

ennifer McGillan didn't think much about it when she uncovered a dusty old box marked "Handwritten OT" during the early days of her one-year term as project archivist organizing the Susquehanna University Archives. The label seemed straightforward enough – handwritten Old Testament – and at first glance, that is exactly what the pile of papers inside the box looked like.

But as McGillan rummaged farther into the university's history she learned that a Dr. Jonathan Rose Dimm, a doctor of divinity who served as president of Susquehanna from 1895 to 1899, began all his sermons with a quote from the Old Testament of the Bible. Armed with this new information, McGillan went back to the box marked "Handwritten OT," only to find that it in fact was a collection of sermons penned by Dimm. Sono after, she was able to put a face with the name when she uncovered a portrait of Dimm annid a stack of pictures of former university presidents.

"After reading his sermons, you realize he had a very rigorous mind," McGillan says

But the state of having his papers mislabeled and unpreserved was anything but rigorous. The sermons are among the many historical treasures that lay buried for decades in disorganized piles of books and other materials in the basement of the university's Blough-Weis Library.

Among just a few of the other treasures are letters from alumni serving on the front lines of World Wai II and articles on the April 14, 1966, "Chapel Revolt," in which students protested the university policy requiring them to attend church service.

"Building the archives has been a voyage of discovery," McGillan says:

McGillan believes these artifacts are vital to Susquehanna's heritage. "There is nothing useless down here," she said. Eake, for instance, the Dimm sermons McGillan says they provide real insights into the life of a man who helped shape the university during its infancy.

In Danger of Being Lost

Not long ago, many of the documents tracing Susquehanna's history were in danger of being lost forever. According to **Rebecca Wilson**, associate director of the Blough-Weis Library, for many years the archives room, located in the lower level of the library, was treated as a "a catch-all storage area."

Boxes of unrelated historical documents and pictures were intermingled with insignificant storage items and stacked on floors and shelves in no particular order. And it was not uncommon for people from both on and off campus to take materials from the archives without as much as a sign-out sheet to track their removal.

. It was really an undestable situation. Things were out of control, and we had to close the archives.] Wilson says

Gift Turns Tides of Fate

Last year, in celebration of their 35th reunion members of the Class of 1968 made a generous gift that turned the tides of fate for the Susquehania archives. The gift, coupled with discretionary funds from the president's office, made approximately \$75,000 available for archival supplies and the hiring of a profes sional archivist on a one-year fixed-term appointment.

In August, McGillan, who holds a master of science in information science with a concentration in incluves from the University of Pittsburgh, begin the monamental task of reorganizing and revitalizing the university incluves. Her assignment also involved seiting policies and procedures for accessing the mate-



rial. McGillan is also reviewing various archival finding aids and creating new ones for the university's collections

Past President of the Susquehanna University Alumni Association Samuel Clapper '68 says he and his classifiates felt the archives were a worthwhile investment for the preservation of their own history, as well as that of the university at large.

"As students we challenged a lot of things, and things were changed during and after our years on campus," he says. The class had scarcely arrived on campus in 1964 when historic Gustavus Adolphus Hall burned and forced many members to spend their early Susquehanna days living in a nearby Holiday lini. By the time the Class of 1968 graduated, compulsory chapel at Susquehanna had become a thing of the past and the social and political changes that accompanied the Vietnam War era were in full swing on America's campuses.

"We thought our campus activities, as well as those of classes that went before us and came after us, should be preserved in a fashion that would make them accessible and useful," says Clapper.

An Interest Beyond History

Before last year, the university's Charles B. Degenstein Professor of History **Donald Housley** and his students were among the few individuals to venture into the archives. "Primary documents were collected and kept in the valit, but there was no organization," says Housley, who relied on archival materials for his comprehensive history, A Goodly Hentage: Susquehaina University, 1858-1985, now in the editing phase. (See story, page 7).

Over the years, Housley and students – including university assistants Jacob Waybright '98 and Jennifer Wright '99 and history major Michael Miller '97 – worked with Becky Wilson and the library staff to bring some semblance of order to the archives.

But, Housley said, the archives didn't make a real turn for the better until



professional help arrived in the form of McGillan Now in addition to the Department of History, students and faculty in disciplines such as religion, political science and anthropology are beginning to take advantage of the archives.

"The real difference is that collections are organized for scholars to easily find," Housley says.



Internship and Work Study Opportunities

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But McGillan hasn't done it alone. She's also had the help of numerous students Together they have organized everything into record group order, the Dewey decimal system for archives, and brought everything up to archival-safe storage standards using preservation tools like acid-free file folders and plastic paper clips.

Working as an intern in the archives last semester, history major Tracey Craley '05 earned two class credits and learned the intricacies of archival theory and records management in a project to organize, catalogue, and preserve the university's Underkoffler music holdings, a collection of popular vintage sheet music. In just 14 weeks, Craley transformed the more than 300 pieces of sheet music into a viable resource for generations to come

"I experienced firsthand how every person that enters this university leaves a little behind," says Craley. "It is amazing to think of all those who have walked the same paths, slept in the same dorms, and in some cases, been taught by the same professors that still teach SU students'

Evolution and Appreciation

"There is so much information in this room," says Kimberly Kardos '06, who is studying political science/international studies with an emphasis on history. Kardos is currently organizing a large audio-visual collection held in the archives, and says the work is well-suited to her personality "I really like working down here because I like to be nosey," she admits

And according to elementary education major Amy Golumbeski '07, the archives are the perfect workplace for someone who likes to dig through the history of the Susquehanna community. Among her favorite discoveries is a student handbook from the early 1900s"

One of the school rules was that you had to dress up for dinner" says Golumbeski, who says she finds it fascinating to see how Susquehanna has evolved

University trivia aside, Golumbeski says the archives have put campus life into perspective for her "By knowing the university's history, you have a greater appreciation for it," she says

Archival exhibits on the main floor of the library have brought that appreciation to a wider audience. Intern Katherine Morgan '05, a history major, created a display featuring newspaper clippings, a scrapbook, programs, and a vintage "Book of Gems" highlighting the history and contributions of the Susquehanna University Women's Association Another exhibit focused on Craley's work on the Underkoffler sheet music collection With help from the departments of music and history, a public concert featuring some works from the collection will be organized for the fall of 2004.



Geoffrey Shearer '91: Behind the Lens and the Desk

eoffrey Shearer '91 was practically born with a camera in his hands, but changed his focus to English while a student at Susquehanna. Today, however, Shearer is back behind the lens – and the desk – as president of his Camp Hill, Pa., family business, The Camera Box.

Shearer, who shares one of this year's Young Alumni Awards with wife, **Tammy '92**, (see companion profile), inherited The Camera Box from his father, who started the business in 1972. Geoff Shearer completed his own first professional shoot at age 14. But being the boss, he says, presents an entirely new set of challenges. "When the final decision is mine – it's a whole different sense of responsibility," he explains, adding that The Camera Box employs a staff of six.

Shearer, who was class valedictorian at SU, adds that being an English major has not hindered him in the business world, although he notes, "I only regret that I didn't take more accounting classes."

When not keeping the business afloat from the financial end, Shearer is busy working behind the camera. The Camera Box contracts with mine central Pennsylvania high schools for senior portraits, shoots for the Harrisburg

(Pa.) *Patriot-News*, and specializes in wedding and family portraits, sports, and specialized advertising shoots. He also processes and prints photos and does digital retouching, printing, and photographic manipulation. In

fact, Shearer completely computerized The Camera Box – a project that he actually started in the 8th grade. Having toyed with the idea of being a teacher for many years, he also taught photography for five years at the

Milton Hershey School, Hershey, Pa.

In 2001, Shearer was honored as one of the "40 Under 40" promising young business and community leaders in the Harrisburg area. Still, Shearer finds time to contribute to his alma mater. He is a member of the Alumin Parents Admission Network and the Harrisburg Leadership Development Committee, and also served on the 2001 Reunion Committee.

"I really enjoyed my time at SU," says Shearer, who actually took one year off to help his ailing father run The Camera Box. "It just seems natural to stay involved."

Although Shearer has fond memories of SU friendships, he notes, "The best part of Susquehanna for me was the education. Susquehanna gave me confidence that I didn't have when I left high school. I buckled down and started to enjoy learning, and that stays with you all your life." He adds, "English majors can do anything – I'm proof of that."

hen Tammy Frailey '92 Shearer married SU college sweetheart Geoffrey Shearer '91 in 1993, she became wedded to a family business, too.

Shearer, who majored in communications with an emphasis in public relations, is now vice president of The Camera Box, the Camp Hill, Pa., business she and her husband inherited from Geoff's father. Today, along with performing marketing and public relations for the business, Shearer is also a professional

photographer. "I do a little bit of everything," says Shearer, who admits that she did not enter the world of professional photography as a complete novice. "I did take photography at SU," she says.

Working for a family business is demanding – "there's always more and more to do," Shearer says – but also provides owners with a special sense of personal investment. "You want to help the business," she says. Along those lines, Shearer has used her marketing and photography skills to move The Camera Box beyond traditional wedding photography into a new form of documentation known as "wedding photojournalism." She has also restructured the business's senior portrait shoots, among other changes.

Shearer also wants to improve her community, and she is a dynamic organizer and volunteer, most recently joining the board of directors of the West Shore Chamber of Commerce. She is also a member of the Professional Photographers of America Inc., Executive Women International Inc., and Harrisburg Young Professionals. Within these groups, Shearer is active, for example collecting clothing for a YWCA program that

helps to dress individuals for job interviews, serving on a scholarship committee for adult students, and establishing a photography award through the Harrisburg (Pa.) Patinot-News Scholastic Art Awards program.

Shearer also remains committed to Susquehanna, serving on the Alumni Association Board, the Alumni Parents Admission Network, Harrisburg Leadership Development Committee, and, in 2002, the Reumon Committee.

She says her Susquehanna University education seemed especially impressive "after the fact," when she realized how well her skills served her in the work world. Like her husband, Shearer recently earned recognition as one of the Harrisburg area's "40 Under 40" young business leaders, a nod to her business acumen and community involvement.

Susquehanna remains a special priority, Shearer says. "Because we met there and because we had such a good experience, we still keep in touch with the friends we made. We still feel a very close connection to Susquehanna."





The day continues a nearly 28-year tradition supported first by the university Chapter of the American Association of University Professors, then for eight years by the Lindback Foundation, and now by the provost and dean of faculty.

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




Record Enrollment with SU's 150th Class

Once again, Susquehanna University expects to start the 2004-2005 academic year with record-breaking enrollment. "Many students, faculty, staff, alumni, parents and friends continue to spread the word about the variety of excellent opportunities available at SU. Thanks to their efforts, we expect to open with at least 1,900 full-time students, the largest full-time enrollment for the 10th consecutive year," said Chris Markle, director of admissions.

About 550 will be new students – approximately 525 of whom will be incoming freshmen; 25 will be transfer students. Nearly 60 percent of the first-year students were in the top one-fifth of their high school classes. About 90 percent were in the top two-fifths. Twenty-two new students were either valedictorian or salutatorian of their high school classes.

"The Class of 2008 was selected from the largest applicant pool in the university's history. Our first-year students bring exceptionally strong credentials to campus; they have demonstrated their talents in high school – both in and out of the classroom. We look forward to welcoming them to the Susquehanna community." Markle said.

Along with celebrating a decade of annual enrollment growth, Susquehanna will welcome its sesquicentennial class, whose graduation in 2008 will also mark the university's 150th birthday. Members of the Class of 2008 come to Susquehanna from 18 states, including from as far away as Maine, North Carolina, Texas and Washington. Three other countries – Bolivia, China and Nepal – will also be represented among the student body. About 7.5 percent of the new students describe themselves as being part of an ethnic minority group.

Letter

I am deeply saddened to read about the reports of sexual assault that have taken place recently at Susquehanna University. I attended Susquehanna in the late 90s and the same types of crimes were being committed then, although the campus climate was such that students often found it difficult to speak out after being assaulted. Assuredly, it is still difficult for the women who are now coming forward to speak of their assaults and name their attackers; these women have my utmost respect.

When I first heard of these assaults, I could not help feeling both sorrow and rage that such crimes are still occurring at Susquehanna. After some reflection, however, I do find some bittersweet hope in the support of Jay Lemons and the university of the investigations into the allegations. Even a few years ago, students who had been raped relied on other students and individual faculty and staff members for support, but had little formal institutional encouragement to come forward with their stories; it seemed the university was sometimes more concerned with the bad press that rape allegations might bring than with the safety and well-being of SU students. However, from the accounts of other SU alums and the messages sent to the SU community, it seems that the current university administration has been nothing but supportive and respectful of the women who have reported their assaults; from all accounts, the university is working in earnest with local authorities to identify and arrest those responsible for these acts of violence. I hope that the actions that the university has taken over these reports will foster the possibility of a

safe campus, one in which all members of the Susquehanna community understand that rape will not be tolerated.

Lynn Palermo, visiting assistant professor of French, attended the 20th-21st Century French and Francophone International Colloquium in Tallabasee, Fla., April 11–13 and the French Colonial Historical Conference in May. She and Assistant Professor of French and Italian Scott Manning hosted the meeting of the Susquehanna Chapter of the American Association of Teachers of French on campus on April 24.

Associate Professor of Spanish Leona Martin's article, "Nation Building, International Travel and the Construction of the Nineteenth-Century Pan-Iberic Women's Network" appeared in the May issue of *Hispania*. In June she served as a consultant for the Advanced Placement Literature Exams at Trinity University in San Antonio.

Assistant Professor of Spanish **Donetta Hines** presented at an international conference on narrative in Buenos Aires in July. The May issue of *Chasqui*, a journal of Latino American Cultural Studies, featured her article "Woman as a Sign of Culture in Crisis in *Escenas de la vida postinoderina.*"

"Is a Small Press a Good Fit for Your Book?," an article co-written by **Gary Fincke**, professor of English and creative writing, and **Tom Bailey**, associate professor of English, has been selected to be reprinted in the 2005 edition of *The Writer's Handbook*, which features the best articles written about publishing along with extensive marketing lists for writers. The article originally appeared in *The Writer* in October 2003.

Sports Toni Davis '04 Named to US Paralympic Swim Team

Davis, a native of New Carrollton, Md., finished first in her class in the 100-meter butterfly, second in the 50-meter freestyle and third in the 100-meter freestyle at the U.S. Paralympic Swimming Trials at the University of Minnesota on April 26 to earn a spot on the team. Davis holds the American records in her class in the 50-meter butterfly (41.65 seconds), the 100-meter butterfly (1:34.02) and the 400-meter individual medley (8:10.73), and is currently ranked among the top 10 in the world in the 100 butterfly.

In 2003, Davis won the 50-meter freestyle and 100-meter butterfly events at the USA Swimming Disability Championships.

At Susquehanna, she competed in the butterfly and freestyle, and swam on the Crusaders' 400-yard freestyle relay team at the Middle Atlantic Conference championship at Wilkes-Barre on February 15.

Davis graduated in May with a bachelor of arts degree in psychology, and has been accepted in the graduate program at The University of Scranton.

Gordon Galloway Named Head Men's Lacrosse Coach

Gordon Galloway has been named head coach of the Crusader men's lacrosse team after serving as an assistant coach for the past three seasons under Ron Miller. Miller stepped down to concentrate on increased duties as an assistant coach with the Crusaders' football program, where he has served as offensive coordinator since 1999

Galloway played both defenseman and longstick midfielder at nationallyranked Mountain Lakes (N.J.) High School, where as a senior he was awarded the John C. Walters award for the player who gives the most back to the game.

Galloway continued his playing career at nationally ranked Hampden-Sydney College, where he lettered three years before earning a bachelor's degree in economics in 1997 as a Thomas W. Hobie scholar in business ethics.

Upon graduating from Hampden-Sydney, Galloway began his coaching career at the high school level. He was an assistant coach at West Linn (Ore.) High School for three years, helping the team to two state finals and the 2000 Oregon High School Lacrosse League championship. Meanwhile, he spent three years in the contract surety bond business before earning a master's in education from Lewis & Clark College in 2001.

Galloway played for Portland Brewing LC while in Oregon, helping to lead his team to two league titles and a 33-3 record, earning co-team MVP honors for his play at the goalie position during Portland's second championship run.

He is familiar with Susquehanna, as his brother Alexander '90 and sister Meghan '92 earned degrees in finance and psychology, respectively, from SU



A.G. "Terry" Shaffer '61



A Career of Global Service A t 25, A.G. "Terry" Shaffer '61 had already reached a crossroads in his career. He was an English and history teacher at Danville High School. He liked teaching, but always felt he would continue in education until a career he would be more passionate about came along. When an opportunity arose with an organization dedicated to serving children and young adults, Shaffer joined Kiwanis International and was able to apply his passion to his profession. Over his 35-year career, he has served in a number of leadership roles and traveled the world for the organization that has over 8,000 clubs in 90 countries.

After joining the organization full tune, he was promoted in 1969 to the director of club service. Over his career, he has served as club secretary, division and district chair, and president of three different Key Clubs. He has been named Kiwanian of the Year three tunes. In 1994 Shaffer was appointed executive director of Kiwanis International, the position from which he will retire this fall. His service with Kiwanis will continue, as he was elected the 2004-05 lieutenant governor of the Kiwanis' Indy Metro Division of Indiana, and has agreed to serve as an archivist for the organization.

On behalf of Kiwanis, Shaffer has traveled to 29 countries including Malaysia, India, Pakistan and the Philippines. Some visits were made as part of Kiwanis' first worldwide service project. In the mid-'90s Kiwanis joined forces with UNICEF to battle iodine deficiency disorder, an epidemic effecting children in lesser developed countries. Shaffer

explains his commitment to this endeavor. "The Kiwanis community is not found just in our backyard. Our clubs are absolutely devoted to meeting the needs of our local communities, but a slice of our efforts has to be beyond that." The project raised \$75 million dollars and Kiwanis continues to work with UNICEF to monitor the project and encourage continued funding.

Former Susquehanna women's basketball coach and SU hall of famer, **Thomas Diehl** is a fellow Kiwanian. He says "Terry is a dynamic individual who wears many hats but gets results. The key to his success is his ability to relate to individuals and have a sincere interest in many people's hves. He is never too busy for a friend and many people throughout the world can say the same thing."

Shaffer lives in Indianapolis, Ind. with his wife, Nancy, who had worked as a production assistant for Kiwanis Magazine. Currently, his work with the local and district Kiwanis is largely devoted to Riley Children's Hospital, a member of the Children's Miracle Network. Shaffer is also a volunteer for the Salvation Army and Cystic Fibrosis.

Remember This Titan

magine watching a Hollywood film where real events from your high school years, including a high school romance, are suddenly retold as a nationwide story. It happened to Nancy Musser '76 Cody, with the 2000 release of the Walt Disney production "Remember the Titans," the story of a town torn apart by racial segregation but united by an undefeated football team.

Cody, the widow of Bill Cody '72 and mother of twins including recent voice major grad Allison '04, has no problem remembering the year 1971 as a "Titan" at Alexandria, Virginia's, racially integrated T.C. Williams High School. She was a cheerleader and girlfriend to football standout Gary Bertier, the film's main character.

Depicted as the fictional "Emma" in the Disney film, Cody says she was not racist despite how the movie portrays Bertier's girlfriend. The film also took liberties with chronology, timing such things as their breakup and Bertier's devastating auto accident for dramatic impact, she says. But Cody was not fazed by Hollywood's decisions to alter her character or the plot.

'I understand why they made it look like a struggle in the football game," she said. "We were a powerhouse and shut out a lot of teams."

Looking at old notes from her high school boyfriend and reflecting back on Bertier's crippling injuries, it is hard for Cody to not get choked up. "It was a rough time. My dad had just died from a heart attack in July, and then Gary's accident was in December.'

Bertier, an All-American linebacker who had received numerous awards for his football prowess, eventually went on to participate in the Paralympics, earning a gold medal in the shot put at the wheelchair games. In 1981, 10 years after his first accident, he was killed in a crash caused by a drunk driver.

Cody, meanwhile, had graduated from Susquehanna, married in 1977, and for the next five years taught history at Middleburg High School, where she also served as head cheerleading coach and student council advisor. She currently works as a department manager for Bon-Ton in the Susquehanna Valley Mall.

Cody was thrilled to be one of 71 original Titans who were invited to attend the "Remember the Titans" premiere at Uptown Theater in Washington, D.C., on Sept. 26, 2000. Guests included former President Bill Clinton and Denzel Washington, the star of the film.

For Cody, it was a welcome chance to relive her high school years. "Every high school has a story to tell," she says, "and to think they picked my high school is amazing."

The Write Formula

IT DOESN'T TAKE LONG FOR AN ASPIRING CREATIVE WRITER TO LEARN THAT THE CRAFT IS, IN FACT, A SCIENCE OF SORTS.

It produces an alchemic combination that generates passion and creativity. And in the case of The Writers' Institute at Susquehanna University, that formula has produced gold.

Founded in 1993, the institute was initially intended to give students more creative writing opportunities and better draw on the talents of **Gary Fincke**, director of The Writers' Institute and professor of English and creative writing. At the time, he was teaching the sole creative writing course offered on campus. It would be another three years before a major was established in the subject. In the fall of 1990, the creative writing program had nine majors. Last year, it had grown to 64. And this fall, more than 70 students are expected to enroll in the program.

"I would have never guessed we could pump this thing up like this," Fincke said

The "we" Funcke refers to includes the other two creative forces that have helped shape the program's success – **Tom Bailey**, associate professor of English and creative writing, and **Karen Holmberg**, assistant professor of English and cre-

ative writing, Bailey joined the faculty in 1999, Holmberg in 2001 They came with credentials from such prestigious creative writing programs as the University of Iowa (Bailey) and the University of Missouri (Holmberg). Prior to accepting Susquehanna's Winifred and Gustave Weber Professorship in the Humantites, a designation he held until the fall of 2002, Bailey taught in the Expository Writing Program at Harvard University. With schools such as those attached to faculty curriculum vitaes, the program was bound to get noticed.

"When Tom came in there were 22 majors, and 1 remember sitting on my back porch telling him that if this works really well maybe

we can have 30 majors. He didn't want to hear that. A year later, we doubled the enrollment. We went from 22 to 42 majors and had to add another faculty member," Fincke said. "It's partly because Tom is such an evangelist for writing," he added.

However, the trio has done more than preach about the program. They've molded it into an extraordinary learning experience that combines rigorous writing workshops, critical reading in literature and student mentoring to produce an increasingly popular major. Last year, the Department of English, which houses The Writers'

Institute, was renamed the Department of English and Creative Writing to reflect the growth of the program and the desire to be identified as having a

vital creative writing program *(see related story, page 16)* Despite the increased interest in the creative writing major, the number of English majors has remained steady as well "Instead of depleting what our colleagues are doing, we've added a whole new kind of student," Fincke said

This new component of the student population also helped propel the institute forward. Student commitment to the program and the craft was responsible for creating a new campus literary journal called *RiverCraft*, and transforming its predecessor, *Sinspuelannia Review*, into one of only three national undergraduate hierary journals. The students' ambition also sparked the creation of *Essay*, a journal devoted entirely to creative nonfriction. In addition, they've continued the 22-year tradition of high school students from across the country. And in each case, intense student involvement has been instrumental to the publication's success.

Holmberg says this level of student involvement is immensely important to an education in creative writing. "There is such a sense of investment and pride in the inagazines. The students do mordinate amounts of completely self-initiated work. The time students pit into these publications is really extraordinary," she said

The students' dedication is an outgrowth of the program's writing workshops: classes marked by m-depth examination of a particular genre, intense writing assignments and critiques, and close facility mentoring These work-

As the institute's first Writer-In-Residence, Boswell spent a week on campus in April 2004, and inspired students in the classroom and in less formal interactions. shops, coupled with the creative collaboration of journal production and numerous opportunities for students, faculty and publishing professionals to discuss their craft in social settings, form the basis of the program. A necessary and inevitable byproduct of this is the family atmosphere that permeates The Writers' Institute.

"It probably begins at that workshop level where there is such trust in the workshop. It's built not just on doing your own thing but on helping each other. These are the cells that build a larger sense of community," Bailey said. "By the time they are seniors," Holmberg adds, "we've mentored them to the point where we're actually very close."

Creative writing major Zachary Macholz '06 says the faculty of The Writers' Institute go out of their way to make students feel welcome from their first day on campus. "During orientation weekend each year, freshman writing majors gather in front of the library under the direction of one or two upperclassman student advisors and walk to Tom's house to eat pizza, listen to *Breaking Beijamin* (the band Fincke's son plays in), and play with Tom's kids and his enormous dog (an English Mastiff)," Macholz says.

Last year, as poetry editor of *RiverCraft*, Macholz was given the opportumty to interview poet Ellen Bryant Voigt, who was on campus as part of the

institute's Visiting Writers Series. "I sat down with her for a little over two hours and asked her about everything from her childhood to her writing to the politics of poetry. Where else does this kind of thing happen but at Susquehanna?" he said.

The Visiting Writers Series is a hallmark of the writing program, bringing acclaimed writers and accomplished editors to campus for classroom visits and public readings. Through the support of the Degenstein Foundation, which in 2002 awarded Susquehanna University a \$500,000 grant establishing the Janet C. Weis Endowment for the Liberal Arts, the institute hosted its first Writer-in-Residence last year. Renowned fiction writer Robert Boswell spent a week on campus working with students.

"These visiting writers that come here are extraordinary, and the students have an unbelievable opportunity not only to hear them in class but to socialize with them, hang out with them, talk with them, just meet them and shake their hands, and again, experience a different sort of mentoring," Bailey said.

The visiting writers also inspire the students, showing them that individuals can succeed in the profession. The faculty do this on a daily basis as well. All are accomplished writers with numerous publishing contracts and prestigious literary awards under their belts.

Fincke is a prolific writer who has successfully published in three genres: fiction, creative nonfiction and poetry. In 2003, he was awarded the Flannery O'Connor Prize for Short Fiction Earlier that year, Fincke received *The Journal* Award for Poetry from Ohio State University Press, and with it, a publishing contract for his collection of poetry, *Writing Letters for the Blind*. It was one of five book deals landed by Fincke received a \$5,000 fellowship for creative nonfiction from the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts.

Bailey's accolades include a Newhouse Award from the John Gardner Foundation and a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship in Fiction. His first novel, *The Lynching of Letitia Johnson*, will be published by Random House in the spring of 2005. In 2003, Etruscan Press published *Crow Man*, his first book of short stories.

Holmberg was the winner of the 1996 Discovery/Nation Award and a two-time recipient of the Academy of American Poets Prize. After she

received the Vassar Miller Prize in 2000, her book of poems, *The Perseids*, was published in 2001.

Despite their success and the close relationship they develop with their students, the faculty never sugar coat the life of a writer. Instead, they exemplify the true nature of the career – patient, diligent and ever-hopeful hard work.

"One thing that stands out to me about The Writers' Institute is the way that the professors cared about their students and valued their potential, yet never coddled them," says **Catherine Pierce '00**, who has since earned a master of fine arts in poetry from Ohio State University and is now enrolled in the doctorate program in creative writing and literature at the University of Missouri.

Nicholas Ripatrazone '03, who is now enrolled in the master's program in fiction writing at Rutgers University, said "At Susquehanna, one learns that writing is work – constant and meticulous revision – but the rewards are tangible and long lasting. The writing faculty's support was constant, their advice precise and well-considered."

The Writers' Institute will soon welcome a new class of writing majors into the fold, and with the new class comes new possibilities. One of these students, **Abigail Martin** of Miss Porter's School in Farmington, Conn., will be aided in her creative endeavors by the first Janet Weis Writers' Institute Scholarship. Given annually to an incoming freshman who demonstrates artistic promise, the scholarship is a four-year renewable award worth a total of \$10,000.

For some students, their interest in writing keeps them in the classroom beyond graduation. Typically, about one-third of the writing majors apply to graduate school, and more than 90 percent of those applicants are accepted to a master's or master of fine arts program, according to Fincke.

But not all graduates of The Writers' Institute choose the path to professional writing. Many become teachers, reporters and editors. In May, the program graduated its first law degree hopeful. **Devon Taylor '04** will attend Rutgers University School of Law in the fall.

"I chose this path rather than going on to further pursue creative writing because during my time at Susquehanna, writing has taught me to examine the world in a very different way. Instead of simply looking at a situation, I've learned to analyze it and see it from many different angles. When I took a few political science and sociology classes, I realized how similar the thinking was, and it was through this that I realized writing was not my greatest passion but rather a very helpful and special vehicle I could use to pursue the study of law,"Taylor said.

The writing faculty believe graduates of the program enter professional life with the fundamentals needed in virtually any job, as well as life itself. "We teach them to read well, think critically and analytically, write well and handle problems creatively. What employer doesn't want that?" Bailey said.

Jennifer Hawbaker '04, who hopes to work in college admissions before going on to graduate school, says, "The program doesn't just develop excellent writers, it develops excellent, functioning members of society."

Along with good writing skills, Hawbaker believes the writing program has given her the confidence and strong work ethic to be successful in any career. "Tom Bailey regularly reminds us that our craft is 10 percent inspiration and 90 percent perspiration. This elbow grease ethic has helped me respond to people who inquire about my future with a writing degree by confidently saying, 'Yes, I'm a writer, and I'm a writer with a promising future,''' she said.

Not Your Parents' English Department

hen Susan Bowers, associate professor and head of the Department of English and Creative Writing at Susquehanna University, came here 20 years ago, she entered a world vastly different than the one she knew in Eugene, Oregon, "the hippy capital of the world," where she grew up. This night and day contrast also is definitive of the department – indeed English academia as a whole – then and now.

Given that the foundations of western literature and its study were based on the interpretations of white males, the discipline has been taught from that perspective throughout most of history, Bowers said. A look at the transformation of Susquehanna's Department of English is a microcosmic examination of the transitions occurring in the field.

"This is not your parents' English department. The faculty were teaching very traditional texts when I came here, but now we're teaching from a much broader perspective," Bowers says.

When Bowers first joined the faculty in 1984, a key goal was simply to balance the sexes in the department. In fact, Bowers helped found the Women's Studies program at Susquehanna and was its coordinator for 10 years. As the decade progressed, the department began hiring faculty from diverse backgrounds. Bowers took the lead in that movement as well. She was one of the founders of the Diversity Studies program and now serves as its coordinator.

Now English students explore everything from Jewish, women's, gay and lesbian literature to slave, Native American and Middle Eastern texts, in addition to more traditional works. "What has changed is, today, we're a department with great attention to diversity. What has always been true is we're a department of very good teachers," Bowers said.

Laurence Roth, associate professor of English and coordinator of the Jewish Studies program, believes the department's transformation is related to the influences of the faculty's teachers. "I'd argue that changes in teaching strategies in our department are a direct result of many of us bringing the teaching strategies of our favorite college professors to SU," Roth said.

"I remember feeling terribly lost in my senior seminar at UC Berkeley when...my professor introduced us to Jacques Lacan's psychoanalytic reading of Edgar Allen Poe's The Purloined Letter," he recalls. "He took me to lunch and talked with me at length about...Lacan's theorizing...he very kindly said to me that it wasn't important that I get Lacan at that moment or even in his class. The point of such abstract knowledge would come home to me when I was ready to assimilate it and when my own thinking about literature had created a need for it – maybe tomorrow, maybe next year, maybe in five years, it didn't matter," Roth said.

"That lunch had a profound impact on my understanding of thinking. Now I see theory as a kind of lever with which to widen our intellectual, artistic and cultural horizons, and teaching as incitement to explore such horizons of the possible," he said.

Drew Hubbell, assistant professor of English, explored such horizons with a group of students in London this summer when Susquehanna expanded programming there to disciplines in addition to business. Hubbell taught his "London Underworld" class there.

"The classroom is the perfect place to think out loud, and often what one person hasn't been able to articulate is taken up by others and given the proper formulation. I find this kind of investigative intellectual work incredi-

bly exciting and satisfying. Every day potentially brings a new discovery – a new line of thought, a new connection, a new interpretation, a new insight into the symbolic movement of our culture," Hubbell said.

The broad hypothesis for Hubbell's "London Underworld" class is that the hterature of 19th-century Londoners both reflects and helps create the moderu notion of humanity. "The real twist for this course is that I taught it in London this summer, so students were able to not only read about London, but also explore the actual places detailed in the literature," he said.

"London Underworld" is an example of how the Department of English has specialized courses to fit the tastes of a variety of students and provide them with specific hterary concentrations. Other such courses include classes on wilderness literature, travel literature and Jewish detective fiction.

In addition, the department offers students editing and publishing opportunities in: *Stance*, a journal featuring freshman writing essays; *Transformations*, featuring their literary critical writing; and *Modern Language Studies*, the academic literary journal produced at Susquehanna which is affiliated with the Northeast Modern Languages Association.

The department also has a very successful creative writing program. *(see related story page 14)* "That program has done so wonderfully. It's really unusual for an undergraduate program, and I credit Gary (Fincke) with the leader-ship for its development," Bowers said.

Despite the changes in the department, the core benefits of an education in English or creative writing remain the same. Simply put, the department epitomizes what an undergraduate liberal arts education is all about.

"An English department is a wonderful place for anyone who wants both the freedom to explore ideas and the challenge of having to express those ideas effectively," says **Catherine Pierce '00**, who is now a Ph.D candidate at the University of Missonri.

"There is rarely a clear right or wrong in English studies," she continued. "This lack of an answer key is alternately frustrating and exhilarating. Ulumately, though, I think what an English professor does hest is ask you to form your own thoughts and opmions, taking into account the wisdom of writers, history, and the faculty and students around you, and then learn how to express those ideas successfully," Pierce said.

It is also a track of study that prepares students for virtually any profession, as demonstrated by paralegal **Julie Maeyer '94 Baker**, of Camp Hill, Pa. Having had no formal training in her profession, she attributes her career success to the skills she learned as an English major at Susquehanna."The working world is looking for people that have solid educational backgrounds and good reading, writing and analytical skills," she said.

Bowers says graduates from the English program have gone into everything from government and business to law and education. "The purpose in a literature course is to teach students to engage all kinds of texts, and everything is a text, so an undergraduate English degree is one of the best degrees to have," she said.



Virtual Entrepreneur

hen Alyssa Andreadis '99 Gregory couldn't find a job she loved in the "real world," she created her own virtual reality, carving out an employment niche in cyberspace. Last November, Gregory left a traditional nine-to-five position to launch avertua, a "virtual assistant" firm that provides clients with a range of services from data entry to web design – all online.

"I was working with a career coach because I couldn't really find a job that was a good fit for me," Gregory says. "She introduced me to the whole idea. It seemed hke a great next step for me." She describes her decision as "really taking a plunge." That plunge was into largely-uncharted seas; according to the International Virtual Assistants Association, "VAs," as virtual assistants are sometimes called, have only been around for a few years.

Gregory, a corporate communications major, credits SU with preparing her for her new career. Along with gaining communication skills in the classroom, she completed work study with the University's Office of Publications, where she developed her expertise in design. In the years since graduation, Gregory had already built up a client base as a part-time freelance web and graphic designer. As a virtual assistant, she provides those services, as well as letter writing and mailing, proposal writing, typing and word processing, data entry and management, and other services that help clients do more without having to add personnel or buy new equipment.

Because the work is done via e-mail, fax, phone and the avertua website (avertua.com), Gregory is able to conduct business from her home in Morristown, N.J., and still haudle clients from all over the country. "I have very few clients who request to meet with me personally," she says, explaining that she contracts with firms based in California, New Mexico and Massachusetts, as well as in her home region.

"One of the biggest challenges with having a business like this is that it's project-based," Gregory notes. With around 30 clients, the result is that work is not always steady. However, Gregory says present business is booming beyond her expectations. "I'm really busy," she says. "In fact, I've even thought of hiring a VA for myself."

SU Alum Scores Stanley Cup

allers to the office of Tampa Bay Lightning general manager **Jay Feaster '84** are serenaded with radio play-by-play announcer Dave Mishkin's call of the final climactic seconds of game seven of the Stanley Cup finals, as the Lightning defeated the Calgary Flames 2-1 to claim the first championship in the franchise's 12-year history.

The victory culminated a dramatic two-year rise from perennial doormat to National Hockey League champions for the franchise and for Feaster, who through a series of shrewd moves and skilled negotiations was able to bring championship hockey to a region that had all but given up on the hopes of the Lightning ever becoming competitive.

When Feaster was named general manager in February, 2002, his first order of business was to heal a growing rift between head coach John Tortorella and Vincent Lecavalier, the Lightning's immensely talented but underachieving center.

Tampa's previous general manager, Rick Dudley, had been asked by Lecavalier's agent to pursue a trade for his client after repeated clashes with the fiery Tortorella during the first half of the 2001–02 season.

The upper management of the Lightning refused to consider trading Lecavalier, who had been the first overall pick in the 1998 draft and was seen as the cornerstone of the franchise, and removed Dudley from his position in favor of Feaster, who shared the opinion that Lecavalier needed to remain on the roster.

"I didn't want to be known as the general manager who traded away Vincent Lecavaher," said Feaster. "I told John and Vinny that wherever we are going, we are going together. Fortunately, both guys took me at my word."

Feaster's other task was to institute stability to an organization that had 54 different players appear in a game during the 1999-2000 season.

"We had to stop the revolving door," he recalled. "The key was to identify the core players and give them a chance to grow together."

When Feaster took over, the Lightning had finished in last place in three of the previous four seasons, and in the other finished ahead of only an expansion team. However, it did not take long for him to sense that the organization had turned the corner toward respectability.

The following season, the Lightning won the Southeast Division title for the first time in team history, a sign of things to come.

Hockey is a sport filled with superstitions, and the Lightning's march to the Stanley Cup was no different for Feaster. From attending practices to picking ont suits, he made sure to follow the same routine that proved successful in the team's most recent win.

"I had a suit that was undefeated through the first three rounds of the playoffs," he noted. "I wore it in game two of the finals, and we won. Then I wore it in game three in Calgary and we lost By game seven it was hard to figure out what to wear."

The Lightning rode a see-saw through the final two rounds of the playoffs, alternating wins and losses for a record 13 straight games before breaking the streak with a victory in game seven of the finals. Alternating between the highs of victories and the lows of losing was frustrating to Feaster.

"You can only appreciate the wins. When we lost game six in Philly (5-4 in overtime after leading with two minutes left) it was devastating," he said. "We were put in a position against Calgary (trailing the series three games to two) where we were fighting for our life every time on the ice."

One moment that epitomized the spirit that the Lightning brought to the ice was in game one of the Eastern Conference finals against Philadelphia, when St. Louis, generously listed at 5-9, 181 pounds, bowled over 6-5, 220-pound Flyers captain Keith Primeau.

"On his knees, Primeau is as big as Marty standing on his skates," Joked Feaster. "That play encapsulated the entire year for us. They played bigger and better than their talent, and it showed the heart that this team has."

As the playoffs progressed, greater demands were placed on Feaster as the national media prowled the locker room on a daily basis, looking for every angle on what led to the success of the Lightning.

"You have to prioritize your time, and take care of the people who have been with you," Feaster said. "Your family, friends and team come first, and you just deal with the rest as best as you can."

Following the Lightning's victory over Calgary in game seven of the finals, the city of Tampa threw a parade in honor of their champions. About 20,000 people attended the festivities which culminated with a rally at the St. Petersburg Times Forum, the home arena of the Lightning.

The championship was the second major professional sports title in less than 18 months for the region, as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers won the Super Bowl in January, 2003 for their first National Football League championship.

"I've had people tell me that the community has never come together like they did for the playoffs," said Feaster. "Our Stanley Cup merchandise has been going off the shelves, and I think we've gained more than just a foothold here."

The joy may be relatively short-lived, however, as the league faces a standoff between management and players over a new collective bargaining agreement. The current agreement expires on September 15, about three weeks before the scheduled start of the regular season.

Many observers believe that the labor impasse is so strong that not only is the start of next season in jeopardy, but the season itself may be in peril of cancellation. For Feaster, however, the work continues.

"It's business as usual around here," he reported.

Except for the fact that his Tampa Bay Lightning are the champions of the NHL.

Blossoming as a Leader

hen Daisy Conduah '06 first arrived for orientation, she was struck by Susquehanna's immense difference from her Manhattan home – the rural area, the friendliness of the students, the bugs.

"It's slower paced, more relaxed. Everybody knows your name, like 'Cheers'," the biology major laughs.

Daisy has not only adjusted to the differences; she has become a leader who impacts her surroundings. The oldest of four, whose parents emigrated from Ghana and is the first of her family to attend college, has a packed schedule.

In addition to her challenging course load, she is the president of the Black Student Union for the second year, a mentor to middle school students, a student advisor, a computer lab monitor, the secretary for Diversity Council and a student representative to the university's board of directors. Sometimes she sleeps, too.

Daisy has always been an involved individual, but her investment in the university has surprised even herself. "I like the person I'm becoming I'm very focused about the things I do on campus and I feel like there are a lot of things I'm working for," Daisy says.

Susquehanna has provided Daisy with many opportunities. Besides her current commitments, she spent a summer conducting research with Assistant Professor of Biology Matt Persons.

"Being here — having challenges — is helping me become a stronger person," she says. In particular, Daisy has already learned "how to deal with people of different backgrounds" and "how to deal with a rigorous course load."

One of Daisy's unique experiences will be acting as student liaison to the board of directors. In this position, she will interact with business and academic leaders and learn about the workings of the university. Daisy says her role is to offer a student perspective "that can help them better make decisions for the students," as well as to bring back information to the Student Government Association (SGA). She was elected to her position by fellow students in the SGA.

Daisy's leadership has earned her recognition from faculty as well. Associate Professor of Biology Tammy Tobin-Janzen calls her "remarkable," stating that "her most impressive quality is her unstinting willingness to get involved to improve the lives of the people around her."

Dean of Students Tracy Tyree says that "Daisy has blossomed as a leader and role model on campus," and that "we are fortunate to have her as a member of our student body."

Daisy plans to return to city life when she graduates. Het dream is to attend Mount Sinai Medical School and open a free clinic for teens that provides prenatal screening, counseling, check-ups, family planning and classes on drugs and sex education. In the meantime, she says, "By continuing to be a part of these organizations I hope that I can impact others in a positive way to do more than I have done."

Collaborative Research Connects Students ... and Persons

atthew Persons, assistant professor of biology and recipient of the 2004 John C. Horn Distinguished Service Lectureship, freely admits to self-satisfaction in the dynamics of student-faculty research.

"I live my scholarship vicariously through my students. Their success is my success," Persons says.

He calls his student researchers "full collaborators and partners" in his work. "When I see students present papers at meetings, publish an article in a scientific journal or be an ad-hoc reviewer for a scientific journal, I feel some external validation of the communication, writing and critical thinking skills of our students. It feels good to be part of that," he says.

Since joining the Susquehanna University faculty in 1999, Persons has developed a national reputation for his scholarship in the area of animal behavior. His research has been featured in *Natural History* magazine, *BBC Wildlife* magazine, National Public Radio and the syndicated television program "Wild Moments with Jack Hubley." He serves as an ad hoc reviewer and has written for such academic publications as *Animal Behavior*, the *Journal of Arachnology* and the *Journal of Insect Behavior*. His research on the chemically -mediated predator-prey interactions in wolf spiders is supported by a \$250,000 grant from the National Science Foundation.

Biology major Ryan Bell '05 is one of the students who works with Persons in the research lab. "Not only have I been able to do research on three separate projects, but I have also had the chance to present my research. I have presented at four different conferences and won an award for my poster at the meeting of the American Arachnological Society," Bell said.

"The benefits of working with Dr. Persons these past three years are more numerous than I can detail," he continued, "but I know that were I to have gone elsewhere I would not have had this sort of an opportunity to work so closely with such an incredible researchet, academic and person."

Terry Winegar, dean of the School of Natural and Social Sciences, echoes Bell's description of Persons, calling him a "gifted and energetic researcher."

"Like much of the scholarship at SU, Matt's work is most often conducted with undergraduate students. These research experiences, along with his successes in the classroom, provide significant and meaningful experiences for our students in their preparation as scientists and citizens," Winegar says.

Linda McMillin, provost and professor of history, says she admires Persons' intellectual engagement and curiosity. "I love having lunch with him. We always find some big philosophical, scientific questions to talk about. Who knew there were so many crossroads between spidets and medieval history?" she says.

The Horn lectureship memorializes John C. Horn who served as chair of the university's board of directors from 1962 to 1978. Each year, the award recognizes a faculty member for outstanding scholarship and conscientious service to the university. As recipient of the award, Persons will offer a public lecture during the spring semester.



Hitting a High Note



hile most other children were trying to wriggle out of practicing piano, Martha Fuchs '06 was always eager to tickle the ivories. "I loved it," she says, explaining that musical talent goes back at least three generations in her family. "I've been singing since I was pretty young, too."

Later, when Martha was a student at Hempfield High School, near Lancaster, Pa., she began searching for a university that would help her take her varied talents to the next level. Susquehanna seemed like the natural choice. "One of the things I loved about SU was that you could do both vocals and instrumentals," says Martha, explaining that many schools do not encourage such diversification. "That was a real perk."

Today, Martha, an alto whose instrurnent of choice is the oboe, is a music education major. She is also extremely active, serving as secretary of the Collegiate Music Educators National Conference, and as a member of the professional music fraternity for women Sigma Alpha Iota, the band, orchestra, choir, chamber singers and woodwind quintet — as well as a student of voice, in her rare spare time.

"That keeps me pretty busy," admits Martha, adding that music students are also required to perform in and attend frequent student and faculty recitals. As a result, she says, "As far as the music department goes, it feels like family. We're all pretty close."

Martha credits Susquehanna with helping to hone her talents and build her leadership skills. While Martha recalls being "really, really shy" as a first-year student, she gained self-assurance from interactions with students and faculty and by getting involved in campus activities that gave her "a million more responsibilities than I was used to having." Now, "I'm more independent, more assertive and have more confidence," she says.

By faculty measures, Martha, a junior, has already hit a high note. Professor of Music Susan Hegberg recognizes her as very strong in her academic courses and a "versatile and talented musician." Gail Levinsky, assistant professor of music and Martha's advisor, agrees she is "the type of student who has what we look for. She's intelligent, creative, responsible, and has a passion for learning."

Inspired by some of her teachers who served as "wonderful role models," Martha's goal as an educator is "to be someone students can look up to not only as a teacher, but as a person."

"I have always loved working with children, and for me to be able to work with others while teaching them about the thing which I most love truly excites me," she says.

Martha is still undecided about whether she'll begin her career upon graduating, or first attend graduate school. When she does start working, she says: "I'd like to teach either high school or middle school music, and I'd like to have a private oboe studio as well. But there are so many directions I could go — the possibilities are endless. I know I will have the confidence to do whatever I am called to do."

Going the Distance for Students

hen asked what drives her to be so involved as a member of the Susquehanna faculty, Assistant Professor of Political Science Michele DeMary sighs and says "Well, my husband lives 400 miles away so what else am I going to do?"

Then she laughs affably. While it's true that she and her husband, Lee Fortier, an attorney in Massachusetts, maintain a long-distance relationship during the academic year, she is quick to acknowledge that the energy and activity that consume her life in Selinsgrove make the days between visits go by very quickly.

"I truly enjoy the SU community. Students, faculty and staff are all a pleasure to work with, and I learn new things each day from those around me."

DeMary joined the Susquehanna University faculty in 2000, replacing the late and legendary Gene Urey, who taught in the political science department from 1964-1999 and helped prepare many SU students for law school and ultimately law-related careers. DeMary preserves her predecessor's legacy of excellence by administering the Gene Urey Memorial Scholarship Competition, which recognizes outstanding students in constitutional law.

In addition, DeMary, who earned her Ph.D. from the University of Massachusetts, is the prelaw advisor, coordinator of the Legal Studies Program and director of the Arlin M. Adams Center for Law and Society. The center was established in 2001 in honor of prominent Philadelphia jurist Arlin M. Adams by the family of Sigfried and Janet Weis and the Degenstein Foundation of Sunbury, with support from The Annenberg Foundation. The center brings renowned speakers to campus for engaging dialogues on current legal topics.

According to Terry Winegar, dean of the School of Natural and Social Sciences, "Michele is a truly outstanding teacher at a university that prides itself on its excellent teaching."

Linda McMillin, provost and professor of history, shares admiration for DeMary. "She draws students in and helps them see the connections between politics and their daily lives. She models the importance of civic engagement. And she is a lot of fun. She sees the absurdity of life and can laugh at herself," McMillin says.

DeMary is currently researching three different academic papers, and overseeing the educational paths of 26 academic advisees, more than a dozen seniors interested in attending law school, three senior thesis projects, two independent studies and one sophomore honors essay.

This deep portfolio of work brought DeMary recognition as the 2004 recipient of the University Teaching Award. The award is determined by nominations from the faculty and Student Government Association. Nominations are then reviewed by the Faculty Personnel Committee, which submits award recommendations to university Presidenr L. Jay Lemons.

Malcolm Derk '05, a political science major and president of the Student Government Association, says: "Dr. DeMary truly knows het students and her teaching shows it. She takes time for students and shows her dedication at every level. Her knowledge, accessibility, passion for teaching and friendship exemplify distinguished teaching at Susquehanna."

While she appreciates the individual recognition, DeMary points to the broader involvement that she and all faculty members at Susquehanna have in shaping and changing students' lives.

"I feel part of a team that is doing important work," she says.

And that helps make the miles go by pretty quickly.

Competing with Confidence



Ozlanksi '05 was sure he'd attend college in a big city. When he received recruitment lettets from Susquehanna, "I just pitched them. Because of the location, I just wasn't interested at all," he recalls with a smile.

The first-generation college student likes to tell the story of how he came to Susquehanna. He did evaluate several metropolitan colleges. Then, almost on a whim, Michael and parents made the 45-minute drive from his home in Mount Carmel, Pa., to Selinsgrove for a business in-action day, then an admissions open house. "We had this shockingly good feeling about the place... it turned out that Susquehanna was the only place I applied to, and it really is a fantastic fit," he says.

As a first-year student at Susquehanna, Michael was interested in joining a student organization that combined service projects with a regional or national competition. He refused to be deterred by the fact that no such club existed on campus. With the support of the Sigmund Weis School of Business Dean James Brock, Michael and two other students founded Susquehanna's Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) team.

Visiting Instructor of Management Steve Wilkerson signed on as faculty advisor and Michael was elected president. In its inaugural year, the team educated members of the community about market economics, personal finance and entrepreneurship, and at the same time conducted traditional service projects such as a community center fundraiser and a campus -wide food drive.

At SIFE competitions, the group's efforts garnered several recognitions on the regional and national levels, including "Rookie of the Year" honors at the national contest in Kansas City, Mo. "Michael's leadership was largely responsible for the SIFE team's amazing performances," Brock said.

In turn, Michael is quick to acknowledge the dean's support, and recognizes Wilkerson's selfless devotion in making "tremendous contributions" to the team's success.

Michael, who also serves as president of the university's Accounting Club, is an accomplished trumpet player. He finds the time to perform in the symphonic band and offers music lessons to students in the music preparatory program.

At Susquehanna, Michael recognizes the opportunity to "constantly learn and constantly push yourself." In recognition of his academic achievement, Michael received a \$1,000 scholarship this year from the Beta Gamma Sigma business honor society, of which he is a member.

While many seniors are sending out resumés and preparing grad school applications, Michael is doing neither. After a summer 2004 intetnship with PriceWaterhouseCoopers, he received and accepted — an offer of full-time employment upon graduation. Michael will be working with the assurance practice at the firm's Philadelphia office.

The internship also allowed Michael to measure his career readiness and reinforce the value of his Susquehanna education. When he found himself working with students from schools such as Villanova, Saint Joseph's and Notre Dame, "I was initially slightly intimidated by my peers because of the universities that they attended," he admits. "However, once I had the opportunity to work with them, I learned that ... many times I had the intellectual advantage over them," he says.

Following Hurricane Ivan-induced floods on the Isle of Que and in other areas around Selinsgrove this fall, the student organization Arts Alive took the initiative to run the Red Cross's victim relief tent and helped residents remove debris and recover from the disaster. Other campus organizations joined the effort.

As Hubbell said, such service opportunities give students "an opportunity to make a difference in their community, and apply some of the skills they learn in the classroom for a noble cause."

Membership of the Sports Hall of Fame will increase to 159 as six former studentathletes and two longtime coaches are inducted at halftime of the Crusaders' men's basketball game against Lebanon Valley on Sat., Feb. 5, 2005. This year's inductees are:

Bob Shaara '85 (baseball/football) led the Middle Atlantic Conference in rushing as a senior with 787 yards on 133 carries with seven touchdowns and shared MAC Player of the Year honors. He ranks 11th in school history with 1,648 yards and 16 touchdowns. Shaara was a career .322 hitter in baseball with 26 steals and 63 runs. He resides in Riverton, N.I.


Chris Labrecque '88 (wrestling) capped a senior season in which he went 25-4 by placing sixth at 167 pounds at the 1988 NCAA Division III championships to earn All-America honors. Labrecque won the MAC title at 167 pounds that year, becoming the only Crusader to earn Most Outstanding Wrestler honors. He resides in Oceanport, N.J.

Keith Henry '91 (football) was a consensus All-American as a senior after setting school records with 35 tackles for loss and 14 sacks. As a junior, Henry made 55 tackles and eight sacks to earn third-team Football Gazette AllAmerica honors. Henry finished with 171 tackles and a school-record 25 sacks, and was first-team All-MAC as both a junior and a senior. Henry resides in Perkasie, Pa.

Will Ciecierski '91 (men's basketball) was a three-time MAC Northern Division All-Star and league MVP in 1988-89 after averaging 13.4 points per game. For his career, Ciecierski scored 1,206 points to rank 13th on the career list and ranks fifth with 134 threepointers and 275 assists. Ciecierski resides in Dothan, Ala.

Tracey Corrigan '95 (field hockey) was a two-time All-Commonwealth selection and set what were career records for goals (41) and points (93). As a junior, she scored a then school-record 15 goals as the Crusaders went to the NCAA Division III playoffs, and followed up with 13 goals as a senior. She was the team's Best Offensive Player award winner as a junior and a senior. Corrigan resides in Sunnvvale, Calif.

Kristen Venne '99 Marcinko (women's basketball) was a three-time All-American and the 1999 Jostens Trophy winner as the Division III player of the year, when she was a first-team Academic All-American and a Kodak Division III All-American after averaging 21.4 points and 9.4 rebounds per game. Venne was named All-Conference four



Jim Taylor (men's track and field coach) led the Crusaders to 11 MAC championships and coached 32 All-Americans and seven national champions during his 26 seasons (1979-2004). In 1982, the Crusaders won their first MAC title since 1971 to begin a streak of five straight conference titles. Susquehanna added conference crowns in 1988, 1994, 1995, 1997, 1998 and 2003. Taylor resides in Selinsgrove.

Connie Harnum (field hockey/ women's tennis coach) served as field hockey coach for 27 seasons from 1974 through 2002 and compiled a 195-159-23 record, leading the Crusaders to three NCAA appearances while coaching no fewer than 32 firstteam All-Conference players. Harnum was women's tennis coach from 1975-91 with a 95-51-1 record, winning the MAC championship in 1979 and the MAC Northern Division in 1988. She resides in Selinsgrove. - Jim Miller

Enrollment Growth Trend Continues

Susquehanna began the 2004-2005 academic year celebrating 10 years of record-breaking enrollment. Full-time enrollment stands at 1,930 students. In August, 534 first-year students came to campus along with 23 transfer students for a total of 557 new students. The Class of 2008 was selected from the largest applicant pool in the university's history. Nearly 60 percent of the firstyear students were in the top one-fifth of their high school classes. The new class represents 19 states and three other countries - Bolivia, China and Nepal. About 7.5 percent of the new students describe themselves as being part of an ethnic minority group.

Strategic Planning Moves Ahead

Susquehanna University's new strategic plan, approved by the board of directors at its November 2003 meeting, focuses institutional efforts and resources on a set of initiatives that will enhance the student experience and strengthen the university. The plan builds on priorities generated by a comprehensive self-study required for the ten-year re-accreditation by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. The Middle States team visit in spring 2004 resulted in a highly positive report that commends the overall strategic goals of achieving greater intellectual engagement and a stronger Susquehanna University community. Working groups of faculty, staff and students are leading campus involvement in achieving the plan's 12 initiatives. pus taping of National Public Radio's award-winning program Justice Talking. Hosted by veteran NPR correspondent Margot Adler, the program explored the issue of academic freedom during a fast-paced hour of debate, interspersed with questions from the campus audience. In the spring, the Adams Center presented its third annual lecture, featuring Pulitzer Prize winner and former New York Times columnist Anthony Lewis and retired Maj. Gen. Michael J. Nardotti Jr. The guest speakers engaged in a dialogue on balancing civil liberties and national security, which was moderated by Gary S. Gilden, professor of law at The Penn State Dickinson School of Law.

Distinguished Guests

Susquehanna welcomed a host of additional distinguished guests to campus during the 2003-2004 academic year who enriched the teaching and learning environment. Among them were former Secretary of the Interior and Arizona Governor Bruce Babbitt, David Lamb, author of the ground-

breaking novel Do Platanos Go Wit' Collard Greens?, and Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow Marcia Grant, founder of the first private women's college in Saudi Arabia. Martin Marty, Fairfax M. Cone distinguished service professor emeritus at the University of Chicago Divinity School, presented the annual Alice Pope Shade Lecture, and novelist Robert Boswell was The Writers' Institute's first Writer-in-Residence. David Levy. renowned astronomer and science editor of Parade magazine, presented the inaugural Distinguished Lecture in Science. The new Edward S. and A. Rita Schmidt Lectureship in Ethics, established by Edward R. Schmidt '69 in honor of his parents, brought to Susquehanna Jeffrey B. Van Duzer, dean and associate professor of business law and ethics at Seattle Pacific University's School of Business and Economics. Aerospace engineer Donna L. Quality and Value Recognized

Susquehanna continues to receive positive recognition in numerous guidebooks to selective colleges. The guides provide information in such areas as academic reputation, student retention, student selectivity, faculty-student interaction, quality of campus life, and alumni giving. For example, The Yale Daily News' Insider's Guide to the Colleges cites the university's "close-knit atmosphere" and small classes, Peterson's Competitive Colleges recognizes how faculty are "highly engaged in student learning," and Barron's Best Buys in College Education praises student volunteer programs and required career planning. Susquehanna also appears in the Fiske Guide to Colleges, Princeton Review's The Best 357 Colleges, and U.S. News & World Report's "America's Best Colleges" guide. The university is one of about 150 institutions selected for inclusion in the new Colleges of Distinction website and upcoming book.

Senior Scholarship Celebrated

The deadly mating rituals of female spiders, evolution amid the Centralia mine fires, the surface of Mercury, motivating students to read, Supreme Court influence on the freedom of choice and President Bush's intentions in the Taiwan Strait were among the topics discussed at Senior Scholars Day in April. The day continued a nearly 28year tradition in which students present the findings of their research to the campus community. Sixty-three seniors from various disciplines participated in this student-centered event. Thirtyeight presented research posters and an additional 25 students made oral presentations. Senior Scholars Day also honors those faculty mentors whose guidance and assistance were invaluable to the students' work.



Service Learning

About 60 percent of the student body, or 1,100 students, volunteered 48,322 hours of community service. According to calculations used by the Independent Sector, an organization supporting the non-profit community, these contributions equaled \$775,568. SU's Center for Service Learning and Volunteer Programs coordinates assistance to more than 30 charitable and civic organizations in the region. The upstart organization, Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE), also served the community through business projects aimed at improving the lives of community members. In addition to being named regional champions, the group won the Rookie of the Year Award at the 2004 SIFE USA National Exposition in Kansas City, Mo.

Global Campus

Last year 200 students participated in for-credit study abroad programs in 13 countries, including Australia, China, Costa Rica, Germany, India, Italy, South Africa, Spain, and Trinidad and Tobago. This number is a significant increase from the 112 students who studied abroad in 2002-2003. Another 30 students participated in a non-credit study trip to the Czech Republic, Poland and Germany over spring break. In addition, summer 2004 marked the first year in which students could study in London through the Office of Continuing Education. In January, several students spent a portion of their winter break helping the needy in Nicaragua and Costa Rica through the Susquehanna University Central America Service Adventure (SU CASA).

Susquehanna Hosts Women's Studies Conference

Scholars and professionals from four states converged on Susquehanna last spring for the Mid-Atlantic Women's Studies Association 2004 Annual Conference. Titled "Women in Rural Communities: Maintaining Activism, Cultivating New Experiences, Advancing Scholarship," the conference presented panel discussions related to women's studies teaching, research, health care and the experiences of rural women. Sponsored in part through generosity of Geisinger Health System and Sunbury (Pa.) Community Hospital, the conference featured a keynote address by Visiting Scholar Mary Catherine Bateson, a visiting professor at Harvard Graduate School of Education and professor emerita at George Mason University.

Successful Outcomes

Despite challenging economic conditions 92 percent of graduates from the Class of 2003 reported being employed or entolled in graduate school within six months of graduation, according to the Center for Career Services annual survey. In preparation for future career or academic endeavors, 220 students — 42 seniors. 146 juniors, 27 sophomores and five freshmen — participated in internships. This represents a 22 percent increase over the previous year.

Arts Abound

The arts flourished at Susquehanna last year with numerous student and faculty performances and presentations. The 2003-2004 Artist Series featured the Ahn Trio, the Lily Cai Chinese Dance Company, Kronos Quartet, the Bonnie Rideout Scottish Trio with The City of Washington Pipe Band, and Shakespeare's Othello, performed by the Aquila Theatre Company of London. Rolling Stones trombonist Michael Davis performed at the seventh annual Fall Festival O'Bones. A symposium and concert featuring the seldom-heard Hollywood Songbook by composer Hanns Eisler, with text from poet and dramatist Bertolt Brecht, was another highlight of the year. Exhibitions at the Lore Degenstein Gallery included paintings by Robert Henri and his contemporaries, painting and sculpture

Enhancing E-Communications

The university website continues to serve as a vital communications tool as evidenced by an increase of nearly 45,000 "unique visitors" over the previous year, a seven percent increase. The number of page views increased by 3.4 million, or 24 percent. A new virtual tour, which provides a visual introduction to life at Susquehanna, received the CampusTours.com 4-star Virtual College Tour award, joining a select group of colleges and universities that have received this national award. Susquehanna alumni have responded enrhusiastically to their new online community, which now brings together more than 4,000 members. Other investments in information technology included substantial upgrades to the library's wireless network capabilities and the addition of six "smart" classrooms, bringing the total to 30.

A Fine Year for Athletics Susquehanna athletics programs enjoyed continued success in 2003-04. The men's golf team won its 10th consecutive Middle Atlantic Conference championship, while four athletes earned All-American honors during 2003-04, led by football standout Mark Bartosic '04 who was a unanimous All-American after breaking the MAC record for career catches, yards and touchdowns and becoming the first player in NCAA football history with four consecutive seasons of at least 1,000 yards receiving. In April, Bartosic signed a contract with the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League. Freshman Emily Lepley '07 finished sixth in the 100-meter hurdles at the NCAA Division III Outdoor Track and Field championships to earn All-America honors, while senior Ryan Gleason '04 became Susquehanna's second All-American in cross country after finishing 19th at the NCAA championships. Senior Bob Haile '04 was named to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America third team in baseball after graduating with a gradepoint average of over 3.75 as an accounting major. In all, Susquehanna placed 118 scholar-athletes on the MAC All-Academic team during 2003-04.

2004—A Year of Achievements

The year ending June 30, 2004 was one of significant milestones for Susquehanna University. Continued commitments — both financially and through volunteerism among alumni, parents and friends have helped Susquehanna reach several historic achievements, further strengthening the campus community.

More than 5,300 donors contributed a total of \$8,160,867, a 53 percent increase over last year. This amount includes \$2.3 million to the Susquehanna University Fund (SUF), the highest total ever recorded. The Business & Industry Campaign, with leadership provided by Chairman Roger Haddon Jr. and Vice Chairman Tim Apple, aided in the success of the SUF by raising nearly \$170,000 — including an anonymous \$25,000 challenge grant — breaking its own previous record. Other special projects contributing to the success of the SUF were \$15,000 raised in honor of retiring track coach Jim Taylor for the purchase of an electronic scoreboard, and nearly \$10,000 from biology alumni to fund summer student research at Susquehanna.

For the first time in five years, alumni participation in the SUF reached 30 percent, with 3,770 alumni providing support. Participation in the annual fund from graduates of the last decade continues to increase, with 24 percent contributing during the fiscal year. In fact, 75 percent of the Class of 2004 made commitments to the SUF through the Senior Challenge, also a record high.

Among the year's highlights:

- > A gift from The Charles Foundation of Morristown, N.J., to strengthen the Christopher D. Rooke '82 Scholarship Endowment for communications majors. Established in 2001, the fund honors the memory of Christopher D. Rooke '82.
- > A grant from the Merck Company Foundation of Whitehouse Station, N.J., funded the purchase of sophisticated instrumentation and equipment for Science in Motion, an educational outreach program for high schools in the Central Susquehanna Valley.
- > Funds from the Reverend Paul B. Lucas Library Endowment, the Gertrude V. Walker '27 Library Endowment and the Susquehanna University Parents Association supported renovations to the Blough-Weis Library. The \$100,000 project transformed a portion of the library's lower level into a multimedia facility offering state-of-the-art equipment for research and learning.

In addition to their generous philanthropy, Susquehanna's alumni continue to uphold the university's mission of achievement, leadership and service. This year we honored seven alumni with the Alumni Association's highest awards for each category. They are Jay Feaster '84 for his achievement in professional sports management as the general manager of the 2004 Stanley Cup champion Tampa Bay Lightning; Gary Baylor '69, for his achievement in growing the Country Cupboard into one of the largest businesses in the Susquehanna Valley; Ralph Purpur '66, for his leadership in the audit profession with Esteé Lauder; Rebecca Shade '54 Mignot and Richard Spotts '68 for outstanding service to both Susquehanna and their communities; and Geoffrey '91 and Tammy Frailey '92 Shearer, who received the young alumni award for their achievements in business, leadership and service to the community.

The Alumni Association Executive Board, under the leadership of President Meg Finley '85 Flournoy, created a new Susquehanna tradition with the addition of Career Day last winter. Forty alumni volunteers returned to campus on February 7, to speak with students about their educations and subsequent career paths. More than 175 students attended the keynote address and various other workshops throughout the day.

Reaching out to our alumni and parent communities is becoming easier with more people engaged in electronic communication. On June 30, the Alumni Association registered the 4,000th user to its online community. Having launched in 2002, the online community, located at www.sualum.com, has a whole new look with an updated home page. Alumni and current parents are kept informed on the latest Susquehanna news via the electronic newsletter, which is e-mailed every few months.

We extend our sincere thanks to the many alumni, parents and friends whose generosity made the 2003-04 year a remarkable one. It is a privilege to list their names on the following pages.

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Faculty Highlights



Provost and Dean of the Faculty Linda McMillin

The board of directors of Susquehanna University approved the appointment of Linda McMillin as provost and dean of the faculty in February 2004, following a national search and upon the recommendation of university President L. Jay Lemons. McMillin, who holds the Ph.D. in history from the University of California, Los Angeles, has taught at Susquehanna University since 1989 when she joined the Department of History as an assistant professor. In 1996 she received tenure and was promoted to associate professor, and in 2002, she became a full professor of history. She has held the position of department head twice. and directed Susquehanna University's Honors Program for two years. McMillin has been honored with numerous awards and fellowships, including National Endowment for the Humanities grants and a Fulbright-Hays Fellowship/Spanish Government Grant. She was the recipient of an American Council on Education Fellowship from 2000 to 2001. As provost and dean of the faculty, McMillin plays a central role in faculty recruitment, development and evaluation. She provides intellectual leadership for the academic program and student learning, and is responsible for the university's three schools, as well as interdisciplinary, student life, community outreach and academic support programs.

Visiting Instructor of Management Steve Wilkerson was honored by the Susquehanna University Student Government Association (SGA) with the 2004 Dorothy Anderson SGA Faculty of the Year Award. The award recognizes a faculty member with at least three years of service who has provided distinguished service through instructional excellence, community involvement, and outstanding teaching, both in and out of the classroom. He teaches business statistics in the Sigmund Weis School of Business and is advisor to the new, award-winning student group Students in Free Enterprise. The Student Government Association established the award in honor of Dean of Student Life Emeritus Dorothy Anderson '62 for her distinguished service to Susquehanna University. Anderson served as the Student Government Association Senate advisor from 1967 to 2002.

James Brock, dean of the Sigmund Weis School of Business, presented "Developing Study Abroad Programs: Small School Successes and Challenges" at the AACSB International—The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business—annual Deans' Conference in Newport Beach, Calif., February 2004. His presentation focused on the school's London Program and its growth in recent years to the point where currently more than 50 percent of Susquehanna business majors spend at least one semester studying abroad. Paul Dion, associate professor of management, along with Shruti Gupta, assistant professor of management, presented papers at the American Marketing Association Summer Marketing Educators' conference in Boston, Mass., August 2004. Dion delivered the paper "Relationship Commitment Determinants in B2B Services: The Situational Influence of Buyer Dependency" and Gupta presented "The Strategic Role of Corporate Social Responsibility in Generating Customer Loyalty and Brand Trial" at the conference. 

Class Notes

The Bench Marks Her Success

For recently appointed Judge Kate McCarty '76 Morrow, the daily donning of her judicial robes is a transformative experience, as though she is literally cloaking herself in responsibility.

"You feel the difference," says Morrow, 50, who sits on the bench of Pennsylvania's 41st Judicial District Court of Common Pleas, which covers rural Perry and Juniata counties.

Tapped by opposition-party-Governor Edward Rendell to replace a retiring president judge, Morrow — the first female judge to preside in the two counties — was sworn in July 8, 2004, and at work in the courthouse the next day.

Several months into her tenure — she will run for election in 2005 — Morrow "absolutely loves" the job. Because the counties are too small to support specialized courts, she hears a variety of cases, including criminal and civil, and jury and non-jury. "It's always something different," she says. "No day is the same."

Law school, Morrow notes, was not something she considered during her time at SU, where she majored in sociology with an emphasis on economics. Upon graduation, she worked as an admissions counselor at Albright College in Reading, Pa., before attending law school at Tulane University in New Orleans.

Her initial interest was in family law."I wanted to use my sociology with a humanservices-type law degree." However, Morrow was also drawn to maritime law and spent the first seven years of her career with an admiralty law firm in Houston.

In 1989, husband Lewis '77— a second-generation Susquehanna alum, himself decided to shift his own career from geology to farming, and the family re-settled in Perry County. Morrow began a solo private practice, a dramatic change for the former big-city lawyer. "There were 50 lawyers in my old firm," she says. "That was considered small for Houston."

The type of law she practiced changed, too. "I pretty much had to do everything," she says, "Estate planning, real estate law, representing municipalities..." The switch also gave Morrow a chance to focus on child advocacy, an interest dating back to her study of sociology at SU.

A judgeship, she notes, was not something she dreamed about as a young attorney. But when the opportunity presented itself, she felt ready to make the move. Son **Hunter '08**, was preparing to start his own freshman year at Susquehanna, while children Ben, 15, and Annie, 10, were largely self-sufficient. "The timing was right," Morrow says.

Morrow admits to mixed feelings about running for office next year, but is happy with her new role. "I truly think I can make a difference," she says. And while she does not dwell upon serving as the district's first female judge, she adds, "It's something that I hope my children are proud of me for. It's nice to have a place in history." —Beth Fantaskey Kaszuba
