# TABLE OF FUNDAMENTAL ALLOWANCES. 

## QUARTERMASTER SUPPLIES.


#### Abstract

War Department, Office of the Chief of Staff, Washington, August, 29, 1917.


1. The accompanying Table of Fundamental Allowances, Quartermaster Supplies, superseding the one published in General Orders, No. 39, War Department, 1915, contains a complete alphabetical list of all such supplies prescribed as the equipment for troops in the field, and shows the rate at which the different articles are issued. Therefore, knowing the strength of an organization, or headquarters, in personnel, animals, and vehicles, all of which are factors given in Tables of Organization, the appropriate equipment may be determined. Immediately following the table is a set of General Notes. The equipment designations A, B, and C, appearing in the table, are those prescribed in paragraph 319, Compilation of Orders, War Department, 1881-1915.
2. The word battalion herein is used in the sense of battalion or squadron; and the word company, being intended as a designation for the smallest administrative unit whether statutory or provisional only, is used in the sense of company (except bakery company), troop, or battery, and therefore includes not only such organizations within regiments of infantry, cavalry, and field artillery, and those in mounted engineer battalions, field signal and telegraph battalions, balloon and aero squadrons, but is applicable also to ambulance companies, field hospitals, motor companies, pack companies, and wagon companies.
3. The primary use of the table is in determining the complete field equipment (C) in any instance where there is no prescribed table showing it; but it also serves to show, for example, what equipment to take on a march and what not to take; or, in other words, the articles and quantities thereof that properly belong to equipments A and $B$, respectively. Similarly the equipment appropriate to any change in the strength of a command may be ascertained.
4. To illustrate how to use the table, assume that the strength of an organization, say a company, is known, and that it is desired to determine its complete equipment. Turn to the first page of equipment C, and proceed down the column headed "Company," making
note of the equipment therein prescribed, at the same time adding, in regular order, the amounts, as shown in the "Individual" and the "Animal" columns, corresponding to the strength in men and animals, and similarly for each of the other pages. It will be noted, as clearly shown in the table, that comparatively few articles are issued to officers; the necessary supplies for the care of their mounts, as prescribed in A. R. 1096, and the tentage, fuel, and mineral oil required by officers form a part of the equipment of the organization with which they serve, but the other articles listed as a part of their equipment are sold, but not issued, to them.
5. In every instance where there is a published Equipment Table, Quartermaster Supplies, for any organization, it will govern in the matter of allowances.

In certain instances the full allowances given will be in excess of actual requirements, in which case only such quantities as are actually required will be issued. Where conditions require the issue of allowances in excess of that shown, authority must be obtained from the department commander or commanding general in the field.
The prescription in the foregoing tables to the effect that the allowances of fuel for heating purposes will be fixed by the commanding general (or division commander) contemplates that the organizations are integral parts of a division on the march or in camp. Under other circumstances, the allowances for heating purposes should be fixed by the commanding officer.

If the division is operating in the proximity of the L. of C., or if contact can be maintained by the supply column of the L. of C . with the division, a part or all of the reserve is preferably kept at the advance depot of the $L$. of C . in readiness to be promptly carried forward by the supply column when required. If, on the other hand, the division is to be separated for some considerable period of time from the L. of C., part or all of the reserve must be carried in the supply train with increased reserve supplies if necessary.

Similarly, when conditions arise making such action necessary, the allowances of the "additional camp supplies", listed as "expendable" may be temporarily increased, without reference to the War Department, when specially prescribed by the department commander or commanding general in the field, having due regard in each instance to the interests of the service and existing law; and, in the same manner, the allowances should be decreased when advisable. The authority to increase allowances on approval of a commanding general in the field will, however, be limited to "expendable"' supplies not obtained on contract by the department quartermaster, the approval of the department commander being necessary for temporary increases in allowances of those thus obtained on contract. Whenever action, as above authorized, is taken, the department quartermaster or senior quartermaster on the staff of the commanding general in the field will be informed thereof and will submit a copy of the authority directly to the Quartermaster General.
If articles not prescribed in the Table of Fundamental Allowances are considered necessary, recommendation should be made to the War Department.
Troops serving in Europe are issued certain additional articles upon arrival there, such as jerkins, moccasins, rubber boots, toques, etc.
