



April Adams April 1, 1953 to January 13, 1999



When April Adams started pharmacy school in the fall of 1995, she worried how she would make it over the next four years. April fretted that she would be the oldest person in the class, that she would not "fit in", that she would make no friends, and that she would be unable to balance the rigors of pharmacy school and the demands of her family. Before deciding to return to school, April had spent the last 15 years of her life raising her children, Alissa and Neal. April was also busy with her thriving cake-decorating business, but she longed to do something different-something where she felt she could make a difference in the lives of others. Before having children, April had worked as a computer programmer and systems analyst but she wanted a more personally fulfilling profession, one in which she could have more contact with people, so April decided to become a pharmacist. She and her husband, Barry, felt that her graduation from pharmacy school would be timed perfectly with Alissa's graduation from high school; just in time to help fund her daughter's college education.

It was the Class of 1999's good fortune that April Adams chose pharmacy. But April still had her worries about her choice to return to school. She quickly discovered, however, that these worries were unfounded. First of all and much to her delight, April learned that at 42, she was not the oldest freshman. She also discovered that her combined roles of wife, mother, and pharmacy student were not a hindrance to her success in school or at home, but in fact made her more efficient. But the worries that April most happily cast over her shoulders were those about making friends and fitting in. April had an electric smile and zest for life that everyone was drawn to, from students to professors. In short, April was fun. Whether she was at a happy hour, helping with Fred Lab, on a boat cruise, attending a fraternity function, driving to school with her "car-poolers", handing out some of her famous cupcakes, hosting a party, or just hanging out in the lobby, April was having fun, and so was everyone else around her. Furthermore, April never looked at her circle of friends as being complete and as a result it never stopped expanding throughout her pharmacy school career. While April was officially a member of Rho Chi and AZO, she was an "honorary" member of both Phi Delta Chi and Kappa Psi. She thought nothing of attending "Tex Mex" or the formal dinners of her competing pharmacy school fraternities. To April, these events were just additional opportunities to experience fellowship with her pharmacy school family.

This sense of family was the main reason that April longed to return to pharmacy school for the spring semester of her senior year. She had missed her classmates terribly during her six months of rotations away from school and worried that everyone would go their separate ways and lose touch once they graduated. While, like everyone else in her class, April was anxious to return so that she could finish her coursework and finally graduate after four long years of pharmacy school, April's main reason for wanting to return was to see her classmates together once again as a group. But sadly, April never got to witness her class reunion. April died unexpectedly during the early morning hours of January 13, 1999.

When the Class of 1999 returned for its final semester, April's seat was empty. Our final semester of pharmacy school was not the same. Missing was April's warm smile and magnetic personality. But we knew that she was with us in spirit - to keep us smiling through one more semester, to cheer for us at our graduation, to give us faith during our boards, and to guide us as we embarked on our careers. No one cherished the Class of 1999 more than April Adams and it is to her memory that we dedicate this yearbook.

In Dedication of Dr. Aaron Burstein

aron Burstein, Pharm.D.,

B.C.P.S. joined the School of Pharmacy faculty as an Assistant Professor of Pharmacy Practice and Sciences in 1995 after completing a postdoctoral fellowship at the Millard Fillmore Hospital in Buffalo, New York, a residency in a hospital pharmacy residency at the Moses Cone Memorial Hospital in North Carolina and obtaining bachelors and doctoral degrees

from the State University of

New York at Buffalo.

While at Maryland, Dr. Burstein pursued his twin interests in Neurology and Pharmacokinetics. In addition to teaching and his substantial research load, he was a sought after special projects mentor for students interested in Neurology, served as a research project advisor for residents, directed a post-Pharm.D. fellow, and mentored nontraditional Pharm.D. students. Dr. Burstein's tenure at Maryland will be remembered for his collegiality and his dedication to one-on-one teaching and mentoring. In addition to his pharmacokinetics and neurology



research, he collaborated with numerous faculty on issues ranging from toxicology to diabetes management. His mentoring efforts are demonstrated by the numerous publications, abstracts, and research projects which students brought to fruition under his guidance.

Dr. Burstein left Maryland in 1999 to pursue his research interests at the National Institutes of Health.

In Dedication of Dr. Christine Eccles

r. Christine Eccles came to the University of Maryland in 1979 as Assistant Professor in the Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology. She was promoted to Associate Professor in 1987. Dr. Eccles was a faculty member who successfully balanced her career with a wonderful family, raising a boy and girl; and who enjoyed life in

general, particularly cross-country skiing, dancing, and traveling.

Dr. Eccles was an active participant in the School's educational program, developing courses, serving as coursemaster and frequent lecturer. She initiated several Toxicology and Neurotoxicology courses, offered to professional and graduate students. She not only taught in the programs on the Baltimore campus, but she also made significant contributions to the "Essentials of Toxicology" course in the MEES Program at College Park. She was a frequent participant in the Summer Minority Student Program, working as a volunteer with students in her laboratory.

Dr. Eccles research career related to the area of neurotoxicology. She had an interest in lead and mercury toxicity, as well as the toxicity of Agent Orange. More recently, she became interested in neurodegenerative diseases, including research in glutamate-induced neurotoxicity. The latter interest resulted in a successful sabbatical leave in 1996 at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.

Most impressive was her commitment to use her background and knowledge to serve others. In this regard, she participated extensively on committees at the community, state, federal and international levels. Her input was continuously sought on committees and commissions dealing with environmental toxicity questions. For instance, she served as chairperson of the Community Advisory Committee of the Maryland Environmental Service (Hawkins Point Secure Landfill) and as a member of the State of Maryland Hazardous Waste Commission. She was also a member of the State of Maryland Governor's Scientific Advisory Council.

Dr. Eccles unique area of expertise was important to the teaching, research and service programs of the School. Her contributions as a faculty member and interesting colleague will be missed as she devotes more time to her family.

In Dedication to Dr. Emmeline Edwards



r. Emmeline Edwards joined the School of Pharmacy faculty in 1992 as an Associate Professor in the department of Pharmaceutical Sciences. She joined our faculty from SUNY, where she was an Associate Professor in Behavioral Pharmacology. Dr. Edwards received her Ph.D. in Neurochemistry from Fordham University and completed her post-doctoral training in behavioral pharmacology at SUNY. Dr. Edwards was actively involved in behavioral pharmacology research with a neuroscience emphasis and provided valuable expertise in this area to the department. She also taught in the pharmacology and human biology portions of our curriculum. Dr. Edward's interest and expertise in behavioral pharmacology research led to a two year appointed position at the National Science Foundation. In this prestigious position, Dr. Edwards was a project officer in charge of reviewing and recommending funding for proposals in the area of neuroscience/behavioral pharmacology. Dr. Edwards left academia in 1999 and is consulting with NINDS.

In Dedication to Dr. Madeline Finberg



nce in a lifetime, a special person may cross your path that stimulates and challenges you like no other. Madeline "Maddy" Feinberg is that special person for many people. She touches the lives of students, seniors, caregivers and healthcare practitioners. Many describe her as "full of energy, dynamic speaker and pioneer in the area of elder education." These are common remarks made by people who know Maddy.

Madeline Feinberg earned her doctor of pharmacy from the University of Maryland in 1993 as well as her RPh in 1979. She worked closely with Dr. Peter Lamy and Parke-Davis as director of the Consumer Drug Education Program. She helped build the program, which reaches out to countless seniors, caregivers and healthcare professionals still to this day. As an assistant professor, she taught numerous lectures on Alzheimer's Disease, Parkinson's Disease as well as other geriatric disease states and syndromes.

She was recognized as a pioneer in the field by awards such as the Governor's Citation for service to Senior Citizens. Dr. Feinberg served as President of the Maryland Pharmacists Association and founding practitioner for the Geriatric Certification Examination. She was recognized for her expertise by being appointed to the USP Advisory Committee specializing in Geriatrics.

In Dedication to Dr. Reiss



r. William Reiss joined the School of Pharmacy faculty in 1993 as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Pharmacy Practice and Science. He joined our faculty after spending two years at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He received his Clinical Pharmacy training at SUNY Buffalo and completed a Fellowship in Clinical Pharmacokinetics at the University of Washington.

Dr. Reiss was actively involved in the teaching and research involving immunology, immunosuppressive agents and drug metabolism. In addition, he was responsible for the Clinical Pharmacokinetics courses in the curriculum. He was also an important member of the Pharmacokinetics-Biopharmaceutics Laboratory where he provided research expertise in organ transplantation and drug metabolism. Because of his research expertise, he was well funded by the pharmaceutical industry, and he was an invited speaker at National meetings on numerous occasions. In addition, to his scholarly activities, he provided extensive service to the University of Maryland and was named Vice-Chairperson of the University of Maryland Institutional Review Board. Dr. Reiss was the first non-physician to hold this position. Dr. Reiss left academia in 1999 to pursue his interests in immunotherapy and transplant drug development at Immunex.

In Memorium Dr. Ralph S. Shangraw, Professor Emeritus

Teacher, Researcher. Mentor, Visionary, Humorist, Family Man. Colleague and Friend



alph S. Shangraw was that unusual person who epitomized each of these terms - and one more: he was a Mench, a Yiddish word connoting the totality of the human condition. Dr. Shangraw loved to teach and his students loved him for it. He approached his subject with curiosity and ardor, translating the most mundane topic into something exciting. His intellectual curiosity led him to ask questions that no one else did - often about products that had limited market value, but important therapeutic benefits. Examples include stability of nitroglycerin products, vitamin/mineral supplement dissolution (or lack thereof!), none of which resulted in large outside funding but had essential public health value. He led by example, always the mentor and teacher. His more than 30 years of continuous volunteer service was recognized by a posthumous award from the United States Pharmacopoiea in the spring of 2000. Ralph Shangraw was a true visionary and his view of the future never dimmed. Whether it was the Professional Experience Program that he pioneered and championed or his concepts of patient care and safety, he was always "right on." His insights were impeccable!

Who can forget the contests he conducted to bring life and humor to school? His creativity was always working to make even the ordinary seem unique. His students and colleagues each have their own favorite memory of a special holiday contest, most often with Ralph competing for the prize!

Ralph was **the** role model for any person wondering how to be a good parent and husband. He was never known to utter an unkind word or even to swear. But more importantly, one only had to gaze at his wife, their kids and grandchildren to understand the depth of love, devotion and pride he had in them all. Dr. Shangraw was undemanding and unselfish. To have been his colleague was a privilege; to have been his friend, extraordinary. He was a giant among men and those who knew him were fortunate to have shared in his vision, his humanity and to have learned by his example. He is sorely missed but will be remembered always.


he second year class of Pharm.D. students traditionally travel to the Midwest or the






