Consequently, they have demanded a greater voice and greater participation in those affairs which concern them as citizens and as students. This was due in large part to the concern and dedication of its officers and members in striving for a better university. It is my sincere hope that we, as students, helped to make this university what it should be-an institution futfilling the needs of its students and society.

## College of Agriculture

Over a century old, the College of Agriculture could easily qualify for the paternal title of the granddaddy of the University. And today Gordon M. Cairns, the college's dean in his eighteenth year of service here, points with pride to the contributions Maryland has made to agriculture. And he indicates that the opportunities in agriculture are almost unlimited - and that Maryland, the Free State's largest educational institution-also offers an almost unlimited, varied academic program sa that these opportunities may be realized.

The college offers 13 agricultural study areas, including special curricula, which prepares the student for further study in forestry and veterinary practice. Other areas include animal science, botany, entomology, food science, and horticulture. But Dean Cairns foresees even more room for expansion in geology and landscape architecture, twa courses that are now in separate departments in the college.

What kind of student enrolls in agriculture in today's modern era? A report shows that a high proportion come from suburbia and the city, indicating that even the so-called "city-slicker" is becoming aware of the opportunities in the field. For example, 66 percent of this year's freshmen class came from Suburbia and the city, while only 34 percent came from rural areas. However, Dean Cairns says, "The interests in a particular kind of career perhaps is the deciding factor rather than from where the student's home is.'

For a student to succeed in agriculture he must be mechanically and mathematically minded, as the college requires an even greater number of credits in the pure sciences and mathematics than the minimum University requirements.

And what are some of the opportunities the agricultural student finds in agriculture today?

- Research firms, both private and public, need him.
- Supermarket chains, electric companies, dairy distributors and meat packing companies need him.
- Banks, insurance companies and government agencies need him.
- The news media need him.

## School of Architecture

The School of Architecture is now locoted in temporory quarters in the Gulch, with a new building in the plonning stages. The "barrocks" in the Gulch are renovoted to provide oir conditioned lecture rooms, studies, librory and office space. The facilities, in direct controst to the usually gloomy halls and shadowy dork clossrooms, are bright, spocious ploces providing odequote spoce for the 140 students now enrolled in the program to study ond creote. The exciting new building, which is plonned to be completed by 1970, is o maior stimulus to a feeling of newness and foscinotion displayed by students ond faculty olike. While being of an advanced design of interconnecting open spoces with studios centrolly locoted the new building will still be compotable with the overall Georgian style.

The Architecture school offers a 5 yeor program and it is olso the newest, being founded in 1967. The courses are a cohesive integration of design, structurol onolysis ond environmental study. With this progrom the students are olso freed of non-professional ocodemics ollowing them to octively ond directly pursue architecture as o coreer.

These peaple who will shope tomorraw's environment hove mony prablems focing them. An exploding populotion coupled with industriolizotion have created on enarmous urban crisis. Mony oreos of rodoy's cities ore on the edge of economic and social disoster, with whole neighborhoads becoming ghettas ond living of a threotening level of frustrotion. These are problems thot will hove to be coped with by the orchitecture field, ond hove generated o sense of urgency in the environmental design profession.

Today, relevoncy is the password of youth and olienotion is an integrol port of campus life. The School of Architecture hos provided an onswer for its students to these difficult problems. This is occomplished by combining the oworeness of the troubles of society with a cohesive spirit between faculty ond students. In the words of Dean John Hill this is described os "o participatory democrocy," "o continual give
 and toke of ideos." Students ond foculty olike work on projects dealing with real problems in real society. They ore involved. This spirit of architecture is to shelter and enhonce Mon's life on eorth ond to fulfill his belief in the nobility of existence."



## College of Arts and Sciences

When trying to summarize and describe the College of Arts and Sciences, one finds a real problem-diversity. Offering 29 possible majors, $A \& S$ ranges from music to molecular physics.

This diversity also creates problems for A \& S administrators. It's difficult for them to provide for the great spectrum of student interests. Especially when there are 10,000 students for which to provide. A \& S contains more than one-third of the University's student population. Naturally, mixing numbers and diversity makes Dean Charles A. Manning's job a challenging one.

Continually growing, Arts and Sciences is certainly a college of contrasts. As one student mixes paint another may be mixing chemicals. As one student transposes music, another translates French.

The College of Arts and Sciences is unique in its blending of two exact opposites. It strives to teach students to think and wark in exact terms and precise calculations. Yet at the same time, it strives to promote individualism and freedom of expression, as well as develaping the abstract. At first glance, this is another aspect of contrast within the Callege. But to the fully developed man, the uniting of the freedom of the arts with the exactness of science is important.

Diversity and contrast make A \& S unique. And as one student observed, "At least we can't be stereotyped."

The school of Business and Public Administration, locoted high on the hill overlooking most of the compus, mokes up o sizeable proportion of the totol University. The Deon of BPA, Dr. Donald $0^{\prime}$ Connell, heads up o full time stoff of 154 professors that odministers to 4000 undergroduates, and 600 graduate students. These people ore distributed into six deportments: business odministration, economics, geogrophy, and government-politics which have degrees ovailable up to the doctorol level, ond journolism ond information onolysis offering degrees only on the undergroducte level. Yet these departments ore only part of thot segment of the university called BPA, for two bureous are incorporoted into this school. These bureaus, the Business ond Economic Reseorch Bureou and the Bureou of Government Reseorch, have little to do with teoching but are designed to study some of the pressing problems of the stote concerned with business or government.

In today's world there is a pressing need for competent and educoted leaders of business ond for our massive government structure. The University praduces o great number of peaple sloted by society to fill these positions. In fact there ore so mony produced thot one begins to wonder of the quality. Peaple going into business ond government need to be aware of ond involved with society enough to understand its problems and improve its quolity. These problems ore substantially token core of at this University by its progrom of involvement. Outside projects are the method. Morketing, accounting ond operations research have integrol projects built into the courses. Journolism hos established o summer internship progrom which ploces journalism majors in jobs designed to give them octuol practical experience. And the numerous professional societies, twenty-two in all, are very octive in bringing autside speokers to campus, initioting tutoring progroms, sponsoring service projects ond many other things. In fact the occounting honorory Beta Alpho Psi won a first ploce in o notion-wide contest for their very progressive progrom.

## Education

With the present crisis of teacher shortage, the College of Education handles the burden of training students for teaching positions of any variety, ranging from kindergarten to college to special education.

A major part of the training of a teacher involves student teaching and observation within the public school systems. Formerly students were assigned to schools in a rather haphazord fashion. But a new concept being used is the establishment of teaching centers - a cluster of schools containing elementary, junior high, and senior high schools. Teachers assigned to these schools are able to meet and discuss problems and programs within each center. This promotes a better understanding of student problems, background, and progress.

A related department to the College of Education is the Institute of Child Study. Supported by the University, the Institute makes studies of individual children, to increase knawledge in the field of educational psychology. Investigating the many facets and influences on the personality of the learner helps bath in-service teachers and student teachers to better understand and aid the child.

Another progressive division within the College is the Department of Industrial Arts. Under the guidance of Dr. Donald Maley, the department has developed one of the most progressive programs in the country. Maryland's Industrial Arts Department has been a leader in expanding the field from a traditionally vocational approach to a broad understanding of industry's place in today's world. One outstanding feoture of the department is the faculty's striving to match student teaching assignments to the needs of the individual.

With the growing importance of technology in education, the University is o leader. The technology center represents the great advances being made in education. Now audio-visual aids and teaching machines demonstrate the use of up-to-date communications medio.

## College of Engineering

Changes in the Callege of Engineering's academic programs for 1969, to meet the ever-changing demands of the scientific world, highlight the college's efforts to bring Maryland to the forefront in engineering.

A "Co-op Plan," which combines classroam study with professional work in the field, is scheduled to begin this summer. The plan will add Maryland to the list of some 50 top engineering colleges in the U.S. that already have this program. The five-year degree program will be offered to third-year students mainly in the mechanical, electrical engineering areas, because these two have the largest enrollments. In the future it may be extended to other engineering fields.

Dean Robert B. Beckmann says that the "Co-op" will be a step forward in raising the quality of education to engineering students here.

Another innovation is a recent proposal for an "undesignated degree in engineering." This addition to the curricula is designed to give flexibility to students' future plans.

But the college is not without its problems. The yearly turnover in the freshman class, because of academic problems, is 20 percent. So a student-faculty committee, led by T. W. Cadman, assistant professar of Chemical Engineering, came to the rescue and a Freshman Counselling and Guidance Office was set up on the grass roots level.

Dean Beckmann, who is deeply concerned with the problem, says, "We hope with this kind of personalized approach that freshmen will come in any time and see one of the two faculty members who are volunteer advisors. The problem is not so much with the sophomores and the rest but with the freshmen who are inclined to experience trouble from the start. If we can get them to come in early, they may be able to be saved."

Finally, the 1969-70 academic years will mark the college's 75 th Anniversary Year. Speakers from various industries will be on hand; canferences and seminars will be held.

Dr. Beckmann says, "This is ta give the college a better image across the country, to show that we are becoming a force in engineering.

## Home Economics

Home Economics is "riding on the crest of a wave," soys Dean Marjory Brooks of the College of Home Economics. And to meet the crest of it the College opened a new area of study when it creoted the Deportment of Family and Community Development.

In the good old days, the family was able to take core of all its needs, but todoy the community hos taken over many of the fomily's functions. So it become the obligation of the universities to train speciolists to guide members of the family toward o better life. With o heovy emphosis on the sociol sciences, the College of Home Economics is preparing students to give valuable service to the community in this field. For example, students may become fomily life consultants, home monagement consultants, and, with a groduate degree, marrioge counselors.

And to keep up with the fast chonging times, the College's Food and Nutrition Deportment is revising some of its courses as government progroms, such as Medicare. University students, armed with an orsenol of knowledge in chemistry, ore preparing to go out and fight the war on hunger by doing research for food manufacturers or government agencies. As Deon Brooks points out: "The hunger problem centers on o lack of food that gives proper nutrition, rather than a lock of food in the United States."

But Home Economics offers more than just training in the lab with test tubes. The deportments of Applied Design and Textiles and Clothing focus on the aesthetic. Each gives home economics students a chonce to fulfill their creative needs. Courses in these areos include foshion design, costume design, metallory, ond ceromics.

In reseorch the College has not lagged behind others. A significant diet study wos corried out on several groups of coeds to analyze the utilizotion of omino acids from food protein. Another was concerned with the intake of carbohydrates on longevity-this time white mice were used as guineo pigs.

It is the second such new graduote professional schaol since World War II, and the first to be established of College Park. It is unique in that it is a separate Schoal whose sole purpase is groduate study ond research.

Now located in McKeldin Library, the School plons to move into the new library to be built in 1969-70.

The School is progressively oriented in o time of rapid changes in the field of library sciences. Students came from o wide variety of backgrounds and fields of study, ranging from History and Librory Science to Theology and Nursing.

The School feels thot its moin purpose is "to place the intellectual choracter of librorianship an a sound and firm basis." While the Master of Librory Science is the "major commitment" of the School, nevertheless, scholorship ond reseorch to promote knawledge ond practice in the field is stressed. And to increose learning at the manogeriol level, the School affers the Library Administrators Develapment Progrom.

Finally, the School reolizes its obligation to provide a harmonious bolance between theory and proctice. The "fusion of teoching, reseorch, and practice" is kept foremost is the minds of the officiols

Now develaping o doctorote degree, the Schoal is eagerly meeting the greot chollenge of the needs of future decodes.

New ideos, new concepts, and rapid surges in growth-these things characterize the College of Physical Educotion, Recreotion, ond Health taday.

From o tiny, not-yet-completely organized callege in the summer of 1949, it has mushroamed into a school that guides and instructs abaut 18,525 peaple - and that figure continues to grow yeor by year. Probably no ather college in the university con come close to influencing thot mony. Over 6,000 freshmen will have finished their heolth-physical educotion requirements this year, and 125 will have graduated from the callege itself. Besides, over 11,000 young men and women will have enjayed the two othletic pragroms the college offers to students in their spore time.

But the college has not grown in numbers only. It hos been the pacemaker in new ideos ond concepts: the innavator. As Lester Froley, the college's deon of 19 years, indicotes: "We now revise and modify our progroms-depending an the trends with respect to the demonds of elementory and secandory school afficiols. For exomple, if they want to teoch square doncing, we will orgonize o course in it sa that our groduotes will be qualified to teoch it.'

Just two years ogo, the college set up an odoptive program in its curriculum designed to moke physical education instructors proficient in teoching the handicopped.

Unlike the physical educotion department, the departments of health and recreotion ore not oriented to teocher training. Heolth groduates interested in advancing knowledge in their oreo moy go to work for such orgonizations os the Tuberculosis Associotion. Recreation groduotes, on the other hond, moy find jobs with city recreation deportments or the YMCA os progrom directars.

And now in the plonning stages is o new gymnosium - a testimoniol to the increosing growth of the College of Physical Education, Recreation, and Heolth at the University of Morylond.

Dean Ray Ehrensberger, better knawn as the "Flying Dean af Maryland," has flawn aver a millian miles since 1952 in arder ta administer his "warldwide, educatianal damain" an aver 400 study autpasts in 25 fareign lands ranging from Asia, Africa, and Eurape ta the frigid regians of the Arctic.

Founded in 1949, the purpase of UC is to give servicemen and their dependents wha are statianed averseas an education, althaugh its headquarters, here in College Park, offers evening caurses ta civilians an and aff campus.

The Munich campus gives the children of military persannel an appartunity ta get twa years af callege study in a fareign country. Educatian-minded servicemen of all ranks and ages attend classes, aften taught by Ph.D.'s, an a multitude of Air Farce bases and Army pasts. Career afficers, if they stay with Maryland, aim for degrees in general studies. Thase wha leave the service transfer their fully accredited caurse credits ta ather calleges.

And it is not uncomman to find career military men wha finally reach their life-lang gaal - a callege diplama - after studying for 10 or 15 years. Take, for instance, the example of Cammander Ralph L. Maare, naw of Hallywaad, Md. It taak him 24 years af an and aff wark to get his degree fram Maryland. And when he gat it he was statianed in Iceland; and Dean Ehrensberger happed a plane to confer a degree an the base's sale graduate. As the Dean tald a Washingtan Past reparter, "I decided that if he could spend 24 years getting this degree, I cauld travel 2,600 miles ta canfer it an him.'

The stary of University Callege has furnished national jaurnals with material about the unique glabal scape of Maryland's classraams. Washingtan papers have dane staries an it tad. But the big stary came in 1965 when the Reader's Digest braught UC national recagnitian far its service ta the warld.

## Sports

## Sports Scene

The majar problem undermining the University af Maryland athletic department is one of inconsistency. Why can't an enarmaus, state-supparted callege, passessing the seemingly unlimited advantages that Maryland has aver ather schaols produce winning teams in her major sparts, natably football and basketball?

This questian has been the topic of discussion thraughout the entire schaal year. Spartswriters, appasing caaches, students, spectatars and many athers find the present level af mediacrity practically incanceivable. The fact of the matter is, it's down right unbelievable!

Over-all seriausness af the departmental stagnatian was nat tatally realized until anly recently. A careful investigation of the situation was made by a special athletic cammittee, appainted by the Baard of Regents. Presenting its findings to the Baard, the cammittee recammended pasitive and immediate action to eliminate the pressing prablem. The repart read:
"The Committee recammends that the Baard af Regents request the administration to take whatever actian may be possible within the academic framewark af the University ta strengthen the faotball and basketball pragrams."

Careful examination af these pragrams under attack reveals some perplexing and possibly self-perpetrating facts. Cammanplace among these is that the University athletic department is under obligation to praduce winners, samething nat accomplished in the majar sparts far several years.

In direct contrast, the minar sports repeatedly rank high in the natianal standings, thus creating a very paradaxical situation. It is difficult ta camprehend that the same university can field a Natianal Callegiate Athletic Association champianship saccer squad, unjustly classified as a minar spart while the football team, anly last seasan ranked as the number ane worst team in the natian in early seasan polls.

Breaking away from the national level, Atlantic Caast Canference statistics serve as a barameter of success. The basketball team barely escaped the ACC cellar by slipping past last place Clemsan in the final game af the regular seasan. Then in the first round af the championship playaffs, they were saundly defeated by Sauth Caralina. Maryland foatballers in keeping with the narm, cauld anly muster twa victories in as many years, bath caming this past season.

On the ather end af the cantinuum, saccer, lacrasse, crass cauntry, and indoor track continued their camplete daminance of the ACC by completing championship campaigns. Why such little success in the major sparts?

Analysis af this prablem must include the area of recruitment, basic drawing card for gaad talent. Because of her status as a state university, very limited schalarship funds are available, especially to aut of state students. This factor places a restrictive clamp on the entire pragram. Many fine athletes are lured fram the Callege Park campus by substantial financial afferings af other
universities with more established recruitment systems.

Once a team has established itself as a goad one, samething that faatball and basketball are far fram achieving, players will give it mare cansideration than a "secand rater." They realize that recagnition is practically impossible an a law ranking team. The spails, many times in the farm af prafessianal contracts, ga to the victors, the ones with which they wish to assaciate.
Anather point ta cansider is paar student interest created by poar athletic perfarmances. It is very difficult to impress possible prospects with a halffilled field house or stadium while trying to disguise student apathy concerning the sparts situation. Paar publicity campaigns play a majar part in this apparant non-interest while scheduling blunders cansistently deny thase interested fans their chance to see mare of the Terps than they already da.

Drastic changes must be made to eliminate these stumbling blacks and vault Maryland athletics back inta praminence. The early manths af 1969 have witnessed the start of Maryland's comeback ta the majar sports scene, with the administration taking whatever action possible.

This year has seen the resignatian of head faotball caach, Bab Ward, fallowing a player pratest of his caaching prawess. Accepting his resignation "in the best interest af the University," the newly arganized athletic department quickly hired Gearge Lester, head caach at nearby Richard Mantgomery High


School to fill the vacoted spot.
Basketball heod coach Frank Fellaws wos fired fallowing the Terp's disuppointing shawing in the 1968-69 campoign. A short but thorough search braught Lefty Driesell, winning coach of Dovidson College's high ranking basketball team.

Last but surely not least, Jim Kehoe, the University's brilliant track coach was appointed Athletic Director to reploce retiring Bill Cobey. Possibly through realization of he fact that the entire brunt of the athletic dilemma rests on his shoulders, Kehoe has relegated himself to swift, hard hitting action policies.
While speoking on the subject of his agonizing reapproisal of the entire University sports situation, Kehoe made it clear that changes must be made.
"I'm used to winning, ond I believe in winning. At this point in my life I'm nat going to embark on any policy to the controry.
This attitude may be exactly what the program needs. Whether ar not Kehoe can communicate this spirit to our new caaches ond they, in turn, to the players, remains to be seen.
Not to be mistaken, Maryland critics of the major sports will have much to feed on this coming season. One cannot expect an entire reversal over night. However all aspects of the athletic program are under intensive investigation and Maryland sparts fans everywhere cun be assured that everythng physically possible to improve conditions as they now stand will be done.


## Football

This year, 1968, was destined to be the "Year of the Terp". Haw could the football team miss? Alan Pastrana, recordbreaking quarterback of the 1966 campaign, who sat out last season with an unheeled knee was returning. Bill Lovett, leading ground gainer from last year was loaking forward to anather fine season. Ernie Torrain had decided to give it another try after his argument with offensive coach Tom Steigleder. The likes of Rick Carlson, high scorer last seoson, Ron Pearson, defensive standaut, and many athers pointed to a very promising faotball campaign.

Who could have imagined the heartbreak which lay ahead untimely fumbles, intercepted passes, unpredictable officiating (to say the least), dropped passes, and many other unfulfilled expectations? Numerous penalties, on bath players and coach, constantly blunted any offensive drives Maryland could muster.

Spring training started early with appraximately 120 candidates reporting for the squad. The nucleus of this group cansisted of 32 lettermen, all having one goal in mind . . to win a foatball game and put an end to Maryland's 13 game losing streak. Well aware of this pressing situation was Head Coach Bab Ward, now in his second season. Ward had big plans to better the 0-9 record af last season.

The season's opener came quickly with Maryland being put to a stiff test by nationally ranked Florida State. A strang Seminole team, led by All-American end Ran Sellers, handed the Terps their first of many setbacks of the season, 24-14.

Traveling to Syracuse in search of victory, the Terps met the big Orange in Archibald Stadium. The big Orange proved to be a little too big as they overwhelmed the gridders, handing them their 15 th straight lass. Caach Ward, understandably upset after the $32-14$ defeat, lamented, "I never thought a victory would be so hard to get.'

The winless Terps were hungry for victory when they invaded Norfalk, Va. to play Duke in the annual Oyster Bowl. and for 59 of the 60 minutes could taste the Blue Devil Special. With a little bit of luck they would have feasted, but a controversial decision by the referee allowed Duke to gain field position and kick what proved to be the winning field goal with three seconds remaining in the game.

After the 30-28 heartbreaker, coach Ward summed up the situation perfectly - "Our boys played their heads off, they're just unlucky." One bright spot of the otherwise dreary afternoon was the selection of the Terp fullback Bill Lovett as the outstanding player of the Oyster Bowl.

Bob Ward, coach turned prophet, predicted a victary over the visiting Tar Heels fram North Carolina. The gads must have been
smiling for the prophecy soon became a reality. The game saw hard running Bill Lovett astonish the crowd by gaining 172 yards for the afternoon and break a Terp rushing record with 39 carries. Alan Pastrana loaked like the quarterback of old as he threw for 129 yards in nine completions. As the gun sounded The Terps dropped from the ranks of the winless. They had finally broken the spell cast upon them sixteen games earlier.
'This is the greatest day of my life!" said Ward, commenting on his first victory as head coach. The Maryland fans showed their appreciation for this "greatest day" by mabbing the team in the center of the field and hoisting Ward and Pastrana upon their shoulders for an impromptu ride to the locker room. The goal posts were ripped down and disappeared from the field almost as fast as the N.C. players did. It was truly a fine day for the University. The sun had broken through the overcast to help brighten the accasion, and Coach Ward, happiest of them all, was finally smiling.

The smiles were to be short-lived however. Maryland would win one more game. Again the goal posts (wooden ones this time) wauld fall to an enthusiastic, rain soaked Homecoming crowd. The 21-19 victory over the South Carolina Gamecocks was the last the Terps were to see for the rest of the season. Losing the last Five games to North Caralina State, Wake Forest, Clemsan, Penn State and Virginia, Maryland clased out another very disappointing campaign.

Even though the team appeared only average as a whole, individually it was strang. The tri-captains, Bill Lovett, Ron Pearson, and Alan Pastrana provided the team with able leadership. Fullback Lovett, with his outstanding running ability, cansistently penetrated opponents' defenses at the clip of 4.4 yards per carry while gaining 963 yards and breaking a Maryland rushing record for carrying the ball 217 times. Tight end Ron Pearson gave the team much needed versatility in playing three different pasitions in as many years. Alan Pastrana, experiencing only a mediocre season, kept the team spirits high with his never-say-die attitude.

It was a very disappainting season for thase seniars playing out their last year of eligibility, but on the other hand a very great challenge for the younger players making their mave from the depths of abscurity to the first team. The future of Maryland faotball now rests in their hands.

With the likes of end Sonny Demczuk, the team's leading receiver, tailback Alvin Thomas, defensive tackle John Dyer, defensive back Wally Stalnaker, punter Greg Fries, quarterback Dennis 0'Hara and many athers, the eternal cry of "wait until next year" may be worth listening to.

The fantastic Maryland Saccer Team, passibly the best in the nation, ended its season as the only undefeated major college team by gaining a tie for the National Collegiate Athletic Association title with the Spartans of Michigan State.

Head caach Doyle Royal gained his 24th consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference title along with the national championship. After the victory he commented, "In the 24 years I have caached soccer here, this is the best record any of my teams have ever had. The 1957 squad had a perfect year but anly played 10 games." This year Royal had the help of two young assistants, Ron Hach and Ray Buckley, bath of whom have won hanors in intercollegiate soccer.

Being ranked number one for a large part of the season is evidence that Maryland had many things going far them, all in the right direction. The mast impartant was team wark, the essence of victary. Each player complemented the other, on and off the field, playing not as a group of individuals but as a team.

Everyone knew from the opening day of practice that Moryland was going to be tough, but just how tough remained to be seen. Back from last year's team were ca-captain Giancarlo Brandoni, All-Americans Alvaro Bittencourt and Mario Jelencovich, plus Bab Conner, Frank Delvecchio, Jay Lillien and Larry Ruhs. Other returnees included Bill Walker, Charlie Wiemers, and Bo White. This was the heart of the team that reached the NCAA playaffs last year anly to be humiliated by Michigan State.

A newcomer to the Maryland Soccer scene, soon to gain fame among the entire population of this large campus was Rocco Morelli, native of Italy now hailing from New York. Gaining notice as junior college All-American while attending the same college as Mario Jelencovich and Giancarlo Brandani, Racco came to Maryland and led the team in scoring with a total of 15 goals.

His finest hour came in the NCAA playoff against San Jose State. Rocco took over the offensive chores and carried the team to a 4-3 victory by scoring all four of the Maryland goals. Another fine hour that few will farget was his prize winning performance on the Byrd Stadium turf during the St. Lovis game in which he seemingly "succumbed" at least four or five times only to recover and further intimidate their goalie. Rocco added calor to the team as well as the spart itself, and in his own colorful way should be a shoe-in for All-American honors.

The offensive honors due others were somewhat overshadowed by Rocco. Teammates Jerry Chareczko and Larry Ruhs carried a large part af the scaring load by finishing secand
and third respectively in offense. Ruhs, last year's leading scorer, was outstanding in the victory over George Washington 'Jniversity. Teaming up with Chareczko, Ruhs scored 4 goals and assisted on 3 athers. Chareczko contributed 3 goals while playing only 3 quarters.

Steady, sure-footed play of captain Alvara Bittencourt cantinually kept the Terps on the offensive while his stalwart defensive acts killed mast enemy attacks.

The turning point of the season was the win over the Middies from Annapolis, the first since 1963. This mode the Terps the best team in the South and allowed them a bye in the first round of the playoffs.

A strong defensive effort was exerted against a tough Navy eleven, one that was indicotive of the Terp's play all season long. Outstanding defensive leoders were Gioncarlo Brandoni and Maria Jelencovich. Goalie Jelencovich, possibly the best in college soccer, held regular season opponents to only 9 goals while posting 4 shutouts in the process. Center halfback Brondoni, playing the position the way it should be played, stopped the opposition's plays before they really could get started.

Brandoni had help from the ever ready duo of Les Bernord and Melih Sensoy, both having chances for All-American hanors. Freshman halfback Sensoy, and Bernard from his fullbock slot, combined to form a formidable defense, strong enough to carry the Terps to the national championship.

Looking back on such a successful season makes it difficult not to mention everyone involved in this true team effort. Frank Schoan remains the hero of the Navy game with his gamewinning goal in the double overtime match. Wally Williams ond Paul Stiel kept the team up during the crucial games of the early season. Recognition must also be given to the strong bench, a definite contributing factor to success. With the likes of Bob Connor, Bo White, Frank Delvecchio, Steve Salfeety, and many athers in reserve, any coach would be happy, Doyle Royal included.

Very seldam does one have the privilege to see such a fine team as was assembled in 1968. The end of another season means the lass of several individuals through either graduation or lass of eligibility. Leaving the ranks of the championship teom are Mario Jelencovich, Gioncarla Brandani، Bob Conner, Bo White, Frank Delvecchio, Alvaro Bittencourt.

These men will, of course, be missed, but the fact that so many return next season can anly paint an optimistic picture for Moryland to retain its number one ranking in 1969.

## Basketball

This season the University Bosketball team traveled a long, hord rood only to find disappointment ond frustration at its end. But even as the Terps spent most of the $1968-69$ season in or near the Atlontic Coast Conference cellar, o fost moving brand of never-soy-die basketboll wos presented.

Despite its losing record, Marylond had severol notoble wins during the seoson. Previously unbeaten George Washington University fell in upset to the scrappy cagers. In turning bock Morshall, defending champion of its own tournoment, iust before Christmos and defeating Wichita in the Charlotte Invitational, Morylond proved it was capoble of winning agoinst some of the country's finest teoms.

North Corolina, ranked third notionally, and the highly touted South Corolina Gamecocks barely escoped upset of the honds of the Terps, with the Tar Heels overcoming a twenty point deficit to win in the finol two seconds of the game.

Although the cagers have played somewhot inconsistently this season, Will Hetzel ond Pete Johnson have both contributed rock-like performances.

A serious, hard working junior, Hetzel leads Morylond ployers in just obout every catogary. After the first 23 games, he had been over the 20 point mork 13 times, had two 34 point games back to back, ogainst Duke ond Clemson, and had sank approximotely 43 percent of his field goal attempts. While averaging 12 rebounds a gome, will scored 79 percent from the foul line.

Praising his serious candidate for All-ACC honors, heod Coach Fronk Fellows commented; "A coach couldn't ask for more from any ployer."

Complimenting Hetzel's outstanding ploy, Pete" the rabbit" Johnson is famous for his intimidation of players much toller thon himself. Lost year's leoding scorer, the 6-0 senior moved into sixth ploce among the all-time Marylond scorers after his
fontostic performance in Maryland's second meeting with North Carolino.

Possibly in what wos one of the finest gomes of his career; Johnson scored 28 points against the tough Tor Heel five and sparked the Terps to o near upset. Playing in his last game in Cole Field House, Pete closed out a colorful era in Maryland basketboll.

This year Cooch Fellows received a pleasont surprise in the likes of post Domatha greot Mickey Wiles. A tronsfer from Georgia, Mickey broke into the storting lineup early and was not to be replaced. The flashy guard took over as quarterbock on the floor, ollowing Pete Johnson to concentrate more on his shooting, and engineered mony of the team's fost breaks.

A contribution from the Freshmen teom lost yeor, Dick Worthington had a lot to learn. His patience ond hard work poid dividends the entire season and earned him a starting position on the Terp's squad. The $6-6$ sophomore, possibly the best leaper on the team, lead the freshmen last yeor in rebounds.

Tom Milroy, ploying the other guard position, averoged 47 percent early in the season, leading the team to eorly victories. An outo accident sidelined Milroy part woy through the season but gained recognition for his quick recovery and strong comebock.

The likes of Rod Horst has made Maryland's offense click. A dedicated, hord working junior, Rod emerged os o double figure scorer os he scored 28 points ogoinst second ranked North Carolino.

Dick Stobaugh broke into the starting lineup just before the Novy game. The 6-7 sophomore alternated with roommate Chuck Worthington for the all-important forward spot.

Junior Bill Sullivan sat out most of lost season in ocodemic trouble. The hustling Sullivon sow limited oction on the inside this seoson.

Homer Warren, Roger Montgomery, and John MacDonald round out the rest of the Moryland Squod.

This has been a very disappointing yeor for players, coaches, and Marylond fans. The Terps record of 2-12 in the ACC did not give the fons much to cheer about.

Possibly the return of Will Hetzel, Mickey Wiles, Chuck Worthington and mony others, all claiming one more yeor of experience can shorten the "long hard rood" ond bring basketboll prominence back to the University.

Jim Kehoe, Maryland trock cooch ond newly appointed othletic director is two-thirds of the way towords another Atlontic Coost Conference trock triple crown. This coveted crown consists of Cross Country, Indoor and Outdoor Trock, three of Marylond's specialties.

Lost year's indoor season reached climax with the indoor conference title meet in which Marylond captured five individual titles, one reloy title, established two meet records ond clinched its 13th stroight ACC chompionship.

Individuol winners included George Wojtech, 600 yd., Rolond Merritt, 60; Tom Gogner, Pole Voult; Fronk Costello, high iump; Jack Hanley, Shot Put, John Boker, ond the two mile relay teom.

The outdoor seoson, beginning with the Florida Reloys sow the two mile reloy teom copture o third and estoblish o new University record.

During the South Corolina Relays at Columbio, the Terps performed well ond won the duol meet with North Corolino. Resuming the southern tour ofter crushing Novy in a dual meet 118-27. Marylond scored victories in the Columbio Reloys and posted a fair showing of the Quontico Relays.

Highlighting the entire season wos the ACC Championships. Completely dominoting the event, Marylond won nine out of a possible seventeen ACC events. In the process, the trocksters broke six conference ond two University records, while copturing their 17th stroight conference chompionship.

To finish her very successful compoign, Maryland's track teom defeoted powerful Villonovo, holders of the notionol indoor trock chompionship in a season-ending dual meet in 1968.

Morylond hos made it known to oll thot once again she will field onother powerhouse this yeor by crushing the Naval Acodemy in their annual encounter. Kehoe's trock machine ploced first in oll 12 events held in the meet.

This seoson the Terps will once ogoin rely on the speed of Rolond Merritt, 60 yord IC4A Chompion. Rolph Jones will odd thot much needed punch the sprint deportment needs.

John Boker, who hos run o metric mile equivalent of o four minute mile will hold down the distonce events while the shorter races go to George Woiteck and Jim Meehon. Woitech hondles the 600 yord ond Meehon runs the 1000 yorder.

The grueling two-mile run is adequately hondled by ACC Cross Country champion Chorlie Shrader along with Russ Traintor, o sophomore.

Members of the oll-importont one mile relay include George Woitech, Rolond Merritt, Jim Colhoun ond Ernie 0 'Keefe. Morylond's two mile team is composed of John Boker, Jim Meehon, Ernie O'Boyle, Marty Brotemorkle ond George Minorik

In the field events, Rich Drescher will hondle the discuss while Jock Honley will put the shot. John Williamson competes in the pole vault, in which he has already set the Novy Fieldhouse record. Elliot Gorrett more thon adequotely handles the long jump olong with John David in the high jump.

## Lacrosse

Lacrosse, though not as well known as most college sports, offers an exciting brand of fast, rough and tumble action. The University of Maryland, in keeping with these standards, consistently fields one of the finest teams in the nation.

This season, coaches John "Hezzie" Howard and Rennie Smith were faced with the unavoidoble problem of rebuilding the Maryland attack. Although All-American Steve LaVaute was returning, replacing the likes of Alan Lowe and Jack Heim was not easy. They had to look no further than the midfield, and quickly converted Doug Carter from middie to attackman. While taking the pressure off LaVaute, Carter added that needed punch and finished in scoring. LaVaute despite injury, has his usual brilliant season, this one being his last.

Maryland had the makings of a championship team simply because of the large number of returnees from last yeor's squad. This fact alone that Maryland had depth in most positions, especially midfield, opened the door to a successful campaign. Starting the season all wrong, the Terps were tied by Princeton and in the process lost star attackman Bart Ellinger. The sloppy play indicated that much work was still needed if they planned to contend for a second straight national title.

Several reasons for the team's future victories were veteran midfielders Steve Pfeiffer, Bruce Hinkle, and Charlie Liembach, all playing in their last season. Hinkle consistently came up with the crucial faceoffs while Liemback, always close at hand gave assistance onywhere it was needed. The steady play of Steve Pfeiffer was significant in his being chosen the only Terp for All-American honors. Bruce Picarillo, Reed Kaester and many others formed the tough midfield units, some of the best in the nation.

Tri champions last year, the Terps were denied individual honor because of their loss to Navy. Taking a 23-2-1 record and a perfect season into the clash with the midshipmen, Maryland
gained its 24 th win, the first over Navy in nine years.
Five different Terps scored goals in this tough defensive battle which saw outstanding defensemen Hugh Mallon, Jack Daily and Craig Hubbard limit the Middies to only three goals. Terp goalie Norm Vander schuyt proved himself to be one of the best in the country with his performance around the nets.

Beating Navy was the high point of the season for the team as well as happy coach Howard. Commenting on the outcome of the rest of the season Howard concluded, "We beat themand to me that represents a successful season."

Convincing victories over North Carolina and Virginia gave the stickers the Atlantic Coast Conference title. The only thing standing between them and the national championship was Johns Hopkins, who the Terps had beaten last year to gain a share of the coveted crown.

The victory over Virginia had been costly, leoving the team physically beaten and without the services of defenseman Craig Hubbard. On May 18, 1968, the Terps dropped from the ranks of the undefeated by losing to a fired up Johns Hopkins eleven, 10-8. They had come so close yet now were so far away.

It had been an uphill struggle the entire season with numerous injuries to key players keeping the Terps from reaching full effectiveness, yet they finished second in the nation. This is truly a tribute to the many hard fighting Maryland players and determined coaches who operate in the game of intercollegiate lacrosse.

In addition to first teom All-American honors presented Steve Pfeiffer, several team members made the second team. These were goalie Norm Vanderschuyt, defenseman Hugh Mallon, midfielder Charlie Liembach and attackman Steve LaVoute. Two others received honorable mention.







## Baseball

Despite o 2-1 loss to Penn State in their seoson's finale, the University Diomondmen, under the watchful eye of head coach, Jack Jackson, compiled the best record of any Terp nine in history.

The outstanding record of nineteen wins, six losses, and one tie resulted in a .731 percentage, thus surpassing that of the 1950 team whose 20-8 record was good for .714. During this 1968 season, five of the six games lost were by one run, while the sixth was by two runs.

This year's team hod strength in both offense and defense, with major contributions coming from the highly talented pitching staff. Two big winners were juniors Mike Herson (5-0) and Tom Bradley (5-2). Other top notch performances were turned in by George Manz (4-2) and Mark Harris (1-1) both seniors.

Ranked as one of the best in the nation, the pitching staff had the lowest Earned Run Average in the entire country. The staff also boasts of three men signing professional contracts. They are Mike Herson, George Manz, and Tom Bradley.

The team as a whole, led by freshman outfielder Jim Norris, batted 285. Norris, a native of Seaford, Long Island, hit . 421 for 21 games. This was good enough to get him the Atlantic Coost Conference batting crown and made the first .400 hitter since Jim Pitt, who set an ACC botting record with a .460 average in 1964. Other players swinging big bats were Gene Hiser (.299) and Bob Simpson (.287).

Except for North Corolina which nipped the Terps in both games of a double-header here on May 11, (1-0) and (2-1), Maryland took its three gome series with every conference rival it ployed. Compiling on ACC record of 12-5-1, the Terps finished in third place.




## Tennis

After finishing a season of thirteen victories with only three defeats, most coaches would have been more than hoppy. Not so with Doyle Royol, head tennis coach of the University. His team's exceptional recard wos only good enough to secure third ploce in the Atlantic Coost Conference.

The netmen made an early show af strength in the Cherry Blossom Tournoment held on their home court. During the entire three days of competition, Maryland did not loose a single set.

Individual effort the essence of victory, is an area where John Schaffer, leader of the young Terps, excelled. Playing out of his number one seeded position, Schaffer hod trouble reaching his patential but teamed up with second seed Dave Werchen to take the number one doubles motch during the post season ACC tournament.

Third seeded Nick Mackoranko, only a freshman truly was the outstonding ployer of the 1969 seoson. While losing only one match the entire season, Nick has the distinction of being the only Terp to take a singles title in the ACC.

Considering the stellar performonces turned in by all Terp netmen this past season, the 1969 campaign should develop a banner year, especiolly since they don't lase o single member from the top six!

The Greek system has been port of much controversy this year. Greeks hove a heritage, a tradition. And this tradition is being challenged. Greeks are no longer isolated. Their off-campus "community" is no longer just a suburb of the University. Newer graups which do not have this tradition, question the system.

Other compus organizations have charged thot Greeks are discriminating against blacks. The Campus Coalition Agoinst Racism ond University individuals are demanding that Greeks change their membership requirements, especially the black ball practice.

Much discussion has begun as a result of the changing attitudes both toward Greeks and among Greeks. But where all this will lead is, at present, a matter of conjecture. Nevertheless, all valid criticism and suggestions ore seriously considered.

The year 1969 hos been a year of change for all men. And so it may be for the Greek system. But change, where change is needed, con only bring impravement.

Pi Rha is campletely open as far as color or religion is concerned.

Delta Upsilan was founded natianally at Williams College in 1834, making it the sixth oldest national fraternity. DU was founded as a reaction to the secrecy emphasized in fraternities in the early 1800's. Men from several colleges gothered to found on order bosed an the ideals of justice, friendship, character, and liberal culture. And they chose the name Delta Upsilon, a translation of their motto "Justice, our foundation." Todoy, their colors of blue and gold are seen on nearly 100 campuses thraughaut the nation.

The job of estoblishing a chapter isn't easy, but it's being done eagerly. As one member remarked, "Right now, we're throwing out our grappling hooks."

Hard work and endless hours are the ingredients of one of America's top daily college newspapers - the Diamondback. With a new high circulation of 20,000 copies Monday through Friday. The Diamondback expanded its staff, equipment, and coverage, trying to include every facet of life at the University of Maryland during 1968-69. Diamondback stoff members get professionol experience from working with odvertising, soles, news reporting, layout, and copy editing in a tightly organized operation.

The news department's growth and efficiency was illustrated on election night, when o massive coordinated effort by the staff produced the most up-to-date morning-after coverage of any comporable poper on the East Coost.

Editor-in-chief Steve Parks reorganized ond decentralized the staff after the first semester resignotion of monoging editor Iro Allen.

Editor Parks olso enlarged the editoriol poge layout. His endorsement of Richard Nixon was one of the big surprises of the year.

Surprise characterized much of the Diamondback's news. The pre-spring nude craze . . the strength of the new Third Porty in the SGA elections .. The HEW desegregation order.

The sports department experienced one of the most exciting years in its history. A feud between Coach Bob Ward and Executive Sports Editor Dave Bourdon exemplified Ward's deterioroting relations with the college community which eventually led to a player revolt and the coach's resignotion. Bourdon produced one of the year's most outstanding stories following Ward's departure: a three page examination of the Ward ero.

The continued expansion of the paper's news coverage was reflected by the streamlining of the business side. Under Business Manager Tom Winer, total income soored to $\$ 145,000$. Circulation went up to 20,000 copies daily - up 3,000 over $1967-$ 68. Averoge number of pages increosed from 12 to 15 per issue, with 144 issues published for the year. Winer also tightened controls on spending, instituting a formula which tied paper size to ad lineoge and beginning daily billing.

This, then was the Diomondback for 1968-69-a dynomic force on a restless compus.
