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



D DOG.


A tree, and a man, and a dog. The tree gives umbrageous protection to the man; the man owns the dog, and the dog guards the man. The dog is a noble animal.

KID.


Here is a goat and a lass and a kid. Is the kid the young of the goat? Oh no, the kid is the young of William Brown.


S SWELL.

See the sea! Do you hear the roar of the sea? Oh yes, I hear the roar of the sea, and see the heavy swell on the shore.




T TWO.

Oh yes, the boy did eat the figs and the nuts and the


plums and the cakes!

He must not live in the house.


Rural Scene.
