Preface

Two years ago, in the stillness of a calm, fragrant summer night, it pleased GoD to call to Himself our father and founder, the Rev. John Mason Neale. When day broke on the morning of the Transfiguration, its beams fell on a weary body, newly laid to rest, and on a very sore bereaven home.

What Dr. Neale was, in his relation to the Sisterhood he founded, it would not be easy to express. How, through all the troubles and difficulties that beset S. Margaret's at various times of its existence, his far-sighted judgments and loving courage upheld, and taught, and guided his Sisters. How, first by his example, and then in sermons, Scripture lessons, prayers, and conferences, he spared no pains to brace them for their daily labours, and for the high line of religious life

which he had marked out for them to follow: the union of action and contemplation.

Now, taken suddenly from amongst us, in, as it seemed, the summer of his life and of his toils, he has left us with our duties still before us; with his lessons, so we hope, still in our minds.

By the help of GOD we continue unto this day. But we are aware that if the spirit of our founder is to remain with us, his teaching must not be entrusted to the guardianship of mere memory or manuscript. Therefore we not only prepare his sermons for the press, but collect in the present volume the devotional exercises given by him at various times for private use. We hope that they may be profitable to other Sisters besides ourselves; and we also consider this collection to be a tribute due to our founder's memory.

It has been subjected to no revision external to the Sisterhood. It is simply a Sisters' book, prepared by Sisters, who, alone, are responsible for it. Various devotions have been added to the original matter, in order to render the book more useful as a manual; but the additions are carefully in accordance with Dr. Neale's own teaching, and, in almost all cases, from books given by himself for devotional use; almost the only exception being the *Himmlisches Palmgärtlein* (the German original of the *Cæleste Palmetum*), which has kindly been put into our hands by Mr. J. D. Chambers.

were among the books most generally given by him for his Sisters' use; but, as these are all easily attainable, it has been thought undesirable to swell the volume by selecting portions of their contents.

The parts not by Dr. Neale are marked with an asterisk. A supplementary volume of Litanies, &c., is in the press.

Fully aware of the imperfection of our work, and of its responsibility, we yet dare to hope that it may not be wholly unacceptable nor unprofitable; for, truly, "we have been careful that they that will read may have delight, and that they that are desirous to commit to memory might have ease, and that all into whose hands it comes might have profit."

- 18 The high hills are a refuge for the wild goats: and so are the stony rocks for the conies.
- 19 He appointed the moon for certain seasons: and the sun knoweth his going down.
- 20 Thou makest darkness that it may be night: wherein all the beasts of the forest do move.
- 21 The lions roaring after their prey; do seek their meat from God.
- 22 The sun ariseth, and they get them away together: and lay them down in their dens.
- 23 Man goeth forth to his work, and to his labour: until the evening.
- 24 O Lord, how manifold are thy works: in wisdom hast thou made them all; the earth is full of thy riches.
- 25 So is the great and wide sea also: wherein are things creeping innumerable, both small and great beasts.
- 26 There go the ships, and there is that Leviathan: whom thou hast made to take his pastime therein.
- 27 These wait all upon thee: that thou mayest give them meat in due season.
- 28 When thou givest it them they gather it: and when thou openest thy hand they are filled with good.
- 29 When thou hidest thy face they are troubled: when thou takest away their breath they die, and are turned again to their dust.

- 30 When thou lettest thy breath go forth they shall be made : and thou shalt renew the face of the earth.
- 31 The glorious Majesty of the Lord shall endure for ever : the Lord shall rejoice in his works.

ASPIRATIONS FOR FREQUENT USE.

Blessed be the Name of our LORD JESUS CHRIST. O Good JESU, be to me a JESU, and save me. O Name of JESU, sweet Name: O Name of JESUS, lovely Name; O Name of JESU, strengthening Name. What is JESU, but SAVIOUR? therefore, O JESU, for the Glory of Thy Name, be to me a JESU, and save Thou me.

O Most Gentle Jesu, most loving Jesu, most longed for Jesu! O Jesu, the Salvation of them that trust in Thee! O Jesu, the Consolation of

them that fly to Thee for succour! O Sweet Jesu, Remission of our sins! O Jesus, Son of the Virgin Mary! Jesu, Jesu, Jesu, have mercy upon me; give me grace, wisdom, love, purity, humility, that I may perfectly love, and praise, and serve Thee. Let me glory in Thee here, and come to Thy perfect fruition there. And this I ask for all who call upon Thy Holy Name.

OF SELF-EXAMINATION.

- 1. Place yourself in the presence of God.
- 2. Ask for light and grace.
- 3. Offer to His glory any amendment you may find yourself to have made.
- 4. But if you find that you have done little good, or much evil, be humbled, but in no wise discouraged; and, by GoD's grace, start afresh.
- 5. Thinking over all the circumstances of the day (week, month, &c.), quietly consider how you have acted towards God, your neighbours, and yourself, in thought, word, act, and omission; and particularly as regards your resolutions, your passions, and your evil inclinations.

QUESTIONS TO BE USED OCCASIONALLY.

I. TOWARDS GOD.

LORD, make me to know Thee, and to know myself.

1. How are you disposed concerning mortal sin? Are you fully determined never to commit it on any account whatever? Has this determination been kept since you last made it till the present time? [Herein lies the foundation of the spiritual life.]

2. Concerning Gop's commandments? Do you take pleasure in them? [Healthy persons enjoy wholesome food, and reject that which is bad.]

3. Concerning venial sins? Are there any to which you are specially inclined? worse still; are there any that you love?

4. Concerning spiritual exercises? Do you value them? or do they vex you? which of them do you like most or least? [And if you feel distaste for any, search out the cause of your feeling.]

5. Concerning God Himself? Do you take pleasure in thinking of Him? Is your heart turned fully to His love? Do you feel singular joy in considering His greatness, goodness, and sweetness? Do you make room for thought of Him amongst all other occupations of mind or body?

6. Concerning Christ made Man? Do you give yourself up to ministering to Him? sit at His feet, and hear His word? seek Him and the shadow

of His Cross in all things here, that you may follow Him in Virginal glory there?

7. Concerning your vows? [And here examine yourself by your rule.]

- 8. With your lips: how do you speak of God? Do you take all possible pains to fill your proper part in the Offices of the Community? by study, by punctuality, by attention? [Omitting responses likens us to the sleeping Apostles in the Garden.] Do you shrink from speaking of Him at any time, from shyness or human respect, or false humility? ["Curse ye Meroz," &c. "Whoso shall not confess me," &c.]
- 9. In your works: have you a single eye to God's glory? Do you check natural distaste or impetuosity, and work quietly, without hurry? Do you wish to see fruit of your work? or to begin, or finish, or go on with it, your own self?

10. What have you given up for GoD? How thoroughly?

II. TOWARDS SELF.

- 1. How do you love yourself? with the spirit of earth or of heaven? With a desire for all manner of comfort; or for whatever shall most glorify God?
- 2. Do you think of what people will say of you? Do you think of what the Angels will say of you?
 - 3. Are you patient with yourself?
 - 4. How are you minded, touching a low esteem

of yourself, on your own part and on that of others?

- 5. With your lips: do you ever boast? or flatter yourself in conversation?
- 6. In your works: do you injure your health unnecessarily [a stitch in time saves nine], or shrink from anything you ought to do?
 - 7. What are your earthly wishes?
 - 8. And hopes?
 - 9. What is your ruling passion?
 - 10. Do you yield to pride or despondency?

III. TOWARDS YOUR NEIGHBOUR.

- 1. On entering the religious life, did you yield up all your natural objects of affection to your LORD?
- 2. If He has lent them, or any of them, to you again, have you accepted the loan gratefully, and do you use it for His greater glory? or for your own pleasure only?
 - 3. Three degrees of love :-

Love of an object for it's own sake. Love of an object for God's sake. Love of God in that object.

- 4. How do you fulfil your duty of intercessory prayer?
- 5. How are you minded towards other people in general? Do you act towards your Sisters, your

patients, your children, your visitors, as towards our LORD in them?

- 6. Do you neglect any act of kindness or duty that you might show another? from carelessness, ignorance, misapprehension?
- 7. Do you execute duties which will bring you credit, and leave other duties in the background unperformed? or take credit to yourself for others' work?
- 8. Do you misrepresent or carry gossiping tales from one to another? Do you needlessly injure the character of another Sister in the eyes of the Superior or the Priest? [This is more hurtful to the community than it would be to lay a train for blowing up the house.]
- 9. How do you find fault? like S. Stephen? [And all . . . looking stedfastly upon him, saw his face as it had been the face of an Angel.]
- 10. Do you dare to speak out when your duty requires it? [Am I my brother's keeper?]

- 3. Did I do it in hope, not only that there are such blessings, and such promises, but that they are mine?
- 4. Did I do it for love of Jesus only: that I might show my love to Him, and in my poor manner, requite His love to me?
- 5. If I had to do it over again, what chiefly would I do that I did not do in it?
- 6. If I had to do it over again, what chiefly would I leave undone that I did in it?
- 7. How does it seem compared with what I know it would have been, had it been done by a Saint?
- 8. Do I firmly resolve, if I have the same opportunity again, to use it more wholly to the Glory of God?

PREPARATION FOR EASTER CONFESSION.

[S. Bernard.]

I. In union with Thy most bitter grief, O Thou. Who Thyself didst carry my sins, and bear my infirmities, LORD JESUS CHRIST, with the whole multitude of true penitents, and of those that seek Thee in truth, I confess to Thee all my sins: evil committed, good omitted: good done from impure motives, or done negligently: as Thou best knowest them in weight, number, and measure: and the lost days of my life, in which I have offended Thee, and lessened Thy praise, and fell away from Thee, the chief good, and drew my neighbour into

my fall. Accept, O LORD, out of my life the residue of my years: but for those which I have wasted and lost, a broken and contrite heart, O God, Thou wilt not despise. My days have gone by without fruit. I cannot recall them; but grant that I may, at least, recollect them in the bitterness of my soul. LORD, the deep abyss of my misery calls upon the deep abyss of Thy mercy. Shut not up Thy loving-kindness in displeasure: let not the inexhaustible fountain of Thy mercy be dried up towards me on account of my sins: Thou that hast mercy on all, and hatest nothing that Thou hast made, and passest by men's iniquity to the end they should repent. It pertaineth to Thee, O LORD, to forgive sins: have pity on me, while it is the time of grace and compassion: while it is the time of amendment, grant that I may merit the happiness of Thy blessing, so that in the Last Day I may not be smitten with the word of Thy curse.

2. Grant, Lord, that I may forsake my besetting sins, and may do such things as shall please Thee: Grant that the time I have hitherto given to myself, I may now give to Thee: that where sin hath abounded, there grace may much more abound. Call to mind, Lord Jesus, that it is not Thy wont to lose any whom the Father hath given to Thee: rather it is Thy nature and property ever to have mercy and to forgive: to destroy none, but to save.

For Thy FATHER sent Thee not into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Thee should be saved: that Thou mightest be an atonement, and an advocate, not against us, but for us. For that which we owe, Thou hast paid: for that which we have sinned, Thou dost atone: that which we have neglected, Thou suppliest.

- 3. Therefore, Lord, both now and in the hour of my death let Thy plenary and even superfluous satisfaction, Thy most precious Death, and the inestimable price of Thy Blood, atone for me: as well as the Commemoration of Thy satisfaction, the Venerable Sacrament of Thy Body and Blood, which is offered daily to Thee in Thy Church for the salvation of Thy faithful; in which Thou Thyself art Priest and Sacrifice, He that offers and He that is offered, and He to Whom it is offered: Grant that it may now obtain for me the grace which I merit not: and hereafter the rest and the glory which Thy most bitter death has purchased.
- 4. Let the consideration, then, O Lord, of human frailty move and incline Thee: for Thou knowest what is the substance of man, and that Thou didst not form Him in vain: and preserve me, the work of Thy loving-kindness, that Thy labour may not have been expended to no purpose, nor the effusion of Precious Blood be useless. Thou Who art the Purification of sinners, grant that being cleansed from the impurity of sin, I may see Thee hereafter

face to face, and happily attain to Thee: Who livest and reignest with the FATHER and the HOLY GHOST: world without end. Amen.

O most sweet and gentle Saviour Jesus, Who didst create me, and hast renewed me with Thy most pure and precious and sacred Blood, pierce and penetrate my mind with the dear remembrance of the inestimable mercies Thou hast showed me. And grant me to taste truly of the bitter griefs which Thou didst bear for me, that by the thoughts of all Thy goodness my cowardly heart may be quickened to love Thee. And, perceiving the fragrance of the passion which for me Thou didst bear and undergo, make me shrink from the infection of my sins. O most pitying Jesus, on me, poor, miserable, shame-faced sinner, turn Thine eyes: wherewith Thou lookedst on S. Peter when he had denied Thee, and on Magdalene when she had grievously sinned against Thee, and on the good thief hanging at Thy right Hand on the Cross; and let me this day weep for my sins with S. Deliver me from the hands of mine enemies, as Thou deliveredst the woman taken in adultery; and call me from the sepulchre of sin as Thou calledst Lazarus. Give me grace to walk in

And by His sorrow when He was condemned to death, I pray Thee, Eternal FATHER, give us a gentle judgment at our death. And by His great sorrow when He said, Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani, I pray Thee, Heavenly FATHER, never to forsake us, and never to let us forsake Thee. Amen. Our FATHER.

And I offer to Thee, O FATHER Eternal, all the sufferings that Thy Blessed Son ever bore in this world: especially His most bitter Passion, His precious Scourging, His Head crowned with thorns, the Exaltation of His Sacred Body by the fixing of

the nails, His Most Precious Death, and the opening of His Side. I pray Thee, O FATHER, by the merits of that Passion, that it may please Thee to forgive us all we owe Thee in any way by reason of our wasted time. Or else be pleased to set that Passion between us sinners and Thy justice. Amen. Our FATHER, &c.

And by the very exceeding love which constrained Thy Blessed Son to come down from Heaven, to bear such sorrow and such pain; by that love I pray Thee, Eternal FATHER, of Thine infinite goodness to fill us with such love that we may be fit to enter into Thy blessed Heaven so soon as our souls shall depart from our bodies. FOR DEVOUT RECEPTION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT.

CONSIDERATION.

[French, 16th c.

Moses put off his shoes before he drew near the burning bush, and Esther washed and anointed herself to please King Ahasuerus; Abigail carried gifts to David for the quenching of his wrath; the Queen of Sheba made herself ready with rich things for the sight of Solomon's glory. In like wise, daughter, make oblation of the affections of thy heart; wash thee with the water of contrition; anoint thee with the oil of grace; make good store of holy works; and see thou come betimes, that thou mayest see Solomon in his glory, and appease the wrath of God, and be dear and pleasant to JESUS, and feel the warmth of the burning bush within thy soul. The Blessed Sacrament is the bush burning with the fire of love. Jesus dwelleth therein as Ahasuerus in his secret chamber. By reason of our sins, God's wrath is kindled against us, even as David was wroth with wicked Nabal. And the glory of a greater than Solomon sitteth here hidden after a manner incomprehensible. Prepare thee, then, like Moses, Esther, and Abigail, and that good Queen; that thou mayest hear JESUS speak in thy heart, and mayest sweetly enjoy

thy Bridegroom Jesus, and mayest obtain the justification of Divine virtue; that the eye of thy soul may contemplate Him Whom thy heart desires; and say thou to Him: I cannot speak, I cannot say that which is in my heart, O Divine Goodness, and if Thou help me not, sweet Jesu, Thou must forgive my poverty; I am constrained to draw nigh Thee.

Most Sacred Body of Jesus, Thy Bride, the Church, commands me to receive Thee, Pure Flesh of my God. And I know myself unworthy, and I see that I am not sufficient for this thing. Help me, then, O Blessed Son of God, purge Thou my heart; forgive my sins; lift up my desires; increase in me the fruits of repentance; draw me to Thee, as Thou drewest Thy disciples; look upon me as thou lookedst on S. Peter; feed me as Thou fedst the multitude; deliver me from mine enemies as Thou deliveredst the Canaanitish woman; satisfy my desire as Thou satisfiedst the hunger of the children of Israel; let Thy holy Manna, Thy precious Body, strengthen me and give me Heavenly might, that I may live righteously, and go on like Elijah to the mountain where I shall see my God. Amen.

Cleanse thy heart with all diligence; and grieve with a great sorrow for thy sins. And confess all

and every the faults thou hast committed against God and thy neighbour, and make satisfaction for them as it shall be ordered thee. Before thou comest to receive the holy, and sacred, and precious Body of Jesus Christ, thou shalt retire into some secret place, where thou shalt bow thyself down, and close thine eyes to keep thy mind from wandering. So think of what thou art, and what He is Whom thou wouldest receive, and what the effect will be if thou receivest Him worthily. And having for some space thought upon these things, it will be well to say on this wise:

O most sacred fruit of life! O singular bread of angels! O most holy manna, sweet, precious, and beyond all things loving, what eye is able to behold Thee? What heart is worthy to receive Thee? What man is worthy to draw nigh to Thee, Who art brighter than the sun, and comprehendest the heavens and all elements, and dwellest in majesty unapproachable? I acknowledge and confess that I am utterly unworthy to lift up my face toward Thee. I cannot receive Thee as I ought, and if I leaned not on Thy sovereign mercy, I durst not open mine eyes before Thee; because I have committed so many sins, because my innumerable sins are above all things abominable, and the number of them is past mine understanding; and the frailty of my nature cannot detest their unspeakable horror. Therefore, O pitying FATHER, cleanse the heart of Thy daughter; and, since Thou willest that I behold and receive Thee, justify my poor soul; so that seeing Thee I may desire Thee, desiring Thee I may love Thee, loving Thee I may receive Thee worthily; and, receiving Thee, may, with all good Christians, be received by Thee, now in grace, and finally in Thy Kingdom of eternal glory. Amen.

DEVOUT CONTEMPLATION.

If thou wilt worthily receive the Body of Jesus CHRIST, thou must beforehand consider that in the Blessed Sacrifice are Bread, Wine, and Flesh, for the food of thy soul; the Bread of Angels, given by God to man; the Wine drawn from the grape of the Virginal Vine, and pressed in the wine-press of the Cross, which makes glad the hearts of Saints by the ecstasy of the spirit of Divine love, because they behold the love which Jesus made manifest in the shedding of His precious blood; and the Flesh is the precious Body of the Paschal Lamb, and of the fatted calf, killed for the food and support of the poor prodigal. And when thou hast considered these things, wash thy hands and thy lips and thy feet. Thy hands are thy works, thy lips are thy words, thy feet are thy thoughts and thine affections; let there be in thee none but holy

works, Christian words, and pure affections. And when thou hast thus, by full confession, purged thy heart, and lips, and body, thou mayest say:

O most sovereign food! O most salutary refection! O Heavenly Table, where FATHER, and SON, and HOLY SPIRIT are verily present, and at which all spirits are refreshed and fed. Who shall make me worthy to approach Thee, and gather up the little crumbs beneath Thee? Who shall grant me this day to receive Thee, O my God, without offending Thee, while I receive? Who shall help me to prepare, if Thy sovereign mercy be not my Helper? Make me grieve duly for my sins before I draw nigh Thee. Give me a fervent desire to receive Thee as I ought. Kindle my heart with Thy love; strengthen my soul with Thy grace; justify me by Thy mercy; that I may alway abide in Thee, now by grace, and eternally by glory. Amen.

PRAYER TO OUR BLESSED LORD IN THE MOST HOLY SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR.

I salute Thee, most holy and precious Body of my Creator Jesus Christ, Which art perfectly contained in this Sacrament. I confess and acknowledge Thee with my tongue, and love Thee with my heart, and do earnestly pray Thee that Thou wouldest please to visit my poor soul which is so sick. Thou art the Sacred Victim offered to GOD the FATHER for me. Thou art the Fountain of grace and mercy: come oftentimes to visit my soul, that in Thy presence it may recover its strength, and find grace and comfort in Thee. My sweetest LORD, look not upon my sins, nor upon my great iniquities, for they are too manifold; but call to remembrance Thy great mercy. Thou art He Who giveth virtue to herbs and stones and all created things. Thou art the spotless Lamb, white and innocent, this day and every day sacrificed and presented to God the FATHER for the redemption and salvation of Thy people. O sweet Manna from heaven! O fair glory, kindle Thy grace and holy love in my heart. Extinguish all vice in me; give me of Thy virtue plentifully. Increase and multiply upon me Thy mercy; grant me perfect health of body and soul. Bow Thyself and come down: come to me, that I may come to Thee, and be one with Thee for ever. O Sacrament great and reverend, I pray Thee by Thy mighty power, that all mine enemies be driven backwards, and all my sins forgiven me. Give me good purpose to amend my life and my ways. Order my thoughts and works according to Thy holy will. O my most sweet Jesus, I beseech Thee that my understanding be enlightened, and my desire kindled, and my hope strengthened and

surely grounded; that my poor life be mended, and daily go from strength to strength; and that, finally, I may die a holy death, pleasing to Thee, and attain life everlasting. Amen.

Unsought, Thou seekest us, -uncalled, Thou comest to our poor dwellings: what wilt Thou do to those who seek and call Thee? I call Thee, good JESU, come to my soul;

enter this dwelling darkened by sin. With Thee will enter light, and grace, and salvation.

I desire Thee, O LORD, I pray for Thee, and I love Thee.

[A Spanish Prayer of the 15th c.

Almighty God, Who openest Thine Hand, and fillest all things living with goodness: Who art the true and living Bread That comest down from Heaven, in the strength whereof we must go all the days of our life through the wilderness of this world, till we come to the Mount of God: Behold, O Lord, how I, who can do no good thing of myself, come to Thee, Who canst do all things:—

beseeching Thee that as Thou hast given me a good will, so Thou wouldest enable me to perform it in deed; delighting always to labour in Thy service, desiring above all things to be dedicated wholly to Thee, turning away mine eyes lest they behold vanities, and quickened in Thy most holy law. And grant me now so to receive this "Bread of the Mighty, and this Wine that blossometh into Virgins," that everything weak in me may be strengthened, everything impure may be cleansed: so that pleasing Thee both in body and soul, I may finally find Thee, after serving Thee here, to be my exceeding and eternal great reward there: Who livest and reignest with the FATHER and the Holy Ghost, now and ever. Amen.

THREE OFFERINGS TO GOD THE FATHER.

The First Offering.

O God, the Father Eternal, I confess that I am unworthy to receive this precious and worthy Sacrament; and have not such contrition and sorrow for my sins as is needful for a worthy reception thereof. But, O Father, I offer Thee Thy Son our Lord: and all the bitterness and sorrow which He bore in this world to make satisfaction for my faults and sins; particularly the Agony He suffered in the Garden, saying, My soul is exceeding sorrow-

ful, even unto death, and sweating blood and water, by reason of the utter grief which filled His Heart. And I offer Thee, Eternal Father, the great and bitter woe that He suffered; hanging naked on the Cross, and saying, My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me? for of all comfort in heaven or in earth His holy and most sacred soul was forsaken, so that it was swallowed up of sorrow. And He suffered and died for me, to redeem me from everlasting damnation. O Heavenly Father, I humbly beseech Thee, by virtue of the grief and sorrow of Thine Only-Begotten Son, forgive my little sorrow and contrition for my sins. And vouchsafe to prepare my soul worthily to receive this worthy Sacrament. Amen.

The Second Offering.

O God, the Father Eternal, I confess that I have not done penance for my sins as is fitting for a worthy reception of the worthy Sacrament; but I offer Thee Thine Only-Begotten Son, Jesus Christ, and the sorrowful penance that He bare to deliver me from the pains of hell; and all the troubles He endured in this world more than two-and-thirty years; especially the pains he suffered in His bitter Passion; all the wounds He received in His scourging, when, from the Crown of His glorious Head to the Sole of His blessed Feet,

there was no soundness in Him. And the pain He felt when the Crown of Thorns was pressed upon His holy Head; and when, being condemned to death, He bare His Cross to Calvary between two thieves, and His blessed Body was stretched upon the Cross, and His sacred Hands and Feet were pierced with great nails, and He was hung up shamefully between two murderers. fainting and dying in the deepest depth of all agony to make atonement for my sins. O God the FATHER, full of mercy, I beseech Thee, by virtue of that dolorous penance which Thy dear Son bare for me in His bitter Passion, satisfy for what is wanting in me, concerning the little penance I have done for my sins; and vouchsafe to prepare my soul worthily to receive the Blessed Sacrament, Amen.

The Third Offering.

O God, the Father Eternal, I confess that I have not the fervour and the loving desire which are fitting for a worthy reception of this Blessed and Holy Sacrament; but I offer Thee Thine Only-Begotten Son, Jesus Christ; and the great desire and fervency of love which made Him descend from Heaven to the Virgin's womb, and take human Flesh, and unite His most high Godhead to our poor manhood. And I offer Thee

His earnest longing for my redemption when He hung upon the Tree of the Cross, crying, I thirst; and saying, FATHER, into Thy Hands I commend My Spirit; crying with a loud voice, I die of love. And I offer Thee the great and exceeding love wherewith He presents, and alway will present, to Thee in heavenly Glory, the merits which by His Holy Life and Passion, His Resurrection and glorious Ascension, He hath obtained for us; and by virtue of that perfect charity and divine Love of Thy dear Son, be pleased to warm and kindle my poor soul and the affection of my heart with the same divine Love and fervent desire; and fit me worthily to receive this Blessed and Holy Sacrament to the glory and praise of the Blessed and Holy TRINITY; and of the glorious Virgin, and all the Holy Church triumphant and militant; and for the conversion of all poor sinners; and for the souls of the faithful departed; and for . . .

O God, my Father, and my Creator, I, thy poor wretched creature all deformed by sin, come unto Thee, a poor daughter to my sweet Father; a poor faithless bride to my Bridegroom and my Friend; a poor sick woman to my Sovereign Physician; a poor starving woman to the Refec-

tion and Life of my soul. O my God, my FATHER. I long for Thee with all my heart. Come, LORD, and tarry not. Come, my LORD, and my GOD; O tarry no longer. O my God, Who didst create me in Thy fair Image and Divine Likeness; and didst redeem me with Thy precious Blood, and elect me in this holy time of grace and Christianity: come unto me, Thy poor creature, and tarry not. LORD JESUS CHRIST, pour Thy grace upon me, and kindle me with Thy heavenly love. O my God, I would I had in me all the beauty of all angels, and all the burning love of the Seraphs, and all the holiness and purity of the blessed Spirits in Heaven; or all the fervent devotion, love, and desire of all Thy blessed friends and elect, who ever were, or are, or will be, in heaven or on earth; that, filled with those most holy perfections, I might receive Thee in this holy and blessed Sacrament. O most Blessed LORD, I confess that I am a miserable sinner, unworthy of so great a blessing: but I beseech Thee for Thine Own merit's sake, make my soul one with Thee for ever. Amen.

[Then say three times:]

LORD, I am not worthy that Thou shouldest come under my roof: but speak the word only, and Thy servant shall be healed.

[Then, trusting in the goodness and mercy of our LORD JESUS CHRIST, go and receive Him with fear and reverence, and

in firm faith that it is your LORD and your GOD, Who can save you or condemn, Who came down from Heaven to redeem you, and so was born of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and hung upon the Cross, by reason of His great love for you. And when you have received, lift up your heart, and say silently:

Enter my heart, O God, and make it holy. Enter my heart, and make it pure. Enter my heart, O God, and keep it for Thyself, and never part me from Thy heavenly Love. My Lord and my God, I beseech Thee, vouchsafe to open the virtue of This blessed Sacrament to my soul: fill me with all its grace, strength, and merit. And by that virtue wherewith Thou changedst water into wine, I pray Thee, change me into Thine Own Self, according to Thy Word.

[Then say Nunc dimittis, with blessed Simeon, and rejoice with spiritual joy. Think that this is He Whom he bare in his arms, and had so longed to see. And after that, say:]

JESU, Most Mighty GoD: JESU, most Good Shepherd: JESU, most Royal LORD: I, Thy poor, and little, and miserable handmaid, with all my heart, and all my might, and all my will, and all my love, do most humbly pray Thee that Thy Precious Body and Blood which I have now received may abide in my heart for ever; and grant that no stain of sin may dwell in me, who by Thy grace am nourished and rejoiced

with the most pure and holy Sacrament of Thy Body.

PREPARATIONS AND THANKSGIVINGS * For Special Occasions.

ON ENTERING THE RELIGIOUS LIFE.

- I. Who cometh? CHRIST, Who, when He saw thee, loved thee, because He beheld in thy soul that love for Him which He Himself inspired.
- 2. To whom? To a soul which hath kept the commandments of God from her youth, and, desiring a yet more faithful service, asketh, Good Master, what good thing shall I do to inherit eternal life?
- 3. Wherefore? To make answer unto thee: Yet lackest thou one thing: sell all that thou hast, and distribute to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come, follow Me.

Aspiration. The LORD hath set His seal upon me, that none else may enter into my heart.

Thanksgiving.

1. By faith behold Christ in the midst of thine heart, looking upon thee well pleased, and saying: There is none that hath left house, or brethren, or

sisters, or father, or mother, or wife, or children, or lands for My sake, and the gospel's, but shall receive an hundredfold now in this time, with persecutions; and, in the world to come, eternal life.

2. Look upon yourself from this day forth as irrevocably bound to the service of Christ, though your life-vows be not yet pronounced, and ask our Lord to let you rather die than forsake Him.

3. Pray that every day of your future life be marked by advance in the way of perfection, and that nothing may stop or hinder you in your course.

Aspiration. Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither hath it entered into the heart of man to conceive the good things that He hath prepared for them that love Him.

DAY OF PROFESSION.

Preparation.

- I. Who cometh? CHRIST, the glorious Bridegroom. Who hideth the matchless treasures that He brings His brides beneath the veils of poverty, subjection, and all self-denial: Who hath so long time said unto thine heart, Leave all, and thou shalt find all.
- 2. To whom? To this unworthy Bride, who gave the world her first thoughts and cares, and long resisted the appeals of His love.
 - 3. Wherefore? That He may say to thee, now,-

Thou hast not chosen Me, but I have chosen thee: and, hereafter, if thou wilt,—Come, My elect one.

Aspiration. The world and its vain pomps I have despised for the love of my LORD JESUS CHRIST, Whom I have seen, Whom I have loved, in Whom I believe, in Whom I rejoice.

Thanksgiving.

- I. By faith behold Christ in thine heart, saying unto thee, He that abideth in Me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit.
- 2. Seek to comprehend the marvellous honour of being chosen as the bride of Christ. So great a King the Bridegroom, so poor a little creature the bride! But love is strong as death.
- 3. Remember that to whom much is given, of him shall much be required. Pray that thou mayest so labour and suffer now, that thou mayest then hear from thy dear LORD's lips those sweetest words, Come, bride of CHRIST, receive the crown which the LORD hath prepared for thee for ever.

Aspiration. One thing have I desired of the LORD which I will require: even that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to behold the fair beauty of the LORD, and to visit His temple.

RENEWAL OF VOWS.

Preparation.

- 1. Who cometh? CHRIST, Who drew thee to Himself by the cords of love, parting thee from the world, and binding thee unto Himself by a threefold cord not quickly to be broken.
- 2. To whom? To a sinner in Jerusalem, unworthy of her LORD's dear love; who hath sought not to break but to loosen her bonds, and hath feared to commit herself entirely into GoD's hands.
- 3. Wherefore? That He may say unto thee, If thou wilt return, O Israel, return unto Me. Wilt thou not, from this time, cry unto Me, My FATHER, Thou art the Guide of my youth?

Aspiration, I will arise, and go to my FATHER.

Thanksgiving.

- 1. By faith behold Christ in thy heart, receiving the renewal of thy vows, and renewing thy strength like the eagle's.
- 2. Pour out thy heart in contrition before thy LORD, and ask for grace that thou mayest pay that thou hast vowed, and say not before the Angel, It was an error.
- 3. Seek for grace, that thou mayest comprehend with all saints what is the length, and breadth, and depth, and height, and to know the love of Christ,

which passeth knowledge; that, absorbed in that sea of love, thou mayest die to all else, and live to Him alone.

Aspiration. God is a faithful judge, strong and patient: shall God be provoked every day?

ANNIVERSARY OF PROFESSION.

- I. Who cometh? CHRIST, the True and Jealous Bridegroom, Who showeth thee all stains wherewith thou hast defiled thy soul since its baptism to the religious life, saying, Is this the crown wherewith I crowned thee, My bride, in the day of Mine espousals, and of the rejoicing of Mine heart?
- 2. To whom? To His faithless bride, who boweth herself down in shame, saying, For these things I weep; mine heart is turned within me, for I have grievously rebelled.
- 3. Wherefore? To make loving answer: Awake, awake, put on thy strength, O Zion; put on thy beautiful garments, O Jerusalem, the holy city; for henceforth there shall no more come into thee the uncircumcised and the unclean. Shake thyself from the dust; arise and sit down, O Jerusalem; loose thyself from the bands of thy neck, O captive daughter of Zion.

Aspiration. I laid me down and slept: I awaked; for the LORD sustained me.

Thanksgiving.

- I. By faith behold CHRIST in thy heart, saying unto thee, I remember thee, the kindness of thy youth, the love of thine espousals, when thou wentest after Me in the wilderness, in a land that was not sown.
- 2. Render thanks to God, Who hath troubled the waters of thy soul for its healing, and say, Thy Word, O Lord, healeth all things, for Thou hast power of life and death. I have found Him Whom my soul loveth; I held Him, and would not let Him go.
- 3. Earnestly render the renunciation of every act, and word, and thought of sin, saying, Away from me, all ye that work vanity; for the LORD hath heard the voice of my weeping.

Aspiration. My beloved is mine, and I am His: He feedeth among the lilies.

*SEVEN DEVOUT CONTEMPLATIONS AND PRAYERS FOR HOLY COMMUNION.

1. JESUS, AT THE LAST SUPPER, OUR KING.

Set Christ before thee in the Blessed Sacrament as the glorious King of heaven and earth, sitting at His great banquet, receiving ready and joyful service from Angels and all creatures, and hear how He saith, "All power is given unto Me, in heaven and in earth." "Riches and honour are with Me; yea, durable riches and righteousness, that I may cause those that love Me to inherit substance; and I will fill their treasures." Come humbly, like a poor forsaken beggar, to the throne of the Most Meek King, and seek His grace.

Prayer.

O CHRIST JESU, King of Glory! I, poor and miserable, draw near Thy royal table. Thou dost invite and lovingly compel me, else I durst not approach it. Look, therefore, with mercy on my misery and need: I ask no riches, nor honour, nor earthly joy; one thing alone I crave, Thy grace, O JESU; and my heart's desire shall be fulfilled.

2. Jesus, in the Garden of Gethsemane, our Judge.

Consider how CHRIST shall one day judge the quick and the dead in the garden of Gethsemane, which is in the valley of Jehoshaphat. Sin-laden kneel before His judgment-throne, and pray that He may show thee mercy in that day.

Prayer.

O JESU, all power is given Thee of Thy FATHER

to judge the quick and the dead. How shall I stand before Thy face, when Thou shalt call me to account for every thought, and word, and work, in that very place where, for my sins' sake, Thou didst wrestle with the bitterness of death? Be merciful, then, to me, a sinner, for the love's sake which Thou showest me in this Holy Sacrament. Look on the Wounds of Thy hands, and of Thy feet; look on the sacred Wound of Thy side, whereby Thou givest us entrance to Thy most tender heart, and spare me. On these marks of Thy love, O Jesu, J will now and ever fix mine eyes, unceasingly praying and saying, When Thou comest to judge the world, condemn me not.

3. JESUS, IN THE FLAGELLATION, OUR PHYSICIAN.

Consider Christ, in the Flagellation, as the Physician "by whose stripes we are healed." Cry to Him for healing, as one who hath fallen among thieves, and is wounded, and left half dead.

Prayer.

O good Samaritan, Physician of my soul, Christ Jesu! There is no healing for my wounds, save in Thy virgin Flesh, torn with the cruel scourge, and Thy precious Blood so richly shed for me. O let me feel its power in this Holy Communion,

strengthen me in the hour of my death with this draught of immortality, that my soul may be delivered from destruction, and evermore dwell with Thee, and praise Thy Name.

4. Jesus, Crowned with Thorns, our Bridegroom.

Behold the Thorn-crowned SAVIOUR as thy bridegroom, betrothing thee to Himself for ever. Love Him, therefore, as His bride, and pray Him to fulfil thy longing after the joys of heaven.

Prayer.

O Jesu, crowned with thorns for me! Who am I, that Thou shouldest vouchsafe to say to me, "I have loved thee with an everlasting love: I will betroth thee unto Me in loving-kindness and in mercies?" How couldest Thou show me greater honour and love? Be glad and rejoice, O my soul. The Fairest among the children of men hath brought thee into His chambers, and desires to betroth Himself to thee in everlasting love. Why seekest thou yet after the path of Egypt, to drink troubled waters? Wilt thou yet hew thyself cisterns of vain delights? Wilt thou not turn with loving haste to thy Bridegroom, Who givest thee to drink of the torrent of His pleasures?

Lo, I lift my hands to Thee, O JESU: stretch out Thine arms to me, embrace me and bind me to Thyself for ever. In Thine arms I desire to live and to die.

5. JESUS, BEARING THE CROSS, OUR LEADER.

Consider thy Cross-bearing Saviour as the Leader, saying unto all men, "Be of good cheer: I have overcome the world." Draw near to Him as to a mighty warrior, and pray Him to guide and strengthen thee in thy battle with the world, the flesh, and the devil.

Prayer.

O mighty Man of war, O glorious Conqueror, Christ Jesu, Who didst upon the cross triumph over the devil, the world, and the flesh, how shall I, weak creature, withstand so strong enemies, unless Thou uphold me? The flesh excites, the world entices, Satan drives me to all sin. Without Thy help, O Jesu, I am lost. Therefore I flee to Thee in this most Holy Sacrament: set me beneath the banner of Thy cross, lead me, defend me, and strengthen me with Thy most blessed Body and Blood, and I shall vanquish mine enemies, and follow Thee whithersoever Thou goest.

6. JESUS, THE CRUCIFIED, OUR SIN-OFFERING.

Consider thy crucified Saviour as the Sacrifice for our sins. Offer thyself in sacrifice to Him, and pray Him graciously to accept thee.

Prayer.

O Jesu, Redeemer of the human race, Who, for my sake, didst offer Thyself to Thy Heavenly Father a whole burnt-offering, without any reservation: behold, I desire in this most Holy Sacrament to offer my whole being in sacrifice to Thee, and to Thy Heavenly Father, and to the Holy Ghost. Make me acceptable in Thy sight, O Jesu, as a sweet-smelling sacrifice.

7. JESUS, LAID IN THE GRAVE, OUR LIFE.

Consider how, with thy dead and buried SAVIOUR, thy life is hid in God. Pray earnestly that He awake thee from the dust, and give thee eternal blessedness.

Prayer.

I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that I shall stand at the latter day upon the earth: and though after my skin worms destroy my body, yet in my flesh I shall see God my Saviour, Whom I now desire to receive under the form of bread and wine.

Thy Death and Burial, O Jesu, opened my way to everlasting life. Therefore let me henceforth lay aside all things displeasing unto Thee, and seek the things which are above. Clothe me with loving mercies, with gentleness, humility, meekness, and patience, and then come unto me and bring Thy holy love, which is the very bond of perfectness, and Thy blessed peace shall dwell in my heart. O LORD JESU, when shall I come to appear before Thy holy presence!

Sunday, in the spirit of union with S. Mary Magdalene bathing our Lord's feet with her tears.

Monday, in the spirit of union with the beloved Disciple leaning on Jesus' bosom, and asking Him questions.

Tuesday, in the spirit of union with the Angel who strengthened our LORD in the garden.

Wednesday, in the spirit of union with S. Veronica wiping the holy face of Jesus.

Thursday, in the spirit of union with Simon the Cyrenian helping to bear the cross.

Friday, in the spirit of union with the daughters of Jerusalem weeping for Jesus.

Saturday, in the spirit of union with Mary receiving the body of Jesus in her arms.

One o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Fountain of Salvation, Who, in the Garden of Gethsemane, didst say to Thy Disciples, My soul is exceeding sorrowful, even unto death; tarry ye here and watch with Me: and again, Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation; the spirit truly is willing, but the flesh is weak: Give me grace so to watch with Thee one hour in Thy Passion here, that I may rest with Thee for ever in Thy glory hereafter.

O merciful Jesu, my Strength, my Refuge, my Guardian, my Guide, in Whom I have hoped, in Whom I have believed, Whom I have loved: receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

As the hart desireth the water-brooks, so longeth my soul after Thee, O God, Who, for my sake, didst suffer, to the end that with joy I might draw water out of the Fountains of Salvation.

Tarry ye here, and watch with Me. Behold, He that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep.

II.

Two o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Lover of men, Who, being in an agony, didst pray more earnestly, and Thy sweat was, as it were, great drops of blood falling down to the ground: and Who didst say, FATHER, if it be possible, let this cup pass from Me: when I shall drink of the cup that Thou didst drink of, and shall be baptized with the baptism that Thou wast baptized withal, leave me not, neither forsake me, O God of my Salvation.

O Lord and Governor of the world, Who art able to cure all manner of sickness, and all manner of disease, because Thou art Almighty: receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

As the hireling earnestly desireth the day to come to an end, so is my expectation unto Thee, O LORD. O let my prayer enter into Thy presence! incline Thy ear unto my calling.

In the hand of the LORD is a cup, and the wine is red.

I will receive the cup of salvation.

III.

Three o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Joy of the Angels, Who, as at this hour, didst say to Thine Apostles, it is enough; the time is at hand, and the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners: grant that whenever my time is at hand to suffer, I may find Thee a very present help: and that, whenever I am tempted or afflicted by sinners, I may remember Thee, the Saint of saints.

O LORD, to Thee I fly as to the Throne of Grace, and the Altar of Mercy, to the Ark of the Covenant, and the City of Refuge: receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

I have gone astray like a sheep that is lost: O seek Thy servant, merciful Shepherd, Who didst search for us in the Garden of Gethsemane, and the Judgment-seat of Pilate, and the Pavement of the Soldiers, and the Hill of Calvary: and didst find us on the wood of the Cross.

My time is not yet come, but your time is alway ready.

It is enough: the hour IS at hand.

IV.

Four o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Master of the Apostles, call to mind that hour when the soldiers came out with swords and staves to take Thee, and one of the Twelve betrayed Thee with a kiss. Grant that I may never bow the knee before Thee, and receive Thee with my lips, when Thou comest to me under the form of Bread and Wine, without also clinging to Thee, in my heart, and resolving that I would die a thousand times rather than be separated from Thee, O my Light and my Joy.

O Thou that art the Refuge of the poor, the Strength of the victors, the Comfort of the mourners: grant me so to love Thy Passion, that I may follow it; and so to grieve for it, that I may hate the sins which caused it: receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

I will acknowledge my sin unto Thee, and mine unrighteousness have I not hid: give me grace at

all times, and especially when my life draweth nigh to the grave, to make a good and holy confession of all my sins.

The Meditation.

They laid hands on Jesus, and bound Him. To proclaim liberty to the captives.

v.

Five o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Lamb without blemish and without spot, Who wast, as at this hour, forsaken by all Thy Disciples, and didst alone for us, yet without us, bear the burden and heat of the day, grant that though Thou hast been so often forsaken by us, we may never be forsaken by Thee: and as Thou didst now stand before the unrighteous judgment-seat of Caiaphas, so vouchsafe that when we shall be judged righteously by Thee, O Thou true High Priest, we may be delivered from all the punishment that we have merited by our sins.

O Thou that art our FATHER, as well as our Brother, receive me, Thine unworthy and prodigal son, now returning to Thee. Array me with the first robe of innocence, Thou that, for my sake, didst wear the purple garment of Martyrdom: receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

Deep calleth unto deep, O Lord: the deep of misery to the deep of mercy: the deep of ingratitude to the deep of love: the deep of despair to the deep of hope. O let not the water flood drown me, neither let the abyss swallow me up.

The Meditation.

He loved them unto the end. Then all the Disciples forsook Him.

VI.

Six o'clock a.m.

O Lord Jesus Christ, Light of Light, Who wast at this hour denied by the Chief of Thine Apostles: grant that, as I have denied Thee with Peter, so with Peter I may go out and weep bitterly: cast Thine eyes on me, as Thou didst on him: and give me grace henceforth to confess Thee where I have hitherto denied Thee: and, where I have heretofore forsaken Thee, henceforth to forsake all things for Thee.

LORD, Thou knowest all things; Thou knowest that I love Thee. Help me to minister to Thy lambs for Thy sake: help me to give if it be but the cup of cold water that shall in no wise lose its reward. Receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

O my Light, my Hope, and my Salvation! lighten my darkness, chase away my doubt, preserve me in my danger, that I may come to Thy brightness, rejoice in Thy certainty, repose in Thy safety.

The Meditation.

Thou knowest my downsitting and mine uprising.

I know not the Man.

VII.

Seven o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Mirror of Patience, Who wast, as at this hour, presented before Pilate, when he was determined to let Thee go: and the multitude cried, saying, Not this Man, but Barabbas! grant that I, who am guilty, may go free through Thy taking on Thee my guilt: grant that, as Thou art unrighteously condemned, so I may justly be acquitted.

God, Who art offended by sin, and appeased by penitence, regard Him that did no sin, and give ear to His sorrows: remember all His offering, and accept His sacrifice. Receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

Let Thy Blood, O Very Paschal Lamb, be on us and ours, not to condemnation, but to eternal life: that so the destroying Angel may pass by us, and we may follow Thee in safety across the Red Sea of our death.

The Meditation.

I will be surety for him: of my hand shalt thou require him.

Not this Man, but Barabbas.

VIII.

Eight o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Lover of Purity, Who wast, at this hour, arrayed in a white robe, and sent by Herod to Pilate; and by him wast endued with a purple garment, and brought forth to the multitude: grant that I may so wear the robe of innocence in this life, that hereafter I may be counted worthy to be brought unto Thee in a vesture of glory.

O God, Who of old time didst preserve eight persons in the Ark from perishing by water,—and Who, as at the eighth hour, wast re-arrayed in a vesture of purity, figuring thereby our regeneration, accomplished on the eighth day: grant that I may so with Thee pass through the Lent of this life,

that I may rest with Thee hereafter in the eternal Octave of Thy Heavenly Easter. Receive me, &c.

O Thou that didst say of old, Thou hast a few names even in Sardis which have not defiled their garments, and they shall walk with Me in white, for they are worthy, Grant me so to keep innocency and take heed unto the thing that is right, that finally I may sit down at Thy Marriage Supper: Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

Herod and his men of war mocked Him, and arrayed Him in a white robe.

The fine linen is the righteousness of Saints.

IX.

Nine o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Crown of all Saints, call to mind this hour, when Thou wast led forth to the people, with the Crown of Thorns on Thy Head, and the Reed in Thy Hand: and vouchsafe that as Thou didst go out to war in this Helmet, and didst overthrow the Old Enemy, so I, taking to myself for an Helmet the hope of salvation, may be found Thy true follower by destroying the works of the Devil.

O Bishop of our souls, Whose Mitre was made precious with Thine Own Blood, draw nigh unto my soul and save it! O merciful and faithful High Priest, Who canst be touched with the feeling of our infirmity, let Thy Blood make reconciliation for all mine offences. Receive me, &c.

O Thou Good King, Whose sceptre was a reed, with that reed, as with a merciful pen, erase the handwriting that is against me, and then nail it to Thy Cross. Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

The Crown wherewith His Mother crowned Him in the day of His Joy.

I will make Thee a Royal Diadem in the Hand of my God.

x.

Ten o'clock a.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Mirror of Life, Who wast, as at this hour, acquitted by Pilate, and the Jews said, We have a law, and by our law He ought to die, because He made Himself the Son of God: Grant that if it be Thy Will that I should suffer, I may suffer for well-doing and not for evil-doing, following herein Thy steps, who didst no sin, neither was guile found in Thy mouth.

O Thou, concerning Whom it was said, as at this Hour, Behold The Man! Grant that I may so behold Thee now in Thy Sorrows, that hereafter I may not fear to see Thee when Thou comest in Thy glory. Receive me, &c.

Let Thy Sceptre, O merciful King, be held out to me. Let Thy purple Robe defend me. Let Thy Crown be my safeguard here and my exceeding and eternal great reward hereafter. Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

Behold the Man!
There shall no Man see My Face and live.

XI.

Eleven o'clock a.m.

O Jesus Christ, Consolation of the afflicted, Who, as at this Hour, didst give Thy face to the smiters, and Thy cheeks to them that plucked off the hair; and upon Whose back the plowers plowed, and made long furrows: Grant that the rivers that flow therefrom may make glad the hearts of them that labour in the desert of the world, and may finally bring* them forth to the Ocean of Thine infinite and eternal love.

Grant, O LORD, that with all joy I may draw water out of these wells of salvation: Grant that I may be cleansed in this fountain opened for sin and for uncleanness: Grant that I may so attain to those rivers of pleasures which are at Thy Right Hand for evermore. Receive me, &c.

LORD JESUS CHRIST, Who wast bound that we might be set free, loose us from the chains of our sins, and knit us to Thee by the everlasting cords of Thy Love.

The Meditation.

He took him and healed him and let him go. Pilate therefore took Jesus and scourged Him.

XII.

Twelve o'clock: Noon.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Example of Patience, Who didst vouchsafe to faint three times under the weight of Thy Cross, and yet didst say to them that followed Thee, Daughters of Jerusalem, weep not for Me: Grant that we may weep with those that weep in this world, and forgetting our own afflictions, may so bind up the brokenhearted, and comfort all that mourn, that hereafter we may come to that place where all tears shall be wiped away from all faces.

O God, Who, leaving us a marvellous example of humility, didst suffer without the gates: Grant that I also may cheerfully and bravely go forth with Thee beyond the camp of this world, bearing Thy reproach. Receive me, &c.

O Thou True Isaac, Who, bearing the wood of the Cross, and enduring the fire of God's anger, didst offer Thyself as the Lamb for the burntoffering: Thyself Victim and Priest, Thyself Shepherd and Lamb: lead me forth in the green pastures by the still waters.

The Meditation.

The earth is weak: I bear up the pillars of it. Him they compelled to bear His Cross.

XIII,

One o'clock p.m.

O Lord Jesus Christ, fountain of pardon, Who, when they pierced Thy Hands and Thy Feet, didst say, Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do, Grant that the blood of Thee, our Elder Brother, may cry from the ground unto Thy Father and our Father, not for vengeance, but for pardon—not for final condemnation, but for the remission of all our sins.

O Thou, the lifting up of Whose Hands was the true evening sacrifice, and Who didst stretch forth Thy Hands in the midst of us, as he that swimmeth spreadeth forth his hands to swim: Grant that we, in Thy strength, and following Thine example, may so contend against the waves of this troublesome world, that, when the morning shall come, we may merit to stand with Thee on the shore. Receive me, &c.

O Thou, Who from the watch-tower of the Cross didst foresee the salvation of the elect that should be wrought by Thy merits, and the reprobation of the wicked, that should perish through their own sin, set me, in the great and bitter day of judgment, at Thy Right Hand. Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

A place called the place of a Skull. O Grave, Where is thy victory?

XIV.

Two o'clock p.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, King of the Jews, over Whose Head was written a superscription with this title, Thine enemies themselves bearing Thee witness, that Thou art the King of Israel: Grant that whensoever Thou shalt permit me to be tried and tempted, all the devices of mine enemies may but fulfil the purposes of Thy mercy, and may set forward my Salvation.

O Thou, Who, being a King, hadst nevertheless no place where Thou mightest lay Thy Head; and Whose Kingdom, according to Thine own saying, consisted in this, that Thou shouldest bear witness to the truth: make me so, like Thee, a King and a Priest, that I may always patiently suffer, when need is, for the Truth's sake: and may offer myself up, soul and body, to Thy service. Receive me, &c.

O Thou, Who didst say that Thou wouldest dwell in the thick darkness, call to mind this hour, when there was darkness over all the earth. Scatter Thou the shadows of sin and misery, and rise upon us, O Sun of Righteousness, with healing in Thy wings.

The Meditation.

As for me, I am a Worm, and no man. Behold your King!

XV.\

Three o'clock p.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, King of Penitents, Who,

when the sun was darkened and the moon ashamed, didst reign on Mount Zion and in Jerusalem, and before Thine ancients gloriously, and yet didst call a penitent to the foot of Thy Cross, appointing her a place where the mighty men were: receive me in like manner, who desire to repent all my many sins, to be near Thee in Thy conflict, that hereafter I may be near Thee in Thy Kingdom.

O Thou, Who, of old time, didst place Cherubim and a fiery sword that turned every way to keep the way of Paradise from man; and didst turn aside that sword, and open that way, when Thou saidst to the Penitent Thief, Verily I say unto thee, To-day shalt thou be with Me in Paradise: Receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

O Thou That didst as at this hour thirst for our salvation, Grant me to drink of that river which is in the midst of the Paradise of God. Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

I sat down under His Shadow with great delight.

To him that overcometh will I give to sit with

Me in My Throne.

XVI.

Four o'clock p.m.

O Lord Jesus Christ, Martyr of martyrs, Who as about this hour didst say, "It is finished;" and again, "Father, into Thy Hands I commit My spirit;" and having said this, didst bow Thine Head, and give up the Ghost: Grant that, in the agony of mine own death, all Thy good pleasure may have been accomplished in me: Grant that I may joyfully commit my spirit into Thy Hands, knowing that Thou art able to keep that which I have committed unto Thee against that day.

O Thou that didst conquer by death, and triumph by suffering, vouchsafe to us that victory, after which there can be no more war, and that triumph, after which there can be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying. Receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

O Thou that hast devised means whereby Thy banished ones should be brought back to Thee: Grant that, one day, I, returning from my long exile, may see Thee face to face in my Country. Who livest, &c.

Ye have killed the Prince of Life. If a man keep My saying he shall never die.

XVII.

Five o'clock p.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Lord of Life, call to mind this hour in which, after Thou hadst left Thy companion behind Thee, the soldiers came and brake his legs: and grant that when we suffer in this world, we may say with him, "And we indeed justly:" and so may pass from death to life, from sorrow to joy, from a vale of misery to a Paradise of Immortality.

O Thou that didst come to fulfil the law, and even in death wouldst not suffer that aught should be done against it, fulfilling that which was written, A bone of Him shall not be broken, grant that we, fulfilling Thy commandments to the last, may have our portion with Thee, O Thou true Paschal Lamb! Receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

O Thou Who didst give up the ghost before sunset, so that Pilate marvelled that Thou wast already dead, suffer us not to be tempted above that we are able to bear, or to be afflicted longer than Thou seest to be needful for us. Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

The Tree of Life in the midst of the garden.

In the midst of two animals Thou shalt be made known.

XVIII.

Six o'clock p.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Bridegroom of Thy Church, Who didst vouchsafe that she should be formed from Thy side, as Thou wast sleeping in death, and should be redeemed by the Blood, and sanctified by the Water: Grant that we, whom Thou hast loved with an everlasting love, may hereafter be presented unto Thee, not having spot nor wrinkle, nor any such thing.

O Fountain of David, give us grace to come to Thee for cleansing. O good Physician, give us power to hasten to Thee for healing: O smitten Rock, draw us to Thee for refreshing: O "Brook in the Way," lift up our heads to everlasting joy! Receive us according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon us.

O Thou, Who hast three that bear witness on the earth, the Spirit, and the Water, and the Blood, bear witness with my spirit that I am a child of God; and, if a child, then an heir: an heir of God, and joint heir with Thee. Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

They shall look on Him whom they pierced. The Lord turned, and looked upon Peter.

XIX.

Seven o'clock p.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Prince of Peace, Who wouldest not be taken down from the Cross till Thou hadst accomplished the work which Thou camest to do: Grant that I may never desire to give up that Cross which, in Thy good Providence, Thou dost lay upon me here, till I have performed all that which Thou wouldest have me to do and to bear.

O Thou, Who, after the bitter week of Thy Passion, didst prepare for Thyself a Sabbath in the Tomb: Grant that we also, after the week of our worldly life shall have come to an end, may rest in Thine eternal Sabbath, according to Thy promise. Receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

O Thou, Whose rest is glorious, and in all Thy glory there shall be a defence to Thy people, grant

me never to desire rest here, but to wait for that blessed Sabbath which remaineth for the people of God. Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

They shall rest in their beds. They rest not day nor night.

XX.

Eight o'clock p.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, the Death of death, call to remembrance this hour, in which many of Thy saints that slept arose, the first-fruits of Thine own Resurrection, the blessed earnest of our own immortality. And grant that we, who have Thy precious Passion in remembrance, may rise from the death of sin to the life of righteousness, so that hereafter we, like those Thy saints of old, may enter into the Holy City, and appear unto many, even unto the multitude of Thy redeemed.

O Thou Who, if Thou makest Thy servants the sharers of Thy conflict, makest them also the partakers of Thy victory, endue us with such trust in Thee, that when we go down into the valley of the shadow of death, we may fear no evil, knowing that Thou art with us, and that Thy rod and Thy staff they will comfort us. Receive me according

to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

O Thou to Whom the darkness of the grave is no darkness, but that night shineth with the day of Thine own Resurrection, preserve us this night and evermore. Who livest, &c.

The Meditation.

Thy dead men shall live. The little hills shall rejoice on every side.

XXI.

Nine o'clock p.m.

O Lord Jesus Christ, Captain of our Salvation, Who didst vouchsafe that, as at this hour, Thy servants, Joseph and Nicodemus, should anoint Thy Body to the Burial: Grant that we also may bring Thee the myrrh and aloes of repentance and confession, and, according to Thine own command, when we fast, anoint Thee our Head, Who, for us, didst endure the bitterness of death, and dost anoint us with Thy Holy Spirit.

O Thou, Who didst give such grace to Nicodemus that, when Thou wast reckoned with the transgressors, and hadst been crucified between two thieves, he would be Thy disciple in secret no longer: Give us grace boldly to confess Thee before men, that so Thou mayest confess us before Thee, our FATHER, in Heaven. Receive me according to the multitude of Thy loving-kindness, and have mercy upon me.

Grant, O LORD, that, dying with Thee, we may be buried with Thee, and may find our refuge under the shadow of Thy Tomb, until this tyranny be overpast. Who livest, &c.

XXII.

Ten o'clock p.m.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Ruler of Thine enemies, call to remembrance that hour in which Thine enemies took counsel against Thee, saying, God hath forsaken Him; and, now that He lieth, let Him rise up no more; and set a watch and a seal, and made Thy Sepulchre as sure as they could; and vouchsafe that, as these their devices were over-ruled to Thy glory, so now all things that seem to be against Thy faithful people may work together for their good.

On this Cross I see Thee, dearest Saviour, Who in Thy Birth hadst no cradle, and in Thy Death no resting-place. The foxes have holes, the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man had not where to lay His Head.

O Jesu, Thou didst suffer so much for me in Hands and Feet, and Body and Soul; and I am so impatient in my pain. Thy Bed is the hard Cross, Thy drink is gall and vinegar; and I com plain of my place of rest and of my refreshment.

 - 4. To Thee, O JESU, we commend the soul of

Thy servant, as Thou didst commend Thine Own Soul to Thy FATHER; and we pray Thee, by all the pains, and troubles, and needs, of that Thy departing soul, graciously to deliver this soul from all trouble and need, and lead it from misery to eternal life. Our FATHER, &c.

(At Holy Communion.)

O God, by Whose will the moments of our life run on: Accept our prayers and offering for Thy servant N., that *his* health may be restored to *him*, and *he* may yield Thee thanks in Thy holy Church. Through, &c.

* For Grace to Die Well (At Holy Communion.)

Accept, we beseech Thee, O LORD, the Offering we present Thee for the close of *Thy servant's* life, and grant that through it all our sins may be cleansed; so that *we*, who for our evil deeds do worthily deserve to be punished in this life, may attain eternal rest in that which is to come. Through, &c.

I entreat Thy Mercy, Almighty God, that by the virtue of this Sacrament Thou wouldest vouchsafe to strengthen me, Thy servant, with Thy heavenly grace, that in the hour of my death the Enemy may not prevail against me, but I may enter with Thy holy Angels into Life. Through, &c.

Remember, O Christ Jesu, Thy loving-kindness, which moved Thee to look in mercy upon Peter, when he had thrice denied Thee. So turn Thy gracious eyes on this sick man: work in him true repentance, let him earnestly bewail his sin, faithfully cleave to Thee till his life's end, and praise Thee eternally in heaven. Amen. 5. OF THE MOCKING.

Remember, O CHRIST JESU, Thy meekness

and patience, when they spat in Thy Holy Face, whereon the Angels love to gaze, when they dragged Thee from place to place, and clad Thee in a white robe to mock Thee. Behold, against this sick man the furiqueness of ill spirits increaseth more and more, they seek after his soul, and think to destroy it among the terrors of death. But do Thou forsake it not, Who hast done so great things for it, comfort and strengthen it against all temptations of the devil, and when the enemy seeks to drag it away to damnation, then clothe it in the wedding-garment of Thy righteousness which Thou hast purchased for it with Thy Precious Blood. 6. OF THE SCOURGING AND CORONATION.

Remember, O Christ, Thy great shame and suffering, when Thy virgin Body was stripped by wicked men, and beaten with rods and scourges, and Thy blessed Head was crowned with thorns. Behold, how this sick man is now chastised in soul and body, and smitten with weakness in his head and limbs. Let his pains avail to salvation; strengthen him inwardly by Thy Holy Spirit to bear his sufferings patiently: sprinkle and cleanse his soul with Thy Blood, so richly poured forth in Thy Scourging and Thy Crowning, that he may attain to the Crown of Thine Elect. Can this ever be thought and prayed over too much?

v. 25. The world could not contain them: that is, bear or endure them.

if they should be written every one.

But it is your part, is it not? to endure all:

to go wherever He calls,

to obey whatever He commands.

Leave partial virtues, and partial obedience to the world.

And how far are you so obeying in every thing?

v. 10. And while they steadfastly, &c.

The condition on which we can see .Him, either as ascending or returning.

v. 11. Why stand ye gazing up into Heaven?

The uselessness of thinking even of our LORD, unless we try to follow Him.

S. John xx. 31.

That ye might believe, and that, believing, ye might have life.

And, with the strength of so many Communions and Absolutions, what kind of life ought this to be?

S. John xv. 26, 27. S. John xvi. 1-4 f.

xv. 26. The *Comforter*. Is it nothing to know, that, so universal among God's people is the feeling of discouragement and dispiritedness, that thence the Holy Ghost takes His dearest Name?

Even the Spirit of truth. Think how many comforters, that are not spirits of truth!

And again, how often, when the truth is spoken, it is spoken harshly and unkindly. Then here is the blessing of both together.

v. 27. Ye also, &c.

Is not that the exact office of a Sister?

And, because she has been with her LORD, if not "from the beginning," at all events in a nearer and dearer way than others?

xvi. 1. And if the Apostles might be offended, how much more danger for us!

v. 2. They shall put you out of the synagogue.

We know a little about this, and probably may know more. Therefore, we must pray very earnestly that by no sin nor indiscretion of ours we may give occasion to others to blaspheme.

v. 4. These things have I told you.

Having been warned, over and over again, of future difficulties, now pray that, being forewarned, you also may be forearmed.

II.

1 S. Peter iv. 7-11.

The connection between this and the feast. The end of all things:

as to our LORD of all miseries, and sufferings, in His Ascension.

The end of all things:

because His Ascension is the pledge of His return.

The two previous rules:

be ye sober :--self-denial :

and watch.

Then the main rule—above all, charity.

Charity shall cover, &c.

as if showing us the virtue of that love, which is but an offshoot of the love of our LORD, which covered our sins.

As every man, &c.

For every talent, account must one day be rendered.

If any man speak, &c.

For neglect of opportunities of teaching—if they were ever neglected, it would be a grievous account.

As of the ability, &c.

Oh, how much need of prayer, that *all* ability may be exerted to the utmost in His service!

12.

S. Mark xvi. 14-20.

See how exactly the promise then made to the Apostles applies, in a certain sense, to Sisters.

In My name shall they cast out devils:

The conversion of sinners.

They shall speak with new tongues:

Is not this to be prayed for—that all reserve, all false shame, all shyness, may be ended—as to speaking to others of the things nearest and dearest to your heart?

They shall take up serpents:

The prayer:—that she may not only meet with, but go forth to encounter, difficulties and dangers.

And if they drink, &c.

Holiness and purity, and a heart fixed on God, preserved in the midst of unholiness and impiety and turmoil.

They shall lay hands, &c.

And these—the duties of a Sister to the poor.

He was received up-they went forth.

They went forth—how?

to what?

and in what spirit?

These are questions for a Sister.

And then-what will her receiving up be?

The servant is not above his LORD: but every one that is perfect shall be as his LORD.

Miscellaneous Meditations, Chiefly for Seasons of Especial Toil.

S. Luke xxi. 1-10.

The rich man—"the same LORD over all is rich." "Worthy is the Lamb to receive riches."

The steward—the conscience.

The debtors—each opportunity of doing good.

Of each opportunity it may well be asked, *How much owest thou unto my Lord?* how much, by means of this, ought I to have done for Him?

Then notice, that we are more tempted to slur over sins of omission in some cases than in others. The debtor that owed a hundred measures of wheat was only let off for eighty; he that owed the oil for fifty. And notice the danger of a hurried examination. Sit down QUICKLY, and write four-score. And ask God that, taking the steward as the type of a Priest, he who guides you may never be unjust to you, or to any one, by being satisfied with your doing less than you ought to do—especially to those who, like you, are trying after the highest life.

Genesis xxviii. 10-22.

v. II. All night

because the sun was set.

and, notwithstanding the gloom and coldness, in that night the place became *Bethel*.

Stones for pillows—a time of trial turned into a time of rest.

in that place to sleep—as our dear LORD on the Cross.

to sleep. Canticles v. 2.

v. 12. And he dreamed—in the night, to a stranger, God sends His special revelations.

And so the world would call a Sister's hopes, dreams.

A ladder. . . . Heaven. Take any active employment among others as such a ladder—indeed set on the earth, and, indeed (if you will), reaching to Heaven.

Ascending; to assist those who themselves are ascending.

Descending; with message of comfort and strength.

v. 13. The LORD stood above it—for by that same ladder He Himself ascended.

v. 15. I will not leave thee . . . of. And what is that for a Sister?

Isaiah liv. 5. Isaiah lvi. 5. Cant. i. 4. Rev. xiv. 3, 4.

v. 16. True of any house in which your duty lies, if you WILL.

v. 18. The stone becomes a pillar, &c.

Our sufferings offered to God with the same desire that our Blessed Lord offered His, and then directly

v. 19. Luz becomes Bethel.

v. 20. In this way that I go—the higher and more perfect:—bread to eat—the Bread of Life;

raiment—" if so be that being clothed," &c.; my Father's house in peace—in the Vision of Peace.

v. 22. But a Sister's vow is infinitely more; not the tenth part—but *every single* power and faculty of body and soul; *herself*, both here and hereafter. Amen.

Isaiah xli. 10-16.

- 10. "Fear thou not." Notice how all God's most loving messages begin so: Isa. xl. i., S. Mark xvi. 6, S. Luke ii. 10. If true to all God's people, much more to one His own in a more especial sense. "I am with thee—I am thy God." Then, reference to the Blessed Trinity. "I will strengthen—help—uphold." "Of My Righteousness;" namely, which the Holy Ghost works in His servants.
- and his temptations; "ashamed"—"confounded"—"be as nothing"—"perish." Whatever you already know of this gradual victory, God grant you may learn tenfold as much!
- most earnestly of all: that, in time, you may "seek them" in self-examination, and "not find" them. And see from the end of that verse how temptation in itself is not a sin; "they that war"—not that have warred.

- 14. Notice the new nature given with the new name;—"thou worm Jacob"—"ye men of Israel:" the weakness, and sin, and earthliness of our own nature—the Prince that has power with God and man. And again, the one in the singular, the other in the plural; because now we are knit together with all the servants of our dear LORD. Then again, the Blessed TRINITY—"the LORD," "thy Redeemer," "the HOLY ONE."
- 15. This new instrument is the Cross: "new," for it was by a new way that our LORD conquered; "sharp," for think of Gethsemane and the Pavement and Calvary; "having teeth," because made, as it were, of so many passions. And if we take this, then the mountains and hills of difficulties are to disappear.
- 16. "Thou shalt fan them;" we must make the effort: "and the Wind shall carry them away"—the influence of that Blessed Spirit Who helpeth our infirmities. And then the final blessing; in our Country: "Thou shalt rejoice in the LORD."

Isaiah x. 24-27.

24. Notice the title—"LORD GOD OF HOSTS." Both because the help promised comes by the ministration of His heavenly hosts, and because of the hosts of His people here, our brethren, in whom "the same afflictions are accomplished."

"That dwellest in Sion." Remember the meaning of the word: think what your expectation is; and how you, in a higher sense than others, ought to be dwelling in Sion. Has it been so this very day? Then the old message: "Be not afraid." Would that come so often, unless there were great cause for fear? "He shall smite thee." "In the world ye shall have tribulation." (I Thess. iii. 4.) "His staff after the manner of Egypt;" that is, when the rods were turned into serpents, Exod. vii. 12, for the more resolved, as Moses then, we are to serve God, the fiercer temptation we must expect.

25. "Yet a very little while." It is a Sister's motto, though she often feel, as S. Bernard did, "O LORD JESUS! what a long little while this is!" "The indignation:" that is, of Satan and his servants. And how?

26. Look at Judges vii. 24, 25. The Midianites hemmed in at Bethabara (compare S. John i. 28), and utterly destroyed at Jordan. So these spiritual enemies begin to be conquered at Baptism, but not finally subdued till death; for he that is dead is freed from sin. Oreb and Zeb destroyed at a rock and at a vineyard: both wonderful types of the victory we gain by our dear Lord over the world and Satan. And above all, Gideon's men were (Judges iii. 4) "faint, yet pursuing." Then, having heard of Satan's rod, now we hear of our Lord's: "as His Rod was upon the sea." So with the sea of this

troublesome world, making us a safe passage through it, and so, finally, of the sea of death.

27. "In that day." All times of especial self-dedication. Baptism, Confirmation, Vows; but far more gloriously, in that day when "the Egyptians, whom ye have seen to-day, ye shall see them again no more for ever." "Burden," and "yoke." Sin as a misery, and as a slavery. "Because of the anointing." So I S. John ii. 20, 27. Or we may take it of the anointing of our LORD, with His very Name Christ, as our King, to help us.

IN NURSING, &C.

ı.

Psalm xxvi. 6-12.

6. Thine Altar. Generally taken of the Altar. Now, apply it to self-oblation, particularly as to the self-denial of the present work. And from your own little Altar, look to that great Altar, in union with the sacrifice of which all your acts of self-sacrifice must be made.

And so. A lesson to be learned now, every hour of the day, that there is only one strength in which to succeed.

- 7. And that, by self-denial and tenderness, you have the privilege of being able to do.
 - 8. The habitation—in this case, our own little

oratory. The place, &c.—The Blessed Sacrament. Thine honour—because our dear Lord's greatest humility is His greatest honour. And so of the Cross that is said, Isa. xxiv. 23.

- 9. Temptations more especially now to be expected—to discontent, weariness, listlessness.
- no. See the two kinds of temptation. Not so much the temptation to "wickedness"—that is, the left hand—and so the weaker temptation is to known sin. But the *right* hand is full of *gifts*—offers of thoughts of the superior happiness of other states and conditions.

But as for me. The emphasis that "me" has for one who has dedicated herself for ever to the LORD! Deliver me: in Thy time cause the trial to cease, and be merciful unto me, while it lasts.

12. My foot standeth right. Yes, and if so, then now is the time to proceed more than ever before.

2.

Deut. viii. 2-9.

You are now in one of these "ways of the wilderness." So here is the lesson. "To humble thee," by showing your entire dependence on your dear LORD, and your own weakness. "And to reprove thee," as in 1 S. Pet. i. 7-9; "and to know what was," &c. As with Abraham, Gen. xxii. 16; and with Abraham's blessing: "and suffered thee to

hunger," as now, unable to receive the Bread of Life daily. "But by *every* word." So that even such a time as this, with no external privileges, shortened times for prayer, &c., ought to be a time of advance in the inner life.

- 4. "Thy raiment;" that strength and armour put on in time past: "thy foot;" your resolution of running this especial race with patience.
- 5. And so these times of trial and deprivation are only proofs of your Lord's love.
- 6. Notice the allusion to the Blessed TRINITY. "To walk in *His* ways:" His ways of sorrow and labour in this world; His ways, when He shall be followed whithersoever He goeth in the next.
- 7. The life of a Bride of Christ. "Fountains" of grace that others have not, that spring out of "valleys," greater humility and self-sacrifice. "Depths" of God's love, which others cannot understand.
- 8. Not only absolute necessaries to life, but every kind of help.
- 9. "Bread without scarceness." Remember your almost daily Communions in time past. "Whose stones are iron," whose very troubles and hardships give strength: "out of whose hills," &c.; whose difficulties actually give defence and courage, as brass used for armour.

Earnest prayer to be led further and further into this "good land."

3.

Psalm cxxii.

This "house of the LORD" is also taken of the *Cross:* apply it to this case.

- r. Glad. This must always be your prayer: to more than acquiesce in these seasons of trial and self-denial. It will not come all at once. And why glad? Because that house, however painful, is the house of the LORD.
- 2. And therefore to us the Cross is the Vision of Peace, and our feet shall stand there. Compare "He hath set my feet upon a rock," &c.
- 3. The Communion of Saints, united in their being fellow-sufferers with their suffering LORD.
- 4. "Thither:" namely, to the Cross. "The tribes" of Martyrs, Confessors, Virgins, every righteous soul, to testify by the very name *Martyr* or *Confessor*, to Israel, to the future generations of the Church. "To give thanks." "Count it all joy when," &c.
- 5. "There" is the seat of judgment; the great test whether we are our LORD's, the touchstone whether a Bride of CHRIST deserves that name, willingness to suffer for Him. Again: it was the seat of judgment when the two thieves were divided by it; and will be at the end of the world, when the sign of the Son of Man shall appear in Heaven.

"Of the House of David:" of those that suffer for persecution, conflicts, troubles of all kinds, before they attain to their kingdom, as the True David attained to His.

6. "For the peace" of those that are thus tried: that tribulation may bring forth patience, and patience experience," &c. "They shall prosper." They shall, indeed. If we suffer, we shall also reign with Him.

7. "Walls:" because, as S. Anthony of Padua says, tribulation defends. Exod. xiv. 22 l.; 1 Sam. xxvii. 4; 1 Kings xvii. 3; Job ii. 13; Cant. ii. 14. "Palaces," because it crowns.

8. "For my brethren and companions' sake"—
"knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren which are in the world;"
but, above all things, because the Cross was, all through His life, but more especially in its earthly close,

9. The House of the LORD our GOD.

4.

2 Cor. i. 3-11.

3. The reference to the Blessed TRINITY, and with respect to all Three Persons, as the God of comfort. The *Father* of our LORD, the FATHER of mercies, the God of all comfort. If there be need

indeed of comfort in a Sister's life, is there not a supply here?

- 4. See how careful He is to mention all tribulation, as well as all comfort; and how He dwells on the word over and over again; ten times in five verses: herein, then, more especially a Sister is called to follow her LORD. He suffered, that He might be able to sympathise; He was comforted, that He might be able to comfort. It is hard enough to bear, this life; but if you can but learn something of that text, "Ye shall be comforted in Jerusalem," will you not have borne it well?
- 8. Therefore, if S. Paul was not ashamed of telling how much the effort cost, much more must not we be. "Out of measure:" beyond God's ordinary dealings, above strength; and yet notice how elsewhere he says, "I can do all things:" and then the last step, "despairing even"—not of success or victory, but "life."
- 9. "The sentence:" that is, we had resolved to give up all things, even life itself, for Christ's sake. So, every Sister must have it; so her own act and deed in giving herself unreservedly to our Lord has written the same sentence in herself. And then the consequence: that we should not trust in ourselves: that we should trust in God. Try more and more to realise what is that omnipotence of strength, which, by putting all your trust in your Lord, you make your own.

10. And then the happy ending. Notice, again: the work of the Blessed Trinity. The FATHER delivered, by sending the Son; the Holy Ghost delivers daily, and we trust that in the day of judgment our dear LORD will deliver us, entirely and for ever.

11. "And by means:" the intercession of others.

5.

Proverbs xxxi. 11-14.

A Sister can only take this in one sense, and of one Bridegroom.

II. Think of the unspeakable privilege, that He, in Whom is all your trust, should condescend to trust in you: and safely trust in you. See what steady watchfulness, what constant and cheerful obedience, what complete self-devotion it implies! It is this which you wish for, and after which you are trying. How near will you allow your LORD to lead you to the fulfilment of this text? "So that," &c. That is, so that He shall not need, not want or lack, that spoil which she is to bring Him in: not one of those good works which He has prepared for her to walk in.

12. "She will do Him," &c. And what a humbling thought that ought to be that we should ever have done Him, that there should be a possibility of our ever doing Him evil; evil to Him Who

endured the Agony, the Crown of Thorns, the Scourging, the Cross, for our good. "All the days"—some at greater cost than at others. The alabaster box which has to be brought will sometimes cost much more than its usual price of three hundred pence—and ought you not to rejoice that it will?

13. "Wool and flax." The types of all the substances, animal and vegetable, out of which garments are made. So from everything which comes before her, a sister must be preparing that fine linen in which—or not at all—she must sit down at the marriage-supper of the Lamb. And so in ver. 14; at whatever trouble and cost, she will find the means of serving God in everything, how distant soever it seems at first to be from Him. And how do the ships bring it? By water: thus referring again to the water of our Baptism.

6.

Proverbs xxxi. 15-21.

15. "She riseth;" &c., as her LORD, leaving her an example, did also.

"Riseth" from this world in the night of trouble; and so that others see her good works ("Giveth meat," &c.)

16. "She considereth:" compare S. Matt. xiii. 44. And this great treasure is that perfect love and self-devotion to which a Sister is pledged to the end of her life. And notice: "she considereth it,"—she reckons up, as S. Paul did, the sufferings of this present time; and then, finding them "not worthy to be compared with the glory," she buyeth it at the price of her whole self. And, as our LORD is the true Vine, she, by her own self-denials, plants a vineyard also; shows forth His example in herself, in what she does and what she bears.

- 17. And next, you see how much courage this asks. "She girdeth her loins with strength." The strength has been given her; but she must use it for herself. "Comfort" is only another word for strength. God gives her that; and she must apply it to herself.
- 18. "She perceiveth," &c. There are times, notwithstanding all discouragements, when advance is perceived—when the reward is with the sacrifice—the Cross not too heavy for the Crown. And so, "her candle goeth," &c. Why? Because, "The LORD is my light and my salvation." "Thou also shalt light my candle."
- 19. A dear reference to the Cross as the instrument by which the work of God's salvation, "woven from the top throughout," was completed. And you, in your own degree, must yourself take up that Cross, and yourself work by it. For see
- 20. How our LORD, on that same Cross, "stretched out His hands" to the very ex-

tremity of the transverse beam for "the poor;" reached them forth, saying, Come unto Me, all that labour and are heavy laden," &c., "to the needy." Must you not follow Him in this also?

21. And then, no fear of coldness or want of fervour for all her affections and desires; the "household" of the faithful soul. They are all purified and inflamed by the "scarlet" of the King's own Royal Blood. And then, it may be taken in the sense that the Church can never fear the decline of love, being, as she is, beautiful with the scarlet of the Martyrs.

.7.

Isaiah 1. 5-11.

- 5. See Exod. xxi. 6.; Deut. xv. 16. In the fullest sense of the words, to be taken in a Sister's mouth, vowed as she is "for ever" to her LORD's service. Then: how He Himself served; not disobedient; not unwilling.
 - 6. Then His reward in this world; where notice how Isaiah describes the Passion even more minutely than any of the Evangelists. He did all this; and what must those who seek to be closest to Him expect? The "bundle of myrrh" is very bitter, as well as very healing.
 - 7. The two parts of Christian warfare. God helps us; and then, and therefore, we help Him.

"The LORD GOD will help me," &c., "therefore have I set" (not, has He set) "my face," &c. And notice the gradual increase of confidence,—"therefore shall I not be confounded;" then, "I know that I," &c.

8. "He is near." That is what you must try to realise in all your Crosses, that He after Whom you are trying to bear them is really near. And then it must follow: If God be for us, who can be against us? "Let us stand together." You may take it in two senses; either as the expression of faith against enemies, or as a longing prayer to stand quite close to our Lord. And so, that, "Let him come near to me." Either my enemy may come near, if he chooses, for he can do no harm: or, Let my Lord, Whom I love, let Him come near, and I must be safe. Notice that change of number again: "Who is he that shall condemn me? Lo, they all," &c.

sister: "that obeyeth," &c. Surely, in the chief sense, that Servant Who is now highly exalted, and has a name above every name, (Isa. lii. 13.); but it may very well be taken of Confession. And notice how it seems, from this text, to follow, that true servants of their Lord must expect times of depression. It does not say, but that walketh; but simply, that walketh, as if this were almost a part of Christian life. "Let him trust in the

Name of the LORD." And you know what is that Name, the strong Tower into which the righteous runneth, and is safe.

8.

Isaiah xlii. 19.

The chief title of our dear LORD in Isaiah—"when he saw His glory, and spake of Him:" not "Well-beloved Son, in whom," &c.: not "the Brightness of His glory and the express Image" &c.: but "Servant:" here—lii. 13; liii. 11; xlii. 1.

The lesson of service for a Sister.

- 1. To Him.
- 2. Then to others for His sake.

And she must be a servant, as He was, blind and deaf.

How could He be blind when-

"Thou spiest out all my ways."

When-"Thou God seest me."

When (Hab. ii. 1) from the watch-tower of His Cross, He at once foresaw the whole future of His Church and every member of it.

"Blind:" to difficulties; having no eyes or sense for them: and so must a Sister be.

"I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills:" not the hills of difficulty, as Zech. iii. 7: S. Matt. xxi. 21; but that hill where (Is. xxv. 10) is the reward of them that overcome.

"Deaf:" to temptation—"If Thou be the Son, command these stones;" "cast Thyself down."
"If Thou do these things, show Thyself." "Let Christ descend now from the Cross."

This last, a Sister's temptation from the beginning; to lay down the Cross she has taken up, when she feels its heaviness; to turn back from the plough; to rest in the race.

No exemption from that to be expected; but try to realise that: "Who is *deaf* as thy messenger that I sent?"

9.

- 1. Exod. iv. 10-17.
- 2. Judg. vi. 13, 14.
- 3. Isa. vi. 5-8.
- 4. Jer. i. 7-9.
- 5. Esth. iv. 11.

These are the different discouragements or distresses of those to whom God had given a true work to do for Him. Let us see how our dear LORD took all upon Himself: and then remember that the servant is not above his Master; and that we could no more be without discouragement if we are really His—and the more, the more we try,—than without sorrow.

- 1. Moses' excuse—Compare that with Isa. liii. 2, and also xlii. 19, and so again, 2. Cor. x. 10.
- 2. Gideon's excuse.—Compare it with Micah v. 2, and with S. John i. 46. And the remedy. "The LORD looked upon him. And so pray that you may be looked upon—and then it will be, "Go in this thy might."
- 3. Isaiah's excuse.—Where notice that purification cannot be without pain; it was the burning coal which purified his lips. And compare that with the cup that our dear LORD had to drink: how the sins borne by Him who did no sin were purified by His Passion, and the Captain of our Salvation was made perfect through suffering. A Sister knows that she is to expect suffering also, while the days of her purification are being accomplished.
- 4. Jeremiah's excuse.—"I am a child." This was literally true: for he was then about ten or eleven. With this compare S. John vii. 15; and yet remember what our LORD did in that very childhood which His Prophet urged as a discouragement.
- 5. Esther's excuse.—Danger: and we know how our Lord went out to His sufferings, not as His servants might, believing that there was danger, but knowing the certainty of His death. "If I perish, I perish," with Esther; but with Him, "I have a Baptism to be baptized with."

The conclusion: that all God's servants, even

His greatest Saints, have begun with terrible discouragements; and His Grace overcame them.

So it may be now. Pray never to be really discouraged, but that those words, 2 Cor. vi. 9, 10, be fulfilled in you.

10.

S. Matt. xxviii. 20 l.

And to fulfil this promise, we know what our LORD, though exalted to the Right Hand of the FATHER, submits to endure still; as

open blasphemy and unbelief; fearful carelessness and negligence: and want of love and earnestness even in the presence of his own glorified Body. Make these resolutions, or other such:

- I. To endeavour to be more earnest than ever in watching by our LORD; more especially on the monthly day of Reparation.
- 2. On occasion of Celebration for the sick, or otherwise, where irreverence and carelessness are to be apprehended, insist on making the arrangements yourself; thus preventing the sin in some measure. Standing in so dear and close a relation to the LORD there offered for you, it is your duty and privilege to be more especially and openly zealous for His honour.
 - 3. Feeling bitterly any external dishonour offered

to your LORD, try more, every day of your life, after such perfect holiness, and love, and purity, as befits one who day by day receives that Body and that Blood. And pray that all faithful Priests, especially the Priest of your House, may so live, as those who celebrate daily, ought to live.

II.

Isaiah lxv. 8-10.

8. First, we think of that speech of our LORD's, the most difficult that He ever made: S. Matt. xxvi. 29; which they generally take to mean all the endurance of Martyrs and Confessors and others that have bravely taken up the Cross, which (S. Luke xxii. 16) is there "fulfilled in the Kingdom of God." New-because, proceeding from the new heart and the new spirit God has given us, and from the new law of love. Is found. whom? "My FATHER is the Husbandman:" and compare S. Luke xiii. 7. In the cluster. 1, All derived from the True Vine; but, 2, not in the single grape: showing forth either the Communion of Saints, or the variety of graces that go to make up the Christian life of any follower of CHRIST. One saith. Who, but He that ever liveth to make intercession for us; the same Who also asks, "Who hath despised the day of small things?" For a blessing is in it. That is the comfort in every

Cross, in every single act of self-denial, in every day of uncongenial work. A blessing is in it, indeed, if done heartily and simply for Christ's sake. Days of suffering—but a reward that cannot be measured by days and years. That I may not destroy them all. Compare that of the wise man: "The multitude of the wise is the welfare of the world."

9. See how the LORD and the servants, the Head and the members, are separately spoken of.

A seed out of Jacob. Mine Elect shall inherit it. There we have the King; sprung (1) literally from Jacob, and (2) supplanting Satan, "art by art to overthrow;" as Jacob did Esau.

Mine Elect—Elect before the world was, to save man: shall inherit it, when His own arm wrought salvation for Him.

Out of Judah an inheritor, &c. My servants shall dwell there.

There we have the subjects.

Judah the true "Praise."

Him Whose Name is praise.

My mountains: the earthly mountains of difficulty; the heavenly mountain of glory. Shall dwell there. "In My FATHER'S House are many mansions."

10. And Sharon, &c. The place of roses—i.e., of resisting to blood—then the safe and everlasting

fold. The valley of Achor, once the place of sin and suffering and death (Josh. vii. 24, 26), not only now the door of hope (Hos. ii. 15), but also the green pastures and still waters promised to the faithful servant. "Our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

12.

Jeremiah xxxi. 9-14.

- 9. With weeping: here, as always, only one way—that of suffering and repentance,—to God. With supplications will I lead them: for the very power and desire of prayer, as well as its answer, must come from Him. RIVERS of waters. Notice the abundance and difference of God's graces—yet, for all that, one way: A straight way, wherein they shall not—it does not say fall, but not even stumble. Ephraim. And remember how he obtained the right of the first-born—by being signed with the Cross.
- no. So never be discouraged if sometimes permitted not to feel Gon's presence—to be scattered, as it were, from Him; and look forward to being gathered (and so compare Isa. xl. 11) in this world, and kept for ever in that.
- 11. At what price we know; and, that being so, it cannot matter how much stronger than us Satan

is, when our ransom has been paid: the LORD HATH redeemed.

12. Even in the Church Militant; but still in the height of Sion: therefore the wheat and the wine—our Lord's Body and Blood; the oil—the grace of the Holy Ghost; the young of the flock—those whom, in our turn, we have been made the means of leading right; a watered garden—hence, bringing forth the flowers of different graces; but not without our labours, as well as God's; but if He sends the rain and the dew, and gives the seed, we, at least, must give the tillage.

13. In those three last clauses, notice, again, the work of the Blessed Trinity, and also the beginning, and progress, and end of Christian life.

14. Of the great High-Priest it is written: "He shall see of the travail of His soul, and shall be satisfied." So also of the priests who derive their priesthood from Him. With My goodness—beginning at the Incarnation, continued on the Cross, and at the Right Hand of the FATHER, a sacrifice in the everlasting kingdom.

13. S. Mark viii. 1–9.

 Have been with Me, and yet—have nothing to eat; reminding of Isa. 1. 10, and teaching how near we may really be to our LORD, when we seem to feel least of His care.

Three days. Notice these constant references to the Resurrection, as Exod. v. 3; Hos. vi. 2, and here.

3. If I send them away—they will faint. Try to feel more and more how all strength, both to will and to do, comes from your LORD; and that if He gave you up, you would faint indeed.

Divers of them—but, with us, all of us came from far, as in Eph. ii. 13.

- 4. Notice the—a man: and think of that love which does enable a mere sinful man to satisfy God's people with the True Bread of Life.
- 6. To sit down. See how that is fulfilled, "in quietness and confidence shall be thy strength."

And notice how, in this miracle, the two greatest Sacraments were set forth:

The Holy Eucharist by the Bread, Baptism by the Fishes;

and how the greater blessing attended the fewer loaves and the more people; as if to teach that, though God will bless every work done for Him,—the harder work He will more abundantly bless.

14.

Psalm xx. (For one Nursing.)
[There cannot be a more appropriate Psalm.]

1. Day of trouble. Notice, day, and not night,

because "blessed is the man that endureth temptation," &c.

Hear thee: which implies how constant must be your call to be heard.

The Name of the God of Jacob: the Name, exalted above every name, of Him Who revealed Himself to Jacob, in the night, in danger, and in great fear.

- 2. Notice the Church militant and triumphant.
- 3. All THY offerings, Who has not forgotten His own: that as that was accepted, so, by virtue of it, these may be.

Burnt sacrifice, as implying the pain it costs. "He was a burning and a shining light."

- 4. Thy heart's desire; temporally, to be granted. All thy mind—the one thing desired of the LORD: to be fulfilled.
 - 5. The sorrow turning into joy.
- 6. Helpeth His Anointed, because He helps me, "Who am a member of the Head.

The LORD perform all thy petitions.

The wholesome strength of His Right Hand, which, nailed to the Cross, healed our fallen nature.

7. Chariots and horses. $\left\{\begin{array}{c} \text{inanimate} \\ \text{and} \\ \text{hormal} \end{array}\right\}$

The Name for the third time; doubtless, in reference to the Blessed Trinity.

9. Save, LORD; the "Hosanna" that accompanied our LORD's entrance into the earthly, now addressed to Him in the Heavenly, Jerusalem.

15.

Eccles, iii, 6-8.

6. A time to get: at home, in many Communions, Confessions, Visits to the Blessed Sacrament, Hours, times of private prayer in the Oratory.

A time to *lose:* when called to God's more outward service; must live, so to speak, on what has been laid up; must go in the strength of that meat forty days.

A time to *keep*: namely, the remembrance of past sins, till they are forgiven.

And a time to *cast away*: forgetting those things that are behind, when they are a discouragement, and a temptation to think struggling of no use.

- 7. The great art, in both its clauses, for one ministering to others: when to comfort; and when comfort would be only false peace: when to blame; and when blame would only irritate or harden.
- 8. A time to *love*: and the time of all times is in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament.

A time to *hate*: surely, in Confession, the sins which we have to mention.

A time of war: every hour of this life.

And a time of *peace*: the happiest *and* in the Bible.

If we may but come to that time some day!
