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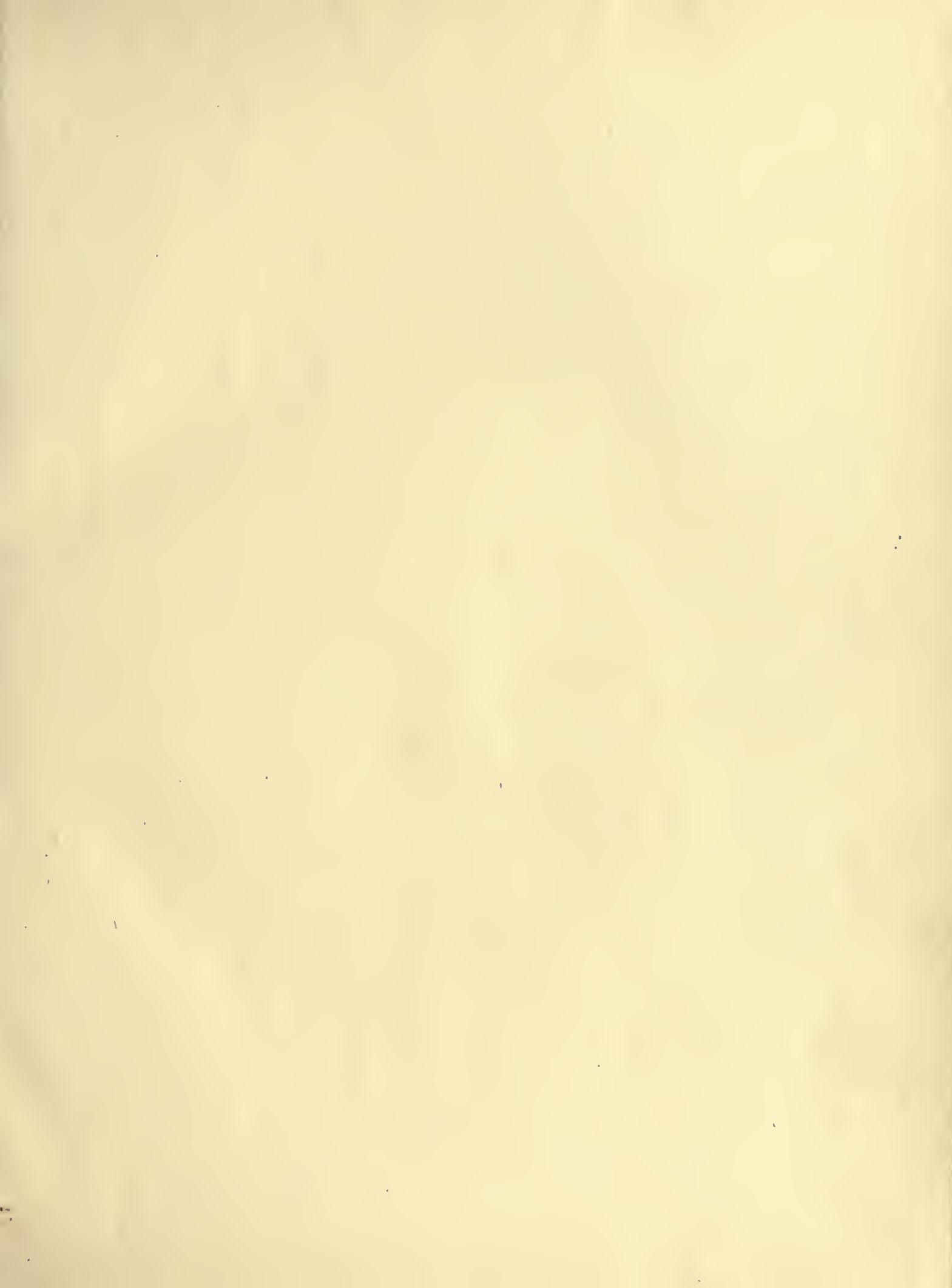

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THE Publication of the following curious Roll, from one in the possession of His Grace the Duke of Manchester, was undertaken by the late Mr. William Pickering, in the year 1845, but, from accidental circumstances, left unfinished at his decease in 1854. Upon the sale and dispersion of his property, the impression, as far as completed, came into the hands of Mr. Henry G. Bohn, and to that gentleman's spirit of enterprise and zeal in the cause of Literature, it is owing that this pictorial Chronicle is at length given to the Public.

Mr. Pickering was indebted to the Rev. Lambert Larking for the original transcript of the Roll, as also for the description of the Shields emblazoned upon the back of it, and the very complete Index to the Historical Notices.

INTRODUCTION.



THE curious pictorial history of the Earls of Warwick given in the following pages is printed from a Roll "labured and " finished by Master John Rows of Warrewyk," and a short account of the history of its author, together with some remarks explanatory of the pictorial illustrations, will be found necessary for a due appreciation of the work itself and the more ready solution of the signification of the numerous devices that accompany each portrait.

JOHN Rows, the author of this and of another Roll upon the same subject, hereafter alluded to, was born, in or about the year 1411, at Warwick, and was one of the two sons of Geoffrey Rows of that town, by Margaret, daughter of Richard Fyncham. Geoffrey Rows was the eighth son of Thomas Rows,* paternally descended from the Rowfes of Brinklow,† whilst his wife, Margaret Fyncham, was descended from the family of Babington, and nearly related to that Thomas Babington of Dethick who fought under Henry V. at Agincourt, and whose son John Babington was traitorously slain at Bosworth, through the instrumentality of Sir James Blount, Provost-Marshal to the Earl of Richmond.‡ Rows was also connected, through his mother, with the family whose chronicler he became,—Joan Babington, his wife's cousin, having married Sir Thomas Neville of Rolleston.

His personal career is best gathered from his Life, by Leland, who himself

Being Captain of Hammes for Richard III, he betrayed his trust to the Earl of Richmond, released the Earl of Oxford, who was his prisoner in that fortress, and joining Henry of Richmond, acted as his Provost-Marshal at Bosworth, where, in seeking to slay his wife's uncle, and thereby accelerate her possession of his estates, he slew instead John Babington of Dethick, the kinsman of his intended victim.

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derived it from observations dropped now and then by Rows himself, in his "*Historia Regum.*" "*Artibus Oxonie donatus honore magistri*"—one of the lines attached to his portrait upon the Roll in the College of Arms, informs us that he was educated at Oxford, and on leaving the University he became one of the Chaplains of the Chantry of Guy's Cliff, Warwick, and resided there the greater portion, if not the whole, of the remainder of his life, for he himself speaks of having been there forty-one years when he dedicated his "*Historia Regum,*" shortly after the birth of Prince Arthur, in 1486, to King Henry VII. His death occurred in 1491.

Guy's Cliff, the residence of Rows, and the site of so much legendary lore, is situated about a mile and a quarter from the town of Warwick; it was described by Leland as being in his time "an abode of pleasure, a place meet for "the Muses, with its natural cavities, its shady woods, its clear and crystal "streams, its flowering meadows, and caves overgrown with moss, whilst a "gentle river murmurs amongst the rocks, creating a solitude and quiet, most "loved by the Muses."*

Here Rows lived and wrote; but he spent, no doubt, much of his time in his native town and in the castle of his patron, for he founded a library over the fourth porch of St. Mary's Church, which he furnished with books; and the numerous dates and circumstances given in his "*Roll of the Earls of Warwick*" afford conclusive evidence that he was intimately acquainted with the muniments of the family and the circumstances that occurred in the Castle during the period of his long residence at Guy's Cliff. He tells us that he had searched in vain

* Guy's Cliff, or Gibcliff, as it was formerly called, on the western bank of the Avon, was chosen as early as the fifth century by St. Dubricius, Archbishop of Caerleon, as a place of devotion, and here he built an Oratory dedicated to St. Mary Magdalen; it was the spot where in the tenth century, Guy, Earl of Warwick, spent the last years of his life. Thomas Beauchamp, 13th Earl of Warwick (No. 48), procured the patronage of it from the Priory of Warwick, and changed its name to Guy Cliff, in honour of Sir Guy, but it continued a hermitage till the reign of King Henry VI, in the first year of whose reign Richard Beauchamp, 15th Earl of Warwick, obtained a licence to found a Chantry for two priests; and by letters patent, 5th Nov. in the ninth year of the same reign, he had licence to annex thereto lands to the value of 24 marks per annum, consisting of the manor of Athorne, and a rent-charge in Whitnash and Wellesburn, making (as says Rows) "certain there, a fore was uncertain at Gybclyf, a chauntrie of 2 pryftis that God wold fend hym Eyre male." (Vide No. 50.) The Earl's further reasons for this act are given in the Biographical Notice, No. 50; and he further, by will, directed that the chapel and residences for the priests should be rebuilt, which was done at a cost of £184 0s. 5½d. At the survey, 37 Hen. VIII. (1545-6), it consisted of the chapel, the residences, a garden, and two closes of land, and was at its dissolution valued at £19 10s. 6d. beyond reprises, which are estimated at 22s. 2d.

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amongst the muniments for the Conqueror's Charter of creation of the Earldom of Warwick to Henry de Newburgh,—he throws more light than any historian upon the sad history of Anne, Countess of Warwick, after her husband's death at Barnet, and a remarkable instance of his knowledge of family events is afforded in his narration of the time and place of the birth and christening of Ann Neville, Princess of Wales, and subsequently Queen of England, whose age till now has been a subject of speculation with all historians who have written concerning this ill-fated lady. United in succession to both the rival Houses of York and Lancaster, it was her unhappy destiny to be made the pivot on which turned more than one state intrigue; and in seeking a clue to the mystery that envelopes those intrigues, and more particularly the causes of that last great quarrel between King Edward and her powerful father, the exact age of Ann of Warwick is in itself no insignificant contribution to English history.

But neither did Rows confine himself to the “*solitudo et quies musis amicissima*,” or to the “pretty house of stone,” built for the Chantry Priests by Richard Beauchamp, Earl of Warwick, or even to frequent journeyings between Guy's Cliff and the neighbouring town; he was occasionally a visitor to the metropolis, where he had perused the records at Guild-hall, and saw the elephant brought to London in the reign of Edward IV; on one occasion he travelled so far even as North Wales and the Isle of Anglesey, being sent thither for the purpose of consulting the Welsh Records, and at another time he went southward to visit the monks of Glastonbury Abbey; * he was also so far interested in political matters as upon one occasion to have presented to the Parliament, held at Coventry in 1459, a Petition upon the State of the Country and Grievances of the People, his sympathies with whom are manifested in his account of Margaret, daughter and heir of Turchil, of Warwick, (No. 30.) His death occurred 24th January, 1491, at the age of 81 years; and he was buried in the body of St. Mary's Church, Warwick, where, in Leland's time, his epitaph was still remaining.

His portrait, in the act of writing his Roll, is to be seen on the back of the one in the Library of the College of Arms, and to which the following lines are annexed:—

“ John Rows hoc junxit heroum nobile stemma
“ Warwyk quem genuit, senior fuit incola Gyclif,

* On this occasion he brought away with him transcripts of some curious genealogies preserved in the archives of the Abbey, one of which showed that the soldier who pierced our Saviour's side was a natural son of Julius Cæsar, and that upon his conversion he married his only child to Joseph of Arimathea, who was by her the ancestor of Ygema, the mother of the famous King Arthur.

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“ Artibus Oxonie donatus honore magistri,
“ Qui Britonum varia studiose cronica lufrans
“ Scriptis ex variis opus hoc conjecit in unum
“ Per quod quisque Comes propriis donabitur Armis
“ In Warwyk succelfurus feliciter heres.
“ Fecit hic ut ducum redeat premortua vita
“ Vivat hic ergo, Deus, per meti nefcia fecla.”

The Portrait is accompanied by his Armorial Bearings, viz. 1 & 4 Vair, on a Fefte Gules, three Ducal Crowns, Or; for Rows: 2 & 3 Argent, three Bars Sable, on a Bend Ermine, three Crofs crofflets, Sable, for Fincham: there is alfo a Rebus, on his Name, twice repeated, viz. the letter V. in the centre of a Red Roſe;—Rows was then a Lancaſtrian.*

And many others, left unfinished at his death. Of theſe, the firſt was edited by Hearne, in 1716, and a ſecond edition was printed in 1745; the Life of Richard Beauchamp, Earl of Warwick, has been printed in Strutt's "Manners and Cuſtoms of the Engliſh," and ſome Hiſtorical Notices from his Engliſh Roll, as given in the Lanſdowne MS. 882, are attached to Hearne's "Life and Reign of King Richard II."

Alluſion has been made to our author's interference with political matters, and upon this ſubject ſomewhat more muſt be added for the more complete illuſtration of the Rolls about to be noticed:—

Walpole, in his "Hiſtoric Doubts," designates Rows as a vehement Lancaſtrian; he was ſo only for a brief period towards the cloſe of his life: Walpole knew him but as the author of the "*Hiſtoria Regum Angliæ*," dedicated with fulſome flattery to King Henry VII; he knew not that the author of that Dedication had only very lately deſcribed his then patron's adverſary, King

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Richard, as ruling his subjects "full commendably, punishing offenders of his Laws, and oppressors of his Commons, and so cherishing those that were virtuous that he got great thank of God and love of all his subjects, both rich and poor, and great laud of the people of all other lands about him." But Richard had been vanquished and slain; and Rows now prefaces his Dedication to the conqueror by describing his fallen adversary as a tyrant,—"*biennio matris utero tentus, exiens cum dentibus et capillis ad humeros, cujus in nativitate Scorpio erat ascendens,*" &c. and he hesitates not to fasten upon him not only the murders of Henry VI.—of Edward V.—and of the Duke of York,—but of his own wife, Anne of Warwick: Walpole, ignorant of his former associations, is yet puzzled by his conflicting assertions; for after stating that the murder of Henry VI. had made him detested of all nations, he adds immediately the account of an embassy arriving at Warwick Castle from the King of Spain, to negotiate a marriage between their children, at the reception of which he was himself present;—again, after stating that the laws of nature even had been set aside to form the monster he had described, he proceeds to say that, if he may speak truth in Richard's favour,* he must own that, though small in stature and in strength, Richard was a noble knight. Had Walpole been aware of Rows's former political creed, he would have possessed a clue to these contradictions.†

For more than thirty years had Rows been Chaplain at Guy's Cliff, to pray for the good estate of the Earls of Warwick; twenty of these years were passed under the immediate patronage of that greatest and last of the mighty Barons who formerly overawed the Crown of England:‡ no wonder then that we find him loud in praise of the godson and near kinsman of his illustrious patron; no wonder that we find him defending the rights of the people, for Warwick, the stout supporter of the cause of King Edward, was essentially the man of the people, and Edward IV. a people's king,—to speak in the forcible language of a modern writer,—"Edward was the man of his age, not one inch behind it or

† Anthony à Wood tells us that Rows wrote his history in 1483, having commenced it in the latter part of the reign of Edward IV; and one of the objections urged against him as an historian, by Walpole, is, that though he lived under all the three reigns of Henry VI. Edward IV. and Richard III, the lives of the two first occupy but two pages, and the latter, three: if Wood's statement that it was written under the house of York be correct, all the latter portion of the work had probably to be cancelled, and (like his Latin Roll) re-written in a spirit not at variance with the Dedication.

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Eliz.), and if additional evidence of its value were needed, it would be found in the fact that this officer, whose skill and knowledge in his profession have never been excelled, made notes of the drawings, and accurately transcribed the whole of its Pedigrees and Historical Notices: unfortunately he does not state in whose possession the Roll then was, or give the date of the transcript which now forms No. 839 of the Ashmolean Library; Sir William Dugdale's transcript of the Latin Roll is likewise in the same Library.

A rough-coloured copy of a part of this Roll will be found in the Lansdowne MS. 882; it has the appearance of having been made about the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and is printed in Hearne's "Additions to the Life of King Richard II:" it is, however, a very imperfect transcript; Nos. 13 to 17, and 43 to 46, being altogether omitted; and as neither Richard III, Anne Neville, nor their son the Prince of Wales, are included, it is wanting in those curious passages which exhibit the varying political views of the writer.

DESCRIPTION OF THE PLATES.

I.



GUITHELIN, King of Britain, who founded the Town of Warwick about the period of the Birth of Alexander the Great, B. C. 356, calling it Caer Guithelin, or Caerleon, the City of Guithelin: in his left hand is a representation of the Town of Warwick, a Bear sejant in the gateway; upon his right, surmounting a Helmet, the Crest of Wales, viz. upon a ducal Coronet, a cradle of fretwork, therein a Greyhound Argent.*

Arms. Gules, two Lions combatant, crowned, Or.—These Arms, attributed to Hector, Prince of Troy, are given by Hardyng to Brute the first King of Britain:—

“ He bare on gules, two lions of gold
 “ Counter rampant with gold both crowned
 “ Of old Trojans, he was the next heir found
 “ And in these Arms, he did this Isle conquer;
 “ His Ancestry after him, the same did bear.”

2. **GUIDERIUS**, King of Britain, A.D. 17; slain A.D. 44. In his right hand, a Mound and Cross,—in his left, a representation of the Town of Warwick, of which he was accounted the second Founder.

Arms. As the last.

3. **ST. CARADOC**, the Restorer of Warwick. In a complete suit of chain armour, coronet and nimbus round his head; he bears in his right hand the Church of St. John the Baptist, which he founded, by his side the City of Old Sarum, which he built, and at his feet that of Warwick (which he restored), with the Bear sejant at the gate, and escutcheon with the Ragged Staff above.

Arms. Azure, a ladder in bend Argent, between six lioncels rampant, Or.

4. **CONSTANTINE**, King of Britain; crowned A.D. 433, murdered 443, a great benefactor to Warwick, the name of which he altered from Caer-leon to Caer-umber; he holds the City in his left hand, and in his right, a Sceptre: on his right side stand the Towns of Worcester and Caerwent.

Arms. As Nos. 1 and 2.

5. **GWAYR**: a Cousin in the third degree to King Arthur, and a great benefactor to Warwick, which he holds in his left hand; he changed its name again from Caer-

At Warwick Castle, she receives from the herdsman the ring sent to her by her husband, Sir Guy, just before his death in the Cave of Guy's Cliff.

Arms. Chequy, Or and Azure, a cheveron Ermine, impaling Gules, cruilly botony, Or.

Also, Ermine, a Cheveron Gules. The Arms of the "Ancestry of Sir Guy."

21. GUY, Earl of Warwick. In chain armour; a Battle-axe in his right hand, and on his left arm, a Shield chequy, Or and Azure, a Cheveron Ermine; upon his head a fan-like ornament,* which is found upon helmets of the 13th century, charged with the same Arms as upon the shield. At his feet lies a group of the monsters of which he rid the world, perhaps meant to represent the giant Amarat, Duke O tton, and the Soldan, one of whom carries a shield with an enormous boss; there is likewise one of the Dragons of which he slew several, and the grateful Lion rescued from death by Sir Guy, when travelling with his friend Sir Heraud of Ardern.

Arms. As the last.

Arms of Sir Heraud of Ardern. Ermine a fesse chequy, Or and Azure.

22. GUY, Earl of Warwick, after his assumption of the pilgrim's weeds, and beneath which appears the Tabard of his Arms; in his right hand, a Staff,—in his left, a Rosary; his head irradiated, and at his feet, Colbrond the Danish Giant whom he slew at Winchester, after his return as a pilgrim from the Holy Land.

Arms. Chequy, Or and Azure, a human head (that of Colbrond) affronté, and filleted, Argent.—*Crest.* Upon a Helmet, a Wreath, thereon a Cross botony, Or.

Arms of Colbrond. Gules, an owl Argent.

23. RAINBURN, Earl of Warwick, son of Sir Guy and the Lady Felice. The legend attached to him is silent as to the meaning of the figure at his feet; but we learn from the Latin Roll, that he earned for himself in Russia the reputation of a valiant knight, from having slain many giants in single combat.

Arms. Quarterly of 4: First, Chequy Or and Azure, a cheveron Ermine,—Sir Guy; 2. Sable, a Staff raguly in bend, Argent,—Gwayr; 3. Argent, a Cross botony, Or, entwined by a serpent, amid flames of fire,—Eneas; 4. Chequy, Or and Azure, the head of Colbrond, affronté and filleted, Argent,—also Sir Guy: impaling, Per saltire Gules and Azure, a Cross patonce, Or, for the daughter of Athelstan, King of England.

24. WEGEAT, or WAYTH, }
 25. UFA, } Successively Earls of Warwick: all similarly
 26. WOLGEAT, or WOLLET, } portrayed, in chain armour, with Staves or
 Lances in the right hand surmounted by their
 head-pieces, attached by a chain to the hilts of their swords; each holds a Charter in the left, in memorial of benefactions made to the Abbey of Evesham.

Arms of Wageat and Ufa. Quarterly 1. Sir Guy; 2. Gwayr; 3. Eneas; 4. Chequy, Or and Azure, with Colbrond's head.

Arms of Wolgeat. 1st & 4th as the last: 2nd. Rohand; 3. Gwayr.

Description of the Plates.

27. WYGOD. His head-piece worn, but attached, as before, to the Sword, which is brandished in the right hand; in his left, a small Shield.
Arms. 1st & 4th as the last: 2nd. Gules:* 3. Eneas; impaling Sable, an Eagle displayed, Or, beaked and membred Gules for Leofric, Earl of Mercia.
28. ALWIN. Armed as the five preceding Knights, but the Shield on his arm shews Chequy, Or and Azure, a Cheveron Ermine.
Arms. As Nos. 24 & 25.
29. THURKILL. A great Saxon Warrior, but one of those who adhered to the Norman William; armed as the preceding, but with Battle-axe in his right hand, and in his left, the Town and Castle of Warwick: at his feet, a Bow, Arrows, and Club.†
Arms. As No. 26.
30. MARGARET, daughter of Thurkill. Upon her left, the Preceptory for Templars, founded by her at "Llammadoc" in North Wales.
Arms. Lozengy, Or and Azure, a bordure Gules charged with plates, impaling the Arms and Quarterings of her father.
31. HENRY DE NEWBURGH, Earl of Warwick, and husband of the last. In his right hand, a Lance; in his left, the Priory of St. Sepulchre, which he founded: at his feet, a Lion.
Arms. As the last, excepting that the Arms of Eneas are given instead of Gwayr in the 3rd quartering of the impalement.
32. ROGER DE NEWBURGH, Earl of Warwick. Armed as the last, but holding in his right hand his Sword, and in his left, the united Church of All Saints and St. Mary; by his side is the Hospital of St. Michael, for Lepers, and beneath, a Preceptory for Templars, both of them founded by him: at his feet, a Lion.
Arms. 1. Newburg; 2. Sir Guy; 3. Chequy, Or and Azure, the head of Colbrond as before; 4. Rohand:—impaling, Chequy, Or and Azure.
33. WILLIAM DE NEWBURGH, Earl of Warwick. Armed as his predecessors, excepting the head-piece, which, hitherto of Anglo-Saxon, is now of Norman fashion; he holds in his left hand the Church of St. John, Warwick, which he founded: at his feet, a Lion.
Arms. Dexter, as the last: Sinister, Per Pale, Or, a Lion Rampant, Azure for Percy, and Azure, fretty Or, for D'Eyville.
34. WALERAN DE NEWBURGH, Earl of Warwick. Represented with furcoat over his armour, and head-piece furnished with nasal; in his right hand, a Sword and Charter: he bore the Sword at the Coronation of King John, and the Charter commemorates the confirmation of his father's gift to Gibcliff or Guy-cliff. A Lion at his feet.
Arms. Dexter, as the last: Sinister, Per Pale, Azure, a bend Argent cottised, Or, between six lions rampant, Or, for Bohun; and Or, two Bars Gules, for Harcourt.

* The Cross Crosslets botony are omitted here by mistake; they are given in the Latin Roll.

† The escutcheon, which marks the building in his left hand to be Warwick Castle, is omitted in this Roll, though found on the Latin or Lancastrian Roll.

Description of the Plates.

35. HENRY DE NEWBURGH, Earl of Warwick. With furcoat, as the last Earl, and Shield upon his right arm, charged with the fame; in his left hand, a Spear, and at his feet, a Lion.
Arms. Dexter, as the last: Sinister, Per Pale, Or, two Bends Azure, for D'Oyly, & Barry nebuly of twelve, Gules and Or, for Basset.
36. THOMAS DE NEWBURGH, Earl of Warwick. His helmet placed upon the corner of his shield is the first represented with a visor, and attached to it is a gorget of chain; he is uncovered excepting a fillet that surrounds his head.
Arms. Dexter, quarterly of Six;—1. & 2. as the last; 3. D'Oyly; 4. Colbrond's head; 5. Rohand; 6. Gwayr: impaling azure, 6 lioncels rampant, 3, 2, & 1, Or, for Longespée.
37. MARGERY, Countess of Warwick. With Charter, in her left hand, allusive to her grant of the Clay-pits to the Commonalty of Warwick.
Arms. The dexter per pale for her two husbands, viz. Per pale, Or and Vert, a Lion rampant Gules, charged with an annulet for Mareschal, and Argent, five Annulets, 2, 2 & 1, Gules,* for De Pleffetis; impaling the Arms of her father, as the last.
38. JOHN MARESCHAL, Earl of Warwick. Helmet as No. 55, with furcoat and shield charged with the Arms of Mareschal.
Arms. Dexter, Per Pale, Or and Vert, a Lion Rampant Gules, charged with an annulet; impaling those of his wife, as the last.
39. JOHN DE PLESSETIS, Earl of Warwick, second husband of Margery. In an Anglo-Saxon helmet,† with furcoat of his Arms, and Shield on his left arm: at his feet, a Lion.
Arms. Argent, six Annulets, 3, 2 & 1 Gules; impaling as before.
40. ALICE, daughter of Earl Waleran, wife of William Mauduit, Baron of Hanslope.
Arms. Argent, two Bars Gules; impaling, Quarterly of 4,—1st. Newburgh;—2. Sir Guy;—3. Gwayr;—4. Rohand.
41. WILLIAM MAUDUIT, Baron of Hanslope, her husband. In his hand, a Shield, per pale of Mauduit, and Argent, two Bars, and in chief, three fleurs-de-lis, Gules, for St. Liz.‡ At his feet, a Gryphon.
Arms. Same as the last; excepting that the Arms of Eneas are put in the place of those of Gwayr.
42. WILLIAM MAUDUIT, Earl of Warwick. In helmet and chain gorget, as in No. 36. A Gryphon at his feet.
Arms. Quarterly of six; 1. Mauduit; 2. Newburgh; 3. Sir Guy; 4. Rohand; 5. Argent, two Bars,§ Gules, for St. Liz; 6. Argent, a Lion Rampant, Azure & Chief Gules, Waltheof, earl of Huntingdon: impaling Sable, a Lion Rampant Argent, crowned Or, for Segrave.

* In the subsequent shield, the arms given for De Pleffetis are 6 Annulets.

At his feet lies Piers Gaveston, upon whose shield of Vert, 6 eagles displayed, Or, he tramples; the Earl had seized him out of the custody of the Earl of Pembroke, carried him to Warwick Castle, and caused his head to be struck off, on Blacklow Hill.

At his feet is a muzzled Bear, and a Font, with a crowned figure, alluding to the Baptism of a son of the Monarch of the Lithuanians, whom he took in war, and brought to London and christened after himself, Thomas.

(Suns and Roses) with the pendant Lion of March; on his head he wears the ducal circlet and Cap of Estate, and at his feet lies the Dun Cow of Warwick.‡ His Crest and Badge are upon his right hand; the latter a camail, or guard for the throat of chain-mail, so called from its resemblance to the tippet of camel's hair in fashion in the 14th century.§

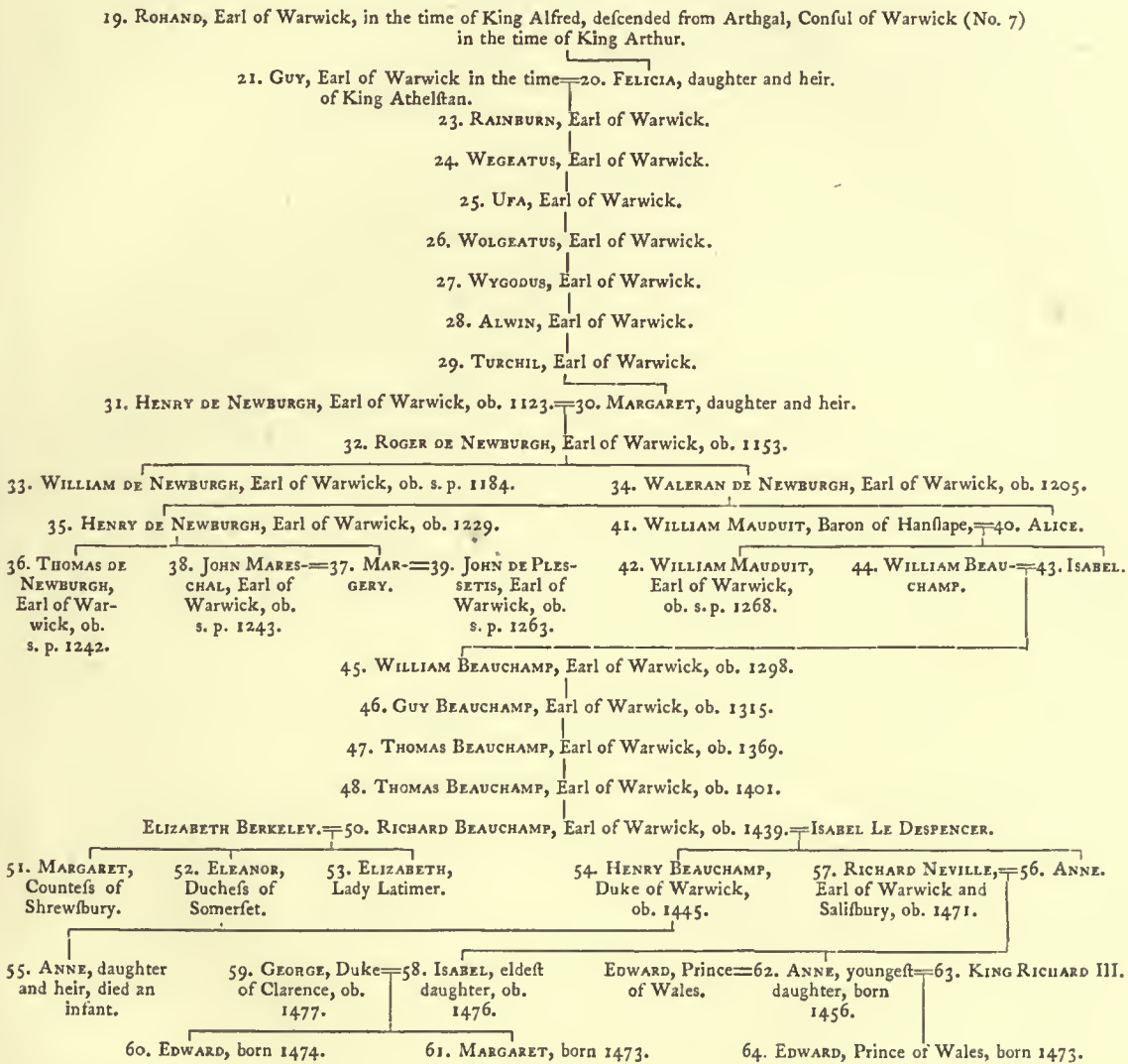

Between this portraiture and the preceding, the Roll has been mutilated for the purpose of inserting Edward, Prince of Wales, son of King Henry VI, and the first husband of Anne Neville; he is represented in a full suit of Armour, standing on a Lion, with Sceptre in his right hand and Royal Crown upon his head, surrounded by the Crests of Jerusalem, Arragon, and Anjou, on his right, and Sicily, Naples, and Lorraine, on his left; beneath runs the legend noticed in the Introduction.

† The author, in thus representing the Prince of Wales, appears to shadow forth the Royal Dignity, to which he was then the apparent Heir; in the Lancaster Roll, he transfers the compliment, as before stated, to Edward, Prince of Wales, son of King Henry VI. (then dead), and depicts King Richard's son in a Tabard, with a ducal Cap and Circlet only upon his head, and neither Rod or Sceptre in his hand, whilst beneath are the following lines:—

"Edwardus illustris Princeps Wallie Regis Ricardi tercij et venerabilis confortis sue Anne Regine Anglie unica Proles & Heres, immo heres Celi, quem in sancta anima nunquam infecit macula culpe sed ante parentes infans obiit et apud Middleham honorifice sepulture traditur."

- Beauchamp*, Richard, Earl of Warwick, made Earl of Albemarle, distinguished in justing at Mantua, at the Council of Constance, where he was for the King and temporality of England, and at Guines, when he was Captain of Calais and elsewhere; called by the Emperor "the father of courtesy," who said, that "if all courtesy were lost, it might be found in his person;" his plans for improving Warwick, viz. to wall the town, to gather the waters of Avon where the rock made it shallow, to enlarge the arches of the bridge, to compound with the millers between Warwick and Tewksbury, so that small vessels might come from Tewksbury to Warwick, opening a water communication to Bristol; purchases St. Bartholomew fair for Warwick; made a chantry of 2 priests at Guycliffe, that God might send him an heir male, at the instigation of Dame Em Rawghtone, an anchoress dwelling at Allhallows, North Street, York; before his death charges his son never to change the name of Warwick for any other; Regent of France and King's Lieutenant, dies at Rouen 30 April, 1439, and is buried at Warwick in the beautiful chapel of his foundation, 1439; guardian to H. - Beauchamp*, Thomas, Earl of Warwick, born in Warwick Castle, named after his godfathers Sir Thomas of Lancaster, and Sir Thomas Wymynton, Prior of Kenilworth, made, by the King's gift, Marshal of England for life, and Sheriff of Warwickshire and Leicestershire, heir to Sir Guy and Alice, distinguished at Cressy and Poitiers, and at siege of Calais, and in heathen land, &c. ob. 1369; takes the Archbishop of Sens prisoner, made Lieutenant of Scotland under Edward Baliol; Lieutenant of France under King E. III. in the war time; makes the great booth in the market, and makes the town toll-free, gets Gowerland by plea, but his son loses it again, dies at Calais 14 November, 1369, and is buried at Warwick, in the faire quire which he began and his son finished, 47.
- Beauchamp*, Thomas, Earl of Warwick, K. G. after the death of his elder brother, Sir Guy Beauchamp, heir to his father Sir Thomas, ob. 1401, 8 April; sentenced to perpetual imprisonment, for taking part with the Commons, and his lands given to Sir Thomas Holland, Earl of Kent, and Duke of Surry, but he was restored 2 years after, very charitable in alms and visiting the sick, finishes the quire of St. Mary's Church which his father began, and is buried in it, began the guild of the Trinity and St. George of Warwick, began the new tower next the dungeon: his ancestors having given Guycliff unto the Priory of Warwick, he got it by change of livelihood to him and his heirs, and new built the mansion under the chapel,

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- and named it Gycliff in remembrance of Sir Guy, 48.
