



#### HISTORICAL NOTE

Louis XIII (reigned 1610-1642) suffered chronically from mental and physical illnesses, so much of France's business was administered by Cardinal Richelieu, first minister from 1626-1642. Together they secured a system of royal absolutism that allowed Louis' son, Louis XIV, to develop the monarch's powers even further. Louis married Anne of Austria, daughter of Philip III of Spain, in 1615, but the arranged match inspired love on neither side.

The play is set at the time of yet another Huguenot (French Protestant) rebellion, this one the capture of La Rochelle by rebel forces in 1628. England, where Puritan influence was strong, was a natural ally to the besieged Protestants, and had indeed attempted an earlier, unsuccessful incursion led by Lord Buckingham.

Buckingham, the English Prime Minister under Charles I, was at the time of his murder preparing to sail to La Rochelle again. His relief expedition, however, did not sail after his murder by John Felton.

Dumas (Père) set his 1844 romance within Alexandre this historical context, inventing the characters Milady, d'Artagnan, De Wardes, Rochefort, Constance (among many others). The Three Musketeers success, and was first dramatized was an instant in 1845. Then as now the work's mixture of romance, adventure, comedy, and politics delights audiences This is a production of Peter readers. adaptation, first presented at Stratford. Ontario. in 1968 under John Hirsch's direction. Ours effort at capturing the cavalier tone and of that text.

#### SYNOPSIS - - ACT 1

D'Artagnan, a young Gascon, leaves for Paris to become a King's musketeer. Upon his arrival, he initially outrages the "three inseparables" with his clumsiness, but redeems and distinguishes himself in a fight with the Cardinal's guards, thereby binding himself to Athos, Aramis, and Porthos.

After securing quarters and a servant, D'Artagnan becomes involved with Constance Bonacieux by agreeing to fetch the Queen's diamond necklace, which she has imprudently given to Buckingham as a gesture of love, but which the King has asked her (at the Cardinal's prompting) to wear at a formal ball. In the meantime, Richelieu has had Milady seduce Buckingham and steal two of the twelve diamond studs on the necklace in anticipation of the Queen's exposure at the upcoming ball.

D'Artagnan, with the aid of the "three inseparables," uses his cunning, skill, and courage to overcome many obstacles set in his way and to return the necklace-complete with two replacement diamond studs --to a grateful Queen Anne. She wears them, thwarting the Cardinal, who initiates his revenge by having Constance kidnapped.

#### SYNOPSIS - - ACT 11

D'Artagnan rallies his scattered friends to fight at La Rochelle, and at the same time eludes the Cardinal's grasp. Lord de Winter, spared by d'Artagnan after a fight, introduces him to his sister-in-law, Milady, who reveals to the audience her complicity in Constance's abduction and her intention to punish d'Artagnan for his disruption of her plans. He, however, further infuriates her after disguising himself as her lover, the Comte de Wardes, and learning of the fleur-de-lys branded on her shoulder, which marks her as a criminal and confirms our suspicion that she is Athos' former wife.

Shortly thereafter, the Cardinal arranges for Milady to assassinate Buckingham, for which she asks possession of the Chateau de la Fère, a <u>carte blanche</u>, and d'Artagnan's head. Athos, however, intercepts her and arranges with d'Artagnan to have her arrested in England. The wily Milady, though, seduces her guard and tricks him into murdering Buckingham.

Still bent on revenge, she returns to France and poisons Constance, whose death precipitates Milady's execution by those she has wronged. The Cardinal, after learning that his own <u>carte</u> <u>blanche</u> has cleverly been used to defend this action, relents and appoints d'Artagnan a lieutenant in the Musketeers.
