Solon Chase, Chase's Mills. A Widely Known Son of Maine.




HON. LUCILIUS EMERY, ELLSWORTH. Chief Justice Maine Supreme Court.






GEN. SELDEN CONNOR, AUGUSTA. Governor of Maine, 1876-9, and United States Pension Agent Since 1897.







Ex-Governor of Maine and Member of Congress from the Fourth Maine District.











HON. EUGENE HALE, ELLSWORTH. United States Senator Since 1881.

## A BRIEF HISTORY OF MAINE.

All of us who are sons and daughters of Maine are justly proud of the place held in history by our native State, for we know that in all the great sisterhood of the Union there is no State with a past which gives its children more reason for pride. While students and writers for a long time neglected the early history of Maine, they have in recent years made more general use of the wealth of material here, and gradually the world has realized that back at the beginning of things on this continent Maine was playing a part worthy of a State whose record of achievements has been so long and brilliant in later generations.

There is no need to delve into the misty traditions of the visits of the Northmen to our shores. There is good reason to believe that they explored the shores of New England centuries before Columbus was born, but all that belongs to legendary lore rather than to the realm of recorded history. But after the New World became well known to Europe the shores of Maine were visited by the earliest explorers, and this section soon became the center of the long and bloody struggle between England and France for the possession of the continent. More than one early voyager sailed up the Penobscot River in search of the fabled Norumbega with its wonderful columns of crystal and silver.

Not until the beginning of the 17th century did the explorations have definite results. The voyages of Gosnold (1602), Pring (1603). Weymouth (1605). Champlain (1605), and John Smith (1614) were the most notable in their effect upon European knowledge of this section and in stimulating attempts at colonization. In 1604 a French expedition under De Monts planted a colony upon a little island at the mouth of the St. Croix River, then the only settlement of Europeans in all America north of the Spaniards in Florida. The colony was abandoned a year later, but it was nevertheless the real beginning of New France. The real beginning of New England was in the colony planted at the mouth of the Kennebec in August, 1607, by George Popham and 120 others sent out from England by the Plymouth Company whose head was Sir John Popham, Lord Chief Justice of England.

They built a fort, which they called Fort George, and erected a church and a score of rude houses around it. This was the first English settlement in New England, but like the French colony at the mouth of the St. Croix it was a broken beginning. The rigors of a single winter, during which their leader died, disheartened the colonists, who were largely adventurers and seekers for wealth, and in the fall of 160S they all returned to England. Part of them made the return voyage in a little pinnace or shallop of 30 tons which had been built soon after their arrival, the first shipbuilding venture in America and the beginning of the great industry which later made the Kennebec famed around the world. This craft was called the "Virginia of Sagadahoc," this section being then known as the northern part of that vast and vague "Virginia" which Sir Walter Raleigh had claimed for England some 20 years earlier, and the lower part of the Kennebec being known as the Sagadahoc at this time and for a century or more later.

In this same year, 1668. French Jesuits landed upon Mount Desert and a few years later they were joined by others from France, but in 1613 the colony was wiped out of existence by an English expedition from Virginia under Samuel Argall. At this time and for many years later many English traders and fishermen were frequenting the coast of Maine. Their chief rendezvous was in that region which includes Pennaquid and Monhegan and the mouths of the Sheepscot, Damariscotta and St. Georges rivers. Most of them were mere adventurers, coming and going with the seasons, and making no attempts at permanent settlement until about 1625. In 1630 it is said that 84 families, besides fishermen, were residing along the coast of this region.

The permanent settlement at Pemaquid, which was later with its successive forts to be the scene of so much stirring history, dates from 1625-26. Sir Ferdinando Gorges received in 1622 a grant of territory stretching eastward from the Piscataqua River, and within a few years Agamenticus, now York, Saco, Scarboro, Falmouth, Brunswick and Arrowsic were founded. Gorges had dreams of a city which should be the seat of great power and in 1641 Agamenticus became Gorgeanna, the first chartered city in America. In 1652 it was organized as a town and named for the English city of York, being the second town to be incorporated in what is now Maine. The first was Kittery in 1647.

The part played by Maine in saving the Plymouth colony from destruction is a chapter of special interest. It was only the corn secured at Pemaquid and the neighboring islands which saved the Pilgrims from starvation, and later it was only by means of the profits of the fur trade maintained with the Maine Indians that Plymouth was able to free itself from the burdensome debt which it owed in England. The Plymouth traders established several posts along the coast and on the lower Kennebec, but the one most important and most permanent in character was that maintained from 1625 to 1662 at Koussinoc, at the head of the tide on the Kennebec where Augusta now stands.

The post stood where Fort Western was built a century later, in 1754, and here for a generation the men who came in the Mayflower were almost as much at home as in the streets of Plymouth. Few of us here in Maine have realized the close connection between Plymouth and ancient Koussinoc on the Kennebec. There is nothing legendary or uncertain about it. but it is a matter of authentic history that Myles Standish, John Alden, the Winslows, the Bradfords, the Howlands, the Southworths and others whose names are revered as those of the men who laid the cornerstone of our civilization, came here to the spot where Augusta now stands, not once but continually through a third of a century. The site of old Fort Western and its immediate vicinity was long trod by the same feet that consecrated Plymouth Rock. These Pilgrim Fathers lived in peace with the Indians, but left wholly to the French missionaries, who came down through the wilderness from Ouebec, the work of trying to civilize or Christianize them. When the game became scarce the post was abandoned.

The name of New England was given to this region by John Smith in 1614 on his voyage of exploration and trade along the coast. The name of Maine was early applied to this part of New England, as in the charter granted to Gorges by Charles I in 1630 when it is spoken of as "the Province or Countie of Mayne." The name, as is now generally accepted, came from speaking of it as "the main land" in distinction from the many islands along the shore. Massachusetts lost no time in bringing the Maine settlements under its authority, although the confusion in the charters and patents made trouble for many years. In 1652 all the towns as far east as Casco were annexed by Massachusetts, and by 1660 all Maine west of the Penobscot was claimed and retained in spite of royal orders from Charles II. The region east of the Penobscot was then and for many years later held by the French, whose claims, indeed, covered the territory westward to the Kennebec.

From 1675 to 1750 a series of Indian wars, six in all, devastated Maine, checking the tide of immigration, costing many hundreds of lives and ending at last, as such a warfare had to end, in the practical extermination of the Maine red men. The Indians had given a welcome to the early explorers and settlers which was wholly friendly, but in the course of a century they had suffered many wrongs. Their lands were taken, they were cheated in trade, the game was killed off and some of the Indians were even kidnapped and sold as slaves in Europe. Their contact with the English had brought them only degradation and injustice. Thus when King Philip's war began in Massachusetts in 1675 it was not long before the Maine Indians were drawn into it, though it was with reluctance that the peaceful Abenakis of the Kennebec region joined the other more warlike tribes at whose hands they had often suffered. At this time it is estimated that between 5000 and 6000 people lived along the coast of Maine, of whom less than 1000 were east of the Kennebec. No fewer than 300 English lives were sacrificed in Maine and most of the settlements were abandoned and desolated before peace came in 1678.

This first war was wholly between the Indians and the English settlers. All of the remaining Indian wars were incidental to the long and bloody struggle between the French and English for the possession of this part of the continent, a struggle in which the Indians were always the active allies of the French who had never stolen their land or cheated them in trade and who had won them through the zeal of the Jesuit missionaries. To follow these wars would be tedious detail. No one of them was as bloody as the first war had been, for the settlements were better protected by garrisons of soldiers from Massachusetts and the English had become more wary of surprises and ambuscades. Still the fourth of these wars, usually known as Lovewell's war, 1722-25, cost the lives of fully 200 English soldiers and settlers.

During the third and fourth wars the English sent numerous expeditions against the Jesuit missionary, Sebastian Rale, whose headquarters were at Norridgewock and who had carried on for over 30 years the work which the pioneer missionary of Maine, Gabriel Druillettes, had begun in the Kennebec valley in 1646 with the sanction of the English. Beyond doubt Father Rale used his great influence to keep the Indians loval to the French, but the English accused him of encouraging uprisings and giving countenance to Indian savagery. Four winter expeditions failed in their main purpose, but in the summer of 1724 a force of 200 English soldiers succeeded in surprising the Norridgewock village. A great part of the Indians were killed and the village was completely destroyed. Father Rale was shot with the rest and the scalp was torn from his white head to be exhibited in triumph in Boston. The power of the Kennebec Indians was broken and they never recovered from this crushing blow. Most of the survivors fled to the eastward or northward to Ouebec.

The struggle between England and France continued and many of the blows of the battle fell upon Maine. It was a Maine man, William Pepperell of Kittery, who led the expedition in 1745 which captured Louisburg on Cape Breton, the chief stronghold of the French in America next to Quebec. Many hundred Maine soldiers and sailors were with this expedition, and also with the expedition of 1755 which drove the French from Acadia and that of 1758 which captured Louisburg a second time. A force of 400 French and Indians attacked the forts at St. George and Friendship in 1758, but failed to capture them, and this was the last blow struck against the English by the Indians of Maine.

In 1754, as outposts to guard the disputed border, the English built three strong forts along the Kennebec, Fort Shirley to replace Fort Richmond which had been built in 1718, Fort Western on the site of the old Plymouth trading post at Koussinoc and Fort Halifax at Teconnet or Winslow. These were never attacked and after a few years they were dismantled and abandoned, while settlements sprang up around them. The capture of Quebec in 1758 put an end to the long warfare, and with the welcome arrival of peace the tide of immigration from Massachusetts and Great Britain poured along the coast of Maine and up the river valleys.

Maine's part in the war for independence is a splendid chapter in its history. When the news came from Lexington and Concord in April, 1775, a company was formed at York and at once hurried to Boston. A Maine regiment, raised by Col. Scammon of Saco, participated in the battle of Bunker Hill. The first naval battle of the war was the capture in May, 1775, of the armed British sloop Margaretta by the intrepid patriots of Machias who refused to obey the British command that they take down the village Liberty pole. In the late fall of 1775 occurred the expedition of Arnold with 1100 troops up the Kennebec and through the wilderness in the attempt to capture Quebec and win Canada to the side of the colonies. In October of the same year Portland, then a town of 2000 people, was bombarded and burned by a British fleet of four vessels under Capt. Mowatt. The British held the Penobscot through the war, with their headquarters at Castine, and eastern Maine was the scene of several important expeditions and engagements. But the patriots of Machias and vicinity remained unsubdued, and in 1783 the treaty of peace recognized the St. Croix, instead of the Penobscot, as the eastern boundary of Maine. It has been estimated that Maine contributed over 7000 soldiers to the

American army during the war, and of this number about 1100 shared with Washington the hardships of that memorable winter at Valley Forge.

Hardly had peace been declared in 1783 before the movement began for the separation of Maine from Massachusetts, a movement which was not crowned with success until 1820, 37 years later. It was at first a minority movement, but the arguments for separation became stronger as Maine grew in population and desired more the dignity and privileges of separate statehood. Then there was a political reason, as Massachusetts was strongly Federalist while Maine was in sympathy with the opposite party. The first vote of the people of Maine on the subject was taken in 1792 when 2,084 votes were cast in favor of separation and 2,438 against it. It is worthy of note, however, that in 83 of the 89 towns which made returns there was a majority in favor of separation. The six towns opposing separation were all in York county, and their overwhelming majority against it was large enough to more than overcome the majorities of the 83 towns favoring separation.

There were numerous petitions sent to the General Court during the following dozen years and several conventions were held, but the next vote was not taken until 1807 when 3,370 votes were cast for separation and 0,404 against. Plainly the movement was losing ground, but the War of 1812 greatly strengthened it and when the third vote was taken in 1816 there were 10,584 votes for separation and 6,491 against it. In the next year another vote resulted 11,969 for separation and 10,347 against it. The fifth and final vote in 1819 resulted 17,091 for and 7,132 opposed. Every town in Maine gave a majority for separation. In the meantime there had been no end of lively discussion in both Maine and Massachusetts and many debates in the General Court. The people of Massachusetts were very unwilling at first to allow the separation, but finally left the decision wholly with Maine. There was still the struggle in Congress, but under a compromise Maine was admitted as a free state to offset the admission of Missouri, and on March 15, 1820, the separation from Massachusetts became complete.

A constitutional convention was at once held in Portland and only 796 votes were cast in the new State against the constitution there drawn up. William King of Bath became the first Governor, receiving 21,083 votes of the 22,014 cast. The temporary seat of government was Portland and in 1827 Augusta was made the permanent capital, other places which presented claims for the honor being Belfast, Wiscasset, Brunswick and Hallowell. When Maine became a State in 1820 its population was 298,335 and it contained nine counties and 236 towns. The population in 1790 was 96,540; in 1800 it was 151,719, and in 1810 it was 228,705. At each census since Maine's admission as a State its census has been as follows: 1830, 399,455; 1840, 501.793; 1850, 583,169; 1860, 628,279; 1870, 626,915; 1880, 648,936; 1890, 661,086; 1900, 694,466. In 1900 Maine ranked 30th among the States of the Union in population.

In the second war with Great Britain Maine bore an important part. A Maine man, Gen. Henry Dearborn of Gardiner, was at first the commander-in-chief of the national army, and Maine's quota of the troops called for was 2,500 men. The famous naval battle in which the American brig Enterprise captured the British brig Boxer, occurred Sept. 5, 1813, off the mouth of the Kennebec. The British early invaded eastern Maine, capturing Eastport, Castine, Belfast, Machias, Frankfort, Hampden, Bangor and other towns. The few companies of militia could offer little resistance to the thousands of British regulars. At Bangor the enemy burned 14 vessels, carried others away and plundered much public and private property. Although the treaty of peace was signed Dec. 24, 1814, the British did not evacuate Castine until the following April. The "cold year" of 1816 was almost as much of a blow to Maine as the war had been. There was snow in every month, the crops were complete failures and it is estimated that about 15,000 people moved out of the State, most of them going westward to Ohio.

After Maine's admission to the Union in 1820 prosperity reigned and the State made substantial progress. The first event of general historic interest was the dispute over the northeastern boundary, commonly called the "Aroostook War" or "Madawaska War." The line had long been in dispute and was the cause of frequent guarrels among the settlers and lumbermen of the St. John and St. Croix region. The officials sent to the border by the authorities of Maine and New Brunswick in 1839 came into collision. The militia was called out and there was a mustering of forces by both sides, but through the intercession of Gen. Scott, the head of the United States army, who came to Augusta for the purpose, it was decided to refer the question to arbitration, and thus the threatened bloodshed was averted. By the Ashburton treaty of 1842, Daniel Webster being the American commissioner, the line was fixed greatly to the advantage of Maine, and the State received \$200,000 as reimbursement for the expenses incurred in defending the integrity of American territory. After the signing of this treaty in 1842 the small body of United States troops which had been kept at Houlton since 1826 was withdrawn and the post abandoned

After years of temperance agitation Maine led the way in legislation on this subject. In 1851 Governor Hubbard signed the famous "Maine Law" which had been drawn by Mayor Neal Dow of Portland and passed by the Legislature through his efforts. This was the first prohibition law enacted by any state, and after being made more stringent in later years its principle was embodied in the fifth amendment to the constitution which was adopted in 1884. In recent years there have been vigorous assaults upon Maine's prohibition policy and attempts to have the question of constitutional prohibition resubmitted to the people, but without success.

No state in the Union had a more glorious record in the Civil War than Maine. From Bull Run, where one-fourth of the Federal troops were volunteers from Maine, to Appomattox, where Gen. Chamberlain of Maine received the sword of Lee in surrender, the sons of Maine were always at the front and did their part. No state in proportion to its population sent more men to the defense of the Union. Over 70,000 Maine men enlisted under the old flag. There were over 30 full regiments of infantry, two of cavalry, one double regiment of heavy artillery, several batteries and hundreds of men who went into the navy, and when the regiments after long service were decimated by battle and disease they were recruited again and again. No regiments had heavier losses in battle than some of those from Maine. Maine regiments were the first to carry back the flag to South Carolina and Texas. No Maine regiment lost its colors in dishonor, or brought them back with any other stain upon them than the life blood of their defenders. The State has no more precious possession than those returned Maine battleflags which are treasured at the State House in Augusta.

The financial burden which the war imposed upon Maine is indicated by the growth of the bonded debt of the State from \$700,000 in 1860 to over \$6,100,000 in 1866, while in every town and city the debt burden was similarly increased. Moreover, there was such a drain upon the State that its population actually decreased in the decade from 1860 to 1870, a misfortune which overtook no other Northern state except New Hampshire. But no figures of troops furnished or of losses in battle, no statistics of increasing debt or decreasing population can measure what those four years of war meant to the patriotic people of Maine—the sorrow, the sacrifice and the suffering, the desolated homes and the broken lives.

As to the political history of Maine it may be said briefly that in the early years the State was usually Democratic, and only once, in 1840, was its electoral vote cast for the Whig presidential candidate. Since the formation of the Republican party in 1856, a movement in which Maine took a leading part, the State has been emphatically Republican at every presidential election, and also at every gubernatorial election except those of 1878 and 1880 when a fusion of the Democrats and the Greenback party succeeded in electing their candidate for Governor. The Governor chosen in 1878 was Alonzo Garcelon of Lewiston, and in 1870, when another election was held, Governor Garcelon, desirous of gaining the Legislature for his party, seized every opportunity afforded by the irregular way in which the election returns were then handled to refuse certificates to Republican candidates and seat Democrats in their place. Tn this way a Democratic majority was secured and the Legislature was organized. The Republicans, gaining possession of the State House, organized a rival body, and proceeded to elect Daniel F. Davis as Governor since no candidate had received a majority at the polls. Feeling was intense throughout the State and Augusta became an armed camp. Peace was preserved by the militia until a decision of the Supreme Court established the legality of the Republican Legislature. This affair of the "State Steal" or "Count Out," as it is referred to, was a crisis in the history of Maine and it is little less than a miracle that bloodshed was averted. In 1880 the system of annual elections was given up and the present system of biennial elections adopted.

In the years that have passed since the Civil War Maine has enjoyed a progress that has been steady and substantial. The gain in population has not been great, only about 100,000 in 40 years, for this State, in common with the others of New England, has suffered from a declining birthrate among the old stock and has seen for many years a continuous procession of its sons and daughters departing for the great cities and for all sections of the West. Factors in the increase of population have been the Swedish immigration to Aroostook and the influx

of French Canadians to the manufacturing centers. The former began in 1870, through the efforts of Hon. W. W. Thomas, Ir., of Portland, and the hardy, industrious and sober Scandinavians, with their descendants, have been an important factor in the development of the great Aroostook region. The earliest European element, not English, to be introduced was the German colony brought in by Samuel Waldo who, in 1739, founded the town of Waldoboro. The Irish began to come in as laborers a century later with the beginnings of railroad construction. The Canadian immigrants have confined themselves largely to the cotton manufacturing centers of Lewiston, Biddeford, Augusta and Waterville. In this connection it is of interest to note that of the 15,878 births in Maine in 1907, 9,452 were the children of American parents and 3,265 the children of foreig-born parents, while in 2,801 cases one of the parents was foreign-born. In the same year there were 11,427 deaths in the State, 6,498 marriages and 787 divorces.

The material prosperity of Maine is indicated by the State valuation for 1907 which was given by the State assessors as \$354,516,848. This was a gain of \$72,640,047 in the preceding decade. Of the valuation in 1907 about 45 per cent was in the 20 cities of the State. In 1907 the 52 savings banks of Maine held deposits of \$85.382,447, representing the savings of 225.346 depositors. This takes no account of the many millions deposited in the savings departments of the trust companies and national banks. It is an eloquent evidence of the thrift and industry of our Maine people and is a showing which few states can approach. Ten years earlier the 52 savings banks had deposits of \$57,476,895 in the names of 163,115 depositors. The bonded debt of the State, which was \$6,100,000 at the close of the Civil War, has been reduced to \$334,000 in 1008 and will soon be wholly wiped out. Of the 521 municipalities of the State-20 cities, 428 towns and 73 plantations-280 are in 1008

without a dollar of municipal debt and a large share of the others are nearly free from debt.

The shipbuilding industry which was so important on our coast for generations, and in which Maine long held first place among the states, has declined in recent years, and the cutting of ice for export is no longer a thriving business. Along other industrial lines, however, there has been increasing prosperity. The development of the pulp and paper business has been followed by more extensive operations in the Maine woods. Although forests still cover about three-fourths of the area of Maine, the primeval growth of pine for which the State was famed has long since disappeared. It is the vast spruce tracts that supply the great pulp mills and the many saw mills on the rivers of the State There are also extensive manufactures in hardwood. Agriculture is on a far better basis than in earlier years, and much more attention is paid to dairying, orcharding and potato raising. Over 95 per cent of Maine's 60,000 farms are owned by the men who till them. Maine ranks second among the states in granite production and high in its general mineral resources. In its fisheries it has more persons employed than any other New England state, nearly 20,000 according to the latest figures. Cotton mills are the leading industries in several cities on the Saco, Androscoggin and Kennebec, and woolen mills, lumber mills, shoe factories and general manufacturing establishments prosper in all parts of the State, though only a very small part of the water power is yet utilized. The steam railroads of the State, which began in 1836 with the little road from Bangor to Old Town, have in 1908 a total of 2,145 miles and there are also 384 miles of electric road.

The development of Maine's summer resort business within the past generation and the increasing appreciation of the value of its fish and game resources have been an important factor in the prosperity of the State. Maine, with its unrivaled summer climate, its 3,000 miles of magnificent coast line, its 1,600 beautiful lakes, its 5,000 rivers and streams, its vast and unbroken forests, its rugged mountains and its many picturesque villages among the hills and ponds, has won the name of "the nation's summer playground," and thousands upon thousands of vacationists and tourists, hunters and fishermen, seekers for rest and lovers of Nature at her best are thronging within our borders each summer, adding many millions of dollars yearly to the revenues of our people. There are summer colonies all along the coast and at a hundred inland points, and the names of scores of Maine's summer resorts are familiar throughout the land. This annual invasion of summer visitors is solving in large measure the "abandoned farm" problem of a few years ago.

From the earliest colonial times the cause of education has been dear to the hearts of the people of Maine. When the State was admitted in 1820 there were 24 incorporated academies within its borders and others were established later. Many of these, the oldest and strongest, survive, though the free high school law, which dates from 1873, proved a death blow to a large part of the academies. One of the first laws of the new State was that requiring every town to raise not less than 40 cents annually per inhabitant for school purposes. The State has long had a compulsory attendance law covering the ages from 7 to 15, and few states have a lower rate of illiteracy. The old district plan of school supervision has given way to town management and to management by two or more towns uniting for the purpose. In 1907 the whole number of those of school age in the State, 5 years to 21, was 209,950; the number of different scholars registered in the public schools during the year was 131,671. There were 3,989 public schoolhouses in the State and the estimated value of the school property was \$6,151,746. The amount expended on the public schools of the State in 1907 was \$2,040,285. There were 4,608 female teachers and 460 male teachers employed. The State maintains Normal schools at Farmington, Castine, Gorham and Presque Isle and there are Normal departments at several seminaries and institutes. The institutions of higher education are Bowdoin College at Brunswick, dating from 1794; Colby College, which was established as Waterville College in 1820; Bates College at Lewiston, established in 1863, and the University of Maine at Orono which has developed from the Maine State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts which was established in 1868. There are also the Bangor Theological Seminary at Bangor, dating from 1814, and St. Mary's College at Van Buren, established in 1887.

But the greatest glory of Maine is not in its civil history, its military record, its political institutions, its industrial development, its educational progress, its material prosperity, its wealth of resources or its natural attractions. These things are themes for chapters in the story of our State, and the knowledge of them makes us love it more, but the proudest boast of Maine is the sons it has given to the world. These are the real test of a state's greatness, and measured by such a test the State of Maine has justified its motto of "Dirigo." Let us mention briefly a few of the great names that Maine can claim, names which the world knows and which the passing years will not dim.

To statesmanship and the great realm of public affairs Maine has given Sir William Phipps, George Evans, Sargent Prentiss, Jonathan Cilley, William Pitt Fessenden, John A. Andrew, Hannibal Hamlin, Lot M. Morrill, the Washburn brothers, Hugh McCullogh, James G. Blaine, Nathan Clifford, Luther Severance, Thomas B. Reed, Nelson Dingley, Jr., Melville Weston Fuller, William P. Frye, Eugene Hale, Charles E. Littlefield, John D. Long, Alfred E. Buck, United States minister to Japan, W. W. Thomas, Jr., long our minister to Sweden, Frank S. Black, governor of New York, DeAlva S. Alexander, the senior in service of the present New York congressional delegation, Senators Felch of Michigan, Grover of Oregon, Washburn of Minnesota, Gibson of Montana and Perkins of California, Governor Dole of Hawaii, Governor Pingree of Michigan, and scores of others who have attained eminence in public office in this and in many other states as governors, as members of Congress, as judges and in various offices of distinction. No other state ever produced such a family as the Washburn family of Livermore. This one family gave to the public service one United States senator, four members of Congress from four different states, two foreign ministers, two governors of two different states, one major general in the army and one captain in the navy.

Among those who have gained fame in the stern work of war Maine claims such leaders as Sir William Pepperell, Gen. Henry Knox, Gen. Henry Dearborn, Commodore Edward Preble, Gen. Oliver Otis Howard, Gen. Joshua L. Chamberlain, Gen. Berry, Gen. Selden Connor and Gen. Thomas W. Hyde.

To literature Maine has given Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, Nathaniel P. Willis, Seba Smith, the Abbott family, Elijah Kellogg, Sarah Orne Jewett, Rebecca Sophia Clark, Edward Stanwood, Arlo Bates, Charles A. Stephens, Martha Baker Dunn, Laura E. Richards, Edwin Arlington Robinson, Holman F. Day and a host of others of lesser fame, but whose works have strength and beauty and the elements of permanency. To music and art Maine has given Annie Louise Cary, Emma Eames, Madame Nordica, Franklin Simmons, the sculptor, Alfred Stone, the architect, and Eastman Johnson, the painter; to the stage, Sol Smith Russell, Richard Golden, Dustin Farnham and Maxine Elliott. Among Maine men whose scientific achievements the world has honored may be mentioned Parker Cleveland, Fordyce Barker, Sir Hiram Maxim and Robert E. Peary.

To educational work Maine has given such men as Nathan Lord, for 35 years president of Dartmouth, President Harris of Amherst, President Mosher of Hillsdale College, Chancellor

Day of Syracuse University, Albert K. Smiley, the founder and patron saint of the Mohonk Conference, Mary J. Garland, the pioneer in kindergarten work in America, and many great teachers of far-reaching influence whose names have long been honored and beloved at our own Maine colleges. In the great world of business affairs we find such sons of Maine as William Deering of Chicago, the harvester king; Melville E. Ingalls of Cincinnati, the Western railroad magnate; Jacob L. Greene, president for 30 years of the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company; John F. Dryden of New Jersey, the builder and head of the great Metropolitan Insurance Company; Thomas H. Hubbard of New York, banker, railroad man and philanthropist; Frank H. Munsey, who has revolutionized the magazine business; Henry V. Poor, the country's leading railroad statistician; Henry W. Poor, railroad president and banker; Charles W. Morse of New York, organizer of ice trust and steamboat trust; Francis H. Clergue, organizer of stupendous industrial and transportation enterprises in western Canada; Charles C. Stickney of St. Paul, railroad president; E. C. Allen, founder of Augusta's publishing industries; the Ricker brothers of Poland Spring, the greatest summer hotel men in the world; John F. Stevens, for a time at the head of the Panama canal commission; Eben Jordan, the great Boston merchant; and Edwin Ginn and Dana Estes, the publishers.

To journalism Maine has given such names as Crosby S. Noyes of the Washington Star, Edwin B. Haskell of the Boston Herald, Edward P. Mitchell of the New York Sun, and Morrill Goddard of the New York Journal; to theology such names as Samuel Harris, Henry B. Smith, Roswell Dwight Hitchcock, Newman Smyth, Egbert C. Smyth, John S. Sewall; Charles Carroll Everett, Edwin Pond Parker, Bishop Spaulding of Colorado, Charles Fletcher Dole, Minot J. Savage and the Abbotts; to the work of spreading Christianity in dark and distant lands such great missionaries as Cyrus Hamlin, George Dana Boardman, Americus Fuller, Daniel Dole and James Liddell Phillips. Maine has given to the good cause of making the old world laugh such names as Artemus Ward and Bill Nye. In the work of temperance legislation no name is better known than that of the pioneer in this cause, Neal Dow of Maine. In the great organization of women banded together "for God and home and every land," no name is higher than that of Lillian M. N. Stevens, long its national leader. In Masonry, the greatest of all secret orders, no American name is more revered than that of Josiah H. Drummond. Among all the great anti-slavery agitators in the years before the war none worked with more impassioned zeal than Elijah and Owen Lovejoy, the former dying a martyr's death at the hands of a mob in Illinois.

The list is incomplete enough, but it indicates something of the part that Maine has played in American history as a Mother of Men. The contemplation of such a roll of honor brings to our minds a realization of the true glory whose luster sheds its deathless radiance upon the name of Maine. The past of our State is secure, and who can doubt its future?

### Agricultural Statistics.

(From the United States Census Report.)

Maine has a total land area of 29,895 square miles, of which 9,844 square miles, or 32.9%, are included in farms. The surface consists of two great slopes, the northern and the southern. The northern slope, comprising about one-third of the total area, is drained by the St. John river and its tributaries, the southern slope by numerous streams which flow into the Atlantic. The broad, flat divide which separates the two slopes serves as a natural reservoir, most of the rivers of the State having their sources in the large lakes of this region. Some of the lakes have outlets on both sides of the watershed.

The surface of a large part of the State is rugged and broken. The soil of the river valleys is very productive, but in the mountainous regions and along the sea coast it is for the most part sterile. The Aroostook Valley, which comprises the largest area of fertile farming land in New England, has a deep, porous, yellow loam, especially adapted to the growing of fruits and vegetables. This section has developed remarkably during the last decade.

### TERMS OF COURT.

LAW COURT.

For the purposes of the Law Court of the State of Maine shall constitute one District. The sessions of the Supreme Judicial Court as a Law Court shall be holden as follows:

At Augusta, on the second Tuesday of December; Bangor on the first Tuesday of June; Portland on fourth Tuesday of June, all the foregoing to be holden within each year.

### NISI PRIUS TERMS.

Trial terms of the court are held annually as follows:

Androscoggin—At Auburn, on the third Tuesday of January, April and September, civil and criminal.

Aroostook—At Houlton, on the first Tuesday of April (with adjourned term at Caribou), and third Tuesday of September, civil and criminal; and at Caribou on the third Tuesday of November, civil.

*Cumberland*—At Portland, on the second Tuesday of January, April and October, civil. (The Superior Court has exclusive criminal jurisdiction.)

Franklin—At Farmington, on the first Tuesday of February, and fourth Tuesday of September, civil and criminal; and on the third Tuesday of May, civil, unless otherewise ordered.

Hancock—At Elsworth, on the second Tuesday of April and October, civil and criminal, and on the third Tuesday of January, civil.

Kennebec—At Augusta, on the first Tuesday of March, and third Tuesday of October, civil. (The Superior Court has exclusive criminal jurisdiction except trials for murder.)

Kno.r—At Rockland, on the first Tuesday of January, first Tuesday of April, and third Tuesday of September, civil and criminal.

Lincoln-At Wiscasset, on the fourth Tuesday of April and October, civil and criminal.

Oxford—At South Paris, on the second Tuesday of October and March, and at Rumford Falls on the second Tuesday of May, civil and criminal.

*Penobscot*—At Bangor. on the first Tuesday of January, April and October, civil; and on the first Tuesday of February, and second Tuesday of August, criminal.

*Piscataquis*—At Dover, on the third Tuesday of January and September, civil and criminal, and on the first Tuesday of May, civil.

Sagadahoc—At Bath, on the first Tuesday of April, third Tuesday of August, and fourth Tuesday of December, civil and criminal.

Somerset—At Skowhegan, on the third Tuesday of March and September, and fourth Tuesday of December, civil and criminal.

*Waldo*—At Belfast, on the first Tuesday of January, and the third Tuesday of April and September, civil and criminal.

Washington—At Machias, on the second Tuesday of January and October, and at Calais, on the fourth Tuesday of April, civil and criminal.

York—At Saco, on the first Tuesday of January; and at Alfred, on the first Tuesday of May and third Tuesday of September, civil and criminal.

### SUPERIOR COURT.

#### CUMBERLAND COUNTY.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL—Organized in Baltimore, Md., Dec. 25, 1784. Church in Maine composed of two conferences, Maine Conference and East Maine Conference. The Maine Conference is composed of the Portland, Central and Augusta districts: has 148 churches; 92 parsonages; 117 ministers; 10,822 members; 1.307 probationers: 12,723 Sunday School scholars. The East Maine Conference is composed of the Bangor, Bucksport and Rockland districts; has 162 churches; 91 parsonages; 105 ministers; 8,600 members; 1,029 probationers; 11,989 Sunday School cholars.

UNIVERSALIST—Parishes, 93; families, 5,610; church organizations, 72; members, 3,402; church edifices, 87; Sunday 56: Sunday School scholars, 4,200; preachers, 61; annual meetings held in June.

FRIENDS—New England yearly meeting of Friends is held alternately at Portland, Maine, and Providence, R. I. Meets at Providence, June, 1909. The denomination has 24 meetinghouses in Maine, with about 1,800 members.

UNITARIAN—Maine Association incorporated 1875 and organized at Saco, Oct. 8, 1878; has 21 churches.

CHRISTIAN-Ministers, 35; membership, about 3,600; conferences, 3.

DISCIPLES-Churches, 7; membership, about 500.

EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN—Churches, 7; membership, 1,445; first Lutheran church formed in Portland in 1874.

PRESEVTERIAN—Churches, 3; ministers, 3; membership, about 503. Churches in Maine are a part of Boston Presbytery. Sunday Schools, 6; membership, about 425. First Presbyterian Church in Portland organized in 1885; Presbyterian Church in Houlton organized in 1888.

CHURCH OF GOD—Denomination organized 1830, at Harrisburg, Pa. First church in Maine formed Sept. 27, 1873, in Palmyra by Silas L. Pennell and 24 others. Number of churches, 12; ministers, 16; communicants, about 250.

ROMAN CATHOLIC—Diocese of Portland embraces Maine, Louis S. Walsh, bishop. Churches, 104; chapels, 33; priests, 121; college for boys, 1; academies for girls, 5; orphan asylums, 3: parochial schools, 23, with attendance of 9,437; home for aged women, 1; schools for Indian children, 4. ## History of Benton

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### EARLY SETTLEMENT

Sometime about 1775 George Fitzgerald and David Gray came from Ireland, and settled near each other, about a mile north of what is now Benton Station. Several years later one Gibson settled about two miles north of the Station, on the present river road. Previous to 1777 Stephen Goodwin from Bowdoinham located at Goodwin's Corner. About 1783 Gershom Flagg from Laucaster, Mass., settled on the west bank of the Sebasticook, and received from the Plymouth Company the grant of a strip of land, fifteen miles long by half a mile wide, for his services in the construction of Fort Halifax. It is further related that he gave a portion of this land to his brother-in-law. Hon. Joseph North of Augusta, who had surveyed for him. About 1779 Job Roundy removed from Lynn, Mass., to land north of what is now Benton Village, and began clearing the farm later occupied in part by his aged son, William, who was born on the place in 1806. About 1790, about a mile south of East Benton, John Denico, Simon Brown and Mr. Anderson took up land on the present lower Albion road, and previous to 1800 Solomon Peck, a revolutionary pensioner,

came from Vermont and began farming in a primitive way, on the west bank of the Sebasticook below Benton Falls. These were among the earliest settlers of whom any record can be obtained; but from the year 1800 down the list grows larger. A curious document still extant gives "An Inventory of the Real & Personal Estate of the Inhabitants and non-resident Proprietors of the Town of Clinton, taken by the Assessors of said Town, May 1st, 1800." According to this paper thirty-nine persons (many of whose names will be hereafter mentioned) were assessed, the total tax on their real estate being \$511.96 and on their personal estate \$354.83.

Among the settlers in Benton at the beginning of the present century were Joseph and James North, the latter the father of the historian, Hon. James W. The brothers were engaged in trade and lumbering, but James dying, February 10, 1812, Joseph removed to Augusta. In 1812, Dr. Whiting Robinson came from Albion and bought the David Reed farm of Timothy, son of Ebenezer Heald. In 1816 he bought of William Fellow the farm north of that then occupied by Dominicus Getchell, where he died about 1853. Getchell conveyed his farm, in February, 1822, to John Reed. Next north of this farm lived Doctor Bowman, who died previous to 1816. Dr. Stephen Thayer came from Fairfield prior to 1836 and was located for a year or two at what is now Benton village. The John O. Fowler farm, on the east side of the Sebasticook, was first settled by one Barnes, nearly a century ago. Just north of this farm Samuel Fowler, father of John O., settled early in the cen-

tury. Across the river from him lived "Squire" Stinchfield, over ninety years ago. His son, Captain John H., and Captain Trial Hall, occupied farms in this vicinity, and in Captains Hall's barn the town of old Clinton held its meeting for a number of years..

On the road from Sebasticook river to Clinton Town House were two early farmers—Charles Ames and Isaac Holt. Colonel Reed was an old settler. Previous to 1820 Isaac Spencer built the house called "The Star and Eagle" (from a curious device which he placed over the front door). It stands about a mile above the Falls, on the east side of the river, and was later owned by Asher H. Barton, Sumner Hodgkins and Mrs. Loudon Brown.

In April, 1820, the Reed Spencer farm was deeded to Hobart Richardson. In the same year Henry Sleeper and Samuel Hudson bought of Peter Grant one undivided half of the lot afterward known as the Ford and Hudson lot. In 1824 Amos Barton deeded the Joseph Hurd farm to Jonah Crosby. About 1830 Thomas J. Hinds bought the mile square, and in June, 1833, sold it to Steward Hunt; and in October, 1831, Johnson and Samuel Lunt conveyed to the Stinchfields, house lots back of the brick store in Benton Village. Still other old settlers in this neighborhood were Abram Roundy, brother of Job, who lived on the east side of the Sebasticook, and died between 1850 and 1860; Nathaniel Brown, who lived on the Albion road and died in the fifties; and Moody Brown, who occupied a farm next east of Nathaniel.

### EAST BENTON

At East Benton the number of early settlers included the following: Andrew Spaulding, 1823, who took up a farm near Roswell Paul's land; Samuel Spaulding who came in 1831 and purchased about all the land formerly held by Denico, Brown and Anderson; Capt. Andrew Richardson about this time settled about half a mile west of the William Paul farm, which place he bought of the proprietors through Reuel Williams of Augusta; John Spaulding, near Roswell Paul's land; Noah Paul, who came from Hallowell about 1830 and settled on the lower Albion road; Josiah Hollingsworth and Solomon Hinds, who came some time between 1830 and 1840 and settled on a part of the Denico, Brown and Anderson tract.

### BROWN'S CORNER

At Brown's Corner, now generally known as Benton Station, an early comer was Dr. Ezekiel Brown, a former surgeon in the Continental Army. His house sat at the corner of the road leading to the bridge. Isaiah Brown also lived here about 1815.

About two miles north of this, on the river road, lived Samuel Gibson. About 1800 Timothy Hudson erected a house, as did also James Gray.

### INCORPORATION

The first entry in the records of the town of Benton is "an act to divide the town of Clinton, and to incorporate the town of Sebasticook." The act received the Governor's approval on March 16, 1842. Eight years after, on March 4, the town voted to instruct the selectmen to report a new

name for the town. They settled upon Benton, in honor of Thomas Hart Benton. The name was approved by the Legislature, and since 1850 the town has ably supported its honorable title.

In 1800 the Kennebec river road was laid out; in 1835 the Norcross road at East Benton was accepted, and about 1855 the Clinton road from East Benton was put through. The Unity road was laid out in 1810. The road from Hanscom's Mills to Albion, on the north side of Fifteen-mile stream, was laid out between 1850 and 1860; that from Benton Falls to Albion, called the lower road, was laid out about 1820-3; the Harris road, from Albion lower road to Winslow, was laid out in 1867; the road from the old Asher Hinds house, on the Sebasticook river road, to the old Smiley house in Winslow, was laid out previous to 1830; the road from Unity road to Clinton line, near John Richardson's house, was laid out in 1852; and the road from the Kennebec river road to the east end of Fairfield bridge was laid out in 1847. The covered bridge between Benton and Fairfield was built in 1848. It was made free in 1873. Bunker's island, between the two towns, was set off from Benton to Fairfield several years ago. Previous to the building of the bridge Jacob Ames kept a ferry for teams and foot passengers, about half a mile north of Benton station. The railroad bridge, that formerly crossed the river from Fairfield to Benton above the covered bridge, was built in 1858-9, and burned in 1873. The bridge at Benton Falls was built in the fall of 1869. The so-called artificial bridge at Benton village was built in 1887. At the

same spot, about twenty years ago, stood a covered bridge, which was carried away by a freshet about 1871. A short distance above this bridge stood another,—built in 1850, but was carried away prior to the building of the village bridge. A toll bridge was built just below Benton Falls previous to 1800. It was carried away several times, but the last being about 1871, after which it was never rebuilt. The town house (formerly Israel Herrin's store), stands in Benton village just south of the brick store, on the opposite side of the road. It was purchased by the town for its present purpose Nov. 6, 1860. Previous to this, town meetings were held in No. 5 schoolhouse. at the Falls.

### INDUSTRIAL ACCOUNT

- 1800—Capt. Andrew Richardson built a saw mill on theeast side of the Sebasticook at Benton Village. Ten years prior two saw mills were erected by Job Lacy and Abram Roundy and others back of the J. O. Fowler farm.
- 1810—Jeremiah Hunt engaged in the tanning business and for several years after.
- 1830—Thomas J. Hinds built a saw mill about two miles from the mouth of Fifteen-mile stream. He sold in 1835 to Steward Hunt who added a shingle mill. This same year Wm. Dewey, Harlow Spaulding, Wm. L. Wheeler, Geo. Perkins and Jno. Mulliken bought for \$32,000 all the mills on the Sebasticook and also three farms. In 1852 they sold the last of the property.

### HISTORICAL

- 1820 to 1830—Between these years Isaac Spencer, Sr., and Isaac Jr., owned two saw mills at Benton; Capt. J. H. Stinchfield, a dye and earding mill; and Martin Bisbee, a tannery. Afterwards Gershom Flagg built and operated a grist mill at the Falls.
- 1840—Jonah and Otis Crosby built a saw and grist mill in the south eastern part of the town. Previous to this date Nelson, Jesse and Thos. Norcross built shingle mills on the Fifteen-Mile Stream, selling later to Jos. Eaton and he to David Hanscom who installed a gang of saws and a planer. After being burned and rebuilt the mills were finally burned and never rebuilt. About this time Jos. Hurd and Amos Foss built a mill on the stream below Crosby's.
- 1854—Hiram Pishon and Daniel Ayer built a tannery on Fifteen-Mile stream; about ten years later Crosby and Walker built a brush block and handfe factory at the Falls, Heath and Crosby were also engaged in the manufacture of wooden shoe soles from 1879 to 1882.
- 1872—A potato planter factory was started in the John Palmer carriage shop by J. L. True, H. L. Crosby, John B. and A. G. Clifford. The business was sold a few years later to Benjamin & Allen of Oakland.

Benton's principle industry is the box board mill at the Falls, controlled by the United Box Board and Paper Co. At this mill formerly a grist mill, was begun the first pulp grinding in the state, making it the pioncer of that great industry throughout the state of Maine. Joseph Given of Brunswick converted the old grist mill into a two grinder

pulp mill and organized the Kennebec Fiber Co.

Later the Somerset & Kennebec Co. was organized, and in 1899 the electric railroad running between Benton Falls and Fairfield was built for carrying the supplies and product of the mill and to accommodate the public. The road is operated by the same company as the mill but under a separate management. Since 1902 the present management has run the mill. About 100 men are employed when running on full time, receiving from \$4000 to \$5000 in wages monthly. About 25 tons of box boards are produced daily. The United Box Board and Paper Co. controls the Sebasticook water supply from its sources at Newport and Moose Pond.

John E. Brown's stone cutting and monumental works at Benton is an important industry.

In April, 1835, Johnson Lunt sold the Cony & Barton Store building to Prince Haws; in 1840 Zimri Haywood traded one year at the Falls; about the same time James B. Farnsworth and Briggs Carter traded two years at the Village. H. S. Abbott & Co in brick store since 1890.

### ECCLESIASTICAL

### CONGREGATIONALIST

Early in the century there was no church building in Benton, services being occasionally held in No. 5 schoolhouse by two old clergymen known as "Parson" Adams and "Parson" Lovejoy. The only church edifice for many years in town built previous to 1828 was on the east side of the

Sebasticook, on the Winslow and Clinton road, overlooking the Falls. Though always belonging to the Congregationalists, the structure was used by them in common with the Baptists, Universalists and Methodists since the re-organization of the church on July 16, 1858. The re-organization alluded to was necessitated by the loss of the old records, previous to 1858. Under the original organization there was no settled pastor for a number of years; then Rev. Nelson Bishop was installed, sometime previous to 1845. His successors have been: Reverends George Tewksbury, 1852-53; James M. Palmer, 1853-55; Benjamin P. Dodge, 1856-58; F. P. Smith, 1858; Henry M. Vail, 1859-60; F. P. Smith, 1860; S. H. Smith, 1860-67; Henry Marden, 1867; Frank G. Clark, 1868; William S. Brown, 1869-70; Benjamin A. Robie, 1871; F. I. Bailey, 1872; Charles D. Crane, 1873; John Dinsmore, 1873-74; Charles D. Crane, 1875-76; John Dinsmore, 1876-78; James Heath, July to October, 1878; Alexander Wiswall, 1878-81; G. N. Jones, 1881-82; John Dinsmore and A. N. Small, 1883; T. P. Williams, 1883-92. (We have not obtained the list from this time).

### METHODIST CHURCH

In 1892 the Methodist chapel at Benton was erected by the Methodist society and is considered part of the Clinton charge. The chapel is located on the west side of the Sebasticook river and is a very convenient and pretty church home. For a list of pastors see under Clinton M. E. church.

### FRIENDS CHURCH

At East Benton is located the new Friends church build-

ing erected in 1900. It was dedicated on October 10th, of that year. The credit for building the church belongs to Rev. Marcus Thomas in company with the thoroughly loyal members of the Society and community.

At the time of the dedication of the church Rev. Everlon Prescott was the pastor.

Rev. Wm. Fletcher of Waterville is pastor of the Falls Baptist church.

### EDUCATIONAL NOTES

There were in Benton nine school districts at the time of incorporation, and since then another district has been added. Each contains a comfortable and well appointed schoolhouse, uniform text books are used, and the entire school property is valued about \$3,500. Usually a high school was maintained in No. 5 schoolhouse at the Falls: but the proximity of Waterville offered advantages in higher education with which it was useless for Benton to compete. No. 5 schoolhouse stands on the site of old Clinton Academy. This latter building was begun about 1830, by a company of citizens, who proposed making of it a female college. The company, however, were unable to complete the structure, and accordingly turned it over to the Methodist society, which finished it and threw open its doors to scholars of both sexes. About 1858 the Methodist society deeded the academy to Hobart Richardson, who deeded it to Daniel H.

Brown; and in July, 1859, Brown deeded it to Asher H. Barton, Eliza S. Barton, Joseph C. Richardson, William P. Heald, Albert D. Hinds, Isaac Abbott, Albert Ludwig, George W. Reed and William K. Lunt. They sold it to district No. 5 in the same month, reserving the right to hold a high school in it for two terms a year. The building was destroyed by fire in 1870. It was rebuilt in 1871, and in 1883 an attractive hall was finished off in the upper story.

### DAM BUILDERS

Many of the leading men of Benton have given their chief attention to building stone and wooden dams, and bridge abutments. The maddening rush of nearly every river in New England has been checked by the labor of these men, who face many dangers in their difficult occupation; nor is their work confined to New England, for several dams at Plattsburg, N. Y., on the Saranac river, while many scattered throughout Cape Breton, Canada and Ontario, are of Five substantial structures of this their construction. nature at Berlin Falls, and others at Rumford Falls, Livermore Falls and many more, are monuments to their skill and perseverance. Among those who have participated in this work, and have had the direction of crews, are the following: Wesley Brown, Fred E. Brown, Joseph Spencer, Bert Morrill, George Crosby, Edward Rideout, Otis Brown and Ferd Marcia.

## History of Clinton

### EARLY SETTLEMENT

We take up the early settlement of Clinton by the different sections of the town, as follows: Clinton Village, Pishon's Ferry, Noble's Ferry, Morrison's Corner, Decker's Corner, and Woodsum's Corner.

Settled at Clinton Village: Asa Brown and a Mr. Grant before 1798, on the Sebasticook about a mile east. About this time Jonathan Brown; previous to 1800 Jesse Baker. Where the cemetery now is a Mr. Michels, about the same time as Baker; Joseph Doe at the foot of the "Fifteen Mile Rips." About 1810 or '12 James and Charles Brown about a mile south-west of the village; David and Martin Hunter from Topsham about 1815. The former was locally known as "King David," because of his masterful ways.

### AT PISHON'S FERRY

Samuel Varnum about 1789 or 1790; Charles Pishon before 1800; David Pratt about 1802; Abram Frees, a physician, about 1815; John Totman at an early date; Gideon Wells, a tavern keeper, from Vienna about 1800; Joseph Mills, Benjamin Chase, the builder of the first saw mill at the Point, about 1815.

### CLINTON

### AT NOBLE'S FERRY

Benjamin Noble from Swan Island about the close of the Revolutionary War settling about two miles below Pishon's; Deacon Joseph Spearin, just before the War, on the Jonas Chase farm; about one-half mile below the ferry James Lamb, a veteran of 1815, about 1800; Francis Low, Mephibosheth Cain and Stevens Kendall.

### AT MORRISON'S CORNER

Mordecai Mooers first settler; John Flood prior to 1810, on the Ridge road; James Morrison about 1820, on the Martin Jewell farm; Samuel Weymouth not far from this time, and a Mr. Miller who built a saw mill west of the Corner about 1810, which was operated about 10 years.

### AT DECKER'S CORNER

A Mr. Decker not far from 1800, his son Stephen, better known here, with his father at the same time; Ebenezer Lewis at an early date; the father of Aaron, Lewis, Abner and James Eldridge, not far from the close of the Revolution, from Boston.

### AT WOODSUM'S CORNER

Abiathar Woodsum, the first settler, and a store keeper, about 1820 or a little earlier; Daniel Holt and a Mr. Goodwin.

### INDUSTRIAL ACCOUNT

About 1833 David Hunter, 1st, ("King David"), David 2d, and James his brother, built the first saw mills where

the present mills now stand; and in 1834 David Hunter 1st, David 2d, and Jonathan Brown erected a grist mill on the site of that now in operation. Cain and Webber's roller mill was established 20 years ago by Mr. Webber and others, Mr. Cain entering the partnership about three years later. They have a store in connection and do about \$15,000 worth of business annually. These men are also extensive lumber dealers, buying timber lots and clearing off the lumber.

On the island opposite the village was once, in 1836, a shingle machine owned primarily by E. G. Hodgdon, David Hunter 1st, and others, but afterwards run by James Spaulding. About 1850 it was changed into a brush factory, the owners being two Vermont men. After three or four years they sold it to Justin Brown, who for a time manufactured staves in the building. Brown sold to A. R. Mitchell & Co., who erected a large building for the manufacture of croquet sets and brush handles. This firm failed, however, and the factory was set off to the creditors. Shortly after this, about 1885, the factory was burned to the ground. In 1884 Arthur McNally bought the land and the privilege. Later he built the saw mill which he sold to Manly. Morrison in 1898. Fifteen men are employed in this mill and a large amount of business done annually.

As early as 1840 a carding mill was built by Billings & Stinchfield, near the old Hunter grist mill. Billings afterwards bought out Stinchfield and conducted the business until he died. Jesse Dorman bought the plant and run it until 1890, when he sold it to William Lamb.

Mr. Lamb run a saw mill until 1894 when it was totally destroyed at the event of the second big fire. A roller mill was built by Will Richardson and Maurice Kendall, and opened in the fall of 1899. The following May Alpheus Richardson bought out Will Richardson, and afterward assumed tull control.

### TANNERY

The tannery was built in 1890 by Jonathan B. Besse, and is now owned and operated by his son, Frank L. Besse. The leather tanned is mostly sheepskin and is used for shoe linings. The tannery has a capacity for tanning 3000 skins a day, employing about 20 men. The average monthly pay roll is about \$750. One thousand cords of hemlock bark are used each year at the tannery.

Spaulding and Davis' Novelty business has developed into an important industry within the past few years. They now make six different articles of household use, viz: Clothes dryers, ironing tables, wall racks, sleeve boards, lace curtain stretchers, and the last one added, clothes tongs. Seven hands are employed. Last year the company sold 21,027 pieces.

The famous Billings axes are made here by Geo. P. Billings, whose father established the business here many years ago. A sawmill near Pishon's Ferry is in active operation, Geo. Ricker proprietor.

### ECCLESIASTICAL

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Religious worship and a society was established soon after the incorporation of the town. The earliest form was the Methodist Episcopal Church, organized about 1800. Reverends D. B. Randall, James Farrington, Theodore Hill, Benj. B. Byrne and others were early pastors. In 1866-7 the edifice on Church street was erected. Over \$3,000 was expended in 1884 in enlarging and beautifying the buildings, erecting a chapel, and buying the parsonage. The present membership is about sixty-five. The Benton M. E. church is also considered a part of this charge. The first church erected in the village was the old Union church built about 1847, and jointly occupied by the Methodists, Congregationalists and Universalists.

#### FREE BAPTIST

The society was organized in February 1888, with but 14 members. The church is located on Western Ave., and cost about \$4,000. Rev. Albert D. Dodge was the first pastor, serving for five years, when he was followed by Rev. L. S. Williams in 1893, Rev. E. J. Whitman in 1898, Rev. S. Wakeley, 1901; Edward Foster, 1905; J. L. Smith, 1908. Its present membership is about 70.

A Baptist society was organized at Pishon's Ferry, about 1800. The society worshipped in District No. 2 schoolhouse until Good Templars' Hall was built about thirty-five years ago, after which time services were held in the Hall for several years. The Second Free Will Baptist church of Clinton was organized in 1874 at Pishon's Ferry, with about fifty members. Until 1890 the congregation worshipped on alternate Sundays in Good Templars' Hall. On that date they erected an edifice near the ferry where they have since worshipped. Their pastors have been Revs.

The Free Will Baptist Society at Morrison's Corner was organized in 1827. The early meetings were held in the district schoolhouse but a church erected in 1850 stood for over fifty years when it was burned. This society is extinct.

The Christian Baptist church at Woodsom's Corner, on town house hill, is another of the ancient landmarks. For many years Benj. P. Reed served as pastor of this society. He was succeeded by J. A. Johnson and the Rev. Mr. Lang, the last regular pastor.

### SCHOOLS

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The history of the public schools of Clinton, like that of other Maine towns, is the story of the founding of her earliest school by the first settlers, the continual struggle of her citizens against all odds to give to their children the advantages of an education. The new school building opened in the fall of 1902 in the village fills a long felt need and puts the school facilities of this live town on a footing equal to any town of its size in the State. There are three grades, each provided with its own instructor and arranged in regu-

lar courses. The high school which, until six years ago was held throughout the town at the different school buildings, is now permanently located here. This new structure was constructed at a cost of \$8000 and is entirely modern in its construction.

### DAM BUILDERS

The town of Clinton is noted among other things for the number of men who have been or are dam builders. The following have been in charge of crews: Alpheus Brown, John Kennedy, Pooler Lewis, Bert Lewis, Ellis Libby, Ezekiel Brown, Geo. Ricker, Daniel Richardson and Preston Weymouth. # LIBRARY

The Brown Memorial library, is the gift of one of her loyal and liberal sons, William W. Brown. It is a beautiful stone building, well designed, situated on Railroad Street. It was dedicated August 15, 1900, since which time its well chosen stacks of books have been read by a people who well appreciated a free public library.

### THE CLINTON ADVERTISER

The Clinton Advertiser was established in 1877 by B. F. Foster and was issued semi-monthly. It was an eight page leaflet 6 x 7 inches. It has been published continually. In the fall of 1903 Mr. Foster sold the paper to Marcellus Cain, the present publisher. The regular weekly issue is now a welcome visitor to almost every home in town. Mr. Cain has definite plans for enlarging his paper in the near future to place it on an equal footing with other local publications.

# History of Fairfield

# EARLY SETTLERS

Fairfield is situated on the western side of the Kennebec river, three miles north of Waterville, and 26 from Augusta. It is the most southerly town in Somerset county, and is bounded on the north by Norridgewock and Skowhegan, on the east by the Kennebec river, on the south by Waterville and Oakland and on the west by Smithfield. Its total area is about 42 square miles. It is probable that the banks of the river were explored long before any permanent settlements were made, as the river formed the principle thoroughfare then in use. We are told that when Colonel Benedict Arnold was raising volunteers to join his famous expedition up the Kennebec in 1775, that David Emery enlisted in September that year leaving his farm on what is now the River road in this town. We also find that Samuel Emery was born in Fairfield, June 15, 1773, being the first white child born in this town. So we conclude that Mr. Emery was the first settler that we have any record of at this time.

Peter Pushard was probably the first to locate permanently in the southern part of this town. His cabin was on the lot now occupied by the beautiful residence of Chas. Lawrence, in about 1774.

About 1780 William Kendall came here having bought up most of the land now occupied by the village. Heerected a log cabin near the upper end of the island and dug the cellar upon which he not long after built the first frame house in the village. This house still stands and is now occupied by his grandchildren, Mrs. Carter and Mr. Wm. F. Kendall. In 1781 it is supposed he built the first saw and grist mills. These he located on the upper end of the natural canal which has furnished power for so many mills during the past century and a quarter. On Christmas day 1782 he married Abagail Chase at Noble's Ferry, near the present Good Will Farm, and drifted down the river in a birch canoe to the home thus prepared in the wilderness. Capt. William Kendall, a soldier of the Revolution, enlisted March 12, 1777, and served three years. He with Mr. Emery, who was also a soldier, is buried in the Emery Burying Ground.

Elihu, Harper, and Zaccheus Bowerman came here from Falmouth, Mass., 1782. These and other members of the same family settled near the central part of the town and were among the leading men of the early settlement, as well as now being represented by many prominent descendants.

Some of the early settlers on the River road running south of David Emery's, who has already been mentioned, were Capt. Isaac Chase, who had five sons and seven daughters, all of his sons holding some military office during their lives; Esq. Low, who settled on the lot afterward sold for its water power and upon which Shawmut now stands; George Hobbs, noted for moving buildings; Rev. Wilson Colcord, who labored on his farm during the week, and in the pulpit

on the Sabbath; Benj. Burrill, Davin Pearson, known as the neatest, and perhaps the thriftiest farmer on the road; Wilson Colcord, Jr., Timothy Osborne, Andrew Hanson, John Durrell and James and Samuel Emery, who settled on Emery Hill. They built a saw mill just above the location of the present bridge on the stream which it is said ran much stronger then than now.

Samuel Tobey was another of the early arrivals in the town.

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# INCORPORATION

Fairfield was incorporated June 17, 1788.

The first warrant was directed to Samuel Tobey, and the first meeting held in the dwelling house of Seth Fuller on the 19th day of August, 1788. Daniel Cony, Esq., was chosen moderator; Samuel Tobey, town clerk; Josiah Burgess, Elihu Bowerman and Joseph Town, selectmen and assessors; Samuel Tobey, treasurer; Gideon Holway, constable; and Joshua Blackwell, collector. Tything men, and other necessary officers were also elected. The second meeting was held the following March at which John Mandal was elected constable.

At the meeting held the next month at the home of Israel Blackwell, the town threw its first vote for governor; the record says there were 15 votes for John Hancock.

1792, Feb. 21-Voted that Deacon John Tozer and David Parsons take a new valuation of the estates of Fairfield. Voted to notify the meetings by posting warrants, one at Nathan Chase's mill, one at Daniel Wyman's and one at Lemuel Tobey's, these being the places most central or most commonly frequented.

1796-Voted \$20 to cover Martin Stream bridge.

1797-Voted for separation of state; yeas, 36; nays, 22.

1802—Town meeting held in the new meeting house. Previous to this the meetings had been held at the homes of several of the citizens. (This meeting house was situated at Fairfield Centre, and was used for sometime as a meeting place for transacting town business; in 1847 the town purchased it of the pew holders who had previously bought the church of the town, and it was used as the town house until that body began its sessions at the village.)

1808—Voted that wheat, rye and corn be a legal tender in payment of taxes, the prices to be 6s, 5s and 4s, per bushel respectively.

1819-Vote on separation of the District of Maine to form a separate state, yeas, 117; nays, 26.

1861—The votes thrown by the town for the presidential election were: Lincoln, 354; Douglass, 69; Breckenridge, 19; Bell, 13.

1872-Bunker Island annexed.

1873—Meetings held in Andrews' Hall until a suitable place be provided.

### **CHURCHES**

The Friends seem to have been the first to do active church work in town, beginning about 1788.

The town early took measures to secure preaching. In 1793 they raised 30 pounds ( $\pounds$ 30) for the support of the gospel. Two years after the incorporation of the town, it

was voted to build a meeting house. This was a union house and built at Fairfield Centre. In a few years the town sold the pews to purchasers, some of whom paid as high as \$50 for a single pew. The pew owners afterwards deeded them to Hiram Burgess, and he to the town in 1847, for the sum of \$150. For two years previous to this purchase the subject of a town hall had been agitated, one party striving for a new hall, and the other advocating the purchase of the old meeting house. But the matter was amicably settled by the purchase of that original meeting house. The Friends house was built at North Fairfield about 10 years earlier and was twice rebuilt.

### FAIRFIELD CENTRE METHODIST SOCIETY

The following is given by Mr. Ansel L. Nye, gathered from various sources, chiefly from the history of Methodism in Maine, by Stephen Allen and W. H. Pillsbury.

The first Methodist sermon preached in Fairfield was by Jesse Lee, March 5, 1794, at Fairfield Centre. He preached here again Aug 24, 1808. There was a meeting house built here in the early settlement of the town, in which occasional meetings were held. The first revival was in 1809, under the labors of Ebenezer F. Newell, the circuit preacher. For several years the meetings were held at the house of Elisha Nye. The present meeting-house was built as a Union house in 1837.

The following is a list of the preachers appointed to this charge from 1821 to 1877. This church is now united with Fairfield village and has regular preaching on Sunday

### M. E. CHURCH, FAIRFIELD VILLAGE

The following account is taken from the records made by Rev. Ezekiel Robinson, up to 1859, and added to by succeeding pastors.

According to an account by Rev. Ezekial Robinson, the first sermon preached by a Methodist in the village, then known as Kendalls Mills, was by Ezekial Robinson, in the summer of 1827.

In 1831 Rev. Joshua Nye, a local preacher, began preaching at the village, preaching regularly once a month. Two years after this he removed to the village where he remained until his death, in 1856. He was called "Father Nye" by his devoted people.

In 1839 a house of worship, 60 feet long and 40 feet wide, to be called the "Union Meeting-house," was built and dedicated.

In 1845 Rev. J. Thying commenced preaching once a month. Father Nye preached the remaining Sabbaths.

In 1850 Rev. Cornelius Stone was appointed the regular pastor, but after one year the work was again turned over to Father Nye. At this time there were 70 members in full standing.

In 1852 the church was owned and provided for equally by the Congregationalists and Methodists. The Methodists were served by the pastors of the Waterville charge for a few years until 1858, when Rev. Mr. Robinson was appointed to the circuit. Those appointed to this charge succeeding Mr. Robinson were Rev. W. Rideout, appointed in 1859, serving until the next appointment; B. Foster, 1861; Wm. H. Strout, 1863; J. Mitchell, 1864; J. W. Hathaway, 1865; A. R. Sylvester, 1866; True P. Adams, 1868; D. B. Randall, 1870, who served three years, and raised the church, adding the lecture room as a lower story; Rev. H. B. Abbott, 1873; Perry Chandler, 1875; K. Atkinson, 1877; C. F. Allen, 1879; C. Munger, 1881; J. A. Corey, 1882; D. B. Holt, 1885; E. L. Allen, 1888; H. H. Clark, 1889; Wm. S. Fitch, 1900, H. Chase, 1891; O. S. Pilsbury, 1895; G. R. Palmer, 1900. He served the church until the appointment of Rev. J. H. Roberts the present pastor.

### UNIVERSALIST

The Universalists sold out their interests in the union house and in 1856 built the Universalist Meeting house.

A meeting on Nov. 10, 1885, petitioned for by R. H. Aldrich, V. R. Connor, F. P. Wing, J. P. Totman and H. F. Thompson, met at the old Universalist church. Rev. R. H. Aldrich was the first pastor of the organization. In 1886 a lot was bought by subscription for the location of a new church on High street, but it was decided to remodel the old structure which was done during the pastorate of Rev. S. G. Davis, who came to the church in 1889. Rev. E. L. Houghton came to the church in 1891. After 1894 the pulpit was filled by supplies until the arrival of Rev. J. F. Rhodes in 1898. The pipe organ, run by water motor, was purchased in 1898 by subscription. In 1902 Rev. James Peardon became pastor. F. E. Barton is the present pastor.

#### BAPTIST CHURCH

The Baptist Society was organized on Sept. 18, 1876, with twelve charter members, in the Chapel which had been dedicated the previous year. Rev. B. F. Shaw was the first pastor. Rev. D. Pope became pastor in 1878 for one year. Rev. Frank Jones followed him remaining but three months. Succeeding pastors: Rev. C. C. Tilley until 1882. (During his pastorate the parsonage, situated just north of the church on Newhall street was erected.) Rev. N. D. Curtis, 1885 until 1891; Rev. A. K. P. Small from 1891 to 1893; Rev. N. T. Dutton, from 1893 to 1896; Rev. E. N. Fletcher, 1896 to '98; Rev. H. M. Ives, 1898 until March 29, 1904.

The Chapel was improved and enlarged in 1888, costing \$2,600. It was rededicated Feb. 28, 1887. The bell was hung about this time, the gift of the Newton Baptist Church.

The church was again remodeled 1899 and the vestry added. J. L. Clark is the present pastor.

CHURCH OF THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY

Fairfield has been a mission parish since 1870 and up to the time of the appointment of Rev. Louis Bergeron it was under the charge of the pastor of the church at Waterville. Rev. Father Halde attended for a long time and Rev. Father Charland, who is the present pastor of St. Francis de Sales' church at Waterville, also had charge for a number of years.

The first Chapel was put up in 1880, but it was soon seen that it was not large enough to accommodate all the Catholics. Father Charland was succeeded by Rev. Louis Bergeron, the first resident pastor.

The corner stone of the new church building was laid in August, 1892. It was completed the next year and dedicated the 16th day of July, 1893.

The old chapel, moved over near the new church building, is now used as a winter chapel or vestry.

Father Bergeron was succeeded by Fr. P. A. Jouvin, Dec. 1, 1899. Since Fr. Jouvin took charge of the parish he has bought a rectory at a cost of \$2500 and has paid \$2000 on the old debt. The church has also been improved and the rectory furnished.

Besides his duties in Fairfield village Fr. Jouvin has charge of the mission at Shawmut where there is a good Catholic community of about 40 families.

#### SHAWMUT CHURCH

The church edifice at Shawmut was erected as an Episcopal house about fifteen years ago. Union Church Society was also formed in the village and held its meetings in the old Club Room. In the spring of 1904 the church was bought by subscription for the Union Society. It has been moved and is now occupied regularly, but no pastor is located here.

There is also a Free Baptist Society, but this is now doing but little active work. The Chapel was sold to the Catholic Societies of Christopher Columbus and St. John Baptist for a society hall.

The Advents have a Hall where they worship in the village. There is also a Union Mission where regular meetings are held. G. W. Hinckley is pastor of the Union Church at Hinckley.

# SCHOOL ITEMS

The town was first divided into school districts, and places selected for the erection of schoolhouses, in 1793. These divisions were made by Josiah Burgess and Daniel Shepherd.

We find that the following year the town raised the sum of £60 for schools and houses (also £10 for preaching). "Class Masters" were chosen for the several "classes." In 1803 we find there were 11 districts, as they were then called,

in 1826 this number had increased to 15; and in 1879 there were 18. In 1875 the first school supervisor, James Plummer, was elected to look after the town school.

### HIGH SCHOOL

In the year 1874, \$500 was raised for a free high school in this town. The direct object of the high school was to offer to the older and more advanced pupils a chance to attend school during the winter months. The sum of \$400 was raised annually for the support of the high school which gradually but surely raised its standard of scholarship.

This is now a fitting school for the Colleges, having long since become an independent institution. Fourteen years ago Walter Francis Kenrick began as principal of the school, and to him and his untiring endeavors is due the strength and efficiency of the present high school. He remained for several years, being succeeded in 1903 by Gny C. Healey, who did excellent work for one year. Harry Emery Pratt, the present principal, began in 1904.

# GOOD WILL FARM

Good Will Farm, the home for boys, which has now acquired a world wide reputation, was early conceived in the mind of its founder and director, Rev. George W. Hinckley. 1889—Founded on the Chase farm by Rev. G. W. Hinckley:

formally opened for boys in September; Good Will Association organized in November.

1890-Sunshine Cottage added; dedicated September 1.

- 1891—Golden Rule Cottage dedicated September 1; also Prospect Cottage was dedicated the same time.
- 1892—Fogg Cottage and Bailey Cottage dedicated September 1. Later Christian Endeavor Cottage was opened.
- 1895—Mary Louise Hall, dedicated Dec. 31; Chas. E. Moody School Building, the following day: Elizabeth Wilcox Smith Cottage, a home for girls, was soon after opened.
- 1897—Moody Memorial Chapel dedicated, June 16th. Grange Cottage built this same summer.
- 1900—Emily F. Ryerson Memorial School Building constructed.
- 1903—The dormitory, "Buckminster," and the Manual Training building, "Quincy," opened.
- 1904—Bancroft-Foote House dedicated in September.

This institution is a monument to the untiring effort and wisdom of Bev. G. W. Hinckley. It has grown wonderfully and bids fair to keep up its progress in the years to come. The place it fills is now recognized as almost infinite in its scope. Besides the great institution of Manual Training there is a regular publication largely done by the students called the Good Will Record.

# FACTS OF INTEREST

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VILLAGE CORPORATION

This village was incorporated as such in March, 1856, under the name of Kendall's Mills Village Corporation. The first officers were, E. W. McFadden, Clerk: Joseph F. Nye,

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Treas. and Col.; Orin Woodman, E. G. Pratt and Geo. Richardson, Assessors.

The Corporation maintains a fire department, a night watchman and a day police, the water department, and electric lights.

A fire department has been maintained ever since 1856 when the old Victor Engine was brought to town. The Victor fire company was formed July 15, the meeting being held in the North schoolhouse, James F. Moses being chosen foreman.

There is now excellent steamer and hydrant service throughout the entire village. The Steamer "Amoskeag" now in use, was bought in Manchester, N. H., in 1882. The engine house centrally located on Bridge street was built the same year.

The electric lighting plant was put in about 1886 when ten of Fairfield's most prominent citizens invested in the power. The plant was later sold to the Waterville and Fairfield Light and Power Co., which company operates the lighting system of both places, and also the efficient railroad system which so closely connects this village with an enterprising city.

#### LAWRENCE PUBLIC LIBRARY

This Library was erected in 1901 on a lot given by Mrs. Newhall, on Lawrence Ave. The building is a beautiful stone structure, artistically finished and decorated, dedicated July 24, 1901; Hezekiah Butterworth, the well known writer, delivering the address.

Frances Kenrick has served as librarian since it was opened. The library contains over 5,000 volumes, while there are 29 regular periodical publications found upon its tables.

Mr. Lawrence and Mrs. Newhall, the donors, give annually for its support the sum of \$500, while the town raises the sum of \$600.

#### VICTOR GRANGE

Victor Grange, No 49, was organized October 29, 1874 with 29 charter members. This is one of the most prosperous and successful granges in the state and has met with a remarkable growth. A new hall erected at Fairfield Center is the home of the organization. This building was dedicated October 1, 1903, and is one of which its many members are proud.

### THE FAIRFIELD JOURNAL

The Fairfield Journal was established in 1862 since which time it has continued regularly. Mr. A. C. Ladd took possession of the Journal in 1897. He sold to the Fairfield Journal Publishing Company, Dec. 31, 1906.




