



Public Enjoys Art People Party But Merchants Cast Loud 'No' Vote

A roar of "No!" came from Princeton merchants this week after last Saturday's third — annual? — Art People Party.

A petition of 57 signatures in opposition was presented Tuesday night to Borough Council. Among the signatories was Fred Blaicher, President of Palmer Square, Inc., and according to Thomas Brophy, who organized the protest, everybody on Witherspoon, Palmer Square and the neighboring reaches of Nassau Street signed except the food and restaurant people, most of whom apparently had a wonderful day.

The petition says its signers are opposed to having the Party on a Saturday, and in its present location. "Based on our experience with the past three Earth Days (sic), it has a negative effect on our business." ("Earth Day" was a single event in 1971. It has not been repeated. This year was the third Art People Party.)

Mr. Brophy, who was chief spokesman before Council, emphasized that he and his allied merchants are not opposed to the Party as such, only to the "where" and "when."

"Why not have it Sunday?" Mr.

Brophy asked. "Or somewhere else?"

Borough Mayor Robert W. Cawley, who said he was "very enthusiastic" about Saturday's all-day affair, told his Tuesday press conference he was surprised at the merchants' opposition because most of the Witherspoon Street shop-owners he talked to on Saturday "seemed to think it was all right."

He quoted one merchant as saying "Sure, maybe business was off some, but it was great, anyhow."

Sunday would be a difficult day, the mayor explained, because there could not be a following "rain day," and he added, at his press conference, "I would NOT favor moving the location."

"I am opposed to the element attracted here by the Party," Mr. Brophy told Council, "and traffic tie-up was very bad. Havoc and filth — it was Englishtown re-visited." Englishtown is a well-known "flea market."

Mr. Brophy questioned the le-

gality of offering arts and crafts for sale without requiring a state sales tax, and he asked why the Arts Council had imported a hot-dog vendor instead of lining up one of the nearby restaurants.

"Merchants in this town are taken for granted," he complained, "like a 9-5 faucet you turn on and off. Do you know the square-foot rental we pay?"

Mayor Cawley said a Chamber of Commerce survey had shown a majority of Witherspoon Street merchants in favor of closing that street again this year—why the change? (Philetus Holt, Arts Council president who ran the party, said earlier Tuesday that the survey showed 60 percent of the merchants in favor, a figure which surprised him because he thought it would be exactly the opposite.)

The survey was wrong, Mr. Brophy declared, but Mrs. Kathleen Edwards defended its accuracy, explaining to Council that Jack Yeoman of the Chamber had



Township Looks at Future with 6-Year, \$5.2 Million Capital Budget

A six-year capital budget of \$5.2 million, including a 1973 allotment of \$552,500, was approved Monday night for the Township by Township Committee.

It isn't binding, emphasized Committeeman Abbot Low Moffat. "Frankly," he said, "it's an experiment rather than a carefully considered document, but we hope it can be a guide."

Committee colleagues protested Mr. Moffat's modesty—he was chief architect of the budget—and said they thought the nine pages of accounting work was indeed a "carefully considered document."

Each year, the state asks municipalities to back out these capital budgets, and each year the governing body has to explain that it's really just a Christmas list, and not anything legally binding. (For example, the Borough has been including parking garages in its capital budgets for many years.)

However, the Township's six-year projection is new for the municipality, Mr. Moffat reminded the audience and Committee, and Mayor Jay Bliman praised the budget as a useful "departure point."

Highlights

Sewers: "Top priority" goes to Princeton's sewer problems. The Township allots to sewers \$2.1 million, including \$1.2 million to stop infiltration and improve the sewage treatment plant.

Mr. Moffat points out that ending infiltration is not only required by the state, it is an economic necessity: charges from the future Stony Brook Regional Sewerage Authority will be based on metered water usage. Idle water seeping where it shouldn't, is like gold

being washed down a drain. For this year, the budget proposes an outlay of \$207,000, so that work can start at once on infiltration in the Hillside sewer system and so the Township and Borough can start to buy equipment and material for preliminary exploratory work.

The budget also earmarks for 1973 the PCII sewer, Autumn Hill Drive's western part and Random Road.

For the years '74 to '78, the Township proposes new sewer lines for Greenhouse Drive, the Lawrenceville Road, Heather Lane, Cherry Valley

east from Heather (to be shared with Montgomery Township) and Drakes Corner Road, west from The Great Road.

New sewer lines were down for \$942,000 (payable through assessments) and treatment of existing lines, for \$1,170,000. The budget points out that these are overall cost figures, to be shared with the Borough.

Roads: Three links in the Terhune Loop Road system are sketched out for the next six years: Iron Johnson Park School to Winfield Road; Snowden Lane to Bertrand Drive and from Terhune's present ending near Concord Lane, to Route 27.

Changes in the Master Plan relating to housing, or decisions by the Princeton Region of Schools to build new schools would change any long-range road planning.

Open Space: This year, the Township has a chance to buy 30 of the 80 acres that constitute Woodfield Reservation. At present, the Township pays \$1 a year for Woodfield to Mrs. Lydia Poe, with the option of buying Woodfield after Mrs. Poe's death. However, Mrs. Poe has indicated that she is willing now to sell 30 acres — it is not yet known which 30 — of the tract.

Township calculations allot \$155,000 to this purchase. "Green Acres" money from the state would pay about \$75,000 and the Township anticipates that the Borough will join in paying for the rest.

Additional purchases, maybe for the rest of Woodfield, would come to \$150,000 over the next years, the budget calculates.

Library: A third floor addition to the Public Library building is blocked in for 1975 at a cost of \$400,000. The Township's share would be \$260,000.

Sidewalks, Bike Paths: "We do not feel the Township can afford to embark at this time on an ambitious experimental program of bicycle paths built primarily for recreation," the report says, regretfully.

However, it recommends a re-examination of the Township's sidewalk Master Plan: why not build cheaper, wider asphalt walks instead of the narrow concrete ones, and thereby provide both bike ways and walk ways? (And maybe save money on school busing because more children could bike to school.)

The six-year cost of such a program is an estimated \$245,000 with \$10,000 suggested for this year.

found that all but three of the Witherspoon merchants were in favor.
After a lengthy series of complaints, in which Mr. Brophy said his Palmer Square shoe store usually did two-to-five times its weekday business on Saturdays, and had lost business on May 5, and other merchants protested that art and crafts workers "cluttered up the sidewalks, and did they have Borough permits?" Borough Council member Barbara Sigmund commented.
"It amazes me that merchants don't take advantage of these people who come to town," and Jan Schaefer, from the audience, asked,
"Why not use the Art People Party for merchandizing and promotional devices, run sales perhaps? There is room for a lot of imagination here," and someone pointed out that The Gratta, Witherspoon Street Italian restaurant, sold varieties of Italian sandwiches outside on the Street.
"Plan your sales for that day," said one audience member. "Don't be so stuffy you can't change."
Successful Elsewhere. Two Councilmen, Arthur P. Morgan and Martin P. Lombardo,

asked why such a street fair seemed to work very well indeed for merchants in other places—Monterey, California, and New York City, as examples—and not here?
"Because I sell white bucks," Mr. Brophy retorted. "I sell more than anybody on the eastern seaboard because that's what Princeton people like to buy! This is a unique town!"
A sharp, and sometimes hostile exchange then occurred between Mr. Brophy and two or three members of the audience who said Princeton stores were only for the affluent.


Party, said there seemed to be a lack of communication between merchants and the Chamber of Commerce. (One merchant said earlier that the Chamber is chiefly interested in the "area" and its big firms, and cares little for the local shop-owner.)
Mr. Ford said the Council would like to regulate what is sold at next year's Party and who sells it, so that the flea-market atmosphere may be diminished. He, and other speakers spoke a new note of cooperation between merchants and Council in planning next year's Party, a note which hadn't been sounded before, apparently in the belief that the Chamber spoke for the merchant.
"We must include merchants in next year's planning," said Councilman Robert Powell, "but the town does NOT belong to the merchants or to the special interests—one day in 365, one small street opened to pedestrians—it was terrific, and it should be encouraged."
"It seemed to me on Saturday," observed Mayor Cawley, "that everyone I saw was smiling. I like to think some of those smiles were converted into business. The Arts Council would love some help—I hope next year we can work together."

TAKE A WALK ON ELM
Probably on Asphalt. An early summer re-run of last month's Borough Council meeting brought out Elm Road and Allison Road residents once again Tuesday night to talk about sidewalks, and drainage, or lack of it. Before the commercials (see "Cover"), Council had passed, 5-1, the ordinance requiring walks on Elm. An amendment allowing asphalt as an alternative to concrete passed only because Borough Mayor Robert W. Cawley cast the tie-breaking vote.

Council members Joseph P. Moore, Thomas Cawley and Robert Powell want concrete walks. Council members Barbara Sigmund, Arthur P. Morgan and Martin P. Lombardo like asphalt. Mayor Cawley likes asphalt, too.

Mr. Lombardo, in fact, doesn't like the whole ordinance, and cast the "no" vote.

"The whole plan is inadequate," he said.

Sartelited Subject. "We've had more research and discussion on these sidewalks and on the neighborhood's drainage problems than on many, larger issues," Mr. Powell observed, after he'd heard all last month's stories of poor drainage, and arguments about how walks spoil a semi-rural area and how sidewalks are needed as a safety measure.

Garrett Heher, who lives on Elm, has been talking with Clark and Rapuano, landscape consultants. Their man suggests a "stabilized earth" sidewalk, one-quarter as expensive as concrete and, Mr. Heher thinks, a lot better.

Mercer County, lease lord and owner of Elm Road, says no. Only concrete. Also, the county has the say about how close the walk should be to the property line. The closer the better, county engineers say, to allow maximum safety from Elm traffic.

"Stabilized earth" is no good, said Borough Engineer Donald Harney. It turns to mud in rainy weather and is a sour surface for wheels—

baby carriages or bikes. Asphalt is expensive to maintain, compared to concrete.

Drainage in the area, non-existent in many cases, can be helped if curbs are installed along Elm. Mr. Harney advised. Many residents implored Council to take care of drainage before bothering about walks.

In other matters, Council honored Ira H. Miller for 25 years of service with the Borough and presented him with a gift, and set aside May as "Senior Citizens Month."

SENATOR PROMISES HELP

In Housing, Senator Clifford P. Case has promised he will urge HUD officials in Camden to join Princeton Township in a site-plan survey of the Yedlin public housing land on State Road, and the Princeton Housing Authority has been informed that a representative

of HUD will be in Princeton this week to inspect the site.

Mayor Jay Bleiman announced these events to Township Committee Monday night. Last month, responding to residents opposed to the project, HUD (the Federal Housing and Urban Development Agency) announced it was requiring major environmental studies of the Yedlin area. Normally these surveys are done only for large-scale projects like airports, prisons or highways.

Mayor Bleiman said he had written HUD's Washington office, has received a reply, and has given full details about the Yedlin project.

"I pointed out that Mr. Yedlin himself hasn't been through the Township's site-plan machinery," the mayor said, "and I urged that the Camden office combine forces with us. I made the same point to Camden. The Wash-

ington man said it seemed reasonable."

(The next night, Tuesday, during Borough Council's meeting, two Council members urged Princeton residents to write their support of the Yedlin project.

"It is sad to think a few people can stand in the way of those who are in need," said Martin P. Lombardo. "We should write the director of HUD asking the agency to fulfill its commitment without delay," said Barbara Sigmund.)

After Mayor Bleiman had made his report Monday night, Len Newton, 90 Dempsey Avenue, rose from the audience and gave a chronological account of his 10 years of effort in housing in Princeton.

He challenged local governing bodies to take the initiative to bring low and middle-income housing into the community.

"I really question the ability of local government to meet its people's needs," he challenged, "because some citizens object, they can use their influence to get a delay! You cannot allow a minority view to keep this housing from reality."

When Mayor Bleiman asked what he'd suggest, Mr. Newton proposed financing Mr. Yedlin's site-plan appearance. "For \$10,000, he can go the site-plan route," Mr. Newton said. "You on Township Committee pay for it, if the Federal government won't. Underwrite it! I think this is really a matter of whether you have the will."

SEWER TAX UPPED \$15

By Township Committee. Every Township householder will pay an additional \$15 a year sewer tax as the result

of an ordinance passed Monday by Township Committee. The new \$45 fee applies to everyone. It is based on the 35,000 cubic feet of metered water which the Princeton Water Company estimates is the amount used annually in the average home. Big users, who exceed that amount, will pay \$3 per additional 1,000

cubic feet over 15,000

The increase is the first since May, 1968, and it will meet increased sewer operating costs. Anticipated costs are \$181,129 reported Administrator Joseph R. Nini Monday night, and estimated income only \$138,502.

Committeeman Abbot Low Moffat abstained in the 40 vote. He told the audience that because his property on Pheasant Hill Road and others in that area, had been initially subject to higher sewer taxes at the time of development, he actually stood to gain from the new measure and would pay less in sewer tax.

Harris Barnett, from the audience, protested the metered-water flow method of calculation. A large family, he suggested, wouldn't pay its fair share. Helen Fairbanks agreed, pointing out that the tax penalized householders living alone.

Mr. Nini reported that the state will indeed treat Wood field Reservation gypsy moths with fatal bacilli preparations rather than chemical spray. Two other areas in the municipality will, however, be sprayed and residents will be told when spraying will start. The bacilli treatment is experimental, and therefore will be done without charge to the Township, Mr. Nini explained. Rusty Scupper patrons may park in an off-site lot when they visit the new Alexander Street restaurant. Committee unanimously approved the Zoning Board's recommendation that the Scupper be allowed to lay out 55 more parking spaces in adjacent land to be leased from the University and the Penn Central.

The state, however, must still harmonize two sets of map lines thereby establishing

that the land isn't in the flood plain.

Minutes of the meetings, ordinances as introduced, the budget, capital budget and various related Township documents will be deposited from now on in the Princeton Public Library and the governmental documents room at the University's Firestone Library, to provide a little light reading for Princeton residents.

Free screening for hypertension will be offered at a Township Board of Health booth at the Medical Center's June Fete, announced Committee member Barbara Smoyer. An unnamed pharmaceutical firm is the sponsor, she said.

CARPI TRIAL DELAYED

No New Date Set. The murder trial of Colin C. Carpi of Princeton on charges dating back to February, 1971, was postponed this week by Superior Court Judge Arthur A. Salvatore. It had been scheduled to start in Trenton on Monday.

A conflict in the court schedule was cited by Judge Salvatore as the reason. Monday's date proved to be in conflict with the opening of the trial of two Atlantic County magistrates, who were indicted earlier this year. Judge Salvatore said that a new date will be set when it can be determined how long the magistrates' trial will last.

The 40 year old Mr. Carpi has been accused of the murder of his estranged wife, Laura, 37, who disappeared from her home at 213 State Road on February 8, 1971. Three months later, her body was found in the East River in New York.

Mr. Carpi, whose home is at 148 Fairway Drive, has been charged with shooting his wife and disposing of her body in the river. His attorney is Gerald Stockman; the prosecuting attorney will be Bruce M. Schragger.

SCHLUTER BACKS TAMM

For County Judge Slot. Sen. William E. Schluter has cleared the way for Theodore T. Tamm Jr. to become a Mercer County Judge, announcing he is "perfectly satisfied" with the Borough and Township Magistrate's qualifications.

Sen. Schluter had briefly delayed his support for Judge Tamm, saying he needed time to review the nomination. Judge Tamm will probably be confirmed for the \$37,000 a year post at a special Senate session after the June primary. He would succeed Arthur Salvatore who was elevated to the State Superior Court.

PAY RAISES RATIFIED

By Borough, Township Police. Without fanfare, Borough and Township police members have ratified 1973 pay contracts, according to Ptl. Bernard Lenhardt, president of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association 130 which has been nego-

tiating with Borough and Township officials on a new contract since December.

Police received a salary increase of \$750, or an effective increase of around 6%. Maximum salary for a patrolman in the two departments will be \$12,750.

Ptl. Lenhardt also reported that West Windsor Township police have "reached an agreement on the negotiating table" that is similar to the one agreed to by the Princeton police.

Police salaries are negotiated every year by the PBA.

TO SUE UNIVERSITY

For \$1.5 Million. A civil suit in which a Princeton resident will ask \$1.5 million from Princeton University in punitive damages, charging defamation and breach of contract, was filed Monday in Superior Court.

Lawrence Lavernich, 9 Park Place, bases his suit on civil conspiracy, charging the University with violating its rules in regard to him and others in the now disbanded Slavic Department.

Mr. Lavernich, a 1953 graduate of Harvard with honors in the Slavic Department, came to the University in 1967 as a doctoral candidate. He had been an interpreter during the 1969 Soviet exhibit in the New York Coliseum Exhibit, and had worked on the staff of the Institute of International Education.

Twice Mr. Lavernich says University examiner failed him in the linguistics section of the written exam for the Ph.D. He charges that, after he had been failed, "the University adopted ex post facto regulations and applied them to my colleagues so they would not be held to the same standards and regulations as I."

He also charges that the University tampered with his records in an attempt to show he did not take certain required courses. He says he has transcripts showing he did take the courses.

The late Professor David Depardiez was prohibited from examining him, although he agreed to do so. Mr. Lavernich says. Instead, the University assigned to him a man without a doctorate and without tenure as a faculty member, by implication a man in competition with him who would not be eager to have him pass.

After a long series of letters, appeals to and from various committees of the University and its trustees and their lawyers, Mr. Lavernich decided to sue.

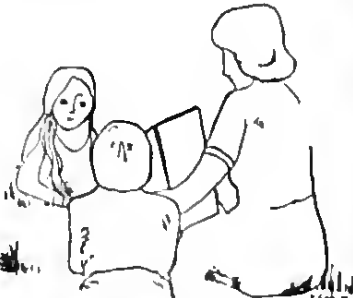

OFFICES?

Monday night with the Inter-governmental Drug Committee; the Institute for Applied Psychotherapy should go.

The IDC recommended that between now and August 31 when IAP's "program year" ends, the Institute should work with Mrs. Nancy White, administrator of Corner House, to effect an orderly transition in deciding what programs are appropriate for present IAP members.

The Drug Committee's evaluation of the IAP project included talks with representatives of SLEPA (the State

In the past, the Drug Committee felt, it might have been a good idea to have for IAP as an independent entity, but this was no longer true.

Committee member Barbara Smoyer said the Drug Committee felt IAP's contributions were "substantial," and she added that some staff might be absorbed into Corner House.

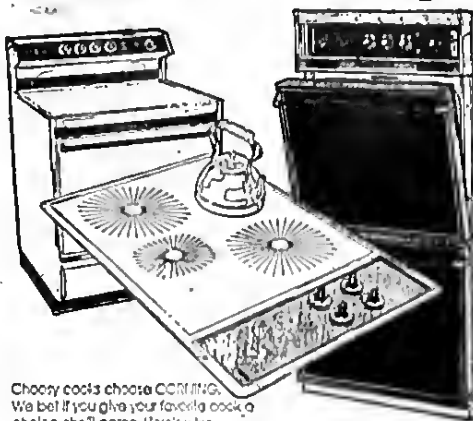

What Other Show Has Run for 40 Hit Years?



LONG AGO, BUT NOT FAR AWAY: "Belle the Typewriter Girl," the final 1973 spring production for Princeton Community Players, was given by the Ployers 35 years ago — in 1938. "Belle" was just as much a mellerdrommer then as now, and in this scene, carving the hom for all it's worth, are Erling Dorf (geology professor at Princeton) in the gun-totin' role of Abe; Bernard Ledwidge (a grad. student back in '38) as the knife-wielding Edward Blake; Alden Wicks (artists now resident in New Hope) as Ralph and Melanie Updegraff (whereabouts now unknown) as the helpless Belle herself. Identification is by "Mr. Community Ployers" — Herbert McAneny.

When Herb and Marguerite McAneny and about 30 other people founded Princeton Community Players 40 years ago, they had two purposes in mind to bring Town and Gown together and to provide some thing that would keep McCarter Theatre from being dark and silent for 11 months of the year between Triangle Club shows.

Whether Town and Gown are any more together, 40 years later, is between the acts' speculation. But McCarter certainly isn't dark any more between Triangles, and maybe the Ployers helped.

"Our first play was 'Cock Robin' on May 22, 1933," Mr. McAneny begins, "one performance was all we could do—couldn't draw enough of an audience to fill McCarter for more than that."

Herb McAneny, the quiet, rather diffident man who taught English and history to restless young scholars at the old Princeton Country Day School and then at Princeton Day

Players dropped to one. One acters were taken to Fort Dix, and even a long play, "The Bird Man" Fort Dix saw "Belle the Typewriter Girl," too.

War time performances were not to be benefits—for British War Relief, the town's Playground Fund or, again, the hospital.

Expansion came after the war. The Ployers incorporated in 1946, issued bonds and purchased "Avalon," the Henry Van Dyke mansion where the YM-YWCA now stands.

"We knocked out one wall on the main floor and made a place where we could give plays for small audiences—in the round," sometimes," Herb remembers, looking over play bills. After the actors had folded the costumes and gone home Saturday night, the small theatre became the Sunday morning meeting place for the Unitarians. The upstairs was remodeled into apartments and the McAnenys themselves lived there, on the top floor.

"Ham?" "Then," Herb says, with real nostalgia, "we got the best theatre we've ever had—next to Bill Diermer's meat market."

It was the building on Alexander Street where the Ballet Society now is, and the jubilant Ployers called it the Play-rail! It had everything poor old Avalon had lacked: work space where sets could be hammered out, performing space for either in the round or proscenium, plenty of parking.

"We were there four years—we gave 'Belle' there in 1958, and 'Mary of Scotland' with Georgine Hill Freedman as Mary and Pat Sturhahn as Queen Elizabeth." But the rent went up. So...

From 1961 until 1966, the Ployers shared Murray Theatre with Theatre Intime, but then, Intime just couldn't let us have the time we needed... (Continued on Next Page)

School, doesn't happen to be president of the Ployers this year — he's treasurer.

But he has been president three times, and so has his wife, Marguerite. She's also directed at least a dozen plays; he's only directed five because he's rebel in so many.

Among the five, of course, is "Belle the Typewriter Girl," which he did in 1958 and is doing again, rehearsing toward an opening night next Friday, May 19.

How It All Began. In the early '30s, in Princeton, the University League used to give plays, Herb recalls. Then one night, some people gathered at the home of Richard Field, a geology professor and decided to start something for the whole town.

By the end of the first year, in May, 1931, Princeton Community Players had 250 members. It now has 135.

"The town had far fewer organizations 40 years ago—not so many groups devoted to singing, dancing and so on," and he smiles a rather quiet smile. "And so many meetings to go to as there are now."

The Ployers doubled their usual schedule to give two performances of "And So To Bed."

It was a 1936 benefit for Princeton Hospital. Princeton socialites posed for photographs at various key locations in town (Madie Laughlin Jr. in a barber's chair if Diermer's Mayor Charles R. Edeman in a photo for Cox's Store with the caption "Why be caught with an empty ice box?"; R. Kenneth Faunan, who would one day be a mayor, too, jointly posing in the Nassau Inn, and the pictures were bound into a fund raising booklet that is a treasure of Princeton life and Princeton ways.

War Time Changes. War brought change. From three or four productions a year, the

 because they were expanding, so we turned to John Wither-
 spoon School. Not good at all;
 you can't even drive a nail!
 And you had to meet the jan-
 itors' time schedules....."
 Wandering, once again, like
 Evagelne or the Flying
 Dutchman, the Players came
 to rest at the Unitarian Church
 where they have been for the
 past three years. Scenery and
 costumes have to be stored
 elsewhere—usually in a mem-
 ber's barn, and a new and
 wonderful moveable light board
 must be transported to and fro
 also, but there's a stage and a
 modern building and room for
 a small audience.
 Wide Variety Players plays
 over the past 40 years, have
 ranged from J.S. Barrie's
 "The Admirable Crichton,"
 back in that first decade, to
 Jonesco's "Rhinoceros" in the
 '40s and this year's "House of
 Blue Leaves."
 Bernard Shaw has always
 been a heavy favorite—"St.
 Joan," "Candida" and "Arms
 and the Man" in the first dec-
 ade, were joined later by "Pyg-
 malion" and "The Devil's Dis-
 ciple" also in the stack of old
 playbills.
 "Berkeley Square" and
 "Summer and Smoke"—about

 "People sometimes remem-
 ber us best for our original

 era" in 1953. That was a grand
 show! One of our best."
 The late P. Mackay Sturges
 was later mayor of the Bor-

 "The Old Order Changeth."
 "I'd say today's active Play-
 ers members are younger than
 we were when we started,"
 Herb estimates. "I find it hard
 to enlist the enthusiasm of old-

 all tell me how busy they are
 with other things. But we still
 have them as dues-paying
 members."
 For the next 40 years, the
 Players want to underscore
 their workshops. Acting work-
 shops have been held in recent
 seasons, and next year there



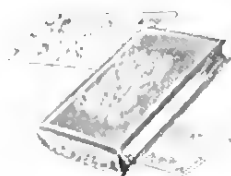

Cesar and Rosalie. A glossy, French import (with English titles) in which Yves Montand, Romy Schneider and Sami Frey, all in love with each other, weigh the pros and cons of their romantic triangle. By far the best thing about this uninvolved account of upper bourgeoisie types is Miss Schneider, who has never looked as beautiful as she does here.

Cesar (Montand) loves Rosalie who loves Cesar but also loves David (Frey) who loves Rosalie. David, who turns up out of the blue, had been an earlier chapter in Rosalie's life. Rosalie is also a loving mother, having had a daughter from a previous marriage.

Everyone chatters amiably but aimlessly and at great length; the three take turns walking out on the others, only to show up again. The furnishings and scenery are never less than attractive but Cesar and Rosalie, which was a smash hit in Paris, is likely to make less of a stir in the United States.

THE PRINCE

The *Heartbreak Kid*. Elaine May's second film based on a Neil Simon screenplay has a flaws, but it is also a wincingly accurate comedy about a young man on his honeymoon and his victims. There is ample humor both in broad laughs and in the caustic, powerful insights that come from moments of recognition when human foibles are accurately captured and revealed.

Lenny Cantrow is honeymooning in Miami with his wife (Jennie Berlin), whom he has never really looked at and about whom he soon has some grave doubts. (She eat Milky Ways in bed for one thing.) When she gets sunburned the first day and must stay indoors, Lenny discovers the girl of his dreams when he meets Cybill Shepherd, a beautiful, blonde All-American girl from Minneapolis who toys with his affection. Lenny, in love, pulls out all the stops to get her.

Despite its laughs, the film is laced with streaks of cruelty. The scene where Lenny tries to tell his wife the truth is one of the meanest, but Miss May with her sense of pace and comic timing does not let the cruelty tear down the whole movie. Even a Graduate-style ending can't detract from the brilliant comedy she has directed. PG.

'The Gondoliers' to Open Two-Day Run Tuesday

For the first time in its four-year history, the Gilbert & Sullivan Association plays in McCarter Theatre on Tuesday, May 15 and Thursday, May 17 with its current production of "The Gondoliers."

Yet it would be inaccurate to say that the boards of McCarter are in any way unfamiliar to most members of this hardworking and experienced company.

Arthur Lithgow, who has co-directed the staging with Ruth Kay Walker, was the Executive Director of McCarter Theatre for many years and directed many plays, both modern and classical, on McCarter's stage. Quite incidentally, he is one of the few people in America (if not in the world) who has directed every single one of Shakespeare's plays.

**MUSIC
In Princeton**

David Agler, the musical director, has sung and played on the stage of McCarter a few years ago when he was an undergraduate at Westminster Choir College.

Roy Walker, now a graduate student at the University of Michigan, was a leading instructor in the McCarter Workshop a few years ago. This team of directors was responsible for the successful performance of "Pirates of Penzance" last year at the Kirby Arts Center in Lawrenceville.

When it comes to Lee Bryant, Jr., there is scarcely a square foot of McCarter's stage that has not responded to his charmingly eccentric dancesteps in a host of Gilbert & Sullivan operettas of the old Savoyard organization, where he played the leading comedy parts of Ko-Ko in "The Mikado," Sir John Porter in "Pinafore," the Lord Chancellor in "Iolanthe," and once, in 1957, the Duke of Plaza-Toro, which he is recreating this spring in "The Gon-



ARE THEY GONDOLIERS? In a way, yes. They are Kathy Prudon and Don Coldwell, singing *Cosilda* and *Luiz* in the Gilbert & Sullivan Association's production of "The Gondoliers." It will be given May 15 and 17 — skipping a day in between — at McCarter.

Although a Gilbert & Sullivan production is a gay and light-hearted affair, combining music, satire, laughter, and wit in ways that have seldom been equaled since, the actual job of putting on a G&S opera is arduous, requiring careful attention to tempos and intonation (Sullivan's music is not easy music) and expert timing in the accurate delivery of Gilbert's sharp and witty barbs at Victorian stodginess and respectability.

Approximately four to five weeks of more or less continuous rehearsal are needed to bring actors and chorus to that pitch of precision that a well done G&S opera requires. While the cast is working at Westminster Choir College and in the auditoriums of Trinity Church and Stuart School, John Kemp, the designer of the scenery, has been busy painting the sets, which include one Venetian scene — complete with canals and gondolas — and one scene set in the capital of Kingdom of Barataria, an island some 300 miles in a southern sea.

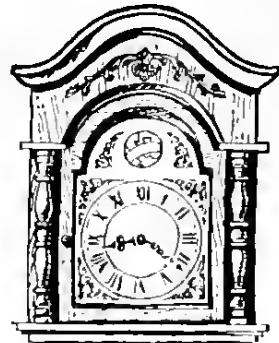

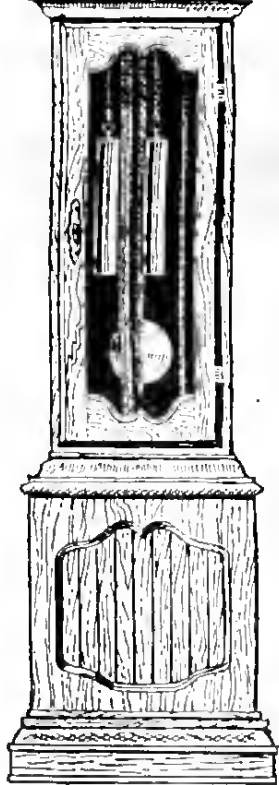

For Your Information . . .

In an effort to clear up the confusion about how to care for clothes, the Federal Trade Commission issued a rule that generally requires clothing manufactured after July, 1972, to be permanently labeled with washing or cleaning instructions. This created more confusion than it cleaned up.

One of the four "examples" of instructions read "Dry clean only. Do not use petroleum solvents or coin operated method on dry cleaning."

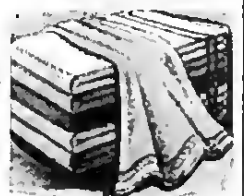

CONFIRMATION SET

For 410 by St. Paul's, The Princeton University Chapel will be the site of confirmation ceremonies Thursday at 4 p.m. for 410 children, plus several more adults, from the parish of St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church Bishop George W. Ahn, S.T.D., of the Trenton diocese, will officiate.

Confirmation marks the ritualization of the coming of the Holy Spirit to the individual, just as the Spirit came to the Apostles on the Pentecost following the Resurrection.

In the first century the apostles waited in the Upper Room for the fulfillment of Christ's promise of the coming of the Spirit. On the day of the Pentecost the Spirit came and Peter went out on a balcony and promptly converted 3,000 listeners. St. Paul's has not come close to that record but the confirmation class of 410 is its largest ever, thus the university chapel instead of St. Paul's Church, itself for the service.

The children, mostly sixth and seventh graders, will be divided into 23 classes as they enter the chapel. Each class will follow a banner read for the confirmation and display one word chosen by the class to represent an outgrowth of the coming of the Spirit.

Girls will be dressed in white robes; boys in red.

Because of the large number, one man and one woman will serve as proxy sponsors for the candidates. Candidates will come in groups of 24 to kneel down. The sponsor will place his hand on the right

shoulder, as Bishop Ahn anoints each individually on the forehead with oil and makes the sign of the cross.

The candidates for confirmation will sing at the service, accompanied by a special ensemble arranged for this occasion. The musical group, including several university students and members of the St. Paul's parish, will consist of folk and electric guitar, trumpets, organ, tambourine and bass fiddle.

Preparation for confirmation began in January. Under the supervision of Sister Gail Nolan, R.S.M., director of religious education at St. Paul's, the classes took religious instruction, practiced music, and engaged in service activities, including visitations to a nursing home and an orphanage, and an ecology project.

The children are from St. Paul's School, Stuart School, and Princeton and Montgomerie Township public schools. Confirmation classes have been given every two years at St. Paul's, although the church is now considering changing that to every year.

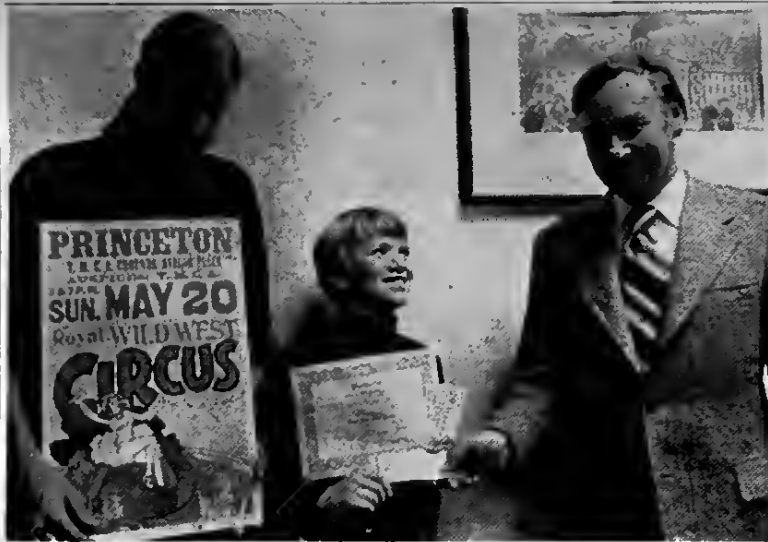

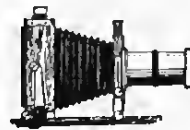

ART In Princeton

FROM THE 17TH CENTURY

At University Art Museum. The Princeton University Art Museum is featuring the Claude Lorraine Album. Although Lorraine (1630-1682) was best known for his landscape painting, his drawing was very important to him. During his lifetime, he did not permit his drawings to be sold and gave few away. Shortly after his death, it is believed that this collection, including some other drawings that have since disappeared, were assembled into an album by his heirs, in order to sell to their Queen.

Several years ago, the album was purchased by the Norton Simon Museum of Art. The drawings, carefully removed from their pages revealed sketches and notations on the reverse side of many of the works. They have been carefully preserved and are now presented to the public on a rare and beautiful roll.

The drawings are displayed in 156. It is a carefully executed landscape, predominate with objects often drawn from the Bible or mythology. Line and tone are combined to create a soft, lyrical atmosphere.

Many different media are used. Wash, ink line, and chalk are used separately and in combination. Occasionally the work is executed on tinted paper which is employed to heighten the great range of textural and tonal effects that make these drawings notable.

One of the outstanding features of the drawings is their great clarity and freshness of the tonal passages. The many contrasting areas have been better preserved than comparable works of the era as a result of being sheltered from the light between the leaves of the album.

Thus we are able to see dark, firm lines and tonal variations much as they were when Lorraine executed the drawings. Rich tones and intricate details abound in the work, accentuating and highlighting the fine and delicate nature of contrasting lines and form.

As the Lorraine drawings embody the artist seeking to idealize and ennoble the image in eras past, the Contemporary Photography display in the Morrison Gallery exhibits the current artistic concern with the display of distortion, both natural and philosophical, that man has imposed upon himself in this century.

Through different technical approaches, as well as subject matter, the use of the photograph to make a major statement is well displayed. In addition to their subject, overlapping, combined images, graphic techniques, lens distortion and color effects are used as visual tools by the photographers. The effect of the low-angle, by washing in the statement it makes. A few post-nature photographs are included and provide both sensory and

agery and effective contrast to the strong commentary made by the companion photographs.

Values are questioned, standards are ridiculed and simple subject matter often becomes a grotesque reflection of life. All of this is done using familiar subject matter occasionally through gimmicks but generally through a strong combination of subject, concept and technique.

At McCarter Theatre, "Photography as an Art Medium" is the newest collection to be included in the Princeton Art Association series. It is a pleasant change and much of the display represents the best uses of photography.

Capturing light, texture and detail are best shown through the camera lens. Many of the works illustrate results of a good marriage of the technical skills of the photographer and a sense of space, form and poetry.

There are examples of low-darkroom technique, some experimental photography and a few that attempt to make a pretentious statement. A judicious pruning of the accepted works would make this show even better.

At Gallery 100, Gallery 100 is featuring paintings by local artist Ken Melndoe. Landscape predominates in this display, but florals and a still life are included. The artist has still not freed himself from the Van Gogh approach to art, and intense color, heavy impasto and vigorous brushwork make for strong viewing.

Garden sculpture, pottery and batik are also on display. Works range from the very formal to original and imaginative pieces.

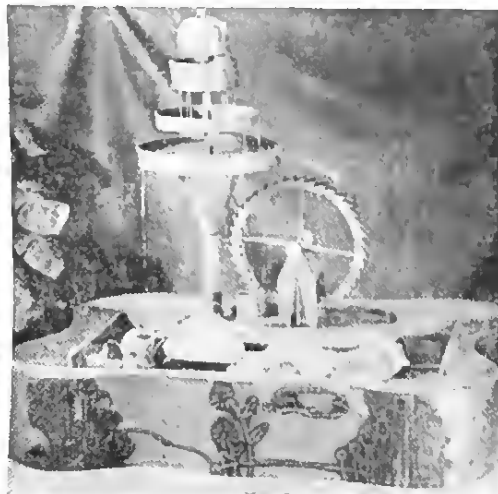

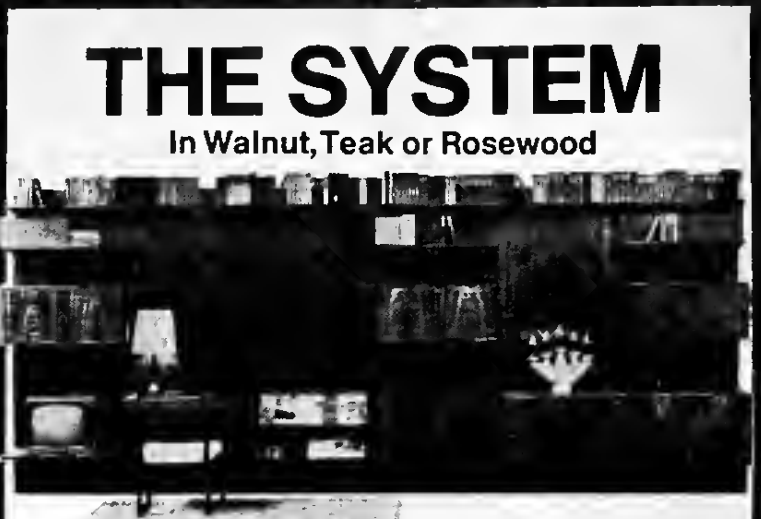

CHINA EXPERT TO SPEAK
On Campus This Friday, William Hinton, the American author whose association with the People's Republic of China reaches back to its beginnings in the 1940s, will address his first Princeton audience at a lecture this Friday, at 8 p.m. in the Senate Chamber of Whig Hall on the Princeton University Campus.

The lecture is entitled "The Socialized Transformation of China" and is open to the public without charge. The U.S. China Friendship Association in Princeton is a sponsor of the event along with several student organizations, and its members will be meeting with Mr. Hinton who is president of the Association during his visit here.

William Hinton first went to China as a newspaper reporter in 1937. He returned as a staff member of the United States Office of War Information in 1945 and as a technical volunteer with UNRRA in 1947. When this United Nations agency left China, Hinton remained, returning to the United States in 1953.

His book, "Fanshen" written in 1953 describes the daily life of Chinese peasants during the revolution. His most recent visit to China was a six month stay during 1971 during which he met with Premier Chou En Lai. His discussions with participants in the Cultural Revolution are reported in his book "Hundred Day War," published last summer.

TWO ON PROBATION
For Marijuana Possession. Two Princeton men were placed on probation last week by Borough Judge Theodore T. Tams Jr. for possession of under 25 grams of marijuana.

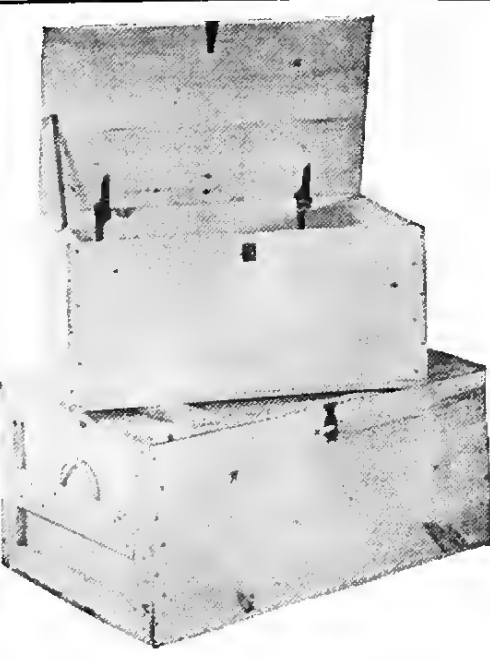

The Board also reduced its transportation account by \$10,000. Board member Robert C. Duncan, in commenting on this item, stated that it might necessitate an increase in the number of students who will walk to school next year.

The district presently provides transportation for some students living closer to the schools than the distance required by the state. He also indicated that the sidewalks presently being planned by West Windsor Township could also have an effect next year on the number of "walkers". The other cuts approved reduced the amounts available for library books, in-service planning for the high school, musical instruments, office furniture, supplementary instruction, athletic equipment, student activities and salaries for coaches.

150-lb. Crew Hopes to Become Best in East

Princeton's 150-lb. crew, very likely the last entry in the annual spring sports derby to draw spectator attention in the Sunday papers — to say nothing of the lightly-attended races on Saturdays — is the best of the Tiger teams as this abbreviated season winds down.

In the face of an uncertain future for rowing at a number of colleges, Princeton and Yale in particular, the 'fifties last week won major honors for themselves on the meandering Housatonic River near Derby, Conn. Edging Harvard by little more than a matter of inches, and by a slim two-fifths of a second on the stopwatch, Princeton's oarsmen won the Goldthwait Cup for the first time in 15 years and in so doing brought to an end a string of 28 consecutive victories recorded by Harvard.

The winning time of 5:39.1, a course record for the Housatonic made possible by the current and a strong following wind, was nonetheless extremely unusual for a 150-lb. crew racing over 2,000 meters. A finishing sprint at 39 strokes to the minute erased a half-length Harvard lead and brought the Princeton shell in by a fraction of a deck length.

Yale was third, more than four lengths behind. Princeton's jayvees also defeated Harvard, by one-fifth of a second. The Crimson freshmen prevailed by two-fifths of a second in a regatta rarely matched for the narrow margin of the victories.

This weekend, the Tiger lightweight will seek to become the first Princeton varsity since 1957 to win an Eastern sprint title. They'll be seeded first for the annual races on Lake Quinsigamond at Worcester, but it will take a superb performance on their part to defeat Harvard' line shell two weeks in a row.

Princeton's heavyweight varsity will also be at Worcester, but has not won this spring and is unlikely to qualify for the six-boat final. In five outings this spring, Princeton has defeated only Columbia while trailing Penn in the Childs Cup regatta.

The underdog Tigers appeared to be ready to win the Carnegie Cup here Saturday, but their lead with 500 meters left evaporated when they caught a crab. Cornell overtook them with ease, winning by better than a length from

Yale and by nearly three from Princeton. Kansas State was some six lengths behind.

BALL TEAM STUMBLES
Well Out of League Race.
Another weekend in which it lost two out of three games it home killed off any long-shot chance Princeton's baseball team had of finishing near the top of the Eastern League race. The Tigers were blanked by Yale Friday, 3-0, and lost the first game Saturday to Brown, 6-1, before topping the Bruins, 4-1, in the nightcap.

During the three-game span, Princeton completed 19 innings while managing to score only

a single run. The team batting average is around .185 and one of the two catchers who have been alternating behind the plate hasn't had a hit all year.

No better than 11-13 as the week's action began, Princeton is in trouble despite both ability and depth in pitching — a factor often considered to be about 80 percent of the strength of a college ball team. Last week, for example, the Tigers' five starters all had earned run averages between 2 and 3, but the team had averaged less than two runs in its last nine games, and that just isn't sufficient to win under most circumstances.

Yale pitcher Bob Corcoran simply overwhelmed them scattering four singles and allowing only one runner to reach second. The Elis threatened constantly, winning when they scored twice in the sixth and added another in the eighth. The losers again committed the sin of a punchless ball team, making as many misplays as they did hits. In fact, losing pitcher Randy Blevins' .297 average at the plate is the highest on the Tiger roster.

Bob Hoot of Brown was no better than 1-4 on the year but he tamed Princeton with ease in the opener Saturday. Bill Cambridge took the 6-1 loss, with sophomore Scott Mellenby working in relief.

The Tigers gained an even split on the day when Steve Crandall gave them support

Eventually, he yielded another hit and lost his shutout but the 4-1 triumph marked Princeton's first over Brown in four years.

First baseman Ken Beytin ended a prolonged slump in this contest, driving in three of the victors' runs with a pair of timely singles. Princeton's three-run cluster in the fourth was its highest scoring outburst in more than a month.

Second baseman John Cullinan, who had been leading the league in stolen bases with seven, saw his advantage vanish to Brown shortstop Bill Almon. The Bruin infielder pilfered four at Columbia Friday and was successful on two of three tries here to run his sea-

Victor in its first game over MIT but beaten nine straight times thereafter, Harvard was never headed on Finney Field last Saturday. The Crimson jumped out to a 3-0 lead, fell back to a 3-all tie but then dominated the action for the rest of the afternoon.
