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

#### REPORT OF SELECTMEN.

THE Selectmen have during the last year performed the duties of Overseers of the Poor and Surveyors of Highways, having been chosen such officers at the last Annual Meeting. They report as follows, regarding the matters which have been committed to them in addition to the ordinary duties of their offices.

A new highway has been constructed from the Southerly side of Washington Street opposite Oak Square, to the Newton line. The contract for the work, including a filling of stone one foot in depth for the whole distance, was for the sum of two thousand dollars. This highway was twice laid out by the County Commissioners, as their first proceedings were set aside for irregularity. A contract had been made with Messrs. Williams & Hay, for the work required by the first order of the Commissioners, and one hundred and fifty-five dollars were paid upon that contract. One hundred dollars of this amount were repaid the Town by the County, leaving a balance of fifty-five dollars to be added to the sum of two thousand dollars paid under the second contract. To this should be added the further sum of forty-nine dollars paid to the Surveyor, making the total cost of the road to the Town, the sum of two thousand one hundred and four dollars, (\$2,104.)

Parsons Street has been graded, and is now fit for travel from Washington' Street to North Beacon Street. It passes under the Boston and Worcester Rail Road, and the grading was done by that corporation, because the bridge over the road, as built by them was of a less width than had been agreed on with the Town.

River Street has been graded for the whole length of the Causeway from Harvard Street to the Cambridgeport Bridge. The half of that bridge which is in Brighton, has been almost entirely rebuilt with a new pier and fender, and half of the bridge between Watertown and Brighton in the same street, has been entirely rebuilt. These repairs on River Street and the bridges were done by the order of the Special Commissioners (with which the Town is familiar) and cost the sum of six thousand six hundred and forty-eight dollars and seventeen cents, . . . . . . . . . . . \$6,648 17 Of this expense the County paid the sum of one

- thousand six hundred and seventy-one dollars twenty-nine cents,
- Making the net cost to the Town, four thousand nine hundred and seventy-six dollars and eightv-eight cents,

It will be remembered that the Town received in 1857, of the Hancock Free Bridge Corporation, the sum of sixty-five hundred dollars, . . . . . . . . . . . . \$6,500 00

- On account of this highway and the bridge the annual interest on which sum since that time has been just about sufficient to meet the expenses of litigation, of taking care of the bridges and tending the draws.
- Deducting from this sum of six thousand five hundred dollars, the net expense of the road to the Town, . . . . .

And we have a balance of . . . \$1,523 12 Which is all that will remain to the Town with which to keep the street in repair and support the bridges hereafter. That part of the street between the foot of Market Street and Gooch's Wharf, has been repaired and graded this year, out of the money appropriated for highways, and the remainder of the street between Gooch's wharf and Harvard Street will need to be graded during the coming year.

A narrow part of Rockland Street has been straightened and graded, at a cost of four hundred dollars, three-fourths of which amount was paid by the Town, and one-fourth by abuttors.

The Great Bridge controversy with Cambridge has been adjusted, and an act has passed the Legislature providing for the future support of the bridge, in accordance with the propositions submitted to and accepted by the Town in February last. A copy of the act is annexed to this report. Almshouse. The Selectmen by direction of the Town purchased seven acres of land adjoining the Poor Farm, for the sum of six hundred and seventy-five dollars. This purchase increases the farm to about fourteen acres. A new Almshouse has been built on the premises, at the cost of twenty-two hundred and sixty-five dollars and seventy cents. (\$2,265 70.)

The building is two stories high, and measures thirty feet by forty, with two L's, each fifteen feet by eighteen. It will accommodate, it is believed, from fifteen to twenty permanent occupants, besides the family of the keeper of the house. The number of paupers now in it is three.

The Selectmen have not made any alteration in the basement of the Town Hall building as yet, for the reason that she room was used for a while as a drill room, and that no application has been made for the room, for particular purposes sufficient, as they thought, to justify making an entire alteration, and it seemed to them that a partial alteration should not be made, but that it would be better to wait until some use could be found for all the room. Moreover, under the circumstances, as the expenses of the Town for other purposes were so great, it was thought wise to economize as much as possible.

A vote was passed by the Town directing the Selectmen to lay water pipes, with hydrants, &c., to convey the water from the Frog Pond along a part of Washington Street, in accordance with a proposition of the Cattle Fair Hotel Corporation. It was found, however, that the corporation understood that they were to have a right to tap the pipes if they saw fit, but as nothing was said of this in the proposition made to the Town, and as the Town would be obliged to keep the pipes in repair, the Selectmen did not think it advisable to go on with the work without further instructions from the Town.

Aid to the Volunteers from this Town in active service, and to the families of such as have them, has been rendered by the Selectmen, as directed by a vote of the Town, somewhat modified by an act of the Legislature. The amount paid for this purpose is stated in the Auditor's Report.

#### COPY OF AN ACT IN RELATION TO CAMBRIDGE GREAT BRIDGE.

#### Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-Two.

#### AN ACT

In relation to the Rebuilding and future support of "Cambridge Great Bridge."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows: —

SECT. 1. The city of Cambridge, and the inhabitants of the town of Brighton, are hereby authorized and required to rebuild the "great bridge" over Charles river, between the city of Cambridge and the town of Brighton, in a substantial and proper manner; the same to be made of the width of twenty-eight feet, with a draw in the centre thereof, at an equal distance from each abutment, of not less than thirty-two feet in width, and with the necessary and proper draw-piers, one above and one below said bridge. The expense incurred in such rebuilding of the bridge and piers shall be borne by said city of Cambridge and said town of Brighton in proportion to the respective valuations of said city and town; but all the additional expense incurred in deepening the channel below said bridge, so as to admit of placing the draw in the centre of said bridge, shall be borne equally by said city and town.

SECT. 2. The bridge, when it shall have been rebuilt as aforesaid, shall be divided by a line along the opening in the middle of said draw, at an equal distance from each abutment, and said line shall forever be the dividing line between Cambridge and Brighton at that point.

SECT. 3. So much of said bridge and draw as shall lie south-westerly of said dividing line, together with the most southerly pier, shall be forever supported, maintained, and repaired, and the south-westerly half of the draw shall be raised by, and at the expense of said town of Brighton; and so much of said bridge and draw as shall lie north-easterly of said dividing line; together with the most northerly pier, shall be forever supported, maintained, and repaired, and the northeasterly half of the draw shall be raised by and at the expense of said city of Cambridge.

SECT. 4. For the purpose of placing the draw of said bridge in the centre of the same, as above provided, said city and town are authorized and empowered to deepen the channel in said river, so far as may be necessary for that purpose.

SECT. 5. All acts or parts of acts, inconsistent with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed.


SECT. 6. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
