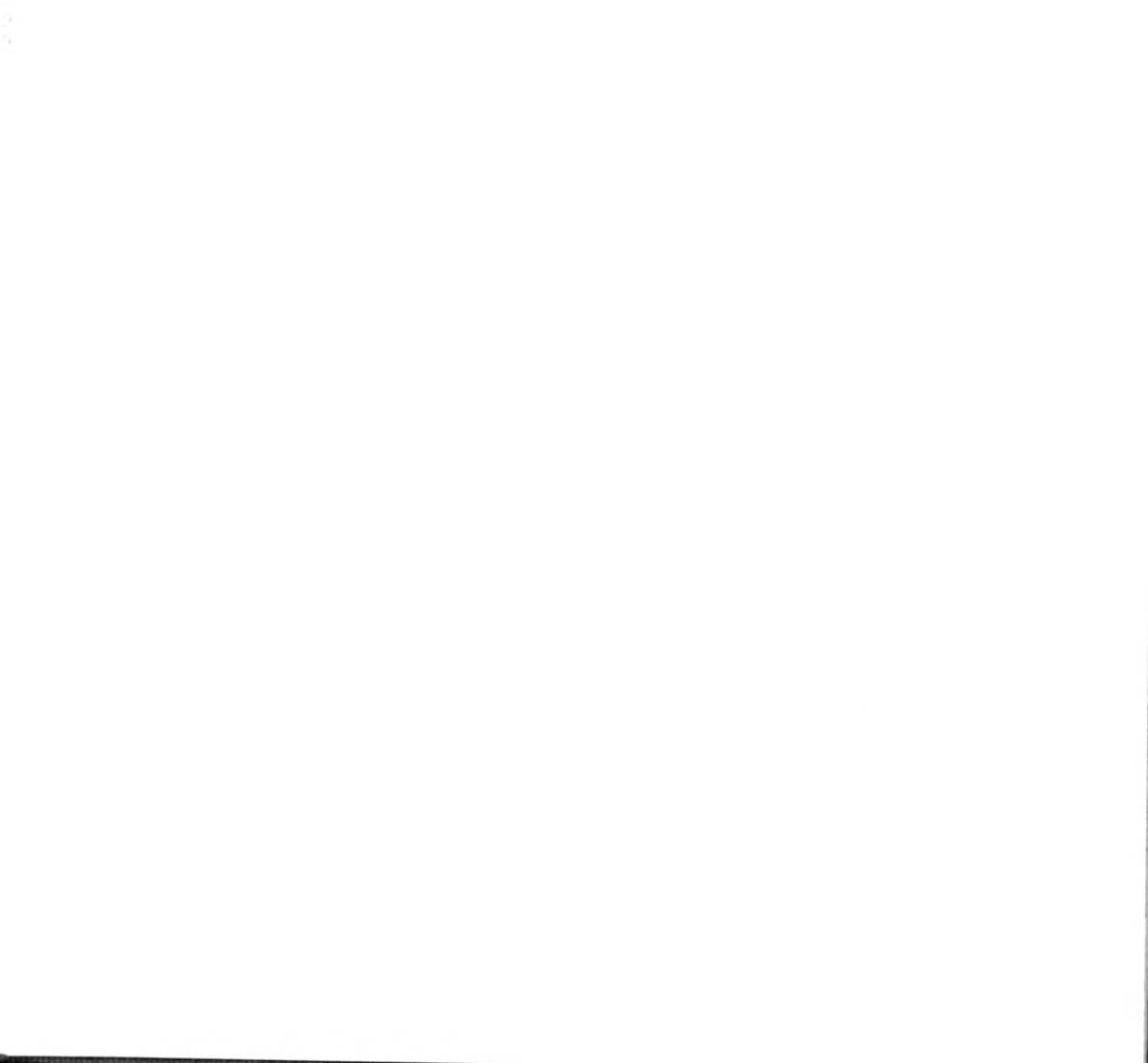
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PREFACE

For years I have had it in view to prepare for publication our family tree, which would necessitate a traditional history of foreign ancestors in Scotland, Ireland and Wales. One object of the book is to preserve in one volume all that is authentic in regard to the ancestral lines of several families that are closely related by frequent intermarriages. I hope by this work to rescue from oblivion ancient tradition that would soon be lost, beyond the reach of anyone who might hereafter desire to write our family history. The most troublesome and tedious part of the task was collecting necessary documents, old letters and ancient family records. Important contributions have been obtained from David Watson, Miss Maud Wilson, James O. Houston, V. A. Milroy, Mrs. S. J. Traylor, Mrs. Nannie Crain, Horace Stafford, and others. In fact, it is very gratifying to me that nearly all to whom I have applied for information have responded promptly and cheerfully, giving me not only their immediate family record, but have kept up an interest in the undertaking, searched out others, and located for me scattered members of the different families. To them all I beg to return a warm acknowledgment of their kind assistance.

Several obstacles have retarded the progress of the work of completing the manuscript; but this has been an advantage; it gave me time to examine more minutely the authorities and make a better arrangement of the matter to be published.

In the biographical sketches it has been my aim to compile as much as possible in the smallest compass, and to select from each of the branches represented some prominent one, deserving of notice. I regret that for want of sufficient data I am compelled to leave without special notice so many worthy ones. The scholar will undoubtedly find much to criticize in the literary style of the book; but I trust all errors and imperfections will be kindly viewed, and that it may meet with favor from the many relatives whose names appear upon its pages. The book is intended as a souvenir that shall remain within view of those are numbered with our fathers. It is hoped the succeeding generations will prize it as the book of memory. It is a home-hold treasure.

The most useful purpose of this science was to signalize merit; and preserve the memory of the illustrious. This will always secure it from contempt.

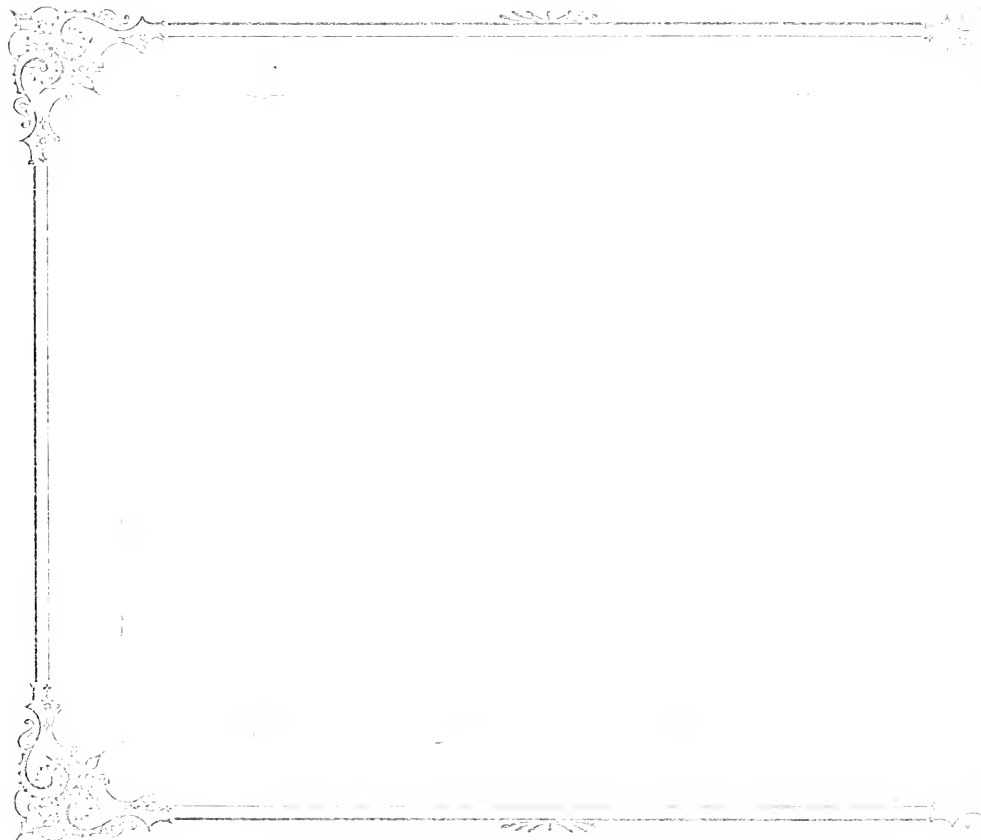

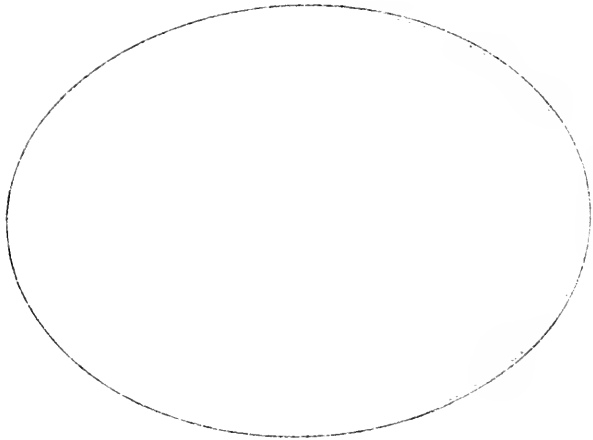

ABNER SLINN (6) born in 1820, SOLOMON (5) b. 1775, LEVI (4) b. 1718, CLEMENT (3) b. 1709, JAMES (2) b. 1676, JOHN (1) b. 1652.

Abner Slinn was born near Charlesburg, West Va., Nov. 1st, 1820. He was the fourth child of Solomon and Mary Ann Kirkley Slinn. His boyhood was spent on his father's farms in Virginia, and Adams county, Ill. Received his education in country schools and at Dr. Nelson's Academy in Quincy, Ill. When Mr. Slinn became of age he located in Lacey, Florida where he married his first wife, Mrs. Mary Hough, by whom he had two sons, Greaveson A. and Ebenezer Frank. In 1850 he moved his family to Chicago and engaged in grain and general commission business until 1867 when he came to Fort Scott, Kansas and with his sons started the "Fort Scott Store" which became one of the big institutions of the county and made him a prominent factor. His wife died in 1880 and in the spring of 1883 he saved the son, Greaveson, died suddenly and unexpectedly. While Mr. Slinn always directed his business affairs, Greaveson had general management and supervision and when he was gone his father greatly felt his loss. The last ten years of Mr. Slinn's life were marred by southernly attacks with his wife, rendered necessary by his failing health.

He was one of the counties in California. Home'd in all of his transients. A fine example of a physical and moral man, measuring several inches over six feet tall, and very well proportioned. He was a member of the Congregational church and in his last illness gave a faithful proof of the Christian's love, calm and happy, commending to his neighbors and friends the faith that had been his in comfort. He was the same to the last, active and clear in mind, keen about at heart and kind in temper. His soul's direction, through the reflection and liberally sympathized kept him fresh and bright in his declining years.

His big loving heart was sometimes deeply wounded by the poverty and ingratitude of others, but he satisfied in silence.

His joy and interests were his kind friends, but with these there was no lack of enemies and enemies in the path of duty. He believed in freedom and opposed the sale of "southerners" at great personal risk. However with him was much to be gained.

The value of his example cannot be over-estimated. His love life was spent in the service of those he loved. In 1852, he married the Miss Wilson teacher in Fort Scott public school and lived with her on his farm near the city until the end of his death, which occurred March 6, 1891.

He was buried in the cemetery at Fort Scott, Mo. It is a privilege to God that it was his lot to live in this country and to be able to give to him in exchange with

A demi wolf charged with three mullets, under the shield, *Res non verba*, (not in words).

Milroy, Scotland.

A leopard's face. (No motto found.)

Houston, England and Scotland.

A sand glass. Motto, *In Time*.

Two laurel sprigs in orle. Motto, *Virtus semper viridis*, (virtue is always verdant).

Moffat, Scotland.

ROBERT DE BRUCE, eighth Lord of Annandale, Earl of Carrick and King of Scotland (of whom some of us are lineal descendants) was the eldest son of Robert de Bruce, seventh Lord of Annandale and Countess Marjoria. King Robert was eighth in direct male descent from Robert de Brus, the Norman Baron who accompanied William the Conqueror to England in 1066.

Sir Herbert Maxwell has truly said that the Scottish nation owes its very existence to Robert Bruce, and dearly they keep his memory.

There are some things in his early life that his most devoted admirers could wish to see erased from the pages of history. But when we consider the age in which he lived, the customs of warfare, low standard of morality and the trying circumstances in which he was placed, we can easily draw the mantle of charity over all his faults and inconsistency. Admitting his short comings as a man, as a King he never gave his subjects cause to blush for him. After he was crowned King he followed a single purpose with heroic courage, wise judgment and quick discernment.

No truthful historian has attempted to charge him with cruelty. He was humane and even indulgent to prisoners of war, forgiving and generous towards his enemies. He always desired peace with England, yet would stoop to no dishonorable terms to obtain it.

Had he lived longer he would have displayed the same energy, in the affairs of peace as in war, for which he was so conspicuous in war. The following from Historia "Majoris Britannia" is all we know of his appearance and personality:

His figure was graceful and athletic with broad shoulders. His features were handsome, he had the yellow hair of the northern race, with blue and sparkling eyes. His intellect was quick and he had the gift of fluent speech, in the vernacular, delightful to listen to.

President Johnson was born in Scott County, Ind. He was the eldest of eight children born to Gideon and Maria Bruce Wilson Johnson. They owe much to the faithful instruction of their sainted mother, who was a devoted Christian woman, and possessed more than ordinary intelligence and learning.

Thomas Brown Wilson.

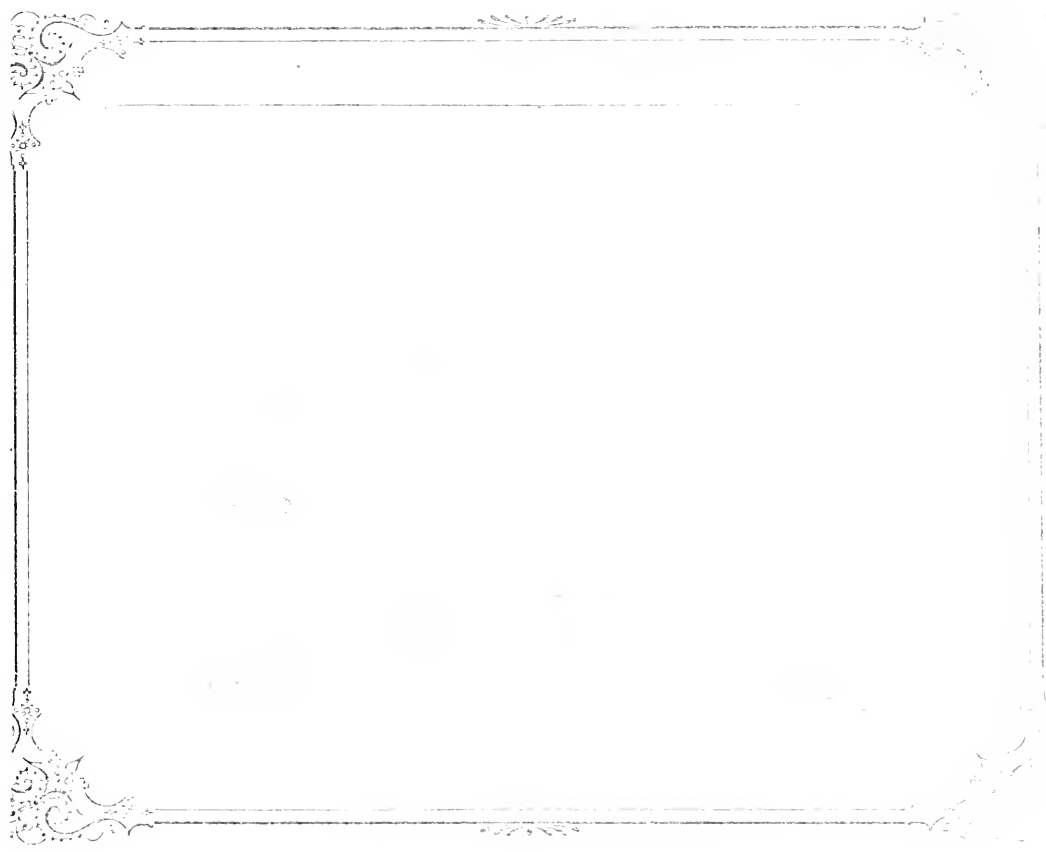
The death of Thomas Brown Wilson, the last of the eight sons of William and Margaret Wilson, occurred Jan. 5, 1893, at the home of A. Shinn, his son-in-law, near Fort Scott, Kansas. He was born in Washington county, Pennsylvania,

Sept. 15, 1816. Came to Scott county, Indiana with the family in 1816. He was employed on his father's farm until seventeen years of age, when he was apprenticed to learn the tanner's trade. Soon after completing his apprenticeship he married Ann Lowry, and settled on a farm near Lexington, Ind. He also conducted a tan yard in connection with the farm.

In 1858 he quit the business of tanning and for several years engaged in merchandising, was not successful, and finally lost all his property.

It was always a mystery to his children he did not attain a higher position financially; he had energy and ability enough for success in any undertaking. This want of success gave his children the advantage of being reared in what they called poverty.

Mr. Wilson, or "Uncle Brown," as he was familiarly called by every one, was a kind laborer, often visiting and kindly caring for the sick. His habits of industry and honest business, and his piety should challenge our emulation. His life has never been more beautiful and beloved than in his last years. Instead of the irritability and passion which characterized his life in former years there was in him a serenity and even cheer-



that was remarkable in one suffering as he did with the infirmities of age. His memory which had always been good became unusually clear, enabling him to recall events in his early life on his death bed at the age of eighty-three. His love of reading was a solace to him through all the labors and trials of his life, and a delight in his decline, when all but mental pleasures had become extinct for him. He was quite a musician in his day. Played beautiful Scotch airs on the flute and taught the old fashioned singing schools in country school houses.

When a boy he manifested a talent for rhyming that would have gained some notoriety for him in after years, had he persevered.

His nephew, Blair Wilson, wrote to him in 1856 to send him some of his early attempts at poesy, but he could not remember his boyish rhymes, and wrote him the following in reply.

Those lines you want I can't now quote,
For they have slipped my mind;
Those simple doggerel rhymes I wrote,
In days of Auld lang syne.

Or many years have swiftly fled,
Since that delusive time:
When rhyming fancies filled my head,

In days of Auld lang syne.

Since life's realities I've tried,
Such follies I resign;
Those rhymes in which I took such pride,
In days of Auld lang syne.

I often visit yet the spot,
Where boyhood joys were mine;
And naught can from my memory blot,
The scenes of Auld lang syne.

My aged parents living yet,
Were then in life's full prime;
Though altered now I'll ne'er forget,
Their looks in Auld lang syne.

Your worthy sire who now is not,
But long since passed from time;
Comes up in many a cherished thought,
Of days of Auld lang syne.

How many friends by death removed,
Have I to dust consigned;
Yet I've some as dearly loved,
As those of Auld lang syne.

My youngest darling baby pet,
We call her Eveline:
Was sent by heaven to compensate,
For friends of Auld lang syne.

I have one, another calls his own,
 But still I say she's mine;
 As well as those I keep at home,
 Since days of Auld lang syne.

The issues in the election in the fall of 1892 suggested the following lines from Mr. Wilson. He died in a couple of weeks after the poem was written.

The good old days when I was young,
 Are much to be lamented;
 For people lived so happy then,
 And always were contented.

They had enough for present use,
 And never strove for riches;
 In summer wore tow linen clothes,
 In winter buckskin breeches.

In wooden troughs and other ways,
 Beef hides were tanned to leather;
 And made our shoes for rainy days,
 Or for inclement weather.

We ate our meals with pewter spoons,
 And paid but little taxes;
 Cut down trees to catch the coons,
 With blacksmith's hand made axes.

For meal we punctured bits of tin,
 On this the corn was grated;
 Then sifted it with sheep-skin sieves,
 With holes well perforated.
 Fat bears and bucks we killed for meat.
 And then we shot wild turkeys;
 Some would even possum eat,
 Like old time southern darkies.
 For any kind of sweetening goods,
 We did not pay the money;
 For hollow trees throughout the woods,
 Were stowed with luscious honey.
 But little money had we then,
 Yet each one a great defender;
 Of sound finance. And coon skins made,
 A lawful legal tender.
 Politics in those good old days,
 Was one united faction;
 For all the votes we ever cast,
 Were for old General Jackson.

Judge Francis Wilson.

(The following is taken from "History of Orange, Ia and Washington Counties," published 1887 by Goodspeed Co., Chicago, Ill.)

Judge Francis Wilson, of the tenth judicial district of Indiana, was born in Lexington, County, Indiana, Feb. 16, 1836. His

were Thomas Brown Wilson and Ann (Lowry) Wilson, early settlers of Indiana, the former being a tanner, at which trade Francis was brought up.

After the age of fifteen years, our subject taught school for about five years. During a portion of the time, however, he attended Hanover College. In 1857 he went to Centralia, Illinois, where for two years he taught school and surveyed and also began the study of law, borrowing books from Judge Bruce. He then taught school and studied law for a couple of years at Paoli, Orange County, Indiana, and in 1862 was admitted to practice at the bar of that county, and the same year was appointed Provost Marshal, which office he held during the remainder of the Civil War.

While in Paoli he formed a connection in the practice of law, with Col. A. M. Black. He remained in Paoli until 1867, when he located in Bedford, Indiana, forming a partnership with Col. A. C. Voris, and afterward with Hon. Moses F. Duun, which lasted until he was elected judge in 1872.

The judge in early life was a Republican, and was an elector for Lincoln, but he has been a Democrat since 1872.

As an evidence of the estimation in which our subject Wilson is held, it is only necessary to state that the judicial district over which he has been

called upon to preside is not only a large one, but is republican.

October 24, 1861, he married Mary White, daughter of Dr. Cornelius White of Paoli, and one child has been born to him, Laura, born July, 1864.

Death of Judge Wilson.

The following letter refers to the death of Judge Wilson, of Bedford, Ind., a brother of Mrs. A. Shinn of this city. We add our tribute to Mr. Duun's concerning the high worth and character of the judge, whose death will be a great loss to the bar of Indiana.

BEDFORD, IND., April 26, 1885.

HON. S. A. DAY, Fort Scott, Kansas.

DEAR FRIEND:—Only a week ago to-day you handed me a letter from Judge Wilson. At this moment he lies in his cottage here sleeping his last sleep. He died of erysipelas at eight o'clock this morning.

Three days ago he held a complaint good for me at Bloomington, and to-day, before a higher tribunal, must plead his own case.

He was a grand man; one of the brightest lights and closest thinkers of Indiana has passed

from among us, suddenly and peacefully. He never betrayed a friend or a client; and never sold an opinion. "Requiescat in pace."

Hon. Francis Wilson.

On last Sunday the sad news reached Paoli that Judge Wilson had died at his home in Bedford on the morning of that day.

The remains were brought to Paoli for interment. Funeral services were held on Monday afternoon, and were attended by a very large congregation. Able and interesting discourses were delivered by Rev. Frazier, of the Presbyterian church, and Rev. John Stalker, of the Baptist church. Very nearly all the members of the Bar and county officers of the tenth circuit, and of the Bar of other circuits, were present.

Judge Wilson's reputation as an attorney and jurist was not limited to his own circuit. He was known throughout the state as one of our ablest Judges. But perhaps the people of Orange county felt a livelier interest in his career than those of any other community. It was here the foundation of that career was laid. Here his first laurels as an attorney were gained. Here those habits of

industry and promptness and integrity and ability which were so strongly characterized in his life, first attracted public notice and gained the fast friendship of the many good citizens, who have stood by him in every vicissitude.

He was not an old man, being but forty nine years of age, and had his general health been good, he would have been in the full vigor of manhood. His mind, however, was always clear and quick of perception. There seemed to be no such things as knotty law points with him. He would dispose of, in an instant, all questions that other lawyers had been puzzling their minds over for days. If there was a better judge in the state of Indiana than Judge Wilson, no one knew who he was.

When on the bench he knew no politics, no religion, no friends, no foe, all stood on equal footing in his court.

He was the special champion of the rig the widow and orphan; and woe was the man who attempted to trifle with their in Judge Wilson's court. Socially he was a hearted man. The poor and oppressed always his warmest sympathy. He gave liberally means to the cause of charity, and to aid friends in distress. Had he not done so he would have

a wealthy man. As it is, he has left behind him a host of friends who will ever have a warm place for his memory, in their hearts.

A meeting of the members of the Bar was held here Sunday afternoon to attend the funeral of Judge Wilson, to be held at Paoli.

A committee was appointed to prepare suitable resolutions and present them at the meeting of the members of the Bar and citizens to be held Thursday night, at the court house. Also a committee was appointed to drape the court room in mourning, which performed their work very tastefully, draping the Judge's desk and chair. A black streamer was also stretched in front of the court house, beneath a large photograph of Judge Wilson. Inside streamers of crape ran from post to post and festoons of crape were suspended from the walls in the rear of the Judge's desk. Thus it was that the place so recently busy scene was now turned into a house of mourning.

Those who spoke at the memorial meeting Thursday night, were Major Mulkly, R. A. Fulk, R. East, W. F. Browning, J. W. Buskirk, J. E. Brant, W. P. Rogers and J. E. Henley. Ir. Browning's speech especially was very

interesting and touching. His duties brought him near to Judge Wilson and he learned to cherish him as a very dear friend. He said, no purer nor better Judge ever sat upon the bench of that court house. Many tears were shed during the meeting, for no public man ever endeared himself to the hearts of the people as had Judge Wilson.

The following is the report of the committee on resolutions.

WHEREAS: It has pleased God to remove Hon. Francis Wilson, Judge of this, the tenth Judicial circuit, from our midst by death;

THEREFORE: Be it resolved by the members of Monroe county Bar and county officers, that in our estimation Judge Wilson was an able, upright and honorable Judge, whose scholarly attainments added luster to his profound learning as a lawyer. That he was a good citizen, a sincere friend, and a devoted and faithful husband and father.

RESOLVED: That we shall ever remember him as a man whose heart for his fellow man was tender and great. Always on the side of right. As a lawyer, true to the cause he espoused, active, earnest, forceful.

An opponent whose power was only equalled by his affability and uniform kindness to the one he opposed

As a Judge, one in whose heart and mind centered honesty, justice, discrimination, in short all the qualifications for that high office. By his death the community has lost a citizen of unsurpassed integrity, the Bar, a member of almost unequalled ability, the profession, a Judge unexcelled.

Thomas Addison Wilson.

Thomas A. Wilson was born in Scott county, Ind., in 1840. Prior to the rebellion he attended school and clerked in his father's store. He was the fifth of seven children born to Thomas A. and Ann Wilson. In July 1861 he enlisted in company E. Twenty-second Indiana Volunteers. In August he went by rail with the Twenty-second from Indianapolis to St. Louis. For ten months the Twenty-second was almost constantly on the march in South-west Missouri, being a portion of the Army of the South-west under Fremont and Curtis. Mr. Wilson's first experience in battle was at Pea Ridge, Ark., and afterwards in battles of Pittsburg Landing, Siege of Corinth, and Perryville. In this last named battle Company E lost one half its members in killed and wounded.

Less than three months later commencing

Dec. 31, 1862, the battle of Stone River was fought in which the Twenty-second again met with great loss in killed. Mr. Wilson was wounded on the first day of this battle, three balls taking effect in less than ten minutes. One going through his body near the heart another breaking the bone of his thigh and the other going through his wrist. He lay for nine days before his wounds were dressed and was in the hands of the enemy until the battle was over, which lasted about four days. His father and mother were at his bedside in the field hospital at Murfreesboro soon after the battle, his mother remaining with him until he was discharged and sent home in April, 1863. After his discharge, while still using crutches, or a cane, he attended college at Hanover, Ind. for one year. Then learned the trade of a carpenter and followed it in Fort Scott, Kansas, and Del Norte, Cal. for several years. Became a member Presbyterian church while at Hanover, set Deacon in First church at Fort Scott and in the Del Norte church. He is still active in work and is an enthusiastic prohibitionist; was of the delegates to the Pittsburg convention 1896.

In 1896 he married Augusta Weiden and resides in Scottsburg, Ind.

BRUCE LINE OF WILSONS.

Elizabeth Bruce Wilson, daughter of Robert Bruce, a direct descendent of King Robert Bruce, was born in Scotland about 1747; her sister, Martha Bruce, married John Milroy in 1746. Elizabeth married William Wilson of Londonderry County, Ireland, came to America and settled in Millin County, Pennsylvania, where seven children were born to them, five sons and two daughters.

John Wilson.

John Wilson was born in Londonderry County, Ireland, about 1739. His father, William Wilson, was a wealthy landed proprietor of a large and valuable entailed estate, which had descended for several generations from father to eldest son. The heirs were always named William and John alternately, *i. e.* William would name his first-born son John, and John in turn would name his eldest son William. Their ancestors were from Scotland and England. John Wilson received the estate at his father William's death in 1765 and soon after married a Scotch woman by name of Margaret Moffat, by whom he had several children. During the insurrections in Ireland and trouble with England John took an active part in the political and religious conflicts. Belonging to the Orange Organization, he opposed the Roman Catholics with bitter animosity. He was also opposed to union with England and spared neither time nor money to further the cause of his party.

With the impulsive nature that we know he possessed, we may easily conceive the fact that he made enemies and was more than generous to his friends.

He lived extravagantly. Kept hounds. Had frequent hunting parties on his estate. Entertained with such lavish hospitality that he became financially embarrassed.

The inability to pay his debts, and despairing of Ireland's independence, induced him to take

passage to America in 1771, but he died of ill fever on the voyage and was buried in the sea.

William, his eldest son and heir, a lad of eighteen at the time of his father's death, came to America in 1761 and settled in Pennsylvania near his cousin, another William Wilson, whose daughter Margaret he married in 1795. This cousin had married Elizabeth Bruce, a native of Scotland, and lineal descendant of King Robert Bruce. They had seven children, of whom Margaret was the eldest. After their marriage William and Margaret lived in Washington County, Pennsylvania eight sons were born to them, two died in childhood—George and James. In 1811 they removed to Ohio, and in 1818 came down the Ohio river in a flat boat to southern Indiana; settled in Scott County, where William died in 1855 and Margaret in 1856.

Henry Wilson.

Henry, another son of John Wilson's, came to America about the year 1799 under the following circumstances: He learned that England feared another revolt in northern Ireland and was going to disarm all opposed to her rule. Henry had a very fine gun which had belonged to his father, this he secreted in a bog to prevent the King's officers from getting it; but an English spy saw him and led the officers, who were collecting arms, to the spot where it was buried in the bog. Henry was captured at the bog, on his valuable rifle, and sentenced by force to rejoin his father.

severely wounded the officer and received a sword cut in his own breast which left an ugly scar. As the penalty for resisting the King's officers was death, Henry was secreted by an uncle until he secured passage for him to come to America. He came to Pennsylvania and married Jane Dill, by whom he had eight children. He died on his farm near Washington, Penn. His son Samuel J. Wilson was an eloquent Divine, and one of the most prominent men in the Presbyterian church. His biography is given elsewhere.

Thomas Wilson, also son of John Wilson, came to America and settled in Morganfield, Ky., about 1801. He married, but no children or grand children have been found.

Another Thomas Wilson came to America in 1812 and married Hannah Brown in Washington County, Penn. Two of their sons, James and William, married and removed to Monroe County, Ohio. This last named Thomas Wilson who married Miss Brown was a nephew to John who died on ship and a brother to William who married Elizabeth Bruce. He died in Washington County, Pa. This Hannah Brown was a sister to John Brown who married Miss Houston and lived in Nelson County, Ky. The Browns were a fine family very intellectual and somewhat aristocratic and dignified for those back woods times.

These five men, Henry Wilson, two Thomas Wilsons and two William Wilsons are all represented in this book by some of their posterity, except

Thomas Wilson of Morganfield, Ky., and I know of no other Wilson relatives who came to this country.

Margaret Moffat Wilson.

Of Margaret Moffat who married John Wilson in Londonderry county, Ireland, in 1767 we know but little. She was a Scotch woman. Tradition says she was of same family as Robert Moffat, the celebrated missionary, born in Scotland in 1795.

A letter written by her to her son William in 1812 is still in existence, and it will have place here, as it shows better than any other way the motherly and loving Christian spirit of the dear old woman.

LONDONDERRY, IRELAND,

June 16, 1812.

DEAR WILLIAM:

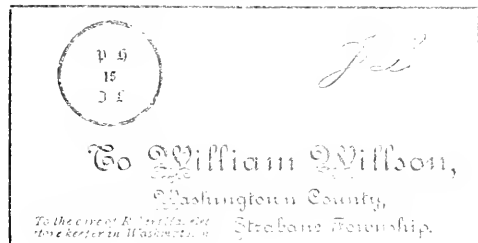
I received your letter of October 17th, which gave me great joy to hear that you were all alive and well. As it is all I have received these five years, your aged mother returns love and thanks for your kind invitation to that country, but alas! I fear I shall never see you. Hugh's want of health and my frailty and dangers of the sea; I dare not venture. We are very lonely since Mary's death, but I thank God that out of free love and mercy he was pleased to take her out of trouble. I fear if I have many days to live, I will be able to say, "I hope from my heart I will be allowed to say, "You will be here." Dear William, Henry,

has forgotten his mother. If I could get a small bit of paper with his name on it, from his own hand, it would bring joy to my longing heart. I mean to write with him, but this is the first opportunity to let you know we are alive.

All friends are well. The bearer is to be shipped, not time to write any more at present. My love and blessing be with you all.

Rev. Thomas Brown Wilson.

Thomas Brown Wilson was born on his father's farm in Washington county, Pa., Nov. 22, 1822. He entered Jefferson College at the neighboring town of Canonsburg, and graduated in 1849, taking the second honors of his class. He graduated from the Western Theological Seminary in 1852. He was licensed to preach April, 1852, by what was then called the Presbytery of

Ohio, and was ordained by the same Presbytery.

He was pastor of the Sixth church of Pittsburg, Pa., 1852-55, and of the Presbyterian church of Xenia, O., 1855-58. He married Miss Margaret B. Saunders in 1853. He died while on vacation at Canonsburg, Pa. Sept. 21, 1858. He left two children, Rev. Maurice E. Wilson, now pastor of the First church of Dayton, O., and Rev. Calvin D. Wilson, now pastor at Franklin, O.

Rev. Thomas B. Wilson was a man of fine pulpit powers, and deep piety. He was an excellent scholar, and an attractive and inspiring orator, and had he lived longer would have taken a prominent position in the church. His wife was a woman of great strength of character, and noble qualities. Both of these persons have left an abiding impression upon all who knew them.

Samuel Jennings Wilson, D. D.

This biography of Dr. Wilson is founded upon an extended memoir compiled by William H. Jeffers, D. D., an eminent Presbyterian minister.

Samuel J. Wilson, D. D., son of Henry and Jane Dill Wilson, was born in Washington county, Pennsylvania, July 19, 1828. His father emigrated from the colony of Scotch in Northern Ireland and settled in Pennsylvania. In religious belief Henry was a staunch Presbyterian. The mother of Samuel, Jane Dill Wilson, was daughter of Thomas Dill, whose annals were published for their piety and self-sacrificing efforts.

ism. Jane was a woman of unshaken faith and piety. The parents of Samuel were faithful in the religious instruction of their children. The mother's instruction and example determined in no small degree the tenor of Samuel's subsequent life, and he often expressed his deep gratitude to her.

He was nineteen years of age when he entered Washington college. Though reserved and unassuming in his manner, young Wilson was soon recognized by his class-mates and throughout the institution as a man of more than ordinary ability. He was systematic, painstaking and persistent. It does not appear that during his entire college course, a single failure was recorded against him in the class-room.

During the second year of his college life the Presbyterian church at Washington was blessed with a revival of great power. Fifty-nine names were recorded on the church roll as a result of that revival; among these is the name of Samuel J. Wilson. His spiritual nature was stirred to its utmost depths, and the remembrance of those revival scenes remained fresh in his mind ever afterward.

After his graduation in 1852 he at once entered the Theological Seminary at Alleghany City, Pa., and completed his course there in 1855. But his connection with the Seminary was not to terminate till his death. He was instructor of Hebrew and History and Hebrew. After two years as instructor

he was advanced to the full professorship by election in the General Assembly of 1857. At the death of Dr. Jacobus in 1876 Dr. Wilson became the senior professor and presiding officer of the faculty. Thus he entered upon what proved to be the great work of his life.

His first work in the pulpit after he was licensed to preach was at Steubenville, O., and afterwards at Wheeling, and at Sharpsburg. He consented to take these charges always with the understanding that no services should be expected of him which would interfere with his regular work in the Seminary. In 1867 he was induced to undertake the supply of the Sixth Church of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. This church had been for some time vacant, had a membership of only forty, and was burdened with debt. Through his earnest labors and co-operation of the little flock, the process of restoration began almost immediately and twenty-two were added at the first communion. Ten years later there was a membership of four hundred and sixty-six. He ministered to this church for fifteen years as stated supply and regular pastor.

As a man and as a preacher, Dr. Wilson was thoroughly in earnest. There was that in his manner which indicated that he was conscious of the divine presence. His power in the pulpit was widely recognized, and his services were in great demand for special occasions.

During the years of the civil war his con-

was often heard in the pulpit and on the platform of city and country urging to loyalty and self-sacrifice in support of the North.

In 1874 he was called to preside as Moderator over the General Assembly at St. Louis and there received the appointment to the conference which was held in London, England, in July, 1875, for the purpose of maturing a plan for the confederation of the Presbyterian church throughout the world. This conference resulted in the organization of the Presbyterian Alliance, with its general councils to be held once in three years. He was a member of the first of these councils, which met in Edinburgh, Scotland, July 3, 1877, and at the time of his death he was under appointment as delegate to the third general council held in Belfast, Ireland.

During the last years of Dr. Wilson's life his health seemed fairly good; but after the close of his last year's work in the Seminary his health became impaired. He preached with great earnestness on Sabbath, July 15. The next day he pronounced the benediction at the funeral services of an acquaintance, which was the last time his voice was heard in public. Three days later he was unable to leave his room. The disease was pronounced by his physician to be typhoid fever, and before it had run its course his strength and vitality were exhausted. Toward the last in answer to the tender inquiry whether he wanted anything, he whispered, "Rest," and when further

asked if he were at peace, he replied, with a indistinctness, "Perfect peace." On Friday morning, August 17, 1883, he fell asleep.

Dr. Wilson was married in 1859 to Mary Elizabeth Davis, a woman of fine spirit and lovely character, a favorite with all who knew her. She died in the summer of 1880, after a prolonged illness, leaving a son, Robert Davis, and two daughters, Eliza Cochran, now Mrs. Charles McKnight, and Jane Dell, now Mrs. William Walker. The son was a member of the Pittsburgh bar, with unusually bright prospects of success at the time of his death in 1890.

Rev. Maurice Emery Wilson.

Maurice Emery Wilson was born in Baltimore, Maryland, April 2, 1855, his father being at the time pastor of the Sixth church of Pittsburg. He graduated at Washington and Jefferson College in 1876, and from the Western Theological Seminary in 1879. He was licensed April, 1878, by the Presbytery of Pittsburg, and ordained December, 1880, by the Presbytery of Athens, O. He was stated supply and pastor at Gallipolis, Ohio, from 1879 to 1881; pastor at Emsworth, Pa., from 1881 to 1884; pastor of the Westminster Church of Baltimore, Md., from 1884 until 1891; when he became pastor of First Church of Dayton, O. He was married June 10, 1879, to Miss Fannie L. McCombs of Washington, Pa. He has one daughter, Anna, now fifteen years of age. He resided

the degree of D. D. from the Westminster College of Maryland. He stands in the front rank among the young ministers of the church.

Rev. Calvin Dill Wilson.

Calvin Dill Wilson was born in Baltimore, Maryland, July 12, 1857, his father being at that time pastor in Xenia, O. He graduated at Washington and Jefferson College in 1876, and at the Western Theological Seminary in 1879. He was licensed April, 1878, by the Presbytery of Pitts-

burgh; ordained May, 1880, by the Presbytery of Chester, Pa. He was pastor at Atglen, Pa., from 1879 to 1883; pastor at Churchville, Md., from 1883 until 1893, he then became pastor at Frankton, O., where he now resides. He was married October 23, 1889, to Miss Mary Webster of Warford county, Md. He has one child, Maurice Webster Wilson.

He has attained some prominence as a writer for the magazines and press, and is the author of several books.

General Samuel Milroy.

General Samuel Milroy was born August 14, 1780, in Kishakoquillo Valley, in Millin County, Pennsylvania. His grandfather, John Milroy, was a native of Scotland, and was a lineal descendant of Robert Bruce, the heroic king of Scotland. John Milroy married Martha Bruce in 1746. She was also a descendant of Robert Bruce and was probably a cousin of her husband's. In the attempted revolution in Scotland in 1744, in which Charles Stuart, the Pretender, sought to regain the throne of

Scotland, sought to regain the kingdom of his ancestors from the English: John Milroy engaged heartily in the cause of Stuart, but after the defeat of Stuart at the battle of Culloden, his followers were proscribed and pursued without mercy. John Milroy, with his young wife, escaped to Ireland, and soon emigrated to the American colonies; settled near Carlisle, Pennsylvania, and became a prosperous farmer. He had a family of two boys and three girls, and was afterwards with his eldest son, killed by the Indians. His house

with all its contents was burned during one of the massacres at Carlisle. Among the valuable belongings burned were his family record and coat of arms.

The only surviving son, Henry, after arriving at maturity, married Agnes McCormack, and settled in Millin County, Penn. Henry had a family of four boys and two girls. Samuel, the subject of this sketch, was the third son, and when eleven years of age, his father died. He was soon afterward apprenticed to learn the trade of carpenter and joiner. In 1803 he married Frances Alexander and settled in Center County, Pa., following his trade until 1806, in which year his wife died, leaving two children, a daughter and a son. The daughter was the first wife of John Adams of Carroll County, Ind. The son Henry Bruce Milroy, who was the first sheriff of Carroll County, Ind.

Soon after the death of his wife, Samuel set out with his elder brother, John, to try their fortunes in the Great West. They came across the Alleghany Mountains to Pittsburga, Pa., and descended the Ohio river on a flat-boat to Cincinnati. They left Cincinnati with the intention of going to St. Louis, but when opposite Bardstown, Nelson County, Ky., in which county resided a large number of their old neighbors, as well as some relatives, they concluded to turn south about twenty-five miles and enjoy themselves for a time among old friends and relatives.

After visiting their friends, where they were warmly welcomed, they both went to work, Samuel at his trade, and John to surveying. In about a year, John married Isabella Houston, by whom he had ten children. The eldest was Dr. Henry A. Milroy, of Delphi, Ind.

Samuel, after working at his trade for several months, still had dreams of making a fortune in St. Louis, and in the fall of 1807, in company with George Wilson, a relative, of the same trade with himself, traveled on foot to St. Louis, where they worked at their trade very successfully for about ten months, when both were taken down with bilious fever, from which they did not recover for six weeks. As soon as they were able to travel they set out on their return to Nelson County, Ky. They struck the Ohio river at Evansville, and were offered wages as hands on a keel-boat loaded with goods for Louisville. They accepted the offer, and on the way up an incident occurred that showed the sincerity of Wilson's friendship.

While passing a large drift, Samuel saw a log sticking out of the upper edge, and supposing it was solid and stationary, placed the end of his setting pole against it, then threw his weight upon the pole, for the purpose of propelling the boat; but the log suddenly turned and he went into the river head foremost. Wilson rushed to the place where his friend lay gone down and plunged in after him without a moment's hesitation, knowing that he could not swim. Samuel kept his face over

of mind, and thought it best to let himself go down to the bottom, and then by a vigorous spring send himself to the surface, but finding the water very deep, after sinking fifteen or twenty feet, he commenced to work for the surface. Upon reaching the top, Wilson came to the rescue. He called to the men on the boat to throw out a rope, which was quickly done, they seized it when only a foot from the drift, under which the water was sweeping with a strong current, and were drawn on board just in time to save their lives.

Upon arriving in Nelson county, Samuel resumed his trade with his usual energy. In 1810 he married Martha Houston, a young sister of his brother John's wife, by whom he had ten children, seven sons and three daughters. Three of the boys died young. The eldest, Gen. Robert H. Milroy, will be given special notice elsewhere.

In 1812 the Indians destroyed a settlement in Scott County, Indiana Territory, killing three men, five women and sixteen children. Samuel Milroy raised a company in Kentucky and reached the scene of the massacre in just four days after its occurrence. They found the ruins of the houses still smoking, and the bloody, mangled corpses of the victims scattered in ghastly array. Milroy with his volunteers determined to follow the Indians, and followed their trail for several days, but a fall of snow covered the foot-prints and they were compelled to give up the pursuit.

During this scout he had a good opportunity

for observing the country and formed a favorable opinion of a portion of Washington County, Ind. After his return he became disgusted with the institution of slavery, and determined to emigrate to Indiana Territory, from which slavery was excluded by the ordinance of 1777. He sold his property in Kentucky in 1814, and in company with his brother James came to Washington County, Ind., and purchased one hundred and sixty acres of land. Here he built a house and moved his family to their new home.

In 1816 the congress of the United States passed an act to enable the people of Indiana Territory to form a constitution and state government. This act required an election to be held in the counties to choose delegates to a constitutional convention. Samuel Milroy was elected one of the delegates from Washington county, and was a member of three of the most important committees of the convention.

In the following August he was elected one of the representatives from Washington county, and was re-elected a member of the legislature from that county for nine years successively, and was speaker of the house at the session of 1821.

He was commissioned a major by Governor Posey in 1816, a colonel by Governor Jennings in 1817, and a brigadier-general by the same governor in 1819.

He sold his farm in Washington County in 1826, and in company with his son Henry Bruce

Milroy, he came out to the Wabash, and finally located in Carroll County, Ind. Near the close of the year 1827 he was appointed by John Quincy Adams to examine the land offices of Illinois. In 1822 he was elected to the legislature from the district composed of the counties of Montgomery, Fountain, Warren, Tippecanoe and Carroll, and shortly after the election he unexpectedly received the appointment to examine the land offices of Illinois, from President Jackson. Soon afterward he received from the same president the appointment as Register of the Land Office at Crawfordsville, Ind., an office then worth three thousand dollars per annum. He thus held three offices at one time and it was with him a matter of deep solicitude which office should be retained and which resigned. Finally by the urgent solicitations of his friends, he concluded to accept the registership, and resign the other two offices.

He was a delegate to the first Democratic national convention ever held in the United States which met in Baltimore in 1822, and nominated General Jackson for his second term. He was a delegate and attended every succeeding Democratic national convention from that time to 1843, when Polk was nominated. This was the last convention prior to his death.

In 1835 he was appointed by President Jackson one of the Board of Visitors to the United States Military Academy at West Point, and nobly discharged that duty. In 1839 he was elected

state senator from the counties of Carroll and Clinton, Ind. In 1839 he was appointed agent for the Miami and Pottawatomie Indians and in 1840 succeeded in purchasing from the Miami tribe, their great reservation, which the government had for many years, through different agents and special commissioners, tried in vain to purchase. This last office he held up to the time of his death, which occurred on the 26th of May, 1845, at Delphi, Indiana. His death was caused by erysipelas, of which disease his son Bruce had died two weeks before.

Gen. Samuel Milroy's house was the home of hospitality, where friends and strangers found a ready welcome.

Such is a brief outline of one who in his day was the most prominent citizen of the state of Indiana.

Gen. Robert H. Milroy.

Robert Houston Milroy was the eldest son of Gen. Samuel Milroy by his second wife, Martha Houston, and was therefore of same Bruce ancestry and great grand-son of John Milroy from Scotland.

Robert was born in Washington County, Indiana, June 17, 1816, and was graduated at North Carolina University, Vt., in 1843, taking degrees, both in the Classical and Military Departments.

In the war with Mexico he served as captain in the 1st Indiana Volunteers. He studied law

was admitted to the bar in 1849, and in 1850 was graduated from the law department of Indiana University.

He was a member of the constitutional convention of Indiana in 1849-50, and in 1851 was appointed judge of eighth judicial circuit court of Indiana.

At the opening of the Civil War he issued a call for volunteers, and was made captain, becoming colonel of the 9th Indiana Volunteers on the 26th of April, 1861. Served in West Virginia under McClellan and Rosecrans. Received a commission as brigadier-general Feb. 6, 1862, and was made major-general of volunteers in March, 1863. He had charge of the second division of the 8th army corps, stationed at Winchester, Va. In June, 1863, he was attacked by nearly all of Lee's army, on its way to Pennsylvania. Gen. Milroy resisted this superior force for three days, until his ammunition and provisions were exhausted and then cut his way out by night, losing a large portion of his forces.

This retention of Lee's army at Winchester enabled Gen. Meade to fight advantageously at Gettysburg; when otherwise the great battle would have taken place farther north. In 1865 he resigned from the army, became a trustee of the Wabash and Erie canal in 1868, which place he held for some time.

He was appointed superintendent of indian affairs in Washington Territory, and continued in

the office until 1874.

He was appointed Indian agent in 1875 and reappointed in 1885.

During his law practice his uniform kindness and faithful attention to the interests of his clients won the respect and esteem of his brethren at the bar.

He was a ruling elder in the Presbyterian church, and died at Olympia, Washington, March 24, 1890, as he had lived a firm believer in the Christian faith and of a sure hope of immortality.

From a Letter.

The following is from a letter to Val. A. Milroy, Jan. 25, 1898.

"My parents, James Milroy and wife, emigrated from Kirkcubright, Scotland, to western New York in 1818. Three children, David, Jane and James, were born in Scotland. The others, William, Ebenezer (myself), Agnes, Margaret, Mary and John, were born in York, Livingston County, N. Y.

Father's mother and one sister died in his

home. Grandmother was 100 years old when she died in 1835.

David came to Logan County, O., and left three sons, two of whom, William and Robert Bruce Milroy, are in San Francisco, Cal.

James left three sons, and three daughters. The eldest, Dr. W. F. Milroy, is a physician in Omaha, Neb., John is in Houston, Texas, George is in N. Y.

William Milroy was a Covenanter minister in Logan County, O. He left a family of eleven children. His eldest son, William, is professor of Latin in Geneva College, Beaver Falls, Pa. He studied in Yale and graduated in Hopkins University. One other son is a lawyer and one a physician. The youngest is a student in Beaver Falls, Pa. The names of father's brothers are John, William and Peter. I think we can trace our ancestry back to Gilbert and William Milroy mentioned in "Scots Worthies," who owing to persecutions were arrested, their ears cut off, property

confiscated, and they banished to Jamaica, and sold as slaves. In 1710, Gilbert, returning, wrote a history of their sufferings. Please note, grandmother, whom I so well knew, was born less than thirty years after.

Dr. W. F. Milroy, of Omaha, Neb., has given much research to this family record. Found information in old libraries of New York and Baltimore. Also Prof. W. Milroy aided him in information gotten from Yale libraries. The result of Dr. Milroy's labors is a family tree of considerable information.

GENEALOGY OF HOUSTONS.

Houston.

Three brothers of the name of Houston born in Wales, removed to Scotland and from there emigrated to the American colonies about 1730. James, the eldest, settled in Delaware, John and William in North Carolina.

James afterward moved to Pennsylvania, and in 1798 moved to Nelson County, Kentucky, where he died Sept. 8, 1808. He married Jane Elliott, an English lady of high family. Six children was issue of this marriage. After the ceath of Jane, James Houston married Abigail Brown, and nine children were born to them. Nearly all of Abigail's children moved to Indiana. Samuel was judge of the Washington County court for many years, Alexander held various offices in same county, was representative and magistrate. John Milroy, who married Isabel was Surveyor-General for several years, and his brother, Gen. Samuel Milroy, who married Martha, was Receiver in Land Office and member of Congress from Indiana in 1836.

William Houston, eldest son of James and James Elliot Houston, married Nancy McClarty, who was of Scotch-Irish ancestry, and nine children were born to them.

John Houston, second son of James and Jane Elliot Houston, was a member of the Legislature from Nelson County, Ky., for many years. His children all scattered off to Indiana and Missouri.

James Houston, third son of James and Jane Elliot Houston, married and had two children: John B. Houston, who was a lawyer and lived in Lexington, Ky. He was also speaker of the house of representatives in Kentucky. The daughter married a Presbyterian minister in Owensboro, Ky.

Joseph Houston, fourth son of James and Jane Elliot Houston, had three children, two sons and one daughter. Eli the eldest was judge in Mississippi where he died. Felix, second son of Joseph Houston was a lawyer and at one time commander-in-chief of the Texas army.

Mark Elliott Houston, the youngest of the

children of William and Nancy McClarty Houston was a lawyer and a partner of the memorable Ben Hardin of Kentucky for thirty years. Served his country three years in the House of Representatives and eight years in the Senate. He was a delegate to the convention which framed the new constitution of Kentucky, and was county attorney for twenty years in Logan County, Kentucky.

Samuel Miligan Houston.

Samuel M. Houston, third son of Alexander and Margaret Mitchell Houston, was born in Nelson County, Kentucky, Nov. 1798 and was married to Rebecca Wilson Dec. 29 1825. To them were born six children, four sons and two daughters. Erasmus P., the eldest son, was county clerk at Clay Center, Kansas. None of the children are now living except James Otis, who resides at Geneva, Neb.

Samuel taught school when a young man and was justice of the peace from 1832 to 1836. Was elected Commissioner in 1844, and was superintendent of the poor farm in Washington County, Ind., for three years. He was a member of the Legislature in 1837.

He died on his farm in Washington County, in 18 highly respected and admired by all who had known him. Rebecca died a few years later at the home of her son, Daniel Houston, near New Philadelphia, Ind.

J. S. M. Houston.

The following special telegram to the *World* describes the standing of J. S. M. Houston in the State University of Missouri.

Special to the World:

"J. S. M. Houston of Raymore, Cass County, Mo., is the valedictorian of the 1898 law class of the state university. Mr. Houston was born at Clarksburg, Moniteaux County, Mo., 1872. He was raised on a farm, attending school four or five months in the year. Later he attended the State Normal and graduated with distinction in 1890. After this he taught school. In 1895 he married Miss Maggie Miller of Johnson County, Kansas, and moved to Columbia to study law. In 1896 he won the "Zealer Scholarship" from Boone County in a rigid competitive examination. In 1897 he won the "Rollins Scholarship," \$50 in cash for standing at the head of the Junior Law Class. Last month Mr. Houston got second honors in the senior law thesis contest. His thesis will be published in a leading law journal and bound for library use.

What proves Mr. Houston's ability more than anything else is his winning the valedictory this year, in a class composed of fifty-two members, and Judge Martin pronounces it the best class ever graduated from the law school. So to stand at its head is an honor indeed."

From a Letter.

A few years ago Anna Elliott of Bloomington, Illinois, made a genealogical tree of our branch of the Houston family, beginning with Christopher Houston, born in North Carolina in 1744, whose father, John Houston, came from Scotland to Pennsylvania early in the eighteenth century. The oldest Houston I know of in Missouri is my grandfather, Christopher C. Houston,

born in North Carolina in 1804, moved to Kentucky and then to Mo. His address is now Grain Valley, Jackson County, Mo. Gen. Samuel Houston of Texas and grandfather are cousins.

LOWRY AND OCHELTREE.

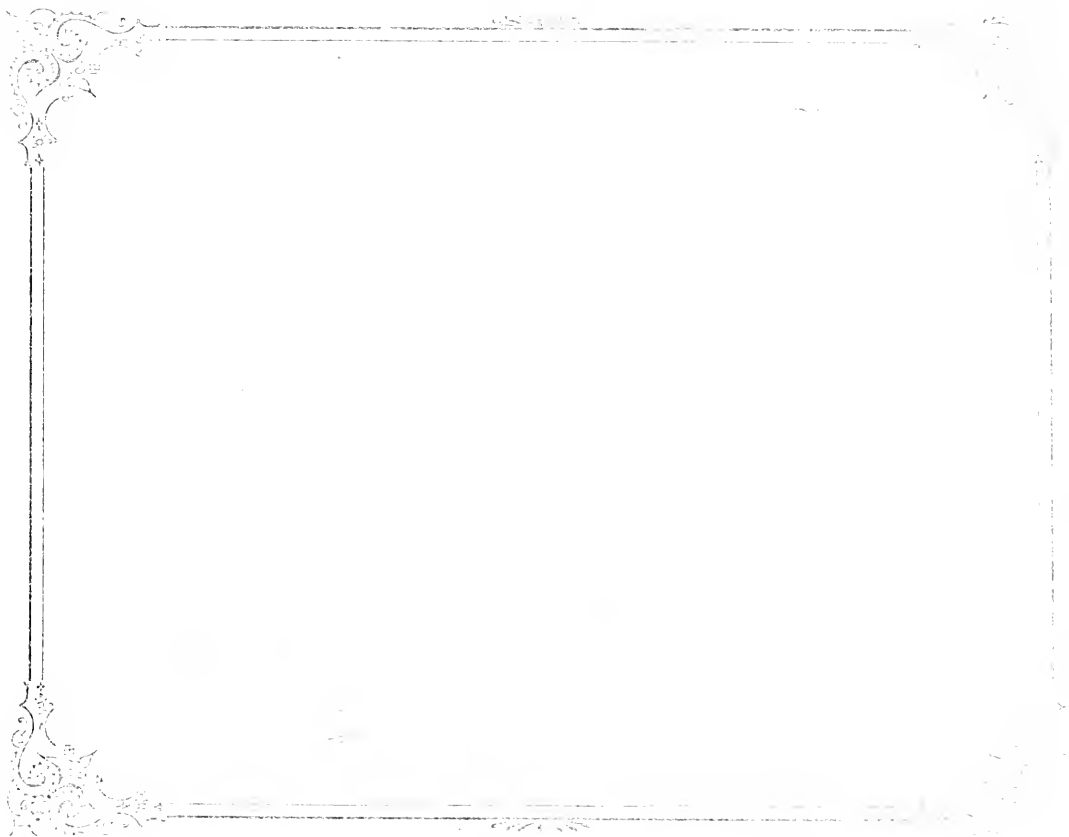
Ann Lowry Wilson.

Ann Lowry Wilson, daughter of Joseph and Nancy Ochiltree Lowry, was born in Botetourt County, Virginia. Her father was a native of that state; her mother was born in Armagh, Ireland, and came with her parents, Michael and Mary Ochiltree, to America in 1793. At that time Nancy was eighteen years old. The captain of the ship in which they came lost his bearings at sea and sailed for several weeks far out of his course. As there were several hundred emigrants on board, provision became almost exhausted before their signal of distress was sighted by the captain of another ship, who came to their relief, set them on the right course, and enabled them to land safely in *Philadelphia*.

The second daughter, Mary Ochiltree, married a gentleman by name of Clinton, to whom she was engaged in Ireland. He was teaching school in *Penn.* at time of their marriage,

which was soon after the Ochiltrees landed. The Ochiltree family left Mary with her husband and came to Augusta County, Virginia. No word ever came to them from Mary and nothing is known of her fate.

Rachel Ochiltree married William Young in Virginia. Nancy Ochiltree, the third daughter and mother of Mrs. Wilson, had a family of seven children when she and her husband, Joseph Lowry removed from Virginia to Indiana in 1818. Ann was but six years old when her parents came to Jefferson county, Indiana. They afterward settled on a farm near Lexington, Scott County, Indiana, where Ann was married to Thomas Brown Wilson, Oct. 1833. Before her marriage she had united with the Methodist Church, but as her husband was a Presbyterian, she joined that denomination, which was the faith of her parents. She has always gone forward in discharge of duty, though called upon to pass through many trials, and to bear the load



of many and exacting responsibilities. Her Christian faith and fortitude not only helps her to bear her own sorrows, but makes her a comforter to others. As a devoted Christian mother, and sympathetic friend, her life has been full of good deeds and kind acts. She is now in her eighty-seventh year and realizes her uncertain hold on life; and confidently and calmly speaks of her departure. "Her children" can truly "rise up and call her blessed."

John J. Dickson.

John J. Dickson, brother of William M. Dickson, was born in Lexington, Scott County, Indiana, in 1826. After working for several years at the trade of cooper, John and his mother moved to Davis County, Iowa, where he was very successful financially, and is a retired farmer and highly respected citizen to-day. He married Mary Eliza Parker, sister of his brother's wife, in 1855. To them were born ten children, eight of whom are living. He served one year in ranks of Union army in civil war.

He has been a contributor to the press for years and a short time ago he collected his productions in one book entitled, "A Home's Thoughts in Prose and Poetry." His style is

excellent. — *Journal of Commerce*. "The Editor is one of his best poems."

American manhood. Of Scotch-Irish Presbyterian stock, his grand-father, Rev. Jacob Dickson, presided over one parish in Scotland for over fifty years. United on his mother's side with the oldest families of Virginia, the Campbells and the Lowrys, he possessed in the highest degree, that honest, fearless determination of character which has been the bone and sinew of so many of our great men. The judge's father, Richard L. Dickson, was sent in an official capacity to the English Colonies, came to America, met and married Rachel Lowry in 1825, near Madison, Indiana. Afterwards settled on a farm in Scott County, Indiana. Two boys were the issue of this marriage.

In 1835 the father died, leaving the widow and two sons, John and William. The family moved to Panover, Indiana, where there was a good school. John volunteered to learn the trade of cooper, while William attended college, first at Hanover, and afterwards at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio. Here he swept out the recitation rooms for his tuition, and cooked his own scanty meals.

He was graduated from old Miami in 1846. While teaching school in Kentucky he studied law, was admitted to the practice at Lexington, Kentucky, in 1849, and afterward attended Harvard Law School. While there, Chief Justice Parker, his preceptor, picked him out as an unusually bright, honest young man, and made him one

of his law school. He graduated at Harvard in 1850. Afterward, without money, without a friend in the city, alone, with only a letter of introduction from Justice Parker to Judge Wright, we find young Dickson in Cincinnati, O. By tutoring in Judge Wright's family, teaching elsewhere, and by reporting as a space reporter on the old Cincinnati Times, he managed to make a living. In 1852 he married Annie Parker, daughter of Dr. John Parker of Lexington, Kentucky, and came again to Cincinnati. Although almost an entire stranger he ran on the independent ticket for prosecuting attorney of the Police Court. To the surprise of everyone, and most of all to himself, he was elected.

We find him afterward rapidly rising to the front rank in his profession. His arguments under the Fugitive Slave Law, and in the celebrated Blind Tom case, are well remembered. At the age of thirty-one he was appointed, by Governor Chase, Judge of the Common Pleas Court. On account of extreme youth, and younger looks, he was bitterly opposed by some of the older members of the bar, but by hard work, uniform courtesy to all, and just decisions, he left the bench for the practice of law, loved and respected by all.

He was a presidential elector for Lincoln when he was first elected. During the war he was the confidential friend of Lincoln, Sherman, and Chase. He spent much of his time at Washington, D. C., and had much to do with Lincoln,

the Emancipation Proclamation. While at Washington he was tendered by General McClellan the position of Assistant Judge Advocate General, with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He spent some weeks at the front, but a certain distrust of the methods and men employed compelled him to decline.

The war over, he took a leading and active part in reconstruction. His ready pen and active brain were employed in the interest of his party and his country.

In 1866, in the prime of his manhood, at the age of thirty-nine, he was stricken down by sickness, followed by extreme nervous prostration, from which he never recovered. Foreign travel and the best medical advice of this country and Europe were tried in vain. Notwithstanding his terrible physical suffering, the last twenty-five years of his life were spent in writing and devotion to his family. He was always a hard student and was translating Thier's History from the French at the time of his death.

He constantly wrote for the magazines of the country and the daily press, always on politics and sociology. His well known initials, "W. M. D.," will long be remembered and their absence regretted. His style was peculiarly concise, terse, perspicuous. His stirring sentences were such not that they *could* be understood, but that they *must* be understood.

Public and private dishonesty he could not brook, but for the unfortunate or wronged kindly heart prompted him to a generous sympathy. For some years before his death he was president of the Trustees of the Ohio Medical College.

Before Judge Dickson retired from the practice of law his income was unusually large, considering the few years of his professional career and the best care was taken of it. His wealth and noble virtues obtained a high social position that was enough for him. He should be held up as a noble example of the eminence obtainable by energy and assiduity, in our fortunate country.

In religion Judge Dickson had accepted the views of his brother, who had decided to study for himself the words of the blessed Lord as found in the Gospels. The substance of these he found in two great commandments, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart and soul and mind," and the second which is like unto it, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." He devoted the superior mind which God had given him to practical thinking. The moral aspect of a transaction he set apart to be considered by itself.

His character as a public man, a private citizen, and a loving father, stands as a shining light. Take him all in all, his place will be hard to fill. The public man, a reasoner. None could be found more noble and honest than he.
