

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

Ibistorical.

THIS Church was organized November 15, 1885. It sprang out of a union Sunday-School which was opened the first Sunday of the previous June, and which had been the Sunday-School of the neighborhood. Excepting one Episcopal Church, there was then no religious organization existing between Fortieth and Fifty-third streets. The school was greatly needed, and it brought together in christian fellowship and labor, people of various denominational connection, making them acquainted with one another as fellow-workers and disciples of Christ. This Christian companionship proved very delightful.

Preaching services were held from the first, and were attended by increasing numbers. When it was realized that the neighborhood was ripe for the organization of a Church, the question of denomination inevitably became a principal issue. Each one naturally favored his own; and many felt that if another denomination were chosen they would remain with the organization only until a Church of their own sort was established.

The Sunday-School, however, had been illus-



trating the fact that Christian fellowship could not be bounded by denominational lines, and that in the esssentials of the faith and in spirit we were all in sympathy. It seemed sad that a neighborhood which had so much in common should be divided where most of all it ought to be united, namely, in the worship of God and in the work He had commissioned it to do.

As a consequence of such sentiments as these, at a meeting held September 5th, it was decided to make a trial of a Church of the Neighborhood, on the basis of the Christian faith common to all evangelical believers. Trustees were chosen the 19th of the month, and a committee was appointed to arrange for organization. Two months later the new Church was formed. The following April the Rev. John P. Hale was called to the pastorate, and began his labors the first Sunday of June. Councils composed of ministers of the Congregational, Episcopal, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches were called, both for the organization of the Church and the installation of the pastor.

It was agreed that during the first year the spiritual affairs of the Church should be administered by four deacons. But at the first annual meeting, the Prudential Committee was chosen, in the manner prescribed by the Articles of Government, and have since been in charge of our spiritual affairs. Various benevolent causes, some of



them denominational, some of them general, were adopted by the Church; one of which is presented to the congregation each month for their support. The departments of devotional and benevolent activity were organized as soon as was practicable, so that the Christian energies of the congregation might be enlisted and wisely directed.

For twelve years now the Church has pursued its steady, quiet course, maintaining the public worship of God, the teaching of the Word in the Sunday-School, the cultivation of personal piety and character, and all those helpful missionary and benevolent ministries which ought to center in. and to emanate from, God's house. While not organically connected with any denomination, we have always believed in the unity of Christ's Church and in practical co-operation with sister Churches. In Foreign Missions we are connected with the American Board, in Home Missions with the Presbyterian Church, in the education of colored people in the South with the Methodists, in City Missions with the Congregationalists and others, and in Bible and Tract and Sunday-School work with the great undenominational societies. The aim which we hold before our eyes, to be realized in the Church life and in each individual, is the kingdom of our Lord, which He established

and for which He taught us to pray. We believe



Triennial Review.

The Church.

The steady course of our Church life during the past three years has been evenly pursued. The period has been one of trial and anxiety in the business world, and the effects of its wear and strain have been felt somewhat, not only in revenues but also in general tone. This tone has not been one of depression, but rather of steady determination, as of those who in the midst of many daily cares were bearing bravely the heat and burden of the day. As will be seen by the report of the Ecclesiastical Society and by the tables of our benevolent gifts, the Church has admirably passed this period of strain from which we are now emerging. For there has been a palpable improvement and upward movement in most departments noticeable during the past six months.


The Church in November, '85, celebrated its tenth anniversary with appropriate services, and entered into the second period of its history. Up to that time there had been no denominational Church in our immediate neighborhood. In that



year, however, the Presbyterians organized a Church where the Lake Avenue Union Church had been. In the same year the St. James' M. E. Church was formed, and became at once large and influential. The building was located in the same block with ourselves. The entrance of new Churches in this field was timely and necessary, owing to the rapid growth of the community during the last decade, and indicates how conditions have changed in our neighborhood since the Church was organized.

The lines of our own work remain mostly the same as in previous years, and are indicated in the following reports. The chief enlargement has been in the direction of our systematic relief of the poor in the district west of us. Our Church has been one of the foremost in sustaining the Relief District. Our pastor has been its treasurer, and many of our ladies, under the direction of the Friendly Aid Committee, have been constant in the friendly visits to the homes of poor families which have been assigned to them by the Bureau.

The Senior Society of Christian Endeavor was discontinued over a year ago, and that field was left to the Junior Society. Its place, however, was partly occupied by the Book and Blazer Club on the social side, and on the missionary side by the Young Woman's Missionary Society, which was organized November 18, '97, and which meets monthly for missionary study and effort.



The benevolences of the Church reached the highest mark in 1891, when they ran high up in the eleven thousands. The next year they dropped into the ten thousand column. During the three following years they ranged in the nine thousands, then rose into the ten thousand column again, and last year passed once more the eleven thousand mark.

In the meetings of prayer, especial attention is given to Bible study. One evening a month is regularly called the Bible study evening. For over a year and a half, the various books of the New Testament were studied in order on these evenings; and for the past year the discourses of our Lord have been analyzed and their principal teachings discussed.

In its various departments the work of the Church is pursued with system, perseverance and energy, without strain after temporary effects, but with the aim to accomplish the high ends which God has set before us.

The Ecclesiastical Society.

When it was determined to establish this Church, the first definite step taken, was the organization of the Kenwood Evangelical Church Society, to care for its temporal concerns. This occurred

September 19, 1885. As long as the Church remained in the chapel and until the present auditorium was occupied (in November, 1888), the revenue was obtained by voluntary contribution. Since that time the pews have been rented, and the increased expenditure involved in the occupancy of the new building has been provided in this way.

The building, including lot and furnishings, cost \$65,423.92. Of this sum \$20,000 was obtained by the sale of interest-bearing six per cent. bonds, maturing in five years. These bonds, however, were not allowed to mature, for at Christmas time, 1891, the whole debt was liquidated by subscriptions then made, and paid during the following year. The trustees now hold in trust a property valued at over eighty thousand dollars, free from all incumbrance. The property has a frontage of one hundred and twenty-nine and one-half feet on Greenwood avenue and of one hundred and ninety-seven feet on Forty-sixth street.

For some years past the Church has felt the pressure of the times in common with all other Churches. For some five years the pew rentals have not quite sufficed to pay current expenses, which have included some heavy special items, particularly in 1896, when Forty-sixth street was paved and the Church was re-carpeted and many of the walls re-decorated. No special effort was made, however, in the matter, the trustees believ-



ing that any little deficiency would be cared for by the natural income of the Church, when times improved. There were, therefore, notes amounting to \$1,400, which the trustees carried three years ago. And subscriptions were taken quietly in '96 and again in '97 to meet expenses and extra calls for improvements. In this way the Church has promptly met all bills, and has reduced its floating debt out of available funds so that now but \$250 of debt remains, and this will doubtless be paid out of the current income in the next few months. The trustees feel that the Society has occasion to congratulate itself on so fair a showing during a period of such long and severe financial depression.

The Sunday=School.

During the interval since the last manual was published, the sessions of the Sunday-School have been held, as previously, at the close of the morning Church services. The general attendance of officers, teachers and scholars has varied but little from the years immediately preceding.

On the first of January, 1896, Mr. Fitch felt compelled to give up the superintendency of the School. His long service had been one of love, and the School consented to his retirement most reluctantly. His death, which occurred April 11, 1897, closed a life of the highest devotion and usefulness. His memory is sacred to us and will continue to stimulate us in the service of Christ.

Mr. C. J. Dodgshun was chosen to succeed



Mr. Fitch, but absence and ill health compelled him to resign in July of the same year. He was succeeded by Mr. George H. Bliss, who still continues to lead the School.

Upon the marriage of Miss Fitch, Mrs. A. W. Hoyt was called from the charge of the intermediate department to the superintendence of the Primary Department, which has flourished during the entire three years under her guidance. The Kindergarten niethod of teaching has been recently introduced for the six smallest classes with happy results. Mrs. L. A. Carton succeeded Mrs. Hoyt in the superintendency of the intermediate department, and has demonstrated beyond peradventure the wisdom of establishing this department of the School.

Considerable money has been wisely expended during the last year on the library, and it is intended to still further increase its utility.

The same system of collections and benevolence has been continued which has been practiced in previous years. The usual Christmas, Easter and anniversary services of the School have been also observed.

During July and August, when many of the scholars are absent, the regular lessons have been suspended and a series of special subjects taken. Both gentlemen and ladies from among the teachers, in response to the Superintendent's call, have



taken charge of these lessons. The instruction has proved most interesting.

Occasional social gatherings of the officers and teachers have been held at the homes of the Super-intendents and of some of the teachers, in which the friendships of the teachers have been cemented and the interests of the School have been furthered. These meetings were largely attended and much enjoyed.

The most perfect harmony and co-operation prevails among the officers and teachers of the School. While the School has not grown largely in numbers its efficiency has been steadily maintained. The outlook for the future is full of encouragement.



The Ladies' Society.

All the work officially undertaken by the ladies of the church is done through one society. The various departments are each placed in charge of a committee of ladies. The directors of these committees, together with the officers of the Society, constitute the Executive Committee, which plans out the work for the whole Society. Thus all its agencies are recognized as parts of one whole, and all its members hear the reports and appeals made to the Society from all departments. During the past three years which we are now to



review, sewing and business meetings have been held fortnightly in the season. There has been a usual attendance varying from forty to eighty-five. Luncheon is served at each meeting by six ladies. and at the close of the season a reception has been held at which time tea has been served and a musical program rendered. The social life centering at these meetings has been delightful, while the business of the Society is transacted with thoroughness and dispatch immediately before lunch. The money raised by the Society during this period may be found in the statistical tables. The garments made at the meetings in 1894-'95 have been as follows: 136 garments for the Half Orphan Asylum, 70 for the Industrial School for Boys at Glenwood, 57 for the School Children's Aid Society, and 13 comforters were made to order. In the year 1895-'96: 49 garments for Boys' Industrial School at Glenwood, 28 for the Fresh Air Fund Children, 39 for the University Settlement Creche, 62 for the Half Orphan Asylum, 75 dresses for the School Children's Aid Society, 5 for the Friendly Aid Committee, making a total number of 307 pieces. During the period from September 30, 1896 to April 7, 1897, the following work has been accomplished: 99 garments for the Boys' Industrial School at Glenwood, 55 for the School Children's Aid Society, 22 for the University Creche, 6 for the University Settlement, 85



for the Half Orphan Asylum, 136 towels for the Presbyterian Hospital, 19 comforters for different ladies of the Society, and for the church, 8 curtains and 48 napkins; a total of 478 pieces.

The devotional meetings of the ladies have been held weekly, the second and fourth meetings in each month being under the charge of the Home and Foreign Missionary Committee, when missionaries from various countries have addressed the ladies The Committee on Foreign Missions co-operates with the ladies of the Congregational churches. They have supported Miss Stanley at Tientsin. China, while the ladies of the Home Missionary Committee, co-operating with the Presbyterian ladies, support Miss Clements as the missionary of this church at Antonita, Colorado. They also aid the Methodist Colored School at Morristown. Tenn., and send Christmas and missionary boxes each winter to the West and South. The work of the Committee on City Charities has been large and varied, as will be seen by a glance over the statistical tables. They have supported Miss Anna Scott, a Bible reader, whose time is now principally spent among the Italians on the West Side. The Social Committee have taken charge of the three church socials given each winter in our parlors, which are always largely attended and which serve to enlarge acquaintance and promote friendliness in the church.



The Book and Blazer Club.

The youngest member of the Church body is the Book and Blazer Club, which had its beginnings at a meeting held November 30, 1896, at the home



of Mr. Spooner, where some fifteen young people met the pastor and members of the Prudential Committee for the purpose of discussing the formation of a Church Club. Its chief object was to be the cultivation among the young people of the church of social and intellectual fellowship. We thus hoped to stimulate the activity of our young people in the direction of church interests. The plan met with the enthusiastic approval of those present and a temporary organization was effected. A meeting for a formal and permanent organization was called, at which nearly a hundred persons were present. The officers chosen for the year were the following: Mr. F. M. Case, President; Miss Elizabeth Morse, Vice-President: Miss Ruth B. Steele, Recording Secretary: Mr. I. P. Sewell, Corresponding Secretary: Miss Franc Reese, Treasurer.

After a year of gratifying success along the line mapped out, the Club finds in its ranks a very healthy desire to broaden its usefulness in doing something more than "the promotion of social and intellectual fellowship" among its members. It has recently formally planned to organize and conduct a class for Bible study, thus supplying a need which has been long felt in our church.

The character of the regular monthly gatherings has been pleasing and entertaining. The Club has given sociables, readings, musicales, tableaux and lunches, and has been steadily



encouraged by the large attendance at its meetings and by the perceptible gain in the interest and enthusiasm of its members and friends. The officers for the ensuing year are named on a subsequent page.

Junior Endeavor Society.

The Junior Endeavorers were organized as a Society in November, 1892, at the suggestion of our pastor, Mr. Hale; its purpose being, as our Constitution states, to encourage religious and missionary endeavor among the boys and girls of our Church. Its members are between the ages of eight and sixteen years. The Society chooses its own officers and all meetings are presided over by its own members. Some grown person acts as our superintendent. For much of the time Mr. Hale has done this and has attended most of our meetings, but during the spring of 1897 Mr. George F. Fisher acted in this capacity, and after his absence from the city Mr. H. L. Lanphear accepted the charge.

Once a month we hold a missionary meeting, and the topics of other meetings are prepared by a Committee appointed to do this work. During the past two years we have been addressed by Miss Russ and Mrs. Williams of the Y. P. S. C. E.,



President Patch of Redfield College, Miss Wright of Turkey, and others.

We have given one fair and one lecture, by which our missionary fund was increased, and in which we took great pleasure. We contribute half the cost of supporting an Indian boy at the Good Will Mission, and send our Foreign Missionary offering through the W. B. M. I. The average attendance at our meetings is about thirty.



Urticles of Government.

ARTICLE 1 -- DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES

This Church was organized for the worship of God and the advancement of His kingdom. We acknowledge the Lord Jesus Christ as the Great Head of the Church, and receive the Holy Scriptures as authoritative in matters of faith, order and discipline. We believe that Christ's Church is one, and pray for the realization of its unity through all the earth. Recognizing the minor differences which exist among believers as being consistent with Christian integrity, we have united, as a Church of Jesus Christ, upon the great essentials of the evangelical faith.

ARTICLE II. GOVERNMENT.

SECTION 1. The government of this Church is vested in the body of believers who compose it, and are in fellowship, whose majority vote is final.

SEC. 2. While this Church, in the conduct of its affairs, is governed by its own understanding of God's Word, it gladly recognizes the obligations and privilege of the fellowship of Churches, and will seek to promote it by counsel, co-operation and sympathy.

ARTICLE III. - OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers of this Church shall consist of a Pastor, four Elders, not less than three Deacons, a Clerk and Treasurer in one person, and the Superintendent of Sunday-schools. These shall constitute the Prudential Committee.

SEC. 2. Officers shall be chosen by ballot; a majority of all the votes cast being necessary to a choice. The Sunday-schools shall elect their own superintendents, subject to confirmation by the Church.

SEC. 3. Elders shall be chosen for the term of four years, deacons for the term of three years, the clerk for the term of one year. They shall serve the appointed time and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vacancies may be filled at any regularly called business meeting.

SEC. 4. Elders and deacons shall be divided into four and three classes respectively, so arranged that one class shall retire annually. After the year 1890, these officers, upon the expiration of a full term of service, shall be ineligible to an immediate re-election.

ARTICLE IV.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Section 1. The Prodential Committee shall have charge of the spiritual concerns and interests of the Church. They shall maintain its government and discipline, receive and dismiss members,

administer the sacraments, and, subject to the direction of the Church, shall have control of its public worship and beneficence. They shall study to promote its spiritual life, shall support the weak, and, in general, take loving and watchful heed over the flock. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, two of whom, in the absence of the Pastor, must be elders. An appeal may be taken to the Church from any action of the committee, but after the statement of the case to the Church, at least one week must elapse before the final decision be made.

SEC. 2. THE PASTOR shall be a member of this Church and its recognized leader and teacher in religious things. As such, he shall faithfully discharge those duties which properly appertain to his sacred office. He is also the executive officer of the Church, and shall moderate its meetings and those of its permanent boards and committees.

When a Pastor is to be chosen, the Prudential Committee shall call a joint meeting of the Church and Society for that purpose. Notice of the hour and object of the meeting shall be given from the pulpit the two Sundays preceding. All members of the Church and members of the Society of legal age shall be entitled to vote. In the induction of a Pastor into office, the counsel and co-operation of neighboring Churches shall be invited.



Sec. 3. The Elders are particularly charged, in connection with the minister, with pastoral oversight. In his absence, they shall see that pastoral duties are properly discharged. When the office is vacant, they shall nominate another Pastor to the Prudential Committee, who, if they approve the choice, shall call a joint meeting of the Church and Society to take action in the matter.

Sec. 4. The Deacons shall provide for the sacramental services, and are especially charged with the relief of the poor and needy in our Church and community.

Sec. 5. The Clerk shall make a correct record of the proceedings of all business meetings of the Church and the Prudential Committee, and shall have the custody of all official books and papers belonging to them, subject to call. He shall keep a Church Register, containing names and residences of members, a record of baptisms, marriages, deaths, dismissals, etc., with dates. As Treasurer he shall hold the benevolent funds of the Church, subject to the instructions of the committee, under whose direction he shall perform all the duties usual to the offices he holds. At the annual meeting he shall submit to the Church written statistical reports, both as Clerk and as Treasurer.



ARTICLE V. -INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS.

Officers, before entering upon their duties, shal be publicly installed with prayer. Superintendents of Sunday-Schools and the Clerk shall qualify as Deacons. Pastors, Elders and Deacons shall answer affirmatively to the following

Installation Questions:

- 1. Do you heartily accept as your own the confession known as the Apostles' Creed, and do you hold to that form of faith commonly called Evangelical?
- 2. In discharging the duties of the office to which you have been called in this Church, do you engage to abide by its Articles of Government, and to study its peace, purity and advancement; do you promise faithfully to maintain the truths of God's Word, and diligently to perform the duties of your office; endeavoring to adorn your profession of the Gospel by the purity and exemplary piety of your personal life?

At the Installation of a Pastor the following question shall be put to the congregation:

Do you, the people of this congregation, promise to give this man whom you have chosen as your Pastor, that encouragement and honor which are due him as a Minister of Jesus Christ; will you receive the word of truth from his lips in meekness



and love; and will you continue to him such worldly maintenance as should be sufficient for his comfort?

When Elders or Deacons are installed, the following question shall be put to the members of the Church:

Do you, the members of this Church, receive as office-bearers in God's house, these men whom you have chosen; do you promise to uphold them and their associates in the discharge of their duties, submit to them in the due exercise of discipline, and encourage them in the godly service to which they are appointed?

ARTICLE VI.-MEMBERS

The essential requirements of membership in this Church shall be a personal faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and an outward walk accordant with that profession. Persons desiring to unite with this Church, either by letter or on profession of faith, will make their desire known to any member of the Prudential Committee, who are charged with the duty of inquiring into their Christian history and present religious experience. When received, their names and residences (and if they came from a sister Church, the name of that Church), shall be duly announced to the congregation. At the earliest communion service possible after they are received, they shall publicly enter



into covenant with the Church, in the manner prescribed in the following:

Form for the Recognition of Members.

The Minister, after any introductory words he may deem expedient, shall first address

Those Received by Profession of Faith. Beloved: In now presenting yourselves to unite with this Church, you signify your agreement with us in the following articles of faith: You believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of Heaven and earth; and in Jesus Christ the Son of God, and the Saviour of men through repentance and faith; in the Holy Spirit, our Comforter, Sanctifier and Guide; and in the Sacred Scriptures as the revealed will of God to men, the rule of our faith and practice.

Believing it to be your duty to make public confession of your faith, you solemnly acknowledge the Lord God Omnipotent as your God and Father. You receive as your personal Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ, who His own self bore our sins in His body on the tree, that we having died to sins, might live unto righteousness. You accept the Holy Spirit as your Guide and Sanctifier. Humbly renouncing your sins and yielding yourselves unto God, you declare it to be your purpose by His help to regulate your conduct by the law of



Christ, and to carry your religion into all the relations of life; thus adorning the doctrine of God, our Saviour in all things.

The Minister will here administer baptism to those who have not received it. Then shall he say

TO THOSE RECEIVED BY LETTER. Beloved: You have heretofore made public profession of your love for the Lord Jesus, and your dependence upon His atoning grace for the pardon of sins and the life eternal. You do now solemnly renew your consecration to Him, and accept afresh the sweet obligations of His name and service.

To BOTH CLASSES. In uniting with this Church you engage to submit to its government so long as you are members of it; to walk with your fellow disciples in charity, to attend to the ordinances as you have opportunity, to contribute to the support and extension of the Gospel as God may prosper you, and in every suitable way, as members of this Church, to promote the advancement of His cause and kingdom. Do you thus consent and covenant?

COVENANT OF THE CHURCH. (All the members rising.) We, then, the members of this Church, welcome you to our fellowship in the blessings of the Gospel, and to our joy in the service of our divine Redeemer. We covenant to love and watch over each other with Christian fidelity, and to seek each others' advancement in the life and likeness



And now dearly beloved, the Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make His face to shine upon you and be gracious unto you; the Lord lift up His countenance upon you and give you peace.

Now unto Him who is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God, our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever.—AMEN.

ARTICLE VIL-SACRAMENTS.

SECTION 1. The mode of baptism shall be according to the preference of the candidate. Infant baptism may be administered in connection with the communion service.

Sic. 2. The Lord's Supper will be celebrated the first Lord's Day of February, April, June, August, October and December. A preparatory service will be held on the Wednesday evening previous. The invitation to the Lord's Table shall include all who love the Lord Jesus Christ and desire to commune with us.

ARTICLE VIII. DISCIPLINE.

All discipline shall be exercised in love, with constant regard for the highest good of the individual and the purity of the Church. The rule of procedure shall be that recorded in Matt. xviii. 15-17. If charges are preferred against any member of the Church, they shall be made in writing to the



Prudential Committee, together with the names of witnesses; and a copy shall be furnished the accused. He shall have at least a week's notice after citation before trial and shall be fully heard by the Committee. At least a week shall intervene between the hearing and the final action.

ARTICLE IX.—BUSINESS MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The annual meeting shall be held on the first Wednesday evening after the first Sunday in December, at which time the annual reports shall be submitted, and the election of officers be held.

Sec. 2. Business meetings may be called by the Prudential Committee, or at the written request of five members of the Church. At such meetings business shall be confined to the subjects named in the call. Notice of all business meetings must be given from the pulpit at the morning service of the previous Lord's Day. Notice of a proposed change of these articles, or of an election of officers, or of the annual meeting shall be given on the two Sundays next preceding the day of the proposed meeting.

ARTICLE X. - AMENDMENTS.

These articles, or any of them, may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, at any meeting regularly called for that purpose.



Constitution of the Ecclesiastical Society

ARTICLE 1 -NAME AND MEMBERSHIP.

The name of this Society shall be THE KEN-WOOD EVANGELICAL CHURCH SOCIETY. All persons of legal age contributing to its support, and all persons of legal age, members of the Church to be organized in connection with this Society, shall be entitled to vote at all its meetings.

ARTICLE II - TRUSTEES AND THEIR DUTIES.

Section 1. The property of this Society shall be held in trust for the Society by a Board of seven Trustees, who shall also manage its pecuniary affairs according to the laws of the State. They shall be subject at all times to the directing vote of the Society, and shall have no power to bny, sell, mortgage or transfer real property without the specific authority of the Society therefor. No act of the Trustees shall be valid except when passed in open board at a meeting regularly called. The Board shall make an annual written report of its doings to the Society.

Sec. 2. Trustees shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Society for the term of three years. They shall be divided into three classes, one of



which shall go out of office each year. A majority of the Trustees shall be members of the Kenwood Evangelical Church, and no person shall be eligible for the office of Trustee whose election would invert that proportion.

ARTICLE III --OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES.

As soon as convenient after the annual meeting of the Society, the Trustees shall meet and organize by the election of a President, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall also serve as officers of the Society. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board and appoint the Standing Committees. The Clerk shall keep a record of all the meetings of the Society, and of the Board of Trustees, and shall hold the papers of the Society, subject to call. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the Society, and pay out the same only on the written order of the President. In case of a vacancy in any of these offices from any cause, the Trustees shall elect a successor for the unexpired term, at a special meeting called for the purpose. President and Treasurer shall present written reports at the annual meeting of the Society each year,

ARTICLE IV. - ANNUAL MEETING.

The first regular annual meeting of the Society, for the election of officers and the transaction of appropriate business, shall be held the third Mon-



day of December, 1886, at 7:30 p. m., and annually thereafter.

ARTICLE V. SPECIAL MEETINGS

Notice of all meetings of the Society shall be given from the pulpit on the Sunday preceding the appointed time. Special meetings may be called by the Trustees, or by any ten members, such call being in writing, with not less than three days' notice.

ARTICLE VI — QUORUM AND RULE AS TO DISPOSAL OF PROPERTY

Section 1. Twenty members shall constitute a querum, but no sale, mortgage, or transfer of property shall be made except at a meeting which has been notified on two preceding Sabbaths.

Sec. 2. But no action of the Society shall alienate the property of the Society from the use and purposes of the Society, nor may the name be changed, except upon affirmative vote of not less than three-fourths (†) of all the adult members of the Church and Society at the time of such action.

SEC. 3. Section two (2) of this article shall not be repealed except by an affirmative vote of three-fourths (†) of all the adult members of the Church and Society at the time of such action.

ARTICLE VIL -- AMENDMENTS.

Any proposed alterations of these rules must be stated in the public notice of the meeting appointed



for that purpose, but no amendment inconsistent with Sections 2 and 3 of Article VII. shall be entertained.

MUSIC COMMITTEE.

By an arrangement between the Church and Society, the Music Committee consists of one person appointed by the Prudential Committee from their own number, one of the trustees appointed by that Board, and one person elected by the Society at its annual meeting. This Committee elects its own chairman, engages the members of the Choir and controls its secular management, within the limits of expense determined by the Society or its trustees.



Constitution of the Sunday=School

ARTICLE 1 -- NAME.

The name of this school shall be the Sunday-School of the Kenwood Evangelical Church.

ARTICLE II. OFFICERS.

The officers shall consist of a Superintendent, an Assistant Superintendent, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Librarian, and such others as may be determined by vote of the teachers.

ARTICLE HI ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The officers above named shall be chosen by a majority of the ballots cast. The offices created by vote of the teachers shall be filled by the Superintendent, subject to confirmation by the teachers. The full term of service for officers shall be for one year from the first Sunday in January, and until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE IV. DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The Superintendent shall be the executive officer of the school. He shall direct its management, conduct its exercises, appoint its teachers, and in general shall study its welfare and efficiency.

If any teacher is absent, without sufficient



excuse, for more than three consecutive Sundays, it shall be his duty to provide another teacher for the class.

SEC. 2. The Assistant Superintendent shall assist the Superintendent in the discharge of his duties, and in his absence assume the management of the school.

Sign. 3. The Secretary shall keep a statistical register of the school and present a summary report of the same in writing, weekly and quarterly. He shall also keep a correct record of the minutes of all teachers' meetings, and have the custody of papers and records belonging to the school.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall hold all moneys belonging to the school and disburse the same in accordance with the vote of the teachers.

Sec. 5. The Librarian shall have general oversight of the library, and attend to the proper distribution and care of the books.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and Librarian to present written reports for the year at the annual meeting. All officers shall be subject to the directing vote of the teachers.

ARTICLE V.-MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. Meetings for the study of the lesson may be held from time to time, as determined by the vote of the teachers.



SEC. 2. Business meetings of the teachers shall be called by the Superintendent quarterly. He may call special meetings at any time, and shall call such a meeting at the request of any five teachers.

Notice of all business meetings shall be given during a regular session of the school. At these meetings the officers and teachers of the school shall be entitled to voice and vote.

SEC. 3. The annual meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall take place the week preceding the annual meeting of the Church at the call of the Superintendent.

ARTICLE VI.-QUORUM.

 Λ quarum for the transaction of business shall consist of at least ten officers and teachers.

ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of those present at any business meeting, provided at least ten days notice be given of the change proposed.



Constitution of the Ladies' Society

ARTICLE 1 - NAME AND OBJECT.

This organization shall be called the Ladies' Society of the Kenwood Evangelical Church; its object is the advancement of all those interests in the Church for which the ladies may properly have a care.

ARTICLE II. -OFFICERS

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. They shall be elected by ballot, perform the duties usually incumbent upon their respective offices, and serve until the election of their successors.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP.

The payment of an initiation fee, and thereafter of an annual due, of one dollar, shall constitute any lady a member of this society; and only members shall be allowed to vote.

ARTICLE IV -COMMITTEES.

Any permanent department of the Society's work may be entrusted to a standing Committee, which shall have charge of whatever the Society undertakes in that department, and may suggest such plans concerning its prosecution as seem



wise. The directors of these committees shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting; and with the officers of the Society shall constitute the Executive Committee, who shall consult for the general interests of the Society, and appoint the other members of the standing committees.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

From the third week in September until April, the Society shall hold meetings at such intervals as it may determine. All meetings shall be previously announced from the pulpit. The last meeting before the summer recess shall be the annual meeting, when the retiring Secretary, Treasurer and Directors of Standing Committees shall make reports for the year, and the President shall give an annual address, all of which shall be in writing.

ARTICLE VI - MONEYS.

Money raised by the Home and Foreign Missionary, the City Charities, and the Friendly Aid Committees may be forwarded by them directly to its proper destination, but full report of the same shall be made quarterly to the Treasurer, and be entered upon her books. All other moneys collected by the Society or any of its committees shall be held by the Treasurer, and be disbursed only by vote of the Society.



ARTICLE VIL-STANDING ORDERS.

Any permanent arrangements other than those prescribed by the constitution shall be kept by the Secretary upon a separate page of the record book, for easy reference.

ARTICLE VIII. - AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a twothirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting, provided notice of the amendment proposed be given at the next previous regular meeting of the Society.

STANDING ORDERS

- The following shall be the usual order to be followed at the business meetings:
 - (1) Call to order.
 - (2) Devotional Exercises.
 - (3) Reading of Minutes.
 - (4) Report of the Treasurer.
 - (5) Reports of Committees.
 - (b) Unfinished Business.
 - (7) Miscellaneous Business.
- 2. The following shall be the list of Standing Committees: (1) On Foreign Missions. (2) On Home Missions. (3) On City Charities. (4) On Friendly Aid. (5) On Benevolent Work. (6) Devotional Committee. (7) Social Committee. (8) Pulpit and Flowers.



- 3. The retiring President shall present a report of the work of the Society during her year of office at the next following annual meeting of the Church.
- 4. The Committees on Foreign and Home Missions and on City Charities shall spread intelligence and awaken interest in the causes they represent and shall solicit offerings in their behalf.

The Devotional Committee shall have oversight of the meetings of prayer other than those held in the especial interest of missions.

The Social Committee shall meet and introduce strangers, promote friendly intercourse in the Church, and arrange for such social gatherings as are deemed advisable.

The Dorcas Committee shall have charge of the sewing and all other such work undertaken by the Society.

The Friendly Aid Committee shall conduct the organized work of friendly visitation and relief in the families of the poor in the district assigned to the care of this Church.

The Pulpit and Flower Committee shall care for the arrangement of the flowers at the Church services and have general oversight of the Church furnishings.



Ibyde Park Christian Union.

ARTICLE 1 - MEMBERSHIP

Active members of the Prodential Committee of the Kenwood Evangelical Church and of the Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Woodlawn Park, together with the Board of Spiritual Control of any Church which may hereafter be associated with us, shall constitute the membership of this corporation.

ARTICLE II - STEWARDS

The management of the affairs of the Union shall be intrusted to a Board of Stewards or Trustees, twenty-one in number, of whom five shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Board shall consist of the Pastors of the Churches co-operating and of men chosen by the Board of Spiritual Control in each Church, from those who have been ordained as office-bearers therein. The number of Stewards chosen from each Church, when once agreed upon, shall not be changed except by the consent of a majority of the members from every co-operating Church. Stewards from each Church shall serve one year from the date of their election.



ARTICLE HL-DUTIES OF STEWARDS

The Stewards shall have entire control of the affairs of the corporation, both spiritual and financial, subject, however, to the direction of the Union. They shall annually elect a President, Secretary and Treasurer, and such other officers as they may require, and may adopt rules for their ordinary guidance.

ARTICLE IV --- MEETINGS.

Meetings of the Union for the transaction of business shall be called by the Secretary upon the written request of any five members. The annual meeting shall be held on the last Monday in April, when written reports for the year shall be presented by the Secretary and the Treasurer. Due notice of all meetings shall be mailed each member by the Secretary.

ARTICLE V. AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws or any of them may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Stewards and the approval of all the Boards of Spiritual Control of the Churches co-operating; or by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Union present at any regularly called meeting; provided, that ten days previous notice of the amendment be properly mailed to each member.



Poung Moman's Missionary Society.

ARTICLE I. - NAME.

This Society shall be called the Young Woman's Missionary Society of the Kenwood Evangelical Church.

ARTICLE II. OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The object of this Society shall be the promotion of a missionary spirit, the acquiring of missionary knowledge and the collection of money for missionary purposes.

SEC. 2. The moneys collected by this Society shall be divided equally between the Woman's Board of Missions of the Interior and the Woman's Presbyterial Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III. - OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society, chosen annually, shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer.

ARTICLE IV .-- DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all the meetings of the Society and to have general oversight of the work. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in her absence. The Recording Secretary shall keep a



careful record of all business transacted and read the minutes of the previous meeting. The Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence and shall send out all notices of meetings. The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all moneys entrusted to her, and once a quarter shall forward half the amount to the Treasurer of the State Branch and half to the Treasurer of the Woman's Presbyterial Society for Home Missions.

ARTICLE V -DUES.

Any person may become a member of this Society by the payment of at least ten cents a month.

ARTICLE VI - ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of this Society shall be held in April for the election of officers and presenting of annual reports.

ARTICLE VII, -- AMENDMENTS,

This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Society present, provided notice of this amendment has been given at a previous meeting.



The Ikenwood Cadets.

On the 16th of November, 1896, this Company was organized after the plan of the Boys' Brigade in the Free College of Glasgow, Scotland, which was formed October 4th, 1883, and was the first Company of this Christian army. It was organized to bring together into fellowship in the Church boys over twelve years of age, and by military discipline to develop them both in body and in mind and in the highest elements of dignified Christian manhood.

The plan waited some time for a leader, until the Prudential Committee, who had it in mind, found the very man to take charge of it, in the person of Mr. Tappen Halsey, who has acted as Commandant and has achieved by his tact, wisdom and perseverance, the very best results which were hoped for it. Under the efficient discipline of their Captain, Mr. W. S. Gorrell, and their first Lieutenant, Mr. Lee Parkinson, the Company has made remarkable progress. In the first year Louis Williams was appointed second Lieutenant, and in the present year, after his departure, Herrick Hammond was elected to that position.

A fine *csprit de corps* has pervaded the organization. There was an average attendance of 37 the first year out of an enrollment of 42, and this



year the average is even better. The weekly drill is invariably opened with chapel exercises, consisting of Bible reading, singing, prayer or remarks. Each member in his pledge engages to abstain from the use of tobacco, liquor and profane and vulgar language, and to try in all ways to be a Christian gentleman.

Equipment was provided and paid for, consisting of hat, coat and trousers of blue cloth, with belt and rifle for each cadet; swords for officers, and drum and trumpet, all of which is the property of the Company, and has cost over eight hundred dollars. The drill and discipline has been rigid, and the results are most satisfactory both to parents and officers. Capt. Gorrell has given an extra evening each week for advanced military study using the blackboard for questions or illustrations, and the Cadets use paper and pencil for their answers. Their papers are carefully supervised and the percentage of each is figured out; a percentage of sixty credits out of a possible eighty being demanded. Medals and awards are given for the best work.

Thus we seek to cultivate habits of thoroughness, obedience, promptness and a soldierly, Christian bearing in all who come within the influence of the organization.
