

## WOMAN'S BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS

## FIRST METHODIST PROTESTANT CHURCH

Pittsburgh, Pa., May 12, 13 and 14, 1921

The 28th Annual Session of the Woman's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Protestant Church assembled in First Methodist Protestant Church, Pittsburgh, Pa., May 12, and was called to order by the president, Mrs. A. G. Dixon.

A delightful song service led by the pastor, Rev. J. R. Clark, preceded the

devotional, led by Mrs. N. Vice, of the Indiana Branch.

The 33rd Responsive Reading in Church Hymnal was used after which sentence prayers followed and a consecration service, theme being "Prayer and service."

In opening the business session the president urged reliance upon God in undertaking the work of the board. The hostess church tendered its greetings through the pastor, who assured the members of the board of the hearty welcome which was accorded not only by the church, but by the city.

The greetings of the Branch were given by Mrs. E. E. Stewart. She reviewed briefly the history of the board and commended the work most highly.

Mrs. Stewart impressed upon the workers the need of faith and prayer and said the opportunities were never so great. Her cordial welcome was responded to by Mrs. J. M. Millikan, of the North Carolina Branch, who expressed for the board pleasure in being permitted to come to Pittsburgh, the "City of Big Things." She outlined the progress of the city, industrially, commercially and religiously and said that the women of the church looked upon Pittsburgh as the hub around which the missionary wheel of our church revolves.

Following roll call, Mrs. Dixon, in making her address, recounted the activities of the Society, saying more work had been accomplished during the year than in any year in the history of the organization. She has visited a number of Branches and has created a number of organizations. Mrs. Dixon recommended putting an organizer in the field. She told of the relationship of the Home Missionary Society to General Conference and in closing sounded the "go forward" keynote,

The President asked the two vice presidents to name the committees for

the meeting.

On motion, the bar, consisting of the first four rows of seats in the center of the church was fixed. Dr. T. H. Lewis, president of General Conference, was introduced and in the beginning of his address told of the meeting of the Administrative Board of Missions which had just preceded this meeting. After considering the subject of uniting the two women's mission boards, the speaker said the vote was taken which resulted in a tie and he had with much pleasure cast his vote in favor or uniting the boards. Dr. Lewis commended the movement and said it was a good and wise stop and suggested for a motto: "L'ach for All and All for Each." He told of the various interests of the church and urged denominational fellowship. At the close of his address the congregation sang: "Blest Be the Tie That Binds Our Hearts in Christian Love."

## FRIDAY AFTERNOON, MAY 13, 1:30 O'CLOCK

The afternoon session opened with devotional led by Mrs. C. R. Knight. Minutes were read and approved.

Workers conference, which was conducted by Mrs. R. T. Lewis, was interesting and instructive.

Report of Children's Home was submitted by Mrs. Garrett, house mother of the home, after which Mrs. King delighted the audience with a solo.

Revs. A. J. Allen, C. M. Lippincott, W. A. Curfman, Albert Kaufman, and F. W. Perkins were introduced.

Miss Dorn Cook, in charge of the Pittsburgh Mission, gave an interesting report of the splendid work at the Mission.

Report of Secretary of Life and Memorial Members was accepted, after which motion prevailed to have forms for Life and Memorial Members. Mrs. Jane Gordon and Mrs. Cooke were appointed to prepare same.

Mrs. Lewis Huckenberry told in a most impressive manner of the young people's work in the Pittsburgh Branch.

Mrs. Millikan presented two memorials from the North Carolina Branch, one memorializing the Board to issue a manual of Home and Foreign Mission work. The other from a joint executive meeting of the two Societies in North Carolina Branch asking that arrangements, if possible, be made to hold both board meetings in same locality, one directly rollowing the other. Both memorials were referred to Executive Committee.

Mrs. Jane A. Gordon, president of the Pittsburgh Branch, presented pennants for thank offering and Young People's Societies which were gratefully received and she was asked to express gratitude to the Branches. The pennants are beautiful in design and will stimulate workers to greater activity. Motion prevailed that a new office, that of Thank Offering Secretary, be created.

Rev. J. S. Leland, of Pittsburgh conference, was introduced.

Rev. T. R. Woodford gave a detailed account of the Pine Ridge work, which was accepted by a rising vote of thanks and referred to Auditing Committee.

Dr. C. E. Wilbur was present for the afternoon session.

Motion to reimburse Dr. Woodford \$35 which he personally paid for repair work carried.

Meeting adjourned, Rev. Allen pronouncing the benediction.

The evening session was in charge of Mrs. H. E. Risler, of Washington, vice president of the Executive Board of the Woman's Home Missionary Society. Mrs. T. R. Woodford led the devotional after which the chi'dren of the Pittsburgh Mission gave a splendid demonstration. Following this Judge Tensard De Wolf, of Morals Court, was introduced and spoke on "The Causes of Delinquencies in Childhood and the Responsibility of Parents." He made a strong plea for the churches to lend their support in preventing the causes that bring 5,000 children into his court annual y.

Rev. T. R. Woodford, of Kentucky, gave an interesting and instructive address on "Experiences at Pine Ridge School." The andience seemed keenly alive to the needs of the school and received his interesting message enthusiastically.

The meeting closed with a prayer by Rev. Mr. Allen.

## MORNING SESSION, MAY 14

The morning session was called to order by the president and Mrs. Paul Cullison, of Maryland Branch, led the devotional.

Minutes were read and approved.

Meeting adjourned for committee work.

Meeting called to order and a recess taken until after luncheon.

Report of Committee on Credentials and Resolutions submitted and

adopted.

Auditing Committee submitted report which was accepted.

The Executive Committee presented report. It was accepted and considered item by item. While under discussion cars arrived to take party over to the Mission School. Consequently meeting adjourned.

On returning the board resumed work. Dr. Lyn.an E. Davis was pre-

sent/l and was lavish in his words of commendation.

Report of Executive Committee was adopted as a whole.

Secretary was ordered to send letter of sympathy to Mrs. Craig.

Item of Committee on Ways and Means which had been referred back was presented and report adopted as a whole.

## REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

Madam Chairman, Members of the Woman's Home Missionary Executive

Board, and Friends:

Opportunity, they say, is represented as a beautiful figure, poised on tiptoe with winged feet, elusive and ready for flight at a moment's notice; but surely some of our women have grasped her skirts and held her, while they have set in motion plans for a larger development, for we bring today the best report of our work since our organization.

The women of America are accepting and forwarding a programme for the world's betterment, and are filling with zeal and enthusiasm every nost,

from the guardianship of the home to the desk in the counting house.

As we look back over the past year we realize how beautiful it has been made through service, and how woman, through motherhood, or as doctor, nurse, teacher or missionary, has accepted the vocation with courage and faith undaunted by the discouragements that come to all, steadily moving forward.

Whether in the home, in the cotton bolt, in the mountains of the South, in the crowded city slums, in the hospitals or children's homes, or in the local church community, they have heard and answered the call. "The Lord hath need of them," and they have "counted all things loss," in comparison.

As this is the day of unprecedented opportunity, we pray that the women of the Methodist Protestant Church may esteem it a personal privilege to have a part, and never rest in any effort or cease to pray till the successful comple-

tion of the work undertaken.

We realize that the call of the mountains requires an answer in consecrated service, Christain education and evangelism, and is for men and women ready for that service who will give this people a larger vision which will bring to them the Christ; also the material things they need—education, medical care, good roads, newspapers and sanitation.

We would make a plea for the negro in the elevation of the home life in the South, Christain education, domestic economy and manual training, which will enable and enrich this people, and make it a factor in the uplift of our nation. Wherever the religion of Christ has been taught, the response has been

noticable encouraging and purity and fine morals the result.

Settlement work among the foreign children is productive of great results and far reaching in its effects, yet difficult to tabulate. It is seen in the changed conditions of the home, the shining, smiling faces of happy children, a longing for improved surroundings, and a desire for better things—a hearthunger that longs for the unaccustomed touch of love and friendly interest. The judge of our morals court says that 60 per cent of the children who come before the court are raised in homes that are not fit to live in, and that a child is no better than the community in which he lives. If you let a slum element control a district, they will soon control the community, and that in a very few years.

Membership-The Woman's Home Missionary Society is always looking

for new recruits, and this year reports a net gain of 564.

Maryland reports the largest gain of the branches in auxiliary members—185.

Knoxville Auxiliary, of the Pittsburgh Branch, reports a gain of thirty new members, and numbers now about ninety members.

Three members, 1 from Indiana and 2 from Pittsburgh, report as perpetual members. This money goes into a fund known as the Perpetual Endowment Fund, and is a new feature of the organization. The cost of this is \$30; invested at 4 per cent, it pays \$1.20 a year, and will cover the membership dues

for time and eternity, the auxiliary through which it came receiving credit. What memorial could be more beautiful than this, that one may still have a part in the extension of Christ's kingdom for all time, even after having passed over into the border land? "If we are in partnership with God, let us plan large things," Moody penned upon the margin of his Bible when dying.

Our society must work for greater numerical strength. We must consecrate more time, more of our energy and ability to the task, and endeavor to teach every woman in our individual churches through a well-planned membership drive. Let us ask every officer of our organization to prayerfully canvass for new members. Let us do it now.

Financial—The year just closed has been the most prosperous since our organization. Having passed our goal, over five thousand dollars, we feel that

the branches should be heartily commended for this splendid result.

We note that Maryland Branch, having raised \$1,855.34, has an increase

of \$1,055.34 above last year.

Ohio also did well, and has \$1,745.87 to her credit, an increase of \$306.87. Pittsburgh leads, having raised over \$3,700 for all interests, about \$1,639.64

more than last year.

These are all to be commended for greater activity; and while we do not want to make money our first consideration, we do want to emphasize the fact that it is very necessary part, and is one of the most beautiful of all ministries; for it brings to those who know not our Father the knowledge of His salvation big large and the large and

tion, his love and tender care.

Missionary Education—The reading of missionary literature is becoming more general each year in our work, and we should plan the systematic study of it. The women represent 60 per cent of our constituency, and ours is the rtsponsibility of training them in a programme of missionary education through the local church. We plan, in our monthly programme, an outline for helpfulness, and urge every president to develop it. Let us take advantage of every help furnished, and gain a broader, finer culture. Let us give a new impetus to our work, through the channel of story, picture and pageant, and

usher in a new day through missionary education.

Official Organs of Publication—The editors of our church papers have been uniformly kind in extending to us the use of the columns of their papers. We feel that we shold avail ourselves more freely of their offer, and plan to have a page as an incentive for greater activity and inspiration. The editor of the Woman's Home Missionary Department in the Missionary Record welcomes branch and auxiliary reports, all secretaries' reports, and news pertaining to the work in general. Read her suggestions in the annual minutes. Let us canvass for more subscriptions to our church papers; and, like a sister secretary, I would like to suggest a subscription to the Missionary Record as a requirement of membership.

Thank offering expresses the gratitude of a loving heart, and means consecrated giving and consecrated service. It means increased support in every department of our work, and puts courage and strength in the hearts of our workers. This year we have a much larger gift than usual, Ohio and Pittsburgh branches leading. A large pennant will be awarded the branch having the largest gift. Let us strive for 100 per cent in thank offering, remembering it brings God's promised blessing. "Come near, and bring thank offerings into the house of the Lord." "God loveth a cheerful giver." Let us all strive to have our thank offering in November and have a special service.

Young People's Work—We need loyal, earnest, alert leaders. We need trained workers, teachers, missionaries, field secretaries. We need student bodies organized, the college girl to be kept in touch with the opportunities for

service, and to keep her in closer touch wth her church. We need more young people's societies, more children's organizations, more "Buds of Hope" and mission bands. Help us to organize them in a big, splendid enthusiastic service for Christ and humanity, and begin now in your local church. Twenty new ones have been added to the list.

Branch and Auxiliary Organizations—Two new organizations of three auxiliaries each have been organized during the past year, one in Alabama and one in West Virginia. New auxiliaries in Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and New York are the result of our president's visit to those states.

Your corresponding secretary spent a most delightful time with the United Ohio Branck in annual session at Steubenville, the reports showing a growth in interest and membership, and a growth in thank offerings and in going "over the top" in meeting their budget.

An invitation to visit the annual meeting of the Indiana Branch also was accepted, and a Home Missionay Society of fifteen members has been organized in the Antioch church and two perpetual members secured. While in session, the branch decided to make Mrs. J. L. Barclay a perpetual member, thus honoring her for a beautiful life of service in a fitting memorial. Six invitations for visitors were issued to your secretary, desiring information and organization in our work.

If we could but secure the interest of a large number of people who have no part in our work! Why not make it of first importance and join one branch in executive session, the first Friday of each month, in prayer for the "unreached women of our church?"

As we face the new issue of a new year, may we give to our God that undivided service that will challenge every thoughtful woman as never before to the task of winning five million mountaineers, of whom 280,000 can neither read nor write; thirteen million foreigners, five million of whom are unable to read or write English, and two million negro illiterates in the United States. Surely the task is great enough to inspire the largest service and the greatest minds in a worth-while, efficient campaign.

May the day speedily come when we will have an organized society for missions in the twenty-five hundred churches and two thousand Sunday-schools; and may that day mark, too, the completion of a circle when all of the women in all of the churches shall be enlisted in the missionary cause and make our own religion practical by putting into effect our individual effort.

"Lord, speak to me, that I may speak
In living echoes of thy tone.
As thou hast sought, so let me seek
Thy erring children, lost and lone.

"O lead, Lord, that I may lead
The wandering and the wavering feet.
O feed me, Lord, that I may feed
Thy hungry ones, with manna sweet.

## "IN LABORS ABUNDANT

Meetings have been continued regularly at Pine Ridge, Meadow Branch and Rogers and an occasional service has been held at other points. There have been 60 preaching services during the year, with an average attendance of 39; 93 Sunday School sessions average attendance, 32; 34 Y. P. S. C. E. meetings averaging 24; 28 Junior C. E. meetings averaging 10; 31 Wednesday night prayer meetings for students and three home meetings. Children's Day Easter and Christmas exercises were held in the Sunday Schools. Contributions were as follows: Foreign Missions, \$8.83; Home Missions, \$10; China Famine Sufferers, \$30.62. On the 4th of July, our Pine Ridge Sunday School held a patriotic picnic. Fifty-five scholars were given a free treat to ice cream and yet a profit of \$24 was realized from the sales of refreshments. This amount was appropriated to our fund for purchase of furniture for the dormitories, by vote of the School.

During the year, about 110 visits have been made in the homes by Mrs.

Woodford and myself.

Alvin Drew School was open eight months, beginning September 1st, and closing April 28th. We have labored together harmoniously. Miss Marguerite Shamp has taught mathematics, geography, English, spelling and penmanship in grades above the fourth and she has also rendered valuable service at the piano, both in school exercises and in religious services. Miss Inez Caudle has taught the elementary grades and had charge of the library. Mrs. Woodford has served as dean of the girls and housekeeper and also taught physiology, history and elocution and during the first term, in addition to these duties, also served as cook. We were very thankful indeed when Miss Mary Land came, January 1st, to take charge of the work in the kitchen and dining room. She has been very faithful and in many ways proven her genuine interest in the work. Mr Edward Watson also came to our aid January 1st, and has taken quite an interest in looking after the boys and making himself generally useful. He has helped greatly along musical lines with his saxophone and clarinet.

Equipment

The improvements authorized at the Board Meeting a year ago, were all made, costing just about what was estimated, \$3,000.00. These improvements made us more comfortable and enabled us to accommodate more than three times as many boarding students as we had the previous year. However, if we are to go on growing the coming year, it is necessary to do more building at once. In this connection, I have plans to suggest to the Executive Committee at the proper time.

Appreciation

We wish to express our thanks first to God, Whose we are and Whom we serve, without Whose help we should not have been able to "bear the strain of toil, the fret of care." Then to every worker in every auxiliary of the Woman's Home Missioary Society, we wish to say "Thank You," for we realize that without the support and backing which you are giving us we could not go on with the work. And finally, to every friend who has sent us expressions of their interest in the work, either in money or other things, we give assurance of our sincere appreciation. In the midst of trial and sacrifice, it has been a great encouragement to us to know that back of us there was a great company of folks who were ready not only to supply our material needs, but above all clse, were bearing us up on wings of prayer to the loving heart of God, who is able to do for us far more than we ask or think.

## METHODIST PROTESTANT CHILDREN'S HOME

## High Point N. C., May, 1921

Eleven years in the life of the Children's Home has passed into history. The influences for the moral and physical betterment of humanity set in metion will ever go on, widening and deepening. God only knows what the value of these will be in the coming years. We do hope and pray that the faithful anr intelligent effort of the teachers and officers connected with this work during the past year, will be rewarded by being used as a means of great good to the children under their care.

We have had very little sickness until this year. In June one of our girls was taken to the hospital and after being treated for two weeks she was

operated upon for appendicitis. Since, we have passed through four epidemics: Sore eyes, chicken pox, influenza and measles. In all this sickness we had no deaths and feel that we should be profoundly grateful to our Heavenly Father for His many blessings and wish humbly to acknowledge our dependence upon Him.

Our school with Misses McCulloch and Isley in charge in the fall and Misses Darnhill and Isley in charge for the spring term, has been very satisfactory. The children have done splendid work in spite of so many interruptions. Having to suspend the school during the epidemic of measles, it was decided not to re-open until early fall on account of the weakened condition of the children's eyes.

Liss Bowlian continues her systematic Bible teaching with the children, which will bear fruit in years to come for no child can study the Bible and not become a better Christian, a better man and a better citizen.

The Home having been full for some time, the number of children remains practically the same, for when one goes out another is admitted. Two boys and two girls, having finished the tenth grade, went out last spring line of the eleven children who have gone out from the Home at the age of 13 years, were back for a reunion last August and seemed happy to get home and together once more. These boys and girls are developing into fine men women and are doing well in their chosen work. Four are in college, one of whom will graduate this spring and expects to teach; one is a graduate nurse and is assistant floor supervisor at Hygeia Hospital Richmond Va.; two are book-keepers two are farmers one mechanic and one girl after doing satisfactory office work for more than two years was married last fall.

We are very proud of these boys and girls. They have shown in many ways that they appreciate the Home for what it has done for them. Two of these mays have placed a typewriter here to be used by their sister and have furnished books for a course in shorthand and typewriting in order that she may be prepared to accept a position when she leaves. Others have remembered the Rome in various ways.

The form is one of our most profitable assets. It not only gives employment and elercise to the boys but our clops have been good and have help'd very materially to cut down the high cost of living. One of the attractions to visitors to the Home is a herd of Holstein cattle.

Just now Mr. Auman, assistant superintnedent, and the boys are preparing to build a barn which is very much needed. The principal part of the bumber has been donated by people of Randolph county

The boys' building has been delayed on account of the high cost of labor and material. Our most urgent need is money for the boys' building, furnishings, gymnasium and a laundry with modern equipment.

The Ceneral Conference and the Young People's Convention meeting in North Carolina near enough the Home so that the delegates could pay it a visit has greatly increased interest as has been evidenced by some very substantial contributions received.

I would like to take this opportunity of calling attention to those who are blessed with this world's goods to the fact that this institution is one of the very best causes to which legacies can be left. It is our hope that these words may sink into some fertile soil and bear much fruit in the years to come.

## REPORT OF PITTSBURGH MISSION FROM MAY, 1920, TO MAY 1921

We have at our Mission 94 families that we visit, with 275 children of all ages. In the last year five of our families have gone to Europe and more are planning to go. Eight families moved to other cities. We are always getting new recruits.

Three ladies from Bellview brought a party to the children on June 2. Mt. Nashington girls brought a party to the evening class June 10. We have given 25 more Bibles to the children. We had seven class picnics. We sent 30 children to Valencia for a summer vacation; 35 children went to Rosedale for vacations. We took a party of mothers and working girls to Rosedale to spend the 4th of July. Y. W. C. A. girls gave a picnic to 33 children in Riverview Park. In July we had our annual picnic at Mt McKinley Park, Knoxville, where 81 children enjoyed themselves immensely. September 11, six of our girls made a visit to Knoxville Society at their quarterly meeting where they sang for the ladies and recited the Lord's Prayer in different languages. October 16th, four ladies from Washington, Pa., spent the greater part of the day at the Mission. We enjoyed their visit very much. November 9th nine girls went to Knoxville for the Thank Offering service and told the story of Job, Solomon, Noah, Sampson and recited the Beautitudes. Sixteen girls went to the First Church the Sabbath before Christmas and took part on their program of Christmas exercises. The first Wednesday in February, five girls went to squirrel Hill and gave some Christmas poems.

April 15th, 12 children gave a short dialogue at the Knoxville Home Missionary meeting. Fourteen of the older boys and girls attended a musical at the First Church which was given for the benefit of the Children's Home at High Point. The children have sold \$6.46 stamps for the China relief.

We have a few of the children with us that started when the Mission opened. One of these girls told me the other day that she was going to get a prize this year at school for good behaviour and faithfulness and good work, due, she says, to the influence of the Mission. Any one visiting the Mission when it began and now can see the change. These people do not express themselves very often or we would have quite a number of testimcnies of good that the Mission has done in the past.

We gave a Christmas to 275, counting mothers, working girls and big boys and all.

Miss Mary Marshall and Mrs. McCracken gave a very delightful Haliow-c'en party to 14 of the older girls. We gave potted plants to the larger scholars for Easter and four dozen baskets to the children. The baskets were donated and made by Miss Hornacker's class from the Knoxville church. The boys classes have been out on several hikes and Mrs. Gordon has planned to take all the boys over 8 years of age to the Carnegie Institute next Sabbath for a story hour.

Several of the larger boys have been over to this church for services.

May 7th, twelve girls spent a half day in the woods, guests of the girls' society, Grace M. P. Church, Sharpsburg. They had such a delightful time that they ask every day when are they going again..

The Mission looks very beautiful now. We have our new lights and new wall paper and paint, so come out and see us before the mill smoke takes the shine off

Motion to ask for some space as hertofore in the Missionary Record, car-

ried.

If the memorial from North Carolina asking that manual be printed for the Home and Foreign Missionary Societies is approved by the W. F. M. S., we concur in the same and recommend that the matter be left in the hands of the Central Committee.

Motion prevailed that proceeds of all Perpetual Membership dues be deposited in a separate fund by our W. H. M. S. Treasurer, the interest of which is to be credited to the dues of the Branches holding these memberships.

Resolved, That Miss Marguerite Shamp be continued at Pine Ridge at

same salary as last year.

That the selection of teacher to take the place of Miss Caudle be left with superintendent.

That Miss Mary Land be continued at same solary at Pine Ridge.

That we recommend the employment of Mr. Watson and that his salary be supplemented during vacation from the Expense Fund.

The Lockhart school proposition was quite a problem because we had no money to finance it and after many discussions we decided to ask the board of education to take it over. A committee was sent to Westminster to meet the board of education, and after hearing the committee they were favorable to taking the work and at a later meeting voted they were ready to take the Lockhart school work over.

A number of meetings were held through the year. The committee kept in close touch with the work. Dr. Woodford's work and progress at Pine Ridge was highly commended, and his continued presence at Pine Ridge was

unanimously requested.

Whereas, The General Conference in its session at Greensboro, N. C., May 21-28, 1920, authorized the establishment of a school for colored people in Texas, and

Whereas, The matter of this proposed colored school was placed in the

hands of the Woman's Home Missionary Society, and

Whereas, The Woman's Home Missionary Society, because of other finan-

cial obligations, found it difficult to promote this school, therefore,

The Woman's Home Missionary Society, in annual session in Pittsburgh, 'a., May 12-14, affirms the action of its Central Committee and transfers the proposed school to the board of education of the Methodist Protestant Church and authorizes that all monies in hand for this school be transferred to this board and property in Lockhart, Texas, be sold under the direction of the board of education and the funds placed in the treasury of this board to be used in the purchase of a new site at San Antonio, Texas.

## REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND MORAL REFORM

"Go ye into all the world." The gospel of temperance is a message of healing and mercy to the world. If we cannot preach it in Christ's name we should not preach it at all. If we can preach it in Christ's name we should preach it wherever the curse of intemperance is found.

The past year has been the most productive of moral reform in our national history. Prohibition is now firmly entrenched in the Constitution and the hearts of the people In only one year of its enforcement it has proved its value. Jails have been depopulated to such an extent that in some sections of the country the prison buildings have had to be rented for other purposes than that for which they had been erected; and jailors, sheriffs, constables, and others who were largely dependent upon the proceeds of fines for intoxication have had to seek outside positions because of the vast decrease in drunkenness. There are fewer inmates in the alcoholic wards of hospitals and charitable institutions than there have been in the last fifty years. The beneficial effects of prohibition are so far reaching that it would be impossible to tell them all. The ratification of the 19th Amendment should be productive of great good. The scope of women's activities is greatly broadened through the offices of this amendment, and already plans are being made. The greatest fields for the efforts of the women of America lie in the following direction: All public officers should be held to the standard of their oath of office. Reverence for law should be instilled in the breasts of every loyal and patriotic American. I am sure we all heartily favor the strictest kind of law enforcement. The protection of the American flag and all consular service should be withdrawn from any citizen of the United States who goes into a foreign country to do that which is outlawed in our own lard. An anti-gambling crusode should be inaugurated. We cannot have a great United States and an honorable people if we permit the spreading of the gambling mania through our nation. Anti-prize fighting movements should receive our commendation and support. Our boys saw enough scenes of blood and fields of carnage dur-

ing the war without still further brutalizing manhood by turning bruising and blood letting into a sport This sort of an education will turn our youth away from the higher ideals of their manhood to the lower level of the brute. The motion picture industry is one that has grown to monstrous proportions during the last decade. Motion picture shows should feature the beautiful, clean home life of America and not display the looseness and immorality that winds up in divorce courts. The motion picture industry could be made one of the greatest powers for good in all the land. Strict censorship should be endorsed. An educational campaign against use of doped cigarettes should be forwarded. The laws that are at present upon our statute books relating to the sale of tobacco to minors should strictly be enforced, and the heaviest penalties possible should be meted out to those dealers who disregard these laws. Robt. Fulton was called a fool from one end of the country to the other for sticking to his ideal of propelling a boat by steam. Any person who is not willing to be called a fool for sticking to his ideals surely is not deserving of success. There is no movement more widely ridiculed in the whole world than the present movement for the re-establishment of the American Sabbath. I thank God that there have been and are men who have the courage to stand for their ideals in the face of the ridicule the press of the country is pouring out on the Godly men who are standing out for a clean American Sabbath. I am sure we all agree with the United States Supreme Court, when it unanimously declared on February 29, 1892, that "This is a Christian Nation" and with the help of Almighty God, we women will help to keep it so. Further recommend that literature on temperance and moral reform be placed on the literature table of each Branch Auxiliary.

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
