FOREWORD

With the issuance of *Crime in the United States—1980*, we in law enforcement reflect on the decade of the 70s with mixed emotions. It would appear that the concerted efforts of law enforcement at all levels of government have yet to find a panacea in the fight against crime.

The decade saw a 50-percent increase in crimes reported to law enforcement as measured by the Crime Index. There were only 2 years—1972 and 1977—when we experienced a respite; all other years were characterized by increases.

Students of the crime problem have pointed to various reasons for the growth in reported crime during the last 10-year period. Among these were a higher sensitivity on the part of the public in reporting crimes that were heretofore unreported, an economic situation conducive to the commission of crime, and a lowering of the threshold of risk in being prosecuted for the commission of a crime. While these or other reasons may explain that 50-percent increase, the fact still remains that our society was and is faced with a burdensome social problem. Crime is a major concern; its reduction has to be a national responsibility. If we are to enter the decade of the 80s with the legacy of the 70s, then the task of law enforcement becomes even more onerous. As shown by the phenomenon of the past 10 years, law enforcement alone cannot cope with this grave social ill.

It is evident that no one segment of the government or the public-at-large has the answer to crime reduction. Each of us must take an active interest in this problem and support those institutions constitutionally charged with protecting and defending the citizen-at-large. Only through the efforts of the Nation as a whole will we curb the tide of crime.

CRIME FACTORS

The presence of crime in our Nation is a matter of serious concern not only to the law enforcement profession, but to society at large. Historically, the causes and origins of crime have been the subjects of investigation by many disciplines. While no definitive conclusions have yet been reached, a number of factors affecting the volume and type of crime that occurs from place to place have been delineated. Some of these are as follows:

- Population density and size of locality and its surrounding area.
- Variations in composition of the population, particularly age structure.
- Stability of population with respect to residents' mobility and transient factors.
- Economic conditions, including job availability.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Climate.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Attitudes of citizenry toward crime.
- Crime reporting practices of citizenry.

The Uniform Crime Reports give a nationwide view of crime based on police statistics contributed by state and local law enforcement agencies. Population size is the only correlate of crime utilized in this publication. While the other factors listed above are of equal concern, no attempt is made to relate them to the data presented. The reader is, therefore, cautioned against comparing statistical data of individual communities, counties, or colleges and universities solely on the basis of their population or student enrollment.

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SECTION I

SUMMARY OF THE UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

On September 1, 1980, the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program marked its 50th year within the FBI. Local, county, and state law enforcement agencies nationwide have throughout these years voluntarily provided the UCR Program with information on the offenses known to them. While in its first year (1930), the Program enlisted the cooperation of 400 cities in 43 states, representing approximately 20 million inhabitants; participants currently number in excess of 15,000 and represent a population of over 220 million. Through the last 5 decades, these agencies' data, aggregated at the national level under the auspices of the UCR Program, have gauged and measured the fluctuations in crime. While many technical improvements have occurred, the Program's foremost objective remains the same—the generation of a reliable set of criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management. The use of UCR data has also expanded, and the statistics have become a valuable research source for a myriad of constituents—sociologists, legislators, municipal planners, scholars, the press, and criminal justice practitioners. The general public, too, has become increasingly interested in the periodic assessments of crime in the Nation.

Historical Background

The Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) was formed in 1927 to create a viable system of uniform police statistics. This task was not an easy one, for it was not possible to merely cumulate state statistics to obtain a national data set. Rather, to provide nationwide uniformity in the reporting of data, standardized definitions were formulated to overcome the variances in definitions of criminal offenses in different sections of the country. From a study of these variances among state codes and an evaluation of the recordkeeping practices in use, the Committee in 1929 finalized a plan for crime reporting which became the foundation of the UCR Program.

Without regard for local statutes, reporting agencies would be required to submit their data in accordance with the UCR definitions of offenses as set forth in Appendix II of this publication. Because of variances in punishment for the same offenses in different state codes, there was no

possibility in such a program to distinguish between felony and misdemeanor crimes.

Through the voluntary and cooperative efforts of a multitude of agencies, the implementation of UCR in 1930 was successful. In that same year, Congress enacted legislation under Title 28, Section 534, of the United States Code authorizing the Attorney General to gather crime information. He, in turn, designated the FBI to serve as the national clearinghouse for data collected by the Program. Since that time, data based on uniform classifications and procedures for reporting have been obtained from the Nation's law enforcement agencies.

In an effort to provide as complete a picture of crime in the United States as possible, the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the IACP chose to obtain data on offenses that come to the attention of law enforcement agencies, since these data were more readily available than any other reportable crime information. Seven offenses, because of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and likelihood of being reported to law enforcement, were initially selected to serve as an Index for evaluating fluctuations in the volume of crime. These crimes, known as the Crime Index offenses, were murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. By congressional mandate, arson was added as the eighth Index offense in late 1978.

Acting in an advisory capacity concerning the operation of the UCR Program through its Committee on Uniform Crime Records, the IACP remains a vital link between local police departments and the FBI. The National Sheriffs' Association (NSA) in June, 1966, established a Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting to serve in an advisory role to the NSA membership and the national UCR Program. This Committee actively encourages sheriffs throughout the country to fully participate in the Program.

Also active in promoting interest in the UCR Program are committees on Uniform Crime Reporting within state law enforcement associations. These committees foster widespread and more intelligent use of uniform crime statistics and lend assistance to contributors when the need exists.

Methods of Data Collection

UCR Program contributors compile and submit their crime data by one of two means: either directly to the FBI or through their state UCR Programs. Those which submit directly to the FBI are provided, on an individual basis, continuing guidance and support from the national Program.

Presently, there are 44 operational state-level UCR Programs which have been very effective in the attainment of increased coverage of law enforcement agencies due to state mandatory reporting requirements. These agencies are also able to provide more direct and frequent service to participating law enforcement agencies and to make information more readily available for use at the state level. These state-level agencies have contributed to more streamlined operations at the national level.

With the development of a state UCR Program, the FBI ceases direct collection of data from individual law enforcement agencies within the state. Instead, completed information from these agencies is forwarded to the national Program through the state data collection agency.

The conditions under which these systems are developed ensure consistency and comparability in the data submitted to the national Program, as well as provide for regular and timely reporting of national crime data. These conditions are: (1) The state Program must conform to the national Uniform Crime Reports' standards, definitions, and information required. These requirements, of course, do not prohibit the state from collecting other statistical data beyond the national collection. (2) The state criminal justice agency must have a proven, effective, mandatory, statewide Program and have instituted acceptable quality control procedures. (3) Coverage within the state by a state agency must be, at least, equal to that attained by national Uniform Crime Reports. (4) The state agency must have adequate field staff assigned to conduct audits and to assist contributing agencies in record practices and crime reporting procedures. (5) The state agency must furnish to the FBI all of the detailed data regularly collected by the FBI in the form of duplicate returns, computer printouts, and/or magnetic tapes. (6) The state agency must have the proven capability (tested over a period of time) to supply all the statistical data required in time to meet national Uniform Crime Reports' publication deadlines.

To fulfill its responsibilities in connection with the UCR Program efforts, the FBI continues its internal procedures of editing and reviewing individual agency reports for both completeness and quality; has direct contact with individual contributors within the state when necessary in connection with crime reporting matters, coordinating such contact with the state agency; and upon request, conducts training programs within the state on law enforcement records and crime reporting procedures. Should circumstances develop whereby the state agency

does not comply with the aforementioned requirements, the national Program may reinstitute a direct collection of Uniform Crime Reports from law enforcement agencies within the state.

Reporting Procedures

A count of Crime Index offenses (murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson) that become known to law enforcement agencies is reported monthly. Tabulated from agency records, the figures include all reports of Index crimes, also known as Part I offenses, received from victims, officers who discovered the infractions, or other sources.

Whenever complaints of crime are determined through investigation to be unfounded or false, they are eliminated from an agency's count. The number of "actual offenses known" is reported to the FBI regardless of whether anyone is arrested for the crime, the stolen property is recovered, or prosecution is undertaken. Each month law enforcement agencies also report the total number of actual offenses cleared. Crimes are "cleared" in one of two ways: (1) at least one person is arrested, charged, and turned over to the court for prosecution; or (2) by exceptional means when some element beyond police control precludes the physical arrest of an offender. Other monthly submissions on the Index crimes include the number of clearances which involved only offenders under the age of 18; the value of property stolen and recovered in connection with the offenses; and detailed information pertaining to criminal homicide.

The age, sex, race, and ethnic origin of persons arrested are reported monthly for both Part I and Part II offenses by crime category. Part II offenses, while excluding traffic violations, include all crimes except those classified as Part I.

Various data on law enforcement officers killed or assaulted are collected on a monthly basis. Other law enforcement employee data, specifically the number of full-time sworn officers and civilian personnel, are reported as of October 31 of each calendar year.

Editing Procedures

Each report submitted to the UCR Program is thoroughly examined for arithmetical accuracy or for deviations which may indicate reporting errors, as data reliability is a matter of high priority to the Program. In an attempt to identify any unusual fluctuations in an agency's crime counts, monthly reports are compared with previous submissions by the agency or with figures for similar agencies. Large variations in crime levels may indicate modified records procedures, incomplete reporting, or a change in the agency's geopolitical structure.

Noted deviations or arithmetical adjustments are brought to the attention of the state Program or the submitting agency through correspondence. A standard procedure of the FBI is to study the monthly reports and

to evaluate periodic trends prepared for individual reporting units. Any significant increase or decrease is made the subject of a special inquiry. The communications containing these inquiries specifically direct attention to possible discrepancies in the records or in their reporting procedures. When it is found that crime reporting procedures or annexations are in part responsible for the difference in the level of crime, the figures for specific crime categories, or if necessary, totals are excluded from the trend tabulations.

In addition to its internal data verification practices, the UCR Program attempts to maintain statistical validity by providing training seminars and instructional materials in UCR procedures. Throughout the country, liaison with state Program and law enforcement personnel is established and training sessions are held to explain the purpose of the Program, the rules of uniform classification and scoring, and the methods of assembling the information for reporting. When an individual agency has specific problems in compiling its crime statistics and remedial efforts are unsuccessful, FBI Headquarters' personnel may visit the contributor to aid in resolving the difficulties.

As a further aid, contributing agencies are supplied with the *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook* which details procedures for classifying and scoring offenses. Also, since a good records system is essential for accurate crime reporting, the FBI makes available the *Manual of Law Enforcement Records*, which serves as a guide in the establishment of a sound law enforcement records system.

To enhance communication among Program participants, the UCR "Newsletter" and State UCR Program "Bulletins" are utilized to explain revisions in the Program, as well as present information and instructional material. Newsletters are produced as needs arise.

The final responsibility for data submissions rests with the individual contributing law enforcement agency. Although the Program makes every effort through its editing procedures, training practices, and correspondence to assure the validity of the data it receives, the statistics' accuracy depends primarily on the adherence of each contributor to the established standards of reporting. Deviations from these established standards which cannot be resolved by the national UCR Program may be brought to the attention of the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the IACP or Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the NSA.

Reporting Area

One method of analyzing the statistics submitted to the UCR Program is the presentation of the data by reporting areas. Geographically, the United States is divisible by regions and divisions. Further breakdowns by city size rely on population figures and proximity to metropolitan areas.

A Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA), generally, is made up of a core city or cities with a

combined population of 50,000 or more and the surrounding county or counties which share certain metropolitan characteristics. "Other cities," most of which are incorporated, are those outside SMSAs. For crime reporting purposes, rural areas are made up of the unincorporated portions of counties outside urban places and SMSAs. As a general rule, sheriffs, county police, and many state police report crimes committed within the limits of the counties but outside cities, while local police report crimes committed within the city limits (urban places).

Certain tables within this publication present statistics relative to "suburban" areas. A suburban area consists of cities with less than 50,000 inhabitants together with counties which are within an SMSA. In this context, the core city is, of course, excluded. The concept of suburban area is especially important in a study of this nature because of the particular crime conditions which exist in the communities surrounding the Nation's largest cities.

During 1980, the law enforcement agencies active in the UCR Program represented 99 percent of the United States population living in the SMSAs, 96 percent of the population in "other cities," and 94 percent of the rural population. When considering the national population, as reported by the Bureau of the Census, the combined coverage accounted for 98 percent of the total.

The vast majority of the United States law enforcement agencies submit crime reports to the UCR Program. However, each tabular presentation in this publication shows the extent of population coverage represented by the data included.

More detailed information concerning the geographical entities used in this publication can be found in Appendix III.

Population Data

To compute crime rates for the Nation, states, SMSAs, and geographic divisions and regions, April 1, 1980, Bureau of the Census preliminary counts were used. Since final census figures were unavailable when this book went into production, the preliminary census data were employed to ensure that the crime rates would be comparable throughout all presentations and that publication could occur on a timely basis.

Offense Estimation

Tables 1 through 5 of this publication contain statistics for the entire United States. Because some law enforcement agencies do not provide data for all 12 months of a given year, estimated crime counts for such agencies are used in the above-mentioned presentations. Offense estimation occurs within each of three areas: Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas, "other cities," and rural areas. Assuming that nonreporting areas have the same proportionate crime experience as those which did furnish complete data, estimates are based on the reported crime experience of similar areas within a state.

Crime Trends

Crime trend statistics offer the data user an added perspective from which to study crime. Percent change tabulations presented in this publication are computed using only figures for reporting units which have provided comparable data for the periods under consideration. Exclusions from trend computations are made when figures from a reporting unit are not received for comparable time frames or when it is ascertained that unusual fluctuations are due to such variables as improved records procedures, annexations, etc.

Care should be exercised in any direct comparisons between data in this publication and those in prior issues of *Crime in the United States*. Valid percent changes for 2, 5, and 10 years are presented in this book's tabular portions.

Recent Developments

In January, 1980, the national UCR Program implemented changes in reporting to comply with Public Law 94-311 and the Office of Management and Budget Circular A-46, which directed any Federal agency collecting data regarding race to begin collecting ethnic origin information. The modifications affected the UCR Program's arrest and homicide reports, necessitating their expansion to include information on the ethnic origin of persons arrested and of murder victims and offenders. Not all contributors could immediately comply with this new collection effort. (The already cumbersome arrest collection forms now contained 2,542 numerical entries.) However, the response did provide adequate data for publication, and ethnic origin information appears in Section II (murder victims and offenders) and Section IV (persons arrested) of this book.

To ensure that all participants remained abreast of Program modifications affecting their reports, the *UCR Handbook* was updated to include instructions pertaining to ethnic origin and arson. Copies have been disseminated to the law enforcement community. Also released in 1980 was the *Manual of Law Enforcement Records*, a revision of the former *Manual of Police Records*. In essence, the original text has been updated to incorporate advances made in the handling of law enforcement records without tampering with the basic concepts of records management. For example, the book contains a discussion of the impact of computerization on the recordkeeping systems of small- to medium-sized agencies.

During 1979, the UCR Program initiated an analytical crime research effort, and a study was conducted to determine long-term crime and arrest patterns. In an attempt to broaden the Program's analytical capabilities, a second series of analysis, focusing on homicide, was begun in 1980. This study, the Homicide Analysis Project, is a comprehensive examination of murder victimization, characteristics of the victim and offender, and other factors. An article on the first phase of the homicide

study, which deals with the probability of murder victimization, was published in the March, 1981, issue of the "FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin."

Several years ago, the general membership of the IACP affirmatively passed a resolution to evaluate or review the national UCR Program. Behind this resolution was the Nation's law enforcement community's desire to determine the overall effectiveness and utility of the Program as it presently exists. Conceived in the 1920s and becoming operative in the 1930s, the Program has experienced various subtle changes during the intervening 50 years. However, the basic Program has remained static. In view of the broad utility which has evolved for UCR and the expanded capabilities of law enforcement to supply information related to crime, a review of the UCR Program appeared appropriate.

In order that a review, with an eye toward enhancement, would prove beneficial to all those with an interest in the crime problem, a comprehensive study would be necessary and would require considerable resources. The Bureau of Justice Statistics, recognizing its role in the broad spectrum of national criminal justice statistics, has agreed to underwrite this project. Presently, the development of a comprehensive review of the Program is in its seminal stages. The success of the undertaking will depend on the cooperative spirit of all law enforcement, as well as that of UCR data users.

The Fifth National State UCR Conference was held from June 15-18, 1981, at the FBI Academy, Quantico, Virginia. Attendees included representatives from state UCR Programs and from law enforcement agencies developing Programs within their states; members of the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the IACP and the Uniform Crime Reporting Committee of the National Sheriffs' Association; representatives from the Bureau of Justice Statistics and Bureau of Social Science Research; IACP Headquarters' staff; and members of the fire service community. Major topics of discussion were the future direction of victimization studies as they pertain to UCR; the progress of the collection of arson data; and the evaluation of the effectiveness and viability in servicing law enforcement with a 50-year-old Crime Index system.

The biennial UCR Conferences provide a forum atmosphere for the resolution of data collection problems which are national in scope. Further, the bringing together of those persons responsible for crime statistics collection within the various states allows for the free exchange of ideas.

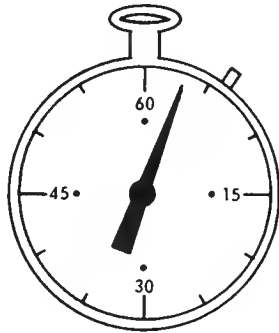
Regarding the state Programs, the total number in operation has decreased by three. The loss of these Programs was due to budgetary problems, their state governments being unwilling or unable to continue funding the UCR systems. In view of the existing economic climate, similar situations may arise in other states. The state Program concept is, however, still strong and has much support. Further, those Programs having

financial problems or having discontinued show a willingness and desire to return to their previous levels of participation as soon as possible.

On December 28, 1980, the 96th Congress of the United States passed into law the Parental Kidnaping Prevention Act. This law mandated the Attorney General to collect data on the volume of parental kidnapings occurring in the Nation during the next 3 years. Designated to collect

the data, the FBI is to compile such information and furnish it to the Attorney General. He, in turn, will report to Congress. At the present time, FBI field offices and other sources are gathering these data and providing them to the UCR Program. However, should it be determined that additional data are needed, the Program may be asked to solicit the required information from its contributors.

The crime clock should be viewed with care. Being the most aggregate representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the Index Offenses. This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of the Part I Offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

SECTION II

CRIME INDEX OFFENSES REPORTED

MURDER AND NONNEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER

DEFINITION

Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, is the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

The classification of this offense, as for all other Crime Index offenses, is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Not included in the count for this offense classification are deaths caused by negligence, suicide, or accident; justifiable homicides, which are the killings of felons by law enforcement officers in the line of duty or by private citizens; and attempts to murder or assaults to murder, which are scored as aggravated assaults.

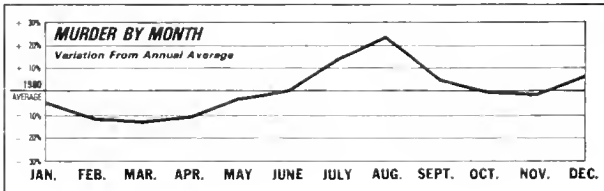

Volume

There were an estimated 23,044 murders in the United States during 1980. These offenses represented approximately 2 percent of the total violent crimes committed.

An overall view of the four regions of the Nation disclosed that the most populous, the Southern States, accounted for 42 percent of the murders. The Western States reported 21 percent; the North Central States recorded 20 percent; and the Northeastern States, 17 percent.

Murder offenses occurred more frequently during August than in any other month of 1980.

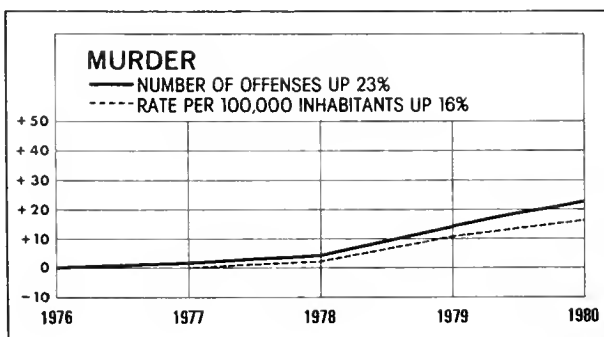


Trend

When comparing 1980 to 1979, the number of murders jumped 7 percent nationally, with the increase extending into all regions, population groups, and areas. The increase in murder volume was reflected regionally by a rise of 15 percent in the Western States; 8 percent in the Northeastern States; 5 percent in the Southern States; and 4 percent in the North Central States.

The volume of murder offenses rose in the suburban areas by 11 percent and in cities with 250,000 or more inhabitants by 8 percent. Rural areas experienced an upswing of 5 percent in the volume of murders.

The following chart reveals an increase of 23 percent nationally in the murder counts from 1976 to 1980.



Rate

Nationally, an average of 10 of every 100,000 United States inhabitants were murder victims in 1980.

The number of murder victims in relation to population was highest in the Southern States with 13 murders per 100,000 inhabitants, a 1-percent rate increase over the previous year. The Western States' rate was 11 per 100,000, an 11-percent rise over the 1979 rate. Both the North Central and Northeastern Regions experienced rates of 8 per 100,000 population; however, the Northeast's rate represented an 8-percent increase and the North Central Region's rate a rise of 3 percent.

Collectively, the SMSAs reported a murder rate of 12 victims per 100,000 inhabitants; the rural areas recorded a rate of 7 per 100,000 inhabitants; and cities outside metropolitan areas (Other Cities) registered a murder rate of 6 per 100,000 inhabitants.

Nature

For each murder reported to the UCR Program, contributing agencies provide supplemental information which is more extensive than for the other Index crimes. Submitted monthly, the data consist of the age, sex, race, and ethnic origin of both victims and offenders; the types of weapons used; the relationships of victims to the offenders; and the circumstances surrounding the murders.

Approximately 77 percent of the murder victims in 1980 were males. An average of 53 of every 100 victims were White, 42 were Black, and 4 were persons of other races.

As depicted in the following tables, 17,559 offenders were identified in connection with murders of 15,648 victims during the year. Ninety-four percent of those killed were slain in single-victim situations; 13,028 by single offenders and 1,605 by more than one assailant. Also slain were 792 persons by 349 offenders in situations where there were multiple victims and single offenders. Concerning homicides involving multiple victims/multiple offenders, 223 persons were slain by 244 assailants.

As in recent years, firearms were the dominant weapons used in the commission of murders throughout the United States during 1980. The accompanying chart illustrates the number of murder offenses in the Nation for which the types of weapons used were reported to the UCR Program. Firearms were the weapons used in 68 percent of the murders in the Southern States; in 63 percent of those in the North Central States; in 58 percent of those in the Western States; and in 54 percent of those in the Northeastern States. Sixty-two percent of the murders nationwide were committed by the use of firearms. Of all murders, 50 percent were by handguns, 7 percent by shotguns, and 5 percent by rifles.

Of weapons other than firearms used in the commission of murders reported in 1980, 19 percent were cutting or stabbing instruments. Geographically, the Northeastern States reported the use of these instruments in 24 percent of the murders committed within that region. In the Western States, these types of weapons were employed in 21 percent of the murders, while both the Southern and North Central States reported their use in 17 percent.

Nationwide, other dangerous weapons such as blunt instruments, poison, explosives, etc., were used in 13 percent of the murders. Personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.) accounted for the remaining 6 percent.

As has been noted in prior issues of this publication, criminal homicide is primarily a societal problem over which law enforcement has little or no control. Supporting this statement is the fact that 51 percent of the murders committed in 1980 were perpetrated by relatives or

persons acquainted with the victims. Sixteen percent of these killings were within family relationships, one-half of which involved spouse killing spouse.

Arguments resulted in 45 percent of all murders, while 18 percent occurred as a result of felonious activities such as robbery, rape, etc. Seven percent were suspected to be the result of some felonious activity.

The accompanying table shows murder circumstances/motives for the past 5 years.

An examination of murder statistics for the past 5 years shows a slight decrease in the use of firearms as weapons. In 1976, firearms were used in 64 percent of all murders, while 62 percent of all murders in 1980 were perpetrated with these weapons. An analysis of weapons used in criminal homicides for 1976 through 1980 is shown in tabular form.

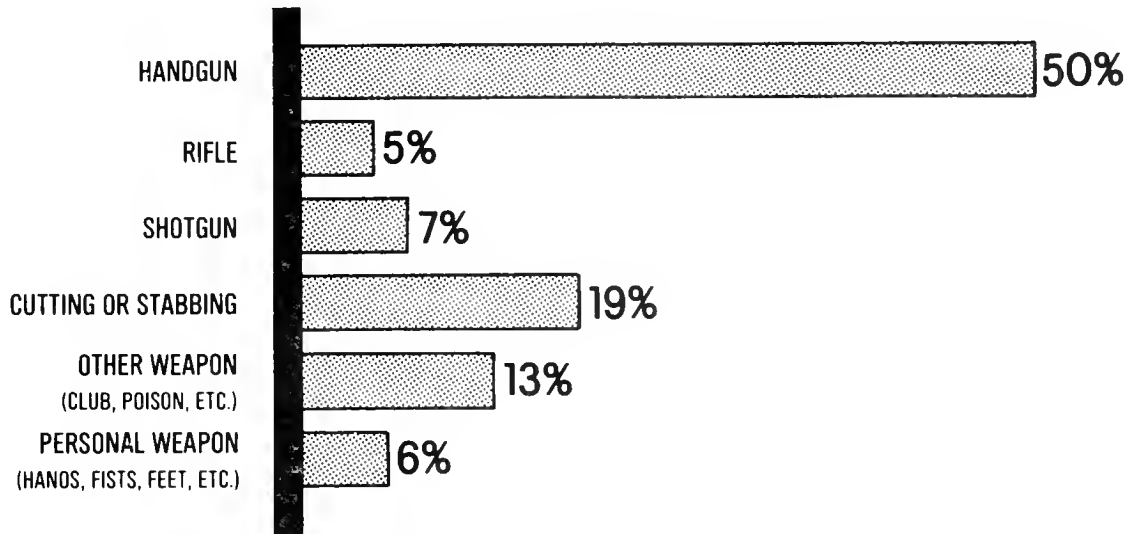

Clearances

The clearance rate for murder in 1980 was higher than for any other Crime Index offense. Nationwide, law enforcement agencies were successful in clearing 72 percent of the murders occurring in their jurisdictions.

City law enforcement agencies cleared 72 percent of the murders during the year, while those in suburban and rural areas cleared 71 and 81 percent, respectively. In 1980, persons under 18 years of age accounted for 5 percent of the willful killings cleared by law enforcement in cities and rural areas; 6 percent of those cleared in suburban areas involved only persons in that age group.

Persons Arrested

During the period 1976-1980, murder arrests for persons under 18 years of age increased less than 1 percent, while adult arrests for this offense rose 5 percent. In 1980, of all persons arrested for murder, 45 percent were under 25 years of age, with 9 percent of the total being 17 or younger. The 18- to 24-year age group showed the greatest involvement in this offense, accounting for 35 percent of the total 1980 murder arrests.

Whites comprised 51 percent of the total arrestees for murder in 1980; Blacks made up 48 percent; and the remainder were of other races. The collection of statistics regarding ethnic origin was initiated in 1980; and according to the data reported to the UCR Program, 25 percent of the juvenile arrestees, 15 percent of the adult arrestees, and 16 percent of the total arrestees were of Hispanic ethnicity.

FORCIBLE RAPE

DEFINITION

Forcible rape, as defined in the Program, is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are not included in this category.

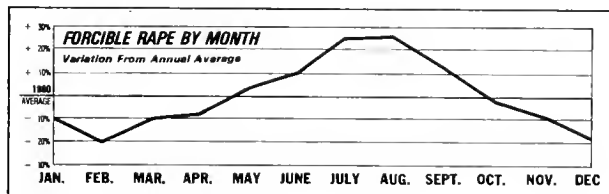

Volume

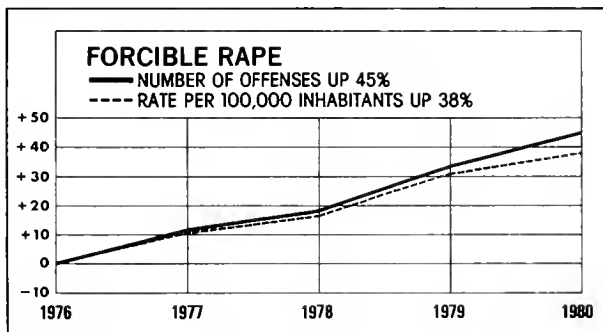
An estimated 82,088 forcible rapes came to the attention of law enforcement in 1980. Duplicating the experience of past years, forcible rape again accounted for 6 percent of the volume of violent crimes and less than 1 percent of the total Crime Index. Geographically, the Southern States, the region with the largest population, recorded 35 percent of the forcible rape volume; the Western States accounted for 27 percent; the North Central States recorded 22 percent; and the Northeastern States, 16 percent.

The accompanying chart indicates that more forcible rapes occurred in the summer months than during any other time of the year. The greatest number were recorded in August, after which the volume continuously dropped through the end of the year. Although the least incidence of forcible rape was recorded in February, December's volume was nearly as low.



Trend

Final 1980 national statistics revealed that reported forcible rape offenses were up 8 percent over 1979 figures and 45 percent over the 1976 volume. Accounting for 39 percent of the forcible rapes, cities with populations over 250,000 reported a 5-percent volume increase for the year. Cities having 1,000,000 or more inhabitants showed the only decrease in the volume of forcible rapes in 1980—a 1-percent decline. Upward fluctuations in forcible rapes were recorded for the suburban areas (up 11 percent) and the rural areas (up 10 percent) as well as all regions. The Southern States, the most populous region, experienced an 11-percent rise; the Western States, a 10-percent increase; the Northeastern States, a 4-percent rise; and the North Central States, a 3-percent upturn.



Rate

By Uniform Crime Reporting definition, the victims of forcible rape are always female. In 1980, an estimated 71 of every 100,000 females in the country were reported rape victims, a 6-percent rate increase over 1979. Since 1976, the forcible rape rate has risen 38 percent.

In 1980, the female forcible rape rate increased to 85 victims per 100,000 females in the SMSAs and to 40 per 100,000 females in cities outside metropolitan areas (Other Cities). In the rural areas, this rate remained the same as last year's—30 per 100,000 females. On a regional basis, 101 per 100,000 females in the West were forcible rape victims. In the South the female forcible rape rate was 75; in the North Central States, 59; and in the Northeastern States, 53.

Nature

Of all reported offenses in this category during 1980, 77 percent were rapes by force. Attempts or assaults to commit forcible rape comprised the remainder. Even with the advent of rape crisis centers and an improved awareness by police dealing with rape victims, forcible rape, a violent crime against the person, is still recognized as one of the most underreported of all Index crimes. Victims' fear of their assailants and their embarrassment over the incidents are just two factors which can override their decisions to contact law enforcement.

Clearances

Forty-nine percent of known forcible rapes in the Nation were cleared by arrest or exceptional means in 1980. The rural areas recorded a 62-percent clearance rate; the suburban areas, a 49-percent clearance rate; and cities, a 48-percent rate. Of the total clearances for forcible rape, the Nation as a whole recorded 9 percent involving only persons under the age of 18. The cities and suburban areas each had 10 percent involving that age group, while the rural areas reported 8 percent.

Persons Arrested

Total forcible rape arrests in 1980 were up less than 1 percent from 1979, while an 18-percent increase was evident from 1976. Arrests of persons under 18 years of age for this offense increased 3 percent from 1976; and adult arrests climbed 21 percent for the same time period.

Fifty-four percent of the forcible rape arrests in 1980 were of males under the age of 25, with 29 percent of the arrestees in the 18- to 22-year age group. Fifty-one percent of the persons arrested for forcible rape in 1980 were White, 48 percent were Black, and all other races comprised the remainder. Eleven percent of forcible rape arrestees in 1980 were Hispanic.

ROBBERY

DEFINITION

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

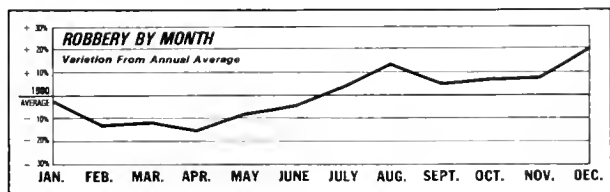

Volume

Comprising 4 percent of the total Crime Index and 42 percent of the crimes of violence, an estimated total of 548,809 robberies during 1980. They occurred most frequently in the second half of the year, the highest volume being in December.

The Northeastern States experienced the highest proportion of robberies, 32 percent of the total. The Southern States followed with 27 percent; the Western States reported 22 percent; and the North Central States accounted for the remainder.

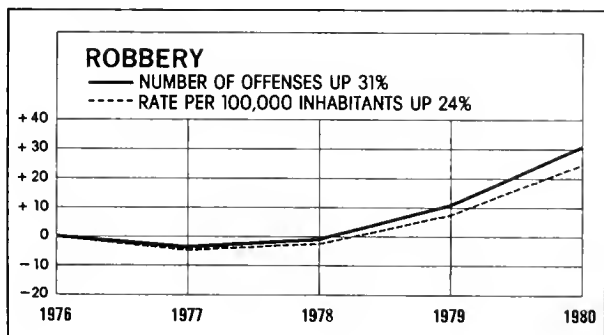


Trend

The volume of robbery increased 18 percent over the previous year and 31 percent over the 1976 experience. Cities over 250,000 in population and the suburban areas each reported 19-percent rises in robbery offenses in 1980 as compared with their 1979 volumes. An increase was also recorded by the rural areas, 9 percent.

Geographically, all four regions experienced an upsurge in robbery from 1979 to 1980. In the Southern States the increase was 20 percent; in the Northeastern States, 19 percent; in the Western States, 18 percent; and in the North Central States, 11 percent.

The accompanying chart depicts the trend in the volume of robbery, as well as the robbery rate, for the years 1976-1980.



Rate

In 1980, the robbery rate was 244 per 100,000 inhabitants, up 15 percent from the 1979 rate. That robbery is primarily a large-city crime is illustrated by the fact that during 1980, 7 out of 10 occurred in cities with populations of 100,000 or more. The robbery rate for these cities was 664 per 100,000 people.

SMSAs recorded a robbery rate of 319 per 100,000 inhabitants for the year. In cities outside metropolitan areas (Other Cities), the rate was 65 robbery offenses per 100,000 population, and in the rural areas, it was 23 per 100,000 inhabitants.

Regionally, robbery occurred most frequently in the Northeastern States, where the rate was 363 per 100,000 inhabitants. The rate per 100,000 inhabitants for the Western States was 278; for the Southern States, 199; and for the North Central States, 176.

Nature

The value of property stolen during robberies in 1980 was an estimated \$333 million, with an average loss per incident of \$607. However, the impact of this violent crime on its victims cannot be measured in terms of monetary loss alone. While the object of a robbery is to obtain money or property, the crime always involves force or threat of force and many victims suffer serious personal injury.

More than half of the robberies reported in 1980 were perpetrated on the streets or highways; the average loss for this type of robbery was \$399. Among the various categories, bank robbery, which comprised less than 2 percent of all robberies, registered the highest average loss, \$2,784.

All types of robbery increased in volume from 1976 to 1980. Bank robberies jumped 71 percent; convenience store holdups rose 47 percent; street robberies climbed 45 percent; gas or service station holdups increased 5 percent; and robberies of other commercial or business establishments rose 20 percent. Residential robberies increased 17 percent for the 5-year period.

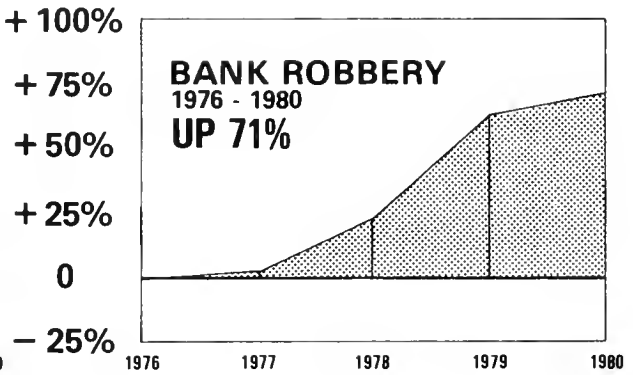
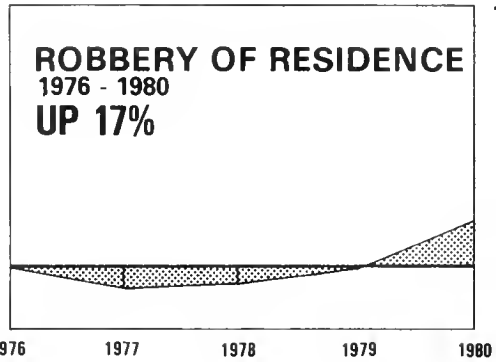
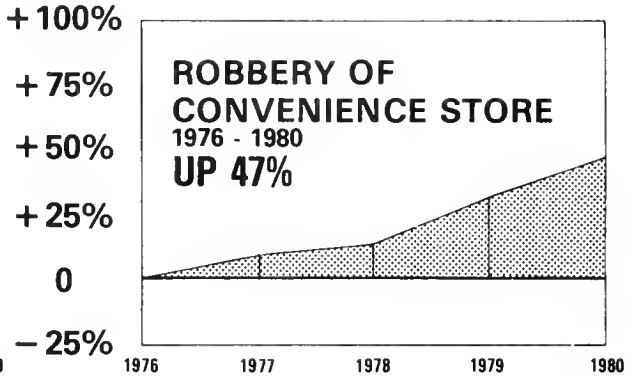
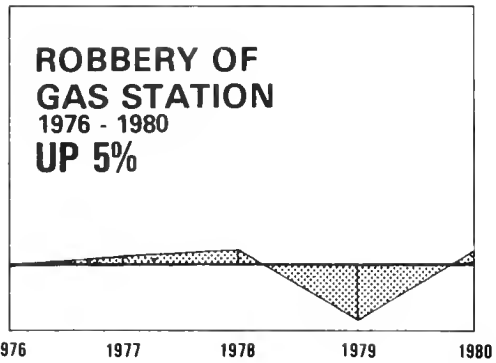
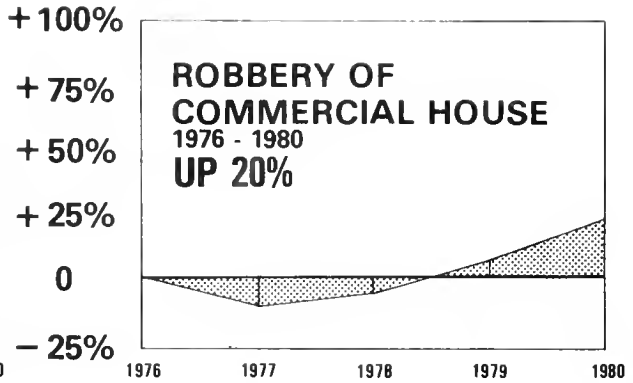
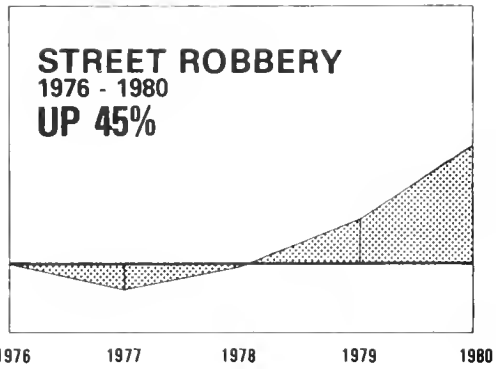

Clearances

Nationally, 24 percent of the robbery offenses reported to law enforcement were cleared during 1980. Rural law enforcement agencies were successful in clearing 40 percent of the robbery offenses reported to them, while those in suburban areas cleared 27 percent and those in cities, 23 percent. Of the robbery clearances reported, 19

percent in the suburban areas, 16 percent in the cities, and 11 percent in the rural areas involved only persons under 18 years of age.

Persons Arrested

Arrests for robbery rose 6 percent in 1980 as compared to 1979. Increases in the volume of arrests for these offenses were also experienced in the suburban areas and in cities, each recording 6-percent upswings. The rural areas showed the only decrease in robbery arrests, down 2 percent from the previous year.

Data on arrests disclosed that 73 percent of the persons arrested for robbery were under 25 years of age, 53 percent were under 21, and 30 percent were under 18.

An average of 7 out of every 100 persons arrested for robbery during 1980 were female. Arrests of women for this offense increased 4 percent when compared to 1979 figures.

From the standpoint of race, 58 percent of those arrested were Black, 41 percent were White, and the remainder were of other races. Fourteen percent of the robbery arrestees were Hispanic.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

DEFINITION

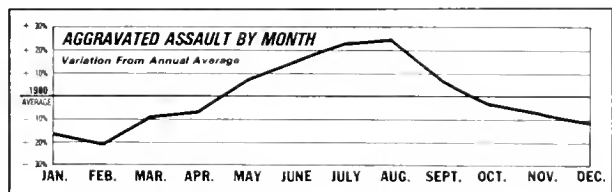
Aggravated assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Volume

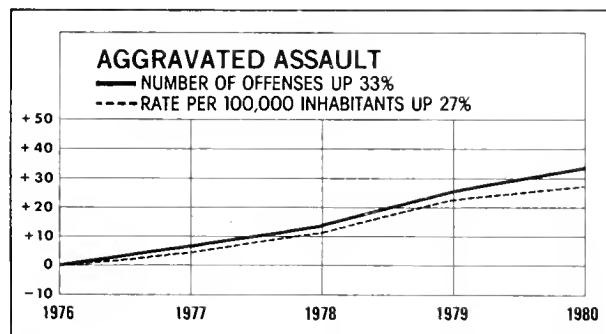
Numbering nearly 655,000, aggravated assaults comprised 5 percent of the total Crime Index and 50 percent of the crimes of violence during 1980. Geographically, the Southern States, the country's most populous region, reported 36 percent of the total count of these crimes. The Western States followed with 24 percent, while the Northeastern States and North Central States each accounted for 20 percent. As has been the experience in previous years, aggravated assaults occurred most frequently in the summer months of 1980.



Trend

Aggravated assaults increased 7 percent in volume between 1979 and 1980. Cities with 250,000 or more population recorded a 6-percent upswing, suburban areas showed a 7-percent rise, and rural areas registered a 2-percent increase.

Rises were recorded in the volume of aggravated assaults for each geographic region during the year. The increases were 9 percent in the Western and Southern States, 4 percent in the Northeastern States, and 3 percent in the North Central States.



Rate

The aggravated assault rate per 100,000 United States' inhabitants was 291 in 1980, up 4 percent from 1979 and 27 percent from 1976. For SMSAs, the rate was 328 per 100,000 inhabitants; in cities outside metropolitan areas (Other Cities), it was 262 per 100,000 inhabitants; and in rural areas, it was 137 per 100,000 inhabitants.

Of the four geographic regions, the Western States had the highest rate, 371 per 100,000. Following were the Southern States with 319; the Northeastern States with 262; and the North Central States with 220.

Nature

In 1980, 24 percent of the aggravated assaults were committed by firearms; knives or other cutting instruments were used in 22 percent; 28 percent were committed with blunt objects or other dangerous weapons; and the remaining were committed with personal weapons such as hands, fists, and feet. A comparison of 1976 and 1980 revealed that aggravated assaults committed with firearms increased 35 percent during the 5-year period. Assaults with knives or other cutting instruments rose 25 percent; assaults where blunt objects or other dangerous weapons were used increased 41 percent; and those aggravated assaults committed through the use of personal weapons climbed 32 percent. The accompanying table shows the regional experience of aggravated assault in 1980 by type of weapon used.

Clearances

During 1980, the Nation's law enforcement agencies cleared an average of 59 per 100 reported cases of aggravated assault. Ten percent of the clearances were for offenses in which no adults were involved and only persons under age 18 were identified as the assailants.

City law enforcement agencies cleared 58 percent of the aggravated assault offenses brought to their attention. Suburban and rural agencies reported 58 and 68 percent aggravated assault clearance rates, respectively. Persons under age 18 accounted for 10 percent of the city clearances, 12 percent of the suburban clearances, and 6 percent of those in the rural areas.

Persons Arrested

The number of persons arrested for aggravated assault in 1980 was nearly 260,000. The total was up less than 1 percent over the 1979 total and 17 percent above the 1976 figure. During the 5-year period 1976-1980, arrests of persons 18 years of age and over for aggravated assault rose 21 percent, while the number of arrests of persons under age 18 remained relatively stable.

Collectively, persons 21 years of age and over accounted for 70 percent of the 1980 aggravated assault arrests. Arrests of males for this offense outnumbered those of females by 7 to 1.

Whites made up 62 percent of the arrestees for aggravated assault; Blacks comprised 36 percent; and all other races accounted for the remainder. Eighty-six

percent of the arrestees were persons of non-Hispanic ethnicity.

BURGLARY

DEFINITION

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program defines burglary as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify an offense as burglary. Burglary in this Program is categorized into three subclassifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry.

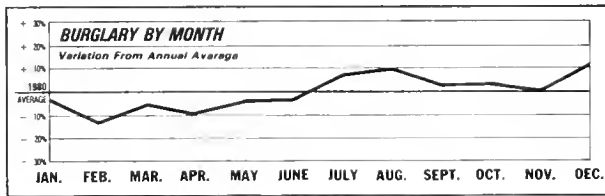

Volume

An estimated 3,759,193 burglaries occurred in the United States during 1980. These offenses made up 28-percent of the total Crime Index and 31 percent of the reported property crime.

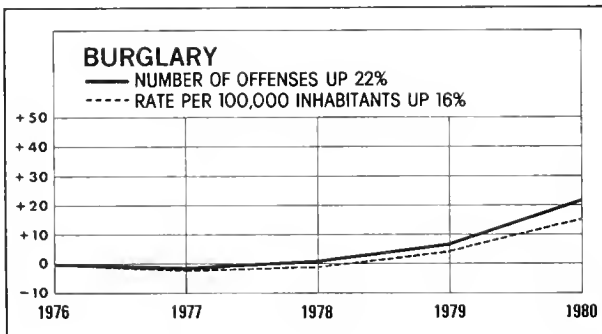
Geographically, the Southern States, the most populous region, experienced 33 percent of all reported burglaries; the Western States, 24 percent; the Northeastern States, 22 percent; and the North Central States, 21 percent.

Averages by month for 1980 showed that the burglary experience was lowest during the first half of the year and then rose during the last two quarters. December was the month with the highest reported burglary volume, while February recorded the lowest count.



Trend

Burglary offenses during 1980 rose 22 percent over the 1976 volume and 14 percent over the 1979 total. For the year, cities 250,000 and over in population and the suburban areas each reported 15-percent increases, while in the rural areas a 13-percent rise was recorded. Up-swings were registered in all regions, with the Southern States up 17 percent; the Northeastern States up 14 percent; the North Central States up 13 percent; and the Western States up 11 percent.



Rate

The 1,668 burglaries per 100,000 inhabitants reported during 1980 represented an 11-percent increase over the 1979 rate and a 16-percent rise from the 1976 experience. For 1980, the SMSAs reported a rate of 1,912 burglaries per 100,000 people, cities outside metropolitan areas (Other Cities) had a rate of 1,263 for every 100,000 in population, and the rural areas recorded a lower rate of 830 per 100,000 inhabitants.

Recording the highest 1980 burglary rate with 2,078 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants, the Western States' rate

was up 7 percent from 1979. Among the other regions, the Northeastern States' rate was 1,680, up 14 percent; the Southern States' rate was 1,657, up 11 percent; and in the North Central States, the rate of 1,371 represented a 12-percent jump.

Nature

Residential property was targeted in 67 percent of the reported burglaries during 1980; nonresidential property accounted for the remaining 33 percent. Burglaries of residences rose 19 percent over the 1979 experience, while nonresidential offenses were up 5 percent.

Seventy-three percent of the burglaries in 1980 involved forcible entry, 19 percent were unlawful entries (without force), and the remainder were forcible entry attempts.

Daytime occurrences increased 21 percent for residential property and 1 percent for the nonresidential category between 1979 and 1980. Nighttime burglaries also rose—14 percent for residential property and 2 percent for nonresidential structures.

Burglary represents a substantial financial loss. In 1980, burglary victims suffered losses estimated at \$3.3 billion. The average dollar loss per burglary was \$882.

Clearances

Adults were involved in 71 percent of all burglary offenses cleared during 1980. Only young people under 18 years of age were offenders in the remaining 29 percent.

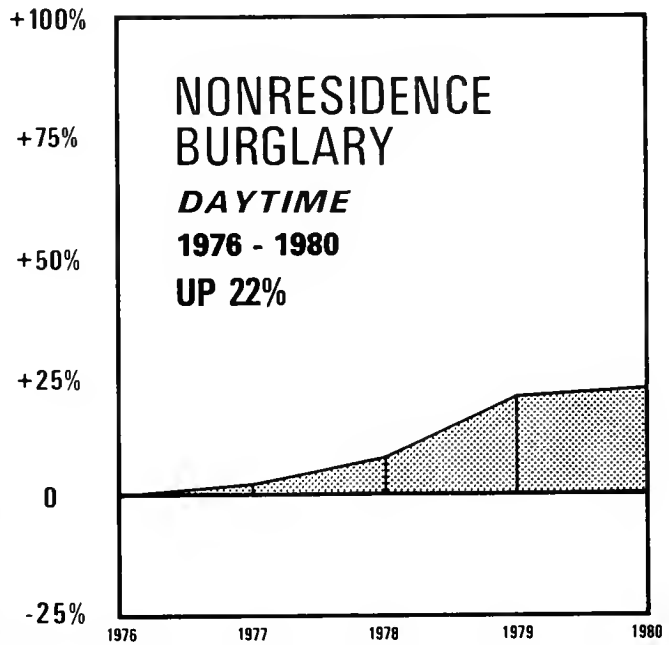
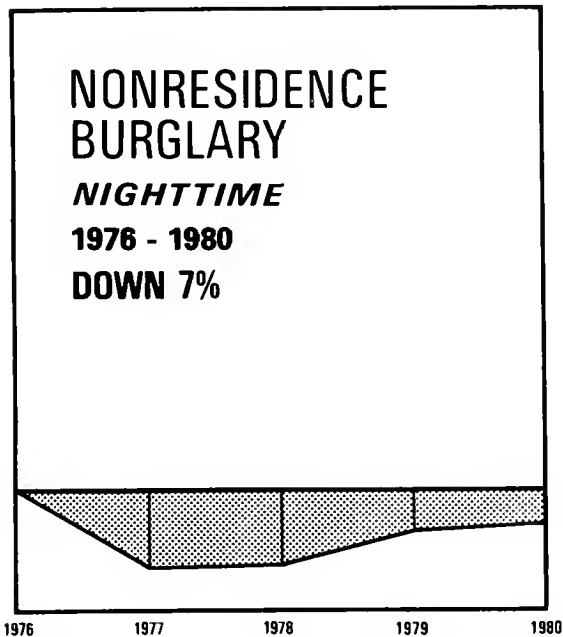
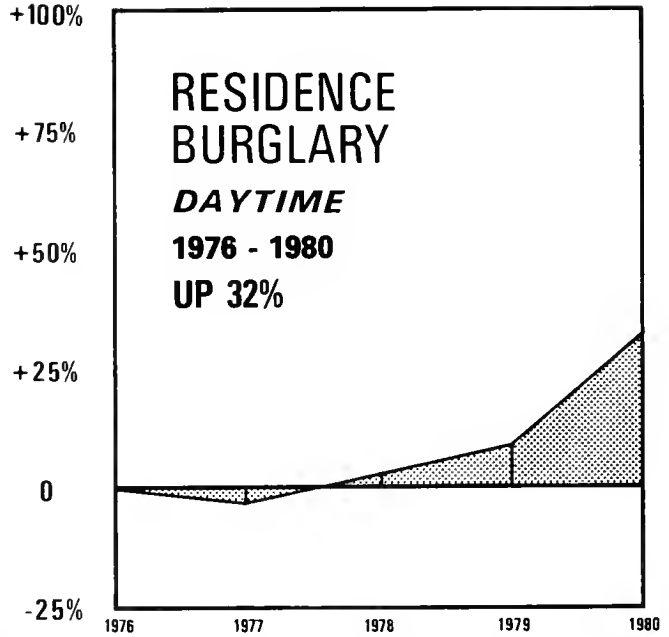
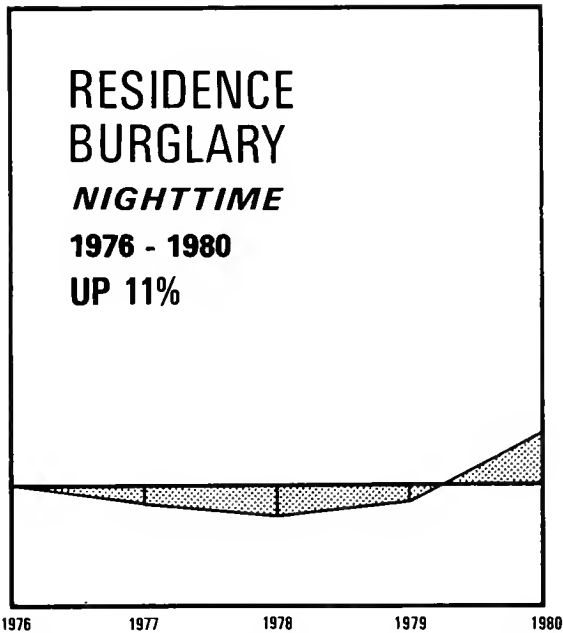
In the suburban areas, persons under age 18 accounted for 32 percent of burglary clearances; in the rural areas, they comprised 27 percent; and in cities with more than 250,000 inhabitants, they were offenders in 25 percent.

Of the burglaries reported within their jurisdictions in 1980, law enforcement agencies in rural areas cleared 17 percent; those in the suburban areas recorded a clearance rate of 15 percent; and agencies in cities with 250,000 or more inhabitants obtained clearances in 12 percent of these crimes. The national burglary clearance rate was 14 percent.

Persons Arrested

In the UCR Program, several persons may be arrested in connection with the clearance of one crime, or the arrest of one individual may clear numerous offenses. The latter is often true in cases of burglary. A comparison of arrest figures for 1976 and 1980 shows a 2-percent increase in total burglary arrests, but a 11-percent drop in arrests of persons under 18 years of age. Arrests of adults for burglary jumped 15 percent during the period.

From 1979 to 1980, burglary arrests rose 2 percent. An increase of 10 percent was seen for arrests of persons 18 years of age and over, while a decrease of 6 percent occurred for persons under the age of 18. Arrests for burglary were up 4 percent in the suburban areas and 3 percent in the Nation's cities, while they decreased 2 percent in the rural areas.



BURGLARIES OF UNKNOWN TIME OF OCCURRENCE ARE NOT INCLUDED.

Nationally in 1980, persons under 25 years of age accounted for 81 percent of all arrests for burglary, and 45 percent of all arrested for this crime were under the age of 18. An average of 6 of each 100 persons arrested for this crime during 1980 were female. Of the total burglary

arrests, Whites accounted for 70 percent, Blacks for 29 percent, and other races for the remaining 1 percent. Eighty-nine percent of the persons arrested for burglary were non-Hispanic.

LARCENY-THEFT

DEFINITION

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. In the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, this crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is also excluded from this category for crime reporting purposes inasmuch as it is a separate Crime Index offense.

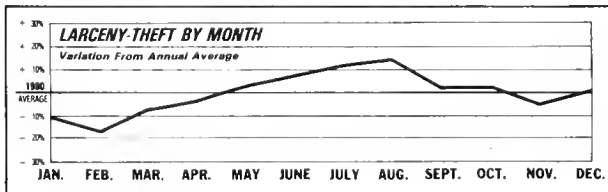

Volume

A high-volume property crime, larceny-theft totaled an estimated 7,112,657 offenses in 1980. Fifty-three percent the Crime Index total and 59 percent of the property crime total were attributable to the volume of larceny-theft.

A first-quarter rise in the volume of larceny-theft continued into the third quarter before tapering off. August was the month in which the number of larceny-thefts recorded was highest; February's count was the lowest.

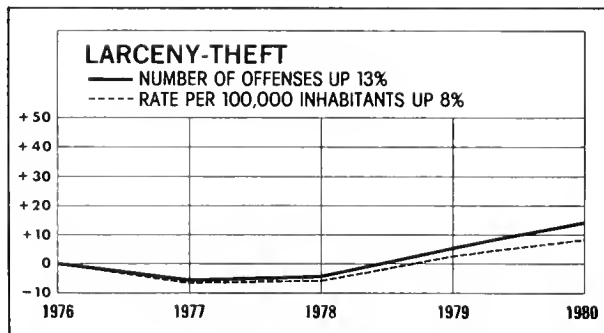
The 1980 geographic distribution of larceny-theft remained unchanged from the previous year. The Southern States, which are the most populous, reported the highest number of larceny-thefts, 31 percent of the total. The North Central States followed with 26 percent; the Western States recorded 24 percent; and the Northeastern States accounted for the remainder.



Trend

Compared to 1979 figures, the 1980 volume of larceny-thefts rose 8 percent in the Nation, as well as in all cities collectively. Cities with 250,000 to 499,999 inhabitants and cities 1,000,000 and over in population each experienced 11-percent increases. The suburban and rural areas also showed upswings, 6 percent and 12 percent, respectively.

Volume increases among the regions ranged from 10 percent in the Southern States to 5 percent in the Northeastern States. The Western States reported a 9-percent rise in larceny-thefts and the North Central States, a 7-percent upturn.



Rate

During 1980, there were 3,156 larceny-thefts per 100,000 United States' inhabitants, an increase of 6 percent from the 1979 rate and 8 percent from 1976.

The 1980 larceny-theft rate was 3,535 per 100,000 inhabitants in SMSAs; 3,519 per 100,000 inhabitants in

cities outside metropolitan areas (Other Cities); and 1,144 in the rural areas.

The Western States reported the highest 1980 larceny-theft rate with 4,002 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants, a 5-percent increase over 1979. The North Central States had a rate of 3,117, a rise of 7 percent; the Southern States' rate of 2,969 was up 6 percent; and the Northeastern States, with a rate of 2,749, reported an increase of 5 percent.

Nature

In 1980, the average value of property stolen by larceny-theft was \$307 per incident, up from \$256 in 1979. When the average value was applied to the estimated number of larceny-thefts, the loss to victims nationally was \$2.2 billion. While a portion of the goods stolen is recovered, the relatively low clearance percentage for larceny-thefts (18 percent) and the frequent absence of owner identification on recovered property indicate the overall loss due to this criminal activity is not substantially reduced. In addition, other studies have indicated many offenses in this category, particularly if the value of the stolen goods is small, never come to police attention.

The average value of goods and property reported stolen as a result of pocket-picking in 1980 was \$252; by purse-snatching, \$154; and by shoplifting, \$66. Miscellaneous thefts from buildings and thefts from motor vehicles averaged \$483 and \$341; respectively; and thefts of motor vehicle accessories resulted in average losses of \$172 per offense.

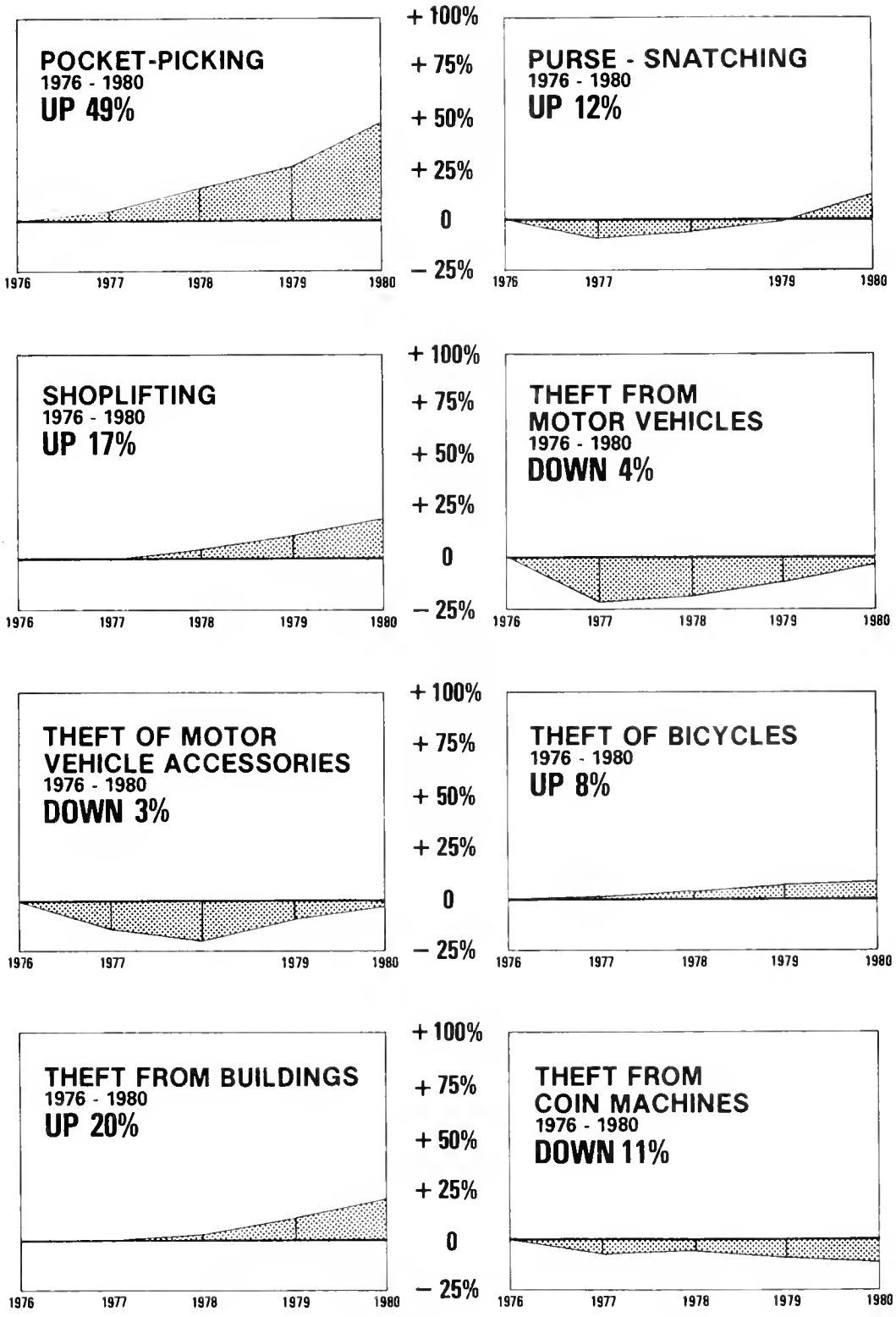
Thefts of motor vehicle parts, accessories, and contents accounted for 36 percent of the larceny-theft volume of 1980. Other major types of thefts which contributed to the large number of these crimes were those from buildings, 17 percent; shoplifting, 11 percent; and bicycles, 10 percent. The remainder was distributed among pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from coin-operated machines, and miscellaneous types of larceny-thefts. The accompanying table presents the distribution of larceny-theft by type and geographic region.

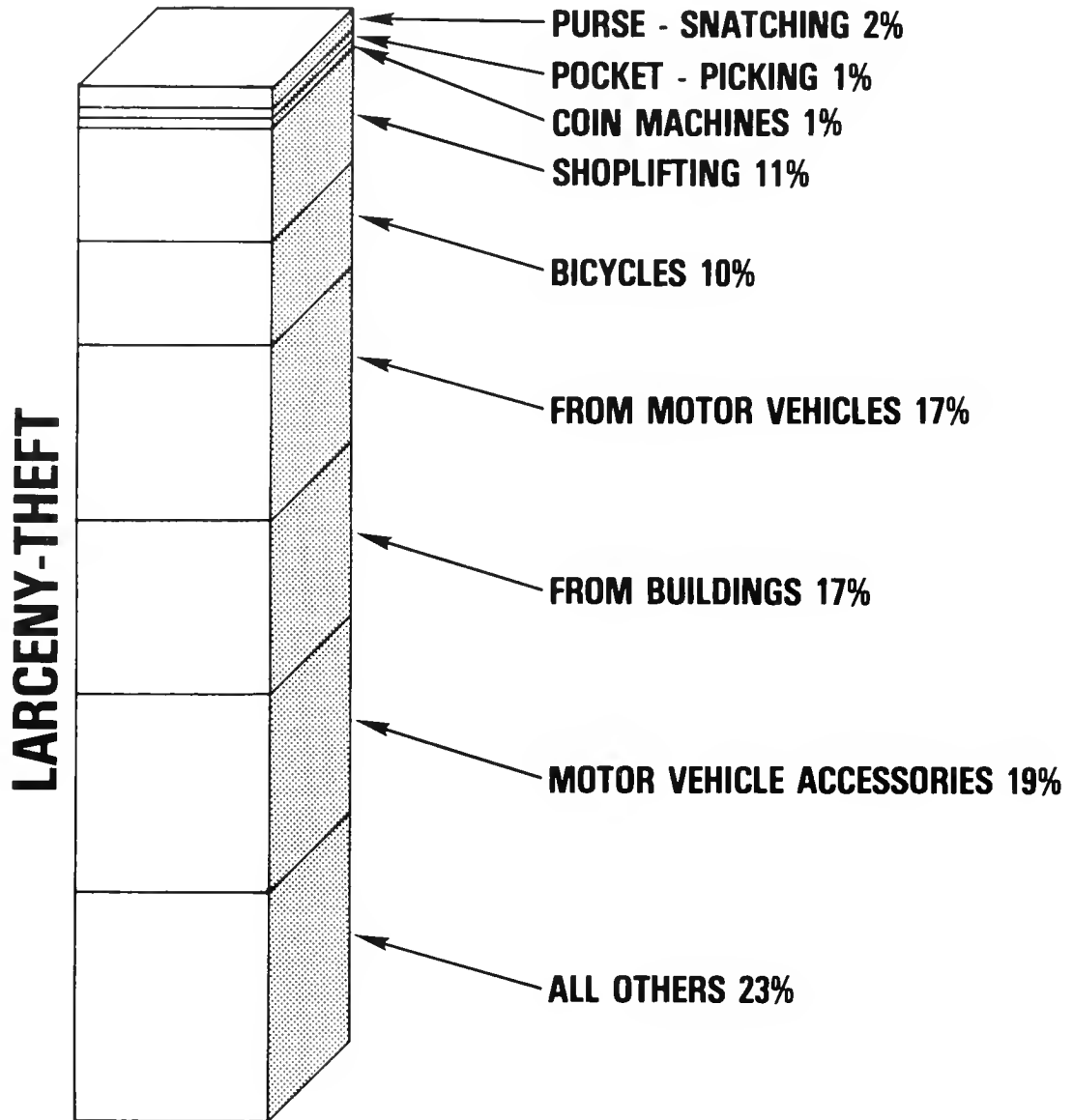

Clearances

Nationwide in 1980, 18 percent of all reported larceny-thefts were cleared. In the Nation's cities, law enforcement agencies cleared 19 percent of larceny-thefts; in the suburban areas, 17 percent; and in the rural areas, 15 percent. One of every 3 of these crimes cleared in the Nation's cities and suburban areas involved persons under 18 years of age exclusively. In the rural areas, larceny-theft clearances for this age group represented 20 percent of the total.

Persons Arrested

The total volume of larceny-theft arrests was up 8 percent during the period 1976-1980. Adult arrests increased 18 percent for this 5-year period, while those of persons under 18 years of age dropped 6 percent. Between 1979 and 1980, total larceny-theft arrests rose 2 percent,

adult arrests increased 8 percent, and arrests of persons under 18 declined 5 percent.

The larceny-theft category not only comprised the largest portion of the total Crime Index offenses reported, it also accounted for 51 percent of the total arrests for Index crimes in 1980. Fifty-five percent of these arrests were of persons under 21 years of age, and 37 percent of the arrestees were under 18. While arrests of males for larceny-theft violations increased 4 percent in 1980, arrests of females for these offenses dropped 2 percent. Females comprised 29 percent of all larceny-theft arrestees and were arrested for this offense more often than for any other in 1980. Whites accounted for 68 percent of the total larceny-theft arrests and Blacks for 31 percent. All other races made up the remainder. Ninety-one percent of the arrestees were persons of some non-Hispanic ethnicity.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

DEFINITION

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft is defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. This definition excludes the taking of a motor vehicle for temporary use by those persons having lawful access.

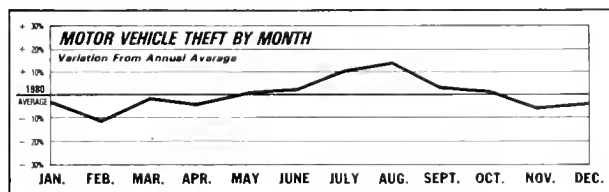

Volume

Accounting for 8 percent of all Index crimes, motor vehicle thefts totaled an estimated 1,114,651 offenses in 1980. Of these offenses, 30 percent occurred in the Northeastern States; 25 percent were reported in the Southern States; 23 percent took place in the Western States; and 22 percent were recorded in the North Central States.

A rising trend in the volume of motor vehicle thefts began in the second quarter of 1980 and continued steadily through most of the third quarter. The greatest number of motor vehicle thefts occurred in August, and the lowest was recorded in February.



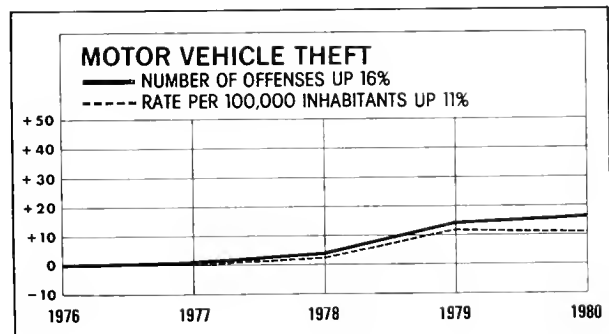
Trend

In the Nation overall, motor vehicle thefts in 1980 were up 2 percent from the previous year. Like the Nation, the cities and rural areas each recorded 2-percent increases. However, in the suburban areas, a less than 1-percent decrease was registered.

Percent changes for 1979 versus 1980 revealed a 5-percent rise in the number of motor vehicle thefts in cities 250,000 and over in population; within this population grouping, cities with 1 million or more inhabitants reported a 10-percent volume increase. Cities with populations from 100,000 to 249,999 showed relatively no change in the volume of motor vehicle thefts reported, and the remaining population groups showed decreases.

Regionally, the changes in the volume of motor vehicle thefts ranged from a 4-percent increase in the Southern States to a 4-percent drop in the North Central States. The Northeastern and Western States each reported 3-percent rises.

The accompanying chart illustrates that since 1976 the number of motor vehicle thefts nationwide has increased 16 percent.



Rate

The national motor vehicle theft rate was 495 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants in 1980, a 1-percent decrease from the 1979 rate. Compared to the 1976 experience, the rate increased 11 percent.

In 1980, 1,352 thefts per 100,000 inhabitants occurred in cities with populations over 1 million. The motor vehicle theft rate in the SMSAs was 609 per 100,000 inhabitants, while cities outside metropolitan areas (Other Cities) had a rate of 260 and the rural areas one of 134. The continuing high motor vehicle theft rates in the most heavily populated municipalities of the Nation clearly indicate this crime is primarily a large-city problem.

Geographically, the motor vehicle theft rate ranged from 678 per 100,000 inhabitants in the Northeastern States to 379 in the Southern States. While the Northeastern States' rate showed a 3-percent increase from 1979, the Southern States' rate indicated a decrease of less than 1 percent from the previous year. In the Western States, the motor vehicle theft rate of 595 offenses per 100,000 people in 1980 was down 2 percent from 1979; and in the North Central States, the rate of 416 offenses per 100,000 was down 4 percent.

An estimated average of 1 of every 143 motor vehicles registered nationally was stolen in 1980. Regionally, this rate was greatest in the Northeastern States where 12 of every 1,000 motor vehicles registered were stolen. The other three areas reported lesser rates—8 per 1,000 in the Western Region and 5 per 1,000 in both the North Central and Southern Regions.

Nature

Of all motor vehicles reported stolen during the year, 75 percent were automobiles, 13 percent were trucks or buses, and 12 percent were other types.

The average value of the vehicles when stolen was \$2,879, for an estimated total national loss of \$3.2 billion.

Clearances

Nationwide in 1980, law enforcement agencies cleared 14 percent of the motor vehicle thefts reported in their locales; those in cities cleared 13 percent; those in the suburban areas cleared 17 percent; and rural agencies cleared 31 percent. By geographic location, clearance percentages for motor vehicle theft ranged from 22

percent in the West North Central Division to 8 percent in the Middle Atlantic Division.

A high proportion of the clearances in all geographic divisions and population groups involved only persons under 18 years of age. In the suburban areas and the Nation's cities, persons in this age group accounted for 25 percent of the motor vehicle thefts cleared, and in the rural areas, they comprised 22 percent.

Persons Arrested

As in prior years, motor vehicle theft arrests primarily involved the younger segment of the Nation's population. During 1980, 65 percent of all persons arrested for motor

vehicle theft were under 21 years of age, and those under 18 accounted for 45 percent of the total.

When the total volume of arrests for this offense during 1980 was compared with that of the previous year, a decrease of 11 percent was observed. Arrests of persons under 18 were down 18 percent, while adult arrests decreased 4 percent from 1979. For all ages collectively, a 2-percent drop in motor vehicle theft arrests was evident during the period 1976-1980.

In 1980, 69 percent of motor vehicle theft arrestees were White, 29 percent were Black, and the remainder were of other races. Fifteen percent of all persons arrested for this offense were Hispanic.

ARSON

DEFINITION

Arson is defined by the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

Background

Designated a Part I offense by congressional mandate in October, 1978, arson was added to the UCR Program's Crime Index data collection in 1979. The commencement of the data collection effort followed thorough study by the Program which enlisted the input of members of the law enforcement, fire service, and insurance communities regarding the types of information to be gathered and the design of the collection form.

A number of problems were recognized at the outset of the planning. One was the proper classification of the crime within the Index. Although arson is sometimes referred to as "violent" because it can result in injury or death or called "white collar" because fraud is often the motive, destruction of property (either actual or attempted) is always involved. Therefore, for UCR purposes, arson was added to the property crime category.

Another concern was maintaining the integrity of the Crime Index. Since the entire concept of the Index is based on actual offenses known to law enforcement, it was decided that only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set, including attempts, were to be reported as arsons. Unknown origin or suspicious fires were to be excluded until definitely determined to be arsons, and therefore, crimes.

Also an obstacle to overcome was the UCR policy on scoring multiple offense situations, i.e., two or more Index crimes occurring at the same time and place. Before the addition of arson to the Index, contributing law enforcement agencies were instructed that in such situations only one crime, based on an established hierarchy of offenses, was to be reported. However, it was recognized that arson frequently occurred in conjunction with other Index crimes and that valuable information could be lost if the past procedure was employed. Therefore, it was determined that arson should be exempt from the hierarchy rule and that all arsons should be reported regardless of their commission in conjunction with another Crime Index offense.

During 1979, the first year of the arson data collection, over 8,500 law enforcement agencies were able to provide at least partial arson statistics; in 1980, the participation grew to almost 11,500 contributors. The number of reported arsons also increased, from 77,147 in 1979 to 128,752 in 1980. That increase in volume, however, must be viewed as an increase in law enforcement participation in the data collection effort and not as a surge in the actual occurrence of arson incidents.

Volume

Representing 84 percent of the United States population, 11,488 UCR participating agencies submitted 6 or more monthly arson reports during 1980. From these submissions, a total of 128,752 arson offenses were reported for the year. Most of the agencies submitting

arson counts were able to provide complete reports with detailed information, including type of structure and extent of damage.

Nature

The most frequent targets of arsons in 1980 were structures, comprising 54 percent of the total reported incidents. Mobile property (motor vehicles, trailers, airplanes, boats, etc.) accounted for 24 percent of the arsons, while the remainder were directed at other property (crops, timber, fences, signs, etc.).

Residential property was the target in 58 percent of the structural arsons during 1980, with 40 percent of such offenses directed at single occupancy residences. Eighteen percent of all targeted structural property was uninhabited or abandoned at the time the arson occurred.

Motor vehicles comprised 92 percent of all mobile property at which arsons were directed.

The monetary value of property damaged due to reported arsons in 1980 was \$891 million, and the average loss per incident was \$7,745. Industrial/manufacturing structures registered the highest average loss, \$72,971 per offense.

Clearances

Agencies reported clearances for 16 percent of all reported arsons in 1980. The highest clearance rate (32 percent) was recorded for offenses in which community or public structures were involved, while the lowest (9 percent) was registered for motor vehicles. Persons under 18 years of age exclusively accounted for 40 percent of the arson clearances.

Persons Arrested

Data on persons arrested for arson have been reported to the UCR Program for many years under the Part II crime classification, although it was not until 1979 that the actual number of arson offenses was collected. During 1980, the estimated number of arrests for arson totaled 19,800, down 1 percent from 1979 but up 12 percent from the 1976 experience.

Of all persons arrested for arson, 44 percent were under 18 years of age and 70 percent were under 25. Males comprised 88 percent of all arson arrestees.

Seventy-nine percent of the persons arrested for this offense were White, 20 percent were Black, and the remainder were of other races. Hispanics comprised 7 percent of the arrestees.

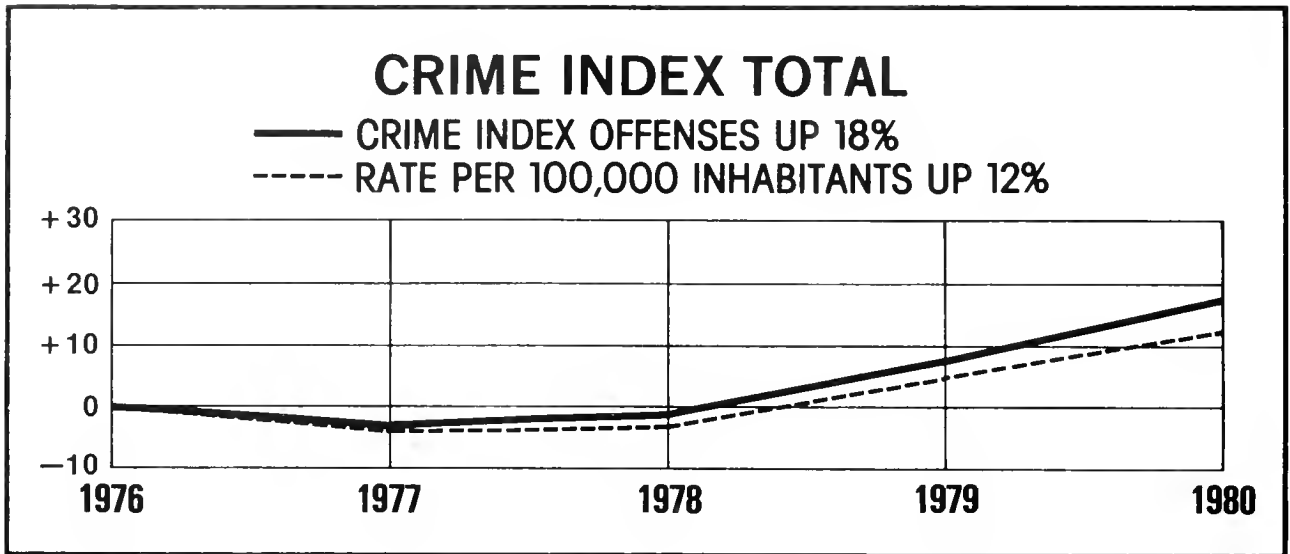

Crime Index Total

During 1980, an estimated 13,295,399 Crime Index offenses occurred throughout the Nation, an increase of 9 percent over 1979. The volume of Crime Index offenses in 1980 increased 18 percent over 1976 figures and 55 percent above those for 1971.

Both the violent and property crime categories showed upward trends over 1979, 11 percent and 9 percent, respectively. From 1976 to 1980, violent crimes were up 33 percent and property crimes rose 16 percent. For the

10 years, 1971-1980, violent crimes surged 60 percent and the property crimes escalated 54 percent.

Individually, all offenses within the Index rose during 1980. Among the violent crimes, murder increased 7 percent; forcible rape, 8 percent; robbery, 18 percent; and aggravated assault, 7 percent. In the property crime category, burglary increased 14 percent; larceny-theft, 8 percent; and motor vehicle theft, 2 percent.

The estimated crime figures for all Index offenses covering these time periods are set forth in the table, "National Crime, Rate, and Percent Change."

Provided in the table, "Regional Offense and Population Distribution, 1980," are data showing the geographical distribution of estimated Index crimes and population. When utilizing figures presented on a regional basis in this publication, the reader is cautioned to consider each region's proportion of the total United States population. For example, while the Southern States accounted for the largest volume of Crime Index offenses in 1980, they also represented the greatest regional population.

Based on the Index offenses, crime rates relate the incidence of reported crime to population. However, many factors, some of which appear on page v of this publication, influence the nature and extent of crime in a particular community. A crime rate takes into consideration only the factor of population and does not incorporate any of the other elements which contribute to the amount of crime in a given area.

The table, "Crime Rate, Region, 1980," lists the crime rates for the four geographic regions of the United States.

Crime Index Tabulations

In the accompanying tables, data on crime in the United States as a whole; geographic divisions; individual states; Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas; cities, towns, and counties; and college and university campuses are presented. Although the total number of actual criminal offenses occurring is unknown, the volume of crimes reported to law enforcement agencies represent an indicator of criminal activity.

In reviewing the tables in this report, it must be remembered that many factors can cause the volume and type of crime to vary from place to place. Population, one of these factors, is used in computing crime rates; however, all communities are affected to some degree by seasonal or transient populations. Since counts of current permanent population are used to construct crime rates, short term population variability is not accounted for in these rates.

In addition to the presentations outlined above, national averages for the value of property stolen in connection with each offense are presented in the tables. Further breakdowns by type for the robbery, burglary, and larceny-theft classifications are listed. Also, data on the

type and value of property stolen and recovered are provided.

National averages can serve as a guide for the law enforcement administrator in analyzing the local crime count, as well as the performance of the jurisdiction's law

enforcement agency. The analysis, however, should not end with such a comparison. It is only through an appraisal of local conditions that a clear picture of the community crime problem or the effectiveness of the law enforcement operation is possible.

SECTION III

CRIME INDEX OFFENSES CLEARED

A crime is cleared when a law enforcement agency has identified the offender, has sufficient evidence to charge him, and actually takes him into custody. In exceptional instances, crimes may be cleared when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes taking the offender into custody. Examples of circumstances resulting in exceptional clearances would be the death of an offender (suicide, deathbed confession, etc.) or the refusal of a victim to prosecute after an offender is identified. It should be noted that the arrest of one person can clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in the process of clearing one crime.

Law enforcement agencies cleared 19 percent of the Index crimes reported in 1980. Among the violent crimes, 72 percent of murder offenses, 49 percent of forcible rapes, 24 percent of robberies, and 59 percent of aggravated assaults were cleared. In connection with property crimes, law enforcement agencies cleared 14 percent of

the burglaries, 18 percent of the larceny-thefts, and 14 percent of the motor vehicle thefts.

Clearances for crimes against persons are generally higher than those for crimes against property not only because more intense investigative efforts are often afforded these offenses, but witnesses who can identify the perpetrators are frequently available.

Geographically, the highest overall Crime Index clearance rate was recorded by the Southern States with 21 percent. The Western and North Central States each reported 19-percent clearance rates, and the Northeastern States recorded 17 percent cleared.

Clearances Involving Only Persons under 18 Years of Age

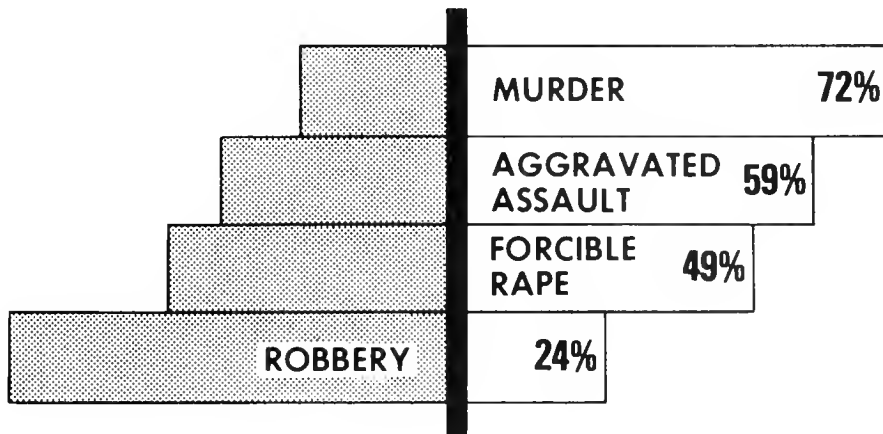
Twenty-four percent of the Crime Index offenses cleared in 1980 involved only persons under the age of 18. Persons in this same age group were responsible for 11 percent of the violent crime clearances and 28 percent of those for property crimes.

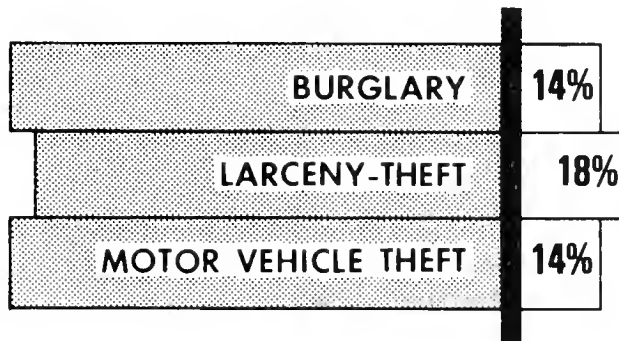

SECTION IV

PERSONS ARRESTED

The number of persons arrested serves primarily as an indication of law enforcement activity. However, data on the arrestees can provide a limited profile of the perpetrators of crime, especially for those crimes which have high clearance rates. Although law enforcement practices, policies, and emphases differ among agencies (particularly for offenses against public order, such as drunkenness, vagrancy, disorderly conduct, and related violations) and can influence the volume of arrests, policies regarding arrests for serious crimes, e.g., robbery or burglary, are likely to be consistent and uniform throughout all jurisdictions. UCR Program procedures require that an arrest be counted on each separate occasion an individual is taken into custody, notified, or cited. Also, only one arrest is counted for each individual arrested, regardless of the number of charges lodged against him.

In 1980, law enforcement agencies in the United States effected an estimated 10.4 million arrests for all criminal infractions other than traffic violations. Nationally, the arrest rate per 100,000 inhabitants was 4,653; for cities with populations 250,000 and over, the rate was 6,439; for suburban areas, 3,838; and for rural areas, 3,242.

Arrest Trends

Arrests by law enforcement for all crimes other than traffic violations increased 2 percent between 1979 and 1980. In this same period, arrests of persons under 18 years of age decreased 6 percent, while arrests of persons 18 years of age and over rose 4 percent. Considering arrests only for Crime Index offenses (murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson) the number of persons arrested in 1980 was up 1 percent over 1979.

During the 5 years from 1976 to 1980, arrests for all offenses except traffic increased 5 percent. Arrests of persons under 18 years of age were down 10 percent, while those of persons 18 and over increased 10 percent. When restricted to the eight Crime Index offenses, total arrests increased 7 percent and those of persons under age 18 fell 7 percent. An increase of 17 percent in adult arrests occurred during the same 5-year period.

Arrests for drug abuse violations in 1980 increased 2 percent over the 1979 total. In the period 1976 to 1980, arrests for these violations were down 12 percent. The types of drugs involved in violations resulting in arrests

during 1980 are shown by geographic region in the accompanying table.

Age

Nationally, 6 percent of all persons arrested were under the age of 15, 21 percent were under 18, 38 percent were under 21, and 56 percent under 25.

A further examination of figures on youthful arrestees showed that persons under 25 years of age comprised 70 percent of those arrested for Crime Index offenses, 57 percent of those arrested for violent crimes, and 73 percent of those arrested for property crimes.

In the suburban areas, the volume of arrests of persons in the young-age groups was greater than the national figures, with the under 15 age group representing 7 percent; under 18, 24 percent; under 21, 42 percent; and under 25, 60 percent. The distributions of arrests in the rural areas were lower for the younger age groups, with the under 15 group being involved in only 3 percent; under 18, in 12 percent; under 21, in 29 percent; and those under 25, in 48 percent.

Considering only the Crime Index offenses (including arson), 13 percent of the arrestees in the Nation were under the age of 15; 36 percent were under the age of 18; and 54 percent were under 21.

Sex

A comparison with 1979 figures showed that in 1980 arrests of males were up 1 percent and those of females rose 2 percent. Nationally, male arrests outnumbered those of females by 5 to 1 with males accounting for 84 percent of all arrests, 81 percent of those for Index crimes, 90 percent of the violent crime arrests, and 79 percent of those for property crimes.

As in previous years, female criminal involvement related mainly to larceny-theft, the crime which accounted for 29 percent of all female arrests and 79 percent of female arrests for Index offenses. The number of female larceny arrests, however, declined 2 percent, 1979 versus 1980.

From 1976 to 1980, arrests of males under 18 years of age decreased 9 percent; female arrests for the identical age group decreased 12 percent. Arrests for the eight Crime Index offenses during this 5-year period declined for both females and males under age 18, 10 and 6 percent, respectively.

Arrest Rates

Arrest rates are a measure of law enforcement activity in response to crime. The accompanying table presents the Crime Index arrest rates per 100,000 inhabitants in the four geographic regions of the United States.

Law Enforcement Code of Ethics

As a Law Enforcement Officer, my fundamental duty is to serve mankind; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation, and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the Constitutional rights of all men to liberty, equality and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all; maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn, or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of the police service. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession . . . law enforcement.

SECTION V

LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL

Law Enforcement Employees

As of October 31, 1980, 438,442 law enforcement officers were employed on a full-time basis by 11,719 agencies representing 211 million United States residents. The national rate was 2.1 officers per 1,000 inhabitants. Including full-time civilians, the total law enforcement employee force was 559,916 for a rate of 2.7 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Varying demographic and other jurisdictional characteristics greatly affect a locale's requirements for law enforcement services. For example, the needs of a locale having a highly mobile or seasonal population may differ significantly from those of a community whose population is relatively stable. Similarly, a small community situated between two large cities, due to its geographic location, may require a greater number of law enforcement personnel than a similarly sized community having no urban centers nearby. Because of such variances in service requirements, care should be used when attempting any comparison of employee rates.

The functions of law enforcement also differ significantly throughout the Nation. In certain areas, sheriffs' responsibilities are limited almost exclusively to civil functions and/or the administration of the county jail facilities. Likewise, state police and highway patrol agencies' duties may vary greatly from jurisdiction to jurisdiction.

The law enforcement employee rates presented in the following tables represent national averages; they should be viewed as guides or indicators, not as recommended or desirable police strengths. In fact, the law enforcement strength in many of our Nation's communities is less than the national average. Adequate manpower for a specific locale can only be determined after careful study and analysis of the various conditions which contribute to the

requirements for law enforcement service in that jurisdiction.

In 1980, the national average for cities in the 10,000 to 49,999 population range was 2.1 law enforcement employees per 1,000 inhabitants. However, this low average rate for smaller cities is contrasted by the higher 3.3 average rate for cities with populations of 250,000 or more. While the suburban areas averaged 2.3 full-time law enforcement employees per 1,000 inhabitants, the average rate for sheriffs' or county police departments was 2.0.

Geographically, the highest law enforcement employee rates per 1,000 inhabitants were evident in the South Atlantic and Middle Atlantic Divisions, with 3.1 and 2.8, respectively. The fewest employees per 1,000 population were reported by the West North Central and West South Central Divisions, each with an average rate of 2.2.

Sworn Personnel

Rates based solely on sworn law enforcement personnel (excluding civilians) showed the national average for all cities was 2.1 officers per 1,000 inhabitants. The lowest average rate (1.7) was in cities with 10,000 to 24,999 residents, while cities 250,000 or more in population recorded the highest rate, 2.7. For sheriffs' or county police departments, the average rate was 1.5 per 1,000 population.

Ninety-six percent of all sworn personnel in city agencies were male. In the suburban areas, males represented 95 percent of all sworn personnel, while in the rural areas, they accounted for 90 percent.

Civilian Employees

Civilians represented 19 percent of all city law enforcement personnel in 1980. In suburban areas, they accounted for 21 percent of the total strength, and in the rural counties, they comprised 24 percent.

BY POPULATION GROUPS, 1980

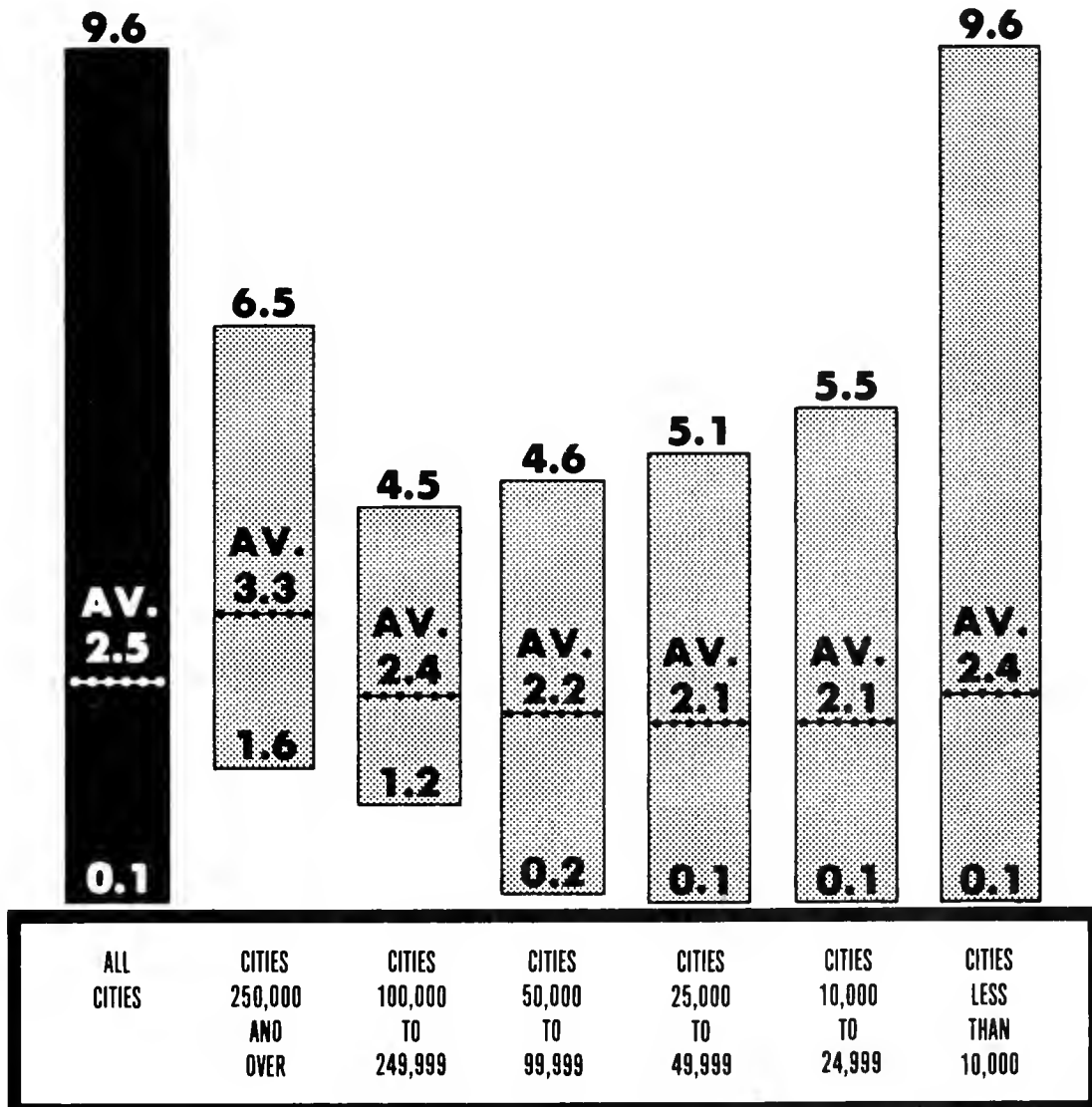

ASSAULTS ON LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

Nationwide, an average rate of 17 of every 100 law enforcement officers were assaulted in 1980. Throughout the year, 57,847 assaults were reported by 9,235 agencies representing approximately 81 percent of the total United States population.

Injuries to Law Enforcement Officers

During 1980, approximately 22,000 personal injuries resulted from assaults on law enforcement officers for a rate of 6 injuries per 100 officers nationwide. Within the

nine geographic divisions, the rate showed 8 of every 100 officers were injured in the New England and Pacific Divisions; 7 per 100 officers in the Middle Atlantic Division; 6 per 100 in the West North Central and Mountain Divisions; and 5 per 100 in each of the remaining Divisions. Law enforcement officers in cities with populations of 100,000 to 249,999 experienced the greatest rate of assaults with injuries, 9 per 100 officers. The rural counties had the lowest injury rate, 3 for every 100 officers.

Weapons Used in Assaults on Law Enforcement Officers

Eighty-two percent of the assaults on law enforcement officers during 1980 were committed with personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.). Firearms were used in 6 percent of the assaults, knives or cutting instruments in 3 percent, and other dangerous weapons in 9 percent. Data on the types of weapons used in assaults within geographic divisions and population groups and by the types of activities in which the officers were involved at the time the assaults occurred are presented in tables 77 and 79.

Of all officers assaulted with firearms, 23 percent sustained personal injuries. Thirty-four percent of the assaults with knives or other cutting instruments resulted in injuries to law enforcement officers during the year, while the injury rate for personal weapons and other dangerous weapons was 38 percent for each.

Time of Assault

Data concerning assaults on officers by time of day and population group are set forth in table 80. Approximately one-half of the assaults on law enforcement officers occurred during the 6-hour period 8:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m.

Activity of Law Enforcement Officers at the Time of Assault

The largest portion of assaults, 33 percent, occurred while officers were responding to disturbance calls (family quarrels, man-with-gun calls, bar fights, etc.). Twelve percent of the assaults occurred while officers were engaged in the handling, transporting, or custody of prisoners; 11 percent while enforcing traffic laws; and 8 percent while investigating suspicious persons. Responses to robberies or burglaries in progress or attempted apprehensions of suspects for these offenses resulted in 3 percent of the assaults; 19 percent occurred when officers attempted to arrest suspects for other crimes. The remain-

der of the assaults took place while officers were performing other duties.

Type of Assignment

Fifty percent of the law enforcement officers assaulted were in one-officer vehicles, while 32 percent were in two-officer vehicles. Five percent were assigned to detective or special assignments, and 13 percent were on other assignments. Vehicle patrol officers were victims in 82 percent of all assaults of officers. Table 82 presents the types of assignments the officers were performing when assaulted.

Clearances

Ninety-four percent of the assaults on law enforcement officers reported in 1980 were cleared. In terms of population groupings, cities with populations ranging from 50,000 to 99,999 had the highest clearance rate, 96 percent.

By activity, the highest clearance percentage for all agencies was recorded for assaults on officers responding

to disturbance calls, attempting other arrests, and transporting prisoners. Ninety-five percent of the offenses in each of these assault categories were cleared. The lowest clearance rate (62 percent) was reported for ambush attacks on officers. Table 83 shows the percentage of assaults cleared by type of activity for each population group.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED

In 1980, 104 local, county, state, and Federal law enforcement officers were feloniously killed as compared to 106 in 1979. During the 10-year period, 1971-1980, 1,147 officers were slain. It should be noted that the collection of statistics regarding officers killed in the line of duty was expanded in 1972 to include data on Federal officers. Therefore, the total for 1971 does not include Federal officers murdered in the line of duty.

Geographic Locations

In 1980 as in previous years, more officers (45) were slain in the country's most populous region, the South, than in any other. Fourteen officers were killed in the Western States, 15 in the North Central States, 23 in the Northeastern States, 6 in Puerto Rico, and 1 in the U.S. Virgin Islands. Information on officers feloniously killed in 1980 by geographic division and population group is presented in the following table.

Of the 104 officers slain during 1980, 97 were from 86 different local, county, state, and Federal law enforcement agencies in 32 states and the District of Columbia. As indicated above, the remaining 7 were from Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. Among the states, New York, with 11 officers slain, lost more officers in line-of-duty deaths than any other. The States of Texas and Georgia followed with 9 officers killed in each.

Circumstances Surrounding Deaths

During the year, 22 officers were slain by persons engaged in the commission of a robbery or during the pursuit of robbery suspects, and 8 lost their lives at the scene of burglaries or while pursuing burglary suspects. Eighteen officers were killed while attempting arrests for crimes other than robbery or burglary.

Seventeen officers lost their lives while enforcing traffic laws, and another 17 were slain while investigating suspicious persons or circumstances. Twelve officers were killed upon responding to disturbance calls (family quarrels, man-with-gun calls, bar fights, etc.); 7 in ambush situations; 2 while handling mentally deranged persons; and 1 while transporting a prisoner.

Types of Assignment

Of the 104 officers killed in 1980, 73 were on patrol duty when attacked; 69 of these were assigned to vehicles and 4 were on foot patrol. Of the remaining victim officers, 21 were detectives on special assignments and 10 were off-duty but taking appropriate police action at the time they were slain.

Forty-nine of the 94 officers who were on duty when murdered were alone and unassisted at the scene of the fatal incident.

Weapons Used

Firearms were the weapons used in 91 percent of the murders of law enforcement officers during 1980. Sixty-nine of the officers were slain with handguns, 13 with rifles, and 13 with shotguns. The officers' own firearms were used against them in 13 of the killings.

Of the 9 officers slain with other weapons, 3 were killed with knives and 6 by vehicles.

Forty-four of the officers who met their demise in 1980 attempted to utilize their service firearms while in contact with their assailants, and 27 discharged their service weapons. Sixty-three percent of the officers killed by firearms were within 5 feet of their assailants at the time they were shot.

Profile of Victim Officers

Ninety-one of the officers killed during 1980 were White, and 13 were Black. The average years of service for the slain officers was 8. Five percent of the slain officers had 1 year or less of law enforcement experience; 26 percent had more than 1 but less than 5 years of service; 42 percent had 5 through 10 years of experience; and 27 percent had served as law enforcement officers for more than 10 years.

Persons Identified

Law enforcement agencies cleared 95 of the 104 murders of police officers which occurred during 1980. In connection with these crimes, 162 offenders were identified, 93 percent of which were male. Of all suspects identified, 57 percent were White and 43 percent were Black. The assailants ranged in age from 15 to 71, and the

average age was 27 years. Nine percent of the offenders were under the age of 18, and 62 percent were between 18 and 30 years of age.

As can be seen from the accompanying chart, the majority of the assailants were not first-offenders. Seventy-three percent had prior arrests, 49 percent had previous convictions, and 48 percent had been arrested for violent crimes, such as murder, forcible rape, etc. Thirty-nine percent of the offenders had at one time been paroled or given probation following criminal convictions, while 25 percent were on parole or probation at the time of the police killing in which they were involved. Persons having prior arrests for narcotic charges made up 26 percent of the total offenders, while 9 percent of the assailants had previous arrests for police assaults.

During 1980, 16 offenders were justifiably killed either at the scene of the police killing or in ensuing confrontations. Four of these assailants were killed and an additional 11 were wounded by the victim officers themselves. One of the offenders committed suicide.

APPENDIX I

TABLE METHODOLOGY

Designed to assist the reader, this appendix explains the construction of many tabular presentations in the book. The following key refers to the columnar headings used throughout the appendix.

Key: A) Column 1 shows the table numbers. Included are tables 1 through 65, *Crime in the United States - 1980*.

B) Column 2 indicates the level of submission necessary for an agency's statistics to be included in a table. There are three levels of participation:

1. Agencies having reported data for all 12 months of the year.
2. Agencies having reported data for at least one month but less than 12 months of the year.
3. Nonreporting agencies.

The tabulations presented in the publication

employ statistics from one or more of the above-listed participation levels. For example, table 1 includes all three agency reporting levels, but table 14 presents only data for agencies having reported the entire year.

C) Column 3 explains how each table was constructed. Data adjustments, if any, are discussed along with various definitions of data aggregation.

D) Column 4 contains general comments regarding the potential use and misuse of the statistics presented.

APPENDIX II

OFFENSES IN UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

Offenses in Uniform Crime Reporting are divided into two groupings designated as Part I and Part II crimes. Information on the number of Part I offenses known to law enforcement, the number cleared by arrest or exceptional means, and the number of persons arrested is reported monthly. Arrest data are reported for Part II offenses also.

The Part I offenses are as follows:

1. **Criminal Homicide.**—a. Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter: the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded. Justifiable homicides are limited to: (1) the killing of a felon by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and (2) the killing of a felon by a private citizen. b. Manslaughter by negligence: the killing of another person through gross negligence. Excludes traffic fatalities. While manslaughter by negligence is a Part I crime, it is not included in the Crime Index.

2. **Forcible rape.**—The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Included are rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape. Statutory offenses (no force used—victim under age of consent) are excluded.

3. **Robbery.**—The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

4. **Aggravated assault.**—An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.

5. **Burglary—breaking or entering.**—The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempted forcible entry is included.

6. **Larceny-theft (except motor vehicle theft).**—The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles or automobile accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article which is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included.

Embezzlement, “con” games, forgery, worthless checks, etc., are excluded.

7. **Motor vehicle theft.**—The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self-propelled and runs on the surface and not on rails. Specifically excluded from this category are motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.

8. **Arson.**—Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

The Part II offenses are:

9. **Other assaults (simple).**—Assaults and attempted assaults where no weapon was used and which did not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

10. **Forgery and counterfeiting.**—Making, altering, uttering, or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true. Attempts are included.

11. **Fraud.**—Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Included are larceny by bailee and bad checks, except forgeries and counterfeiting.

12. **Embezzlement.**—Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one’s care, custody, or control.

13. **Stolen property; buying, receiving, possessing.**—Buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, including attempts.

14. **Vandalism.**—Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control.

15. **Weapons; carrying, possessing, etc.**—All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers. Included are attempts.

16. **Prostitution and commercialized vice.**—Sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring, or transporting women for immoral purposes. Attempts are included.

17. **Sex offenses (except forcible rape, prostitution, and commercialized vice).**—Statutory rape and offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Attempts are included.

18. **Drug abuse violations.**—State and local offenses relating to narcotic drugs, such as unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, and manufacturing of narcotic drugs.

19. **Gambling.**—Promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

20. **Offenses against the family and children.**—Nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

21. **Driving under the influence.**—Driving or operating any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

22. **Liquor laws.**—State or local liquor law violations, except “drunkenness” (offense 23) and “driving under the influence” (offense 21). Federal violations are excluded.

23. **Drunkenness.**—Drunkenness or intoxication. Excluded is “driving under the influence” (offense 21).

24. **Disorderly conduct.**—Breach of the peace.

25. **Vagrancy.**—Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

26. **All other offenses.**—All violations of state or local laws, except offenses 1-25 and traffic offenses.

27. **Suspicion.**—No specific offense; suspect released without formal charges being placed.

28. **Curfew and loitering laws.**—Offenses relating to violation of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

29. **Runaways.**—Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes.

APPENDIX III

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING AREA DEFINITIONS

Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area

The geographic presentation of Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) data relies on the concept of the Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA). Comprehension of this term is crucial to understanding the related UCR concepts of "Other Cities" and "Rural Area," which are discussed later in this appendix.

An SMSA is a statistical construct used to define metropolitan areas in a uniform manner. It is an integrated economic and social unit with a recognized large population nucleus. The SMSA concept was developed to facilitate the analysis and dissemination of statistical information on metropolitan areas. The primary objective in establishing standard definitions of these areas was to make it possible for Federal statistical agencies to utilize the same boundaries when publishing statistical data.

An SMSA always includes a central city (cities) of specified population (generally over 50,000) and the county (counties) in which it is located. In addition, an SMSA also includes contiguous counties when the economic and social relationships between the central and contiguous counties meet specified criteria of metropolitan character and integration. An SMSA may cross state lines. In New England, SMSAs are composed of cities and towns instead of counties.

The Office of Federal Statistical Policy and Standards of the U.S. Department of Commerce has responsibility for designating and defining SMSAs. It, in turn, is advised by the Federal Committee on Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas. The detailed criteria followed in establishing and defining SMSAs can be found in the U.S. Department of Commerce publication, *Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas*, revised edition 1975.

Community Types

Uniform Crime Reporting data are often presented using three community-type aggregations. These are SMSA, Other Cities, and Rural Area.

SMSAs, as defined earlier in this appendix, made up approximately 73 percent of the total United States population in 1980. In addition to the core city (cities), an

SMSA includes suburban cities and suburban counties. Together these two groups make up the suburban area. A suburban area includes cities with less than 50,000 inhabitants in addition to counties (unincorporated areas) within the SMSA.

"Other Cities" are those outside SMSAs. Most of these places are incorporated and comprised 11 percent of the 1980 population of the United States.

A rural area is that portion of a county outside the SMSA excluding areas covered by city police agencies. For crime reporting purposes, rural areas are made up of unincorporated portions of counties outside urban places and SMSAs. They comprised 16 percent of the 1980 national population.

APPENDIX IV

10-YEAR TRENDS IN CRIME, 1971-1980

This appendix presents quarterly crime data for the 10-year period, 1971-1980, and examines crime trends and seasonal patterns. The approach taken here in supplements year-to-year percent-change comparisons and yields a generalized perspective of the movement of crime.

While a particular offense may possess a number of traits or attributes in common with other crimes, each offense has its own unique patterns and characteristics. These traits are ultimately reflected in a particular offense's movement over time.

Quarterly crime rates for the Crime Index total, violent crime total, property crime total, and each Index offense were computed for the period 1971-1980. Data from agencies having submitted all 12 months of crime reports and the corresponding jurisdictional populations were used in the computations. Statistics on arson are not included in the appendix since the collection of data on this crime did not commence until April of 1979. Population figures were not adjusted to account for possible quarterly changes.

The first quarter of 1971 was selected as the base period and the crime rate corresponding to that period was equated to 100. The "relative" quarterly crime rates resulting from this standardization process are presented in both tabular and graphic form.

As a first step in smoothing the data and ascertaining the trends for the various crime categories under consideration, 4-quarter moving averages were computed. The results of these computations are presented in both tabular and graphic form. On the graphs, the moving averages are depicted by dotted lines, whereas the relative crime rates are represented by solid lines.

Seasonal indices depicting the effect of seasonal fluctuations were computed and tabulated. For each crime category, quarterly seasonal indices denote the average ratio of the relative crime rate to the corresponding moving average values. To illustrate, a seasonal index of 107.3 indicates that the relative crime rates for that particular quarter are, on the average, 7.3 percent higher than the corresponding moving average trend values. Any seasonal index (e.g., 91.4) with a value less than 100.0 indicates that the quarter under consideration was, on the average, some percent (in this case 8.6) below the corresponding moving average trend values.

Crime Index Total Trend and Seasonality

During the decade, 1971 to 1980, the quarterly relative crime rate for the Crime Index total fluctuated between 93 and 155. The rate was lowest in the first quarter of 1973 and peaked in the third quarter of 1980. It will be noted that the Crime Index total was consistently lowest in the first quarter and highest in the third quarter of each year. For the first quarter through the fourth quarter, the seasonal indices were 91.4, 99.6, 107.3, and 101.6, respectively. As explained earlier, the first quarter seasonal index (91.4) denotes that the relative crime rates for the first quarter were on the average 8.6 percent below the corresponding moving average trend values.

According to the moving average figures, the Crime Index total displayed periods of alternating upward and downward movement. In 1972, the Crime Index total incurred a mild decline. This downturn was followed by a period of steady increase (1973 to 1975). Between 1976 and 1977, the Crime Index again declined. However, from 1978 into 1980, the Index underwent a period of substantial rise.

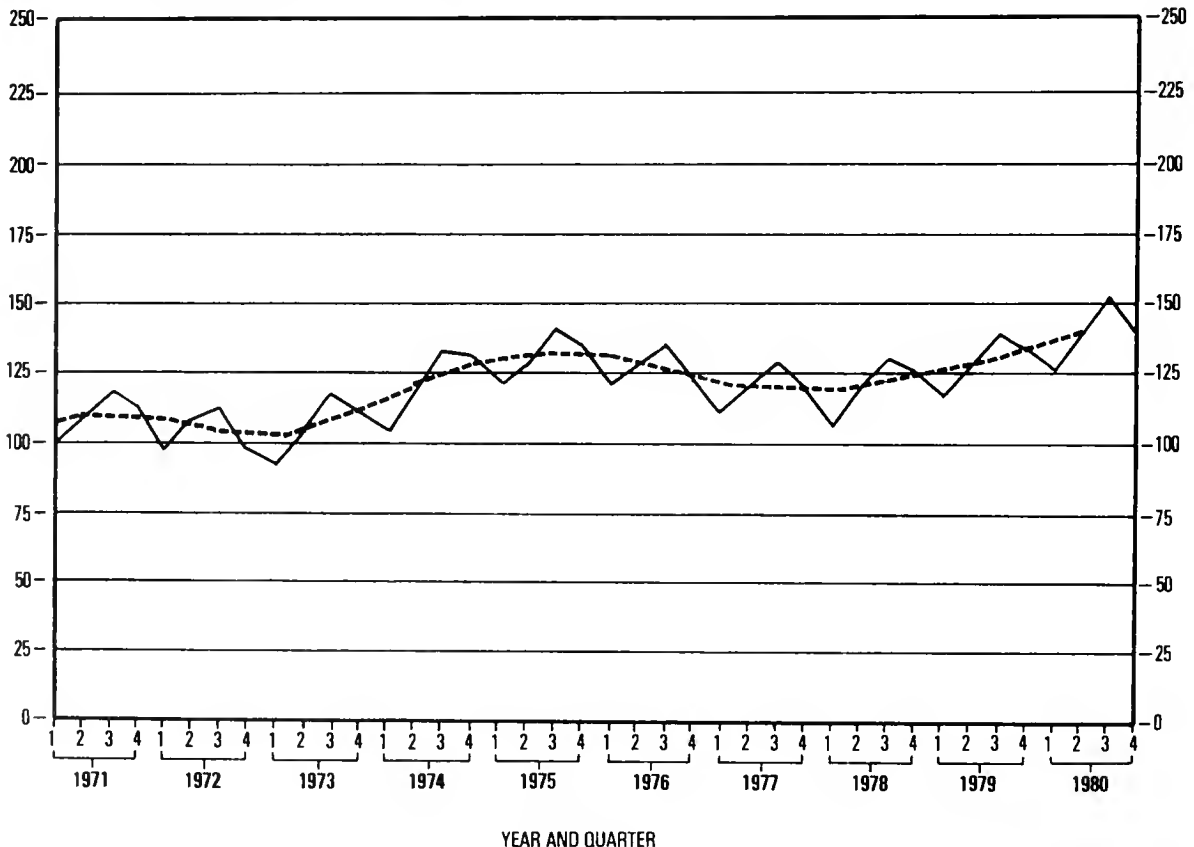

Violent Crime Trend and Seasonality

Between 1971 and 1980, the quarterly relative crime rate for violent crime ranged from 98 to 165. The low occurred in the first quarter of 1972, while the high was reached in the third quarter of 1980. For the 10 years under study, violent crime was always lowest in the first quarter and usually highest (all years except 1971 and 1974) in the third quarter of each year. The seasonal indices for the first quarter through the fourth quarter

were 92.3, 97.1, 107.0, and 103.6, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.) According to these figures and from a review of the accompanying graph, it is noted that the relative crime rates in the first and second quarters consistently fall below the moving average trend line.

The moving average evidenced (except for a decline during 1975 through 1976) a steady increase between 1971 and 1980.

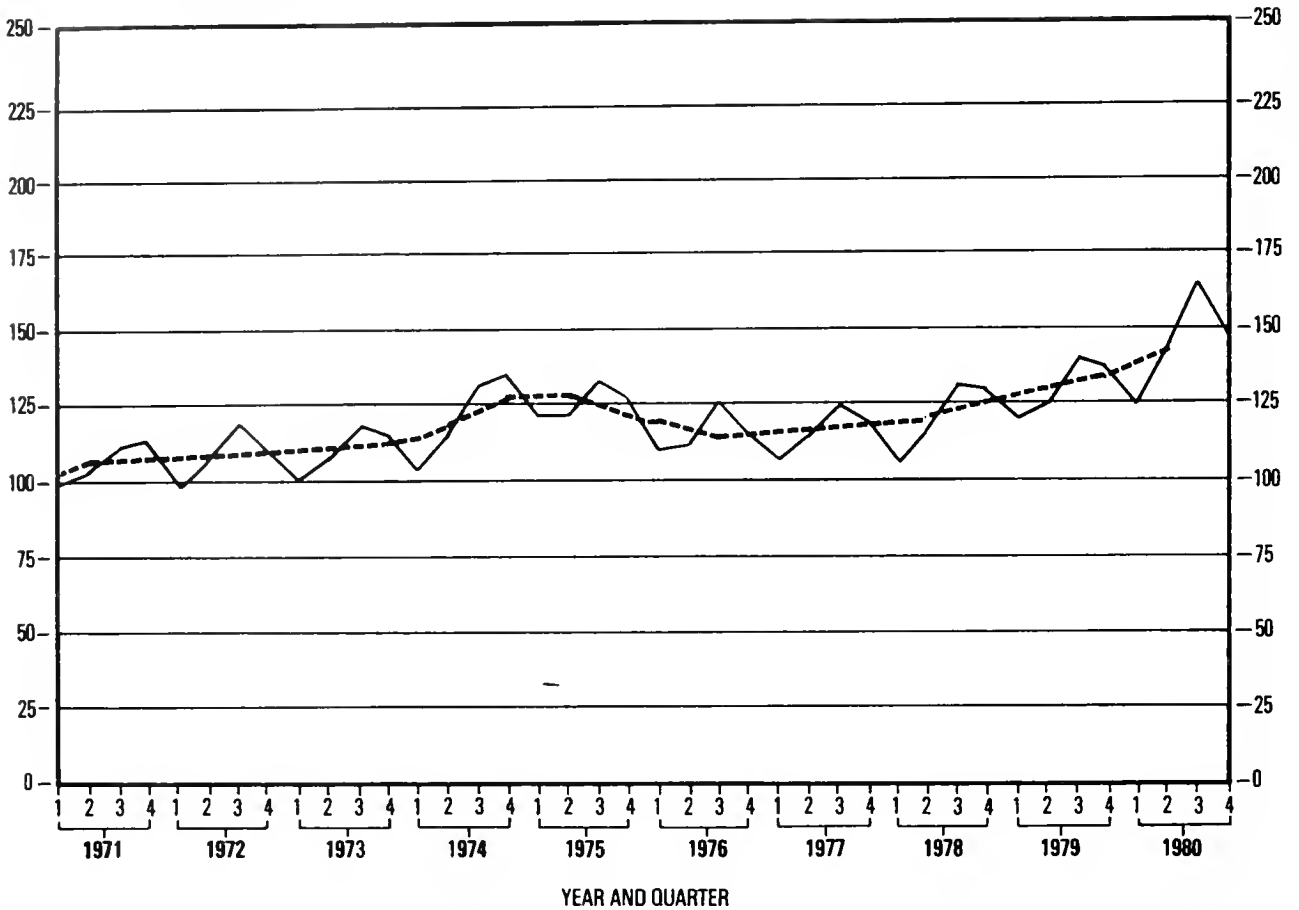

Property Crime Trend and Seasonality

From 1971 to 1980, the quarterly relative crime rate for property crime varied between 92 and 154. The rate was lowest in the first quarter of 1973 and reached a high in the third quarter of 1980. It will be noted that the relative crime rate was consistently lowest in the first quarter and highest in the third quarter of the year. For the first quarter through the fourth quarter, the seasonal indices were 91.4, 99.2, 107.8, and 101.6, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.) These figures, along with the accompanying graph, indicate that the second and fourth

quarters of the years under consideration experienced the least seasonal impact.

According to the moving average figures, property crime encountered alternating periods of decline and increase. The property crime trend decreased from the end of 1971 through the latter part of 1972. Subsequently, a 3-year period of increase ensued between 1973 and 1975. In 1976 and 1977 the trend again moved downward, but the steady upward movement which followed lasted into 1980.

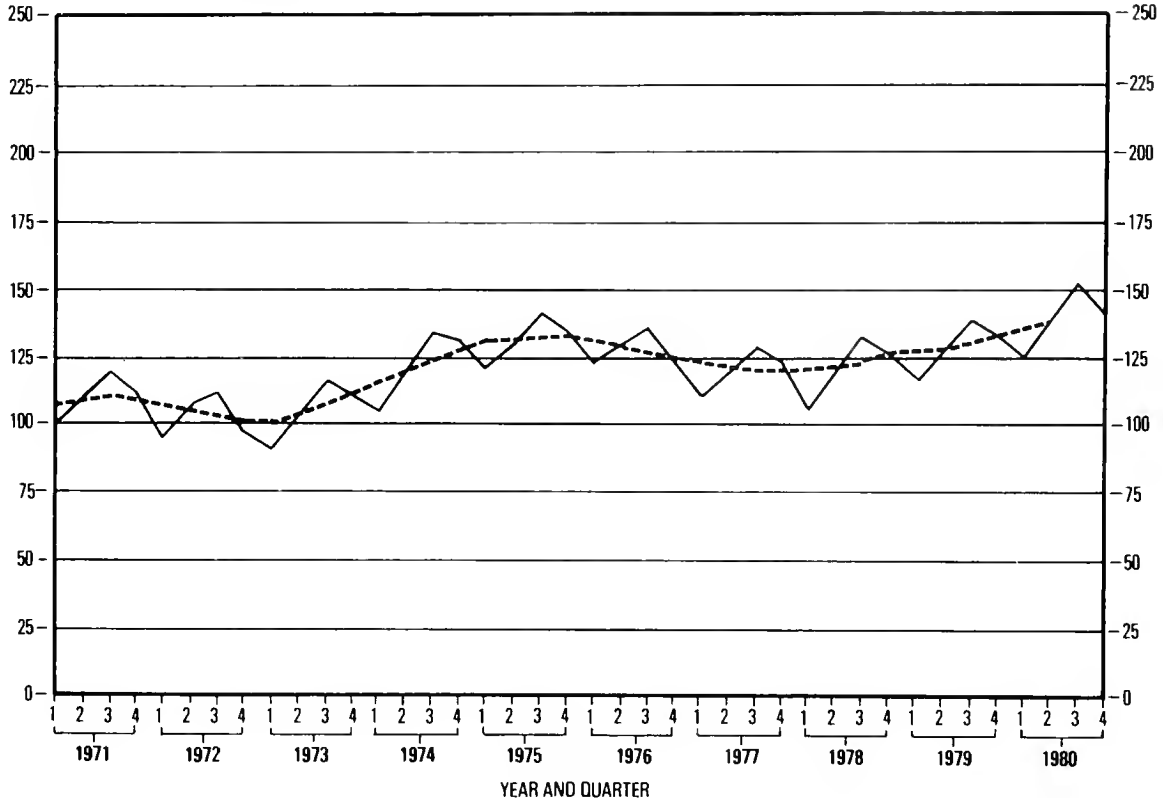

Murder Trend and Seasonality

During the period 1971 to 1980, the quarterly relative crime rate for murder fluctuated between 99 and 138. Annual lows occurred in the first or the second quarter of the year. Yearly highs were encountered in the third or fourth quarter. The seasonal indices for the first through

the fourth quarters were 95.0, 95.4, 104.2, and 105.5, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.)

The murder trend was generally characterized by a gradual upward movement. The moving average figures rose between 1971 and 1974, following which there was a decline during 1975 and 1976. A gradual upward trend again commenced in 1977 and continued into 1980.

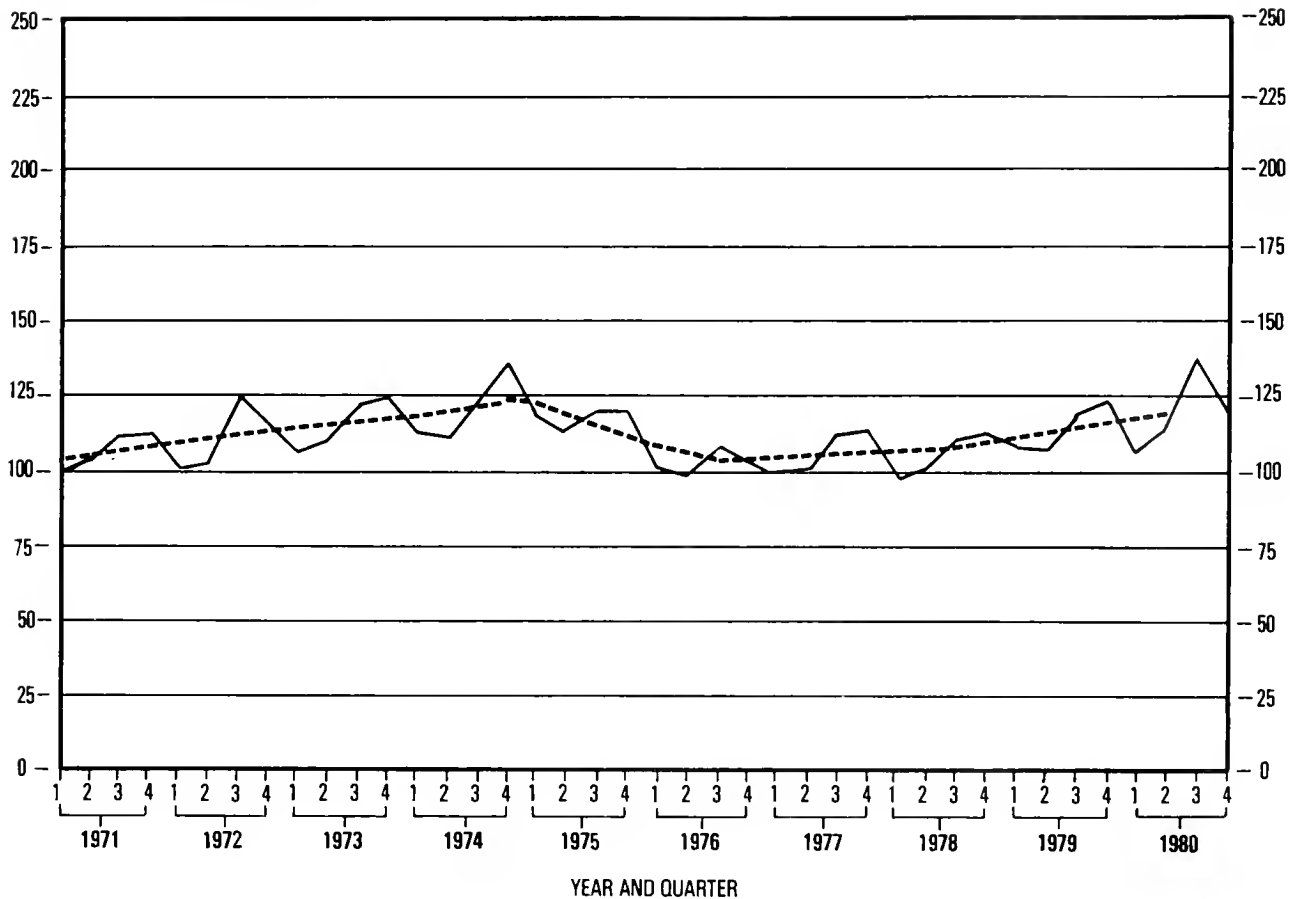

Forcible Rape Trend and Seasonality

The quarterly relative crime rate for forcible rape fluctuated between 100 and 243 during the years 1971 to 1980 and showed the highest range of variation of any Index offense during the study period. The low occurred in the first quarter of 1971, while the high was reached in the third quarter of 1980. It will be observed that forcible rape consistently bottomed out in the first quarter of each year (the winter months) and peaked in the third quarter (the summer months) of all years under study. As can be seen from the accompanying graphs, quarterly forcible rape rates are generally distinguished by undulations with

pointed peaks and troughs. For the first quarter through the fourth quarter, the seasonal indices were 85.9, 101.5, 116.8, and 95.8, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.)

According to the moving average figures, the forcible rape trend demonstrated (except for a mild decline during 1975 and 1976) a steady increase between 1971 and 1980. It will also be noted that forcible rape showed a higher increase than any other Crime Index offense during the past 10 years. This trend has shown no evidence of altering its established course.

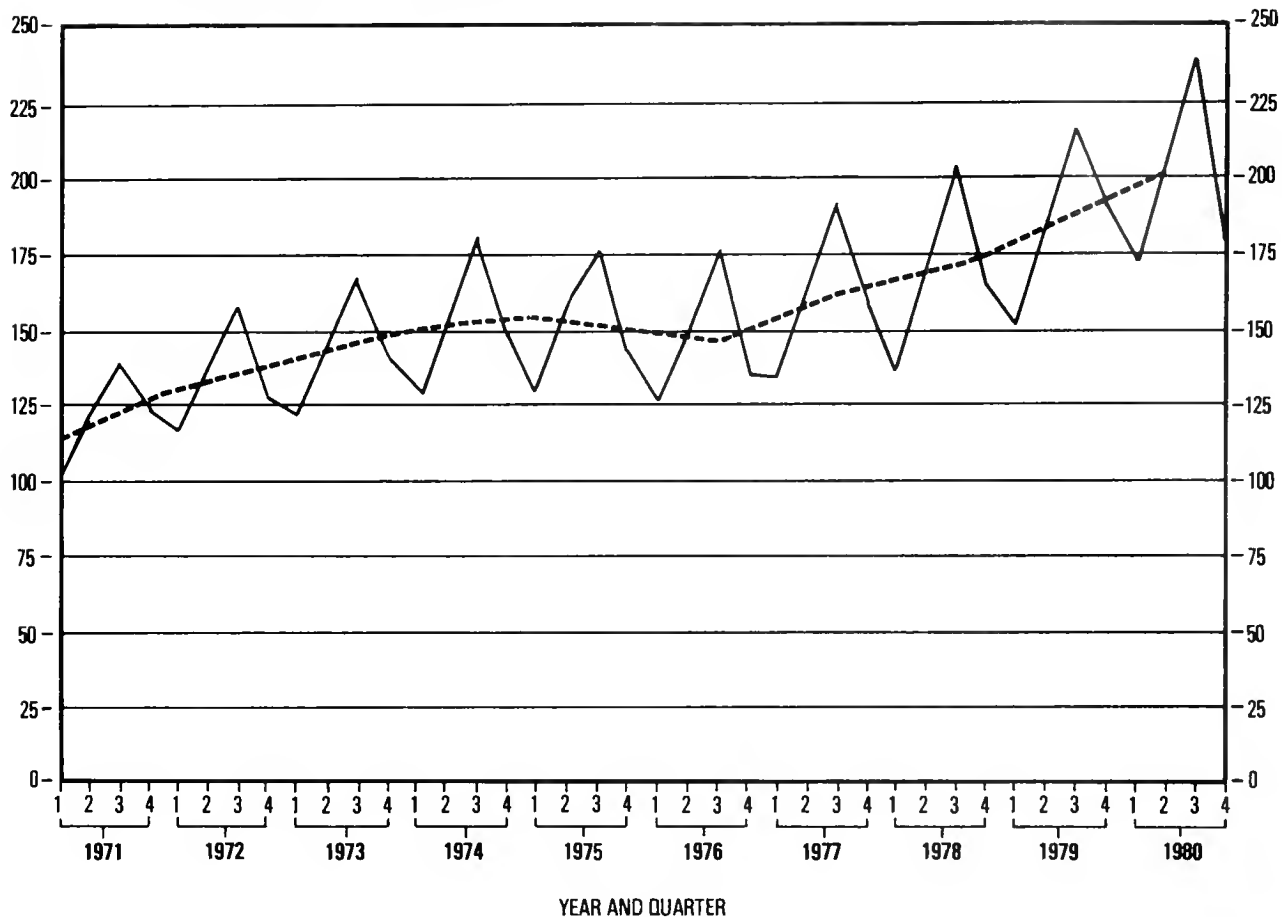

Robbery Trend and Seasonality

The quarterly relative crime rate for robbery ranged from 79 to 132 during the period 1971 to 1980. The rate was lowest in the second quarter of 1978 and highest in the fourth quarter of 1974. Although seasonality was rather mild, robbery was virtually always at a low in the second quarter and highest in the fourth quarter of the year. A review of the accompanying chart reveals that the configuration of quarterly relative robbery rates is generally characterized by single peaks and single troughs. The seasonal indices for the first quarter through the fourth

quarter were 97.5, 89.7, 101.0, and 111.7, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.)

The moving average trend displayed a period of relative stability between 1971 and 1973. This quiescent period was followed by a short-lived increase that lasted until early 1975. From the second quarter of 1975 through the end of 1977, the robbery trend turned downward, eventually giving way to an upward movement that lasted into 1980. This latter increase in the robbery trend, however, has not yet reached the peak experienced in 1975.

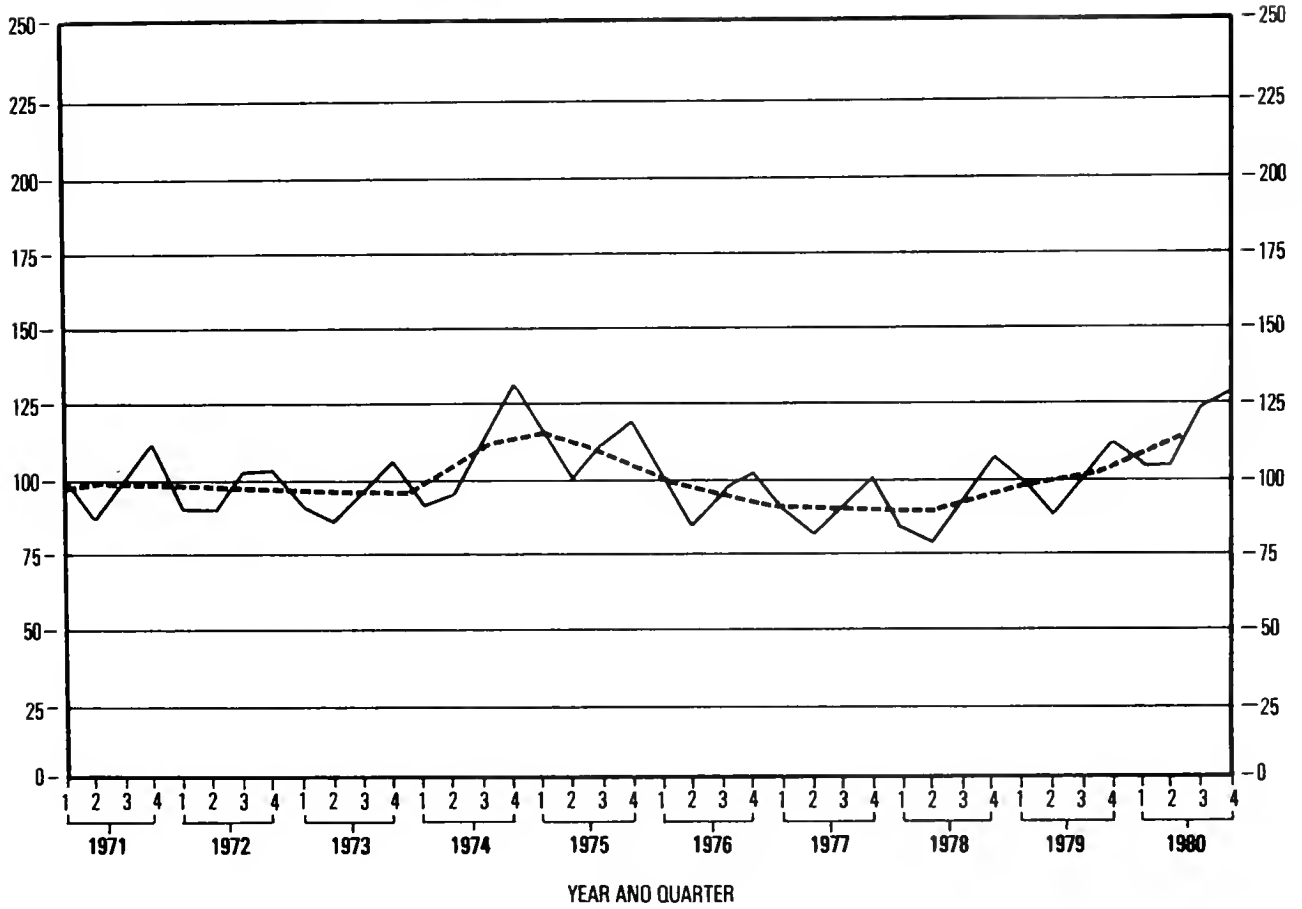

Aggravated Assault Trend and Seasonality

Between 1971 and 1980, the quarterly relative crime rate for aggravated assault oscillated between 100 and 211. The low occurred in the first quarter of 1971, while the high was reached in the third quarter of 1980. It will be noted that the relative crime rate was consistently lowest in the first quarter and highest in the third quarter of the year. According to the accompanying graphs, the

undulations for the quarterly relative aggravated assault rates were marked by single peaks and single troughs. For the first quarter through the fourth quarter, the seasonal indices were 88.6, 103.4, 110.8, and 97.2, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.)

The trend for aggravated assault generally followed a steady upward path, commencing in 1971 and continuing into 1980. This up-trend shows no signs of mitigating.

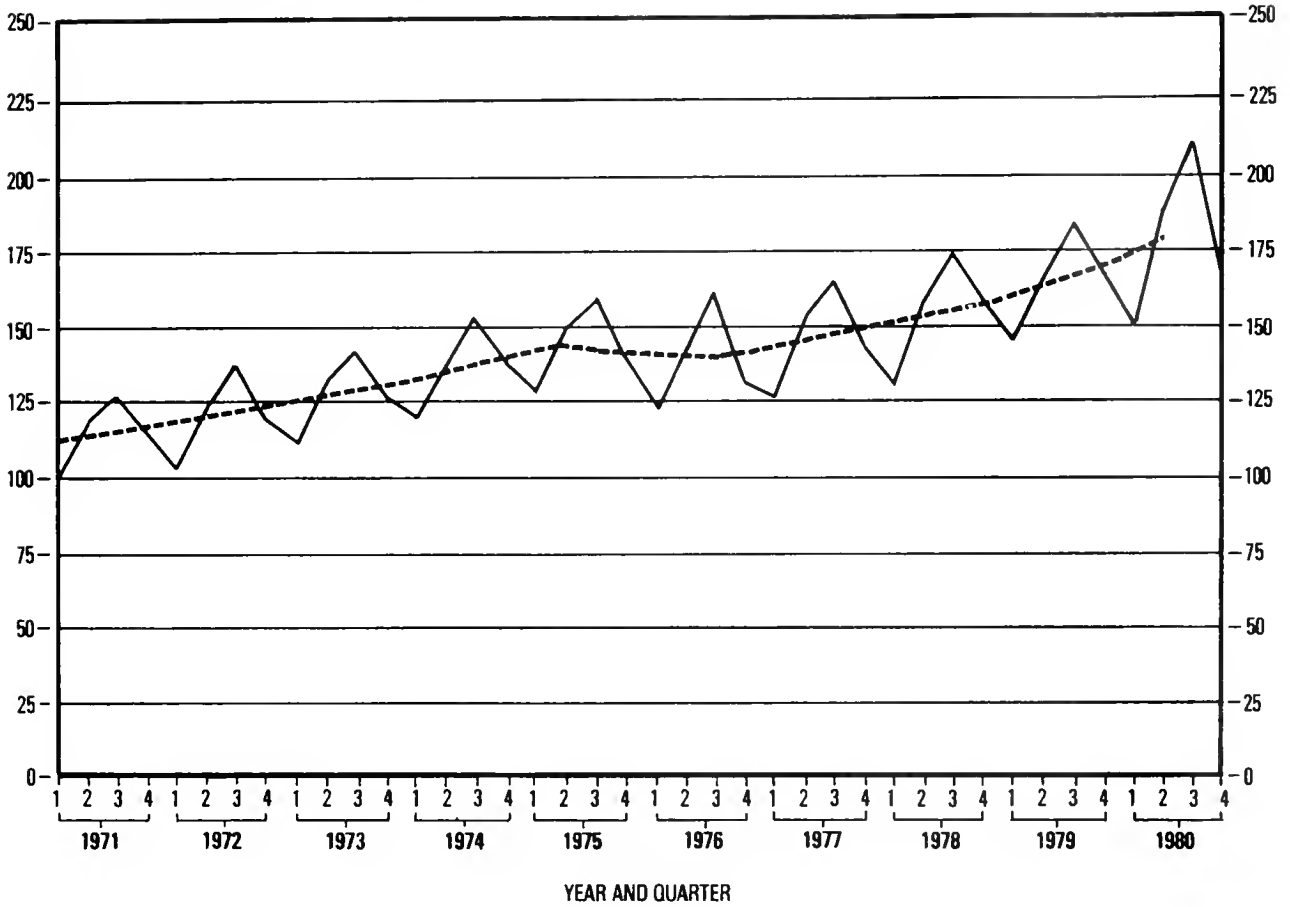

Burglary Trend and Seasonality

During the 10-year period, 1971 to 1980, the quarterly relative crime rate for burglary varied between 99 and 147. The rate was lowest in the second quarter of 1971 and the first quarter of 1973 and reached a high in the third quarter of 1980. Burglary peaked in the second half of each year throughout the entire decade under study. The accompanying chart reveals that burglary quarterly relative crime rate data were characterized by dual peaks and troughs. The seasonal indices for the first quarter

through the fourth quarter were 96.1, 94.6, 104.8, and 104.4, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.)

The moving average curve was generally stable between 1971 and 1972. This relatively dormant period was followed by an upturn that began in 1973 and continued into the first half of 1975, at which time a decline ensued. This decrease continued until the end of 1976, after which the curve remained stable for more than a year. In 1978, the burglary trend again began to move upward, continuing into 1980.

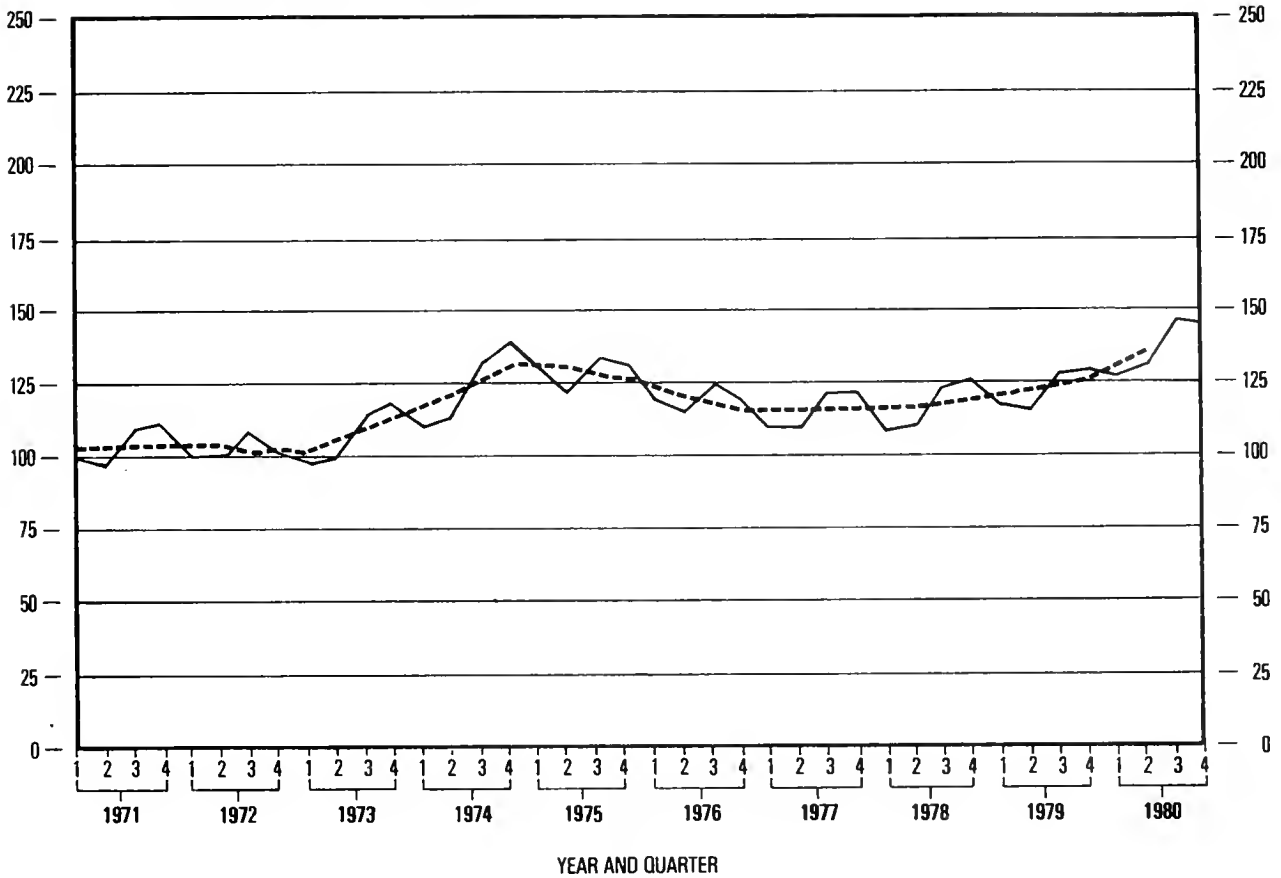

Larceny-Theft Trend and Seasonality

The quarterly relative crime rate for larceny-theft fluctuated between 89 and 168 during the period 1971 to 1980. The rate was lowest in the first quarter of 1973 and highest in the third quarter of 1980. Larceny-theft consistently bottomed out in the first quarter and peaked in the third quarter of each year. It will be noted from the accompanying graph that the configuration of quarterly relative larceny-theft rates was characterized by single peaks and troughs. For the first quarter through the fourth

quarter, the seasonal indices were 88.5, 102.5, 109.1, and 99.9, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.)

The larceny-theft trend was marked by alternating periods of upward and downward movement. Between 1971 and 1972, the moving average figures experienced a decline. This was followed by a period of increase that started in the second quarter of 1973 and continued into early 1976. Subsequently, the trend decreased until the end of 1977. A rise again ensued, commencing in 1978 and continuing into 1980.

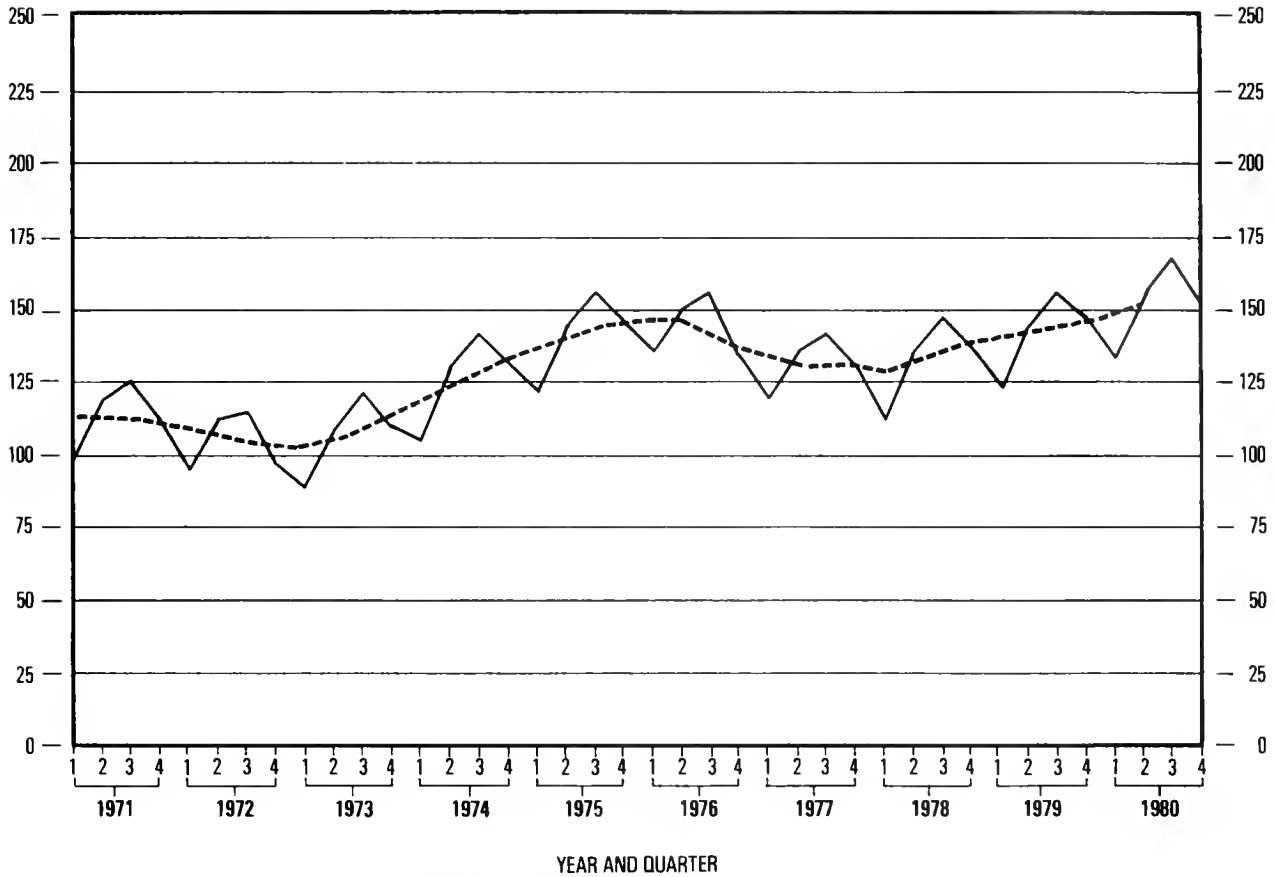

Motor Vehicle Theft Trend and Seasonality

The motor vehicle theft quarterly relative crime rate fluctuated between 84 and 113, the lowest range of variation of any Index offense during the 10-year period under study. The low occurred in the first quarter of 1978, while the high was reached in the third quarter of 1971. Motor vehicle theft was lowest in the first quarter (the winter months) and highest in the third quarter (the summer months) of each year. It will be noted from a review of the accompanying chart that the quarterly

relative crime rate data are characterized by dual peaks and single troughs, a departure from the types of configurations distinguishing the other Index crimes. The seasonal indices for the first quarter through the fourth quarter were 91.7, 98.0, 106.6, and 103.8, respectively. (See the last table in this appendix.)

The moving average was generally stable throughout most of the decade under review. Motor vehicle theft had the flattest trend curve of any Index offense during 1971 to 1980.

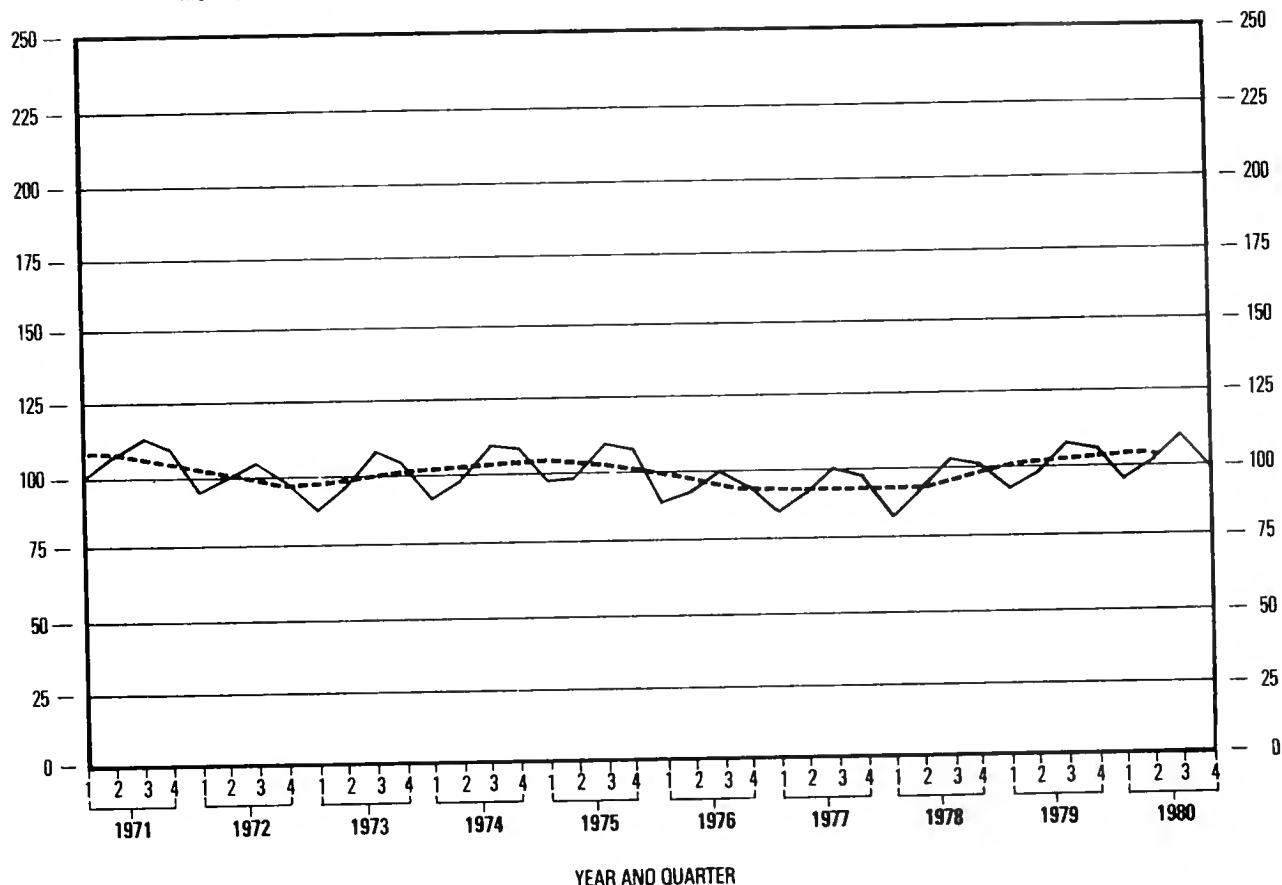

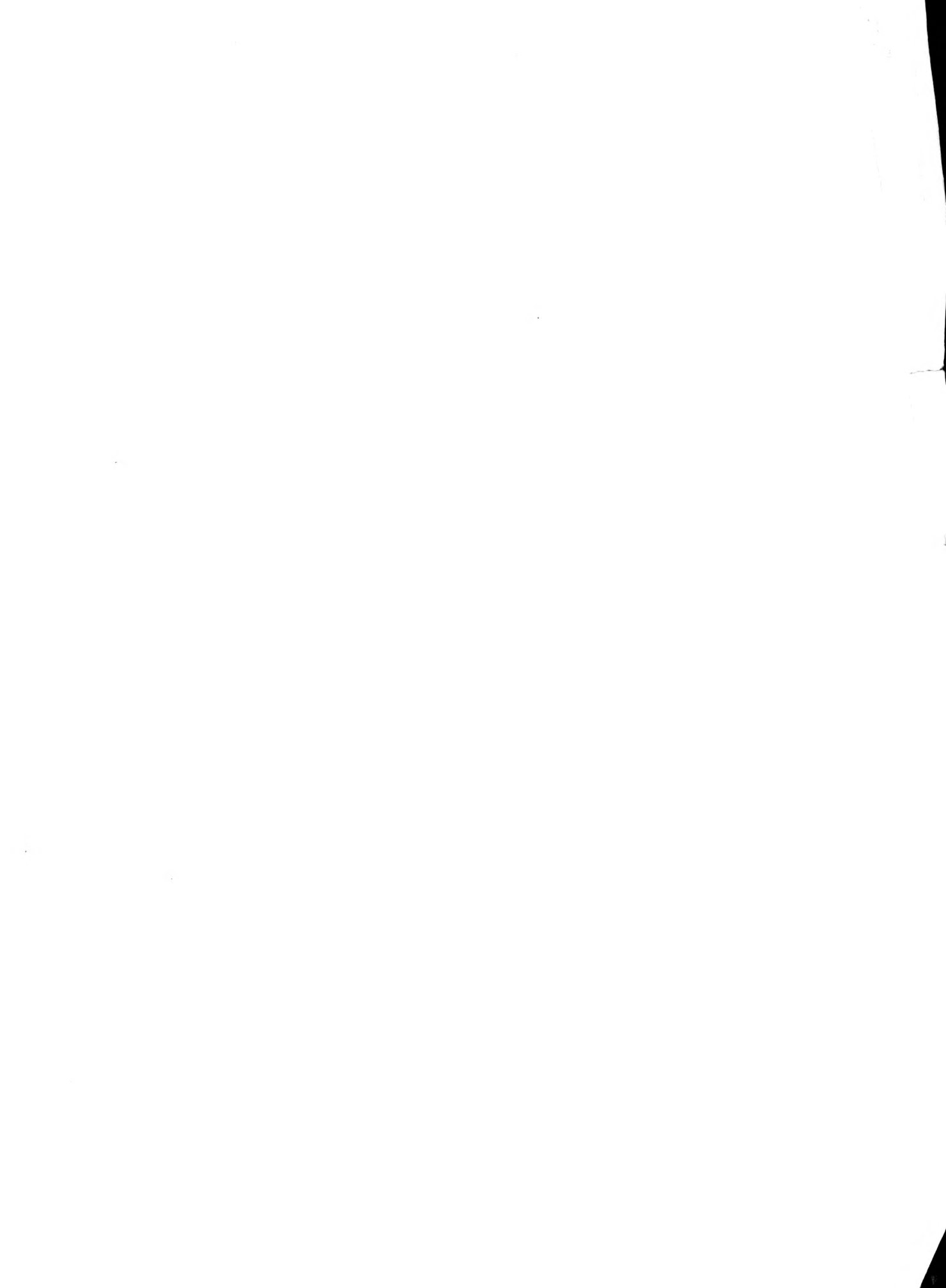




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
