

Charles G. "Lefty" Driesell



FIVE - O - FIVE IN 25

With his 500th career win, a 91-38 success over Towson State, 2/21, Lefty joined 3 other Division I coaches who are still active (with 10 or more years at a Division I school in achieving the elite 500 or more wins in their career. They are Ralph Miller, Oregon State; Guy Lewis, University of Houston; Norm Sloan, University of Florida; and Driesell.

Also, Driesell joined 16 others in Division I, with 10 or more years, with 500 or more wins in their coaching career. Kentucky's Adolph Rupp tops the list with 875 career wins in his 41 years coaching.

Of the 17 who have won 500 or more games, only 4 have averaged 20 or more wins a year. They are Rupp, 875 in 25 years; John Wooden, 667 in 29 years; Dean Smith, 550 in 24 years; and Driesell, 505 in 25 years.

With the 500th milestone win, Lefty joined Smith as the only 2 coaches, active, (among those with a minimum of 10 years in NCAA Division I) to win 500 games while compiling a winning percentage of better than 70%. Lefty's 505-210 gives him 71%. Smith is tops with 77%. In his 16 years at Maryland, he is 329-145 for 70% and an average of 20.6 wins a year.

The historic 500th win also gave Lefty another 20-game winning season. The 25 wins last season made it the 10th time in the 16 years his teams have won 20 or more games a season for the Terps. It was his 16th in his 25 years as a head coach since he had 6 seasons winning 20 or more at Davidson in his 9 years there. Driesell has not had a losing season since his first year as a college coach at Davidson, 1960. He won 20 or more games at Davidson 6 times. When he came to Maryland, the Terps had 3 straight losing seasons and had only two 20-game winning seasons in the history of the school. His first year at Maryland, 1969, he broke even at 13 games. The 25-12 record last year gave him a 20-game season in 10 of his 16 years. In his 25 years as head coach at Davidson and Maryland, Driesell's teams have been in the top 20 rankings 14 times and 9 of these 14 have been in the top 10. Lefty has had 5 teams ranked in the final "Top Ten"; 8th in 1973; 4th in 1974; 5th in 1975; 8th in 1980; and 10th in 1984. Two teams ranked 11th, 1972 and '76; and one ranked 18th, 1981.

His 1984-85 team, his 15th year, he won his first ACC Championship. It marked the 5th time he coached his teams to the ACC Championship game.

At Davidson, he had 4 teams ranked in the final "Top Ten"; 10th, 6th, 8th, and 3rd, and two teams ranked in the final "Top 20"; 16th and 18th. Davidson had never had a team that was nationally ranked in the history of the school and has not had a "Top Ten" ranked team since Driesell left. The year he left (after the 1968-69) season, the team he left behind was 27-3 and ranked 3rd in the final AP and UPI poll.

In his 16 years at Maryland, his teams have been invited to play in either the NCAA playoffs or the NIT, 15 of those 16 years. He has been in the NCAA championship tournament 10 times with a 12-11 record. His Davidson teams reached the East Regional Championship game twice, 1968 and 1969. The Terps played in the 1975 Midwest Regional title game,

Last year marked the 8th (7th for Lefty) appearance in NCAA Tournament play in the school's history. It is the 10th year Driesell has been invited to play in the Tournament. Last year's invitation was Lefty's 5th appearance in the tournament in the last 6 years. His totals are 9 wins and 7 losses. The 8 years of NCAA play in Terp history have been 1958, and Lefty's teams in 1973, 1975, 1980, 1981, 1983, 1984, and 1985.

Seven of his losses in NCAA Tournament play came to teams that advanced to the "Final Four". His Terps lost to last year's national champions, Villanova and the 1981 Indiana national champions. In 1983 they lost to runnerup Houston; Louisville (3rd) and Providence (4th) defeated the Terps in 1975 and 1974. His Davidson teams lost to runnerup North Carolina in 1968 and the 4th place Tarheels in 1969.

With a schedule ranked the toughest in the country by the NCAA last year, Maryland played during the regular season 13 teams that were extended an invitation to play in the NCAA tournament. The Terps also played 5 teams that were picked to play in the NIT.

By winning the first round of the Southeast Regional last year, it marked the second year in a row that Driesell has coached his team to the NCAA's "FINAL 16" or "SWEET 16". Five of the 13 teams they met in the regular season joined them in the "FINAL 16"; Villanova, Georgia Tech, Alabama, North Carolina and North Carolina State.

The 23 regular season wins last year were the most ever won by Driesell in his 16 years at Maryland. He won 22 in the 1974-75 season. His victory high has been 27 (27-5), the 1971-72 season as he led the Terps to the ACC title game, then went on to win the NIT, capping a 7-game post-season winning slate. The 37 games played last year were the most ever played by a Maryland team. Lefty's 1971-72 team played 32 while winning the NIT and the 1983-84 team played 32 games (24-8) with 3 in winning the ACC title and 2 in the NCAA Mideast Regionals.

Lefty got his first win as a college coach, 12/3/60, a 65-59 win over Wake Forest at Davidson. He got his 100th win, January, 1966, a 105-79 win over West Virginia, in Charlotte. He got his 200th win, January, 1971, 88-69 over Loyola, (Md.); 300th win, March, 1975 over Notre Dame, 83-71, in the NCAA Midwest Regionals in Las Cruces, New Mexico; the 400th win, November, 1980 over Navy, 86-64, in Cole; the 450th win, February, 1983, over Georgia Tech, 77-68, in Cole; his 475th win, over N.C. State, February, 1984, 63-50; and his 500th victory over Towson State, 2/21/85, 91-38 in Cole.

His 1979-80 Terrapins were picked to finish 6th in the ACC but finished 1st with an 11-3 regular season conference record and an overall record of 24-7. Driesell was named the ACC Coach of the Year as well as District Coach of the Year. Albert King gained All-America honors and Buck Williams joined the Olympic team. King was named the ACC "Player of the Year" and the ACC Tournament "Most Valuable Player." They then went on to advance to the semi-finals of the NCAA Eastern Regionals. Greg Manning was named an Academic All-American after All-ACC Academic honors for the third consecutive year. Manning also led the ACC in both free throw shooting and field goal percentage, the first and still only time any ACC player has won both titles outright.

Under Driesell, Maryland has a 16-1 record against International competition. Driesell and the Terps have hosted six National Teams in Cole Field House and have won all six games, including an overtime decision against the Russian National team. In addition, Maryland represented the United States in both the Eighth Intercontinental Cup Games in Mexico in 1974 and the Kirin World Cup games in Japan in 1980, winning both championships.

Driesell has coached two Rhodes Scholars in Danny Carrell at Davidson and Tom McMillen at Maryland. Both studied at Oxford. He has also developed 3 Phi Beta Kappas. McMillen was a 3-time Academic All-America and Greg Manning also achieved academic honors for the Terps. Driesell's son Chuck, was an All-ACC academic selection the past 2 years.

After playing in the NBA for 10 years, former Terrapin Len Elmore is now in his first year of study at the Harvard Law School.

Lefty has had 3 players play for the United States Olympic teams; McMillen, Steve Sheppard and Buck Williams. McMillen currently is playing for the Washington Bullets and Williams is a top performer with the New Jersey Nets.

With Elmore now in Harvard's Law School, there are 7 of Driesell's former Terrapins now playing in the NBA. They include McMillen and Williams, Brad Davis, Dallas Mavericks; John Lucas, San Antonio Spurs; Albert King, New Jersey Nets; Charles Pittman, Phoenix Suns; and Ben Coleman, Portland Trailblazers.

Among the many recognitions Driesell has received, one of the most prestigious and precious was the NCAA



"Award of Valor". Driesell became the first coach to receive the award when he helped save the lives of at least 10 children and several adults from a townhouse fire near Bethany Beach, Delaware in 1973.

Born on Christmas Day, 1931, Driesell has also been honored as a basketball player. A three-sport athlete at Granby High School in Norfolk, Va., he was named All-State in 1950 when his team won the Virginia State Championship. He was also named the outstanding player in the state tournament and received a scholarship to Duke.

He began his coaching career as the Junior Varsity Coach at Granby High School after graduating from Duke in 1954. He became Granby's Varsity Coach a year later but quickly advanced to Newport News High where his teams compiled a 57-game winning streak while winning 64 of 70 games. His overall high school record included 97 wins and only 15 losses. He also coached the junior varsity football team to two undefeated seasons.

At Duke, Driesell was a Dean's List student where he received his B.A. Degree. He later received his Master's in Education at William and Mary College.

He recently was appointed to serve on the ACC Men's Basketball committee.

Driesell and his wife, Joyce, are the parents of three daughters, Patty, Pam, a Maryland graduate, Carolyn and son Chuck, a June Dean's List graduate.

Terps Coaching Staff

Ron Bradley begins his third season as Driesell's senior member of the basketball coaching staff. Prior to joining the staff as a full time coach, Bradley spent two years with the team as a volunteer coach and served as the academic adviser for the team. He presently is studying for his Doctor's degree in Sport Psychology.

Ron came to Maryland from Nazarene College in Quincy, Massachusetts where he was head coach of the Crusaders for five years, posting a 96-51 overall record. As an undergraduate at Eastern Nazarene, he lettered four years, (1968-1972) scoring 2,649 points in 107 games. He was named to the N.A.I.A. and NCAA All-American teams and in 1972 was drafted by the New York Nets. He received his B.A. in psychology and history from Eastern Nazarene and his M.S. in physical education at Bridgewater (MA) State College. Ron is married to the former Denise Smith of Salisbury, Md. They have a seven-year-old son, Brad, and one-year-old daughter, Katlin.

Oliver Purnell joins the basketball staff this year coming from Old Dominion University where he was an assistant coach since 1975.

A 1975 graduate of Old Dominion, Purnell played basketball at ODU, 1971-75. He was a starting guard all three years for the varsity. As a senior, he captained the Monarchs to a 25-6 record and the NCAA Division II national championship. During his coaching years, ODU had a 196-99 record with nine post season trips. He scored 1,090 career points and is ranked fifth on the ODU all-time assist list with 474. He was a sixth round draft choice of the Milwaukee Bucks of the NBA.

Purnell joined the Monarchs' coaching staff in July of 1975 as a graduate assistant and later was elevated to a full-time assistant coach and in 1980 was named as top assistant coach. Purnell is widely recognized as one of the most successful recruiters in the game. He was largely responsible for many of the fine current players at ODU.

He has his Bachelor's degree in health and physical education and his Master's degree in Administration from ODU. He is married to the former Vicky Wise, and they have two daughters, Olivia 2 and Linsay, 6 months. He is a native of Berlin, MD and his wife a native of Snow Hill, MD. She is a University of Maryland 1975 graduate with a Bachelor of Science degree in music. She worked in the University's Admission Office two years after graduation then went to the Admissions Office at UMBC for another two years before marriage and moving to Norfolk.

Bart Bellairs joined Driesell's staff in September. Highly recommended and known by Driesell for some time, Bellairs came to Maryland from Wilkes College, (Wilkes-Barre, PA) where he was head coach for two years, 1983-85. He was an assistant at Wilkes before he was named head coach, 1981-82.

In his first year at Wilkes, he took the team from last place to first place in the Middle Atlantic Conference. With the reputation of a most successful recruiter, Bellairs, in his first year at Wilkes, signed five players off Pennsylvania High School teams. Three were from the state 4-A Williamsport title team; one from the 3-A Allentown Central Catholic title team; and one from the Northwest Area High School, Shickshinny, Pa., (near Wilkes-Barre).

While at Wilkes, he was an instructor in physical education, 1981-85; assistant baseball coach, 1981-84; head cross country coach, 1981-82; director of intramurals, 1981-85; and served an internship as assistant to the Athletic Director, 1980-81.

Bellairs received his BA in sociology/social work from Warren Wilson College (Asheville, NC) in 1979. As a student, he was selected to the Dean's list, voted to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities; and founded and was president of the college chapter of Fellowship of Christian Athletes his four years. He earned his Master of Science Degree in physical education from Western Illinois, 1981. While at Western Illinois, he was a Graduate Assistant Coach in both basketball and baseball as well as a physical education Instructor.

Born 8/24/56 in Knoxville, TN, Bellairs attended Madison Central High School, Richmond, KY. He and his wife Laurie have a 3-year-old daughter, Katie.

The very intense and hard working Baxter is another of Driesell's long list of standout point guards. An excellent ball handler and fine shooter, Jeff will start at guard this his senior year ... As a reserve, he has come in to get some key points for the Terps ... Last year, he hit 2 important foul shots in the final seconds in the final 2 regular season games against North Carolina State and Virginia to insure the Terp victories . . . He played in 35 of the 37 games last year ... He scored 97 points, 2.8 average, and handed out 46 assists ... He hit both field goal attempts in the NCAA Southeast Regional games against Villanova while playing 10 minutes ... His season and career high of 14 points was scored twice, vs UMES and Towson State ... As a freshman, playing in all 30 games, Jeff scored 103 points, his season high, had 33 assists and hit .794 from the foul line ... With the 3-point play that year, he hit on 6 of 15 attempts ... He had his high scoring game against Navy with 10 and had nine against Clemson and Georgia Tech... In his sophomore year, his high of 9 points came in the Mideast NCAA Regional game against West Virginia . . . Playing in 21 games, he averaged 7 minutes per game and had 48 points, 16 assists and 5 steals ... His 3-year point total is 248 points for the 86 games ... Jeff now has played in three straight NCAA tournaments, against Tennessee-Chattanooga and Houston in 1983; against West Virginia and Houston in 1984 and last year in the Southeast Regionals vs Miami (0), Navy and Villanova... Came to Maryland from DC's John Carroll High where he averaged 19 points his senior year while hitting 59% of his field goals ... He had a team high of 6.2 assists per game and hit 79% of his free throws . . . Jeff played in two post-season All-Star games, the Capital Classic (Largo, MD) and the Derby Classic (Louisville, KY) . . . He was an All-Tournament selection in the Capital City Classic in Richmond, the Seagull Classic in Atlantic City, and was the MVP of the Curley Classic in Baltimore . . . Jeff has two sisters and three brothers.



A pre-season All-American selection, Len enters his senior year for the Terps and Driesell as one of the nation's top players . . . Coaches and other experts believe that last year's "ACC Player of the Year" with another brilliant playing season will be a strong candidate for the national "Player of the Year" honors . . . A definite high pick in the NBA draft, going early ... For last year's accomplishments, refer to INSIDE FRONT COVER Bias caught the attention of the basketball world his sophomore year with a fantastic season climaxed with his brilliant performance in the ACC Tournament . . . He led the Terps with his dominating play to the ACC title giving Driesell his first championship in his 15 years at Maryland ... For his awesome 3-game display, he was the unanimous selection as the "Most Valuable Player" of the tournament by the vote of the 8 coaches . . . He also was a unanimous choice for the ACC All-Tournament team In the title game against Duke he had a game high and his career high of 26 points as he hit on 12 of 17 from the floor and 2 of 2 from the line . . . For the three games, he had 56 points with 26 of 43 from the field, four of six from the line and 18 rebounds . . . He also had 7 assists and played all but 5 minutes in the three games-115 minutes ... He totaled 15 points in each win over N.C. State and Wake Forest... He had 18 points on 6 of 9 and 6 of 6 foul shots against West Virginia in the opening game of the NCAA Mid-East Regional won by the Terps, 102-77... He hit 16 in the 72-70 loss to Illinois in the second round of the regional... As a freshman, it was his basket at the buzzer that put the Terps into the second round of the 1983 NCAA tournament as the Terps defeated Tennessee-Chattanooga, 52-51 and went on to meet Houston in the 2nd round of the Mid-West Regional ... In addition to his then career high 26 points against Duke in the ACC Championship game, he scored 25 against Duke in the regular season, 2/11 in Cole and 24 against North Carolina 1/12 in Cole and 24 also against Old Dominion at Norfolk, 1/21 ... He also had his then career high 10 rebounds against Duke along with his 25 points ... Len scored in double figures in the last 16 games of the season ... He missed scoring in double figures in only four games of the 32, giving him a total of 28 ... He would have started all 27 regular games last year but for Driesell's long time tradition of starting his seniors in the final home

game of the season . . . He had started 32 straight before the Virginia game as he started the last six of his freshman year . . . As the Terrapin basketball team opens the 1985 season, it will mark the "Silver Anniversary" for the Maryland alumnus as the University's team physician and Orthopedic Surgeon. The former Terp quarterback was selected as team physician in 1960. In all these 25 years he has medically supervised athletes in all of the University's sports programs, which now numbers 22.

He is with the football team at all games, home and away, and attends all the home basketball games and many away games. His office is on call at all times when the trainers call for him to see an athlete.

He is considered one of the nation's top Orthopedic Surgeons and is most prominent in the field of "Sports Medicine." He has an annual clinic which attracts the top Orthopedic Surgeons and athletic team doctors in the country. His reputation has brought him numerous professional athletes of all sports, men and women, for surgery and treatment.

Dr. Lavine had been the team physician for the Washington Redskins since 1975, but resigned in October. He also was the team physician for the Washington Bullets, 1973-79. Thus, his trophy mantle glitters with 5 Maryland ACC Championship rings, 2 Redskin Super Bowl rings, and one NBA Championship ring while with the Bullets.

Out of Pittsburgh's (PA) Schenley High School, he had scholarship offers from the University of Kentucky and West Virginia before choosing Maryland. In his first year as the Terp quarterback, he played for the legendary Clark Shaughnessy. Playing for the late Jim Tatum his junior year, he led the Terps to a 9-1 record including a 20-7 win over Missouri in the Gator Bowl in which he threw for two touchdowns.

Following graduation from the University's Medical School, he interned in Philadelphia and Cleveland, served two years in the Air Force then began his medical practice at Washington Hospital Center. He now works out of the Center and Sibley Hospital.

While guiding the basketball academic program, Wendy is studying for her Doctorate Degree in Counseling and Personnel Services/College Student Development Concentration.

She received her Bachelor of Arts in Sociology/Social Work from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1974, as she received Phi Beta Kappa honors. She studied for her Master's Degree in Education from the University of Indiana, Bloomington, in 1979.

Wendy will monitor each of the basketball players class schedules daily and maintain close records of their progress. Her program will include supervising, organizing and directing study hall periods and arranging for tutoring services when needed. She will serve as each players' individual counselor and lend the proper instruction in the development of study skills and time management techniques. She comes to the basketball program after having served a year as an academic advising intern in the Maryland football program.

Between her first and second degrees, she coached girls field hockey, basketball and softball at the Lawrence Academy (Groton, MA) and at the Moravian Academy (Bethlehem, PA) and also was a counselor in the residence hall at both preparatory schools. 

1970-71 14-12

Won 5 ACC games and upset 2nd ranked South Carolina in Cole Field House. Set attendance record of 180,842 an average of 12,056. (15 Home Games 180,842 — average 12,056) (26 games 273,553 — average 10,521).

1971-72 27-5


Won National Invitational Tournament title. Advanced to finals of ACC Tournament. Started string of consecutive NON-ACC wins with 17 against NON-LEAGUE opponents and started string of 14 consecutive wins with four in NIT. Ranked 11th in AP Poll. (14 Home Games 184,323 average 13,166) (32 games 352,436 average 11,014).

1972-73 23-7

Gained F1NAL E1GHT in NCAA Tournament. Ran streak to 31 consecutive wins against NON-ACC opponents before losing to Providence in the finals of the NCAA Eastern Regionals. Increased attendance record for fourth consecutive year. Won first 10 games of season to set consecutive win record of 14. 8th in AP Poll. (13 Home Games 172,828 average 13,294) (30 games 340,964 average 11,365).

1973-74 23-5

Ranked 4th in AP Poll. Lost to North Carolina State 103-100 in ACC finals in what was considered the best ever in the league tournament. (13 Home Games 157,357 average 12,104) (28 games 288,764 average 10,313).



1974-75 24-5

Ranked 5th in AP Poll. Set NCAA field goal percentage record hitting .547 for season. ACC Coach of Year. Gained FINAL EIGHT in NCAA Tournament. Beat Notre Dame to reach Championship game of Midwest Regionals. Won ACC regular season title with 10-2 record. Won all 4 games on home courts in North Carolina. Set new attendance records for Cole Field House. (14 Home Games 187,971 — average 13,427) (29 games 314,341 — average 10,839).

1975-76 22-6

Ranked 11th in AP Poll. 5th consecutive 22 plus victory season. Won first 11 games of season. Set Maryland free throw shooting record with .758. (15 Home Games 186,656 average 13,110) (28 games 343,785 average 12,278).

1976-77 19-8

Second year with 10 wins in a row. Had 11 in 1975-76. Brad Davis was 1st round pick by Los Angeles as a



Junior. Steve Sheppard 2nd round pick by Chicago. (19 Home Games 240,254 — average 12,645) (27 games 325,547 — average 12,057).

1977-78 15-13

Beat North Carolina State 109-108 in opening round of ACC Tournament after losing twice during regular season. Set school record with 130 points against East Carolina. (14 Home Games 172,173 — average 12,298) (28 games 304,501 — average 10,875).

1978-79 19-11

Gained 2nd round of NIT. Led ACC in attendance for eighth consecutive year. Upset top ranked teams in nation. No. 1 Notre Dame, No. 3 Duke, No. 4 North Carolina State, No. 8 North Carolina State. Win over Notre Dame on National TV. Buck Williams named Rookie of the Year in ACC. (18 Home Games 201,536 average 11,196) (30 games 316,449 average 10,548).

1979-80 24-7

Picked to finish 6th in the conference, the Terps led the way with an 11-3 record and were regular season champions. Advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Eastern Regionals and a No. 8 ranking in both wire service polls. In the final NCAA Division I Statistics they finished second in the nation in field goal percentage (55.1). Coach Driesell named ACC and District III "Coach of the Year". Albert King named Player of the Year (ACC), M.V.P. of the ACC Tournament, and 1st Team All-American by the Associated Press. Greg Manning became the first player ever in the ACC to capture both the field goal and free throw percentage titles in the same season. (16 Home Games 160,815 ---average 10,051) (31 games 317,501 average 10,241).

1980-81 21-10

Seventh time recording 20 or more victories. Advanced to the finals of the ACC Tournament for the sixth time, and to the second round of the

NCAA Tournament. Albert King became the Terp's all-time leading scorer, finishing his career with 2,058. points. Seniors Ernest Graham and Greg Manning also ended careers among top five in scoring: Graham 4th - 1,607 and Manning 5th -1,561. Manning established new marks for career field goal and free throw accuracy, hitting 58% of his shots from the floor and 86% of his foul shots. Four players drafted by NBA, with Buck Williams (Jr.) and Albert King going in the first round. Set new attendance records, both overall and average: (15 Home Games 196.978 -average 12,840).

1981-82 16-13

Fourth consecutive post-season tournament appearance, advancing to 2nd round of NIT. Upset No. 1 Virginia in overtime at home, 47-46, on final day of regular season. Center Charles Pittman selected in 3rd round of NBA draft by the Phoenix Suns. (16 Home Games 157,275 average 9,830) (29 games 286,264 average 9,871).



1982-83 20-10

Eighth season for Lefty's team to win 20 or more games a season. Had 2 big upset wins over UCLA and Notre Dame, both at Cole Field House, and by a point. Terps and U. Va. only teams in the ACC to beat eventual national champion, North Carolina State both games. The Terrapins, for the fifth consecutive year, went to post-season tournament. Selected for the Mid-West NCAA First Round Regionals, defeating Tennessee-Chattanooga before losing to NCAA finalist Houston by just 10 points.

1983-84 24-8

Two historic achievements highlighted Lefty's 15th season as head coach of the Terrapins: 1. He won his first Atlantic Coast Conference Championship. 2. He claimed his 300th victory for Maryland in the final regular season game with the 74-65 win over Virginia in Cole March 4. The year also gave him his ninth 20 wins or more as the Terps went 24-8. The Terrapins went to post-season tournament for the sixth consecutive year as they were selected for the NCAA Mid-East Regional. Three Terrapins were drafted by the NBA, center Ben Coleman and forwards Herman Veal and Mark Fothergill.



1984-85 25-12

With his milestone 500th career win, a 91-38 success over Towson State, 2/21, Lefty joined 5 other Division I coaches who were still active (with 10 or more years at a Division I school) in achieveing the elite 500 or more wins in their career. With Washington's Marv Harshman retiring, the active list is now 4; Driesell, Ralph Miller, Guy Lewis and Norm Sloan. The Terrapins went to post-season tournament for the seventh consecutive year as they were selected for the NCAA Southeast Regionals. Driesell advanced to the "Final 16" for the second consecutive year, losing to eventual NCAA Champion Villanova by a mere three points. The 25-12 mark gave Driesell a 20-game winning season in 10 of his 16 years with the Terps. He can claim coaching another All-American as Len Bias was accorded the honor as well as Bias being named ACC "Player of the Year".





Dr. John S. Toll

President

As president of a major research University with five campuses and 87,800 students worldwide, John S. Toll devotes considerable energy to strengthening excellence in teaching, research, and public service. He is committed to the University's effort to develop programs of high quality, to retain and attract outstanding faculty and students, and to extend the University's expertise throughout society. As a highly respected leader in higher education, he has created new partnerships with industry, government, schools, and other institutions in this region.

In the past two years, milestones in the University's progress have included two Pulitzer Prizes for faculty members and important developments in medical research and treatment, in biotechnology, and in many other areas, among them:

- The National Science Foundation awarded the College Park campus a \$16-million grant to establish a Systems Research Center, one of six national centers of excellence in engineering.
- The University of Maryland Foundation's high-tech research park has been selected as the site for the nationl Supercomputing Research Center.
- Three private gifts of \$1.5-million each gave great impetus to the University's thrust to increase the level of private support. More than 25,000 alumni, parents, and friends also made gifts to the University during 1983-84, for a record level of private philanthropic support of \$10.4 million. "Our future will



be built on the twin pillars of private and public support," says Dr. Toll.

• The arts flourish at Maryland, including the highly acclaimed Handel Festival; the travelling exhibit on "350 Years of Maryland Art and Architecture"; the gala 15th anniversary of the Maryland International Piano Festival and Competition; and numerous other cultural events.

John Toll graduated from Yale with highest honors and earned his advanced degrees in physics at Princeton. During his distinguished career as a theoretical physicist and educator, for 12 years he chaired the physics department at the College Park campus and led it to national prominence. He then served as president of the State University of New York at Stony Brook from 1965 to 1978, when he returned to Maryland to become the University's 22nd president. An avid jogger and tennis player, Dr. Toll and his wife Deborah have two daughters.



John Brooks Slaughter, the third Chancellor of the College Park Campus, is a distinguished scientist and a dedicated humanitarian as well as an able administrator. His research specialities are in the fields of electrical engineering and computer systems. His accomplishments in these fields have brought him high recognition. He is a Fellow in the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He holds membership in the National Academy of Engineering, was selected U.C.L.A. Engineering Alumnus of the Year (1978), received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Science Foundation (1979), and was recognized for Distinguished Service in Engineering by Kansas State University (1981).

Dr. John Brooks Slaughter

Chancellor

Since his undergraduate days Dr. Slaughter has been active in humanitarian affairs. As chapter president of Zeta Sigma Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., (San Diego) from 1957 to 1959 he participated in cultural, social, and educational activities directed toward the enhancement of the black community in San Diego. As president of the Board of Directors of the San Diego Urban League he was concerned with providing equal opportunities in education, employment, housing, and social services.

Prior to assuming his responsibilities at the University of Maryland he served as Academic Vice President and Provost at Washington State University and as Director of the National Science Foundation. In his inauguration address to the College Park campus on May 3, 1983, he set the course for his administration: "I want to see this campus continue its vigorous pursuit of academic excellence while reaching out to a more diversified student body. I want the University of Maryland at College Park to set a national standard for excellence and equality. As we pursue these goals, we must also enhance our contributions to the State. Finally, I am committed to a university that is a community, a community that takes pride in itself and touches each person involved in the campus with pride."

Dr. Betty F. Smith Chairperson, Athletic Council Faculty Representative For Athletic Department



Dr. Smith was appointed to the all important position as Chairperson of the Athletic Council by Chancellor John B. Slaughter, June 1, 1985. She succeeds Dr. Charles A. Taff who chaired this important University and Atlantic Coast Conference athletic supervision responsibility since 1978. With her appointment, Dr. Smith has the distinction and privilege as

the first female educator to be named to the position in the Conference.

Dr. Smith came to the University in August, 1970, as Professor and Chairman of the Department of Textiles and Consumer Economics. She continues to serve in this capacity. Prior to joining the faculty at Maryland, she was a member of the faculty at Cornell University.

A native of Arkansas, she received her B.S. degree at the University of Arkansas, 1951; an M.S. degree from the University of Tennessee, 1957; a Ph.D. degree in Textiles from the University of Minnesota; and another Ph.D. degree in Biochemistry, also from Minnesota in 1965.

In 1971, Dr. Smith was elected a Fellow of the Textile Institute. She teaches and conducts research in textile chemistry. She belongs to numerous professional societies, including the American Chemical Society, Sigma Xi, the Fiber Society, and the American Economics Association.

Dr. Smith has approximately 70 publications and papers from her research in textiles. She is co-author of a book, Introduction to Textiles, (Smith and I. Block) which was published by Prentice-Hall in Spring, 1982. In 1984, Dr. Smith was named a distinguished Alumna of Southern University.

Since coming to the University, Dr. Smith has served on numerous Department, College, and University committees.

While having some time to relax from her heavy academic assignments, Dr. Smith is an avid golfer.

Francis A. Gray, Jr. (Maryland '43) Associate Athletic Director



Frank Gray joined the athletic department as Administrative Director in 1972. He is primarily responsible for the fiscal program of the department with an operating budget of approximately \$6,000,000.

A native of Maryland and 1943 graduate of the University with a degree in Agriculture Economics and

Farm Management, he began his professional career with the University as an Assistant County Agricultural Agent.

He entered private industry in 1955 but returned to the University in 1960 as Associate Dean of Student Life. Bob Stumpff returned to the athletic department in July 1980 as Associate Athletic Director for Business Affairs. He now supervises the game day operations of Byrd Stadium and Cole Field House. He is responsible for the daily operation of all athletic facilities, including security and scheduling. He also coordinates the departments' insurance programs and wurall functions.

Bob initially came to the University from Lewistown, Pa., where he was on the wrestling and track teams. As an undergraduate at Maryland, he was the manager of the wrestling team. Bob received his degree in Transportation Administration in June, 1968. Upon graduation, he was named Administrative Assistant to the Director of Athletics, Jim Kehoe. From September 1969 through July 1980, he was the Associate Director of the Maryland Student Union. He is a 1978 graduate of the University of Kentucky's College of Business Management Institute.

Since 1970 he has been a member of the Board of Governors of the "M" Club and is presently a faculty adviser to the Sigma Circle of Omicron Delta Kappa. Bob is also a member of the College of Athletic Business Managers Associates.

Gothard Lane (Randolph Macon '71) Assistant Athletic Director



Gothard Lane assumed the duties of Assistant AD for Non-Revenue Sports in March of 1982. He also works with the football and basketball programs handling their scheduling.

He joined the Maryland football staff in 1973 as a defensive backfield coach, a position he held for four years. From 1977 until his appoint-

trative Assistant to the Director of Atheltics and Director of Recruiting.

As Assistant AD he has the administrative responsibility for all non-revenue sports, men and women.

Frank Costello (Maryland '68) Strength and Conditioning Coach



Frank Costello assumed the position as Assistant to the Athletic Director in 1981 and heads up the strength and conditioning program for the entire athletic department.

Certainly no stranger to Maryland, Costello was an All-American on the Terrapin Track teams in 1965, '66 and '68. Upon graduation he served

six years as an assistant track coach and was then appointed head coach in 1974, a position he held for seven years. He developed several world class track stars including the all-time hurdler Renaldo Nehemiah.

In addition to coaching track and field, Costello has published articles on training techniques in several national publications, is in demand as a clinical speaker and noted for his theories on improving speed, conditioning and flexibility. He served as a conditioning consultant for the Green Bay Packers from 1977-80 and has served as the U.S. High Jump coach for the Olympic Development program.

Frank came to Maryland as the New Jersey State High Jump Champion and record holder in 1963 and was undefeated in ACC, IC4A and NCAA competition in 1965 winning both NCAA titles. While competing for the Terrapins he also won seven titles in the Penn Relays, the Millrose games, the Eastern European Championships, the Southern Hemisphere Games and the French National Championship. He was ranked third in the world in 1966.

Costello works closely with the coaches, trainers and team physician in developing conditioning programs suited for each individual.

He is assisted by Scott Fanz, a former standout offensive tackle for the Terrapins, 1978-80. He was named Costello's assistant immediately following graduation.

William "Spider" Fry (Maryland '51) Assistant Athletic Director



"Spider" Fry moved into an administrative position in the athletic department in 1978 after having devoted 15 years to the athletes as Head Trainer. He now serves as Director of the Golf Facilities.

As a Maryland undergraduate he earned his letter in varsity soccer and a B.S. Degree in Physical Education.

He was an assistant trainer at Maryland before taking over the Head Trainer duties at Dartmouth.

He returned to Maryland, after five years at Dartmouth, in March 1967.

Jeff Hathaway (Maryland '81) Business Manager of Athletics



Jeff Hathaway returned to the University in November of 1982 to become head Trainer for the Terrapins basketball team. He also served as an assistant to Frank Gray, the Associate Athletic Director for Administrative Affairs. In May of '84 he took over the duties of Business Manager of Athletics and will supervise and administer the Athletic sales office

Department Ticket sales office.

Following graduation from Maryland, Hathaway went immediately to the Chicago White Sox baseball team as Director of Community Relations. He arranged all public appearances and speaking engagements of all the White Sox players during the 1981 and 1982 baseball seasons. He came to Maryland from DeMatha High where he worked as basketball manager and assistant trainer with Coach Morgan Wootten.

He served two years as student trainer with basketball at Maryland and two years with the Terrapin football team as a student trainer.

Jeff did his public relations internship with the Washington Redskins during the 1980 training camp at Dickinson College with PR director Joe F. Blair. He received his B.S. in Athletic Administration through individual studies program. He is a certified emergency medical technician.

Thomas M. Fields (Maryland '42) Executive Director Educational Foundation



Tom Fields has served as Executive Director of the Maryland Educational Foundation since 1970 when he retired as a Colonel in the U.S. Marine Corp.

For the past fiscal year the funds generated by the Educational Foundation totaled \$2,250,000. The membership of the Terrapin Club has

expanded to 3,203 with 82 life members (\$10,000 contribution), 96 Super Terrapins (\$2,500 annual contribution), 570 Diamondbackers (\$1,500 annual contribution) and 603 Gold members (\$750 annual contribution).

Over one half of all contributors did not attend the University of Maryland but all are strong supporters of Intercollegiate Athletics and its principals of competition.

The funds provided by the foundation have enabled the Terrapins to develop a Women's program that has also gained national recognition. All funds go to scholarships and the scholarship program for Women athletes is on a par with the program for men's non-revenue sports.

Fields was a track star for the Terps as an undergraduate and helped lead the Terps to one of their finest days ever at the Penn Relays winning three Championship of America relay races. During World War 11 he served in combat on Guadalcanal, Vella Lavella, Bouganville, and Iowa Jima. He also served in Korea and Vietnam and at the time of his retirement from the Corps he was the Deputy Director of Information, Headquarters, Marine Corps.

John W. Zane (Maryland '60) Assistant Athletic Director



Jack Zane returned to Maryland in August of 1969 after serving as the Sports Information Director for The George Washington University for six years.

He received his degree in Journalism from Maryland in February of 1960 after serving as a student assistant to Joe F. Blair for three years. He served

as a full time assistant with Blair for two years after graduation.

While at Maryland he was the first Executive Sports Editor of the Diamondback, SMC of Pi Kappa Alpha and a member of Sigma Delta Chi Journalism fraternity.

He served seven years as a member of the NCAA Public Relations Committee and one as a member of the NCAA Public Relations/Promotions Committee. He has been a member of CoSIDA for 25 years and was elevated to the presidency of CoSIDA for 1985-86 at the annual meeting, July 1 in Boston.

He is a member of Football, Basketball, and Baseball Writers of America, the Maryland Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, the Atlantic Coast Sportswriters and the Washington D.C. Touchdown Club as well as a Diamondback member of the Terrapin Club.

A graduate of Southern High at Lothion, he is a native of Maryland and served four and a half years in the Navy before enrolling at Maryland. He is married to the former Judy Allen of Fayetteville, West Virginia and a graduate of The George Washington University.

Joe F. Blair (Missouri '50) Assistant Sports Information Director



Joe returned to Maryland in August of 1983 where he began his public relations career in August of 1950. He served as the Sports Information Director at Maryland for 13 years before joining the Washington Redskins as Public Relations Director and Head of Media Relations.

He has worked with the NFL

Players Association, helped out at Maryland and served as a consultant with the Washington Federals during his 35 years in the Washington area.

Joe spent a total of 18 years with the Washington Redskins, retiring after earning his Super Bowl ring in 1982 when the Redskins defeated the Miami Dolphins.

During his years he says he has enjoyed working with some of the finest coaches in the profession, especially Jim Tatum, Vince Lombardi, Joe Gibbs and Jack Pardee, and one of the best General Managers in the NFL, Bobby Beathard. After only one season back at Maryland he includes Bobby Ross among the group.

He has worked with a National Championship team at Maryland (1953) and the Super Bowl Champions with the Redskins. He worked 12 Super Bowl games for the NFL office.

The "Blair Lounge" at the Ledo restaurant was named for him in 1956.

Terrapin Olympians

The ultimate individual reward in the world of intercollegiate athletics is to be named an All-American and to hopefully go on to represent the United States in international competition.

Three Terrapin basketball players have earned such berths on the prestigious United States Olympic Team, with all three being selected in the past three Olympic years.

Tom McMillen, who ranks as the number three career scorer in Maryland history, became the first Terp to represent his country. The three time All-American center for Coach Driesell, helped the 1972 U.S. Team, coached by Henry Iba, earn a Silver Medal.

A Rhodes Scholar and eight year veteran of the N.B.A., he is currently playing for the Washington Bullets.

Steve Sheppard, known to Maryland fans as "Bear," was selected to the 1976 Olympic team. An integral force in leading the Terps to three national rankings, he also provided that same force in helping the U.S. team, coached by Dean Smith, in its triumph of the Gold Medal in the '76 Games in Montreal.

Buck Williams, Maryland's tenacious power forward for three seasons was the last Terp honored, when he was chosen for the 1980 Olympic team. The team went on to a 4-2 record against various NBA All-Star teams and also defeated the Gold Medal winning 1976 team.

This first-round draft pick of the New Jersey Nets, third over-all, is Maryland's second all-time leading rebounder and is reckoned with in the N.B.A., after being named Rookie of the Year in 1981-82.



University of Maryland athletes and its program receives the best press coverage in the nation. The Terrapins are in a unique situation located just eight miles from the heart of the nation's capital and 30 miles from the major metropolitan area of Baltimore.

The Terps get daily "beat" coverage from the Washington Post, the Washington Times, and USA Today in our nation's capital. In Baltimore, the daily attention comes from the Baltimore News-American and the Baltimore Morning and Evening Sun.

In addition, there are 10 other daily papers publishing around the state and some of the finest weekly papers in the country. Thus, the Terrapins have 16 daily papers covering their athletic activities. The Washington Post has a daily circulation of over 800,000 and 1.1 million with the Sunday edition. USA Today has over a million daily circulation and



the Baltimore Morning Sun has a daily circulation of over 200,000 and over 400,000 on Sunday. In all, of the 16 daily newspapers that give the Terrapins blanket coverage, some 4 million or more readers will follow the Terrapin athletic teams.

Along with the print coverage, the Terps get game coverage from the seven television stations in the two cities: WRC, WTTG, WJLA, and WDVM in Washington and WMAR, WBAL, and WJZ in Baltimore along with their radio affiliates as well as numerous other radio stations in DC and around the state. They do frequent individual interviews with the coaches and athletes.

Both wire services staff the Terrapin games with Regional Sports Editors Gordon Beard of the Baltimore Bureau of the Associated Press and Don Cronin of the Washington Bureau of United Press International.

With Washington, DC, the News Capital of the World, every major publication and news outlet has a staff in Washington giving Maryland national coverage of all major athletic events.

For the seventh consecutive season, the affable and very busy Johnny Holliday will call the playby-play for the Maryland Terrapins. He has handled the play calling of Maryland football the past seven years also, all on radio 63 AM, WMAL. This is Johnny's 29th year as an announcer for both radio and television, his 24th as a sportscaster.

The popular and talented Holliday's career was highlighted last year as the ABC Radio Network chose him to do the Olympic reports for ABC. He traveled to Insbruck to broadcast the Winter Olympics, then spent 3 weeks in Los Angeles doing the Summer portion of the Olympics for ABC Network and WMAL. For many years, he has been called upon by the network to call many major events including the Masters and U.S. Open Golf championships; title boxing matches; major league baseball, playoff games and the World Series; NFL and NBA reports and a lot more for the network and WMAL.

Johnny did the play-by-play for the Washington Federals on WMAL their two years of existence. He hosts the Stadium show from RFK before every Redskin game. He also will and has hosted the Bobby Ross and Lefty Driesell radio and television shows.

He does the morning sports broadcasts for WMAL then does the afternoon ABC Information Radio Network shows.


