A new era of Illinois cross country is on the horizon as for the first time in 36 years, Gary Wieneke will not be the head coach. Instead, the reins of the program have been turned over to Paul Pilkington.

Pilkington comes to Illinois after serving as an assistant track and field coach at his alma mater, Weber State. In his two seasons as the men's 5,000 and 10.000 meter coach and female distance and hurdler coach, Pilkington produced three NCAA qualifiers, ten regional qualifiers and 34 all-conference selections. In addition, he led the Wildcats to indoor and outdoor track championships in 2002 and in 2001 and 2002, Weber State's cross country team placed second in the Big Sky conference.

An accomplished ruunner, Pilkington won the 1994 USA Track and Field marathon national championship as well as the Los Angeles marathon. In 1995, Pilkington earned a spot on the U.S. World Championships team.

Pilkington inherits a team with a strong blend of youth and experience. Six letterwinners are returning from last season's squad which finsihed third out of 24 teams at the regional meet, the strongest showing by an Illini squad in 16 years. Leading the way is sophomore Jason Bill who is coming off a season in which he qualified for the individual NCAA championship.

From the first day he stepped on campus, Bill showed why the future of Illinois cross country was in good hands. As a true freshman, Bill earned four top-10 individual finishes and was an All-Midwest Region pick after finishing seventh at the Regional Championships. That performance earned the rookie a berth to the NCAA Championships as an at-large selection, the first Illini freshman to do so since Craig Virgin 29 years earlier.

While Bill appears to have a tight reign on the top spot, the Illini will look for depth and consistency at the next four scoring postions.

Seniors Adam Palumbo and Brent Pfeiffer should fill that role this season. Palumbo competed five times for the Illini in 2002 finishing fourth on two ocassions including the NCAA Midwest Regional where he finished 42nd overall with a career-best 10,000 meter time of 31:06.11.

Palumbo returns in the best shape in his career after a rigorous summer of training.

Pfeiffer returns to the lineup after redshirting the 2002 season because of an injury. As a junior, Pfeiffer competed in six races and scored for the Illini in two outings including the Big Ten Championships.

Pilkington will be counting on returnees Kris Cunningham and Jon Houseworth to team with Palumbo and Bill to solidify the top of Illinois' lineup. Each runner has shown marked improvement, with Houseworth using the track sesason tohelp build his stamina.

After finishing second on the team to senior John Kronforst through the season's first-four meets, Bill took over as the team's top performer at the NCAA Pre-National Meet where he

earned a top 50 individual finish. At the Big Ten Championships Bill ran an 8,000 meter personal best of 24:48.2 to lead the team to an eighth place finish.

Bill followed that performance with a seventh place finish at regionals, which led Illinois' third place team finish. In his final performance of the season, Bill had the opportunity to run at the NCAA individual championship.

The Illini have a strong group of incoming freshman who will be expected to step up and contribute immediately.

Pilkington is looking for one or two freshman to place in the team's top seven. Expected to compete for those spots are Mike Kelley, Eric Tietz, Kacey Carr, Ed Murray and Tim Kelly.

For the first time in 36 seasons the Illinois men's cross country program will have a new coach at the helm as Paul Pilkington prepares for his first season as them men's cross country head coach.

With the talented stable of runners Pilkington has, the Illini are looking to continue their upward climb in the Big Ten.

Paul Pilkington comes to the Illini after serving two seasons as an assistant track and field

coach at Weber State University. At Weber State, he coached the male 5,000 and 10,000-meter runners, all female distance runners, and female hurdlers. In 2003 he coached ten regional qualifiers and 3 NCAA national qualifiers. In addition, he boasts 34 all-conference selections in his two seasons.

At Weber State, Pilkington led the Wildcats to the 2002 Big Sky conference title in men's and women's indoor and outdoor track. In 2003, the women's team repeated as indoor champions. Under his direction, Weber State's cross country team placed second in the Big Sky in 2001 and 2002.

Wayne Angel

Pilkington has served as a personal cross country coach in Roy, Utah where he coached five female U.S. Olympic Trials qualifiers, three Foot Locker cross country national finalists and over twenty Utah high school champions, six state record holders and two high school All-Americans.

As a runner, Pilkington has had a very successful career. In 1994 he won the USA Track and Field marathon national championship as well as the Los Angeles marathon. In 1995 he was a member of the U.S. World Championships team, while in 1992, Pilkington was the USA Track and Field 20-kilometer national champion. He was also a four-time Olympic Trials qualifier in 1988, 1992, 1996 and 2000.

A 1981 graduate of Weber State, Pilkington earned U.S. Track and Field Federation All-American status in the steeplechase. In 1987, he was recognized as a NJCAA

All-American in the steeplechase while at the College of Southern Idaho. In 1992, he graduated from Utah State with a master's degree in instructional design.

He and his wife Darby have 3 children, Jake (22), Seth (20) and Erin, (17).

Wayne Angel comes to Illinois after a one-year stint at the University of Iowa where he was the head women's cross country coach and assistant track and field coach for the Hawkeyes. During his brief stint in Iowa City, Iowa, Angel helped guide the Iowa women's track and field team to a sixth-place finish at the Big Ten Outdoor Championships, the school's highest finish in nine years. Angel received his B.A. in physical education from the University of Illinois in 1982 while enjoying a successful track and field career. A two-time Big Ten Champion as a member of the 4x400 meter relay, Angel ended his one year Illinois career as the school-record holder in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 50.56 seconds and currently ranks fourth on the school's all-time list in the event. A tri-captain for the Illini in 1981, Angel won his first Big Ten title at the 1981 Big Ten Indoor

Championships in the 4x400 meter relay with a time of 3:12.7 before claiming the same title outdoors with a time of 3:08.1. Angel also finished fourth for the Illini at the Big Ten Indoor Championships in the 500 meters and fourth in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles outdoors.

Angel is a former Army Airborne Ranger, and a distinguished honor graduate of the Army's Air Assault School. A twotime USTAFF and Junior College All-American, Angel was inducted into the Rantoul High School (IL) Hall of Fame in 1985.



2002 IN REVIEW

Illinois' cross country team used a strong blend of youth and experience to close coach Gary Wieneke's career on a high note. As a team, the Illini had four top-five finishes, including two victories, and a top-ten finish.

The season began with a second place showing at the Great American Invitational. In the race, the Fighting Illini were paced by senior John Kronforst and freshman Jason Bill. Kronfrost finished second and Bill came in third. The race proved to be a preview for the Illlini's season, as the duo finished either first or second for the team in every meet for the year.

In their second meet of the season, the Illinois State Pre-Regional Meet, the Illini topped the seven team field by placing all five of their scorer's in the top eight.

After a 16th place showing at the Roy Griak Invitational, the Fighting Illini placed first at the Illinois Invitational as Kronforst and Bill came in first and second respectively. In the final tune-up before the Big Ten Championship, the Pre-National Meet, Bill became the first Illini other than Kronforst to lead the team.

At the Big Ten Championships, the Fighting Illini finished eighth, for their best showing since an eighth place finish in 1999. Career best performances were turned in by Bill (24:48.2) and classmate Paul Jellema (25:26.6), the first and fourth scorer's for the Illini.

In the NCAA Midwest Regional Championship, the Illini runners turned in the school's top regional finish in 16 years, finishing third at the 24-team championship. Bill had a record-setting performance, earning All-Midwest Regional honors with a seventh-place finish in a time of 30:15.55. It was Illinois' best individual finish at regionals since 1996 and was just nine seconds from being one of the top-10 10,000 meter performances in school history.

Kronforst earned all-region honors as well, following his 12th place finish. In doing so, he became the first Illini runner to earn back-to-back all-region honors since Scott McClennan in 1997-99.

With his finish, Bill became the first Illini individual to qualify for the NCAA Championships since 1996. He was also the first Illinois freshman to qualify for the NCAA meet since 1973 when Craig Virgin qualified and finished third.

In addition to Bill and Kronforst, seniors Justin Mitchell and Aaron Wahls were consistent scorers for Illinois and junior Adam Palumbo came on strong at the end of the season to score in the final three meets. Mitchell was the third scorer in four meets and the fourth scorer in his two other competitions, while Wahls scored in four of six events, including being the fifth scorer at regionals. The Big Ten Conference

This year marks the 88th rendition of the Big Ten Cross Country Championships and the Illinois cross country team will be making its 79th appearance. The Big Ten first sponsored a cross country championship in 1908, with Nebraska claiming the first title. Four years later in 1912, Illinois made its first appearance at the Championships and finished a modest seventh, led by R.T. Welsh who finished eighth individually. A year later, Illinois vaulted to second in the team standings thanks to a second-place finish by A.H. Mason, sparking Illinois' cross country prowess within the Big Ten Conference.

Illinois did not field a team during the 1916 season and a Conference championship was not held from 1917-18 on account of World War I. Illinois and the rest of the Big Ten returned to competition in 1919 with the Illini finishing seventh. Illinois again abstained from competition in 1939 and sent just three competitors to Chicago for the 1940 Championships. After not competing at the Championships from 1951-53, Illinois returned strong in 1954 with a third place finish. Illinois' last missed action at the Big Ten Championships came in 1964, when the Championships were ironically held at the University of Illinois Golf Course in Savoy. In fact 1964 saw only six teams compete as Michigan, Ohio State and Purdue failed to field teams.

While Illinois' participation was an off-and-on affair early on in the programs history, there is no doubting Illinois success when it comes to the Big Ten Championships. In the previous 78 years of competition, Illinois has won three team titles, finished in the top two 20 times, in the top three 28 times and in the top four on 47 occasions.

The Illini have also had four runners claim eight Big Ten individual titles, most recently by Craig Virgin in 1976. In fact, Virgin was undefeated at the Big Ten Championships, winning a then unprecedented four consecutive Big Ten titles from 1973-76. Indiana's Bob Kennedy and Michigan's Kevin Sullivan (currently an Illinois volunteer assistant) are the only other Big Ten competitors to win four straight titles. Joining Virgin as Big Ten Champions for the Illini are Allen Carius in 1962-63, Vic Twomey in 1945 and Robert Woolsey in 1932.

History of Illinois Cross Country

The University of Illinois has had a strong and successful program ever since the early 1900s. Several great runners have made significant contributions throughout these successful years. Most recently, Len Sitko owned the spotlight. Sitko finished second in the 1990 Big Ten meet and went on to earn All-America honors with a 22nd-place finish at the NCAA meet.

In the 1980s, UI won one Big Ten crown and finished second on four other occasions. The premier runners of the decade were All-Americans Kerry Dickson, Jeff Jacobs, Greg Domantay, Ty Wolf and Joe Leuchtmann.

The '70s were dominated by great individual performances. In 1971, Rick Gross finished second in the Big Ten and ninth in the nation. Jim Eicken earned All-America honors in 1978, and Mike Durkin finished third in the conference and 18th in the nation in 1973.

Craig Virgin was synonymous with success in the early 1970s. He was the first runner in Big Ten history to become a four-time cross country champion, winning the crown from 1973-76. Virgin also won the 1975 NCAA championship and went on to win the cross country world championship in 1980 and '81.

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Preceding Virgin in the 1960's were All-Americans Ken Brown, Allen Carius and Ken Howse. In 1960, Brown finished fourth in both the Big Ten and the nation. Howse garnered All-American status in 1969 after a fourth in the Big Ten and 37th nationally. The dominant Fighting Illini runner in the '60s was Allen Carius. In 1962 and 63, Carius repeated as the Big Ten champion as well as the national champion. He stands as the only to win back-to-back Big Ten and national crowns.

Each year, most of these former athletes, along with dozens of other Illinois cross country alumni (and their families) from all decades, return to Champaign-Urbana one weekend during the fall to keep the Fighting Illini tradition alive. The returnees annually challenge the current team to an exhibition meet.



John Kornforst earned back-to-back All-Midwest Regional honors after finishing ninth at the 2000 regional meet and 12th at the 2001 meet.



Sophomore Jason Bill led Illinois to a third place regional finish in 2002, placing seventh. The finish was the Illini's best since 1986 when they finished second.

Fighting Illini Cross Country





Since its founding in 1867, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign has earned a reputation of international stature. Its distinguished faculty, outstanding resources, breadth of academic programs and research disciplines, and talented and diverse student body constitute an educational community ideally suited for teaching and research. Located in east central Illinois in the twin cities of Urbana and Champaign (population 110,000), the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign is the state's flagship public university.

STUDENTS

The University has a fundamental commitment to undergraduate education. More than 26,000 undergraduate students are enrolled in nine undergraduate divisions, which together offer some 4,000 courses in more than 150 fields of study.

The divisions are: the College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences; College of Applied Life Studies; College of Communications; College of Commerce and Business Administration; College of Education; College of Engineering; College of Fine and Applied Arts; College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Institute of Aviarion.

Undergraduate admission is highly selective. In a recent freshman class, the average student was in the top 10 percent of his or her high school graduating class and scored in the top 10 percent of those taking the national college entrance examination. Approximately 9,000 graduate and professional students are enrolled in more than 100 disciplines. Many of these programs rank in the top 10 in the country, making Illinois among the nation's top 20 universities that grant doctoral degrees, according to the National Research Council.

WORLD-CLASS FACULTY

Many faculty have been recognized for exceptional scholarship with memberships in the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the National Academy of Sciences, and the National Academy of Engineering; with the National Medal of Science; as National Science Foundation Young Investigators; and by such organizations as the National Endowment for the Humanities, Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, National Academy of Education, and the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation. At Illinois, research has a home in libraries, laboratories and classrooms, where it provides a reallife context for teaching and learning.

COMPUTING

A leader in supercomputing applications, the University is home of NCSA (National Center for Supercomputing Applications) where Mosaic web browsing software was first developed. Since first released in 1993, Mosaic has spawned exponential growth in the use of the World Wide Web. NCSA staff has also been instrumental in promoting World Wide Web access at the White House and in the city of Chicago. There are 23,000 network connections on campus for students, faculty and staff.

RESEARCH

Students and scholars find the University an ideal place to conduct cross-disciplinary research. The most visible example of the University's commitment to such study is the Beckman Institute for Advanced Science and Technology, which was founded in 1985. Here research groups from nearly two dozen disciplines work within and across the following three main research themes: biological intelligence, human-computer intelligent interaction and molecular and electronic nanostructures. In 2002, General Motors teamed up with the Beckman Institute to study driver distractions and how well humans interact with in-vehicle technologies. The special atmosphere at the Beckman Institute has also led to the invention of a technique to extend the life of silicon chips by a factor of 50, a development that has caught the interest of the world's major chip manufacturers.

UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

Academic resources on the campus are among the world's finest. The University Library is the third largest academic collection in the nation, housing more than 15.9 million items in the main library and in the more than 40 departmental libraries and units. Only Harvard and Yale have larger collections. The library's computerized cataloging system was the first in the world to serve as the primary access to a large academic library. Users have worldwide access to the collections through the Internet, with more than a million patrons logging on each week.

THE ARTS

A major center for the arts, the campus attracts dozens of nationally and internationally renowned artists each year to its widely acclaimed Krannert Center for the Performing Arts. Designed by alumnus Max Abramovitz, an architect of New York City's Lincoln Center, the facility has four indoor theaters and an outdoor amphitheater. Together, they host more than 300 performances each year. The University also supports three major museums: the Krannert Art Museum and Kinkead Pavilion, the World Heritage Museum and the Museum of Natural History. Other major facilities include the multipurpose Assembly Hall (17,000 seats), which hosts concerts, convocations, theater and sporting events; Memorial Stadium, site of Big Ten Conference football games; and the Intramural-Physical Education Building.

PARTNERSHIP ILLINOIS

Also integral to the University's mission is a commitment to partnerships with many sectors of Illinois business and industry. Each year more than 60,000 Illinois residents participate in scores of conferences, institutes, credit and noncredit courses and workshops presented on campus and statewide. Universitysponsored programs in both urban and rural areas of the state bring University faculty to the citizens of Illinois to share their expertise in food industries, health, K-12 education, technology transfer and economic development, to name a few. Cooperative Extension Service offices throughout Illinois serve nearly one million people annually. The Institute for Competitive Manufacturing has succeeded in solving business and manufacturing problems in hundreds of Illinois firms by matching student project teams with businesses in need.

OUR GRADUATES SUCCEED

Freshman rerention and overall graduation rates are well above the national averages. Typically, approximately 90 percent of freshmen return for their sophomore year. The graduation rate for students who enter the university on a full-time basis is approximately 80 percent. The national average for four-year schools is approximately 50 percent. Over 50 percent of seniors find employment before graduation and 95 percent find positions within nine months of graduation. Each year, more than 400 graduates are accepted to law school. Medical school admissions are also impressive with more than 200 students admitted each year.

According to regular surveys of thousands of graduates, more than 90% indicate they would choose Illinois if they had to make their college choice again

The goal of each sports program within the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Illinois is to strive toward success. The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics has taken a comprehensive approach to the success of the student-athlete. The Illini Life Skills program is designed to meet the total needs of the student-athlete.

Sponsored by the NCAA, the Illini Life Skills program is comprised of five programming commitment areas viewed as critical to personal growth and development. The commitment areas are: academic excellence, athletic excellence, personal development, service to campus and surrounding communities and career development.

This comprehensive balance of academic excellence, athletic achievement and personal well-being is stressed daily by the administrative staff and coaches. Inevitably, a student-athlete's playing days will end, but with the assistance of the Illini Life Skills program, each Fighting Illini athlete will be fully prepared for career and personal challenges ahead.

Presentations and workshops in many of the above areas can be ordered from the Illini Life Skills program menu on an individual or team basis. Each program is tailored to the specific individual's request.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Among the elements stressed by the academic services department to assure student-athlete success are counseling and tutorial services, a monitoring program and state-of-the-art computer labs.

The Irwin Academic Center, the former Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity house opened as a center to consolidate academic services for studentathletes.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

Athletically, the University of Illinois has long supported a broad-based

sports program. Its coaching staff and facilities are among the nation's best. The UI's support units include excellent staffs for recruiting, equipment, facilities maintenance, fund raising, publicity and promotions. Its sports medicine staff not only assists student-athletes in strength training and conditioning, but also in personal health maintenance.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

As important as the UI's commitment is to the student-athlete's performance in the classroom and on the field, it also considers the individual's spiritual and emotional needs, and his/her career objectives. Fighting Illini student-athletes are afforded the opportunity to attend a variety of seminars during their collegiate experience, helping them enhance their future following athletics. Among the seminars offered are those in career placement, financial planning, time and stress management, sexual harassment, drug and alcohol education and player/agent relations.


Service

The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics also sponsors a Student Athletic Advisory Board (SAAB), which is made up of representatives from all 19 Fighting Illini intercollegiate athletic teams.

Members of SAAB and their teammates perform various acts of community service such as visits to local hospitals, grade schools and other personal appearances.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

The strong relationships built within the vast Illinois alumni networking system provide excellent opportunities for all student-athletes, whether it be for summer jobs, internships or in career placement after graduation. Once the individual's career is established, the DIA asks for his/her participation in a follow-up program that allows student-athletes to benefit from their predecessors' experiences.

The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics (DIA) was chartered in 1892 as a not-for-profit corporation of the State of Illinois. It was charged with overseeing and conducting the University's intercollegiate athletic programs and associated support services, and operated as a separate entity.

After the state legislature voted in June 1989 to bring UI athletics within the University proper, the DIA assumed the functions and responsibilities of the Athletic Association. The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics began operations officially July 1, 1989, and now, more than a century after University of Illinois athletics began, the mission is still to achieve excellence both in the classroom and in sport competition.

The director of athletics is the division's chief executive officer, and reports directly to the chancellor of the Urbana-Champaign campus. The chancellor has final authority regarding the athletic program in all areas except for budget and major appointments. Those decisions rest with the University of Illinois Board of Trustees.

The Athletic Board serves the DIA in an advisory capacity. It is composed of 18 members, (nine faculty, five alumni, three students and one trustee); and the three non-voting (ex-officio) members from the University administration. The faculty and student members are nominated by the Urbana-Champaign Senate and selected by the chancellor.

The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics does not receive state tax dollars and over the years has been able to fully fund the NCAA maximum allowable number of athletic scholarships for student-athletes in each of its sports programs, as well as to hire excellent coaches and maintain and upgrade its facilities, staying on par with the best major collegiate programs across the nation.

This has been accomplished through revenues derived from four major sources: gate receipts from football and men's basketball; television and radio rights fees for those two sports; corporate sponsorships and donations to the Fighting Illini Scholarship Fund. The FISF contributions provide the maximum allowable number of scholarships in the 19 men's and women's sports at an average annual cost of approximately \$10,000 for instate student-athletes and about \$15,000 for those from outside Illinois.

FACILITIES

The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics utilizes and maintains 12 facilities for competition and the administration of 19 sports. The facilities include Memorial Stadium, Assembly Hall, Huff Hall, Illinois Field, the Outdoor Track and Field and Soccer Stadium, the Armory, Atkins Tennis Center, the Intramural and Physical Education Building, Kenney Gym, the University of Illinois Orange and Blue Golf Courses, the Bielfeldt Athletic Administration Building, the Ubben Basketball Practice Facility and the Irwin Academic Center.


The \$ 12.5 million indoor football practice facility, located just east of the current Irwin Football Complex and locker room was completed in the fall of 2000. Many teams use the spacious indoor facility.

In 1996, more than 100 members of the DIA staff moved into the Bielfeldt Athletic Administration Building, located on the east-west axis between the Atkins Tennis Center and the Assembly Hall. The facility houses DIA coaches, administration and staff, including the Fighting Illini Scholarship Fund, the Varsity "I" Association, accounting and personnel, athletic public relations, marketing and compliance.

A "Park of Tradition" commemorating the history of Fighting Illini athletics is planned adjacent to the Bielfeldt Building, along with the opening of the Illinois Hall of Fame. The Ubben Basketball Practice Facility opened in 1999 and features practice courts for men's and women's basketball, offices and meeting rooms, training and equipment facilities, strength and conditioning and locker rooms.

In 1992, the DIA completed an \$18 million renovation project on Memorial Stadium, replacing the main and balcony stands on the east and west sides of the Stadium.

Illinois Field, the home of the 2000 Big Ten tournament champion Illini baseball squad, and the Outdoor Track Stadium have also seen construction upgrades, adding lights to both facilities and expanding the track stadium to accommodate Illinois women's soccer matches. The Outdoor Track and Soccer Stadium also includes future plans for seating for 8,000 and a permanent press box.

BASEBALL

 Senior first baseman Andy Schutzenhofer became a four-time All-Big Ten selection after being named to the first team this season.
 Teammate Eric Eyman, a freshman, was named second team All-Big Ten at shortstop, while pitcher Joe Ziemba was named to the third team.

• Schutzenhofer finished his career ranked among Illinois' all-time career leaders in 11 offensive catagories including games started, consecutive starts, hits, runs, RBIs, doubles, total bases, walks, and hit by pitches.

 Illinois won the UTPA/AI Ogletree Classic in early March. Five Illini were named to the All-Tournament team, including pitcher Ted Rowe, who earned tournament MVP.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

 Illinois went 2S-7 and 11-5 in the Big Ten. The Illini won the Big Ten Tournament for the first time in school history and earned a No. 4 seed in the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the second round. Illinois finished the year ranked 11th in the nation.

• The Illini went undefeated at the Assembly Hall, winning all 14 home games. The Illini senior class finished their careers 51-2 at the Hall, the best home record of any team in the nation over the last four years.

Brian Cook Big Ten Player of the Year

 Brian Cook was named a third-team All-American and earned Big Ten Player of the Year and Big Ten Tournament Most Outstanding Player honors. He was the first Illini player since 1990 to lead the league in scoring.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

- Illinois advanced to its seventh straight post season, including its fifth trip to the NCAA Tournament in its last seven seasons.
- Head Coach Theresa Grentz became just the eighth women's coach to win 600 games.
- Forward Cindy Dallas reached the 1,000 point plateau, becoming just the 16th player in Illinois history to reach that mark. She also became just the second player in Big Ten history to claim back-to-back rebounding titles.
- Forward Angelina Williams was named second team All-Big Ten, while Dallas earned third team All-Big Ten honors.

MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

- Freshman Jason Bill and senior John Kronforst each earned All-NCAA Midwest Region honors by finishing seventh and 12th respectively at the regional meet.
- Bill's performance qualified him for the NCAA National Meet. He was the first Illini since 1996 to run at the national meet and the first UI freshman to do so since 1973.
- Bill also competed at the U.S. Cross Country Junior Championships finishing eighth.

WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

Received the All-Academic Cross Country Team With Distinction award from the NCAA after registering a cumulative team GPA of 3.55, the best in the Big Ten. Erin Frakes led the Illini at the NCAA Midwest Regionals finishing with a career best time of 21:45.30, the sixth-best time in school history.



FOOTBALL

- Won four of its last six games to finish with a S-7 record, 4-4 in the Big Ten, which was good enough for fifth place.
- Antoineo Harris set a single-season school rushing record with 1,330 yards.
- The offense broke the school's total offense record for the second straight year, averaging 446.3 yards per game.
- A school record five players were selected in the 2003 NFL Draft.

MEN'S GOLF

- Illinois finished second at the NCAA Central Regional Championships to advance to the NCAA National Championships where they would finish 21st overall. The Illini won four tournaments throughout the season and finished second at the Big Ten Championships.
- Head Coach Mike Small was named Midwest Region Coach of the Year.
- Sophomore James Lepp had one of the most successful seasons in Illinois history. He broke the Illinois single season stroke average record (71.41) and became only the second Illini to be named Big Ten Golfer of the Year. He was a second team All-America selection and was named first team All-Big Ten for the second straight year.
- Freshman Patrick Nagle also had a stellar season, being named a thirdteam All-American, first team Freshman All-American and the Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

WOMEN'S GOLF

 The Illini qualified for postseason play for the second consecutive season finishing 10th at the NCAA West Regional Championships.

> Illinois won three tournaments during the season.

> Senior Laurin Kanda captured Medalist honors at the Illini Spring Classic and set a school record and a women's course record at Stone Creek by firing a 67 in the opening round.

MEN'S GYMNASTICS

• Finished fifth at the NCAA Championships, the team's highest finish since 1998.

- Junior Kara Kapernekas and sophomore Ashley Williams advanced to the NCAA South Central Regional Championships in the all-around.
- Both Williams and Kapernekas were second team All-Big Ten selections.
- The team recorded the third best score in school history, 195.750, and tied the school balance beam record of 49.150 at the State of Illinois Classic.
- Three individual school records were broken or tied in 2003. Sophomore Jessica Cole tied the vault record by scoring a 9.925, Kapernekas and senior Amanda Kaufman both tied the school floor exercise mark by post-

ing 9.95s, and Kapernekas also broke the all-around record by earning a score of 39.37S.

SOCCER

- Came back from a 3-0 deficit to upset top-seeded and 11th ranked Penn State 4-3 in the Quarterfinals of the Big Ten Tournament
- Sophomore Tara Hurless scored 12 goals on the year to tie for the Big Ten lead during the regular season.
- Hurless and senior Meghan Kolze were both named second-team All-Big Ten and were also named third team All-Great Lakes Region by soccerbuzz.com. Christen Karniski was selected to the Big Ten All-Freshman Team. Sophomore Andrea Ridgeway was named to the All-Big Ten Tournament Team.
- Sophomore goalkeeper Leisha Alcia was selected to the Canadian National Team pool and suited up for Team Canada for a pair of friendly games against international competition.

SOFTBALL

- The Illini softball team had its most succesful season ever posting a record of 39-17-1 and advancing to NCAA Regional competition for the first time in the four year history of the program.
- Illinois recorded its first ever national ranking last season, moving as high as No. 21 in the USA Today/NFCA poll.
- · Illinois recorded the 100th win in program history, 9-0 over St. John's.
- Sherri Taylor tossed the program's first ever perfect game.

SWIMMING & DIVING

- Junior Ilkay Dikmen qualified for her second-straight NCAA Championships, competing in both the 100 and 200-meter breaststrokes.
- Illini Divers Lisa Fish and Allison Prather each qualified for the NCAA Zone Diving Championships for the second straight season.
- Freshman sprinter Christina Brunka set a pair of school records in the S0 and 100-meter freestyles at the U.S. National Championships, earning berths in the U.S. Open in both events.

MEN'S TENNIS

- The 2003 Illinois Men's tennis team will go down as one of the top squads in the history of the sport. The Illini won the program's first ever NCAA Team Tennis Title, the school's first title in any sport since 1989, and became only the fourth tennis team ever to complete the season undefeated with a 32-0 record.
- The Illini then went on to complete the triple-crown of college tennis when Amer Delic won the NCAA singles crown and the duo of Rajeev Ram and Brian Wilson took home the NCAA doubles crown just a week after bringing the team title to Champaign. Delic, Ram and Wilson all earned All-America honors for their perfomances at the Nationals.
- Delic was also named Big Ten Male Athlete of the Year along with fellow Illini Matt Lackey.
- In addition, the team won the ITA National Indoor Title in Feb. with a victory over Florida in the finals. Following that win, the team was ranked No. 1 in the nation for the remainer of the season.
- The Illini won their seventh consecutive regular season Big Ten title and their sixth conference tournament championship in the last seven years.

WOMEN'S TENNIS

• The Illini finished the season with a 17-8 record and advanced to the round of 32 at the NCAA Championships. It was the squads fourth trip to the NCAA tournament in the last five years.

The team finished the year ranked No. 25 in the country.
The duo of Michelle Webb and Jennifer McGaffigan advanced to the round of 16 at the NCAA Doubles Tournament. The tandem finished with a record of 30-8 and won the program its first ever regional title.
Juniors Tiffany Eklov and Jennifer McGaffigan earned All-Big Ten horors.

MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

• Head Coach Gary Wieneke completed his 28th and final season. During his tenure at Illinois, the Illini won 12 Big Ten Championships, had 152 athletes win Big Ten Titles, 145 become All-Americans and had 11 win national championships.

 Senior Charles Burton advanced to the NCAA National Meet after finishing fourth at the Mideast Regional meet with a career-best triple jump of 53' 1.75".

WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

PACER

Perdita Felicien

World Champion, Three-Time NCAA

Champion

- Senior hurdler Perdita Felicien won her second straight NCAA Title in 100meter hurdles at the NCAA Track and Field Championships. It was Felicien's third career NCAA title, she also won the 60-m hurdles at the 2002 Indoor Championships. In addition, the 10-time All-American anchored the 4x100meter relay to an eighth place finish at the NCAA Championships.
- Felicien's personal best 100-meter hurdle time of 12.68, run during the semifinals of the 2003 NCAA Championships, broke the NCAA Meet record and her own school record, and also tied the Big Ten record.
- Felicien was named the NCAA Female Track and Field Athlete of the Year for the second time, she also won the award in 2001. She was also named Big Ten Female Athlete of the Year.
- Felicien also won her fifth and sixth career Drake Relays titles with wins in the university section 100-meter hurdles and invitational section 100-meter hurdles. She was named the Drake Relays Most Outstanding Women's Performer for the third consecutive year joining Olympian Merlene Ottey as the only athletes to accomplish that feat.
- Nicole Whitman broke school and Big Ten records in the triple jump with a leap of 44' 4".

VOLLEYBALL

- Illinois posted a pair of wins over Top 15-ranked teams. The Illini defeated No. 13 Wisconsin at Huff Hall and sixth-ranked, and eventual Big Ten Champion, Minnesota in Minneapolis.
- Head Coach Don Hardin recorded his 300th career win as a collegiate head coach when UI defeated Connecticut.
- Senior outside hitter Sue Webber was named an honorable mention All-Big Ten selection and junior middle blocker Lisa Argabright earned honorable mention AVCA All-Midwest Region honors.

WRESTLING

- Senior Matt Lackey won the 165 National Title, becoming Illinois' seventh NCAA Champion in nine years. He finished the season with a perfect 38-0 record and ended his career as a three-time All-American and two-time Big Ten Champion.
- Lackey was named Big Ten Male Athlete of the Year along with fellow Illini Amer Delic.
- The team finished ninth at the 2003 NCAA Championships, the seventh Top-10 finish in head coach Mark Johnson's tenure.
- Freshman Alex Tirapelle became the first freshman in Illinois history to make the NCAA Finals as a freshman. He finished second.
- Eight of 10 Illinois wrestlers qualified for the NCAA Championships.

The Irwin Academic Services Center features academic sercives offices, study areas, computer labs and meeting rooms for more than 600 UI student athletes.

The Irwin Academic Services Center, an 8,000 sqaure foot building, provides a comfortable environment for the exclusive use of student-athletes. It allows student-athletes to strive for and achieve the high academic standards of the University while also growing as individuals. It is a place where student-athletes can study individually or in group settings, meet with tutors, complete assignments, or conduct research in one of three state-of-the art computer labs.

Formerly the Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity house, the building was renovated by the Division of Incolligiate Athletics and opened in the fall of 1997.

Features of the Irwin Academic Services Center: Main Floor

- A lounge including tables, couches and chairs to provide a relaxed, comfortable atmosphere.
- A break room with access to drinks and snacks, as well as more tables for quiet study, meetings with tutors, or group work.

Lower Level

- Two classrooms specifically designed for review sessions, meetings with tutors and quiet study.
- Career services offers period seminars and workshops on academic

wellness issues such as: time management, note taking, research paper writing, alcohol abuse, and nutrition.

 Career services also provides workshops on topics such as: major exploration, resume writing, and career planning.

Second Floor

- The main computer lab is equipped with all programs found in University computer labs and also has a monitored check-in station.
- The second floor is also home to the administrative and counselor offices. Academic counselors monitor academic progress, assist in degree program planning, and serve as resourses to provide campus information.

Third Floor

- Contains three computer labs, complete with three laser printers and a scanner.
- The middle computer lab has room for goups working on projects. The bulletin boards advertise upcoming CHAMPS/Life Skills events.

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<u>RON GUENTHER</u> DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS (Illinois '67)

n 12 years as Director of Athletics at the University of Illinois, Ron Guenther has returned his alma mater to the national elite in competing for championships in 19 intercollegiate sports with outstanding coaches, staff

and facilities, including a Top-25 finish in the Sears Cup competition and an NCAA Title for the Illinois men's tennis program last season. He was named the 2001 NACDA/Continental Airlines Central Region Athletic Director of the Year.

The MVP of the 1966 Illinois football squad, Guenther continues to move the Illini athletic program on a breakneck pace toward a position of competing at a championship level in all programs.

Guenther has overseen a series of dramatic changes that have local, regional and national media, alumni and fans marveling at his abilities to add sport programs in women's soccer and softball, recruit top-level coaches, plan for and build championship facilities with more than \$50 million in capital donations and create a model program producing outstanding student-athletes. Guenther has established Illinois as a rising power among NCAA institutions by:

- Bringing the Chicago Bears to central Illinois for a one-season stint at Memorial Stadium. With a partnership formed in the fall of 2001, the Bears played one full season, 10 games, in Champaign while Soldier Field underwent construction. With that partnership came funds that refurbished the Irwin football complex, including new locker and meeting rooms as well as a training room and upgrade to the coaches offices.

 Adding popular women's sports like soccer and softball as the first UI athletic programs added in two decades.

- Hiring championship-level coaches such as Head Football Coach Ron Turner who led the Illini to a Big Ten Championship in 2001, an astounding 10-2 record and a bid to the Bowl Championship Series.

— Hiring Illinois Head Basketball Coach Bruce Weber who led his previous Southern Illinois squad to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances. He looks to lead a squad that returns four starters from the 2003 Big Ten Tournament Champion team.

— In his 12 years as director, Guenther has also landed nationally recognized men's tennis coach Craig Tiley, who led the Illini to the school's first NCAA team title since 1989. Illinois swept the field at the national championships, taking the team, singles (Amer Delic) and doubles (Rajeev Ram/Brian Wilson) title. Tiley's squads have won seven straight regular-season Big Ten titles and trips to the NCAA Tournament. In 2000, the team of Graydon Oliver and Cary Franklin won the NCAA doubles title.

- Guenther also extended the contract of nationally prominent wrestling coach Mark Johnson who has engineered Top-10 finishes for the program seven times in his 11-year career, including a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Championships and a second-place finish at the Big Ten Championships in 2001 The Illini have crowned seven national champions since 1995 and five in the last six years.

- Guenther has also hired former Illini and member of the 1998 Big Ten Championship golf squad, Mike Small, who, in his first two seasons, led the team to the NCAA Championships. The Illini have taken second in the Big Ten in both 2002 and 2003 and All-American James Lepp was named the Big Ten Golfer of the Year last season.

--The Illinois track and field programs have also excelled at both the NCAA and international level. Senior hurdler Perdita Felicien won three national titles in two years. In 2002, Illinois placed 10th at the NCAA Championships and Felicien was named the 2001 and 2003 National Female Track Athlete of the Year, following her All-American performances in the 100-meter hurdles.

- The Illinois men's gymnastics program under head coach Yoshi Hayasaki is year in and year out ranked among the Top-10 in the nation. This year was no exception with the team placing fifth at the 2003 NCAA Championships and crowning four All-Americans.

— Signing an exclusive \$7.5 million agreement with Nike as one of only 13 Nike

institutions in the United States

- Christening new facilities like the Ubben Basketball Practice Facility, Irwin Indoor Football Facility and the Bielfeldt Athletic Administration Building.

- Overseeing the construction and opening of the \$21 million Irwin Academic Center, providing 600 student-athletes with a state-of-the-art, convenient academic center to reach their full potential as students.

Under Guenther's leadership, Illinois has steadily improved its performance on the field and in the classroom. Off the field, Illinois student-athletes have continued to benefit from outstanding academic service programs, matching the overall campus grade point average and producing nearly 100 Academic All-Big Ten award winners annually in all sports. Guenther also has spearheaded a revolution for funding for championship-level programs and facilities as the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics has opened necessary additional revenue streams totaling more than \$3 million through working partnerships with corporate sponsors and management of the Illini Sports Radio Network.

Guenther's aggressive plan to make the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics a valuable and enthusiastic partner in the overall education, research and service mission of the University has begun to pay dividends in the 21st century.

Now in his fourth decade with the University of Illinois, Guenther was the Most Valuable Player on the 1966 Illinois football squad under Head Coach Pete Elliott. Guenther was a second-team All-Big Ten selection at offensive guard, also earning first-team Academic All-Big Ten honors and recognition as the University's outstanding senior in physical education. Guenther earned his bachelor of science degree in physical education from Illinois in 1967 and an M.S. in administration in 1968 before embarking on a successful career in coaching, athletic administration and business.

Guenther was named the 17th Director of Athletics in 1992 after serving for two years with the University of Illinois Foundation as Director of Major Gifts and for three years as a partner with The Barofsky Association, a Chicago-area investments and marketing firm. From June of 1988 to March of 1989, Guenther served as Interim Director of Athletics for External Operations, administering the development program, public relations, promotions, tickets, merchandise and summer camps.

Guenther spent the previous three years within the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics as associate athletic director for development, coordinating the "Campaign for Excellence in Athletics." That campaign began the first major facelift of athletic facilities in nearly 60 years on campus and provided the impetu for the eventual construction of Illinois Field for baseball, the UI Outdoor Track and Field and Soccer Stadium, the Atkins Tennis Center and the Irwin Football Complex, housing coaches offices, locker rooms, sports medicine, strength and conditioning facilities and meeting rooms for Illinois football.

One of the nation's top athletic fund raisers, Guenther has been instrumental in soliciting gift commitments totaling more than \$50 million toward capital improvements at Illinois during the last 15 years.

Firmly committed to delivering the Illinois message across the state and Midwest, Guenther served from 1983 to 1987 as assistant athletic director for Chicago operations, renewing a commitment that continues today to reach out to the thousands of Chicago-area alumni, donors and fans. During his tenure in Chicago, Guenther created the annual statewide caravan for promotion and public relations and saw a tripling in the number of donors to Illinois athletics.

Guenther spent eight years at North Central College in Naperville, III., including a stint from 1975-79 as director of admissions and also as an associate head football coach. From 1979-83, he served as the vice president of development and public affairs at North Central, helping to design and implement a \$15 million Capital Campaign. As associate head football coach, Guenther helped the Cardinals amass a 23-12-2 record, including the school's first winning season in 15 years.

Before moving to North Central College, Guenther was offensive line coach at Boston College from 1971-74, helping to develop nine National Football League players. From 1968-71, Guenther was a teacher and coached football, wrestling and track and field for the Evanston Township and Glenbard High School systems in suburban Chicago.

Born Oct. 3, 1945, Guenther is a native of Elmhurst and a graduate of York High School. He lettered at Illinois in 1965 and 1966, helping Illinois to a 24-14-1 record in his four seasons. Guenther earned MVP honors on a squad that produced five All-Americans in 1966. ahting

JAMES J. STUKEL PRESIDENT (Purdue '59)

ames J. Stukel is in his ninth year as president of the three-campus University of Illinois, a great public institution enrolling some 70,000 students at Chicago, Springfield and the original campus, Urbana-Champaign.

When the Board of Trustees selected him as the University's 15th chief executive officer in 1995, Jim Stukel set out to reconnect the people and communities of Illinois to their largest, strongest and best-known center of higher education. This vision - to strengthen the U of I's ties to the state - soon led to an ongoing series of community visits. More than 200,000 road miles later, Stukel has taken the University's story and offers of help to Illinois towns, cities and suburbs; to its community colleges; to its alumni clubs and gatherings; to mayors, council members and county boards; to legislators in their home districts; to media in their editorial board rooms and studios. This community-visit program, quite apart from other alumni, donor and legislative appearances and efforts, has taken the president on the road more than 40 times for a day or two each visit - and has reached thousands of Illinoisans face-to-face.

Stukel's citizen outreach is one of four major pillars of his presidency. The others are to protect and enrich undergraduate education; to enhance quality at all levels and in all aspects; and, finally, to streamline business operations to save money and reduce bureaucracy. An example of the last is a large-scale conversion from 150 separate computer systems on the three campuses to a single, integrated system that ties together human resources, business and finance and student systems. The first elements of the UI Integrate project were up and running as of summer 2003 with the rest expected to be fully operational in 2005. Stukel believes up-to-date business systems and processes will save money and produce efficiency.

President Stukel's commitment to the University is personal and of longstanding. A native of Joliet and Purdue graduate, Jim Stukel earned his master's degree in engineering in 1963 and Ph.D. in 1968, both from the College of Engineering at the Urbana-Champaign campus. After nearly 20 years on the engineering faculty at Urbana, including being director of the Engineering Experiment Station, he moved to the Chicago campus as executive vice chancellor and, from 1991-95, was UIC chancellor.

He has served important roles with national higher education organizations; his term as chair of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges draws to a close in fall 2003.

Dr. Stukel and his wife, Joan, have three grown sons and a daughter and six grandchildren.



<u>NANCY CANTOR</u> CHANCELLOR (Sarah Lawrence '74)

N ancy Cantor, a sports fan and Chancellor of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, grew up in New York, graduated from Sarah Lawrence College, and received her Ph.D. in social psychology from Stanford University in 1978. Her scholarly work, in three books and numerous book chapters and articles, has focused on personality, cognition, life tasks, and relationships. She is married to Steven Brechin, an environmental sociologist, and is the mother of their two teen-agers, a son and a daughter.

Chancellor Cantor chaired the psychology department at Princeton University and came to this campus three years ago from the University of Michigan, where she was the Provost, in charge of academic affairs. She has become nationally known for her advocacy of racial and ethnic diversity as an essential element of excellence in education.


Under Dr. Cantor's leadership, this campus has provided seed money for 10 multidisciplinary Cross-Campus Initiatives to study critical societal questions. These range from the issues of aging to food security, from globalization to research in repairing the human nervous system. Two Initiatives will focus on the revolution now underway in bio-technology.


Within sight of the Morrow Plots, the oldest continuous experimental agricultural plots in the nation, a new, state-financed Institute for Genomic Biology is going up to sustain and advance Illinois as a research leader in genome based biology.

A few blocks away, the privately-financed Doris Kelley Christopher Hall, also under construction, will house a new Cross-Campus Initiative to Promote Family Resiliency, in which researchers, students, families, and social agencies will collaborate to study how it is that some families are able to raise successful children even when confronted with extreme difficulties.

The Initiatives include Exploring the Human Experience, which this year, beginning in the fall, is commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Supreme Court's landmark Brown v Board of Education decision. They are all part of an effort on this campus to put our best faculty and our students in fresh combinations to the benefit of all.
