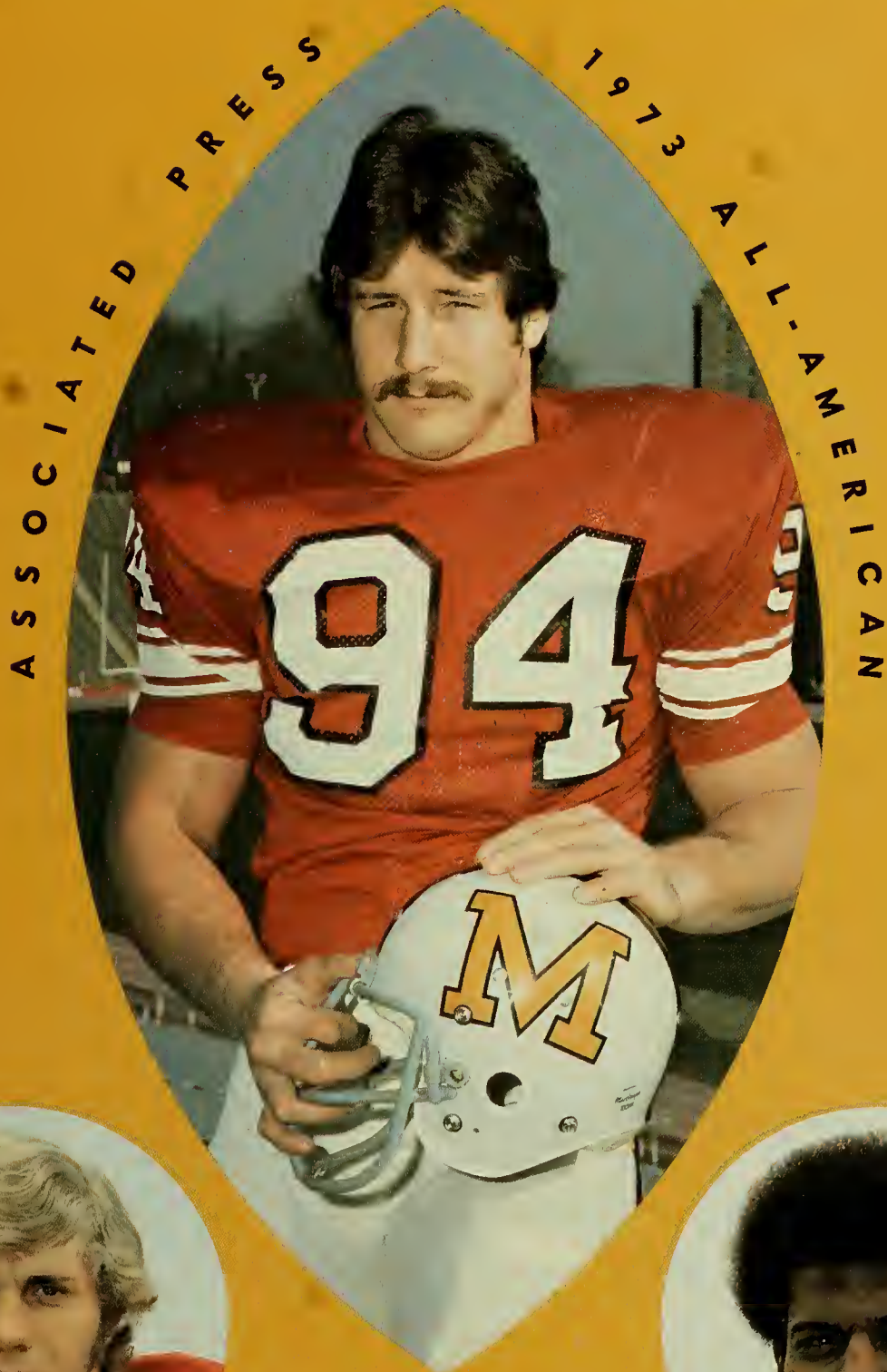

Dr. John W. Dorsey was appointed August 1, 1974, as Acting Chancellor of the University of Maryland at College Park. He follows Dr. Charles E. Bishop, first Chancellor of the College Park Campus, who resigned in June after four years to become President of the University of Arkansas.

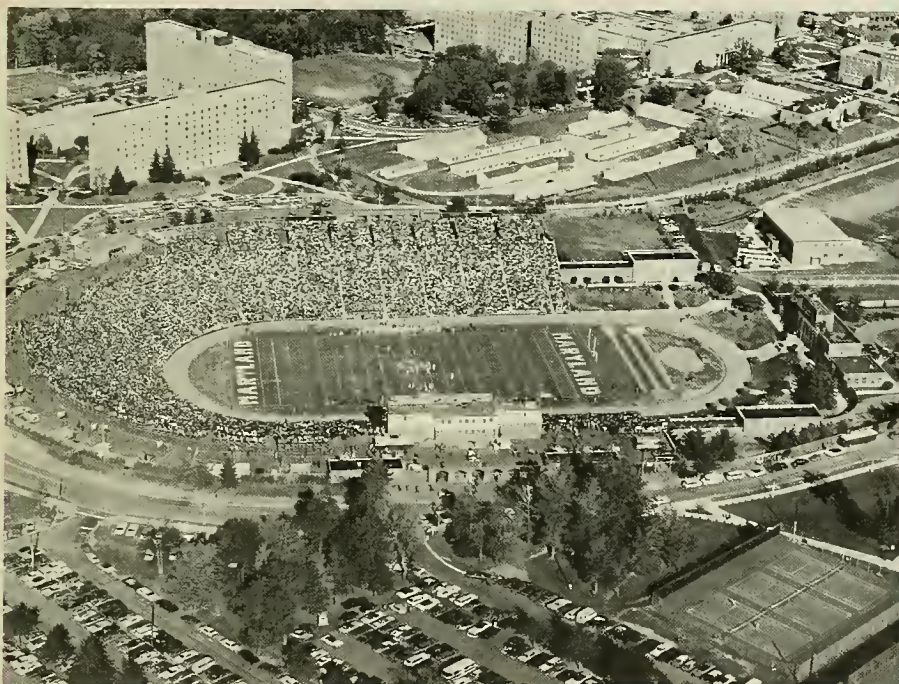

MARYLAND'S OUTLAND TROPHY CANDIDATE

Randy White — Defensive Tackle

At home in Maryland weight room

Maryland Tackle Dick Modzelewski was awarded the Outland Trophy in 1952, and Duke's Mike McGee captured the treasured trophy in 1959. Now Maryland's Randy White is considered a top candidate to return the trophy to Maryland for the second time and the Atlantic Coast Conference for the third time.

White is not only a top candidate for the Outland Trophy (honoring the outstanding interior lineman and selected by the Football Writers Association of America) but many consider him the "Outstanding College Football Player of the United States". Another award is given for that.

White is a Sports Information Director's dream. Just sit back and listen to what the writers and his coach have to say about the talented youngster.

Larry Felser in the Sporting News reports "For the fourth consecutive year the No. 1 pick on the NFL board may be a defensive lineman. The string started with Walt Patulski, now a Buffalo starter, went to John Matuszak, a Houston starter and continued last winter with Ed Jones, the Tennessee State giant drafted by Dallas."

"The man most likely to extend the string is Randy White, the swift and tough Maryland Terrapin. Some say he is the best defensive lineman to come out of Maryland since Stan Jones, now Buffalo's defensive line coach."

Jerry Claiborne, Maryland's veteran coach says of White, "He will be one of the nation's best football players this season. If there is a better defensive tackle around I'd hate to meet him, because, well, he'd have to be some kind of player."

"Randy is a good football player because he'll do anything you ask of him. He's almost too cooperative at times.

He's so coachable, he serves as an example for everyone else."

Jerry McCain, Publisher of Southern and Southeastern Football publications says; "Outstanding player in the league? Randy White. Hands up. I know the old saying is "Hands down" but Randy is 6-4, about 250, lifts almost twice his weight and catches and captures running backs from behind. When Randy is around the better stance is hands up."

Paul Attner, of the Washington Post, has watched Randy White perform longer than any other reporter covering the Terrapins and reports; "Envision for a moment the perfect All-American defensive lineman. He would stand, oh, about 6-4 or 6-5, would weigh maybe 250 pounds, have muscles like Charles Atlas, the quickness of a Bob Lilly, the meanness of a Joe Greene, the durability of a marathon runner. An Impossible mixture? Meet Randy White."

"White is 6-4. He weighs 248 pounds. He bench-presses 430 pounds. He runs the 40 in 4.6. He catches enemy runners from behind with regularity, frightens opponents so much they frequently run away from him, never tires and just loves to hit anything that moves. In short, he performs like an All-American should."

In explaining White's dedication to improvement Attner reports "Thanks to almost daily workouts in the weight room — either at Maryland or in a YMCA in his home town of Wilmington, Del., White has increased his weight by 36 pounds, his strength by 220 pounds and lowered his speed by three-tenths of a second."

What has emerged Attner says "is an awesome-looking man with an enormous neck, wide shoulders, large chest and a model-slim waist. It is enough to send fear through

any opponent who must face White across no-man's land in those fall weekend wars."

Attner continues "A Tulane halfback won't forget him, not for a while. The Green Wave runner thought he was going to daylight last season. Instead, he ran into what must have seemed like a brick wall named White. The player came to a jarring stop, flipped in the air and crashed to Mother Earth. The collision even stunned the home crowd at Byrd Stadium."

"White might be even more sensational on a team with a more free-lance defense" says Attner "But under Claiborne's regimented scheme he ad-libs infrequently, even if the natural urge is to roam. But once in a while he has a chance to unleash an out-and-out quarterback chase, running down his victim from behind much as a cheetah captures its prey."

Kent Baker of the Baltimore Sun reported "During the mid-week lull between the University of Maryland's third and fourth football games this season, a daring thief carted off Randy White's home jersey."

"At the time a Terrapin jersey carried about as much prestige as a deflated football, but the burglar obviously was someone with acute foresight."

"The person who filched No. 74 now possess the battle shirt of a full-fledged All-American, Maryland's first on the Associated Press first team since center Bob Pellegrini in 1955."

"It does not take long to realize Randy White, wearing any number, is a gem of a football player" says Baker.

"White, the sixth collegiate All-America from Delaware high schools, is quiet, almost shy" reports Baker, "and even Bob Hope (on his national TV show) could not evoke much emotion from him when he said White was "quick enough to correct a mistake before the instant replay."

Bill Schellhammer of the Wilmington Evening Journal reports; "It is also very much part of the White psychological makeup not to spend time looking backward — or too far forward either."

Randy White says "Its great that I made All-American but I realize that I'm just one guy here and the others are just as important. Coach Claiborne has always stressed the team philosophy and we really practice it here. No one's more important than any other. I wouldn't be where I am if it wasn't for my teammates. You can't single out just one guy. It feels good but it took a lot more than me to get me where I am."

"Now they'll be guys trying to knock me off because of the recognition. I'll just have to be tougher or else it'll happen."

Guy White Randy's father, says "Randy making All-American didn't come as a surprise to me. I knew it was just a matter of time. He works at it. He worked construction all last summer and I know he'd come home dead tired. Then he'd go lift weights all night. He's determined."

Sports Information Director notes; Football came naturally to Randy since his father Guy White had played three years of offensive end at West Chester State where he majored in physical education. He also played in a Bowl game, the Tobacco Bowl in Johnson City, Tennessee against Appalachian State, winning a 7-3 decision.

Randy White knows what it takes to become an Outland candidate and is quite familiar with the qualities of a Heisman Trophy winner. He personally clashed with John Cappelletti 10 times in Byrd Stadium last fall and twice left the Nittany Lion lying in his own backfield.

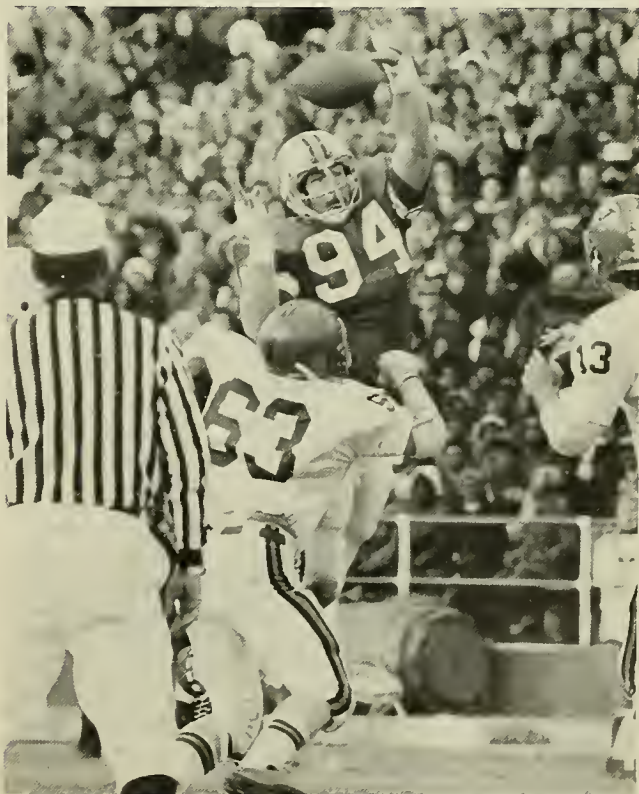

THE 1974 OUTLOOK

In his third year at College Park Jerry Claiborne is facing perhaps the toughest schedule the University of Maryland football team has ever tackled. The Terrapins open the season with Alabama in Byrd Stadium and then visit Tampa to meet the University of Florida the following Saturday.

The Terps also meet another contender for the National Championship in Penn State and another top 20 team in North Carolina State.

The Coaching Staff, team and fans are greeting the 1974 season with enthusiasm and accept it as a challenge. The enthusiasm began to build last November in Clemson, South Carolina with the bid to the Peach Bowl and resulted in a 42-9 whipping of a good Tulane team the following Saturday and a berth in the top 20 for the first time since 1955.

The enthusiasm was nurtured during the summer as the pre-season publications unanimously ranked the Terps in the top 15. Two publications Game Plan and Sports Quarterly's Football Roundup ranked the Terrapins ninth in the nation.

Fortunately Claiborne has his program well established and the Terrapins are returning 45 lettermen from the first Bowl team in 19 years, the first winning team in 11 years and the second highest scoring team in Maryland football history.

Also there is the presence of Claiborne. "He has always tried to be the best in everything he does and it has rubbed off on us," says Randy White. "He has an effect on everybody. He's given us organization, confidence, continuity and winning. Everyone believes in him, that's the important thing. He says 'Do this and you'll win' and we have."

Eleven starters return from the exciting offense of last year and eight regulars return from the nationally ranked defense.

For the first time since 1951 (Bob Ward) the Terrapins begin the season with a First Team Associated Press All-American on the squad in Defensive Tackle Randy White. Also for the first time ever the Terrapins open the season with three All-ACC selections in the lineup in White, Bob Smith and Louis Carter. Smith is bidding to become Maryland's first three time first team selection.

Randy White may well be the best football player to ever play at Maryland. He leads a defensive unit that believes its wide tackle six alignment is the ultimate, has a secondary that has played together for two years and an outstanding linebacker in Harry Walters. Smith anchors the secondary at safety and is one of the best punt return men in the nation.

The high scoring offense has Carter at tailback and two exceptional pass receivers in Frank Russell, split end and Walter White at tight end. Bob Avellini and Ben Kinard return at quarterback and Leon Harris had a fine spring practice there.

The running game should again be exceptionally strong with Carter, 801 yards plus 126 in the Peach Bowl, Rick Jennings and Alan Bloomingdale. Carter scored 14 touch-



downs last fall and on the halfback option threw a total of 11 passes, completed 8 for 231 yards and six touchdowns. His total included a record 68 yard toss against Georgia in the Peach Bowl.

Russell grabbed 41 passes for 503 yards and is considered an outstanding blocker as well from his split end position. Walter White pulled in 29 passes for 528 yards and six touchdowns from his tight end position.

The offensive line is anchored by Stan Rogers a 6-4, 255 pound senior who bench presses over 400 pounds and is the strongside tackle.

Steve Mike-Mayer returns as one of the best place kickers around. In two years he has set career records for Most Points by a placekicker, 134, and field goals 25. He has converted 25 of 50 field goal attempts and hit 23 of 31 attempts from within 45 yards. His longest attempt was 64 yards and he was successful on a record 54 yarder. Mike-Mayer also kicks off into or beyond the end zone with consistency.

Major losses from 1973 were All-American Paul Vellano, defensive guard, Ken Scott, defensive tackle and Bart Purvis offensive guard. Others were Al Neville, quarterback, Kevin Ward and Mickey Riggleman defensive ends and Bill Murphy offensive guard.

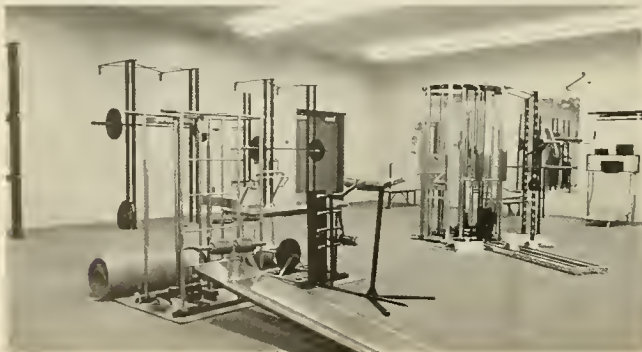
Despite the loss of Vellano the Terps should be strong at guard with Guy Deitz and Dave Visaggio. Both have seen duty as starters in the past. Visaggio suffered a knee injury last fall and missed spring practice but returns at full strength. Deitz was one of the hardest workers on the squad during the spring and should become a star this fall.

Ken Schroy, Jim Brechbiel, Pat Ulam and Joe Younge along with Smith give the Terps experience and depth in the defensive secondary.

John Schultz, Kim Hoover and Ken Roy are three outstanding wingbacks. Roy has seen action at tailback also. As a freshman Roy gained 126 yards rushing for a 4.1 average per carry and completed his only pass for a 34 yard touchdown against Penn State. He also caught a touchdown pass and scored one td running.

LeRoy Hughes, Rod Sharpless and Junior College transfer Bill Evans give the Terps strength at defensive end. Kevin Benson, although only a junior returns as a starter for the third year. With Walters on the other side and Jim Santa and Steve Zannoni returning as lettermen the linebacking corp also has depth.

Guard John Vesce, Center Bob Lange and Tackle Frank Romano all return as offensive starters with only Guard Bart Purvis, now with Green Bay, missing. Competition is strong for the spot Purvis vacated as it is also with the spot left open by Ken Scott at defensive tackle. Ralph Fisher, Joe Campbell and Russ LaHayne all had a fine spring at defensive tackle and either one could gain the starting role.



STRENGTH AND QUICKNESS

COLLEGE PARK—Maryland Football Coach Jerry Claiborne rates strength and quickness high on his list of tangibles contributing to a winning football team. He was appalled at the lack of both attributes when he assumed the duties as the Maryland Coach in December of 1971.

In his initial testing of the Terrapins only seven were able to bench press over 250 pounds and only 14 ran the 40 yards in 4.9 or less. Claiborne immediately established a weight training program that has had phenomenal success with his ability to motivate others a major contributor to the results.

On August 20 of 1973 39 players pressed over 250 pounds and 23 of them were among the initial group. Also 44 men ran the 40 in 4.9 or less. In March of 1974 69 players pressed over 250 pounds and 49 ran the 40 in 4.9 or better. Of this group 36 pressed better than 300 pounds with Randy White topping the list at 430.

The weight training program received a big boost last fall with the addition of the new football facilities that include one of the finest weight rooms in any collegiate facility.

All-American Defensive Tackle Randy White has proven just what dedication and adherence to the program can accomplish. He enrolled at Maryland as a 212 pounder who ran a 4.9 forty and could bench press 260 pounds. Now he

bench presses 430 pounds, runs the 40 in 4.6 and weighs in at 248 pounds.

Demonstrating that the program is just as beneficial to the backs Louis Carter, a 190 pounder, bench pressed 230 pounds and ran the forty in 4.8. He now presses 315 pounds, weighs 201 pounds and ran three consecutive 4.5 40 yard sprints recently. Pat Ulam a defensive back improved from a 5.0 forty and 230 pound bench press to 4.8 and 300 pounds on the bench press.

While Randy White leads the strength tests with his 430 pound bench press three others have topped 400 pounds. Linebacker Kevin Benson, Offensive Tackle Stan Rogers and Defensive Guard John Zernhelt, are just ahead of Tom Sullivan, 390, and Linebacker Harry Walters, 380.

Tailback Carter and Defensive Back Mike Cielensky lead the backs in pressing 315 pounds with Fullback Ralph Fisher at 305 pounds.

Offensive Backs Carter, Rick Jennings, Defensive Backs Dan DeCarlo, Ken Schroy all have been timed in 4.5 for the 40 yard sprint with Defensive Back Jim Brechbiel, Receiver Frank Russell, Defensive Tackle Randy White and Tight End Walter White all 4.6 sprinters.

Linebackers Kevin Benson 4.7 and Harry Walters 4.75 along with Jim Santa 4.75 have the quickness to go along with their strength. Halfback Kenny Roy also runs a 4.75.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

JIM KEHOE



James H. Kehoe assumed the duties of Director of Athletics at the University of Maryland on July 1, 1969 after serving as Maryland Track Coach for 23 years.

His five years as Terrapin AD have been exciting to say the least. The Terps have become National Powers in basketball, football and lacrosse and host the Carmichael Cup, symbolic of athletic supremacy in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

It was Kehoe who lured Coach Lefty Driesell to Maryland to become the Terp basketball coach and then obtained the services of Jerry Claiborne to guide the Terrapin football fortunes. He also brought Bud Beardmore back to Maryland to take charge of the lacrosse program.

The combined record of basketball, football and lacrosse in 1968-69, the year prior to Kehoe's taking over, was 17-30. This past year with Driesell, Claiborne and Beardmore having established their programs the same three sports recorded a 39-11 record and national ranking in all three.

Kehoe is directing one of the few athletic programs in the nation that is not operating at a deficit yet continuous improvement in the physical facilities is evident.

He lured his former track teammate Col. Tom Fields into retirement from the Marine Corp to direct the Maryland Educational Foundation and instituted a drive to revamp the image of Maryland athletics. This past year the Maryland Educational Foundation exceeded its 350,000 dollar goal and the Terrapin Club increased its membership to over a thousand.

The athletic image has benefited not only from winning but from one of the finest radio and television networks in the nation. Over three-quarters of a million fans watched the Terps in person last year and many more benefited from national telecasts in both football and basketball. In addition from 20 to 30 stations carry the football and basketball games on radio as compared to only one station in 1969.

During his tenure as AD the Terps have won a NCAA Championship in Lacrosse and twice finished as runner-up for the National title, won the National Invitational Tournament Basketball Championship and gained the finals of the NCAA Eastern Regional Tournament for the first time, and the football team played in the Peach Bowl. It was the first Bowl appearance for the Terps since the 1955 team visited the Orange Bowl and the best record in 18 years.

Within the ACC the Terps won 22 of 64 Championships under Kehoe direction as compared to 13 for runner-up North Carolina. Maryland has now captured 117 titles since the ACC was formed in 1953. North Carolina has won 54 to rank second.

He has the Terps competing against the best in the Nation as the basketball team opened the 1973 season at UCLA and in 1974-75 will host UCLA and Notre Dame in Cole Field House. Claiborne's football team closed out the 1973 season with a 42-9 defeat of Tulane in Byrd Stadium, after hosting Penn State there earlier, opens the 1974 season with Alabama and follows that with a trip to Tampa to meet Florida.



As Maryland Track Coach Kehoe saw his teams capture the ACC Indoor and Outdoor Championships in all but one year of the ACC's existence. He won the first and last 14 in both and in addition captured eight cross Country titles including his last six as a coach.

After taking over as Track and Cross Country Coach in 1946 his teams won a total of 48 Southern and ACC team titles. In dual meet competition his teams were undefeated for his last nine years and the track team had a winning streak of 27 straight victories and the cross country team 29 at his retirement.

Maryland won the IC4A track titles in 1965-1966 and 1969 to claim Eastern track supremacy.

Perhaps his greater moment as a coach was reserved for his final season as track coach. In his final meet, by the margin of a single point, Maryland defeated heavily favored Villanova for the IC4A outdoor championship. Kehoe declared this his "greatest track victory" during his career as a coach.

A native of Bel Air, Maryland, where he starred in several sports, Kehoe entered Maryland in 1936 and concentrated on track and cross country. He lettered in all three of his varsity seasons, was undefeated in dual meet competition and won several Southern Conference titles in indoor and outdoor competition. He also established indoor and outdoor records in the 880 yard and two mile runs.

While a student at Maryland he was president of the Men's League, and a member of Omicron Delta Kappa National Honorary Fraternity.

In addition to coaching at Maryland he served as a Associate Professor of Physical Education and Director of Intramural Athletics. He holds an Honorary Doctors Degree from Steed College in Tennessee.

During World War II he served as an officer with the 81st Infantry Division in the Pacific, rising from the rank of private to Lieutenant Colonel upon retirement. He participated in the Philippine Islands and Central Pacific Campaigns and was awarded the Bronze Star, American Service Medal, Asiatic Pacific Medal, Victory Medal and Philippine Liberation Medal.

Kehoe is married to the former Barbara Riggs England, a 1943 Maryland graduate. The Kehoe's have four children; daughters Courtney Ann, Barbara Sue and Mary Lou and a son Jim. Courtney Ann and Jim are graduates of the University.

JERRY CLAIBORNE

Head Football Coach

Success and Jerry Claiborne are synonymous in academics and athletics, first as an outstanding student athlete at Kentucky, as the head football coach at Virginia Polytechnical Institute, as the defensive coordinator for Colorado's third ranked Bluebonnet Bowl Champions and as the head football coach at Maryland.

Claiborne was named the Coach of the Year by the Atlantic Coast Conference Sportswriters Association last year, the first Maryland Coach to receive this honor since the late Jim Tatum was honored in 1955. He was named the District III Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association and was one of the top four in their balloting for National Honors. He was runner-up for National Coach of the Year honors in the United Press International poll.

All of the above was achieved in only his second year at the University of Maryland where the Terrapins had won only nine games in five years prior to his arrival and 13 games in the previous six years. In two years in College Park Claiborne has won 13 games, including eight last year and led Maryland to a bowl for the first time since the 1955 team visited the Orange Bowl.

His 1973 Terrapins dropped a tough 17-16 decision to Georgia in the Peach Bowl, were ranked among the top 20 teams in the nation in all of the polls, were the second highest scoring team in Maryland football history, were only the seventh Maryland team to win eight games in a single season and the sixth bowl team in 81 years of competition at College Park.

He developed the first winning team in College Park since 1962 and only the undefeated, 10-0 team of 1955 surpassed the 1973 record in the past 19 years.

Pre-season publications have listed his 1974 Terrapins as high as ninth and all rank the Terps among the top 15 teams in the nation.

The press and players alike credit Claiborne for the meteoric rise in Maryland's football fortunes. Paul Attner reported in the Washington Post "a nucleus of fine athletes, a experienced staff, but most importantly the man himself projected something to the Maryland team and the entire football program that had been lacking. He came in talking about winning. He talked about it so much he soon had everyone believing it".

Richard Kucner, in the Baltimore News-American, says: "Claiborne's young followers thrive on high-intensity emotion, and the Pied Piper of College Park has them whistling a merry tune. He does it quietly, with sincerity his chief selling point".

The players add; "He has so much confidence in himself that he makes a believer out of you" said End Frank Rus-



sell. "He's built that winning confidence in us. We've always had the physical ability. He's changed our mental outlook".

Paul Vellano, a 1973 All-American now with the World Football League, says "A team of Coach Claiborne's just can't be a loser. He's just got a air about him. He's confident and very obviously a leader, and we believe in him 100 percent. He always seems to keep his emotions under control. He's always got control of the situation".

Vellano adds; "Our scouting reports are like term papers, 14-15 pages thick. By Saturday we were ready. Coach Claiborne never quits working. He's always in his office and his assistants are too. The guy is a winner, he works awfully hard, he treats you right and you don't want to let him down."

Terp Tackle Ken Scott, also now in the WFL, paid Claiborne the supreme compliment last winter. "I've never seen anyone who can go like he can" said Scott. "He always knows what he wants to do, minute by minute. He's never sloppy. He never yells at practice, never raises his voice. And he never cusses. I admire him as much as any man I've ever known."

Claiborne lured more fans to Byrd Stadium last fall than ever visited there in a single season in the past. Only Clark

Shaughnessy in 1942, Paul "Bear" Bryant in 1945 and Jim Tatum in 1947 have moved onto the football scene in College Park with the success of Jerry Claiborne in Maryland's 81 year history.

In Vellano, runner-up for ACC "Player of the Year" honors and Randy White, Delaware's "Athlete of the Year" Claiborne has developed Maryland's first All-Americans since Gary Collins in 1961. Claiborne greeted Vellano as a 285 pound sophomore in December of 1971. In August of 1972 Vellano reported as a trim 232 pounder, worked on a weight training program, played at 240 pounds as a junior and 252 pounds last year. Randy White developed from a 212 pounder, who could bench press 260 pounds, to a 248 pounder who can now bench press 340 pounds and runs a 4.65 forty.

When Claiborne reported to College Park he freed seven men on the football team with the strength to bench press 250 pounds or better. Last fall the roster listed 39 men pressing over 250 pounds with 17 topping the 300 pound mark four topping 400 pounds, and 23 were among the initial group tested.

During spring practice 69 players pressed over 250 pounds, and 49 ran the 40 in 4.9 or better. Of this group 36 pressed better than 300 pounds.

Claiborne is no newcomer to building winning football programs. In 1963, his third year at Virginia Tech, he was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year after leading the Gobblers to a 8-2 record. In 1966 he led Virginia Tech to the Liberty Bowl and was named the District III Coach of the Year and in 1968 he again returned to the Liberty Bowl with the Gobblers.

In 12 years as a Head Coach he has won 61 percent of his games, ranking among the top 25 active coaches in the

nation. He has been honored with coaching duties in the Blue-Gray and Coaches All-American game. His program at Virginia Tech produced four All-American players while in two years at Maryland he has produced two first team All-Americans and a pair of backs with Honorable Mention honors on the Associated Press team. Three of the four are back for the 1974 season.

In 1949 Claiborne was named the Outstanding Senior on the University of Kentucky's Orange Bowl team. He was a outstanding defensive back while playing for Paul Bryant at Kentucky and a superior assistant coach while serving with Coach Bryant at Kentucky, Texas A & M and Alabama. He has also served with Frank Broyles at Missouri and Eddie Crowder at Colorado.

Coach Claiborne was born in Hopkinsville, Kentucky where he had outstanding athletic and academic careers in high school and continued the same at the University of Kentucky. During his senior year at Kentucky, the defensive secondary, of which he was a member, established and still holds the NCAA record for pass interception returns.

In addition to his outstanding athletic endeavors, he was held in high esteem academically, elected into several honorary leadership-scholarship organizations including Lamp and Cross and Omicron Delta Kappa. He was also selected as the Outstanding Senior in the College of Education and graduated from the University of Kentucky with high distinction, accumulating a 2.7 out of a possible 3.0 grade point average.

In 1968 he was elected to the University of Kentucky Hall of Fame.

Claiborne began his coaching career at Augusta Military Academy as head football coach and basketball mentor. The first year his basketball team won the state prep

championship and the second year his football team won the state championship.

After two years at the Academy, Coach Claiborne returned to his Alma Mater as assistant coach with Paul Bryant. After two seasons Coach Bryant moved to Texas A&M and with him went Coach Claiborne as defensive coordinator. In two short years Texas A&M was the Southwestern Conference champions and Coach Claiborne's defense led the league.

When Claiborne arrived at Maryland the Terps were ranked last in the ACC in defense. The Terps have led the league in defense the past two years and are nationally ranked in total defense, rushing defense and defense against scoring.

The Terps held opponents to 112 yards per game this past season for an average of 2.6 yards per play and 11.3 points a game.

While excelling on defense the Terrapins were also ranked second in the ACC in pass offense with 140 yards per game and had the best completion percentage .593 of any team in the league. Maryland completed more passes than any team in the league, 118, and averaged eight yards per attempt and 13 yards per completion.

The 29 point per game production trailed only the 33 points recorded by North Carolina State.

Coach Claiborne is a active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletics and has served as a Deacon in the Baptist Church. While in Virginia he served as State Chairman of the Cancer Crusade and currently is serving as the Prince Georges County Chairman for the Cancer Crusade. The Virginia campaign raised over \$1,000,000 for the first time in the history of the State with Claiborne as Chairman. On a national basis Coach Claiborne was again honored by his fellow countrymen when he was selected as one of the "Outstanding Young Men in America."

Mrs. Claiborne, the former Faye Hooks, of Hopkinsville, is also a University of Kentucky graduate. The Claiborne's have two sons and two daughters. David, 21, Johnathan 17, Katie 15 and Eileen 11. Coach Claiborne is 44. Johnathan

was a defensive star for the Maryland Junior Varsity this past season as a freshman. He excelled as a defensive safety.

THE ASSISTANT COACHES

John Devlin (West Chester '59) Defensive Ends & Linebackers

Coach Devlin works with the group that Coach Claiborne has often mentioned as the key to the success of the wide tackle six defense. The linebackers are especially important to this defensive alignment. In Harry Walters he has one of the finest linebackers in the nation and Kevin Benson, a junior, has started for two years on the other side.

Devlin joined the Terps in 1973 replacing Bobby Ross who assumed the head coaching duties at The Citadel.

He is quite familiar with the Terrapins defensive alignment having served with Coach Claiborne at Virginia Tech from 1966 thru 1970 in the same capacity.

He served as the defensive line coach at Florida State for two years before rejoining Coach Claiborne at Maryland.

The native of Norristown, Pennsylvania began his football career at St. Matthews High in nearby Conshohocken, Pa. and went on to West Chester State College.

While at West Chester he achieved all-conference honors as a tackle and was also the weight man on the track team. His 1958 team at West Chester was called the best ever coached by Glenn Killinger, the Rams coach for 25 years.

Devlin began his coaching career at Waynesboro high and then coached the Fourth Army team while serving in Germany. He joined Paul Dietzel at West Point for three years before moving to Virginia Tech with Coach Claiborne.

He was born in Norristown on April 12, 1937. While in Germany he married the former Irma Kleemann of Regensburg, Germany. They have four children, John III 12, Elizabeth 11, William 8 and Michael 5.

Jerry Eisaman (Kentucky '60) Quarterbacks

Coach Eisaman's quarterbacks directed the 1973 Maryland offense to the second most productive season in 81 years of competition by the Terps and were the most effective passers in the Atlantic Coast Conference completing over 58 percent of their tosses.

In addition to passing for six touchdowns the quarterbacks ran for five scores including a 52 yard run by Ben Kinard.

While at Kentucky Eisaman was recognized as the All-SEC Sophomore quarterback and was elected Co-Captain his senior year. He also played in the Blue-Gray game.

Academically, he received the Sam Huey Award for the highest scholastic standing among the members of the football team for four years, and was a member of the Scabbard and Blade Honorary Society.

While an officer in the Army he coached the First Cavalry Division to the Far East Championship and also coached the Fort Knox Tankers. From there he spent three

years at Seneca high in Louisville, Kentucky before joining Coach Claiborne at Virginia Tech in 1966 where he coached the offensive backs for three years.

He served as the offensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati for three years before rejoining Claiborne at Maryland.

Coach Eisaman is a 37 year old bachelor.

George Foussekis (Virginia Tech '68) Defensive Guards

Coach Foussekis achieved All-American recognition for three years while playing for Coach Claiborne at Virginia Tech and has developed a All-American at Maryland in Paul Vellano a first team selection by the American Football Coaches Association in 1973.

He has two of the hardest workers on the squad returning in Guy Deitz and Dave Visaggio.

Foussekis was a member of the Gobblers 1966 Liberty Bowl team and signed with the Denver Broncos in 1968. He returned to Virginia Tech with Coach Claiborne in 1969 and worked with the defensive line there for two years.

In 1971 he served as the defensive coordinator at William & Mary and rejoined Coach Claiborne when he assumed the head coaching duties at Maryland.

Foussekis is a graduate of Lane High in Charlottesville, Virginia where he Captained the football, basketball and baseball teams. He was named the Most Valuable Player in all three sports. His 1963 football team at Lane High won the state championship and he was named first team All-State.

He has helped recruit several Virginia stars for the Terrapins including Walter White of Albermarle High in Charlottesville and Ralph Fisher of Radford High in Radford.

The 28 year old bachelor was born on April 28, 1946.

Joseph Krivak (Syracuse '57) Receivers

Coach Krivak joined the Maryland staff this past spring when Joe Gardi left to join the staff of the Philadelphia team in the World Football League.

In his first season at Maryland he will have the pleasure of coaching several of the top receivers in the ACC, and two of the top receivers in the nation in Frank Russell and Walter White. The two caught 70 passes for 1,031 yards and nine touchdowns in 1973.

Coach Krivak had the same duties at Syracuse for the past five years with Ben Schwartzwalder.

While at Virginia Tech Coach Claiborne recruited several of Coach Krivak's players from Madonna High in Weirton,

West Virginia and said "We are very happy and quite fortunate that we were able to get a coach of his caliber to replace Coach Gardi."

Krivak is a native of Central City, Pennsylvania where he attended Shade Township High. He was a member of Syracuse's 1956 Cotton Bowl team and lettered in 1954-55-56 as a guard-center-linebacker. He also lettered in baseball for Syracuse.

He received his Master's from Syracuse in 1962. He served as the Head Football Coach at Madonna High for eight years, winning a State Catholic Championship and two Ohio Valley Conference Championships. His teams recorded a 48-25-3 record.

Coach Krivak married the former Jean Irvin of Weirton and they have three sons, Edward 11, John 9, and Jeff 6.

Thomas Groom (Virginia Tech '67) **Offensive Setbacks**

Coach Groom's offensive setbacks gained 1,742 net yards rushing last fall and passed for an additional 182 yards on the halfback option. The setbacks scored 19 touchdowns rushing caught two td passes and passed for six touchdowns as they accounted for a total of 27 td's, 13 more than the 11 Terp opponents scored as a team.

In Louis Carter he has developed a pre-season All-America selection and he has eight veteran backs returning.

Groom played his collegiate football for Jerry Claiborne at Virginia Tech where he was a three year letterman and as fullback captained the 1966 Liberty Bowl team. He also captained the undefeated 1963 State Championship team at Charleston Catholic in Charleston, West Virginia.

Following graduation from Tech he remained as a graduate assistant until entering the Army as a Commissioned 2nd Lt. He served as an assistant coach at the USMA Prep School, Fort Belvoir, Virginia in 1968 and in 1969 transferred to West Point as an assistant coach under Tom Cahill.

In 1971 he served as a graduate assistant under Head Coach Eddie Crowder at Colorado. He moved with Coach Claiborne to Maryland.

Coach Groom is married to the former Sharon Daltom and they have two children, Thomas 8 and Gina 5.

John "Jake" Hallum (Newberry '61) **Offensive Line**

Coach Hallum lost only Bart Purvis from the offensive line that helped the 1973 Terps become the second highest scoring team in 81 years of football at College Park.

In Stan Rogers he has one of the strongest offensive linemen to ever play at Maryland.

Hallum played four years of collegiate football at Newberry, receiving his B.S. degree in 1960. He received his Master's from Murray State in 1965.

He began his coaching career at Pickins High in South Carolina as assistant coach in football and basketball and head baseball coach. In 1962 he moved to Hopkinsville High in Kentucky again as an assistant in football and basketball and head baseball coach.

He then moved to Paul G. Blazer high in 1966 as head football and track coach, recording a three year record of 20-6-0 in football. His 1966 football team captured the District Championship and in 1967 won the State Championship. His track team placed third in the state in 1967.

Coach Hallum was named the "Outstanding Young Man" for the Ashland and Boyd County area in 1967. The Lexington-Herald "Coach of the Year" in 1967 and the Kentucky High School Athletic Association "Coach of the Year".

In February of 1968 he moved to Morehead State University as assistant football coach and in April was named the head football coach and assistant professor. He served in his capacity until moving to Maryland to join Coach Claiborne. He left Morehead with a winning program and a 7-3 record in 1971.

He was born in Liberty, South Carolina on Nov. 2, 1938. His wife Mable is a native of Greenwood, South Carolina. They have two sons, Tod Jacob 10 and Bart Jeffrey 7.

Thomas R. Park (West Chester '69) **Recruiting**

Coach Park, serving as Coordinator of the Recruiting program, saw the Terps complete one of the most successful recruiting years ever this past spring.

Only a reported six figure baseball contract, luring Willie Wilson from College Park to Kansas City, prevented the Terps from having a super recruiting year.

Coach Claiborne is impressed with Park's "great organizational ability" and also cited him as a dedicated, hard working and loyal individual, all the qualities that it takes for his position.

PRESIDENT

UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND

This year Dr. Elkins completed his twentieth year at the University as its twenty-first president. He is chief executive officer of the Board of Regents and head of the growing five-campus system which includes University College and its world-wide program of education.

During his period in office, President Elkins has seen the University grow from an annual enrollment of 8,500 students to more than 70,000. The total operating budget which was \$23 million in 1954 in more than \$225 million this year.

In addition to degrees from the University of Texas, Dr. Elkins earned his B.Litt. and Ph.D. degrees at Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar.

Long a sports enthusiast and an avid golfer, Maryland's President was elected to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in 1963 and was the recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the University of Texas in 1972. While an undergraduate there he earned eight varsity letters in football, basketball, and track.

Dr. Elkins began his professional career as a history instructor before serving as President of San Angelo Junior College and Texas Western College (the University of Texas at El Paso).

He is a member of the Southern Regional Education Board and past president of the National Association of



State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the Southern University Conference.



ALFRED J. HANLON

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Alfred J. Hanlon is concerned primarily with scheduling, team travel, personnel policies and general office administration. He has been with the Athletic Department since 1969, when he retired from the U.S. Air Force with the rank of colonel after directing the Maryland AFROTC program for two years.

A rated command pilot, Hanlon commanded a heavy bomber squadron in England and North Africa during World War II. He has served in a wide variety of command and staff positions since that time. His military decorations include the Legion of Merit, the Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Air Force Commendation Medal and the Presidential Unit Citation Badge.

Hanlon is a native of Boston and a 1939 graduate of Harvard University, where he was a varsity letterman in track. He is married to the former Barbara Foster of Boston, and they have three grown children, Christopher, Brenda and Mark.

DR. JOHN E. FABER

CHAIRMAN, THE ATHLETIC COUNCIL

First appointed to the athletic council in 1951, Dr. John Faber has served as its chairman since 1963. Dr. Faber is the University's representative to the Atlantic Coast Conference. He is currently serving his second term as President of the ACC having also served in 1969-70.

For 36 years Dr. Faber served as lacrosse coach at the University. During that time the accomplishments of his

teams secured a place for him as one of the greatest names in Maryland athletic history. He won 276 games suffering only 75 losses with two ties. Five times his Terps were undisputed national champions and two other times they shared that honor with another school.

A professor in the microbiology department, the University is fortunate to have such a man as its Faculty Chairman of Athletics.



EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MARYLAND EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

Col. Thomas M. Fields

When Jim Kehoe assumed the duties as Director of Athletics at the University of Maryland he realized that financial stability was absolutely necessary to achieve the goals he set for Maryland athletics.

Kehoe has achieved many of those goals and financial stability is one of them. The University athletic department was one of only 10 percent in the nation that operated without a deficit last year and Tom Fields had a big hand in achieving that goal.

When Kehoe lured Col. Fields into retirement from the Marine Corps, contributions to the Maryland Education Foundation were minimal. For the fiscal year ending June

30, 1970, the contributions totaled approximately \$30,000.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1974, contributions totaled just over \$386,000, an increase of over 1200 percent.

During the past year the Terrapin Club renewed 96 percent of their contributions and the membership now stands at 1200, quite a jump from the 132 original members.

Of the 1200 members, six are life members, (\$10,000 contribution), 102 are Diamondback members (\$1,000 annual contribution) 380 are Gold members (\$500 annual contribution) and 712 are Silver members (\$100 or more annual contribution).

The goal established by Col. Fields last year was \$350,000 and everyone termed that an unrealistic goal. However as he has with each previous goal Fields once again topped it with his \$386,000 and now has a goal of \$500,000 for the coming year with a membership increase to 2000.

With the results he has achieved in the past through hard work and determination he will achieve that goal as well.

The former Maryland All-American distance runner and teammate of Kehoe's took over his duties at Maryland in 1970 and his success has followed the pattern of his life.

His service to his country followed the same pattern he established as a track star for the Terrapins and recently as a University Administrator.

During World War II he served in combat on Guadalcanal, Vella Lavella, Bouganville and Iowa Jima. He also served in Korea and Vietnam and at the time of his retirement from the Corps he was the Deputy Director of Information Headquarters Marine Corps.

Colonel Fields and his wife, the former Patricia T. Hansel, have four children. They are Thomas M. Jr. 19, Karen 18, Lori 16 and David 14.



SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR

John W. "Jack" Zane (Maryland '60)

The duties of a sports information director are primarily to disseminate information concerning the various athletic teams and at Maryland this means continuous work with teams of championship caliber.

The many outstanding young men and women at Maryland provide a wealth of material for the news media and the information is well received.

Zane assumed the duties as SID at Maryland in 1970 after serving as an Associate with Dan Daniels for a year, and following six years as SID at George Washington University.

He has hosted the news media for National Championships in Basketball, Wrestling and Lacrosse, for one of the finest Holiday basketball tournaments in the nation, the Maryland Invitational, and annually for one of the major Invitational Indoor Track Meets.

Maryland publications in Wrestling and Lacrosse have been honored by COSIDA as being among the best in the nation the past two years.

Zane received his degree in Journalism from Maryland and while a undergraduate served as the first Executive Sports Editor of the Diamondback and SMC of Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity. He was a member of the Sigma Delta Chi Journalism Fraternity at Maryland and now is a member of the Maryland Professional Chapter.

While at GW he served as President of the Southern Conference SID's and on the Executive Committee of the Southern Conference Sportswriters Association and currently serves on the Public Relations Committee of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

He is a member of Co-SIDA, the Football Writers and Basketball Writers of America, the Sports Reporters Association of Baltimore and ACC Sportswriters. He is also a member of the Washington D.C. Touchdown Club and Maryland's Terrapin Club. This past year he was honored with a Honorary Membership in Maryland's "M" Club.

In 1970 and each subsequent year he has been listed among Personalities of the South a annual biographical publication.

A graduate of Southern High of Lothian, Maryland he served four and a half years in the Navy before enrolling at Maryland. He is married to the former Judy Allen of Fayetteville, West Virginia, a graduate of The George Washington University.

Assistant to the Athletic Director

Russ Potts, Assistant to the Athletic Director for Promotions and Advertising, has added a new dimension to the Maryland athletic department. His duties encompass three areas: (a) All advertising sales for the athletic department such as printed programs, scoreboard and sponsorship of the football and basketball radio networks, (b) ticket promotions for football and basketball, and (c) all television and radio negotiations.

Potts also supervises arrangements for the Jerry Claiborne and Lefty Driesell television shows seen on WMAL-TV in Washington.

The modern scoreboards in Cole Field House and Byrd Stadium are the sales work of the Winchester, Virginia native. The magic message systems have also added another advertising and promotion dimension to the Terrapin football and basketball games.

The football and basketball banquets, which have grown to be among the nation's best in college ranks, are also the responsibility of the 35-year old Potts.

This year's football television schedule gives Maryland its' most extensive coverage in history with two games live (Florida and North Carolina) and four other games shown on a delayed basis on WMAL and WBFF.

He directs the production of the nation's largest football and basketball printed programs. In addition, the football and basketball radio networks have grown from a humble beginning in 1970 to their current status of 28 for football and 35 for basketball.



Potts is a 1964 Maryland graduate where he received a B.S. Degree in Journalism. He served as President of Phi Delta Theta Social Fraternity and Sigma Delta Journalism Fraternity during his undergraduate days at Maryland. He was selected to the 1966 edition of 'Outstanding Young Men in America.'

Russ is married to the former Emily Strite of Martinsburg, West Virginia. They are the parents of two daughters, Kristi (6) and Katie (3).



Ellen Futtrell of WMAL is the program director for the weekly broadcast of the Terps games, while Potts serves as network coordinator. Coach Jerry Claiborne will do a weekly pre-game show, beginning fifteen minutes before kickoff on all network stations.

WMAL Radio of Washington is the originating station with Mal Campbell calling the action for the Terps and Len Hathaway doing the color. Network sponsors are: The F & M Schaefer Brewing Company (1/4 sponsorship), Shenandoah Downs-Charles Town Race Course (1/8 sponsorship), the Wild Life Preserve (1/8 sponsorship), and Maryland Apple Growers.

The network is the creation of Russ Potts, Sports Promotion Director at the University. As late as 1970, Maryland had only one station, but has experienced tremendous growth in the past four years.

Dr. Lavine is an orthopedic surgeon.

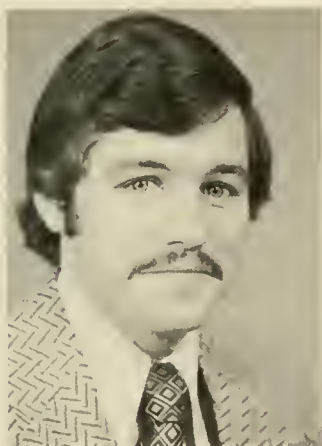


TRAINER — WILLIAM FRY

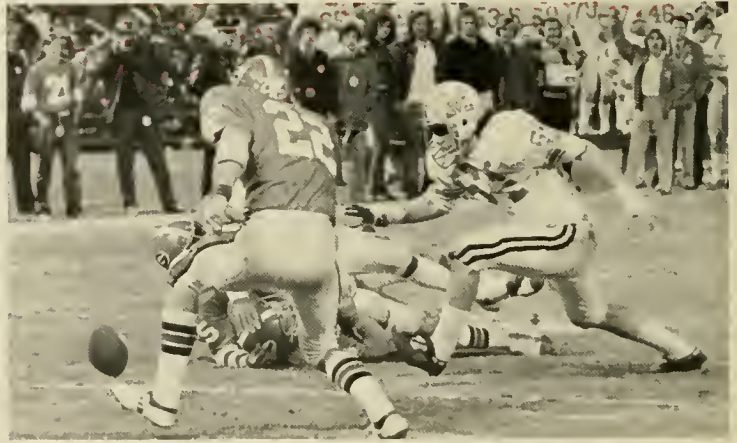

NOTES: In final three games of regular season Maryland outscored opponents 103-22 topping Virginia 33-0, Clemson 28-13 and Tulane 42-9.

- vs Tulane: Terps gained 445 yards against Bowl Bound and Nationally ranked Green Wave in 42-9 win. Tulane gained only 53 yards rushing on 32 plays, then went on to defeat LSU the following week. Louis Carter scored twice and passed for a pair of td's
- vs Clemson: Terps received Peach Bowl bid following 28-13 win over Clemson with team learning of invitation upon arrival at the Greenville-Spartanburg Airport. Louis Carter ran for 127 yards and scored three touchdowns.
- vs Virginia: Terps recorded third shutout and held fifth opponent without touchdown as they defeated Virginia 33-0. Maryland gained 512 yards against Cavaliers the highest total since 1954, with 392 yards rushing. Alan Bloomingdale picked up 98 on nine carries.
- vs Penn State: Penn State scored twice in first 1:24 of game with 98 yard KO return, and recovered fumble of ensuing KO. Terps came back on halfback pass by Ken Roy to Frank Russell, Steve Mike-Mayer FG and Louis Carter pass to Walter White for 16-12 lead. Bob Smith returned punt 83 yards for 22-22 half-time tie. Interception and fumble helped Penn State to 42-22 win with 20 point 3rd quarter.
- vs Duke: Terps win 30-10 in Oyster Bowl with 20 point 4th quarter. Carter throws two td passes 21 yards to Walter White and 25 to Ken Roy. Paul Vellano voted MVP trophy by press only the second defensive player to win it in 27 year history of the game.

- vs Wake Forest: Terps held Wake Forest without a first down rushing and only one first down in game that coming on a screen pass the only completion in 18 attempts. Terps gained 347 yards rushing and 467 in game, the highest total at the time, since 1954. Deacons gained only 44 yards rushing on 32 carries and 69 yards total offense on 50 plays.
- vs North Carolina State: Terps gave N.C. State 17-0 lead on three fumbles and a interception, and held three times inside the 10 with only a field goal resulting. Louis Carter ran for 110 yards and caught four passes, Walter White caught eight for 112 yards and Frank Russell added five catches as Terps rolled up 387 yards but eventually lost 24-22 missing field goal try with 15 seconds left.
- vs Syracuse: Terps gain first win over Orange since 1961 with 38-0 shutout. Bob Avellini hit Walter White with 60 yard td pass on fourth play of game and Terps went on to lead 24-0 at half.
- vs Villanova: Steve Mike-Mayer kicks three field goals, one a record 54 yarder, as Terps win 31-3. Bob Smith returns five punts for 108 yards including 56 yard td. Al Neville suffered discolated elbow in second half.
- vs North Carolina: Terps broke Tar Heels ACC winning streak at 15 and first Maryland win in Chapel Hill in 12 years with 23-3 win. Frank Russell and Walter White each caught two td passes. Randy White is named National Lineman of Week by AP.
- vs West Virginia: Terps suffered disappointing loss 20-13 on Danny Buggs punt return of 69 yards with eight seconds left in game. Mountaineers also scored on 75 yard pass with 5:36 remaining to tie the score 13-13.

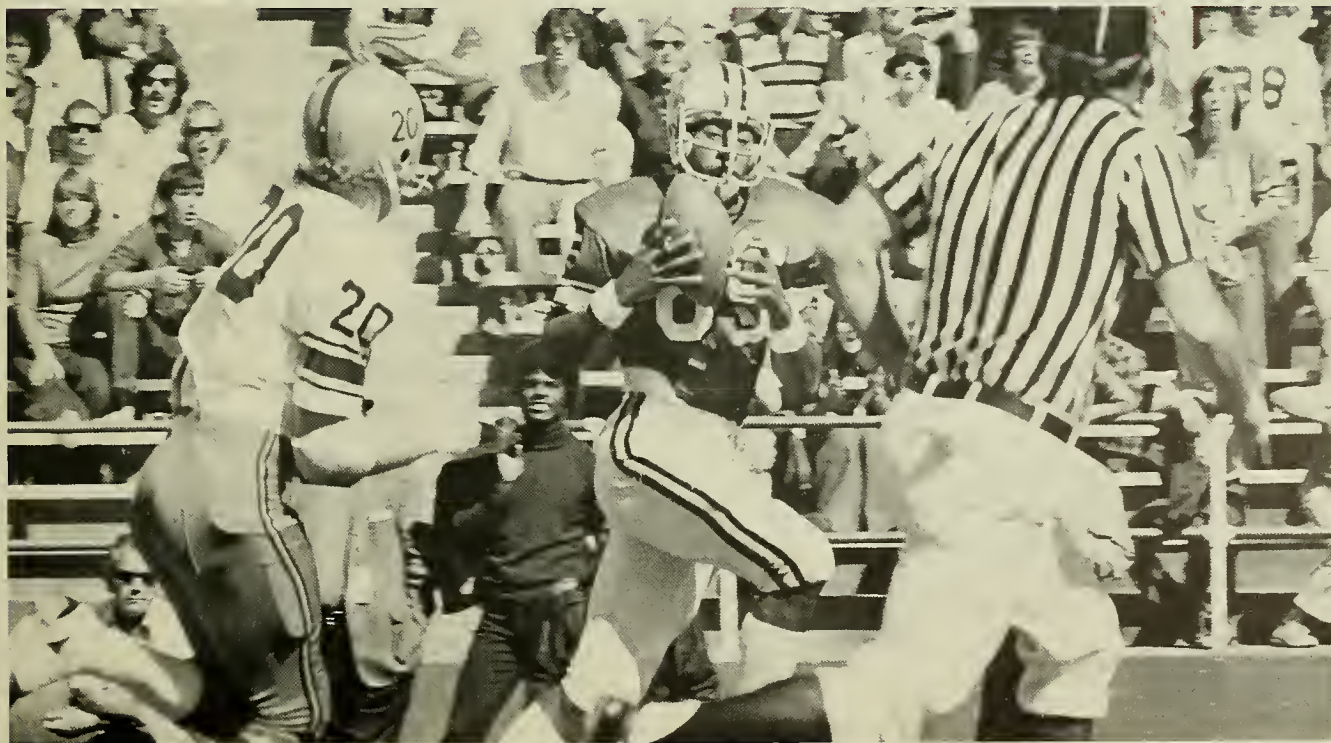

Maryland Basketball 1974-75



Lefty Driesell

Maryland lost 47 percent of the offense and 60 percent of the rebounding from its fourth ranked basketball team when the Class of '74 graduated in May.

When Tom McMillen, the Terrapins Rhodes Scholar, delivered his Commencement Address it officially marked the end of the McMillen-Elmore Era that had delivered a NIT Championship, a berth in the NCAA Eastern Regionals and 73 victories in the last three years.

McMillen and Elmore, both All-Americans and first round NBA draft choices, contributed 1,128 points and 751 rebounds last year and a three year total of 2,824 points along with 1,912 rebounds.

What would be a catastrophe to many programs served as merely added inspiration to Terrapin Coach Charles G. "Lefty" Driesell. His program in five years had delivered 100 victories to Maryland fans who had witnessed only 59 in the previous five years and 84 over a eight year span prior to Driesell's arrival at College Park.

With his program established Driesell has five established veterans returning in All-American Guard John Lucas, Seniors Owen Brown, 6-foot-8 forward, Tom Roy a 6-foot-9 center-forward and Guard Bill Hahn along with junior Maurice Howard a 6-foot-3 guard.

Lucas and Howard form the best backcourt combination in the Atlantic Coast Conference and the Terrapins won 10 of the 11 games that Owen Brown started in last year, the only loss a 103-100 decision to NCAA Champion North Carolina State in overtime.

Joining the veterans are four high school All-Americans including Moses Malone, the 6-foot-11 center from Petersburg, Virginia and the most highly sought after high school player in the country. Chris Patton, 6-foot-9 from St. Francis High in Athol Springs, New York and Brad Davis a 6-foot-3 guard from Monaca, Pennsylvania were also on all of the high school All-American teams. Mike Cherry was All-State in Elm City, North Carolina as a 6-foot-5 forward and John Newsome, 6-foot-6 led his Norfolk Catholic team to a outstanding season.

The fourth All-American enrolled at College Park a year ago but was ineligible in Steve Sheppard the high school "Player of the Year" in New York for 1973. Sheppard came to College Park on his own, had a fine year in the classroom and at 6-foot-6 is expected to break into the lineup somewhere probably competing for the spot vacated by McMillen.


Lucas led Maryland in scoring as a sophomore with his 20.1 points a game and 564 points for the season, hit 51 percent of his shots from the field and 75 percent from the free throw line while contributing 159 assists. Howard scored at a 12.2 points a game pace, hit 55 percent of his shots and led the team at the free throw line hitting 79 percent.

As is typical with Lefty Driesell coached teams the Terrapins were nationally ranked in scoring, margin of victory, rebounding and field goal percentage. The Terps hit 51 percent of their shots from the field last year, the fifth Driesell Coached team to achieve the 50 percent mark and the seventh to score over 80 points a game. It also was his ninth team to win over 20 games in a season and seventh to rank among the top 11 teams in the nation. In fourteen years as a head coach he has never had a team that was out-rebounded and his last 13 teams have hit better than 70 percent of their free throws including 75 percent by the 1973-74 Terrapins.

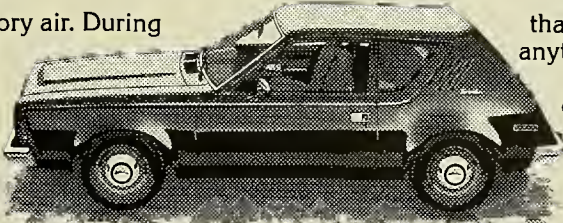
