



# 1975 OUTLOOK

For the first time in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference the Maryland Terrapins open the season as defending champions sporting a 10 game winning streak within the league. The Terps had shared the title with Duke twice, including the 1953 National Champions, but never had they reigned alone and never had they won 10 in a row.

The 1953-56 teams won 12 of 13 games but a tie with Wake Forest held the winning streak to nine. In winning 13 of their last 14 league games the Terps have averaged over 30 points a game and held the opposition to eight. During the Ten game winning streak they have outscored league opponents 326-58 and recorded five shutouts with only a field goal in a sixth game.

Defense of the title in '75 will come much harder as 15 starters and both kicking specialists have departed. The kicking specialists were Steve Mike-Mayer, the nation's kick scoring leader, and Phil Waganheim, the nation's fifth ranked punter. In addition, 11 of the starters were drafted by NFL teams, nine received some sort of All-American recognition and six were All-ACC selections.

However, Coach Jerry Claiborne has his program established at Maryland and there were 13 upcoming seniors in the starting lineup during spring practice along with two outstanding sophomore lettermen and 17 of the 30 lettermen have earned letters at least twice.

Starters returning (7) are all All-ACC candidates and include Jim Brechbiel, the "Big Play" defensive back; John Schultz, the multi-talented wingback; Kevin Benson, a four-year starter at linebacker; Ralph Fisher, moving over to take Randy White's spot with the ability to be outstanding there; Paul DiVito, a steady defensive guard, and LeRoy Hughes, a leader and superior end in Maryland's wide tackle six defense.

The offensive backfield appears strong with a pair of outstanding quarterback candidates, two proven tailbacks, strength and running ability at fullback and the most solid performer on the team at wingback.

Mark Manges, a superior athlete, served as the backup quarterback to Bob Avellini as a freshman and Larry Dick had an outstanding spring after picking up an extra years' experience as a red-shirt. Both excel at running the option and are fine sprint out passers.

Tailback Rick Jennings has proven himself to be a fine runner while serving as the backup to Louis Carter for two years and Jamie Franklin had a superior spring after returning from a two-year layoff from football. Tim Wilson moved to fullback in the spring and demonstrated fine blocking to go along with his running and is backed up by Chuck Moss, a transfer from Syracuse and Dan DeCarlo, a letterman.

All John Schultz does at wingback is run well, catch well, block well and score when he has the football in four down territory. Schultz handled the ball 51 times last fall, on 35 carries and 16 receptions and scored nine touchdowns. Eight came on plays from within the 10 yard line.

Bob Raba and Vince Kinney at tight end and Kim Hoover and Chuck White at split end provide excellent targets for Manges' and Dick's aerial game.

The interior offensive line has yet to be tested with Eugene Ochap at center, backed up by Jack Sharkey; Ed Fulton, John Nash and Mike Yeates, the guard candidates, and Lettermen Tom Schick, Marion Koprowski, Dave Conrad and John Zernhelt, the top tackles. Nash was a starter last year.

Defensively the Terps have five starters returning with Brechbiel the star of the group. He has two years' experience as a starter, has nine pass interceptions to his credit with one touchdown, has blocked two punts through the end zone for safeties, blocked three field goal attempts and an extra point attempt and can return punts, literally earning his reputation as a 'big play' man.

The other halfback spot in the secondary has lettermen Mike Cielensky and Joe Younge along with Ken Roy who moved from wingback. Roy, another talented performer, had a fine spring, making the adjustment from offense and has talent and desire. Pete Zachary is a letterman safety, playing behind the ACC's best in Bob Smith, and was backed up in the spring by Jonathan Claiborne.

Linebackers Harry Walters and Jim Santa both joined the pros and Steve Zannoni also graduated leaving Benson and Mike Miller as the lettermen returning. Benson returns as a three year starter and following a knee operation, if fully recovered, will be a four year starter. George Shihda moved over from defensive end in the spring and won the other starting role backed up by Miller. Sophomores Bradd Carr and Keith Calta should work in giving Coach John Devlin five solid performers to work with, at the vital position in the wide tackle six defense.

The Maryland defensive ends are not down linemen and have considerable pass defense duties as well as usual line chores. Hughes thrives at the position and had nine minus yardage plays last year including three quarterback sacks and accounted for 44 minus yards. He was in on 65 tackles. Bill Evans is a letterman on the other side but was challenged in the spring by Chip Garber for the starting role.

The tackles are again solid with Fisher moving in for White at left tackle and with Joe Campbell, a letterman, and Russ LaHayne the Terps have three solid players.

DiVito and Ernie Salley are both lettermen with Salley earning his letter as a freshman last year. They are backed up by Bob Schwartz, Ted Klaube and Larry Seder, all sophomores.

Mike Sochko, a defensive end candidate, was so impressive kicking in the spring that he is now a kicking specialist and should be a good one. He consistently kicked off into the end zone in the spring, has 40 plus range on field goals and averaged over 42 yards punting in the spring game. He will get considerable work in the early fall and should be a capable replacement for both Mike-Mayer and Waganheim.

Claiborne has said in the past that freshmen have the best chance of playing at the skill positions or on the specialty teams. Six freshmen were on the 1974 Liberty Bowl team, two lettered and with another fine recruiting year, several should make the squad in '75 but that remains to be seen.



# DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



# JIM KEHOE



Jim Kehoe's University of Maryland athletic program continues to improve with each year. The Terps have increased their winning percentage each year since the former Track Coach took over the program on July 1, 1969, and this past season seven of the 21 varsity sports he administers ranked among the top 20 in the nation.

The Terps also captured the Carmichael Cup, symbolic of overall supremacy in the Atlantic Coast Conference in Men's sports, for the second consecutive year and ninth time in the 14 years it has been presented.

In overall, head-to-head competition the Terrapins won 209 of 298 intercollegiate athletic contests during the 1974-75 season with the 13 men's teams recording a 123-41-5 record and the eight Women's sports compiling an 86-39-4 record.

His six years as Terrapin AD have been exciting, to say the least. The Terps have become National Powers in basketball, football and lacrosse completing the past season as National Champions in Lacrosse, ranked fifth in basketball and thirteenth in football.

It was Kehoe who lured Coach Lefty Driesell to Maryland to become the Terp basketball coach and then obtained the services of Jerry Claiborne to guide the Terrapin football fortunes. He also brought Bud Beardmore back to Maryland to take charge of the lacrosse program.

The combined record of basketball, football and lacrosse in 1968-69, the year prior to Kehoe's taking over, was 17-30. The past two years the same three sports recorded a cumulative 39-11 and 41-11 record with national rankings in all three.

In addition Kehoe is directing one of the few athletic programs in the nation that is not operating at a deficit yet continuous improvement in the physical facilities and caliber of the teams is evident.

He lured his former track teammate, Col. Tom Fields, into retirement from the Marine Corps to direct the Maryland Educational Foundation and instituted a drive to revamp the image of Maryland athletics. This past year the Maryland Educational Foundation contributed \$531,000 for the support of the Maryland athletic scholarship program.

The athletic image has benefited not only from winning but from one of the finest radio and television networks in the nation. Nearly a million fans watched the Terps in person last year and many more benefited from national telecasts in both football and basketball. In addition some 40 stations carry the football and basketball games as compared to only one station in 1969.

During his tenure as AD the Terps have twice won the NCAA Championship in Lacrosse and twice finished as the runner-up for the National title, won the National Invitational Basketball Tournament, gained the finals of the NCAA Eastern and Midwestern Regional basketball tournaments and the football team has been to consecutive Bowl games.

Within the ACC the Terps have won 26 of 74 Championships under Kehoe's direction as compared to 15 for runner-up North Carolina. Maryland has now captured 121 titles since the ACC was formed in 1953, more than double the 56 by North Carolina to rank second.

As Maryland Track Coach Kehoe saw his teams capture the ACC Indoor and Outdoor Championships in all but one year of the ACC's existence. He won the first and last 14 in both and in addition captured eight Cross Country titles including his last six as a coach.

After taking over as Track and Cross Country Coach in 1946 his teams won a total of 48 Southern and ACC team titles. In dual meet competition his teams were undefeated for his last nine years and the track team had a winning streak of 27 straight victories and the cross country team 29 at his retirement.

Maryland won the IC4A track titles in 1965-1966 and 1969 to claim Eastern track supremacy.

Perhaps his greater moment as a coach was reserved for his final season as track coach. In his final meet, by the margin of a single point, Maryland defeated heavily favored Villanova for the IC4A outdoor championship. Kehoe declared this his "greatest track victory" during his career as a coach.

A native of Bel Air, Maryland, where he starred in several sports, Kehoe entered Maryland in 1936 and concentrated on track and cross country. He lettered in all three of his varsity seasons, was undefeated in dual meet competition and won several Southern Conference titles in indoor and outdoor competition. He also established indoor and outdoor records in the 880 yard and two mile runs.

While a student at Maryland he was president of the Men's League, and a member of Omicron Delta Kappa National Honorary Fraternity.

In addition to coaching at Maryland he served as an Associate Professor of Physical Education and Director of Intramural Athletics. He holds an Honorary Doctor's degree from Steed College in Tennessee.

During World War II he served as an officer with the 81st Infantry Division in the Pacific, rising from the rank of private to Lieutenant Colonel upon retirement. He participated in the Philippine Islands and Central Pacific Campaigns and was awarded the Bronze Star, American Service Medal, Asiatic Pacific Medal, Victory Medal and Philippine Liberation Medal.

Kehoe is married to the former Barbara Riggs England, a 1943 Maryland graduate. The Kehoes have four children: daughters Courtney Ann, Barbara Sue and Mary Lou and a son Jim. Courtney Ann and Jim are graduates of the University.

# JERRY CLAIBORNE Head Football Coach

THE SPORTING NEWS has joined with University of Maryland fans in honoring Jerry Claiborne for his performance as the Head Coach of the Terrapins. Claiborne was named the "National Coach of the Year" by THE SPORTING NEWS in 1974 after leading the Terrapins to two consecutive Bowls and developing the Nation's "Outstanding Lineman" in Randy White.

When Claiborne arrived at College Park the Terrapins had recorded a 25-66 record during the previous nine years. In three years he has his program established and has a record of 21-11-1, has two bowl trips, has been named the Atlantic Coast Conference "Coach of the Year" (1973) and received attention as National Coach of the Year the past two years.

When Claiborne first met the press in Cole Field House he listed several goals. Foremost was a winning season and then the ACC Championship. National recognition with an ultimate Bowl trip was the other goal mentioned. In just three years all of the goals have been achieved along with the establishment of a winning attitude among both the players and fans.

In his first year the Terps achieved their first non-losing season in eight years with a 5-5-1 record and then followed that with an 8-3 season and trip to the Peach Bowl. A berth in the top 20 also resulted and only a missed field goal prevented the Terps' first outright ACC title. The ACC sportswriters recognized the significance of the feat by naming Claiborne the league's "Coach of the Year" the first Maryland Coach to receive the honor since the late Jim Tatum in 1955. He was ultimately named District II "Coach of the Year" by the American Football Coaches Association and was one of the top four in their National balloting. He was runner-up for National Coach of the Year honors in the United Press poll.

His 1973 team was the first winning team in College Park since 1962 and only the undefeated 10-0 team of 1955 surpassed the 1973 record during the 19 year period.

The 1974 team, despite a tougher schedule, matched the 8-3 record, visited the Liberty Bowl and moved up in the National rankings finishing the season in thirteenth place.

The 1974 team also captured the first outright ACC championship for the Terps as the 1953 National Champions and 1955 team shared the title with Duke. His ability to motivate and develop football players is not only proven by the won-lost record but is recognized by the news-media and professional scouts as well. A total of nine players on the 1974 team were accorded some sort of All-American recognition, 11 were drafted by the NFL, two more signed with the NFL as free agents, one



went to Canada as a free agent and two others joined the WFL.

In addition Randy White, a defensive lineman and ACC "Player of the Year" captured the Outland Trophy as the best interior lineman in the country, the Lombardi Trophy as the best overall lineman and UPI honors as lineman of the year. White is a perfect example of Claiborne's ability to develop youngsters, as the Terps premier lineman arrived at College Park as a 212 pound fullback who bench pressed 260 pounds and ran a 4.9 for the 40. He left Maryland as a 250 pounder, bench pressed 460 pounds and ran a 4.6 for the 40.

When Claiborne arrived he also greeted a future All-American in Paul Vellano who weighed 285 pounds. The next fall Vellano played at 240 pounds after reporting in at a trim 232 and as a senior played at 252 pounds and was named to the Coaches All-American team.

The ACC sportswriters have voted 12 Maryland players to the All-League team in Claiborne's three years and only I2 were named during the previous 12 years.

The Terps were last in the ACC in defense when Claiborne took over but have led the league in the all-important defensive statistics ever since. While winning their last I0 ACC games the Terps have outscored league opponents 326-58 and recorded five shutouts. In winning 13 of their last 14 league games the Terps have also averaged over 30 points a game while holding the opposition to eight.

The Terps established a Byrd Stadium record with the 54,412 in attendance at the 1974 opener and the



second largest crowd with the 49,647 at the N.C. State game. In each of the last two years Claiborne has lured more fans to Byrd Stadium than had ever visited there in the past and in 1974 averaged 37,995 for six games in the stadium that has 35,000 permanent seats. The capacity for all games in 1975 will be 47,000 with additional seats added when needed.

This past summer Claiborne conducted clinics in Europe, Ramstein, Germany and Alconbury, England, for the USAF, participated in the NCAA College Football Press Day in San Francisco, and participated in numerous clinics including appearances in Alabama, Kentucky, and Tennessee.

His 1974 Terps were ranked ninth in the nation in total offense averaging 407.6 yards a game, twelfth in passing and thirteenth in scoring while the defense was sixth holding opponents to 8.8 points a game, fourth in punting and thirteenth in rushing defense. His field goal kicker, Steve Mike-Mayer, led the nation in kick scoring, his punter Phil Waganheim was fifth in the nation with a 42.2 average.

Six of his 1974 players were selected to play in All-Star games with Louis Carter participating in three games and winning the Most Valuable Player honors in the Coaches All-American game in Lubbock, Texas. Randy White was also selected for three and starred in the East West Shrine game blocking a punt for a touchdown while Stan Rogers also had a fine game in Lubbock. Bob Avellini had a fine Senior Bowl game and Steve Mike-Mayer was selected for the Senior Bowl and Chicago All-Star game. Randy and Walter White, Carter and Mike-Mayer were all selected for the Chicago All-Star game. Walter White was forced to pass up the Lubbock game with a shoulder injury suffered in the Pittsburgh Steelers Rookie camp.

His players have captured the ACC's Brian Piccolo award the past two years with Al Neville winning the award in 1973 and Dave Visaggio in 1974. His Defensive Safety Bob Smith also became the first Terp to ever make the All-ACC first team three times.

Success and Jerry Claiborne are synonymous in Academics and Athletics, first as an outstanding student-athlete at the University of Kentucky, as the Head Football Coach at Virginia Polytechnical Institute and now at the University of Maryland.

He was named the "Outstanding Senior" on the University of Kentucky's 1949 team that went on to the Orange Bowl, while playing as a defensive back for Paul Bryant. He went on to become a superior assistant while serving with Coach Bryant at Kentucky, Texas A & M, and Alabama. He has also served with Frank Broyles at Missouri and Eddie Crowder at Colorado.

He was born in Hopkinsville, Kentucky, where he had outstanding athletic and academic careers in high school and continued the same at the State University. During his senior year at Kentucky, the defensive secondary, of which he was a member, established and still holds the NCAA record for pass interception returns.

In addition he was held in high esteem academically, elected into several honorary leadership-scholarship organizations including Lamp and Cross and Omicron Delta Kappa. He was also selected as the "Outstanding Senior" in the College of Education and graduated from Kentucky with High Distinction, accumulating a 2.7 out of a possible 3.0 grade point average. In 1968 he was elected to the University of Kentucky Hall of Fame.

Claiborne began his coaching career at Augusta Military Academy as Head Football Coach and Basketball Mentor. The first year his Basketball team won the State Prep Championship and the second year his Football team won the State title.

After two years at the Academy he returned to his Alma Mater as assistant coach with Paul Bryant. After two seasons Coach Bryant moved to Texas A&M and



with him went Coach Claiborne as defensive coordinator. In two short years Teaxas A&M was the Southwestern Conference Champions and Coach Claiborne's defense led the league.

He is no newcomer to building winning football programs. In 1963, his third year at Virginia Tech, he was named Southern Conference "Coach of the Year" after leading the Gobblers to an 8-2 record. In 1966 he led Virginia Tech to the Liberty Bowl and was named the District III "Coach of the Year". In 1968 he again returned to the Liberty Bowl with the Gobblers.


In 13 years as a head coach he has won 61 percent of his games, ranking twenty-third among the Winningest Active Major-College Coaches in the Nation. He has been honored with coaching duties in the Blue-Gray and Coaches All-American game and will join the East-West Shrine staff in 1975.

His program at Virginia Tech produced four All-Americans while in three years at Maryland he has produced Four First Team All-American selections and had a dozen honorable mention selections.

Coach Claiborne is an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and has served as a Deacon in the Baptist Church. While in Virginia he served as State Chairman of the Cancer Crusade and since moving to Maryland has served as Chairman of the Prince George's County Cancer Crusade. The Virginia campaign raised over \$1,000,000 for the first time in the history of the state with Claiborne as Chairman.

Mrs. Claiborne, the former Faye Hooks, of Hopkinsville, is also a University of Kentucky graduate. The Claibornes have two sons and two daughters: David 22, Jonathan 18, Katie 16 and Eileen 12. Coach Claiborne is 45. Jonathan is a defensive safety on the Maryland football team playing on the second unit this past spring.

# THE ASSISTANT COACHES

### John Devlin (West Chester '59) Linebackers

Coach Devlin works with the group that Coach Claiborne has often mentioned as the key to the success of the wide tackle six defense. The linebackers are especially important to this defensive alignment and in '74 Harry Walters led the team in tackles with 173. Walters was an All-ACC selection and HM All-American and is now playing in the Canadian League.

Devlin joined the Terps in 1973, replacing Bobby Ross who assumed the head coaching duties at The Citadel.

He is quite familiar with the Terrapins' defensive alignment, having served with Coach Claiborne at Virginia Tech from 1966 through 1970 in the same capacity.

He served as the defensive line coach at Florida State for two years before rejoining Coach Claiborne at Maryland

The native of Norristown, Pennsylvania began his football career at St. Matthews High in nearby Conshohocken and went on to West Chester State College.

While at West Chester he achieved all-conference honors as a tackle and was also the weight man on the track team. His 1958 team at West Chester was called the best ever coached by Glenn Killinger, the Rams' coach for 25 years.

Devlin began his coaching career at Waynesboro high and then coached the Fourth Army team while serving in Germany. He joined Paul Dietzel at West Point for three years before moving to Virginia Tech with Coach Claiborne.

He was born in Norristown on April 12, 1937. While in Germany he married the former Irma Kleemann of Regensburg, Germany. They have four children, John III 13, Elizabeth 12, William 9 and Michael 6.

### Jerry Eisaman (Kentucky '60) Quarterbacks

Coach Eisaman's Quarterbacks have directed the Maryland offense in record setting fashion the past two years as only the 1951 Sugar Bowl team ever scored more points. The Terps scored over 300 points in each season, and the '74 offense ranked ninth in the nation overall and twelfth in passing. Bob Avellini, now with the Chicago Bears, was the second most prolific passer in Maryland history and only injuries prevented him from surpassing all of Dick Shiner's records.

Eisaman has perhaps his best quarterback combination yet in Mark Manges and Larry Dick. Manges excelled as a freshman backing up Avellini and Dick was redshirted last fall and had a super spring practice.

The offense averaged 407.6 yards a game last fall and the quarterbacks personally accounted for 11 touchdowns.

While at Kentucky Eisaman was recognized as the All-SEC Sophomore quarterback and was elected Co-Captain his senior year. He also played in the Blue-Gray game.

Academically, he received the Sam Huey Award for the highest scholastic standing among the members of the football team for four years, and was a member of the Scabbard and Blade Honorary Society. While an officer in the Army he coached the First Cavalry Division to the Far East Championship and also coached the Fort Knox Tankers. From there he spent three years at Seneca high in Louisville, Kentucky before joining Coach Claiborne at Virginia Tech in 1966 where he coached the offensive backs for three years.

He served as the offensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati for three years before rejoining Claiborne at Maryland.

Coach Eisaman is a 38 year old bachelor.

### George Foussekis (Virginia Tech '68) Defensive Guards

Coach Foussekis achieved All-American recognition for three years while playing for Coach Claiborne at Virginia Tech and has developed an All-American at Maryland in Paul Vellano, a first team selection by the American Football Coaches Association in 1973.

Foussekis coaches with the same fervor that made him an All-American on the playing field and is just as successful. He has been especially effective recruiting in his native state of Virginia. His recruits include Walter White the tight end from Charlottesville now with the Pittsburgh Steelers and Ralph Fisher of Radford now replacing Randy White at defensive tackle.

Dave Visaggio, one of Foussekis' guards won the ACC's Brian Piccolo Award in '74 and Ernie Salley won his first varsity letter as a freshman in '74.

His guards contributed 14 quarterback sacks last year and 37 plays in which the opposition was held to no gain or minus yards.

Foussekis was a member of the Gobblers' 1966 Liberty Bowl team and signed with the Denver Broncos in 1968. He returned to Virginia Tech with Coach Claiborne in 1969 and worked with the defensive line there for two years.

In 1971 he served as the defensive coordinator at William & Mary and rejoined Coach Claiborne when he assumed the head coaching duties at Maryland.

Foussekis is a graduate of Lane High in Charlottesville, Virginia where he captained the football, basketball and baseball teams. He was named the Most Valuable Player in all three sports. His 1963 football team at Lane High won the state championship and he was named first team All-State.

The 29 year old bachelor was born on April 28, 1946.

### Thomas Groom (Virginia Tech '67) Offensive Setbacks

Coach Groom's setbacks gained 2,025 yards rushing in '74 and scored 22 touchdowns running with the football. Terp opponents scored only 13 touchdowns as a team with two of those coming on defense, and rushed for only 1,471 yards.

In Louis Carter he developed the Terps' All-Time ground gainer and touchdown producer. Carter was a second team All-American selection by the Football News and the Most Valuable Player in the Coaches All-American Game in Lubbock, Texas. Carter has joined the Oakland Raiders and Fullback Alan Bloomingdale moved on to the New England Patriots.

Groom played his collegiate football for Jerry Claiborne at Virginia Tech where he was a three year letterman and as fullback captained the 1966 Liberty Bowl team. He also captained the undefeated 1963 State Championship team at Charleston Catholic in Charleston, West Virgina.

Following graduation from Tech he remained as a graduate assistant until entering the Army as a Commissioned 2nd Lt. He served as an assistant coach at the USMA Prep School, Fort Belvoir, Virginia in 1968 and in 1969 transferred to West Point as an assistant coach under Tom Cahill.

In 1971 he served as a graduate assistant under Head Coach Eddie Crowder at Colorado. He moved with Coach Claiborne to Maryland.

Coach Groom is married to the former Sharon Dalton and they have two children, Thomas 9 and Gina 6.

### John "Jake" Hallum (Newberry '61) Offensive Line

Coach Hallum has only one starter from the offensive line that enabled the Terps to score over 300 points in each of the past two seasons. He helped develop one of the best offensive linemen to play for the Terps in Tackle Stan Rogers now with the Denver Broncos. Rogers had an outstanding game in the Coaches All-American game in Lubbock and was Maryland's first Offensive Lineman to achieve All-ACC honors since Ralph Sonntag in 1969.

John Nash is the only starter back in the line but with Coach Hallum working them on the weights the Terps have the strength and ability to carry them as they gain the needed experience. Tom Schick, John Zernhelt, Marion Koprowski and Dave Conrad are all tackle candidates with Ed Fulton and Mike Yeates joining Nash at guard. With Eugene Ochap and Jack Sharkey at center Hallum has nine top candidates, averaging 234 pounds and standing 6-foot-1 on the average. Koprowski is the smallest at 5-11 and 219 pounds with Dave Conrad 6-4 and 250 pounds the largest.

Hallum played four years of collegiate football at Newberry, receiving his B.S. degree in 1960. He received his Master's from Murray State in 1965.

He began his coaching career at Pickins High in South Carolina as assistant coach in football and basketball and head baseball coach. In 1962 he moved to Hopkinsville High in Kentucky again as an assistant in football and basketball and head basketball coach.

He then moved to Paul G. Blazer high in 1966 as head football and track coach, recording a three year record of 20-6-0 in football. His 1966 football team captured the District Championship and in 1967 won the State Championship. His track team placed third in the state in 1967.

Coach Hallum was named the "Outstanding Young Man" for the Ashland and Boyd County area in 1967, the Lexington-Herald "Coach of the Year" in 1967 and the Kentucky High School Athletic Association "Coach of the Year".

In February of 1968 he moved to Morehead State University as assistant football coach and in April was named the head football coach and assistant professor. He served

in his capacity until moving to Maryland to join Coach Claiborne. He left Morehead with a winning program and a 7-3 record in 1971.

He was born in Liberty, South Carolina on November 2, 1938. His wife Mable is a native of Greenwood, South Carolina. They have two sons, Tod Jacob 11 and Bart Jeffrey 8.

### Joseph Krivak (Syracuse '57) Receivers

Coach Krivak joined the Maryland staff in 1974 and coached two of the top receivers in the ACC in Walter White, tight end now with the Pittsburgh Steelers, and Frank Russell, wide receiver who moved on to the Baltimore Colts. The two caught 58 passes between them for 844 yards and Russell ranks as Maryland's All-Time pass receiver both in receptions and yards gained.

Coach Krivak had the same duties at Syracuse for five years with Ben Schwartzwalder and he was a member of Syracuse's 1956 Cotton Bowl team and lettered in 1954-55-56 as a guard-center-linebacker. He also lettered in baseball for the Orangemen.

He received his Master's from Syracuse in 1962.

Krivak served as the Head Football Coach at Madonna High in Weirton, West Virginia for eight years, winning a State Catholic Championship and two Ohio Valley Conference Championships. His teams recorded a 48-25-3 record.

Coach Claiborne recruited several of Coach Krivak's high school players for Virginia Tech and was "very happy" to have him join the Terp staff when Joe Gardi moved to the staff of the Philadelphia team in the WFL.

Coach Krivak married the former Jean Irvin of Weirton and they have three sons, Edward 12, John 10 and Jeff 7.

# Gothard Lane (Randolph Macon '71) Defensive Ends and Scout

Coach Lane is one of the Assistant Coaches who only sees his men play on film. On game days he is out of town scouting next week's opponent and is very proficient at the job. During the week he has the coaching of the defensive ends as his duties and has one of the toughest men on the squad in LeRoy Hughes. His defensive ends recorded nine quarterback sacks in '74 and accounted for 23 tackles in opponents' backfields, six others for no gain. They also contributed a total of 122 yards in losses by opponents and recovered three fumbles.

He has coached at Bishop Eustace Prep in New Jersey, Randolph Macon College, Virginia Tech and Tulane before joining the Terps in 1973.

Coach Lane is a native of Camden, New Jersey and product of Pennsauken high, a school that has produced several outstanding football players for the Terps.

He played on the undefeated (9-0) Randolph Macon football team in 1968. He is a 28 year old bachelor.

### Thomas R. Park (West Chester '69) Recruiting

Coach Park, serving as Coordinator of the Recruiting program, saw the Terps complete their second consecutive outstanding recruiting year this past spring.

In keeping with Coach Claiborne's desire to keep the best football palyers in the state at home playing for the state university the Terps landed eight top prospects and all eight played in the Maryland State All-Star game.

In addition four of the top players in Virginia have joined the Terps for '75.

Coach Claiborne is impressed with Park's "great organizational ability" and also cited him as a dedicated, hard working and loyal individual, all the qualities that it takes for his position.

Park worked with the Maryland junior varsity in 1972 and the West Chester State team during the 1973 spring practice. He is a Captain in the Marine Corps Reserve, coached two years as the defensive coordinator of Marine teams and in 1971 was the offensive coordinator of the Quantico team.

Park, known since his school days as "Thom" and spelling it that way, was a defensive guard on West Chester's 1967 Tangerine Bowl team and Lambert Cup winners with a 10-1 record. He also wrestled for West Chester where he received his BA as a Psychology Major in 1969. He has worked towards his Master's Degree at West Chester.

The 29 year old bachelor was born in Columbus, Ohio on March 3, 1946, graduated from Hershey High while making his home in Hummeltown, Pennsylvania and has served six years in the Marine Corps Reserve with duty in the Far East.

### Dick Redding (Springfield '40) Junior Varsity

Coach Redding, in addition to his duties with the Junior Varsity coordinates the scouting program that has been so effective. He also works with the place kickers.

Each year several of the players that begin fall practice with Coach Redding move up to the varsity and this includes the freshmen. Six of his freshmen were on the '74 Liberty Bowl team including two who earned their letters and seven played on the '73 Peach Bowl team.

Prior to joining Coach Claiborne at Maryland he had coached at Virginia Tech for 18 years, two years with the varsity line and 16 years as Freshman coach.

Redding began his coaching career at Vermont College where he served as Athletic Director, football, basketball, baseball and track coach. He entered the Navy in 1941 as an aviator and in 1947 resumed his coaching career at Davidson College as assistant football and head swimming coach.

He has served as a member of the National Rules Committee in both track and swimming and is a member of Sigma Delta Psi Honorary Athletic Fraternity along with the National Football Coaches Association.

Coach Redding captained the football, basketball and track teams at Springfield College. He played in the 1940 NCAA basketball tournament as Springfield won the New England Championship.

Coach Romaine had an honor in '74 that few coaches ever achieve. He coached the winner of the Outland Trophy as the nation's top interior lineman, the Lombardi Trophy as the nation's top lineman and winner of the UPI "Lineman of the Year" honors, in Randy White. In White he was also coaching a Unanimous All-American choice and the ACC Player of the Year. White is now a linebacker with the Dallas Cowboys.

Coach Romaine was a defensive line coach at Kansas State for three years before joining Coach Claiborne's staff.

Co-Captain of the 1965 undefeated and third ranked NAIA team at East Stroudsburg, he began his coaching career at Mansfield State in 1967. He served two years as assistant football coach and assistant Dean of Men at Mansfield.

He then moved to Kansas State in 1969 as a graduate assistant working with the freshman team. He received his Masters in Physical Education from Kansas State in 1970 and served as varsity line coach for three years.

The 31-year old was born in Franklin, New Jersey on May 16, 1944 and attended high school in Port Jarvis, New York, where he earned 10 varsity letters before concentrating on football in college.

He is a member of the Masonic Lodge and Phi Sigma Kappa Social Fraternity.

Romaine married the former Marcia Seymour, a cheer-leader at East Stroudsburg and native of Mansfield, Pennsylvania. She taught school in Mansfield and also in Kansas.

### Terry Strock (Virginia Tech '62) Defensive Secondary

Coach Strock probably dreaded the Cole Field House Commencement program more than anyone else this past spring. All he lost that day was Bob Smith, the first Terp to ever make the All-ACC team three consecutive years; Ken Schroy, a Philadelphia Eagles draft choice, and Pat Ulam, now with the WFL. Smith, now with the Colts, Schroy and Ulam had played together in the secondary for four years and only Jim Brechbiel was ever able to break the trio up as starters.

Strock does have a starter back in Brechbiel and three other lettermen in Pete Zachary, Mike Cielensky and Joe Younge.

Strock was Co-Captain of Coach Claiborne's first team at Virginia Tech, where he received his B.S. degree in Business Administration in 1962. He also played baseball for the Gobblers.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at Colonial Heights High in Virginia and a year later was named Head Coach at Culpeper, Virginia High.

In 1966 he returned to Virginia Tech where he coached the offensive receivers for two years and the defensive backs for three years under Coach Claiborne.

He is a native of Hagerstown, Maryland and a 1957 graduate of South Hagerstown High. He was born in Hagerstown on March 12, 1939.

Coach Strock married the former Cynthia Fralin and they have two daughters Cheryl Lee 7 and Christi Lynn 5.

# STRENGTH AND QUICKNESS

Jerry Claiborne rates strength and quickness high on his list of tangibles contributing to a winning football team. He was appalled at the lack of both attributes when he assumed the duties as the Maryland Coach in December of 1971.

In his initial testing of the Terrapins only seven were able to bench press over 250 pounds and only 14 ran the 40 yards in 4.9 or less. Claiborne immediately established a weight training program that has had phenomenal success, with his ability to motivate others a major contributor to the results.

The weight training program received a big boost with the addition of the new football facilities that include one of the finest weight rooms in any collegiate facility.

All-American Defensive Tackle Randy White has proven just what dedication and adherence to the program can accomplish. He enrolled at Maryland as a 212 pounder who ran a 4.9 forty and could bench press 260 pounds. He left Maryland a 248 pounder who could bench press 460 pounds and run a 4.6 for the forty.

Demonstrating that the program is just as beneficial to the backs, Louis Carter, a 190 pounder, bench pressed 230 pounds and ran the forty in 4.8. He left Maryland as a 201 pounder who bench pressed 330 pounds and ran a 4.5 forty.

Current Defensive Backs Jim Brechbiel, Mike Cielensky and Pete Zachary all bench press over 300 pounds.

Sophomore Guard Mike Yeates tops the linemen in the bench press at 415 pounds while Tackle John Zernhelt and Linebacker Kevin Benson also top 400 pounds.

There are now 78 Terrapins bench pressing over 250 pounds with 44 topping 300 pounds.

## 1974 IN REVIEW

Coach Jerry Claiborne referred to his 1974 Maryland team as an unemotional squad that disturbed him at times but worked hard and performed well.

Emotion was evident however throughout the season. It first surfaced when 54,412 fans gave the teams a standing ovation following the 21-16 loss to Alabama.



The first real emotion shown by the team surfaced following the workmanship 20-10 win over defending conference champion North Carolina State and again following the loss to Penn State.

Then on November 16 the Terrapins became an emotional team for a full afternoon. Facing the challenge of the second ranked defensive team in the ACC the Terps scored, in the first three quarters, more points than any Maryland team in the last 20 years. The 56-13 win over Duke gave Maryland its first outright ACC title and the suddenly emotional team carried Coach Claiborne to the Oyster Bowl awards platform.



The following Saturday the team returned to its unemotional workmanship manner and recorded a 10-0 shutout of Virginia thus holding its fifth opponent of the season scoreless.

Twenty-five seniors closed out their career in the Liberty Bowl game and they left College Park as the most successful class since the 1956 class departed. Under the tutelage of Coach Claiborne they had not known a losing season although Maryland had suffered through nine consecutive non-winning seasons prior to his arrival in College Park.

Nationally ranked in scoring defense, scoring offense, total offense and pass offense they also finished the season ranked thirteenth in the polls, the highest ranking for a Maryland team since the undefeated 1955 team was ranked third.

Six of the Terrapins were voted the best at their position by the ACC sportswriters, nine received some sort of All-American mention and Randy White captured every national award for a lineman as well as Player of the Year honors in the league.

Steve Mike-Mayer led the nation in kick scoring and Phil Waganheim ranked fifth in punting.

Louis Carter and Randy White were accorded All-ACC honors for the second time while Bob Smith was the first Terp to make the team three times.

Quarterback Bob Avellini led the ACC in both passing and total offense while Smith and Ken Schroy were the top punt returners in the league.

When the Terps received their invitation to the Liberty Bowl from Herbie Hunt they accepted it as an honor they had worked hard for and then proceeded to demolish their final three opponents 107 to 13 thus justifying the early bid and finishing with a strong 8-3 record.



Alabama 21 Maryland 16 — Calvin Culliver scored twice in first half but Steve Mike-Mayer pulled Terps to 14-9 with three field goals. Louis Carter added a fourth quarter score as Maryland held Alabama scoreless for the final 24 minutes of the game but could not offset the Richard Todd score set up by a fumble.

Flodida 17 Maryland 10 — Terps led 10-7 at half but Florida added 10 third quarter points on a 49 yard field goal and a touchdown on a 28 yard drive following an interception. Bob Avellini came in and took the Terps to the Florida 10 but the drive stalled with a fumble and Avellini's final bid ended with a 49 yard drive to the 28 as time ran out. Frank Russell caught eight passes for the Terps and Louis Carter picked up 80 yards rushing in the losing cause.



Maryland 24 North Carolina 12 — Louis Carter ran for 158 yards and scored twice on a 76 yard run and 22 yard pass from Bob Avellini as Terps led 24-0 before Coach Claiborne cleared the bench. The game was played in a driving rain before a regional TV audience.

## 1974 IN REVIEW

Maryland 31 Syracuse 0 — Bob Avellini hit 17 of 22 passes for 210 yards and John Schultz scored twice as Terps used 24 second half points to rout Syracuse 31-0. Freshman Quarterback Mark Manges scored his first collegiate touchdown on a 17 yard run.



Maryland 41 Clemson 0 — Bob Avellini completed 14 of 22 passes for 213 yards and John Schultz added two more touchdowns as Terps led 20-0 at half. Steve Mike-Mayer contributed 11 points, Ken Schroy returned three punts for 84 yards and Phil Waganheim punted for a 46 yard average as the Terps excelled in the kicking game. Ken Roy added two fourth quarter touchdowns after replacing Schultz.



Maryland 47 Wake Forest 0 — Louis Carter returns opening kickoff 62 yards to Deacon's 27 and Bob Avellini hits John Schultz with td pass on first play. Schultz was scoring in his fifth straight game and his seventh touchdown. Jim Brechbiel returned interception 17 yards for second score and Avellini's second td pass gave Terps a 19-0 half-time lead. Maryland wrapped it up with 21 third quarter points, and recorded its third consecutive shutout.

Maryland 20 North Carolina State 10 — The Terps held the defending ACC Champions to 288 yards total offense and one touchdown on a one yard pass. Louis Carter ran for 180 yards, Quarterback Bob Avellini scored on a 30 yard run and Bob Smith intercepted a pair of passes. Steve Mike-Mayer put Terps ahead with a 44 yard field goal. Terps rolled up 441 yards total offense.

Penn State 24 Maryland 17 — Terp defense gave up only one touchdown as Penn State used a 79 yard pass interception and a 21 yard run with an intercepted lateral on the kickoff for a pair of touchdowns. Bob Avellini hit Walter White on a 34 yard pass for first Maryland score and following Penn State's third touchdown again hit White on first play for 66 yards and a score. With three touchdowns in 25 seconds neither team crossed

the goal line again following White's second quarter score. Terps had final bid fall short at Penn State 12. Avellini passed for 302 yards completing 18 passes with five to White for 144 yards.

Maryland 41 Villanova 0 — Louis Carter suffered a rib injury on opening kickoff and did not carry the ball in the game. Rick Jennings replaced him and gained 150 yards on 20 carries. Joe Brancato, Tim Wilson and Freshman Tony Black all scored their first collegiate touchdowns. Wilson also added a 45 yard scoring run to his initial three yard td. Terps gained 511 yards total offense with 328 rushing. Randy White and Jim Brechbiel each blocked a punt for a safety.



Maryland 56 Duke 13 — The top two defensive teams in the league met with identical records and a defensive battle expected. Avellini completed 10 of 11 passes for 191 yards and left game with 50 seconds gone in third quarter and 42-7 lead. Jennings again replacing Carter ran for 105 yards with Terps gaining 537 yards in game. Maryland scored on first three possessions of each half and eight of first 10 in game for 56-7 third quarter lead in the Norfolk, Virginia Oyster Bowl.



Maryland 10 Virginia 0 — Terps came up flat in final game but defense held up and Louis Carter returned to lineup. Carter scored only td of game on a 44 yard run and set up Steve Mike-Mayer's field goal with a 45 yard run on third and 41 from the Maryland 17 and 30 seconds remaining in first half. Carter ran for 213 yards on 29 carries and Walter White caught five passes playing in his hometown for the first time.

## EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MARYLAND EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION



When Jim Kehoe assumed the duties as Director of Athletics at the University of Maryland he realized that financial stability was absolutely necessary to achieve the goals he set for Maryland athletics.

Kehoe has achieved many of those goals and financial stability is one of them. The University athletic department was one of only 10 percent in the nation that has operated without a deficit the past two years and Tom Fields had a big hand in achieving that goal.

When Kehoe lured Col. Fields into retirement from the Marine Corps, contributions to the Maryland Educational Foundation were minimal. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1970 the contributions totaled approximately \$30,000.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1975, contributions totaled \$531,000 up from the \$386,000 the previous year.

During the past year the Terrapin Club renewed 96 percent of their contributors and the membership now stands at 1,400, quite a jump from the 132 original members.

Of the 1,400 members, nine are life members (\$10,000 contribution), 164 are Diamondback members (\$1,000 annual contribution and 510 are Gold members (\$500 annual contribution).

The contributions have not only enabled the University's self-sustaining program to remain just above the break even point but enabled the Terrapins to regain their stature as the overall champions of the Atlantic Coast Conference with National prestige in just about every sport.

Fields, a former Maryland All-American distance runner and teammate of Kehoe's, took over his duties at Maryland in 1970 and his success has followed the pattern of his life.

During World War II he served in combat in Guadalcanal, Vella Lavella, Bougainville and Iwo Jima. He also served in Korea and Vietnam and at the time of his retirement from the Corps, he was the Deputy Director of Information—Headquarters Marine Corps.

Colonel Fields and his wife, the former Patricia T. Hansel, have four children. They are Thomas M., Jr. 20, Karen 19, Lori 17 and David 15.

#### ALFRED J. HANLON

#### ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Alfred J. Hanlon is concerned primarily with scheduling, team travel, personnel policies and general office administration. He has been with the Athletic Department since 1969, when he retired from the U.S. Air Force with the rank of colonel after directing the Maryland AFROTC program for two years.

A rated command pilot, Hanlon commanded a heavy bomber squadron in England and North Africa during World War II. He has served in a wide variety of command and staff positions since that time. His military decorations include the Legion of Merit, the Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Air Force Commendation Medal and the Presidential Unit Citation Badge.

Hanlon is a native of Boston and a 1939 graduate of Harvard University, where he was a varsity letterman in track. He is married to the former Barbara Foster of Boston, and they have three grown children, Christopher, Brenda and Mark.

#### DR. JOHN E. FABER

#### CHAIRMAN, THE ATHLETIC COUNCIL

First appointed to the athletic council in 1951, Dr. Faber is the University's representative to the Atlantic Coast Conference. He recently completed his second term as President of the ACC having also served in 1969-70.

For 36 years Dr. Faber served as lacrosse coach at the University. During that time the accomplishments of his teams secured a place for him as one of the greatest names



in Maryland athletic history. He won 276 games sugering only 75 losses with two ties. Five times his Terps were undisputed national champions and two other times they shared that honor with another school.

A professor in the microbiology department, the University is fortunate to have such a man as its Faculty Chairman of Athletics.

#### MARYLAND BASKETBALL 1975-76

In six years with Charles G. "Lefty" Driesell Maryland Basketball has developed a winning tradition and it should continue in 1975-76 and for many years to come.

The Terps have returning, in addition to the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year, a consensus All-American John Lucas, one of the best freshmen in the nation last year in Brad Davis and another superior guard Maurice "Mo." Howard. Davis and Howard were honorable mentions on the All-American lists.

Steve Sheppard, an outstanding forward, returns also giving the Terps four starters back, scoring in double figures, as Sheppard and Howard shared starting roles last year. Tom Roy, at center, and Owen Brown, a forward, are double figure scorers and the two leading rebounders departing as six Terrapins scored 11 or more points a game enroute to the NCAA Midwest finals and a fifth place national ranking in both wire service polls.

John Newsome and Chris Patton gained experience as freshmen, participating in tough tournaments as well as regular season games. Tournaments included Maryland Invitational, Atlantic Coast Conference and NCAA. Patton has fully recovered from a knee operation and should excel as a sophomore.

Three outstanding Maryland High School products and a super athlete from nearby Washington, D.C. will join the Terps in the fall. Larry Gibson, a 6-10 center and 6-4 forward Tyrone McKay from Dunbar in Baltimore and Guard Brian Magid of Silver Spring, Maryland have joined the Terps along with Eastern High's James Tillman from the District of Columbia.

Larry Boston was one of the most sought after athletes a year ago upon graduating from John F. Kennedy High in Cleveland, Ohio. He joins the Terps after a year at Vincennes Junior College and will have three years of eligibility at Maryland.

Eric Shrader, a straight A student from Great Valley high in Malvern, Pennsylvania elected to continue his Pre-Med studies at Maryland and was an outstanding guard in high.

During the last four years the Terps have won 97 games while losing only 22 and none of the current Terrapins have played on a team that failed to win at least 23 games, or was ranked lower than 8th in the nation. The last three years rankings are 8th-4th-5th with Lucas and Howard playing on all three.

#### DR. WILSON H. ELKINS

## PRESIDENT UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND

This year Dr. Elkins completed his twenty-first year at the University as its twenty-first president. He is chief executive officer of the Board of Regents and head of the growing five-campus system which includes University College and its world-wide program of education.

During his period in office, President Elkins has seen the University grow from an annual enrollment of 8,500 students to more than 70,000. The total operating budget which was \$23 million in 1954 is more than \$225 million this year.

In addition to degrees from the University of Texas, Dr. Elkins earned his B.Litt and Ph.D. degrees at Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar.

Long a sports enthusiast and an avid golfer, Maryland's President was elected to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in 1963 and was the recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the University of Texas in 1972. While an undergraduate there he earned eight varsity letters in football, basketball, and track.

Dr. Elkins began his professional career as a history instructor before serving as President of San Angelo Junior College and Texas Western College (the University of Texas at El Paso).

He is a member of the Southern Regional Education Board and past president of the National Association of



State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the Southern University Conference.

#### DR. ROBERT L. GLUCKSTERN

## CHANCELLOR COLLEGE PARK CAMPUS

Robert L. Gluckstern is a distinguished physicist and administrator. On July 1, 1975, he became the College Park Campus' second chancellor.

Educated at MIT and the City College of New York, he spent fourteen years on the Yale University physics faculty. In 1964, he moved from Yale to the University of Massachusetts at Amherst as professor and head of the physics and astronomy department. Under his leadership, the department grew from 14 to 52 faculty members and 25 to 100 graduate students, and increased federal support from \$30,000 to \$950,000 a year.

He became associate provost of the University of Massachusetts in 1969, vice chancellor for academic affairs and provost in 1970.

Dr. Gluckstern participated in the design of a number of high energy particle accelerators at Brookhaven, Los Alamos, Lawrence Radiation and National Accelerator Laboratories and advised on the theoretical problems involved in the construction of these highly sophisticated giant machines. (High energy particle accelerators are used by physicists to discover the constituent particles of the nucleus of the atom and to understand the nature and role of these particles.)

The new chancellor has remained active in teaching and will teach a general physics course to undergraduate students this fall.



Dr. Gluckstern, who is 51, was born in Atlantic City, New Jersey. He is married to the former Norma Block. The Gluckstern's have three children.
