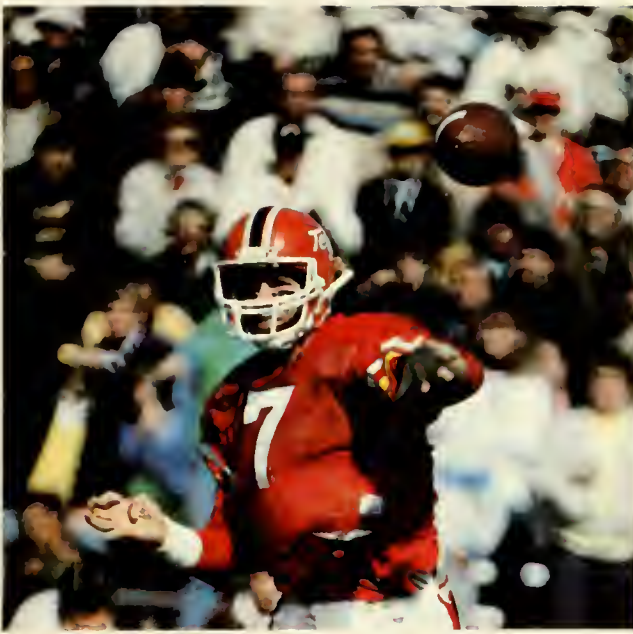

Esiason was one of 12 finalists for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award and was honored by the Washington Touchdown Club as the Arca College Player of the Year.

He has completed 54 percent of his 556 passes for the Terps. The career percentage is the only mark he does not hold for the Terps as Bob Avellini hit on 231 of 394 for a career mark of .586 in 1972-74.

In 11 games last fall Esiason hit on 176 of 314 passes for 2,302 yards and 18 touchdowns. He had only 10 interceptions, a passing percentage of .561 and averaged 209.3 yards per game passing. He then hit on 19 of 32 passes for 251 yards and a pair of touchdowns with only one interception against Washington in the Aloha Bowl, statistics that do not count in his season or career marks.

His longest passes of the season were 50 and 60 yards to Russell Davis for touchdowns against Penn State. He also hit on three of four conversion passes that are not included in the statistics.

As a sophomore he hit Russell Davis on scoring passes of 69 yards against Syracuse and 60 yards against Tulane.

His top single games were 279 yards on 24 of 39 passes against defending National Champion Clemson and 276 on 18 of 36 against National Champion Penn State. He also threw for 253 yards and three touchdowns on 19 of 33 against Duke.

Esiason also holds for the placements, has scored a pair of touchdowns rushing and caught a pass for 13 yards.

QUARTERBACK BOOMER ESIASON (E-SIGH-ah-SUN) 6-4, 200, senior, is the most prolific passer in Maryland football history. Despite playing in only 21 regular season games he holds the Terrapin career records for YARDS GAINED PASSING, TOUCHDOWN PASSES THROWN, PASSES ATTEMPTED AND COMPLETED and the TOTAL OFFENSE MARK.

He has started every game he has played in for the Terps and thrown one or more touchdown passes in 17 of the 22 games. He holds two single game passing marks and four season marks along with a pair of season total offense records.

While setting the records he has led the Terps to wins in nine of the 12 ACC games. In his first game utilizing the offensive system installed by Coach Bobby Ross he threw for 276 yards and a pair of touchdowns against National Champion Penn State. The Terps lost the game 39-31 but the Blonde Lefthander and the new offense had captivated Terrapin fans. The Terps wound up leading the ACC in scoring with 32.1 points a game and Esiason runner-up for league Player of the Year honors.

Robert J. "Bobby" Ross

Head Football Coach

Bobby Ross assumed the duties as Head Coach at the University of Maryland on January 14, 1982 and less than a year later had his team in the initial Aloha Bowl in Honolulu, Hawaii.

He immediately established a rapport with the members of the football squad establishing himself as a disciplinarian but one who treats every player as an individual. He impressed upon them the importance of their classroom work and captivated them with his football philosophy.

He immediately captivated the Terrapin fans as well, despite making his first appearance in Byrd Stadium with an 0-2 record. However, the Terps scored 31 points against National Champion Penn State in the opener and lost a one point decision at West Virginia when Ross declined a tie and went for a two point conversion and the win.

He won his Byrd Stadium opener against North Carolina State 23-6 and then won seven in a row before suffering his only ACC loss of the season to Clemson 24-22.

Ross also made an impression on the high school coaching ranks as 288 coaches attended the annual Maryland Coaching Clinic this past spring.

He has been accessible to the media and fans alike. The Washington Touchdown Club named him the 1982 College Coach of the Year while the Media voted him ACC Coach of the Year honors. The Coaches voted him District III Coach of the Year honors. He has been selected to participate in the ABC/NCAA football tour of 1983 appearing before the Football Writers at Kings Island.

He has covered Maryland and the neighboring states from border to border on speaking engagements and participated in numerous clinics.

His 1982 Terrapins upset North Carolina 31-24 in Chapel Hill before a sellout crowd and a Regional CBS

television audience that covered over 30 percent of the nation. The Terps then returned to CBS to meet Clemson in Byrd Stadium and dropped an exciting 24-22 decision to the defending National Champions before 51,750 in the stadium that has 35,000 permanent seats.

Ross impressed Director of Athletics Dick Dull with his outlook on Intercollegiate Athletics, his organizational ability, his views on recruiting, classroom work and all phases of his coaching ability.

He has had a hand in just about every phase of coaching. He served as a head coach in high school, head coach on the collegiate level and as an assistant in the NFL. As an assistant he has worked with the freshmen, the defensive secondary, the offensive backfield, and the linebackers. He has served as defensive coordinator and headed the recruiting programs at several schools. On the professional level he has worked with the special teams, the defense and the offensive backfield.

As a head coach his 1974 Citadel team led the Southern Conference in total defense and his 1975 team ranked fifth in the nation in scoring defense, allowing opponents only 8.8 points a game. He coached The Citadel's all-time passer, all-time ground gainer and all-time placekicker. He also coached the school's first Associated Press All-American. His Citadel teams led the Southern Conference in home attendance in his last three years there and in 1975 and '76 broke the all-time attendance records for the school.

His first Maryland team led the ACC in scoring and rushing defense. The Terps also ranked third in the nation in rushing defense giving up only 87.2 yards a game and eighth in scoring with 32.1 points a game. The Terps averaged 39,325 per game in Byrd Stadium, an increase of 8,225 per game over 1981, and the highest average attendance since 1978. It was the highest scoring team in the ACC since 1972 and only two league scoring champions ever scored more in the 30 years of the ACC.

His first chore as the Maryland Coach was assembling a coaching staff. One that would bring new ideas and innovations to the game, experienced coaches and men who could convey their ideas to the young men. Eight of the nine assistant coaches have advanced degrees. The staff has worked with such well known coaches as Jerry Claiborne, John McKenna, Marv Levy, Bill Peterson, Ara Parseghian, Lou Holtz, Bo Rein, Bob Blackman, Ben Schwartzwalder, George Welsh, Bob Thalman and Vince Gibson among others.

Coach Ross is a strong believer in conditioning and a weight program. He has Frank Costello working with the football team on a strength, conditioning and flexibility program.

Ross was instrumental in having the Maryland Public Secondary Schools Championship games played in Byrd Stadium in 1982. The four Championship games will again be played at Maryland this Thanksgiving weekend.



HIGHLIGHTS OF HIS FIRST SEASON AT MARYLAND

FIRST VICTORY: Terps defeated North Carolina State in Byrd Stadium 23-6 for his first Maryland win, first game in Byrd Stadium and first ACC game. He became the first Terrapin coach to win his initial league game since Lou Saban in 1966. Last three Maryland coaches had failed to win over the Wolfpack in their league debut.

STREAK: Seven consecutive wins equaled the longest winning streak since the 1978 team won first eight games of season extending streak to 12.

AWARDS: Eastman Kodak District III Coach of the Year as selected by the American Football Coaches Association. ACC Coach of the Year as selected by the ACSWA, & AP. National College Coach of the Year by the Washington Touchdown Club. Johnny Unitas Award by the Quarterback Club of Baltimore. Also honored by the Touchdown Club of Annapolis and others. UPI Coach of the Week for victory over North Carolina.

POST-SEASON: Team selected to play in the Inaugural Aloha Bowl against Washington of the PAC 10. John Tice selected to play in the East West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl, Dave Pacella in the Hula Bowl and Mark Duda in the East West Shrine game.

ATTENDANCE: Drew 235,950 to Byrd Stadium and 508,179 for 12 games played. Increase of 8,225 per game and highest average home attendance since 1978. Only three Maryland teams have averaged more. Total attendance of 508,179 ranks as second highest ever for Terps, topped only by the 1975 team, and only the second Maryland team to draw over a half million in one season. The 84,597 at Penn State was the largest crowd to ever see the Terps play.

NATIONAL RANKING: Team ranked 20th in final Associated Press and United Press International polls although not ranked in any pre-season polls. USA Today ranked the Terps 18th.

RECORDS: First Maryland Coach to win eight games in his initial season. First to have a winning season in his first year at Maryland since Jim Tatum won seven

of 11 games in 1947. Terps made 41 changes in the Maryland record book and 34 were established by the offense.

BOBBY ROSS PROFILE

EDUCATION: Graduated from Benedictine High School (Richmond, Virginia) in 1955. Received BA degree in English and History from Virginia Military Institute (Lexington, Virginia) in 1959.

PLAYING EXPERIENCE: Three sport letterman at VMI (football, basketball and baseball). Quarterback and defensive back at VMI where he captained the football team.

MILITARY EXPERIENCE: First Lieutenant, U.S. Army 1960-62 (Active Duty).

COACHING EXPERIENCE: One year as head football coach at Benedictine High School (1959). One year as assistant coach and head baseball coach at Colonial Heights, Va. High (1962). Two years as head football coach at Colonial Heights (1963-64). Freshman football coach at VMI, (1965), and varsity assistant coaching the defensive secondary at VMI (1966). Four years as football assistant at William & Mary, coaching the offensive backfield (1967-68), defensive backfield coach and head of recruiting (1969) and defensive coordinator and head of recruiting (1970). One year at Rice University (1971) as linebacker coach and head of recruiting. One year at Maryland (1972) as linebacker coach. Five years as head football coach at The Citadel (1973-77). Four years as assistant coach with the Kansas City Chiefs as special teams and defensive coach (1978-79) and offensive backfield coach (1980-81).

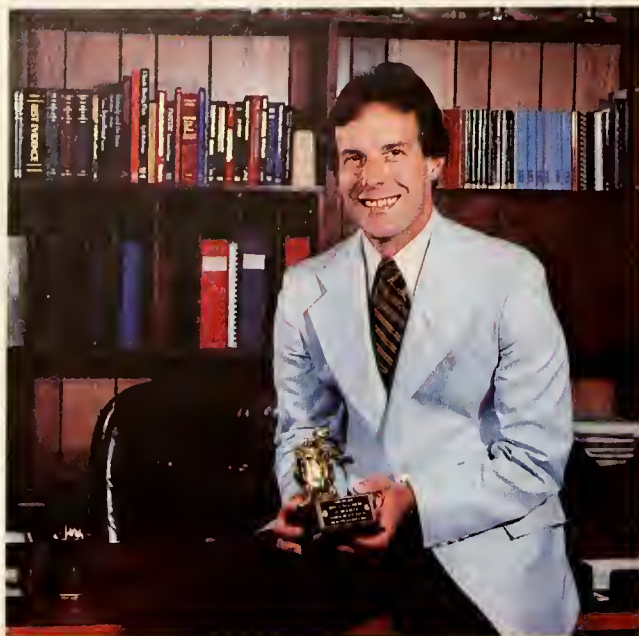

Richard Michael "Dick" Dull

Director of Athletics



Dick Dull is the chief administrator of an extremely successful Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. In his first two years as the Director of Athletics the Department has not only been successful in Intercollegiate competition but has been financially stable, operating in the black both years.

Dull spent his first Christmas as Director of Athletics searching the nation for a Head Football Coach. His second Christmas on the job was spent in Hawaii as Bobby Ross took the Terps to the initial Aloha Bowl for a Christmas Day game against Washington.

With the sole responsibility of finding a replacement coach, when Jerry Claiborne departed for his Alma Mater Kentucky, Dull publicly announced four criteria to guide his search: (1) a coach representative of the values, goals aspirations which Maryland had established for itself as an academic institution; (2) a coach capable of providing a positive meaningful and educational experience for the young men who play football at Maryland; (3) a coach capable of winning football games; (4) a coach who believed in playing wide open offensive football with special emphasis on the passing game. His search ended in Kansas City where Ross was serving as an assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs in the National Football League.

In his first year Ross took the Terps from a 4-6-1 record to an 8-3 record, a national ranking and a berth in the Aloha Bowl. He was named Atlantic Coast Conference and District III Coach of the Year.

Both Basketball teams followed with berths in the NCAA Championship Tournaments as the men played two games in Houston and the Women gained the final 16.

Dull has the responsibility for a self supporting department of the University with a five million dollar budget. In addition to supporting 22 varsity teams the Department is responsible for the operation and maintenance of an 18 hole golf course and driving range. Other facilities include Cole Field House, Byrd Stadium, Shipley Field, two football practice fields and an artificial turf all-purpose practice field. In addition there are facilities for Intercollegiate Soccer, Women's Field Hockey, Lacrosse and Tennis. The department has over 90 employees.

Dull assumed the duties of Director of Athletics on August 1, 1981. He was appointed by the Board of Regents on June 19, 1981.

He was well qualified for the position taking over a department that he had worked his way through, beginning as a student athlete in 1964.

Despite rising prices, especially in the areas of equipment, medical care, insurance, travel and scholarships and competition for the entertainment dollar, he has maintained financial solvency.

The outlook for 1983-84 is bright. An aggressive promotional program, successful fund raising program, successful recruiting ventures and exciting competition against the best teams available all contribute to expectations for another year of national rankings and a balanced budget.

Since joining the Maryland Athletic Department Dull's duties have encompassed everything from coaching on the field to scheduling, supervision and administration of all non-revenue sports, serving as liaison with the Office of Financial Aid, supervision and administration of the Business Office of Intercollegiate Athletics and he reorganized the former Department of Women's Intercollegiate Athletics into the Office of Non-Revenue Sports.

Since taking over as Athletic Director he has reorganized the promotions department and initiated new Athletic Department publications designed to whet the appetite of sports fans and athletes interested in Maryland athletics.

He initially came to Maryland as a student-athlete from Biglerville High in Pennsylvania. He received his Bachelor of Arts as a Political Science major in 1967 and then moved on to the Maryland School of Law.

He received his Doctor of Laws in 1971 and the experience gained as an Attorney at Law for four years contributed to his success and perseverance throughout the past two years.

As an undergraduate he was a champion javelin thrower for the Maryland Track and Field team. His best competitive throw was 251 feet.

He was Pennsylvania High School Champion in 1961, the Pennsylvania Jaycee State Champion in 1963 and the PIAA State runner-up in 1963. In 1965 he was the National Junior AAU Champion.

Among his many titles won while at Maryland are ACC Champion, Penn Relay Champion, and ACC-SEC Champion. He also placed eighth in the National AAU Championships and the NCAA Championships.

As a javelin coach he produced two ACC Champions and an All-American, while also handling the academic affairs and administration of the Track team.

His Bar memberships include the Court of Appeals of Maryland and the Federal Court for District of Maryland.

He served from June 1971 to June 1973 as Attorney at Law, Legal Aid Bureau in Baltimore, Maryland and from June 1973 to January 1975 as Attorney at Law with the University of Southern California, National Senior Citizens Law Center. While with USC he served for a period as the Acting Director of the Washington office.

His hobbies include photography, fishing and motor sports. He was born on July 1, 1945.

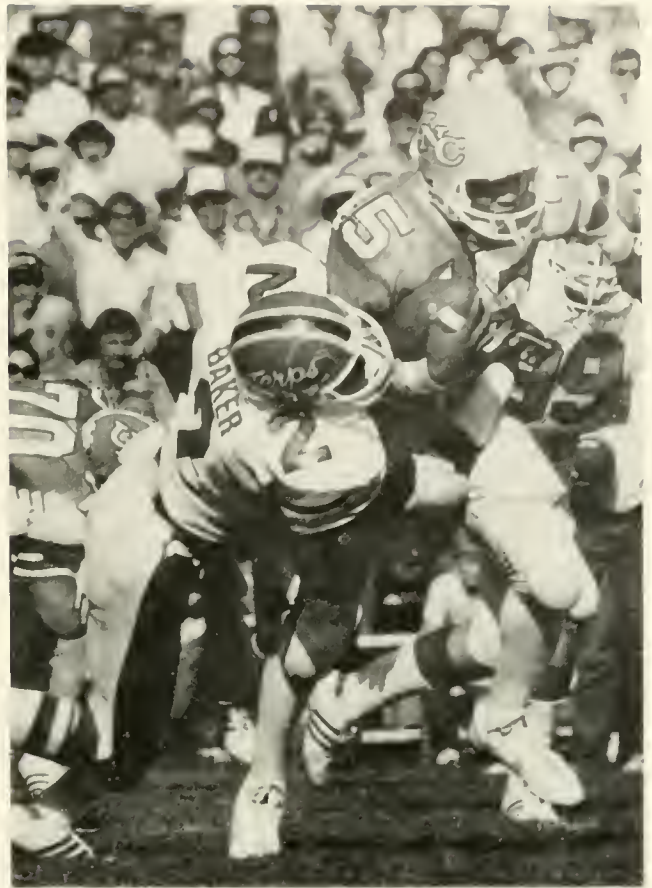

He moved to College Park from ACC rival Virginia where he coached the receivers for Coach Dick Bestwick. He spent two years with Sonny Randle at Marshall as the Offensive Coordinator and quarterback coach and two years with Bo Rein at North Carolina State as the receivers coach. In 1974 & 75 he coached the receivers for Bob Thalman at VMI and in '76 coached the offensive backs.

As an undergraduate he caught 117 passes for over 1,600 yards and captained the William & Mary Indians.

He served two years in Newport News, Virginia following graduation with a year each at Newport News High and Denbigh High. He then joined Lou Holtz at North Carolina State for two years, 1972-73, as a graduate assistant and picked up his Master's Degree in Education.

His wife Marsha is a graduate of Mississippi University for Women and a native of Atlanta, Georgia. They have two children, Ryan and Lauren.

Coach Cavanaugh was born 8/4/48 in Queens, New York and attended Chaminade High School.

George Foussekis (Virginia Tech '68)

Assistant Head Coach/Inside Linebackers

Coach Foussekis is serving his twelfth year with the Terrapins having joined Jerry Claiborne's staff in 1972. He was named Assistant Head Coach by Coach Ross and assigned on the field duties with the Inside Linebackers, a vital part of the wide tackle six defense.

He began his coaching career at Virginia Tech in 1969 and worked with the defensive line for two years. In 1971 he served as the defensive coordinator at William & Mary replacing Coach Ross as he moved to Rice University. He is a graduate of Lane High in Charlottesville, Virginia where he captained the football, basketball and baseball teams. He was named the MVP in all three sports. His 1963 football team at Lane High won the state championship and he was named first team All-State.

The 37 year old bachelor was born on April 28, 1946. He received his Master's Degree in Education from Bowie State College.

Offensive Coordinator/Offensive Line

His wife Gloria is a native of Bethpage, New York, a graduate of Cortland and received her Master's from Maryland. They have one child, Kelly Anne.



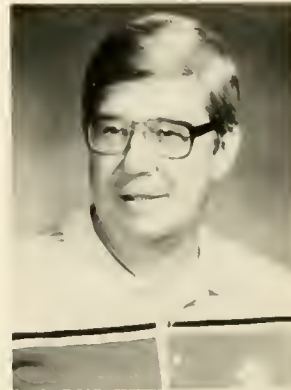

Certainly no stranger to Maryland, Costello was an All-American on the Terrapin Track teams in 1965, '66 and '68. Upon graduation he served six years as an assistant track coach and was then appointed head coach in 1974, a position he held for seven years. He developed several world class track stars including the all-time hurdler Renaldo Nehemiah.

In addition to coaching track and field, Costello has published articles on training techniques in several national publications, is in demand as a clinical speaker and noted for his theories on improving speed, conditioning and flexibility. Frank came to Maryland as the New Jersey State High Jump Champion and record holder in 1963 and was undefeated in ACC, IC4A and NCAA competition in 1965 winning both NCAA titles. While competing for the Terrapins he also won seven titles in the Penn Relays, the Millrose games, the Eastern European Championships, the Southern Hemisphere Games and the French National Championship. He was ranked third in the world in 1966.

Costello works closely with the coaches, trainers and team physician in developing conditioning programs suited for each individual.

WEIGHT TRAINING

Bobby Ross was an assistant coach with the Terrapins in 1972 when Maryland embarked on an intensive weight training program. His feelings towards a weight program are if anything even stronger today.

Frank Costello installed a downhill running program that he picked up from the Russians a few years ago while serving as the Maryland track coach in the mid '70's. Costello has worked with several NFL teams, especially the Green Bay Packers as a conditioning coach during the training camps. He is now the conditioning and weight training coach for all Maryland athletes. His training programs are designed for each sport and position as needed and may be quite effective if followed throughout the summer without requiring too much time.

Maryland football players have pride in their weight training and their off season efforts are obvious when they return in the fall bench pressing considerably more than they did when they completed spring practice.

Terps still point to Randy White of the Dallas Cowboys as an example. White has provided incentive to many Maryland athletes with his accomplishments in the program. White weighed 212 pounds and bench pressed 260 pounds when he enrolled at Maryland. He left at 248 pounds and bench pressed 450. Joining the 400 pound bench press club has become a goal for Maryland football players.

Dr. John S. Toll

President

John S. Toll is a vital force for excellence in higher education in the State of Maryland and in the nation.

In 1978, when he became the 22nd president of the University it was his hope that "with a determined effort from everyone concerned, the University of Maryland can, in about a decade, become one of the best state university systems in the nation."

Now, on his fifth anniversary, a major national study has placed the University near that mark. The National Academy of Sciences evaluation of graduate education in the U.S. shows the departments of computer science, physics, math, art history, economics and electrical engineering among the top 10 public universities in scholarly quality of the faculty. Seven other programs ranked among the top 20. Of these the arts and humanities programs were also listed in the 10 most improved among public universities.

Growing confidence in the quality of the University has brought five gifts of \$1,000,000 or more from individuals and organizations since Dr. Toll became president. Membership in the Presidents Club (donors of \$10,000 and above) has quadrupled to 410, and the number of alumni and friends who contribute to the annual fund has grown from 5,000 to 20,000.



Exceptional students, too, are recognizing the University's strong academic position. In five years there has been a six-fold increase in the number of National Merit and National Achievement winners coming to Maryland; 21 of the 38 1983 National Merit winners in Maryland are students here this fall. And, at a time when SAT scores of entering freshman were declining nationally, there has been a steady increase at Maryland.

Dr. Toll received his undergraduate degree in physics from Yale where he graduated with highest honors. His advanced physics degrees were earned at Princeton. An avid jogger, camper and tennis player, Dr. Toll and his wife Deborah have two daughters.



John Brooks Slaughter, the third Chancellor of the College Park Campus, is a distinguished scientist and a dedicated humanitarian as well as an able administrator. His research specialities are in the fields of electrical engineering and computer systems. His accomplishments in these fields have brought him high recognition. He is a Fellow in the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He holds membership in the National Academy of Engineering, was selected U.C.L.A. Engineering Alumnus of the Year (1978), received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Science Foundation (1979), and was recognized for Distinguished Service in Engineering by Kansas State University (1981).

Since his undergraduate days Dr. Slaughter has been

active in humanitarian affairs. As chapter president of Zeta Sigma Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., (San Diego) from 1957 to 1959 he participated in cultural, social, and educational activities directed toward the enhancement of the black community in San Diego. As president of the Board of Directors of the San Diego Urban League he was concerned with providing equal opportunities in education, employment, housing, and social services.

Prior to assuming his responsibilities at the University of Maryland he served as Academic Vice President and Provost at Washington State University and as Director of the National Science Foundation. In his inauguration address to the College Park campus on May 3, 1983, he set the course for his administration: "I want to see this campus continue its vigorous pursuit of academic excellence while reaching out to a more diversified student body. I want the University of Maryland at College Park to set a national standard for excellence and equality. As we pursue these goals, we must also enhance our contributions to the State. Finally, I am committed to a university that is a community—a community that takes pride in itself and touches each person involved in the campus with pride."

Dr. Charles A. Taff
Chairman, Athletic Council

Dr. Charles A. Taff, Professor of Transportation, College of Business and Management is Chairman of the Athletic Council. Dr. Taff served as Chairman of the Department of Business Administration from 1962 to 1973. He is the author of numerous articles and of four books, two of which are in sixth editions.

For 15 years Dr. Taff was Editor of the Transportation Journal, a professional publication that is published quarterly and is currently a member of its Editorial Review Board.

He served as a member of the Joint U.S. Canadian St. Lawrence Seaways Tolls Committee which recommended the fee structure for the Seaway. He has served as a transportation consultant to the President's Council of Economic Advisors under four Presidents.

Dr. Taff has also served as President of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Francis A. Gray, Jr. (Maryland '43)
Associate Athletic Director

Frank Gray joined the athletic department as Administrative Director in 1972. He is primarily responsible for the fiscal program of the department with an operating budget of approximately \$5,000,000.

A native of Maryland and 1943 graduate of the University with a degree in Agriculture and Farm Management, he began his professional career with the University as an Assistant County Agricultural Agent.

He entered private industry in 1955 but returned to the University in 1960 as Associate Dean of Student Life. During his 12 years prior to joining the Athletic Department he served two years as Acting Dean for Student Life and has served as Administrative Director for the Executive Dean for Student Life, the Vice President for Student Affairs and the Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs.

Randy Hoffman (Maryland '74)
Associate Athletic Director

Randy Hoffman was named an Associate Director of Athletics this past summer after serving as Assistant AD and Director of Sports Marketing. A 1974 graduate of the University he has worked with the golf program as assistant coach, head coach and Director of Golf Facilities. He assumed management of the Golf course in 1981.

He received a Bachelor's degree in Business Management-Marketing in 1980 and is currently finishing his Master's program in Administration at Maryland.

Randy came to Maryland from Lewishurg, Pennsylvania where he captained the football, basketball and golf teams and was an All-Conference quarterback. He is a member of the Terrapin Club and Alumni "M" Club.

William "Spider" Fry (Maryland '51)
Assistant Athletic Director

"Spider" Fry moved into an administrative position in the athletic department in 1978 after having devoted 15 years to the athletes as Head Trainer. He now serves as Director of the Golf Facilities.

Assistant Athletic Director

Gothard Lane assumed the duties of Assistant AD for Non-Revenue Sports in March of 1982. He also works with the football and basketball programs handling their scheduling.

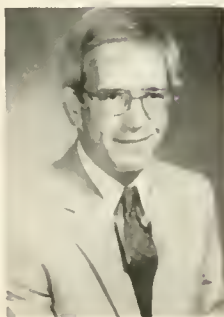
Bob initially came to the University as manager of the wrestling team. He received his degree in Transportation

Thomas M. Fields (Maryland '42)
Executive Director Educational Foundation

Tom Fields has served as Executive Director of the Maryland Educational Foundation since 1970 when he retired as a Colonel in the U.S. Marine Corp.

For the past fiscal year the funds generated by the Educational Foundation totaled \$1,400,000. The membership of the Terrapin Club has expanded to 2,157 with 417 life members (\$10,000 contribution), 58 Super Terrapins (\$2,500 annual contribution), 537 Diamondbackers (\$1,200 annual contribution) and 501 Gold members (\$600 annual contribution).

Over one half of all contributors did not attend the University of Maryland but all are strong supporters of Intercollegiate Athletics and its principals of competition.

The funds provided by the foundation have enabled the Terrapins to develop a Women's program that has also gained national recognition. All funds go to scholarships and the scholarship program for Women athletes is on a par with the program for men's non-revenue sports.

Fields was a track star for the Terps as an undergraduate and helped lead the Terps to one of their finest days ever at the Penn Relays winning three Championship of America relay races. During World War II he served in combat on Guadalcanal, Vella Lavella, Bougainville, and Iwo Jima. He also served in Korea and Vietnam and at the time of his retirement from the Corps he was the Deputy Director of Information, Headquarters, Marine Corps.

John W. Zane (Maryland '60)
Assistant Athletic Director

Jack Zane returned to Maryland in August of 1969 after serving as the Sports Information Director for The George Washington University for six years.

He received his degree in Journalism from Maryland in February of 1960 after serving as a student assistant to Joe Blair for three years. He served as a full time assistant for two years after graduation.

While at Maryland he was the first Executive Sports Editor of the Diamondback, SMC of Pi Kappa Alpha and a member of Sigma Delta Chi Journalism fraternity.

He served six years as a member of the NCAA Public Relations Committee and is currently a member of the NCAA Public Relations/Promotions Committee. He has been a member of CoSIDA for 23 years and serves as a vice president.

1982 IN REVIEW

When Bobby Ross assumed the duties as the Maryland football coach he promised the fans exciting football. We will make things happen both offensively and defensively he said.

Exciting it has been for the Maryland players and fans. The Terps won eight of 11 games and lost the three by a total of 11 points.

They opened the season dropping a 39-31 decision at Penn State and then lost to West Virginia 19-18 in Morgantown when the attempt at a two point conversion and the win failed.

Ross and the Terrapins wound up playing for the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship on November 13 and lost a 24-22 decision to Clemson.

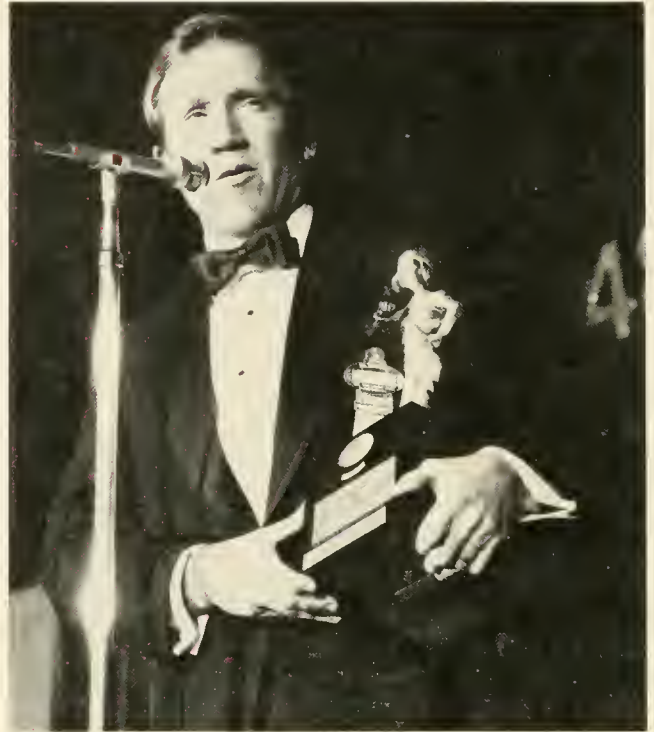
Maryland's wide tackle six defense once again ranked among the best in the nation holding opponents to only 87 yards a game rushing and 293 yards a game total offense. The Maryland offense averaged 419 yards a game.

The Terps made 41 changes in the Maryland record books and 33 of the records were established by the offense.

PENN STATE (Sept. 11 Beaver Stadium, University Park, PA). There were 84,597 on hand to see the exciting opener won by Penn State 39-31. It was the largest crowd to ever see a Maryland football team and the third largest in the history of Beaver Stadium. Bobby Ross, in his debut, saw his offense score more points than any Maryland team ever had against Penn State and more than they had scored in the last four years combined. Russell Davis had a school record 188 yards on pass receptions with a pair of touchdown receptions from Boomer Esiason of 50 and 60 yards. Penn State blocked a punt on the fourth play of the game and had a first and goal but had to settle for a field goal as the Maryland defense held on the one. The teams then swapped field goals before Penn State recovered a fumble on the Maryland 25 and took a 13-3 lead.

Terps drove 80 yards to cut it to 13-10 but another Maryland fumble led to a score and a 20-10 halftime lead. Esiason hit Davis with a 50 yard toss after an interception by Lendell Jones stymied Penn State. Penn State drove to the Maryland one with a first and goal but again had to settle for a field goal and 23-17 lead.

Maryland took a 24-23 lead on Esiason's 60 yard pass to Davis but Penn State came back to take a 36-24 lead. Willie Joyner's second touchdown of the game cut it to 36-31 but the Terps fell short as their final drive ended on



the Penn State 24 with an interception. Joyner was named the ACC offensive player of the week.

WEST VIRGINIA (Sept. 18, Mountaineer Field, Morgantown, W VA). The largest crowd to ever see a sporting event in the state saw a game that was ultimately decided by an errant conversion pass with 1:39 left in the game.

After the high scoring opener the Terps were in a defensive struggle that saw them leading 12-9 after three quarters. The Terps scored first on a safety. West Virginia took 3-2 and 6-2 leads before Boomer Esiason's pass to Russell Davis made it 9-6 at the half. West Virginia tied the score 9-9 and Jess Atkinson gave Maryland a 12-9 lead with a 49 yard field goal. West Virginia went ahead 19-12 with a touchdown and a field goal but Maryland drove 75 yards with Rick Badanjek, a freshman, scoring his first touchdown with 1:39 left in the game. Coach Bobby Ross immediately went for the two points and the win but the conversion pass failed.

Running backs Willie Joyner and Dave D'Addio were both home recuperating from injuries and the Terps rushed for only 66 yards.

NORTH CAROLINA STATE (Sept. 25, Byrd Stadium). Bobby Ross made his Byrd Stadium debut as an

underdog to the N.C. State Wolfpack but picked up his first win as the Terps took a 23-0 lead and won 23-6.

Boomer Esiason threw a touchdown pass to Russell Davis on the first play of the second quarter and three plays later Howard Eubanks intercepted a pass and his 19 yard return gave Maryland the ball on the seven. Freshman Rick Badanjak carried three straight plays scoring on third and one.

Badanjak then recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and Jess Atkinson kicked the first of three field goals for a 17-0 lead. The Terps had scored 17 points in just 3:38 of the period. Atkinson added a 45 yard field goal on the final play of the first half.

Willie Joyner returned to the lineup and rushed for 111 yards after missing the West Virginia game and Dave D'Addio played for the first time after missing both road games.

Maryland drove 95 yards to the State one to open the fourth quarter but stalled and Atkinson kicked his third field goal of the game for a 23-0 lead.

State came into the game with a 3-0 record while Maryland was 0-2. The Terps held State to zero yards rushing and Mark Duda was named the ACC defensive player of the week.

SYRACUSE (Oct. 2, Carrier Dome, Syracuse, NY). After only one home game the Terps went back on the road and Coach Bobby Ross evened his record at 2-2 with a 26-3 win at Syracuse.

For the second consecutive week the Terps led 20-0 at the half. Jess Atkinson hit four field goals and Dave D'Addio and John Nash scored touchdowns.

Boomer Esiason threw a 43 yard scoring pass to Nash as the Terps passed for 214 yards and rushed for 205.

The Maryland defense held Syracuse to 23 yards rushing as Mike Corvino was named the ACC defensive lineman of the week.

Syracuse crossed midfield once in each half. They reached the Maryland 32 in the first half but Corvino came up with the ball on a sack and recovered fumble. In the third quarter Syracuse drove 66 yards to the 27 but had to settle for a 44 yard field goal. In the fourth quarter they took over on the Maryland 45 but J. D. Gross intercepted on first down from the 30 for the Terps.

INDIANA STATE (Oct. 9, Byrd Stadium). Terps scored on first two possessions with drives of 83 and 52 yards and led 35-0 at the half. The Terps added a field goal in the third quarter for the final 38-0 score. The defense gave up only 125 net yards in the game and Boomer Esiason was named the ACC offensive player of the week as he hit 13 of 14 first half passes for 203 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Terps had 490 yards total offense as Coach Ross had 12 different runners carrying the ball and 12 catching passes. The Terps used five fullbacks, five running backs, three quarterbacks and three offensive lines in the game.

Darryl Emerson scored on a 38 yard pass, Rick Badanjak on a 34 yard run, Willie Joyner on a 15 yard run and Greg Hill on an eight yard pass.

WAKE FOREST (Oct. 16, Byrd Stadium). Jess Atkinson kicked a 50 yard field goal to open the scoring in the first quarter and the Terps added three second quarter touchdowns for a 24-7 lead, enroute to the 52-31 win.

As expected it became an offensive battle as there were 95 passes thrown in the game and 983 yards total offense. Maryland had 537 yards with 345 on the ground and Wake Forest 446 with 363 passing.

John Nash scored on runs of 12 and 67 yards in the second quarter and a five yard run in the fourth quarter. Esiason threw touchdown passes of 22 and 28 yards to Greg Hill, and 24 yards to Mike Lewis.

Freshman Mike Ramseur scored four touchdowns for the Deacons with his third cutting the lead to 31-24. Maryland then scored three times to take a 52-24 lead with over 10 minutes remaining in the game.

Nash rushed for 152 yards on only 13 carries as the Terps were scoring the most points since 1975. Offensive guard Ron Solt was named the ACC offensive lineman of the week for his blocking in the game.

DUKE (Oct. 23, Byrd Stadium). The Terps were playing their third consecutive home game and gave Coach Bobby Ross a perfect Stadium record with the 49-22 win over Duke.

The Terps led 29-0 with only 11:14 gone in the game as Boomer Esiason threw touchdown passes of 15 and 20 yards to Greg Hill, 12 yards to John Tice and ran for a score.

Jess Atkinson kicked a pair of field goals and John Nash and Rick Badanjek ran for touchdowns as the Terps improved their record to 5-2 with five consecutive wins.

John Tice was named the ACC offensive lineman of the week, catching four passes, scoring one touchdown and blocking well on the corners.

Lendell Jones, with a school record four interceptions, was named the league's defensive back of the week. Jones intercepted Ben Bennett three times.

Tim Quander returned the opening kickoff 74 yards to the Duke 21 and Esiason passed for the score three plays later. After Duke ran three plays and punted the Terps drove 74 yards for a score. The snap from center was high and Esiason jumped up to catch it and then threw to John Tice for two points. Three plays later Jones intercepted a pass and returned it to the 12. Esiason ran it in for the touchdown and one play later Jones again intercepted Bennett on the Duke 44.

It was the first time since 1954 that the Terps had recorded over 100 points in back-to-back games. With 52 against Wake Forest and 49 against Duke the Terps had 101 points in the two games. In 1954 Maryland beat George Washington 48-6 and Missouri 74-13 in the final two games of the season.

NORTH CAROLINA (Oct. 30, Kenan Stadium, Chapel Hill, NC). The Terps took a five game winning streak to Chapel Hill to meet the nationally ranked Tar Heels and the nation's top defensive team. It was a regionally televised game (CBS) with over 33 percent of the nation included in the audience.

The Tar Heels had limited opponents to only 43 yards a game rushing but Willie Joyner chipped in with scoring runs of 49 and 84 yards and a 55 yard run setting up a score. Joyner rushed for a school record 240 yards on 16 carries with 212 yards in the second half.

The Terps finished with 320 yards rushing in the game and 486 yards total offense for the day.

North Carolina led 7-0 after the first quarter but Maryland went ahead 10-7 on a 20 yard touchdown pass from Boomer Esiason to Russell Davis and a Jess Atkinson field goal. UNC led 14-10 at the half and took a 17-10 third quarter lead on a field goal after an Esiason pass was intercepted on the six and returned 57 yards to the 37 where John Tice caught the Tar Heel back from behind.

Joyner's 55 yard run carried to the 18 and Dave

D'Addio scored on the next play for the Terps to tie the score 17-17.

UNC went ahead 24-17 on the second play of the fourth quarter after a 75 yard drive.

Maryland again tied the score 24-24 on Joyner's 49 yard run with 13:11 remaining in the game.

UNC then drove to the Maryland 35 where the Terps held and took over on the seven following the punt. On third and one Joyner went 84 yards for a touchdown and 31-24 lead. The Terps again held and took over on their own 24 with 5:43 remaining and ran out the clock picking up four first downs including one on a third and 12 with a 14 yard pass to John Tice.

Joyner and Tackle Dave Pacella were the ACC's offensive players of the week.

MIAMI (Nov. 6, Byrd Stadium). Terps ran winning streak to seven and 5-0 in Byrd Stadium with 18-17 win over Miami, one of the five nationally ranked opponents on the schedule.

The Terps led only twice in the game, at 7-6 and the final 18-17 score. Freshman Rick Badanjek scored both Maryland touchdowns and Jess Atkinson kicked the winning 38 yard field goal with 2:14 left in the game. The Terps then had to play tough defense as the ensuing kickoff bounced off a Miami lineman and was recovered by Miami on their 49. Miami drove to the 23 but then missed a 40 yard field goal with 12 seconds remaining.

The Terps had set up the winning opportunity when Coach Bobby Ross elected to go for two points following the four yard touchdown run by Badanjek with 7:50 remaining. Esiason hit Mike Lewis with the two point pass making the score 17-15 Miami.

Bill McFadden was the ACC defensive back of the week as he had one interception and led the defensive secondary from his safety slot.

CLEMSON (Nov. 13, Byrd Stadium). Maryland and Clemson met for the ACC Championship in Byrd Stadium with a standing room crowd of 51,750 on hand and a CBS Regional Television audience.

Clemson won the 24-22 thriller as the Terps fell behind 21-7 after three quarters and trailed 24-7 with 14:37 left in the game.

The Terps drove 79 yards in six plays with Boomer Esiason hitting Greg Hill for a 37 yard touchdown and then throwing to Rick Badanjek for the two point conversion. The Terps then trailed 24-15. After holding Clemson to five plays and 17 yards on the next series the Terps drove 71 yards in five plays and when Jess Atkinson kicked the extra point trailed only 22-24.

The Terps held again and had possession on the Clemson 21 after a four yard punt. However, the Terps were thwarted by a holding penalty and then a fumble after a pass reception on second down from the 30.

Turnovers hurt the Terps in the second half as they had a pass intercepted while on the Clemson 12, fumbled on the Clemson 49, fumbled on the Maryland 40, and fumbled on the Clemson 24.

John Tiece set a school record in the game with 11 pass receptions and Esiason completed a school record 24 passes for 277 yards.

VIRGINIA (Nov. 20, Scott Stadium, Charlottesville, VA). Terps received and accepted bid to the Aloha Bowl following the 45-14 win over Virginia.

The Terps led 31-0 at the half and 38-0 in the third quarter. Willie Joyner rushed for 170 yards and a pair of touchdowns as he became only the third Maryland player to top 1,000 yards rushing in a season. Joyner finished with 1,039.

Esiason threw touchdown passes to three different receivers. Dave D'Addio scored twice with a run of 28 yards and a six yard pass reception.

Maryland recorded 556 yards total offense and intercepted four Cavalier passes on defense.

HONOLULU, (Dec. 25, Aloha Stadium). Washington threw 56 passes against the Terps, the last a 11 yard scoring toss with six seconds remaining, to defeat Maryland 21-20.

Five touchdowns in the game came on pass plays with Tim Cowan hitting Anthony Allen with three (27,71,11) and Boomer Esiason hitting John Tiece with a 36 yard toss and Dave D'Addio from 19 yards. John Nash scored

from two yards out to give Maryland a 18-14 lead with 10:44 remaining in the game. Esiason's two point conversion pass to Tiece put the Terps up 20-14.

Esiason completed 19 of 32 passes for 251 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He hit Tiece with six passes, Dave D'Addio with four and John Nash with three.

The Terps failed on a 32 yard field goal attempt with 3:39 to go in the game and Washington then drove 80 yards in 16 plays for the winning score. The Huskies converted three fourth down plays in the drive.

JACOBS' BLOCKING TROPHY: ACC coaches selected Maryland's Dave Pacella as the winner of the Jacobs' Blocking Trophy last fall with John Tice of the Terps the runnerup. Previous winners for the Terps were Bob Pellegini in 1955 and Ralph Sonntag in 1969.

NATIONAL STATISTICS: The Terps ranked third in the nation in Rushing Defense (87.2) last fall and 17th in Total Defense (293.5). On offense the Terps were the nation's eighth highest scoring team (32.1), and ranked 15th in Total Offense (418.9). In addition Boomer Esiason ranked 13th in Passing Efficiency and 22nd in Total Offense. Jess Atkinson ranked 12th in Field Goals and 19th in Scoring with Willie Joyner 14th in Rushing. Lendell Jones was 5th in pass interceptions with only three players picking off more than the seven interceptions he recorded.

TERP RANKING: Bobby Ross' Terps ranked 20th in the Associated Press and UPI polls after the 21-20 loss to Washington in the Aloha Bowl with Washington finishing seventh in both polls. USA Today ranked the Terps 18th.

FOOTBALL CLINIC: There were 288 coaches in attendance at the Maryland football clinic this past spring. They represented nine states and the District of Columbia with 126 from Maryland, 84 from Virginia and 23 from D.C. Pennsylvania had 19 with New Jersey 14 and New York 11. Six coaches were from West Virginia with North Carolina, Delaware and Ohio also represented. There were 139 high schools in addition to Junior Colleges and CYO Clubs represented.

TERP NOTES

TOP RANKED OPPONENTS: Five of the 1983 Terp opponents were in Bowl games last year and a sixth, Clemson, was ineligible for a bowl but ranked eighth in the nation. Those in Bowl games were Auburn (Tangerine), Pittsburgh (Cotton), North Carolina (Sun), Vanderbilt (Hall of Fame) and West Virginia (Gator).

TOUGH SCHEDULES: The Maryland schedule was ranked the sixth toughest in the nation last fall. Five of the opponents wound up in the top 20 in the nation with Penn State the National Champion. The others were Washington (7), Clemson (8), North Carolina and West Virginia. On the '83 schedule Penn State has been replaced by Pittsburgh with Auburn and Vanderbilt replacing Indiana State and Miami. All three newcomers were bowl teams and had a combined record of 26-10.

MARYLAND FOOTBALL ATTENDANCE: Home attendance in 1982 was up 8,225 per game despite the fact the Terps were 0-2 before they played a home game. The 235,950 in Byrd Stadium was the second highest home attendance in Maryland football history as 254,156 saw the 1976 undefeated team. When the Terps drew 508,179 for the 12 game schedule it was only the second time the attendance topped the half-million mark. The 1975 team drew 535,637 for 12 games.

INAUGURAL BOWL GAMES: When the Terps met Washington in the Aloha Bowl it was the second Inaugural Bowl game for the Terps. Maryland met Minnesota in the initial Hall of Fame Bowl in 1977 winning 17-7. The Terps dropped a 20-21 decision to Washington on a touchdown pass with six seconds left in the game.

TOP MARYLAND FOOTBALL CROWDS: The largest crowds to see a Maryland football team play were both against National Champions. Maryland lost at Penn State 39-31 last fall and defeated Tennessee 28-13 in the 1952 Sugar Bowl.

PITTSBURGH SERIES CONTINUES: Terps lost a 38-9 decision to the Panthers in Pittsburgh in 1980. Pitt visits Byrd Stadium on September 24 and Maryland will

return the visit on September 6, 1986. The two teams meet in 1988 and 1989 and Pitt then becomes a regular on the Maryland schedule in 1991.

PENN STATE SERIES RESUMES: Although Maryland and Penn State do not meet this fall they have met in 21 of the last 23 years. Penn State returns to the schedule in 1984 and is scheduled at least through the next 10 years.

WEST VIRGINIA SERIES: This is the third consecutive year the Terps and Mountaineers have met and the game is a regular on the future Terp schedules.

SPRING PRACTICE AWARDS: The "Tough Terp" award voted on by the team for the "most aggressive" player went to Fullback and Co-Captain Dave D'Addio. Defensive Lineman Pete Koch and Fullback Dave D'Addio were voted the Co-Captains for the 1983 season. The Maryland Way awards for the "most improved" voted on by the coaching staff went to Offensive Guard Ron Solt and Defensive Guard Tyrone Furman. The Maryland Way awards in 1982 went to two members of the current squad who followed with excellent years. They were Running Back Willie Joyner and Outside Linebacker J. D. Gross.

LAST ELEVEN YEARS IN BYRD: The Terps have a 48-13-1 record in Byrd Stadium for the last 11 years. Of the 13 losses, four have been to Penn State, three each to West Virginia and North Carolina and one to Alabama. The tie was with Syracuse.

EARLY TELEVISION FOR TERPS: According to Dick Lamb, Historian of the Football Writers Association "The first regularly scheduled college football game to be televised was the Penn-Maryland game of October 5, 1940.

WIDE TACKLE SIX AGAINST RUSH IN ACC: When Maryland led the ACC in rushing defense last fall allowing only 87.2 yards a game it was the ninth time in the 11 years the Terps have utilized the wide tackle six they have led the league. The 1981 team gave up only 83.9 yards a game.

MUTUAL RADIO will broadcast the Maryland-Pittsburgh game in addition to the regular Maryland and Pittsburgh networks.

NCAA FOOTBALL TELECASTS: Excluding Georgia Tech the newest member of the ACC, Maryland and North Carolina have appeared on regular season network telecasts the most of the league schools. The Tar Heels have made 30 appearances (three national) including three in 1982. The Terps have 20 appearances (five national) with two in 1982. Duke has been on 19 times with North Carolina State 18 and Clemson 17.

NIGHT GAME: The Maryland-West Virginia game on September 17 will be the first night game played in Byrd Stadium which opened in 1950. The last night football game played in College Park saw the Terps defeat Georgetown 33-7 in the old 18,000 seat Byrd Stadium that was located on the East side of U.S. 1. It was on September 30, 1949 8:15 P.M. in the second game of the season. The Maryland-West Virginia will be a National Cable Telecast by TBS of Atlanta. TBS telecast two ACC games last fall with Virginia playing Clemson and the Cavaliers against Virginia Tech.

SCHOLARATHLETE AWARDS DINNER: The Baltimore Chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame honored five Terrapins. Included were players Mike Muller, a senior linebacker and two high school players who will join the Terps this fall. Dave Amend a lineman from Archbishop Curley High and Azizuddin Ra'ooof a wide receiver from Northeast High were the high school players. Bobby Ross was honored for his first year at Maryland along with Jack Scarbath 1951 Terp Quarterback who will be inducted into the Hall of Fame in December. Muller was the fifth Maryland player to receive the collegiate award following Bob Smith (1975), Jonathan Claiborne (1978), Joe Muffler (1979) and Jim Shaffer (1980).





PHYSICAL TESTING RESULTS: Fullback Dave D'Addio and Running Back Willie Joyner were graded as the best all-around athletes on the team this past spring. Offensive Guard Ron Solt graded highest among the linemen. Al Covington was the fastest for the 40 and Russell Davis ran the fastest mile and a half for the second consecutive year.

ACC STATISTICAL LEADERS: The Terps have won a number of individual titles since the formation of the ACC, including three each by Quarterbacks Dick Shiner and Bob Avellini and a pair of rushing titles by Charlie Wysoeki. The Terps have also won 10 kick scoring titles.
