





Washington and Baltimore can be reached easily from anywhere in the world. USAir, which is headquartered in the metropolitan area, uses Baltimore/Washington International Airport as its hub. Dulles International Airport is a hub for United Airlines, and the area is serviced by Reagan National Airport. College Park is 10 minutes from the Amtrak Northeast Corridor Line and frequent train service along the East Coast.

Playing for the Terps means competing in the Washington/Baltimore media market, the nation's fourth-largest.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Terps are covered extensively by two of the nation's top 10



newspapers: the Washington Post and the Baltimore Sun.

■ *USA Today*; the nation's newspaper, is headquartered less than 20 miles from Byrd Stadium.

• The Maryland Terrapin radio network, which can be accessed up and down the East Coast, boasts one of the largest coverage areas in collegiate sports.

■ Every major national television network — ABC, NBC, CBS and Fox — has a major news-gathering affiliate in both Washington and Baltimore. No university in the East boasts eight major news outlets within a 35-mile radius of its campus — except for the University of Maryland.

■ ACC football will receive extensive live television coverage in 1998, with ABC (14 games), ESPN/ESPN2 (10 games) and J-P Sports (10 games) combining for 34 telecasts. Over the next eight years, ABC and ESPN/ESPN2 will combine to televise 238 ACC games.

■ The Atlantic Coast Conference was cleared on 295 radio stations during the 1997 season, totaling more than 500 hours of live game coverage.

• ESPN, which originated its first-ever sports broadcast from the University of Maryland in 1979, has been a regular visitor to Byrd Stadium over the years.

• The Tyser Tower press box at Byrd Stadium seats more than 160 members of the print media on its third level and features state-of-the-art facilities for radio and television on the fourth level.

42, took over as the Terps' head coach in December 1996 following five seasons as the top assistant for the Northwestern Wildcats, whose meteoric rise to national prominence included the school's first Rose Bowl appearance since 1949 and first conference championship since '36. Previously, Vanderlinden spent nine seasons as an assistant at Colorado, where he was part of a program that made six bowl appearances in a seven-year stretch, including a victory in the Orange Bowl to win the 1990 national

"I absolutely think Maryland should be one of the premier programs in the country," said Vanderlinden on the day he was introduced as the Terps' head coach. "We have a beautiful campus in a great location, first-class facilities and an impressive stadium, a supportive administration committed to winning, and a large fan base with enthusiastic boosters. These are the essential ingredients necessary for success."

Since arriving in College Park in the winter of '96, Vanderlinden has been tireless in his efforts to awaken the Terrapins' grid fortunes, focusing on his twin goals of "graduating all of our players and winning the [conference] championship."

Those were similar goals during his days at Northwestern, where he served as Gary Barnett's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator from 1992-96. In that span, a moribund Northwestern program — one that hadn't had a winning season in more than 20 years — was transformed into a two-time Big Ten Conference champion and Rose Bowl participant. The Wildcats won five league games in the first three seasons, but then went 15-1 in conference play on way to capturing consecutive Big Ten titles in 1995 and '96. Northwestern played USC in the 1996 Rose Bowl and Tennessee in the 1997 Citrus Bowl.

At Northwestern, Vanderlinden was the chief architect of a defensive unit that in 1995 finished first nationally in scoring defense (12.7 ppg) and third nationally in turnover margin (+1.82 pg). In '96, the Wildcats finished 19th nationally in turnover margin. In addition to heading up Northwestern's defensive efforts, Vanderlinden oversaw the inside



linebackers and punt return unit. The Wildcats were among the nation's top 10 punt return teams three times, finishing first in '92, fourth in '93 and ninth in '95.

During his tenure at Northwestern, Vanderlinden recruited and coached several of the most outstanding players in school history. Under his guidance, Northwestern's Pat Fitzgerald was the 1995 and '96 Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and a two-time All-American. Fitzgerald also was named the Chuck Bednarik and Bronko Nagurski national defensive player of the year in '95, as

well as the national defensive player of the year by Chevrolet and *Sports Illustrated*.

The success enjoyed on the field by the Wildcats was congruent with Vanderlinden's philosophy of high academic achievement. Northwestern earned recognition by the College Football Association as one of the exemplary academic programs in the nation.

Vanderlinden came to Northwestern alter coaching Colorado's defensive line for nine years (1983-91). He also served as the Buffaloes' recruiting coordinator for two years (1985-86). While at CU, he coached three All-Americans and five first team All-Big Eight selections. In addition to winning the 1990 national championship, Colorado captured three Big Eight titles (1989, 1990, 1991) and played in six bowl games. From 1985-91, Colorado's delensive unit was considered among the best in the country, ranking No. 10 for fewest touchdowns allowed, 11th in fewest points allowed and 18th in total delense.

Only three years after his arrival in Boulder, the Buffaloes advanced to their first bowl game in nine seasons. All told, CU would make six bowl appearances during Vanderlinden's final seven seasons on the staff, including the 1990 campaign, when the Buffs won the national championship.

It was Vanderlinden's hands-on experience in two successful and stunning rebuilding efforts which attracted him to Maryland athletic director Deborah A. Yow.

"Ron won unanimous support of our selection committee, and that was great because he was always my top choice," said Yow. "Everyone has said that he is a dynamic coach, that he is knowledgeable, a relentless recruiter and a tireless worker. He's done twice what we want a coach to do: build up a program. And the rebuilding jobs were at good academic schools in Colorado and Northwestern. Based on those credentials, he

was an early front runner."

Vanderlinden began his full-time coaching career at Ball State University in 1982, where he worked with the offensive line for two years. From Ball State he moved to Colorado, then to Northwestern.

As a graduate assistant coach, he began his coaching career at Bowling Green State University under Denny Stolz in 1978. He then moved on to the University of Michigan, where he was a graduate assistant in 1979 and '80 on Bo Schembechler's staff. During his time in Ann Arbor, Michigan participated in both the Gator and Rose bowls.

Said Bill McCartney, former head coach at Colorado: "Ron is a student of the game. He brings energy and fire to the game. I expect Maryland to be a physical and very versatile football team. I expect them to run with authority and pass with continuity. On defense, I expect they will play with an aggressive, challenging style."

Vanderlinden earned his bachelor's degree from Albion (Mich.) College in 1978. A fouryear starter at center, he was a two-time first team all-conference selection, earning the honor as a junior and senior, when Albion posted undefeated seasons. Albion also participated in the first Division III playoff game in school history. He also earned three varsity letters in baseball.

A native of Livonia, Mich., Vanderlinden and his wife, Lisa, have a daughter, Chelsea, and a son, Reid. Vanderlinden is one of seven children born to Pete and the late Mary Vanderlinden. Pete was one of 14 children born to Belgian immigrants of Dutch descent.

Defensive Coordinator Inside Linebackers



Wally Ake, who has been a part of 12 bowl teams during an 18 year major college coaching career, is in his second season as the Terps' defensive coordinator. Ake, who handled defensive ends last season, is overseeing the inside

linebackers in 1998.

Ake joined Ron Vanderlinden's staff in 1997 after a three-year stint as defensive coordinator at Rice University, where he helped lead the Owls to a 7-4 record and a secondplace Western Athletic Conference Mountain Division finish in 1996. In 1994, Rice's defensive unit finished among the nation's top 25 in four categories as the Owls captured a share of the Southwest Conference title. In addition to coordinating Rice's defense from 1994-96, he coached the Owls' defensive line (1996) and the inside linebackers (1994-95).

Ake previously worked in the Atlantic Coast Conference when he served as Clemson's inside linebackers coach from 1990-93. Under Ake's defensive leadership, the Tigers participated in the 1993 Peach Bowl, the 1991 Citrus Bowl and the 1990 Hall of Fame Bowl. Clemson's 1990 squad ranked first in the nation in total defense, while the 1991 team was ranked No. 1 against the rush.

Prior to his stint at Clemson, Ake spent six years on the coaching staff at University of Arkansas, where he coached the defensive line from 1984-88 and the linebackers in 1989. During his time in Fayetteville, the Razorbacks captured two consecutive Southwest Conference titles (1988-89) and played in bowl games all six seasons, including the Orange Bowl (1986) and the Cotton Bowl (1988-89).

Ake, 48, is a 1972 graduate of the College of William & Mary, the same school at which he launched his college coaching career in 1979. He graduated from Falls Church (Va.) High School in 1968. He later spent five seasons on the coaching staff at Falls Church, serving as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach from 1974-77 and as head coach in '78. After starting his college coaching career at College of William & Mary in '79, he moved on to Arkansas as a graduate assistant in 1980 before serving a three-year stint (1981-83) as defensive line coach at the U.S. Air Force Academy.

He and his wife, Chris, have one son, Aaron.

Craig Johnson

Offensive Coordinator Quarterbacks



Craig Johnson, who coached alongside Ron Vanderlinden during the resurgence of Northwestern's football program, is in his second season as the Terps' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. A former starting

quarterback at the University of Wyoming, Johnson last year tutored Brian Cummings, whose completion percentage (60.4%) was the seventh-best in University of Maryland history. At Northwestern, he oversaw the Wildcat quarterbacks for five seasons, including quarter-

back Steve Schnur, who was the Big Ten's pass efficiency champion in 1996, and Len Williams, who finished his career as the fifthleading passer in conference history. All told, he coached three Wildcat quarterbacks to All-Big Ten honors in five seasons.

Johnson has coached on four teams that advanced to bowl games, including Northwestern squads that played in the 1996 Rose and 1997 Citrus bowls. He also coached in the 1985 Peach Bowl while at Army and the 1984 Liberty Bowl while at Arkansas.

Prior to his stint at Northwestern, Johnson served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for three seasons (1989-91) at Virginia Military Institute. During that time, the VMI offense ranked fifth nationally in total

offense in 1990 and first nationally in rushing offense in 1991. VMI's quarterback, Tony Scales, ended his career as the second-leading rusher among quarterbacks in Division I-AA history.

Johnson entered the collegiate coaching ranks as a graduate assistant at his alma mater,

RON VANDERLINDEN ON CRAIG JOHNSON: "As I received head coaching inquiries, the first person I contacted was Craig Johnson, whom I had worked with five previous years at Northwestern University. During our five years together it was easy to see that Craig was one of the bright young offensive minds in football. Craig's coaching and development of the Northwestern quarterbacks played a large role in the two Big Ten championships we won together at Northwestern. He is an outstanding teacher and football strategist. Craig is thorough in his preparation and is a great family man. Maryland's offense is in great hands under his leadership."

Wyoming, in 1983. After one season on the Cowboys' staff, he joined Arkansas' program as a graduate assistant in 1984, when the Razorbacks played in the Liberty Bowl. In 1985, he was a part-time assistant running backs coach at Army. Johnson then moved on to Rutgers, where he served as running backs coach for three seasons (1986-88).

Johnson was a three-year letterwinner as a quarterback at Wyoming, throwing for more than 1,100 yards and seven touchdowns in a starting role his senior season of 1982.

Johnson, 38, and his wife, Darlene, have two daughters, Shelby and Sydney.

Rubin Carter

Defensive Line



Former NFL lineman Rubin Carter, who played for the Denver Broncos from 1975-86, is in his second season as Maryland's defensive line coach. Carter joined the Terrapins' staff in 1997 after spending the previous two seasons in a similar

capacity at San Jose State under John Ralston.

A prototype nose tackle during a long and successful career in the National Football League, Carter was a durable pro who appeared in 166 games over the course of his 12-year NFL career. At the time of his retirement, he played in more games (152) at nose tackle than any other NFL player in history, and his 166 games played tied for the fifth most in team history. He totaled 1,036 tackles, including 33 sacks, during his professional career. Carter, who was featured on the cover of Sports Illustrated in 1977, missed just two games from 1975-85, a remarkable achievement for a nose tackle. Highly regarded as a strong emotional leader during his Broncos' career, he was Denver's nominee in 1986 for the Ed Block Memorial Award of Courage.

After retiring from pro football in 1986, Carter remained in the Broncos' organization as a defensive line coach from 1987-89, where he tutored four All-Pro defensive linemen: Simon Fletcher, Rulon Iones, Karl Mecklenburg and Greg Kragen. He was a part of three Super Bowl teams while with Denver — as a coach in Super Bowl XXIV and as a player in Super Bowls XXI and XII.

A 1975 graduate of the University of Miami, Carter was the Hurricanes' most valuable player in 1973 and a Kodak, UPI and Associated Press All-American in 1974. He was named MVP of the 1975 Hula Bowl. He was a

fifth-round draft choice in 1975 by the Broncos.

Carter was inducted into the Ft. Lauderdale Hall of Fame in 1981 and the University of Mi'ami Sports Hall of Fame in '92.

Carter, 45, and his wife, Karen, have one daughter, Diandra, and three sons, Andre, Alvin and Joshua. Andre began his major college football career at the University of California in the fall of 1997.

Wide Receivers



Mike Gundy, a fouryear starting quarterback at Oklahoma State who still figures prominently in the Cowboys' record book, joined Maryland's staff in 1997 as wide receivers coach. Prior to his arrival in College Park, Gundy spent one sea-

son as an assistant coach at Baylor (1996) and six seasons as an assistant coach at Oklahoma State (1990-95). At Baylor, Gundy was the Bears' passing game coordinator and quarterbacks coach; at Oklahoma State, he started out as wide receivers coach, took over as quarterbacks coach in 1992, and was elevated to offensive coordinator in 1994.

During his four seasons as a starting QB at Oklahoma State (1986-89), Gundy established most major school passing records and finished his career as the Big Eight's all-time leader in total offense. A three-year team captain, Gundy led the Cowboys to a cumulative record of 29-14 as a starter. Major school records set by Gundy included passing yards in a game (429) and season (2,203); career (58.3 percent) and season (64.8 percent) completion percentage; and completions in a game (27) and season (170).

Gundy, who shared the same backfield with two of football's greatest tailbacks (Barry Sanders and Thurman Thomas), helped lead the Cowboys to back-to-back 10-2 seasons in 1987 and '88. Oklahoma State defeated West Virginia in the '87 Sun Bowl and Wyoming in the '88 Holiday Bowl. His 2,163 passing yards in '87 ranked him second in the NCAA. That same year, Oklahoma State led the nation in touchdowns (70) and points scored (522). Gundy was selected to play in the 1990 Japan Bowl following his senior season.

The 30-year-old Gundy and his wife, Kristen, have one son, Gavin. Gundy's brother, Cale, was a four-year starting quarterback at Oklahoma.

Tight Ends/Offensive Tackles



Bob Heffner, whose father, Fred, played for the Terps' national championship team in 1953, is in his second season on Maryland's coaching staff. The Terps' tight ends coach in 1997, he had his duties expanded in the offseason to include the

offensive tackles.

Heffner, who brought 17 years of coaching experience with him to College Park, joined the Maryland staff after serving as offensive line coach at Northern Illinois in 1996. Heffner coached at Lafayette College for a total of five seasons on two separate occasions prior to Northern Illinois. He was Lafayette's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 1993-95 and offensive line coach in 1988-89. During his time at the Easton, Pa., school, Lafayette claimed Patriot League championships in 1988 and '94.

Between his coaching stops at Lafayette, Heffner spent four years in the professional ranks. He served as the director of player personnel and offensive coordinator for the Arena League champion Tampa Bay Storm in 1993 and as offensive line and running backs coach for the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League.

During his time with British Columbia, the Lions' Doug Flutie was voted the CFL's Most Valuable Player after setting the league record for passing yards in a season, and Jim Mills was named the league's Most Valuable Offensive Lineman in 1990 and '91.

Heffner began his collegiate coaching career with Illinois State as the interior defensive line coach in 1981 before taking over as offensive line coach during a seven-year stay with the Redbirds. Under his guidance, Illinois State had two offensive linemen earn All-American recognition and eight claim first team all-conference honors. In addition, three backs posted 1,000-yard rushing seasons.

A 1979 graduate of Temple, Heffner earned three letters as an offensive guard and played on Owl teams that made Mirage Bowl appearances in '77 and '78. He began his college coaching career at his alma mater in '79, helping the Owls to a Garden State Bowl victory over California that same year.

Heffner, 42, and his wife, Nancy, have three daughters, Katie, Molly and Shelby.

Son of former Indiana head coach Bill Mallory, Doug Mallory is in his 11th season coaching at the collegiate level. He began his coaching career in 1988 as a graduate assistant at Indiana before taking an assistant coaching job for one season (1989) at Army. He then moved on to Western Kentucky for a four-year stay, spending his last two seasons as defensive coordinator. Under his guidance, the Hilltoppers' defense finished 18th nationally in final statistical rankings in 1993.

As a player, Mallory totaled 182 tackles and six interceptions at Michigan during his fouryear career. The Wolverines played in four major bowl games — the Sugar, Holiday, Fiesta and Rose — and shared the 1986 Big Ten championship during his five-year stay. As a senior co-captain, he earned second team All-Big Ten honors and honorable mention Associated Press All-America recognition after finishing second on the team in tackles (71).

A 1988 graduate of Michigan with a degree in sports management and communications, Mallory, 33, and his wife, Lisa, have two daughters, Emily and Allison.



Elliot Uzelac, a former

Uzelac brought 31 years of coaching experience with him to College Park — 30 at the collegiate level and one in the NFL. He most recently served as offensive coordinator/offensive line coach at the University of Minnesota in t997.

Prior to Minnesota, he worked the 1995 and '96 seasons as associate head coach and offensive coordinator at the University of Kentucky, where he oversaw a Wildcats' unit that committed just 16 turnovers in '95, fewest in school history. In addition, the Wildcats' 30 touchdowns in 1995 were the most since 1984 and the 24 rushing TD's were the most since 1974. The Wildcats' 1995 roster included tailback Moe Williams, who rushed for 1,600 yards, established three SEC records and set 15 school marks that season.

From 1993-94, he served as offensive coordinator at Colorado, directing a CU unit that led the Big Eight in total offense both seasons and set or tied 55 school records. Colorado's 1994 offense was led by Heisman Trophy winner Rashaan Salaam and Kordell Stewart.

A 1964 graduate of Western Michigan, Uzelac also has coached for the Cleveland Browns (1992), Ohio State (1991), Indiana (1990), Navy (head coach 1987-89, assistant coach 1971-72), Michigan (1982-86, 1973-74), Western Michigan (head coach 1975-81), and Bowling Green (1968-70, 1965). Among the coaches he has served under include Bo Schembechler, Bill McCartney, Don Nehlen and Bill Mallory.

During his seven seasons as head coach at Western Michigan, he guided his alma mater to more Mid-American Conference victories than any coach in school history to that point. He was named MAC Coach of the Year in 1976. Uzelac later served a three-year stint as head coach at the U.S. Naval Academy.

Uzelac earned a master's degree in physical education from Bowling Green in 1966. He and his wife, Wendy, have two children, Lisa and Nick, and one granddaughter, Jordan.

Jay Robinson assumed duties as director of football operations in April 1998 after spending the previous 24 years as either a player or coach at Towson University. His administrative responsibilities with the Terps include

A 1979 graduate of Towson, Robinson joined the Tigers' coaching staft on a part-time basis upon graduation before moving into a full time position in 1983. In five of his final six



seasons at Towson, he coordinated a high-powered offensive attack that generated better than 400 yards and nearly 30 points per game. Towson finished in the top 10 nationally in total offense four times in his six seasons as offensive coordinator, including second in 1993. Terps Enter Year 2 of Ron Vanderlinden Era

Youth was served a year ago when the University of Maryland opened up the Ron Vanderlinden era, and it's certain to be on the Terrapins' plate again in '98.

Maryland lists 24 freshmen or sophomores on its preseason two-deep, f0 of whom will enter fall camp No. f at their respective positions. A year ago, in Vanderlinden's inaugural season as head coach, 13 freshmen — true and redshirt — saw significant playing time, including nine who started at least one game.

This season, as Vanderlinden and Co. continue their efforts to rebuild the Maryland program, the second-year coach says a shortage of depth at a number of positions will mean early playing time for several underclassmen.

"We've had a productive off-season and spring practice," says Vanderlinden, who knows all about rebuilding Division I-A football programs, having been intimately involved in successful turnarounds at both Colorado and Northwestern. "Particular improvement has been made physically at most positions. But a lack of depth will require several of our underclassmen — including freshmen — to vie for significant playing time, including starting positions."

Offensively, the major task facing the Terps will be replacquarterback ing Brian Cummings, who was at the controls for most of the past three seasons and figures prominently on major Maryland passing lists. Sophomore running back LaMont Jordan is a prominent returnee who will be joined by three starters on the offensive line and most of the wide receiver corps.


Defensively, Maryland will feature one of the nation's top linebacker duos — Kendall Ogle and Eric Barton, who finished 2-3 in the ACC in tackles a year ago — but must revamp both the front four and secondary units.

A difficult schedule awaits the Terps, who faced the nation's 22nd-most demanding slate (according to the Sagarin Ratings) last season. All told, Maryland is scheduled to face five teams coming off bowl appearances, and seven which posted winning records in '97. The opposition's cumulative .562 winning percentage in '97 is the second-highest among ACC schools.

A breakdown of the Terps by position:

Quarterback: A pair of juniors — Ken Mastrole and Trey Evans — are expected to resume their spring battle this fall for the right to replace Brian Cummings, who started 25 games over the past three seasons and finished his career listed among the top five on most major school passing categories.

Mastrole, a 6-3, 225pounder, saw limited duty as a sophomore in '97 after starting three games in 1996. He holds a significant edge in game experience over the other quarterbacks, having thrown 108 career passes as a Terp. As a sophomore last season, Mastrole made seven relief appearances and threw 19 passes while backing up Cummings, who is now playing in the CFL. Two years ago Mastrole became the first quarterback in school history to start as a redshirt freshmen when he took the field vs. West Virginia. He went on to play a

total of eight games in '96, completing 36 of 89 passes for 354 yards and one touchdown before breaking his collarbone vs. Duke.

"Ken has the only game experience and the most practice reps of the quarterbacks on our roster, and he will be given every opportunity to step up and assert himself in this role," says Vanderlinden.

Evans, also a fourth-year junior, has seen scant duty as a

Terp but has positioned himself for a run at the starting job by improving his arm strength, accuracy and ability to run the offense.

"Both players made significant progress learning and executing the new Maryland offense during the spring," says Vanderlinden. "Mastrole has a strong arm and better than average mobility for a player his size. Evans demonstrated the ability to make

plays under pressure in the spring."

Behind Mastrole and Evans are a pair of redshirt freshmen, Gil Harris and Erik Lipton, and incoming freshman Calvin McCall (Orlando, Fla.).

Running Back: Sophomore LaMont Jordan, last year's runner-up for ACC Rookie of the Year honors, headlines the Terps' stable of running backs. A 5-11, 214-pounder out of Forestville, Md., Jordan is coming off a rookie campaign in which he established Maryland freshman standards for rushing yards (689) and attempts (159). His 689 yards ranked eighth nationally among true freshmen running backs, and his 920 all-purpose vards led all ACC freshmen.

Jordan, a 1998 preseason All-ACC selection who accounted for 71 percent of the Terps' rushing yards last season, became the first rookie in Maryland history to register two 100-yard rushing games, turning the trick in games vs. Temple (135) and North Carolina State (126). His effort in the win over Temple earned him ACC Rookie of the Week honors. Jordan averaged 4.3 yards per carry and finished third on the team with 22 receptions in '97.

"LaMont Jordan has demonstrated the ability, speed and power to be rated among the ACC's best backs," says Vanderlinden.

Behind Jordan at the tailback spot are junior Harold Westley and sophomore Mukala Sikyala, Jr. The 5-7, 178-pound Westley rushed for 421 yards and a pair of touchdowns as a freshman in '96 before being shifted to wide receiver last year. Now bigger and stronger, Westley has returned to his more natural running back position, where the Terps hope to take advantage of his breakaway speed. Sikyala, a walk-on, also figures to contribute at this spot after

a solid spring performance.

A newcomer to watch is Marc Riley, a 6-3, 205-pounder out of Coram, N.Y., who was rated among the Terps' top signees this past February.

At fullback, the Terps return a pair of lettermen in sophomore Matt Kalapinski and junior Kenny Rogers. The 6-1, 225-pound Kalapinski, a tough inside runner and tenacious blocker, is back after picking up valuable playing experience as a true freshman, when he made four starts while appearing in all II games. Rogers, a 5-9, 198pounder, is a versatile back who can also be utilized at the tailback spot. Also on the depth chart at the fullback position are Frank Mentzel and incoming freshman Chad Killian, an all-state choice out of Pittsburgh, Penn.

Wide Receiver: The Terps return seven lettermen who totaled 89 catches for 1,195 yards and seven touchdowns last season. Leading the way is redshirt sophomore Moises Cruz, who topped the team in receptions (29) and receiving yards (337) in '97. Cruz, who was not charged with a drop last season, had at least four receptions in five games in '97, including a season-high six grabs (for 91 yards) vs. Ohio.

Cruz enters fall camp listed No. 1 on the depth chart at the slot position, where he is backed up by returning twoyear letterman Bruce James and one-year letterman Keon Russell. James, a 5-8, 173pound senior, has totaled 47 catches for 511 yards and one touchdown in his career, but has been hampered by injuries.

At flanker, junior walk-on Jermaine Arrington moved to the top of the depth chart following an impressive spring showing. A 5-9, 172-pound junior who has the speed to get deep, Arrington showed flashes of big-play potential during spring drills.

Pushing Arrington at the flanker spot will be three returning lettermen: sophomore Omar Cheeseboro,

senior Kendrick Walton and sophomore Doug Patterson. Cheeseboro, who was slowed in the spring by a pulled hamstring, is expected to be one of Terps' top playmakers in '98. Last year, the 6-2, 190-pound Cheeseboro led the team in

touchdown catches (4) while finishing tied for fourth on the squad in receptions (14) and second in average yards per catch (14.7). Two of his four TD receptions came vs. North Carolina State.

Walton, a three-year letterman, rates as one of college football's truly inspirational stories in '98. The 6-2, 181 pounder missed the end of the '97 season and all of spring drills after developing a cancerous tumor in his mouth, but opted to return for his final collegiate season even though it means playing without most of his lower teeth. which had to be removed during surgery. Patterson is a true sophomore who totaled nine catches and averaged 13.7 yards per catch as a freshman in '97.

Sophomore letterman Jason Hatala, a 6-0, 174pounder, heads the depth chart at split end, where he is backed by fellow sophomore Curtis Jones. Hatala last season averaged 20.4 yards per catch on 11 receptions, totaling a Maryland freshman record 129 receiving yards in a victory over Duke.

Incoming freshmen who will get a look from the coaching staff are Maurice Shaw (Suitland, Md.) and Guilian Gary (Horseheads, N.Y.).

Tight End: The Terps have improved themselves at this position with the addition of Wisconsin transfer John Waerig, and the development of sophomore Mike Hull and redshirt freshmen Eric James and Matt Murphy. True freshman Todd Wike, one of the prominent signees in the Terps' 1998 recruiting class, joins the fold following a stellar prep career in Lebanon, Pa.

Waerig, a 6-2, 261-pounder, played the 1995 and '96 seasons at Wisconsin before transferring to Maryland, where he redshirted the '97 campaign. A tough, physical tight end, he is an outstanding blocker and above-average receiver who figures to be an impact player for the Terps in '98.

Hull, who has added weight and strength in the off-season, was one of the Terps' top freshmen a year ago, making 10 starts and totaling 13 catches for 185 yards and one touchdown. James and Murphy, both of whom continue to progress in the Maryland system, return after redshirting in '97.

Offensive Line: The coaching staff is expecting significant improvement from the Terps' offensive front, which returns three starters from a year ago. "Our intent," says Vanderlinden, "is to put the best five linemen on the field, so there could possibly be several position changes before we settle on a starting unit. We are looking for ability, toughness, and a relentless attitude."

Anchoring the offensive line is 6-7, 299-pound senior John Feugill, an 11-game starter at right tackle in '97 who has had 23 starting assignments during his Maryland career. A preseason All-ACC choice by Athlon, Feugill "was the most consistent performer on the 1997 offensive line and is looked to be the leader in that group this season," says Vanderlinden.

The Terps also return starters in 6-2, 271-pound sophomore Ben Thomas and 6-5, 284-pound junior Brad Messina. Thomas, an 11-game starter at center as a redshirt freshman, "has the ability and now the experience to assert himself as one of the better centers in the ACC," says Vanderlinden. Messina, an 11game starter at left guard, has shifted to left tackle where the coaching staff wants to take advantage of his size and athleticism in their bid to replace Darryl Gilliam, who made 32 starts during his four-year

Maryland career. Backing up at the tackle spots are threeyear letterman senior Ryan Rezzelle (6-8, 282), redshirt freshman Mike Sherman (6-4,302) and sophomore Brett Trammell (6-5, 295).

At right guard, 6-3, 292pound junior letterman Jamie Wu leads the race to replace the departed Pat Ward, a 22game starter during his Terrapins' career. Wu is backed by 6-5, 284-pound redshirt freshman Chris Snader and 6-4, 290-pound sophomore Timm Howard. At left guard, 6-3, 278-pound junior Eric Timothy and 6-4, 287-pound redshirt freshman Mike George are waging a close battle for the starting job.

Three freshmen newcomers include guard Bob Krantz (Clifton, Va.), center Sam Marvis (Greenshurg, Pa.) and tackle Matt Crawford (Moravia, N.Y.).

Defensive Line: Junior nose tackle Delbert Cowsette is the lone returning starter on a defensive front that is undergoing some major reconstruction. The Terps must replace three senior starters from a year ago, including Eric Ogbogu, a sixth-round draft choice of the New York Jets who was the South teJm's defensive MVP in the Hula

"Having lost starters in Eric Ogbogu, Eric Hicks and Johnnie Hicks, all of whom saw their eligibility expire, there will be an opportunity for several young players to step up and fill the gaps," says Vanderlinden.

Cowsette, 6-1, 270, is a key returning veteran the coaching staff will look to for leadership and performance. An II-game starter in '97, Cowsette led the Terps in tackles for losses (10) and ranked fifth on the squad in total tackles (63) last season. He has appeared in 22 games and recorded more than 100 tackles during his career. He is backed by 6-3, 267-pound redshirt freshman Melvin Fowler, Jr.

At the other inside position is sophomore letterman Kris Jenkins, a 6-5, 282-pounder who showed vast potential while logging some significant playing time as a true freshman in 1997. Jenkins saw action in all H games last season, finishing the campaign

with 17 tackles. Behind Jenkins on the depth chart are redshirt freshman Derrick Jones, a 6-1, 257-pounder, and 6-2, 264pound sophomore Jason McCauley.

Manning the defensive end positions going into fall camp are senior letterman Rasheed Simmons and junior letterman Peter Timmins. The 6-5, 244-pound Simmons, a former Michigan transfer, was a five-game starter in '97 who totaled 32 tackles and a pair of sacks. The 6-3, 240-pound Timmins has been shifted to defense after starting much of last season at the H-back spot.

"Rasheed Simmons improved steadily throughout the '97 season and has a chance to emerge as a solid defensive end in the ACC," says Vanderlinden. "Timmins has shown the quickness and ability to get off blocks and make plays that you look for at that position."

Lending depth behind Simmons are 6-3, 237-pound junior Eric Calendine and 6-1, 246-pound redshirt freshman Albert Surman. Backing Timmins is 6-1, 238-pound junior Jomo Huggins and 6-2, 231-pound senior walk-on Chris Hayes. The Terps will also take a look at a host of newcomers on the defensive front, including Nate Rust, Jr.,

a junior college transfer from Lackawanna JC who is expected to be in the mix at a defensive end position. The other newcomers are all freshmen: 6-3, 235-pound Durrand Roundtree (Baltimore, Md.), 6-2, 245-pound Charles Hill (Palmer Park, Md.), 6-2, 255pound Todd Bradley (Yorktown, Va.) and 6-4, 220pound William Shime (Ft. Washington, Md.).

Linebacker: Maryland returns one of the nation's top linebacker tandems in seniors Kendall Ogle and Eric Barton, who finished 2-3 in the ACC in tackles last season. The pair combined for 272 tackles in '97 and have totaled 471 stops in their careers.

"Both are among the premier linebackers in the nation," says Vanderlinden of the Butkus Award candidates. "They possess the size, speed, tenacity and instincts to finish their careers as the top linebacker duo in the ACC, if not the country."

Ogle, the ACC's leading returning tackler, finished with 138 total stops in 1997, second only to Clemson's Anthony Simmons. He registered double-digit tackle efforts in nine of 11 games in '97, including a carcer-best 17 vs. Clemson. The 6-I, 231-pound Ogle, who takes a streak of 22 consecutive starts into '98, is backed by redshirt freshman Reggie Lewis and true freshman E.J. Henderson (Aberdeen, Md.).

Barton, a preseason second team All-American by Athlon and Bob Griese, enters his final collegiate campaign with 258 career tackles, including an ACC-best 85 solo efforts last season. A 6-3, 229-pounder who has made 23 career starts, Barton registered 48 tackles during one four-game stretch last season despite playing with a cast on his right hand. In 1996, he became only the second sophomore in school history to lead the team in tackles when he totaled 106 stops. Behind Barton on the depth chart are redshirt freshman Monte Graves and sophomore Jon Watkins.

At the bandit linebacker spot, the Terps were dealt a serious blow during spring ball when junior Erwyn Lyght, a nine-game starter who fin-

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ished sixth on the team in tackles in '97, was sidelined with a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee. Waging a battle to replace Lyght in the starting lineup are a pair of freshmen — 6-1, 225pound Ryan Swift and 6-1, 220-pound Aaron Thompson — who are coming off redshirt seasons.

Secondary: The Terps head into the '98 season minus the services of three starters, including free safety Lewis Sanders, prompting Vanderlinden to label this unit "the area of greatest concern on

defense and an area where we need to come of age quickly."

Sanders, the Terps' fastest player and most consistent defensive back last season, will sit out the '98 campaign while he continues to rehabilitate nerve damage in his right shoulder suffered in the season finale vs. Georgia Tech. A year ago, Sanders finished tied for third in the ACC in interceptions (4) and ranked third on the team in tackles (74). He also played an important role on special teams, ranking fifth in the ACC in kickoff return average (24.2).

Paul Jackson, a 5-11, 192pound two-year letterman, is expected to step in and replace Sanders at the free safety spot. Paul Jackson, who is backed up by 6-1, 202-pound sophomore Tony Jackson, saw significant playing time as a junior a year ago, totaling three interceptions and 27 tackles in 11 games. Tony Jackson saw limited playing time in '97 but has shown an ability to be a playmaker --- he had two interceptions last year and eight pickoffs this past spring.

Sophomore Shawn Forte, who missed the entire 1997 season with a broken leg, is bidding to replace departed strong safety Henry Baker, who finished fourth on the team in tackles (66) and shared the team lead in pass breakups last season. Forte is being pushed by redshirt freshman Chris Sanders, a converted cornerback. Four newcomers — true freshman Randall Jones (Frederick Md.), Tyrone Stewart (Washington, D.C.), Rod Littles (Gainesville, Fla.) and Marlon Moore (Brandywine, Md.) - are expected to provide help at the safety positions.

The corner positions entering fall drills are manned by a pair of two-year lettermen: junior Lynde Washington and senior Cliff Crosby, both of whom came out of spring ball ranked among the most

improved players in their unit. Washington, a 5-8, 175pounder who started seven games a year ago, registered 37 tackles and three pass breakups in '97. The 5-10, 172pound Crosby, a four-game starter in '97, totaled 28 tackles in six games. Backing up at the corner positions are senior letterman Quinzy Fraser and juniors Bryn Boggs and Mike Castleberry. The Terps will have two newcomers at cornerback: Renard Cox, a junior college transfer out – of Lackawanna IC in Pennsylvania, is expected to step in and make immediate contributions, and true freshman Tony Okanlawon of Forestville, Md.

Kicking Game: Sophomore kicker Brian Kopka returns after sharing the team lead in scoring (30 points) last season. Kopka, who became only the third true freshman to kick for the Terps, took over the placekicking chores in the season's fourth game and went on to convert six of 10 field goal attempts and 12 of 13 PAT tries in '97. Kopka earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors following the Duke game, when he connected on all three of his field goal attempts in a 16-10 Maryland win. Pushing Kopka for the starting placekicking chores is senior Brad Rhodes, a three-year letterman who has made 10 of 11 PAT attempts and 2 of 6 field goal tries during his career.

Senior Russ Edwards is back as the team's starting punter after posting a 38.0yard average as a junior in 1997. Edwards will be challenged for the starting job by third-year sophomore Sean Starner, who saw limited action last season.

Back to handle the longsnapping duties are sophomore Scott Rudolph and junior John Helmer.

RALEIGH, N.C. — The Terps scored 21 of their 28 points after intermission, but it wasn't enough to overcome a 31–7 halftime deficit in an eventual 45-28 loss to North Carolina State. Maryland trailed 31-0 just prior to halftime, when senior quarterback Brian Cummings brought the Terps to life with a 46-yard touchdown pass to redshirt freshman Omar Cheeseboro on the final play of the half. It was the first of two TD receptions by Cheeseboro, who also was on the receiving end of a 31-yard scoring pass from Cummings in the fourth quarter. True freshman LaMont Jordan rushed for 126 yards to become Maryland's all-time leading freshman rusher. Cummings was 11 of 22 for 161 yards and three touchdowns.

Jordan, who led all ACC freshmen in rushing yardage, broke his own school record for rushing attempts by a freshman when he carried the ball 25 times vs. the Yellow Jackets. Jordan, who opened the game's scoring with a four-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, just missed attaining his third 100-yard rushing game of the season. Jordan's touchdown was set up by an Eric Hicks fumble recovery — the first of three fumble recoveries on the afternoon by the Terps, who, despite winning statistical battles for time of possession (32:15 to 27:45) and takeaways (4-2), could not overcome a 501-yard offensive output by Georgia Tech. The Jackets were led by QB Joe Hamilton, who threw for 265 yards and three touchdowns.

FINAL SEASON NOTES

The Terrapins completed Year No. 1 of the Ron Vanderlinden era with an overall mark of 2-9 and an Atlantic Coast Conference record of 1-7.

Maryland's victories in 1997 came on consecutive weekends — a 24-21 win in Philadelphia over Temple and a 16-10 victory in College Park vs. ACC foe Duke.

Linebackers Kendall Ogle and Eric Barton finished 2-3 in the ACC tackle race. Ogle had 138 tackles to finish second in the ACC, Barton had 134 to finish third. LaMont Jordan of Forestville, Md., established Maryland single-game and single-season freshman rushingyardage records. Newcomers played a major role for the Terps in '97, with 13 true or redshirt freshmen seeing action during the season. Head coach Ron Vanderlinden earned his first career major college coaching victory with a 24-21 win over Temple on Sept. 27.

Quarterback Brian Cummings Earns Team MVP Honors

Senior quarterback Brian Cummings was elected MVP by his teammates after posting personal bests for completions (154), attempts (255), yards (1,760) and touchdown passes (10) in 1997. He also finished his career in the school's top five for the aforementioned categories. The three-year starter's 60.4% completion rate was the seventh-highest single-season total in Maryland history. Cummings finished his four-year career by completing 344 of 594 passes (57.9%) for 4,080 yards and 22 touchdowns.

LaMont Jordan Shatters Terps' Rookie Rushing Standards

True freshman LaMont Jordan impressed the entire ACC with his powerful rushing game in 1997. Jordan led all ACC freshmen in rushing yards (689), attempts (159) and all-purpose yards (920). His 689 yards also ranked fourth in the conference. His season totals for yards and attempts were Maryland freshman single-season records, and he also established Maryland freshman single-game marks for yards (135, vs. Temple) and attempts (25, vs. Georgia Tech). He also became the first freshman in school history to have two 100-yard rushing efforts in a single season. Jordan accounted for 71% of the Terps' rushing yards in 1997. He was named ACC Rookie of the Week Sept. 29 following his 135-yard effort vs. Temple.

Ogle/Barton: Maryland's Bookend Linebackers Finish 2-3 in ACC Tackles

Juniors Kendall Ogle and Eric Barton combined to form the most prolific linebacking duo in the ACC. Ogle and Barton, Maryland's starting outside backers, finished 2-3 in the ACC tackle race, combining for 272 stops in 1997. Ogle's 138 stops were a team-high and second only to Clemson's Anthony Simmons (144). Barton finished with 134 total tackles, including a team-high 85 solos. With Clemson's Simmons declaring for the NFL draft, Ogle and Barton are the ACC's leading returning tacklers. Both Ogle and Barton were Butkus Award nominees in '97.



Terps in the Hall of Fame

BOB WARD


National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

Bob Ward weighed all of 165 pounds throughout his four-year playing career at Maryland and, even in the early 1950s, that was no size for a lineman. Especially a lineman who was a first-team All-America middle guard on defense as a junior in 1950 and a first-team offensive guard as a senior in 1951.

The forte of the Maryland teams of the early 1950s was consistency—a winning consistency. During Ward's four years, the team was a combined 32-7-1, winning two bowl games (1949 Gator over Missouri, 1951 Sugar over Tennessee to complete a perfect 10-0 season).

The awards and honors Ward earned as a Maryland player belie physical stature, but speak volumes about the man. He was the MVP of the 1949 Gator Bowl, Maryland's first bowl victory. He was the only player ever to earn All-America honors as both an offensive and defensive position player. He earned Southern Conference Player of the Year honors as a senior and was chosen Lineman of the Year by the Washington Touchdown Club and the Philadelphia Sportswriters Association in 1951.

JACK SCARBATH

National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

Jack Scarbath is an integral part of Maryland football history. In his first start, the All-America quarterback scored the first touchdown in the new Byrd Stadium, a 21-yard run in the first game of the 1950 season.

Scarbath was the quarterback for head coach Jim Tatum's new Split T offense for three seasons (1950-1952). Scarbath led the Terps to a 24-4-1 record, including a perfect 10-0 record and Sugar Bowl victory in 1951. In that time, he rewrote the Terrapin record books. Scarbath completed 125 of 260 passes for 2,287 yards, an average of 18.3 yards for every completion.

After his senior season, Scarbath finished runner-up to Oklahoma's Billy Vessels in the voting for the Heisman Trophy, was a first-team All-America quarterback and a first-round draft choice of the Washington Redskins.

He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 1983.

JIM TATUM

• National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

In a brief time as a college football head coach—one season at North Carolina (1942, 5-2-2), one at Oklahoma (1946, 8-3, Gator Bowl victory over North Carolina State) and nine years at Maryland (1947-55, 73-15-4, 2-2-I in bowl games)—Jim Tatum had become a coaching legend.

Tatum's teams from 1950-1955 were 51-8-2, with a perfect 10-0 record and Sugar Bowl victory in 1951. The squad marked 10-0 regular season records in 1953 and 1955 before both teams were upset by Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl, with the 1953 team the declared national champion.

Tatum left to return to his alma mater, North Carolina, in 1956.

He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 1984.

STAN JONES

Pro Football Hall of Fame

Stan Jones was the starting right tackle on the Terp defense that allowed only 31 points during 10 regular season games in 1953. With Jones leading the way, Maryland recorded six shutouts and allowed only one team, Georgia, to score more than six points. He earned All-America honors that season and was chosen "Outstanding College Lineman of 1953" by the College Football Coaching Board.

After his All-America career as a Terp, he served 13 years in the National Football League. He played for the Chicago Bears for 12 seasons and finished his career as a Washington Redskin.

"I was very prepared for the NFL when I left Maryland," Jones said. "From my coaches who taught me football to my professors who taught me anatomy, physiology and weight training, I received a great education. I couldn't have picked a better place to go — they picked me and there was not a better place to be."

Stan Jones was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 27, 1991.

DICK MODZELEWSKI

National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

Outland Trophy Winner

Through three All-America years at Maryland and 14 All-Pro years in the National Football League, Dick Modzelewski was always "Little Mo." At 6-0, 235 pounds during his playing days at Maryland, he was one of the bigger collegiate linemen during the early 1950s. He was the second Mo at Maryland, so he had to be "Little" to his older brother Ed, "Big Mo."

Dick Modzelewski played three years as defensive tackle for the Terps on the great teams which were 24-4-1. He would become Maryland's first winner of a major national honor when he received the Outland Trophy as the nation's top lineman in 1952.

Through his career at Maryland, the Terps fashioned a 22-game unbeaten streak. The "Little Mo" led defense allowed only 147 points with only four teams scoring better than a touchdown while six were shut out.

At the end of his senior season, Modzelewski was named to every All-America team and was awarded the Outland Trophy. He was a second-round draft choice of the Washington Redskins, while teammate Jack Scarbath was the Redskins' first pick. He spent 14 seasons in the National Football League, splitting time with the Redskins, the Pittsburgh Steelers, the New York Giants and Cleveland Browns. Modzelewski was an All-Pro and on NFL Championship teams with both the Giants (1956) and the Browns (1964). After retirement, he became a defensive line coach for Cincinnati, helping the Bengals to the 1982 Super Bowl.

Dick Modzelewski was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 1993.

RANDY WHITE

- National Football Foundation

Randy White changed the look of football's defensive lines. At Maryland, and later in an All-Pro National Football League career with the Dallas Cowboys, he was regarded as the quickest defensive lineman to play the game. He could be in an opponent's backfield before a quarterback could make a hand-off.

In 1974, Randy White cleaned up the college football awards plate. He was honored with the Outland and Lombardi trophies as the top collegiate lineman, was ACC Player of the Year, was an

unanimous first-team All-America choice, named the Delaware (his home state) Athlete of the Year and named the Amateur Athlete of the Year by the Philadelphia Sportswriters Association.

A first round draft choice of the Dallas Cowboys (the second player selected overall), White was an All-Pro performer throughout his career and shared Super Bowl MVP honors with Dallas teammate Harvey Martin when the Cowboys defeated Denver in Super Bowl XII.

No one else will wear "94" at Maryland—Randy White's number has been retired.

He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994.

BOB PELLEGRINI

• National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

Bob Pellegrini was recruited to Maryland as a quarterback, but made his name as one of college football's best linemen. In his first season, Pellegrini was a 6-2, 215-pound sophomore guard for the 1953 national champion Terrapins. He would play guard again in 1954 in an era when players went both ways, before being switched to center for his senior year to fill a Terrapin void.

As a senior, Pellegrini led Maryland to its second 10-0 regular season and ACC championship in three years as the Terps defeated defending national champion UCLA. He was selected ACC Player of the Year, named consensus All-America and pictured as Herman Hickman's cover boy for Lineman of the Year in 1955.

Pellegrini led the Terps to a 27-4-I record over his career, with rankings in the Top 10 each season. He was the first pick in the National Football League draft by the Philadelphia Eagles. Pellegrini became one of the building blocks of an Eagle turnaround that took the team to the top of the football world. A losing team when he joined, the Eagles defeated Vince Lombardi's

Green Bay Packers for the World Championship four years later with Bob Pellegrini at linehacker. Bob Pellegrini was inducted

into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in December 1996.


National champion Maryland and 18th-ranked Duke tied for the ACC's inaugural grid title. The Terps finished the regular season with a perfect 10-0 record, including a 3-0 mark in league play. Maryland, which lost to Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl, 7-0, scored 298 points, the most by a team until 1967, while allowing an ACC record-low 31 points. The Terps led the nation in rushing defense, 83.9 yards allowed per outing, and scoring detense, 3.1 points per game. Terp tackle Stan Jones earned consensus All-America honors while teammate Bernie Faloney was named first-team Academic All-America.

Maryland led the nation in defense against the rush, allowing 83.9 yards per game. Maryland had a 15game win streak snapped with a 20-6 loss to Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl. Terp center Bob Pellegrini was a consensus All-America.





For the third straight year, the Terps took part in postseason competition, defeating Florida, 13-0, in the Gator Bowl. Maryland, which led the league in total offense with 375.2 yards per game, set an ACC single-game total offense mark with 802 yards in a 62-24 victory over Virginia, November 22. Maryland's John Schultz was the nation's top kickoft returner with a 31.0 average.


Maryland's powerful Terrapins swept through the regular season undefeated and became only the second team in ACC history to win three consecutive league titles outright. Coach Jerry Claiborne's club ran its conference victory string to a record 20 straight. The Terps appeared in a bowl for the fourth straight year, losing to Southwest Conference champion Houston, 30-21, in the Cotton Bowl. Maryland tackle Joe Campbell and Wake Forest defensive back Bill Armstrong were consensus All-Americans. Maryland's No. 8 ranking in the final AP poll was the first Top 10 finish by an ACC team since 1960.

Maryland pocketed the championship for the sec ond year in a row and earned its fifth outright crown over the past 11 seasons. The title was not decided until the season's final weekend when the ferps knocked off Virginia, 45-34, for the league crown. Maryland, taking part in its third straight bowl game, defeated Tennessee in the Sun Bowl, 28-27, while Virginia, making its first-ever bowl game appearance, defeated Purdue in the Peach Bowl, 27-24. Maryland, trailing Miami, 31-0, at the half, rallied for 42 second half points to beat the Hurricanes, 42-40, setting a record for the greatest comeback in NCAA Division 1A football history.



Gambino's three scores propelled Maryland to a 20-7 lead, but Georgia reeled off 13 points in the fourth quarter to tie the game. The Bulldogs threatened to win the game in the closing seconds, but time ran out with Georgia on Maryland's four-yard line. Despite the tie, there was no question as to the game's most valuable player. Gambino won the Burkhalter Award, signifying the game's outstanding performer. Gambino was inducted into the Gator Bowl Hall of Fame in 1992.

University of Maryland

The Campus

The University of Maryland, College Park, is the most comprehensive institution of higher education, research and service in the state. The university offers 100 undergraduate majors, 88 master's programs and 69 doctoral programs in 13 colleges and schools.


The university is one of only 30 public research universities that are members of the prestigious 58-member Association of American Universities. It is classified as a Research-1 university by the Carnegie Foundation by virtue of the range of its bacprograms, the calaureate amount of federal support received and the number of doctoral degrees awarded each year, sharing that honor with the top research universities in the country.

Among the public universities in the Association of American Universities, Maryland ranks among the top in percentage of African-American undergraduate students. In addition, the university has the largest number of African-Americans and other minority members among its peers.

History

The University of Maryland was founded in 1807 in Baltimore as a faculty-owned College of Medicine. The medical school was considered one of the top schools in the country, attracting notable professors and lecturers from throughout the world. In its beginning, tuition cost \$140, grades were sent home weekly to parents, and students could obtain room and board for \$300 annually.

Five years later, the growing institution was renamed the University of Maryland. Despite the name, the university was not considered a state institution as it was still owned and operated by the faculty. Baltimore College of Dental Surgery, the first den-

tal school in America, became part of the university in 1840, awarding the first Doctor of Dental Surgery (D.D.S) degree in 1841.

In 1859, the Maryland Agricultural College, which would evolve into the University of Maryland, College Park, was opened under a charter secured by a group of Maryland planters in 1856. In addition to spending one hour each day hoeing or plowing on the college farm, students took a broad range of courses in ancient and modern languages, natural sciences, English and mathematics. After a disastrous fire on campus in 1912, the state acquired the college and rebuilt it.

In 1920, the state legislature combined the College Park institution with the professional schools in Baltimore to form an expanded University of Maryland. The entity eventually grew to include campuses in Baltimore County, on the Eastern Shore and the worldwide University College, a continuing education institution.

The following decades saw the increasing growth of student population, excellence in programs and curricula and the burgeoning of the University of Maryland, College Park, into a nationally recognized research institution.

July 1, 1988, marked the dawn of a new era in higher education for the state of Maryland, as the five components of the university were merged with six other state universities and colleges to form the University System of Maryland, and College Park secured its flagship status with a mandate to become one of the pre-eminent research universities in the nation.

Research

The unique role of American research universities in advancing science and technology has kept the United States in the forefront of innovation and product development. Research dollars from federal and state agencies, corporations and foundations fuel much of the basic and applied research activity of the University of Maryland's faculty and graduate students.

The university has unique

facilities, research centers and institutes that attract new research projects and funding, as well as provide expanded knowledge in business, science and technology. The A. James Clark School of Engineering houses the Glenn L. Martin Wind Tunnel — the most advanced aerodynamic testing facility of its kind on any university campus — and the Neutral Buoyancy Facility, which simulates weightlessness for space research, the only such facility on a university campus. Other specialized facilities include: Computer Vision Laboratory; Bioprocess-Scale up Laboratory; Laboratory for Ion Beam Research and Application; Superconductivity Research Center, Laboratory for Plasma and Fusion Studies; Psycholonguistics Laboratory; Computer-Assisted Cartographic Laboratories; Developmental Psychology Laboratory and the Center on Aging.

Service

Programs of public service are central to the overall mission

of the university. The philosophy is reflected in the wide array of programs and initiatives that benefit the state's business, agriculture and education communities.

With more than 90 high technology firms in the three-county area of Montgomery, Prince George's and Frederick counties, the university has found abundant opportunity to extend its business and technology outreach programs to the region. Many of these programs are part of the Engineering Research Center, which operates the Technology Advancement Program and the Maryland Industrial Partnerships, programs designed to provide Maryland entrepreneurs and small businesses with research facilities. technical assistance, administrative support and access to technology that will advance their economic base.

The Institute for Systems Research has formed partnerships with major corporations, including Lockheed Martin, Westinghouse, BF Goodrich, Hughes Aircraft and Dupont to apply advanced systems research to solving industry problems in the fields of communications, manufacturing, controls and robotics.

The University of Maryland features a diversity of cultural and recreational activities. Four art galleries, more than 200 annual musical performances and countless dance and theater productions, expose audiences to the broadest range of programs in the arts. And intercollegiate, club and intramural sports provide students of all levels an opportunity to participate as spectators or athletes.

The Libraries

The seven libraries at the university constitute the largest university research library institution in the Washington metropolitan area, providing vital resources to researchers, visiting scholars, and businesses throughout the region. The libraries' holdings include more than 2.5 million volumes, 24,000 subscriptions to periodicals and nearly 5 million items available in microfilm format. University libraries also offer several nationally and internationally recognized special collections such as the International Piano Archives at Maryland, the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the National Public Broadcasting Archives.

The Alumni

Graduates of the university go on to distinguished careers in many fields. Chosen from thousands of qualified alumni, an inaugural group was inducted into the University of Maryland Alumni Association Hall of Fame in 1995. They included 21 outstanding individuals who have brought, and continue to bring, great honor to their almamater. Their achievements are as varied as their lives, but they all have one thing in common: a degree from the University of Maryland, College Park.

University Traditions

Testudo is a Diamondback turtle. Like some other famous personages born into the Depression of the 1930s, the derivation of his name is cloudy. But it is likely that his moniker is derived from the scientific classification for turtle (testudines). Or the top turtle could be named after testudo gigantia, a species native to the African nation of Sevchelles and one of its remote islands, Aldabra. Or the name could have come from a dictionary definition that says the word, testudo, was derived from the Latin and meant a shelter held over the head of Roman soldiers -like a tortoise shell. These explanations are a long way from the Chesapeake Bay where the Diamondback lives.

When Testudo had his coming out on May 23, 1933, he was thrown into a world filled with intimidating mascots-Wildcats, Tigers, Devils, Wolves, Bears-thought up over a halfcentury of intercollegiate competition. The University of Maryland, College Park, was consolidated from different state schools in 1920 to form the base of today's wide-ranging state system, and the remodeled Maryland needed a flag carrier to do battle with Wahoos, Lions and Generals.

Dr. H.C. Byrd, a football coach who later became university president, recommended the Diamondback as mascot in 1932 in response to the student newspaper's search for an "official" leader. Byrd's childhood in Crisfield, Md., apparently included skirmishes with this brand of snapping turtle, indigenous to the Chesapeake Bay. The school paper was in fact already called the *Diamondback*, and when the Class of 1933 stepped forward with the idea of giving the university a permanent bronzed version as its graduation gift, Testudo was in to stay.

Maryland had been referring to itself as Old Liners, yet another name whose derivation no one seems sure of. Historians are in a skirmish over whether the nickname is a reference to a Revolutionary War Troop of

Maryland soldiers who distinguished themselves on the field of battle, or they feel it could refer to a squabble with Pennsylvanians over just where the border between the two states should be.

The Class of '33 raised money for casting a Diamondback by holding its senior prom on campus to save money on expenses. And the yearbook and Student Government Association chipped in. Edwin C. Mayo, Class of '04 and a former quarterback, donated at cost the 300pound bronzed beauty as President of Gorham Manufacturing in Providence, R.I. Robert J. Hill cast the inspired sculpture accomplished by company artist Aristide Cianfrani. Further turtleization came when the student yearbook, The Reveille, became The Terrapin in 1935. Newspapers, even then exploring every angle, shortened Terrapin to Terp for headline writing ease when it wasn't trying to cram Old Liner into a single column head. The name was in place; now came the stuff of legend.

The Stuff of Legend

The nicely thought out plans that made Testudo an instant hit did have a flaw. Putting Mr. T in front of the campus gym, Ritchie Coliseum, exposed Testudo to every road agent wearing enemy colors. Ritchie was right on U.S. Route 1, then the principal North-South highway along the Eastern Seaboard. When a less dignified opponent needed something extra against the turtle and his troops, they practiced emotional blackmail, and kidnapped him.

That was not the worst of it. They painted his golden skin enemy colors, and defaced his pedestal which was only to have

the block M on it. Instead, opponents painted illegitimate JH's or GW's or V's or NC's on his nest. A riot took place when Johns Hopkins students kidnapped the handsome reptile in 1947; 200 police were called to the Baltimore campus to control the justified anger of College Park students. Two years later, the nifty shelled crusader was found on the lawn of a University of Virginia fraternity house, whose occupants smugly called President Byrd with the message to get Testudo off their lawn. Of course Byrd obliged, and soon after Testudo was hidden in the campus carpentry shop where he was less inspirational, but a whole lot safer.

The second stadium bearing Byrd's name was built in 1950, and in 1951 Testudo, sans coats of rivals' paint, took his perch in front of the Byrd Stadium football team house. He had beaten back all who would wrong him, and to make sure he would not travel again, he was fed 700 pounds of cement and had his body attached to a new pedestal by long steel rods.

With his permanent nesting came success for Maryland. Acting as guardian to waves of Terp competitors, the national football championship came, as did several ACC titles in the 1950s. His popularity among the students might have been the undoing of success, however. When McKeldin Library was constructed in the middle of campus, the student body demanded Testudo's full-time presence in the center of day-today activities. Testudo had gone far beyond being just a symbol for athletics. He was a campus symbol. Students carefully carried him up the hill to the main College Green and the library, and he was bolted to a new bed of stone in the early 1960s.

Coincidence or not, football

did have a downturn in the 1960s with Testudo absent. In the 1970s, when a costumed Testudo started to roam the sideline, success was returning. The furry Testudo reigned over unrivaled ACC football prowess, and sent Terps out to the four corners of the football world for bowls and intersectional clashes.

In 1992, a bronze duplicate to Testudo was created and installed just outside the new Football Complex and taken back to Meisner's factory where the first duplicate was created using the Lost Wax method.

While Testudo was being copied by Meisner Co. in front of McKeldin, the research library was undergoing exten sive refurbishment. As part of the new interior and exterior McKeldin received, the original Testudo was given a new pedestal and his bronze coat

was



locker room door. As the football team takes

the field the team congregates around the bronze Terrapin, and then all touch his nose for good luck. In 1995, Testudo was again duplicated as a bronze Terrapin statue was placed in Cole Field House as part of the lobby refurbishment.

Joel Meisner Co. of Farmingdale, N.Y., created the duplicates. Two men spent two days in June of 1992 pouring a rubberized material over Testudo as it sat in front of McKeldin Library, followed by a wax mold on top. After a day to let the molds set, the wax was broken and easily removed. The rubber mold, which actually recreated Testudo, was painstakingly peeled away from the bronze cleaned. The Class of '33, which created Testudo in the first place, used its 60th reunion to dedicate the rejuvenated campus symbol.

Sixty-five years ago, the Diamondback Turtle Gorham used as a model for the shelled wonder had a ribbon attached to it at the dedication. The ribbon was tied to the canvas covering the statue. The Diamondback moved forward, and revealed the splendor of his larger, bronzed brother. But no one rushed the smaller Diamondback in his duties. All in attendance were true believers who knew what many unfaithful have discovered about Terrapins. They bite.

University President

Dr. C.D. Mote, Jr.

Dan Mote was appointed 27th president of the University of Maryland June 2, 1998. He comes to Maryland from the University of California, Berkeley, where he was Vice Chancellor of University Relations, President of the UC Berkeley Foundation, and held an endowed chair in Mechanical Systems.

"The Regents could not be more pleased with this appointment," said Lance Billingsley, chairman of the University System of Maryland Board of Regents. "Dr. Mote brings to the University of Maryland the national stature, record of accomplishment, and leadership abilities to build on [former university president] Brit Kirwan's legacy and to propel this institution into the top tier of American research universities. A man of impeccable credentials, he is widely recognized for his ability to form strategic alliances between the academy and the community. I can think of no one better to take over the helm of our flagship university."

Mote, 61, was named to the vice chancellor's position and foundation presidency at UC Berkeley in 1991. In those capacities, he has been responsible for working with the university's external constituencies through a variety of programs, including fund raising, government relations, publications and public information. In 1992 he launched a comprehensive, campus-wide campaign to raise \$1.1 billion in private support by the year 2000.

From 1987 to 1991, Mote served as chair of Berkeley's Department of Mechanical Engineering, leading the department to its No. I ranking in the National Research Council review of graduate program effectiveness. He came to Berkeley in 1967 after three years on the faculty of Carnegie Institute of Technology. He has held research positions at the University of Birmingham (England), the Norwegian Institute for Wood Science and Technology, the Technical University of Darmstadt, and the Tokyo Institute of Technology.

His technical expertise is in the areas of dynamic systems, instrumentation, vibration, and biomechanics. He is internationally recognized for his research on gyroscopic systems and also the biomechanics of skiing injury. His research work has yielded 300 publications as well as patents in the U.S., Norway, Finland and Sweden.

He is a registered professional engineer in California and has served professional soci etics in a number of capacities. He was Vice

President of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers (Environment and Transportation Group) from 1986-90 and Vice Chairman of the ASME Council on Engineering in 1989-90. He was the founding chair of the ASME Noise Control and Acoustics Division and served from its inception in 1979 until 1983.

Among his numerous honors, Mote has received research fellowships from the National Science Foundation and from the Royal Norwegian Council for Scientific and Industrial Research. In 1971 the University of California, Berkeley gave him its Distinguished Teacher Award. In 1988 he was elected to the National Academy of Engineering in the U.S. and was awarded the Humboldt Prize by the Federal Republic of Germany. In 1997 Mote was chosen Honorary Member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the highest award bestowed by this society, for exemplary accomplishments in the course of his career.

Mote holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in mechanical engineering and a Ph.D. in engineering mechanics, all from the University of California, Berkeley.

Athletic Administration

Deborah A. Yow, Director of Athletics

The University of Maryland athletic department has made remarkable progress under the leadership of Deborah A. Yow over the past four years. Budgets are now balanced and the inherited operating debt of almost \$7 million has been paid in full. There is a spirit of excitement and pride at Maryland and the department has a clear vision for its future.

In her inspiring first meeting with the staff, shortly after she was named A.D. in the summer of 1994, she challenged the Terrapin athletic department to "raise our sights and sharpen our tools...to work hard and work smart...to recognize that our only limitations are those which we place upon ourselves."

Deborah Yow has rallied the department toward the achievement of five strategic goals:

1) Generate significantly higher revenues through increased corporate sponsorships, aggressive marketing and more effective fund-raising;

2) Boost the graduation rate of Terrapin athletes to a level equal to the general student body;

3) Raise the level of competitive achievement nationally and in the Atlantic Coast Conference, while carefully complying with ACC and NCAA rules;

4) Develop a streamlined, highly efficient athletics organization;

5) Provide outstanding customer service.

In achieving most of these goals over her first four years as athletic director, Yow and her dedicated coaches, administrators and staff have re-engineered the department from a debt-ridden, under-achieving organization to a responsive and financially sound model - with a clear vision and a determined drive toward national prominence. Maryland now ranks in the top 10 percent of all NCAA Division 1 programs competitively across all sports, is competing effectively in the ACC, and set an enviable record of 154 All-ACC academic honor roll studentathletes. Corporate sponsorship revenues are up 265 percent and annual fund-raising for scholarships has increased 60 percent. Maryland is a remarkably improved athletic program.

In 1997, Debbie Yow formed the employee "Committee on Quality in the Workplace" to recommend initiatives to improve working conditions and to design programs to recognize the value of athlet-

ic department employees. This has proved to be a wonderful tool in recognizing the worth of our outstanding employees across the department. There is a compelling sense that the Terrapin athletic department is a family, with a common goal and a shared purpose.

Maryland's athletic director recently observed, "We have the finest coaches, support staff, and administrative team in America. It is because of their courage, hard work, and cooperation that we now have a strong, viable athletic program. I am immensely proud of each of them. I am equally proud of our Terrapin fans who buy tickets and our Terrapin Club members who faithfully support the Maryland athletic program with their donations for scholarships, and the Maryland Educational Foundation and M Club members who serve and give liberally. We have a great Terrapin family. That's the foundation for all our successes ... and the basis for our bright future."

Regarding the many achievements of the Terrapin athletic program, Debbie Yow says, "We are pleased, but we are not satisfied...our vision is to be one of the top 10 programs in the nation consistently...we see no reason to settle for less." Yow, who is a member of the NCAA Management Council and other prestigious national groups, is known for her goal-oriented and proactive management style. She consistently inspires and expects maximum effort from herself and those around her. Her words set the tone for everyone in athletics: "Winning isn't everything, but the will to win is." She points out that this applies in the classroom, on the field of competition, and in life.

Reflecting on the status of the Terrapin football program, Maryland's A.D. realistically points out, "The new coaching staff inherited a team which had to play an unprecedented 13 freshmen in 1997, with more than 50 percent of our points scored in the 1997 season coming from these young freshmen. We have launched a determined rebuilding program, with this year's team also starting many young players new to the lineup. With a clear vision and with high aspirations for Maryland athletics, the Terps prepare to enter the new century on a dramatic upward thrust. The athletics staff embraces this prospect, with gratitude for its successes and with renewed determination to further enhance the program's national stature. It has the skill and determined leadership to reach its lofty goals, as a part of this great university. And it will.

Terrapins No. 19 in Athletic Excellence

University of Maryland this past June achieved one of the major department goals of the Deborah A. Yow era by earning inclusion in the top 20 of the Sears Directors' Cup, the national all-sports ranking measuring overall athletic competitiveness.

In final standings released by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, the Terrapins' athletic program was ranked tied for 19th out of 306 Division I schools. It is the highest finish for the Terps since the rankings began, and Maryland's 38-

position jump from the No. 57 spot in the final 1994-95 rankings is the greatest in that time period by a school not previously ranked in the top 25. Maryland finished third among ACC schools in the 1997-98 rankings.

Since the end of Yow's first year as athletic director, when the Terps finished 57th in the rankings, Maryland has made remarkable progress in the Sears Directors' Cup. The Terps jumped 21 spots (to 36th) in Yow's second year, then climbed four more spots (to No. 32) after her third year.


She earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Maryland's College of Business and Management with a concentration in personnel and labor relations.

Curl and Terrell are part of the growing University Sports Medicine program of the University of Maryland Medical Center, which also provides medical care for the Baltimore Ravens of the NFL, UMBC, Coppin State University and 14 high schools.

Says Deborah A. Yow, Maryland's director of athletics: "When we recruit student-athletes to play for Maryland, we owe them the best education, the best coaching and the best comprehensive health care. Drs. Curl and Terrell are excellent physicians who understand college athletics. It is especially gratifying for us to partner with our medical center in the same fashion as other ACC institutions do with their medical schools, like North Carolina, Virginia, Duke and Wake Forest."

LEIGH ANN CURL, M.D. HEAD TEAM PHYSICIAN

Leigh Ann Curl, a former All-American basketball player at the University of Connecticut and a 1998 inductee into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame, is beginning her second year as Maryland's head team physician.

Dr, Curl, who is a member of the University of Maryland School of Medicine faculty as an assistant professor of orthopedic surgery, has performed volunteer work as team physician for USA Basketball, USA Rugby, Johns Hopkins University, St. John's University, the New York Mets and the New York City public schools recreation program.

She received her medical degree in 1989 from Johns Hopkins, where she served her internship and residency. She was a fellow in sports medicine and shoulder surgery at The Hospital for Special Surgery at Cornell University Medical Center in New York City.

Dr. Curl graduated summa cum laude from the University of Connecticut in 1985 and was her class valedictorian. She was a four-year starter on the women's basketball team, serving two years as team captain, and became the third women's basketball player in school history to score 1,000 points. She currently ranks 10th in career points and fifth in rebounds at UConn. A two-time GTE Academic All-America, Curl also was a two-time Big East Conference Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

TOM TERRELL, M.D. **PRIMARY CARE DOCTOR**

Tom Terrell, an Academic All-American basketball player at Jacksonville University in 1986, is beginning his second season as the primary care sports medicine doctor for Maryland's athletic program.

A member of the University of Maryland School of Medicine faculty as a clinical assistant professor of family medicine, Terrell was in private practice in Atlanta prior to joining the Terps' medical staff. He received his M.D. from Emory University Medical School in Atlanta and a Master of Philosophy in biological anthropology from the University of Cambridge in England. He was a fellow at Michigan State University in primary care sports medicine and a medical officer for the 1996 Olympics.

A former collegiate athlete, Terrell was an Academic All-American at Jacksonville University in 1986 when the Dolphins advanced to the NCAA Tournament. He also was selected the Sun Belt Conference Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year and was awarded an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.

Sandy Worth, who has been affiliated with Maryland's athletic program since 1973, coordinates and directs the medical care for the Terps' football program in addition to her responsibilities as the university's head athletic trainer.

A native of Timonium, Md., Worth supervises and schedules a professional staff of five full-time assistants and approximately 25 student trainers who combine to provide medical assistance to the university's more than 600 student-athletes. Worth, a 1973 graduate of Maryland, joined the Terps' staff that same year as an associate trainer. She was promoted to head trainer in 1992.

During her career at Maryland, Worth has worked directly with five teams that have captured national championships - four in women's lacrosse and one in field hockey. In addition, she was the trainer for the women's basketball program when it won eight ACC titles and advanced to three NCAA Final Fours.

A member of the National Athletic Trainers Association, Worth was the head trainer for the 1989 and '93 U.S. women's lacrosse teams which won World Cup championships.

MICHAEL MEYERS ASST. TRAINER

Michael Meyers is in his second year on the athletic training staff at the University of Maryland. He works directly with the football and women's basketball programs.

Meyers came to College Park from Morgan State University, where he was a member of the training staff for two years. A native of Woodbridge, Va., Meyers began his career in athletic training at Norfolk State University. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Old Dominion and his master's degree in health care administration from the University of Maryland, University College.

BRANT BERKSTRESSER ASST. TRAINER

Brant Berkstresser was named an assistant athletic trainer for football at the University of Marvland in October of 1997. Terrapin Club

Providing Scholarships for Today's Student-Athletes

What is the Terrapin Club?

As the scholarship fund-raising arm of the athletic department, the Terrapin Club is composed of approximately

4,500 members who contribute money annually to help pay the scholarship costs of our student-athletes. For many student-athletes, scholarships are the only means available to continue their education; for others, scholarships provide the opportunity to compete at the highest level of athletic competition in America's premier conference, the Atlantic Coast Conference.

With nearly 600 student-ath-

letes, 400 of whom benefit from scholarship support, the scholarship bill for the coming year is approximately \$4.5 million. For the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1998, the Terrapin Club contributed approximately \$2.8 million toward scholarships.

How Much Should I Contribute?

As a Terrapin Club member, you can contribute the minimum of \$125 or any higher amount. Your benefits of membership, however, do vary depending on your level and amount of contribution. The Terrapin Club is composed of seven levels of membership, ranging from the Top Terp level, where members contribute at least \$10,000 per year, to the Silver level, where members contribute \$125 per year.

What Benefits Do I Receive for Being a Member?

Members of the Terrapin Club directly assist the university in providing athletic scholarships. In addition, benefits of membership include priority seating for football and basketball, preferred parking, a monthly newsletter, and invitations to receptions and Terrapin Club events. Furthermore, you must be a member of the Terrapin Club to purchase men's basketball season tickets.

What Methods of Contributing are Available?

Direct gifts are the most common way of contributing. They are made in the form of cash, stock, checks or credit card (Visa or Mastercard). As a donor, you have the option of contributing once annually or periodically throughout the year. Also, you can now make your contribution via electronic bankdraft, where your account will be debited a set amount on the 10th of each month.

The University of Maryland Foundation (the depository for scholarship money) qualifies for most charitable matching gift programs. Please contact your employer to see if you are eligible for a matching gift program.

Is My Donation Tax Deductible?

Since your gift to the Terrapin Club provides you the right to purchase preferred seating for football and/or basketball, 80 percent of the total amount of your gift is tax deductible as a chari-

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table contribution for income tax purposes, according to Internal Revenue Service code, Section 170(m).

How is My Seat Location Determined?

Ticket assignments for football and basketball and all special events (the ACC Tournament, bowl games, etc.) are based on a point system designed to reward loyalty and total dollar contributions. Terpoints also are awarded for consecutive years of participation and referrals of new members.

The University of Maryland athletic department embraces the concept that the student-athlete is first and foremost a student.

Terp Choices

Terp Choices is a program designed to guide student-athletes by orienting, supporting and increasing awareness of the relevant issues pertaining to student-athletes in today's world. The focus of the program is making personal choices and how they may affect an entire team, not just a single individual. Education and interactive workshops are presented to the athletic team and are led by student educators.

The Mentorship Program

The Terrapin Career Mentorship program involves an alumni-based group of individuals who are interested in working with graduating student-athletes. The mentors aid students through the process of making the transition from college to the work world. Attempts are made to match the individual student-athlete with a mentor from the same field of interest. Mentors are asked to assist the student-athlete in preparing the necessary tools to make him or her a more competitive job sceker.

Internship Program

The Internship Program is offered every spring to student-athletes who have earned 40 and 80 credits. The goal is to secure local summer internships for all interested student-athletes in an appropriate field of study.

The Partnership Program

The Terrapin Partnership Program is made up of a group of faculty and staff members at the University of Maryland who are interested in working with student-athletes who have just begun the process of earning a college degree. Volunteers are matched with freshmen or sophomore student-athletes so that they can develop a primary contact person with whom they can share their questions or concerns about campus life, home life, and academics.

Career Information Fairs

Career Awareness in Academic Support is expanding to include a variety of programs which will be offered for student-athletes throughout the semester. Career awareness will be an ongoing process and will include assistance with resume writing and interview skills. The end of the semester will bring a career awareness fair which will host a number of professionals with whom student-athletes can learn about career interests and planning. Unlike typical "job fairs," the purpose of this program is to allow student-athletes to explore multiple career opportunities by speaking directly to individuals in their chosen area of interest.

Team Maryland

Team Maryland is a class taught in conjunction with the campus' Center for Political Leadership in which student-athletes are exposed to leadership and public speaking skills and techniques. The program consists of a group of volunteer student-athletes who learn about the challenges for children in the community by speaking to different elementary schools about drug abuse and the importance of education.

In conjunction with the campus' Center for Political Leadership, participants are taught leadership skills and public speaking techniques to use in their school-based presentation. In addition to school visits, Team Maryland has hosted visits from local schools to our campus.

Academic Support

Terp Tutors

Teaching Excellence and Recognizing the Potential for Success targets local elementary and middle school students and helps those who may be struggling in the disciplines of reading and math. Student-athlete volunteers visit local schools and provide free tutoring services. The program is designed to reach out to the community and help young people improve their school skills, self-esteem and awareness of the world around them.

Byrd Stadium

Home of the Terps

Byrd Stadium has been home to national championship football and men's and women's lacrosse teams, and to more than 50 ACC track and field champions. It hosted the Queen of England at a football game, and was the stage where the greatest high hurdler in history, Renaldo Nehemiah, performed his amazing feats. It also has been a regular site for the NCAA men's lacrosse Final Four, where several attendance records have been shattered.

Byrd Stadium — it's the firstclass home of the Maryland Terrapins.

Situated at the foot of the campus' North Hill, the stadium is named for Dr. H.C. Byrd, a multisport athlete as an undergraduate who later became head football coach and eventually served as university president. His vision gave University of Maryland preeminence among Eastern campus sports facilities for decades and the impetus for the Terrapins to win more ACC championships than any league school.

Since opening on Sept. 30, 1950, when Maryland defeated Navy 35-21 in the dedication game before a school-record crowd of 43,386 fans, Byrd has undergone a number of major facelifts, three of which occurred in the 1990s and have resulted in its present form. The first came shortly after the

1990 home season, when the Tyser Tower press box — a fantastic five-tier, 90-foot high, 160-foot long structure — was built on the stadium's south rim. Tyser Tower accommodates 300 exterior luxury suites, a hospitality suite with theater-style seating, a spacious working press area, television and radio booths, and a photo deck.

Construction has been completed on a beautiful new football complex — since named the Gossett Football Team House —

just beyond the east end zone. This \$7 million building houses football coaching offices and meeting areas, academic computer lab, locker rooms, weight facility, and a medical support area. A bronze Terrapin sits in front of the team house, its installation coming in 1992 as part of the celebration of the 100th year of football at the university. Following the 1994 campaign, Byrd's seating capacity increased by more than 12,000 to its current level of 48,055 when a massive upper deck was added on the stadium's northside. The cost for the latest renovation exceeded \$45 million.

The refurbishing of Byrd included new restrooms, bleachers and the stadium's first formal entranceway off of Field House Drive. The Gossett Football Team House, Tyser Tower, concession stands, rest rooms and stadium portals, designed by H.O.K. Architects of Kansas City, are enclosed in sand-molded brick that matches the Williamsburgstyle brick used on most of Maryland's 335 buildings. The brick gives the contemporary architecture a timeless veneer and unity with the university's traditional Georgian look.

Byrd Stadium Highlights

- 1950 Byrd Stadium is constructed at a cost of \$1 million. The original capacity was 34,680, but could be boosted to more than 50,000 with temporary bleachers around the rim of the stadium.
- 1953 Byrd is home to the national champion Terrapin football team.
- 1955 In a game billed as the "Best of the East" vs. the "Best of the West," Maryland defeated No. 1-ranked UCLA 7-0. Historians called that game one of the greatest of the decade.
- 1957 Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Phillip visited while former Terp head coach Jim Tatum returned to the scene of his greatest coaching triumphs. The Terps went on to upset North Carolina in what then head coach Tommy Mont later called his finest moment as coach.
- 1974 The legendary Bear Bryant returned to College Park with his third-ranked Alabama Crimson Tide on Sept. 14. Temporary bleachers were installed for only the second time in stadium history to accommodate 54,412 fans, then the largest crowd ever at Byrd. Later in the season, on Oct. 11, the second-largest crowd (49,674) in Byrd history watched the 15th-ranked Terps defeat 17th-ranked NC State 20-10.
- 1975 The Byrd Stadium attendance record of 58,973 was set when 14th-ranked Maryland hosted ninth-ranked Penn State.
- 1983 Byrd Stadium played host to its second-largest crowd, 54,715, as the 17th-ranked Terps met West Virginia.
- 1985 The Terps, ranked No. 1 in the preseason by Sport magazine, set the all-time school home attendance record, averaging 51,546 for six home games.
- 1990 Construction began following the last home football game of the season on what was the first major athletic construction on campus in 35 years. The Byrd Stadium refurbishment was the first of its kind to be done without the supervision of Curley Byrd.
- 1994 Following the end of the football season, renovations continued with the addition of an upper deck.
- Seating capacity is 48,055 an increase of 12,000 following the completion of the upper deck on the stadium's north side. As needed, bleachers can increase the seating capacity to 62,000.

Gossett Football Team House

Whether they are taking advantage of the academic computer lab, spacious weight room, or state-of-the-art sports medicine area, football players at the University of Maryland are provided the finest in facilities at the Gossett Football Team House.

Located at the east end of Byrd Stadium, the 46,000-square foot building is an all-purpose complex that combines football function with imaginative design. Truly the "home" of the football Terps, the \$7 million Gossett Football Team House features a first-class locker room, coaching offices, multiple meeting rooms, a strength and conditioning center, computer lab, medical facilities, audio-visual center, and equipment areas.






It was designed by the same firm (H.O.K. of Kansas City) that has performed the architectural work on some of America's premier collegiate and professional sports facilities.

Upon entering the main doors, student-athletes and visitors alike are greeted by an impressive reception area highlighting some of the great players and great moments in Maryland's storied football history. Nearby are coaching offices that overlook Byrd Stadium through oversized windows, as well as multiple meeting areas and conference rooms. A Terrapin Terrace, which surrounds the secondfloor offices, is available for outdoor functions.

On the lower level, student-athletes make their strength and conditioning home in the 7,000-square-foot strength center under skylights that reveal more than 12 tons of workout machinery. The spacious dressing area features a double locker and footlocker for every player. The layout of the ground floor allows easy access to the many amenities the building has to offer. The locker rooms, which house a sauna and shower facilities, are less than 100 feet away from the secondfloor conference areas. The nine conference areas are interconnecting and feature the latest in audio-visual equipment, some of which is available in only a handful of NCAA football programs.





Gossett Football Team House

As an integral part of the Byrd Stadium complex, the Gossett Football Team House is situated in the middle of campus and is within walking distance of dorms and dining areas. Both the practice fields and Byrd Stadium field are immediately outside the locker room door, or nearby. The steps leading down to the complex's front door face Cole Field House and the home of Maryland's outstanding academic support unit.

Each phase of the building—from the 3,500 square foot medical and hydrotherapy rooms, to strength center, to office suites—was designed to teach and support football excellence.

The building is named for Barry and Mary Gossett, long-time Terrapin supporters who have given generously to the athletic and academic programs at the University of Maryland.











Strength and Conditioning

In the highly competitive collegiate football world of the '90s, the off-field preparation of the student-athlete is a critical component to the on-field success of any Division I program. Dwight Galt, Maryland's director of strength and conditioning, believes strongly that a solid offfield training program can dramatically improve levels of performance, as well as significantly reduce the chance of injury. The benefit of performing structured strength and power training throughout the entire year has allowed the Terps to reach new levels in physical development.

At the University of Maryland, the maximal development of athleticism is the primary goal of the strength and conditioning program. To accomplish this requires more than just strength and power training in the weight room. Speed improvement, agility, flexibility, conditioning, plyometrics, and nutrition also play critical roles. The Terps' strength staff places substantial emphasis



Members of the Maryland football program follow a structured year-round weight training program.




The weight training facility in the Gossett Football Team House is more than 7,000 square feet in size.



on all these areas, with special attention on the improvement of speed potential. Galt and his staff employ a wide range of state-ofthe-art training methods to assist in enhancing all aspects of speed development.

The Terrapins are fortunate to train in one of the premier weight training facilities in the United States. Conveniently located in the Gossett Football Team House, this facility has excellent aesthetic appeal, with two magnificent skylights and large windows overlooking the playing field at Byrd Stadium. The Terps' spacious weight room includes 7,200 square feet of functional floor space, with two elevated offices that are easily accessible to the training floor.

Maryland football players train with some of the best equipment available, including 20,000 pounds of customized York free weights, seven pieces of Keiser progressive air resistance machines, and a full line of Hammer strength equipment. The weight complex also features immense, self-contained power rack stations, Olympic lifting platforms with Eleiko bumper plates, and 10 upper body pressing stations.

A meaningful goal of every Terrapin football player is achievement of the prestigious "Iron Terp" award, which is recognized twice year to those team members who achieve extremely challenging strength goals, based on body weight. It is a great honor and matter of pride to earn an "Iron Terp" award, and the Terps must "train to win" to accomplish this!

Atlantic Coast Conference

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 46th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 62 NCAA and AIAW championships, including 27 in men's competition and 35 in women's. In addition, 100 men and 24 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

The University of Maryland and the ACC had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when the Terps captured the first of what would eventually he four national football titles for the conference.

The ACC is one of only two conferences to capture three or more national football titles since 1980. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981, Georgia Tech followed suit in 1990, while Florida State pocketed national title No. 4 in 1994.

The nine schools that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have produced 334 first or second team gridiron All-Americans and 50 first team Academic All-Americans. ACC teams have had 1,387 players selected in the annual professional football draft, including 97 first round selections. A year ago, 154 players from the nine current ACC schools played in the NFI. during the regular season or playoffs.

If success is best measured in terms of wins and losses, then the ACC over the years has proved itself to be among the elite in Division I-A football. The ACC is the nation's second winningest bowl conference as the nine current league teams are a combined 79-67-5 (.540) in postseason play, including a 22-16-1 mark since 1987. Over the past eight years, the ACC is the only conference in the country to have each of its schools play in a bowl game.

Georgia Tech and Florida State rank among the nation's winningest bowl teams. Among teams with 20 or more bowl appearances, the Yellow Jackets are No. 1 with a 18-8 (.692) postseason record while the Seminoles are third at 16-8-2 (.654).

In the decade of the 1990s, ACC teams have posted the nation's second best non-conference record. Including both postseason and regular season games, the ACC is 176-92-4 (.654) vs. nonleague foes since 1990.

Over the past two years, the ACC has had more first round picks (15) in the annual NFL draft than any other conference. The SEC is second to the ACC with 14 first round picks, tollowed by the Big 12 (8) and the Big fast (7).

In 1997, the ACC had 16 players earn first, second or third team All America honors. The league tied with the Big 12 for the most consensus All Americans with six each. Over the past two years, the ACC has produced 10 consensus All Americans from four different schools.

1997-98 IN REVIEW

The 1997-98 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 29 national team titles the last seven years.

The ACC's 1997-98 national champions were Maryland in women's lacrosse and North Carolina in women's soccer and field hockey. In addition, the ACC had two other teams participate in national title games — Florida State in football and Maryland in men's lacrosse. Overall, ACC teams posted a 77-58 (.570) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 19 of the 24 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1997-98 season include 85 teams competing at NCAA Championships, four bowl teams and 19 top 10 showings.

Eight ACC teams, in six different sports, representing five of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was hroken for the 11th straight year in 1996-97 as 1,410 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference conducted championship competition in 24 sports during the 1997-98 academic year — 12 for men and 12 for women.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, hasketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Women's sports were initiated in 1977. Conference championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse and softball.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953 at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter memhers — Maryland, Clemson, Duke, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest drawing up the conference bylaws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On Dec. 4, 1953, conference officials again met at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The conference operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

Bowl Championship Series

Starting with the 1999 college football bowl season, the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) will determine the national championship.

The BCS will consist of the Rose Bowl, Sugar Bowl, Orange Bowl, and the Fiesta Bowl. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern.

The Bowl Championship Series differs from the original Bowl Alliance in that, for the first time, it will guarantee a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

Any Division I-A independent team or champion of the Western Athletic Conference or Conference USA which is ranked sixth or higher in the BCS standings will also be eligible for the Bowl Championship Series.

Otherwise, any Division I-A team can qualify for the BCS if they meet one of the following requirements:

- Has won at least eight college football games during the most recently concluded regular season excluding victories in exempted games.
- 1s ranked among the top 12 teams in the BCS final regular season standings.
- Is ranked in the final BCS regular season standings no lower than the lowest

During the 1999 bowl season, the Fiesta Bowl will host the national championship contest. The game will be played on Jan. 4 at 8 p.m. ET in Tempe, Ariz. The Fiesta Bowl shall select the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS will also mark the return of regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC or Big East champion in the Orange Bowl, and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS bowl games during the 1999 bowl season include the Orange Bowl on Jan. 2 at 8 p.m. ET, the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. ET and the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 5 p.m. ET.

ABC-TV has the broadcast rights to each of the four bowl games during the four-year contract.

Johnny Holliday, now in his 20th year as "Voice of the Terps," is considered one of the finest playby-play announcers in the country.

In addition to calling the action for the Maryland football and basketball teams, Holliday also hosts the Ron Vanderlinden and Gary Williams television shows. As the Terps' director of broadcasting, he also handles a myriad of speaking duties within the athletic department, ranging from banquets to alumni functions to golf outings.

His long list of credits includes ABC's coverage of the 1996 Summer Olympics and the Winter and Summer Olympics in 1984, 1988 and 1994. In addition, he has covered championship boxing, the Masters, the USFL Game of the Week, and the Liberty and Aloha bowls.

Holliday's announcing career allows him to lay claim as Washington's most versatile broadcaster, and among the

hest nationally. Whether it be in radio, where he was named America's No. 1 disk jockey during his rock 'n roll deejay days, to his public address duties with the Cleveland Browns, Oakland Raiders, and Golden State Warriors, to his work in Washington television for the Senators and Bullets, Holliday makes a complicated business look easy.

He brings that ease to the Maryland coach's television shows on Home Team Sports, the region's premier sports channel. If e also has been the host of Redskin general manager Charley Casserly's show and ACC Sports Sunday. He also does special events for HTS that include baseball, tennis, basketball and track and field. He is among the pioneer broadcasters for the sport of women's basketball, earning a Distinguished Service Award from ACC women's basketball officials for his work on that league's women's basketball telecasts the past seven years.

A native of Miami, Ela., Holliday began his broadcasting career in Perry, Ga., and through the years has worked in four of the nation's prime radio markets: Cleveland, New York, San Francisco and Washing-

From Baltimore (and north): I-95 south to exit 25B, College Park/U.S. Route 1 South. After approximately one mile, take a right-hand exit off of U.S. 1 onto Route 193 West. Go two traffic lights to Stadium Drive. Make a left onto Stadium Drive.

From BWI Airport: I-195 West to 1-95 South. Travel to exit 25B and follow the above directions to Byrd Stadium.

From National Airport: 1-395 North until it terminates at New York Ave. Make a right onto New York Ave. And exit at Maryland Route 295 (Baltimore/Washington Parkway). Exit at Maryland Route 193 West (Greenbelt Road) and follow straight for three miles to Stadium Drive.

From Washington/Richmond (and south): I-95 North to exit 25B, College Park/U.S. Route 1 South. Take the above directions to Byrd Stadium.

From Dulles International Aiport (and west): Dulles Toll Road to I-495 West. Take 495 West (Washington Beltway) for approximately 25 minutes to exit 25B. Take the above directions to Byrd Stadium.

When time permits, working credentials will be mailed. When this is not possible, they will be left at the Press Will Call entrance at the West Gate of Byrd Stadium.

PHOTO REGULATIONS: Photo passes will be issued only to accredited photographers on assignment. Photographers should obtain an armband from the media relations assistant on the field below Section 28 to gain admittance to the field. Under NCAA and ACC rules, photographers are not allowed between the 25yard lines and must remain outside of the restraining lines surrounding the playing field.

PARKING: Game day press parking is located in Parking Garage f, to the left of the back entrance to Cole Field House. The parking garage is best accessed from the Stadium Drive entrance to campus. Access is via pass only and is available on an extremely limited basis.

SERVICES: Complete team and individual statistics by quarter; play-by-play; and postgame notes and quotes will be provided to the working media. Scores of other college games are provided before, during and after the game. Fax machine service is available in the press box.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS: Head coach Ron Vanderlinden and selected players will be brought to the team meeting room on the second floor of the Gossett Football Team House for postgame interviews. The team room is accessed through the front door of the complex, located one level above the playing field. Please enter the glass doors and follow the hallway to the team room on the right. Interviews with the visiting team will take place in the weight room of the Varsity Team House, which is located outside of the stadium on the opposite side of the field from the Tyser Tower Press Box.

RON VANDERLINDEN INTERVIEWS: Coach Ron Vanderlinden will be available to the media at his weekly Monday noon media luncheons. Members of the media are invited conduct interviews with Coach 10 Vanderlinden at the weekly media luncheons, which are held on the second floor of the Tyser Tower Press Box. Coach Vanderlinden will also be available on the weekly ACC Teleconference, held each Wednesday. Contact Brian Morrison at the ACC Office (336-851-6062) or the University of Maryland Media Relations Office for the telephone number. Coach Vanderlinden also is available for interviews following practices.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: All player interviews must be arranged through Dave Haglund or Kevin Messenger. Players have been instructed not to participate in interviews unless they have been arranged through the Media Relations Office. Interviews will be conducted Monday through Thursday. No interviews will be allowed on Sunday or Friday. Player phone numbers will not be released, and members of the media are asked not to attempt to contact student-athletes on the telephone. Players are not available for live call-in radio shows.

PRACTICE COVERAGE: Practices are open to the media with few exceptions (Sunday practices are closed). Media wishing to attend practice should contact the Media Relations Office in advance. Once the teams goes into pads in the fall, photographers will be allowed to shoot warm-ups, stretching drills and the first two periods of practice. Team meetings before, during and after practice are private. Practices generally begin at 3:45 p.m. and conclude at 6 p.m. The team does not practice on Monday during the season.


