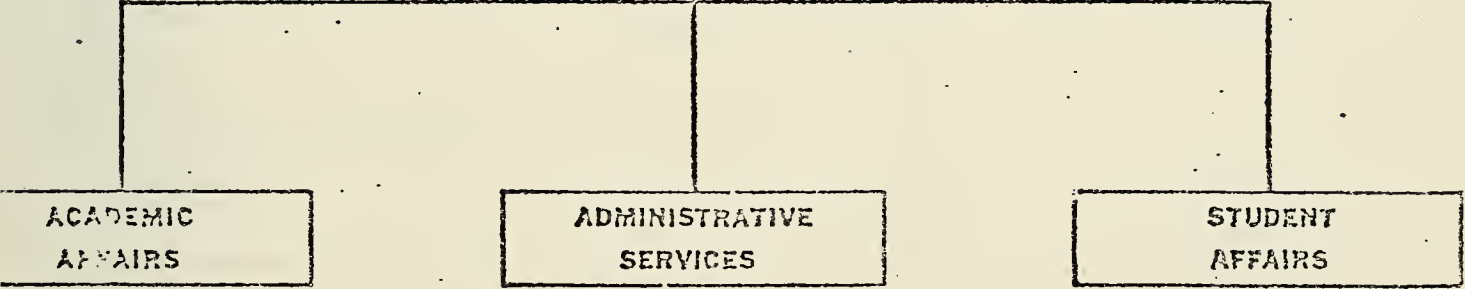

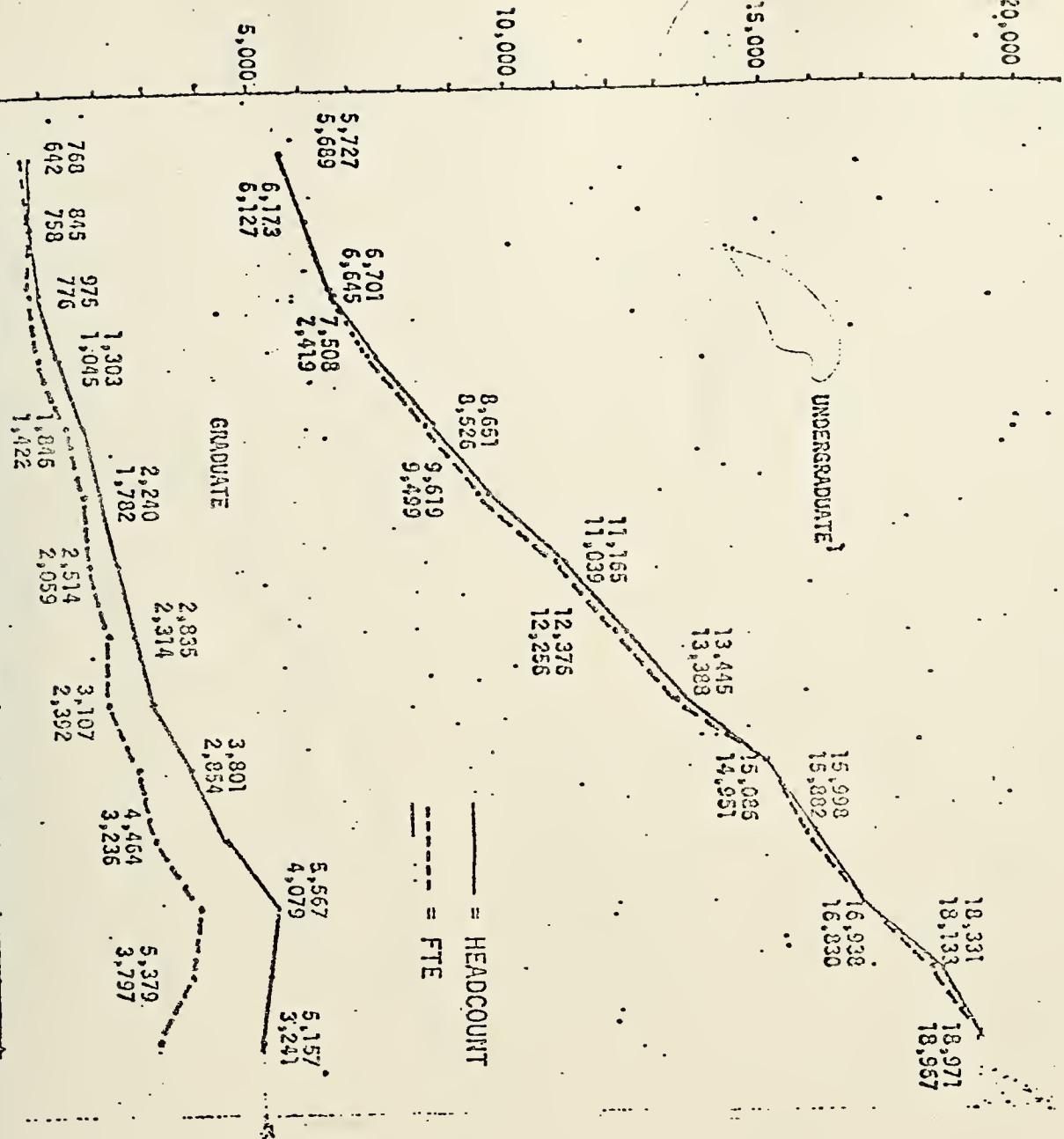

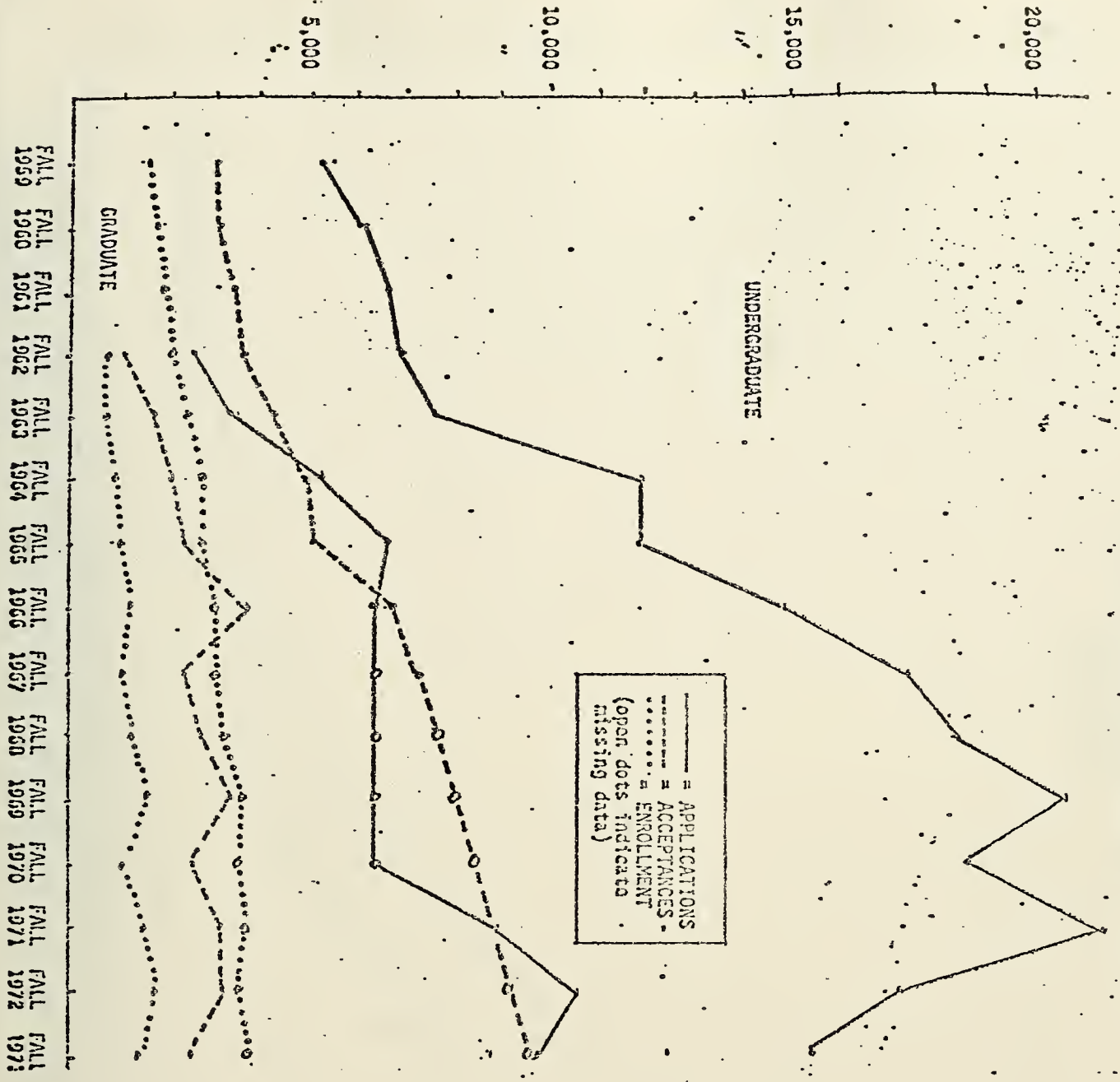

HEADCOUNT AND FTE ENROLLMENT



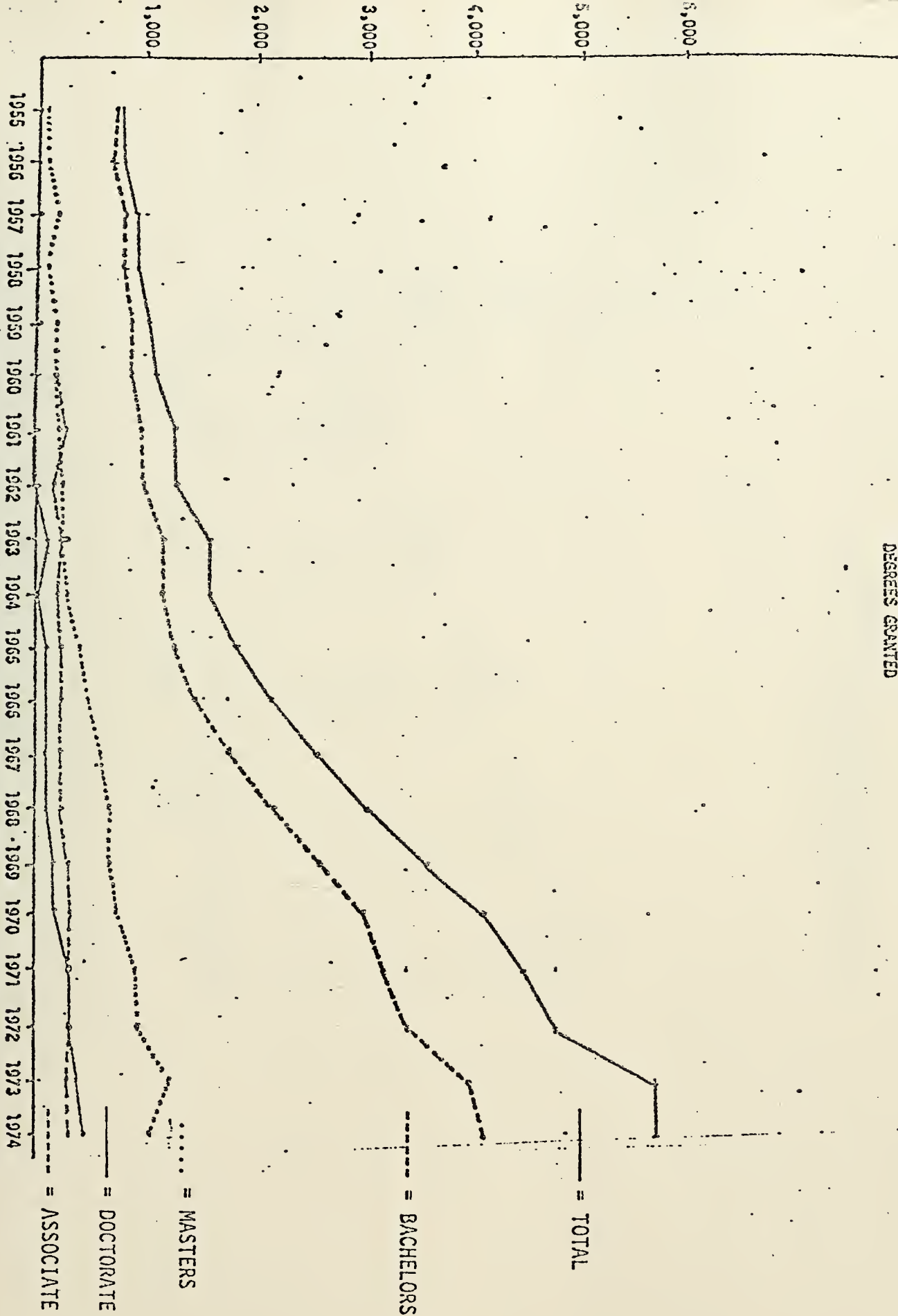

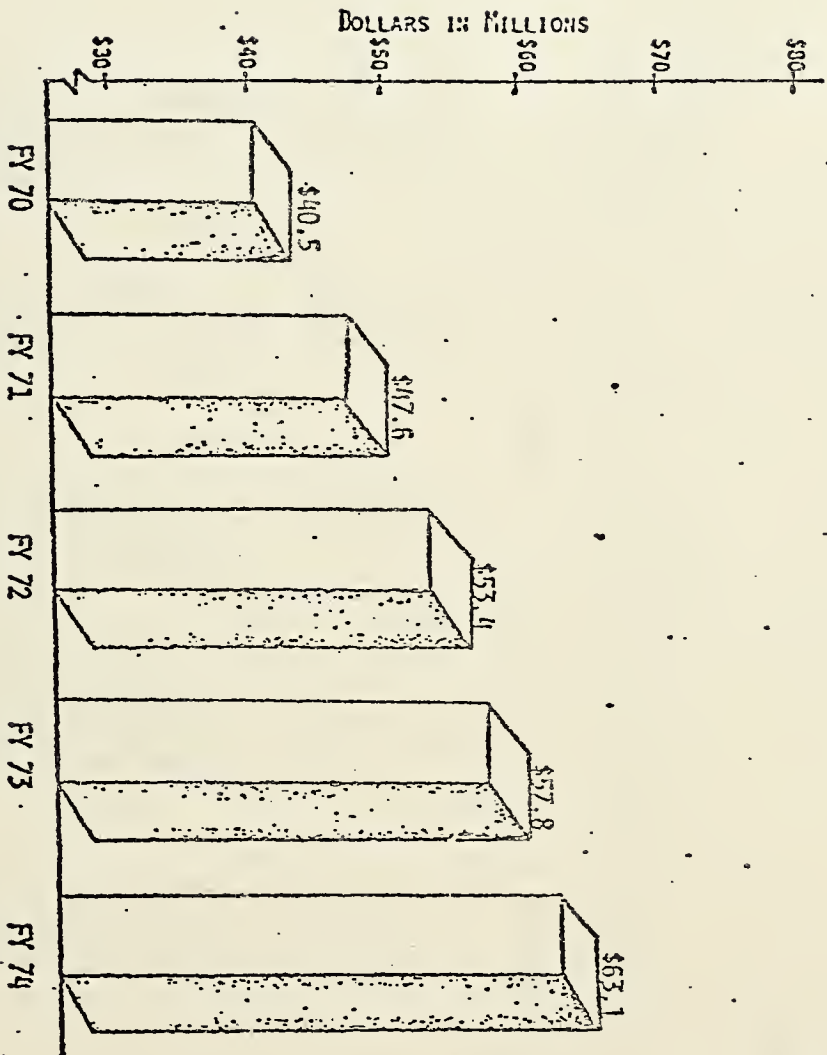

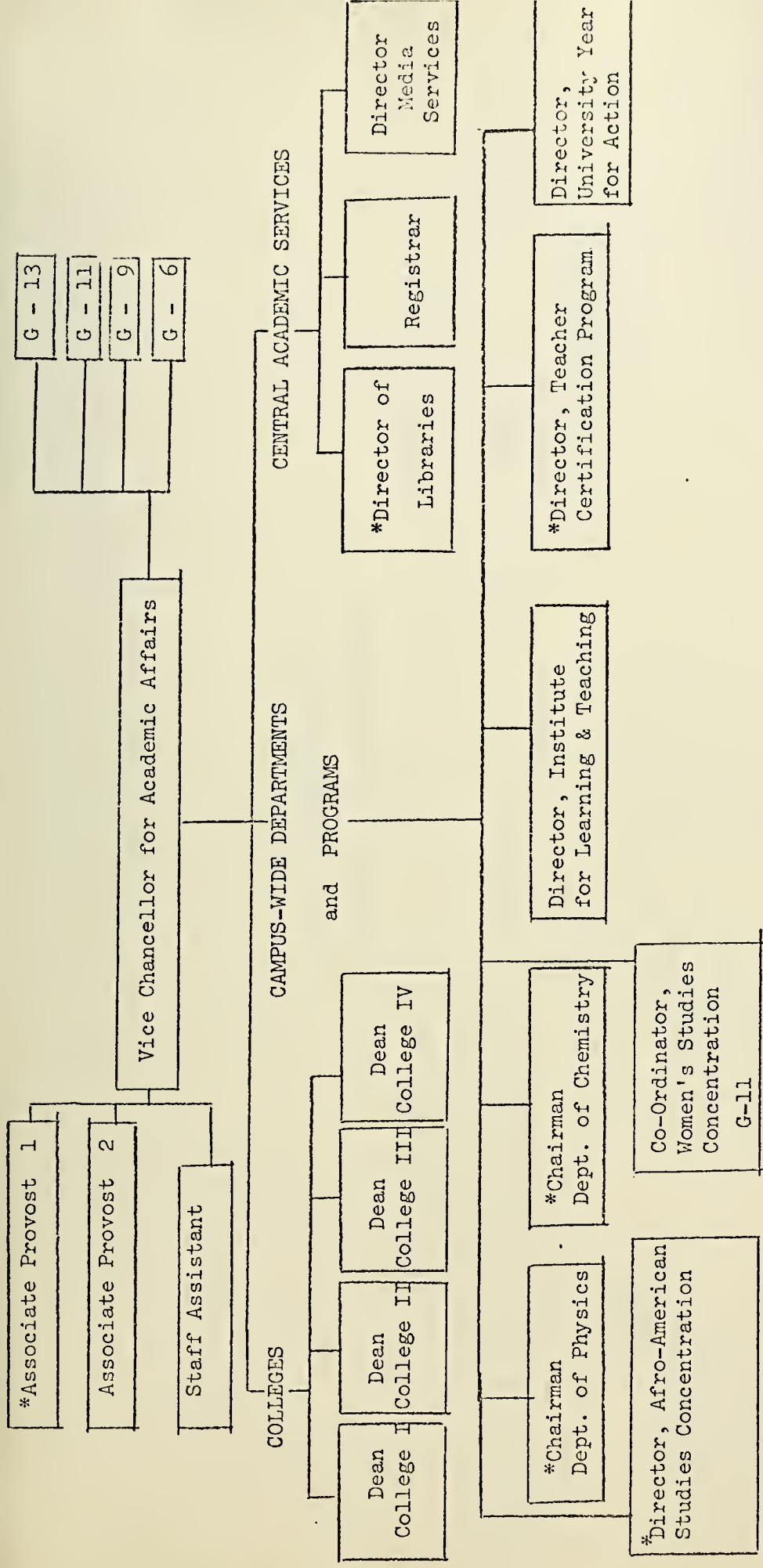

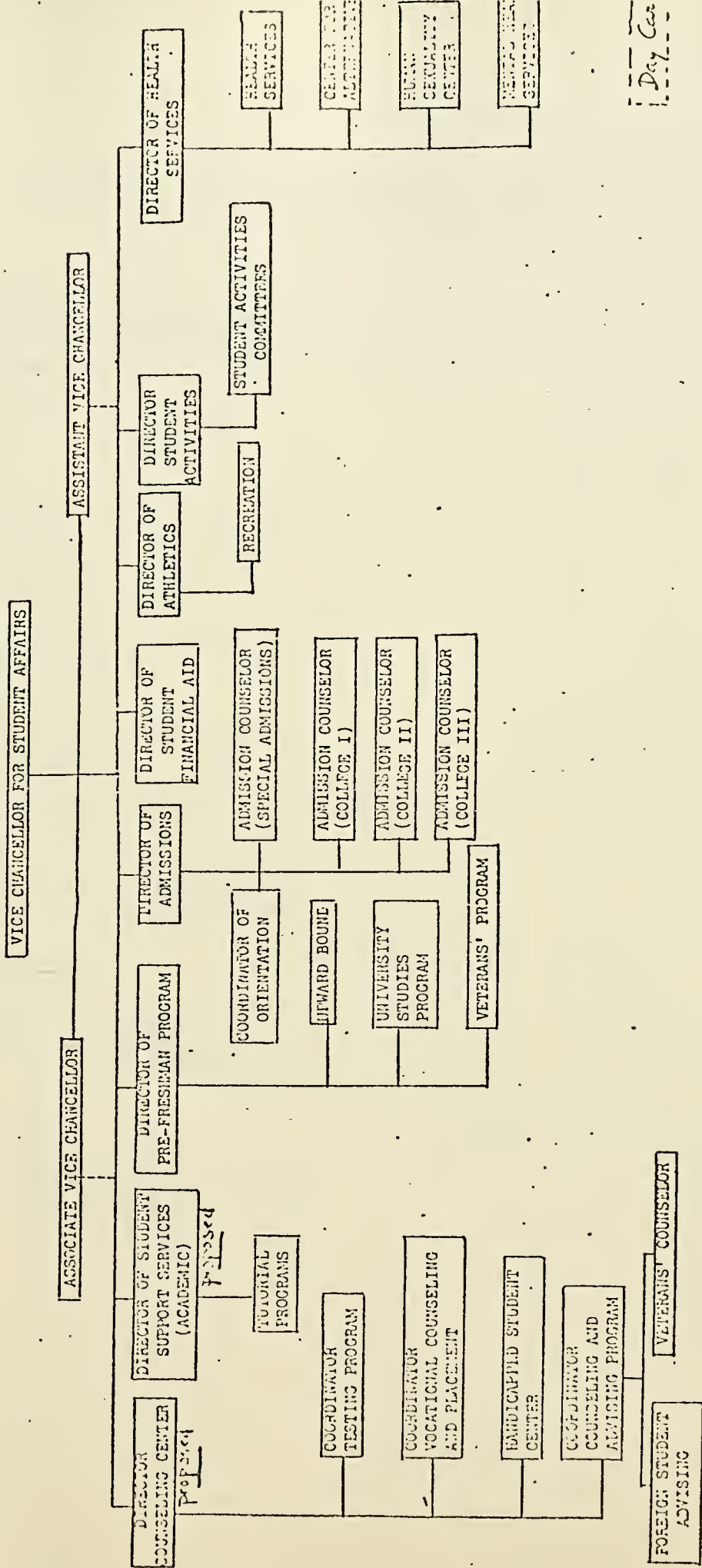

MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND SPECIAL PROJECTS, COLLEGE I, FISCAL YEAR, 1973 - 1974

The particular accomplishments of College I during the academic year 1973-74 include 1) the ratification, by faculty, student, and staff referenda, of a permanent constitution of the College, 2) the passage by the College Senate of the effective motions deriving from a Long-Range Planning Report that had been prepared by the Long-Range Planning Committee and reviewed by the various academic departments, 3) the institution of a team-taught, Freshman Interdisciplinary Course, partly funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, in Law and Justice, for the development of a program of collegiate academic support services, as called for in the Long-Range Planning Report, 5) the preparation of a proposal for membership in the "Change in Liberal Education" program sponsored by a consortium of educational associations, 6) the planning and preparation of additional foundation courses (Work and Society, Learning and Schooling) and the planning and small beginnings of interdisciplinary concentrations (East-Asian Studies, Latin American and Spanish-Urban American Studies, Law and Justice, American Civilization, Educational Institutions.)

1. At the beginning of the academic year the college governance situation was unresolved. The College Executive Commission had been approved in Fall, 1972 for a one-year period, and one of its primary charges was to prepare a new constitution to present to the students, faculty, and staff for approval. The Executive Commission, chaired by Professor Joan Lucas, and its Constitution Committee, chaired by Professor Sanford Lieberman, produced a constitution which called for a college-wide Senate consisting of sixty members, of which thirty-three are faculty members, twenty-four students, three members of the professional staff, and one member of the non-professional staff. The constitution lodged in that Senate the normal powers of recommendation and review on such matters as instructional program, admissions, budget, consultation on major administrative appointments for the College, and similar matters. The constitution was approved by the faculty, students, and staff in the Fall, and in November elections were held among the various constituent groups, and the senate assembled. During 1973-74, its Moderator was Professor S. Schiavo-Compo, and its Secretary was Professor G. Volpe.

2. The major activity of the new College I Senate was to review and approve a series of motions enacting the recommendations of the College's Long-Range Planning Report. This report was prepared during the academic year 1972-73 by a committee of faculty and students chaired by Professor F.R. Hart (English). The committee issued its report in late Spring, 1973, and the report

was distributed to the faculty in Fall, 1973. The Executive Commission held hearings on the document and asked the various departments of the College to discuss it. Many departments prepared reports that later were distributed to the members of the Senate. The Senate then took up the motions prepared by the Long-Range Planning Committee, and, after some emendation, they were approved.

The report and its accompanying motions take up three basic elements of Long-Range Planning - the nature of the Freshman experience, the concept of liberal education and its relation to core requirements, and the principles of development for interdisciplinary studies. The recommendations on the Freshman Year call for the institution of a new series of team-taught Interdisciplinary Freshman Courses; the recommendations reaffirm the colleges' requirement of Freshman Writing and seek to involve members of other departments than English in the teaching of writing, and they call for the establishment of significant academic support services in the Dean's Office. The central section of the report and its enabling motions reaffirm the College's commitment to a liberal education and to the range of study it involves. The report goes on to note a conflict between the ideally required range of study on the one hand and the student's need for flexible programming on the other. It seeks to resolve that conflict by setting forth a significant range of requirements and by asking the student to choose the requirements he will satisfy. Specifically, it asks the student to take twelve courses which will be distributed in at least four of six subject areas, in such a way that no more than three courses can be credited towards their requirement in any one area. The required areas are 1) history, cultural history, anthropology; 2) foreign language; 3) philosophy, the arts, literature; 4) mathematics, statistics, computer language; 5) theory and method of the natural sciences; 6) behavioral sciences.

The third section of the report calls for the development of interdisciplinary studies, but recognizes the need to limit such programs of study both in range and in number. Hence it sets priority on the development of programs in institutional studies and in area and ethnic studies, and it calls for the development of no more than five major interdisciplinary programs over a five-year period.

The Long-Range Planning Report is an important step in defining the nature of College I as a capital Liberal Arts College, and it throws particular weight on the development of an introductory Freshman Year and on the growth of interdisciplinary programs to complement the range of traditional departmental offerings.

3. A particularly important development parallel to the passage of the Long-Range Planning Report was the College's planning and teaching effort in Law and Justice. This program involved the teaching and evaluation of a double-credit, team-taught course in Law and Justice, a course which tested and exemplified the concept of Interdisciplinary Freshman Courses, as proposed by the Long-Range Planning Committee. In addition to this course, the planning committee for Law and Justice, shared by Professor R. Swartz (Philosophy), worked on preparing plans for a concentration in Law and Justice which would exemplify the College's long range interest in interdisciplinary programs focused on institutional studies. The teaching and evaluation of the Freshman Course in Law and Justice and the planning and teaching of a second-semester series of follow-up seminars was in part funded by a \$30,000. planning grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Law and Justice Planning Committee is preparing a proposal for a development grant which would provide funding for the institution of a concentration in this area.

Two points might be noted about the Law and Justice program in general. One of the characteristics that has interested the College in the development of programs in institutional studies has been the possibility of combining solid intellectual concern for major questions and issues of contemporary life with the preparation of students for clusters of careers that relate to these issues. Thus the Law and Justice program addresses itself both to the broad questions of the nature of justice, the basis of authority, and the principles governing the operation of the law, and to the structures developed by society to organize the administration and enforcement of the law. At the same time, the program offers material relevant to the preparation of a whole series of legal and para-legal careers, from legal secretaries to judges. The second point to be noted about the program is that it involves the substantial contribution of humanists - of philosophers, of literary critics, and historians - in addition to specialists in sociology, politics and law. The program is unusual if not unique in the field of legal studies because of the strength of this humanistic component, in our view, an exciting element of the program as it develops.

The Law and Justice course was taught twice, by faculty teams from such departments as Philosophy, Sociology, English, History and Politics. In addition to its subject-matter content, the course provided instruction and training in writing, and it included a team of upper-class student interns who functioned as tutors, as teaching aids, and as models for the Freshmen. The course was designed as an intensive one, and thus it carried eight credits

for the freshman involved (Interns received three hours credit.) With the help of Professor Jane Martin of the Philosophy Department and of Joan Tonn and Ronn Farland of the Office of Educational Planning, the course was evaluated in respect to the educational goals of the course itself, the values of the course as an alternative to Freshman English and the validity of the student intern program.

While the results of the evaluation are not yet fully compiled, the subjective response of both students and faculty to the course itself has been enthusiastic.

One should note that there have been still other efforts to implement the recommendations of the Long-Range Planning Report. The Faculty Committees and such other interdisciplinary areas as East-Asian Studies, American Studies, Hispanic Studies, and Educational Institutions have been active in conceptualizing programs, and some concrete results of this activity are apparent in the offering of an Interdisciplinary Freshman Course in Learning and Schooling in Fall, 1974, and in the hiring of a full-time instructor of Chinese to supplement the College's meager offerings in the area of Asian Studies and Culture.

4. In June, 1974, the College Dean's Office submitted a proposal for primary membership in the "Change in Liberal Education" program sponsored by the Association of American Colleges and other organizations. The program proposed by the College includes the restructured pattern of Freshman offerings and the development of interdisciplinary studies recommended by the Long-Range Planning Report. In addition, the program incorporates collegiate attempts to identify and support a cadre of master teachers who will function in areas of curriculum development and will test new teaching methods, and for whom these teaching responsibilities will be their sole duty at the University. The basic assumption behind this combination of new directions in Freshman and upper-class program development with emphasis on expanded and redefined roles is that needed change in education can be best accomplished through a specific program that integrates curriculum development and evaluation, a pedagogical development, and faculty rewards.

The passage of the College's Long-Range Planning Report has been an important step in the development of the academic identity of College I. To implement that report and to provide the necessary concomitant growth in the areas of teaching and of more effective support will be major challenges to College I in the next years. The College's proposal for "Change in Liberal Education" has been a token that we recognize the magnitude of that challenge and a step towards meeting it.

We will continue to seek outside support for our programs whenever possible.

Major Accomplishments and Special Projects,

College II, Fiscal Year 1973-1974

1. Boston Harbor Island Project:

The College II Anthropology Department has developed a program focussing on the study of the archaeology and paleobotany of islands in Boston Harbor. A contract has been executed with the Massachusetts Department of Natural Resources for the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement Evaluating the Archaeological and Paleobotanical Resources of the Twelve Islands in Boston Harbor (\$30,217). Studies are beginning on July 1, 1974. The importance of this project, and the urgency for completing it, have increased as a result of recent decisions by the Commonwealth to develop the Boston Harbor Islands over a ten-year period of time.

2. Nantucket Program:

An island community located thirty-five miles off the Massachusetts coast, Nantucket possesses a unique cultural heritage and natural environment almost unspoiled by the forces of modern life. Recognizing that the Island's heritage and environment will best be preserved if both Nantucket residents and "off-Island" scholars and students have a genuine understanding of the Island, College II has designed an interdisciplinary "Semester Abroad" on Nantucket for a limited number of upper-division undergraduates and qualified Nantucket residents. This program will make use of the Island's unique cultural and natural resources in order to teach the humanities and related disciplines to University students and islanders. The academic program is based on two core seminars and an advanced research seminar and will (initially) stress the role of the humanistic disciplines in understanding the Nantucket heritage; it is expected that an expanded program for succeeding years will include environmental studies and social sciences as well.

UMB faculty members from various departments will participate as consulting experts, directors of independent study projects undertaken by students, and public lecturers for the community-at-large. The National Endowment for the Humanities has awarded a \$31,684 grant for a pilot program which will be underway during the spring and fall 1975 semesters, with approximately 15 students each semester.

3. College Orientation Project for Boston Public Schools:

Designed by two graduating College II students, with technical assistance and financial support from the Dean's Office, COP made contact with high school students who had not been receiving helpful information from high school guidance counselors about the practical realities of attending college. Designed to meet this need, COP is an "instructive program" rather than simply a "recruitment effort" for UMB. It provides essential information to core-city students lacking an understanding of the nature of undergraduate education and the kinds of opportunities it can create for college graduates. Approximately 500 Boston students visited UMB under COP auspices and participated in workshops, briefing sessions, and visits to college classes; approximately 750 additional students met UMB students and staff members in their own high schools; and approximately 25 faculty members and 25 students from UMB participated in this program. Plans are underway to continue COP in 1974-1975 under University-wide auspices.

4. January Term 1974:

The three-and-one-half week period in January 1974--which followed the end of the Winter Recess and preceded the commencement of the spring semester on January 28--was not scheduled by the University for any formal academic purpose. This lacuna in the academic calendar was intended to facilitate the move from

Park Square to the new Harbor Campus. During this extended period College II authorized a special "January Term 1974." This permitted highly motivated students to enroll in courses which lent themselves to intensive, concentrated study which did not depend upon access to the University library or laboratory facilities: i.e. Independent Study courses, certain Seminars, Special Topics courses, and small-group tutorial versions of regular lecture-discussion courses. Primarily, however, it was an opportunity for Independent Study, with students taking the initiative in seeking out faculty members willing to assist them in developing proposals and supervising their projects, while conforming to the usual departmental guidelines for authorizing such courses. In addition, a number of instructors took the initiative by announcing their willingness to work with students for stated specific purposes during the January Term. No student was permitted to register for more than one course; and credits varied from 1-to-3, depending upon the nature of the course, and the relationship of its demands and expectations to those in the regular semester-long version of the course. Seventy-five students participated in the January Term 1974: they studied with twenty-two faculty members who voluntarily made themselves available to students seeking the opportunity to engage in academic work during this otherwise unscheduled period.

5. College Leadership Changes:

In January 1974 Walter G. Rosen announced his resignation as Dean of College II, and returned to the Biology Department as a tenured Full Professor. Chancellor Golino subsequently appointed Professor Robert J. Steamer (tenured Full Professor in the Politics Department of College II) as Acting Dean of College II.

6. Lunchtime Theatre:

Sponsored by the Theatre Arts Department, this series of free dramatic productions attracts audiences of approximately 100 during the noon-hour. Offered for the first time during the spring, the season lasted for eight weeks, with two-to-four performances each week. Audience responses have been unusually enthusiastic. Indications are that interest in the theatre is being developed in students who previously were not familiar with the pleasures of play-going.

7. 2 the Point:

This 80-page orientation handbook was published by the Dean's Office in order to assist College II students in their adjustment to the new Harbor Campus, and to help them become familiar with the intricacies of the College II Building. Information about the various support services available to students is included in 2 the Point.

8. Tutorial Program:

Administered by two staff members who are professionally trained as Basic Skills Specialists, this program is sponsored by the Dean's Office. It provides tutorial help for students encountering academic difficulties, and thus supplements such assistance being provided by faculty members through their regular courses. Tutors are upper-division students who are trained by the staff members and by faculty members who participate in the program on a released-time basis as Basic Skills teachers and consultants.

9. Freshman Seminar Program:

During the spring semester two sections of a special pilot program were offered for incoming Freshmen. These Seminars combined an emphasis on the development of basic skills (especially writing) with academic advising, with an introduction to the University as an institution providing educational opportunities

significantly different from those afforded in high schools, and with a systematic introduction to an academic discipline of the student's choice. Twenty-five students completed the program. Two additional sections will be offered during the fall semester 1974.

10. Self-Paced Mathematics Program:

Supported by funds from the Dean's Office, a pilot program has been successfully introduced for self-paced instruction in mathematical skills. Developed and offered by Professor Bernice Auslander, it utilizes specially prepared instructional materials and specially trained student-tutors (upperclassmen and graduate students) working under her direct supervision. This program will be continued during the 1974-1975 academic year.

11. Individual Major Program:

Students may propose a coherent program of study as a substitute for the conventional departmental major, provided a convincing rationale is submitted to a student-faculty committee which enforces relevant guidelines for such alternatives

12. Urban Studies Concentration:

Faculty members from various departments have been overseeing the development of a formal elective program for the interdisciplinary study of The City, supplementing the departmental majors required of students. (This Concentration is analagous to the Afro-American Studies and Women's Studies programs being offered at UMB.)

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1974 FISCAL YEAR

Instruction keyed to training in public and community service careers, particularly at the graduate level of higher education, has long encompassed experimentation and innovation. But seldom has there been an attempt to synthesize interdisciplinary and field learning in an urban milieu around an undergraduate curriculum based on certification of individual competence.

The College of Public and Community Service (CPCS) of the University of Massachusetts at Boston was created to do just this. The College, which was designed to offer pre-professional and liberal arts training, was mandated to organize its curriculum around a competency-based certificate system rather than course credits, to place emphasis on interdisciplinary instruction, and to incorporate field experience as an integral component of its learning program.

In October 1971, the University adopted plans for CPCS, and in December the Trustees of the University of Massachusetts authorized a planning year. On April 4, 1973, following nine months of planning starting in July 1972, the Trustees officially established the College and approved its enrollment of an initial class of 300 students in the Fall. The University also provided some resources with which to staff and operate the College in its first year. Throughout the planning phase of the College's development, which essentially involved a small core staff and outside consultants working from mid-1972 until the actual registration of students in October 1973, the substance of CPCS's mission was shaped. Institutional goals were translated into tangible curricular programming. The faculty, staff, and students were recruited, selected, and given an orientation to what the College was doing and intended to do. Mechanisms of governance were planned and initiated. Student financial assistance and cooperative relationships with public and private service agencies to assure field education opportunities were arranged. And, additional financial support was solicited to assure adequate resources for innovation and experimentation during the College's initial growth years.

In October 1973, CPCS opened with an initial enrollment of about 300 students. Enrollment for the second year will increase substantially. To accomplish the many goals set for the College and to meet educational needs of those pursuing public and community service careers and the complex needs of those whom they wish to serve, the College selected a student body whose composition is diverse. The students reflect a broad mix of socio-economic background, sex, age, race and ethnic origin, previous educational training, experience, and employment. Special attention was given to recruitment of a student body composed of those who are currently employed in service agencies, those who have been out of high school for some period of time and want to return to college, those who have not completed high school but are prepared for college, and those who for whatever reason are often left economically and educationally disadvantaged by societal institutions and practices (e.g., women and minorities). Sensitive recruitment, selection, and admissions

measures -- reinforced by the convenience of College facilities located in downtown Boston proximate to numerous means of transportation for its commuting students, plus low tuition and available financial aid -- have combined to attract a unique cross-section of people.

The College, which is located at the downtown Boston campus in the Park Square area at 100 Arlington Street, offers educational training leading to the B.A. degree. Other professional degrees may be authorized in the future.

A Competency-Based Certificate System

The College is committed to a competency-based curriculum which will allow flexibility for students in planning and scheduling their learning program to best suit individual needs. It offers a comprehensive blend of educational situations in which students learn skills and concepts, and are placed in real work settings where these can be used. As such, competency can be acquired and demonstrated not only in courses, but also on the job, in field work, and from use of resources in the Greater Boston area. Too, students bring competencies already developed through previous work experience.

Since first opening its doors last fall, the College has identified specific competencies (through consultation with professionals, potential employers, community people, and others) in order to define what a student enrolled in a particular curriculum career area needs to know and do, and at what level of skill. Similarly, more general competencies have been developed in liberal arts areas and essential skills. These competencies have been drafted into certificates of competency.

The College and its curriculum are keyed around problem areas rather than traditional academic disciplines; CPCS is organized into seven different curricular centers, each with its own certificate(s). They include: The Essential Skills Center (which focuses on writing and speaking, reading, and mathematics); three professional service career centers (Housing and Community Development, Legal Education Services, and Human Growth and Development); and three general learning centers [Institutions (social, political, and economic change), Individual and Society (communications), and Cultural Studies (centered around American culture)]. Also, to build a program encompassing field experience education, the College has established an Office of Cooperative Education. Its mission: To form and monitor a variety of cooperative relationships with service agencies and organizations in the Greater Boston area which provide crucial field work training for students; to assist in developing learning plans for individual students in the field; and to coordinate the College's career development, vocational counseling, and job placement efforts with those of the University.

To date, the College offers twelve different certificates through the seven curriculum centers. Each certificate describes various competencies required, the performance expected of students, and standards of evaluation to be applied. In addition, students can request that a certificate be designed in a career area other than the three areas offered, that competencies outlined in certificates of the general and career centers be combined to equal entirely new certificates, and that an "independent interest" certificate be subject to negotiation between individual students and the faculty. The B.A. degree will

be awarded upon attainment of ten specified certificates: Three essential skills certificates; one career center certificate; five certificates from the general centers, of which three must be from each of the three general centers; and one "independent interest" certificate. During fiscal year 1975, the College plans to modify and perfect its curricular offerings, and is currently considering proposals for the addition of entirely new certificates and improvements of those now in existence.

A portrait of the twelve certificates currently available through the curriculum centers follows:

Essential Skills: Three certificates in writing and speaking, reading, and mathematics. The mathematics certificate includes competencies in basic and business mathematics, plus statistics.

Housing and Community Development: One career certificate in housing, which is divided into two parts. The first comprises basic competencies in analytical and critical skills, the second a number of competencies in three professional career areas (advocacy, management, and development). To receive this certificate, students are required to demonstrate mastery of basic competencies plus those in one of the three career areas. Another certificate in community development will be offered in the future.

Legal Education Services: One career certificate involving competencies in legal institutions (legislative, judicial, and administrative), doctrine, assessment, comparison and history, professional and paraprofessional roles, investigation and negotiation, counseling, criminalization and stigmatization, and working with people in or emerging from the criminal justice system. The last is the first of several competencies being developed which relate to a specific career, only one of which is required; others planned include juvenile advocacy and dispute settlement.

Human Growth and Development: One career certificate encompassing general competencies in areas of learning, family dynamics, scientific methods and research, assessment, mental health delivery systems, and social/emotional-cognitive/moral, and physical development. The remaining competencies to be earned require work in one of several specialties: early childhood, developmental disabilities, addiction, or preparation for graduate work in social work or psychology.

Institutions: Three certificates in social change, political economy, and management. The social change certificate focuses on community and interest group organization and tactics, research and analytical skills in a community field setting, leadership, and electoral politics and decision making at all levels. The certificate in political economy centers around an analysis of power, political conflict, the economics of families and individuals, traditional American economic institutions and alternatives, plus local economic data and research. The management certificate covers major areas of public and organizational administration including decision-making processes, legal and administrative strategies to change organizational behavior, managerial problem solving, program development, budgeting, and grant development.

Individual and Society: One certificate in communication. Competencies in this certificate include awareness of one's communication style, listening and speaking, non-verbal communication, identifying different types of verbal communication, and analysis of a communication situation. Other certificates are currently in the process of development.

Cultural Studies: Two certificates. One certificate deals generally with American value systems, their origins, and functions. The second requires competence in a variety of fairly specific instances where cultural understanding is important, for example, with regard to differing attitudes toward conflict and violence, politics, and art.

Key elements in the CPCS certificate system include a Policy Board and a Certificate Council (both of which include student representation). A Director of the Certificate Curriculum was appointed to work with the Certificate Council and the curriculum centers, as well as a counselor whose charge is to develop a network of supportive services for the students. Academic advising is the responsibility of selected faculty and staff, each of whom is responsible for between six and fifteen students; advisors work with students both individually and on a regular basis through group planning seminars. Finally, during the first year, the academic calendar has generally consisted of a sequence of eight-week learning units -- which provides a flexible schedule for day-long seminars, workshops, mini-courses, individual and group tutorials, independent projects, field work, and time for evaluation of competencies acquired by students.

Individual Learning Assessment

No less important to the success of the certificate system of the College is assessment of the competency of individual students. And, since learning and evaluation of learning can occur in a variety of ways, CPCS is experimenting in this vital area.

Critical to the learning assessment process at CPCS is the concept of a certificate evaluation team. Normally, such a team is composed of a minimum of two persons, at least one of whom is a faculty member of the curriculum center administering the certificate, and at least one person from outside that center (including faculty members from other centers, CPCS staff, persons outside the College competent in professional and subject areas addressed by the certificate, and students within the College who are judged similarly competent). Stipends are provided to both those from outside the College and CPCS students. Each curriculum center or individual students may propose alternative models for these teams to the Certificate Council for approval. The Director of the Certificate Curriculum must approve each team's composition (initially recommended by the curriculum center), and teams are provided with a set of forms for each distinct stage of the assessment process (initiation by a student, negotiation between the student and the team, and reports of evaluation).

While most of the certificates center on written or oral examination of students in various ways, many of the techniques used allow for judgment as to a student's previous experience and learning, and field work. The teams specifically are allowed to negotiate alternatives to stated competencies or means of their demonstration. Several assessment techniques employed include: An

oral examination in a situation that closely parallels the circumstances in which a skill is required in a work setting; a written report whereby a student prepares an analysis of a study of relevance to the certificate and shows abilities in research, coordination, and critical analysis; a portfolio of writings, analyses of experiences, list of readings and their utility, plus written statements by any number of people as to the student's ability in the certificate area; analysis of a project (in written and/or oral form) in which the student has been involved in a field situation; on-site evaluation, where a student requests a visitation, observation, video-taping of a work setting situation or series of situations; and evaluation of a student in a field learning setting over time.

Further, the scheduling of learning assessment is variable. The College initially contemplated that evaluation would transpire at the end of each learning unit; and, in fact, in late December 1973 (at the close of the second learning unit) several teams awarded students competencies in the certificates of writing and speaking and social change. The College, in order to better suit the learning needs of individual students and to provide more flexibility in learning assessment generally, has since altered its plans. Faculty in each center are now encouraged to allocate a full one-third of their resources to competency evaluation of students over the entire learning unit period, special time periods within the unit, or to assign one-third of the center staff to full-time assessment duties. Also, in an effort to afford newly-drafted certificates a true test, the College changed its calendar to offer a three-week assessment period during January. By the end of the first year, then, the College was experimenting with a number of different formats for learning assessment -- including five relatively changing learning units and creation of a special seven-week prior learning assessment seminar for twenty-five of the approximately forty new students added during the Spring semester. As a result, well over 600 competencies were awarded to first-year students. And, CPCS is now in a better position to decide which combination of orientation/prior learning assessment, learning activities, and means of competency evaluation best meets the needs of all those involved.

Critical Self-Analysis

Evaluation of the competency-based curriculum as it evolves during the College's growth years will demand the energies of everyone at CPCS. Indeed, one of the nine stated goals for CPCS is "to foster within the College itself a capacity for institutional change and ongoing reassessment." Put another way, this goal implies development of a College as competent to be evaluated in the performance of its overall objectives as students are certified to be competent in particular areas of learning. Focus on competency requires no less.

Accordingly, a considerable amount of time spent by the faculty and staff during fiscal 1974 has been on critical self-analysis as the College begins to match its objectives with the tests afforded by the enrollment of students. As a consequence, the College has constantly been changing and reassessing its activities in the light of experience. Competencies and certificates have been drafted and revised, and new ones are now being developed. Means of instruction and provision of a varied mix of learning activities have been put to scrutiny. Techniques and procedures underlying learning assessment have

evolved and are still being perfected. Governance mechanisms have been rethought, redesigned, and retested. The list of change and experimentation at the College during its first year is as extensive as it is important.

To assist the College in this process of creating an innovative curriculum, CPCS sought and received a grant from The Fund For The Improvement of Post-secondary Education (HEW) for fiscal 1974 -- essentially to help implement and evaluate CPCS's emerging competency-based certificate system. Similar support was also given to the College's field education program by HEW's Cooperative Education Program. Other financial assistance and cooperative relationships with area institutions were secured during this first year of operation.

While such support has been crucial to the effective functioning of the College, it has also allowed CPCS to embrace the objective of "institutional change and ongoing reassessment" with considerable wherewithal. Staff have been hired to provide the resources with which to mold components of the curriculum, to assist in documentation and evaluation of curricular centers and other College activities, to aid in planning for an expanding and increasingly diversified overall learning program. Equally important, this support has permitted the College to seek the advice of educators and others across the country in what is basically an experiment. Among those who have lent their expertise and knowledge to the College during the first year are: Harold Hodgkinson, Center of Research and Development in Higher Education, University of California, Berkeley, California; Jane Lichtman, Project Nexus, American Association of Higher Education, Washington, D.C.; Morris Keeton, Antioch College at Columbia, Columbia, Maryland; Louis Richard Meeth, Department of Higher Education, State University of New York at Buffalo, Buffalo, New York; and Frederick J. MacDonald, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey.

As the College enters its second year, even more attention will be given to the processes of perfection and change. To this end, CPCS has attempted throughout the first year to assure a substantial and necessary resource base for the College in fiscal 1975 -- in terms of both human and financial resources -- with considerable success. Significantly, the College has been awarded second-year funding from The Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (\$119,331) and HEW's Cooperative Education Program (\$30,000). Such support, along with other potential financial assistance currently being solicited, should assist the College through a period of growth, innovation, and evaluation of results in the year ahead.

Faculty and Staff

To administer the competency-based certificate system, CPCS has recruited as faculty and staff those persons who have been trained in the academic community as well as persons of demonstrated competence holding positions of responsibility in human service agencies and programs who may or may not have an academic degree. The varied expertise which the College has assembled is amply evinced in the following description of some of the recent activities of a cross-section of the faculty and staff.



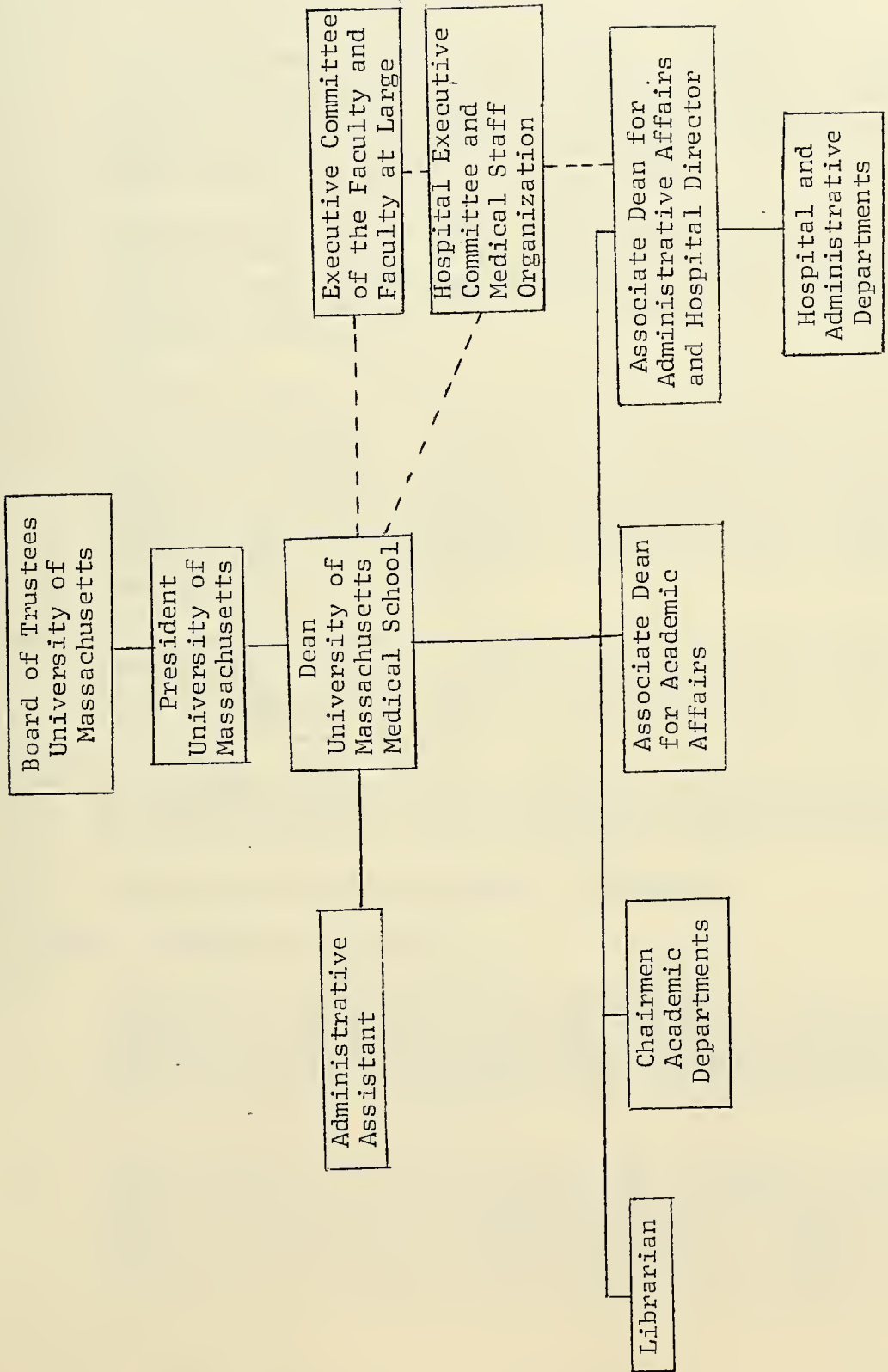

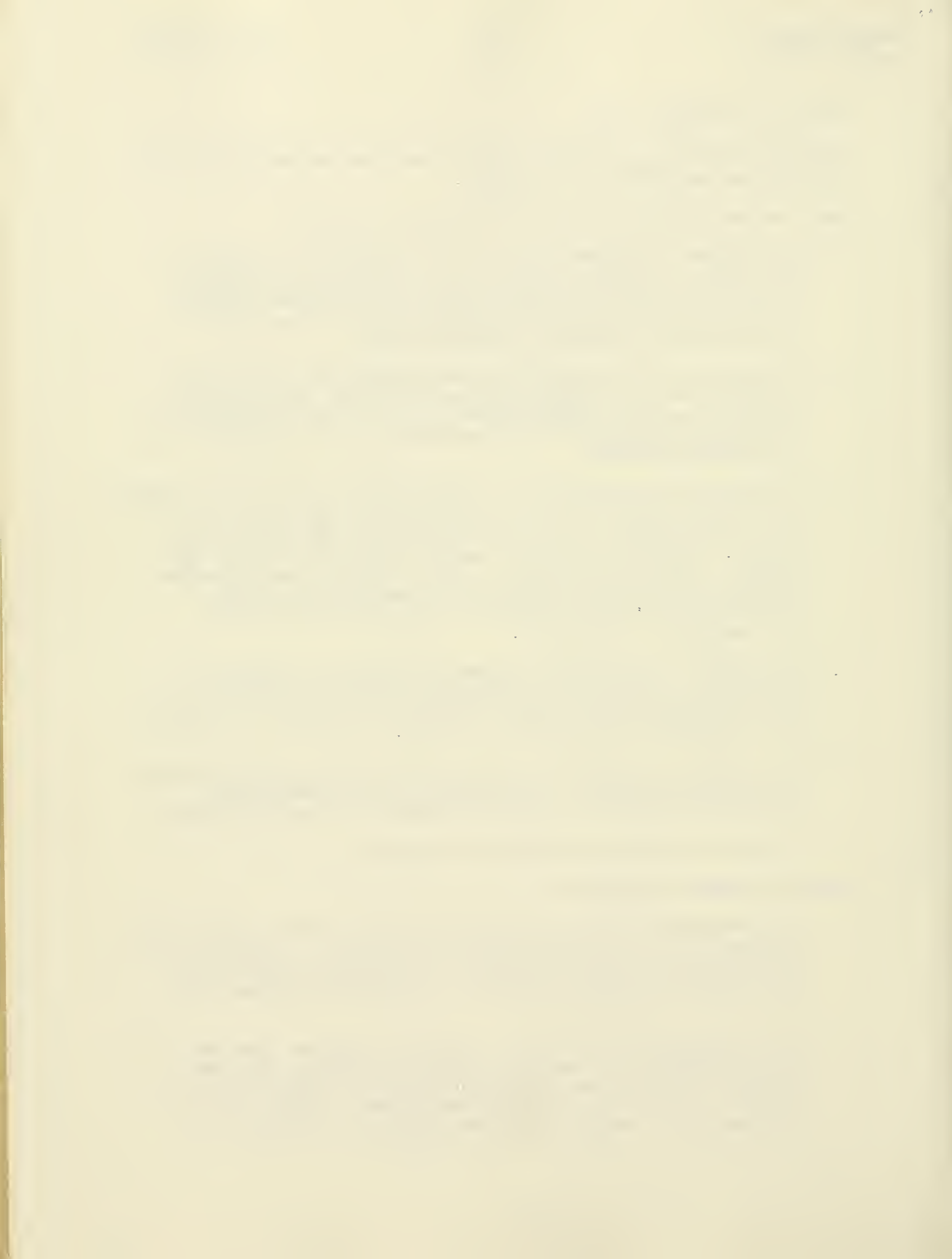

5. Faculty publications, research grants, research projects, and other professional activities are appended.
6. Major accomplishments during the fiscal year 1973-74
 - a. We admitted our fourth class of forty students. Included in this class are eleven women and one student from a racial minority. We had to drop one student for academic failure, but will replace him sometime this summer from our pool of Massachusetts applicants studying abroad.
 - b. Performance on the National Board Examinations, Part I and Part II, continues to be very good. So far, we have had no failures, and our average scores put us in the top third in the nation. In medicine the graduating class averaged out at the 85th percentile.
 - c. Our first class graduated on Saturday, May 25th, with ceremonies taking place in the Library. The principle speaker was Dr. Calvin Plimpton, President of New York Downstate Medical Center. About 500 persons attended, including a number of Trustees and former Trustees. At graduation, the graduating class announced the setting up of a scholarship. This generous act is quite typical of their spirit and will be very helpful to the school.
 - d. The sixteen students who graduated selected a variety of internships. Two-thirds chose either family practice or some form of primary care. Most of the class obtained their first or second choices on places to intern.
 - e. Our faculty has grown to 65 full-time and about 300 part-time or voluntary faculty. The teaching by the voluntary and part-time faculty in the local hospitals has been very good.
 - f. We now have housing for about 47 students.
7. Special projects or programs
 - a. Our residency training program will begin on July 1, 1974, with residents at the first and second year levels. They will get their speciality training at the Worcester City Hospital and will work with panels of families in the Model Cities Area and at our clinic in Barre.
 - b. The clinic in Barre, which we run in conjunction with the Holden Hospital, now has three doctors. We have obtained a grant of \$140,000 from the Regional Medical Program to get it started. At the rate at which the number of patients is increasing, it should be self-supporting by January, 1975.




- c. We have submitted a proposal to the Johnson Foundation for support of clinics in areas where there are few physicians. We will also submit it to a new foundation run by the Commonwealth. This is run by Dr. Hugh Fulmer.
- d. We are starting a program to train nurse practitioners who can give medical care under supervision at the Belchertown and Munson State Hospitals where the medical care is woefully inadequate. This is financed by the Regional Medical Program and is run by Dr. Alfred Yankauer.
- e. We have started, under the auspices of the Department of Public Health, a clinic for handicapped children which meets twice a week. It is run by Dr. Arthur Pappas.
- f. We are planning to run a number of neighborhood clinics for children who are medically disadvantaged. They will be financed by grants controlled by the Department of Public Health.

8. Future plans and needs

- a. Our worst problems are budgeting. We will have for the next year a barely adequate medical school budget and no hospital budget, although we will open the hospital and receive the entire building before July 1, 1975. We need to have more firm support from the Governor and his various secretaries.
- b. A parking garage is being planned, and architects have been hired.
- c. Some preliminary arrangements for training nurses have been discussed with the heads of two nursing schools, but no definite plans have been made.

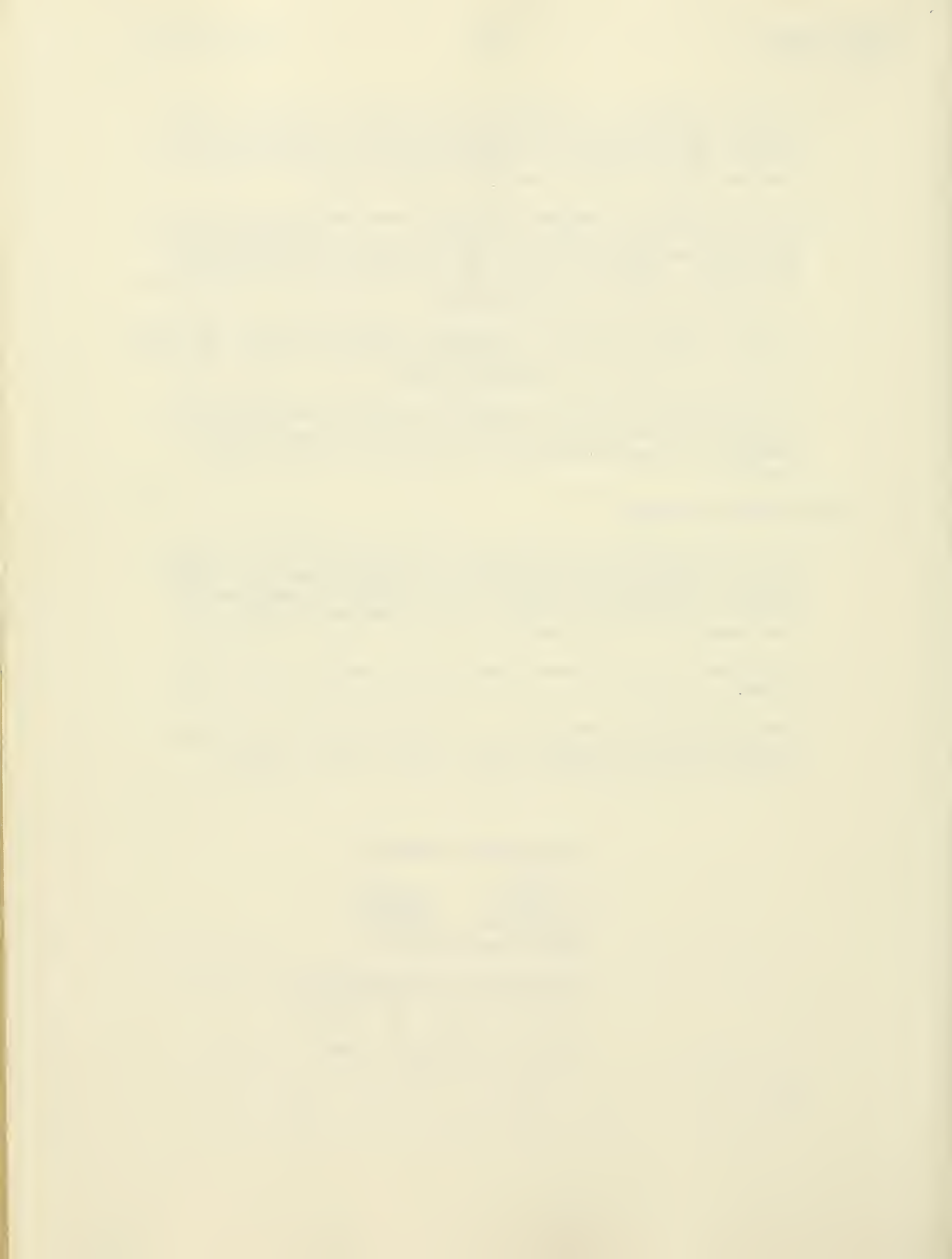

In response to your memorandum of May 7th, the following information is submitted regarding my activities for the academic year now ending. There have been no additions to my bibliography nor have I engaged in any research activities.

Professional activities have been primarily administrative and have included:

- 1) Admissions- As usual, the largest percentage of time was devoted to the role of Chairman of the Committee on Admissions. One thousand and twenty-six applications were processed, 168 applicants interviewed and, as of this date, 110 letters of acceptance issued to fill the sixty-four places in the class.
- 2) Preparation of the 1973-74 Catalogue- This edition of the catalogue is the largest yet published. Unfortunately, due to factors beyond our control, publication was delayed until December 1973.
- 3) Class Schedule- In cooperation with the Basic Sciences Curriculum Committee, a schedule for the first and second year classes was prepared and distributed.
- 4) Clinical Schedule- In collaboration with the Clinical Clerkship Committee, a schedule for the clinical clerkship, an elective portion of the fourth year was prepared for the class of 1975.
- 5) Graduation Exercises- This office participated in some of the planning and preparation for the first graduation exercises of the school held May 25, 1974.
- 6) Student Counseling- As the only "assistant dean" present full time, a good deal of time throughout the year was devoted to individual counseling of students from each of the four classes.
- 7) Letters of Recommendation- Although Dr. Davidson had the primary responsibility for preparing the "Dean's Office" letter of recommendation for fourth year students, I also reviewed these letters with him prior to final typing. In addition I wrote a number of personal letters of recommendation in support of individual students.
- 8) Registrar's Activities-General supervision of the activities of the Registrar with regards to reports of student performance, preparation of transcripts, etc.
- 9) Financial Aid- This activity becomes increasingly time consuming as the student body enlarges. In addition to reviewing applications, collating data, and talking with individual students, each year it is necessary to file an annual report with the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare covering the Health Professions Student Loan and Scholarship Program.
- 10) AAMC Activities- These have included being a representative to the Group on Student Affairs, Group on Medical





During July, 1973, I had major responsibility for the teaching of neuroanatomy in the
core Neural Science course for first-year students at the Harvard Medical School.
Until January, 1974, my research was carried out in Dr. Richard L. Sidman's labora-
tories at Harvard. This was the agreement Dr. Sidman and I had worked out with Dr.
Clark to provide an orderly transfer of my activities and access to the final months
of research support accruing to me at Harvard.

During the fall semester, 1973, I organized and gave most of the lectures in the
course "Advanced Human Neuroanatomy", offered at the Harvard Medical School primarily
for the benefit of graduate physicians training in neurology, neurosurgery, and
psychiatry, but also available to upperclass undergraduate students at Harvard and
other medical schools including the University of Massachusetts Medical School. This
year the total number of registered auditors was 48, including 10 undergraduate
students from Harvard and one from UMass.

On Monday, April 22, 1974, I gave the special course "Neuroanatomy: A Practical
Overview" for the annual meeting of the American Academy of Neurology in San Francisco.
The special one-day courses presented by the Academy at the annual meeting are almost
invariably organized by teams of six to eight specialists. This was the first time
in the history of the Academy that a course had been organized and given entirely by
one individual. I have been asked to repeat the course at the next annual meeting
in April, 1975.

On Tuesday, April 2, 1974, I gave a lecture on "Neuroanatomy of the Visual Pathways"
for the course in Neuro-Ophthalmology organized by Dr. David Cogan and colleagues
at the Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary.

I presented invited lectures on my research on Monday, December 10, 1973, at the
Worcester Foundation for Experimental Biology and on Monday, May 20, 1974, at the
Department of Anatomy, University of Arizona School of Medicine, Tucson, Arizona.
