'Tis gentle Spring, and many a smile
 Is seen to deck Columbia's soil,
 The spot with freedom crown'd
 No more fell Winter's howling storm,
 Augusta's circling plains deform,
 And strip the country round.

“Plague on all shallow ploughing,” said uncle Zebedee, who, by the way, I think to be a first rate farmer. “Deep ploughing,” said he, “is of great consequence to every species of plant. It not only furnishes the means of nourishment to the roots, but it counteracts the injurious consequences of either too wet or too dry a season. By deep ploughing you clear your ground of root weeds of every description—by deep ploughing your manures are properly covered—and by deep ploughing a heavier crop is raised than can be got from a shallow furrow.” Another intelligent farmer says, “I have ever found deep ploughing attended with good crops, when ridges shallow ploughed, in the same field, were but indifferent.” Now shallow ploughing is a very common fault with our farmers. Some are so very particular as not to vary an half inch from the practice of their fathers, grand-fathers, and great-grand fathers. There is Tim Dozy continues to plant the same cornfield, and in the same way that his ancestors did before him—just skimming the surface with his grubby stags and hungry dobin.

What a difference between the calculations of neighbor Dozy and neighbor Trim! The one is ever skimming over the surface and takes up with the scum, while the other finds good luck in the pot.

Let no one neglect his garden. "For gardening is the most productive and advantageous mode of occupying the soil. Gardens also employ the greatest number of labourers, and furnish the greatest quantity of useful produce from the smallest space of ground. The greater the extent of land therefore, thus cultivated, the more beneficial to community." You may think that a garden is of little consequence to you, as your father before you never paid much attention to one. But, my friend, I tell you for a truth, that a good garden, well managed, is as valuable as a beef and pork barrel well filled. By making use of the product of your garden, less bread and animal food is rendered necessary; "and if taken in sufficient quantities," says a well experienced writer on agriculture, "the human frame can be supported by them alone, more especially in youth, or when severe labour is avoided." You may say that you can live on meat alone, because you care nothing about sauce. But the fact is, that you would eat of the oyster were it not for the trouble of breaking the shell. Up, up, boys—this is no time for sleep. 'Tis the month of May. "Early to beed and early to rise"—makes me think what a respectable appearance you will make ten years hence.

O! thou prime of the rolling year,

“Every careful farmer will lay it down as a rule, frequently to inspect all his implements; and when any part of them is in the least damaged, or in danger of giving way, he will take care immediately to have it repaired.” Now, my friend, Capt. Snug, always looks out about this. He is none of your *do-for-the-present* farmers. His rakes never want a tooth; his forks a tine; or his ploughs a handle. If a tool is no longer wanted during the season, it is carefully laid up; and the captain always knows where to find it, for he has a place secure and properly constructed for containing all his implements. Now, in my opinion, no circumstance marks more the character of an attentive husbandman. “Where machines are necessarily exposed in the field, a great part of the season, they require to be new painted, at least, every second year. This defends them from drought, rain, rust and rot.” In this, my old friend, too, is up to the mark. His tools are all bright and of the first order. Look to your cabbages, and hoe them at least every other morning. Weeds, weeds, my lads—if they are not plucked up by the roots and given to the pigs to be converted into manure, they will not only mar the beauty of the field the present season but seed the earth for a plentiful crop of trouble the next.

“Composts are frequently made of various materials, as, several sorts of earth, lime, old mortar and plaster, green vegetables, before they run to seed, soft chalk, soap ashes, dung, &c. They should be mixed as much as possible in forming the heap. A fermentation is soon excited, and the oftener the heap is turned, so much the more will fermentation be promoted.”

“Composts are peculiarly well calculated for grass lands; improving their quality, and checking the progress of moss.”

How is your garden? Do the weeds overtop every thing? Remember that these weeds, if thrown into your hog-pen, will make good manure. The boys had better be pulling weeds, than going a fishing. They will catch two to one this way.—Come, wife, let us go into the garden and gather the cucumbers for pickling; but be cautious how you step, for the vines have no love for petticoats.—Gather ripe seeds—every one should raise his own seeds, and then there will be no grumbling on account of bad seed, &c. Blast the bugs—how they crippled my cucumber vines! A fig for your *preventives* and *preservatives*—one bug, taken by the knap of the neck and pinched 'till he's dead, is of more consequence to the vines than a thousand prevented or preserved ones.

I intended to have said a little to our fair dairy women before this, but it is not now too late. There is a newly invented pan for setting milk, to which none heretofore used can be compared. It is made of cast iron, and being softened by annealing in charcoal, is turned smooth inside, and laid over with a coat of tin, to prevent the iron coming in contact with the milk, and prevent injury from rust. The outside of the dish is painted, and they are easily kept clean. There is a proper degree of coolness, and the milk throws up more cream than in any other dishes. Earthen dishes are commonly glazed with lead, which the acid of the milk readily dissolves, and forms a compound of a most poisonous nature. Thus says Sir John Sinclair, whose experience in every branch of husbandry is beyond dispute. The best churn now in use is supposed to be what is called the cradle churn. "It is rocked regularly not faster than a pendulum of a clock, and answers the purpose of making butter uncommonly well." Come, Sarah, my dear, send Mrs Kindly, our parson's good lady, a cheese and box of your best butter. The neighbors say the Parson cannot preach to empty seats upon an empty stomach—so let us give him the comforts of this life, and be in our seats on the Sabbath to receive the bread of heaven.

Now autumn comes, in russet pride,

“Mind the main chance.” That is, look out and make all the manure you can. Cattle, horse and hog dung should be mixed well together, as the one corrects the defects of the other. You must lay them *stratum per stratum*. There is no difficulty in doing this, if your stable, cow-house and hog-stye are suitably placed and arranged. Mix a little good earth with the dung and it will be the better for it. Remember the better you keep your animals the better the dung will be. He, therefore, who keeps his cattle on meadow hay and scrub oaks, must expect to “sing small” in the dung line. Lay a stratum of mould, marl, muck or other earthy substances on the surface of your barn yard before the dung is collected, that none of the valuable juices may be lost. If possible to prevent, never let the water run from the yard. Your stables and cow-houses should also be so arranged, as that all liquids passing therefrom should be received into your yard and upon your dung. Come, friend Dupy, this is a serious matter, and must be attended to. Let us try to mend matters a little. And be sure that we mend them for the better. A compost heap, well managed, is a kind of farmer's Bank, a place of discount and deposit, from which his interest is drawn.

VERMONT.

Situation, Boundaries and Extent.

THE State of Vermont is situated between 43

degrees and 44 minutes, and 45 degrees north latitude; and between 1 degree 43 minutes, and 3 degrees 36 minutes of east longitude from Philadelphia. It is bounded on the east by the west line of Connecticut river which separates it from New Hampshire; on the south by Massachusetts; on the north by the 45th degree of north latitude, which separates it from Lower Canada; and on the west, by the State of New York; from which it is separated by the west line of the towns of Pownal, Bennington, Shaftsbury, Arlington, Sandgate, Rupert, Pawlet, Wells, and Poultney, and by the middle of the deepest channel of Poultney river, East Bay and Lake Champlain. Its mean width is 65 miles, and mean length 157 1-2 miles, it contains 10,237 1-2 square miles, or 6,552,000 acres.

GOVERNMENT OF VERMONT.

The present Constitution of Vermont was adopted by the Convention holden at Windsor, July 4, 1793. According to which, the Legislative powers are vested in a House of Representatives, chosen annually by the freemen of each organized town, on the first Tuesday of September, of such persons as shall have resided in the State two years.

The Executive Powers are vested in the Supreme Executive Council, which consists of a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and twelve persons chosen by the freemen of the State, at their meeting holden in each town, on the first Tuesday of September annually. In addition to the usual executive powers, the Governor and Council have power to revise and propose amendments to the laws passed by the House of Representatives; and if the amendments are not concurred in by the House, to suspend their passing until the next session of the Legislature.

The House of Representatives have power, in conjunction with the Governor and Council, to elect, annually, Judges of the Supreme, County and Probate Courts, Sheriffs, Justices of the

Peace, State's Attornies, and Directors of the State Bank, and in case of vacancy, Major Generals and Brigadier Generals.

The annual session of the Legislature is at Montpelier, on the second Thursday of October.

LITERARY INSTITUTIONS.

Whereas doubts have arisen respecting the duties of the Listers, in the several towns, in relation to the reductions to be made for buildings, mills, &c destroyed by fire or otherwise:

Therefore, Resolved, As the sense of this Legislature, that in each intermediate year between the full appraisal of the Real Estate, as required by the act, passed Nov. 15, 1820, in relation to the List of this State, the Listers in each town are to appraise and estimate the amount of such deductions, and in their return of the List to the General Assembly, set the aggregate of such deductions as a distinct item, and deduct it from the aggregate of the List—And are not otherwise to vary the appraisal of any of the Real Estate.

Sec. 2. *It is hereby further enacted,* That when any cause shall be appealed by the plaintiff or plaintiffs, from the decision of a Justice of the Peace, then, and in that case, the several County Courts in this State shall follow the same rule in taxing bills of cost, as is before prescribed in this act for taxing the same before Justices of the Peace.

Sec. 6. *It is hereby further enacted,* That no cost shall be taxed in favor of any plaintiff or plaintiffs, for travel or attendance in causes where the defendant may tender a confession of judgment, agreeably to the sixth section of the

STATE'S PRISON.

ALL persons convicted of crimes, the punishment of which was confinement, by former laws, are now sentenced to State's Prison at Windsor, for the same periods. Such persons as are convicted before the Supreme Court, of crimes, described in "the act for the punishment of certain capital crimes, and other high crimes and misdemeanors," the punishment of which was cropping, pillory, or whipping;—and those who are convicted by the Supreme or County Courts, of crimes not described in the last mentioned act, and where corporal punishment was formerly in-

dicted may now be sentenced to the State's Prison for a term not exceeding three years, instead of the corporal punishment. And those who are convicted of perjury, subornation of perjury, forgery, swindling, obtaining property by false tokens, and counterfeiting hard money orders, instead of the former punishment, may be sentenced to the State's Prison for a term not exceeding seven years.

The government of the Prison is vested in a Superintendant, chosen annually by the Legislature, who enters upon his office, on the first day of December. He is authorised to establish such rules, regulations and bye laws for the management of the concerns of said prison, and for the government and security of the convicts, as may be necessary and proper, and not repugnant to the constitution and laws of this State. He may have power to appoint and remove a keeper, servants and guards. It is the duty of the Superintendant to purchase all the provisions and materials for manufacturing, and all other articles necessary for the prison, and to sell all manufactures and other articles proper to be sold, and keep an exact account thereof, and of all the expenses, and make report to the Legislature. In case of death, resignation or incapacity of the Superintendant, the Governor is authorised to supply his place.

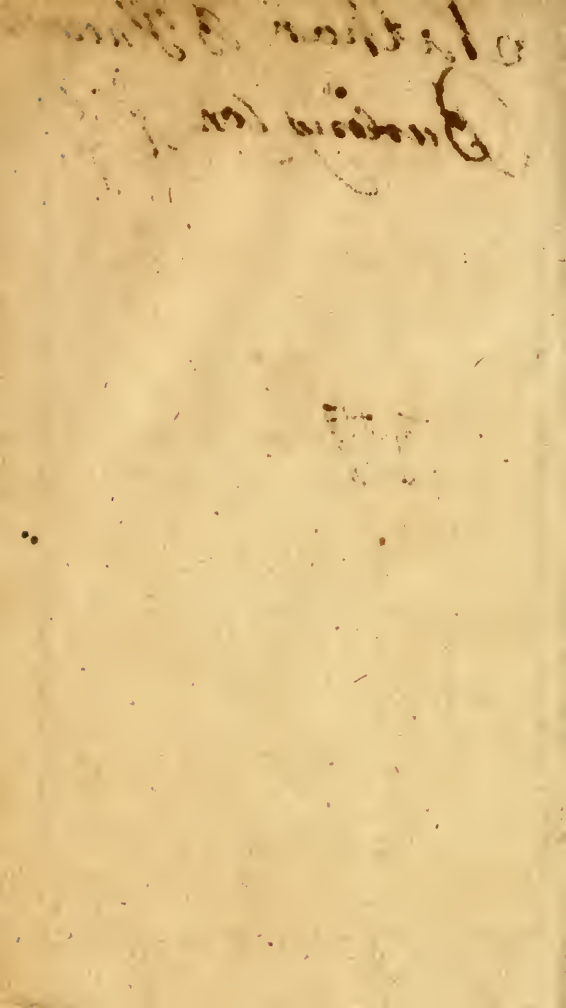

VERMONT.

Situation, Boundaries and Extent.

THE State of Vermont is situated between 43 degrees and 44 minutes, and 45 degrees north latitude ; and between 1 degree 43 minutes, and 3 degrees 36 minutes of east longitude from Philadelphia. It is bounded on the east by the west line of Connecticut river which separates it from New Hampshire ; on the south by Massachusetts ; on the north by the 45th degree of north latitude, which separates it from Lower Canada ; and on the west by the state of New York ; from which it is separated by the west line of the towns of Pownal, Bennington, Shaftsbury, Arlington, Sandgate, Rupert, Pawlet, Wells, and Poultney, and by the middle of the deepest channel of Poultney river, East Bay and Lake Champlain. Its mean width is 65 miles, and mean length 157 1-2 miles, it contains 10,237 1-2 square miles, or 6,552,000 acres.

Government of Vermont.

The present Constitution of Vermont was adopted by the Convention, holden at Windsor, July 4, 1793. According to which, the Legislative powers are vested in a House of Representatives, chosen annually by the freemen of each organised town, on the first Tuesday of September, of such persons as shall have resided in the state two years.

The Executive powers are vested in the Supreme Executive Council, which consists of a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and twelve persons chosen by the freemen of the state, at their meeting holden in each town, on the first Tuesday of September annually. In addition to the usual executive powers, the Governor and Council have power to revise and propose amendments to the laws passed by the House of Representatives; and if the amendments are not concurred in by the House, to suspend their passing until the next session of the Legislature.

The House of Representatives have power, in conjunction with the Governor and Council, to elect, annually, Judges of the Supreme, County and Pro-

bate Courts, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, State's Attornies, and Directors of the State Bank, and in case of vacancy, Major Generals and Brigadier Generals.

The annual session of the Legislature is at Montpelier, on the second Thursday of October.

SEC. 1. *It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont, That no plaintiff, in any civil action, before a justice of the peace, shall recover any travelling fee, except for his actual travel when he personally appears in court. Nor shall any plaintiff, in any civil cause whatever, before a justice of the peace, recover a greater sum than one dollar and fifty cents, for costs, on any judgment where the debt or damages recovered, does not exceed the sum of one dollar and fifty cents; except costs which may accrue from continuances at the special instance and request of the defendant, or in case the defendant shall appeal to the County Court. And for every sum in debt or damages, recovered above the sum of one dollar and fifty cents, the plaintiff shall recover no more costs than debt or damages, except costs which may accrue from continuances at the request of the defendant as aforesaid, or in case of appeal, as aforesaid.*

SEC. 2. *It is hereby further enacted, That when any cause shall be appealed by the plaintiff or plaintiffs, from the decision of a justice of the peace, then, and in that case, the several County Courts in this State shall follow the same rule in taxing bills of cost, as is before prescribed in this act for taxing the same before justices of the Peace.*

SEC. 6. *It is hereby further enacted, That no cost shall be taxed in favor of any plaintiff or plaintiffs, for travel or attendance in causes where the defendant may tender*

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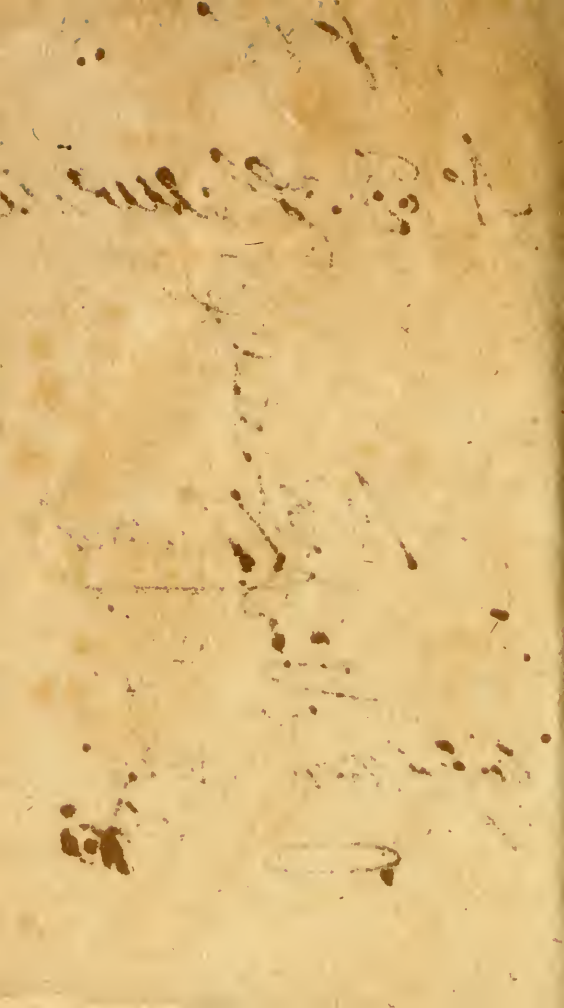

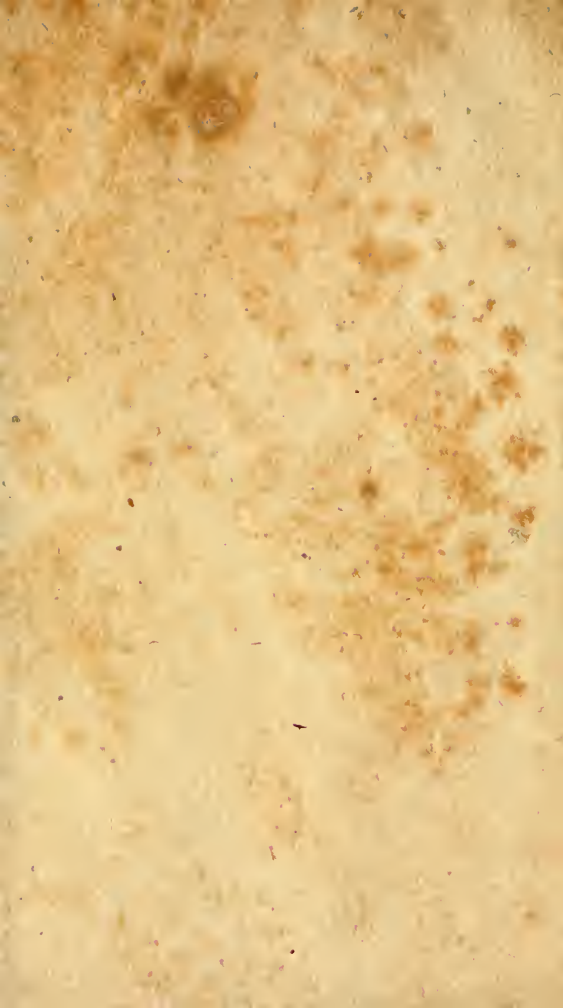

Bad fence is one sign of a bad husband.

Plough for spring grain. There is no time to lose; every farmer must be busy in his field; his boys must not be suffered to lounge about. Bring them up in the way they should go, that when they become men, they will be respected as honest and industrious. Plant early peas and potatoes in warm land. Lay your gardens in ridges.

Sow sallads, early turnips, and radishes. A little pains and attention will furnish you with all these agreeable things, and save you the trouble of running to your neighbour every day or two for them.

Let flax ground be ploughed often. Sow your early beets and carrots, they will taste well with a slice of pork. Uncover roots, and loosen the dirt around them. Plant early potatoes; look to your garden seeds.

You may now set fruit trees. Set out cabbage stumps for greens, and roots for seeds.—Keep clear from quarrels, and do not plague your brains about politics; for he who quarrels himself into notice, will be sick of his bargain.

Cut your coat according to your cloth ; that is, balance accounts between your expenses and your income ; and again, plant no more ground than you have dung for ; and again, relate no more stories than you can support by good vouchers. Now attend to sheep-shearing.—Bleed your oxen, and turn them out to grass. Do not neglect your gardens ; but weed your early beets and sallads. Sow carrots, &c. for winter. Set out more cabbages, and hoe your early ones. Set tobacco plants. What need have we to go to Virginia for tobacco ? Every one that has land and disposition may raise his own.

Destroy bugs that infest your vines. Water tender plants in the evening. Salt your cattle, and cows often, if you would add value to their milk. Plant cucumbers for pickling. Weed flax. Plough fallows while the dew is on, and pay attention to compost manure. Attend to your corn. Pole beans. Salt cattle, and prepare your tools for haying. Place your hencoops in your garden, that the chicks may destroy bugs and worms.

 And ripen'd fruit in place of flowers
 Salute the well pleased eye.

Cut corn-stalks as soon as the milk is out of the kernel.—Put your cider mill in order. Get off flax seed and prepare it for rotting. Take care that the birds do not rob you of your peas. Pull white beans and hang them up to dry. Take care of your corn-stalks; they make excellent fodder if well cured.

This is one of the most pleasant months in the year. The earth returns her abundance to repay us for our labour. The weather is generally clear and healthy, and the country seems alive with business.—Now collect your apples for cider, and put them under cover till they become mellow. In general farmers are too careless about making and putting up their cider. You can't be too nice about your barrels. Musty cider is the worst of all liquors.

Put up swine for fattening, and give them plenty of brimstone or antimony. Let out your shoats to gather nuts; and drive out drones, for they are worth nothing, and cost much.

Be careful to bung up your barrels tight, which you have emptied.

Can we, untouched by gratitude, view that profusion of good, which the Divine hand pours around us?

What feelings are more uneasy and painful than the workings of sour and angry passions?

A beggar's wallet is a mile to the bottom. No matter for that, give him a trifle and you will get rid of him.—Every one now should be busy in harvest ; regardless of minor concerns. Gathering of corn and potatoes will employ all hands.

Plough your low and wet gardens into ridges. Husk your corn betimes. I have thought it cheaper to husk my own corn with my own hired men, than to make a husking ; for among all the frolick, bustle and confusion of a husking my corn gets mixed, crumbled and dirty ; some husked, some half husked, and some not at all.—Haste makes waste, and waste costs money, says cousin Tim.—Finish making cider. Gather in your roots. Gather in your seeds, and take good care of them, that you need not have to beg of your neighbours next spring.

Heap up your summer dung, or carry it into your fields and grass lands.—Feed your turkeys if you mean to have them ready for thanksgiving.—*Keep no more cats than what will catch mice.*

After the first departure from sincerity, it is seldom in our power to stop ; one artifice generally leads on to another.

Happiness does not grow up of its own accord ; it is the fruit of long cultivation, and the acquisition of labour and care.

A good wife makes a good husband ; so you see we must go hand in hand. Finish ploughing. Gather roots from your garden, or the frost will save you the trouble.—Now carefully house your tools. Every farmer should have a place on purpose for this business. If you have borrowed a tool of your neighbour make haste to carry it home, lest it cause a hue and cry next spring to find it.

Dig stone that you may sled them in the winter. Bleed horses and fat cattle. Look to your hogs ; give them plenty of brimstone. Remove your cabbages. Shelter your bees. Pay your taxes. Secure your cellars. Plant and set fruit trees. Thresh out grain. Rack off cider, and put it into clean barrels. Put up cattle. Listen not to tatlers. Employ no quacks. VERMONT.

SITUATION, BOUNDARIES AND EXTENT.

THE state of Vermont is situated between 42 degrees and 44 minutes, and 45 degrees north latitude ; and between 1 degree 43 minutes, and 3 degrees 36 minutes of east longitude from Philadelphia. It is bounded on the east by the west line of Connecticut river, which separates it from New Hampshire ; on the south by Massachusetts ; on the north by the 45th degree of north latitude, which separates it from Lower Canada ; and on the west, by the state of New York ; from which it is separated by the west line of the towns of Pownal, Bennington, Shaftsbury, Arlington, Sandgate, Rupert, Pawlet, Wells, and Poultney, and by the middle of the deepest channel of Poultney river, East Bay and Lake Champlain. Its mean width is 65 miles, and mean length 157 1-2 miles, it contains 10,237 1-2 square miles, or 6,552,000 acres.

DIVISION.

The state of Vermont is divided into 13 counties, which are subdivided into 245 townships and 16 gores. The townships are generally about six miles square ; the gores are much smaller. The names

GOVERNMENT.

The present Constitution of Vermont was adopted by the Convention holden at Windsor, July 4, 1793. According to which, the Legislative powers are vested in a House of Representatives, chosen annually by the freemen of each organized town, on the first Tuesday of September, of such persons as shall have resided in the state two years.

The Executive Powers are vested in the Supreme

Executive Council, which consists of a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and twelve persons chosen by the freemen of the state, at their meeting holden in each town, on the first Tuesday of September annually. In addition to the usual executive powers, the Governor and Council have power to revise and propose amendments to the laws passed by the House of Representatives; and if the amendments are not concurred in by the House, to suspend their passing until the next session of the Legislature.

The House of Representatives have power, in conjunction with the Governor and Council, to elect, annually, Judges of the Supreme, County and Probate Courts, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, State's Attornies, and Directors of the State Bank, and in case of vacancy, Major Generals and Brigadier Generals.

The annual session of the Legislature is at Montpelier, on the second Thursday of October.

The Militia of Vermont is divided into *four* Divisions, with a Major General to each; *ten* Brigades, with a Brigadier General to each; and into *thirty-five* Regiments, with from eight to twelve companies in each. The Governor is Captain General and Commander in Chief. The Militia of the state consists of all the able bodied males, with a few exceptions made by law, between the age of 18 and 45 years. Each soldier is required to keep himself constantly provided with such arms and equipments, as are necessary for actual service, and, by so doing, his poll is exempted from taxation. The major generals and brigadier generals are appointed by the Legislature. The field officers are chosen by the commissioned officers of their respective regiments, and the several companies elect their own officers.

The *Washington Artillery*, denominated Governor's Guard, choose their officers annually, and are commissioned by the Governor. Officers for 1824-5, Joseph Somersby, *captain*; Roswell H. Knapp, *1st lieutenant*; Christopher C. Wing, *2d lieutenant*; Stephen Smith, *ensign*.

The Medical and Philosophical Society of the State of Vermont.

The society is to be composed, 1st of Fellows 2d of Hon. members, 3d Cor. members, and 4th of Ord. members. The requisites for admission are,—if the candidate be a medical man, the highest honor of a medical institution; if a clergyman, a collegiate education, with the degree of A. M.; if a member of the bar, the degree of A. M.—Nevertheless candidates are eligible to become members without these pre-requisites, provided they have rendered themselves conspicuous in any of the sciences to which this society is devoted.

The candidates are to be elected members, by a vote of two thirds of the Fellows present. Honorary members to be elected from distinguished corresponding and ordinary members, and such other men of science, as shall be recommended by two or more, of the regular members—corresponding from ordinary members, possessed of the degree of Doctor of Medicine. Ordinary members to consist of the Matriculated Students of the Vermont Academy of Medicine, to be elected by a vote of two thirds of the members present.

BANKS.

There are four Banks in this State. One at Burlington, with a capital of \$150,000. E. T. Englesby, President, John C. Thompson, Cashier. One at Windsor, with a capital of \$100,000. Abner Forbes, President, Edward R. Campbell, Cashier. One at Brattleborough, with a capital of \$100,000. Jonathan Hunt, jr. President, E. Seymour, Cashier. One at Rutland, with a capital of \$100,000. This Bank was granted the last session of the General Assembly, but has not yet gone into operation. The Banks of Burlington and of Windsor were established in 1818, and the Bank of Brattleborough, in 1821. They are in successful operation, and their bills are current throughout the New England States. But few, if any of them, have ever been counterfeited. Six per cent. as a bonus on the profits of these Banks, is annually paid into the Treasury of the State. It has usually amounted to from six to seven hundred dollars per year.

STATE PRISON.

The Vermont State Prison, situated in the town of Windsor, is a firm and well constructed building, entirely of stone. It was erected in the years 1808 and 9, at an expense of about 40,000 dollars. The first commitments were made in 1819. For many years after the first commitments from five to seven thousand dollars annually were drawn from the Treasury for the support of the establishment. Under the prudent management of its present officers, a nett saving of some hundred dollars is annually made to the Treasury. The immediate government of the prison is vested in a superintendent and warden. The former has the principal management of the prudential concerns and the disposal of the State Prison Manufactures. 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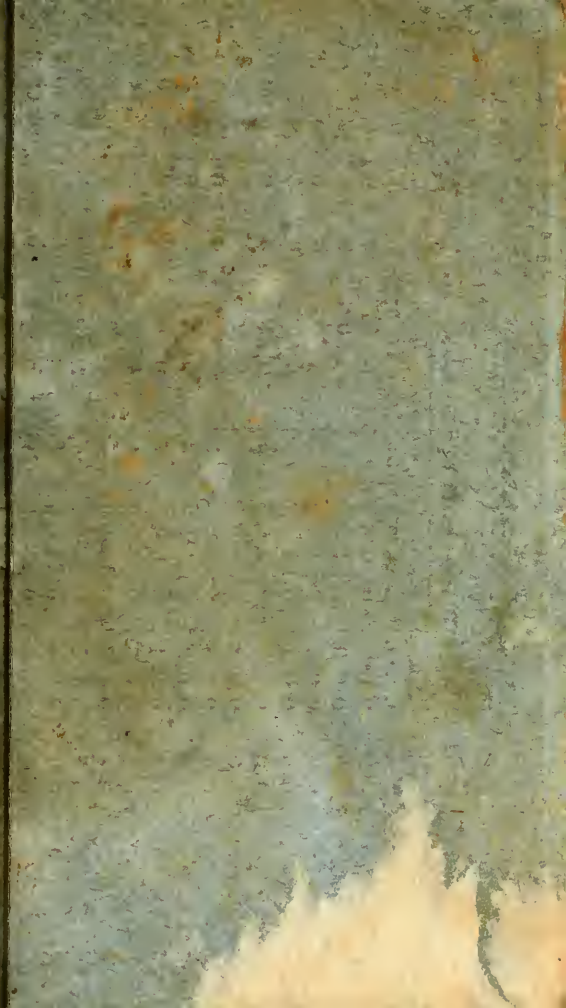

Well, neighbour Ploughjogger, how do you spend your long winter evenings ? Why, sir, I am now engaged in reading to my family Marshall's Life of Washington. It is decidedly my opinion that we cannot spend our long evenings at this season more agreeably, or more profitably to our families, than by reading them books of history, biography, and travels.

Happiness does not grow up of its own accord ; it is the fruit of long cultivation, and the acquisition of labour and care.

“ *Change of weather makes conversation for fools,*” says neighbor Thinkum. “ *No matter what the weather is ; if we do but calculate we shall be able to sail with all winds.*” In fair weather we should prepare for foul, and in foul weather for fair.

Keep an eye upon your fields ; nor let the product of them wholly go to feed the vermine. You will do well to secure your crops as they become ripe, without waiting in all cases for express and particular orders from the Almanack maker. Remember that the wise Solomon has said that, *He that is slothful in his work is brother to him who is a great waster*, and Solomon's sayings may be considered as nearly on-a par with the Almanack maker's at all times.

He that often *empties a jug*, whether it be stope or earthen, may himself expect soon to go to *fill a jug*, built with stone and corked up with iron.

Raw eggs, says the American Farmer, given to sheep and cattle which have been poisoned by eating laurel or ivory leaves, will effect a speedy cure. The dose is one for a sheep, or four for a cow.—They can be administered by simply breaking the shell and slipping the yolk and as much of the white as practicable, down the animals throat.

NEW-HAMPSHIRE.

Electors of President and Vice president, by general ticket ; electors 8 ; state election, 2d Tuesday in March ; state Legislature at Concord, 1st Wednesday in June ; senators 12, representatives 198 ; pay per day, \$2 ; term of office, both branches, one year ; governor, chosen for one year by the people ; governors eligible, indefinitely ; governor, DAVID L. MORRIL ; must be an inhabitant seven years ; 30 years of age ; estate of £500 half freehold—has a negative in making laws ; and, with advice of Council, appoints military and civil officers of the state generally ; salary, \$1,200 ; secretary, Samuel Sparhawk ; adoption of U. S. constitution, June 21, 1788 ; state constitution, Sept. 5, *1792.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Electors of President and Vice President, by districts ; electors 15 ; state election 1st Monday in April ; state Legislature at Boston, in January and May ; numbers of senators and representatives indefinite ; pay per day \$2 ; term of office, both branches one year ; governor chosen for one year by the people ; governor eligible, indefinitely ; governor, LEVI LINCOLN ; must be an inhabitant seven years, freehold estate of £1000 in the commonwealth ; must declare himself of the Christian

religion ; and with the Council, appoints the officers of the state generally ; salary, \$3,367 ; secretary, *Edward D. Bangs* ; adoption of the U. S. constitution, February 6, 1788 ; state constitution, March 2, 1780.

P. VAN NESS ; must have resided in the state four years. The governor, with the council, commissions all officers, appoints some, grants pardons, and sees that the laws are executed ; salary, \$750 ; secretary, *Norman Williams* ; adoption of U. S. constitution, July 4, †1791 ; state constitution, July 4, 1793.

NEW-YORK.

Electors of President and Vice President, by Legislature ; electors 36 ; state election 1st Monday in Nov. ; state legislature at Albany, 1st Tuesday in Jan. ; senate 32, Assembly 123 ; pay per day \$3 ; term of office, senate four years, in classes, Assembly one year ; governor chosen for two years by the people ; governor eligible indefinitely ; governor, DE WITT CLINTON ; must be a wise and discreet freeholder of the state ; may convene and prorogue the Legislature, grants reprieves, and with the consent of the Council, appoints to office, &c. ; salary, \$5000 ; secretary, *John V. N. Yates* ; adoption of the U. S. constitution, July 26, 1788 ; state constitution, April 20, 1777.

NEW-JERSEY.

in any civil action, before a justice of the peace, shall recover any travelling fee, except for his actual travel when he personally appears in court. Nor shall any plaintiff, in any civil cause whatever, before a justice of the peace, recover a greater sum than one dollar and fifty cents, for costs, on any judgment where the debt or damages recovered, does not exceed the sum of one dollar and fifty cents; except costs which may accrue from continuances at the special instance and request of the defendant, or in case the defendant shall appeal to the county court. And for every sum in debt or damages, recovered, above the sum of one dollar and fifty cents, the plaintiff shall recover no more costs than debt or damages, except costs which may accrue from continuances at the request of the defendant as aforesaid, or in case of appeal, as aforesaid.

The foregoing list is gleaned from the National Register, published at the city of Washington, April, 1825. Some few alterations, in the postmasters in this state, may have taken place since, and there may be errors in some of the names. But it is believed to be as correct as the nature of the subject will permit. The compensation is for the year 1823.

It appears by the foregoing, that there are 163 post-offices in this state, and that the sum of about *twenty thousand dollars* is annually paid on the postage of letters, papers, and pamphlets, by the citizens of Vermont.

 RATES OF POSTAGES,

*Established by act of Congress, passed, March 3d,
1825.*

For a SINGLE LETTER, composed of one piece of paper, for any distance not exceeding 30 miles, 6 cents; over 30, and not exceeding 80 miles, 10 cents; over 80, and not exceeding 150 miles, 12 1-2 cents; over 150, and not exceeding 400 miles, 18 3-4; over 400, 25 cents.

DOUBLE LETTERS, or those composed of two pieces of paper, are charged with double those rates.

TRIPLE LETTERS, or those composed of three pieces of paper, are charged triple those rates.

LETTERS composed of more than three pieces of paper, are charged with but triple postage, unless they weigh together one ounce avoirdupoise, in which case they are charged with quadruple postage for each ounce according their weight; their contents of whatever articles they may be composed, are always included in the weight on which postage is charged; but no packet of letters conveyed by *water mails* shall be charged with more than quadruple postage, unless the same shall contain more than four distinct letters.

Newspaper Postage.

For each newspaper carried not over 100 miles, 1 cent; over 100 miles, 1 1-2 cents; but if carried to any office in the state in which it is printed, whatever the distance may be, the rate is 1 cent.

Pamphlet Postage.

Pamphlets published periodically, not exceeding 100 miles, 1 1-2 cents per sheet; over 100 miles, 2 1-2 cents per sheet. Pamphlets not published periodically, not exceeding 100 miles, 4 cents per sheet; over 100 miles, 6 cents per sheet.

Extract from the By-Laws of the Medical Institution.

The Medical Lectures shall begin annually on the 1st Wednesday of September, and continue fourteen weeks.

*Dean of the Faculty.

At the commencement of every Lecture term, each student shall pay to the Dean of the Faculty the sum of three dollars for defraying the contingent expenses of the Institution.

*The lecture fees shall be as follows :

Anatomy and Physiology, - - - -	\$14
Surgery and Obstetrics, - - - -	10
Chemistry and Natural Philosophy, -	10
Theory and Practice of Physic and Materia Medica, - - - - -	10
Graduation fee, - - - - -	12

Candidates for Medical Degrees shall have attended two courses of lectures on each of the above branches, the last of which must have been in this Institution.

No one will be admitted as a candidate for a degree unless he is twenty-one years of age—sustains a good moral character—has studied three years with a respectable physician, or physicians—has passed a satisfactory examination before the Medical Faculty on the several branches taught in the Institution—and has read and defended before the Faculty a written dissertation on some subject connected with Medical Science.

The dissertations must be given in to the Dean of the Faculty at least three weeks previous to the day of examination.

There shall be two examinations yearly.—One on the day next succeeding the close of the Lecture term—the other on the Saturday immediately preceding the annual commencement in the University.

Students who have attended two courses in this Institution will be admitted to succeeding Lectures

by paying three dollars for defraying contingent expenses.

Terms of Admission.—The requisites for admission to the freshman class, are a knowledge of Clark's Introduction to the making of Latin, Virgil, Cicero's Select Orations, Sallust, Graeca Minora and the Greek Testament, Geography and common Arithmetic. In all cases bonds are required to secure the payment of tuition.

Students from other colleges, in order to an admission into this, must produce a certificate of their regular dismissal, and submit to an examination.

Annual commencement, on the second Wednesday in August.

COURSE OF STUDIES.

Freshman Year.—First term.—Livy five books, Graeca Majora 1st volume, Adam's Roman Antiquities.

Second term.—Livy finished, Graeca Majora 1st volume, Murray's English grammar, Lacroix's Arithmetic, Morse's Geography.

Third term.—Horace through the Odes, Graeca Majora, Lacroix's Algebra.

Written translations from English into Latin, and from Latin into English during the 1st and 2d term, and English composition during the 3d term.

Sophomore Year.—First term.—Legendre's Geometry, Horace finished, Jamieson's Grammar of Rhetoric and Hedge's Logic.

Second term.—Graeca Majora 1st and 2d vols. Excerpta Latina, Walker's Rhetorical Grammar.

Third term.—Excerpta Latina, Cicero de Oratore, Analytic Plane Trigonometry.

Translations into Latin and Greek, and English composition through the year.

Junior Year.—First term.—Graeca Majora 2d volume, Analytic Conic Sections and Spherical Trigonometry.

Second term.—Select portions of Virgil with written criticisms, application of Geometry Trigonometry and Conic Sections, Enfield's Philosophy, Tytler's Elements of History.

Third term.—Graeca Majora, Enfield's Philosophy. English and Latin themes through the year.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

To be admitted to the Freshman Class, the candidate must be thoroughly acquainted with the grammar of the Latin and Greek languages, and be able to construe and parse any portion of the following books, viz :—Virgil, the Greek Testament, Cicero's Select Orations, and Dalzel's *Collectanea Græca Minora*. He must likewise be able to translate English into Latin correctly; and possess a knowledge of Geography and Arithmetick, including Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, with the doctrine of Roots and Powers.

N. B. The time appointed for examination, is the day preceding the annual commencement. Applicants from a distance, however, may be examined at the close of the ensuing vacation.

For admission to an advanced standing, the candidate, in addition to the requisites for the Freshman Class, must be acquainted with the studies pursued by the Class, which he wishes to join.

It is desirable that those youth, who are studying with a view to enter this College, should use the

particular books here prescribed. In extraordinary cases, however, an equivalent knowledge of other classicks will be admitted as a substitute for partial deficiencies.

No scholar from another College can be admitted without examination; nor can any such applicant be admitted to examination, without producing from the presiding officer, a certificate of his good standing and regular dismissal.

N. B. In all cases, a bond for the payment of the College bills, is required.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION AND STUDY.

For the Freshmen.—First term.—Sallust, Cicero de Officiis, Murray's English Grammar, Arithmetic reviewed; and a portion of Dalzel's Collectanea Græca Majora.

Second term.—Græca Majora continued, Cicero de Amicitia and Senectute, Jamieson's Rhetorick, Livy, and Day's Algebra.

Third term.—Græca Majora continued, Livy continued, Day's Algebra concluded, and Priestley's Lectures; with a review of preceding studies.

Through the Year.—A portion of the Greek Testament, on Monday morning; written translations from Latin or Greek into English, or from English into Latin, once in two weeks; and declamations once in two weeks.

Sophomores.—First term.—Horace, Playfair's Euclid, and Morse's Geography.

Second term.—Horace continued, Græca Majora continued, and Day's Trigonometry, and Mensuration of Superficies and Solids.

Third term.—Græca Majora continued through the first volume; Tacitus, Hedge's Logic, and Day's Mensuration of Heights and Distances, Navigation and Surveying; with a review of preceding studies.

Through the Year.—A portion of the Greek Testament on Monday morning; written translations from the Latin and Greek Classics, English compositions and declamations.

Juniors.—First term.—Tacitus continued; Græca Majora, second volume; Dutton's Spherical Trigonometry and Conic Sections, and Enfield's Natural Philosophy.

Second term.—Cicero de Oratore, Græca Majora continued, Enfield's Natural Philosophy concluded.

Third term.—De Oratore continued, Græca Majora concluded, Enfield's Astronomy, Vince's Fluxion's, and Paley's Natural Theology, with a review of preceding studies.

Through the year.—Greek Testament Monday morning; frequent exercises in composition, Forensic discussions and declamations.

Seniors.—First term.—Blair's Lectures, Paley's Moral Philosophy, Vattel's Law of Nations, and the first volume of Locke on the Human Understanding.

Second term.—Locke on the Human Understanding continued, Stewart's Elements of the Philosophy of the Human Mind, Brown's Lectures, and Butler's Analogy.

Third term.—Brown's Lectures continued, and Payley's View of the Evidences of Christianity, with a review of preceding studies.

Through the year.—On Monday morning, a portion of the Greek Testament; the Hebrew language once a week: frequent exercises in declamation, composition and forensic discussions.

N. B. In addition to the exercises in Elocution before the respective instructors of each class; the Senior class in succession, (four each week) declaim before the whole College, after evening prayers; and twelve (four from each of the three lower classes) speak on every Wednesday afternoon.

Examinations.—All the classes are carefully examined twice a year, before the whole Faculty, a Committee of the Corporation and such other literary gentlemen as are disposed to attend.

Exhibitions.—One of the Sophomore class, on the day preceding the spring vacation; one of the Junior class, on the last Wednesday in November; and one for the Senior class, on the evening of the same day.

5th. Theory and Practice of Medicine.

6th. Medical Jurisprudence.

The course of instruction commences at the Medical College in Castleton, the first Thursday September, annually, and continues fifteen weeks.

here are five Lectures daily, through the whole term, and occasionally six, besides regular evening examinations. The Matriculation fee, is \$3; the fee for all the courses \$40; and the graduation fee \$12.

In order to be entitled to a recommendation by the faculty, for a degree, the candidate must have arrived at the age of twenty-one years, and have sustained a good moral character—must have studied the different branches of medicine, either in some medical institution, or with some respectable physician and surgeon, for at least three years, including the lecture terms—must have diligently attended two full courses of lectures, on all the several branches, either at this or some other incorporated institution, the last of which must have been at this—must have passed a satisfactory examination before the faculty and delegates from the Vermont Medical Society, and have delivered and defended a written dissertation on some medical subject, to the approbation of the faculty & delegates; must have obtained certificates from the treasurer, that he has paid into the treasury the graduation fee, and either paid, or secured to be paid the prescribed lecture fees.

Having complied with these terms, and been recommended to the corporations, both of the Vermont Academy of Medicine, and of Middlebury College, the candidate shall be entitled to the degree of Doctor of Medicine, on a major vote of both corporations, unless some sufficient reason appears, why he should not be admitted to such honour; and said degree shall be conferred, either at the annual commencement of the Vermont Academy in Castleton, or at that of Middlebury College, at the choice of the candidate.

The price of board in Castleton, including room-rent, fuel, and washing, varies from \$1 25, to \$2 a week.

It appears that of the fifty-seven men, who signed the DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE, the birth places of four are unknown: ten were natives of Massachusetts; nine of Virginia; seven of Pennsylvania; five of South Carolina; four of Maryland; three of New-

†Mr. Carroll first took his seat in Congress on the 18th July, 1776, when the credentials of the Delegates newly appointed by Maryland, were presented. The following anecdote should not be lost:—After Mr. Carroll was introduced to the President on first taking his seat, he drew his attention to the parchment copy of the Declaration of Independence and invited him to sign it. Mr. Carroll replied, “with great pleasure.” and advanced to the table—whilst signing it, a member remarked, in an under tone, “there goes a few millions,”—alluding to the great wealth of Mr. Carroll.

It is a fact proved by the Journals, that the following delegates from Pennsylvania, who signed the Declaration of Independence, were not members of Congress at its date, nor were they appointed as such by the Legislature of Pennsylvania until the 20th of July:—George Clymer, James Smith, George Taylor, James Wilson, George Ross and Benjamin Rush

††Voted for Independence, but was not present when the Declaration was signed.

Jersey; three of Connecticut; two of New-York; two of Delaware; two of Rhode-Island; two of England; one of Ireland, and one of Wales.

The youngest man who signed the Declaration of Independence, was Edward Rutledge, of South Carolina, then aged *twenty-six* years, and the oldest man who signed it, was Benjamin Franklin, then aged *seventy* years. What a splendid career of usefulness he ran after three score and ten! The average age of all the persons who signed the Declaration, at the time of signing, was a fraction more than forty-four years.

Thomas Lynch, jr. of South Carolina, was but 27 when he signed the Declaration, and died in the 30th year of his age, being the youngest man who died after having signed that most important of all State Papers. It is remarkable that the *three* youngest men in Congress, July 4, 1776, were all South Carolinians; their ages averaging but 27 years and a third, while that of the whole assembly, their own included, averaged more than 44 years. The average age of the persons who signed the Declaration of Independence, at the time of their death, was sixty-six years and nearly a half year. The one who lived to the greatest age, was William Ellery, of Rhode-Island, who lived to be ninety-two. The only one now alive, Charles Carroll—Health and peace to the evening of his days!—is now in his eighty-eighth year.

It is not out of place, nor unworthy of remark to say, that an examination of the signatures of those fifty-seven gentlemen, subscribed to the Declaration, will exhibit many excellent specimens of penmanship. It is doubtful whether to any state paper in any country, can be found so many well written names.

Of the members of the Continental Congress, who signed the Declaration of Independence, and of whose occupations we recollect to have had any account, twenty-eight were brought up to professional pursuits, five as merchants and three as farmers or planters. Of the professional men, twenty-one were lawyers, six physicians and one a minister.

At a very critical period of the revolutionary war, when there was great difficulty in procuring supplies for the American Army, and when there was a danger of its dissolution for want of provisions to keep it together, a number of patriotic gentlemen gave their bonds to the amount of about £260,000, in gold and silver, for procuring them. The provisions were procured, and the army was supplied and kept together. The following are the names of the choice spirits who came forward on that critical occasion :

SITUATION, BOUNDARIES AND EXTENT.

THE state of Vermont is situated between 42 degrees and 44 minutes, and 45 degrees north latitude; and between 1 degree 43 minutes, and 3 degrees 36 minutes of east longitude from Philadelphia. It is

bounded on the east by the west line of Connecticut river, which separates it from New-Hampshire; on the south by Massachusetts; on the north by the 45th degree of north latitude, which separates it from Lower Canada; and on the west, by the state of New-York; from which it is separated by the west line of the towns of Pownal, Bennington, Shaftsbury, Arlington, Sandgate, Rupert, Pawlet, Wells, and Poultney, and by the middle of the deepest channel of Poultney river, East Bay and Lake Champlain. Its mean width is 65 miles, and mean length 157 1-2 miles, it contains 10,237 1-2 square miles, or 6,552,000 acres.

DIVISION.

The state of Vermont is divided into 13 counties, which are subdivided into 245 townships and 16 gores. The townships are generally about six miles square; the gores are much smaller. The names of the counties and shire towns, and the number of towns and gores in each county, in 1824, are exhibited in the following

GOVERNMENT.

The present Constitution of Vermont was adopted by the Convention holden at Windsor, July 4, 1793. According to which, the Legislative powers are vested in a house of representatives, chosen annually by the freemen of each organized town, on the first Tuesday of September, of such persons as shall have resided in the state two years.

The Executive Powers are vested in the Supreme Executive Council, which consists of a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and twelve persons chosen by the freemen of the state, at their meeting holden in each town, on the first Tuesday of September annually. In addition to the usual executive powers, the Governor and Council have power to revise and propose amendments to the laws passed by the House of Representatives; and if the amendments are not concurred in by the House, to suspend their passing until the next session of the Legislature.

The House of Representatives has power, in conjunction with the Governor and Council, to elect, annually, Judges of the Supreme, County and Probate Courts, Sheriffs, Justices of the peace, State's Attornies, and Directors of the State Bank, and in case of vacancy, Major Generals and Brigadier Generals.

The annual session of the Legislature is at Montpelier, on the second Thursday of October.

SEC. 1. *It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Vermont,* that no plaintiff in any civil action, before a justice of the peace, shall recover any travelling fee, except for his actual travel when he personally appears in court. Nor shall any plaintiff, in any civil cause whatever, before a justice of the peace, recover a greater sum than one dollar and fifty cents, for costs, on any judgment where the debt or damages recovered, does not exceed the sum of one dollar and fifty cents; except costs which may accrue from continuances at the special instance and request of the defendant, or in case the defendant shall appeal to the county court. And for every sum in debt or damages, recovered, above the sum of one dollar and fifty cents, the plaintiff shall recover no more costs than debt or damages, except costs which may accrue from continuances at the request of the defendant as aforesaid, or in case of appeal, as aforesaid.
