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




























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















































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
FOUNDER'S HALL

Named for those people who were instrumental in the creation of Francis Marion College, Founders Hall was begun in May of 1973 and occupied in the fall of 1975. The College's first classroom building, the two-story structure is designed to accommodate all present and anticipated instructional needs as well as provide facilities for programs ranging from small seminars to large lectures. Housing most of the College's academic departments, the structure was officially dedicated on June 29, 1975.




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









BIOLOGY DEPARTMENT



The Biology Department offered an extremely successful summer marine biology course. The course, which included five field trips to the coast, had tremendous appeal for upper-level biology students.

The Biology Department, like other departments at Francis Marion, is responsive to student interest. On the basis of requests from students in a senior genetics course, an accredited seminar on human genetics was presented.

The Department made extensive use of film loops and other visual aids in its offerings, especially its introductory courses.





BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION AND ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT





In view of the current economic situation, the Business Administration and Economics Department was extraordinarily busy during 1974–1975. More stu-dents elected business administration and economics as a major or took courses offered by the department to keep abreast of current conditions. Outside organizations, including newspapers, sought in-formation relating to the economy. The Department was busy but well-prepared to cope with the demands.

Dr. James R. Rhinehart and Mr. Duane P. Myers studied industrial development in the State, with particular attention to why it occurs and what affects it. Mr. Lawrence M. Glisson taught a new course on transportation and business logistics. Mr. Donald E. Kellev coordinated seminars on small business initiation and management, income tax preparation, marketing and finance, and the economy.

CHEMISTRY AND PHYSICS DEPARTMENT







The Chemistry instructors attended the Southeastern Meeting of the American Chemical Society, where Dr. Richard W. Henderson read a paper. Dr. William H. Breazeale, Jr. is presently serving as Chairman-elect of the South Carolina chapter of the American Chemical Society. The Physics instructors attended the South Carolina meeting of the Southeastern American Physical Society.

Dr. Henderson worked with three students on research projects: David Andrews worked with leaching lead from ceramic items, David Strom finished research in radical chemistry, and Danny Decamps started research into chemical effects on bacteria.

The purchase of various items of equipment gained for the Department a stature equal to any other in the Southeast.





EDUCATION DEPARTMENT







For a student to be approved as a teacher under the previous system utilized by South Carolina, he had to complete a list of courses chosen by the State. During 1974-1975 the Approved Program Approach to Teacher Certification replaced the earlier approach. This program allows each college to establish its own certification requirements. The Education Department is now approved in Early Childhood Education, Elementary Education, Biology, Chemistry, English, French, History, Mathe-matics, Political Science, Sociology, and Spanish.

A workshop was held as a refresher experience for past education graduates of the College. An Education Laboratory was established to provide exposure to teaching aids for students in methods' courses.

And for the first time a Master's Degree was offered by Francis Marion in education.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

The English Department, under the guidance of Dr. James W. Dewsnap, has successfully continued presenting film versions of great literary works for local high school students. The 1974-1975 schedule included HENRY V, JULIUS CAESAR, LORD OF THE FLIES, and BILLY BUDD.

Mr. Robert Parham, was chosen by the South Carolina Arts Commission for the Poet-in-the-Schools Program. Mr. Parham gave week-long, informal creative poetry seminars in various high schools throughout the state.

Offered for the first time was a course in Black Literature, which was taught by Miss Candace Phipps. Also offered for the first time was a course for superior students. Students were invited to participate in the seminar taught by Dr. David J. Burt.

New to the Department for the year was Mr. Clarence P. Huggins.









FINE ARTS DEPARTMENT







The Fine Arts Department sponsored numerous recitals by faculty members and guest artists.

Five shows by art students were scheduled in Smith College Center. Miss Cathy E. Cranford staged two shows of her work, and Mr. Steven F. Gately presented a show at Coker College and exhibited his work at Clemson University.

The 47-member Francis Marion College Chorus, directed by Dr. Adrian R. Ketcham, presented fall and spring concerts. Ten students from the Chorus formed the Francis Marion Ensemble, which performed at concerts and by invitation.

The Francis Marion College Theatre produced three plays, "The Skin of Our Teeth," "The Lion in Winter," and "Harvey."

The Francis Marion Wind Ensemble directed by Mr. J. Franklin West, performed a concert each semester.



HISTORY DEPARTMENT

During the summer of 1975 Dr. Joseph T. Stukes, the new Chairman of the History Department, led a European History in Europe study. Students earned three or six hours credit while touring six European nations.

Two courses were also added to the curriculum--The History of Black America and The Georgian History of England. These new courses are forerunners of changes taking place on the basis of a comprehensive department-wide study during the year that took into account student interest and departmental goals and standards.

The Department built a bridge into the communities of the Pee Dee through a weekly series of articles in FLORENCE MORNING NEWS by different history instructors. Special-interest seminars were also offered for students and the general public.










MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT







The Mathematics Department did some switching around during 1974-1975. Statistics I and Basic Concepts I and II were renumbered as freshman courses. In the words of Dr. Jack W. Smith, Department Chairman, "They're basically the same, just not so frightening."

Two new graduate mathematics courses were offered. Both were courses with education emphasis taught by mathematicians: Problems in Teaching Algebra and Elementary Mathematics.

Dr. Osvaldo Marrero, a researchist in the field of combinatorics, served as Guest Lecturer at the College of Charleston. Dr. James R. Ramey, Jr., Dr. Roger W. Allen, Jr., and Mr. C. Leonard Zucker did research in the field of analysis.

MODERN LANGUAGES DEPARTMENT



The Modern Languages Department feels it plays an important role at Francis Marion. A substantial part of the College purpose, "... understanding the world about them . . .," is fulfilled by the Department's attempt to provide knowledge relating to customs and traditions of other cultures. Dr. George D. Crow pointed out that employees need a basic command of foreign lanquage as businesses ex-. pand into the international realm.

The Department increased cooperation with area high schools. There have been special visits to Francis Marion by high school classes with basic interest in languages.

The Department expanded its inventory of audio and visual teaching aids. Emphasis is being placed on cassette teaching material.

Dr. Joseph A. James had a book published by the University of North Carolina Press.









POLITICAL SCIENCE AND GEOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT







The Political Science Department, chaired by Dr. Neal D. Thigpen, has experienced tremendous growth as a major. 1974-1975 saw three new courses--Ethnic and Minority Group Politics, Modern Political Ideologies, and Latin American Politics--and a new instructor--Miss Eileen L. Kirley--added to the Department.

The Department operated its program to meet student needs. Political Science 103 included significant emphasis on careers in the political science field.

Dr. Harlan G. Hawkins and Dr. Dick R. Laird attended several national professional meetings. Dr. Roderick A. Stamey attended the Southern Political Science Convention in New Orleans.

Dr. Thigpen was appointed to the Governor's committee to study state election laws and is Vice-Chairman of the South Carolina Republican Party.

PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT



Groundwork for paraprofessional training to be offered jointly by the Psychology and Sociology Departments was laid during 1974-1975.

An article by Dr. Lois A. Hoff, Department Chairman, was accepted by the JOURNAL OF COMPARATIVE AND PHYSIOLOGICAL PSY-CHOLOGY. Dr. Jesse J. Jordan and Dr. Douglas A. Mandra had a paper accecpted by the South-Eastern Psychological Association. Dr. Jordan and Dr. Gary W. Hanson participated in a seminar on the changing American family.

Dr. Hanson read a paper before the Southeastern Psychological Association Convention. He also served as Training Director for Hotline and as a consultant to the Comprehensive Mental Health Center. Dr. Hoff and Dr. Hanson served as members of the Board of the Mental Health Association.





SOCIOLOGY AND PHILOSOPHY DEPARTMENT







Webster's Dictionary defines sociology as "the science of human society" And the Francis Marion Sociology and Philosophy Department covers the area well. A very important innovation during 1974-1975 was initiation of paraprofessional training designed to prepare students who plan careers in "helping agencies." New to the Department were Miss Sandra A. Long, Miss H. Susan Cloninger, and Dr. Richard C. Brunk.

Dr. Donald R. Bailey read a paper entitled "The Burned Out Liberal: Casualty in Civil Rights" at the AKD Sociological Research Symposium and submitted eight papers for publication. Miss Long also read a paper on "The Beauty Pageant as Ritual" at the same meeting.

During the year the Department offered seminars on the family and aging. In addition, Dr. W.L. Birch was elected President of the South Carolina Council on Family Relations.


AWARDS DAY










I stood there watching, inwardly crying, as teeth tore into fibrous flesh. One by one they came down. kissing the ground from which they came for the last time.




VIGNETTES: Do you have any general comments?






A GREAT PLACE FOR STUDENTS

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FMC — AN ECONOMIC VALUE TO COMMUNITY

In a short period of time a lot of money has gone into Francis Marion College.

As a state-supported institution, naturally tax dollars have played an important role in creating this facility. One also naturally would wonder what is the return for this indirect investment of tax dollars?

Apart from educating the people who attend the college, bringing the expansion of culture, theatre, recitals, lectures of interest, a sharing of community programs, keeping educated people in the region, the College also reciprocates on a more tangible level.

With an enterprise of size, such as FMC, follows a job market in various skills for area residents. In the past fiscal year, salaries totaling \$2.2 million were expended by FMC. This is money that goes back into the region, assisting the rise in area living standards.

It takes supplies, equipment, and contractual services to run such an enterprise as FMC, and, in this category, the College expends \$1.2 million, \$500,000 of which is directly poured back into the Pee Dee area. It is estimated that about 300 students have come to Florence





and FMC who ordinarily would not be residing in this area were it not for the College. At a "minimum," it has been estimated the these students' expenditures for housing, food, and transportation in a given year is \$2,000 each, bringing \$600,000 yearly into the Florence area.

The remaining 1800 students expend at the least \$250 each for clothing, food, and transportation, totaling \$450,000 annually, which flows into the Florence and surrounding area economy.

Those students who graduate each year and remain in this area offer greater contributions to their communities through teaching, and engaging in civic and community activities.

As FMC expands, the surrounding area will benefit in numerous ways. Thus, education is a vehicle for economic and academic progress, enriching the community it serves.







CHANGE IN GRADING SYSTEM VIEWED



If a change were made, who would benefit? Under either system each would still get a B (above average grade); under the 5.0 system one gets a 3.9 and the other a 3.0. Chang-ing to the 5.0 system would look like the bare minimum. When the grades are transfered, the old 4.0 system will be used.

Another bad thing about the change would be that it would place even more emphasis on grades. Ideally, students go to college in order to learn. Grades are important because they force the student to expend a certain amount of effort in order to reach a minimum level of achievement. Usually the more effort a student makes the greater his grades will be. A 5.0 system would make every point on a test count.

A change from the 4.0 system to the 5.0 can only work to the detriment of the students.

Our present grading system is adequate, but is "adequate" enough? We have a wide variation of individual grading by subject and professor. This variation often causes unnecessary resentment between students and faculty, especially when a student barely misses the next higher grade by a fraction of a point.

The second problem is the wide range from one grade to the next. For example, for an 80 and an 89 the same grade is given.

The third problem is the amount of difference it would make in the total G.P.R. I believe that this total with our present system is lower than it would be by using a more detailed grading system. If this is so then the present system is hurting our students' chances for better jobs, easier acceptance in other schools, and on the permanent record since it is not reflecting what the student is actually making.


All of these problems could best be dealt with by changing our grading system from a 4.0 to a system that would give the student exactly what he earned. For example, if a student made an 87 he would receive a 3.7. Using a 5.0 scale where a 100 is a perfect 5.0 and having all professors grade by a set scale, I feel, will give the students a more adequate reflection of their work.

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



GREEK WEEK



KAPPA ALPHA




Kappa Epsilon Gamma, the first fraternity established on campus, maintained its tradition of service to the College and the community.




The Theta Delta Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha spent a busy year of continued service to the College and the community.

ZETA TAU ALPHA





VIG: Five years ago a new college was started. How have early decisions about the College materialized?

WDS: The progress we have made has exceeded our expectations. Our building program has moved guite successfully. If our present pace of acquiring library books is maintained, within the next two years, we will come close to 150,000 volumes. As for faculty and students, our 2300 students and the size and quality of our faculty is about what I expected, perhaps our faculty is even stronger than anticapated. And our early decisions about a balanced athletic program have been realized.

VIG: If you had the opportunity to begin FMC again, would you do anything dif-

ferently?

WDS: I would make very few changes, except I would urge the building of the College Center and Founders Hall at least a year earlier.

VIG: Do you anticipate any more graduate programs in the future?

WDS: At this point we see FMC as principally an undergraduate institution. We recognize that we are the only public-supported, fouryear college in this part of the State, and, therefore, we feel that we have a certain responsibility to the larger community. This is why we moved into a master's program in elementary education. I can't anticipate the future and what needs might exist, but we will carefully assess situations that develop in the tuture, and, if it appears that we are the institution to provide certain kinds of programs, then I am sure our faculty and staff will make the appropriate effort to offer such programs.

VIG: FMC is called "the College for the Future?" What immediate and farreaching future do you forsee?

WDS: I anticipate that our broad admissions policy will remain unchanged as we strive to serve the largest number of people possible and that we will continue to carefully expand the curriculum. Perhaps the most significant thing is a new emphasis on continuing education, for people who are beyond the usual college age.
