EARLY SETTLEMENT

In recurring to the local history of the town of Windham we find that on Nov. 20, 1734, Abraham Howard and Joseph Blaney, representatives of the town of Marblehead, sent a petition to the General Court of Massachusetts showing that the town was very small in extent for its number of inhabitants, and prayed for a tract of land for a township for such of its citizens as would settle thereon.

This petition was granted the following year, and John Wainwright, John Hobson, and Daniel Epes were appointed on the part of the House, William Dudley and Ebenezer Barrell on the part of the Council; which committee was fully authorized to admit sixty inhabitants belonging to the town of Marblehead who most need a grant, to become grantees, to lay out the township and also the first division of home lots. The conditions of the grant were, that the home lots should be sixty-three in number, be laid out "in as defensible a manner as conveniently may be" and all future divisions in equal proportions; three of the lots to be disposed of, one for the first

settled minister, one for the ministry, and one for the support of schools; each grantee to build a dwelling house eighteen feet square and seven feet posted, to have seven acres of land brought to English Grass and fitted for mowing, to settle a learned orthodox minister, to build a convenient meeting house for the public worship of God, within five years from their admission, and that each grantee pay the committee five pounds upon their admission. The following grantees, sixty in number, were admitted Jan. 17, 1735: Jeremiah Allen, Micah Bowden, Robert Bull, Nathaniel Bartlette, John Bailey, Thomas Bartlette, Nathan Bowen, Francis Bowden, Jedediah Blaney, Samuel Brimblecom, Joseph Blaney, Thomas Chute, Peter Coleman, Moses Calley, Nathaniel Cogswell, Richard Dana, Benjamin Dodge, Humphrey Devereux, Nicholas Edgseome, Nathaniel Evans, John Gelton, Thomas Frothingham, Joseph Gallison, Joseph Griffin, Wm Goodwin, Robert Hooper, Eben Hawkes, Jr., Abraham Howard, Benjamin Hendley, Edward Holyoke, Joseph Howard, John Homan, Ebenezer Hawkes, Benjamin James, Wm. Ingalls, Giles Iremy, Samuel Lee, Joseph Majory, Isaac Maxfield, Wm. Mayberry, John Oulton, Robert Paramour, George Pigot, John Palmer, Jonathan Proctor, James Perrimon, James Pierson, John Reed, Richard Reed, Samuel Stacy, 3rd, James Sharrar, John Stacy, Eben Stacy, James Skinner, Joseph Swett, Joseph Smithurst, Andrew Tacker, Isaac Turner, Calley Wright, and Thomas Wood.

In the year 1735, Roland Houghton, a surveyor together with members of the committee, came to this section and commenced locating the grants. They run out and established the first division of home lots, sixty-three in number, each containing ten acres; located the town boundaries; and made a return of their proceedings with

a plan of the town, which was accepted by the General Court June 7, and the lands confirmed to the grantees.

The town of New Marblehead, as it was first called, as originally laid out embraced the contents of six miles square. The first lots were located on the main road from Westbrook and extended backward one half mile to the Presunscott River. This road running to Raymond from Westbrook was the first to be located in town.

The lots extended on the road two miles, being but ten rods wide on the road, as they were termed "Indians lots" being laid out as "home lots in as defensible a manner as conveniently may be." All the land in the township outside of the sixty-three home lots was owned in common by the owners of these lots. On July 4, 1735 the grantees, at a meeting held in Marblehead, voted to add to each lot a strip on the east side of the road which should be identical in size and shape with the original lot.

Of the early pioneers Capt. Thomas Chute had the honor of being the first to settle in town, arriving July 30, 1737. Mr. Chute was an Englishman, born in 1690 who had emigrated to Marblehead, Mass. He settled on lot No. 12 about thirty rods from the bank of the Presunscott. He was the first to clear the land to erect his rude cabin, and here was the first happy home of civilized man on Windham soil.

The second settler was William Mayberry one of the original grantees from Marblehead. Home lot No. 27, fell to him where he proceeded to carve a home from the wilderness. This is the Frederic Smith farm. John Farrar, the third settler, came from Tiverton, Rhode Island. His lot was No. 31, and he built his cabin a few rods from the river.

The next to settle here was Stephen Manchester also from Tiverton; he settled on lot No. 32 near the river. His son Thomas was the first child born in Windham, in 1739. These four pioneers settled within one years time.

The fifth settler, Abraham Anderson, came from Marblehead--earlier from Groton, Mass. ---and settled on home lot No. 36, on the main road, in 1738. He built the first house and his was the first family to settle on the main road in Windham where he lived nearly two years before any further settlements were made. Then several families moved in and settled on the home lots on the main road.

Most of the early settlers of Windham were from Marblehead and Salem. They were people of strong moral character, hardy and robust of constitution, and with never failing courage, and iron wills that well equipped them to face the hardships of this early pioneer life, to make for themselves and their posterity an independent and honorable position in the noble state of their adoption.

The name New Marblehead was retained until the town was incorporated under its present name which was chosen in honor of Windham, or Wymondham, in Norfolk county England, being doubtless the earlier home of one of the leading families.

In 1795 there were twenty-nine of the house lots settled while some clearing had been done on all the others except No. 4. Soon several other families came and made settlements on the one hundred acre lots, and such was the prosperity of the settlements that the town was incorporated June 12, 1762, the sixteenth town in the state. Prosperity rested upon this peaceful hamlet from this until notified from Boston to prepare for a struggle for independence in which these hardy citizens, who had so often fought the lurking Indian, were fitted to do themselves honor, and service to their fellow colonists.

INDIAN HISTORY

From the first settlement in this town in 1737 to 1743, the settlers were unmolested by the Indian tribes. But these amicable relations between the native Indians and the first settlers, so essential to the latter, and upon which their comfort, and the prosperity of their infant settlement mainly depended, were soon interrupted. Scarcely had the hardy settlers made a beginning and gained a lodgement in this world of woods, ere the tocsin of war was rung in their ears. A war between Great Britain and France was anticipated, which would inevitably bring the English settlements in contact with the Indians and draw down the vengeance of the savage upon the newly settled towns. Fully satisfied that a rupture was about to take place, Massachusetts resolved "to put her whole inland frontier, extensive as it was, into a good posture of defense. As the eastern Provinces, Maine and Sagadahock, were most exposed to incursions from the savages, in case of a rupture, the Legislature made an appropriation of about £1280 to be disbursed from the public treasury, and expended among the eastern settlements for their defense". One hundred pounds of this appropriation was assigned to New Marblehead, and expended in building a fort. This fort was built on home lot No. 33, in the center of the "Ancient Domain", or home lots, on the most elevated and beautiful site in the "two mile territory."

The fort was fifty feet square, two stories high, with wall one foot thick, of hewn hemlock timber, the upper story jutting one foot over the lower, with a tier of port holes. There were two watch boxes

placed at diagonal corners, two stories high, twelve feet square, with walls one foot thick, each watch box having a swivel gun, furnished by the proprietors, and so placed as to defend two sides of the fort. The fort was surrounded with a stockade about twenty-five or thirty feet from it, made by setting posts ten or twelve inches in diameter, twelve feet long, perpendicularly in the ground, and so near together that the Indians could not pass between them. The fort was provided with an iron "mine powder gun" by the Commonwealth, which was placed before the fort for the purpose of firing alarms, and giving the neighboring settlements warning of the approach of Indians. The fort was built during the spring of 1744 and was the only one ever erected in town.

The war that had been anticipated between England and France in 1743, was declared in March 1744 and finally communicated to the Governor of Massachusetts. Thus were the early settlers met at the very commencement of their settlement with all the privations, hardships and dangers of Indian warfare; their settlement retarded, their comfort, happiness and prosperity blasted.

The first outrage committed by the Indians on the inhabitants of this town, was on April 14, 1747 when they took and made prisoners, William and Joseph Knight, two sons of William Knight who had come from Manchester, Mass., to this town. They were unarmed and taken by surprise at Saccarappa, in Westbrook, were carried to the Indian settlements but were well treated by them and soon after returned home. Their next attack was made the same year, on Aug. 27, when a body of Indians, supposed to be between twenty and thirty, entered the town, probably with the intention of taking captive every one of the inhabitants, and to furnish themselves with plunder while devising the ruin of some other hamlet. They made an attempt

to take William, the son of Thomas Bolton, and William Maxfield, a young man living with William Mayberry, prisoners. Bolton and Maxfield were both well armed with muskets and made a brave resistance. Bolton fired but before he had time to reload he was overpowered and taken prisoner. He was carried by the Indians to Canada and sold to a French Naval officer whom he served in the capacity of servant and was taken to sea on board a French frigate. This was soon captured by the English who took him to Boston where he gained release and returned home. Maxfield was more fortunate, for by retreating, he held the enemy at bay until rescued by a relief party from the fort. On Aug. 22, 1750 the Indians surprised and captured Seth Webb, son of Samuel Webb, an emigrant from Falmouth, to this town in 1742, who had settled on home lot No. 23. They carried him to Canada but he afterwards made good his escape and returned in time to participate in the next Indian war.

This was the last conflict of what is called the fifth Indian war. Of the five men of this town who had been attacked none had been killed and only one wounded. A treaty was fully confirmed with the Indians Aug. 3, 1751. From this time until the breaking out of the French war at the close of 1754, which instigated the sixth Indian war—the inhabitants of the little colony were unmolested by the roving redmen. Being no longer imprisoned within their dwellings, they applied themselves to cultivating thier lands and improving their buildings. New dwellings were erected, several families moved into town, and there was a progressive increase in population and improvements.

At the close of the year 1754, hostilities again commenced between the English and French settlers in America, and the Indians again began hostilities with the English. In May 1755 they began an attack on the settlements in New Boston, (now Gray), North Yarmouth and New Gloucester.

The inhabitants of this town were in daily expectation of an attack and spared no pains to put the settlement in a good state of defense. Three dwellings, (Mayberry's on home lot No. 16 ; Bolton's on home lot No. 52. ; and Graffam's on home lot No. 91) were converted into garrison houses being modeled after a manner similar to the fort. 84.

Joseph Knight was a second time made prisoner, Feb. 1756, and taken as far as the Androscoggin River. Having been for some time a prisoner on the occasion of his former capture he had partially learned their language, and ascertaining that they intended to attack all the frontier towns from Brunswick to Saco, he determined to make his escape and alarm the settlements. This he effected on the seventh of the following May after escaping from the camp while the redmen slept .

The next and last "tug of war" between the inhabitants of this town and the Indians was May 14, 1756. On the morning of that day Ezra Brown and Ephraim Winship left the fort to work on Brown's lot about a mile to the north east. They were accompanied by a guard consisting of four men and four boys. Their course lay through a strip of woods. Brown and Winship being about six rods in advance, and in the thickest part of the woods, were fired upon by a body of fifteen or twenty Indians who lay in ambush. The Indians were the Rockameecook tribe, commanded by Poland, their King. Brown was shot dead upon the spot. Winship received two balls, and fell to the ground, when both were scalped. A brave fight was made by the guard which was soon assisted by others from the fort who had heard the firing. The Indians immediately took to ambush and Poland began the fight, by firing upon Stephen Manchester. In his eagerness when reloading he unwittingly uncovered himself where he

was concealed when Manchester returned the fire with mortal effect. The Indians instantly gathered around their fallen chieftain, when two others were shot. The band then fled bearing the bodies of their dead and wounded warriors.

The death of Poland put an end to all troubles with the Indians in this quarter; they were never known to attack the settlements in this or the adjoining towns afterwards, although they continued the war in some parts of the state until the fall of 1758. The inhabitants, however, never felt secure until the close of the war with France, in 1763, making a second period of war with the Indians and French of nine years. Thus it will be seen that from the first settlement of this town, in 1737, until 1763, a period of twenty-six years, fifteen years were consumed in war with the Indians and French.

INCORPORATION

The original boundaries of New Marblehead, as laid out May 15, 1735, were as follows: "We began at a place called Saccarappa Falls, in Presumpscot River, and so as the river runs to a great pond called Great Sebago Pond, thence north 45° east, four miles and 120 rods, thence south 45° east to North Yarmouth back line, thence three miles south, 45° west, to the corner of North Yarmouth and Falmouth bounds, thence south 24° 20 minutes west, eight miles and 60 rods, to Saccarappa Falls."

The first town meeting after the incorporation, was held by virtue of a warrant from Hon Stephen Longfellow, at the old fort, July 5, 1762. Abraham Anderson was chosen Moderator; Thomas Chuts, Town Clerk; Caleb Graffam, Thomas Mayberry and John Farrar, Selectmen.

POPULATION

The population of Windham at different periods since its settlement in 1737 has been: in 1759, 29 families; in 1763, 39 families; in 1764, 250 (est) inhabitants; in 1790, 938; in 1800, 1329; in 1810, 1630; in 1820, 1793; 1830, 2186; 1840, 2274; 1850, 2380; 1860, 2635; 1870, 2428; 1880, 2312; 1890, 2216; 1900, 1929.

EXTRACTS FROM THE ANCIENT TOWN RECORDS

1765. Voted, To allow men thirty shillings, old tenor, per day, for laboring on the highways.
1766. Voted, To allow Thomas Mayberry fifteen pounds, Abraham Anderson, eighteen pounds, and John Farrar, eighteen pounds, old tenor, for expenses of Mr. Peter Smith's ordination.
1767. Voted, That Peter Cobb be Selectman in the room of Curtis Chute, who was killed at Falmouth by lightning, June 4, 1767.
1771. Voted, That John Stevens and Nathaniel Evans be informers of deer and moose the present year.
1774. Voted, That Richard Mayberry be Captain, David Barker, Lieutenant, and Joseph Swett, Ensign the present year.
- “ Voted, To accept the report of the committee to the town of Boston, in answer to their letters to this town relating to Bohe tea.
1776. Voted, To choose one Captain and two Lieutenants for the first company of the Fourth Regiment, whereof Timothy Pike, Esq., is Colonel.
1777. Cumberland, ss. Windham, January 22, 1777.

This may certify that I, Margaret Mayberry, administratrix, hath received twenty pounds of my negro man named

Lonnon, it being the sum of his appraisal of Mr. Thomas Mayberry's estate, and I hereby certify that the above named Lonnon is free and his own man.

1783. Voted, To allow two pounds for a wolve's head.

MILITARY MATTERS

The military record of the town of Windham is unsurpassed by few, if any, towns in the state. No generation of its noble citizens has passed but has borne arms against the enemy of home or freedom. Scarcely two decades had passed since the death of Poland, the last Indian to attack this settlement, when the report of the first gun fired at Bunker Hill was heard and once more the old flintlock that had been lately used only to provide meat for the household or protection from troublesome beasts of the forest was shouldered by either father or son, while they marched side by side to the seat of conflict and fought and suffered, as probably no people have fought and suffered, for American liberty. The following is a list of those who served in the Continental army. In the war of 1812 several of Windham's men enlisted in the regular United States service, and a company of militia was raised in this section to defend Portland in case that place were attacked; but these were under muster only fourteen days and never were under fire. The names of Windham men who enlisted for five years or during the war and served in the regular army: Timothy Chadbourne, Josiah Freeman, Jonathan Freeman, Thomas Hardy, William Ingersol, Nathaniel Ingersol, James Jordan, Jeremiah Jordan, Thomas Jordan, Merrill Knight, William Knight, Joseph Knight, Samuel Libby, Joshua Mabury, George Mugford, John Peco, John Pettengill, Ephraim Winship, Isaac Varney, Daniel Knight.

Thomas Hardy and Isaac Varney died in the service; Joseph Knight was severely wounded; Merrill Knight was killed in battle.

But three men served in the American army during the war with Mexico, these were: Joseph C. Chute, Augustus Hall, and Charles Rand. Chas. Rand died in the service.

CIVIL WAR

It was during the war of the Rebellion that the blood of every patriot was fired with love for the Union, and with a deathless desire to see slavery forever stamped out in the United States of America. The number of men credited to the town of Windham who served in the Union forces, according to the Maine adjutant general's report, was 302; these were among the bravest and noblest forces in the field, gaining for themselves well-won honors, and for their country victory in a righteous cause. INDUSTRIAL ACCOUNT

At a proprietor's meeting held Jan. 19, 1738, a vote was passed granting to Messrs. Ebenezer Hawkes, Wm. Goodwin, Isaac Turner, and Ebenezer Stacy, all the right to any one of the falls of water on the Presumscot river, with ten acres of land adjoining the same, upon condition that they should erect and put in operation a sawmill. This was built at Malison Falls and accepted by the proprietors Dec. 13, 1740. This was the first mill of any kind ever erected within the limits of this town. On account of the frequent depredations of the Indians little work was done by them and they were later destroyed. It is generally supposed that tanning was carried on here at one time as the old tan vats have been discovered, but nothing definite is now to be found in regard to them.

In 1863 a mill was erected by a corporation, The Malison Falls Manufacturing Co., and the manufacture of ladies' dress goods, flannels, broad cloth, and curseys began. The mill, located near the present one, was bought by Thomas Robinson who bought out the rights of the company and took possession of the plant. The present owners are his sons who have continued the business. The mill now in operation was built in 1888. About 125 men are regularly employed. Valuation of plant \$100,000.

The pulp mills located here were built about 1870 and constitute one of the most active industries in this section.

E. E. True is Superintendent.

The first powder mills built here were erected in 1812 at Gambo Falls, by Fowler and Laffin. It is supposed that the first powder was manufactured on the Gorham side where the mills are now generally located. In 1830 the business was carried on by Oliver Whipple, and in 1874 the Oriental Powder Co. took possession. About 35 men are employed at these mills, and from 500 to 1000 tons of powder produced annually. The refining is done on the Windham side of the river. The total number of men killed in the frequent explosions here is forty-seven, so far as known; there have been at least fifteen explosions during the last thirty years. Gambo Falls is said to have gained its name from a native African who had formerly lived near the Gambo river, but who worked here for many years, and was known by that epithet.

Very early in the century clothing mills were operated at Pope's Mills. At about 1840 a woolen mill was erected there, and saw and grist mills were operated there at that time. On May 7, 1861 by the breaking of a dam at Little Sebago this busy manufacturing village was swept away. Several of the mills were rebuilt latter but have been destroyed by fires, one on the east side burning the factory then located there together with all the houses, and the factory on the west side was burned later with a boarding house and stable.

R. H. Soule's flour, grain, and feed mill was built in 1892 by E. A. Soule, and was first run by a gasolene engine, the second ever run in New England. Six years later it was run

by water power, the power being transmitted over 80 feet with a loss of only 5%. Two years ago electricity was installed as the operating power. From two to four men are employed. The property is valued at \$2,000.

The other industries are given in the Business Directory.

CHURCH ACCOUNT

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH.

In the year 1742, five years after the first settlement was made by Thomas Chute, at a meeting of the proprietors held March 3, it was voted "to settle an orthodox minister as soon as may be," and "That the said settled minister shall have paid to him the sum of forty-five pounds out of the proprietors' treasury for his settlement." "The sum of thirty pounds per annum be allowed and paid out of the proprietors' treasury for the support of the said minister from the time of his settlement until the said township be incorporated into a town." As previously stated there had been reserved one lot of the original sixty-three for the first settled minister, and one for the ministry; so it will be seen that the church in this town was well founded and supported. A committee was chosen to contract with Mr. John Wight to become the minister here. He was settled in the

fall of 1743, when seven pounds ten shillings which had been voted by the town were expended in his ordination. It seems to have been an early custom for these devoted people to make a touching scene at the ordination ceremony for we find an account of a similar program at the ordination of Mr. Wight's successor, Rev. Mr. Smith.

This early gathering was called a Congregational society, and their church was built in 1740, according to the agreement of the proprietors. The society was not formed until 1743 when it was composed of seven members. Mr. Wight remained here about ten years, or until his death in May, 1753. He was a Harvard graduate and came from Dedham, Mass. His successor, Rev. Peter Thatcher Smith, also a Harvard graduate, was ordained Sept. 22, 1762, and dismissed Nov. 26, 1790. He died in 1826 at the age of about 96. Nathaniel Stone was the third pastor of this church. He preached from 1798 to 1805. Asa Lyman, the fourth pastor came from Connecticut and was installed pastor in 1809 and dismissed the following year. Gardner Kellogg came in 1811 and continued until his death in 1826. Wm. Gragg served from 1828 to 1831; Jonathan L. Hale, 1832 to 1835; John W. Shepherd, 1836 to 1839; Wm. Warren, 1840 to 1849; John Perham, 1851 to 1854; Luther Wiswell, 1854 for many years; Robert J. Kile, and James E. Aiken the present efficient pastor.

FRIEND'S CHURCH.

The Friends Society is the second society to be established in town. There were persons of this denomination in

town prior to 1774. In 1779 they established public worship and are the only society in town that has been in continuous working power since organization. Two of the grantee's were of this faith, Ebenezer Hawkes, Sr., and His son of the same name, but the children of Ebenezer Jr., were the first of the family to settle here. Their first meeting house was erected prior to 1780; this was replaced by a two-story house about 1800, these were located on town-farm road nearly opposite the house owned by Walter Jaques. A Monthly Meeting organization was established in 1803.

Several of the ministers who have resided in Windham since 1811 are Obadiah Gould, Phebe Pope Cobb, Lidia Allen, Amos Hanson, Joseph Pratt, Eunice Day, Elijah Cook, Phebe L. Pope, John Cartland, Silas F. Strout, and Thomas J. Ingram. Present membership 110.

This society at one time built an academy, which was the only one ever located here, but we are unable to give any account of its work, or of the time of its existance.

METHODIST CHURCH

The Methodists had a small meeting house at Windham Center, erected in 1792. This meetinghouse was abandoned and afterwards they erected a house in the southern part of the town, but this was afterwards moved and used for a schoolhouse. They then held their services in the free meeting house at Windham Upper Corner.

FREE BAPTIST CHURCH.

This society was established prior to 1822 when Elder Clement Phinney, a very influential and popular preacher, conducted services near Mallison Falls. A large society was gathered and a meeting house built in this part of the town. For several years this house was filled to its utmost capacity by an enthusiastic congregation, but gradually the meetings lost their best supporters, the meetings became fewer, and finally public worship was suspended. The meeting house stood for several years unoccupied and was finally taken down. A free meeting house was erected in the southern part of the town in 1870 and was occupied by the General Baptists (as they were then called), and the Second Adventists.

UNIVERSALIST SOCIETY.

This society is of comparatively late date for in the early days there were no followers of this faith here. The society was organized June 8, 1840. At a meeting of its members, June 15, 1840, it was voted to build a meeting house 48 feet long, 38 feet wide, with posts 17 feet high, with a suitable belfry, steeple, dome, and spire. This was erected, and dedicated the following May. Rev. Leander Hussey was the first pastor. This society was very active and successful for several years, but as the original supporters passed away the new generation did not fill their places and the church lost its support. Services were suspended for several years until, in 1871, the society was reanimated under the minis-

try of the Rev. S. S. Fletcher, and again put in good working condition. A large congregation filled the church every alternate Sabbath, and a large Sabbath school formed and supported. But "history repeats itself," and so it has here for today no regular pastor is employed nor regular meetings held, but occasional services are conducted by transient or neighboring preachers. The last regular pastors were Harry E. Townsend and Eliot B. Barber.

The East Windham Memorial Chapel was built in 1898, and the society is an undenominational incorporation. The pulpit is filled by supplies. Miss Catherine Field gave the lot and timber for its construction, while the work of construction was a free will offering of the people. Its membership is 35.

SCHOOL ITEMS

The school history of this town is one that imparts credit to its founders and early settlers, as well as to those who have had the later management of matters of education. The early schools, doubtless, were held in log houses, and were fully attended by all the boys and girls in the settlement up to nearly the age of maturity. The character of the early schoolmasters was necessarily one of sterling moral worth, coupled with those strong, progressive, yet kindly souls, that have the power every one covets for themselves of gaining the respect and confidence of every one in the community. We learn that the first school in town was taught by Samuel Webb, in 1743. Among those who served the town in this capacity later were: Benjamin Moody and John Patterson. The town has voted the following sums for the support of schools: In 1770, £30; 1780, £400; 1790, £40; 1800, £100; 1810, \$700; 1820, \$946; 1830, \$1,046; 1840, \$1,000; 1850, \$1,200; 1860, \$1,450; 1870, \$2,634.

In 1840 there were 18 school districts in town, with the total number of scholars 884. These were, in the order of their numbers: Anderson's, 40; Little Falls, 52; Gambo, 56; Mabury's, 27; Windham Hill, 40; Adjoining the Duck Pond, 63; Kenard's, 54; Adjoining Gray, 68; Dole's, 76; Ireland, 65; Scotland, 37; Canada Hill, 15; Plains, 62; Windham Upper Corner, 65; Windham Center, 64; Pope's, 57; Great Falls, 34; Adjoining Raymond, 7. In 1872 one

district had been added to this list, Anthoine's, and the total number of scholars was 776.

The schools at the present time show the remarkable development which has been common to all the Maine towns; more and more care has been devoted to the matter of education, and improvements in system and management are introduced whenever it is apparent that the change is practical. The town now has a successful high school where the advanced students in town may complete their education, or take a preparatory course for one of our colleges. The inducements and advantages offered the young people in town today, are superior to those of any former decade, but the advance of the schools is not stayed here, each of the succeeding years will add to their efficiency and value.

PROFESSIONAL MEN

PHYSICIANS

The first physician who located in Windham was Dr. Caleb Rhea. He moved from Danvers, Mass., in 1785 or 86 and remained here until his decease in 1796, then but 39 years of age. Dr. James Paine was the next; he came from Limerick in 1797, and practiced his profession until 1818, when his health failed and he removed to Portland, where he

resided until his death four years later. Other early physicians here, were Drs. Folsom, Calvin Howe, Jacob Hunt, James Merrill, S. W. Baker, John Waterman, Chas. G. Parsons, S. C. Hunkins, L. W. Houghton, T. L. Weston, James P. Webb, Geo. L. Kilgore, Bertram F. Dunn, Eli Edgecomb, Isaiah Hedge, Silas E. Sylvester, Roscoe G. Milliken, Frank Carter, F. A. Harris, John Swan, James M. Buzzell and Joseph A. Parsons.

Those of recent date are: Drs. R. B. Jordan, B. F. Marshall, I. D. Harper. Dr. Woodman and Drs. C. W. Bailey and Chas. F. Parker now practicing.

LAWYERS

Joseph Pope was the first to open an office for the practice of law in this place. He came in 1803. Others who practiced prior to 1870 were: Barker Curtis, Asa Mitchell, Hezekiah Frost, T. A. Deblois, John Eveleth, David P. Baker, Peter R. Hall, T. S. Chase, F. A. Staples, T. S. Brigham, John C. Cobb and John O. Winship. Since that date the town has had no regular lawyers.

Gov. Andrews of Massachusetts was a native of this town. John Anderson, a son of one of the early settlers was for many years a member of Congress.
