



#### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

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
- There shall be a Program Committee consisting of three members, which shall be elected annually at the first meeting in May, when the subject for the following year shall be selected by the Club.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare a program for the following year, which shall begin the middle of October and end the middle of May. Any questions which may arise during the year shall be referred to the Program Committee. Whenever it is necessary for the Club to transact any business the Chairman of the Program Committee shall act as presiding officer, and shall perform all the duties usually devolving upon such an officer. The minutes shall be kept by the Secretary of the Program Committee and the Treasurer of said committee shall take charge of the funds of the Club.
- 3. The number of members shall be limited to thirty-two. When vacancies occur all names of candidates for membership shall be presented to the Program Committee in writing. A list of these candidates for membership shall be announced one week before they are to be voted upon. From the list thus presented each member shall be entitled to vote for one candidate, the candidates receiving the lowest number of votes to be dropped after each ballot until one shall have received seventeen votes, or a majority, when such candidate shall be declared elected.
- 4. At the first meeting in May six readings for the first three meetings of the following year shall be drawn. The Program Committee shall announce the subjects of these meetings to the readers four weeks before the program begins.
- 5. The drawing of the readings for the remainder of the year shall take place at a meeting to be held a week before the program begins. After this drawing each member is entirely responsible for her own

reading. If for any reason a member can not read in her turn, she must provide a substitute. Any member failing to do this, without giving an acceptable excuse to the Program Committee, shall forfeit her membership, which shall be vacant without further action.

- 6. A place for each meeting shall be announced at the previous meeting. If for any reason a hostess shall change the time or place of meeting, she shall notify each member of such change.
- 7. A member who is absent from three consecutive meetings, without sending an excuse in writing to the Program Committee, will be considered as desiring to withdraw from the Club, and her name will be dropped from the list, the Secretary notifying such member to that effect.
- 8. Any member may bring a friend, not a resident of the city, to any regular meeting.
- 9. All necessary expenses shall be divided equally among the members of the Club. An annual fee of one dollar shall be paid by each member of the Club.
- ro. Seventeen votes shall be necessary for electing committees, members, and for the transaction of any important business.

# BY-LAWS.

#### ARTICLE I.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Reading Club of Fort Wayne.

#### ARTICLE II.

Its object is the study of History, Literature and Art, also the general intellectual and social culture of its members.

### ARTICLE III.—OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. There shall be a Program Committee of three members, elected by ballot, at the first mseting in March, the subject for the following year having been selected by the club at a previous meeting. The chairman of the Program Committee shall be elected first and shall be the presiding officer of the club. The committee shall elect the Secretary and Treasurer from their number.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and have printed a program before the first meeting of the following year.

SEC. 3. At the last meeting in May the drawing of the readings for the ensuing year shall be made. The Program Committee shall announce the subjects of the three meetings to the readers thereof at least four weeks before the program begins. After this drawing each member is entirely responsible for her own reading. If for any reason a member cannot read in her turn, she must provide a substitute. Any member failing to do this without giving an acceptable excuse to the Program Committee shall forfeit her membership.

#### ARTICLE IV.—MEETINGS.

- SEC. 1. The club year shall begin the middle of October and end the middle of May, the meetings to be held weekly at half past two o'clock.
- SEC. 2. As far as possible the business of the club shall be transacted at the first meeting of each month, when the members will assemble at two o'clock.
- SEC. 3. A place for each meeting shall be announced at the previous meeting. If, for any reason, a hostess shall change the time or place of meeting, she shall notify each member of such change.

#### ARTICLE V.—MEMBERSHIP.

SEC. 1. The number of members shall be limited to thirty-two. When vacancies occur, all names of candidates for membership shall be presented to the

Program Committee in writing. A list of these candidates for membership shall be announced one week before they are to be voted upon. From the list thus presented each member shall be entitled to vote for a candidate, and a majority of the votes of the members of the club shall be necessary for her election. If there is no election on the first ballot, the succeeding ballots shall be confined to the three candidates having the highest number of votes, until there is an election.

SEC. 2. A member who is absent from three consecutive meetings, without sending an excuse in writing to the Program Committee before the date of the fourth meeting, will be considered as desiring to withdraw from the club, and her name will be dropped from the list, the Secretary notifying such member to that effect.

SEC. 3. Any member may bring a friend, not a resident of the city, to any regular meeting.

#### ARTICLE VI.

All necessary expenses shall be divided equally among the members of the club. There shall be an annual fee of one dollar for each member, payable at the first regular business meeting of the club.

#### ARTICLE VII.

Seventeen members must be present for the transaction of business.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the club, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided that a written notice of the intended change has been given at a previous meeting.



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


