


Preface.


On the 11th of May, 1891, in accordance with the plan adopted in 1880, the details of which are set forth and explained in the Preface to Volume VIII. of the Collections of The Worcester Society of Antiquity, a petition was presented to the City Government of Worcester for a third appropriation, to defray one-half the expense of copying, editing, indexing and printing the Town Records from 1817 to 1832, inclusive. This petition bore the following names: Albert Curtis, George F. Hoar, George Chandler, Nathaniel Paine, Frank P. Goulding, A. G. Bullock, F. A. Gaskill, E. B. Crane, Richard O'Flynn, Samuel S. Green, Samuel H. Putnam, Harvey B. Wilder, E. M. Barton, Lyman Brown, George M. Woodward, S. E. Hildreth, Clark Jillson, T. A. Dickinson, John C. Otis, Samuel E. Staples, S. D. Hosmer, James L. Estey, M. A. Maynard, Walter Davidson, George Sumner, Dwight A. Davis, I. Chauncey Lyford, Charles H. Banister, Edward R. Fiske and Franklin P. Rice.

At a meeting of the City Council, June 15th, 1891, the sum of five hundred dollars was voted for the purpose above named.

The publication of this portion of the Town Records, as Volume XI. of the Collections, was authorized by vote of The Worcester Society of Antiquity, at the regular meeting September 1, 1891.

Worcester Town Records.

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Worcester, qualified to vote in Town affairs, for the choice of Town officers, and for a County Treasurer, held at the South Meeting House in said Worcester, on Monday the third day of March, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and seventeen.

- Art. 1. The meeting having been opened by the Town Clerk, votes for a Moderator were called for, brought in, sorted, and counted, and Abraham Lincoln, Esquire, was chosen Moderator, and entered upon the discharge of the duties of his office.
- 2^d. Levi Heywood was chosen Town Clerk, and sworn by the Moderator as per certificate on file.

Abraham Lincoln Nathan White Ephraim Mower Nathaniel Stowell & John Flagg were chosen Selectmen and Overseers of the Poor for the current year, and sworn by the Town Clerk, March 3d, 1817, according to Law.

James Wilson was chosen Town Treasurer, and Sworn March 5th.

Abraham Lincoln Reuben Gleason & Jonathan Harrington \} were chosen Assessors, and Sworn by the Town Clerk March 3d 1817.

A motion was made and secon[d]ed, to choose a Committee of Estimates, consisting of three persons, which passed in the affirmative, and thereupon Levi Lincoln J^r. Edward D. Bangs, and Levi Heywood were chosen on said Committee, to make their report at the adjournment of this meeting.

Art. 3rd Votes for a County Treasurer were called, brought in, & counted and were for Samuel Allen, Esquire, forty two votes, he being the only person voted for.

On a motion made and seconded, the choice of Constables was postponed until the adjournment of this meeting.

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the town of Worcester, qualified to vote in Town affairs, at the South Meeting House in said town, on the seventh day of April A. D. 1817, agreeably to the foregoing warrant—

Art. 1st. Chose Abraham Lincoln, Esquire, Moderator.

Art. 2d. This article being under consideration, on motion made and seconded, it was voted, to refer the subject matter thereof to a Committe consisting of five persons, with full power to finally adjust the claim of Isaiah Thomas, Esquire, refered to in said article; and William Chamberlain, John Totman, John Gleason, Nathan White and Amherst Eaton, were chosen on said Committee.¹

Art. 3. Voted to refer this article ² to the Selectmen and Overseers of the Poor, with directions to obtain what support they can from the Parent and Grand Parent for the poor persons mentioned in said article.

A motion was then made to dissolve this meeting and being seconded, passed in the affirmative, and the meeting was accordingly dissolved.

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Worcester, qualified by the Constitution to vote for Representatives to the General Court, holden at the South Meeting House in said Worcester, on Monday the fifth day of May A. D. 1817, agreeably to the foregoing warrant.

A motion to send three Representatives, being made and seconded, passed in the affirmative.

might furnish a considerable part of the means of their own support, if they were properly directed, and provided with suitable employment—

The expenses to the town, of supporting their poor, during the last year will amount to something over two thousand dollars being about two hundred dollars more than those of the year preceding—The expenses during a few of the last years, have increased in an alarming degree, & unless some course is taken to check them, they will soon become extremely burthensome to the town—

Your Committee believe, that if all the poor of the town were collected into one establishment, the expenses of their support would soon become much reduced—that all the means of a comfortable subsistence might be provided for them collectively, at a much less rate, than in their present scattered situation & according to the present system of supporting them-that there would always be well ones enough among them to nurse and take care of the sick & that the large bills for nursing, to which the town is now subjected would thereby be avoided—that the bills of Physicians, which are now charged for riding into every quarter of the town to visit one patient in a place, would probably be reduced to less than one half of their present amount—that constant employment & regular living would render the poor of the town much more comfortable than they can be under their present regulations & tend to divert them from one half of the miseries to which a life of idleness and irregularity leaves them exposed, and that an establishment of this kind would do much honour to Inhabitants of the town.

You'r Committee therefore advise, as the most eligible mode of effecting these objects, that the Inhabitants of the town purchase a farm, with suitable buildings thereon, which will be sufficient to provide employment for those of the poor who are able to labor & which will produce a considerable portion of the means of their subsistance—

Several farms have been offered to the consideration of the Committee, & among them one belonging to Samuel Harrington Jun. for the sum of three thousand six hundred Dollars—one be-

longing to Edward Knight for the sum of four thousand three hundred Dollars, & one belonging to the Widow Rebeckah Jennison for six thousand Dollars; the latter of which they would recommend to the town, provided the same can be purchased for the sum of five thousand five hundred Dollars, & a suitable delay of payment of the purchase money can be had-This place combines more of the qualities requisite for the object, for which the town wish to purchase, than any other which has been offered them—The buildings on it are such, that with some trifling repairs the establishment might be completed & carried into full opperation early in the spring—Objections may be made by some to the investment of so large a sum of money, for the purpose of trying an experiment which they are not satisfied will succeed. But the Committee from the success of similar plans, in many towns within this Commonwealth, are convinced, that within a very few years, the whole of the original expense will be saved-

They believe also that it will be economical to purchase a farm that will supply a great part of the produce necessary for the support of the poor—they are also satisfied that it will be much less expensive to purchase buildings than to erect them—

The Committee recommend that for the purpose of defraying some part of the expense for purchasing a place for the poor, the Inhabitants shall sell for so much as the same will bring, the house and land which was conveyed to them by the late Phillip Donahue—Also the house and land now occupied by Jonas Brooks—also the house & land where Betsey Denney now lives—

To the Selectmen of the town of Worcester.

We the Subscribers, a Committee appointed by the town, to inquire what title the town has to a certain tract of land called Millstone-Hill and to report to the Selectmen a statement of facts, with our opinion thereon, now respectfully report—that we have investigated the subject in as thorough and careful a manner as our means of information would admit, and we believe the following concise history of the case to be substantially correct.

Soon after the first permanent settlement of the township at a meeting of the Proprietors "on the last tuesday of September 1733" it was voted "that 100 acres of the poorest land on Millstone Hill be left common for the use of the town for building stones." In 1750 (Feb. 27) a Committee previously appointed by the Proprietors to sell their common and undivided lands, without adverting to the grant which had been made seventeen years before to the town, and probably without a recollection or knowledge of that fact, gave a Deed to Daniel Heywood of all the proprietors common and undivided lands not then disposed

of on Millstone Hill, containing by estimation 97 acres. There is no question that this was identically the same land before granted to the town. The estimation of quantity was not precisely correct, probably because there was no accurate survey—in 1765, it was found by a correct survey to contain 100 acres and 100 rods—And there is no question that it is the same land in which the town now claims an absolute fee and in which certain persons, who pretend to derive their title from Daniel Heywood also claim rights inconsistent with the supposed exclusive property of the town therein.

In 1751 Daniel Heywood made a Deed of the same land to John Chadwick and Asa Flagg who in 1761 made a Deed thereof to Bezaleel Gleson. During this time no notice appears to have been taken by the town of the pretended title of Heywood & his grantees nor is there any evidence that the Town exercised its own right by any act of ownership. In 1763, it seems, however, to have been discovered by Bezaleel Gleason that his title in the land was defective. In order therefore to obtain indemnity, or to settle the question decisively, he brought an action of covenant broken against his grantors Chadwick & Flagg for covenanting in their Deed that they were seiz'd of said land avering in his declaration that the Inhabitants of the town of Worcester were seiz'd of the same—to which declaration, at the Superior Court in Worcester in Sept. 1763 the said Chadwick & Flagg pled that they had kept their covenant, and the jury found by their verdict specially "that if by the vote aforesaid (refering to the vote of the proprietors in 1733) such a right passed, as that the proprietors of the common lands of Worcester could not afterwards grant the same land [aforesaid as that the proprietors 1] to any other person or persons, then the jury find for the Plaintiffs forty three pounds eight shillings damages, and costs, otherwise they find for the Defendent costs upon which special verdict, the Court "after mature advisement gave judgment in favor of the plaintiffs Gleason against the defendants Chadwick and Flagg, thus determining that the town was exclusively seiz'd of the land

in dispute. It does not appear how Chadwick and Flagg, who were thus compelled to indemnify Gleason, were themselves indemnified by their grantor Heywood, but it seems that Heywood came back upon the proprietors, and the heirs of the old Committee who had conveyed to him. On the 26th of March 1770, at a meeting of the proprietors the following vote was passed "whereas it appears to said proprietors that Major Daniel Hevwood who purchased nearly one hundred acres on Millstone Hill of the proprietors' committee, the same being recovered of him or his assigns in due course of law, therefore voted that John Chandler Esq. pay said Daniel Heywood the sum of seven pounds, one shilling & three pence now in his hands, provided the said Heywood give a sufficient release to the Proprietors from any further claim relative to the sale aforesaid" A release was accordingly drawn up in due form on the proprietors book to be signed by Heywood, but thro' mistake or negligence, it was never executed. It appears, however, that the sum voted by the proprietors was actually received by Heywood, for on the 31st of the same month, he in consideration of £,7.1.3 paid by the proprietors and £9.1-4 paid by Absalom Rice Benja. Flagg and David Chadwick heirs of the old committee of the proprietors, releas'd to said heirs all actions on account of the covenants contained in the deed of their ancestors and in the preamble of his deed, by way of recital declared "that the said Committee had no right to sell and convey the land to him the said Heywood." presumed, that at this time the question of title was considered as decisively settled in favor of the town, but as Heywood had not actually relinquished the title which he formerly claimed, but merely released his right of action, he undertook, eleven years afterwards, (in 1781) (when the lapse of time might have in some degree obliterated the impression made by the decision of the Court, or rendered the recollection of facts & dates somewhat indistinct and confused) to give a quitclaim without any covenant of seizin or of warranty of his supposed right in the premises to David Chadwick for the trifling consideration of Twenty Shillings-this quitclaim though signed & sealed, was never acknowledged nor recorded. The David Chadwick to

whom it was given was the heir of John Chadwick one of the old committee, and the same person to whom Heywood released his right of action in 1770. From this David Chadwick, the Individuals who now claim a right in the land on Millstone Hill derive their supposed title, through several intermediate conveyances. But the Committee can find no evidence, that Heywood ever obtained from Chadwick and Flagg his first grantees, or from any other person, a reconveyance or release of the title in the land which he had for a valuable consideration before Parted with, or that they ever receiv'd from him any indemnity for the breach of his covenants to them which might have revested the title in him, if he had ever possessed any. We may fairly presume that all this was done, but it is mere conjecture; no proof of the fact exists. Your Committee find by a recurrence to the town records that soon after the decision of the Superior Court in favor of the title of the town, the town (March 1766) assumed an absolute right in the land, and passed a vote forbidding any person to cut wood thereon without leave of the Selectmen. March 6, 1769 an article having been inserted in the warrant for the meeting, to see if the town would sell the land on Millstone-Hill, it was voted in the negative. March 5th 1770 the town granted leave to the town of Shrewsbury to get stone steps on Millstone Hill for their Meeting House.

Dec. 5. 1780 a Committee was appointed to consider what title the town has to the land on Millstone Hill, and report at an adjournment of the meeting. At the adjournment the Committee submitted a report, the substance of which was, that the town had no right to Millstone Hill but what they derived from the grant of the proprietors in 1733, that the Inhabitants had always enjoyed the privilege of getting stones and had never been molested in the exercise of it by the proprietors or those claiming a right under them by a conveyance subsequent to the said grant. This report did not contain any definite opinion to the right of the town to the fee of the land, and did not recommend any measures either for asserting or relinquishing the claim of the town. The Committee seem to have been careful not to commit themselves or the town by any concessions tho' it may appear probable, from

the language of their report, that they doubted the right of the town to the fee of the land. This report was accepted.

Nov. 27. 1784 the town again chose a Committee to examine into their title to the land in question, who, in March 1778 [sic] made a lucid tho' concise report containing a statement of the most essential facts which have already [been] mentioned in the present report and referring, very particularly, to the judgement of the Superior Court in 1763. The Committee also stated, that they had asked advice of Counsel in the law which had confirmed them In the opinion that the fee of the land was in the town of Worcester. This report was accepted and the town at the same meeting chose a Committee "to take care of the town's property on Millstone Hill" who were also empowered "to prosecute every trespasser on the same, and to dispose of the property to the best advantage of the town." It seems that this Committee in pursuance of their authority, between this meeting which was on the 3^d of March and another meeting which was held by adjournment on the 17th of the same month, had prosecuted David Chadwick the last grantee of Heywood for trespass on this land, for at the adjournment it was voted to discontinue a certain action against said Chadwick, and to dismiss the Committee.

May 19, 1791 the town voted to dismiss the following article in the warrant for the meeting "to see if the town will choose a Committee to make inquiry, what trespass has been committed upon the land belonging to said town on Millstone-Hill in cutting or carrying off wood, timber &c and make report to the town respecting the same—March 4, 1793 another Committee was chosen to prosecute all trespassers "on the town's property at Millstone Hill." March 17, 1806 it was voted to dismiss the following article in the warrant for the meeting "to see if the town will require payment of any person or persons of any sum for stones wrought and carried from Millstone Hill."

The above, on a reference to the town records, appear to be all the acts and votes of the town respecting the property on

Millstone Hill. The whole tenor of them shows that various opinions have been entertained, and different opinions at different times prevailed, if not as to the town's right to the land, yet as to the expediency of prosecuting their claims in a court of law. Sometimes the town asserted their absolute right, and took the preliminary steps for defending it but did not persevere in the course in which they had begun.

At other times they seem to have doubted their right, or did not think the property worth the risk and expence of a lawsuit. But the only careful investigation which appears to have been made of the subject resulted in the opinion of a Committee, confirmed by legal advice, that the town had an absolute fee in the land. We believe these to be all the material facts respecting the subject which we have in charge to examine, and it only remains for us, agreeably to our instructions, to express our opinion as to the title of the town to the land on Millstone Hill.

The first question which arises is this—What is the true construction of the vote of the old proprietors, who granted "100 acres of the poorest land on Millstone Hill to be left common for the use of the town for building stones"?

This question we are in a measure constrained to consider as decisively settled by the judgment of the Superior Court in 1763. The opinion of this high judicial tribunal, composed of men eminently learned in the law, if it be not absolutely conclusive, yet it is entitled to the utmost deference and respect—and had we previously formed a different opinion ourselves, we should be strongly inclined to doubt its correctness, when contradicted by a decision of such paramount authority. But independent of the decision of the Court, and even keeping it out of view as far as possible in our examination, we have formed a decided opinion that the intention of the original proprietors was to give the town an absolute property in the land; that the words "to be left common for the use of the town for building stones" were introduced merely to denote the principal design and reason of the grant, and not with a view of reserving to the proprietors any right in the soil or limiting the town in the use of it.

The next question, and perhaps the only remaining one essential in the present inquiry is, whether the town having once had an absolute property in the land, has lost it by losing possession —or in other words, whether any one else has acquired a title by Upon this point, a recurrence to the votes and acts of the town, from the time when the first dispute about title arose, down to a recent period, satisfies us that the town has never for any considerable length of time, ceased to assert its right, and has frequently exercised it by acts of ownership, such as granting licence to other corporations and individuals to get stones from Millstone-Hill appointing agents to take care of it, and defend it against trespassers, and, by the agency of a committee, once actually commencing a prosecution against a supposed trespasser. But whether these proceedings constitute a legal possession, or not, we cannot perceive that any one else has acquired a title in that manner. It is true, that individuals, claiming under Heywood, have from time to time, cut down and carried away wood from this land—but it is also true that, independent of the acts of the town in its corporate capacity, the Inhabitants have from time immemorial used and possessed the Hill for the purpose of getting stone, have cleared off wood from spots when it was most convenient to take stone, have erected workshops on the land, and used the wood for carrying on so much of the blacksmithing business as was necessary for repairing the tools &c. Under these circumstances, we are of opinion that there has been no such exclusive possession either by the town or by individuals as would conclude either party. But what we apprehend will settle this point at once is, that the present claimants do not pretend anything more than a mixed possession. They agree that whatever the town had originally by the grant of the proprietors they now possess. And if, indeed, they claimed a title by possession it could avail them nothing-Unless their claim extended to the sole exclusive property of the land. But we do not think it important for us to examine the title of those who claim under the quit-claim of Daniel Heywood to David Chadwick, (tho' we are persuaded that it would prove defective, even if the town were without right)—for if the town's title be not good, it is of no concern to us whose title is good. On a view of the whole case we are unanimously of opinion, that the title of the town to the fee of the land on Millstone-Hill is good and sufficient in law 1



"The Committee, to whom was referred the Subject relative to the repairs of the Clocks on the Meeting Houses of the first & second Parishes in Worcester have attended to the duties, assigned them, and now ask leave to report.

That in their opinion, the property in the said Meeting Houses, and in the Clocks, belonging thereto is exclusively in the said Parishes respectively; that the Town can legally raise money by assessment, to erect and repair buildings, and to purchase and repair Clocks therefor, to accommodate the Town in its meetings for municipal purposes; that the Town may consequently appropriate monies to pay for the use of such house or houses as it may occupy for town meetings; that in as much as the said Clocks are of general utility, and the town may be saved the expence of erecting a building for its exclusive use, by the alternate occupation of said Parish-houses it is reasonable, that said Clocks should be kept in repair at the charge of the town—Your Committee therefore recommend the passing of the following vote viz.

Voted, that the Selectmen be directed to expend such sum, not exceeding One Hundred Dollars, of any monies in the Treasury of the town, not otherwise appropriated, as may be sufficient to keep in repair the meeting house Clocks of the first and second Parishes, for one year from the first of May last; upon condition nevertheless, that said Parishes will permit the Town to assemble in Said houses respectively for the transaction of its municipal business during said year; all which is respectfully submitted,"



The Committee, to whose consideration was submitted the expediency of increasing the School-Tax for benefit of the Grammar-School, ask leave to make the following report. Having attentively examined into the condition, character, and usefulness of the Grammer School as it has of late been supported, the Committee have no hesitation in declaring it as their opinion, that a respectable School of that kind cannot be maintained with the annual grant of \$400, the sum hitherto allowed for that purpose. They feel it to be their duty also to state their conviction that for several years past the Town has failed to derive much benefit from that school in the education of youth, as it has maintained a character very little if any higher than that of the other town Schools.

The Committee apprehend this may be very justly imputed to a want of funds sufficient to engage the services of an able, and skilful Instructor whose assiduity and learning would give reputation, and stability to the school. The question therefore for the town to consider is, whether, without benefit to itself, it will continue a nominal compliance with the law, and waste the sum annually appropriated, or raise such further sum as will place the school on a respectable basis and make it a source of knowledge as the best means of promoting virtue and happiness in the community, and as the basis of the free civil institutions of our country. Our ancestors were the first legislators who made free schools a political institution and taxed the public with the expence of teaching youth the precepts of virtue and useful knowledge. They were first to call upon the rich by force of law to enlighten the understanding and elevate the morals and the condition of the poor. To this most excellent institution are we, through the

blessing of divine providence, largely indebted for the freedom & happiness we enjoy. The moral energy, the profound knowledge of the rights of man and the steady adherence to the principles which sustained our country in the most disastrous times of the revolution, had their origin in that general diffusion of knowledge, which enabled each individual to understand the merits of the controversy; and it is but a just tribute to the memory of our ancestors to allow that the triumph of the cause of man In the United States is in a great measure to be imputed to this circumstance. Mind is the gift of Providence and belongs to no condition in life. It is as often bestowed upon the poor and lowly as upon the rich—as often upon the child of obscurity, as upon him who is destined to sit upon a throne. We daily see in the Senate, at the bar, in the pulpit, and in all classes of society, a great proportion of its most active intelligent and useful members, who have risen from humble condition, & we can trace with ease the foundation of their distinction & usefulness to the education received in our free schools.

Hence it is that each individual has an interest in the support of schools beyond the education of his own family; for with the existence of schools is identified the cause of virtue of freedom and of humanity. From them come many of the great the wise and the good. In them all who do not will to be ignorant may make such acquirements as to think and act with intelligence. They are therefore one of the highest blessings to the poor, placing them in intellectual improvment on a footing with the rich. Indeed they may be said to be established entirely for the benefit of the poor for the rich can educate their children without the aid of the public.

They are a blessing to the whole community, which we can appreciate best by considering the degraded condition of that portion of the human race that is ignorant of letters. When we find such people we find them generally without the enjoyment of civil or religious liberty—the Slaves of despots, and the dupes of bigots. But where intellectual & moral energy gains its full expansive force, the chains of tyrants are burst asunder, the holy engines of torture are broken in pieces, and man rises from his fallen condition to be again lord of creation. Bondage has its security in ignorance. The master removes from his slave all means of intellectual improvement, that he may know no better condition in life. The despot never employs money or means to enlighten the minds of his subjects, but shuts the avenues of knowledge against them lest they should know & assert their rights. Our course is opposite to this. Our philanthropy should

be broad. Our sympathies should extend to the world of man and as a knowledge of letters is the only sure means by which virtue & happiness can be diffused we should not withhold such resources as we have, to promote the greatest of blessings. In view of these considerations the Committee feel that the town is deeply interested in maintaining a free school of high character where all who desire it may get an education that shall subserve all the ordinary purposes of life. They therefore in the most earnest manner recommend to the Town to increase the School tax to \$2000,—\$1200 whereof to be distributed in proportion to the number of minors as heretofore \$200 whereof to be divided among the out districts and the remainder to be applied to the support of the Grammer School which sum we trust, if judiciously expended, will increase the usefulness of that institution so that it will justly be esteemed an ornament to the Town.

The Selectmen of the Town of Worcester as a Committee, to whose consideration was referred the application of the Trustees of the Worcester Agricultural Society for a grant by the Town of Land whereon to erect a Hall for the use of the Society have given their attention to the subject and now make their Report.

Among the most useful & commendable Institutions of the County Societies for the advancement of the interest of Agriculture are deservedly held in the first rank. The occupation of the most numerous class of the Citizens of Massachusetts is in the business of husbandry. The dependence of all other classes upon this for the means of subsistence renders every encouragement afforded to the Farmer an advancement of the general interest, and more or less directly contributes to the prosperity of the whole community. Until within a few years past the Yeomanry of New England, always among the most distinguished, independent and patriotic of the people, were of subordinate estimation in the artificial arrangements of Society, and they whose labors were most indispensible, to private support and national strength were passed by as the humble Instruments of the power of others. more liberal & enlightened view of the relations of Men to each other & to Society has secured to the husbandman his just place in public regard and by elevating the employment and character, the Farmer has given to his condition higher claims upon public favor.

The Committee review with great satisfaction the measures which have been so eminently successful in this County in promoting the most rapid improvements in Husbandry. The Agri-

cultural Society established but little more than five years since, enrolls the names of more than Six Hundred Inhabitants of the County; and of them are of the most spirited, best experienced and most successful Farmers in every Town, and its opperations have been eminently instrumental in diffusing a knowledge of the great improvements in rural economy which have distinguished the present day both in Europe and America. Whatever apprehentions of its success & advantage have hitherto been entertained it can now be regarded no otherwise than an increase to the valuable & permanent Institutions of the County, and should be cherished and provided for accordingly.

The Committee are of opinion that the Annual Cattle Shows & Exhibitions of Manufactures are of general interest and of peculiar advantage to the place where they are holden. They collect together great numbers of orderly well informed men for the purposes of personal observation, practical improvement and interchange of sentiments, opinions and experiments on subjects appropriate to their occupation and they leave behind them at their Meetings a great profit for their Entertainment and a reputation which altho acquired, is nevertheless reflected with greatest honor upon the place of exhibition. There can be no doubt, that the unusual prosperity of Worcester is in some measure to be ascribed to the spirit & zeal with which our Agricultural interests have recently been managed.

Few Towns in the State are of more consideration & no County has been so honorably noticed for Agricultural excellence. must be desirable to preserve this reputation as evidence of valuable exertion, and as means of just influence with the other parts of the Commonwealth. With these general remarks, the Committee pass to the more distinct object of their appointment in expressing an opinion upon the application of the Trustees of the Agricultural Society the objects of the Institution to be essentially conducive to the general interest, and the annual Shows to be particularly beneficial to the Town, by furnishing a market for much produce consumed upon the occation and by affording to the Inhabitants an opportunity of witnessing specimens of the richest products & improvements without expense or inconvenience, the Committee consider it reasonable to grant the request of the Trustees, in permitting them to erect a Building on the Town's land near the Common. A suitable Scite has been pointed out for the purpose on a range with the Gun-House at the westend of the Burying-Ground. No possible inconvenience can result to the Town from the erection of a Building in that situation, but on the contrary a handsome Edifice would greatly ornament that part of the Town, in a spot where no private building can ever be placed, and moreover conceal an unpleasant and gloomy object, in the grave yard. The Committee have therefore concluded to recommend to the Town the following form of a Vote on the subject.

"Voted: Upon the application of the Trustees of the Worcester Agricultural Society, that the Town do grant to said Trustees for the use and benefit of said Society, full right and permission to Erect a Building not exceeding 60 feet in length by 40 feet in width on the West End of the Old Burying-ground, and to be so situated as that the front of said Building shall range with the front side of the Gun-House-and the Town do grant to said Trustees as aforesaid and their Successors in the said office the Ground-Rent of said Building, and the land on which they shall erect said Building-to have and to hold the same, so long as said Society shall own & possess said Building and improve the same or any part thereof, for the public purposes of said Society —provided however that in the erection of said Building and at any time thereafter no Cellar shall be dug under the same, nor the Earth farther removed, than may be necessary for a firm and secure Underpinning to said Building and that no grave be disturbed thereby & that the Selectmen make a Deed accordingly."



The Committee appointed by the Town to settle the Treasurers Account for the last year, after a careful examination of the Account by him exhibited, find the same correctly stated & rightly cast, and that he has charged the Town with the sum of three thousand seven hundred & ninety-two dollars and fifty-

one cents; and that he has credited the Town with Ten thousand five hundred twenty eight dollars & forty-nine cents receiv'd by him and outstanding in the hands of the present Collector leaving a Ballance in favor of the Town of Six thousand seven hundred & thirty five dollars and ninety eight cents now in his hands and the hands of the Collector, to be hereafter accredited to the town, & to be accounted for by him in his future accounts; The Treasurer's Commissions for the past year having been deducted from the credit, leaving the balance aforesaid

The Committee to whose consideration was submitted the article in the Warrant relative to the erection of a Town-House ask leave to Report as follows

There can be no doubt that a Hall of sufficient dimensions to accommodate the encreasing population of the Town and fitted & furnished for the purpose of transacting Town-business would be a great convenience to the Inhabitants as the First Parish, whose Meeting-house has been hitherto used as a Town House feel disinclined to permit a further use of that building for townpurposes, unless we have a legal right thereto, or pay an equivalent for the same. The only question therefore which the Town have to decide is whether it will build or attempt to hire and the Committee are unanimously & decidedly of opinion that it would be most for its interest and convenience to build. The character, population & resources of the Town fully justify this opinion and the Committee have no doubt that ultimately this course will be found the most economical. It is more difficult to determine what kind of a building it is expedient to erect. The committee have, however, after carefully investigating the subject, & examining the drawings and plans which accompany this report concluded that a building 62 feet by 50 with two full stories and a basement will best subserve the interests of the town. sign the basement as a Market-House or provision Store the first Story as a Town-Hall and the second they intend shall be finished into two-halls one for the use of the Agricultural Society of this County and the other to be rented. A building of this construction is recommended because it is fully believed that the basement may be annually rented for a sum not less than fifty dollars. That one of the Halls may be rented to the Lodge of Masons for nearly one hundred dollars annually and the other subject to the use of the Agricultural Society for nearly the same sum as a school

room, and whether they shall be appropriated to these specific purposes or not the committee have no doubt that the apartments should the building be set in a central part of the town would rent as high as the above estimate

The estimate of the whole expense as made by Capt Lewis Bigelow is \$7,000, for a brick & \$6,000 for a wooden building.

If it was necessary to raise the sum of money by an immediate assessment upon the inhabitants the committee would doubt the expediency of adopt[ing] such a measure, but as the money can be raised by instalments from year to year of small sums and as that seems to be the most just & equitable mode of making an assessment, the committee suppose that obstacle can be easily removed by procuring a loan of money upon the credit of the Town. Such a loan there is little doubt can be obtained on more favorable terms than the usual rate of interest probably as low as five per cent. Should it be procured on these terms it will be perceiv'd that the rents of the building will probably pay the interest of from \$4000 to \$5000 so that the Town cannot in any event advance beyond \$3000, for which it will not receive an equivalent unless the expectations of the committee should be disappointed of which there is not much probability as their estimates are quite as low as the average of rents in the town.

The committee can only state in relation to the location of the building that Doct Paine has in the most liberal manner offered to make gratuitously a Deed of a lot of land a little north of M^r. Lovell's tavern if the town see fit to place it there. The Agricultural Society as appears by an abstract from their records accompanying this report have appointed a Committee to reconvey the land lately conveyed to that Society by the Town on the terms & conditions in said abstract mentioned. These two spots have been examined by the committee & the other public grounds of the town but the Committee forbear designating any spot as most suitable for the location.

In conclusion the committee recommend that the town erect a Hall of brick substantially upon the abovementioned plan and that a loan of sufficient money for that purpose be procured on the most favorable terms, to be refunded by instalments annually to such amount as the town shall deem expedient.

The Committee to whom the subject of the proposed Town-House was referred at the town meeting held on the 3^d of May, have attended to that duty & beg leave to report as follows.

That they consider the ground on which the shop occupied by Reuben Munroe now stands to be the most eligible location for the proposed Building as in their opinion it can be erected at the least cost and also be rented to the most advantage. mittee from enquiry they have made cannot estimate the probable rents at less than three hundred Dollars per annum and they believe that they will exceed rather than fall short of that sum. And in their opinion no other location which could be obtained would be so advantageous to the Town in this point of view. The Committee have ascertained that Mr. Samuel Flagg who holds the land under a Lease from the Town, will give up the lease together with his property the Building now on the ground for the sum of Seven hundred and fifty Dollars—and provided the Town will acquit Mr. Flagg of the ground rent now due & will pay to Mr. Munroe the sum of Thirty dollars possession can be obtained on the first of July.

And the Committee are authorized by M^r. Lewis Bigelow to say that he will purchase the Building now on the ground at the price of Three Hundred Dollars; but in their opinion it is worth more; they estimate the value of the stones in the Cellar and the underpining to be worth Fifty Dollars.

The Committee have measured and staked out the ground in conformity to a plan already laid before the Town under the impression that a Building substantially the same would be erected and they recommend that the South side of the building be placed at the distance of Fifty-nine feet from the bellfry of the Meeting house of the first Parish and the West end of it on a line with the West porch of said Meeting House.

The Committee were not directed to enquire into the kind of Building suitable for the purposes contemplated and they shall only observe in their opinion it will be advisable to have a Basement Story as adding very little to the cost and considerable to the rents to be obtained from it. The Committee are of opinion that the Basement Story should be of Stone & the rest of Brick.

As the least burdensome mode of paying for the Town House the committee recommend that a loan be obtained on the Security of the Town to be repaid by annual installments of one thousand Dollars in addition to the Interest. They think a Loan of sufficient money may be procured at less than the legal Interest.

The above was read and recommitted to the same Committee and the meeting adjourned for half an hour at the time met and the following Report was presented and read viz.

The Town now assembled having voted that the subject of the Town-House be recommitted to the same Committee for further consideration, that Committee have attended to that duty & request leave to Report as follows.

The Committee recommend that the Town pass the following Votes

First that the Town-House be so placed as to have the South Side at a distance of fifty nine feet from the Bellfry of the Meeting-House of the First Parish and that the West end be placed on a line with the West Porch of said Meeting-House.

Second. That the Town-House be Sixty-four feet long by fifty-four feet wide.

3d That the Basement Story of the Town House be of Stone and the upper Stories of Brick.

4th That the money to defray the expence of the Town-House be raised by a Loan on the Security of the Town to be repaid by annual Installments not exceeding the Sum of One Thousand Dollars in addition to the Interest and that the term for the payment of the whole not exceeding fourteen years.

By All which is respectfully submitted

The Committee appointed by the town at their meeting April 3^d, 1826, under an article in the warrant for s'd meeting "to see if the town will release to the Blackstone canal corporation any lands belonging to the Town which may be flowed by raising Long Pond four and a half feet" have given the subject a very deliberate consideration, and ask leave to submit the following Report

The lands which will be flowed by raising Long Pond four and a half feet, consist of about eight acres of low wet meadow ground

ARTICLE 4:—"To see if the town will release to the Blackstone Canal Company free of expense the use of so much of the land belonging to the town as will be affected by raising the water in Long Pond to the height of four & a half feet & release also the right which said town hold in said Pond to be used by said Company as a reservoir to supply the s'd Canal with water."

upon which, when not flowed, may be cut, annually, about four tons of hay; three eigths of which is of a quality called good stock hay, and may be carted with convenience; and five eights of which is of the most ordinary kind, which must be carried to the cart on poles, over a very wet bottom. The hay from this meadow, when put in the barn, is unquestionably of important use to the town farm, and the loss of it may be considered an evil; But when the vast importance of a water communication with the seaboard, and the consequent advantage which would result to the Town of Worcester, is considered, the loss of this meadow is hardly to be taken into the account; and with this impression your committee unhesitatingly recommend to the Town, to release to the Blackstone canal corporation, and to that corporation alone, any lands belonging to the Town which may be flowed by raising long Pond four and a half feet, to commence so soon as it shall be necessary to raise said pond as a reservoir for the use of the Canal, and continue while it shall be used for that purpose.

The Committee to whom was referred the consideration of the expediency of celebrating the approaching fourth of July, at the expense of the town, have attended to the duty assigned them, and ask leave to submit the following report;

The next anniversary of American Independence will derive peculiar importance from the consideration, that it will furnish the experience of fifty years in support of the stability & excellency of our political institutions and the capacity of our fellow citizens for the duties of self government. The successful operation of free Institutions for half a century has silenced the sneers of the enemies of civil liberty, & quieted the apprehensions of the friends of our Country through the civilized world. In support of that sanguinary struggle for liberty, which terminated in the emancipation of our country, the Inhabitants of Worcester made honorable and patriotic exertions. The records of the town, during the war of the Revoluțion, bear ample testimony to their devoted feelings and immense contributions compared with their substance to the common cause of their country.

In the full enjoyment of the fruits of their labors, their sacrifices and sufferings, we have abundant cause as a corporation, for

public demonstrations of joy and of gratitude. Your Committee are unanimously of opinion, that it is expedient, that the next anniversary of our Country's birth should be celebrated by the town in its municipal character, and in a manner purely national. If in the course of our political history, causes of mutual distrust & irritation have existed, they should now be forgotten in the general joy, that former parties have united for public good. No allusions to past differences should disturb the harmony of the occasion. No feelings reflecting on past collisions should mingle with the festivities of that day. To insure that union of feeling so necessary to the enjoyments of this anniversary, Your Committee recommend that the whole direction of the proposed celebration should be entrusted to a committee of arrangements, consisting of twelve persons; that said committee should appoint some suitable person to deliver an oration, suited to the occation; and provide also for such other public exercises and exhibitions as they should judge proper; that a public dinner should be provided in the town hall for such inhabitants of the town as may choose to partake of it, and shall be seasonably provided with tickets for that purpose; that all necessary expenses of that day shall be paid out of the Treasury of the town, provided however, that the town shall not be chargable for any refreshments except for the military escort, and such inhabitants as the Committee of arrangements and the Selectmen shall think proper to invite specially to the public dinner—and that said Committee may best represent the sentiments & feelings of the whole it is further recommended, that they be nominated to the town by a committee of nine first appointed for that purpose by the moderator of this meeting.

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the town of Worcester, held at the Town Hall on Monday the 1st of May 1826 by adjournment from the 6th of March last, the following votes were passed viz.

Voted to raise Twenty-five Hundred Dollars; for defraying the expense of the Public Schools in Town the current year and that the money be expended in the same manner as last year.

The Committee of the Town of Worcester who were directed to examine and cause a plan to be made of the several Roads in the town of Worcester, have discharged the duty assigned them and respectfully ask leave to submit the following report which is accompanied by a plan of the town, the field Book of the Surveyor & the Road-Book of the Committee to which they refer for many of the particular statements respecting the discharge of their trust, your committee deemed it of the highest importance that the services of a skilful Surveyor in whom the public reposed a confidence should be employed to perform this important work. Mr. Butler who was very highly recommended, was engaged and his plan which is now presented furnishes evidence with how much reson, the Committee have been justified in the selection.

They-commenced their work with the survey of the road leading to Hardwick—this road was laid by order of the County 3 rods wide but in many places falls short of its proper width from one to twenty links. Your Committee would observe not only as respects this, but almost every road in the town, that they

have been satisfied from the admeasurements they have taken that many of the inhabitants, owners of land adjoining the public roads have entertained a belief that one half the width of each fence might be placed on the land laid out for the use of the public—your Committee believe this impression is altogether erroneous, the public have a right to the use of the whole width of road as ordered to be laid out free from all obstruction.

The Cross road from Hardwick to the Paxton road in several places falls short of its proper width from two to eight links.

The old Paxton Road by M^r. Ebenezer Mower's house was laid four Rods wide but falls short of that width from ten to thirty links.

Road from foot of Tatnick Hill to Holden falls short of its proper width the greater [part] of its length from four to twelve & a half links less than two Rods.

Road by Asa Gates Mill to Leicester line is generally narrow of its proper width of two rods—at the mill only seventeen links wide & extremely dangerous it should be railed for the safety of the traveller.

Road to Amos Howards is with one exception of a short distance two rods wide.

Road to Jonas Johnsons was laid two Rods wide but falls short of that width—part of it is eighteen links more narrow than it should be.

Road to John Ranks should be two Rods wide but is of less width at the south end and also at a Virginia fence on land of M^r. Thos. Johnsons it is for the greater part of the distance of sufficient width.

Cross road from Tatnick Road to Willard Moores laid two rods wide as far as Francis Flaggs house beyond that no record found; through land of Robert and Charles Blair three links too narrow; from M^r. Flaggs house north it falls short of two Rods from eight to fifteen links.

Joseph Patches Road two rods wide, but near his house, & east of it too narrow, in one place seventeen links less than its proper width—from Beaver Brook to Leicester Road the width between fences varies from 3½ to 4 Rods Hepsy Hemenways Garden fence projects 17 links into the road.

Road from New Worcester over Raccoon Plain to Ward varies from 1½ to 2 Rods wide—should be 2 rods the whole distance.

Road to Leicester laid as a 4 Rod road varies in width from 83 links to 4 rods—the wall in front of Messrs. Hoveys & Butman new houses I Rod in road.

New County road from Jones to Leicester line is fenced to narrow east of M'. Adam's barn—M'. Jones Barn the north west corner projects into the road.

Road from Stafford turnpike to Oxford Road falls short in its width of two Rods from 6 to 10 links in several places.

Road from Oxford by Deacon Trowbridges House varies from 10 to 36 links short of its proper width of 3 Rods.

Road from Miss Waters house to Ward Road east of Bridge near Flaggs Mill, is too narrow by from 6 to 9 links.

Road from Millbury Road to Ward line by Nathan Whites house is too narrow falling short of its proper width of three Rods as laid out from 8 to 39 links.

Road over Bogachoag Hill south of Henry Patches place 47 links wide—the residue over 2 Rods.

Road to Ephraim Curtis' House is 2 Rods wide.

Road from Ward by Timothy Tafts house is from 1 to 6 links too narrow S. W. of said House.

Road from Millbury road to Grafton Road, by Doc^t. Heywoods farm measures in width 35 to 72 links wide.

Road from Millbury which should be 3 Rods wide is generally too narrow, it varies from 55 to 72 links wide.

Sheep Lane is 11/2 rods wide.

Road by Nathaniel Stowells to Millbury line varies from 39 to 48 links in width.

Road to Grafton is generally too narrow part of it is 28 links

—3 rod road.

Road by Daniel Stearns old house measures from 45 to 48 links wide.

Road to Grafton Gore—Benj^a. Newtons house 6 links in road. Old County road back of Clark Willingtons measures from 36 to 40 links. Cross road down Hill 47 links wide.

Road by Aaron Flaggs house part of it falls short of 2 rods by 4 links.

Road by William Eaton Jun^r. falls short from 5 to 13 [links] of 2 rods.

Pine meadow Road falls short of its proper width of 3 Rods from 1 to 28 links.

Cross road by Russell Eatons house measures from 31 to 43 links instead of 2 rods.

Back Street laid 3 Rods wide—too narrow at the north half of it.

School Street laid 2 rods is too narrow from bridge to back Street.

Thomas Street remains as wide as laid out.

Road from School House by Rufus Porters house to Shrewsbury road laid out as a 3 rod road measures from 2 to 3 rods.

Old Road to Shrewsbury laid as a 4 Rod road falls short in width in different places from 2 to 45 links.

Road to William E. Greens house falls short in width from 4 to 19 links.

Road from Chamberlains tavern to West Boylston line from 31 to 48 links wide instead of 2 rods.

Road from Benjamins Thayres to Col. Moores Road generally 2 Rods wide, part of it falls short 9 links of that measure.

Road from Guide post near Maynards Shop passing Col. Moores house measures from 51 to 71 links wide.

Road from West Boylston line over Burncoat Plain measures from 47 to 71 links laid out for a 3 Rod Road.

Road from School House passing Doct Paines Mill to West Boylston west road measures in width from 50 to 68 links, the road has recently been made 10 links more narrow than it has formerly been.

Road from John H. Knights to Holden Turnpike a 2 Rod road measures from 30 to 48 links in width.

Road from Holden Turnpike to West Boylston road, a road 2 rods wide as laid but measures from 28 to 41 links.

Road from Benj*. Thayres by Brooks, Barbers, Stowells & Gleasons houses to Holden road laid 2 rods wide varies from 45 links to 2 rods.

Road across from Barber road by Jon^a. Gleasons Jun. farm to Holden road falls short of its proper width from 3 to 20 links.

Road across from near D. Chadwicks to near Sam¹. Mills from 2 to 10 links too narrow.

Jo Bill road too narrow from Holden Road to top of Hill—the remainder wide.

Road from S. Salisbury's House to Holden line laid out as a 3 Rod road, but varies in its width as fenced from 2 to 3 Rods.

Road over Winter Hill a two rod road but measures from 1 to 2 rods.

Road from Holden line by Thomas Nichols house to the other Holden road at Theophilus Wheelers new farm house measures from 49 to 75 links—should be 3 Rods as laid out.

Boylston Road from Town's farm to Shrewsbury line does not measure 2 Rods in width.

Main Street was

laid out by the Proprietors of the town as a 6 Rod road by what authority it has been reduced for a considerable part of its length to its present width, as between buildings, your committee are ignorant they can find no permission on record, this Street has been rendered more strait on the east side in its course from the house of Captain Slater to the house belonging to Edward D. Banks [Bangs] Esq. by the former proprietors of the land adjoining the street having thrown out a strip of land for the use of the public front of the present buildings; it has also been made more strait on the west side by the buildings belonging to Samuel Brazer Esq. and to Mr. Elisha Flagg having been brought forward into the road how far this incroachment on the public rights has extended to the north and south of these buildings your Committee are not particularly informed—the fence in front of the buildings belonging to his Excellency Levi Lincoln and the Hon. Joseph Allen projects into the street. 'Many of the buildings in the town are placed on the line of the road the door steps are necessarily projected into the street and in a few instances of this kind front fences have also been placed into the road.

Your Committee may not have collected all the information which may have been expected from them previous to the commencement of their [work?] they solicited by a notice put up at each of the public meeting houses in the town that any person having any knowledge in relation to their duties would impart it to them, but the greater part of the facts reported, have been obtained from the examination of the records of the town and the County. The line of the town on the east side is laid down on the plan without any certain knowledge that it is correct—application was made at the office of the Secretary of this Commonwealth for a copy of the original grant to the proprietors of Quansicamond Plantation which has not been receiv'd—the town of Shrewsbury claim to be bounded on this town by the West bank of Quansicamond Pond—but this claim cannot be allowed as appears by the Records of the original Proprietors of this town that on the 16th of March 1721 a small island in the Pond called Rams Island was granted to Moses Leonards 1 This grant was made before the incorporation of the town of Shrewsbury and it goes far to disprove the claim now made by that town. The actual line between this town and Ward is very crooked and the towns much interlocked, an alteration in that is very desirable.

The Report of the Town's Committee on Schools was read and accepted and is as follows.

The School Committee of the town of Worcester appointed last Spring pursuant to an act of the Legislature entitled "an act further to provide for the Instruction of Youth" passed in the winter session of 1826—beg leave to report to the town their doings during the year.

Your Committee felt at first the responsibility and difficulty attending the duties of their appointment, and they entered on them not without much anxiety that any measure adopted in the intro-

duction of a new order of things respecting our schools, should be for the general good. Having learnt by experience as members of the Board of Overseers of the Schools in the Centre District, the importance of a Book of Records, they appointed, at their first meeting, a Clerk, with instructions to procure a suitable Blank Book, in which to record whatever might be judged important in their doings. They then sought first to understand the act providing for their appointment & the duties therein pointed out for them to perform; and having as they thought done this the next thing was to consider how they might discharge their duties to the greatest advantage & acceptance of the town.

To aid them they accordingly invited the Committee-men of the several school districts to a meeting for consultation as to what might meet the wishes & feelings of the several districts. Having obtained what information they could, the Committee then passed the following vote as appears from the Records namely

"That this Committee request the several Committee-men of the respective districts to select such persons to keep their respective schools for the ensuing summer, as should to them be agreeable, subject to examination by this Committee and to be approved by them as the act [pointing?] out their duty requires."

Accordingly the several schools were furnished & taught by instructors obtained as nearly in conformity to this rule as practicable. The Committee attended to the opening, monthly & closing examinations in conformity to the provisions of the act requireing the same, and were in general pleased & in some instances highly gratified with the order, attention & progress of the schools and the devotedness of the instructors to their duty—Thus closed the labor of the Committee for the summer.

On the return of the season of the winter schools were opened in the same way the summer schools had been except that the Committees of the several districts were consulted seperately & individually; and the Committee thought it a pleasing circumstance that in most instances they were enabled to employ masters acceptable to the several districts. Here too, the opening, the several monthly and the closing examinations were attended to by the whole Committee, or in the absence of two of them at General Court, by the other three—except in a case or two, where the duties of their sacred calling prevented.

Before closing this part of their Report the Committee would observe here, that they considered early what plan of examination to proceed upon & concluded on the following, namely—That at

every examination of a School, the examiner should note the time when he examines, the whole number of Scholars belonging to the school, the number absent & number present, the number of each class, the subjects in which they are examined, their appearance in examination, the scholar at the head & the next best: and finally, the order and discipline of the school, and the comparative standing of the scholars from time to time—the whole to be passed to the Clerk, to be kept on file; in order to the better accomplishment of all which the Committee ordered, further, that the same School Registers should be used by the several Instructors which are used in the Schools in the Centre District, wherein the daily conduct & attention or negligence of each scholar might be carefully noted for inspection. And the Committee have the satisfaction to believe that the plan adopted has been attend-They think the schools are improving; & ed with good effects. it has been particularly pleasing to them to observe how the younger Scholars especially are becoming more & more thoroughly acquainted with the elements of spelling & reading, for not attending to which on first going to school, so many grow up with little or no taste for reading and general improvement. The Committee will only add, on this part of their Report, that they cannot but look forward with pleasing anticipation in view of the progress of the Schools, and the additional facilities which it is hoped may still open for the advancement of our youth in knowledge & Virtue.

The financial concerns of the Committee will be reported separately. It only remains for them therefore to report their doings in relation to the Latin Grammar School. This School had formerly been under the care of the Selectmen of the town; but the act authorising the appointment of your Committee made it now their duty to superintend & control it-nor was it overlooked or forgotten. How it might be raised to the character which it ought to sustain was a subject of early consideration with the Committee, as were also the difficulties & embarrassments which had hitherto attended it. As stated in the notice published by the Committee at the opening of the school under the present Instructor, it was their opinion that if a suitable, permanent Instructor could be obtained and regular attendance secured on the part of scholars, the difficulties & embarrassments would be all After considerable inquiry, they at length engaged Benson C. Baldwin to commence as permanent Instructor on the following conditions namely, that for the first six months (which should be a season of trial for mutual satisfaction between M^r. Baldwin on the one hand and the Committee and town on the

other) he should receive at the rate of \$580 per year—that for the year ensuing, on supposition of mutual satisfaction and the concurrence of the town he should receive \$650 and for every subsequent year, \$700 per annum till settled with a family, when his salary should be raised to \$800 annually. Having thus provided, as they believed, against the evil of not having a suitable permanent Instructor, it now remained to guard against that arising from temporary, irregular attendance on the part of Scholars. Here your Committee were deeply solicitous to fix on such regulations as might be hoped to recommend themselves to the good sense of their fellow-citizens; and upon mature reflection they thought for Scholars in the Centre-District, one quarter, and for such as live out of it, one month's attendance at least ought to be insisted on, necessary to the prosperity of the School in general, and the greatest good of each scholar in particular. And as to regularity of attendance for the quarter or month your Committee were decidedly & unanimously of opinion that no excuse ought to entitle a delinquent to his place in the school again, which might not be considered strictly providential or occational, and not likely often to return. In the construction of this rule also, a majority of the Committee thought, after a little experiment of the plan, that no dispensation ought to be granted in favor of any one, on the ground of giving opportunity to acquire a polite accomplishment, when it was not granted in accommodation to the steadily returning business of families. But in the absence of a majority of the Committee difficulties arising, the rest judged it expedient in some instances to relax the rule.

To your Committe these regulations appeared necessary and reasonable, and if they could be understood & acted upon, as the Committee hoped they would be, it was confidently believed they would recommend themselves to the judgement & approbation of the town. It is moreover no small pleasure to your Committee to be able notwithstanding all the difficulties which are, perhaps, ever to be expected in the introduction of a new order of things in any of our social relations, to say here, as they think they justly may, in regard both to the Latin School in particular, and the other Schools generally, that they are, by the common consent of all, in altogether an improving state.

Your Committee would also further say, in closing this Report, that they anticipate with pleasure for their successors in office,

the happiness with which they shall attend to the laborious and interesting duties of their appointment.

The Committee appointed by the Town to settle with the former Board of Selectmen & to transfer the Books and papers of the Town in their hands to the present Selectmen—Report—That they have examined an account Current of Monies receiv'd and expended or paid over for the Town, by the Selectmen, regularly kept in a Book for that purpose, Commencing March 9th 1825 and ending March 10th 1827, and after a careful and satisfactory investigation, have found the account accurately stated and all the payments well vouched or satisfactorily accounted for; and that a ballance of Eighty seven dollars and ninety cents, remaining in their hands since the 10th day of March last, has been paid over to the Town-Treasurer by Otis Corbett Esq. Chairman of the former Board. In addition to that account, they have had exhibited to them an account of Monies received by

said Selectmen since April 1826 for granting Licences under the act of March 4th 1826, for Public Shows, amounting to the sum of One hundred & ten dollars. This money by the provisions of that act, is to be appropriated for the benefit of the Poor of the Town; and the Selectmen, as Overseers of the Poor, have held it as a distinct fund to be applied to the purchase of articles of Furniture for the Poor-house, principally such as will conduce to the comfort of the sick or infirm, & to diminish the labor of those who attend on them. The sum of Fifty-three Dollars & Sixty-five cents has been expended in this way, leaving a balance of Fiftysix Dollars and thirty five cents unexpended which has been paid over to the Committee and by them paid to the present Select-For the purpose of ascertaining whether the monies received by the Selectmen on the Town Bonds, was accurately entered on their acc^t current, it became necessary for the Committee to examine those Bonds; and having done as they deem it proper to include in their Report, a list and discription of the Bonds in order that the Town may be informed, not only what Bonds have been transferred by the Committee to the present Selectmen, but of the actual condition of them.

One half of the original sum secured by Nath! Gates' Bond was paid to the Selectmen in Sept last with interest thereon up to that time and by them credited in their account. The Selectmen received also on the 29th of May last the Principal & Interest of Abraham Lincoln's Bond amounting to \$484—which sum is also credited in their account.

The Committee have also received and transferred as aforesaid, a Note made by W^m. Goulding to the town May 9th 1807 for \$100, on which is endorsed January 1st 1810 a receipt of \$76, —B. Butman & Co's Due Bill for sundry articles of Paint—Increase Stearns J^{rs} Note for \$14,58 dated August 14th 1809 a certain Bond of Indemnity to the town from W^m. Wesson and others —a Note of Thomas Tyler dated March 12, 1827 for \$26,11 made to Otis Corbett for the use of the Town, and by him endorsed. And other papers, Documents, and Books.

It is very gratifing to the Committee to be able to say that the accounts, which it has been their duty to examine have been so Kept as to present at all times an intelligible statement of the pecuniary transactions of the Selectmen. Previous to March 1825 there does not appear to have been any regular account kept by the Selectmen; at any rate not in the Selectmen's Book. The inconvenience & the danger of mistakes, arising from the want of such an account, must have been great; and the example of method and accuracy, which has been set by the Chairman of the

old Board of Selectmen, will not the Committee trust be lost sight of hereafter.

Before closing their Report the Committee ask the indulgence of suggesting the propriety of making it the business of the Selectmen to audit & settle all ordinary accounts & claims against the town. From their necessary acqaintance with the concerns of the [town] they are best qualified to adjust such claims; and in this way the inconvenience & delay often occationed to individuals by a reference of their claims to a Committee of accounts of temporary authority would be avoided. There seems to be no objection to such a course especially if the Town will annually appoint a Committee to examine the accounts of the Selectmen.

Which said Road is hereby reported to the Town for their acceptance; and when accepted & recorded is forever after to be Known as a public Town-Way.

Report of the School Committee of the Town of Worcester for the year ending March 1828

The Committee to whom was entrusted the care of the several District Schools of the Town beg leave to report the following—The Schools under the care of the Committee have been Eight for the Summer & Nine for the Winter, one District having been divided into two. The Instructors in every case have been such as were first presented by the District-Committees and the Committee feel a pleasure in saying that, though they would have wished in some cases, for more promise in the candidates than was afforded from examination, the result of trial in every instance of a new instructor both Masters & Mistresses, has been attended, so far as the Committee have been able to learn with a good degree of satisfaction.

Of the Eight Summer Schools, five were taught by Instructors who had kept before with the approbation of the Committee of the last year and to the satisfaction of the Districts where they taught. The other Three were under the care of Instructors who had not kept before.

Of the Nine Winter Schools, Two of them only had the same Instructors they had the Winter before. The other Seven had new Instructors who were examined and approved in the usual way, except one who being a graduate of College was approved without examination. Both the Summer & Winter Schools were examined monthly by some one or more of the Committee, accompanied in some cases by members of the Districts—a thing

which was very agreeable to the Committee and which they would highly recommend as likely to have a happy influence upon the Schools.

The appearance of the Schools has uniformly been good through the year. Considering their age, the younger scholars have generally appeared to be in advance of the older ones; but not to lay to the fault of the older scholars, the Committee are disposed to regard it only a pleasing proof that the present system of school Education is operating well.

The whole number of Scholars has been in the Summer Schools from 350 to 375; in the Winter Schools from 450 to 475 or nearly that. Reckoning the Latin Grammar School, which has also been under the care of the Committee, the whole number of Scholars in the Ten Schools, has been, in the Summer about 380; in the Winter 500.

The Summer Schools kept from three to four months; the Winter Schools not so long, and one of them but two months. And here the Committee would take occation to say that in their judgment the Winter Schools, generally, ought, if possible, to be kept longer than they are Nor can they pass the circumstance without commendation, that some Districts have generously contributed to continue their schools beyond the time provided for by the public money.

The Committee have alluded to the Latin Grammar School. The Town are aware that Mr. Baldwin left the school last September. The Committee regretted his leaving but in deciding among the applicants for the school they [are] encouraged to hope from experiment thus far, that they were led to the election of a Master who will at least make good the place of Mr. Baldwin; and they cheerfully recommend to the contined patronage of the Town the present Instructor, Mr. Leonard Worcester as one calculated to answer every reasonable expectation & eventually raise the School to what it ought to be and what every citizen must wish to see it an ornament to the town. studies in the School are Reading, Writing, Grammar, Geography, and Arithmetic. A few of the younger lads are studying Latin. Some of the older scholars during the Winter attended to such particular branches as were best suited to their particular prospects in life. The School appears to be in a good state. Committee close their report by expressing their good wishes for the prosperity of the Schools and the growing conviction they have that the ultimate success of the present system of Education in our District Schools depends very much upon the vigilance, activity & thorough attention of the Town's Committee.

The road would of course be changed at the expence of the Corporation But the Selectmen find that the present road and that also which shall be made if the proposed alteration takes place will accommodate only two or three families resident in the vicinity of the hill and such others as have occational business there In this point of view the road is scarcely distinguishable from a private way which the law provides shall in all cases be made & supported by the individuals for whose benefit it ex-But considering there is already a Town Road and that very great advantages would result to those who either live or have occation to go into the neighborhood of M^r. Shepard, to have the proposed alteration take effect and under the circumstances of the case the Selectmen have thought proper that the expence & charges would be bourne partly by the Town and partly by the individuals who may expect the principal advantage from it. It is probable the whole proposed alteration will cost Three hundred Dollars. The charge of the Town in the opinion of the Selectmen ought not to exceed one half of that sum.

The Selectmen have therefore located the road as hereafter described & recommend to the Town to accept the same upon the condition that the Petitioners shall first give good security satisfactory to the Selectmen to save the Town harmless from all loss, cost or damage & expence over and above One hundred and fifty Dollars.

The Committee appointed to settle with the Town Treasurer, with the Selectmen and to report at this meeting now Report That having called on the Treasurer for that purpose, they were informed by him that he was not ready for the Settlement, not having made his settlement with the Collector.

A majority of the Committee have examined the accounts of the Selectmen, which they found regularly kept and easily to be understood. The Selectmen have credited the Town with monies receiv'd by them during the past year, amounting to the sum of \$1603,70 and have charged the town with the payment of various sums, amounting to the sum of \$1515,48 leaving a ballance in their hands of \$88,12.

The receipts include the payments made during the year on the Town-Bonds; all which payments as the Committee ascertained

by an examination of the Bonds; were duly credited. They include also the proceeds of the Town Farm—though the Committee have no means of ascertaining what those proceeds actually are or whether they are accurately accounted for, otherwise than by entries, made from time to time, by the Selectmen, of monies paid over to them by the Superintendent of the farm. They have no doubt that the monies so paid over are fully accounted for by the Selectmen. It would be desirable however that some system of accountability might be devised whereby it might be seen whether full and accurate accounts are rendered to the Selectmen of the proceeds of the Town-farm. The Committee however, have no reason to believe that there has been any failure to render such accounts during the past year. They only suggest what seems to them to be necessary to make the annual examination of the accounts of the Town, what it ought to be, a full exposition of its pecuniary affairs.

With regard to the Town-Bonds the Committee would remark that on several of them, no recent payments of Interest have been made; and that (with a trifling exception) there has been no payment of principal during the year.

A considerable part of the sum charged by the Selectmen as paid during the year; viz the sum of \$830 is for money paid to M'. Bowditch on the Notes given by the Town. For this item no voucher was produced, Mr. Bowditch having declined as the Committee were informed giving a Receipt for the money paid. The Selectmen will however procure evidence of the payment and of the endorsement of it on the Notes if necessary. It is certainly desirable that there should be vouchers for all such payments as are from the case, susceptable of such evidence. With the exception of that sum, and various small sums charged as given to transient poor persons, and to individuals among the poor of the town, as gratuitous and for holiday expences (the latter charges amounting to seven or eight dollars) the Committee find the payments charged to be well vouched.

There is also, in the hands of the Selectmen the sum of \$76,35 received by them for Licences granted for Public Exhibitions or Shows. Of this sum \$56,35 were paid over to them by the former Selectmen and \$20, have been received during the past year. This is a seperate fund for the benefit of the Poor, & no part of it has been expended during the year.

It will be understood that the accounts of the Selectmen, thus examined by the Committee, include a comparatively small portion of the expenditures of the Town. They are merely the Cash accounts of the Selectmen, having reference only to the money

which actually passes through their hands. Of course this Report can furnish no explanation as to the expenditure of the various, and large sums granted for the support of schools and for other purposes. The Committee however cannot avoid remarking that it seems highly desirable that the annual examination of the Town accounts should extend to all the expenditures of the Town. That there should be somewhere kept an account current, on which should appear, on one side, the sums granted & assessed by the Town for all purposes; and on the other, a particular specification of all the expenditures for the purposes which these sums were granted; so that every Citizen might be able, by the examination of a single document, to understand all the pecuniary transactions of the Town, & to judge as to the expediency of like appropriations and expenditures for the future.

The Committee to whom was refered the subject of incumbrances upon the Roads in said town have attended to the business of their appointment and beg leave to report. That they have refered to Records to ascertain the original width of the different roads in the town of Worcester, & have relied on the Field Book of the late surveys taken by order of the town for their present width.

Beginning on the Maine Street by Judge Paine's the road is of proper width to the house of Samuel Allen Esq. at the east end of which the road is 5 inches too narrow the fence in front of his house is 3 feet 7 inches within the road at the barrs of Nath! Maccarty Esq. on top of the hill the road is 7 links too narrow—at the end of Rejoice Newton's south barn 5 links too narrow—at a corner of land between Capt M'Farland & Capt Blair—on the North side of the road Capt Blairs corner is about 11 links within the road.

In the hollow East of Mr. John Moores house the land on both sides belonging to Capt Blair, the road varies from 5 to 14 links too narrow. The corner of Mr. Wm. Moores house is 11 links in the road—The fence East of Thomas Johnsons house varies from 10 to 20 links in the road—The wall opposite Levi Gates' house is in the road. The whole offset in the wall of the widow Peter Goulding is in the road—The woodhouse belonging to the estate of Clark Johnson is 20 links in the road and the road against the house of said estate is 8 links too narrow and continues too narrow to a corner of Benja. Mills to Holden 3 rods At Pratts house 9 & 10 links too narrow from his house to Theophilus Wheelers new house generally too narrow from 1 to 13 links From Mr. Wheelers new barn to his farm house, between his land & Judge Paines the road is from 12 to 25 links too narrow Mr. Wheelers farm and though Mr. Mills farm too narrow by from 15 to 25 links—between Sam!. Mills & Daniel Chadwick from 15 to 21 links too narrow—between I. J. Nelson & Amos Whitney from 2 to 8 links too narrow—between Whitney & the Reads from 1 to 23 links too narrow from Benja. to Sam1. T. Reads in some places too narrow by 12 links from S. T. Reads to Mr. Thaxters land 20 to 26 links too narrow—South & opposite Mr. Thaxters house 6 & 7 links too narrow thence to Elisha Smiths

from 20 to 26 links too narrow—thence to the end of Thaxters land between his & E. Smiths land from 15 to 31 links too narrow thence to Jos. Daniels house from 15 to 30 links too narrow from Mr. Daniels barn to Holden line from 6 to 30 links too narrow.

Road over Winter Hill 2 rods It is generally less than 2 rods and from the house of Gardner Johnsons to Holden line is in many places not over one rod wide in bad condition, and the passing of two teams very difficult.

Road from Holden line to Theoph. Wheelers new house by General Chamberlains—3 rods. Near Sam¹. Goulds house 10 links too narrow. Rejoice Newtons Virginia fence South of Jos. Averys house 15 links in the road. North of Thos. Nichols house at Mr. Ranks land the road 15 links too narrow—South of Nichols house between his new walls 7 links too narrow from Nichols land to the house of Wm. McFarland (Mr. McFarland owning on both sides of the road) the road is from 12 to 32 links too narrow. S. E. of Mr. McFarlands house from 10 to 26 links too narrow—between Willard Moore on one side & John Chadwick on the other generally 7 links too narrow—From Mr. Moores through Mr. Chadwicks land from 1 to 7 links too narrow—through the late Col. Childs farm some short places too narrow by from 2 to 7 links The rail fence of Theoph. Wheeler Esq. opposite to Benja. N. Childs' land from 11 to 27 links in the road.

Maine Street 6 rods. Your Committee are not able from the Survey by which they have been governed, to report so definitely on this road as they would wish. They learn however from the survey, that from the store late of the Hon. A. Lincoln deceas'd to near Mr. Lovells tavern the road is of sufficient width, from the last mentioned place to the brick hotel kept by Mr. Worthington, the Street generally diminishes in width till it is reduced to 4 rods and 3 links between the Hotel and Mr. Heywoods store—in this distance there is no place except between the Bank & Capt. Hamilton's store which is six rods wide—some of the fences & buildings obtrude more than others and some of them it would be difficult to remove but much may be done in time by the constant watchfulness of the Selectmen and highway surveyors.

Your Committee advise that the town pass a vote that the Highway Surveyors for the time being under the advice of the Selectmen, be directed to remove or cause to be removed all incumbrances from the Highways & Town-ways in the town of Worcester so soon as they can be removed without great and disproportionate expense or loss to the town or individuals.

Voted that the Report of the Committee in relation to obstructions in the Highways be put on file and be acted upon at the next town meeting. Said Report is recorded previous to this by mistake.

Voted That the following Bye Laws be made and agreed upon for the directing and ordering of the affairs of the Town therein mentioned.

- rst If any person shall drive any horse, cattle, cart or any wheel carriage of burden or pleasure, or wheel any wheel barrow, or suffer or allow any horse, cattle, cart, wheel carriage or wheel barrow to be on the foot or side walks of any of the Streets in the town of Worcester in which foot or side walks shall be made, or determined upon as hereafter mentioned, such person shall forfeit for every such offence the sum of one Dollar to the use of the owner of the adjoining land; provided that this ordinance shall not apply to any person driving or passing to or from the travelled parts of the highway directly to or from the yard or yards adjoining the foot or side walk.
- 2^d. The foot or sidewalks within the meaning of the ordinance shall be such part of the highway as is within the Curb Stones thereof in all places where the same are paved with brick or stones; and also such parts of said highway as shall be specifically determined upon as and for foot or side walks by the Selectmen, whenever such determination shall be recorded by the Town Clerk in the Book of the Town Records.
- 3^d If any person shall tie any horse cattle or team to any of the trees planted in any public highway or Street of the town for shade & ornament or to any Iron or fence put up for the protection of said Trees he shall forfeit not less than one Dollar nor more than Ten Dollats to the use of the person in front of whose estate the tree shall stand where the offence is committed.
- 4th No person shall hereafter saw any firewood or pile the same upon the side or foot walks of any of the Streets of the Town; and no person shall stand on any such foot or sidewalk with his

wood saw or horse to the hinderance or obstruction of any foot passenger—under penalty of one Dollar for each offence to the use of any person who may sue the same.

5 No person Driving any carriage or any beast or beasts harnessed thereto, or riding after any horse mare or other beast in or through any of the public Streets or highways in the Town, shall suffer the said horse gelding or other beast to go in an immoderate gait so as to endanger persons standing or passing in said street—And any person or persons offending herein shall forfeit and pay for each offence a sum not less than one Dollar nor more than five Dollars to the use of any person who shall sue for the same.

All the penalties except the two last mentioned shall be paid for & recovered in the name of the person who may be surveyor of the highway of the District within which the offence was committed at the time of the commission of the offence.

Voted that all Bye Laws passed by the Town and duly approved shall be published in all the public Newspapers printed in the Town, and one Copy shall be posted in the Town Hall.

The Committee to whom was referred the subject of the 10th article in the Warrant for this meeting Report That by an act of the Legislature, passed Feb. 15th 1816 and by a subsequent additional Act it is lawful for the Town to appoint their Treasurer, the Collector of Taxes, who will have the same powers as Collectors appointed under the Law of 1786 together with other & larger powers. The town have also a right, by the same act, to allow such rates of discount as they may determine by their vote, to all such inhabitants as shall voluntarily pay to the Treasurer the amount of their respective Taxes within 30, 60 or 120 days after the Tax bills shall have been committed to the Treasurer. In case of the appointment of the Treasurer to be the Collector, and the allowance of a discount on the payment of taxes in this manner, all taxes not paid at the expiration of the time so fixed, and all taxes on persons of doubtful Credit, even before the expiration of those times, may be collected by the Treasurer in the manner pointed out by the general law of 1786, or the Treasurer may issue his warrant against any delinquent directed to any Sheriff or Constable of the town.

The Committee have deemed it proper to give this general summary of the provisions of the Law in order that the town may more clearly understand the [] proposition submitted to them in the article under consideration.

The question now is whether the town will avail itself of these provisions of law. It has been long a subject of remark and of complaint among some of the inhabitants of the Town, that there is great and unnecessary and expensive delay in the collection of the Town taxes. Under the system heretofore practised, the Town have been every year sustaining a considerable loss of interest, on taxes uncollected. At the same time injustice has been suffered by all the inhabitants who pay their taxes promptly, in as much as the delay with which others have been indulged, operates in part, to increase the taxes of those who pay promptly beyond their legal proportion. The extent of the loss to the Town, and of the injustice to individuals, caused by this delay in the collection of the taxes, the Committee have not the means of readily ascertaining. By the annual statements of the accounts of the Treasurer, as reported to the Town it will be found however that the

1st of May 1826, the Ballance of Taxes for the years 1824 & 1825, then outstanding in the hands of the Collector, was \$4806,03-On the 7th of May 1827, the Ballance so uncollected of the Taxes for 1825 & 1826, was \$4844,97 and on the 10th of May 1828, the Ballance uncollected of the Taxes for 1826 and 1827 was \$6237, So great arrears of Taxes, running over from year to year, must obviously be the occation of considerable loss, not only in the way which the Committee have already suggested but probably also by the final loss of the taxes of some individuals who remove from town or become unable to pay. The Committee believe there is a prevalent desire to remedy this evil; and from the best opinion they can form of the plan suggested by the article referred to them, they are induced to recommend the adoption of it as the most efficient remedy. They think the experiment is well worth trial. It has been tried in many towns, and it is believed the result is satisfactory.

They therefore recommend that the Town adopt & pass the following votes.

- 1. That the Treasurer of the Town be the Collector of Taxes for the current year.
- 2. That every inhabitant of the Town who shall voluntarily pay the said Collector or either of his Deputies, the amount of his or her Taxes for the current year, within thirty days next after the delivery of the Tax Bills to said Collector, shall be entitled to an abatement of three per cent on said amount—or, within sixty days next after the delivery of said Tax Bills, shall be entitled to an abatement of two per cent on said amount—or within one hundred and twenty days after the delivery of said Tax bills, shall be entitled to an abatement of one per cent on said amount.

That the said Collector be required to complete the Collection of the Taxes committed to him for the Current year, on or before the Fifteenth day of February next; and on that day, as soon thereafter as he may be called on for the purpose, to settle and account with the Selectmen of the Town, or with such other officers or Committees as the Town may appoint, for the whole amount of said Taxes. And in case the said Collector shall refuse or neglect so to settle and account for said Taxes he shall not be entittled to receive any compensation for his services as Treasurer and Collector for the current year. All which is respectfully submitted Austin Denny

Having examined the existing bye laws of the town, your Committee are of opinion that the following ought to be adopted in addition thereto; and be numbered immediately after those in the present code: viz.

- 6. If any person shall smoke a cigar or pipe in any of the Streets in School District No. 1 in said town he shall forfeit, for every such offence, the sum of one dollar to the use of any person who may sue for the same.
- 7. If any person shall play, at any kind of ball, drive whoops or fire crackers in any of the streets of said town he shall forfeit, for each offence, one dollar to the use of any person who shall sue for the same.
- 8th. If any person shall expose himself in swimming or bathing within one hour before sun rise or one hour after sundown, in any part of the Blackstone Canal within the limits of said town, or in any of the ponds, streams, or waters within said limits, in view of a dwelling house or a Street or highway, he shall forfeit, for every such offence a sum, not less than two dollars, nor more than ten dollars, according to the aggravation of the offence, to the use of any person who may sue for the same—The three penalties last mentioned, shall be received in the manner provided for in the fifth rule above stated. All which is respectfully submitted,

Your Committee having taken into consideration the number, variety and importance of the subjects which are generally presented to the town to be acted upon at its meetings, and the necessity that each voter should not only have had notice of each subject presented, but that he should have thought upon the same and decided in his own mind upon the course most expedient to be taken upon it, in order that hasty and inconsiderate measures

may not be adopted.

Your Committee have consulted a number of the publishers of the News-papers, in this town who have agreed to give the warrant an insertion as aforesaid for the sum aforesaid.

That they have examined and settled the accounts of the Treasurer and find them properly stated and well vouched, and by which there appears to be in the hands of John Gleason Jr. former Collector for several years Taxes uncollected to the amount of \$5437,87 and in the hands of William Chamberlain Collector

for the last year Taxes to the amount of \$2603,14 and in the Treasury the further sum of \$178,56 as by the Treasurer's account hereunto annexed.

We have examined and settled the accounts of the Selectmen which are properly stated and well vouched, and by which there appears to be a ballance of money in their hands amounting to \$278,28 and a further sum of \$100,35 which they have receiv'd as Overseers of the Poor for licenses for various exhibitions in town, and which they are obliged by law to appropriate for the comforts and conveniences of the poor.

We have attempted to settle the accounts of Gen. Nathan Heard, the Prudential Committee of School District No. 1, but owing to the manner in which the monies of the town appropriated to this District and the monies raised by the District have been blended by the Collector and Treasurer it has not been in the power of the Prudential Committee of the District to render and account distinguishing the monies received from the one source and the other, and it appears to your Committee, that a change ought to take place in the manner of keeping these accounts, and that an investigation ought to be made into the Treasurers accounts in this respect, and they advise to the appointment of a Committee for that purpose and also to examine and seperate those accounts for former years.

We have settled the accounts of Amos Howard Prudential Committee of District No. 2 and find that he has receiv'd of the town \$127,59—of his predecessor in office \$20,31 and has properly expended \$116,55 leaving in his hands the sum of \$31,35.

The accounts of Nahum Willington Committee of District No. 9 show that he has receiv'd of his predecessor in office \$2,79 of the town \$123,03 and of the District \$0,44 and has properly expended the whole.

The accounts of Isaac Mills Committee of District No. 10 show that he has receiv'd of the Town \$77,44 and has properly expended the whole.

The accounts of Gen. Thos. Chamberlain of District No. 11 show that he received of the town \$73,89 and has properly expended \$43.50 leaving \$30,39 which he has paid over to his successor in office.

The accounts of Ebenezer Reed of District No. 7 show that he received from the town \$92,03 and that he has properly expended the whole.

The other Prudential Committees your Committee have not been able to meet and they have not been informed of any other officers intrusted with the towns money with whom it was their duty to settle according to the vote appointing them.

The Committee appointed by the Town to settle with the Selectmen and Town Treasurer for the year last past, have attended to those duties, and submit the following Report.

Upon inspecting the Books of the Selectmen it appears that they have charged themselves with Sundry Sums of Money received by them during their term of office for rents of town property, amount of several town bonds, interest on other bonds &c. amounting in the whole to Two Thousand, Seven hundred Sixty seven Dollars & Forty nine cents and this Sum your Committee have reason to believe, is all the money which has come to their hands, as for which they are justly chargable They have charged the town with Sundry Sums of money paid out by them or upon their order during the same period, Amounting in the whole to Two Thousand Seven hundred, and Seventy two Dollars and eighty cents, being a ballance due to them of five dollars and thirty one cents. They also charge themselves with the sum of \$93.35 [] in office and have charged as payments made therefrom \$11,56 leaving a ballance of \$81,79 which has been paid over to their Successors. These monies were received for licences, granted

pursuant to the Statute of March 4th 1826, and the same sum of \$11.56 disbursed therefrom was in conformity to the same provisions of Statute. Your Committee have carefully examined the statement submitted to them by said Selectmen of the Condition of the town bonds and are of the opinion that this subject requires the immediate attention of the existing board of Selectmen, or of some agents to be appointed by the town for that purpose. Some of those bonds are probably desperate. Whether any former officers of the town are in fault for not having collected while the obligees were able to pay them, Your Committee have not the means of determining. Some of these bonds have [on] them at this time, but one responsible name, and your Committee are of opinion, that it is not never prudent for the town to suffer their debts to depend on the strength of any single name. Such bonds ought either to be collected without delay, or satisfactory additional security required. On a large proportion of those bonds more than one years interest is in arrear which ought never to be suffered. It is but justice to the late board however to state, that these securities are exhibited to your Committee in precisely the same condition as to their validity in which they were passed to them from their predecessors.

All the entries on the books of the late board were made with great regularity, neatness and accuracy and were supported by satisfactory vouchers, and furnish convincing evidence of the fidelity and exactness with which the complicated and arduous duties of that office has been discharged during the last year.

In settling the account of the Town Treasurer, Your Committee found, that he had charged himself with monies received by him during the past year as follows Viz. Amount of Taxes unaccounted for in the hands of John Gleason Jr., former Collector of taxes of said town of Worcester \$3,561,75 Do. in the hands of William Chamberlain former Collector of said town \$1,264,11 Ballance of former Treasurer's Acct. \$98,67 Amount of taxes, embracing the State, County & town tax for 1830 \$8,692,81 Tax of the Centre School District \$1,373,12 Sundry other sums received from the Selectmen on town Bonds, from the Treasurer of the Commonwealth for Support of State paupers &c &c Amounting in all to the sum of \$16,614,66. He also charges the town with sundry sums paid out by him, pursuant to orders of the Selectmen with \$150 allowed for his services by vote of the town, with the amount of abatements, authorized by vote of the town, payment of taxes &c &c Amounting in all to the sum of \$15,929, 55 leaving a ballance in his hands to be carried to a new account of \$685,11 all these entries were made with accuracy and properly sustained by vouchers.

Your Committee were also charged with settling the several accounts of the prudential Committees of the school districts—but in as much as the Gentlemen composing those Committees, live in different sections of the town sufficient opportunity has not been afforded your committee to complete this part of their duty, and for this purpose ask leave to sit again.

Report That they have looked into the devise as set forth in the will of the testator and find that he gives all his lands on Thomas Street (which your Committee understand consists of two lots the East end thereof) on condition that the town shall within three years from the death of the testator [erect] a Charity House thereon in the manner in said will specified and pay annually to the Overseers of the poor the sum of twenty Dollars to be expended in a thanksgiving dinner for the poor. If the town should Erect such a house within the time aforesaid on the land in question Your Committee are of opinion they will hold all the lots on said street.

The testator however seems to have anticipated that the town might decline the devise on the condition annexed to it, and has made provision in that event, that they may have the lot on the north side of the street on condition that they Erect thereon "a large and handsome brick School house or academy." The town therefore have their option to take all the land by building a Charity House, by which expression your Committee understand the testator to mean a poor house, within three years from his death or to take the north lot by erecting thereon when they shall deem it expedient a School House.

The town has at a great expense provided a poor house which is favorably situated and affords all the accommodations which seem at present to be necessary, your Committee can therefore see no occation for incurring the heavy charge of Erecting such a building as the will requires for the accommodation of paupers.

They have however been informed that the Centre School District is in need of an additional school house and believing that said north lot is a good scite for such a building they see no reason the town should not accept that lot and comply with the terms of the will when they find it convenient so to do.

The Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolutions.

Resolved That the town duly appreciate the benevolent intentions of the testator towards the poor, but under Existing circumstances deem it inexpedient to accept the bequest given on condition that a Charity House be Erected on the land.

Resolved That it is expedient to accept, and the town does hereby accept the bequest Given on condition that a school house be Erected on the land. All which is respectfully submitted.

That on inquiry they find the number of colored scholars who attend the public schools to be about twenty and the probability that the number will not be diminished. That from inconveniences growing out of placing them in the line of the usual promotion of scholars from the lower to the higher schools calculated for a more advanced state of education, in consequence of which they have been kept in the primary schools. Should a house be erected in some convenient place, specially appropriated to their use an instructor for the school would probably be employed who might carry them all forward as is usual in common district schools according to their respective advancements without interfering with any important general arrangements.

Under these circumstances your Committee advise to the Erection of a School house by the town to be specially appropriated to the use of the colored people.

Green, Esq. and commonly known by the name of the Crawford Place—thence running South South Westerly to the West side of Bladder Pond so called—thence in nearly the same direction to where the small Brook running out of Pine Meadow so called crosses the old road leading from Washington Square towards the Worcester Turnpike—Thence Southerly to a Point on the West side of the road leading from the Centre of the Town by Capt. Lewis Bigelow's House occupied by himself which shall be ten rods South of said House—thence West North-Westerly to the point where the North side of the road leading from Mr. Joseph Patchs house enters the great Leicester Road—thence Northerly & Westerly to a Point where the land of Levi Lincoln joins the land of Rejoice Newton on the road leading to Tatnic so called thence Northerly to a Point ten rods West of a dwelling House on Levi Lincoln's Farm known by the name of the Osline Place Thence Northerly & Easterly to a Point ten rods North West of the House now occupied by Mr. Elnathan Pratt Thence Easterly to the Point of starting.

This District to be called Number One.

District No. 2. Beginning at a Point on the North side of Tatnic road so called where Farms of Levi Lincoln and Rejoice

Newton join Thence in a West South Westerly direction to where Beaver Brook so called crosses the Road leading to Joseph Patchs Thence West North Westerly to where the road leading by Ezekiel Fowlers enters the Town of Leicester—Thence bounded by Leicester line to Paxton line, Thence East North Easterly bounded by Paxton and Holden line to Tatnic Brook so called. Thence South Easterly to a Point ten rods South West of House occupied by John Flagg 2d.—thence South Easterly to a Point ten rods North East of House owned by Samuel Gates 2d thence South Easterly in the same direction until it intersects Boundary line of District Number One—thence bounded by District Number One to the Point of starting on the Tatnic road.

This District to be called Number Two.

District No. 3. Beginning at the Point where the North side of the Joseph Patchs road so called meets the great Leicester Road thence Northerly bounded by District Number one to boundary of District Number two till it reaches the Boundary of Leicester—thence bounded by and following the line between Worcester and the Towns of Leicester and Ward till it comes to Kettle Brook so called—Thence Northerly and Easterly till it comes to a Point ten rods East of the Factory owned & occupied by John & Thomas Sutton on Blackstone River—thence North North Easterly to a Point ten rods East of the House formerly owned and occupied by Capt. Ebenezer Wiswall. Thence Northerly to the Point of starting.

This District to be called Number Three.

District No. 4. Beginning at a Point where Kettle Brook so called enters the Town of Worcester from the Town of Ward-Thence bounded by District Number Three until it comes to where the North side of the Joseph Patchs Road so called enters the great Leicester Road—thence East South Easterly bounded by District Number One till it reaches a Point on the West side of the road leading Southerly by the House occupied by Lewis Bigelow at a distance of ten rods south of said House—thence South Westerly to the Centre of the Bridge over the Blackstone Canal near the House occupied by Israel Whitney-Thence Southerly and Westerly to the boundary line between Worcester and Ward to a Point where the West side of the Road leading by William Goss House crosses the Ward line—thence to the Point of starting. And this District is meant to include all the Houses and lands which for all political purposes belong to the Town of Worcester notwithstanding they are situated within the Geographical limits of the Town of Ward.

This District to be called Number Four.

District No. 5. Beginning at a Point where the West side of the road leading by William Goss' crosses the line between Worcester and Ward—Thence Northerly and Easterly bounded by District Number Four till it reaches the Point before mentioned ten rods South of House occupied by Lewis Bigelow—Thence East South Easterly to a Point ten rods East of the House owned by Capt. Lewis Bigelow and commonly known by the name of the Harrington Place—thence South South Easterly to the boundary line between the Towns of Millbury and Worcester at a point ten rods West of the last House on the road leading to Millbury by John & Abel Flaggs—thence bounded by the line between Worcester and the Towns of Millbury and Ward to the Point of Starting.

This District to be called Number Five.

District No. 6. Beginning at a Point before named ten rods South of the House occupied by Lewis Bigelow—thence bounded by District Number One to where the small Brook running out of Pine Meadow so called crosses the old road leading from Washington Square towards the Worcester Turnpike—thence South South Easterly to a Point ten rods South West of House owned and occupied by Aaron Flagg—thence East South Easterly till it strikes the South side of the First Island in Long Pond South of the Floating Bridge thence Southerly bounded by Long Pond till it comes to District Number Five and Grafton Line and Westerly by Millbury Line till it comes to Boundary of District Number Five—thence Northerly & Westerly bounded by District Number Five to the Point of Starting.

This District to be called Number Six.

District No. 7. Beginning at the North East Corner of District Number Six on Long Pond—thence Westerly by Boundary of Number Six till it comes to the Point where the small Brook flowing out of Pine Meadow so called crosses the old road leading towards the Worcester Turnpike—Thence bounded by District Number One till it comes to a Point ten rods North East of a House situated on a Farm now or lately owned by William E. Green and known by the name of the Crawford Place—thence Easterly & Northerly to Shrewsbury line at the Head of Long Pond—thence Southerly bounded by Long Pond at the Point of starting.

This District to be called Number Seven.

District No. 8. Beginning at the head of Long Pond at the Shrewsbury line—Thence Westerly bounded by Districts Number Seven and Number One till it reaches a Point ten rods North

West of the House now in the occupation of Elnathan Pratt—thence North Easterly to a Point ten Rods East of a small House owned by William Paine and occupied by Sylvanus Morse—thence to the Point on the North side of the Road leading to William Paines Mill where land of said Paine & Lewis Barnard join—thence to a Point ten rods South of House of Widow Knights on the Lancaster Road—Thence Easterly to the Point where the Shrewsbury & West Boylston lines meet on the boundary line between those Towns and Worcester—thence by the Boundary line of Worcester to the Point of Starting.

This District to be called Number Eight.

District No. 9. Beginning at the Point on the Boundary Line of Worcester where the Shaewsbury and West Boylston lines meet—thence bounded Southerly by District Number Eight till it comes to a Point ten rods South of the House occupied by the Widow Knights on the Lancaster road; thence North North Westerly to a Point ten rods East of the House occupied by John Mann—thence in the same direction as the last mentioned line till it strikes the Boundary line between the Towns of Worcester and Holden—thence Easterly on the Holden and Southerly on the West Boylston line to the place of starting.

This District to be called Number Nine.

District No. 12 being a new District. Beginning at a Point on the road leading to Lancaster ten rods South of House occupied by the Widow Knights—thence bounded on the South by District Number Eight till it comes to a Point ten rods North West of the House occupied by Elnathan Pratt thence Northerly and Easterly to where the East side of the road leading by Ephraim Drury's House strikes the Boundary line between the Towns of Worcester and Holden—thence Easterly on said line to the Boundary of District Number Nine thence bounded by said District Number nine to the Point of Commencement.

This District to be called Number Twelve.

District No. 10. Beginning at a Point ten Rods North West of House occupied by Elnathan Pratt—thence Northerly and Easterly by District Number Twelve to Holden line—thence West South Westerly on the Boundary line between the towns of Worcester and Holden untill it reaches the Point where Beaver Brook so called enters the Town of Worcester from Holden—thence in a straight line to the Point of Starting.

This District to be called Number Ten.

District No. 11. Beginning at a Point where Beaver Brook so called crosses the Boundary line between the Towns of Worcester

and Holden—thence West South Westerly on the Boundary line between Worcester and Holden till it comes to Tatnic Brook so called—thence South Easterly bounded by District Number Two until it meets the Boundary of District Number One thence North North Easterly bounded by District Number One to a Point ten rods North West of Elnathan Pratts House—thence North Westerly to the Point of Commencement bounded by District Number Ten.

This District to be called Number Eleven.

The foregoing are the territorial limits of all the School Districts in Worcester as now offered to the consideration of the Town by their Selectmen And the Selectmen respectfully recommend their adoption and ratification by the Town under the following limitations and restrictions viz. First That whenever a School House shall be erected and appropriated to the use of the Coloured population within the territorial limits of District Number One any coloured Children residing in District Number Seven within one mile of said School House shall be held to belong to District Number One to all legal intents and purposes and be enumerated among the minors of District Number One accordingly.

Secondly—That the several minors now included in the Territorial limits of the new District Number Twelve shall have all the rights and priviledges of attending School in the several Districts to which they have hitherto belonged until a School House is erected for their accommodation within the said new District Number Twelve, But that said new District may at once enter into all rights inherent by law to such Corporations whenever the Town by their vote shall fix the territorial said District Number Twelve.

The Families comprising the proposed District Number Twelve contain Fifty one minors as shown by the returns of the present year and are all taken from Districts Numbers Eight & Nine from No. 8 the following Families have been taken viz. Wm. & Silas Barber, Joel Gleason, John Forbes, Jonathan Gleason 2d, Daniel Chadwick, Amos R. Black, Sylvanus Morse and Samuel Stowell.

From District No. 9 the following Families have been taken viz. Silas Brooks, Eli Fairbanks, James Barber, Jonathan Gleason, John Mann and Widow B. Smith leaving the number of Minors in No. 8 One Hundred and one and in No. 9 Eighty-one.

The above report was read and accepted by the town.

The Committee appointed at the Town Meeting of which this [is] an adjournment, to consider & report upon the subject of erecting a School House on the lot devised to the Town by Mr. Thomas, the probable expense of said House and a plan for the same.

Report—That they have been upon the lot devised to the Town by the late Isaiah Thomas Esquire and find by an admeasurement not precisely accurate, but sufficiently so for present purposes that the lot is bounded one hundred and seventy two and a half feet on Thomas Street, one hundred and sixty nine feet on Summer Street, one hundred and twenty four and a half feet on Mr. B. F. Smiths and Dr. Paine's land, and one hundred and sixty five and a half feet on Mr. Parley Goddard's land.

In determining what description of Building the Town ought to put upon the lot the Committee thought it [best] to consider the terms of the Will of Mr. Thomas—the present and the probable future wants of the District. The terms of the Will are "I give and devise to said Town the lot lying on the North side of Thomas Street, and making the Corner of said Street and Back Street to erect thereon a large & handsome Brick School House or academy within two years after my decease, [then I give and devise said lots to my Grand Children." Thus it appears the Town are in a measure controlled, as to what they must do, by the very language of the Instrument which gives them a title to the lot. The building must be erected within two years from the decease of Mr. Thomas it must be of brick large and handsome. Considering the present necessities of the District the Committee the number of minors as taken this year to be One Thousand and fifty eight, being more than half of all the Minors in the Town and it appears by the last annual report of the Board of Overseers of the District that the average number of Scholars attending the schools in the District, including the Grammar School was Four hundred and twenty seven. There are constantly keeping within the District Eight schools besides the Grammar School, and one for apprentices kept three months in each year-making in all ten schools requiring ten different rooms. To accommodate these schools there are Four rooms in the Centre school-house which was purchased, paid for repaired and furnished by the District without aid from the Town. Two school houses are on the Common and one near Gen. Heards house each sufficient for one school, which were built at the expense of the Town and there are three rooms hired by the District, constantly, at a rent of twenty five dollars, each, per annum, and one for three months

at a rent of ten dollars for that time. One of these rents will be taken off by the erection of a School House for coloured Children, but there will still be left a present necessity for three school rooms for which there is now paid annually rent of sixty dollars, and our Streets are so fast filling with a prolific as well as a busy population, that it cannot be long before a fourth room will be necessary to accommodate the increasing numbers. It appears from this statement that the Town have furnished but two School Houses for more than one half the minors in the town while to accommodate the remainder they have built ten school houses and have voted money to build or aid in building three more and, at the same time about three fourths of all the taxes are paid by the Centre District. The Committee thought the Building to be erected should be sufficient to accommodate Four Schools of Fifty pupils each. They therefore recommend that the Town occupy ninety seven feet of the front of the lot on Thomas Street, beginning at Mr. Goddards land and running towards Summer Street. This will leave a spacious lot on the corner of Thomas & Summer Streets which can be hereafter used as may be thought best either for the Town's purposes or by leasing for a term of years or a ground rent. The lot ninety seven feet in front and running back to Mr. Smiths will be large enough for a School House and play ground. The Committee recommend that a Building be erected thereon two stories high sixty seven feet long by thirty feet wide leaving a passage way of Fifteen feet at each end of it, so that, if thought best each two schools may be entirely separated from the the other two. They propose to have the Entrance in the Centre of the building, by two entries seven feet wide running through the House and divided from each other by a brick partition. The rooms will then be left at each end, twenty eight by twenty five They recommend that each story be at least ten feet in the By a cast furnished the Committee by Capt. Lewis Bigelow, they estimate the expense of such a building with a Cupola for a Bell, and fitted for the reception of Desks and appurtenances at twenty two hundred and seventy five dollars.

They were not prepared to say what is the best form of desks and benches and have made no estimate of the cost of them. They endeavored only to determine what would be the most desirable form & size and position of the building and its probable cost prepared for fitting up for the schools, thinking all the details better left with a building Committee who could give more time and consideration to the subject than it has been in the power of this Committee to bestow. They recommend, therefore that the Town choose a Building Committee & authorize them

to exercise their discretion in all the details of the building under such restrictions as to the amount to be expended, as the Town may judge best. As those who come after us will share in the benefits of the building, as well as the present generation, it seems but right they should share, also, in the expense of its erection. The Committee therefore recommend that the funds to defray the expense of the building be raised, by borrowing on the Credit of the Town whatever may be granted by them and that the loan be repaid by ten equal annual instalments. The Committee have much satisfaction in saying that in all the recommendations of this report they were entirely unanimous.

Voted that the Building Committee be and are authorized to Borrow Twenty five hundred dollars in behalf of the Town to be paid in ten equal annual instalments from the time the money shall be borrowed for the purpose of building the School House on Thomas Street, as recommended by the Committee chosen for that purpose.

The Committee to whom was referred the subject relating to a School House for the Coloured population Submit the following Report.

Your Committee have examined several different sites for a school house and are unanimously of the opinion that the most eligable place for it would be a tract of land of Simeon Hastings at the junction of the pine meadow & the old road if Mr. H. will sell the lot at a reasonable price—your Committee have not been able to get his terms—they have however ascertained that other lots near that place can be had for a reasonable consideration and would recommend that it be located at or near the junction of said Roads.

Your Committee would recommend that a Building 25 feet by 20 be erected—as one of that size will in their opinion be amply sufficient for the Children of the Coloured population in the Centre District. The expense of the land erecting and finishing a Building of the above Dementions will probably not vary far from Three hundred and twenty five dollars. Your Committee recommend that the manner of finishing the Building be left to the Building Committee. All which is respectfully submitted,

Voted that \$250, be divided among the outer School Districts.

Voted that the remainder of the school money be equally divided among the several School Districts according to the num-

ber of Minors in each district.

As the sense of this meeting it was voted that the Selectmen be directed to Collect the Town-Bonds as soon as may be expedient.

Voted to raise Twenty five Hundred Dollars for repairing the Public Roads and bridges in town the current year.

Voted that the Highway Tax be paid in labor and that the Assessors be authorised to fix the price of Labor of men Oxen &c and to direct what sum each Surveyor shall have to break the Roads in the winter.

The following report was read and accepted.

"The Committee elected by the Town at the [March] Meeting AD. 1832 to make the estimates of the necessary expenditures for the Current year submit the following Report—Your Committee attempted to ascertain the ballance if any in the Treasury They soon ascertained that this was impracticable as the administrator of Capt. Asa Hamilton's Estate was absent from town and no settlement had been effected with him. Whether there is a ballance money in the Treasury your [Committee] know not and it was not any portion of your Committees business to make the settlement with the Treasury. This report is therefore made upon the assumption that the accounts with the Treasury are exactly balanced.

A report of the Committee in relation to the above was read and accepted and [is] on file.

9 Art. The Committee to whom were refered the accounts of Messrs. Uriel Johnson and Benja. Butman for labor performed on the highway have had the same under consideration and ask leave to report. The account presented by Capt. Johnson is for the sum of \$28.50 from information obtained from him it appears, that the whole amount was for work charged as having been performed in January 1831 in breaking out the road leading by Mr. Joseph Patchs house, that it was done without his direction as one of the Surveyors of highways and for which he does not consider himself accountable Under these circumstances your Committee cannot recommend the payment of this account; they believe that the town are not prepared to countenance such an assumption of power by individuals, which they have delegated to their Surveyors and thereby render the town liable without their consent, for any expense which unauthorized persons may think proper to incur or to establish a precedent which may be urged in favor of the allowance of charges for similar services performed in former years, under circumstances which would entitle them to as favorable consideration as in the present instance and to an amount of no trifling importance.

The account of Mr. Butman is for the sum of \$56,24 as having been expended by him in addition to the sum granted him as Surveyor in the Tax bill committed to him Mr. Butman being absent from town the Committee have not had the benefit of an explanation from him & know not what reasons he may assign for thus exceeding his authority or of any circumstances which would

render proper this explanation. The town by a vote required of the assessors of the last year, to direct the several Surveyors in the warrants which should be committed to them, to retain such a proportion of their Highway-tax as the Assessors in their discretion should think proper, to be expended if necessary during that time, then to be worked out in the spring previous to the first day of May. In discharge of this duty the Assessors directed Mr. Butman to retain in his hands the sum of fifty Dollars but it appears from inspection of his account that these directions were wholly disregarded, all the charges are but about the sum of ten Dollars bearing date previous to the commencement of the winter months but whether any of the work has been done since that time is not within the knowledge of the Committee. The apology for such proceeding has not been communicated to them but they are of opinion that when a Surveyor chooses to set at defiance an express direction given by the authority of the town he is not entitled to compensation for any pecuniary losses occationed by such To allow this account would operate as an inducement to others to violate their duty and might render the treasury liable for charges to an unlimited amount. Establish this practice as correct & instead of the town's voting the sum that they may deem proper to expend for the support of the highways, it will become necessary to enquire of the several Surveyors what sum it is their pleasure to expend each in his own district & they will be relieved of all responsibility for their conduct. The Committee are unanimous in the opinion that the application of Messrs. Johnson & Butman for payment of the accounts presented by them should each of them be rejected. 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
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
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
