





O LONGER does the sign "Gents' Furnishing Goods" rest in smug self-complacency over the entrance of the better shops that sell neck-

TERMS

TE SEND goods on approval.

To send goods on approval means: Goods are shipped C. O. D., with privilege of exam-

ination at the express office; or upon paying charges in full they may be taken home, and if returned to the express office within twenty-four hours, the money will be refunded. In case of a disobliging expressman or in case the goods are kept longer than twentyfour hours, they may be returned directly to us, and on their receipt we will send our check for price of goods and expressage both ways.

You see this means that you can experiment with us, and it need cost you nothing. No matter how far away you live-1000 miles or more-or how close at hand you may be, it is all

the same.

All purchases are delivered free within 100 miles of New York City.

Mail orders to the amount of \$20 or over, if fully paid in advance, are delivered free to any point in the United States.

Responsible persons, by giving city references, may remit after receipt of goods, but may not have goods delivered free farther than 100 miles from New York City.

In all other cases we send by ex-

press, with bill for collection.

Beyond the 100-mile limit, we do not pay expressage, but pay for return of money on C. O. D. packages.

Parcels weighing four pounds or less may be mailed for one cent an ounce, and registered for eight cents additional. The post-office refuses parcels of more than four pounds.

We send instructions how to take measurements, and all the information you want or that it is in our power

to send.
