FEVER OF A DIFFERENT COLOR

"I'm a TarHeel born. I'm a Tarheel bred. And when I die I'll be Tarheel dead.. GO TO HELL STATE "

These words spew from Kenan Stadium like an immense cheer from a granite megaphone. The stadium is as crowded as a hospital during an epidemic. The sounds evoke the chaos of beds filled with delirious patients.

Yet, like the lazarettos of old, Kenan Stadium houses only patients suffering from a unique fever. This strange fever remains indigenous to a small area simply known as the "Southern Part of Heaven;" yet, the number of those infected has grown to epidemic proportions. The illness neither discriminates on the basis of race, creed, sex, religion or age. It uniformly contaminates all who dare expose themselves to it.

This feverish plague remains unnoticed — all but anonymous to society. The anonymity may be attributed to its symptomatic similarities with the common fever: bodily temperature increases, sharp rise in heart rate, delirium and chills. A sudden charge in body temperature represents the fever's initial stage. Fans have reported that as they file into Kenan Stadium, often, they will begin to experience heat flashes and a marked increase in body perspiration. Closer observations have revealed that sufferers also undergo a subtle facial discoloration or flushed look.

"When you enter the stadium you can feel the excitement," William Bryant said, "you can feel the blood rising toward your head, and adrenaline makes your body feel like it's on fire."

The victims exhibit a strange urge to gather each fall weekend

in Kenan Stadium. This produces one of the pyrexia's most bizarre spectacles. "... this whole raft of people a'setting on these two banks," Andy Griffith said, "and a'looking at one another across this pretty little green cow pasture."

As the Carolina fans mass together their concentrated ardor erupts into a mob of nervous excitement. Nervous agitation will impassion the illness causing the victim to lapse into condition two: a sharp increase in heart rate. The heart's rapid pumping often causes sufferers to describe feelings of warmth, exhilaration and delirium. "The game's excitement causes you to start clapping faster and faster," Angela Fowler said, "until you're so thrilled that your heart seems like it's going to burst."

A quickened heart rate intensifies the individual's fiery condition, thus weakening the patient for the fever's fiercest assault. This may appear to others as an uncontrollable fit of insanity or delirium. The delirium may cause its victims to either scream wildly, bounce up and down aimlessly, wave shredded strands of paper tied to a stick, slap people located about them, or shout blood-curdling obscenities. However, many victims perform all of these febrific actions. "My mind just starts to swirl when the team comes onto the field," Debbie Proctor said, "I feel insane...but its a fun kind of craziness you hope doesn't end."

"There are some maladies," an anonymous author wrote, "we must not seek to cure."

Like most pyrexias, this rare southern affliction will begin to abate after several hours. The fever's decline produces a feeling



of ague in its sufferers. These fits of shivering, chills, and cold sweat embody the illnesses only drawback — an end to the excitement. The fever's excitement is a fiery burst of hope, joy and a rekindling of each victim's youthful flames. However, only those lucky few whose hearts bleed Carolina blue can boast of having

Students left powerless in Alumni Center battle

What did happen to the "Stop the Alumni Center Campaign?" The campaign against the construction of the George Watts Hill Alumni Center exploded one day last fall when students discovered a white and blue sign proclaiming the new construction site. As students living in the area scrambled to react to the sudden threat, an effort to discover what had happened was begun. We wanted to know why the center was going to be built on Stadium Drive. Weren't those woods protected from development?

After we talked with the executive director of the General Alumni Association, Chancellor Christopher Fordham, two vice chancellors, the director of the Institute of Government, the director of the Physical Plant, the chairman of the Board of Trustees and four prominent student leaders who approved the project, the following picture came into view:

The GAA has for some time needed a new building the alumni could call home; current facilities simply are inadequate. In an effort to meet that need, the GAA presented its case to the administration, which then channeled the proposal through several committees, finally arriving at a basic plan. The proposal called for the construction of a new alumni center on Kenan Hill, site of the Kenan Center and adjacent to the Smith Center. A major fund-raising campaign was promptly begun, and the architects went to work.

Shortly after the completion of the architectural plans, problems surfaced. First, it was decided that there wasn't enough room on Kenan Hill, due to a lack of parking space. Also, a behind-the-scenes political battle was being fought over who was "king of the hill." As a result, the Alumni Center was not built on Kenan Hill.

This left in limbo the plans for a multi-million dollar facility with a completed design and over \$5 million in contributions toward its construction. With the GAA under great pressure to complete the building by the beginning of the University's bicentennial, it pressed the University for a workable site. The pressure worked; the University acknowledged the problem and promised the GAA a suitable location for the building. Several different locations were proposed, but none were suitable to the GAA.

The University was up against the wall. A quick decision had to be made so that the Alumni Center would be completed before the bicentennial. Fordham finally offered the Big Woods site on Stadium Drive. This site was subsequently approved by all the necessary committees, among which four prominent student leaders were included. A few questions were asked, but broad, open discussion was never initiated. Lack of time forced a decision.

Upon review, the GAA accepted the Big Woods site. The location seemed perfect — close to the heart of campus, beside Kenan Stadium, accessed by roads on two sides and plenty of parking to choose from. It seemed an ideal setting for alumni to come home to.

Student leaders representing affected students (which really includes all students, present and future) didn't agree. We felt that the alternative sites were more appropriate. It was our intention to go before the BOT with an alternative proposal. We found, however, that political influences and economic considerations were immense. Because the University promised the GAA a suitable location, the alumni were in the driver's seat.

There was always the question of the sanctity of the land. It was thought that the Big Woods was a protected area. In the proposed long-range land-use plan, the land was designated green, or non-developable, but that was only a proposed plan. Preservation of the Big Woods would have required a move by the BOT to permanently set aside the site — a move that was never made. We were informed by the chancellor that if the Alumni Center wasn't built on that land now, some other building would be within five years. And, admittedly, the center would probably be less obtrusive than most other buildings that could be put on the site. Still, it was a very bitter pill to swallow.

As representatives of Scott College, we were concerned about the impact of construction on our area, as well as the loss of parking spaces. We met with the BOT and voiced our concerns. The members said they appreciated our interests. They invited us to come back if we had any further concerns. They told us to have a nice day. In this manner, student voices were heard.

Those of us who have been most concerned and involved feel somewhat shortchanged — shortchanged by our own administration, our BOT and our Student Government. At no point were the opinions of affected students elicited. Sadly, our administration allowed itself to be put in a position where student interests were subordinated. Student leaders made no effort to represent the student body, much less generate campuswide discussion of the plan. And frankly, there was pitifully little interest, assistance or representation from Suite C.

So the George Watts Hill Alumni Center will go up in the Big Woods. The all-too-familiar influences of big-money, power politics and paternalism over plurality have won again, at the cost of this campus and the interests of students, for whom this University is supposed to exist. We wonder whether a proposal to erect, for instance, a Student Union annex on the site would have ever seen the light of day; we somehow doubt it. In light of the recent controversies over the Rams Club's proposed use of the tennis courts behind Hinton James Residence Hall as a parking lot, housing's roughshod run over the Residence Hall Association and the quiet proposal and quick approval of the Alumni Center plans, one begins to wonder with which group priority on this campus lies.

The leaders of Scott College will continue to look after the concerns of its residents. We hope that we may allowed some input in the integration of the Alumni Center into our area. We will work energetically with the GAA toward the minimization of inconvenience to residents who frequent the Big Woods.

Having exhausted our resources and our avenues of rational protest, it is with considerable regret that we acquiesce. We are convinced that the loss of the aesthetic and emotional value of the Big Woods will be to the detriment of all students. We gave it the old college try, but this time the college wasn't on our side.

Alumni Center to help students in long run

To the editor:

As a member of the Student Alumni Association (SAA), I would like to address the issue of the new Alumni Center site. The Order of the Bell Tower, UNC's chapter of the SAA, functions as a link between the General Alumni Association and the students. We are here to stimulate interest and awareness in UNC's future as students.

The alumni are in the process of building a much-needed center to be used for activities such as homecoming, commencement, reunions, sports and other events. I want to stress that each of you is a future user of this center. It is not to be used only by million-dollar donors; it is for everyone. This will be your home base when you return to UNC.

The Stadium Drive site of the center was offered to the alumni by Chancellor Christopher Fordham and followed the normal approval process by the Faculty

Committee on Buildings and Grounds, the Real Property Committee of the Board of Trustees, the Alumni Steering Committee, the Executive Committee of the alumni association and its officers and directors. This was not done without student participation; student representatives (the student body president, the senior class president, the DTH editor and the SAA President) sit on the association's board, and the student body president sits on the Board of Trustees. Notice was given to students in a front-page DTH article when the decision was made final. The site was chosen due to its excellent central location, which will provide access by foot to any campus event or facility.

Concerns have been raised by students on the issues of parking and the trees now on the site. The architect's plans are not yet in, so it is impossible to address the specifics of lot assignments at this time. It is also important to note that the parking on this campus belongs to the University,

and therefore the University, not the alumni, will decide how it will be distributed.

Another asset of this site is the natural beauty of the land. Every effort is being made by the architect to nestle the building into the site; the alumni are every bit as concerned with preserving the woods and the walkways as the students. The plans for the site will enhance its beauty and will prevent anything inappropriate from being built there.

As with any issue on campus, it is to be expected that student opinion will be divided. This letter has brought forth several considerations in the hope that you, as a student and as a future alumnus, will be able to take an educated stand.

LOST ABROAD IN CHAPEL HILL

International Students at UNC

A small Southern town with an international flare is how some people in the Chapel Hill community like to describe their home here. Yet, the international glow is no accident. In the fall of 1987 there were over 800 foreign visitors enrolled as undergraduates, graduates, or scholars at UNC — Chapel Hill.

Fine, you say, but what if the situation were reversed?

Imagine waking up in the morning as one of more than 24,000 students at a university in a small, rural town 35 miles west of, say, Tokyo, Japan. After you got back from a wild, sake-sipping jaunt through the streets of Tokyo that first weekend in Japan, it might hit you. You would probably begin to acknowledge the fact that, culturally, things weren't going to change a great deal in the near future, and to endure, you would have to adapt. Imagine brushing up on your Japanese.

Similarly, such is the case for hundreds of foreign students who have chosen to study in Chapel Hill, of which Hosoon Chang, a 31-year-old graduate student and native of South Korea, is one. Hosoon and his wife and two-year-old daughter have lived in a student family housing facility on campus for just over a year. Although he is supported heavily by his parents in South Korea, he earns extra money from a part-time job offered to graduate students by the University. "I like it here, but when I finish I will go home," he says with a choppy, difficult English.

Like many, Hosoon is grateful to be able to study abroad, the cost alone is exorbitant to most foreigners. For example, 20 marks or 10 dollars per course is normal in Germany's higher education institu-

tions.

Another obstacle for Hosoon is the disparity between our cultures and his. "It is hard," he says, "and the Center is understaffed. We talk to other Koreans about our problems."

To Hosoon, the "Center" is the International Center located in the Student Union, and, indeed, a staff to student ratio of 1:60 is admittedly weak. Of the 10 people who comprise the office and execute most of its services, two are full-time, two are part-time, and an average of six are active volunteers.

Through the Center, the international students here are able to work out most of the logistics of student life abroad, which involve a wide range of administrative details. Among the daily vexations with which the students must contend are the arranging of scholarship fund transactions, a constant vigilance to visa expirations and reapplication, and a functional knowledge of U.S. tax laws — all with limited fluency in English.

"The language barrier," says Tracey Hall, the program assistant at the Center, "is a constant source of frustration for international students, even when they come here supposedly for help. We do the best we can."

Culturally, one popular introduction into American life for the international student is the host family arranged by the Center. Although many students are hesitant to impose after the first few weeks, the sponsorship remains important to them. Regina Hartl, a second year MBA student from Munich, remarked, "It's nice to know someone is there, across town."

With a family of his own having joined him in Chapel Hill, Hosoon has loosened his ties somewhat

with the couple who gave him his first American living room. He nods an emphatic yes, however, when asked if they played a significant role in his early days here. "Really, nice, too nice," he says in a slightly misused syntax. Patting a healthy belly, he adds that, for a while, his evenings were well spent.

The foreign student also has access to a Campus Friend, another program of the Center in which American students volunteer to be paired with newly-arrived international students in order to help them adjust to the contemporary side of student life in the U.S., and to engender international friendships. Beyond the first week of orientation, there are no obligations to either party, it is up to the students.

One of the most fulfilling experiences open to international students at Chapel Hill is the opportunity to speak to interested groups about their cultures. The Speakers Bureau, coordinated singly and voluntarily by Mrs. Edith Fischer — herself a native of Germany — provides just such an opportunity. Although a relatively small number of students volunteered this year, the numbers are growing steadily, as is the demand.

"Mostly it's the area high schools," begins Mrs. Fischer exuberantly, "who are studying foreign cultures in social studies" who request willing students to give the talks. It's a chance for the education-minded to express themselves, relate their values, and teach in what would normally be a closed environment," she says.

Even more, she added, it is an opportunity to see our schools and the education process here. High schools are popular, but recently a Pakistani woman gave a presen-

tation on traditional costumes and festivals to the Carol Woods Retirement Community, and a group of Japanese students demonstrated Oriental food preparation techniques for another senior audience.

Another popular cultural and society amenity catering specifically to the foreign students in Chapel Hill is the International Women's English Conversation Group for the wives of foreign students and scholars.

Hosoon nods in recognition. "My wife likes it very much." The Conversation Group is headed by a volunteer, Mrs. Mary Helen Hayman — the wife of former Institute of Government professor Dr. Hayman. For 18 years the group has met in the same faculty member's home once a week for a coffee, doughnuts and a rich dialogue.

"Twenty is usually a small gathering," states Mrs. Hayman. Sometimes there are as many as 40 who regularly attend the get-together, plus children, for whom there are daycare rooms set up in the home.

"The current majority," says Mrs. Hayman, "are Japanese women

as young as 16 up to grandmothers, but often 20 different nationalities are represented.

While the opportunities for personal growth on the part of the international student are apparent five minutes off the plane, many seem to integrate themselves as little as possible in the life of the community. That is the opinion of one second-year graduate student from Germany, Anje Berlin. Beautiful and friendly, she seems bothered by her own observation.

"I don't understand it," she says. "They never make friends — good friends — with anybody outside their own circle — their nationality, especially with Americans. They're the ones who still can't speak English understandably after two years. I guess they're trying, but it makes you wonder what their idea of international study is."

Anje has thoroughly enjoyed her career at UNC, and it would be nice to think that the better parts of American culture are responsible for at least some of her knowing smile. She's looking forward to going home to Berlin soon, where she'll finish her thesis and return in

April to defend it. By then she'll be married.

As though thinking about her fiancée far away or a favorite sidewalk café back home, she adds in a moment of reflective insight, "Once the newness (of a place) wears off, it's hard to be away from home. You begin to judge things that are different."

For Hosoon the differences are marked even more. Americans thrive on leisure activity, he says, whereas for South Koreans, thriving still means hard work. Perhaps he has imparted some of this understanding to his newest friends here, whom he will soon be leaving.

Hosoon has said he is ready to go home and work and begin raising a family; he will go as soon as the time comes. But when he leaves Chapel Hill, this time he'll pack among his things memories of a small, Southern town with an international flare and the favorite baggy, white sweatshirt that he's wearing — the one with the blue letters UNC.

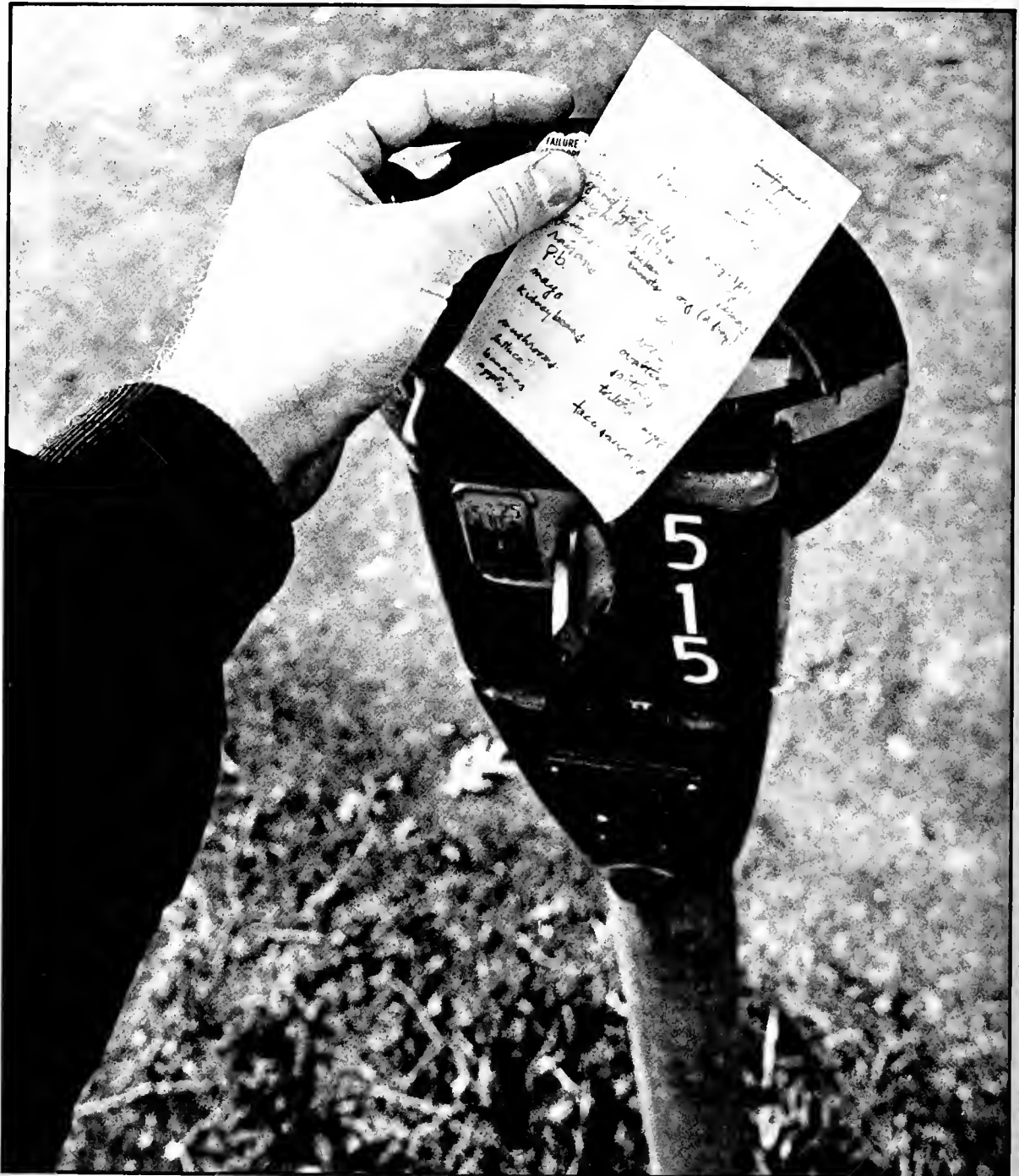

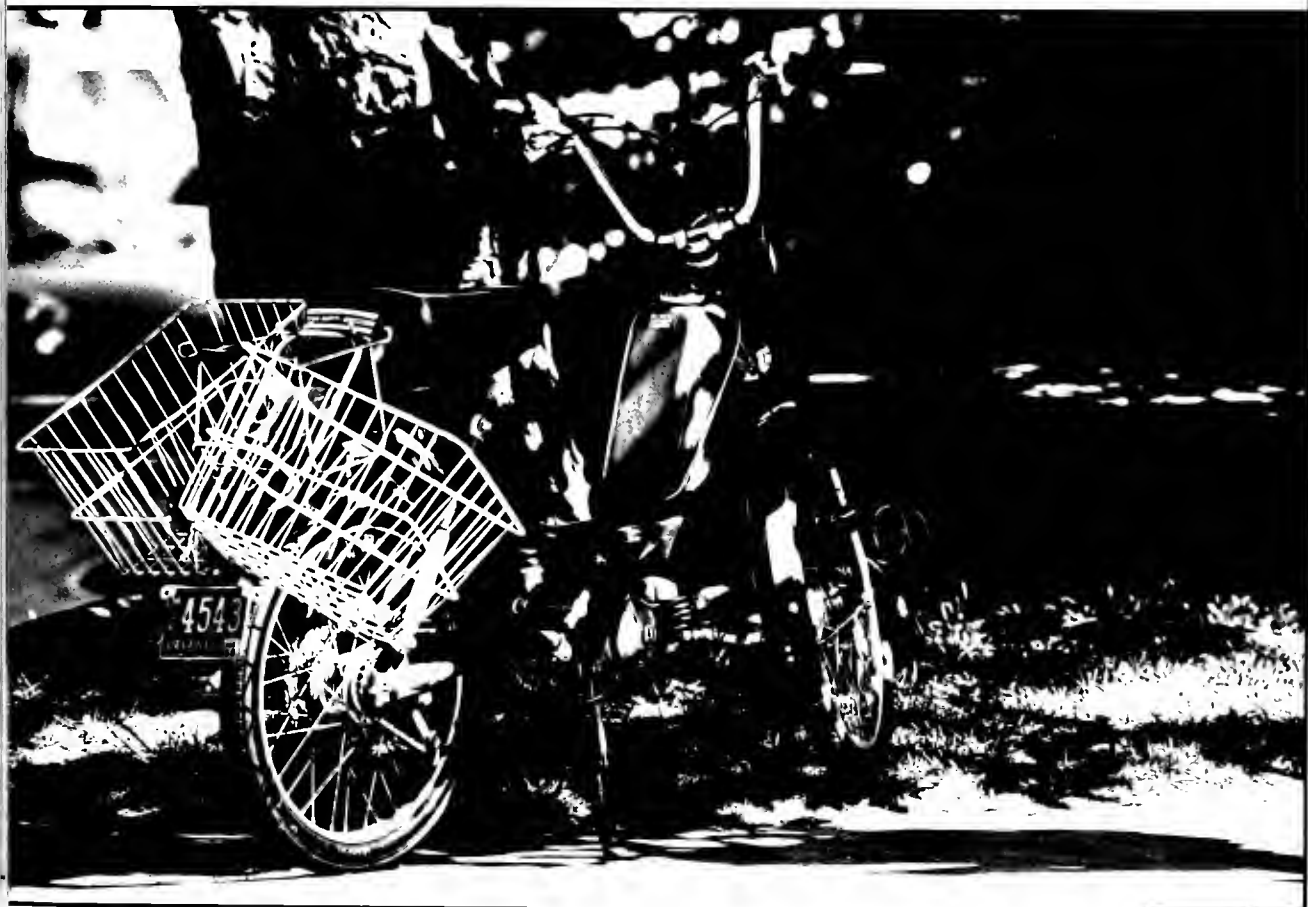

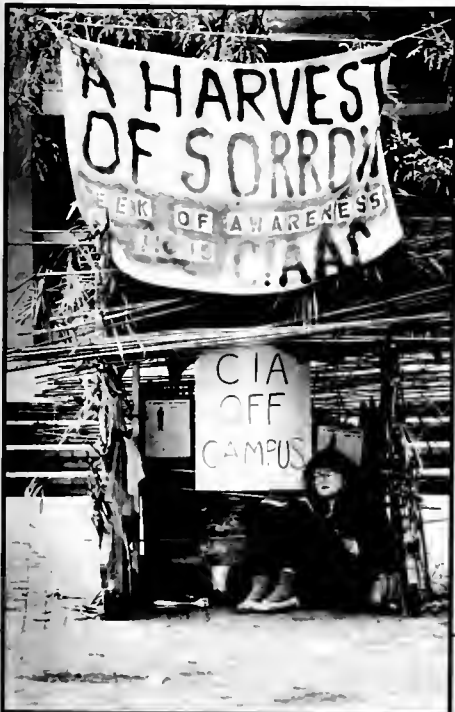

STUDENT ACTIVISM AT UNC:

The Time Is Now!

Congratulations! We have the single honor of being a generation whose sole function is to consume. Let's face it, ultimately that is all we do. Fast food, faster and finer cars, USA Today and cocaine epitomize the things our generation pursues. They are our goals and our gods.

Statistics show that most of us entered college because we wanted to become super-consumers. For most of us college was not about college and learning, rather it was about making more money. College was not about seeking to stretch our limits, but it was about maximizing our potential for sweet satiation. In the end, our concerns are for ourselves.

Why do we insist on limiting ourselves to such a narrow goal as our own gratification? It's too easy to achieve, too boring. We have tremendous potential, both as individuals and as a generation. Idealists and dreamers go into fits imagining all the good we could do for our world if, only we could start putting others' need before our greed. The trouble, though, is that this is difficult to do in an ideal world, let alone this one. Our upbringing has told us to consume, our televisions and magazines scream at us to consume. Our social structure demands that we consume status symbols. We almost cannot free ourselves from consumption.

What is wrong with consuming? If it is there and one can afford it and it brings a person pleasure, then why not consume? These are difficult questions, but let's take a look at them in a broader context. First, the things we want are not always there. To be sure, they are available to us, but often at the price of not being available to another. A large corporation knows that the most profit is to be made feeding America. Thus, products can be purchased here,

but often the raw materials used to make them are denied to the people who dug them out of the ground. Our national trade deficit shows that America is draining the rest of the world. We consume more than we produce. The rest of the world does without so we can stuff ourselves. No, the resources we consume are not always available. They rightfully belong to others. We've had our share.

The next point is affordability. If one has enough money to purchase a good or a service, he or she can pay for it, but may still be unable to afford it. Americans can usually pay for things, but our trade deficit and national debt show that we cannot afford it. On an even more abstract level, South African whites cannot afford to live the lives of luxury and power they have for so long. Many of them will pay for it with their lives. The same threat, though less imminent, hangs over America.

The third point raised in defense of consumption is pleasure. That people could consume more than they need, knowing that they are effectively depriving another of the resources necessary to survive is hard to understand. That they could deprive pleasure from it is sick.

Clearly, then, consuming excessively or consuming for the sake of consuming is wrong. It is an act of violence. When people are forced to do dangerous work under an oppressive system in order to provide extra luxuries for others, any profit fed back into the system perpetuates the slavery. This is where our corporations and our government have had a devastating effect on the world. There are numerous examples of our corporations exploiting the slave labor available in developing countries while any threat of the loss of profit is guarded against by covert

branches of the government.

Excessive consumption meets activism at this point. If we can, through understanding and concern, break this cycle, then perhaps our world could be more just. Perhaps then the degree of misery could be reduced. Then we could take pleasure not from consumption gratification, but from sowing the seeds of justice and being instruments of peace.

There are two avenues we must pursue in order to achieve this: personal and systemic justice. Personal justice is easy to grasp. The necessary changes are simple to understand, but habits must change. Small sacrifices must be made. A non-exhaustive list might include boycotting Coca-Cola until they remove themselves and their products from South Africa, boycotting Coors beer because Joseph Coors uses the profits to fund the contras, having nothing to do with the CIA until they cease their violence and drug trafficking. Such things bring pressure to change, but cannot be considered a whole solution.

Achieving systemic justice is much more difficult. There is no agreed upon path and the way is strewn with obstacles. But we can no longer afford not to seek justice in our world. If you want to dance you have to pay the piper. Thus far, the piper has been held down and gagged, so we haven't had to pay. But if you listen, late at night in a small village somewhere in the third world, you will hear the rising anger of the men, the cold resolve of the women, and the cries of the children. God hears everyone of those cries and his heart breaks. It's time we listened and acted. We can no longer afford not to.

The Residence Hall Association was formed in 1973 and took the place of its predecessor, the Residence College Federation. RHA is dorm government for resident students, working to help people live where they live. It does this by representing residents on issues of concern and seeking ways to improve the quality of dorm life. RHA also works to enhance resident life through social activities, academic and cultural programs, physical improvements in the dorms, and support of certain all-campus activities (such as Springfest).

Each fall, RHA and the area governments together sponsor leadership retreats to help prepare elected officers for their term. RHA develops rules and guidelines to govern the use of dorm social funds, dorm enhancement funds, the use of alcohol at dorm-sponsored events, dorm elections, and summer social funds. GREEK WEEK

UNC Greeks Step Out For A Cause

In the springtime, a young man's fancy may turn to love. Young Greeks' fancies, true to the tradition of their playful predecessors the deities, turn toward games.

So just when several fraternity houses on campus were being renovated, so too was an idea almost as age-old as Plato himself.

It's an idea that on some campuses has evolved into a cause for bashing Greeks.

At UNC-CH, it was a week-long, bizarre combination of rock'n'roll, helium balloons and charity donations, a festival that hadn't been held on the Hill since 1984, according to its co-chairwoman, Leah Totten.

More mortals called this revived event Greek Week.

In fact, everyone calls it Greek Week.

The title perhaps sounded like a simple excuse for Adonises and Venuses to frolic in bacchanalian feasts of the Budweiser type, but according to Totten, the event served three purposes. Co-sponsored by the Interfraternity and Panhellenic Councils, it improved relations among the social organizations, fostered better Greek to non-Greek relations and raised money for charity.

Thirty-two social fraternities and sororities (all except Delta Kappa Epsilon) mixed for a week full of fun and fundraising. The week opened March 21 with a bloodmobile contest co-sponsored by the Greek Week Committee and Alpha Phi Omega. Students gave 250 pints, setting a campus record for blood donation. Also, a helium



balloon liftoff in the Pit raised money for the Multiple Sclerosis Society. Delta Phi Epsilon co-sponsored the event.

Then there was entertainment. Greek Night Out at local bars and restaurants featured some specials the night of March 22nd, while the Pit featured some daytime special events. For example, the acapella singing groups the Loreleis and the Four Corners made music during the lunch-rush March 23rd. The next day, Kappa Alpha Psi and Delta Delta Delta strutted their stuff there, showing racial unity by holding a joint step show. Both organizations had been training together for months, according to chairwoman Totten.

Also, the Carolina Union co-sponsored a human charades and comedy act, which was open to all students.

The Destination Unknown Mixer March 24th was perhaps the highlight of Greek Week. Buses rolled fraternity and sorority members to a surprise destination — Wheels Roller Rink in Durham — where they skated to the tunes of the Connells and the Atlanta based trio drivin' 'n' cryin'.

Lesser known bands got a chance in the spotlight, too, as Greek Week's Battle of the Bands

began. The event started at 6 p.m. March 25 and lasted until midnight, with seven bands competing for 45 minutes each. Students packed into Little and Big Fraternity Courts as the groups alternately blasted out tunes from the Kappa Alpha and Pi Kappa Alpha porches. From the ranks of bands named Smashed Gladiss, The Fidgets, Ex Libris, Play by Play, the Attitudes and the Filter Kings, Lo Sholder emerged to win the contest prize — free studio time. But they've never taken it; the Greek Week Committee couldn't track them down after the judging.

Funding for the total benefit came from T-shirt and cup sales and individual donations. Also, the Greek Week Committee asked any organization participating in the Destination Unknown Mixer to pay \$500 for bus fare and band rental.

Throughout the week, Greek social organizations divided into six teams, received points for participation in blood donation and human charades and were to receive points for the Greek Games, a field day. Who won? No one, according to Brent Milgrom, Greek Week co-chairman and president of the Inter-fraternity Council. Since the scheduled games were rained out March 26th, there

weren't enough points to make a solid decision, he said.

Yet one organization was clearly a winner: the Lineberger Cancer Research Center, whose researchers received a \$10,000 donation from the executive officers of the Panhellenic Council and the Inter-fraternity Council at a final ceremony and banquet March 28th. The Greek Week Committee is the largest single donor to the Cancer Research Center, according to Totten. Its donation went toward the Center's breast cancer research division.

"Any time you can raise \$10,000 in one week, it's a tremendous success," Totten said.

She and Milgrom agree that Greek Week improved Greeks' image among themselves and in the University community at large. "As far as the community was concerned, the response was very positive. People saw that fraternities and sororities were good for something other than just socializing."

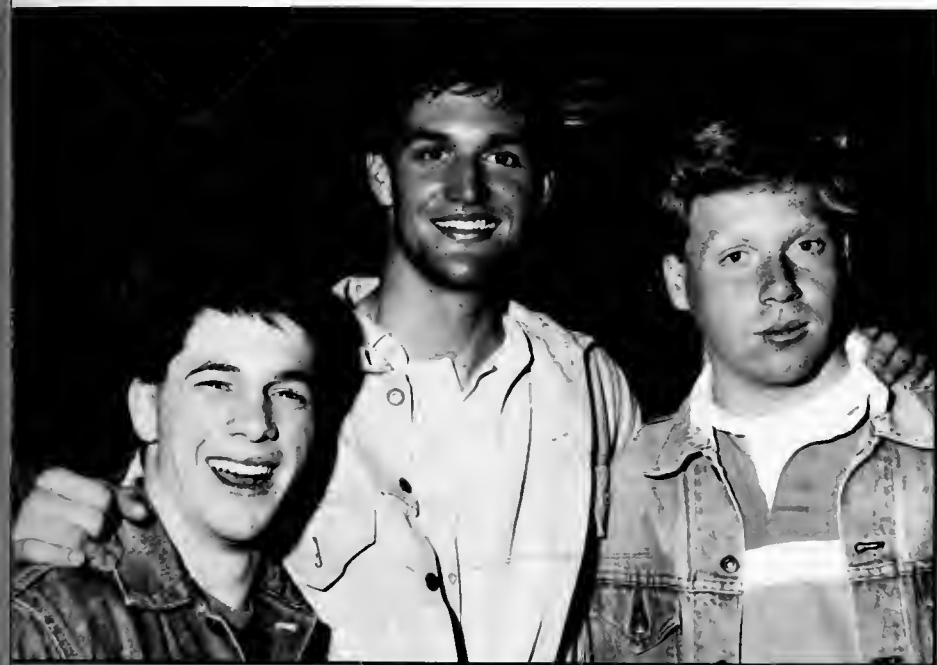
In fact, Totten enjoyed Greek Week so much that she's running the event next year.

CRUM RESIGNS

But Was He Really That Bad?

Throughout his final years at the University of North Carolina, head football coach Dick Crum increasingly came under fire from students and alumni for his inability to keep UNC among the nation's elite college football teams. Last December, after the Tar Heels finished a disappointing 5-6 season by losing their final three games, Crum resigned and the Educational Foundation bought out his contract to the tune of \$800,000. A speedy quest ensued for Crum's successor, and Mack Brown, formerly of Tulane, was named UNC's new head coach.

The turmoil of Crum's final season and the negative publicity he received because of it, though, served to obscure the true magnitude of his accomplishments during his ten year stay in Chapel Hill. Much of the disappointment UNC's ineffectiveness engendered in its fans was the result of Crum's early successes. Had Crum's teams not been as excellent as they were in the early 1980's, few would have expected much from the teams of the latter half of the decade. As it was, in his first six seasons at UNC, Crum took the Tar Heels to five bowl games and made them into perennial top 20 contenders. When, in the last four years, UNC went to one bowl game and finished above .500 but once, Crum became an easy target for the critics. But it wasn't always so. Crum came to Chapel Hill for the 1978 season, replacing Bill Dooley, who at the time held the record for the most Tar Heel coaching victories. Crum would eventually break that record, but got off to an inauspicious start, as his first UNC team went 5-6, dropping close games to Maryland, Clemson, and powerhouse Pittsburgh. Still, Amos Lawrence, the speedy tailback who had rushed for 1,211 yards the

previous year as a freshman, again broke the 1,000 yard barrier. Lawrence would go on to break that barrier in his final two years, and become the only UNC player ever to rush for 1,000 yards in each of his four years.

Things improved dramatically for Crum and the Tar Heels in the next three years. In 1979, All ACC linebacker Buddy Curry served as the cornerstone of a defense that would become one of the nation's most feared, and the Tar Heels rolled to an 8-3-1 record, capping off the year with a stirring 17-15 win over Michigan in the Gator Bowl. Lawrence rushed for 118 yards and quarterback Matt Kupec led the Tar Heels on a 97 yard touchdown drive in the third quarter that gave them the lead for good.

One of the key figures in the 1979 season was linebacker Lawrence Taylor, who came into his own in the latter half of the year and quickly established himself as an absolute force on the field. Taylor would eventually become an outside linebacker for the New York Giants and earn himself an MVP award as well as a reputation as one of the greatest to ever play the game.

Such accolades were still in the future, though, during the 1980 season, when Taylor became nationally recognized and sparked the Tar Heels to a phenomenal 11-1 record. Crum's defensive schemes, obviously more effective because of Taylor's presence, shut down opposing offenses and 11 of UNC's 12 opponents scored fewer than 21 points. The lone exception to this rule, though, was Oklahoma, which blew out the Tar Heels 41-7 in Norman.

UNC finished its year with a convincing 16-7 defeat of Texas in the Bluebonnet Bowl. Lawrence, in the final game of his college career,

rushed for 104 yards, and the Tar Heels defense held Texas to just two second-half first downs. UNC was ninth in the final poll. Taylor, who ended the year with an incredible 16 sacks, earned first-team All America honors and was the overwhelming choice as ACC Player of the Year.

The following year was just as sweet. Junior tailback Kelvin Bryant took over where Lawrence had left off and rushed for 1015 yards while scoring 17 touchdowns. UNC lost twice at home, to South Carolina and Clemson, but knocked off Arkansas 31-27 in the Gator Bowl to finish 10-2. The bowl game victory, unsurprisingly, was a tale of tailbacks, as Bryant slashed through the Razorback defense for 148 yards and his backup, Ethan Horton, rushed for 144. The Tar Heels were eighth in the final poll.

Those two years were Crum's heyday at Chapel Hill. His teams were winning and were nationally prominent, he was fashioning an impressive record in bowl games, and he had earned a reputation as an excellent defensive mastermind. The following two years, UNC had successive 8-4 seasons, and in 1982 ended the year with an impressive 26-10 rout with seventh-ranked Texas in the Sun Bowl, as Horton rushed for 119 yards in relief of Bryant.

The combination of a powerful ground game and a fearsome defense seemed to make up for the absence of a passing game, but hints of the trouble that lay ahead for Crum appeared in 1983. UNC won its first seven games of the year and traveled to Maryland as the number 3 team in America. But a couple of questionable calls and an incredible Terp comeback gave Maryland the 28-26 victory, and knocked UNC into a downward spiral. The Tar Heels lost four

of their last five games, and ended their season in miserable fashion by getting blown out by Florida state in the Peach Bowl, 28-3. Later, Crum said he never should have accepted the bowl bid.

Whether that final loss carried over into the next season remains a mystery, but Crum's magic seemed to have disappeared for good. In 1984, the Tar Heels went 5-5-1 and lost four of their first five games, including a 52-20 blowout by Doug Flutie and Boston College. Horton did rush for 1,274 yards in his senior season, but the following year William Humes rushed for just 515 yards, breaking a string of 12 consecutive years in which UNC had a 1,000 yard rusher.

UNC went 5-6 in 1985, and rebounded slightly in 1986 with a 7-4-1 record, as Derrick Fenner emerged as one of the nation's finer tailbacks and Mark Maye showed signs of living up to the promise of his high school career. But Crum's final season ended in disaster, as the Tar Heels took a 5-3 record into the Clemson game, dropped a close one to the Tigers, choked in the clutch against Virginia and finally were manhandled by Duke. It was an inglorious finish to Crum's career at UNC, and it was a season marred throughout by speculation about his status as a coach.

In many respects Dick Crum was not built to be a head coach. He disliked dealing with the press, was reserved and showed little patience with the whims of fans. What Crum wanted to do was work with his players and fashion them into a winning squad. His success at doing so early in his tenure only made his failure to do so later that much more difficult to understand. Crum was not a crowd pleaser, and his quiet demeanor only served to make him more susceptible to criticism. When he lost, he did nothing to detract attention away from the loss. Charming in private, he was often brusque in public, and Tar Heel fans seemed to relish attacking him.

But during his ten years at UNC, Crum won. His final record as Tar

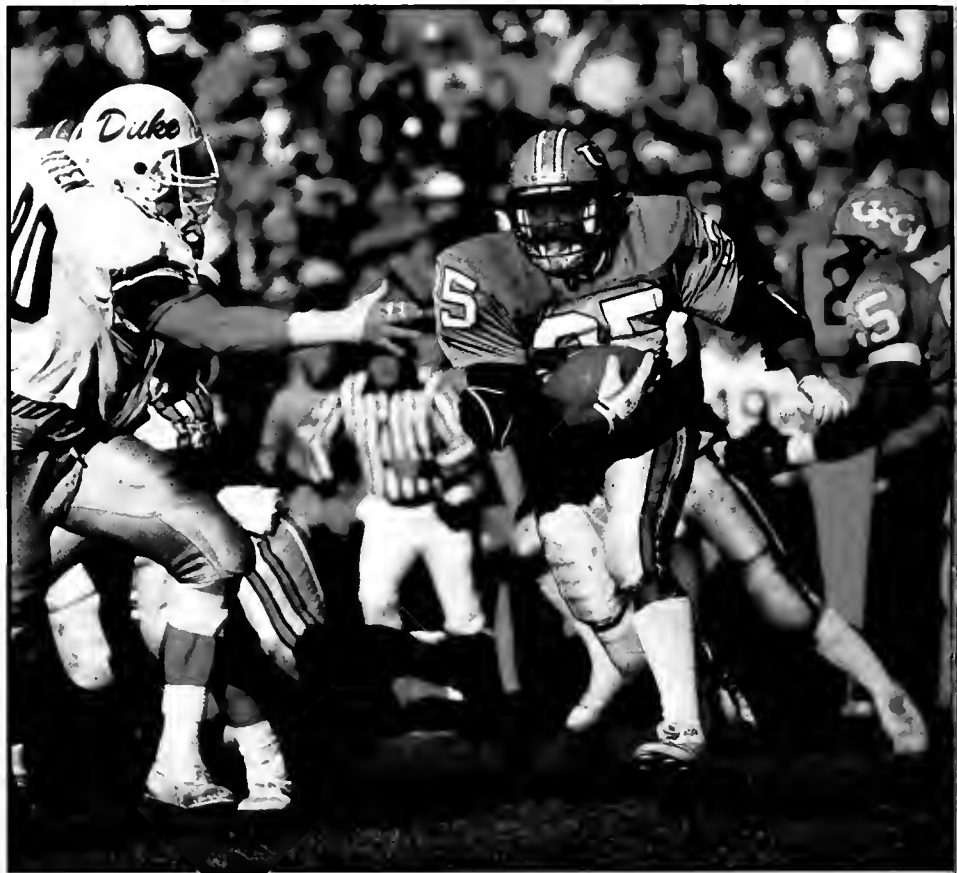
Heel coach was 72-41-3, and for all his problems defeating ranked opponents, that remains a fine record. Crum said at one point that the problem with football at UNC was that the school wanted to be Harvard five days a week and Oklahoma on Saturday. Well for a couple of years, Crum made the Tar Heels, if not Oklahoma, then something pretty close. In the wake of his departure, it is his efforts then and not his troubles later, that should be remembered.

The Man Behind the Mike

Robert "Sarge" Keefer leads a life of which many sports enthusiasts can only dream.

His involvement in sports began in his hometown of Cleveland, Ohio, over 50 years ago, where he became a sports celebrity among area fans while announcing professional baseball games for the Cleveland Indians.

In 1976, fed up with Cleveland's weather and the dwindling success of the area teams, Sarge and his wife, Ann, began looking in areas in which to retire. Wanting to retire in a college town, the Keefers visited the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, Wake Forest, Duke and North Carolina State Universities, but chose the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

As a man with a passion for basketball, Sarge had watched many Carolina games on television, making Chapel Hill an easy choice. "As soon as I saw the town, I knew it was for me," he said.

Opting for early retirement at age 62, Sarge and his wife moved to North Carolina in 1978. But missing the sporting life, he contacted the athletic department about possible employment. "I wanted to do anything," he said.

There were no openings at that time, but a year later, Sarge was contacted about working as a checker at the athletic training table. He gladly accepted.

Sarge was given his nickname by the athletes at the training table. The head of the dining service, a retired Navy officer, was nicknamed "Captain." The logical choice for Keefer, who was once an Army sergeant, was "Sarge." The name fits him perfectly.

Sarge continued working at the table for six years. In 1985, he was

transferred to the Dean E. Smith Student Activities Center where he was a courier. His main duty was taking money from ticket and program sales to the bank.

"It was a perfect job for me," says Sarge, "I was able to meet different people on campus and in town."

Before Sarge started working at the Smith Center, he had begun announcing some of the Tar Heel home baseball games.

Sarge is never at a loss for words on the microphone; he confidently leads the fans at Boshamer Stadium in the seventh-inning stretch institution, "Take Me Out to the Ball Game."

When the game is slow-moving, Sarge tests out new jokes on the crowd, and many boo at the corny punchlines. But the crowd loves him.

Though much of the ball game conversation is between Sarge and the fans, the players are not free from Sarge and his microphone. Until this year, the press box was about 10 feet directly behind the catcher. When a Tar Heel player stepped into the batter's box, Sarge would announce his name with an unpredictable nickname. Devy "Taco" Bell and Dave "Horrendous" Arendas were two of the player's more memorable names from seasons past.

Sarge laughs when he speaks of

his antics. "I know it's rude to make fun, but I don't mean any harm," he says grinning.

At Carolina, his P.A. work is not limited to baseball games. Sarge also announced soccer, lacrosse, gymnastics and volleyball matches at various times. When needed, he fills in at basketball games. As a popular announcer, Sarge has a full schedule of events to cover.

One morning in April 1986, he stood up to stretch while working a softball tournament. He couldn't walk and was rushed to the hospital; he had had a stroke. He remained in the hospital for seven weeks and had to give up his job at the Smith Center.

At first, Sarge was partially paralyzed from the waist down. The first few months he was out of the hospital he used a wheelchair to get around; he now uses a cane.

He walks with a limp and needs help climbing the stairs to the newly constructed press box. "The press box is nice," he says, "But I'd rather be back in my old spot behind the catcher — it was more personal."

As he sits at the press table in his Carolina-blue attire, Sarge turns up the volume on the stereo. "The rock music helps the players relax," he says. "Also, they'd kill me if I turned it off."

Sarge may not like the music, but the players do, and that's what is important to him.

Sarge brags about "his boys" — former Tar Heel baseball players — who are now in the pros.

His account of their opening-day statistics will have to wait though. It is 2:55 p.m.; Carolina plays Wake in five minutes.

As he shuffles the line-up cards, the loudspeaker sounds the national anthem.

"I celebrated birthday number 72 in January — I never even wanted to live this long. But I guess as long as I'm here, I'll be doing this."

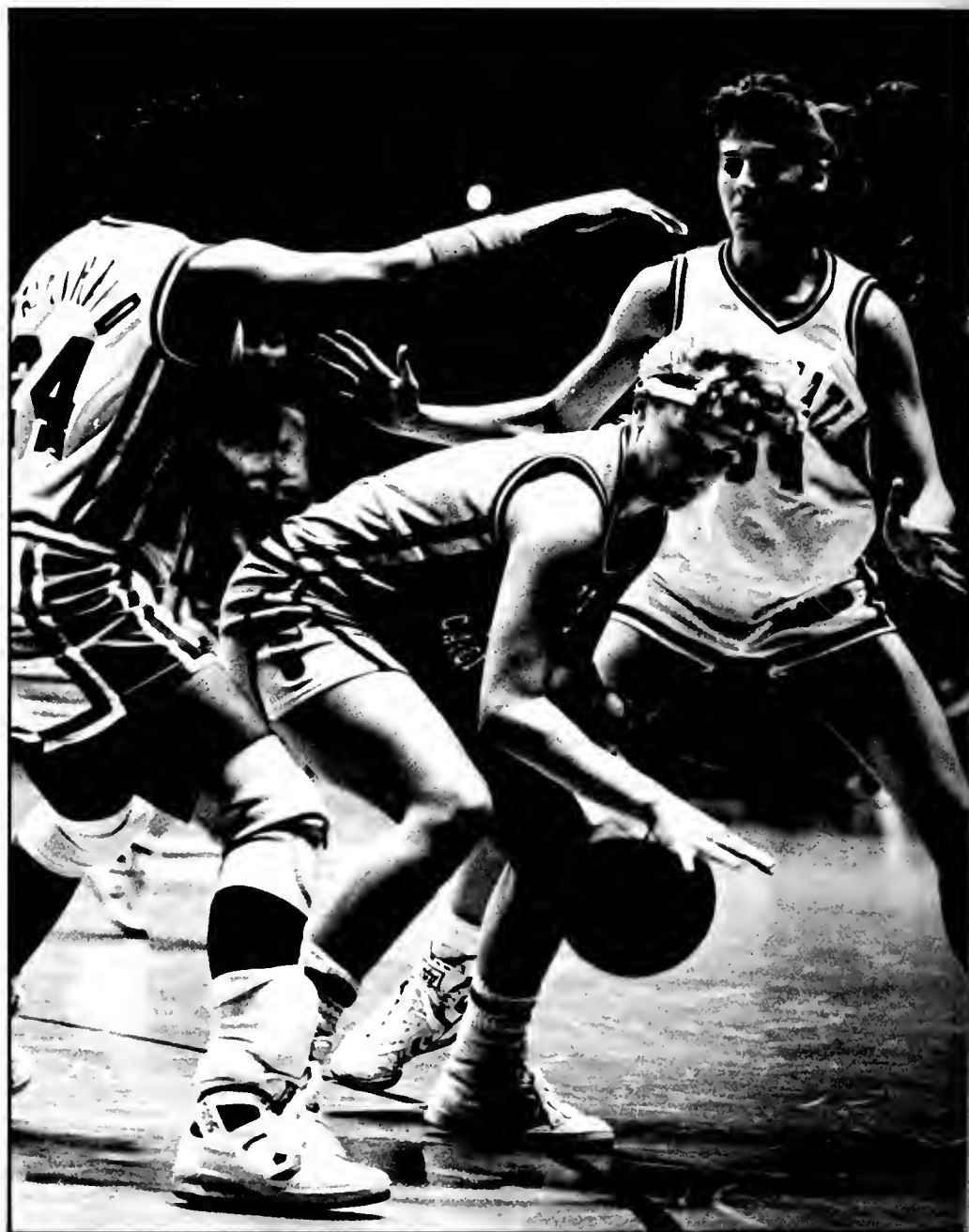

Sure there are things that you'll miss about the dorm, but for cable t.v. and your own room, many would choose the apartment route all over again.

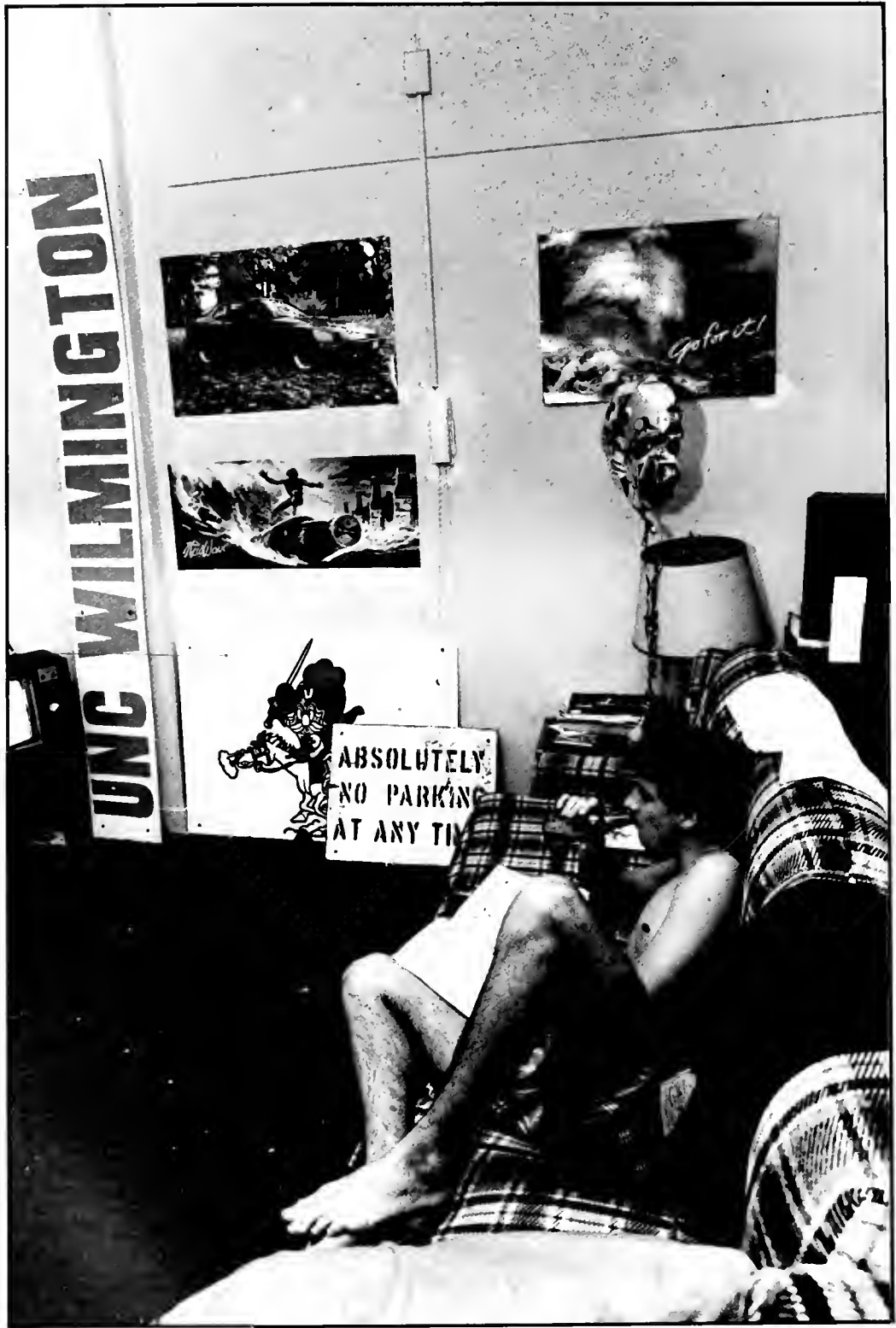

In the heat of the summer, students also appreciate having a swimming pool at their disposal. It's nice to come home after class on a hot day and jump into the pool.

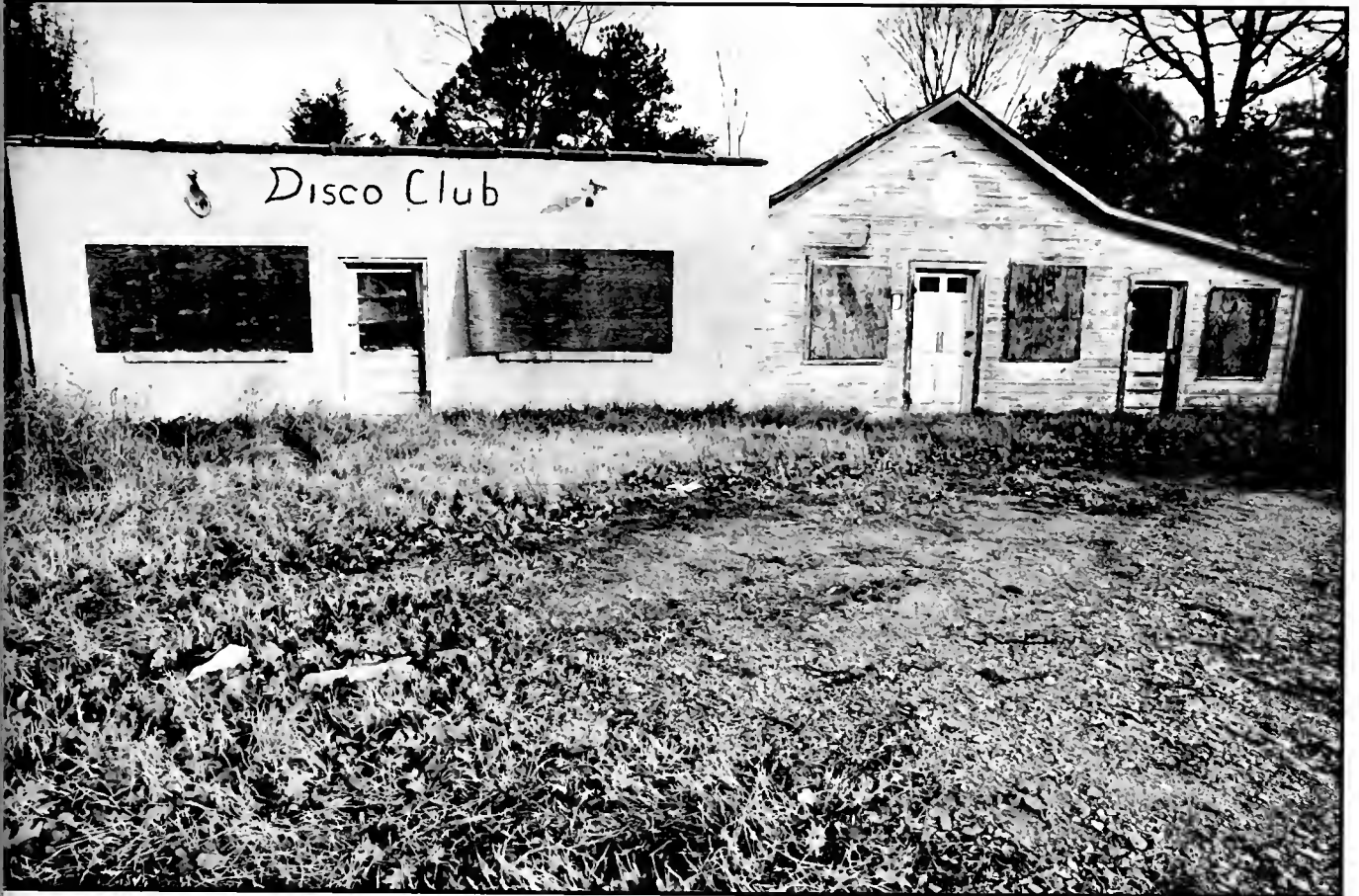
