


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

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

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

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To the Trustees and Supervisors of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

The year just closed was, in many respects, the most important in the history of the NEW YORK ORTHOPÆDIC DISPENSARY AND HOSPITAL, and of the COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL, SCHOOL, both in the work accomplished and in the financial outcome. This result is the reverse of what might naturally have been expected under the conditions that prevailed, and is therefore all the more gratifying. An important contraction of income would have necessitated a curtailment of the work.

These two Institutions while under direction of the same Board of Trustees and closely related in their work and its responsibilities, are largely operated independently and in no respect directly assist one another financially; the former being still very largely dependent upon public support for its income, while the latter is fully endowed. We shall therefore report upon the work and financial situation of each quite separately.

NEW YORK ORTHOPÆDIC DISPENSARY & HOSPITAL.

The increases in the number of patients treated in the DISPENSARY and in the number of visits made by patients to the DISPENSARY have been very marked; as has also the increase in the number of visits paid by the surgeons and nurses to patients outside of the Institution.

The same increase is shown in the number of patients treated in the HOSPITAL. The prevalence of an epidemic of infantile paralysis in the early part of the year no doubt accounts for some part of this increase in the number of patients; yet the larger proportion came in the ordinary course, drawn, as we may justly believe, by the reputation of our Staff for consideration and skill in the treatment of their various diseases.

The Report and Tables of the Surgeon-in-Chief give the full and interesting details upon which these general conclusions are based, and should be carefully considered. We especially commend to your study Table A, showing the steady and remarkable growth, in every essential particular, of our City work during the past ten years (from 1899 to 1908 both inclusive), whether we consider the increase in amount of the work accomplished or the decrease in the cost of it. The average of the latter per patient last year was, with one exception, the lowest during the years cited, while the amount of work done was the largest; and this extra work was performed without any additions to the Staff of Surgeons and of Nurses, and with commendable efficiency. It is, therefore, at this time a source of gratification that the purposes for which the DISPENSARY and HOSPITAL were established are so increasingly and efficiently accomplishing their ends.

The Treasuser submits quite satisfactory results for the year ending September 30th, 1908, of the DISPENSARY AND HOSPITAL. When it is remembered that the period covered by his report was at first greatly disturbed by the panic of 1907, and subsequently seriously affected by enforced economy on the part of a large body of contributors to our charitable organizations, we should, as a Board of Trustees, be most grateful for the outcome.

The Income and Expense Account of the DISPENSARY and HOSPITAL, presents some features worthy of notice. While the total receipts of the year shows an increase of \$1,797.90 over the previous year, the expenses for this period show an increase of \$2,677.99, resulting in a net excess of expenditure of \$880.09.

An analysis of the receipts shows a very considerable falling off in three items, namely :

Free beds annually endowed	\$1,283.33

The decrease in the number of donors was 86, and in the number of subscribers 3. Had it not been for the important amount of \$4,848.45 secured through the good work of the

Entertainment Committee of the Board of Supervisors, the falling off in the three directions mentioned would have been more serious. As it is, these three items serve to emphasize the directions in which the panic affected our receipts, and the direction to which we must bend our energies in this coming year; and the one favorable item mentioned may well emphasize, on the other hand, our continued obligations to the ladies of our Board of Supervisors, whose Report follows.

Referring to the Balance Sheet of the DISPENSARY AND HOSPITAL, we find its interest-bearing investments have increased to the amount of \$139,214.75, and that this increase has been invested in well selected New York City mortgages.

This much appreciated addition to our Endowment Fund, made up of the legacies of Mr. James Henry Smith and Miss Zella Gibbs, announced a year ago, and of other gifts, has not increased this Fund to an extent sufficient to do more than provide about one-third of the necessary income to carry on the work of which we have been speaking, namely that of the NEW YORK ORTHOPÆDIC DISPENSARY AND HOSPITAL; a work which, we repeat, receives no pecuniary benefit whatever from the Endowment Fund of the Country Branch and Industrial School, of which we shall speak presently, built and endowed quite independently for its specific though auxiliary work, through the munificence of Miss Emily Watson. For this School we make no appeal for funds; but we do appeal most earnestly for funds to sustain the work of our City Dispensary and Hospital, a work paramount in its needs and appealing in its character.

COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

The past year witnessed the completion of the two new pavilions, and they were opened to patients on July 1st, 1908.

The work, which is making very favorable progress, is under the direction of a Committee of the Board of Trustees and a Committee of the Board of Supervisors of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital, aided by a Country Committee composed largely of near by residents. While the COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL is thus under the direct supervision and management of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital, which latter supplies it with patients, holds the title of its property, and has the custody of its Endowment Fund, the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital has no responsibility, as already stated above, for its financial support.

The Balance Sheet of the COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL for the year ended September 30th, 1908, submitted by the Treasurer, shows an Endowment Fund invested in mortgages on Real Estate in New York City of \$1,189,000, an increase of \$800,000 over the previous year; and an investment in land, buildings and furnishings of \$416,604.26, an increase of \$108,765.46 for the year.

The current receipts of the COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, together with the surplus of 1907, resulted in a surplus over disbursements the past year of \$4,492.17.





SUPERVISORS' REPORT.

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

We have the honour to present to you the report of the Board of Supervisors.

During the past year we have had the good fortune through the generosity of our friends not only to continue without curtailing, but to enlarge our work of assistance in the care of those helpless little ones confided to our Hospital. It is needless for us to attempt to say how grateful we are for this, and how deeply we appreciate it.

It is always to our Auxiliary Societies that we owe our first words of thanks, regretting that they must of necessity be few and short. None could seem adequate to express our sense of our debt to them, and the most hasty glance at their reports will explain why so many branches of our work would be impossible if we could not depend upon their support. It is to the Orthopædic Guild, the Orthopædic Hospital Sewing Society, the Junior Guild, and the Boy's Guild that we have often turned when practical help was needed, and we have never turned in vain.

Three Visiting Nurses have been supported by members of our Board, Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, Mrs. Wm. Douglas Sloane and Mrs. Marion Story. A fourth by a friend of our Institution who has always been a generous contributor and well wisher, Mrs. Frederic Vanderbilt. This service is of such extreme importance to the work of the Surgeons in the Dispensary, it can scarcely be exaggerated. To the liberality of these ladies is due the ultimate cure of many cases which would otherwise relapse through lack of care at home. The new feature in the work of our Institution, the Clinic for Lateral Curvature of the Spine which was introduced through the liberality of one of the Trustees, Mr. Hugh J. Chisholm, has been enabled to double its service, owing to the generosity of a member of our Board, Miss Caroline White.

Through the kindness of those friends who have subscribed to the Special Fund devoted to it, the School has again been carried on. It means so much to the patients not to lose their places in the Public Schools, because of their treatment, that we feel it is an important branch of our work to prevent it. We beg for contributions for this fund as the teacher's salary and other school expenses cannot be appropriated out of the general treasury, and depend entirely upon subscriptions and donations for the purpose.

Our other Special Funds, Fruit, Ice Cream, Vegetable and Park Drives do much, not only to lighten our task of providing necessities for our patients, but to enable us to give them pleasures and little luxuries and comforts otherwise beyond our means, and we hope that our friends will show their approval by continuing to support them.

At Christmas all our efforts were directed as usual to bringing some of the season's joy and cheer to our little patients, and in this we are always more than generously seconded by many friends, and by the various Guilds who vie with each other in a most lovely rivalry. We may not dwell too long upon it all here, but it is such a happy time, and the children do enjoy it so much, that it is one of the pleasures of our work. One of our Vice-Presidents, Miss Whitney, always gives a tree with presents for all, needless to say what joy that brings, the sight of such a thing alone is something most of these children would never have elsewhere. At it Mrs. Frederic Kernochan gives pounds of tea to the mothers who bring Dispensary patients.

Miss de Forest gives presents to all the Hospital staff, Mrs. Sloane a present to each child in the wards, Mrs. J. A. Burden, another Vice-President, a doll to each girl. The Guilds hang up stockings, visit the wards, amuse the children, and give them fruit or any little delicacy allowed. Besides all the presents given in the Hospital, the Visiting Nures were well supplied for distribution in the homes of Dispensary patients. In fact it is an endless list of kindness and thoughtful attentions. An entertainment was held to help defray our current expenses, a concert at which Brahm's Requiem and other selections was given by Mr. Stowkowski, the organist, and the Choir of St. Bartholomew's Church, who very generously donated their services and an orchestra. The high character of the concert and the artistic rendering of the music made it a most successful entertainment in every respect, and it brought in the handsome sum of \$4,000. In addition to this, \$3,500 was received in donations to the Endowment Fund from persons whose attention has been called to our needs through the concert. Our Entertainment Committee are heartily to be congratulated on the success of their efforts.

In conclusion we address our Annual appeal to the generous public, to our many friends, to continue their interest and help. It is a wonderful work to redeem human beings from suffering and misery and make them strong, healthy men and women, capable of becoming useful citizens instead of charges upon the Community, from a life which is a cruel burden, and to allow them the same opportunity as their more fortunate brothers enjoy. It is our privilege to assist in this and it is our duty to bring it before others, and ask them to join us, and to be generous and liberal in giving the wherewithal to continue and to extend these benefits. No subject appeals more strongly to all hearts than trials and suffering in childhood. It should be such a happy time, when it is not, all long to make it so. Will you not take this practical way of showing your sympathy, and not only contribute yourself to our sadly needy treasury, but induce others to subscribe to it as well?

SURGEON'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

We have treated in our Institution during the past year, ending September 30th, 1908, four thousand, seven hundred, and thirty patients. One thousand, seven hundred, and twentysix of these were new patients, and the other three thousand and four were those continued under treatment from last year. Among this number were five hundred and fifty-three cases of Potts' Disease, four hundred and twenty-six cases of Hip Joint Disease, and two hundred cases of Tuberculous Diseases of the smaller joints; making a total of eleven hundred and seventynine cases of Tuberculosis of the bone and joint. There were three hundred and twenty-nine cases of Lateral Curvature of the Spine, eight hundred and sixty-seven cases of deformities of the Foot, nine hundred and fifty-seven cases of Paralytic Deformities, and the remaining number represents a very large variety of cases. From these figures you will note a very large increase, as compared with last year.

Seven hundred and forty-one cases were discharged cured, and four hundred and sixty-eight were discharged relieved; making a total of twelve hundred and nine individuals restored to conditions where they no longer require surgical treatment.

This number last year was six hundred and fifty-two. Four cases were discharged for neglect, ten incurable, six hundred and ninety-nine received no treatment after their first visit, thirtyeight died, and the remaining two thousand, seven hundred and seventy were continued for further treatment. (For details see Tables I and II.) The number of visits made by patients to the Dispensary was twenty-three thousand, four hundred and fifty-seven. Number of visits made by Surgeons to patients outside the Institution was three thousand, one hundred and sixteen, and the number of visits made by Nurses to patients at their homes was seven thousand, nine hundred and ninety-eight; making a total of thirty-four thousand, five hundred and seventy-one visits. This shows an increase of six thousand, seven hundred and seventy-three visits over last year.

The average number of visits made to the Dispensary daily was seventy-seven, and the average number of visits made daily in every department was one hundred and nineteen. (For details see Table No. III.)

One thousand, eight hundred and twenty Instruments were made during the year in the Manufacturing Department, and five thousand, six hundred and thirty-two were repaired. (See Table No. IV.)

CITY HOSPITAL. The number of patients in the Hospital October 1st, 1907, was forty-eight, and number admitted during the year was two-hundred and fifty-nine. Five patients died and two hundred and forty-nine were discharged improved, leaving in the Hospital October 1st, 1908 fifty-three patients.

The number of days of Hospital care of free patients was seventeen thousand, nine hundred and fifty-four, and for those paying their board two thousand, five hundred and fifty-five, making a total of twenty thousand, five hundred and nine days. We were considerably hampered in the admission of patients to the wards during the winter and spring on account of contagious diseases. In the face of this fact, however, the average daily number of patients in the wards was fifty-six, which is a good showing. Three hundred and thirteen operations were performed, and two hundred and twenty-six patients were operated on. (See Tables No. V and VI.)

For the work in the Pathological Department I refer you to Dr. Warren's report, showing five hundred and ninety-six examinations.

Table (A) gives a record of the Institution's work for the past ten years. It shows the amount of work performed in each department, and the total running expenses of the Institution for each year. The increase in the work during this period, amounting to a very large percentage with a very slight increase in expenses justifies us in expecting the generous support of the public.

COUNTRY BRANCH. The number of patients in the Country Branch October 1st, 1907 was fifty-three, and during the year forty-eight were admitted, and five discharged, leaving ninety-six September 30th, 1908. (See Table No. VII.)

The new pavilions were opened for the reception of patients on July 1st, 1908.

The number of days of free care of patients was twenty thousand, four hundred and sixty-one, and the number of days of pay care three hundred and thirty-six; making a total of twenty thousand, seven hundred and ninety-seven days.

The superintendent has made a report dealing with the Institution in a more detailed way from an administrative standpoint.

The statistical records of the work performed in the various departments of our Institution during the past year does not give one a complete idea of the work as it is really performed day by day in the relief of suffering and the cure of disease. That cannot be appreciated except by close daily contact with the work in its many departments.

One who has such contact must, it seems to me, feel tremendously the necessity and practical value of the work of this Institution.


It is difficult and expensive, as you know, to do an ideal work such as we are doing for these children here and at White Plains, but the money is well spent; for, indeed, the alternative, namely, the neglect of the cripple is one that will not be accepted, and until science discovers some method by which children may be prevented from becoming cripples, society must do what they can to relieve their suffering, and to make them morally strong and industrially efficient.

To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

The past year in the Country Branch has been marked not only by the great improvement in the physical condition of the children, but by the increased interest which has been manifested by the visits of strangers, in the endeavors of the Institution, to benefit the crippled child not only physically, but to give it the educational training which will enable it to take its place among the workers instead of belonging to the dependant class. We have not solved the problem but are advancing in that direction.

The new Pavilions are completed and add greatly to the beauty of the building, and the equipment in machinery will develop the educational feature in a most satisfactory manner.

Much praise is due to the staff for the able manner in which they have brought the Institution into such good working order, under the inconveniences and difficulties incidental to the adding on of the new Pavilions.

We thank the many friends who have shown their interest in the work, by their gifts of books and other articles, and entertainments given for the pleasure of the children.

Report of the Superintendent

of the Country Branch and Industrial School.

* *

To the Trustees of the New York

Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

The work of the Country Branch has grown tremendously during the past year and many new problems are being presented for solution because of the increased number of children made possible by the completion of the two new wings which were opened and ready for occupancy July 1st.

With the addition of the wings having their separate cubicles for each child, a better standard of refined home life can be realized and though the capacity of the hospital has been increased threefold during the past few months, the groups have been kept small as originally and each group is under the immediate charge of a house mother who cares for the home life of the child. The daily care of the cubicle by its occupant, the care of the school and dining-room is an important factor in the development of personal responsibility and obligation in the child.

The school numbers over one hundred children, with five teachers, three academic and two industrial. It has all classes, from the kindergarten to the second year high school, the majority of the children being in the early grammar grades. The academic work, as heretofore, is based on the New York State Regents curriculum, the examinations being taken in White Plains. During the past year, four of our students received certificates for the complete grammar course and are now studying stenography and typewriting, with high school, English, mathematics and history.

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CUBICEL IN NEW PAVILION-COUNTRY BRANCH.

The new quarters offer greater facilities for progress in industrial work. The manual training department being extensively equipped with machinery and benches for wood work, forges for metal work, and the necessary requisites for cobbling. In the near future the Orthopædic instrument shop will offer an opportunity to the boys to put into practice the principles learned in their general manual work.

The sewing department offers a complete course in both hand and machine sewing, giving much attention to textiles, their manufacture and use. Many of the girls, having completed the preparatory courses, are now doing dressmaking.

While we are happy in the extension of the work, the greatest joy is in seeing the marked improvement in the children's physical condition, during the past year many of them taking off their braces for a few hours each day, others taking them off entirely. The fact that some of the children are getting cured and finishing their academic work makes us realize that they are not the same sick children who came to us four and one-half years ago, but sturdy young men and women about to enter the economic field and that soon we will be confronted by the problem of helping each individual to find a congenial means of livelihood.







Our Membership has increased slightly; for though we have had four resignations, seven new members have joined the Guild. We record with sorrow the loss by death of one of our Associate Members, Mrs. Colgate Hoyt.

At an Entertainment consisting of monologues by Miss Beatrice Herford on April 6th, about \$428 was cleared.

Owing to the quarantine on account of contagious diseases at the Hospital during most of the winter, very little visiting could be done. For the same reason our Friday afternoon Sewing Class for the girls in the ward was discontinued after a very few meetings. We hope that this year nothing will prevent our members from taking that personal interest in the children which they need and appreciate very much.

Since March the Guild has employed a woman one day each week to do the mending for the Girls' Wards. She was engaged through Miss Grittenger and her work has been very satisfactory.

A Sewing Circle was organized, consisting of 14 of our members which met at different houses during Lent and made 52 Flannel Shirts for the ward.

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.—"To furnish treatment to the poor with special reference to the Diseases and Deformities of the Spine and the Hip Joints and other of the more serious diseases of the bones and joints requiring surgical and mechanical treatment, and for giving instruction in the same." All cases of deformity, besides those mentioned, including Club foot, Lateral Curvature of the Spine, Infantile Paralysis, Bow-Legs, &c., are received and treated.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE DISPENSARY DEPARTMENT.—Professional services are rendered gratuitously. Those who can afford to do so are expected to re-imburse the Institution for the actual cost of apparatus. Payment for apparatus is received in installments, if required. Apparatus, however, is never *sold* to patients or others—the Institution reserving the right to remove the apparatus and discharge any patient not complying with the directions of the Surgeons. Apparatus will not be supplied in any case that does not come under the immediate care of the Institution.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE HOSPITAL, DEPARTMENT.—Any suitable Orthopædic case between the ages of four and fourteen may be admitted. (Subject to exceptions in special cases.) Board, \$4.00 per week. Application for admission may be made to the Surgeon to the Hospital during the regular Dispensary hours.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.—Application for admission to this Hospital is made through the City Hospital, and only patients who are under treatment at the City Hospital will be admitted to the Country Branch.

THE MEDICAL PROFESSION and the public generally are invited to visit the Institution.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

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To the Trustees and Supervisors of the

New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN;

In reviewing the work and financial situation of the NEW YORK ORTHOPÆDIC DISPENSARY AND HOSPITAL and of the COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL for the year ending September 30th, 1909, we shall follow, somewhat closely, the method of presentation adopted in the last Annual Report, seeing it will serve to keep more distinct and condensed the facts relating to these separate, yet co-operating and jointly managed, Institutions.

There seems to be no call this year for a lengthy report, such as was made last year, since the latter so fully set forth the permanent basis and relation of each Institution, that it is only necessary to note any changes of importance, in their respective positions, during the year under review. Before however, making any comparisons, or drawing any conclusions from the figures and facts respectively submitted by the Treasurer and Surgeonin-Chief in their interesting reports, we desire to invite special attention to one matter of serious consequence to our Dispensary and Hospital work in the City, namely the fact that our present building on 59th Street is wholly inadequate and very poorly adapted to the Dispensary and Hospital work we are now called upon to do. Our patients are not, and cannot be, properly served in our present quarters; and what is accomplished is at a needless and wasteful expenditure of strength and time on the part of our Surgeons and Nurses. It is a situation that calls for prompt and earnest action by the Trustees. The work being done in the Dispensary and Hospital is of such an important and fine quality that we have confidence to believe there are those in

this community who will count it a privilege and pleasure to erect a building suitable to our needs; adequate for the increasing demands upon us; and sufficiently convenient and attractive as to be both a healthful influence upon the patients and an encouragement and inspiration to the Surgeons and Nurses, upon whom so very largely rests the burden and the success of our work. As a step in this direction, we recommend the reference of all the questions involved to a Committee of the Board for consideration, and to report at the stated meeting in February.

NEW YORK ORTHOPÆDIC DISPENSARY & HOSPITAL.

There was a slight falling off the past year in the number of patients treated in the DISPENSARY, and in the number of visits made by patients to the DISPENSARY, and by the Surgeons and Nurses to patients outside, probably due to an effort on the part of the Surgeon-in-Chief to prevent the duplication of treatments by the several Dispensaries. This same tendency is further shown, quite naturally, in the amount charged for use of apparatus. It was a question of better control of patients and of securing improved results. In the CITY HOSPITAL, on the other hand, the work accomplished has been greater and of a broader character.

The financial results of the year have been on the whole gratifying. The income from investments shows an increase over the previous year of \$6,728.46; from free beds, annually endowed \$1,433.33; from donations, \$232.12; and from subscriptions of \$1,311.98—in all \$9,705.89.

As against these increases there were decreases of 601.68, in the receipts for the use of apparatus; and of 125.17 in the receipts for board—in all decreases of 726.85.

The total income from all sources was 50,234.44, and the expenditures, 46,333.09, leaving a balance to the credit for the year of 3,901.35.

We have permanently invested, or awaiting investment, all in guaranteed mortgages bearing $4\frac{1}{2}$, 5 and $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. interest per annum, about \$435,000; and in buildings, \$121,407.23.

COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

This work has made most encouraging and successful progress. On September 30th, 1908, the number of patients was 96, and during the year 48 were admitted, 15 discharged and 2 died; leaving in the Branch and School on September 30th, 1909, 127 patients.

The Balance Sheet remains as reported a year ago. The current expenses were \$50,071.92, amply covered by the Income from its Endowment Fund. This Branch and School have no FINANCIAL connection whatever with the City Dispensary and Hospital, as explained in last year's report.


GENTLEMEN:

Before reviewing the work of the past year, we wish to present our grateful thanks to our friends for the generosity and kindness they have shown us, and express the hope that they will find the means they confided to us put to so good a use that they will feel disposed to continue their interest and assistance.

Our Auxiliary Societies have, as usual, been of invaluable help, giving timely aid when most needed, and carrying on the special works, for which they were organized, with the same thoroughness and devoted care which has always characterized them.

The Orthopædic Guild has as heretofore taken entire charge of one of the Girl's Wards, and supported three Free Beds. The Orthopædic Hospital Sewing Society has kept the linen closet replenished, providing all that is used in the Hospital, with the exception of the above mentioned ward, has supported a Free Bed, and given \$250.00 to the Surgeon-in-Chief to pay for braces needed by patients too poor to pay themselves. The Junior Guild has supported a Free Bed, cared for the second Girl's Ward, giving clothes besides gifts of fruit and flowers, and visiting frequently. The Boy's Guild has under its care in the Boy's Wards, thirty-five patients. They support a Free Bed, also visit frequently and supply many of the minor wants and simple luxuries, which mean so much comfort to the children. These Guilds are doing a most praiseworthy work and it is greatly appreciated.

The Visiting Nurses, whose importance in co-operation with the Surgeon's work in the Dispensary cannot be overestimated, for the vital necessity of not allowing any relapse through neglect after treatment, is too well known to be insisted upon



here, have again been supported through the generosity of three members of our Board, Mrs. Sloane, Mrs. Reid, and Mrs. Story.

When the need for further gymnastic treatment was brought to the attention of the Supervisors with a view to extending that which the generosity of Mr. Chisolm and Miss Caroline White already provided, another member of the Board interested herself in bringing it to Mr. Henry Frick's notice, and he most liberally in reponse, donated the salary of a masseuse. Through this means the surgeon's work is supplemented and cures effected which otherwise could only be partial, and in reporting it we note with great happiness, with heartfelt gratitude and pride, that the efficiency and scope of our beloved institution has again been increased through the efforts of our Board.

The School has been carried on as in the past years, the course of instruction being so arranged, that no patient need lose his place in the Public Schools through enforced absence during treatment. It is entirely supported by special contributions, and we would be very glad to have the interest in it extended. We could do more and better work if we had more money.

The Sunday School has again been under the charge of the kind friends who have interested themselves heretofore in the welfare of our little patients, sowing seed which will surely bring forth fruit in the future, and more sweetness to we know not how many lives.

To provide for extra comforts and simple luxuries for our patients, we have instituted special funds, and to these we beg to call our friends' attention, hoping that they will subscribe to them. Fruit, Ice Cream and the Potato Fund, the latter established to help a large item of our current expenses.

Our Christmas season was as usual made the occasion of much generosity and kindness to all the inmates of our institution. The different Guilds saw to it that each child had its Christmas stocking, Mrs. Sloane and Mrs. Burden gave a toy or doll to each, Miss Whitney gave the beautiful tree as has been her custom for years past, and at which Mr. J. F. Kernochan gives tea to the mothers invited, Miss de Forest gave gifts to the employees, and many others were received, impossible for lack of space to record here, but which were greatly appreciated. To the Society known as the Crippled Children's Driving Fund, we owe a debt of gratitude, for the many drives they gave our patients during the hot summer months, and we are glad to avail ourselves of this opportunity to again tender them our thanks.

At the time of the Hudson-Fulton Celebration, Mrs. Sloane very kindly gave the use of her house to allow the children to see the Parades. Her daughter, Mrs. Burden, gave them a treat of ice cream and cake one day, and candy and flags on the other, sending the same to the bed patients who could not leave the Hospital. On this occasion the Crippled Children's Driving Fund send two omnibuses to take the children to and fro. This is one the many instances of the thoughtful kindness our patients receive.

In concluding our Report, we make our Annual appeal for help to carry on our work. Again we remind the charitable public that this appeal is made in the name of children who suffer, and who can be cured if the means to do it are forthcoming. Surely no plea could be stronger, or object more worthy. Could we but bring its full significance plainly before the minds of the benevolent men and women of our City, we know that all the necessary means would be placed in our hands, and we feel deeply that the responsibility of doing this belongs to us, and year after year we try afresh in the hope that we may be more successful, that if we cannot find the inspired word, at least we may make our cause a little clearer, bring it a little closer to a few more, and so spread the knowledge of it, that some day we may attain our ideal and practical interest in it be universal. SURGEON'S REPORT.

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN :

The number of patients treated in your Dispensary during the year ending September 30th, 1909, was four thousand, four hundred and fifty-two. One thousand, six hundred and thirtysix of these were new patients, and the remainder were patients continued under treatment from last year. Among this number there were five hundred and two cases of Tuberculosis of the Spine, four hundred and eight cases of Tuberculosis of the Hip Joint, and two hundred and five cases of Tubercular Diseases of the smaller joints, making a total of eleven hundred and fifteen cases of Tubercular Diseases. There were three hundred and seventeen cases of Lateral Curvature of the Spine, eight hundred cases of deformities of the foot, seven hundred and forty-nine cases of Infantile Paralysis, one hundred and five cases of Congenital dislocation of the Hip, and the remainder represents a large variety of deforming diseases. (The details of the facts briefly stated are shown in Table No. 1.)

The results of treatment are shown in Table No. 2, and you will there find that five hundred and seventy-five of these patients were discharged cured, three hundred and fifty-seven discharged relieved, one discharged for neglect, eight discharged incurable, twenty-four died, and four hundred and sixty did not return after their first visit, so were discharged leaving three thousand and twenty-seven cases continued for further treatment.

The detail of the work as represented by visits is shown in Table No. 3. Twenty-three thousand and fifty-five visits were made by patients to the Dispensary, three thousand, one hundred and eight visits were made by Surgeons to patients outside the Institution, and eight thousand, two hundred and nine visits were made by Nurses to patients outside the Institution, making in all a total of thirty-four thousand, three hundred and seventy-two visits made during the year. This detail of figures shows more accurately the amount of work performed by your Staff than any other, and it may be noted that each patient visited the Dispensary on an average of six times during the year. If the visits made to them are included, as they should be, they were seen on an average of ten times during the year. The average number of patients visiting the Dispensary daily was seventy-six, and the average number of visits made daily, including those made by Nurses and Surgeons to patients outside the Institution, was one hundred and thirteen. This shows the close attention that was given to each patient, and is most important, as it is not a question of the number of patients treated, but the care given to those who come to us.


In the shop the number of Instruments made was one thousand, seven hundred and forty-four, and the number repaired five thousand, three hundred and sixty-one. The amount charged for the use of apparatus was 6,286.00, and the amount collected from patients for the use of apparatus was 5,424.32, or eighty-six per cent. of the amount charged. (For details see Table No. 4.)

CITY HOSPITAL. The number of patients in the City Hospital on October 1st, 1908, was fifty-three, and during the year two hundred and forty-six were admitted. Two hundred and thirty-three were discharged improved, and three died, leaving in the Hospital September 30th, 1909, sixty-three patients. The number of days of Hospital care for free patients was nineteen thousand, nine hundred and seventeen, and for those paying their board one thousand, six hundred and fifty, making a total of twenty-one thousand, five hundred and sixty-seven. These figures show that the wards were full practically every day in the year, as the average daily number of patients in the wards was fifty-nine. (For details see Table No. 5.)

Table No. 6 shows the operative work in the Hospital. There were three hundred and seventy-one operations performed on two hundred and fifty-five patients. This table shows the wide range of operative work in this Hospital as well as its activities.

The report in the Pathological department is made by Dr. Warren the Pathologist.

COUNTRY BRANCH. The number of patients in the Country Branch on October 1st, 1908, was ninety-six, and during the year forty-eight were admitted, fifteen discharged, and two

died leaving in the Hospital September 30th, 1909, one hundred and twenty-seven patients.

The number of Hospital days of care for free patients was four thousand, two hundred and forty-five, and the number for pay patients one thousand, three hundred and sixty-five, making a total of forty-three thousand, four hundred and ten days care.

DISPENSARY. We have enforced more strict rules as to the reception of patients the past year than ever before. The object being to prevent patients going from one Institution to another, thereby using up the resources of the Institution and failing to get the greatest benefit from treatment. We have declined to receive patients under treatment in other institutions without a request from such institution for us to receive them, or from their family physician. There is, perhaps, some rivalry among the various Institutions to show in their annual report the largest number of patients; I hope that this may discourage such a spirit, as the only spirit of rivalry we need and should have is one in connection with thoroughness of work, and not in the number of patients treated. Besides patients registered in various Institutions give the public an incorrect idea of the number of such patients.

While it is true that equipment is not the most important thing we need in connection with our work, still reasonable equipment makes less difficult the encouragement of a scientific spirit among the workers which is of tremendous importance. It needs no argument to convince anyone who sees our City Hospital and Dispensary that its equipment is inadequate in every particular.

In the Dispensary the rooms are too small, poorly ventilated, and crude in every equipment. If you will visit in the afternoon of an average Dispensary day you will find, as a rule, over one hundred children with their attendants crowded into these rooms in such a way as to make good work difficult, which is very discouraging to those who are attempting to take care of the patients.

In the Hospital while the wards have good light and air their equipment is in every way inadequate.

The operating room, especially in the summer months, is almost unbearable, and at any time is uncomfortable both for the patient and the operator, and its equipment is also crude. The accommodations for the House Staff consists of one very uncomfortable room for two men. It is not only uncomfortable, especially in summer, but it is not fair to force two strangers to occupy the same room. It seems to me that the time has arrived in the history of the Orthopædic Hospital when some definite movement should be put forth to make its quarters reasonably comfortable and adequate for the work we are endeavoring to do. I can assure you that Orthopædic work is in itself difficult enough, but to get men and women to show continued enthusiasm, and to have as a controlling factor in their work high scientific spirit, when they are forced to work at such a tremendous disadvantage, is extremely difficult.

COUNTRY BRANCH. The work at the Country Hospital is progressing in a most satisfactory manner, and has been very successful during the past year both in its surgical aspect, and its educational work.

By a study of Table No. 7 it will be seen how infrequently changes are made in the patients in this Hospital. No child is discharged until all has been done for them surgically and in an educational way to qualify them for useful positions, and in the cases which have been there a sufficient length of time the results we are getting are even more than we anticipated in the beginning of the work.

Table No. 8 shows the amount of work done in the Brace Shop in this Hospital during the year, and is a good beginning of the work which year by year will become a more and more important branch of our industrial training and of economical value to the Institutiou.



REPORT FROM THE COUNTRY BRANCH.

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

The Country Branch is steadily developing the details of its administration, and the difficult problem of combining the medical side of the work and the educational, without allowing one side to predominate, thus failing in the desired results, has been happily avoided, and it is certainly a matter for rejoicing to see the wonderful results that have been effected by the medical skill and constant study, so that results have been obtained that ten years ago would have been pronounced impossible.

The boys are doing very well in carpentering as is evidenced by the bungalow that they have built, and in work done in the manual training room, and several of them passed a very creditable examination at the State's Regent at White Plains.

Several of the girls have also done well at the Regent's examination, and we are endeavoring to give them an education that will enable them to become teachers and stenographers, but we also desire to give them the training in sewing that will fit them to make all their own clothes, and in the cooking classes are being taught not only how to cook, but also the price of food, and its proper selection, and they are lamentably ignorant in all such matters, and we do not desire to neglect that part of a girls training that will make her useful in the home.

We regret to report the resignation of Miss McDonald, whose executive ability and great interest in the work, has done much to carry it through successfully in its early history, and she has endeavored to give the new Superintendent, Mr. Burr, all the help that her experience could give him in the details of the work, and we wish her all possible happiness in her new life.

Mr. Harris has also resigned and is succeeded by Mr. Bayne, and we desire to express the satisfaction which has been felt in Mr. Harris' teaching of the boys in the manual training department, as he never permitted any careless work, and always endeavored to exact obedience and inculcate right principles.

We wish to express our hearty thanks for the increasing interest that is being shown in the Institution, by the gift of books and other articles, and the many efforts that have been made to give the children pleasure in various ways, illustrated lectures, gramophone, entertainments and concerts, and tag day brought them automobile rides.

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
To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN :

It was my privilege to become Superintendent of the Country Branch on August 1st of this year. In taking up the new duties it is gratifying to find that the work is progressing in a satisfactory manner and that the opportunity for service is large. The general health is excellent, the spirit of co-operation among the staff is every where evident and the responsibilities cheerfully assumed by the children exceed by far those undertaken by children of the same age in private life. Some of the duties consist of work in the dining rooms, laundry, cubicles and school rooms.

The average number of patients during the past year has been 119 and the average age of those in the hospital on September 30, 1909, was 11.3 years. On the same day there were 127 patients in the hospital, 115 of whom were in attendance at school.

The school work is good and steadily improving. The industrial and commercial side of the work is somewhat different than that in public school courses in that practical application of the principles taught is furnished by work for the hospital in repairing wood-work, mending clothes and linen, covering braces and in office work. The graded school work follows generally the courses outlined by the New York State Education Department. To supplement this work the children are also given courses in manual training, sewing and cooking. Upon the



completion of the elementary school work the child's whole time is spent in cabinet making, wood-turning, dress making or stenography and typewriting. Five hours a day are spent by the older children in school work.

The brace shop recently installed is not yet in full working order, although it now makes all the new braces needed here and repairs all broken ones. It is furnished with the latest patterns of machinery and is equipped to do the most perfect work in the construction of orthopædic apparatus.

The past summer has seen a great change in the grounds. They have been laid out, graded and planted with shrubs and small trees. Two play-grounds for the boys and girls are included in the plan.

The number of visitors at the Country Branch during the year indicates an increasing interest in the work we are doing. Several inspections have been made by those contemplating similar work in different parts of the country. Many are now looking to us for definite results. Children are being cured, educated and discharged, fitted, we think, to meet life's duties. How practical and efficient our work is can only be estimated in the light of the children's ability to contribute to the world's work and service. To the accomplishment of this end our whole attention is directed.







Apparatus, however, is never *sold* to patients or others—the Institution reserving the right to remove the apparatus and discharge any patient not complying with the directions of the Surgeons. Apparatus will not be supplied in any case that does not come under the immediate care of the Institution.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE HOSPITAL, DEPARTMENT.—Any suitable Orthopædic case between the ages of four and fourteen may be admitted. (Subject to exceptions in special cases.) Board, \$4.00 per week. Application for addmission may be made to the Surgeon to the Hospital during the regular Dispensary hours.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.—Application for admission to this Hospital is made through the City Hospital, and only patients who are under treatment at the City Hospital will be admitted to the Country Branch.

THE MEDICAL PROFESSION and the public generally are invited to visit the Institution.



PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

* *

To the Trustees and Supervisors of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

It is extremely gratifying to be able to report that the work and financial situation of both the NEW YORK ORTHOPÆDIC DISPENSARY AND HOSPITAL, and the COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL, SCHOOL, for the year ending September 30th, 1910, have continued to show encouraging progress, whether we consider the character and amount of the work accomplished in their independent, yet supplemental relations, or their distinct positions in the matter of Real Property, Endowment Funds and Income.

The fact that both of these Institutions have had their difficulties to contend with, their decreases or increases in various items of Income and of Operation, and have need of still greater facilities and funds, does not subtract from the statement that, on the whole, they have made encouraging progress during the past year.

The vital question, after all, is whether the work of these Institutions has been of such a character as to secure valuable results to their suffering patients and to commend it more than ever, to those whose generous contributions, either of selfsacrificing effort or of funds, have made the work possible. It is from both of these directions that the encouragements of the year have come, and will continue to come, we predict, if these Institutions continue manifestly to render efficient and selfsacrificing service to humanity. Let us briefly consider the work and financial situation of each.

NEW YORK ORTHOPÆDIC DISPENSARY & HOSPITAL.

The statement and appeal made in our last Annual Report, in regard to the urgent need of a new Dispensary and Hospital, have already produced generous responses, but not sufficient in amount to justify the Trustees in proceeding with the project. Subscriptions to the extent of \$75.000 have been received, but a further sum of at least \$250,000 will be required. In the confidence that this additional sum will be secured, the Trustees have been giving much thought and attention to the details of the project, so that no time may be lost in providing a suitable and adequate Dispensary and Hospital whenever the necessary funds shall have been contributed. For the additional sum required we make a further earnest appeal.

The following statistics set forth very clearly the work done by the Dispensary and Hospital the past year, those at the Dispensary being especially noteworthy, as last year there was a slight falling off in the number of patients treated in the Dispensary and in the number of visits made by surgeons and nurses to patients outside :

The financial results show a decrease of income in 1910, as compared with 1909, of \$5,416.05, almost equivalent to the falling off in donations; and an increase in expenses over 1909, of \$3.026.03, mainly due to the increased expenditures for Apparatus, Material and Wages, and to the increase of wages paid to Matron, Nurses and Servants. The Expenses exceeded the Income by \$4,540,73; and the cash balance carried forward to the new year is \$6,686.85, as against a cash balance a year ago of \$11,227.58. The Resources show an increase over those of 1909, of \$72,694.71, largely due to the fund subscribed towards the new building.

COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

This work has shown a substantial advance in efficiency and and favorable results. t has assumed its own independent and important place in our general scheme, and its future is of the brightest, viewed from its promised helpfulness to the work in which we are engaged.

The number of resident patients is 131, an increase of 4 over the last year. The Resources and Liabilities are the same as a year ago. The Receipts were \$55,072.34 and the Disbursements \$57,083.79. It is an endowed Institution, and it is the intention of the Trustees to keep its expenses well within its income.

In referring you for more complete information to the accompanying reports of the Surgeon-in-Chief, of the Treasurer and of the Board of Supervisors, the Management take very great pleasure in expressing their high appreciation of the valuable services they have each, in their respective spheres, contributed to the efficiency and value of the work done.

SUPERVISORS' REPORT.

To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

In presenting our Annual Report, we are gratified to again record a successful year, and to those benefactors whose liberality assured it and enabled us to carry on the work of our Board satisfactorily we extend our grateful thanks.

In the foremost rank among these we are happy to count our Auxiliary Societies, who so nobly fulfill the hopes we held when they were instituted. As the years have passed their number and sphere of usefulness have increased almost beyond expectation, until it has become our duty as well as our pleasure, to acknowledge how great an obligation we owe to their energy and enthusiasm.

The Senior Society, the Orthopædic Guild, has supported four beds, taken charge of the Girls' Ward, which includes all supplies, and many luxuries for its use, also visiting the patients. The Orthopædic Hospital Sewing Society has supplied the household linen for the Institution, a large item in our current expenses thus being saved, has supported a Free Bed, has made a donation of \$250.00 to be used in providing braces for patients too poor to buy them, and another donation of \$200.00 to the Fruit and Vegetable Fund. The Junior Guild has supported a Free Bed, given \$150.00 to the Endowment Fund and \$140.00 to the Fruit and Vegetable Fund. The Boys' Guild has supported a Free Bed and given donations of \$50.00 to the Ice Cream Fund and \$25.00 for potatoes. This list of benefactions, seven free beds supported and many donations of money, besides all those in kind too numerous too enumerate here, proves as we said above, that we cannot speak too warmly of the service these societies render our Institution.

The Visiting Nurses' Salaries were met through the generosity of the same ladies who have been responsible for the amount in the past years, Mrs. W. D. Sloane, Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, Mrs. Frederic Vanderbilt and Mrs. A. Murray Young. It is needless for us to dwell on the importance of this branch of our work, it is an indispensable adjunct to the Surgeon's care of the Dispensary patients, perfecting cures where his treatment might otherwise have been wasted through either ignorance or neglect.

The Gymnasium and Treatment for Lateral Curvature of the Spine have been continued with most encouraging success. The three teachers, we owe to Mr. Chisolm, Miss Caroline White, and Mr. Frick, are busy in attendance every day, and we wish that the room were more adequate, lack of space hampers us severely, and prevents the benefit being extended to many who need it sorely.

The School, for whose existence our Board must be solely responsible, but for which we feel very strongly the necessity, as it enables the children to take their places in the Public School when they leave us, was continued and we trust that our friends will kindly contribute to its support as in the past. It is an expense which we feel the result justifies, and a benefit we should deeply regret being obliged to deny.

The Sunday School has been carried on by the kind friends who undertook the work years ago, and we are glad again to express our thanks to them. Their efforts to bring sweet and ennobling influences into the minds and hearts of the children, and their admirable devotion to the cause are deeply appreciated.

We beg to call attention to our special Funds, of great value to us in reducing our heavy housekeeping expenses and in providing simple luxuries and comforts for our patients. We call them Ice Cream, Fruit and Vegetable or Potato Funds and the names explain their object. In days gone by we had one for Park Drives, but that has been rendered unnecessary by the kindness of the Crippled Children's Driving Association who take our children to the Park and give them long delightful drives during the hot summer months.

The patients had a beautiful Christmas celebration, a large tree being given, as usual, by Miss Whitney, at which Mr. J. F. Kernochan gave presents of tea to the mothers. Mrs. Sloane and Mrs. Burden gave toys or dolls to each child, the different Guilds gave stockings, Miss de Forest gifts to the employees, and enumerable others were received and distributed. Christmas at the Hospital goes far towards making the memory of their stay a happy, instead of a painful one to many.

During the past year we have sustained a great loss by the death of our beloved Vice-President, Miss Eweretta C. Whitney, for many years an honored member of the Board of Supervisors, and the dear friend of all who were her associates. This sad event has been recorded in its minutes by the Board of Supervisors, as follows :

"The Board of Supervisors of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital having learned of the death, on the eighth day of May, 1910, of Miss Eweretta Constable Whitney, directed the following minute to be inscribed on its records and a copy sent to her bereaved relatives :--

MINUTE

In recording the departure from this life on the eighth day of May, 1910, of Miss Eweretta Constable Whitney, the Board of Supervisors desires to express the deep grief which every member feels in the loss of their beloved fellow member endeared to them by years of mutual labor in the cause of poor crippled children.

Miss Whitney joined the Board in 1881 and continuously served as Supervisor for twenty-nine years. In 1893 she became its Vice-President and filled that office to the end. She ever contributed to its success by her generous gifts, by her wise judgment and her enthusiasm in its cause. She saw it rise from the day of small things to its present development of usefulness. During all its history she never faltered in her supreme faith in its future, and she lived to see many of her hopes and prayers fulfilled and answered. But her great work was rendered as Chairman of the Free Bed Committee, which position she held from 1882 until 1908, when her health compelled her retirement.

She never regarded this position as one of form. She made herself acquainted with the occupants, from time to time, of each bed, often visited the patients, and by her gentle, loving Christian sympathy partly alleviated their sufferings, and often doubtless prolonged their lives. Her's was the highest class of ministry as expressed in our Lord's words :---

> "Whosoever shall receive one of such children in My Name receiveth Me."

Her loss to the Institution seems irreparable, but her spirit and example will for many years to come, exert their influence.

This is not the time or place for the individual members to express, even if words could be found, their personal sorrow. They hope to show by their future devotion to the cause she loved, the affection they had for her.

The Board then resolved to attend the funeral in a body."

We conclude our report with an earnest appeal to our friends and benefactors to help us to widen their circle. The work of our Institution is constantly growing, the demands for our care steadily increase. The support we have had in the past promises well for the future, but undiminished efforts on the part of all will be necessary to meet our need. Accomplishment, means relief from suffering, cure of painful deformity, the transformation of a helpless cripple, a sad charge and burden, into a useful member of the family. Is not the cause worthy of our tenderest compassion and sympathy, our best endeavors, shall we plead in vain?

SURGEON'S REPORT.

* *

To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

The number of patients treated in the Dispensary during the year ending September 30th, 1910, was four thousand, nine hundred and ninety-six, of this number, one thousand, nine hundred and twenty-nine were new patients, and the remaining three thousand and sixty-seven, were patients continued under treatment from last year. Among this number there were five hundred and thirteen cases of Tuberculosis of the spine, four hundred and thirty-six cases of Tuberculosis of the hip joint, two hundred and thirteen cases of Tuberculosis of the smaller joints, making a total of one thousand, one hundred and sixty-two cases of joint Tuberculosis. Four hundred and forty-two Non-Tuberculosis deformities of the spine, seven hundred and fortyeight cases of Flat Foot, four hundred and seventeen cases of Knock-Knee and Bow-Legs, and nine hundred and thirty-two cases of Infantile Paralysis, and the remainder represent a very large variety of diseased Deformities.

The details of these facts appear in Table I. As compared to the work of last year, there is an increase of five hundred and forty-four patients.

The results of treatment, as may be seen in Table II are as follows: Four hundred and thirty-eight patients were discharged cured, five hundred and seventy-six were discharged relieved, making a total of one thousand, one hundred and fourteen who had received such benefit that they required no further treatment. Two patients were discharged for neglect, fourteen as incurable and six hundred and nineteen received no treatment after the first visit, and three thousand, three hundred and twenty-six were continued for further treatment.

The detail of the work as represented by visits, is shown in Table III. There were twenty-five thousand, one hundred and twenty-two visits made by patients to the Dispensary. Two thousand, seven hundred and forty were made by Surgeons, to patients outside the Institution. Eight thousand, eight hundred and two visits were made by nurses to patients at their homes, making a total of thirty-six thousand, six hundred and sixty-four, an increase of two thousand, two hundred and ninety-two.

SHOP. The number of new Instruments made was, one thousand, eight hundred and eighty-three, and the number repaired, five thousand, five hundred and forty-four. The amount charged for appliances was \$7,769.60, and the amount collected from patients was, \$6,049.96. Details of this work appear in Table IV.

CITY HOSPITAL. The number of patients in this Hospital on October 1st, 1909, was sixty, and during the year two hundred and seventy-three were admitted, and two hundred and seventyseven discharged, leaving fifty-six on October 1st, 1910. The number of days of Hospital care for free patients was seventeen thousand, three hundred and eighty, the number for pay patients one thousand, eight hundred and two, making a total of nineteen thousand, one hundred and eighty-two. The details appear in Table V.

Table VI shows the Operative work. There were three hundred and twenty-two operations performed on two hundred and twenty-six patients.

The opening of a small adult ward for women, in this Hospital this year, was a new departure in our work and has offered us an opportunity to be of great service to a class of patients for which we have heretofore had no Hospital accommodations. Among the total number of patients in the Hospital, twenty-five were of this class, ranging in age from 15 to 48. The large percentage being younger women.

COUNTRY BRANCH. There were one hundred and twenty-seven patients on October 1st, 1909, and during the year, twelve were admitted and twenty-three discharged cured. Two were removed by their parents, and one died, leaving on September 30th, 1910, one hundred and thirteen. The total number of free days care, was forty thousand, six hundred and eighty-nine, and the number of pay days, three thousand, eight hundred and seventy-three, making a total of forty-four thousand, five hundred and sixty-two. The average number of patients during the year was, one hundred and twenty-two. The average age of patients was, 11.7 years.


As has already been noted, we discharged, last year from the Country Branch, twenty-three patients cured. That is significant from several points of view. First, because it means that twentythree children have been cured of joint tuberculosis and restored to a normal situation in life. Those old enough with an education, which enables them to earn a living, and the younger ones, back to the normal life of children of their age.

It is true that it has taken several years to accomplish this, but the encouraging fact is that the length of time required to accomplish a cure is diminishing very materially. Because as the work progresses, and the people know about it and have confidence in it, we are able to get children in the beginning of the disease, the time when such treatment and care as they get, is so effective.


People are beginning to know now the possibilities of Joint Tuberculosis crippling a child, while in the beginning of our work they waited until the child was crippled, thus losing the opportune moment. Getting such cases early in life and disease, will have an important bearing on our educational work as time goes on, because it will eliminate in some measure the necessity of so much industrial education. All of which means that during the next ten years of the development of that work there will be a gradual diminution up to a certain point, of the cost to the Institution, of curing each patient. No argument can be any longer necessary to convince one of the necessity for such work as this, when the fact that in our City Institution alone, last year one thousand, one hundred and sixty-two cases of Joint Tuberculosis were seen. The influence of our Institution in a broader sense is shown by the fact that its work is setting the standard for similar Institutions throughout the country and abroad.

REPORT FROM THE COUNTRY BRANCH.

To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

The work of the Country Branch during the last year has been very satisfactory, as many children have left the Institution perfectly cured, and are earning their living in various positions, and some are showing great adaptibility as typists and stenographers; it has been and will continue to be a problem what kind of work a cripple is best fitted to do, but I hope that we will gradually be able to give them, the necessary education, without wasting efforts in too many directions.

It is with great pleasure that I refer to the interest shown by the medical profession in the Country Branch, and the high encomiums passed upon the work, as the methods of treating Orthopædic diseases there has been pronounced by competent authorities as far in advance of similar Institutions in Europe, and it is to the skill and unwearied interest of the Surgeon-in-Chief that we owe this result.

The Hospital was obliged last winter to grapple with an outbreak of Scarlet fever, and great praise is due to Staff and servants, for the admirable manner in which they adapted themselves to the situation.

The new arrangement of turning one of the wards into servants rooms will meet a great want, and the changing another ward into an isolation ward, will enable the Hospital to have much better facilities for meeting any outbreak there might be of a contagious nature.

There have been but few changes in the Staff, and their harmonious working together has been productive of excellent results, as they all evince great interest and conscientious efforts in the discharge of their duties.

Report of the Superintendent

of the Country Branch and Industrial School.

To the Trustees of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

The year just closed at the Country Branch was one of the most important in its history. The definite results looked for during the past were realized, when twenty-three patients were discharged as cured. All but one or two of these cases have gone to live under home conditions better than those from which they came and are either in school or working at something for which we have prepared them.

During the year we have had an average of 122 patients, whose average age was 11.7 years. Of this number 112 were in daily attendance at school. The hospital furnished 40,689 free days care and 3,873 pay days care.

The several departments into which the administration of the Hospital is divided are working in harmony and rendering efficient service. The medical and surgical side of our work as reported by the Surgeon-in-Chief, shows even better results than were expected. The home and school side of the child's life continues to be as helpful as in the past. The high character of our nursing staff does much toward creating and maintaining a wholesome home atmosphere. The school is well unified and supervised, so that its work compares favorably with the best public schools. In all our industrial work we have endeavored to undertake few things and to do those few well. We continue courses in cabinet making, wood-turning, sewing, dress making, cooking, typewriting and stenography, in addition to the regular school work. In no sense do we think that the Hospital should guarantee the child's preparation for life, yet we endeavor in every way possible to make his stay with us so profitable, that his disease has through us become a blessing. No more patients are being admitted than may be properly cared for under this policy.

In addition to the generous list of gifts to the hospital, it is fitting to mention the new X-ray apparatus furnished by Miss Watson. This has been needed for some time and has been found to be excellent in every particular. With it complete radiographic records of our cases will be made. We are deeply indebted to those who remembered us during the year and are pleased to note that the number is increasing.







OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.—" To furnish treatment to the poor with special reference to the Diseases and Deformities of the Spine and the Hip Joints and other of the more serious diseases of the bones and joints requiring surgical and mechanical treatment, and for giving instruction in the same." All cases of deformity, besides those mentioned, including Club Foot, Lateral Curvature of the Spine, Infantile Paralysis, Bow-Legs, &c., are received and treated.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE DISPENSARY DEPARTMENT.—Professional services are rendered gratuitously. Those who can afford to do so are expected to re-imburse the Institution for the actual cost of apparatus. Payment for apparatus is received in installments, if required. Apparatus, however, is never *sold* to patients or others- the Institution reserving the right to remove the apparatus and discharge any patient not complying with the directions of the Surgeons. Apparatus will not be supplied in any case that does not come under the immediate care of the Institution.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE HOSPITAL, DEPARTMENT.—Any suitable Orthopædic case between the ages of four and fourteen may be admitted. (Subject to exceptions in special cases.) Board, \$4.00 per week. Application for admission may be made to the Surgeon to the Hospital during the regular Dispensary hours.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.—Application for admission to this Hospital is made through the City Hospital, and only patients who are under treatment at the City Hospital will be admitted to the Country Branch.

THE MEDICAL PROFESSION and the public generally are invited to visit the Institution.

THE INSTITUTION is supported by the contributions of the benevolent. Contributions, which are earnestly solicited, may be sent to the Treasurer.

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
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PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

* *

To the Trustees and Supervisors of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

In view of the very comprehensive reports of the Surgeon-in-Chief, of the Board of Supervisors, of the Superintendent, of the Chairman of the Country Branch and Industrial School Committee, and of the other departments, which fully set forth the different phases of the work accomplished the past year; and in view also of the statements of the Treasurer, giving the Income and Expenses and the Resources and Liabilities of the City Dispensary and Hospital and of the Country Branch, it seems unnecessary to do more than to invite your careful attention to their unusually interesting and instructive contents, and, especially, to emphasize any valuable general suggestions that may be gathered therefrom. As a whole, these several reports completely present the work and financial condition of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital and of the Country Branch and Industrial School, for the year ending September 30th, 1911.

Almost all departments of the work show increased activity and growth, and a greater and more intelligent interest on the part of those responsible for their development. This statement is borne out by the following items taken from these reports, namely: the greater number and increasingly recognized value of the visits made by the surgeons and nurses to patients in their homes; the small number of deaths, owing to the comparatively non-malignant nature of the diseases treated; the tendency to treat patients of more advanced ages, to their advantage; the good work done in the Brace Shop, and the very creditable revenue therefrom; the new and noteworthy operation for humpback, with its attendant success and promise; the proposed reorganization of the medical and surgical staffs; the excellent results accomplished by the various guilds, societies and nurses under direction of the Board of Supervisors; the Superintendent's efforts to reorganize the several departments under his care, with a view to greater co-operation and efficiency; the need of an increase of visiting nurses; and the Superintendent's new cottage at the Country Branch.

The work done was larger, but, inasmuch as there was no improvement in the conditions under which it was performed, and no increase of workers, it was accomplished under greater difficulties. More particularly was this true of the Dispensary work, which is so pre-eminently important in our scheme of service. Nevertheless, no movement was made in the direction of securing funds for a new City Dispensary and Hospital, as it was thought prudent to postpone further action until certain important questions such as location, etc., could be more wisely determined; but, impatient as we were of any delay in this direction, we felt satisfied it would really prove, if brief, a gain of time in the end. The solicitation of funds for a new and greatly needed Dispensary and Hospital has, therefore, waited upon the selection of a suitable site. This, however, is a matter too pressing to be much longer delayed.

This hasty review of the surgical and medical work actually accomplished and suggested, makes it evident that the main purposes for which the City Dispensary and Hospital and the Country Branch exist—namely, the alleviation of suffering and the promotion of cures among the sorely afflicted—were distinctly promoted.

Turning now to the financial results of the year, it may be briefly stated that the expenses of the New York Orthopædic Dispensary and Hospital exceeded its income by \$4,749.91, notwithstanding the fact that the income from all sources was \$6,771.74 greater than in the previous year. This was owing to the large increase in expenses for the year, namely, \$6,980.95. Had the donations not shown an increase of \$4,952.23, the result would have been even less favorable, as the subscriptions fell off \$1,047. This decrease in subscriptions makes clear the necessity of securing a larger number of subscribers and of supplementing our income in other ways, since the increase in expenses is due to the enlargement of the work and not to extravagance in the management. We must, however, put forth every effort to keep our expenses as low as may be consistent with the highest efficiency. Fortunately, we had a surplus of \$6,686.85 the previous year, which enabled us to meet the \$4,749.94 excess of expenses over income, and still close the year with a small surplus of \$1,936.91. The resources of the City Dispensary and Hospital show an increase of \$26,998.00 over a year ago, which is an encouraging feature. This increase in resources or assets is apportioned as follows:

COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

This institution is proving more and more a valuable auxiliary to the City Dispensary and Hospital, as it takes up and completes the curative work so well begun in the City. It has had a busy and useful year and shown a better understanding of the problems committed to it. Its income has taken care of its expenses, though by too narrow a margin. An effort should be made to reduce its expenses, and so provide a safe yearly surplus, and this should be a fixed policy. The resources are practically the same as last year.

Through the continued generosity of Miss Emily A. Watson, a very comfortable cottage has been erected on the grounds for the use of our superintendent. This additional convenience is most highly appreciated both by him and by the Board, and their mutual thanks are extended to Miss Watson therefor.

Again the management take very great pleasure in expressing their high appreciation of the painstaking and valuable services rendered by all those associated with them in this beneficent work.

SUPERVISOR'S REPORT.

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

Gentlemen:

We have the honor to present the annual report of the Board of Supervisors.

While outwardly uneventful, the past year has been rich in results, for which we are profoundly thankful, and which cheer and stimulate us to fresh efforts in the future. From the cases in our adult ward alone could be cited instance after instance which would be the strongest incentive to do our utmost in the cause of our Hospital. Such inspiration is irresistible, and our best endeavors are again pledged to its success.

The undiminished interest and generosity of our auxiliary societies has been the source of great gratification. We are always glad of this annually recurring opportunity to acknowledge our debt to them and to express our thanks, this year no less than ever.

The Senior Society, the Orthopædic Guild, has again been responsible for the support of four free beds and taken charge of the Girls' Ward, which means giving all supplies and many luxuries. The Orthopædic Hospital Sewing Society has provided all the linen for the Hospital, which would otherwise have been a heavy item of expense to us, has given a free bed, and \$100 for braces for poor patients. The Junior Guild has supported a free bed, given \$100 to the Potato Fund, and \$30 for ice cream and fruit. The Boys' Guild has also supported a free bed, and gave \$25 to the Potato Fund, and \$50 for ice cream and fruit. Reference to the individual reports of these societies will show that space allows only a portion of our indebtedness to be mentioned here, that numerous other donations have been most generously given.

The salaries of the four visiting nurses have been met by subscriptions from the same ladies to whose generosity and interest the Hospital owes this important branch of its work, three of them members of our Board, Mrs. W. D. Sloan, Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, Mrs. Frederic R. Vanderbilt, and Mrs. A. Murray Young. We wish we could find benefactors to give at least two more. The usefulness of the Dispensary is enormously extended by this means, not allowing the patients to lose the benefit of their treatment, often assuring their cure.

The gymnasium where the treatment for lateral curvature of the spine is conducted with such wonderful success, also again owes its existence to individual generosity, the salaries of its three teachers being paid by Mr. Chisolm, Mr. Frick, and Miss Caroline White.

Our school for the maintenance of which we most earnestly solicit contributions, considering it a very important feature of our work, as it enables the patients to keep their places in the public schools, has been carried on with success, and we feel sure that our friends will appreciate our anxiety that it should continue.

The Sunday School was continued owing to the kind interest of those friends who have in the past given their services. We are glad to avail ourselves of this opportunity to express our sincere thanks for their unremitting attention.

Our Special Funds are always of great interest, as we depend upon them for simple luxuries and extra comforts for the patients and they assist us largely with our housekeeping. Their names explain their object: Ice Cream, Fruit and Potato or Vegetable Funds. We no longer need one for Park Drives, as in the past, for the Crippled Children's Driving Fund takes our patients twice a week to the Park in hot weather, an inestimable advantage and a privilege they greatly enjoy.

Christmas Day was made happy by a beautiful tree, given in memory of our beloved Miss Whitney, whose annual gift it was for so many years, by Mr. and Mrs. Frederic Kernochan. Their kindness was deeply appreciated. The children had many presents as well. Mrs. Sloane gave a beautiful toy to each, the different Guilds gave stockings, Miss de Forest gifts to the employees and numberless others were received to the great pleasure of all.

Each year we are obliged to call upon the public for aid to

support our institution, yet we know that there are thousands of people in our city who would gladly give us the money required, even at the cost of sacrifice to themselves, were the needs of our Hospital brought clearly before them. It is to do this that we beg the help of our friends, to spread the knowledge of what is done, and to make known how much more could be achieved were the means at hand; we are confident that were this accomplished there would be no need for further plea. Α visit to our Dispensary would be a far more eloquent appeal than any other could be, but we realize that for many this is impossible, and therefore we must try to carry our Dispensary to them, and put before them as best we are able just what we are appealing for. To relieve excruciating pain, often of years' duration, and the suffering of children, sometimes to transform minds which are crooked or undeveloped, because of crooked or undeveloped bodies, into normal, healthy ones, to make useful citizens of helpless charges, capable of bearing their part in the work of the community instead of adding to its burdens. What wonder that our hearts should burn with enthusiasm and that we should long to communicate it to those who do not share it only because they do not know as we do what possibilities exist.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

At the beginning of the Hospital year, the buildings were in a bad state of repair and very crowded. Such repairs as were necessary have been made, and as much as possible has been done to relieve the conjested conditions of the Hospital and Dispensary. By your action fire escapes have been installed in the rear of the Nurses' Home; fire escapes have been repaired and improved on the rear of the Hospital building and such improvements as were recommended by Ex-Fire Chief Edward F. Croker have been completed.

The several departments of the Hospital are working harmoniously and with an increasing co-operation we are pleased to observe an increasing efficiency. In an effort to improve the hospital and dispensary records we have adopted a complete but simple system which is satisfactorily fulfilling our peculiar needs.

The continuous increase in the work done in the hospital and dispensary emphasises the limited space in which it is done. The larger work done in the dispensary has developed a larger field of work for our visiting nurses whose time is wholly spent in the homes of dispensary patients supplementing the work of the dispensary surgeons. An increase in this staff is very much needed.

COUNTRY BRANCH:

One-third of the number of patients in the Hospital at the beginning of the year have been discharged cured. This number is larger than the preceding year, and is the largest number discharged cured during any one year. There continues, however, a great demand for admission to the Country Branch. The rapid cures effected during the past two years have introduced a new aspect to our work. Younger children have been admitted than formerly and with their coming the character of the school work has changed so that it more nearly conforms with the average public school work than in preceding years. Emphasis is still placed, however, on manual training, sewing, and cooking, and thorough courses in these branches are given in addition to the grammar school work.

At the reunion at the Hospital in June, forty-one cured cases returned for the day, and it was learned from them that all of the boys and girls discharged as cured during the preceding years were either attending public school or earning their own living. This result justifies the wisdom of the policy under which the Hospital is operated, as it indicates the permanent value of our work in preparing children to take their normal place in life.

In the development of such an institution proper organization of the several departments is necessary and important, by far the more important is the consideration of the individuality of each child. Due regard for the development of that individuality is taken when selection is made of our house mothers, teachers, and nurses. In this respect we have been most fortunate in securing for these positions women whose character and ideals justify the conviction that we are doing our work well.

A larger number of people than ever before are showing an interest in our work by gifts and by interest in individual patients. We are deeply indebted to these friends for the variation that they have brought into the lives of those who are necessarily detained here for a long time. It has been a source of continual pleasure to the Staff to have Miss Watson visit us frequently. Her deep interest in the Hospital at all times stimulates the enthusiasm of our workers.



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A REUNION, JUNE 10, 1911, WITH THE CURED PATIENTS

SURGEON'S REPORT

* *

To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

Gentlemen:

During the year ending September 30, 1911, the total number of patients treated in the Dispensary was 5,345. This is an increase of 349 patients over that of last year, or a 7% increase. Of this number 1,196 had joint tuberculosis; 472 non-tubercular deformities of the spine; 1,024 deformities of the feet; 384 bow-lew or knock-knee, and 1,005 infantile paralysis, leaving a balance of 1,264 cases of various deformities all belonging to an Orthopædic clinic. For details see Table No. 1. Table No. 2 shows the result of the treatment. 364 were discharged cured; 332 discharged relieved, making a total of 696 restored to useful positions in the community. 22 died, and 4,140 were continued for further treatment. I would especially call your attention to the few deaths as indicating the comparative non-malignancy of the diseases treated in our Institution. Visits to the Dispensary and in the care of these patients is shown in Table No. 3. There were 24,918 visits to the Dispensary; 9,035 visits were made by nurses to patients at their homes, and 4,818 visits made to patients outside the Institution by surgeons, making a total of 38,771, an increase over last year of 2,107. I would call your attention especially to the number of visits outside the Institution, which is a feature of our work most valuable, because in this way we carry to patients outside the Hospital in a measure, Hospital treatment, thus saving to the Institution, Hospital care for many who would otherwise be compelled to occupy a bed in the Wards.

It is interesting also to note the ages of the patients treated. 665 were above twenty years of age; 449 over thirty; 139 from fifteen to twenty; 244 from ten to fifteen; 325 from five to ten, and 258 from three to five. Under three years of age there were 347. It has always been known that a large number of our patients are children, but it is possibly not as well known that 1,114 were above twenty years of age.

Brace Shop:—The total number of new instruments made in the shop was 1,905. The number repaired 5,881. The amount charged for apparatus to patients was 6,873, and the amount collected from patients was 5,447. This item is significant as it really is a contribution of over 5,000 from the patients themselves to the Institution, and in proportion to their incomes is in my judgment very generous, as you know they are all poor.

City Hospital:—The total number of patients treated in this Hospital was 368. 304 were discharged relieved; one died, and 63 were continued October I, 1911. The total number of days of free care was 21,954. The number of days of care paid for by the patients 1,223, making a total of 23,177. The average number of patients per day in the wards for the year was 63. The total number of operations performed was 407. As compared to last year there is a gain of 45 in the number of patients treated in the wards, and in operations a gain of 85, which is a gain of 14% in cases and 26% in operations.

Country Branch—The number of patients treated in this Hospital during the year was 158. 39 patients were discharged cured; 4 were dismissed for various reasons, and one died, leaving 114 on October 1, 1911. The number of days of free care was 39,384. The number of days of pay care, 2,719, making a total of 42,103. The average number of patients during the year was 115. The average age of these patients, ten years. The work in this Hospital as compared to last year, shows also a very encouraging increase. The number treated last year was 157, and the number discharged cured was 23. It is obvious therefore, that we are beginning to get results there, and what is more encouraging is the fact that we are getting them in a much shorter time, because we are able to get the children earlier in life as well as, and this is of great importance, earlier in the course of their disease. The need of such a Hospital is evidenced by the fact which was noted above that we treated in our Dispensary 1,196 cases of joint tuberculosis. A large percentage of these cases should be in such a Hospital, as it is the only way to get good results.

It is obvious from the foregoing that the need of a new Hospital, modern and adequate in equipment, increases from year to year. I hope we will soon see such a building.

It is with deep regret and sorrow that the Board of Trustees learns of the death of its former President and senior member of the Board, Mr. O. EGERTON SCHMIDT. Mr. Schmidt was a contemporary member of the Board with Mr. Howard Potter, Mr. Theodore Roosevelt and other founding members of the Institution. He succeeded Mr. Potter as President in 1890, when the latter resigned in order to take up his residence in London, and remained at the head of the Institution until 1909 when, owing to failing health, he retired from the Presidency, after an incumbency of nineteen years, but retained his position as a member of the Board until the time of his death.

He was a gentleman of the old school, always courtly, with a gentle grace of manner, and was invariably considerate of the feelings of others.

The welfare of the Hospital was ever dear to his heart and his devotion to its interests was unswerving. His memory will be cherished with affection by all those who came in contact with him and who followed his unselfish interest in its welfare during the most important period of the Hospital's development.

IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Secretary be instructed to spread upon the minutes of this meeting the deep sense of sorrow which is felt by the Board at the loss of one who for so many years had been identified with the interests and growth of the Institution. and



To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

The past year has shown very satisfactory results as regards the physical condition of the children, many having left perfectly cured, and are maintaining themselves successfully as stenographers, in different positions in Institutions, and are acquitting themselves very creditably, and are giving satisfaction to their employers.

The present set of children are much younger, as it has been found that quicker results are obtained with younger children, and their stay in the Institution will therefore be of shorter duration, and a larger number of patients can therefore be reached, but it increases the expense, as many of the older children were able to make themselves useful in various ways, but so many small children require more nurses and other servants.

We regret that the Assistant Superintendent Miss Welles has been obliged to leave on account of her health, as she fulfilled the duties of her position with conscientious attention and a great deal of good judgment, but we feel that when her successor Miss Washington becomes accustomed to the duties of her position she will prove to be well adapted to fulfill the requirements of her department; there have been no other changes in the Staff, and they all deserve hearty commendation for the manner in which they have discharged the duties of their different positions, and the interest shown by them in endeavoring to advance the success of the Institution.

Our hearty thanks are due to Mr. Barrett for the use of his automobiles to take the children to White Plains for the Regents' examination, to Mr. Spritzer for tickets to the Electric Theatre, automobile rides given by friends, and most especially to Mr. and Mrs. Lehrman for the Moving Picture exhibition given by them at the Institution, a most enjoyable afternoon which will be long remembered by those who were present.

A party of Orthopædic physicians paid a visit to the Country Branch, and expressed a great deal of praise at the results of the Orthopædic work, the children being grouped under the different forms of the different diseases from which they suffered and the physicians were able to judge of the progress made during the stay of the patient, and the results obtained by the new methods recently tried by the Surgeon-in-Chief, and the X-ray pictures were of great service in illustrating most clearly the condition of the patients before treatments and the successful recoveries from what years ago appeared to be hopeless cases.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

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To the Trustees and Supervisors of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

In my report of a year ago your careful attention was invited to the very comprehensive reports of the various departments, as completely presenting the work and financial condition of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital and of the Country Branch and Industrial School.

It is with greater confidence and appreciation of their illuminating and inspiring contents, that I repeat this invitation to you, to our present subscribers and to the benevolent public who are not as yet subscribers, to read and ponder the reports herewith submitted, for the year ending September 30th, 1912. Contact with the facts given by those who most intimately know them, will, I am certain, do more to gain and hold your active interest and to secure the same from others, than any summary or comments I might make. My plea therefore is, for a careful study of these reports and tables. As heretofore, they show a steady increase in the amount of work done and bring into prominence the amount of work left undone, through lack of proper facilities and of money. The Trustees, Supervisors and Staff are doing, it may be modestly and justly claimed, measurably all in their power to meet the needs of those who properly appeal to them, in their respective relations to the work, for relief from their suffering condition; but without a larger sympathy and a more general support from the public at large, our City Dispensary and Hospital cannot possibly meet the increasing demands upon them. Good friends and supporters we have, many of them, and to those we make our grateful acknowledgments; but the work has so grown, that it now requires and deserves a far wider acquaintance and support, than it has thus far received. To secure these, we shall this present year put forth a special effort to give to the public the opportunity of a fuller acquaintance with the pressing necessity and the intrinsic merit of what we are doing. Few even among ourselves, fully appreciate its importance, extent and value, and how can we expect the general public to do so, until we have acquainted it fully with the facts? If the work we are doing *deserves* the sympathy and support of this community, it is my confident belief it will receive both, when and as it is better known. One who has made a study of Hospital conditions and work throughout our country and is intelligently familiar with them, has recently written to one of our Trustees, after a careful inspection of our City Dispensary and Hospital and Country Branch and Industrial School, as follows:

"Your country branch is one of the most interesting illustrations of the successful carrying out of this idea in an adequate plant. The school work is of a high grade and seems to me to compare favorably with that in the best public schools. I have taken pleasure also in the delightful atmosphere, something which is intangible, but none the less important. There is a surprising degree of homelikeness for the size of the institution. This is in part due to the admirable cubicle arrangement which gives many of the children separate sleeping rooms, but it is due even more, I believe, to the high character of the employes whom you have secured.

As you will see, I have developed a good deal of enthusiasm over the work at White Plains. That at the city branch is no less commendable, except for its old buildings. The hospital staff is doing good work in old-fashioned surroundings, but I believe that the high quality of work could be more easily maintained and its scope much extended if it were housed in a modern building. May I add in connection with the city hospital that you have the most complete system of following up dispensary cases through visiting nurses which I have found in any orthopaedic hospital?

You and the other officers have followed the work so closely that some of its excellences may be less striking to you than to a new observer."

It is almost needless to add that such unexpected and unsought words of appreciation and of commendation were most grateful to the management, and coming, as they did, from an expert in hospital matters, should confirm the confidence of our friends and win for us a much larger and more helpful support from the public at large. What, therefore, the City Dispensary and Hospital needs is a large increase in the number of annual subscribers to their current expenses; and subscriptions to a new and adequate City Dispensary and Hospital, which is now under immediate consideration.

The cost of the proposed new City Dispensary and Hospital, land, building and furnishings, is estimated at about \$750,000, towards which we have in the treasury and in good subscriptions \$200,000, and in the probable value of our present site and building an additional \$150,000, or a total of \$350,000, leaving \$400,-000 still to be raised for these specific purposes. It is, however, our wish and hope that, simultaneously with the raising of this money for a new City Dispensary and Hospital, but not necessarily contingent upon it, we may be able to secure an additional endowment of \$250,000 to provide an increase of income for our increasing work. We now, therefore, urgently appeal for the sum of \$650,000, which will with the \$350,000 already in hand, provide a total sum of \$1,000,000—\$750,000 for land, building and furnishings, and \$250,000 for additional endowment.

There was at the close of the year ending September 30, 1912, an accumulated deficit of \$6,515.74, which has since been fully paid by the generous action of the Board of Trustees themselves, so that we have now no floating debt. Of the \$200,000 subscribed towards a new Dispensary and Hospital, to which reference has already been made, \$100,000 is the munificent gift of Mrs. A. D. Juilliard of this city, for the erection of a wing, pavilion or portion of the new building, as a memorial to her sister, May Cossitt Dodge, and is conditional upon the erection of the building being begun this present year. We desire to record our deep appreciation of this most generous and helpful action and to express to Mrs. Juilliard our very sincere thanks.

Again the management take very great pleasure in expressing their high appreciation of the painstaking and valuable services rendered by all those associated with them in this beneficent work. Respectfully submitted,

SUPERVISORS' REPORT

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

We have the honor to present to you the report of the Board of Supervisors.

We congratulate ourselves that during the past year we have been able to successfully carry on the work entrusted to us, and gladly avail ourselves of this opportunity to thank those friends whose generosity has furnished us with means to continue it.

As in the past, first among these have been our auxiliary societies, the Orthopaedic Guild, the Orthopaedic Hospital Sewing Society, the Junior Guild. The Orthopaedic Guild has given us three free beds, has taken entire charge of one ward, providing linen, clothes for the patients, and many timely gifts; also a donation to current expenses of \$200. The Orthopaedic Hospital Sewing Society has supplied the hospital with all the household linen in use, with the above exception; has given a free bed and \$150 to be expended for braces in cases where the patient is unable to pay for them. The Junior Guild has supported a free bed and made handsome contributions to the various special funds as well. The latest organized society, the Boys' Guild, last winter decided to change the character of its work, and now belongs more especially to the dispensary, having become interested in Social Service in connection with the visiting nurses, aiming to enable them to be the point of contact between the patients and bureau of relief and to maintain an emergency fund. We regret the loss to our inmates which this involves, but sympathize heartily with the object in view. Detailed reports of these auxiliaries will be found in our Year Book, and speak more eloquently than is possible to us of the share which is due to them in any success we have attained.

We again owe a most important branch of the work of our institution, the Visiting Nurses, to the munificence of four ladies, three of them members of our Board, Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, Mrs. W. D. Sloane, Mrs. A. Murray Young and Mrs. Frederic Vanderbilt. These nurses, as is now well known, supplement the work of the doctors among the dispensary patients, often preventing their treatment becoming valueless by supervision of their home care. The field is a very large one; two more nurses are very badly needed, but, alas! we cannot provide them unless some kind friend who happens to read this report will be so generous as to give the amount of their salary. Would that it might be so!

The Gymnasium, another highly important aid to the surgeons, was also again provided for by private subscription, being supported by Miss White, Mr. Frick and Mr. Chisholm, who each generously give the salary of a teacher.

The school, of which we are justly proud, as the reports show that children returning to the public schools are often ahead of their classes and have deserved very gratifying mention, is supported by special subscriptions. We earnestly solicit interest in it as we feel that it is absolutely necessary that our patients should not be allowed to fall behind in their studies because of their sometimes protracted stay in the hospital. If we aim at making them physically capable of supporting themselves we should also give them, if possible, the opportunity of mental advantages.

Other objects to which we beg to direct attention are our Special Funds, the Ice Cream, Fruit and Potato or Vegetable Funds. They help towards our housekeeping and allow us to give the children simple luxuries which are greatly appreciated. We hope they will not be overlooked. Owing to the kindness of the Crippled Children's Driving Fund we have not for some years past needed a Driving Fund, as they take our patients to the Park in hot weather, which is an inestimable benefit and for which we are correspondingly grateful.

Christmas was happily spent at the hospital. It is always a great event there as elsewhere, and eagerly looked forward to. Last year's was no exception, and every expectation was more than fulfilled. The beautiful tree was a donation from Mr. and Mrs. A. Murray Young. Mrs. Sloane gave a handsome toy to each child, the different Guilds gave stockings, Miss de Forest gifts to the employees, and an anonymous friend a sufficient sum to send Christmas dinners to the homes of 97 dispensary patients. The day brought great happiness and pleasure to all connected with the hospital.

We regret to report we have sustained a great loss in the resignation of Mrs. William Robison, while happy to say she has consented to allow her name to be added to the list of our honorary members and to continue her interest even if unable to take so active a part. Being elected a Supervisor in 1886, she served as Treasurer for twenty-one years, from which position she resigned to become the efficient Chairman of the Free Bed Committee. Such services as hers are not to be measured by words; they are written into the history of our institution whose very life is owing to just such devotion to its cause, and we deeply deplore the necessity which deprives us of so beloved and valued a member of our Board.

Before concluding our report we beg to say a few words of appeal for our institution. We feel sure that a better understanding of our work and requirements is all that is necessary to solve the problems that confront us. Our difficulty lies in clearly presenting our case to the thousands of men and women who would gladly give money, even at a sacrifice, if they knew what it would accomplish here, and while expressing our gratitude for the loyal support of our friends, we beg them not to stop there, but to do their utmost to spread a knowledge of it in every direction. We work for children, we cure painful deformities, we alleviate what is often agony of suffering to them, we give them their chance to become useful citizens instead of burdens on the community. The pathos of the life of a cripple is greater than tongue can tell. To save more children from it we ask your help.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

During the year constant attention has been given to the general repair of the buildings, and in so far as conditions permit the City Hospital is in a good state of repair. Provision has recently been made to renovate the nurses' home, and work on this has already begun. The alterations necessary to comply with the orders of the city to remove the encroachments beyond the building line of Fifty-ninth Street have been satisfactorily completed during the past summer, so that no unusual expenses are anticipated with reference to repairs during the coming year.

The per capita cost of maintenance in the City Hospital for the current year was \$1.46, which is an increase of eleven cents over the preceding year, and is largely accounted for by the general increase in cost of supplies and labor, but it is interesting to note that we are still, with one or two exceptions, operating our hospital department with a lower per capita cost than any New York City institution doing general or special surgical work. I believe that with adequate storage facilities we would be able to reduce the per capita cost somewhat.

The several branches of the hospital and dispensary work are administered as efficiently and economically as is consistent with good work.

The hospital beds have been full practically all the time, and we have a long waiting list. At no time during the year have we been able to overcome this condition owing to the limited capacity of the hospital wards.

The work of the dispensary has grown enormously during the past two years, as is indicated by the tables covering that work. One of the most important features of the dispensary has been the work of our visiting nurses, who have rendered the general surgical work of the dispensary more effective, but we are not yet meeting the full needs in this direction. Through the year many organizations and societies have rendered valuable aid to us by assisting those who are under treatment in our dispensary and hospital. Among those organizations to whom we are particularly indebted may be mentioned the Association for the Aid of Crippled Children, the Crippled Children's Driving Fund, the Charity Organization Society, the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, the Junior Christian Endeavor Society of the Church of the Stranger, the Parks and Playgrounds Association, the Rest-A-While Home for Helpless Crippled Children, Sheepshead Bay, Long Island, and the Seaside Home for Crippled Children, Averne, Long Island. Acknowledgments of special gifts and help by friends have already been made by the proper officers or societies.

COUNTRY BRANCH:

Consistent with the policy adopted by the Board of Trustees a year ago, the Country Branch has been operated during the past year with a less number of patients than formerly, so that a substantial surplus might accumulate from year to year. This curtailment leaves us with a working capacity for 104 patients, with an average of 103.5 per day during the year.


The buildings and grounds are in excellent condition. The cottage erected for the Superintendent through the generosity of Miss Watson was completed in May of this year and occupied soon after. It is complete in every respect.

It is pleasing to be able to report the same excellent condition existing in the personnel of the staff. Where an effort is being made to surround the child with every wholesome influence that character can bring to it, this fact becomes a subject of gratification.

At the annual reunion of former patients in June over fortyfive cured cases spent the day at the hospital and renewed former friendships. These reunions have provided a stimulus to those who have not yet been discharged cured, and are interesting to the staff as a means of estimating the value of their work. The school remains under the same capable management as formerly.

The Country Branch is deeply indebted to all those who made our Christmas so enjoyable and to those who through the year have brought pleasure into the lives of the children. The staff is

particularly indebted to Miss Watson, who has most thoughtfully provided for a series of entertainments and lectures through the winter months. This is an innovation and is greatly appreciated by those who are by the nature of their work kept from the opportunities of the city.

SURGEON'S REPORT

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

Gentlemen:

During the year ending September 30, 1912, 6,417 patients were treated in the Dispensary. Of this number 4,207 were patients continued under treatment from last year, and 2,210 were new patients. This shows an increase of 1,082.

Of this number 1,329 had joint tuberculosis; 549 non-tubercular deformities of the spine; 1,483 deformities of the feet; 468 bow-legs and knock-knee; 1,249 infantile paralysis, and the remaining number, 1,339, a great variety of deformities. Details of this aspect of the work are shown in Table No. 1.

Table No. 2 shows the results of treatment and it may be seen that 395 were cured; 481 discharged relieved, making a total number of 876 who were sufficiently relieved to require no further treatment; 21 died and 4,930 continued for further treatment.

Table No. 3 shows the detail of the work in the care of these patients and that there were 27,140 visits made to the Dispensary and 15,580 visits made by nurses and surgeons to patients at their homes, making a total of 42,658, which is an increase over last year of 3,887.

That there has been this enormous increase in the work in its present quarters, and with the Staff unchanged seems almost unbelievable.

It is interesting to note again this year, as was done last, the ages of the patients treated and the large number that belong to adult life. 912 were above fifteen years of age, which precludes their admission to children's wards and emphasizes the great necessity of adequate provision for ward treatment of adult orthopaedic patients. As you know, we have provision for only five women and none for men.

BRACE SHOP.

The total number of new instruments made in the shop was 2,070, and the number repaired, 5,941. Table No. 4 shows the detail of this work. The amount charged for apparatus was \$7,383.00 and the amount collected from patients was \$5,540.00.

This amount, it must be remembered, is really a contribution from the patients themselves to the institution, and a very generous one, as these people have not only the burden of poverty but that of disease affecting either themselves or a member of their family.

It is a rule in the work to ask each patient to pay a nominal sum for the cost of their apparatus. When this is not possible it is furnished to them free. No charge is made for the ordinary repairs which represent a very large part of the expense of the shop.

CITY HOSPITAL.

There were 63 patients in the City Hospital at the close of last year; 462 have been admitted; 2 died and 396 were discharged, leaving 64 on October first. The total number of days of free care for patients was 21,776. The number of days of care paid for by the patients was 1,143, making a total of 22,919. The average number of patients per day in the wards was 62 plus.

The number of patients operated upon was 333 and the number of operations performed, 549.

As compared to last year, there is a gain of 94 in the patients treated, and 141 in the operations performed.

In spite of this increase here and of the fact that we have worked during the entire year under great pressure, we have not been able to take care of nearly the number of patients that have needed Hospital treatment, and the waiting list has been from 80 to 100 all the time.

COUNTRY BRANCH.

The number of patients in the Country Branch was 114 at the beginning of the year. Eighteen have been admitted, 14 discharged cured, 18 transferred and 4 died, leaving 96 on October first.

The total number of days of free care was 35,094. The number of days of care paid for by the patients was 2,700, making a total of 37,794. The average number of patients per day in the Hospital was 103 as compared to 115 last year, showing a considerable decrease.

The reason we have done less work here is that a number of beds have been kept vacant in order to keep the expenses well within the income. It is a source of constant regret to me to see beds vacant when they are so terribly needed for children with joint tuberculosis, of whom, as was noted above, we treated in the Dispensary 1,308.

It would seem from the foregoing brief statement of facts in regard to our year's accomplishment that you have every reason to appeal to the public for their generous support of this work, and at this time particularly for contributions for the building fund.

In considering the expense of the work that is done in such an institution as ours it must be remembered that we are dealing with chronic diseases and that the duration of treatment is, in most instances, long. This is one of the most important facts in the whole situation, for many reasons. In the first place, it is very difficult to sustain towards the chronically sick that interested and hopeful relation which is so easily given to those suffering from acute disease. It is only through such interest, however, that anything has been accomplished in the cure of chronic diseases or that we can confidently look to the future for greater accomplishments.

This constitutes the problem of orthopaedic surgery, and that its opportunity for service is very great is shown by the fact that we had in our institution alone over 6,000 patients last year.

The establishment and maintenance of institutions where this spirit of scientific and humanitarian interest can be sustained and made effective have economic problems that are serious, but the aspect of the situation which is even of greater importance has to do with failure to make them completely efficient, because failure at this point is disastrous to the patient and forces upon the community a double burden—that of the necessity of supporting the individual and the loss of his productiveness.

An illustration of this is found in the fact that a large percentage of the inmates in homes for incurables are orthopaedic cases, and they are there chiefly because they have been neglected early in life and early in disease.

I have recently made a study of the inmates of one such home in New York where 50% of the inmates were orthopaedic patients, living out lives of utter uselessness to themselves and a very great burden to the community. So that, looking at the subject from that standpoint alone, is it not obvious that such institutions as ours should be made more and more useful, thus saving the community this burden by placing these people in a position of usefulness?

That the chronically sick have a chance is illustrated again and again by what has been accomplished for them already, and I will mention one recent example—that of humpback. It would seem that at last we have perfected a method of treatment which will definitely prevent this distressing deformity.

It is a source of gratification that this method was perfected in your institution and first performed on its patients, and that about 100 patients have thus far been operated upon without mortality and without a single failure.

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



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REPORT FROM THE COUNTRY BRANCH.

* *

To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

The results produced during the past year in the physical condition of the children have been most satisfactory, and new methods are producing a great result among cases formerly considered incurable.

The manual training department has been discontinued, owing to the fact that the introduction of so many young children has made it unnecessary, and for older boys stenography and typewriting and photography seem to be better adapted to their condition, and the various branches of sewing and cooking to the girls.

The teaching is conducted on the same lines as the public school system, and I cannot speak too highly of the interesting methods adopted by the teachers to instruct children, many of them of foreign birth, very bright, but unaccustomed to habits of application, and the adaptation of every study to the common wants of everyday life.

The heads of the different departments have discharged their duties in a very creditable manner, and have evinced great interest in the welfare of the institution.

The financial condition of the Institution is most satisfactory, and many thanks are due to the Trustees and the Superintendent, who have worked together to produce this happy result, especially in these days of high cost of living, when we hear on all sides of the problem of keeping the expenses of institutions within their income.

Our thanks are due to those who have helped us with gifts of clothing, vegetables and books, and especially to Mr. and Mrs. Lehman for the great treat they gave the children in the moving pictures, especially brought from New York for their amusement, and the interest shown by them in personal acquaintance with the children. There have been many visitors in the past year to the Country Branch by persons who are making a study of work done along the same lines, and the results of their visits, and the opinions they have formed of the Country Branch will appear in the reports which are to be published.



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In the Year Book of the Orthopaedic Hospital for 1891-92 the Supervisor's Report contains the following:

"A number of ladies formed themselves into what they call the Orthopaedic Guild. They provide the linen of all kinds used in the girls' ward, and recently they have been preparing some clothing sorely needed by some of the little inmates."

This was the beginning of the Orthopaedic Guild, and it is most gratifying to know that for twenty-one years we have gone on increasing in numbers and in usefulness.

In the Autumn of 1892 the Guild sustained a severe loss in the death of its first and much-loved President, Mrs. William Carpender, to whose energy and interest its good work is the result. The first bed endowed in 1893 is dedicated to her memory.

In 1894 our Annual Report for the first time appeared in the Year Book of the Hospital, and at that date there were 26 active members and 16 associates. At the present time of writing we number 46 active members and 35 associates.

We still take entire charge of the girls' ward, supplying everything required for its maintenance and we now support three beds.

We have to record with much regret the death of one of our active members, Mrs. John E. Roosevelt, who filled the position of Treasurer for four years from 1902 to 1906.

The past year has been one of unusual prosperity, and we are deeply indebted to some of our new members for their kindly aid, which has enabled us to contribute more generously than ever to some of the "special funds."

May we hope for the same generosity and interest from our members and friends during the coming year.



The Treasurer, Miss Remsen, sends in a very good report— \$1,121.25 receipts from dues and donations, \$1,021.77 disbursements.

Mrs. Arthur Mason-Jones, Chairman of the Working Committee, reports number of pieces of linen given out, 1,706; number replaced, 1,762; stock on hand, 919. Supplying linen for the Hospital (with the exception of one ward) constitutes the main work of this society, but we also support a free bed and are able to donate a very substantial sum for braces and extras. We have 109 members, 50 active and 59 associate.

We want to thank all members, both active and associate, as one without the other could accomplish very little, for their generosity and encouragement, hoping they will continue their interest and that we may be able to go on and even increase the work for the coming year.

At a cake sale held on December 12, \$139 was cleared.


This year shows an increase in our number, four new active members having joined the Guild.



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SECRETARY'S REPORT

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At the December, 1911, meeting of the Boys' Guild of the Orthopædic Hospital, a change in the work of the Guild was discussed. It was decided to raise enough money for the salary of a visiting nurse, and to maintain a small emergency fund on which the visiting nurses could draw at their discretion.

Thereafter, a letter was sent to the Board of Directors of the Hospital and to Dr. Hibbs, Surgeon-in-Chief of the Medical Staff, asking their consent to this proposed change. Their answers expressed regret that the Guild was giving up its old work, but also showed that another visiting nurse was urgently necessary to the increased Hospital and Dispensary work.

At the December, 1912, meeting the following resolutions were adopted:

First—To raise \$1,000 to be given to the Hospital for the salary of a visiting nurse.

Second—To maintain a fund of not more than \$15 a month on which the visiting nurse could draw in cases of urgent need.

Third—That a report of the expenditures of the nurses be given to the committee at the monthly meetings.

Fourth—That the committee be known as the Social Service Committee.

We feel that this is a most urgent need of the Hospital just at present, as the Dispensary work has increased so much in the past year.





To the Trustees and Supervisors of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

I have just finished a careful reading of my report to you of one year ago, and find the facts, situation and suggestions I would now bring to your attention for consideration and action are therein so fully set forth that it is unnecessary I should do more than emphasize in this report the main features of last year's report, namely:

1. The actual, pressing and constant need of an Institution such as ours.

2. The unquestioned importance and value of the work our Dispensary and Hospital are doing.

3. The absolute inadequacy of the facilities we possess for doing this work in an efficient manner and to a sufficient extent to meet the increasing demands made upon us.

4. The justice of our appealing to the charitable public for the necessary accommodations for our work and for a larger income to carry it on.

The appeal then made for \$1,000,000 has been most generously responded to; \$545,000 of the \$1,000,000 being subscribed, leaving \$455,000 still to be secured, and it is this latter amount we now seek.

A site for the new dispensary and hospital has been purchased, architect's plans are in preparation, and the construction of the building will be begun in the early Spring, or as soon as the remaining sum of \$455,000 has been obtained. Meanwhile, the demand for greater facilities is most urgent. The growth of the work in both Dispensary and Hospital during the past ten years, as shown in the Superintendent's report, is simply marvelous, and no better plea for the money we still require could possibly be presented.

The financial situation of the Dispensary and Hospital for the past year shows an improvement. Instead of an excess of Expenditures over Receipts of \$8,452.65, as in the previous year, the Receipts show an excess over Expenditures of \$3,589.17, notwithstanding the fact that the Expenditures were greater. This favorable and fortunate result was due to several causes, notably to an increase of interest on investments; increased returns for the use of apparatus; a necessary increase of donations to provide for the deficit of 1912, which was special and large, and the very considerable sum of \$4,000 realized from an entertainment given by the Board of Supervisors.

We ask for the various and interesting reports, from which these facts are gathered, your careful perusal, and your appreciation of the efficiency, labor and faithfulness made evident by them.

Our special thanks are due to those who have so generously contributed to the Building and Endowment Fund, and to the Committee of the Trustees who have given so much of their time and thought to securing a suitable site and building, and to the Board of Supervisors for their constant interest in all that contributes to the true welfare of the work. To none more, however, than to our able and devoted Surgeon-in-Chief, Dr. Hibbs, and to his Assistants on the Surgical and Medical Staff, and to our House Staff, are our thanks and appreciation due.

Let us now endeavor to complete with all proper speed the enterprise we have entered upon, and which promises so much for those on whose behalf our efforts are put forth.

The Country Branch and Industrial School is of increasing value to the work of the City Dispensary and Hospital. Miss Watson, our Surgeon-in-Chief, and the Superintendent give us so fully in their reports the details of the work of this Branch and School, that I need not do more than call your attention to the information they provide. The increasing recognition of the value and success of the Country Branch and Industrial School must be extremely gratifying to the donor, who has provided both the buildings and the endowment for this department of our work.

SUPERVISORS' REPORT

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

We have the honor to present to you the report of the Board of Supervisors for the past year, and in so doing, we wish to thank your Board, our auxiliary societies, the benefactors of our Institution, and our kind friends among the public for the support and assistance which has enabled us to carry on our work. Our Institution has reached a period where only by the closest co-operation among all interested in it can the demands upon it be met, and for the share of such co-operation it has been our good fortune to receive, we are deeply grateful and desire to express our warm appreciation.

Our auxiliary societies, the Orthopaedic Guild, the Orthopaedic Hospital Sewing Society, the Junior Guild and the Boys' Guild, have, as in the past, been of incalculable assistance to us. It would be impossible to enumerate all the instances wherein they have aided us, even their detailed reports in our Year Book could not do so, but we can at least mention the more prominent occasions of our debt to them.

The Orthopaedic Guild has supported three beds, has provided linen and clothing for one ward, and taken especial charge of its welfare, visiting the patients and giving time and money to provide them with extra comforts of all kinds.

The Orthopaedic Hospital Sewing Society has provided all the household linen for the Institution, with the exception of the Guild's ward, given donations of blankets, curtains, and supported a free bed. A comparison of the supply given in the last few years will show the enormous increase which has become necessary, and what a great debt we owe this society for relieving the Hospital of such an expense. The Junior Guild has furnished clothes for one Girl's Ward, supported a Free Bed, and has given \$100 to the Endowment Fund, \$300 to the Building Fund and \$130 to our Special Funds.

The Boys' Guild, now known as the Social Service Committee, decided to maintain a much needed Visiting Nurse, most generously contributing her salary, and clothes from time to time for some of the Dispensary patients.

The Visiting Nurses have become indispensable adjuncts to the success of the work of our Hospital, as well as to the Dispensary. They follow the cases when dismissed, watching that the Surgeon's orders are obeyed, and also keep in touch with the various Relief Societies that aid may be given when destitution exists among the families of patients. We have been so fortunate as to have two more added to our list during the past year, and they were urgently needed, one by the Boys' Guild and another recently by Mrs. Lewis Cass Ledyard. To the generosity of four ladies, three of them members of our Board, Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, Mrs. A. Murray Young, Mrs. W. D. Sloane and Mrs. Frederick W. Vanderbilt, the salaries of the four who have been for some years in the service of the Institution are due. There is no branch of our work of more value.

The Gymnasium and very important massage treatment, both of which we also owe to private subscription, have been continued, and we gratefully acknowledge our debt to Mr. Frick, Mr. Chisolm and Miss White, whose generosity has provided the necessary fund.

It is with great pride that we report that some of the patients returned to the public school ahead of their classes. Our school is necessarily conducted under disadvantageous conditions, and to have obtained such a result is a testimony to the teaching, to the diligence of the pupils, to the utility of this branch of our work which speaks for itself, and we trust that the support which has been so generously given, and upon which it is enitrely dependent, will not only be continued, but that the circle of our school's friends will be increased on learning of it.

Our other Special Funds to which we beg to call attention are the Ice Cream, Fruit and Vegetable Funds. They give the patients simple luxuries which are of benefit to them and reduce the cost of our housekeeping, especially in the case of the Vegetable Fund. Gifts of fresh vegetables during the summer are earnestly solicited from the gardens of our friends who live near the city, and barrels of potatoes, vegetables and apples are most welcome at all times, as well as subscriptions to the Fund.

Our Driving Fund has been abandoned, as for some years past the Crippled Children's Driving Fund has undertaken to fill this need, for which we are most grateful.

At Christmas, as usual, all united in their efforts to bring as much pleasure and happiness to the Hospital as possible. Mrs. Sloane gave her accustomed gift to each child, the different Guilds supplied the stockings, Miss de Forest, presents for the employees, Mrs. Dickey, ice cream for the Christmas dinner, and Mrs. Young and Mrs. Brewster the beautiful trees. We quote the report of the Superintendent for further details:

"The Christmas exercises were a great success. There were three trees, one in each ward, and one in the Dispensary. Children from the Musical Settlement furnished instrumental music and choir boys from the Church of the Heavenly Rest sang carols in the Dispensary and wards. A large number of unexpected gifts came to us the day before Christmas, so that each child was well supplied. Another year, I believe we could have a larger number of Dispensary children attend these exercises. Many of them had had no other Christmas gift than that provided by the Hospital."



The proceeds amounted to \$4,000 and our warm thanks are due the Chairman, Mrs. Alexander, and her Committee. Many handsome donations were given us in connection with the concert, owing to attention being called to our need, and we cannot too gratefully express our appreciation.

The past year has been a momentous one in the history of our Institution as, owing to the impulse given by the generous donations to the Building Fund for the new hospital, a determined effort has been made to raise the necessary amount for its completion, and the response to our appeals has been of such a nature that we are greatly encouraged. We trust that another year will see the new building far advanced, and that in the future, with greater facilities, we will so extend the field of our work our benefactors will feel that we have justified the confidence they have shown us.

We shall welcome the larger opportunity for service, knowing as we do the increasing need of just such help as we can give, realizing as we also do what the lack of it entails, the suffering, the misery, the poverty,—and we appeal again, as we have done in past years, to all who love children to help us save more of them from the cruel fate to which they are condemned, if not cared for while it is yet time.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

I have the honor to present herewith a brief report of the work of our Dispensary, Hospital and Country Branch.

Throughout the year an effort has been made to keep the cost of repairs of our City Hospital at the lowest figure possible consistent with safety. This has been done with the view of spending no more on our old hospital building than was necessary. The operating expenses of the Hospital and Dispensary increased this year \$2,074.07. This is due to an increase of thirteen per cent in new patients in dispensary and an increase of thirteen per cent in the number of visits made to the Dispensary by patients. The per capita cost per day in the Hospital was \$1.53, an increase of seven cents over last year when substantially the same service was rendered as in the year just closed. This per capita cost per day is one of the lowest of any of the hospitals reporting to the Hospital Saturday and Sunday Association.

It may be of interest to note in the following table the immense increase in the Dispensary and Hospital work during the past ten years, a period during which this organization has been doing a complete work for the treatment of Orthopaedic conditions:

When one considers that the work indicated by the above increases has all been accomplished under the same conditions and in the same building that it was ten years ago, one can very well understand the present need of an early solution of our housing problem.

A careful study of the distribution of our out-patients reveals the fact that our Dispensary renders service not only in Greater New York but in all of the nearby states. The distribution in Greater New York is surprisingly uniform and shows conclusively that the headquarters of our out-patient work should be located near the principal lines of transportation in the central part of Manhattan.

We are deeply indebted to many societies and organizations which have most effectively co-operated with us during the year. The Seaside Home for Crippled Children at Averne, L. I., the Country Home for Crippled Children at Westfield, N. J., and the Rest-A-While Home for Helpless Crippled Children at Sheepshead Bay, L I., cared for one hundred Dispensary patients during the summer months. The Childrens' Aid Society, the Charity Organization Society, Association for Improving the Conditions of the Poor, the Association for the Aid of Crippled Children, the Darrach Home for Crippled Children, the Crippled Children's Driving Fund Association, Baby's Pure Milk and Health Stations, St. John's Guild, New Dorp, S. I., and the Parks and Playgrounds Association have all rendered valuable aid in their several fields of activity. For all of this service we wish to express our grateful appreciation.

COUNTRY BRANCH.

The problems of the Country Branch remain about as they were at the close of the last fiscal year. No new work of importance has been done during the year with the exception of the installation of a laundry dryer which was donated by Miss Emily A. Watson.

Owing, however, to the more acute conditions of the children in the hospital the cost of medical and food supplies has been greatly increased, thereby causing us this year to increase our per capita cost to one dollar and seventy-three cents (\$1.73) per day. When it is considered that this figure covers not

only medical and surgical treatment, but the education of such children as are able to attend school, the figure is not high. Three teachers are now employed who give their full time to instruction and it is of interest to note that very few children who are discharged from the hospital find that there has been any loss in their education owing to their residence here.

The hospital was honored in November in having as its guest the Westchester County Medical Society, which held its annual meeting here. At this meeting our Surgeon-in-Chief, Dr. Hibbs, presented a paper on "The Operative Treatment of Hunchback," illustrated by lantern slides, X-rays and a large number of patients cured by this method of treatment.

We are deeply indebted to many friends who have shown continued and increased interest in our work and who have made the lives of the children brighter and happier because of it. We also appreciate the devoted loyalty that is shown by Miss Watson at all times both for the welfare of the children and the comfort and pleasure of the staff. Her intimate knowledge of the work renders her counsel and advice most valuable to us all.

REPORT OF SURGEON-IN-CHIEF

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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

Gentlemen:

During the year ending September 30, 1913, 7,490 patients were treated in the Dispensary. Of this number, 2,506 were new cases and the remainder those continued from last year, which is an increase of 1,073.

Of this number 1,446 had joint tuberculosis; 608 non-tubercular deformities of the spine; 1,875 deformities of the feet; 514 bow-leg or knock-knee; 1,754 paralytic deformities, and the remaining number were suffering from a great variety of deforming diseases, the details of which appear in Table No. 1.

Table No. 2 gives the details of the results of treatment and shows that 336 were discharged cured and 621 relieved, making a total of 957 returned to a condition of health where they required no further surgical care. Two were discharged for neglect, 5 as incurable, 44 died, and 749 received no treatment after the first visit and discharged as not treated, and 5,733 were continued for further treatment.

The details of this work in the care of these patients in the Dispensary is shown in Table No. 3.

The total number of visits to the Dispensary was 30,366, the number of visits made by nurses to patients at their homes was 11,022, and by surgeons to patients outside the institution 4,368, making a total of 45,756.

It is this table that shows the amount of care that has been given to patients both in the institution and out of it.

Brace Shop:—The number of new instruments made in the shop was 2,425. The number repaired 6,415. The amount charged for apparatus was \$8,205.50, and the amount collected from the patients was \$6,680.33. This item is always of partic-

ular interest as it is a contribution made by the patients themselves to the institution. Table No. 4 gives the details of this work.

City Hospital:—There were 64 patients in the wards on October 1, 1912, and during the year 380 have been admitted, making a total of 444 patients Two died and 376 were discharged, leaving 66 on October 1, 1913. The total number of free days care of patients was 21,381, and the number of days of care paid for by the patients was 969, making a total of 22,350.

The average number of patients per day in the wards was 61.2. Please see Table No. 5 for details.

Table No. 6 is the operative table 309 patients were operated upon, and 510 operations were performed.

The operative work was very seriously interfered with, in fact all the Hospital work was, in the spring, on account of an outbreak of measles in the wards.

Country Branch:—The number of patients in this Hospital on October 1, 1912, was 96. Thirty-eight were admitted during the year, 26 discharged cured and 3 died, leaving 100 on October 1, 1913.

The total number of days of free care was 33,839, and the number of days of care paid for by the patients was 2,060, making a total of 35,899.

The small work done here, as last year, is due to the fact, as you already know, that we have no money.





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To the Trustees of the New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital.

GENTLEMEN:

The work of the Country Branch during the past year, from a medical standpoint of view, has been most satisfactory, as there has been a freedom from contagious diseases, very few deaths, and a steady progress in new forms of treatment, which are producing results that are calling forth high encomiums from persons fitted to judge upon such points.

Although the Manual Training Department has been discontinued, the knowledge obtained by the older boys has not been forgotten, as it has developed a taste for the use of tools, and of putting them to practical use in every day life.

I regret to record the resignation of all the teachers except Miss Hubbard, who succeeds Miss Baldwin as head of the Educational Department, but it was not to be expected that such exceptionally good teachers would care to continue the instruction of small children, as they are a great tax upon their patience, and as they are not remaining in the institution as long a time, of course the teachers cannot see the results of their labors, but it is a matter of great congratulation to all interested in the Orthopaedic work, that the medical skill is shortening the period, that it is necessary for children to undergo treatment in hospitals, and that they can sooner take their place in the world as wage earners.

There was a reunion of the children in June at the County Branch, all doing well, and most of them occupying good positions, and a credit to the institution.

We thank all who have remembered us in various ways, gifts of clothing, books, toys, fruit, flowers and vegetables, entertainments for the children, all evincing an increasing interest in the institution.



Treasurer reports balance on hand, \$111.50.





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The Social Service Committee is pleased to report that by March, 1913, they raised the \$1,000 necessary for the salary of another visiting nurse for the Hospital.

On April 1st, Miss Creelman was added to the staff at a salary of \$75 a month, with the understanding that she was to live outside, but have her lunches at the Hospital, and that she was to pay the necessary car fare for her visits. Her duties have been to visit the homes of the sick patients every day, except Sundays and one afternoon each week. She has made from 240 to 250 visits each month and at each visit renders such professional and social service as the case requires, reporting the same to the Hospital.

The Committee was also able to contribute to the Emergency Fund of the Hospital, and on the whole, we think that we have accomplished a good deal in one year.

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.—"TO furnish treatment to the poor with special reference to the Diseases and Deformities of the Spine and the Hip Joints and other of the more serious diseases of the bones and joints requiring surgical and mechanical treatment, and for giving instruction in the same." All cases of deformity, besides those mentioned, including Club Foot, Lateral Curvature of the Spine, Infantile Paralysis, Bow-Legs, etc., are received and treated.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE DISPENSARY DEPARTMENT.—Professional services are rendered gratuitously. Those who can afford to do so are expected to reimburse the Institution for the actual cost of apparatus. Payment for apparatus is received in installments, if required. Apparatus, however, is never *sold* to patients or others —the Institution reserving the right to remove the apparatus and discharge any patient not complying with the directions of the Surgeons. Apparatus will not be supplied in any case that does not come under the immediate care of the Institution.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE HOSPITAL DEPARTMENT.—Any suitable Orthopædic case between the ages of four and fourteen may be admitted. (Subject to exceptions in special cases.) Board, \$4.00 per week. Application for admission may be made to the Surgeon to the Hospital during the regular Dispensary hours.

RULES GOVERNING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE COUNTRY BRANCH AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.—Applications for admission to this Hospital is made through the City Hospital, and only patients who are under treatment at the City Hospital will be admitted to the Country Branch.

THE MEDICAL PROFESSION and the public generally are invited to visit the Institution.

THE INSTITUTION is supported by the contributions of the benevolent. Contributions, which are earnestly solicited, may be sent to the Treasurer.

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
