(Founded 1877: Incorporated by Royal Charter, 1898).

HE Library Association was founded on October 5th, 1877, during the First International Library Conference, held at the London Institution, under the presidency of the late Mr. J. Winter Jones, then principal Librarian of the British Museum.

Early in 1898 Her Majesty the Queen most graciously bestowed upon the Association a Royal Charter of Incorporation in recognition of the high value of its public work.

Its objects are :--

(1) To unite all persons engaged or interested in Library work by holding conferences and meetings for the discussion of bibliographical questions and matters affecting libraries or their regulation or management or otherwise.

(2) To promote the better administration of Libraries.

(3) To promote whatever may tend to the improvement of the position and the qualifications of Librarians.

(4) To promote the adoption of the Public Libraries Acts.

(5) To promote the establishment of Reference and Lending Libraries for use by the public.

(6) To watch legislation affecting Public Libraries, and to assist in the promotion of such further legislation as may be considered necessary for the regulation and management, or extension of Public Libraries.

(7) To promote and encourage bibliographical study and research.

(8) To collect, collate and publish information of service or of interest to the Fellows and Members of the Association, or for the promotion of the objects of the Corporation.

(9) To collect and maintain a Library and Museum.

(10) To hold examinations in Librarianship and to issue certificates of efficiency.

The Association does for Libraries what they could not do individually without great cost and trouble. The principal Act of 1892 was the work of the Association, and since then its Legislation Committee has introduced several amendments. The Association also undertakes to advise its members gratis on all questions of Library Law. The Hon. Solicitor of the Association, Mr. H. W. FOVARGUE, the author of several important works on Library Law, is an expert in this subject.

The Association has instituted Classes in Librarianship, and an Examination for Librarians, Library Assistants and persons desirous of obtaining appointments, and issues certificates to those who satisfy the examiners.

The official organ of the Association is *The Library Association Record*, a Monthly Magazine, which is sent post free to Fellows and Members. In this magazine (edited by Mr. Henry Guppy, Joint Librarian of the John Rylands Library, Manchester) appear the papers read at Annual and Monthly Meetings, articles on Bibliography, Library and Literary Subjects, Library News, and reports of the proceedings of the Association.

A large number of useful and important papers have been published in the *Transactions*, *Monthly Notes*, *Library Chronicle*, *The Library* and *The Library Association Record*. A complete list of these and other publications still in print and obtainable is annexed.

Monthly Meetings are held on the second Monday of each month, from October to June; and an Annual General Meeting is held during the Autumn.

The Annual Subscription is One Guinea, payable in advance, on January 1st, or it may be commuted by a Life-Subscription of Fifteen Guineas. Candidates for Membership can be elected at any meeting.

Library Assistants are eligible for election as Associates, at an annual subscription of half-a-guinea, which entitles them to all the privileges of Membership except that they may not vote or hold office.

THE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

Libraries and other Institutions are also admitted to Membership, upon payment of an annual subscription of one guinea, when they receive the publications, and each is entitled to nominate a delegate, who, if approved by the Council, may attend the Meetings of the Association, and, on behalf of the Institution which he represents, enjoy all the privileges of ordinary Membership. Visitors may take part in the Annual Meetings on payment of a subscription of one guinea, and will receive the Report of the Proceedings and other *Annual* Publications.

The Hon. Secretary will be glad to afford information respecting the Association, and to receive offers of papers on appropriate subjects for reading at the Monthly and Annual Meetings.

Royal Charter of the Library Association.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, to all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

WHEREAS by a Petition presented unto Us by the Most Honourable Frederick Temple, Marquis of Dufferin and Ava, The Right Honourable Robert George, Baron Windsor, The Right Honourable Sir John Lubbock, Baronet, Henry Richard Tedder, Esquire, and John Young Walker MacAlister, Esquire:

It is amongst other things represented :

That in eighteen hundred and seventy-seven an Association was established in London called "The Library Association." That the objects of the Association were, among other things, to promote the establishment of New Libraries; to endeavour to secure better legislation for Public Libraries; to unite all persons engaged or interested in library work for the purpose of promoting the best administration of Libraries, and to encourage bibliographical research; and that it would conduce to the welfare of the Association, and to the furtherance of its objects, if the said Association were incorporated by Our Royal Charter:

Now KNOW VE that We have taken into Our Royal consideration the said Petition, and being desirous of promoting the said Association, We have of Our special grace, certain knowledge and mere motion, given and granted, and We do hereby for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, give and grant that The Most Honourable Frederick Temple, Marquis of Dufferin and Ava, Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, the Right Honourable Robert George, Baron Windsor, The Right Honourable Sir John Lubbock, Baronet, Fellow of the Royal Society, Henry Richard Tedder, Esquire, John Young Walker MacAlister, Esquire, And all other persons who, pursuant to this Our Charter, are, or may become Fellows or Members of

the Corporation established by this Our Charter in pursuance of the provisions thereof, shall be a body corporate by the name of the Library Association, and shall by that name have a perpetual succession and a common seal with a capacity to sue and be sued by their corporate name, and for the purposes of the said Corporation to take, purchase, and hold any personal property, and also notwithstanding the Statutes of Mortmain any real property, provided that the yearly value of such real property shall not at any one time exceed in the whole one thousand pounds, the yearly value of every portion of such real property being for that purpose taken to be the yearly value thereof at the time when it is acquired by the Corporation, with power to sell, grant, demise, mortgage, exchange, and otherwise deal with such real or personal property, or any part thereof, on such terms and in such manner as they may think fit.

And We do hereby declare as follows :---

PRELIMINARY.

In the construction of this Our Charter, the following words and expressions, unless there is something in the context which is inconsistent with such interpretation, shall have the meanings hereinafter assigned to them, that is to say—

"The Corporation" means the Fellows, Honorary Fellows, and Members of the Library Association, incorporated by this Our Charter.

Words in the masculine gender include the feminine, and words in the singular number include the plural, and in the plural number include the singular.

PURPOSES AND POWERS OF THE CORPORATION.

The purposes of the Corporation are :

 (τ) To unite all persons engaged or interested in library work, by holding conferences and meetings for the discussion of bibliographical questions and matters affecting Libraries or their regulation or management or otherwise.

(2) To promote the better administration of Libraries.

(3) To promote whatever may tend to the improvement of the position and the qualifications of Librarians.

(4) To promote the adoption of the Public Libraries Acts in any City, Borough or other district within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

(5) To promote the establishment of reference and lending Libraries for use by the public.

(6) To watch any legislation affecting Public Libraries, and to assist in the promotion of such further legislation as may be considered necessary for the regulation and management or extension of Public Libraries.

(7) To promote and encourage bibliographical study and research.

(8) To form, collect, collate and publish (in the form of Transactions, Journals, or otherwise), information of service or interest to the Fellows and Members of the Association, or for the promotion of the objects of the Corporation.

(9) To collect and maintain a Library and Museum.

(10) To hold examinations in Librarianship and to issue Certificates of efficiency.

(11) To do all such lawful things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objects.

OFFICERS.

The Officers of the Corporation shall be: a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer or Treasurers, a Secretary or Secretaries, a Solicitor or Solicitors, an Auditor or Auditors, or such other Officers as may from time to time be prescribed by the Bye-laws of the Corporation for the time being in force.

MEMBERSHIP.

Fellows and Members of the Corporation may be elected in manner provided by any Bye-laws duly made under this Our Charter as hereafter provided.

THE COUNCIL.

The Council shall be the governing body of the Corporation, and shall consist of such members as may be from time to time prescribed by the Bye-laws, and subject to such Bye-laws, and in so far as such Bye-laws do not otherwise provide, shall consist of the following persons : (1) The President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, Solicitor, and such other Honorary Officers as may be appointed in accordance with the Bye-laws for the time being in force. (2) Twenty Members or Fellows of the Association at the least, to be annually elected at the Annual General Meeting. The Council shall hold such meetings from

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time to time as may be prescribed by the Bye-laws for the time being in force, and may hold other meetings as occasion may require, and as the Bye-laws may direct. The first Council of the Corporation shall consist of the persons who, at the date of this Our Charter, are members of the Council of the Library Association. Provided always that any Officer who may receive any salary or remuneration for his services from the Corporation, shall not be qualified to be a member of the Council. Subject to the provisions of this Our Charter, or any Bye-law duly made thereunder, the Council shall have the sole management of the income, funds and property of the Corporation and of its affairs, and may do all such things (including the affixing of the common seal of the Corporation to any document) as shall appear to them necessary or expedient in relation thereto.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEES.

The Council shall have power to appoint such Executive or other Committees as in their judgment may be necessary, subject to any Bye-law in that behalf which may be made by the Corporation.

The present Officers of the Library Association shall be Officers within the meaning of this Our Charter, and shall be entitled to hold office until the Annual General Meeting of the Corporation held next after the date of this Our Charter.

GENERAL AND OTHER MEETINGS.

There shall be a General Meeting of the Corporation within three months after the date of this Our Charter, and such Meeting shall have all the Powers of an Annual General Meeting.

An Annual General Meeting of the Corporation shall thereafter be held in every year, at such time and place as the Council shall appoint, but subject to any Bye-law for the time being in force.

Other General Meetings may be held at such times and places as occasion may require, and as the Bye-laws may direct.

The President shall take the Chair at any General Meeting at which he is present, and in his absence the Fellows and Members present shall, subject to the Bye-laws, choose one of their number to be Chairman of the Meeting.

The Fellows and Members shall annually elect a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer or Treasurers, Secretary or Secretaries, Solicitor or Solicitors, and such other Officers as the Bye-laws may direct, and twenty of their number at the least to act as members of the Council.

The Annual or other General Meeting may be adjourned to such time and place as the Meeting may determine, but subject to any Bye-law in that behalf which may be duly made.

Bye-Laws.

Any ten Fellows or Members or Fellows and Members may propose that the Corporation shall make any Bye-law or revoke or alter any existing Bye-law after giving notice thereof in writing to the Secretary six weeks at least before the Meeting at which such proposal is to be made to the Corporation.

The Council shall have power from time to time to make Bye-laws and from time to time to revoke or alter any Bye-laws theretofore made.

The Bye-laws may provide for all or any of the following matters:—

(a) The carrying out of any of the purposes of the Corporation.

(b) The qualifications, election and classification of the Fellows and Members of the Corporation, and the conditions of Fellowship or Membership, including the contributions to be paid by Fellows and Members to the funds of the Corporation.

(c) The qualification, election, nomination, appointment, removal, continuance in office, and duties of the Officers or of Members of the Council or of any Executive Committee or Sub-Committee respectively and of all Officers and Servants of the Corporation.

(d) The issuing, renewing and forfeiture of certificates of efficiency, and the conditions under which such certificates shall be issued, renewed or forfeited subject to the provisions of this Our Charter, the summoning and holding of and proceedings at General Meetings, including the voting at such meetings, and the rights and duties of persons present thereat and the quorum necessary to constitute the same.

(e) The summoning and holding of and proceedings at meetings of the Council and of any Executive Committees or Sub-Committees thereof, the quorum at such meetings, and the business, powers and duties of those bodies respectively.

(f) The management of the funds and property of the Corporation.

(g) Any matter connected with, or relating to, the affairs or government of the Corporation.

(h) The removal of any Fellow, Member or Associate.

Provided that :--(i.) The said Bye-laws shall comply with the provisions and directions of this Our Charter; and (ii.) Any such Bye-law, and any revocation or alteration thereof shall not take effect unless and until it has been sanctioned by two-thirds of the members present and voting on the question at a duly convened General Meeting, and has been allowed by the Lords of Our Privy Council, of which allowance a Certificate under the hand of the Clerk of Our Privy Council shall be conclusive evidence; and (iii.) The notice convening such General Meeting shall contain a notification that such Bye-law, or such revocation or alteration, will be taken into consideration thereat; and (iv.) The Bye-laws set forth in the schedule hereto shall, until the same are revoked or altered in manner hereinbefore provided, be deemed to be and shall be the Bye-laws made for the government and regulation of the affairs of the Association.

FUNDS.

All property now belonging to or held in trust for, and the benefit of all contracts with the Library Association shall from the date of this Our Charter vest in, and enure for the benefit of, the Corporation, and the Corporation shall pay and discharge all the debts and liabilities of the said Association.

ANNUAL REPORT AND STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS.

The Council shall once in every year at least prepare a General Report of their proceedings for the year preceding, and attach thereto a duly certified Statement of Accounts and of the Finances of the Corporation, and shall submit the same to the Annual General Meeting of the Corporation.

The accounts of the Corporation shall be audited by an Auditor or Auditors to be appointed each year at the Annual General Meeting. Each Fellow and Member shall be entitled to receive a copy of such Report or Statement.

SUPPLEMENTAL PROVISIONS.

Any act or thing done by the Corporation or by the Council, or by any Committee or Sub-Committee thereof, shall not be

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invalidated by reason of any vacancy in any office or post in or belonging to the Corporation, or in the Council or in any Committee or Sub-Committee.

A defect in the qualification or election of any person or persons acting as a Member or Members of the Council or of any Committee or Sub-Committee shall not be deemed to vitiate any proceedings of such Council or Committee or Sub-Committee in which he or they has or have taken part, in cases where the majority of Members, parties to such proceedings, are duly entitled to act.

Any document purporting to be certified under the seal of the Corporation to be a true copy of this Our Charter or of any Bye-laws made thereunder shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to be a true copy, and any Bye-laws purporting to be so certified shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been duly made, sanctioned, and allowed, and to be in force.

Any instrument, which if made by private persons would be required to be under seal, shall be under the seal of the Corporation and signed by the proper officer of the Corporation. Any notice issued by or on behalf of the Corporation shall be deemed to be duly executed if signed by the proper officer ; but, subject as aforesaid, any appointment made by the Corporation, and any contract, order, or other document made by or proceeding from the Corporation, shall be deemed to be duly executed either if sealed with the seal of the Corporation, and signed by the proper officer, or if signed by two or more Members of an Executive Committee authorised to sign them by a resolution of that Committee, and countersigned by the proper officer, or if executed in any other manner prescribed by the Bye-laws for the time being in force; but it shall not be necessary in any legal proceeding to prove that the Members signing any such order or other document were authorised to sign them, and such authority shall be presumed until the contrary is proved.

The proper officer of the Corporation shall be any officer authorised by the Council to sign such notices and documents as he is required to sign as aforesaid, and it shall not be necessary in any legal proceeding to prove his authority, and such authority shall be presumed until the contrary is proved. The Council may at any time, and from time to time, having first

obtained the sanction of the majority of the Members and Fellows of the Corporation present, and voting on the question at a General Meeting, of which notice stating the intention to propose the giving of such sanction has been duly issued, apply for and accept a new and supplemental Charter, or an Act of Parliament, if it appears to the Council that such Charter or Act of Parliament is required for carrying into effect any of the purposes or powers of the Corporation.

In witness whereof We have caused Our Letters to be made patent.

Witness Ourself at Westminster the Seventeenth day of February, in the Sixty-first year of Our reign.

The Schedule before referred to being the BYE-LAWS of the LIBRARY ASSOCIATION.

Fellows, Members, and Associates.

Se.

1. The Association shall consist of Fellows, Honorary Fellows, Members, and Associates.

Fellows.—Any member of the "Library Association of the United Kingdom," elected within the first year of its foundation; the Founder of a Library; a member of a Library Board; a Librarian; a Member of the Council of the Association; or a person distinguished for bibliographical attainments—may be elected a fellow.

Honorary Fellows.—Persons who have rendered distinguished service in promoting the objects of the Association, or whose election in the opinion of the Council will be advantageous to its interests or objects, may be elected honorary fellows. Honorary fellows may hold office.

Members.—(a) Any person interested in the objects of the Association may be elected a member. (b) Libraries and other institutions may be admitted to membership upon payment of the annual subscription of one guinea, and they shall be entitled to nominate a delegate who, if approved of by the Council, may attend the meetings of the Association, and on behalf of the library or institution which he represents, shall enjoy all the privileges of ordinary membership.

Associates.—Library assistants are eligible for election as associates. They shall enjoy all the privileges of members except that they may not vote or hold office.

METHOD OF ELECTION.

2. The Council shall have power to elect as a fellow any qualified member of the Association who has been a subscribing member before March the first, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six : otherwise

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the method of election of fellows, honorary fellows, members and associates, in each case shall be the same, namely, a proposal, giving the candidate's name and qualification, and signed by two fellows or members, shall be submitted to the Council, and if the proposal is approved of by the Council the candidate will be balloted for at the next ensuing meeting of the Association (Monthly, Annual, or Special General), the name of the candidate being given in the notice convening the meeting. A simple majority of those present shall suffice to elect any candidate.

SUBSCRIPTIONS.

3. Honorary fellows shall pay no subscription.

Fellows elected before the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, shall pay an Annual Subscription of One Guinea.

Fellows elected on or after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, shall pay an entrance fee of One Guinea and an Annual Subscription of One Guinea.

Members shall pay an Annual Subscription of One Guinea.

Associates shall pay an Annual Subscription of Half-a-Guinea.

All Annual Subscriptions shall be due and payable in advance on the first of January in each year.

If any subscription be not paid within six calendar months the defaulter may be removed from the Association by a vote of the Council. The annual payments of fellows and members (other than delegates) may be commuted by a life-subscription of fifteen guineas, and all life-subscriptions shall be invested by the Council, on behalf of the Association.

CONSTITUTION OF COUNCIL.

4. The affairs of the Association shall be managed (subject to the control of Annual and Special General Meetings) by the Council consisting of a President, twelve Vice-Presidents, an Honorary Treasurer, an Honorary Secretary, an Honorary Solicitor, and thirty-two Councillors, of whom twelve shall be resident in London and twenty in the country. To these shall be added all Past Presidents who are willing to serve. The Council shall hold office for one year.

ELECTION OF COUNCIL.

5. On the death or resignation of any elected officer or councillor the Council, in their discretion, may fill the vacant place.

The voting at the election of the Council shall be by ballot. The President and Vice-Presidents shall be nominated by the Council, but the other officers and councillors may be nominated either by the Council or by the fellows and members at large. Nominations by fellows and members must be signed by at least three voters. The voting papers shall include only nominations sent to the Hon. Secretary by the first of July in each year. Voting papers shall be sent to each voter, whose sub-

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scription is not in arrear, at least four weeks before the Annual Meeting, and the Council shall make such regulations as may best enable all qualified voters to record their votes in a secret ballot. The Scrutineers shall declare the result at the Annual Meeting. A tie shall be decided by lot by the President or Chairman, presiding at the Annual Meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT.

6. The Council shall present to the Annual Meeting a general report on the work of the Association during the year.

THE HON. TREASURER.

7. The Hon. Treasurer shall receive all moneys due to the Association, shall make such payments as the Council directs, and shall keep an account of all receipts, payments, assets and liabilities, of which he shall submit a report to the Annual Meeting, and, whenever requested, to the Council.

THE HON. SECRETARY.

8. The Hon. Secretary shall keep a record of all proceedings, shall draft reports, issue notices, and conduct correspondence, and shall have charge of all books, papers, and other property belonging to the Association.

THE HON. SOLICITOR.

9. The Honorary Solicitor shall advise the Council and Secretary in all matters involving questions of law, and shall advise fellows and members of the Association on questions of Library Law that are of general interest.

COUNCIL MEETINGS.

10. Meetings of the Council shall be called by the President, or by the Hon. Secretary, or by any five members of the Council, and shall be held at such times and places as may be decided at a Council meeting immediately after the election of the Officers and Council, or at any subsequent Council meeting.

THE AUDITORS.

11. Two Auditors shall be elected by an open vote of the fellows and members present at the Annual Meeting. They shall present to the Association, at each Annual Meeting, a report on its financial affairs and shall act as scrutineers of the ballot at the Annual Election of Officers and Council. On the death or resignation of an Auditor the vacancy shall be filled up by the Council.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

12. The Council may appoint Standing Committees, the members of which may be selected from the Council, and from the Association at

large, to deal with various departments of the Association's work under such conditions as from time to time shall be fixed by the Council. Persons who do not belong to the Association may be appointed consultative members of such Committees, but shall not vote upon any question involving expenditure.

PAID OFFICERS.

13. The Council shall have power to appoint such paid officers or servants as may be necessary for the service of the Association upon such terms as they deem proper.

ANNUAL MEETINGS.

14. There shall be an Annual Meeting, of which at least one calendar month's notice shall be sent to each fellow and member. Notices of motion must be sent to the Hon. Secretary by the first of July and must be printed in the summons to the meeting.

15. The Annual Meeting shall receive and consider the general report of the Council, the Treasurer's and Auditors' report, and motions of which notice shall have been given in the summons to the meeting, and papers approved by the Council.

16. It shall be lawful for the Council to admit to each Annual Meeting persons who are not fellows, members, or associates. These shall pay a contribution of One Guinea, and shall enjoy all the privileges of the Annual Meeting for which they have subscribed, shall receive the report of the proceedings at the Annual Meeting and any annual publication which is presented gratis to the fellows and members, but shall not be entitled to any vote.

MONTHLY MEETINGS.

17. Monthly Meetings also shall be held at some fixed time and place, of which notice shall be given to all fellows, members, and associates ; but the Council shall have power to suspend the meetings during July, August, September, and October. The Council shall have authority to engage rooms for the Monthly Meetings, and for the formation of a museum of library appliances, and of a bibliographical library.

18. The Monthly Meetings shall receive papers, which have been approved by the Council, and consider suggestions on all subjects relating to the objects of the Association ; shall examine all library appliances and designs submitted to them by the Council; and shall lay their conclusions and recommendations before the Council. They shall further have power to appoint special Committees for the investigation of any subject within the purpose of the Association ; and the reports of such Committees shall be submitted to the Council. No resolution which does not arise immediately out of the business of the meeting may be proposed at a Monthly Meeting unless at least a fortnight's notice has been given to the Hon. Secretary, and the terms of the resolution set forth in the summons to the meeting.

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SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING.

19. On receipt of a requisition from any five members of the Council, or any fifteen fellows and members, the Hon. Secretary shall, by a summons stating the purpose of the meeting, convene, within one calendar month thereafter, a Special General Meeting, provided that the purpose for which the meeting is required be stated in the requisition.

BRANCH ASSOCIATIONS.

20. In any district containing six fellows or members of the Association, a Local Branch Association may be formed, with a Corresponding Secretary. Resolutions and recommendations forwarded by Local Branch Associations to the Hon. Secretary of the Association shall be laid before the next meeting of the Council.

EXPULSION OF MEMBERS.

21. Any fellow, member, or associate may be expelled from the Association by the vote of the majority of those present and voting at any Monthly, Annual, or Special General Meeting, provided notice of the motion for his expulsion has been given on the summons to the meeting and communicated by registered post to the fellow, member, or associate. Provided always that a fellow, member, or associate, who has been expelled at a monthly meeting shall have the right of appeal to the next Annual or Special General Meeting.

VOTING, ETC.

22. On the demand of any four fellows or members, any motion submitted to a meeting shall be decided by ballot.

23. The Chairman of any meeting shall have the right of voting, and if the number of the votes, for and against, be equal he shall also have a casting vote.

24. When the expression, "fellow or member," "fellows or members," or "fellows and members" is used in the Bye-laws it shall be understood that for the purpose referred to, fellows and members are to be regarded as having equal privileges.

EXAMINATIONS AND CLASSES.

The Preliminary Examination is abolished, but all Candidates for the Professional Examination must produce a certified declaration of having been engaged in practical library work during three years previous to the Examination, or a certificate of having passed some public examination from among those accepted by the General Medical Council,¹ or other satisfactory evidence of good general education.

The Examination consists of three sections :

(I) Bibliography and Literary History.

(2) Cataloguing, Classification, and Shelf Arrangement.

(3) Library Management.

Each section may be taken separately, and certificates *pro tanto* are granted. Handwriting, spelling, and English composition are taken into consideration by the Examiners.

The special object of the Examination as a test of the practical competence of a candidate is held in view by the Examiners in setting the questions; and the candidate is advised to bear in mind that no study of text-books is of value unless accompanied with a knowledge of books, such as can best be acquired by actual experience in a library.

An Entrance Fee of 10s. is payable by Candidates at each Examination, but this may, at the discretion of the Education Committee, be returned to those who sit through the Examination, or portion thereof, for which they enter themselves.

It is proposed to hold the next Examination in December of this year.

SYLLABUS.

I. BIBLIOGRAPHY AND LITERARY HISTORY.

(Two literatures to be taken, of which one must be English.)

(a) Bibliography. Besides the practical knowledge obtained in his own library, the candidate must show a fair knowledge of the matter dealt with in Horne's Introduction to Bibliography and the bibliographical articles in the Encyclopædia Britannica. He must have some acquaintance with the history of printing and the leading bibliographical works of reference. He must know the Latin names of the towns most frequently found in imprints.

(b) Literary History, especially of the last hundred years.

Each candidate must show that he has a thorough knowledge of the matter of the text-books in the appended List, and, moreover, an acquaint-. ance with the editions and forms in which the works of leading writers have been published, and of the literature that has grown up around those works.

II. CATALOGUING, CLASSIFICATION, AND SHELF ARRANGEMENT.

The candidate must be able to catalogue and classify a number of books in at least two languages (one of which must be Latin) besides English. He must be familiar with leading systems of cataloguing and the best printed catalogues produced in English-speaking countries, theories and schemes of classification, size-notation, shelf-registers, mechanical methods used in cataloguing, &c.

III. LIBRARY MANAGEMENT.

This section of the Examination will be a test of the candidate's experience and his skill and readiness in dealing with the various practical problems which may come before him. He will be examined as to the methods in use in his own library. The chief subjects may be thus arranged :

- (I) *Public Libraries Acts.*—History and leading provisions (only if the candidate is from a rate-supported Library).
- (2) Administration.—Committees, staff, finance, business, books, rules and regulations for the public.
- (3) Buildings.—Plans and specifications, lighting, heating, ventilation.
- (4) Fittings and appliances generally, but excluding mechanical methods used in cataloguing.
- (5) Maintenance.—Binding, stationery, periodicals, donations, propositions, &c., and their various books of records.
- (6) Executive work.—Charging and registration of books (lending and reference), registration of readers or borrowers, issue and other statistics.
- (7) General.-Aid to readers, reference library work, news-rooms.

"De l'art de prêcher," par Saint Augustin (en latin), Une des premières impressions de l'introducteur de la typographie à Strasbourg, alors ville impériale. Lyon, Caractères d'imprimerie des XVe. et XVIe. siècles, trouvés dans le lit de Saône. Ces caractères d'imprimerie paraissent prevenir de l'imprimerie de Guillaume Le Roy, la plus ancienne de Lyon. Ils ont été employés dans le "Doctrinal du temps passé" de Michault, attribués aux presses de Le Roy, dans le "Traité d'Albertan" de Brescia, signé de Le Roy, et dans d'autres ouvrages .- Ces caractères constituent une curiosité typographique de première ordre. Ils montrent que, dans les premiers temps de l'imprimerie, la hauteur des lettres était arbitraire, chacun fondait à sa guise, et que la lettre n'avait pas de cran, mais un talus pour indiquer au compositeur la tête de la lettre. Ces caractères sont les plus anciens qui existent, ceux de l'imprimerie de Plantin, conservés au Musée Topographique de la ville d'Anvers, gravés et fondus par des français, Claude Garamonde et Simon de Colines, sont d'une époque postérieure, les lettres ayant déjà des crans comme de nos jours.

7. Under what reigns must we place the biographies of the following persons:—Du Barry, De Berri, Pompadour, Montespan, Ninon de l'Enclos.

8. Name the writings of Napoléon III., Duc d'Aumale, Duc d'Orléans, Comte de Paris.

9. Under what other names may we look for catalogue entries of the following writers :--D'Abrantes, De Raguse?

10. What authors would you recommend to a reader desirous of being acquainted with the lives of :—(a) Napoleon I.; (b) Louis XIV.; (c) Marie Antoinette? (Avoid direct biographies of them.)

CATALOGUING.

Time 11 hours.

I. Describe the differences between "dictionary" and "classified" forms of catalogues, and the merits or defects of each.

2. Rule 28 of the Library Association Cataloguing Rules reads :— "All persons generally known by a fore-name are to be so entered, the English form being used in the case of sovereigns, popes, ruling princes, Oriental writers, friars, and persons canonized." Give illustrations showing the meaning of this rule.

3. To what extent should the repetition dash be used in accordance with Cutter's Rules?

4. Give a list of divisions into which you could subdivide the subjectheadings in a *dictionary* catalogue of :—Bible, India, Chemistry.

5. Catalogue the five books set before you in accordance with Cutter's Rules for a dictionary catalogue, afterwards alphabetizing all the entries by means of numbers, and making as many cross-references as may be necessary in the case of synonymous headings.

6. Catalogue the same books for a classified catalogue.

CLASSIFICATION AND SHELF-ARRANGEMENT.

Time 11 hours.

I. Explain the special features of the Dewey system of classification, and give a list of its classes, and the divisions under Sociology and Natural Science.

2. Compare the relative advantages of the Decimal Classification and Relative Index and the Dictionary Catalogue.

3. Enumerate the chief hindrances met with in the classification of literature.

4. Contrast the relative advantages of Mr. Swan Sonnenschein's Best Books and Mr. Fortescue's Subject-Index of the Modern Works added to the Library of the British Museum, with special regard to the internal arrangement of titles.

5. Enumerate the advantages and disadvantages of close classification on the shelves.

6. Describe the system of classification you would adopt in dealing with, say, 5,000 volumes covering every period of British history.

7. How would you arrange a collection of books by local authors and from local presses, with tracts, pamphlets and papers, the materials of local history?

8. Find close subject-headings for Ruskin's Sesame and Lilies; Schliemann's Tiryns; Sir Thomas More's Utopia; Ascham's Scholemaster; Hartland's Fairy Mythology; Muir's Theory of Determinants.

LIBRARY MANAGEMENT.-CLAUSE II.

Time 13 hours.

I. Having an assured income per annum from the penny rate and other sources, what means would you adopt for ascertaining the relative expenditure, *i.e.*, on books, binding, periodicals, &c.?

2 What rule or rules would you enforce in a general reading room to ensure the fullest possible use of the newspapers and periodicals?

3. How would you arrange magazines and newspapers so that they could easily be found by the readers?

4. Assuming that some card-charging system is in use in your library, what business books would you provide for keeping a record of issues for statistical purposes?

5. In a library having a staff composed of both sexes, what ordinary routine work would you apportion to the female members?

6. Write out a specimen page of a Library Committee Minute Book, or so much of a page as would show the heading and introductory paragraphs of an ordinary committee meeting in their usual order, or what you consider to be the best order in which to arrange them.

7. State briefly what account books you consider necessary to keep the accounts of a medium-sized free library, or (alternatively) a subscription library, in satisfactory order. Show the relation of these various books to each other and to the annual balance-sheet.

8. What do you consider the best method of filing correspondence so that it may be easily accessible, and give ready reference to the replies sent.

4. Show what an important place in our literature historical writing obtained in the reign of George III.; and give some particular account of any one history then published which has since become a classic.

5. State and discuss the estimates of Boswell's character and capacity given respectively by Macaulay and Carlyle.

6. What novels of note appeared between the *Vicar of Wakefield* and *Waverley*? Mention any of the thoughts and ideas they embody.

7. Describe and explain the condition of the drama in the latter half of the last century.

8. Show some knowledge of the inside of the following books :--Peter Plymley's Letters, A Sentimental Journey, The Prophecy of Famine, The Excursion, The Lord of the Isles, Vindiciæ Gallicæ, The Rights of Man.

9. Compare *Paradise Lost* and *Paradise Regained* in regard to the subject, style and treatment. How would you explain Milton's refusal to allow the superiority of the former?

10. Describe the following characters :- Hudibras, Achitophel Mac Flecknoe, The King of Brobdingnag, Martinus Scriblerus.

3. Explain the chief cause of early French poems being so largely anonymous.

4. Prove by authors, and dates at which they flourished, that the fruit of the Renaissance matured earlier in Scotland and France than in England.

5. Who are the authors of the following :- Mariamne, Venceslas, Roman Comique, Riquet à la Houppe, Le Lutrin, La Malade imaginaire, Ibrahim, and when did they flourish? To what departments of literature do the above works severally belong?

6. Who were the chief followers of Montaigne in the eighteenth century? State the works by which each is principally known.

7. "The history of literature and the history of philosophy touch each other only at certain points in their course." How far does Descartes exemplify the points of union?

8. Prove Voltaire's claim to be reckoned as an encyclopædic writer. How far did he justify it ?

9. Name the chief writers of the Romantic Period at its commencement, giving their principal works, stating what each more especially excelled in.

10. Translate the following passage :---

Quant à moi, je crois que l'imperfection des premiers caractères de Gutenberg, qui étaient sans doute entièrement en plomb, et durent s'user des les premières feuilles tirées, ne lui permirent pas de réaliser son plan. 5. Differences of opinion (and therefore of rule), exist as to the advisability of entering pseudonymous works under the real name of the author. State the arguments for and against, which rule you consider best for your own library, and why.

6. Criticise the specimen half page of a catalogue placed before you, pointing out its merits and defects, and noting any errors of compilation or the press.

7. State briefly the rules for dealing with books by joint-authors.

8. Catalogue the four books set before you for a dictionary catalogue, alphabetizing the entries by numbering, and giving such crossreferences as you consider desirable.

9. Catalogue the same books for a class catalogue.

10. Catalogue the same books for a bibliography.

CLASSIFICATION OF SHELF ARRANGEMENT.

Time 1½ hours. Six questions had to be answered. Nos. 1 and 7 were obligatory.

I. Give a concise account of the system of classification adopted in the British Museum, and remark on the chief points of difference between it and the Dewey classification.

2. Discuss the limitations, advantages and disadvantages of a close

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system of shelf-classification as applied to (a) the Reference Department, and (b) the Lending Department, of a public library.

3. Draw out a scheme for a shelf catalogue, which shall show the exact stock at any time, and account for all changes in the stock.

4. Describe, in general terms, Cutter's expansive classification, and the system of notation applied to it by the author. Is this system of notation an important feature of his scheme of classification?

5. Distinguish between Dynamics, Statics, Kinematics. Define Keramics, Malacology, Horology, Petrology, Eschatology, Demography, Iconography.

6. How would you arrange a library of local works? What would you consider "local"? Name a good example of a catalogue of local publications.

7. Distinguish between the relative arrangement (system of classification) and use of Mr. Fortescue's "Subject-Index of Modern Works," and that of Mr. Swan Sonnenschein's "Best Books"; also between the arrangement and use of the Index to Periodicals published by Mr. Stead and that published in America.

8. What purpose is served by a Shelf-list? Is it an essential book of record? If you think it is not, what books would you keep so as to dispense with a Shelf-list?

9. Describe an arrangement of books in a library by which you would keep the books most generally in demand nearest to the place of issue. Mention a library where this is attempted.

Time 11 hours. Six questions had to be answered. Nos. 1 and 4 were obligatory.

On a site of a triangular shape, of which one side is 40 ft., another side 35 ft., and the third 50 ft., sketch out the ground plan of a small library building containing a lending library, newsroom, and small reference department. The lending department must accommodate 10,000 vols. in cases not more than $8\frac{1}{2}$ ft. high, and show a counter with room to display an indicator.

2. Describe any three kinds of adjustable library shelving known to you, in which the spacing is one inch apart.

3. Describe any three forms of newspaper or periodical rack to which the public has access, and give dimensions of one on the overlapping shelf principle, to accommodate 50 periodicals in cases.

4. Describe and give rulings for a list of books for binding.

5. Describe and give rulings for a check list of periodicals: (a) daily; (b) weekly; (c) monthly.

6. What are the books or forms necessary in registering borrowers and guarantors.

7. Describe the process of taking stock of the books in a lending library.

8. Name a few reference books (other than ordinary encyclopædias) likely to aid a reader seeking either literary or historical information.

9. Given an old-established reference library from which it is necessary to remove many works in order to make room for later acquisitions, state some of the considerations that would influence you in the selection of works to be rejected.

10. Name some of the principal works of reference, magazines, and newspapers, which you would recommend for a newsroom in a small provincial town, presuming that an important town with a large free library is in the neighbourhood.

CLASSES IN LIBRARY ECONOMY.

THE Education Committee has instituted a series of classes and examinations in library economy, the subjects comprising bookbinding, cataloguing, elementary bibliography, historical printing, and library management. The lectures for this year commenced on February 1st, and it is hoped that the course has been of assistance as a preparation for the examination of the Library Association, and that assistants and students will in future years more freely avail themselves of the opportunities offered to them for technical training. The question of the continuation of these classes must largely depend upon whether the attendance of students is satisfactory and sufficiently encouraging. Hitherto the expense of the classes over and above the fees received, has fallen upon the funds of the Association. An application has recently been made to the London Technical Education Board for a grant in aid of the work of the Committee, but it is to be regretted that the application has been refused. Had the decision of the Board been favourable, it would have been possible to largely extend the educational influence of the Library Association.

The Committee have been much assisted by the kindness of those who have gratuitously placed at their disposal rooms for the use of the classes and the holding of examinations, including, amongst others, the London Technical Education Board as managers of the Central School of Arts and Crafts, and the Royal Medical and Chirurgical Society.

A Bill to amend the Public Libraries (Scotland) Acts has been introduced by Sir Robert T. Reid, Q.C., M.P., Member for the Dumfries Burghs, in the present session of Parliament. The object of this measure is to enable adjoining burghs to combine for library purposes; the want of such power having proved an obstacle in the case of Dumfries and Maxwelltown, which burghs have received an offer of $\pounds_{10,000}$ from Mr. A. Carnegie for the establishment of a library for their joint use.

PREAMBLE OF PROPOSED BILL TO AMEND THE PUBLIC LIBRARIES ACTS.

THE following is the preamble of a Bill, drafted for the Library Association, which has been introduced by Lord Windsor in the House of Lords, "To amend the Acts relating to Public Libraries, Museums, and Gymnasiums, and to regulate the Liability of Managers of Libraries to Proceedings for Libel."

MEMORANDUM.

This Bill is introduced to meet practical difficulties in the administration of the Public Libraries Acts.

Clause 2.—In an urban district the Public Libraries Acts are now adopted by the urban district council under the Public Libraries Amendment Act, 1893. There is, however, no power enabling the voters to adopt the Acts if they so desire. This clause accordingly empowers any 20 or more voters to request the urban district council to adopt the Act, and if the council fail to do so the question is to be submitted to the whole of the voters in the district for their opinion. The clause corresponds with section 1 (2) of the Public Libraries (Ireland) Act, 1894.

* Clause 3.—There are now three different methods for adopting the Public Libraries Acts in England and Wales; (1) by voting papers distributed among the voters (in metropolitan districts and parishes); (2) by resolution of the urban authority (in urban districts); (3) by the parish meeting, or by a poll under the Ballot Act (in rural parishes). The clause as drawn will simplify the procedure, where the opinion of the voters has to be ascertained, by requiring that the poll shall be taken by ballot.

Clause 4.—In some cases where the Public Libraries Acts have been adopted, the vestry or other body having power to appoint the library commissioners have frustrated the desire of the voters by neglecting to appoint the commissioners, and the voters are left to the tedious and expensive remedy of applying for a mandamus. This clause provides that on the default of any vestry or other authority the Local Government Board may appoint commissioners to carry out the desires of the voters.

Clause 5.—There are no provisions as to the qualifications of commissioners appointed to carry out the Public Libraries Acts in parishes,

* NOTE.—In the new London Government Bill it is contemplated to apply the same method for adopting the acts in metropolitan boroughs as is now in force in boroughs outside London, thereby securing, as far as the metropolis is concerned, one of the objects aimed at in this Bill of the Library Association. and the clause makes the qualifications or disqualifications of a commissioner correspond with those of a parish councillor.

Clause 6.—The Public Libraries Act, 1892, empowers a library authority to make regulations for the use of their buildings, but no power is given to enforce such regulations. Following the precedent of the Public Libraries (Scotland) Act, 1887, section 22, it is proposed to give the library authority power to make bye-laws, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Board, for the regulation of the buildings under its control, and for other definite objects, so as to meet many practical difficulties which have been experienced by library authorities in the past.

Clause 7.—The library authorities of two or more parishes or of two or more urban districts may now agree together for the joint use of one library, but authorities in an urban district and a parish may not so agree. This clause would enable the library authority of any district to agree with any other library authority for the joint use of a common library, &c.

Clause 8.—It is proposed to make county councils "library authorities," in order to facilitate the amalgamation of rural parishes, which separately would be unable to provide an adequate library out of the limited rate.

Clause 9.—The House of Lords has decided that public libraries are not liable to pay income tax, and that they are exempt like other "literary institutions." This was the result of appeals by the Corporation of Manchester at considerable expense. But some libraries, which are by their poverty compelled to use some of their rooms as a lodging for the librarian, or to let them off as a means of income, are deprived of the exemption enjoyed by wealthier institutions-and thus it happens that the poorer the library the more it is taxed. In some towns libraries are also exempted from rates under the Literary and Scientific Societies Act whereas other libraries, in poorer districts, which have to depend on the library rate alone, are refused relief from rates-and are thus again punished for their misfortunes. In some towns the library is assessed at a merely nominal amount, while in others full rates are charged. It is proposed, therefore, to exempt all libraries, &c., from rates and taxes, and thus secure a uniformity of practice, and place these public "Literary Institutions" in the favourable position occupied by private literary and scientific societies in this respect.

Clause 10.—By the Public Libraries Act, 1892, the expenses of administering the Public Libraries Acts in a parish are subject in each year to the approval of the vestry. The Acts having once been adopted, the ratepayers are sufficiently protected by the limited rate imposed by the Act, or fixed by themselves, and the work of the library authority should not be hampered, as it may be, by changes in the constitution of the vestry. Moreover, library commissioners may incur liabilities which

they may not be able to meet if the vestry exercises its power of voting a merely nominal amount for library purposes in any one year

Clause 11.—In an urban district a museum may be provided, either under the Public Libraries Acts or the Public Health (Museums and Gymnasiums) Act, 1891. A reasonable doubt having been expressed as to the power to charge the expenses of a museum provided under the former Acts as expenses under the latter Act, the clause would enable any urban authority to decide that the expenses of a museum already provided may be charged as expenses under the last-mentioned Act, and thus relieve the library rate.

Clause 12.—At the present time no accurate record exists of the places for which the principal Act has been adopted, and it is proposed that notice of such adoption shall be given to the Local Government Board.

Clause 13.—Under the existing law, when a poll is to be taken, different registers of voters have to be used, according as the district is in the metropolis or is a borough or rural parish. The clause provides that parochial electors are to be the voters, whenever a poll is taken under the Public Libraries Acts.

Clauses 14 and 15.—These clauses make the Act applicable in part to Scotland and Ireland.

Clause 16.—This clause is introduced to meet the difficulties which were experienced by the British Museum in the case of *Martin* v. *Trustees of British Museum*. Although in that case it was held that the trustees were not liable for the libel contained in the book, yet library managers without any default on their part might be subjected to expensive legal proceeding in consequence of libellous matter contained in some of the books on their shelves. It is the object of the clause, while amply protecting a libelled party, to relieve library managers from any action or proceedings, unless they wilfully persist in circulating the libellous book after proper notice.

Clause 17.—Local authorities in the provinces have the power to provide a museum or a gymnasium under the Act of 1891, and many have exercised that power. Such local authorities have also power (under the Public Libraries Amendment Act of 1893) to adopt the Public Libraries Act, 1892, without taking any poll of the ratepayers, either by voting papers or by ballot, but by simply passing a resolution and publishing the same as required by that Act. It is felt to be unreasonable to deny like powers to the local authorities in the Metropolis.

The foregoing notes sufficiently explain the objects of the Bill, it is therefore not considered necessary to print the text in full. Should the Bill become an Act of Parliament, it will be published in a future edition of this handbook.

Note.—Under the heading "Notes and Queries on Public Library Law," in the Journal of the Association, are published questions on the operation of the Public Libraries Acts, which have been submitted to the Honorary Solicitor, together with his answers thereto.

BRANCH AND AFFILIATED ASSOCIATIONS.

THE Branch Associations, formed either in connection with or by members of the Library Association, provide a means of intercommunication for those engaged or interested in library work in different provincial centres, who by reason of distance are prevented from taking a more active part in the meetings of the parent Association. The members have largely availed themselves of the advantages offered by periodical gatherings for the reading of papers and for discussions on matters of interest to librarians, and the results cannot but have been helpful to all concerned.

Further particulars will be gladly afforded by the honorary secretaries of the respective Associations, to whom the Editor is indebted for the information here given.

NORTH-WESTERN BRANCH OF THE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION.

THE Branch was founded at a meeting held at Manchester in July, 1896, and is designed to consist of all those members of the Library Association who reside in Lancashire or Cheshire, together with such other members as signify their wish to be included. At present there are 116 members, of whom five reside outside the district. In forming the Branch it was thought that without holding frequent meetings, at stated intervals, and without superceding the meetings hitherto carried on by the "Librarians of the Mersey District," useful work might be found in connection with questions of legislation, rating, instruction and examination of assistants, and other practical matters, more especially such as affect the working of municipal libraries.

A Summer School for the Northern Counties has been formed, and has held sessions in Manchester in 1897 and in Liverpool in 1898. The meeting for 1899 will be held at Wigan. The School is managed by a small committee, of which Mr. G. T. Shaw (The Athenæum, Liverpool) is secretary.

The annual meeting of the Branch is held in the spring at Manchester. The following are the officers for 1898-9:--Chairman, Alderman H. Rawson (Past President of the Library Association); Committee: Sir W. H. Bailey, Alderman J. W. Southern, Messrs. W. E. A. Axon, G. L. Campbell, P. Cowell, A. Lancaster, W. May, J. J. Ogle, H. Plummer, G. T. Shaw, C. W. Sutton; *Honorary Secretary*, C. MADELEY (THE MUSEUM, WARRINGTON).

THE BIRMINGHAM AND DISTRICT LIBRARY ASSOCIATION.

THE Birmingham and District Library Association was established in 1895, at a meeting held at Aston Manor Public Library. Its membership includes librarians and library assistants of Birmingham, Wolverhampton, Worcester, Shrewsbury, Warwick, Leamington, Coventry, Stratford-on-Avon, Wednesbury, Walsall, West Bromwich, Oldbury, Dudley, Aston Manor, Handsworth, &c., and some other persons not actually engaged in library service, viz., members of library committees and persons interested in the public library movement. Meetings have been held at most of the places named, four ordinary meetings taking place in each year, in addition to a summer holiday excursion. The objects of the Association are declared in its bye-laws to be :- The interchange of thought and opinion on library work, the visiting of libraries within the area of the operations of the Association, and the promotion of good fellowship among all who take part in library work. Many interesting papers have been read, and subjects discussed, bearing on the practical work of a library, and in addition to visiting nearly all the principal libraries within the area, visits have also been paid to various' manufactories and places of interest, archæologically or historically, and opportunities of inspecting processes of manufacture specially interesting to those who have the care of libraries have not been lost sight of. Past presidents of the Association have been :-- Mr. John Elliot (librarian, Wolverhampton), Mr. A. Capel Shaw (librarian, Birmingham), and Mr. Alfred Morgan (librarian, Walsall); and the present officers are :--President, Mr. Joseph Hill (Birmingham); Secretary, Mr. ROBERT K. DENT (LIBRARIAN, ASTON MANOR); Treasurer, Mr. William Downing (Birmingham). The subscription is 2s. per annum, but "assistants may pay 1s. per annum," and are entitled to all the privileges of the Association.

LIBRARIANS OF THE MERSEY DISTRICT.

THE Quarterly Meeting of Librarians of the Mersey District was commenced November 23rd, 1897, as an informal club open to all librarians

and assistants in Lancashire and Cheshire. The meetings are held at the various libraries of the district in turn, on the invitation of members, and fourteen places have thus been visited, some more than once. Papers are read, chiefly on subjects of practical librarianship, and new catalogues, forms and appliances are exhibited, and libraries inspected. The number of members is forty-one. There is an annual subscription of two shillings. The present executive consists of Messrs. J. Harding (Bebington) and J. Ward, B.A. (Leigh), and the *Honorary Secretary* is Mr. C. MADELEY (THE MUSEUM, WARRINGTON). Any librarian in the district desiring to join is requested to communicate with the Secretary.

NORTH MIDLAND LIBRARY ASSOCIATION.

THIS Association was formed in March, 1890, as the result of a mecting convened by Messrs. J. Potter Briscoe and John T. Radford, who were respectively elected the first President and Honorary Secretary. The members consist of librarians, assistant librarians and others connected with the working of libraries, who pay a nominal subscription. Membership covers the counties of Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, Leicestershire, Northamptonshire, Lincolnshire, and in the earlier period also included Warwickshire, but the last named county is now within the area of the Birmingham and District Library Association. Meetings have been held, amongst other places, at Nottingham, Derby, Leicester, Lincoln, Hucknall-Torkard, Peterborough and Newark-on-Trent. The Annual Meeting is held at Nottingham on the first Thursday in October. The papers read have been of both a literary and technical character, and different library appliances have occasionally been shown to the members.

The Association numbers nearly sixty members, who have thus had opportunities of becoming better acquainted with each other. A small benevolent fund, which has been established, has also been of practical assistance. Numerous visits have been made to various libraries, printing and publishing works, and bookbinding establishments.
