

Pursuant to the Plan of Episcopal Visitation, the North Indiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in its Sixty-ninth session in the First Methodist Episcopal Church in the city of Wabash, Ind., Bishop David H. Moore, D. D., LL. D., presiding.

Representations.—Rev. L. J. Burney, Dean of Boston School of Theology, addressed the Conference in the interests of that institution.

Rev. J. B. Hingeley, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants, addressed the Conference in refer-

ence to the work of the Board, calling special attention to the great advance that had been made during the Quadrennium, in the support of Conference Claimants, and presented the Conference a check for \$400 from the Board.

Methodist Review.—At the suggestion of the Bishop, M. A. Harlan was elected agent for the Methodist Review.

Auditing Accounts.—On motion of the Secretary, the Conference ordered that the accounts of the Secretary, Treasurer, Board of Stewards, Sustenation Accounts and the Pro Rata Ministerial Claims should be audited by the Auditing Committee.

Conference Relations.—On motion it was ordered that where members of this Conference who have been effective in this Conference but a short time, and are now in the Non-Effective relation, and engaged in secular pursuits, that the District Superintendents shall refer such cases to the Committee on Conference Relations.

W. W. Martin offered the following, which was adopted: "That all cases of proposed change of relation be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations by the Conference or by the District Superintendents, and only such cases thus referred shall be considered by the Committee."

Thursday Morning, March 28, 1912.

Conference convened at 8:15 A. M., with the devotional exercises in charge of Dr. W. L. Munhall and Bishop Moore in the chair. Dr. Munhall announced Hymn 349,

"Something for Jesus,"

after the singing of which, he led in prayer. Hymn 481,

"O Love That Will Not Let Me Go,"

was then sung, followed by Dr. Munhall's address to the Conference on "A Revival in Preaching."

At 9 o'clock the Conference business was resumed, Bishop Moore presiding.

Edward H. Taylor, a supernumerary member of the Indiana Conference, was introduced, and on motion of T. M. Guild he was made Effective. Bishop Moore then announced his transfer to this Conference.

Nominate Committees.—On motion of D. V. Williams, the District Superintendents were constituted a committee to nominate Standing Committees for next year, and apportion the benevolences to the Districts.

Leave of Absence was asked by S. Light for R. J. Wade, to attend a funeral.

The Secretary read the report from the Book Concern.

**Drafts.**—Bishop Moore called attention to the general publications of the Book Concern and in particular, attention to two or three books that are being emphasized at the present time. He also announced a draft from the Chartered Fund, calling for \$30, and a draft from the Book Concern for \$3 884, which drafts were ordered indorsed in favor of the Conference Treasurer, to be used by the Board of Stewards.

Order of the Day.—On motion of C. E. Line, Saturday morning after the reading of the Journal was fixed as the time for the consideration of Question 32, fixing the place for the meeting of the next Conference.

**Transfer.**—Gomer E. Hughes, a member of the Illinois Conference, was introduced, and the Bishop announced his transfer to this Conference.

Eighth Question.—The Eighth Question. "Who Have Been Admitted Into Full Membership?" was called. The following were passed in character, reported in their studies and recommended by the Committee on General Qualifications, represented by their respective District Superintendents, and advanced to the Studies of the third year: Leroy Huddleston, Leo G. Jacobs, Wm. T. Daly, Ernest C. Hallman, Emory Dunbar, Davis E. Cruea, Edwin Dickson and Jesse B. O'Connor. They were called forward, addressed by the Bishop, asked the disciplinary questions, and elected to Deacon's Orders.

Arthur Jones was elected to Deacon's Orders, it being understood that he would be ordained by the Bishop presiding in the New York East Conference; and in like manner Karl H. Carlson was elected to Deacon's Orders. to be ordained in the Newark Conference.

Charles B. Brooks was received on his credentials from the Methodist Episcopal Church South, in the studies of the second year, advanced to the studies of the third year, admitted to full membership in the conference, and elected to Deacon's Orders.

Ballot.—The time having arrived for the election of the delegates to the General Conference, the Secretary read the following rules governing the election of delegates to the General Conference, which were adopted on motion of H. C. Smith:

Rules of Election.—(1) Election of delegates shall be by ballot.

- (2) Majority of all votes cast shall be required to elect.
- (3) If more than the number to be elected receive the majority, then the requisite number having the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.
- (4) A ballot shall be void if it contains more or less number of names than the number of delegates to be elected on that ballot.

- (5) In voting for either of two men of the same name, the initials or given name shall be supplied, or some sufficient designation.
- (6) Three reserve delegates shall be elected, subject to the foregoing rules.
- (7) Only the Official Blank Ballot prepared by the Secretary of this Conference shall be used.

The Bishop announced the following as tellers: C. H. Smith, R. L. Semans, J. W. Walters, Arthur Cates, J. J. Fischer and L. M. Krider. The vote was taken and the tellers retired to count the ballots in charge of J. C. White, one of the Assistant Secretaries.

- S. H. Kirkbride spoke in the interests of the American Bible Society.
- M. S. Marble presented a recommendation of the District Superintendents and the Board of Stewards, as follows:

Recommendations.—The District Superintendents and Board of Stewards of the North Indiana Conference, desiring that the purpose and spirit of the Church may be more adequately expressed in an equitable and just distribution of the Conference Funds, after careful thought, do hereby present the following recommendations for the approval of the Conference:

- (1) That all claimants whose income from other sources affords them a comfortable support be and are earnestly requested to relinquish their claims on the Annuity Fund.
- (2) That in the Statement for the Annuity Fund, under Item VII, each claimant shall state as accurately as possible his net income for the current Conference year. This must not include what he received from the Conference funds when the last annual distribution was made.
- (3) That all claimants, whose net income from other sources plus their annuity may be more than one-half of the average cash salary of the District Superintendents and pastors in the "Effective Relation," shall receive only such part of their annuity as will make their total income equal to one-half of the aforesaid cash salary.
- (4) That the Annuity Fund for 1911-12 shall be distributed at the rate of \$..... for each year of service rendered while in the "Effective Relation."

These recommendations, on M. S. Marble's motion, were to be submitted to The Wabash Plain Dealer, with a request that they be published in today's issue. and to be made the order of the day for 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

Dr. Harry King, President of Moore's Hill College, spoke in the interests of that institution.

Rev. Edgar Blake was introduced as the representative of the Sunday School Society.

Rev. J. Wellington Frizzell, a member of the Central Illinois Conference and of the Board of Control of the Epworth League, was introduced and greeted the Conference.

Preachers' Aid.—The time having arrived, according to the Constitution of the Preachers' Aid Society, for its annual meeting, the Conference suspended business and the Preachers' Aid Society convened, with Bishop Moore in the chair. On motion of T. M. Guild, H. N. Herrick, W. D. Parr and G. B. Work were constituted a committee on nominations. C. U. Wade, Secretary of the Society, made his report, which was accepted.

J. W. Cain made a report of his work as General Secretary of the Society, calling attention to the following amendment, which was passed last year and which was to have been made a part of the Year Book last year, but which was omitted and is now incorporated:

Article V. Section 1, Paragraph 1, of the Constitution of the Preachers' Aid Society, was amended to read: "The net income of this Society shall be distributed annually among those of its members who are designated by the Annual Conference as 'Conference Claimants,' according to the following provisions of the Discipline of 1908, Par. 309, Sec. 2—'Superannuated preachers the widows of deceased preachers, and their children under 16 years of age, are Conference Claimants.' The Society may also appropriate of its net income to any of its members not superannuated, but who have been made 'Necessitous Cases' by the action of the Annual Conference."

On motion of W. W. Martin, it was ordered that a committee of three be appointed to investigate the accounts of the delinquents and to report at an adjourned session. Committee composed of W. W. Martin, A. S. Preston and A. G. Neal.

- C. C. Cissell moved the appointment of a Disbursing Committee, to consist of H. N. Herrick, G. B. Work and H. C. Smith.
- W. D. Parr spoke in reference to increasing the endowment fund of the Society, and the following resolution was offered by W. W. Martin and adopted:

"Knowing that many of our laymen have not given to other endowment funds when solicited, and that many

who have done so are abundantly able to do more,

"We hereby request that the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) be asked from each district in the Conference for the Preachers' Aid Society, to be raised within the next three years; and that the effort to accomplish this purpose be under the direction of the General Secretary of the Society, and a committee of two ministers and three laymen from each District.

"(Signed) W. W. Martin, C. U. Wade, Wm. D. Parr, G. B.

Work, M. S. Marble, Loren M. Edwards."

The resolutions were further discussed by C. E. Line and W. D. Parr.

On motion of B. S. Hollopeter time was extended.

The Committee on Nominations made report of the following officers, who were elected: President, L. J. Naftzger: Vice-President, B. S. Hollopeter; Secretary, C. U. Wade; Treasurer, J. W. Meeks; General Secretary, J. W. Cain; Managers, Hardin Rhodes, W. A. Meeks, Benj. Glasscock, D. O. Skillen and Chesteen Smith. On motion it was ordered that this Committee on Nominations also nominate the names referred to in the resolutions offered by Brother Martin.

On motion the Preachers' Aid Society adjourned.

Conference Business.—Conference business was resumed with Bishop Moore in the chair.

B. S. Hollopeter moved that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at 1:30 this afternoon and at 7:30 this evening.

The following were constituted an auditing committee, on motion of the Secretary: H. N. Herrick, Sherman Powell, A. L. Weaver and J. F. Lutey.

The Long Meter Doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by L. A. Beeks.

**F. J. McConnell.**—Francis J. McConnell, President of De-Pauw University, addressed the Conference in the interest of that institution.

**Resolutions.**—Sherman Powell read the following resolutions, which were adopted:

"We are convinced (1) that the supreme need of our Church is an aggressive evangelism which aims directly at the conversion of sinners, the reclamation of backsliders, and the sanctification of believers; and (2), that only by such evangelism can we pave the way for the restoration of 'the exercise of that power of godly admonition and discipline which Christ has committed to his Church for the promotion of holieness.' Therefore be it

Resolved, That we kindly instruct our delegates to the coming General Conference at Minneapolis in May that they give their voices and votes (1) To further such evangelism as much as possible by General Conference action; and (2), to insist on a timely, kindly, and judicious, yet firm, enforcement of the law against prohibited popular amusements, and to oppose the repeal of such law, in order that the Church may have a consistent attitude and enjoy the protection of the law and power of the Gospel, by the co-operating forces of which the vexed problem can alone be settled."

Whereas, The history of the human race is very largely a history of strife and bloodshed; and

Whereas, We are looking forward to the time when the nations shall be disarmed and the Prince of Peace shall reign in righteousness: and

Resolved, That we respectfully request our Senators Shively and Kern to use their influence and to vote for the ratification of such treaties, according to their original draft.

Whereas, In the past twenty years only two members of this Conference have had official position in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and these two were in secondary positions; therefore be it

Resolved, by the North Indiana Conference in annual session in the City of Wabash, Ind., March 29, 1912, that we nominate for General Secretary of the Epworth League one of our members, who for four years was president of the Indiana State organization of the League, the Rev. Chesteen W. Smith, D. D., and instruct our delegates to work and vote to secure his election.

Morrison of Kokomo, and Mr. W. J. Creighton of Wabash, the Secretary, to Bishop Moore. who invited them to be seated on the platform. The Lay Delegates-elect, Everett Warner of Muncie, Marion B. Bishop Moore then addressed the Joint Session in an enthusiastic and happy manner on the opportunity and importance of the Layman in the Church, and called for an onward move along all lines of religious activity.

The North Indiana Conference Quartet then sang the Welsh melody, and by request the song, "I Want to Go There."

Bishop Moore then called Dr. Parr to the platform to speak on the subject of Conference Claimants, who in an enthusiastic and happy manner aroused great interest in behalf of our Conference claimants.

Ballot.—The Bishop announced the result of the ballot for Reserve Delegates as follows: B. S. Hollopeter, 104; J. A. Beatty, 93; C. U. Wade, 41. Whole number of votes cast, 166. Number of defective votes, 2. The foregoing were declared elected as Reserve Delegates to the General Conference.

On motion of the Secretary, the Conference adjourned, with the Benediction by W. E. McCarty.

#### FOURTH DAY.

# Morning Session.

Saturday Morning, March 30, 1912.

Conference met at 8:15, Bishop Moore being present.

The devotional services were in charge of L. W. Munhall. Hymn No. 1,

"O, For a Thousand Tongues to Sing,"

was sung, after which Brother Munhall asked that fifty people lead in prayer. Hymn No. 325,

"Break Thou the Bread of Life,"

was next sung. Evangelist Munhall then addressed the Conference on the subject, "Revival in Bible Study."

Conference Business.—Conference business was commenced with Bishop Moore in the chair. At his request the Conference sang Hymn No. 225,

"Shall I for Fear of Feeble Man."

Journal.—The Journal of yesterday's session was read and approved.

Thirty-second Question.— The Thirty-second Question, "Where Shall the Next Conference be Held?" was called. W. A. Griest presented the invitation of Simpson Church, Fort Wayne, and O. A. Trabue, the invitation from Kemp Memorial Church, Tipton. After these places had been represented respectively by W. A. Griest and J. A. Beatty, for Simpson Church, and by O. A. Trabue and C. C. Cissell, for Tipton, the Conference voted to accept the invitation from the Kemp Memorial Church, Tipton, which vote. on the motion of W. A. Griest, was made unanimous.

Fourth Question.—The Fourth Question, "Who Have Been Received on Credentials and From What Churches?" was called. Frederick H. Cremean, on motion of J. A. Beatty and recommendation of the Committee on General Qualifications, was received into the Conference on his credentials as an elder from the Radical United Brethren Church. S. Light presented the name of Wm. F. Buckner, a minister in the Free Will Baptist Church. On his motion and the recommendation of the Committee on General Qualifications, he was admitted into the Conference, and his credentials were recognized as a deacon, and he was put in the studies of the first year.

On motion of G. B. Work, it was ordered that hereafter in the reception of men from other ecclesiastical bodies on their credentials, they must satisfy the Committee on General Qualifications as to their educational qualifications, or if they do not, they shall be received on trial. This was adopted by a vote of 61 to 25.

On motion of B. S. Hollopeter and the recommendation of the Committee on General Qualifications, the credentials of Arthur C. Zepp as a local deacon from the Church of the Nazarene were recognized.

The American Bible Society made a report, which was adopted. (See report.)

Memorial.—A memorial from the New York East Conference was read and adopted by a vote of 122 (unanimous.) The memorial was as follows:

Resolved, That the New York East Conference memorialize the General Conference to so amend Chapter VII of the Appendix of the Discipline of 1908 that certificates of work done in educational institutions other than our own may be accepted, at the discretion of the Annual Conferences; provided that, in such cases, special and careful attention be given to the examination on personal attitude to our doctrine and discipline."

Amendment.—The following amendment to the Constitution of the Methodist Episcopal Church was adopted by an Aye and No vote, the vote standing 111 to 3:

In Paragraph 41, Section 1 of the Discipline of 1908, in the second line, strike out the word "Wednesday" and substitute therefor the words "secular day," so that the lines as amended shall read:

"The General Conference shall meet at 10 o'clock on the morning of the first secular day in the month of May," etc.

Preachers' Aid.—On motion of W. W. Martin, Conference suspended business, and the Preachers' Aid Society convened, Bishop Moore presiding. W. W. Martin made the following report:

Your committee appointed to consider the cases of certain members of the Preachers' Aid Society who have not made payments on their notes to the Society for the period of three years, desire to report that S. B. Stookey, J. W. Zerbe and P. E. Greenwalt have made payments to the Society, D. S. Jones, L. E. Knox, J. O. Stutsman and P. H. Walter are referred to the General Secretary, report to be made in one year.

The committee recommends that a form of contract be prepared, which shall be given to each member of the Society now enrolled and to each new member on becoming a member, such contract to specify that such member shall be entitled to its benefits under the Constitution of he Society, at the time such contract is made.

This report was signed by W. W. Martin, Asher S. Preston and A. G. Neal.

On motion, the report was adopted by the Conference.

On motion, the Preacher's Aid Society adjourned.

Conference Business.—Business was resumed.

Watts De Puyster Home.—Miss Sarah Bowman, Field Secretary of the Watts De Puyster Home and School at Rennsalaer, Ind., represented the interests of that institution.

The Committee on Deaconess Work recommended that Miss Effie May Steigleman of Peru, Ind., be consecrated a deaconess.

The Committee on Temperance made their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

The Committee on Education read a report, which was adopted.

S. Light moved that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at 1:30 this afternoon. The doxology was sung and benediction was pronounced by F. G. Browne.

### FOURTH DAY.

#### Afternoon Session.

Saturday Afternoon, March 30, 1912.

At 1:30 o'clock Conference convened, Bishop Moore presiding. After singing

"We're Marching to Zion,"

prayer was offered by D. H. Guild.

S. Light represented the case of Edwin Elliott Parkinson, who was recommended by the Goshen District Conference. His grades were reported by the Conference Registrar, and on motion he was elected to Deacon's Orders, as a local preacher.

Frederick Martin Greenstreet was elected to Deacon's Orders, as a local preacher, having been reported on in his studies by the Registrar and properly represented.

Change of Relation.—Conference granted the following changes of relation: On motion of B. S. Hollopeter, H. J. Norris, from effective to superannuate, upon recommendation by the Committee on Conference Relations. F. L. Erlougher was changed from supernumerary to superannuate, and his case was referred to the Board of Stewards as necessitous. C. H. Jesus Christ as the Son of God. At 10:30 public worship was opened with the singing of Hymn 530,

"O. Thou in Whose Presence My Soul Takes Delight."

H. A. Gobin, D. D., offered prayer. Bishop Moore preached a helpful sermon from Isaiah. 53:11, on the theme. "Christ's Relation to Human Redemption." The service closed with prayer by B. S. Hollopeter.



# Reports of District Superintendents

# FORT WAYNE DISTRICT.

# James A. Betty, District Superintendent.

Dear Bishop and Brethren: In reporting the work of the Fort Wayne District to the sixty-ninth session of the North Indiana Conference, I note with pleasure the general good health and preservation of life of all the pastors and their families. Brother D. J. A. Brown

Peddycord, one honored superanuates, in early part of the year passed from labor to reward. Shortly after Conference Brother and Sister M. C. Pittenger were sorely bereaved in the death of their daughter Ina. After a long and painful

cickness with scarlet fever she slipped away from their home in answer to the call of the Divine Master. Ina was a bright girl of blessed promise, but her light and cheer now intensified, is adding charm to the heavenly world.

I am saddened to record the death of my brother in-law, Chester W. Church, which occurred in our home March 15. For 27 years he had been sorely afflicted and heroically battled against the infirmities of the flesh. January 8th he completed a four months' successful supply work at First Church, Portland.

These last four months were truly a fitting closing of his life. His passion for lost souls, his intense desire to comfort the sick and the sorrowing, his zeal for building up the Master's Kingdom, would put to shame many younger men. He could not have been more intense had he known these were his closing days.

The thirty-six men were appointed by Bishop Hughes to the various charges of the Fort Wayne District. Geneva Circuit was supplied by Brother Jesse Kelly, a local preacher. He served five months and Brother Charles Sherwood completed the year. Brother E. G.

Pelly, who supplied the New Haven Charge was released and Brother M. M. Thornburg was appointed. The year has been one of phenomenal prosperity.

Brother Jeffras feeling a distinct call to the Foriegn Missionary work asked to be released from St. Paul Church, Fort Wayne, that he might go to De Pauw University and more thoroughly fit himself for that important field. He was released October 1st, and Brother F. H. Cremean was immediately appointed to the charge and the work has gone forward with unusual success. Brother Joshua Jarvis, appointed to supply the Fort Wayne Circuit, was released in the middle of the year and Brother W. Z. Horbury from the Wesleyan Methodist Church was secured to fill out the year. The charge, which is without a parsonage unanimously invited him to return at an advance of two hundred dollars in salary and furnish a parsonage.

## Revivals and Membership.

A few splendid revivals have been held this winter. The pastors report more than 200 weeks in revival meetings. About 1,000 people have been converted and reclaimed and 1,033 have been received into the church. The District will report an increase in membership of about 200.

Last year our Conference sustained a loss of 54 members. Three of the Districts made a slight gain, three sustained a loss. I am impressed that the high noon of privilege and opportunity for the church is at our door. We need a return of the vision that getting men saved is our chief business.

The most extensive rivival was at Auburn with the Kerr Brothers as evangelists. One hundred and eighty converted and reclaimed. A great meeting was held at First Church, Bluffton, with Hart and McGan as evangelists. At First Church, Portland, 75 were converted with the pastor as his own evangelist. Other good revivals have been held at Angola, Decatur, Simpson, St. Paul and Trinity Churches, Fort Wayne, Fort Wayne Circuit, Fremont, Geneva, Geneva Circuit, Hamilton, Leo, Poneto, Portland Circuit and York.

## Buildings and Improvements.

The St. Paul congregation, Fort Wayne, began an active campaign immediately after Conference for a larger and more commodious place of worship. This was begun under the energetic and wise leadership of C. W. Jeffras and the church was fortunate in finding a man, in the person of F. H. Cremean, to bring it to completion. The old building was enlarged and remodeled, a fine basement put under the entire building, heated with steam, beautifully decorated, so they now have a new church with a seating capacity of 550 at a cost of \$8,000. December 24th it was dedicated by Dr. W. D. Parr. They are asking for the return of F. H. Cremean at an advance in salary of \$200.

The Simpson congregation is now comfortably housed in one of the most commodius and beautiful churches in the Conference. The 11th of February was fixed for the dedicatory service. Bihson Mc-Dowell and Dr. Parr were engaged to take them across to victory. Sickness prevented the Bishop from coming, but he sent a splendid substitute, Dr. S. C. Bronson of Garrett Biblical Institute. Thirty-two thousand dollars was raised during the day to cover indebtedness, interest and shrinkage. Near the midnight hour the church was solemnly dedicated to the worship of Almighty God. The entire cost of the building and grounds was \$48,000. More than usual credit is due Brother W. A. Griest for his optomistic spirit, wise leadership, untiring effort and devotion. In addition to his heavy pastoral duties, assisted by Dr. William Enslen, he superintended the entire construction of the building. With another increase in salary this church seems willing to try Brother Griest for another year.

At Prospect, on the Ossian Charge, March 10th, was dedicated one of the finest country churches in the state. This enterprise was launched under the pastorate of Brother E. L. Jones and was brought to successful completion by Brother C. B. Dougherty. cost about \$9,000. Dr. Parr raised over \$4,000. In this church I have an unusual pride as it is the church of my childhood. In the old church I was converted and attempted to preach my first sermon. Memories more sacred than I can describe cluster about this place.

At Union Chapel, on the Portland Circuit, after conference will be dedicated another new church. This church will cost \$8,000 and was built by a small membership of 24 people. It takes a pastor like Brother Emory Dunbar to get the people to see they can succeed in so large a task. This year we have built four new churches at a total cost of \$73,000.

Garrett, under the wise, heroic leadership of Brother Charles Tinkham, has launched a new church enterprise. With \$17,000 now subscribed and a considerable portion of this already in the bank, they are ready to move forward and build a new church at a probable cost of \$30,000.

improvements on the District have been quite general. Charges making improvements of one hundred dollars and above are as follows: Angola, \$166; Auburn, \$216; First Church, Bluffton, \$100; Bobo, \$365; Coesse, \$298; Decatur, \$250; Fort Wayne, First Church, \$275; St. Paul, \$750; Fort Wayne Circuit, \$240; Geneva, \$530; Hamilton, \$120; Hoagland, \$525; Hudson and Ashley, \$305; Huntertown, \$619; Monroe, \$230; Monroeville, \$600; Orland, \$650; Poneto, \$415; Portland Circuit, \$109; Woodburn, \$400. Total for the District, \$7,750.

Much of the debt on our church property has been canceled. I am pleased to note the following debts paid: Angola, \$900; Bluffton Circuit, \$75; Decatur, \$1,875; Fort Wayne, Trinity, \$775; Fremont, \$1,274, Hamilton, \$1,000; Harlan, \$100; Huntertown, \$75; Monroe, \$150; Montpelier, \$700; New Haven, \$580; Ossian, \$100; Pennville, \$185; Poneto, \$200; Portland Circuit, \$65; Woodburn, \$55; York, \$158. A total of \$8.267.

#### Salaries.

The salaries for pastoral support have been increased about \$1,700. A proportionate increase has come to our honored Superanuates. Our apportionment is \$700 above last year and I have the promise from all the pastors it will be met in full.

### Benevolences.

Our Benevolences will be considerably in advance of last year. The reports indicate for the cause of Missions about \$11,000, an ad vance of between four and five hundred dollars. For our other Benevolenct interests there will not be much change except for De Pauw University will be greatly increased on account of the payments to the Endowment Fund. The District contributed in pledges to this fund \$37,567. The total of our Benevolences will be very much in advance of last year. First Church, Portland, Loren M. Edwards, pastor, makes an offering of \$1,293 to the Parent Missionary Society. The total Benevolences of this great church is about the same as last year. First Church, Bluffton, Dr. Clark Crawford, paston, \$1,200, and a total for all Benevolences of \$6,000. Auburn, F. F. Thornburg, pastor, Missions \$728, and a total for all Benevolences of \$7.484.

Ninety per cent of the charges have given more largely this year than ever in their history. Please take note of some cases of the amount given per member: Angola, \$13.70; Auburn, \$21; Bluffton, \$14.38; Bluffton Circuit, \$7; Bobo, \$5.84; Coesse, \$9.60; Decatur, \$12.30; Decatur Circuit, \$5.24; Simpson, Fort Wayne, \$30; St. Paul, \$14.50; Fremont, \$13.60; Garrett, \$11; Geneva, \$14; Hamilton, \$12; Harlan, \$9; Hoagland, \$8.80; Hudson and Ashley, \$9.47; Huntertown, \$8; Leo. \$6.70; Monroe, \$7; Monroeville, \$9; New Haven, \$19.75; Ossian, \$27; Pennville, \$11; Portland Circuit, \$24.

## Departmental Societies.

We have 91 Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 14,350. With one exception they are all furnished with the publications authorized by our church. All our schools in the towns and cities are organized into Missionary Societies and many of them in the rural districts are being organized. The Epworth Leagues, both Senior and Junior have done a splendid year's work. Sub-district meetings have been held all over the District with fine programs and splendid interest. The District Convention at Portland was of unusual interest with a program of the highest order. The Juniors have organized three new chapters with a good increase in numbers and interest. About \$1,200 was pledged at the District Conference for the support of D. O. Ernsberger of India.

The Woman's Foreign and Home Missiona: y Societies report a fine increase over last year. The Foreign Society has organized four new Auxiliaries and the Home one. Last year in the great Methodist Episcopal Church the Foreign Society raised \$959,257. This was but \$51,000 short of a million for this society. Their increase was \$195,267. The total in cash receipts for the Home Society last year was \$701,217, exclusive of \$85,710 cash actually expended for supplies, making a total \$784,927. Grand total for the two societies, \$1,724,185. Why do these societies advance like that and our parent society make a slump of \$80,000? Because these women give systematically. Arouse, ye men, and get a little inspiration from your sisters. Brethren, install the Duplex envelope and organize the every member canvass.

Our Ladies' Aid Societies have done their usual good work, raising between nine and ten thousand dollars. These societies are well maintained helping their local churches to pay pastors' salaries, build and improve churches, pay debts, hire janitors, buy coal, contribute to the Benevolences, indeed do whatever the men can not or will not do.

We have five Methodist Brotherhoods. These are at Angola, Bluffton, Decatur, Fort Wayne, First Church, and Simpson. Two men's organizations, not connected with the Brotherhood, are doing splendid service at Wayne Street and Pennville.

## District Meetings.

Our Missionary-Evangelistic Convention held at New Haven the first week in October was far above the ordinary. The follow-upwork by the returned missionaries greatly strengthened our work.

Our District Conference was held at First Church ,Bluffton, February 26-28. Bishop Moore honored us with his presence and his sermon and address thrilled and inspired us to larger things for Christ Ex-Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks spoke to a great audience on the closing night on "My Observations In the Mission Fields." Dr. W. E. McKenzie presented the needs of the Hospital in its enlarging interest. The District unanimously agreed to assume \$12,000. The usual business of the District Conference received careful attention and F. V. Westhafer, the secretary, filled the reports with the minutes. Mont M. Thornburg was recommended to the Annual Conference for admission on trial.

Our people are loyal; our superanvates sweet spirited and helpful; our local preachers ready and efficient. A finer lot of men and queenly women than those who preside in parsonage homes in Fort Wayne District can not be found. It is to this noble company of pastors we are indebted for whatever prosperity may have come to the District. We must push ahead, looking unto Him who is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, combining our courage and faith for the speedy coming of the Lord's Kingdom.

## GOSHEN DISTRICT.

## Somerville Light, District Superintendent.

Bishop David H. Moore and Brothers of the North Indiana Conference: This is the third time I am coming to you with a report of the work of the churches in the Goshen District. Bihsop Hughes at the last session of this Conference appointed thirty-six men to the



charges of this District. Warsaw Circuit was left to be supplied. These men went away to battle and thirty-three return to tell of victory and defeat. August 1st, N. B. Robbins, a supply, was released from service on the Corruna charge and Chester B. Thomas of the Dakota Conference was appointed to serve for the remainder of the Conference year. His return for another year is greatly desired by the people. August 13th, L. C. Baker, on account of failing sight was obliged to give up his work on the Avilla Charge. Brother A. L. Lamport, a superanuate of this Conference, was secured for this work. He

has been so successful that the people unanimously request his return with the assurance of ar advance of two hundred dollars in salary. Scon after the last Conference session Brother E. L. English was appointed to supply the Warsaw Circuit where he has toiled hard and won many souls to the Saviour. Sister Weaver, the wife of our pastor at Syracuse passed through a severe illness involving an operation in a Chicago hospital, but is now making a good recovery. Sister Polhemus, the wife of our pastor at Osceola, battled against a serious affliction the greater part of the year, but is now on the way to complete recovery. Sister Debow, the wife of our pastor at Ligonier, was taken suddenly and seriously ill early in December. children of Brother Freeland, the pastor at Mishawaka, passed through a long siege of typhoid fever, but are now seemingly well and strong. The families of our Supernumerary and Superannuate members have been well with but three exceptions. Brother E. F. Hasty and wife have both been very sorely afflicted the greater part of the year. Miss Buena Bennett, the daughter of Dr. H. W. Bennett, has been a great sufferer throughout the year. But the faith and hope preached by her father so many years are her stay in these days of sore affliction. Brother W. R. Wones has been quite seriously ill, but is now so far recovered as to be able to attend this sesssion. On December 7 death came to the home of Dr. P. J. Shackleford of Warsaw and claimed his mother, Mrs. Mary Shackleford, widow of Rev. Nathan D. Shackleford. Her funeral services were conducted by her pastor. Brother A. G. Neal, assisted by fellow ministers of the Conference. Bright, sweet babies have come to gladden the hearts and homes of Brother and Sister Boase of Wakarusa, Brother and Sister Baker of Avilla, Brother and Sister Stanforth of Hamilton, and Brother and Sister Arlington Singer of Inwood.

#### A General Review of the Work.

First. The work with and for the young life-Sunday Schools. The schools of this District, 80 in number, have an enrollment of about 11,035, a gain over last year. But, now note this, 65 per cent of the members of the Sunday Schools, according to the reports of the pastors, attend the preaching services of the churches, while only 59 per cent of the membership of the churches attend the Sunday School. Our Methodist literature is taken in all the schools and nearly all are organized into Missionary societies. I am glad to note a good increase in contributions for Missions. Last year the schools contributed \$544.00. This year with three schools to hear from they report contributions amounting to \$1,177.

## Epworth League Chapters.

We are able to report a gain in both numbers of chapters and membership for the Junior and Senior Epworth League. Junior chapters report a membership of 839, and 47 Senior chapters report a membership of 1,847. These chapters are supporting a medical missionary in China. The annual convention at La Grange last year was well attended and gave evidence of more than usual interest and enthusiasm.

## The Special Work With and for Adults.

Second. In the presence of all this talk and stir with reference to the Men's Missionary work, the Men and Religion Forward Movement campaign, the Men's Bible Study Class organizations, etc., I am amazed that so little progress is being made in the Brotherhood work. While the pastors report but seven chapters the churches in which they are organized are being greatly benefited. The sixty-four Ladies' Aid societies in the District have raised nearly \$8,000 this year for various purposes. One of the societies of the District now has nearly \$3,000 in the bank with which to start a new church building enterprise. Another has subscribed \$10,000 for a new church and is coming forth with its payments. But aside from the financial aid rendered the organization is one of the large factors in the social life of the church. The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary societies are gaining in numbers and achievement. The two societies have disbursed this year more than \$5,000. The Home society of this District has for several years held the leadership of the Conference, while in mite box offerings the Conference leads in Methodism.

#### Finances.

Improvements for the year are as follows. In May the magnificent new church and parsonage of the St. Paul Church, Elkhart, were opened and dedicated. Dr. W. D. Parr was in charge of the finances and Bishop Hughes preached the sermons of the day: Former Pastor W. H. Brightmire and several visiting brethren gave good assistance. Thirty-seven thousand five hundred dollars were subscribed during the day and at night, after having formally dedicated the church, Bishop Hughes and the pastor had the pleasure of receiving the suscribor of the largest individual amount into the church. Brother Walters is now one of the most successful church builders of this Conference.

At Howe W. J. Huffman, pastor, the old church was moved to one of the best streets in the town and placed on an elegant lot beside the parsonage. The church was completely rebuilt, with fine pasement, kitchen, dining room, furnace and fuel room, new windows. towers on corners, etc. Sunday morning, June 17, the District Superintendent conducted the services attending the reopening. The people in a few moments subscribed and have now paid the \$1,241 needed to take care of this improvement. The church and parsonage at Ligonier, C. L. De Bow, pastor, have both been redecorated. cost was \$1,300, every dollar of which was raised before reopening day. Sunday morning, July 16, the District Superintendent conducted the reopening service. Brother A. L. Weaver, pastor at Syracuse, scored a great victory in the rebuilding of the church at that place. The dedicatory services were conducted by the District Superintendent Sunday morning, October 22. A little more than \$4,000 was needed to met all claims. The people willingly subscribed \$4,726 and this beautiful church was rededicated with great joy.

In the late fall time the church at Kendallville, Millard Pell, pastor, was opened for worship and service. The basement was remodeled, the auditorium refrescoed and wood work refinished with many other minor improvements. The expense was about \$1,000, a part of which sum was raised by the pastor preceding the day of reopening. The remainder was secured by Dr. Asher S. Preston, who conducted the services of the day. Brother Pell has done a good year's work and his return is urged for another year. Sunday evening, June 25, at the Vesper service hour the District Superintendent had the very great pleasure of laying the corner stone of the Eberhart Memorial Church at Mishawaka, W. B. Freeland, pastor. This magnificent church will be ready for dedication in June. It is one of the best, if not the very best Methodist Episcopal buildings in the state of Indiana.

Improvements have ben made on other charges in the District as follows: Trinity, Elkhart, Dr. R. J. Wade, pastor: Bourbon, W. M. Holopeter, pastor: North Webster, W. T. Daily, pastor; Osceola, Preston Polhemus, pastor; Avilla, A. L. Lamport, pastor: Valentine,

W. E. Hogan, pastor: Inwood, Arlington Singer, pastor; Albion, J. S. Newcombe, pastor; New Paris, W. F. Buckner, pastor; Elkhart Circuit, A. A. Turner, pastor; Milford, R. T. Laslie, pastor; La Grange, A. H. Backus, pastor; Leesburg, J. C. Graham, pastor; Corruna, C. B. Thomas, pastor; Topeka, F. A. Reichelderfer, pastor; Wakarusa, Herbert Boase, pastor; St. Mark's, Goshen, J. C. Woodruff, pastor; Waterloo, G. F. Hubbartt, pastor. A total of \$12,865.

The Morris Chapel church on the North Webster charge is to be rebuilt. Pastor, W. T. Daly. Plans are adopted, the material is on the ground and the work will go forward after Conference.

#### Debts Paid.

The following charges have paid debts to the total of \$3,135: St. Paul, Elkhart, Wawaka, Osceola, Elkhart Circuit, Ligonier, Milford, Waterloo and Valentine.

#### Salaries.

Nineteen charges advanced their pastor's salary at the beginning of the year. The amounts ranging from fifty to three hundred dollars. These advances with those of the two former years make the advance in salaries for the three years past \$4,672. The average salary now paid the effective men who are members of the Conference is \$1,052.

#### Benevolences.

The partial reports now in hand indicate a good advance over last year, the total advance being \$6,349. Twenty-six charges report an advance, five charges about the same and six a little less than last year. This good showing has back of it among other influences the great campaign of last September and October conducted by the loyal men of the District, who with the District Superintendent and Dr. J. C. Floyd of Chicago and his enthusiastic company of returned missionaries. Benevolence conventions were held throughout the More than half of the membreship of the District attended these meetings and thirty-two charges were organized for an every member canvass. The Duplex envelope system was adopted and a new line up of the laymen was secured. Not only does this plan help the benevolences, but it also increases the giving for other causes. The average contribution per member for all purposes this year ranges from \$5.76 to \$24.75. Over \$25,000 has been contributed for benevolences and \$94,153 for all causes. In the gain column Foreign and Home Missions hold first place.

### Educational Work.

More students are attending our church schools than formerly. The great De Pauw campaign recently closed aside from securing the \$400,000 for the endowment fund did much to arouse the church to an interest in this and other Methodist colleges and universities. Dr. C. U. Wade and his very efficient helpers did more than raise

\$400,000 with which to enable De Pauw to bless the future. They stirred the youth of the state and turned the feet of not a few towards the pathway of the higher education. I am glad to note in this connection that for two years past young men from the Goshen district have won the college and state oratorical contests. Byron Price, a Methodist lad of Topeka won last year, and Ralph Bowman of La Grange this year. For the endowment fund this district subscribed \$24,653.

# Revivals and Membership.

This has been a glorious season for revival work. This district has not been so stirred for years in the good old fashioned way. Nearly every charge reports conversions and twenty-two have experienced genuine awakenings. In the majority of instances the meetings have been conducted by the pastors who report 1,402 conversions and 1.739 accessions to the church on probation and by letter. Etna Green (harge, B. F. Hornaday, 178 conversions; Middlebury charge, J. W. Bowen, 160; Wawaka, W. E. Loveless, 129; Trinity, Elkhart, Dr. R. J. Wade, 105; Mishawaka, W. B. Freeland, 100; Valentine, W. E. Hogan, 83; St. Paul, Elkhart, J. W. Walters, 75; La Grange, A. H. Backus, 65; Warsaw, A. G. Neal, 50; Osceola, Preston Polhemus, 60; New Paris, W. F. Buckner, 40; North Webster, W. T. Daly, 40: St. Mark's, Goshen, J. C. Woodruff, 30; Milford, R. T. Laslie, 27; Wakarusa, Herbert Boase, 23; Albion, J. S. Newcomb; Bourbon, W. M. Holiopeter: Bristol, C. B. Troxel; Howe, J. W. Huffman; Inwood, Arlington Singer, 20 each: Leesburg, J. C. Graham, 18; Ligonier, C. L. De Bow, 15, and several charges reporting from one to ten. In this connection I am glad to say that one of the Conference Evangelists, J. W. Oborn, whose home is in the bounds of this district, reports 639 in his meetings.

#### District Conference.

Our District Conference was held in St. Paul's church, Elkhart, Feb. 26, 27 and 28. Thirty-six of the thirty-seven pastors of the district were in attendance. The absent one was seriously ill. The speakers from without the district were Rev. Harry F. Ward of Chicago, Rev. Dr. T. P. Frost of Evanston, Dr. Edgar Blake representing the Board of Sunday Schools, Dr. W. R. McKenzie, secretary of the Methodist hospital, Rev. J. W. Cain, secretary of the Peachers' Aid Society, Rev. E. L. Jones, representing the Old People's Home, and our presiding officer, Bishop David H. Moore, who closed the Conference with a great sermon on a great subject. In response to the appeal of Dr. McKenzie of the Methodist hospital at Indianapolis, the district pledged \$8,500 for the endowment fund.

The pastors in Goshen district have done another good year's work for Jesus Christ and His Church. They have the district spirit and are pressing on towards higher ideals. I thank God for good health and another good year in the ministry with these good men and their families.

## LOGANSPORT DISTRICT.

# C. C. Cissell, District Superintendent.

I wish to express my heartfelt thanks and gratitude to Almighty God, whose kind providence has given me health and strength to finish the labors of another year. The Logansport District covers some of the most important territory in Indiana Methodism. It em-



braces four entire counties and penetrates five others. Our district, including the nine counties, has a population of 280,623. In our territory we have 39 pastoral charges, and they contain 78 churches, and our property is valued at \$691.725. We have 37 parsonages. There are 75 Sunday Schools, and we have enrolled 12,213 pupils. We have 38 Epworth Leagues, 13 Junion Leagues and 6 Methodist Brotherhoods. There are 64Ladies' Aid Societies, 15 Women's Home Missionary Societies, and 9 Women's Foreign Missionary Societies. The district is well organized in all departments of church work.

The Lord has been gracious to us, and death has not crossed the threshhold of any of our homes this year. The only one to be called from labor to reward was Sister Amelia Currie, widow of the late Rev. A. B. Currie, who was for many years an honored member of our conference. Sister Currie had suffered for a number of months from a stroke of paralysis, and at her adavnced age, recovery was impossible. Late in the autumn, she entered into that rest prepared for the children of God. Her pastor, Rev. S. F. Harter, conducted an impressive funeral service, and she was laid to rest by the side of her husband.

Rev. J. T. Hammond, who was transferred from the North Minnesota Conference and placed in charge at Converse, while conducting a revival meeting was stricken with paralysis, and since that time has been unable to work. He is slowly improving, but in all probability will be unable to preach for some time. He had completely won the hearts of the people, and they retained him as their pastor, paying him the salary until the close of the conference year. I shall recommend that he be granted a superannuated relation. Rev. J. M. B. Reeves and Rev. J. I. Phillips, two supernumerary brethren residing at Converse, have acceptably supplied the pulpit. Rev. B. M. Bechdolt, in charge at Hobbs, came to the conclusion that it was not well for man to live alone, and he was united in marriage to Miss Hazel McCauley at her home near Cassville, the District Superintendent performing the marriage ceremony.

## Changes in Appointments.

Bishop Hughes appointed 39 men to the charges in the Logansport District last year, and 34 of these served their charges without change. Five changes were deemed necessary during the year. Rev. R. C. Jones was transferred from Windfall to Detroit, Minnesota, and the Rev. S. F. Harter was taken from Galveston and placed in charge there. Rev. C. J. Graves made an exchange with Rev. J. T. Hammond of Morris, Minnesota, and came to Converse. The Rev. J. B. O'Connor was secured to take charge of Galveston, and Bishop Hamilton made the transfer. Rev. J. B. Draper, who was supplying Hillisburg, quit after the second quarterly conference, and the Rev. M. E. Williams was secured for the remaining part of the year. Rev. Lyman K. Dilts, who was in charge of North St. Kokomo, was wooed and won by our Baptist brethren, and quit about the first of September, and his place was acceptably filled by the Rev. E. R. Ryder, a student of Taylor University.

## Improvement of Church Property.

This has been a year of building and improving church proverty in the Logansport District. The new Church at Twin Springs, on the Alto charge, costing \$3,600, was dedicated early in the year by the District Superintendent. Cicero has let the contract for a new brick church which will cost when complete about \$15,000. Much credit is due Rev. J. J. Fischer, the faithful pastor, who faced many difficulties in launching the building enterprise. He secured about \$11,000 in subscriptions, wills and after-death bonds before the contract was made. The work will begin as soon as the weather will permit. Skilman, on the Mexican charge, has a new cement church under construction, costing about \$2,500. The pastor, Rev. F. J. Speckein, assisted in making the cement blocks and in making the excavation. Windfall has built a new parsonage costing \$2,000 and has a new church building started which is to cost \$16,000. The pastor, Rev. S. F. Harter, is deemed an indispensable factor to its completion. At McGrawsville, on the Santa Fe charge, they rebuilt their church at a cost of \$3,000, and it was dedicated free of debt by Rev. Dr. J. C. White of Kokomo. Atlanta is planning to remodel their church and the subscription is well under way for the completion of the work. Bunker Hill will build a new and modern parsonage the coming summer. Center, Elwood, Frankton, Galveston, Grace Church of Kokomo, North St. Kokomo, Wheatland Street Logansport, and Tipton have repaired and beautified their church property this year.

## Payment of Debts.

For many years our district has carried nearly one-half of the entire debt of the conference on church property. This year marks an epoch in our debt paying history. At Broadway, Logansport, there

was a debt of \$23,800, and only a small amount of it provided for. The pastor, Rev. J. A. Sumwalt, raised in subscriptions \$27,000, and of this amount \$11,000 was actually paid on the debt. Dr. John C. White of Grace Church, Kokomo, raised \$14,000 to make such needed repairs and to provide for a debt of \$9,000 of long standing. Main Street, Kokomo, reduced their debt \$2,500. Elwood has for twenty years struggled under a heavy load of debt, carrying a part of the time as much as \$24,000, and this year paid \$2,000, leaving yet unpaid \$11,800. Elwood suffered greatly on account of the failure of natural gas, and the removal of many of their industries. Akron paid \$2,000, Walton \$2,600, Market Street, Logansport, \$1,000; Wheatland Street, Logansport, \$873; Sheridan, \$704; Atlanta, \$301, and Russiaville, \$300. Other charges have paid lesser amounts. The raising of this large sum has hindered us somewhat in our benevolent collections.

### The Benevolences.

Our people have responded nobly for the benevolences, considering the heavy burdens they have been carrying all thees years. The reports of the pastors to me will show some increase over last year. Quite a few of the charges will report all collections in full Main Street, Kokomo, shows the greatest per cent of gain, closely followed by Cicero and Arcadia and Goldsmith. We hope ere long to sing "The morning light is breaking and the darkness disappears." When Logansport District is relieved of this great financial burden she will cheerfully respond to all the demands our great church will make upon her in support of these interests. Our preachers responded nobly to the De Pauw University Endowment Fund, and we rejoice in the great victory achieved by President F. J. McConnell, Dr. C. U. Wade, Rev. G. H. Myers, Rev. S. Powell and others. It will open a field of wider usefulness for our great Methodist University of Indiana.

#### Societies.

The 64 Ladies' Aid Societies of the district raised a little more than \$13,000 last year. Much of this amount has gone to pay church debts and make needed repairs on church property. The Women's Home Missionary Society reports \$1,774 and the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society reports \$1,110. While we have not a great number of these missionary societies, they are active, and are doing excellent work in their allotted field.

# Conventions and District Meetings.

The District Epworth League Convention was held at Wheatland Street, Logansport. It was largely attended, and a fine spirit was manifested among the young people. The program was strong, and the enthusiasm intense. We have held a number of district meetings for the spiritual improvement of the preachers. These were

very helpful. Our district Lyceum was held at Russiaville. It was a season of great spiritual blessing, and the sessions grew in interest to the close. It was the consensus of opinion that it was one of the best Lyceums ever held in the district.

## Revivals.

Special meetings have been held in nearly all the charges. The men have been faithful and persevering in their rvival work. spent 1,770 days in special revival work, and report 1,451 conversions and reclamations. Some of these revivals were attended with glorious manifestations of the power of the Almighty. The interest was intense, and in some instances the people were unable to gain admission. Elwood reports 200, Greentown 155, New Waverly 130. Grace Church of Kokomo 89, Cicero and Arcadia 76, Amboy 76, Santa Fe 70, Market Street of Logansport 65, Boxley 60, Tipton 52, and Kempton 50. Many of these meetings were held in the severest weather, but the people endured the cold and braved the storms.

## Supernumerary and Superannuated Ministers.

The supernumaerry and superannuated members of the Conference living within the bounds of the district are loyal to their pastors, and have rendered efficient help in the regular work, and especially was their assistance appreciated in the evangelistic campaigns. They were useful up to the limit of their strength, and have been Aarons and Hurs indeed in holding up their pastor's hands. These men have truly been a blessing to us. It is not merely the transactions of yesterday or today that we read in the heavens, but the history of earlier centuries as well. Some of the stars which appear to be above us, may have been smitten out of existence before the time of Adam, but their poured out light is still flooding the heavens. So these men live, while they themselves may have lost their youth and earlier activity, the light and inspiration of their lives continue to flood our souls. Their consecration and devotion to their Master is, and shall continue to be, felt as long as time shall endure.

Tipton, the county seat of Tipton county, is a beautiful city of 5,000 inhabitants, and is one of our most important stations. have one of the best church buildings in the Conference, and have a loyal and hospitable membership, and yet it has never been their privilege to entertain the Conference. They come to you this year with a hearty invitation to hold our next session in their city. The church is only two squares from the business section of the city, and the advantages are at once apparent. It has more paved streets than any city of its size in the State. There are no saloons, and the temperance sentiment is so pronounced that under the Proctor law it was found to have a safe majority in favor of the abolition of the saloon. The Church, the business men, the preacher, and the whole city join in asking you to come.

I have enjoyed the fellowship of the ministers and laymen, and have everywhere received courtesy and co-operation. The work is large, is growing, and the best of all is "God is with us."

## MUNCIE DISTRICT.

Bishop Moore and Brethren:

In this, my second annual report, I rejoice greatly that during the year no deaths have occurred among the effective men. However, two of our honored superannuates passed to the home land—Rev. J. A. Lewellen, D. D., and Rev. C. G. Hudson, D. D. Both of

these brethren had served a term on a district. Brother Lewellen on the Wabash District and Brother Hudson on the Goshen District. These two men of God were true to the Church of their choice, served her well and received the welcome of the Master, "well done, thou good and faithful servant."

Mrs. Sarah Meredith, the widow of the Rev. Yancy D. Meredith, has also joined the Church Triumphant during the year.

## Changes.

In July H. C. Alley of Hartford City Circuit gave up his charge and moved to Green Castle, to be a student. R. S. Reed has supplied this circuit and has done noble service. In the fall Herbert Webster gave up Grace Church, Anderson, in order that he might finish his education at Depauw. F. L. Erlougher was appointed to supply Grace Church, but his health gave way and he was not able to finish the year. F. A. Shipley surrendered Indiana Avenue to return to Depauw at the opening of the second semester. Charles B. Brooks, who comes to us from the Methodist Episcopal Church South has for the last few weeks supplied these two churches with great acceptability. Last October Dr. J. C. Murray, wife and daughter, accepted positions in Porto Rico under the auspices of the Woman's Home Missionary Society. G. H. Redding was moved from Gaston to Yorktown, and D. E. Cruea was supplied Gaston. After Conference, W. E. English was released from the Summitville Circuit to accept a charge in another district, and I. C. McNulty, a local preacher attending Taylor University, has supplied this charge during the year. At Conference Daleville was put with Indiana Avenue. It did not prove to be a satisfactory arrangement. At first P. J. Albright supplied Daleville and he was followed by A. G. Kiger, a local preacher.

## District Meetings.

The District Missionary Convention and Revival Conference were held at Alexandria. The Missionary Convention was conducted by Dr. J. C. Floyd and his corps of returned missionaries, and the Revival Conference by the Brethren of the District. With one exception, all the pastors were in attendance at the Revival Conference. Every brother on the program was there to do his part.

These were followed by a missionary rally in every charge conducted by a returned missionary. This proved to be very profitable to every charge.

The District Conference held at Selma was a great success. The high waters interfered. Nevertheless, the attendance was large, the program strong, and enthusiasm great. By laymen and pastors it was pronounced the most successful District Conference ever held in the Muncie District. All were delighted to have Bishop Moore to preach the opening sermon.

## Organizations of the Church.

Sunday Schools.—In many of the churches the Sunday Schools are in a flourishing condition, and with a very few exceptions they are loyal to our own church publications. Many of the schools keep abreast of the times by adopting the graded system and the teachers' training course. In these schools we find the church of tomorrow.

Epworth League.—In a few of the churches the Epworth League chapters have died out, leaving nothing but the charter hanging on the wall, but in many places the Epworth League is a vital spiritual force. There is not a chapter in the district asking for a backward movement on the amusement question. They are loyal to the standards of the Church. Many of these chapters have mission and Bible study classes. About two weeks before Conference the chapter of the First Church, Anderson, had a missionary exhibition, "The World in Anderson." It was unique in every respect and remarkably successful. The District Convention was held last year at Carmel.

While the attendance was not up to the standard, it was a profitable convention

Ladies' Aid Society.—These societies constitute the beehive of church industry. They are tireless workers. They raise hundreds of dollars to repair churches and parsonages and for ministerial support. The Titan Society of the First Church, Noblesville, has raised over \$1,000 this year, standing at the head of the district.

Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and the Woman's Home Missionary Society.—These auxiliaries are doing a great work. Their reports will show gains over last year's. If the money spent by the women of the Church on social functions could be turned to missionary channels, the kingdams of this world would soon become the Kingdoms of our Christ.

Brotherhoods.—We have a few chapters of the Methodist Brotherhood in the district. Judging from the reports to the Quarterly Conferences they are not very active. They have not measured up to their responsibility, and yet what a vast field for work. The fields are already white to the harvest. Men must be reached by men.

#### Devotional Services.

In some of the charges the prayer meeting is a lost art, but in a great majority of the charges it is still a power. It is the spiritual thermometer of the Church. If some of our laymen would give up some of their lodge work and some of the women would surrender some of their social functions and be found in their places in the mid-week prayer service, what a wonderful blessing it would be to the Church.

In almost all of the charges class meetings are still held. They are still a power for good. From these precious services Saints are sent forth into the world's work with a new courage and inspiration and a greater determination to continue faithful.

A few love feasts are held over the district. In a majority of the charges the love feast is never mentioned. It is the devotional service of the past. Many of our young people have neveer been in a love feast where the water and bread were passed as simple emblems of love and fellowship. The love feast still could be made a power for spiritual growth in our churches.

The District Superintendent has tried to make the Quarterly Conference spiritual. He has kept account of the attendance. The total attendance of all the Quarterly Conferences during the year amounts to 2,251. First Church, Alexandria, has the largest Quarterly Conference on the district.

### Our Literature.

Many of the presidents of Epworth League chapters in their reports to the Quarterly Conferences are unable to give the number of Epworth Heralds taken, and even some of the pastors do not know how many church papers are taken on their charges. One pastor on a circuit of five churches reports that not a single church paper except his own is taken in the bounds of the circuit. In the campaign which is now on for the increase of the circulation of the Western Christan Advocate, the district makes a good showing. W. E. Murray, our pastor at Fortville, reports the greatest increase in the circulation of the Western. There ought to be a law prohibiting any man from holding an official relation who does not take one of our Advocates. We need many things, but we do need intelligent Methodists who know for what our Church stands, and what she is doing in the home land and in the foreign fields.

## Financial.

Many of the charges increased and some decreased the pastor's salaries. The total amount of salaries show an increase over last year. With few exceptions all the salaries will be paid. The industrial and agricultural conditions have not been the best over the district. Nevertheless, only nine charges report indebtedness on church and parsonage property. Ten charges have either paid off

all their indebtedness or reduced it. First Church, Anderson, under the leadership of Chesteen W. Smith, has paid off all its indebtedness, amounting to \$2,200. This great church is now free from debt. Yorktown, G. H. Reddin, pastor, has reduced its indebtedness \$1,700. Avondale, J. C. Barrett, pastor, \$400. Westfield, W. E. Pittenger, pastor, \$350. Noble Street, D. S. Jones, pastor, \$275. Whiteley, T. J. Johnson, pastor, \$250. Fortville, W. E. Murray, pastor, \$216. And four other charges report less amounts.

Twenty-eight of the 39 charges report improvements of Church and parsorage property to the amount of \$17,471. Mt. Zion, on the Avondale charge, was remodeled at a cost of \$3,000. W. D. Parr officiated at the reopening. Two churches on the Shideler charge were remodeled at a cost of \$1,200. T. J. Johnson reopened the Pleasant Valley Church, and the District Superintendent the Shideler Church. Bethel Church, on the Noblesville Circuit, was improved at a cost of \$640. D. V. Williams officiated at the reopening services. The Sugar Grove Church on the Albany Circuit spent \$425 on improvements. First Church, Noblesville, the improvements amounted to \$830.

The following charges report church improvements costing between \$200 and \$300 each:

Perkinsville, Madison Street, Fortville, and First Church at Anderson.

The following charges less than \$200 each:

Albany, Alexandria Circuit, Park Place, Carmel, De Soto, Fishers, Hartford City, Ingalls, Jolietville, Mathews, McCordsville, High Street, Daleville, New Burlington, Pendleton, Summitville and Summitville Circuit.

Twenty-one parsonages have been improved. High Street under the leadership of W. W. Martin purchased a new parsonage at a cost of \$5,000 and spent \$1,500 more to make it modern in every respect. Summitville, C. J. Everson, pastor, rebuilt their parsonage at a cost of \$1,325. Pendleton spent \$351, Selma, \$275, and Noblesville \$200 on their parsonages.

The following charges, Albany, Albany Circuit, Noble Street, Carmel De Soto, Fishers, Hartford City, Ingalls, Jolietville, Lapel, Mathews, McCordsville, Avondale, Madison Street, New Burlington and Perkinsville report parsonage improvements costing less than \$200 each.

## Benovelences.

It is impossible to give exact figures concerning the benovelences. Many of the pastors make a sad mistake in postponing the canvass for benovelences until almost the last quarter of the conference year, which for mnay reasons is the most inoportune time to raise benolences. Some pastors boom local church interests and permit the world-wide Kingdom of Christ to suffer. They need the true vision

of John Wesley, "The World is my parish." Many of the charges have adopted the "every member canvass" with the duplex envelope for next year.

### De Pauw Endowment.

The District was loyal to this great movement. By the figures given me by Dr. C. U. Wade, the District gave \$37,500. If all the six districts had given the same amount it would have amounted to \$225,000 for our conference.

## The Year's Work.

The pastors have preached 4,685 sermons and prepared 1,719 new sermons. A few of the pastors report no new sermons prepared. The pastors have made over 23,000 pastoral calls, attended 2,871 devotional services, held 746 official meetings, baptized 403 persons, conducted 481 funerals and married 271 couples.

## Church Membership.

The pastors report 394 accessions on probation and 484 by letter. I can not tell about the gains and losses in membership. Last year I tried to give figures based upon the reports of the pastors, but my figures did not correspond with the figures published in the Conference Year Book, because at the very last moment changes were made in the figures of the membership.

## Evangelism.

The pastors have held 94 revival meetings and spent 1,566 days in these services. They report 765 conversions. Gaston reports 130, Madison Street 102, Matthews 100, First Church, Anderson, 45, Carmel 40, Alexandria Circuit, 37 Summitville 36, Alexandria Circuit 31, and Daleville 30. Four charges, High Street, Avondale, Summitville Circuit and Yorktown between 20 and 30 each. Seven charges, Alexandria, Fishers, Hartford City, Hartford City Circuit, Ingalls, Pendleton and Selma between 10 and 20 each. Thirteen charges report less than 10 each, and six charges not a conversion.

Many of these men of God worked hard and were almost heart-broken over the meagre results. Every pastor may not be able to have a revival on account of local conditions, but every pastor can be a personal evangelist. He can not preach every day personal evangelism to his people without he himself leads the way. He must be a personal evangelist. If he has lost this art, he must go into the secret place of prayer and stay there until he comes out with the burden of the lost on his own soul, with a greater vision of the power of Christ to save, and a fresh baptism of the Holy Spirit for successful soul-winning.

#### RICHMOND DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren: In bringing to you my sixth annual report of Richmond District I beg your indulgence a little. I know the tendency of the times is to worship at the shrine of the god, brevity, but I will try and not worry you over much with a long drawn out report.

The conference year began with a full quoto of pastors. Several



changes have occurred during The people of Lynn complained that their pastor had too much religion, and the people of Cleveland, on the Charlottsville charge, made declaration that their pastor did not have enough. so with the consent of Bishop Hughes we changed them. Whether the claim of the people was true or false they seem to be satisfied. L. G. Black, of was transferred to nois Conference and stationed at Nauvoo. Frank S. Dawson, a local preacher, was secured to take up the work. He has succeeded remarkably well in that very difficult field. About the 1st of

September Davis E. Cruea, of Parker City, became alarmed about his eyesight, resigned his charge, later he was employed by Dr. Line of the Muncie District. Chas. E. Brown was employed to take up the work. J. W. Kerr was appointed to Salamonia Circuit, but because of unsavory reports left the charge. Brother Pfeifer, a Supernumerary, filled out the year.

I am sorry to be compelled to record the serious illness of Dr. Mahin. On January 30th he slipped and fell on the ice, striking his hips. Nothing serious was expected, other than some severe bruises, but partial paralysis of the lower limbs has resulted. He suffers sevely, has to sit up all the time, and sleeps in his reclining chair. (He says,

The last weeks have been characterized by much peculiar suffering and some peculiar trial, but through it all I have never murmured—God's grace has been sufficient. I shall not be able to be at conference. In seventy years I have missed but one session. I have much appreciated my brethren, and especially the younger men have been very kind to me; the consideration they have shown me has been a pleasure and comfort to me. I shall feel the loss of not getting to Conference, but I hope I shall not be forgotten. I send my love to all the brethren.") Dr. Mahin is greatly beloved by all the people who know him, a right hand of help to his pastor. I fear we shall see his face among us no more. Brother Morris, of New Castle, found it necessary to go to the hospital for a serious operation the first of the year. He is fully recovered. During his absence, Brother Westhafer had charge of the

work for a month. Death has not invaded our parsonage homes this year. In the early morning of Saturday, March 9th, Sister John Mc-Mahon passed into the realizations of the heavenly kingdom after an illness of only one hour and a halt. She was a good woman, and enjoyed the confidence and love of all her neighbors. Her funeral occurred from the Methodist Church, Dublin, Tuesday, March 12, under the direction of C. M. Hobbs, her pastor.

## Church Building.

The church at Cambridge City was dedicated May the 14th. It was almost completed before the session of the conference a year ago, but, to be in full readiness, it was deferred till the first of this year. When the time of dedication came the clouds of discouragement hung low, and it was a question whether light would break through, but the day dawned, Bishop Hughes preached, Dr. Parr seized the financia problem, others assisted, and ere long we were basking in the noonday splendor of glorious success. The church has taken on new life; Sunday School doubled in numbers and interest. Credit in large measure is due the pastor, Brother, J. E. Coffin. A demand for his return at an increase of salary is a testimony of the high esteem in which he is The church enterprise at East Greenfield was finally consumated, and the church dedicated September 14th. It encountered various difficulties and perplexities but after three years of heroic struggle, it was brought to completion. Mrs. Ada New championed the enterprise, and has given her time and much toil to it. Dr. Parr had charge of the financial problem. He was assisted by Bishop Vincent, the North Indiana Conference Quartette and others. Sufficient money was subscribed to meet all claims.

A new church building is now ready for dedication at Wilkinson, on the Shirley charge, but it was thought best to wait till spring weather before undertaking it. We have for many years been holding services in th Friends church, but conflicts in the appointments led Brother Van Y, the pastor, to launch the enterprise.

Very substantial improvements were made at Hepewell, on the Lynn charge (costing nearly \$2,500, all provided for. Class and prayer meetings are up to high grade. Improvements of less amounts have been made at other places. Centerville has improvements in progress to the extent of over \$500. Plans have all been authoritatively settled for a \$5,000 improvement at Knightstown.

Debt paying has not been overlooked. The debt on the New Castle church has been paid, aggregating nearly \$4,000. Very few churches or parsonages have debts unpaid, and especially no embarrassing ones.

## Sunday Schools.

There is a good increase of interest in the Sunday School work. They are generally organized into missionary societies and take our literature. The graded lessons have been introduced into geveral of the schools, and they are encourageingly spoken of. First Church, Richmond, makes the largest contributions to missions, more than \$350.

## Ladies' Societies.

The Ladies' Societies continue active in their efforts to advance the material interests of the churches. Many churches and parsonages would go unimproved, pastors salaries unpaid were it not for the loyalty of the women to these causes. The Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies were never more active than they are now. Their reports show splendid and gratifying results.

#### Benevolences.

Demands other than the regular benevolences will reduce the offerings to the various causes, I fear. Yet quite a number of the charges are reporting increase over last year. Spartanburg and Philadelphia have made the largest per cent of gain. I am advised that \$18,368 were subscribed to the De Pauw fund by the people of the district.

## Revivals.

I am very sorry to report the smallest number of conversions of any year during the six years' term. It has not been because effort has not been made. The brethren have put in more than 175 weeks in special services and report six hundred conversions, twenty reclamations and forty sanctifications. and greatest meeting in point of numbers was at New Castle. The month of February was given to an evangelistic campaign which resulted in 75 professed conversions, 20 reclamations and 5 sanctifications. Rev. Don Nichols ably assisted the pastor. Spiritual life and enthusiasm are on the increase in this charge. A splendid work of grace was had at Hopewell, on the Lynn charge, resulting in many conversions and 50 accessions to the church. Brother Duryee has had a splendid year at Sartanburg. He was his own evangelist, and reports 46 converted or reclaimed, collections far in advance of any former year. lottsville reports 56 persons having experienced special and definite work of grace. Other reports are as follows: 'Trenton, 47; Maxwell. 41; Salamonia, 26; Ridgeville, 24; Millgrove, 34; Greenfield, 25; Cadiz, 15; Deerfield, 13; Dublin, 13; Dunkirk, 2; Economy, 7; Farmland, 22; Fountain City, 10; Hagerstown, 13; Kennard, 12; Middletown, 19; Philadelphia, 30; Redkey, 15; Shirley, 23; Richmond, Grace Church, 7, First Church, 30; Williamsburg, 19, and Winchester. 15. These numbers do not represent all the good done on their charges, for in many places the church was greatly strengthened and the spiritual life increased. Brothers Westhafer and Oborn have rendered efficient assistance at several places as conference evangelists.

#### Problems.

When I went to the district I found problems to solve, and undertook them in a heroic spirit. Salaries were low, and not much dis-

position to raise them. They are still low, lower than any other District in the conference in the aggregate, but there are but few charges that have not advancd. This year the increase in the aggregate over the first year is more than \$5.000.

The Men and Religion Forward Movement is doing much to enlist the attention and interest of the men. The movement did not begin sooner than it was needed. How to get the benevolences on the hearts of the people so they will enthusiastically respond to the call for the full apportionment. We have a few who still say, "We do not believe in foreign missions." The worst of it is, they do not believe in missions at all. There is great need of instruction and information. If the people know the needs, and how the glorious Gospel is winning its way, they will respond to the appeal. The pastor is the key man; if he is enthusiastic and determined, the money is found. Some men succeed any where, some fail every where, and the best of men fail sometimes. Our reports will show a handsome increase over the first year, and I think equal to last year. There is great need of deeper consideration to God and these very important interests.

How can a more solid and continuous christian life be obtained for our people? The Kingdom needs stalwart, rugged piety, if we are to conquor the world. An effeminate religion will not rescue the perishing, and attract the thoughtful to a life of self sacrifice for its sake. We must have a religion that will furnish sufficient enjoyment to hold its espousers to the services of God's house, and make it impossible to be attracted by the gay tinsel of the world. Our pastors, for the most part, are conscientious men, but we do not seem to hold and disciple the membership. If some one can solve this problem he will contribute largely to the comfort of his brethren.

The Epworth League is a problem in most churches on the district. Just a few chapters worthy of the name. Charters adorn the walls of many churches which only speak of the once prosperous society, but now a relic of the past.

How to save the church from the ill effects of careless and sloven business methods. I am convinced that a large per cent of the difficulty in raising salaries and collecting benevolences arises from a lack of good business methods properly applied. Careless record keeping among the ministry and laity leads to confusion. The introduction of the duplex envelope system has assisted materially in the solution of this problem wherever adopted and carefully followed. It is no wonder we have difficulty in making progress when we find whole quarterly conferences made up of men not a single one of them subscribers to our periodicals. These are only some of the problems that have employed my time and strength during the past years. Without boasting, I think something has been done in the way of progress.

Five of our veterans hold their quarterly conference relations in the Richmond District—Brothers Mahin, G. H. Hill, O. S. Harrison, S. Billhemer and L. A. Rets. O. S. Harrison lives in Richmond, gives his time and attention to the practice of law. He is in full sympathy with the church, and in happy relation with his pastor. Dr. Hill lives in Indianapolis, and is beloved by his neighbors, and is greatly missed by his friends in Richmond. Brother Rets resides in California. He has spent much of the year in a hospital, and suffers severley from rheumatism. He craves the sympathy and prayers of his brethren. Of Dr. Mahin's condition I have spoken. Brother Billheimer has spent most of the winter in the southland. He is a faithful man of God, and assists whenever called upon. Brother Bills, our conference evangelist, is the pastors' helper and sympathizer.

A personal word. I want to record my devout thanksgiving to God for his good providence and great grace manifest towards me. I have not missed a single appointment in the 6 years because of the illness of myself or wife. I have not been compelled to call upon anyone to hold a quarterly conference for me during the term because of sickness. I have held every one save three, which my brother held when we exchanged work for one Sabbath. I have no complaints to make, some regrets that I have not been a better leader and adviser of my men. There are but four preachers who have continued with me from the beginning. I have been associated with about 75 in all, regular ministers and supplys during the term. I want to say to all of them, and in this public place, I have found you brotherly in your treatment of me. Your homes have been my home, your comforts my comfort, your successes my success.

And Bishop Moore, I want to express my appreciation of yourself, and the satisfaction I have in having you to administer on my estate; and also to assure you of our sympathy and prayers for you while you are passing through the darkness of your great bereavement, knowing you have the light and comfort of Him who is the Light of the world.

In the year's work at Mentone with O. T. Martin as the pastor, new life has come to each department of the church and to almost every member. A good financial system has been installed, old debts all paid and all expenses met promptly.

The new church at Mt. Etna has but \$760 debt standing against it and this will be cared for as subscriptions become due. H. W. Park has had a great revival in which 55 were converted and 33 added to the church.

A new parsonage has been built at Point Isabel at a cost of \$1,500, only \$300 of which remains unpaid. \$4,000 was paid this year on the church debt and both the splendid new churches are paid for. A good revival was held at each point, resulting in 32 conversions and 29 accessions.

C. G. Yeomans of Roanoke has rebuilt Monson Chapel at a cost of \$1,700. It was rededicated by C. H. Smith of Markle, who preached an inspiring sermon and raised the balance needed to complete paying for the work.

Roanoke Church has been freecoed and wired for electric lights and improved at a cost of \$300. Brother Yeomans is closing his third year here of a very successful pastorate.

There has been a revival at North Manchester in which 55 were converted and many joined the church. The church has been frescoed and a new carpet secured at a cost of \$700. J. H. Palmer, the pastor, reports all Benevolences in full and closes the year with a celebration of the 70th anniversary of the coming of Methodism to North Manchester. Bishop Moore honored the occasion by his presence and helpful sermons.

Silver Lake had a good revival at which many were converted and old feuds settled. A. D. Buck, the pastor, is popular with his people.

At South Whitley E. S. Riley is pastor. They have had a real revival with many conversions and the church has been awakened. An Epworth League organized with 60 members. A good increase in Benevolences is also reported. J. T. Fretto, one of our superannuates, has made his home here and is a real benediction to the local church.

At Swayze the salary has been put at \$1,000 and is paid each week in full. J. J. Fred has added 60 to the membership. He has had a revival and is a very happy pastor.

- C. A. Hile of Uniondale charge, has had a great revival, both at Rockford and Uniondale; 66 conversions was the result. He carried the revival from house to house with splendid results.
- H. J. Norris closes his fourth year at Upland and his thirtyninth year in the active work without a break. He reports \$920 for Benevolences and has never done better work in his life than this year. The faculty and students of Taylor University are loyal and liberal in their support of the church.

A church purchased from the U.B. denominaton near Van Buren has been made a part of the Van Buren charge. L.A. Sevits, the pastor, has put \$700 in improvements on this church. He had a good revival and is making good Methodists of the people. The parsonage at Van Buren has been re-roofed and improved.

G. B. Work is closing his fourth year at Warren and his most delightful year in the ministry. He commenced the year on Easter Sunday by taking pledges in the Sunday School for Missions which amounted to \$266. His Benevolences as a result will be much more than full. The Sunday school has nearly doubled and is now one of the best in the District. The Church has paid \$1,100 for improvements and is out of debt.

The greatest number of conversions reported by any pastor was 175 by N. L. Stambaugh of the Warren circuit. Seventy-seven were added to the church.

Methodism has never been in better condition in Wabash than now. The membership of the three churches is 1,141. At Middle Street H. L. Overdeer has kept up the splendid record of last year and is building up a strong, aggressive church. The Sunday school has made splendid advancement in every feature of its work. The Benevolences will be increased and \$1,000 is now paid the pastor. At Wabash Street H. S. Nickerson is preaching great sermons and laboring faithfully and the work is prospering in his hands. At First Church D. H. Guild is having the most successful pastorate of his life. He has gathered into this church a large number of excellent people and the future never looked so bright.

## Building and Improvements.

One new church has been built at a cost of \$6,200. Two were rebuilt and made as good as new. Many others were greatly improved. Two new parsonages were added to the list and plans are on foot for two new churches and one new parsonage. The whole amount spent for building and improving property is \$20,200. The payment of church debts has been given careful attention and \$10,000 has been collected and paid for this purpose during the year.

#### Benevolences.

Missionary conventions were held in each charge in the District in the mouth of September. At the District Epworth League convention held in June at Swayzee, special emphasis was put upon our Benevolent causes. Dr. Richardson, a returned missionery, made an address at the convention and he and Dr. Caldwell were sent to many charges in the District by the League Cabinet. Twelve charges report everything in full. Markle, Warren and Upland report more than full. The W. F. M. S. and the W. H. M. S. have been very active and report large gains. And besides the money they contribute they spread missionary intelligence and enthusiasm that greatly helps the cause. Most of the Sunday schools in the District are organized into missionary societies.

#### Pastors' Salaries.

A most gratifying increase has been made in ministerial support this year, amounting to \$2,650 in the cash salaries. About \$8,000 during the five years. No pastor receives less than \$700 and but three less than \$800.

#### Financial Plans.

A large number of the charges are adopting the duplex system and it promises better things for all concerned. Where it has been started the first week of the Conference year and faithfully worked the results have been excellent. The tithing bands of the District have brought order out of chaos in many churches. D. H. Guild and W. J. Creighton, a layman of First Church, have greatly aided in promoting the good cause.

#### Revivals.

This has been a year of great revivals in many Charges: 1,546 conversions and 1,208 were reported as added to the church. There will be a net gain of about 500 members. These revivals have greatly quickened the churches and have put a decided check on sin in many communities. I think they have done as much good outside of the Church as they have done inside. The old time power has not gone from us, if some of the old time denominations have. Personal evangelism has brought many people into the kingdom during the year and been fruitful in many ways.

#### Men and Religion.

The Men and Religion Forward Movemnet has made itself felt in the Wabash District. During the year many men's meetings were held and quite a number of banquets were given at which the following noted preachers and laymen gave addresses: Dr. R. J. Wade at Markle, Dr. C. W. Smith at Fairmount, Dr. J. C. White and Moulder at Swayzee, E. G. Eberhart at First Church, Wabash, Governor J. Frank Hanley at La Fontaine, Marion and North Manchester, and Judge Marshall Williams at Middle Street and other places.

#### Settlement Day.

Settlement day was observed December 5, 6 and 7 and was a great success. The pastors and stewards met in three divisions at North Manchester, Huntington and Marion. A program was rendered at each place and reports were made which showed most of the pastors paid in full to that date and good progress made on the Benevolences. The Ladies' Aid Societies have been an important factor in church improvement and parsonage care. Twenty-five of the parsonages are furnished with base burners or furnaces; 20 have ranges and other furniture. I hope all others will soon do likewisse.

#### Personal.

I have done my best for the Church and the Kingdom during the year. No truer set of men ever labored together. They have responded to every call of the District Superintendent for aggressive work and they have found an abiding place in my heart.

#### AUDITING COMMITTEE.

#### 1. The Conference Secretary.

Your Committee has carefully examined the accounts of our Conference Secretary, Dorie V. Williams, and found them correct..

2. The Board of Stewards. The Committee has also examined the account of the Board of Stewards for the Conference of 1911 and find it correct.

3. The Sustentation Fund.

The accounts of the District Superintendents showing receipts and disbursements of Sustentation Funds has had careful examination and found to be correct. Since it has been the custom of the Conference to print the detailed statement of expenses in connection with the report of the Committee on Sustentation we recommend that this practice be continued.

#### 4. Pro-rating Ministerial Support.

Your Committee has examined the Ministerial Support only with refence to Conference Claimants. There is but a slight difference in amounts paid as shown by the treasurer's sheets and those of the statisticians. As the latter also give the apportionments to the charges for this cause the figures are taken from their tables. following districts show deficits from their total apportionments as given by the pastors: Fort Wayne, \$94; Goshen, \$31; Logansport, \$34; Muncie, 97; Richmond, \$100; Wabash, District over paid its apportionment by \$49, making the total deficit for the Conference \$207.

An examination of the districts show that in most instances these deficits are legitimate, being the result of careful pro-rating of other branches of ministerial support. The treasurer's report shows that \$2,464 more for Conference Claimants were raised this year than

last, an increase of over twenty per cent.

### BOARD OF CONTROL OF DEACONESS WORK.

The deaconess work of the Methodist church is one of the greatest movements of the past fifty years. Twenty-five years ago there was not one of these consecrated workers in Methodism. Today there are 1,360 licensed deaconesses in the Methodist church throughout the world. The deaconess in the beautiful language of the Discipline is "to work for Jesus only." Her work is to visit the sick, pray with the dying, comfort the sorrowing, seek the wandering, save the sinning, relieve the poor, and care for the orphan.

We regret that there is only one of these workers in the bounds of our conference and do hereby recommend and urge upon our

people where ever it is possible that they be employed.

Therefore be it Resolved, That for the training of these efficient workers in the Kingdom we recommend the various training schools and Deaconess institutions as given in the Methodist Year Book. Also we call attention to the Deaconess school and home for little girls located at Rensselear, Indiana.

Further be it Resolved, That we encourage more of our young

women to prepare and enter this field of labor.

The Board of Control has renewed the license of Miss Blanche Brackney on the recommendation of the Quarterly Conference of Grace Church, Kokomo. Also on the recommendation of the Quarterly Conference of the First Church in Peru we have granted license to Miss Effic Stigleman and recommended that she be consecrated as a deaconness.

In as much as these journals are to be the historical records of work done and kept on file the committee recommends that the District Superintendents see that these reports be bound in cloth that they may be preserved.

#### EDUCATION.

We believe that as never before, the educational work of our beloved Church demands our most careful consideration and hearty co-operation.

Our colleges, which take the students in that latter adolescent period, and are charged with the responsibility of shaping the intellectual and moral nature into harmony with the best ideals of life, require our earnest prayers and efforts.

Our universities and colleges which place emphasis upon technical scholarship, broad and catholic culture, shall have our support.

We urge our young people to give first consideration to the schools offered by our own denomination.

#### Theological Schools.

We urge our candidates for admission to this Conference and all our young ministers, to consider with deep and prayerful consideration the appeals and advantages of our Theological Seminaries. The demands of the age for large intellectual equipment and thorough professional training come to the ministry of the day with increasing force.

The Methodist Episcopal Church has three Theological Schools of first grade within reach of this Conference, and these deserve our loyal support. Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Ill.; Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N. J., and Boston School of Theology, present strong faculties, excellent equipment and comprehensive courses of study. They also offer advantages for Sociological study. These splendid opportunities should be appreciated by all candidates for the ministry.

#### American University.

We have heard with pleasure of the growing interest in the American University at Washington, D. C., the work of raising endowment of this great institution moves steadily forward. We commend this enterprise to all our people. During the quadrennium now closing over \$440,000 have been raised, and we are delighted with the success of the endowment secretary, Rev. Fred. M. Stone, D. D., of our own Conference.

#### Taylor University.

We rejoice at the continued prosperity of Taylor University. During the past year the Helena Gehman Music Hall and central heating plant have been erected. The spiritual tone has been maintained at its usual standard. The campaign for an endowment of \$200,000 will be started at once. We appreciate highly the work Taylor University is doing and commend it to our people as worthy of their patronage and support.

We recommend that the offer of the National Association of Local Preachers, authorizing the North Indiana Conference to appoint annually two members of the Board of Trustees, be accepted

and Rev. W. W. Martin and John Campbell be appointed.

The Women's College at Jacksonville, Ill., and Goucher College at Baltimore, Md., have the unqualified indorsement of the committee as most excellent places for the education of women. Their splendid equipment and high teaching standards, right environment and control, together with their large and increasing attendance, attest their great worth to the Church and their deserved popularity with the people.

#### Children's Day.

The purpose for which the Children's Day Fund is used appeals to our people because it helps to furnish competent leadership to the Church of the future. Some of the most efficient workers of the Church have been helped to their intellectual training by the fund of this society. We urge upon our pastors to follow the suggestions of Dr. Nicholson and make elaborate and attractive plans for their Children's Day service.

We recommend the Rev. U. S. A. Bridge as Conference visitor to De Pauw University for a term of three years from September 1, 1912, and to Drew Theological School, Rev. Sherman Powell; to Taylor University, Rev. C. H. Smith and W. A. Griest; to Woman's College, Jacksonville, Ill., Rev. G. H. Myers; to Boston Theological School, J. A. Sumwalt; to Garrett Biblical Institute, Rev. S. Light,

D. D., and Rev. R. J. Wade, D. D.

#### DE PAUW UNIVERSITY.

Under the masterful leadership of President F. J. McConnell, De Pauw University is winning for herself a prominent place among the strongest colleges of the nation. The work which is done in this school is of that high order which commends itself both to those who are familiar with educational standards and who are seeking a school where their young people may be educated.

The recent Endowment Campaign for \$500,000 terminated suc-The Methodists of Indiana responded in a commendable cessfully. way to the call of the able leader, Dr. C. U. Wade, and his assistants, the Rev. G. H. Myers and the Rev. Sherman Powell. When the University shall realize from this fund, its efficiency will be multiplied

many fold.

The new movement to raise another half million dollars for endowment is the outgrowth of the large hopefulness of the University's constituency. We rejoice in the fact that already \$200,000 have been secured. We will co-operate to the end that this campaign may be successful.

We recommend Dr. W. D. Parr as trustee, to be elected for the term of three years from September, 1912, to September, 1915.

Local Education Collection.

We recommend that 20 cents per member be apportioned for local education, and that one-fourth of this collection be paid to Taylor University and three-fourths be paid to De Pauw University.

#### EPWORTH LEAGUE.

The Epworth League is the only organization of the Church devoted exclusively to the development of the religious life of our young people, and it is the duty of the Church to foster its interests. We view with deep concern the steady decline of this organization in our midst. During the past seven years, with the exception of one year when the Epworth League remained stationary and the Junior League reported a slight gain, each year has witnessed a decline both in number of chapters and members in both organizations.

We do not presume to place the responsibility for this decrease, but we confidently believe that the pastors are the only persons who

can save the League to the Church.

We urge that a greater effort be made to get each department in each active chapter in working order. In many of our chapters but little work is attempted outside the first department. A department organized and recorded in a book of minutes, that lies idle and fruitless a whole year is a menace. It holds back the work of God and encourages a habit of irresponsibility in our young Christians. We urge that a campaign be started in each district to place an active chapter on every charge in the Conference. A chapter in each charge and each chapter at work is at once the need and the possibility of the year before us. We further recommend that an attempt be made to increase the subscription list of the Epworth Herald. No modern business man will go without his trade journal. The Epworth Herald is the young Christian trade journal. It supplies the Christian worker with information concerning our great Church, acquaints him with the latest methods of work and offers him the stimulus and inspiration to be gained from a knowledge of good results obtained by other workers.

We believe that great stress should be placed upon the importance of organized study classes in each chapter that our young people may be thoroughly awake to the fact that we must not only confess Christ but serve Him faithfully and intelligently.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We appreciate the visit and stirring missionary address of Homer C. Stuntz, Assistant Corresponding Secretary of our Foreign Board.

We rejoice that the kingdom of Jesus Christ is an ever advancing kingdom. All reports coming from our mission fields are highly gratifying; furthermore, the good that is there accomplished is not to be told by statistics. The great revolutions of the Orient, with the rebuilding of empires, is but an index of the influence of the kingdom of Jesus Christ.

The nations of the world are everywhere crying for the living And the Master's words were never more true than now,

"The fields are white already for the harvest."

Korea is on her knees winning her thousands for Jesus Christ by a sacrifice that is teaching the home Church what a whole hearted service for Jesus will mean. Yet in the face of this apostolic devotion and sacrifice in every quarter of our mission fields there has been a large falling off in our contributions during the last year to the regular work of the Foreign Board. Recognizing that the Missionary Church is ever a live and growing Church and that giving in sacrifice to foreign fields means an advancing kingdom in the home land, we recommend

That every pastor purchase and read such missionary literature as will put him in touch with the advancing movements that are changing the destinies of nations. We suggest such missionary books as "The By-Product of Misions," by Hedland; "The Evolution of China," by Brewster; "The Report of the Laymen's National Missionary Congress" and the "Annual Report of Our Foreign Board."

Second, we recommend that every Church take a collection for

Second, we recommend that every Church take a collection for the immediate lifting of the debt that is embarrassing the Missionary

Society.

Third, we heartily recommend that all our Churches should adopt the Every-Member Canvass for the cause of missions, asking all our people for offerings on a weekly basis—gathering the same through the duplex envelope when possible.

Fourth, we recommend that all our preachers preach and that laymen and preachers practice tithing as a minimum of giving to the Lord's kingdom, this being the scriptural means of early bringing in

We rejoice in our success, but we should lament the fact that we have not done more and better things in this field in which we have such splendid opportunities to do for God and humanity; and we pray that our people may reach out to the very best endeavor. Lincoln Sunday, we think, is an opportune time to engage the thought of our congregations to this great benevolence, that we may stir their hearts with patriotic sentiments, increase their zeal for God and this people, and therefore we urge our pastors to make the most of this day for this society.

We lament a decrease in our giving for this year and we hope

that we can more than gain what we have lost next year.

We were delighted with the visit of Dr. P. J. McVeety to represent the work of the society to us this year, and we trust that he can soon return to us, when he can report the largest measure of prosperity in our work.

#### HOSPITAL.

Methodist Episcopal Hospital and Deaconess Home of the State of Indiana

We, your committee, are glad to report that the continued success of the Hospital excites our admiration and exceeds all our expectations. The number seeking for admission is continually greater than our limited accommodation will permit us to accept. They come from every denomination, including Jews, Catholics, and even Christian Scientists. Nearly twenty per cent of all the cases treated are free and no distinction is made between these and those who pay. They come from every Conference in the State.

The new building is nearing completion. It will increase the capacity of the Hospital by sixty-five beds. It contains a children's ward and sun parlors and roof garden, and will be one of the most complete buildings of its kind in the country. This building, except for the amount given by the children of the Sunday School, was made possible by the gifts of our people in the City of Indianapolis. It is almost imperatively necessary that another pavilion should be erected at once. It is expected that the three conferences of the State will provide the money without asking assistance of the people of Indianapolis. In harmony with this desire this Conference has been asked to raise the sum of fifty thousand dollars. Of this amount the Fort Wayne District has already pledged twelve thousand dollars; the Goshen District eight thousand five hundred. We commend these districts for their liberality and urge upon the remaining districts the immediate duty of rallying to the support of this great institution. We urge our district superintendents and pastors to assist by a personal canvass.

We heartily commend the work of Rev. W. E. McKenzie, D. D., General Secretary, and hereby assure him cordial welcome to our pulpits and promise him hearty co-operation in his effort to raise the fifty thousand dollars in our Conference. We appreciate the continued enthusiasm and able service of the Hon, Charles W. Fairbanks, as the President of the Board of Trustees; and also express our appreciation of the effort of other distinguished laymen, who are giving much of their time and personal attention to the financial interests of our Hospital.

We recommend that the District Superintendents apportion to the charges in this Conference an amount equal to ten cents per member for the sustaining fund.

#### SOCIAL AND MORAL QUESTIONS.

We your committee on Social and Moral Questions beg leave to submit the following report:

- 1. That it should not be our duty to reach only the individual and present the claims of the Gospel for Reeming Grace, but also to redeem the community from those social and moral evils that tend to compromise the influence of the church .
- 2. That deploring the desecration of the Holy Sabbath, now so prevalent among our people, we will do our very best, in word and deed, to re-establish it as a day of rest and worship.
- 3. That with sadness receiving the news of the apparent miscarriage of the Treaty of Arbitrations, submitted by two of our great nations to our government, we will pledge our faith and powers of influence and word to such a movement as will tend to bring in a universal peace among the nations of the world.
- 4. That in the light of social tendencies to evil, we certainly affirm our faith in the position of our church as it relates to ques-

tionable practices and amusements indicated by cur Book of Discipline, and hereby declare against any backward step in this matter.

5. That as our homes are jeopardized by the prevalence of divorce, made so by the ease by which they are obtained we will support and strengthen any effort that will so modify our laws so that no absolute divorcement shall be granted except upon the one scriptural cause. Until the enactment of such a law we hereby pledge ourselves to a strict adherence to the law of the Church and of our Christ.

6. That as our national and Church holidays are so continually profaned by licentious practices, we will use our influence not only against such practices, but will assert ourselves, and lead our peo-

ple in the wholesome observation of the same.

7. To harmonize with the efforts of the Methodist Federation for Social Service, we recommend:

1. That our Annual Conference give some time to the consideration of social conditions within the bounds of our Conference.

2. That a commission on Social Service consisting of three mem-

bers be raised, whose duty it shall be:

To study social conditions and report those that should be considered by our Conference, and act in conjunction with such other commissions as may be formed by any other conference or church associations and denominations within our state, and shall rally our forces to the support of needed legislation and the enforcement of our civil and state laws.

3. In view of the above we recommend immediate co-operation of the said commission with the Federation Social Service to place upon our statute books a law which will insure for all our laborers one day in seven as a day of rest.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We rejoice in the marvelous success that has attended the work of the Board of Sunday Schools of our Church. 1,128 schools have been established, with 42,000 scholars enrolled. 294 Church organizations have resulted from the schools, and 117 churches have been erected, valued at \$226,650, which is \$120,000 more than the total expenses of the extension work of the board.

Here is evidence of God's blessing upon the work for the youth of the land, and of the great importance of our opportunity in the Sunday school. We shall give greater attention, as pastors, to this department of church activity; urge our people to a deeper interest in the children and young people of our communities; insist upon the observance of Decision day, Children's day and Rally day in our schools; and endeavor to increase the offerings for the work of the Sunday School Board.

Our Sunday school literature is equal to the best, and we request all our pastors and schools to use the literature published by your

Book Concern.

We appreciate the correspondence courses of training for Sunday school workers prepared by the board, and recommend them to our people.

We suggest the organized class as an agency for good in interesting and leading both adults and youth into the Kingdom of God.

We favor the appointment of a Superintendent of Sunday Schools of the Methodist Episcopal Church for the state of Indiana, under whose direction denominational Sunday schools may be conducted, as is now done in some other states.

#### TEMPERANCE AND PROHIBITION.

We rejoice in the constantly growing temperance sentiment in our state. We do not believe that the repeal of the county local option law is an indication of a change in the minds of the people.

We believe that the present city and township local option law, by the operation of which many places have been dry are again cursed by the saloon, was enacted because of the undue and disgraceful influence of the liquor power in our last General Assembly.

The battle is on, we will not lay down our arms until complete victory is ours. We feel as an advancel step the county local option law should be speedily restored. We demand also constitutional prohibition throughout the entire state at the earliest possible day. In the language of the last General Conference, we condemn the license policy. It is vicious in principle, utterly inconsistent with the purposes of enlightened government, and in practice a protection to a traffic which is inherently criminal in its nature. The traffic "cannot be legalized without sin." And further that we will not endorse any political party that by its silence or actions shows itself averse to this position. We favor the Shephard Kenyon Interstate Law to prohibit the shipment of liquor into dry territory. We also favor a law providing for federal prohibition in Hawaii.

We commend the work of the Anti Saloon League, and as Rev. Madison Swadener a member of our Conference, has become the Assistant General Superintendent of the Anti Saloon League of America, we commend him to the public as a brother tried and true, and pledge

to him and the organization our hearty support.

As prohibition is a moral issue we urge that all Christians shall assist to nominate and to elect regardless of any party affiliation only such county, state and national legislators who will vote for laws

which work for the extinction of the liquor traffic.

We recommend in every county the organization of leagues for the enforcement of laws. We urge the co-operation of our pastors and people with the Temperance Society of our Church, which aims at the temperance education of our children and the creation of sentiment that will crystalize into law.

As officers of the Conference Temperance Society we recommend for President, F. P. Morris; Vice President, J. W. Cain; Secretary-Treasurer Herbert Boase; Trustees for the Anti-Saloon League, P. E. Greenwalt and C. J. Everson.

#### WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The conference anniversary of 1911 closed a year of steady growth. The address given upon that occasion by Miss Guthapfel from Korea gave new impetus and courage that has grown daily throughout the year that has just closed. Six district meetings were held during October, 1912, in Goshen, Columbia City, Auburn, Peru and Greenfield. Miss Kipp from India, Mrs. Flora Walker from China, and Mrs. Vance from South America gave helpful addresses.

Miss Housinger and Miss Creek from China have each given us a week of valuable service. The Winona Summer School of the Missions is becoming an important factor in our work. The prayerful consecrated loyal host of our women is beautiful to behold. The passing away of Mrs. L. K. Royer, our Conference Treasurer for nine years, brought heartfelt sorrow throughout our ranks. She was faithful, unusually efficient and a loving worker in this cause which

became so interwoven in her life. Mrs. O. E. Mohler of Fort Wayne has been called to fill the office of treasurer, and has proven herself a most worthy successor and well pleasing to all.

During the year we have been highly favored by having two new representatives in the foreign field. Miss Mary Mann from Albany, Ind., to Foochow, China, and Miss Elsie Roush from Fort Wayne, Ind., to Loando, Africa.

During the year over 5,500 meetings have been held including the regular, public and thanks offering. At the latter our pastors in many places have given the addresses and our work has been ably represented. Jubilee luncheons have been sources of great profit closing membership campaigns. The gains over last year's report are gratifying. Our books give 3,450 members in the auxiliarics, 216 Young Women, 1025 Standard Bearers, 675 King's Heralds, 736 Little Light Bearers, total 6,150. A gain of 936 members and 20 organizations. We have 630 subscribers to the Junior Friend.

Two bequests have been paid during the year, from a brother and sister. Thomas and Nancy Plummer from Cass county, of \$1,028.32. Helen Barrett Montgomery says "We have been doing the greatest things in the world with the rags of our time and the unconsidered remnants of our money." This being the case may we give our best service the coming year that our very earnestness and sincerity compel

others to become interested.

#### WOMAN'S HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

We are glad for this privilege of bearing to you greetings from the faithful workers of the Woman's Home Misionary Society of this Conference, and at the same time we submit to you the Twenty-eighth Annual Report of this great and growing society.

The records show that we are slowly but steadily increasing in numbers and that each year some financial gains are being made, but we covet more of the women, the young people and the children of

our beloved Methodism.

Several new organizations have been effected during the year. Auxiliaries at Claypool; Main Street, Kokomo; Monroeville and Russiaville. Young Peoples' organizations at Arcadia, Huntington, Wheatland Street, Logansport, Markle, South Whitley and Wabash. Mother's Jewels at Huntington and Wabash. All of these societies we are glad to welcome to our ranks and trust they will be true and loyal members and become deply interested in all lines of mission work in our home land.

We now have 76 Auxiliaries with a membership of 2,984, organizations of young people number 57, with a membership of 1,000, while among the children there are 44 organized bands of Home Guards and Mother's Jewels, having 1,000 members, giving us a total membership of 4,984. There are 992 subscribers to the Woman's Home Missions and 404 subscribers to Children's Home Missions. We wish that both of these splendid papers were taken in larger numbers, because a clearer understanding and definite knowledge of our work would make it vastly easier to secure others to join our ranks.

Every Department Secretary is anxious that her own particular department should be especially emphasized, and each one is of great importance—Literature, Temperance, Systematic Beneficence, Supplies, Mission Study, Mite Box, Young People and Children, and Training Schools.

The corps of workers in each District have been faithful and loyal and all are striving for greater numbers and larger financial gains so that our work may be enlarged.

We highly appreciate the interest taken in the work of our Society by the Epworth and Junior Leagues, by Pastors and District Superintendents and trust that with each year their interests will grow.

The obligations of the year are scarcely met before the new and larger duties of another year crowd in and demand greater effort nd larger gifts, but as our numbers increase and a deeper sense of our responsibility to God comes to us we buckle the armor more firmly and face the duties with hope and courage, and trust for larger things for the coming year.

#### SPECIAL WORK.

Another year with its privileges and opportunities for service has passed and the records are closed. Special calls have been responded to in many instances and several new missionaries have gone to the various fields.

The list of Special Work for this Conference according to our records is as follows: We are pledged to support nine regular Missionaries, one Zenana worker, forty-one Bible women, one Assistant Bible woman, seven Bible women in training, two Day Schools, one Day School and one Kindergarten teacher, four Hospital beds and other Medical work, and one hundred and six Scholarships. Added to this list was a bequest of \$100.00, besides special gifts for Memorials and Testimonials, for ocean passage of an out-going Missionary, for the Umbrella and Korean funds, Christmas and Thank offerings.

A goodly number of the leading papers and magazines are being sent regularly to schools and missionaries, and these are always greatly appreciated and are always made to do double or triple duty. This is a line of work which can be done by a little kindly forethought in every Auxiliary, either by the Auxiliary or some individual members.

A number of Christmas boxes were sent out which carried much joy and happiness to the children who otherwise would have had no Christmas cheer. The boxes mean so little to us, but so much to the little ones across the sea and are a help to the work of the missionaries.

Special calls are coming to us for subscriptions for a new hospital at Foochow to replace the dilapidated building now being used for a hospital and which is very inadequate for the work to be done. The Baldwin school for girls at Nanchang, recently destroyed by fire, should be rebuilt at once upon a larger and better scale.

Our greatest needs, however, are for greatly increased membership and for a vision of the needs and the wonderful opportunities in all of the foreign fields, especially just now in China, and a realization of our own personal responsibilities to our Heavenly Father.

Only a very few of us are fitted to go in person to the foreign field with the message of salvation, but each one of us can aid in sending those who are situated so they can go, and then we can aid them not only by financial support, but by remembering them daily at the throne of grace. May God help each woman who is a member of this great organization to get under the burden.

#### BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

J. K. CECIL. Chairman. U. S. A. BRIDGE, Registrar.

- (1) A properly authenticated certificate showing that a student has already pursued and passed a satisfactory examination in a prescribed course of study as a regular attendant on the class room instruction, in any of our regular Theological Seminaries, Universities and Colleges approved by our University Senate, will be received in lieu of Conference examination.
- Similar certificates may also be received in all studies not Biblical or theological from other than Methodist schools, if of equal grade with those approved by our University Senate. The board of examiners in each particular case will determine as to whether the work done is a fair equivalent or not.

- (3) Certificates presented for credit must show the amount of work done, text books used, year in which the work was done and the grade given by the examiner. If no grade is furnished in a beer-tificate presented for credit the only minimum passing grade (70) will be allowed.
- (4) All examinations must be taken at the Mid-year Institute, or the seat of the Annual Conference. Exception to this rule will be made in the case of students in the mission field or in school outside the territory covered by the Conference. In the exception stated above, the student will be required to pass on questions prepared by this Board and in thhe presence of some one designated by the Chairmann of the Board.
- (5) All reports of books read, essays and sermons must be in the hands of the registrar not later than Tuesday night preceding the opening session of the Conference.
- (6) The examination at the Mid-Year Institute and at the next session oft he Conference will be given on the present course of study
- (7) The Mid-Year Institute will be held at Fortville October 14 to 18, 1912.

We deplore the fact that under the freak legislation of the last Legislature many of our county seat towns, formerly dry, are now afflicted with the open grog shop with all of its attendant evils.

As representatives of the Methodist Episcopal Church within the bounds of the North Indiana Conference in Quadrennial Session assembled, we desire to record our unceasing antagonism to this unchristian, unpatriotic system called the "legalized saloon," an institution which is inherently vicious, demoralizing everything it We denounce touches, from the individual to the State and Nation. its attempt to control legislation and influence the judiciary, knowing, as we do, that wherever found, it is always a liability and never an asset.

We urge all Christian citizens to become Christian politicians. to the end that our election machinery may be wrested from the control of men who may be in anyway interested in or controlled by the liquor influences.

We pledge our loyal support to the Anti-Saloon League in its

practical and constant warfare against this legalized anarchy.

We favor passage of the Shepherd Kenyon bill now before Congress, looking to the regulation of the inter-state shipment of liquors into dry territory, and will do all in our power to get our Congressmen to vote and work for the passage of this law.

We pledge ourselves to support only such candidates for office in the coming election as are known to stand for the above named principles, believing that the time has come to crystallize the temperance sentiment of Indiana into practical action, serving notices upon parties and politicians as well, that the sober, home-loving, lawabiding, Christian, patriotic citizenship of this country must be reckoned with.

Whereas, The members and friends of De Pauw University have recently added more than half a million dollars to its endowment fund, for which as Methodist Laymen are grateful. And

Whereas, We have in the bounds of our Conference Taylor University at Upland, Indiana, which is doing a splendid work for the educational interests of the church and struggling under financial difficulties. Therefore be it

M. E. Church with about twenty-five persons present.

Mr. D. O. Skillen of Yorktown was selected Chairman. After a statement by the chairman as to the objects of the meeting, followed by several laymen as to the advantages of such an organization, Dr. C. B. Stemen of Fort Wayne moved that we now proceed to perfect a permanent organization of the "Laymen's Association of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the North Indiana Annual Conference, which motion was numerously seconded and unanimously adopted.

A motion of Prof. B. F. Moore of Muncie that the chair appoint a committee of seven, of whom the chairman should be a member, to report at an adjourned meeting to be held in this room at 4:30 P. M. today, with a plan of organization, was duly carried. The chairman appointed the following committee: D. O. Skillen (chairman), Yorktown; James W. Sale, Bluffton; Hardin Rhoads, Muncie: Daniel Zook, Nappanee; C. B. Stemen, Fort Wayne; B. F. May, Markle.

The meeting reconvened at 4:30 P. M. with about 125 delegates to the Lay Electoral Conference and other Laymen of the North Indiana Conference present. Brother D. O. Skillen in the chair and James W. Sale acting as secretary. Brother Skillen for the committee read a

form of constitution, which is as follows:

### Constitution.

- 1. Name—This Association shall be called the Laymen's Association of the North Indiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.
- 2. Place of Meeting—It shall meet annually at the place of meeting of the North Indiana Annual Conference, on such day and at such hour as may be arranged by the Executive Committee.
- 3. The purpose of this Association shall be to advance the local and Conference interests of the Church and to enlist all Laymen in the general activities of the denomination.
- 4. Membership—The membership of this Association shall consist of its oOcers, standing committees, committees appointed by the Executive Committee between sessions, and one delgate from each pastoral charge, who may be either male or female, to be elected with one reserve delegate at the Quarterly Conference preceding the Annual Convention, or in such manner as the laity of the Charge may determine. The election to an office, or the appointment on a committee, of any lay member present at the session shall constitute him, or her, a member of the Association. The Association may also elect

a lay member not present at the session of the Association, if it be considered that the interest of the Church be conserved thereby, and an election shall constitute him or her a member of the Association.

- Officers-The officers shall be a President, Vice President from each District; a Secretary and Treasurer, which may be combined at the discretion of the Association. Said officers shall serve during the session at which they are elected and the next succeeding annual session until their successors are elected, and shall perform such duties as are usual to their respective offices.
- Executive Committee-There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the officers named in Section 5. The duties of said committee shall be to generally direct the affairs of the Association and to make all the necessary arrangements as to place and time cf meetings: prepare a program of exercises for each session, secure the presence of desirable speakers, and perform other needed work as a Committee of Arrangements, and report the same at the commencement of each meeting.
- 7. Amendment—This Constitution may be amended at any session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting. After due deliberation the Constitution was unanimously

Whereupon the meeting proceeded to the election of officers under the new Constitution, with the following result:

A collection was taken to defray immediate expenses, after which adjournment was had sine die.

### LYDIA A. STOUT.\*

Mrs. Lydia Ann Stout, widow of Rev. Silas T. Stout, for years an honored and useful member of the North Indiana Conference, departed this life Jan. 3, 1911. She was the daughter of Jacob and Lydia (Spangler) Brugh, and was born in Adams county, Pa., in the vicinity of Gettysburg, Feb. 16, 1832. About the year 1837 the Brugh family came to Indiana and were among the earliest settlers in the territory that some two years later became Blackford county. Her father first located some three or four miles south of Montpelier and gave to the desolate wilderness surrounding him the name of Greehland. He was a leading and influential citizen, and during the period from 1839 to 1853 he served at various times as auditor, recorder, clerk and sheriff of the county, and also as a senator in the Legislature of the state.

On October 6, 1851, the subject of this sketch was united in marriage to William H. Campbell by Rev. Asa Martin, then pastor of the Presbyterian church at Hartford City. Shortly after their marriage she and her husband took up their residence for a short time in the village of Matamoras, a mile east of Montpelier, where he conducted a general store. To Mr. and Mrs. Campbell six children were born, four of whom grew to manhood and were living at the time of their mother's death, viz: George B. of Marion, Ind., since deceased; Henry M. of Columbus, Ind.; Wilmot H. and Edward C. of Hartford City. Her husband, William H., died about the year '1864. He was a popular and enterprising man and had hosts of friends. He was twice elected treasurer of the county, although running on the ticket of the minority party. He was an active member and one of the chief supporters of the M. E. church in Hartford City, and for some years served as recording steward of the circuit.

Sister Stout remained a widow some 15 years and cared for and raised her family, displaying business ability of a high quality. About the beginning of the year 1880 she was married to Rev. Silas T. Stout, then a superannuated minister of the North Indiana Conference. He died Dec. 23, 1880. Since that time she resided in her comfortable home in Hartford City, a considerable part of the time alone. She died at the home of her son, Wilmot H. Campbell, where funeral services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. B. Earle Parker, after which her remains were buried in the Odd Fellows' cemetery at Hartford City. A few months ago her sons presented to Grace M. E. Church,

of which she had been a worthy member for nearly sixty years, a beautiful baptismal font as a loving memorial to their mother, and the same was unveiled and dedicated with appropriate public services.

Mrs. Stout was a woman esteemed and loved by the entire community where she resided. She was of the sturdy, pioneer type, who believed in the hearty hand-clasp and good cheer, and when she addressed persons it was with a smile and words that bore the impress of sincerity. She was an indefatigable worker, both at home and for her church and the strangers were always welcomed with that fervent spirit that made them feel that they were at home and glad to come back again. Possessed of a rugged constitution and great energy it was her love to work for her family, her church and her friends. And she went about whatever she did with kind words, scattering sunshine and good cheer. Her life work is ended, but crowded into her career were many useful years.

### LETITIA MAYNARD.

Letitia English Maynard, daughter of Joseph and Mary English, was born in Columbia county, Pa., April 15, 1830, and died April 18, 1911, aged 81 years and 3 days. She was the fifth of six children and the last to pass away. She removed to Richland county, Ohio, in



1846, and to Steuben county, Indiana. in 1847. On June 27, 1852, she was married to Ezra Maynard, a member of the North Indiana Conference, with whom she lived happily until his death which occurred Nov. 8. Through three pastorates she stood nobly by her husband's side, performing the many duties of a Methodist pastor's wife, until failing health came to him, necessitating his giving up the active work. When with resignation and patience she carried her part in the tasks of life. To them were born two children, one of whom, Emma Frances, died

at the age of two months. She leaves one son—J. R. Maynard—and three grandchildren—John, Fred and Hilda. She united with the Methodist Episcopal Church at Salem, Ind., in 1849, and has continued a faithful member until her crowning. Some five years ago she was stricken with an illness from which she never fully recovered. Through age and feebleness she still retained her interest in the church, and was always anxious to do her part in its support. She

James N. and Z. O. Lewellen. When Josephus was ten years old his father bought a farm in Delaware county and the family came to this county, where he grew to manhood.

At the age of seventeen Josephus was soundly converted in a meeting conducted by the Rev. John Pierce and united with the Mt. Pleasant Methodist Episcopal Church. In this same meeting the girl who afterwards became his life companion found Jesus as her Saviour. Mr. Lewellen spent some time in De Pauw University, then known as Asbury University. He taught school for three years in Delaware county.

On September 30, 1869, he was married to Miss Louisa Davis. They were the parents of 10 children—eight sons and two daughters. Two sons and two daughters are deceased. The six remaining sons Nelson B., Ner D., Benson M., Frank D., Arch O., and Josephus, Jr.—reside in Muncie. While his living children are all sons, his five grand-children are all girls, and these girls and their mothers had a very tender place in the affections of this fond parent.

Even before his conversion Brother Lewellen felt impressed that he ought to preach. After his conversion the call became more insistent. In 1873 he received his license to preach from the Selma quarterly Conference, N. R. Phillips being the presiding elder, and Francis A. Sale the pastor in charge. He was admitted into the North Indiana Conference upon probation in 1873, and admitted into full connection in 1875 and ordained deacen by Bishop Thomas Bowman. In 1877 having finished his conference course of study he was ordained elder by Bishop Wiley. In 1873 he was appointed to South Whitley, then Springfield; 1874-76, Ahron; '77-8, Inwood; '79, Monroe; '80-2. Leo; '83-', Roanoke; '86, Ossian; '87-8, Columbia City; '89-9, Winchester; '92-3, Greenfield; '94, Kendallville; '95-00, Warsaw District; 1901-2. Albany. In 1893 he asked for a superannuated relation which was granted him. Since that time he has sustained this relation to the Conference.

As a minister Brother Lewellen was of the type that is ready to sacrifice for the cause of Christ. He never pressed selfishly his own claims to preferment above his fellows. His preaching found its basis and its content largely in the Word of God. He was never so happy as when in revival meetings and souls were being converted to God. It was then that he enjoyed so greatly the singing of the songs of victory. His sympathies were wide. The children found him a real companion and friend. The unfortunate among his parishoners found his counsel safe and his interest in their welfare genuine. And in the home circle his good wife and his children knew him not only as a good husband and father, but as a man of God. During the days of superannuation, his pastor found him wise in counsel and sweet in spirit. "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost, and much people were added unto the Lord."

There is no question in the minds of his brethren in the ministry as to how he died. Such living leaves no questioning for the manner of the closing of earth's pilgrimage. "Our people die well" has been exemplified in his death. Only Monday of this week he sent word to the Ministerial Association of Muncie requesting them to come to his home that morning. When they came he spoke feebly, expressing his interest in all and that all were striving to promote the same cause and at last reach the same eternal abode. As prayer was offered he gave his frequent responses, and at the conclusion joined audibly in the Lord's Prayer.

On last Sunday morning he heard the church bell ring, and he spoke of its call to the house of God. He said, "And I was to preach for Brother Hobson thismorning, but cannot." Then he prayed audibly for deliverance. He called for the members of his family. Spoke to each one personally. Then he preached to them the Word of God. Most wonderfully he presented Christ to them as man's Saviour. And then he seemed to see afar a new suit of clothes all of white, and gave a description of beauteous flowers.

And when the final summons came on Thursday morning, May 18, at 4 o'clock he was ready. We can fancy we hear him saying as he answered the summons:

Do you think I fear you, Goodman Death.
Then, sire, you do not know,
For your grim, white face and your frosty breath
And your dark eyes browed with snow
Bring naught to me but a signal of love.
My Father sent you, He dwelleth above,
And I am ready to go.

Brother Lewellen was a great lover of our hymns. Mr. Bonar of Scotland wrote one of his most favorite hymns and teday it may well be sung as his requiem:

When I shall wake in that fair morn of morns, After whose dawning never night returns, And with whose glory day eternal burns.

The funeral services were held in the High Street Church, Saturday, May 20, at 2 P. M., in charge of C. E. Line, District Superintendent, with the following participating: T. M. Guild offered prayer. Chesteen Smith read the 90th Psalm, and F. A. Robinson read the 15th chapter of First Corinthians. W. W. Martin read the obituary and H. J. Norris spoke on the personal life of Brother Lewellen. Dr. Waldo, pastor of the Baptist church, and pastor of one of the sons of Brother Lewellen, spoke of the spiritual life and of his personal relationship with the deceased. The closing prayer was offered by J. E. Ervin and the benediction was pronounced by C. U. Wade. The services were attended by about forty members of the conference. His body was interred in the cemetery at Mt. Pleasant, his old home.

### REV. H. D. WRIGHT.

Howard Doddridge Wright, son of William M. and Mary A. Wright, was born May 23, 1871, in Wayne county, Ind., and died May 21, 1911, aged 39 years, 11 months and 28 days. He was united in marriage to Miss Sarah R. Seller, of Greencastle, Ind., June 5, 1900.



To the home of Brother and Sister Wright came four bright children, two of whom preceded their father to the heavenly country. The wife, two children, Lawrence and Minnetta, the mother, two brothers, five sisters, and many other relatives and friends are left to mourn the loss of their loved one. Brother Wright spent seven vears at De Pauw taking the academy and college courses and graduating in 1900. entered the North Indiana Conference in 1900. Eight faithful years were spent in serving charges in Indiana-Alto, Wal-Green, Middlebury ton. Etna. Wolcottville. and In 1908 Brother Wright accepted a call to the pastorate of the Metho-

dist Episcopal Church in Cody, Wyoming. Here his labors were crowned with signal success. Many months afterwards illness seized He toiled on, doing his pastoral work on crutches and also toward the end preaching on crutches. When he could no longer continue his work at Cody, his people consented to bid farewell to him and his loved one, and as a token of appreciation placed in his hands a purse of \$525.00. By telegram this church ordered a beautiful wreath for the funeral services. After Brother Wright's return to the home of his childhood all that love and medical skill could do was done to restore him to health, but this was all of unavail and about 12:30 o'clock on Sunday, May 21, his spirit took its flight. From pain and sorrow and suffering he left the world to live in the paradise of God. Brother Wright was converted in early childhood and united with the church at Doddridge Chapel, Indiana Conference. His faith and trust in the Redeemer was clear as the noon-day. As a man, as a minister, as a husband, as a father, as a son, as a brother, as a Christian, he was a success.

Funeral services were held at Doddridge Chapel at 9 A. M., May 24, Rev. C. H. Pinnick, pastor of the church in charge. Dr. Guild, of

Richmond District, offered prayer. Rev. Arthur Cates of Richmond read the Scripture lessons, and Dr. J. C. Bickel of Irvington, Ind., who was State Superintendent of Wyoming, under whom Mr. Wright labored, delivered the address, using as his subject "The Kingly Succession." The Rev. Coffin of Cambridge City, and Rev. Hobbs of Dublin, with the other ministers named acted as pallbearers. The body was taken to Greencastle and short services held in Locust Street Church, to which Brother Wright belonged as a student. The Rev. B. D. Beck pastor and Dr. S. B. Towne of the University had charge of the services, the latter giving the address. Interment was in Forest Hill cemetery, Greencastle.

### MRS. AMELIA CURRIE.

Amelia Jane (Berrie) Currie, was born in Petersboro, Canada, October 17, 1842, and departed this life at her home in Windfall, Ind., July 27, 1911, making her age at the time of death, 68 years, 10 months and 10 days. She was converted and joined the church when eighteen



years of age, and for more than half a century this good woman has by life and example, proven to those about her God's power to save and keep. She loved the church and as long as she was able she was faithful She was very to all its services. anxious about the erection of a new church and gave her pastor her subscription only a short time before she crossed the river to enter the church Triumphant. She was united in marriage to Rev. Adam H. Currie. August 26, 1862, at London, Canada, and two years later came to

United States, settling at Monmouth, Ind., where her husband was assigned as pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and for thirty-one years she was a co-laborer and fitting help-meet with her husband.

Mrs. Currie most faithfully discharged the duties of an itinerant's wife. The hardships and privations of the early ministry were shared by her without a murmur. She was stricken with paralysis last April from which she gradually failed, and on Saturday, June 22, it was evident the crowning was near at hand. The family was summoned to her bedside and remained with her to the end.

On Monday afternoon she was visited by her pastor, whom she recognized, reaching her hand in Christian affection. She was asked by her daughter if she desired to have us sing. She said yes. We

sang a part of that hymnthat has been such a comfort to her through life, "Jesus lover of my soul, let me to thy bosom fly." Which, she seemed to enjoy very much. Later on she took each of her children by the hand, bidding them good-bye, and looking upward as if to say, I must soon go home. She was a true, faithful wife, and mother, bringing much light and sunshine in the home. So that her children rose up and lalled her blessed.

She was the mother of eight children—Mary B. Stoddard of Rising City, Neb.; Grace Herin of Kendalville, Ind., who at this time is lying at the point of death; Maggie Austin, of Muncie, Ind.; Any and Frank Currie of Windfall, Ind.; Luther, Willie and Nettie, with her husband having preceded her to the realm beyond. Rev. Currie passed from labor to reward November 3, 1896.

### REV. CHARLES G. HUDSON, D.D.

Dr. Charles G. Hudson died October 29, 1911. He was born in Franklinville, N. Y., and entered upon his 69th year the 30th day of last April. His father was a Methodist minister, and a member of the Genesee Conference. He graduated at the Genesee Wesleyan



Seminary, which the year after his graduation became Syracuse University, and the same year entered the faculty of the school as teacher of Greek, where he remained for nine years. During this period he went abroad and spent one year in study at Berlin University. a linguist few ministers excelled him. He read easily several different languages. In the last year of his life, he spent much time reading the Bible in Hebrew and Greek. His sermons bore the marks of wide scholarship and careful preparation. He entered the Genesee

Conference in 1863, and when in 1872, he accepted a professorship in Simpson College at Indianola, Ia., he transferred to the Des Moines Conference. Although successful as a teacher, he could not get away from the feeling that he ought to enter the active work of the ministry. In 1874 he entered the North Indiana Conference, and for more than thirty-seven years maintained an active interest in all the affairs of the Conference. Many of the important Churches of the Conference have been blessed with his wise leadership, his brotherly counsels, and his tactful administration. His six years as Presiding

Elder were perhaps the crowning work of his ministry. Blessed with a mind which quickly grasped new situations and mastered details, his skill as a stenographer, both in speed and accuracy. enabled him to serve his Conference as Secretary with exceptional ability. He held this position for fifteen years, and was only relieved when his appointment to the Presiding Eldership made the change necessary. He was official stenographer at three General Conferences and was a member of the General Conferences of 1888 and 1892. His remarkable ability in this work gave him a wide acquaintance among the leaders of the church, and they greatly appreciated the splendid service he rendered to the church. the end of his term on the District he suffered a stroke of paralysis, but refused to surrender. He was appointed to Decatur, and during his three years in that pastorate he astonished all by the energetic service which he gave. Doctor and Mrs. Hudson spent almost three years in California, and then returned to take up the active work again in connection with the Park Place Church, Anderson. After three years of service there, it was with great delight that they moved into the home, purchased by their many friends, and to be occupied by them during their life time. Although suffering from occasional attacks of weakness, he had been able most of the time to attend the services of the church, and he always counted it a real joy to be able to render some service to the Kingdom. took a keen interest in thework of the church, and his presence was always a benediction to his pastor. His ideal for the Christian Ministry was high. He felt very keenly the necessity of men preparing themselves very carefully for the sacred calling. He endorsed by example and teaching the truth that a real brotherly interest, rather than any personal prejudice must actuate men in the ministry. He was quick to detect sham and pretense and measured men with a very discriminating judgment. He possessed a keen sense of humor which together with a ready wit enlivened many occasions of fellowship.

He left a small circle of relatives, but there is a large company of friends who love him as they would love a father and brother. One thing more must be said. Few men are blessed with companions more devoted, more self sacrificing, more patient in trials and afflictions, more cheerful and hopeful in spirit than was Doctor Hudson in the forty years that Hannah Backus Hudson walked by his side. They well deserved the quiet and delightful fellowship given them in the evening time of life.

The funeral services were held at the First Church, Anderson, with the Rev. C. E. Line, D. D., in charge. Brief addresses were made by Dr. C. U. Wade, Dr. G. H. Hill, and the pastor of the church, Chesteen Smith. More than forty members of the Conference were present.



### REV. CHESTER W. CHURCH.

Rev. Chester W. Church, son of Rev. E. P. Church and his wife Elizabeth, was born in Steuben county, Indiana, January 8, 1850, and died at Fort Wayne, March 8, 1912, aged 62 years and 2 months. When he was a small boy, his father entered the ministry in the North Indiana Conference and though his circuits were large and he was away from home much of the time, it is a testimony to his Christian character and worth that his family are christians and his son entered the ministry of the same church. Preachers' children are not always the worst-that old saying has been exploded many, many times. Brother Church early sought the best education that could be had, studying at Old Asbury, now DePauw University, and at Old Fort Wayne college, graduating from this latter institution with credit and honor when only twenty years old. For a while he taught school, forging right to the front at the age of twenty-two was superintendent of the Huntington schools. In 1872 he answered the call of God and the church and entered the ranks of the North Indiana Conference and for forty years has proven a workman that needed not be ashamed. He served the pastorate of five appointments—Lagro, Markle, Roanoke, Simpson, Fort Wayne and Auburn. He was an indefatigable worker who laid emphasis of his life on spiritual things, and good revivals always marked his ministry. To him the chief



message was "Get right with God." He was at Auburn three years and during his pastorate there was taken seriously ill, necessitating retirement from active pastoral work. Recovering in a measure from that illness, he took employment as a traveling salesman with his residence in Fort Wayne. He became quite active in the work of the Gideons and was for a time their local president. He has also, in later years, done much supply pastoral work. Last year he was at Decatur three months and at Portland four months, where he wrought nobly and well and many will rise up and bless his memory for the

faithful ministries oft his faithful man of God, who though sick of body himself, loyally pointed them to the Lamb of God that taketh away sin.

He had the happy way of the real soul-winner in approaching the unsaved and telling them lovingly of Jesus, who was such a real presence to him. At Portland he led the clerk of the hotel where he boarded to know Jesus, and when a few weeks later the young man died of typhod fever, his dying testimony was, "you led me'to Christ." And during these last nine weeks of the most intense suffering he spoke to several about their giving their hearts to God and this not only reveals a splendid loyalty to the work of the Master, but a blessed religious experience as well. And it is undoubtedly true that while our brother has been on the superannuate list 26 years, yet he has led more to Christ some years than some have been able to do in the active pastorate.

Brother Church was never married, but his departure makes sad the only sister, Mrs. J. A. Beatty, and six nephews and one niece, besides a great many of friends and spiritual children whom he has led to Christ. Brother Church was a well educated man and made his culture serve his King, he was a good business man who made it his business to get people saved; he was a good conversationalist who loved to talk about Jesus. He lived a life full of suffering and he closed it as a true Methodist preacher might wish—a good pastorate, though only of four months' duration, then heavenly reward—Jesus.

Funeral services were conducted from the residence of his sister, Mrs. James A. Beatty in Fort Wayne, on Monday afternoon, March 11, in charge of Rev. W. A. Griest. Sixteen members of his Conference were in attendance. The sermon was delivered by his Conference classmate, Rev. G. B. Work, of Warren, Ind. Mr. E. F. Yarnelle, a life-long friend, sang. Rev. J. K. Cecil read the Scriptures; Rev. C. C. Travis offered prayer, and Rev. Loren M. Edwards, D. D., read a resolution passed by the official board at Portland, Ind. The interment was in the family lot at North Manchester.

Alice Krider, wife of Rev. L. M. Krider of the North Indiana Conference, Charles Milton McMahon, of Philadelphia, Pa., and Effie T. McMahon of Dublin, Indiana.

She was happily converted when yet a young woman, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and until God called her from labor to reward, at 1 o'clock, Saturday morning, March 9, 1912, the service of Christ and the church was her chief joy. Her husband was a man of frail health and for many years the victim of lingering consumption. During these years, always unmindful of her own ease and comfort, she bent her energies toward caring for him. He passed away August 1, 1907, after which time, seeming to feel that her burden for her family was lifted, she lived a quiet and beautiful life in

her own home at Dublin, Ind., radiating love and good cheer, and was well beloved by all about her. Her whole life was characterized by self forgetfulness and devotion to the interests of others, especially to the welfare of her family. The sunset of her life was without a cloud. She had rounded out within twenty-seven days the seventy-ninth year of her life. Her death was a glorious entering into rest.

Surely it is of such as she of whom Solomon speaks in his description of a "worthy woman" when he says, "Her price is above rubies. The heart of her husband trusteth in her, and her children call her blessed, for she looketh well to her household. Many daughters have done worthily, but thou excelleth them all. Grace is deceitful, and beauty in vain, but a woman that feareth Jehovah, she shall be praised. Let her works praise her in the gates."

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Church in Dublin at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, March 12, 1912, conducted by her pastor, Rev. C. M. Hobbs, and participated in by Revs. T. M. Guild, District Superintendent, L. J. Naftzger, J. O. Bills, J. H. Runkle and J. E. Coffin. Her body rests beside that of her husband in the beautiful cemetery adjoining the village.
