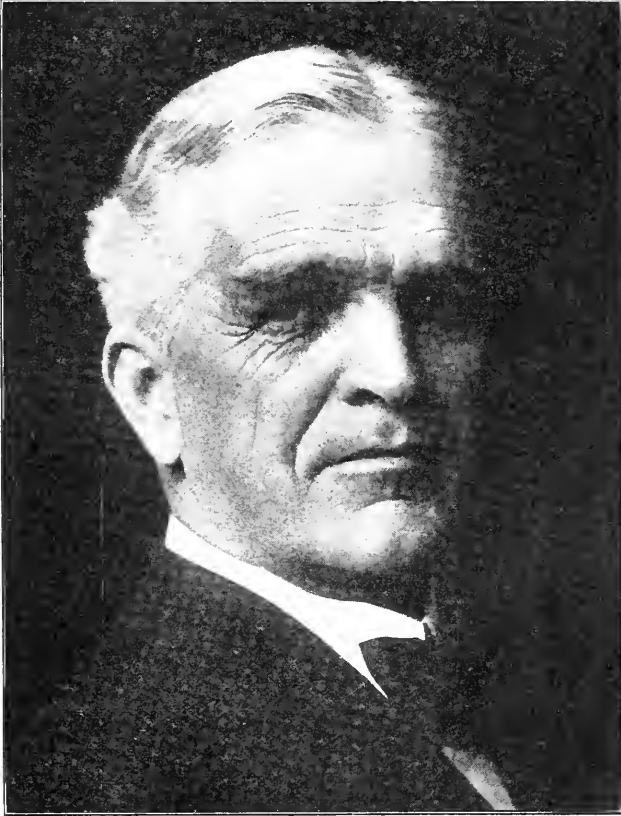

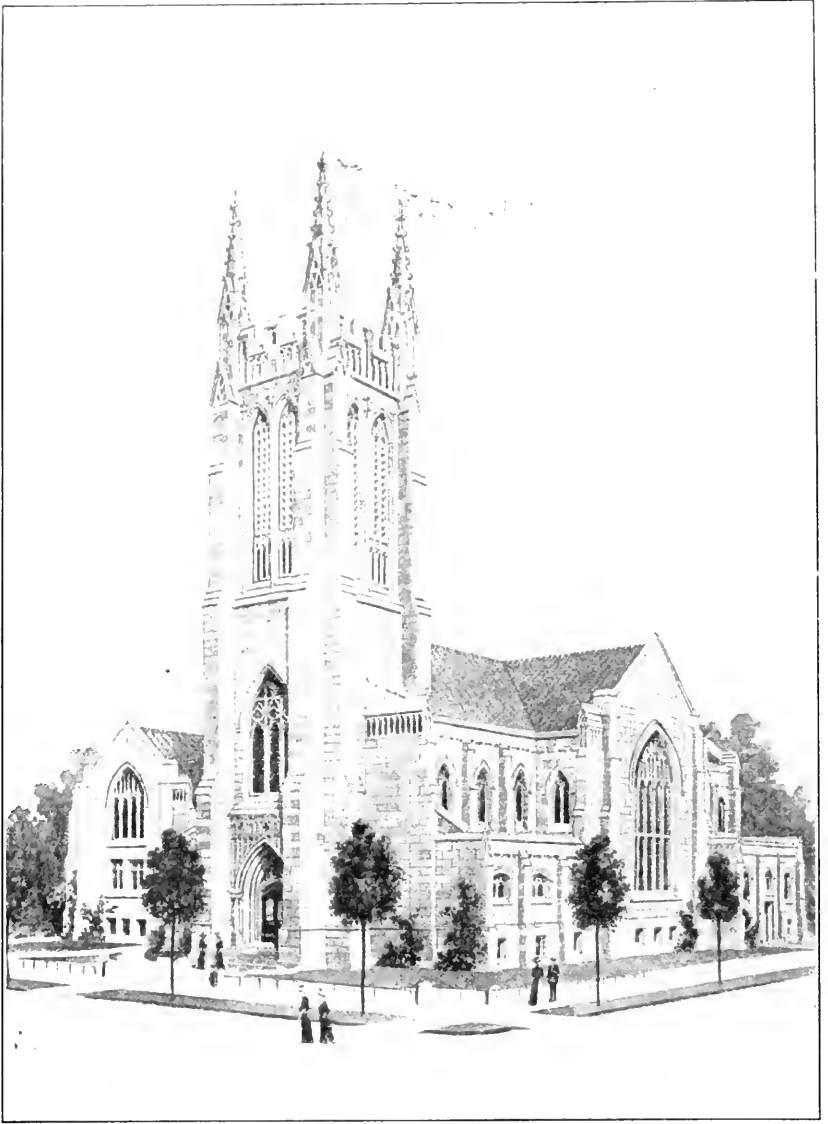

FIRST DAY.

The following in special appointment were passed in character: George R. Grose, J. W. Cain, F. M. Stone, E. L. Jones, W. D. Parr, H. B. Gough, J. O. Stutsman, Madison Swadener, P. E. Powell, E. B. Westhafer, J. W. Oborn, I. E. Price, E. J. Magor, W. M. Nelson, J. E. Ferris, J. C. Murray, G. M. McBride, W. E. Pittenger, C. U. Wade, A. H. Hirsch, Sherman Powell, G. H. Myers, and C. J. Everson.

Transfers.—The Bishop then announced the transfer of W. M. Nelson to the Indiana Conference, and of G. M. McBride to the Southern California Conference.

Preachers' Aid.—The time having arrived, according to Constitution of the Preachers' Aid Society for the annual meeting of that body, the Conference adjourned and the Preachers' Aid Society met, with Bishop McDowell in the chair.

C. U. Wade then read his report as Secretary, which was accepted and ordered to be spread upon the minutes.

On motion of W. W. Martin, R. J. Wade, Earle Naftzger, and O. A. Trabue were named as a committee to nominate officers for the Society for the coming year.

J. W. Cain then read his report as General Secretary, and offered the following amendment to the Constitution of the Preachers' Aid Society:

Article II, Section 2—strike out Paragraph 3, namely: "The money received as dues or fees from the members of the Society."

Amend Article II by adding Section 4: "The money received as dues or fees from the members of the Society, together with such other sums as may be designated for this purpose, shall constitute an Administration Fund, from which shall be paid the general expenses of the Society."

Upon motion of B. S. Hollopeter, the amendment was adopted.

On motion of C. U. Wade, J. W. Cain, G. B. Work, and H. N. Herrick were constituted a committee on the disbursement of the funds of the Society.

The Nominating Committee presented their report, as follows: President, L. J. Naftzger; Vice-President, B. S. Hollopeter; Secretary, C. U. Wade; Treasurer, B. F. Shroyer; General Secretary, J. W. Cain; Managers, Hardin Roades, B. F. Shroyer, Benjamin Glasscock, D. O. Skillen, W. W. Martin. The Society adopted this report unanimously.

Motion of C. U. Wade was passed, that the General Secretary of the Preachers' Aid Society be employed on the same terms as last year, namely, \$1,200 and expenses.

W. D. Parr made an enthusiastic address, urging the pastors of the Conference to support the work and plans of the Preachers' Aid Society.

Bishop McDowell followed with a short address, in which he urged with emphasis the loyal support of every pastor to the plans of the Conference with reference to the campaign for funds for the Preachers' Aid Society.

L. J. Naftzger moved that the resolutions adopted by the Board of Managers of the Preachers' Aid Society concerning the death of Treasurer J. W. Meeks be adopted and printed in the minutes. Motion carried. (See Resolutions.)

Conference Business Resumed.—The business having been completed, the Preachers' Aid Society adjourned, and Conference business was resumed, with Bishop McDowell in the chair.

Fourteenth Question Resumed.—The Fourteenth Question was resumed, and B. S. Hollopeter, Superintendent of the Logansport District, was passed in character and reported his

district. After he had read his report the Bishop asked him if there was anything against any effective elder in his district, and he answered that there was nothing against any of them. The following having been passed in character, those present reported in accordance with the action of the Conference: A. L. Weaver, M. L. Hardingham, LeRoy Myers, J. F. Bailey, F. O. Scurrah, J. J. Fischer, J. B. Cook, J. T. Radcliffe, G. W. Bailor, J. H. Palmer, H. E. McFarlane, H. L. Liddle, L. M. Krider, E. C. Fisher, C. A. Modlin, J. C. White, J. A. Sprague, F. J. Speckien, J. A. Sumwalt, H. L. Overdeer, E. C. Dunn, E. H. Kennedy, T. M. Guild, S. F. Harter, E. E. Wright, W. C. Asay, J. S. Newcombe, O. A. Trabue, W. M. Amos, W. E. Hamilton.

When the name of J. B. Cook was called, on motion of B. S. Hollopetter, the rule was suspended and he was granted the relation of Retired Preacher, and his case was referred to the Board of Stewards as necessitous.

When the name of H. E. McFarlane was called, his case was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Chancellor Hamilton, of the American University, was introduced, and made an impressive address in reference to that institution, and announced its opening for May 27, 1914.

Fourteenth Question.—Muncie District was called, C. E. Line, Superintendent, was passed in character, and he reported the district.

On motion of the Secretary the time was extended.

W. B. Freeland, for the Cabinet, read the following resolutions in reference to the death of Rev. James Rowe, of Chicago, which were adopted, and Bishop McDowell was requested to present them to the family of the deceased:

The members of the North Indiana Conference in session have learned with profound sorrow of the death of the Rev. James Rowe, D. D., Superintendent of City Missions of Chicago, Ill. Through Bishop McDowell we desire to express our appreciation of this great and good man.

Introduction.—President L. H. Murlin, of Boston University, was introduced, and presented the greetings of the university to the Conference.

On motion of S. Light, the case of T. F. Frech was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations and also to the Board of Stewards as necessitous.

Blaine Kirkpatrick, of the Northwest Indiana Conference, was introduced to the Conference and spoke briefly in the interest of the Epworth League Institute, urging the pastors to send their young people to its sessions.

Introduction.—The following were introduced: Thomas Nicholson, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Education; U. G. Leazenby and Aaron Wood, District Superintendents in the Northwest Indiana Conference, and Harry L. Davis, a member of the same Conference; Harry King, President of Moores Hill College, and Fred B. Fisher, Secretary of the Laymen's Forward Movement.

The pastor made announcements, the long-meter doxology was sung, and the Conference adjourned with the benediction pronounced by S. C. Miller.

THIRD DAY.

Morning Session.

Friday, April 3, 1914.

Conference convened at 8.30, with Bishop McDowell in the chair. He led the Conference in singing the hymn,

“A charge to keep I have.”

He then announced Hymn No. 539,

“Awake, my soul.”

He then spoke upon the subject, “The Church as the Agent of Redemption.” At the close of the devotional hour he announced that the regular business of the Conference for the day would be waived, but that the Conference would be in session and consider an efficiency program. Morning theme, “The Call to Advance.” At 9 o'clock he called Bishop Hen-

derson to the chair to preside, who asked Fred B. Fisher to lead in prayer.

S. H. Kirkbride was introduced and discussed the work of the American Bible Society. The Bishop asked the Conference to stand and sing Hymn 200,

“O Word of God incarnate!”

After singing of this, Thomas Nicholson, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Education, addressed the Conference in the interest of that work.

“A charge to keep I have”

was sung. The Statistical Secretary reported that there had been an increase in the probationers and full members in the Conference of 4,962.

F. D. Bovard addressed the Conference in the interest of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension.

North Indiana Conference Quartette sang,

“When I survey the wondrous cross,”

and in response to an enthusiastic encore sang,

“What did He do?”

Bishop Oldham delivered a ringing address on the work of the Board of Foreign Missions. This was followed by a prayer by Somerville Light.

Bishop Henderson then asked the Conference to stand and sing Hymn 653,

“The morning light is breaking.”

The Bishop spoke briefly on some special phases of work of the Freedmen's Aid Society.

The Conference Quartette sang,

“O for a little bit of love!”

After the announcements had been made, on motion of Leslie J. Naftzger the Conference invited Rev. Fred B. Fisher to transfer his membership to this Conference.

On motion of the Secretary, Conference adjourned, the benediction being pronounced by C. U. Wade.

Afternoon Session.

Friday, April 3, 1914.

Conference convened at 1.30 P. M., Bishop Henderson in the chair. He called W. W. Martin to lead the devotions, who announced the first hymn,

“O for a thousand tongues to sing.”

Prayer was offered by C. U. Wade.

The theme for the afternoon discussion was, “An Efficiency Program for the Local Church.” Conference sang one stanza of

“My faith looks up to Thee.”

Then the Bishop introduced Judge Charles F. Coffin, who presented the interests of the Methodist Hospital at Indianapolis.

Conference Quartette sang

“All hail Immanuel!”

which was received with such enthusiasm that at the request of the Bishop they repeated one stanza. He then presented Henry J. Coker, who discussed the subject, “A Survey of Prevailing Conditions.”

Fred B. Fisher was then introduced and discussed “The New Financial Plan—What It Is and What It Does.” This was followed by U. G. Leazenby, Superintendent of Crawfordsville District, Northwest Indiana Conference, who presented the subject, “Launching the New Plan.” This was followed by the quartette singing

“God, give us men!”

At the request of the Bishop the Conference stood and sang Hymn No. 490,

“Savior, more than life to me.”

F. J. Michel, Field Secretary of the Laymen’s Missionary Movement, spoke upon the Lake Geneva Convention that is to be held the approaching summer, urging the attendance of preachers and laymen.

In response to the request of the Bishop for the District Superintendents to make four-minute addresses upon the new financial plan in relation to its effect upon the districts, M. S. Marble, J. A. Beatty, W. B. Freeland, B. S. Hollopeter, C. E. Line, and S. Light made enthusiastic reports of the work accomplished in their districts.

In response to a motion for the appointment of a committee to work out the Conference Policy on the New Plan of Finance, the Bishop appointed R. J. Wade, W. W. Martin, and C. H. Smith.

On motion of the Secretary, it was ordered that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 7.30 this evening in Conference session.

On motion of the Secretary, Conference adjourned, and the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Henderson.

Evening Session.

Friday, April 3, 1914.

Conference convened at 7.30 P.M. in pursuance of the hour fixed by adjournment, Bishop Henderson presiding.

He requested F. Watson Hannan, Professor of Pastoral Theology in Drew Theological Seminary, to take charge of the devotions. Professor Hannan announced Hymn 415,

“Faith of our fathers,”

and offered prayer.

Evening Theme.—The theme for the evening discussion was, “The Call of the Total Task.”

A large chorus of men from Warsaw sang “Prepare ye the way of the Lord” and, in response to an enthusiastic encore, “Loyalty to Christ,” accommodated to “Warsaw for Christ.”

The reports from the meetings held by the different districts immediately following the adjournment of the afternoon session showed that the new financial plan had been adopted by each district, and that the plan would be in operation in practically every charge in the Conference for the coming year.

The Committee on Policy of the Conference made report, which was adopted, as follows:

I. We rejoice in the increase in our membership in the North Indiana Conference of 4,962, a gain of 8%. We approve the summons of our leaders for an advance of 10% upon the present membership of our Church during the year; in order thereto we agree to the immediate preparation of a complete constituency roll, and we renew our covenant to labor incessantly and plan carefully for the securing of this advance.

II. We call upon our laymen to do house-to-house, hand-to-hand work to bring the people of their communities to a decision for Christ, to attend the regular appointed means of grace, to read the Word of God, and to establish the family altar in every home.

III. We heartily indorse the new financial plan, and urge its adoption in every Church as the uniform system throughout the Conference for next year.

IV. We recommend a thorough educational campaign on the methods and merits of this plan in every Church during the year.

1. We further recommend that the District Superintendents give instructions and support to the plan in the first Quarterly Conferences, to which all the officials shall be especially urged to come, and seek to make each set of officials acquainted with the details of the plan.
2. We heartily indorse the group plan of holding one-day missionary campaigns in each charge of the Conference, and we pledge ourselves to co-operate earnestly and honestly with the plans of the District Superintendents and district missionary secretaries in arranging and holding these group meetings.
3. We recommend that Sunday, March 7, 1915, or some day that week, be known as Field Day of the Conference, and that on that day the "every-member canvass" be made in every Church in the Conference.

The Conference Quartette sang

Bishop McDowell expressed his thanks to Bishop Henderson for the service he had rendered the Conference in presiding over it during the day, and prophesied that great things would result from the program of the day.

Bishop Henderson then delivered the address of the evening on the subject, "The Previous Question."

At the close of the address he asked the Conference Quartette to lead the audience in singing

"Fill me now,"

giving the service a consecration phase by having the chorus repeated several times. Prayer was offered by Bishop Oldham.

At the Bishop's request the audience joined in singing Hymn 180, "All hail the power of Jesus' name."

Benediction was pronounced by President Grose, of DePauw University, and Conference stood adjourned.

FOURTH DAY.

Saturday, April 4, 1914.

Conference convened at 8.30, Bishop McDowell in the chair. He led the Conference in singing

"Jesus, Lover of my soul,"

and

"Where He leads me I will follow."

He read for a Scripture lesson the Gospel according to John, twenty-first chapter, beginning at the fifteenth verse, and addressed the Conference on the subject, "Our Care of the Flock of Christ." Prayer was offered by Dr. W. F. Oldham.

Journals.—The Journals of the session of Thursday and all the sessions of Friday were read and approved.

Resolution.—The following resolution was read by L. J. Naftzger and, on motion, adopted:

"Whereas, We feel that the program of yesterday was one of great profit to both pastors and laymen, and that we are greatly in need of the information and inspiration thus received; therefore be it

"Resolved, That we request the Committee on Program to arrange a similar day for Friday of the session next year, and that the evenings of the session be given over to the Conference lecture and to the consideration of our own problems.

Mr. C. F. Ostrander, President of the Business Men's Association of Mishawaka, in a brief talk invited the members of the Conference to accept an automobile ride this afternoon at four o'clock.

Eleventh Question.—The Eleventh Question, "*What Members Have Completed the Conference Course of Study?*" was called. The following were passed in character, were reported in their studies by the Registrar, and, on motion of their respective District Superintendents, were graduated from the Course of Study and elected to Elders' Orders:

Black, recommended by the Fort Wayne District Conference, recommended by the Committee on General Qualifications, represented by his District Superintendent, reported in his studies by the Registrar, was admitted on trial in the Studies of the Third Year, and elected to Deacon's Orders under the "Seminary Rule."

Admitted to Full Membership.—The following, having been elected to membership, were called forward, answered the Disciplinary Questions, were briefly addressed by the Bishop, and admitted into full membership in the Conference: Albert C. Fourth Question.—The Fourth Question, "*Who Have Been Received on Credentials, and from what Churches?*" was called, and the answer was, "None."

Introductions.—Professor F. W. Hannan, Professor of Pastoral Theology in Drew Theological Seminary, addressed the Conference in the interest of that institution. E. C. Wareing, Assistant Editor of the *Western Christian Advocate*, was introduced and spoke in reference to increased circulation of that paper. Benjamin S. Haywood, Field Secretary for Sibley Hospital, was introduced.

Announcements were made, committees called, and the Conference stood adjourned, with the benediction by E. C. Wareing.

FIFTH DAY.

Sunday, April 5, 1914.

At nine o'clock the Annual Conference Love Feast was held, in charge of H. W. Bennett, H. N. Herrick, and E. L. Semans. After a short service of song, Dr. Herrick announced the first hymn,

"Oh, for a thousand tongues to sing!"

Prayer was offered by C. H. Brown, followed by singing Hymn 548,

"Blessed Assurance."

Scripture lesson was read by E. L. Semans from the First Epistle of John. General testimony service followed, begun by A. M. Patterson and P. J. Albright, who are completing forty years of Conference membership.

Following the testimony service, public worship was conducted in charge of the pastor, L. M. Edwards, who announced Hymn No. 19,

"Come, Thou fount of every blessing,"

which was sung, and the Disciplinary order of worship for the morning hour was followed. Prayer was offered by S. Light, District Superintendent; W. B. Freeland read the second Scripture lesson, and the sermon was preached by Bishop W. F. McDowell from John 14:8, 9, his theme being "A Christlike God." The benediction was pronounced by C. E. Line.

SIXTH DAY.

Morning Session.

Monday, April 6, 1914.

Conference convened at 8.30 A. M., with Bishop McDowell in the chair. He asked the Conference to join in singing the hymns, "O, happy day," "I love Thy Kingdom, Lord."

For a Scripture lesson the Bishop read from the Gospel according to Luke 3:10-14. After commenting on these verses in a very profitable manner, he asked L. J. Naftzger to lead in prayer.

Journal.—The Journal of the sessions on Saturday and Sunday were read and approved.

transactions of this Conference session, together with reports and statistics, as the Official Journal, and to distribute the same to the districts, pro rata with the number of members in full connection, and to send a copy of the same to each retired minister living within the bounds of the Conference, and a copy to each Conference widow.

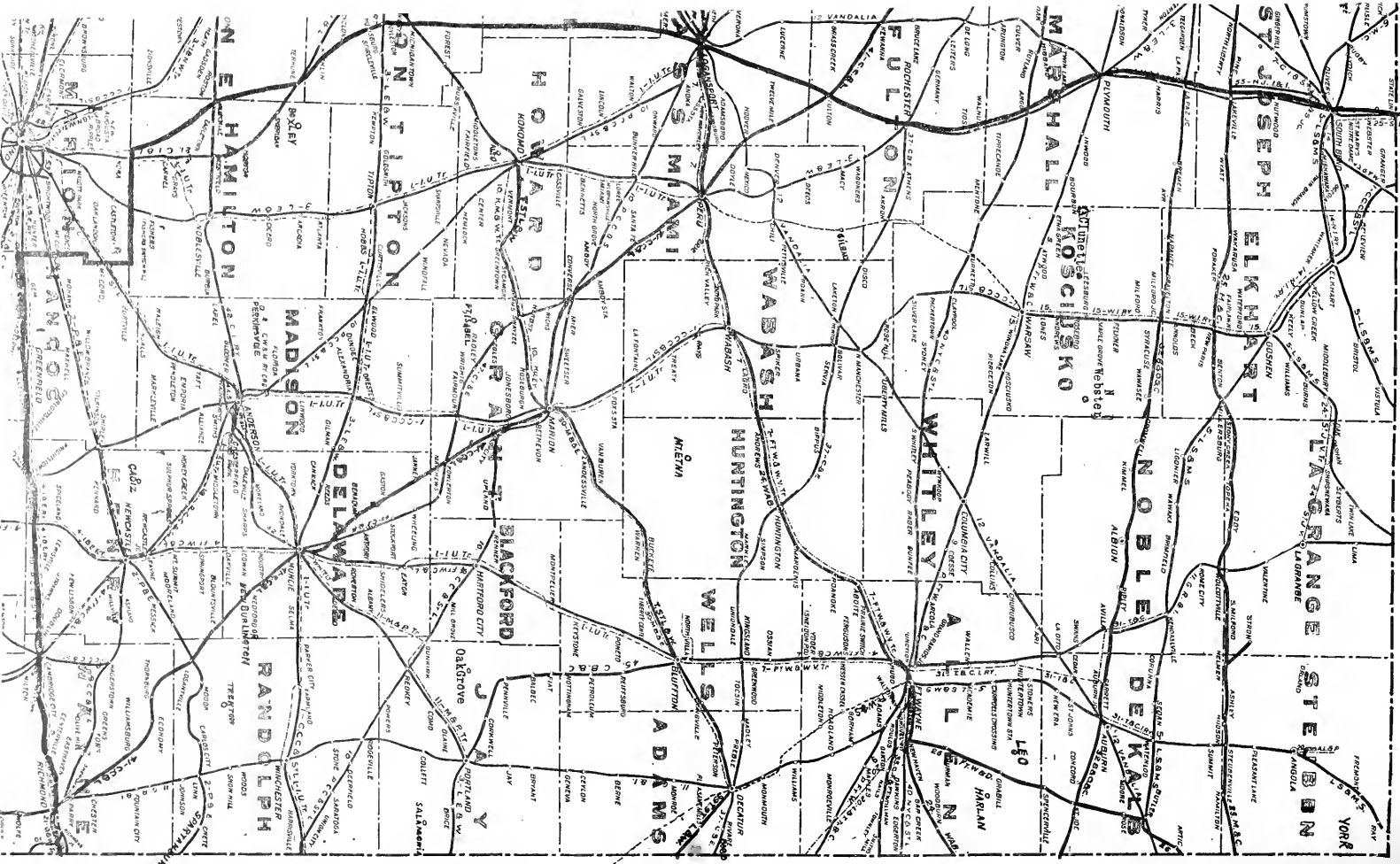

Reports of District Superintendents.

FORT WAYNE DISTRICT.

James A. Beatty, District Superintendent.

Dear Bishop and Brethren: I am glad to report a victorious year. These soldier pastors of Fort Wayne District are a brave company of men. They have hurried in here from the battlefield like a host of Generals just long enough to report and get orders for another campaign, and continue the fight

"Till every foe is vanquished
And Christ is Lord indeed."

The old men of the district appointed by Bishop McDowell a year ago knew where to begin, and went immediately to business. The new ones were not long in settling, and they settled for business too. We have kept hard at it all the year. The noble wives and some of the children of these pastors have helped amazingly to win the victories.

Our district received a shock at the sudden passing out of Brother Lewis D. Rehl. He fell to his death from the top of a cherry tree the second of last July. The limb broke underneath his weight and dashed him a distance of about twenty feet, his head striking the cement walk, causing concussion of the brain, and death resulted three hours later. He was visiting his parents at Napoleon, Ohio, and taking a few days of much-needed rest. Brother Rehl was one of God's chosen workmen, an exceptionally strong preacher, earnest, faithful, systematic, and loved by the brethren of this Conference. I held his Quarterly Conference only three days before his coronation, and the charge was in the best condition it had been for many years. The Communion Sunday was a great occasion. The audience was large and the Divine presence clearly manifest. Every charge he served went forward. He was a faithful servant of God. How we miss him! But most of all is he missed by his sorrowing wife and little daughter, Germaine. Let us pray for them.

Brother E. J. Maupin was obliged to go to the hospital about the middle of January for an operation. He was taken from his pulpit to the Lutheran Hospital in Fort Wayne, where he remained for two weeks. After spending a month recuperating, he is getting back to his former vigor and hopes to be stronger than he has been for several years.

Mrs. Crafts, the wife of G. H. Crafts, who took a supernumerary relation a year ago, was obliged to go to Saint Luke's Hospital, Cleveland, Ohio, and underwent a critical operation for cancer. A complete recovery is reported.

Mrs. C. Claude Travis, in the Wayne Street parsonage, and Mrs. F. H. Cremean, in the St. Paul parsonage, are both detained from this Conference because of serious illness.

Changes.—The first change occurred at New Haven. Alda R. Gilliam, appointed to supply the charge, did so for two Sundays, but on account of overwork during the winter his health failed, and he was obliged to give it up. A. G. Bryan, a local preacher of East Liberty, Ohio, was secured. He served eight months and was released, and Chauncey King, one of the old reliables, brought the year's work to a fine close. So popular is he with his people that the fourth Quarterly Conference requested that he serve another year. J. Orr Powell, stationed at Scottsburg, was transferred from the Indiana Conference to take up the work of the sorrowing people at Ossian, occasioned by the death of their much loved pastor, Lewis D. Rehl. After some delay Henry E. Little, a local preacher from Tennessee, was secured to supply Fort Wayne Circuit. After serving four months he wearied of us and returned to the sunny South. Alda R. Gilliam, much loved by this people and at their request, came and successfully completed the year. J. O. Hochstedler, of Bobo Charge, and Karl R. Thompson, of Decatur Circuit, were granted a release by Bishop McDowell to go to Boston Theological Seminary. Guy H. Black, a student of Garrett Theological Seminary, was secured for Bobo and has done a remarkable work in seven months. He is recommended to be received into the Conference. Joseph Grimes was transferred from the Indiana Conference and assigned to Decatur Circuit. The charge is well pleased with his work and unanimously invited him to return. F. V. Westhafer, of Harlan, was granted a release to attend school, and S. I. Zechiel was transferred from the South Kansas Conference and has done a fine work in closing out the year. He has had the best revival the charge has had for many years, and the people are enthusiastic for his return.

Spiritual Awakening and Membership.—The greatest spiritual awakening of all the years has swept the Churches of the district the past few months. There have been converted and reclaimed 2,121. W. T. Arnold, pastor at First Church, Bluffton, reports 320 of this number, with a gain in membership of 215. Evangelist Johnson first gave valuable help in a meeting where 70 were converted. The Bob Jones Meeting, in January, stirred the city of Bluffton and the country for many miles around. J. Orr Powell, pastor at Ossian, reports 262, and 225 accessions. This will make a membership in this two-point circuit of 600, and will pay a salary next year of \$1,200. B. F. Hornaday, pastor at Orland, reports 200, and 107 accessions, making an increase of more than 50 per cent. J. E. Coffin, pastor at Pennville, reports 200, and 73 accessions. A. C. Hoover, 190, and 75 accessions. C. Claude Travis, Wayne Street, 70 conversions and 105 accessions. The Kerr brothers were the evangelists in this meeting, and the Church received a great uplift. Auburn, F. F. Thornburg, pastor, 80, and 56 accessions. He had the assistance of J. W. Oborn, one of our Conference evangelists. D. A. J. Brown, Poneto, 101. Others reporting smaller numbers, but perhaps as devoted in effort as the foregoing, are as follows: H. S. Nickerson, Angola, 31; J. R. Elson, Bluffton Circuit, 35; G. H. Black, Bobo, 60; F. P. Johnson, Coesse, 18; D. T. Stephenson, First Church, Decatur, 45, and 74 accessions; D. H. Guild, First Church, Fort Wayne, 50, and 77 accessions; F. H. Cremean, St. Paul, 26, and 42 accessions; W. A. Griest, Simpson, 35, and 70 accessions; T. M. Hill, Trinity, 57, and 75 accessions; Charles Tinkham, Garrett, 52 accessions; E. M. Dunbar, Geneva, 32, and 37 accessions; S. I. Zechiel, Harlan, 52, and 45 accessions; C. H. Hickman, Hudson-Ashley, 18, and 25 accessions; Henry Lacy, Huntertown,

19, and 28 accessions; John Phillips, Monroe, 32; C. M. Hollopeter, Monroeville, 26; U. S. A. Bridge, Portland, 32; J. C. Valentine, Portland Circuit, 43; Homer E. Elliott, York, 43. Because of an over-count last year, Monroe suffers a loss of 49, and Leo a loss of 20. Both charges made an actual gain. For the same reason First Church, Bluffton, makes a gain of 155, when it should be 215. The net gain in membership is 1,010.

Building and Improvements.—Three new parsonages were built this year. At Pennville the old parsonage was in such bad repair that Brother Coffin and family did not move into it, but proceeded at once to rebuild. The old house was put on a new foundation, a second story added, tore out the partitions and remodeled the interior, beautifully decorated and lighted it, excavated for a basement, and put in a furnace. The pastor and family now enjoy one of the most modern parsonages in the district, at a cost of \$1,960.

Hoagland has long since felt the need of a new parsonage. Immediately after Conference the Trustees sold the old one for \$1,000 and built an eight-room, modern house with an up-ground cellar, and a new barn, all at a cost of \$1,770.

After this they went immediately to the task of remodeling their church at Hoagland. They made a radical change in the plan of the church, putting the pulpit on the side, building an extension on the opposite side, heating with furnace, putting in art glass windows, and beautifully decorating the interior. This was done at a cost of \$2,500. The 16th of last November this church was reopened, Bishop David H. Moore, preaching morning and evening, easily raising the money. Rev. C. Claude Travis preached an excellent sermon in the afternoon, at which service the District Superintendent rededicated the church. Rev. E. L. English is the happy pastor.

The parsonage of St. Paul, Fort Wayne, was no longer sufficient to meet the needs of this growing Church. The Board of Trustees sold it and applied the proceeds to the building of a splendid, modern, eight-room house, equipped with electric light fixtures of rare beauty. The entire cost, \$3,000. The securing of this splendid preacher's home is only one of the many fine things Dr. F. H. Cremean and his wife have done for this Church.

One year ago last February our church at Ashley burned. This heroic people, while the smoke was going up from the burning embers, was busy maturing their plans to rebuild. They built on the old foundation, but better and more modern, at a cost of \$5,000. Daniel Rinesmith, one of the Trustees, took the contract and thereby saved them large expenditures of money. Dr. W. D. Parr was called and raised the needed amount of money, and solemnly dedicated the church to the worship of Almighty God.

Garrett is now building a fine church to cost not less than \$30,000. The 19th of last October it was the privilege of the District Superintendent to lay the corner-stone. The walls are now up, and it is almost ready for the roof. Charles Tinkham is the pastor, and the Church keeps increasing his salary each year.

Wayne Street Church, Fort Wayne, has spent \$3,200 in lowering the organ, redecorating, and making this one of the most attractive auditoriums in the city. Here Rev. C. Claude Travis preaches to one of the finest congregations in our Conference. They unanimously invited him to return for the sixth year, at an increase in salary.

First Church, Fort Wayne, has installed a steam-heating plant at a cost of \$1,900. Dr. D. H. Guild is skillfully meeting the situation.

Trinity Church, Fort Wayne, has completed repairs costing \$1,870. Rev. T. M. Hill, the pastor, reports a membership of 520.

New Haven, for several years at a standstill, has taken a new

start. They have expended \$1,000 in putting in a basement, installing two furnaces, and decorating the auditorium. Rev. Chauncey King is now their pastor.

Coesse has expended \$1,043 in repairs, putting in a basement, a furnace, and redecorating the auditorium. Rev. F. P. Johnson is the pastor and leader in this enterprise.

Ceylon, a small Church on the Geneva Circuit, has been nicely repaired at an expense of \$275. Sister Hoover, the pastor's wife, saw how sadly this people were neglected, gathered them together, reorganized them, repaired their church, and now they have one of the best Sunday schools and congregations on the charge.

Under the leadership of Rev. John R. Elson, the pastor, Epworth Church, Bluffton, has been moved from an undesirable location and placed on a prominent street three squares north. It has been cleaned, repaired, and put in an attractive condition. The cost was \$560. A revival followed, with 30 conversions.

Mt. Hope Church, on the Bobo Charge, has been remodeled and enlarged at a cost of \$1,925. Rev. Guy H. Black came to this charge last September and soon led them to see they were able. The work was undertaken, brought to successful completion, and now they have a splendid church, well equipped for all their work. Sunday, March 22d, Dr. W. D. Parr was called, and brought them across to financial victory.

Shinn's Chapel, near Montpelier, had gone into disuse. The windows were out, the plastering was off, and nothing left but a shell. Brother Bills and I went out last summer and urged the people to repair, and they responded by doing it, and now they have a good, respectable church. They now have a good Sunday school and regular church services.

Monroeville redecorated their church, put in the indirect system, making it a real beauty and costing them \$783.

Auburn expended \$845 completing the extension of their church, begun last year. This included redecorating the interior, a costly floor-covering of linoleum, putting in a spacious basement, and installing a steam-heating plant. They are expecting to build a large addition next year for Sunday school purposes. They are now inviting this Conference to the hospitality of their homes and the comfort of their beautiful church in this aggressive, growing county seat. Of course you will come.

Other Churches have made smaller repairs, as follows: Angola, \$125; First Church, Bluffton, \$710; First Church, Decatur, \$118; Decatur Circuit, \$100; Simpson Church, Fort Wayne, \$150; Fremont, \$158; Geneva, \$50; Hamilton, \$155; Harlan, \$94; Hometown, \$300; Leo, \$532; Monroe, \$510; Montpelier, \$480; Orland, \$481; Ossian, \$175; Poneto, \$75; First Church, Portland, \$90; Spencerville, \$97; Woodburn, \$125; York, \$142; total expenditures, \$46,324.

Debts Paid.—Paid on old indebtedness, \$13,325, as follows: Auburn, \$400; St. Paul, Fort Wayne, \$1,783; Simpson, Fort Wayne, \$4,600; Geneva, \$100; Hamilton, \$247; Montpelier, \$1,000; Ossian, \$2,200; Poneto, \$392; Portland, \$800; Portland Circuit, \$1,000. A few others with smaller amounts.

Finances.—The best thing we have to report on finance is the New Financial Plan. Wayne Street Church, Fort Wayne, was the first in the district to adopt it. Several more of the larger Churches soon followed. We have pushed it hard all the year. Every charge on the district has now adopted it and is working it.

The salaries of the pastors have been increased \$1,300 and paid more promptly than ever before.

Our benevolences are likewise sharing in this great increase. The

pastors' reports insure more than \$5,000 for Foreign, and more than \$4,000 for Home Missions, besides special gifts. This will be an increase of \$1,700 for the cause of Missions over last year. All other benevolences show a like increase with Missions. This is just the beginning of the larger increase to come through this New Financial Plan.

Twenty-eight charges report a good increase in their benevolences this year, five pulled down, and four pulled even. Eight charges report all benevolences in full. First Church, Bluffton, not only reports all benevolences in full, but reports a total of \$6,244.

Church Papers.—The pastors have faithfully continued the canvass for our Church papers. They report 1,165 Western Christian Advocates, about 50 other Advocates, and 400 Epworth Herald's.

Preachers' Aid Society.—The district made a vigorous and systematic appeal in the interest of our Preachers' Aid Society. We launched the campaign at the meeting of the pastors and District Stewards in May. In addition to sending out the pastors, we had the valuable assistance of Dr. C. U. Wade, Dr. W. D. Parr, Rev. J. W. Cain, and A. B. Cline. Earnest appeals were made, and we have pledged \$6,606, and already paid \$2,165. We expect to continue the campaign until Fort Wayne District reaches the full \$10,000.

Church Organizations.—We have 92 Sunday schools, with a total enrollment of about 15,000. These schools are well organized and use our literature. Their offerings to Missions reaches a total of \$2,343.

The pastors report 44 Epworth Leagues, with an enrollment of 1,882. These young people pledged to Missions, for the support of Dr. E. O. Ernsberger, a little over \$1,300. Several old chapters have been revived and reorganized this year. Miss Ione Easley is the efficient District President.

The Junior League work is encouraging and advancing. Our largest League is still at Trinity Church, Fort Wayne, superintended by Mrs. T. M. Hill, who is also the District Superintendent. The enrollment for the district is 4,250.

We have 57 Ladies' Aid Societies, reporting receipts for the year's work of \$12,512, an increase of more than \$2,000 over last year.

The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies have also made a good advance. The Home Society has raised \$2,966, and the Foreign Society \$2,674.

We have five active Methodist Brotherhoods. Our men are working as never before, but they do not stick to organized Brotherhood as they should. The great Methodist Men's Convention at Indianapolis gave our men a new and larger vision.

District Meetings.—We held three great district meetings within the year, besides the meeting of the District Stewards and pastors, at which time we had a splendid program. The Epworth League was held in June at Geneva. In October we held a One Day Missionary Convention in Simpson Church, Fort Wayne. The speakers were Dr. George R. Grose, Dr. E. H. Richards, and Dr. Fred B. Fisher.

It would be difficult to describe our District Conference. Everybody present put it in the superlative degree. The announcement of such speakers as Dr. George R. Grose, Dr. W. B. Hollingshead, Dr. E. S. Shoemaker, Mrs. Celestine Bernheim, and Bishop Theodore S. Henderson fully justifies the claim. The closing day with Bishop Henderson will ever be precious because of its helpfulness. Our only regret was that we could not have, as we had fondly hoped, our own great leader, Bishop William F. McDowell.

A class of three young men was licensed to preach the gospel, and Mont M. Thornburg, Elbert L. English, and Guy H. Black were

recommended to the Annual Conference to be received on trial, and the latter also for Deacon's Orders.

We have had a good year. Most of us have had the best of all our years. All might have had it so. Best things come high. A Burmese student, some years ago, in contesting with European claimants and candidates, took everything before him. He said, "Everything is possible here to a man who works." Genius has been defined as a capacity for hard work. We must study how to make our efforts count for the largest things. It is not enough to be busy. We must be busy about right things. Resist the temptation to go after small things. Cleopatra said to Mark Antony, "It is not for you to be fishing for gudgeons, but to be taking forts, towns, citadels." We need a ministry who will cease frittering away their time doing things that somebody else could do quite as well, and give themselves to greater and grander tasks to which they have been called from all eternity. The big tasks frighten us and make out of us crouching men. When Peter received the baptism of the Holy Ghost he never again suggested, "I go fishing." They no longer went splashing in the water, wondering where they would find the Master, but became fishers of men. No more failures after this. The big task was sufficient to employ all their time.

GOSHEN DISTRICT.

Somerville Light, District Superintendent.

All Goshen District welcomes the North Indiana Conference to this beautiful city and this modern Memorial Church edifice.

Dear Bishop McDowell, the pastors and Superintendent of Goshen District united with North Indiana Conference and world Methodism in thanksgiving to God for sparing your life and bringing you back to health and strength.

After about five weeks of very efficient service on the Corunna Charge, T. G. Godwin, a supply, was obliged, on account of serious illness in the family, to surrender the charge. Rev. J. S. Cain, Retired Minister, supplied with great acceptability until the appointment of R. P. Geyer, who took charge about the first of September. After several months without a pastor, E. M. Armitage was secured for the Butler Circuit. Jesse Denbo was released from the work of the Warsaw Circuit, September 15th, to attend school. W. V. Mullikin was secured, and went forward with the work. Brother F. A. Reichelderfer, of Topeka, was released September 1st to enter Garrett Biblical Institute. Herbert Boase was taken from Wakarusa to Topeka, and J. C. Lawburgh, of the Indiana Conference, was transferred and stationed at Wakarusa.

Eleven Retired Ministers reside within the bounds of the district. Brothers Lash, Welch, Paschall, Wones, and Hasty have been in feeble health. Brother H. C. Smith was suddenly called to his crowning on Sunday night, July 27, 1913, while paying a visit to his nephew near Santa Fe, his boyhood home. He preached with great liberty and power at the evening service, returned to his nephew's home, and quietly on the wings of sweet sleep passed to the Church Triumphant. The Rev. A. G. Neal, of First Church, Warsaw, pastor of the family, assisted by several brethren of the Conference, had charge of the impressive funeral services. We bespeak for Sister Smith, the devoted wife, the prayer of the entire Conference. In the

early spring the death angel came to the parsonage home at Avilla and accompanied the saintly mother of the pastor's wife, Mrs. Nancy Bassett, to her heavenly home. Brother and Sister Lamport, who had cared for the aged mother so faithfully, took the dear old body to Bristol, her old home, where appropriate funeral services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. C. B. Croxall.

With but two or three exceptions the pastors' families have been free from severe illness. Sister Shaw, the wife of our pastor at Howe, passed through a severe illness, but is now apparently in usual health. Sister Dixon, of Etna Green, was also quite seriously ill for weeks, but is now in a greatly improved condition. Sweet babies came during the year to bless the lives and homes of Brothers and Sisters Loveless, of Wawaka; Bash, of Waterloo; Lawburgh, of Wakarusa; Shaw, of Howe; Geyer, of Corunna; and Cloud, of Syracuse.

Dr. Wade's Wedding.—Wednesday evening, August 6th, occurred the marriage of Rev. R. J. Wade, D. D., pastor of Trinity Church, Elkhart, to Miss Myrtle Mudge, the accomplished daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Mudge, of the same city. The ceremony was performed in the auditorium of the church by the father of the groom, Dr. C. U. Wade, of Greencastle, assisted by the District Superintendent. An informal reception followed in the parlors of the parsonage, where Dr. and Mrs. Wade received the heartiest congratulations. Mrs. Wade was reared in Elkhart and brought up in old Trinity, in which she has been an excellent worker for several years.

On Thanksgiving evening, in the beautiful Christian home of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Mason, Bluffton, Ind., occurred the marriage of Rev. A. H. Bachus, pastor of Lagrange Charge, to Miss Nellie Mason, an earnest, devoted, capable member of the First Church, of Bluffton. The District Superintendent had the pleasure of officiating on this delightful occasion.

Departmental Work of the Churches.—The Sunday schools, 81 in number, have a total enrollment of more than 12,000, and are in the best condition, both in city and country, I have known them to be. With but two or three exceptions they are organized into missionary societies. All use the literature of the Church. A district institute was held in First Church, Goshen, on Wednesday, July 16th. Dr. Hartman and Miss Thomason represented the Board of Sunday Schools. Mr. W. E. Carpenter gave vision of what it means to develop a truly great school such as he has at Brazil, and Bishop McDowell brought the day to a climax with his winged words on "Life and the Bible." Among the schools which have been fully standardized, the one at First Church, Mishawaka, easily ranks first. Three teacher-training classes are in operation; two in connection with the regular session of the school, the third being led by the pastor, Loren M. Edwards, during the week. The combined membership is about 75. Not only has the graded work been introduced, but the teachers have been graded as well. Men teachers are employed in all boys' classes, and no man who uses tobacco is allowed to teach in the Sunday school. The Junior Department is admirably equipped and is pro-

nounced by Dr. Blake the equal of any in the connection for a town the size of Mishawaka.

Offerings for Missions, Board of Sunday Schools, and Children's Day Fund are in advance of former years. There has also been a good increase in the number of conversions in the schools.

Epworth League Chapters.—Most of our Epworth League chapters are loyal and doing good work in a larger way than ever before. A substantial increase in membership is reported by the Senior League chapters. The Junior League chapters have not quite kept pace. The chapters of this district continue to support Dr. Cartney, missionary to China. Fourteen hundred dollars was pledged for this worker. The district convention was held at Bourbon, June 24th and 25th. Bishop Bristol greatly pleased the convention in his masterly address, and President Grose, of DePauw, won the admiration of the great Epworthian host the second evening.

The Methodist Brotherhood.—While we have only eight Brotherhoods on the district, they have done the best work this year ever done by this organization. The truth is, men are interested in the large things of the Kingdom to-day as never before. Christian men are putting business into religion—business into local Church matters, business into forward movements of all kinds, business into great philanthropic enterprises of the hour, real business zeal into the work of evangelism; in a word, making it their chief business to help Jesus Christ save the world. The same royal host of consecrated laymen can be trusted by the General Conference Commission on Evangelism. They want to know "how." They are determined to know "how." They are beginning to know "how." Back to the secret place of prayer; back to the mourner's bench; back to the intelligent, God-inspired preaching of the gospel, which brings conviction to the careless sinner far from God; back to a rejoicing with the angels over repenting, confessing, believing, receiving Christ-saved souls; back to the impulse which moves the saved man out after his own brother sinner; back to the truth that a man is saved to be a savior of his fellow-men; back to every member his own evangelist; back to co-partnership with Jesus Christ in the greatest work to which a man can give his best self.

Boy Scouts.—The Boy Scout Movement is gaining strength. This work has been undertaken on a large scale in Kendallville, Millard Pell, pastor. An expert worker was brought to the city for the summer season. He gripped the boys of the entire city; so much so that the business men became greatly interested and volunteered to support the work.

Woman's Work.—The Ladies' Aid Societies are doing excellent work in every way. They have raised more than \$12,000 during the year. The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies have been more than usually active and, of course, have increased the number of societies and raised and disbursed more money than formerly.

Finances.—The first event of the Conference year was the annual meeting of the pastors and Stewards held at Goshen, May 10th. At this meeting the campaign in behalf of the Endowment Fund of the Preachers' Aid Society was formally launched. The men responded to the filling of the room where the banquet was held. The chief speaker for the occasion was the Hon. Marvin Campbell, of South Bend. Other laymen, with Dr. R. J. Wade, District Missionary Secretary, and the District Superintendent, gave brief addresses. A definitely planned itinerary had been arranged, calling for special services and canvass on May 11th and 18th. The men of the district, with the assistance of J. W. Cain, Secretary of the Preachers' Aid Society,

Drs. C. U. Wade and W. D. Parr, and Brother A. B. Cline, of Bluffton, went after it, with the result that on the night of May 18th the victory was won, the \$10,000 was ours. A little additional effort advanced the district to the \$12,000 mark.

Tuesday, April 29th, the old parsonage at Corunna was sold, and September 15th a more modern house near the Church was purchased, and soon after occupied by Pastor Geyer and family.

Soon after Conference work was begun on the church at North Webster, W. T. Daly, pastor. A roomy basement was put under the entire building, divided into furnace room, kitchen, and dining-room. The building was veneered with first-class brick, tower, and entrance at corner, new seats, carpet, wall decoration, etc., at an expense of about \$6,000. The District Superintendent officiated at the reopening, Sunday, August 10th. So well had the pastor managed affairs that less than \$1,500 was needed to provide for this improvement. And so well did the people respond that \$1,650 was subscribed. Last year the Morris Chapel church, on this charge, was rebuilt at a cost of about the same amount.

Early in the year A. L. Lamport, pastor at Avilla, began the rebuilding of the Avilla church. The building was raised; full basement, with all modern appointments, put in; tower and entrance placed at corner; completely refinished, and refurnished inside and painted on outside. The entire cost of this improvement was \$2,800. The church was reopened by Bishop Moore, Sunday, September 28th. Brother Lamport is invited to return for the third year, with the promise, based on an every-member canvass at both appointments, of an advance in salary from \$800 to \$1,000.

The new church at Cromwell, Wawaka Charge, W. E. Loveless, pastor, begun last year, was dedicated November 16th. Dr. W. D. Parr was called to preach the sermon and raise the \$2,000 needed. A happy people united with Dr. Parr and a jubilant pastor in impressive dedicatory services. The cost of the church was, in round numbers, \$6,000.

At Middlebury, J. W. Bowen, pastor, the church was rebuilt and thoroughly modernized at a cost of \$3,000. The District Superintendent officiated at the services, held November 23d. Nine hundred and forty-three dollars was required to complete payment. The people subscribed \$1,162. Five years ago the pastor found both congregations greatly discouraged, an old dilapidated parsonage, both church buildings in a poor condition, a \$700 salary. During this time he has built a modern parsonage at a cost of \$2,600, rebuilt the Shipshewana church at a cost of \$1,650, and expended on the Middlebury church \$3,000. The salary was advanced from \$700 to \$800, and next year goes up to the round \$1,000. Good revivals have attended his ministry on this charge, and this year he reports a gain in membership of 30 per cent.

The recently rebuilt church at Howe, Roscoe Shaw, pastor, quite badly damaged by fire in the late winter, has been repaired and is again in use by the congregation.

The South Milford church, L. W. Kemper, pastor, was rebuilt and modernized, with a view to making it not only more commodious and inviting, but also to assist in solving the country Church problem by making it a country-side social center. On January 11th the District Superintendent reopened the church. The entire cost of this improvement was about \$1,100.

At Bourbon, R. W. Stoakes, pastor, a fine \$17,000 church is in process of erection and will be ready for dedication early next Conference year. On the Benton and Richville Charge, organized this year, A. A. Turner, pastor, \$1,375 has been subscribed for a new par-

sonage. At Osceola, Preston Polhemus, pastor, the Ladies' Aid Society led in the purchase of a house and lot adjacent to the Church property. The house and lot cost \$650.

Other improvements amounting to \$100 and over have been made on the following charges: Bristol, C. B. Croxall, pastor, for new hardwood floor in auditorium, and other repairs, \$320; Etna Green, Edwin Dixon, pastor, \$530; Goshen, First Church, R. L. Semans, pastor, \$1,455, general repairs on church building; Howe, Roscoe Shaw, pastor, \$140; Inwood, W. E. Hogan, pastor, \$170; Kendallville, Millard Pell, pastor, \$117; La Grange, A. H. Bachus, pastor, \$360; Mishawaka, L. M. Edwards, pastor, \$100; Nappanee, Silas Cates, pastor, \$150; Syracuse, C. A. Cloud, pastor, \$400; Valentine, J. K. Wyant, pastor, \$450; Wakarusa, J. C. Lawburgh, pastor, \$255; Warsaw, A. G. Neal, pastor, \$200; Warsaw Circuit, W. V. Mullikin, pastor, \$235; Wolcottville, I. R. Godwin, pastor, \$231. Total for new work and improvements, \$47,345. The total valuation of church and parsonage property reaches \$705,650. Amount of debts, \$23,884. Net property, \$681,766.

Special Days.—Elkhart County Methodist Day was observed at the beautiful park in Goshen, August 12th. Mr. E. E. Starbuck, of Goshen, representing the Goshen District Laymen's Association, assisted by a very competent committee, made all necessary arrangements for the day. A fine musical contest was greatly enjoyed by the people. A picnic dinner was the order at 12 o'clock, and at 2 P. M., Dr. W. D. Parr gave the address of the day.

Settlement Day.—Settlement Day meeting was held at Pierceton, December 4th. A large majority of the charges reported salaries paid in full to date, and a like majority reported they were working the every-member canvass and duplex-envelope system. The salaries for next year are in most cases practically fixed now, and in nearly every instance backed by the every-member canvass.

Elkhart Methodist Day.—This day was to have been observed January 25th, but the serious illness of Bishop McDowell made it necessary to postpone until March 8th. The day was really devoted to city church extension work, with the debt-ridden St. Paul Church as the chief objective. Bishop W. F. Anderson, of Cincinnati, came in Bishop McDowell's stead and preached three strong, inspiring sermons; one at Trinity Church in the morning, another at Simpson at 2.30 P. M., and the third at St. Paul's at night. Dr. James Rowe, Corresponding Secretary of the Chicago Home Mission and Church Extension Society, came on Friday night and generously gave the three nights and two days in the management of the finances. The totals on Sunday night footed up in round numbers \$15,000, and still there remains about \$15,000 of debt, for which no provision has been made. The heroic St. Paul membership have done their best in every way, giving more, much more, per capita than any other Church in the district. This church building is worth more to-day than it cost.

Salaries.—Twelve charges advanced pastors' salaries at the beginning of the year. This advance amounted to \$2,350. The advance now promised for next year reaches \$2,600. The average salary, including the District Superintendent, now paid the effective men who are members of the Conference is \$1,210. The per cent of advance in other ministerial support compares favorably with the advance in pastors' salaries.

Benevolences.—Thirty-three charges report an advance over last year, two report less, and three about the same. The total advance is \$13,407. For missions alone thirty charges show gains ranging from \$10 to \$300. The benevolence conventions were held throughout the district in late September. I am sure all rejoice because of the re-

sults now in hand; \$39,410 contributed for benevolence, and \$157,964 for all causes. The average contribution per member for all purposes ranges from \$2.73 to \$52.50.

Revivals and Membership.—The spirit of evangelism has been manifested in an unusual way throughout the district. I have not known of such interest in the country sections for years. Several of our country Churches have been completely made over. In both country and town large numbers have been reached and brought into the Kingdom. Thus, by pastors and laymen the work of evangelism has been pressed as never before during my time on the district. For the most part the special meetings have been conducted by the pastors who have thought it out in advance, made a constituency roll, rallied the Church men, and gone after what was at the very door. The program of the Commission on Evangelism has been explained and urged all over the district in congregational Quarterly Conferences. The pastors have seconded the effort. Evangelist Jones, of the Southland, conducted a tabernacle meeting in Warsaw in which nearly a thousand professed conversion. Our pastor, A. G. Neal, conserved the results and gathered in over two hundred new members, a 28 per cent gain. Under the inspiration of this great work the old church is outgrown. Plans are now adopted for the erection of a new \$50,000 church. The Kerr brothers conducted a meeting at Butler, W. H. Brightmire, pastor, in which 130 were converted. City Missionary Nipper, of Ft. Wayne, assisted Brothers Bowen, of Middlebury, and Lawburgh, of Wakarusa, with gratifying results—about fifty conversions at each place, mostly men. Brother Hornaday, our pastor at Orland, conducted a meeting at Shipshewana, on the Middlebury Charge, which resulted in between fifty and sixty conversions and a quickened Church. Brother Brightmire did good service at St. Mark's, Goshen, T. F. Frech, pastor. Conference Evangelist E. B. Westhaver, of Muncie, conducted meetings at the Scott and Prairie appointments on the Howe Charge, Roscoe Shaw, pastor. This was a great work, both Churches and communities were thoroughly aroused, fifty-five professed conversion. In the late winter a Macedonian cry came from Mango. Brother and Sister Bachus, of La Grange, responded to the call by conducting a series of meetings, which resulted in thirty conversions, the organization of a class, a chapter of the Epworth League, a Sunday school, and an enthusiastic Ladies' Aid Society. More than three hundred dollars is subscribed for the support of a pastor for next year, and lots for a new church donated. Seventeen hundred and ninety-three conversions, aside from the tabernacle meetings at Warsaw, have been reported by the pastors of the district. The pastors reporting the largest numbers are: Mishawaka, Dr. Edwards, pastor, his own evangelist, 200 conversions, 322 accessions; Inwood, a two-point circuit, W. E. Hogan, pastor, his own evangelist, 150 conversions; Valentine, J. K. Wyant, 94; Bourbon, R. W. Stokes, 85; Trinity, Elkhart, R. J. Wade, 81; Simpson Memorial, Elkhart, W. A. Huffman, 76; Wawaka, W. E. Loveless, 79; Osceola, Preston Polhemus, 65; North Webster, W. T. Daly, 60; Wolcottville, I. R. Godwin, 50; Goshen Circuit, V. L. Clear, 43; Bristol, C. B. Croxall, 39. In addition to his own work, Brother Croxall went out to a schoolhouse and conducted a series of meetings resulting in the organization of a class of twenty-five members. Nappanee, Silas Cates, 30; Albion, Robert Burns, 21; Leesburg, J. C. Graham, 21. Other pastors report from 3 to 18 conversions. The accessions to the membership reach 2,029. The percentage of gain ranges from 1 per cent to 76 per cent. I am glad to report for Dr. J. W. Oborn, Conference Evangelist, residing at Warsaw, nearly one thousand conversions for the year.

Western Christian Advocate.—The new subscribers to the Western Christian Advocate number 293. Our complete list holds at about 1,100.

Epworth Heralds.—Two hundred and eighty-five subscribers at the opening of the year, 408 reported now, a gain of 123.

The District Conference.—The District Conference was held this year in Trinity Church, Elkhart, March 2d, 3d, 4th. President Grose, of DePauw, gave the address on Monday night and addressed the Conference on Tuesday morning, two great messages on great topics of the day. Dr. W. B. Hollingshead, of Philadelphia, representing the General Conference Commission on Finance, was present Tuesday afternoon and night and did excellent service. Bishop T. S. Henderson, of Chattanooga, Tenn., was present on Wednesday and gave the Conference three addresses on Evangelism. The other speakers from without the district were Prof. Shermerhorn, of Garrett Biblical Institute, who spoke for the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society; Mrs. Bernheim, of Chicago, who gave an address for the Woman's Home Missionary Society; Dr. M. S. Marble, of the Wabash District, and Dr. B. S. Hollopeter, of the Logansport District.

Conclusion.—For myself, after more than three decades of service, I never felt prouder of the Church than I do to-day. Our pastors stand where others have failed; our noble laymen are loyal amid severest tests. I have sometimes thought, when sleep has taken its flight, of these toilers and rejoiced with them in their victories and wept with them in their sorrows. I would rather cast my lot with these comrades of the Cross than to sit at the court of kings.

"Happy if with my latest breath
I may but gasp His name,
Preach Him to all, and cry in death,
Behold! Behold! the Lamb."

LOGANSPORT DISTRICT.

B. S. Hollopeter, District Superintendent.

Bishop and Brethren: At the close of the last Conference session two charges were left without pastors. C. H. Brown, a Retired Minister, was secured to supply Florida, and his services have been of great value to this little charge. The new Church just organized at Anoka was made a part of the Miami Charge, and Leslie A. Hall, of Garrett Biblical Institute, was appointed the pastor.

Walter A. Fonts, who had been appointed to West Middleton, was married to Miss Bessie Levering, of Terre Haute, a classmate in DePauw, on the 27th of May. He graduated from Garrett Biblical Institute the 28th of May, was stricken with typhoid fever on Thanksgiving Day, and lingered until February 7th, when he closed his career on earth to enter the larger and fuller life above. He was one of the best equipped and most promising young men in our ranks. His charge was so well pleased with his services that they increased his salary \$150 and paid it in full to the end of the year. He had arranged for all his benevolent collections with a good increase. Not only does this charming young wife mourn the loss of a husband, but we all mourn the loss of this princely minister of Jesus Christ.

The wife of our retired Brother W. S. Stewart went home to heaven December 8th, after a most beautiful and useful life of seventy-

five years. She was a capable and devoted woman to the Church she loved, a Sunday school teacher of rare ability.

On May 5, 1913, a bright little boy came to brighten the parsonage home of Brother and Sister Asay at Sharpsville. The homes of L. G. Jacobs and wife, of Roann, and B. M. Bechdolt and wife, of Center, have likewise been blessed.

One of the most gratifying events of the year was the successful dedication of a \$27,000 church at Windfall. W. E. Hamilton was appointed at the last Conference to be pastor of this charge and work out this difficult situation. This was a wise appointment. He managed the matter so skillfully that on the 28th of September the Church was ready for dedication and the people ready to pay for it. Dr. W. D. Parr was the needed man to put the crowning touch upon this great enterprise. He raised \$17,000 in good subscriptions and cash. The splendid pipe organ, costing \$3,200, was donated by Elijah Perry, a member of the Building Committee.

On the Twelve Mile Charge, C. A. Byrt, the pastor, has scored a great victory in rebuilding the church at Bethlehem. This building was made new, with ample basement and additional rooms, at a cost of \$8,500. This was dedicated September 7, 1913, by the District Superintendent, when \$3,400 was raised. There is a strong desire on the part of this old and substantial congregation to be made a station. This charge has greatly prospered under Brother Byrt's pastorate.

The Church organized at Anoka a little over one year ago by the pastor at Market Street, Logansport, W. T. Arnold, and brought to new life by a great revival held by Brother and Sister S. J. Mellinger, has commenced and completed one of the finest country churches in the district at a cost of \$8,800. Leslie A. Hall was the pastor in charge of this good work. The church was dedicated January 25th by the District Superintendent, when \$4,150 was raised. Only \$2,700 debt remains, and this is covered by first-class subscriptions. They have paid in cash this year \$6,100 on the church building, besides \$400 for ministerial support. It is their desire to become a station one year hence.

When LeRoy Myers returned from Conference last spring he commenced at once to talk a new church. A subscription was taken, plans secured, and the church is a glorious reality. It was dedicated by Dr. W. D. Parr, March 15th, when \$8,300 was raised. These noble people are princely in their giving and heroic in their undertaking. The church cost \$14,000 besides the lot on which it stands.

A new church commenced more than two years ago at Skillman, on the Mexico Charge, where O. M. Hunt is now pastor, will be dedicated in a few weeks. This patient people have been in the hands of a contractor who is in no hurry.

Rev. L. G. Jacobs, the pastor at Roann, has reconstructed Sjamsville church at a cost of \$650. Not only has the church structure been reconstructed, but new life has come to the people. Great prosperity has come to the whole charge, that shows itself in deeper spiritual life, larger salary for pastor and benevolent collections paid in full.

The much-needed and long-looked-for new church at Pleasant Hill, on the Gilead Charge, is now to become a reality. A \$2,000 subscription has been secured, material bought, and work commenced. C. B. Thomas has been untiring in his efforts to secure this happy state of affairs.

When E. C. Fisher was appointed to the Hobbs and Aroma Charge last spring he had great difficulty in finding a house in which to live, and he led this people to build a splendid new parsonage of eight rooms. This home is now occupied by this happy pastor and his family. It cost \$1,400 and is all paid for.

F. O. Scurrah found among other perplexing difficulties at Bunker Hill a parsonage unfit to be occupied. The situation required rare skill to manage. But he was equal in all ways to the occasion. A splendid new and modern parsonage now stands where the old one stood. It cost \$2,800, and only \$800 remains to be paid. His salary was raised to \$1,000 and has been paid in full each quarter of the year. This Conference made no mistake in opening its doors to this splendid man.

At Goldsmith, H. L. Liddle has sold the old parsonage for \$1,450. They have bought a lot adjoining the church and raised the money to build a new home for the pastor. The work will soon be completed. This will make Goldsmith one of the very best circuits in the Conference. They each year led the district in benevolent collections, and no better spiritual life can be found than in these loyal people.

G. W. Bailor has greatly improved the churches at Forest and at Scircleville. At Forest a new room was added, basement enlarged, new electric lights installed, both church and parsonage painted, and a new barn built. At Scircleville the church was raised and new basement made, new furnace installed, and otherwise improved. The whole amount raised for these improvements was \$2,400. This pastor has labored faithfully to secure these needed improvements.

Improvements have been made at Akron, where A. L. Weaver is pastor; the windows were repaired and one beautiful window added, the floors made secure, a well put down on the parsonage lot, besides an old debt on church and current expenses has been wiped out.

Changes Proposed.—The name of the old Alto Circuit was changed to West Middleton Circuit at our last Conference, and the pastor was instructed to live at the new head of the charge. This was done, and money has been raised to build a new parsonage at West Middleton. Alto now desires to become a station, and, with the Bishop's consent, this will be done. This will solve a long-standing difficulty and will greatly help the work at both places. The salary at Alto will be \$700, and at West Middleton it will be \$800.

Richland Church, on the Amboy Circuit, has taken a decided forward step in country Church life. They have raised over \$1,000 for ministerial support for next year, and ask for a pastor all to themselves. They want their present pastor, LeRoy Myers, to move out to this splendid country station. He has expressed his entire willingness to comply with their request. They have the largest country Sunday school in the district. Practically every family in the community belongs to the Methodist Church, and they are abundantly able to carry out their plans.

Old Debts.—The old and troublesome debts of the Logansport District are being greatly reduced, and we are soon to be in reach of a happy relief from a barrier that has stood in the way of progress. At Elwood, J. F. Radcliffe has seen the debt reduced to \$7,700, with provision made to do much better next year. This faithful pastor has

not only done well with the finances of his Church, but has built it up in every way.

The plan of the Market Street Church, in Logansport, was to pay all the interest and \$1,000 on the principal each year, but H. L. Overdeer handled matters so successfully that \$1,500 was paid on the principal this year. More than one hundred have been added to the membership, and benevolences will be advanced 75 per cent over last year.

Broadway Church has greatly reduced her debt through the faithful work of her pastor, J. A. Sumwalt. This Church will soon take front rank among the great Churches of the Conference.

At Grace Church, Kokomo, \$2,500 has been paid on the debt through the efforts of Dr. J. C. White, who has this Church well in hand. A very handsome garage has been erected on the parsonage lot through the efforts of this energetic pastor.

At Main Street, Kokomo, the debt has been reduced to \$8,000, and this is well in hand.

Revivals and Membership.—The pastor at Peru, Dr. T. M. Guild, has had a gracious year of revivals. A special meeting held in November resulted in many conversions. The "Bob" Jones meeting came to Peru in February, sweeping hundreds into the Kingdom. Nearly 400 have been added to the Methodist Church. The flood of water and destruction that came last spring was followed by a flood of revival fire that will mark this as the year to be remembered in Peru. Dr. Guild has demonstrated that an ex-District Superintendent can be a successful and truly popular pastor.

The revival at Tipton has been the greatest in the history of the Church. O. A. Trabue, the pastor, had been planning for months for this event, and as a result 150 very substantial people were added to this Church, whose membership is now over 700. The four years of Brother Trabue's work in this Church has changed it from a struggling Church, going behind financially and trying to reduce the salary, to one paying all its bills promptly, with an advancing salary. The revival at Main Street, Kokomo, was conducted by the pastor, J. A. Sprague, assisted by L. A. Beeks, one of the sweetest-spirited Superannuates in Methodism. Over 100 were converted and joined the Church. The Sunday school has an average attendance of 473 and pays more for missions than any Sunday school in the district. The salary was increased \$100 this year.

At Sheridan a great meeting was conducted by J. S. Newcombe, the pastor. The conversions number 95, besides the Church was greatly revived. This Church has already set their salary at \$200 in advance for next year and pay all benevolences more than full.

W. C. Asay has had a soul-stirring revival at Sharpsville for the second time in two years. The membership has grown to 324. All bills are paid in full. The Sunday school pays \$213 for the cause of missions.

The greatest revival that has ever come to the Denver Charge has been going on for the past two months, where J. B. Cook is closing his third year as pastor of the charge and his fortieth year in the ministry. At each point on the charge the revival has been raging like a forest fire. Over 160 were converted, and 109 joined the Church. Brother Cook has labored much of his time in great bodily pain, but with the same heroic spirit that has characterized his long and fruitful ministry. This charge will increase the salary to \$1,000 for next year.

John Parker, the pastor at New Waverly, has had a gracious revival at Onward, in which 30 were converted.

B. M. Becholt added many to the Church at Nevada, on the

Center Charge. C. A. Modlin had a good revival at Kempton and has more than doubled his benevolent collections. O. M. Hunt had splendid revivals at Mexico and Ferrysburg. LeRoy Myers had 32 conversions at Richland and a great meeting at Amboy. E. E. Wright saw many converted at Santa Fe. C. W. Montgomery has had a revival all year on the Boxley Charge. Besides many conversions, two splendid young men have given themselves to the ministry. W. M. Amos has had the best revival he has experienced in the nine years of his stay at Walton.

All but three of the pastors in the district have held special meetings. The number of conversions reported is 1,665, and the increase in our membership is 1,036. We have the largest membership of any district, the largest pastoral support, the largest amount of church property, the largest debts, and the best territory for hard work and good results.

Pastors' Salaries.—The laymen are making more earnest demands than ever before for efficient service. They would rather pay a good salary than a poor one, but they want good service, and they are entitled to it. I have never found it so easy to increase the pastors' salaries as this year. The whole amount of increase secured is \$2,735. This was made in the following charges: Arcadia, \$300; Atlanta, \$350; Boxley, \$50; Bunker Hill, \$100; Center, \$100; Cicero, \$200; Gilead, \$200; Hobbs and Aroma, \$100; Kempton, \$100; Miami and Anoka, \$400; New Waverly, \$50; Roann, \$100; Russiaville, \$100; Sharpville, \$100; Main Street, Kokomo, \$100; Macy, \$100; Twelve Mile, \$100; West Middleton, \$150; Windfall, \$100. If the definite promises made to the District Superintendent for next year are good, as much more will be added to the salaries.

Benevolences.—Only four charges will report a decrease in their benevolent collections from last year. Two of these charges have a reasonable excuse. Thirty-two will report an increase, and many a very marked increase.

Arcadia became a station last year, increasing her salary \$300; yet M. L. Hardingham will report a 70 per cent increase in benevolent collections. W. H. Jenkin will increase the collections at Cicero 160 per cent. Greentown has stood second only to Goldsmith, and will hold this very high mark this year under the very efficient service of L. M. Krider. Goldsmith still holds first place, with H. L. Liddle the pastor. It pays \$4.50 per member. The increase in regular benevolences over last year will be \$1,800.

One-day missionary meetings were held on each charge during the month of September. To these the pastors gave most hearty support. J. A. Sprague, the district Missionary Secretary, rendered very efficient service, as did the eight chairmen of the groups into which the district was divided. The pastors were urged to complete their canvass for benevolences by December 1st. Those who did this will make a good report. If all had been faithful here, our report would be great.

Settlement Day.—We had Settlement Day meeting at Peru, December 1st; at Kokomo, December 2d; at Tipton, December 3d. At these meetings the pastors made report of their progress with benevolent collection, and the Stewards reported as to their progress with the current budget of expenses. Another object was to launch the new financial plan authorized by the General Conference. Dr. F. W. Hixson, of Crawfordsville, made helpful addresses at these meetings on this important subject. The plan was heartily adopted by the district, and March 20th was set for the every-member canvass on the charges. This has been faithfully carried out on most of

the charges, and all who entered heartily into this plan are greatly pleased with the good results.

The influence of the great meeting for Methodist men at Indianapolis is exceedingly helpful to us in this work. Many of our laymen attended, and came home to do better service for God and the Church than they had done before. I think this meeting will mark a new epoch in our Church life.

Many of our pastors were invited to return for another year. W. M. Amos was invited to return to Walton for the tenth year, with the understanding that they increase his salary to \$1,000 and build a new parsonage. E. C. Dunn was invited to return to Wheatland Avenue, Logansport, for the seventh year, at an increase of \$200 in his salary.

I have never received a more hearty welcome than was given me by the pastors and people of the Logansport District. It has been a year of hard work, but delightful fellowship and many good results. The pastors have been kind and have given hearty co-operation to all my plans for the work. God bless them all!

MUNCIE DISTRICT.

Dear Bishop and Brethren: There have been no deaths among the pastors or retired preachers this Conference year, but death entered the parsonage at Pendleton and the parsonage at Alexandria and translated Mrs. Emma Williams, the wife of Brother J. E. Williams, and Mrs. Sarah J. Williams, the wife of Brother D. V. Williams.

These two elect women were beautiful characters; grace had done much for them; their lives were given in service; their faith robbed death of its terror and the grave of its victory; they were prepared in every way to be transferred to their heavenly home. Brother J. E. Williams and Brother D. V. Williams and family have our prayers and sympathy in their loneliness.

"Yet Love will dream, and Faith will trust,

(Since He who knows our need is just)
That somehow, somewhere, meet we must"

These bereaved friends did not hopelessly lay away their dead. What a great truth Whittier expresses in these following lines:

Three local preachers have died within the year: Rev. S. Gaskins and Hamilton Welling, both of the McCordsville Charge, and Robert D. Lindsey, of the New Burlington Charge.

The death rate among the membership during the year has been very low; the pastors report only 114 deaths, and six charges report not a death.

Marriages.—Arthur Howell, L. E. Markin, D. C. Beatty, and E. D. Barker—all these four young men have been married during the year. We wish them and their young wives peace and happiness.

Retired Preachers.—There are 17 Retired Preachers connected with the district, four of whom do not live within the bounds of the district. The general health of these retired veterans has been generally good during the year. Two of these Brethren have been very near the border land and, while not strong now, they are able to be about. Brother J. E. Irwin, who celebrates at this Conference his fiftieth anniversary of his entrance into the ministry, had a severe hemorrhage, which came very near ending his life. Brother I. W. Singer, who has moved from Richmond to Anderson, went under the severe ordeal of having one of his lower limbs amputated.

While Brother Irwin and Brother Singer are not strong, both are happy in the Lord and declare that above everything else in the world they love their brethren.

Changes.—There have been but few breaks in the appointments this year. C. B. Brooks broke down in health during the year; Herbert T. Prell was transferred from the Upper Iowa Conference and stationed at Indiana Avenue, Anderson; in November, D. E. Cruca was transferred to the Rock River Conference, and C. B. Dougherty was appointed to Gaston; in the fall E. J. Wickersham surrendered McCordsville to finish his college course at DePauw, and W. E. Aldred, a local preacher of Daleville, was appointed to McCordsville.

District Meetings.—The District Epworth League Convention was held at Summitville, and the District Mid-Year Rally at First Church, Anderson. Dr. Wilbur Sheridan rendered valuable service at the convention and at the mid-year rally.

The sub-district benevolent conventions were held early in the fall. The district was divided into five divisions and a chairman appointed for each division, and he was made responsible for the program of his division. The plan proved to be an excellent one, and the attendance and the interest justified in holding these conventions.

The revival conference was held at First Church, Anderson, in October. Dr. J. O. Randall was present and gave us a definite outline for systematic evangelism.

The Settlement Day conventions were held at Muncie and at Anderson. These were profitable and helpful.

The District Conference was held at High Street Church, Muncie. Dr. Hollingshead and Bishop Theodore S. Henderson were on the program. The program was strong, the attendance and enthusiasm great, and this District Conference has gone down in the district Methodist history as the greatest District Conference during my four years of administration on the district.

Preachers' Aid Society Campaign.—The district fell into line for the campaign to increase the endowment for this society. The days selected were June 29 and July 6, 1913. The time was unfortunate on account of the extremely hot weather, which greatly depleted the congregations, but with all of this disadvantage the district raised over \$5,000 of their \$10,000 promised. Further arrangements will be made to push this campaign to a successful termination.

Salaries.—The following charges have increased their salaries over last year: Indiana Avenue, \$300; Noble Street, \$150; Eaton, \$100;

Fishers, \$100; Hartford City Circuit, \$36; Avondale, \$170; High Street, \$100; Madison Street, \$100; Whiteley, \$25; New Burlington, \$300; Noblesville, \$200; Noblesville Circuit, \$58; Selma, \$100; Shideler, \$50; Summitville, \$200.

Every-Member Canvass.—The district adopted the every-member canvass campaign. Thirty-two charges have fallen into line. The canvass on many of these charges has already been made; on a few charges the canvass will be made immediately after Conference. There are only six charges that are in doubt concerning the adoption of the new financial system.

Church and Parsonage Improvements.—There have been no new churches built this year. We lost one church by fire—Zion church, on the Summitville Circuit. The church was insured for \$660; the membership has rallied and will immediately rebuild.

While there have been no churches built, church and parsonage improvements have amounted to \$16,945. High Street Church stands at the head of the list with \$5,000 improvements. The Sunday school had grown so rapidly that it had to have more room, so the old parsonage was annexed to the church, to increase the capacity for the Sunday school. The interior of the church was decorated, varnished, new lighting system, and other minor improvements. October 12, 1913, was set for the reopening of the church. Bishop David H. Moore was the preacher and Dr. W. D. Parr was the master of finance. Over \$11,000 was raised, which more than covered the cost of the improvements and the indebtedness on the new parsonage.

Noblesville Circuit bought a new parsonage, costing \$1,900. A few improvements on the parsonage and on the church increased the sum of improvements to \$2,011.

Alexandria and Eaton improvements amount to \$1,000 each. The parsonage at Alexandria was painted and repaired; the interior of the church decorated, the woodwork painted and varnished, and a new carpet, making it one of the most beautiful auditoriums in the Conference. The Eaton improvement consisted of putting in a new steam-heating plant.

Perkinsville Charge improvements cost \$719, consisting of new windows, interior decorations, and new piano at Strawtown and a new piano at Beall's Chapel.

Noble Street improvements consist in frescoing, painting, carpet, chairs, porch, and waterworks, costing \$700. The men of the Church gave 700 hours' work to carry out the plan of improvement.

First Church, Noblesville, has spent \$600 on furnace repairs, redecorating, new furnace for parsonage, building walks and cement wall, and change of the church and parsonage lawn.

The Whiteley church has been improved at a cost of \$536, covering the expense of new furnace, new carpet, redecorating the walls, and remodeling the basement.

Selma Charge reports \$500 improvements, covering the cost of new electric plant for Selma church, furnace, repairs, and a new kitchen for the parsonage.

The following charges have made church and parsonage improvements costing between \$200 and \$500: New Burlington, \$450; Hartford City, \$434; Park Place and Daleville, \$361; Hartford City Circuit, \$360; Indiana Avenue, \$350; Carmel, \$350; Jolietville, \$300; Avondale, \$300; Desoto, \$230; First Church, Anderson, \$200.

The following charges have made improvements costing between \$100 and \$200: Albany, Fishers, Fortville, Gaston, Matthews, McCordsville, Selma, and Summitville.

The following charges have made improvements costing less than \$100: Alexandria Circuit, Ingalls, Madison Street, Summitville Circuit, Westfield, and Yorktown.

These improvements consist in new heating plants, papering, varnishing, decorating, new windows, new roofs, new musical instruments, and general repairs.

Old Debts.—Many of the charges have been reducing their old debts. The amount of \$17,565 has been paid on old debts. High Street, \$4,000; Perkinsville, \$1,041; Carmel, \$700; Hartford City, \$600; Noblesville, \$557; Fortville, \$522; Yorktown, \$500; Alexandria, \$400; Normal City, \$280; Selma, \$200.

The following charges have paid less than \$200 on their old debts: Grace Church, Noble Street, Eaton, Gaston, Lapel, Avondale, New Burlington, Noblesville Circuit, Pendleton, Shideler, and Westfield.

Departments of Church Work.—**Sunday Schools.**—The Sunday schools show an increased interest all over the district. There are 77 Sunday schools, a gain of 5 over last year, with an enrollment of 12,886, which is a gain of almost 1,300 over last year. These Sunday schools use 2,799 Sunday School Advocates, 2,756 Sunday School Classmates, and 904 Sunday School Journals; a very large gain in the Sunday school literature over last year.

Many of the Sunday schools have grown so large that it has become a problem how to provide accommodations for them. This is true at High Street, Avondale; Madison Street, Whiteley, and several other places. More room is needed. Almost half of the population of Muncie is south of the railroads. This portion of the city has no adequate church building. I hope to see, before I go off the district, a church building erected or in the process of erection which will be adequate to the needs of the growing Methodism of the South Side; also to see preparations made for a new church building for High Street which will furnish ample room for its great Sunday school and growing membership.

Epworth League Chapters.—There is one new Epworth League chapter. We have 31 Epworth League chapters, a gain of one over last year, with a total membership of 1,669, which is a gain over last year.

Junior League Chapters.—We have 20 Junior League chapters, with a membership of about 900, which is about the same as last year.

Methodist Brotherhood.—We have three Methodist Brotherhood chapters: one at High Street, with a membership of 120; one at Yorktown, with a membership of 20; and a new chapter which has just been organized at Selma.

Ladies' Aid Societies.—We have 58 Ladies' Aid Societies, which are a great service to the Church. They raise large sums of money for improvements, repairs, and ministerial support. During the year they have raised almost \$10,000.

Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and Woman's Home Missionary Society.—There are 18 Auxiliaries of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and 7 Auxiliaries of the Woman's Home Missionary Society. In almost all of these Auxiliaries the young people have been organized into the different Auxiliaries of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and the Woman's Home Missionary Society.

Church Literature.—The pastors report in 1914, 1,037 Western Christian Advocates taken; a gain of 237 over last year. There are 35 other Advocates and 400 Epworth Heralds. Adding the Sunday School Advocates and Classmates, we have over 7,000 religious papers going into the Methodist homes of the district.

Pastoral Labors.—This has been a busy year with the pastors. They have preached over 5,000 sermons and prepared over 1,800 new sermons, and made over 24,000 pastoral visits. They have baptized 930 adults, a gain of 500 over last year; and 226 children, a gain over last year. J. C. Woodruff, of Lapel, has baptized the greatest number

of children—48. He is followed by D. C. Beatty, of Avondale, with 43. Nineteen pastors have reported not a single child baptized. This ought not to be, for on every charge there are children to be baptized and to be enrolled as probationers in the Church. The pastors have officiated at 404 funerals, Dr. G. D. Cleworth, of First Church, Anderson, leading the list with 74 funerals. The pastors have solemnized 248 marriages.

Benevolences.—Disciplinary Benevolences.—The figures that I have at hand show that there will be an increase in the missionary offerings of between \$500 and \$1,000, and also a good increase in the other Disciplinary benevolences.

The following charges report substantial gains in the Disciplinary Collections: High Street, Fortville, Hartford City, Noblesville, Selma, Albany, Alexandria, Alexandria Circuit, Lapel, Yorktown, Matthews, New Burlington, Avondale, Carmel, Eaton, and Jolietville.

Parish Abroad.—By a unanimous vote of preachers and laymen in attendance at the Settlement Day conventions, Muncie District adopted the Parish-Abroad Plan of the Foreign Missionary Society of our Church. We have been given two districts in India, called the Asansol-Pakur Parish. The Muncie District assumes the financial support of this great parish for next year.

Local Benevolences.—These are important, and must not be neglected nor forgotten. Among the most important is the Methodist Hospital at Indianapolis. This institution is doing a great work in the name of Jesus Christ. It was opened May 18, 1908. Since then it has treated almost 9,000 patients. During this period it has treated many guests of the Church, which means practically thousands of dollars to charity.

Temperance.—This moral reform is taking no backward step. We are meeting the same desperate crowd which all the time cries for personal liberty and yet practices the least the principle which they advocate, for as long as you just hold prayer-meetings and class-meetings, and let them alone as a law-breaking crowd, they carry out their principle of personal liberty; but the moment that you stand for law and its enforcement and righteousness, then violence begins. We have seen this truth demonstrated in the Muncie District this year. A "dry" detective was slugged in broad daylight, within half a block of the courthouse in Muncie. A constable who was trying to drive out the "blind tigers" at Ingalls was stabbed to death. Our pastor at Perkinsville, E. H. Taylor, who believes in law enforcement, for trying to drive out the "blind tigers" was stoned twice, and since the "wet" and "dry" election in Muncie several men have been badly injured.

In Vernon Township, Hancock County, the "wets" petitioned for an election; the "drys" went down to Greenfield and obtained the tax record of the "wet" petitioners, published it in a pamphlet form, and distributed it all over the township. Many of the "wets" were so disgusted with their own tax record that they stayed away from the polls, and "drys" of Fortville and McCordsville were happy over the great "dry" victory.

In Mt. Pleasant Township, Delaware County, the "wet" vote at the election was less than the number of the petitioners on the "wet" petition.

In every township in the district where an election has been held the "drys" have greatly increased their majority.

Three years ago Muncie went "wet" by 503 majority, but on the 9th of March the "wets" met their Waterloo, and the "drys" gained a great victory by changing this "wet" majority to a 462 "dry" majority, thus driving out of the city of Muncie twenty-nine saloons.

Membership.—During the period of 1900-1910, natural gas failed in the Muncie District. Taking this period and comparing the percentage of increase of population with the increase of membership, shows that Methodism has been and is still a vital spiritual force. With one exception, there has not been a town of 1,000 inhabitants and over but that the percentage of gain in membership during this period was 100 per cent or more greater than the percentage of gain in population. That exception is Hartford City; but the tide has turned there since 1910, and during the last four years the membership in Hartford City has made a gain of 45 per cent.

But the year 1913-1914 shows marvelous gains in membership of the Churches in Muncie District. The pastors report 13,139 members on the roll, a gain of 1,272 over last year, which is 11½ per cent gain. They report 854 probationers on the roll, making the entire membership 13,921, a gain of 1,517 over last year.

Evangelism.—The pastors have held 77 revival meetings, giving 1,975 days, which is equivalent to 5 2/3 years' service to this great work. They report 1,553 accessions on probation; 1,120 from probation, and 701 by letter, and 2,556 conversions. Last year they reported 1,372 conversions; this year 2,558, a gain of 1,286 over last year. They reported last year 682 accessions on probation, this year 1,553, a gain of 871. Last year 437 by letter, this year 701; a gain of 264.

Fifty-eight of the Churches hold prayer service, with an average attendance of 1,647, and 450 official members attending prayer-meetings. Fifty-three of the Churches hold class-meetings.

The most remarkable effect of this revival spirit has been on the prayer-meeting attendance. Some of the Churches are now holding prayer-meetings where the prayer-meeting had completely died out. The attendance at other prayer-meetings has increased to a remarkable extent. The most remarkable prayer-meeting is at the High Street Church, where the attendance runs from 300 to 500, and the majority are men.

Under the great revival influence and power over the district many men and women have given themselves to personal evangelism who had all their Christian lives been indifferent to this kind of work; men and women who were just nominal members have entered into clear and definite religious experience.

Beatty, 125; Westfield, L. E. Markin, 125; Madison Street, P. E. Greenwalt, 97; Shideler, G. F. Osburn, 75; Summitville, M. B. Graham, 75; New Burlington, J. L. Murr, 67; Alexandria, D. V. Williams, 65; Fortville, W. W. Wiant, 62; Noblesville, F. A. Hall, 51; Albany Circuit, C. M. Hobbs, 50; Noble Street, D. S. Jones, 50; Eaton, J. A. Patterson, 49; Matthews, A. G. The pastors have worked hard, been true, preached the old gospel. The Holy Ghost has honored their work and great results have come out of their toil, for which we sing,

RICHMOND DISTRICT.

William B. Freeland, District Superintendent.

With devout thanksgiving to Almighty God and with profound appreciation of the ministers and laymen of Richmond District. I bring to you, Bishop and brethren, my second annual report.

A survey of the religious activities of the territory with the district reveals some significant facts. The difficulties of aggressive work for the Kingdom are increased on every hand by the division of almost every community into a number of small religious organizations. It is the rule to find a Methodist Episcopal Church, a Friends Church, and either a Disciple or Newlight Church in each hamlet or village. There must be added to these various little sects of sporadic character like the Come-outer, the Heavenly Recruit, and the Seek-no-further. The result of such a condition is to prevent the united activities so necessary in presenting a front to evil, to preclude maintenance of the higher standards of work with respect to numbers, financial strength, and efficient ministers, and add confusion to that residuum of religious thought which our generation retains. It is a glaring example of the waste and inefficiency of our too much divided Protestantism.

We have eighty-one church buildings, and have maintained regular services in all of these but two. The membership of these societies varies from twelve to seven hundred. Fifty of them have fewer than one hundred members, and twenty of these have fewer than fifty members each. But the quality is in many respects unsurpassed anywhere in Methodism. Thirty chapters of the Epworth League and thirteen Junior societies number in the aggregate about two thousand members. The Woman's Foreign and the Woman's Home Missionary Societies are aggressive, and they have accomplished much for the

spread of the evangel of the Christ. Men's Brotherhoods flourish in a few of the Churches, and Ladies' Aid Societies continue their work of supplementing the finances of the Churches in fifty-three places. Our seventy-seven Sunday schools enroll nearly fourteen thousand of all ages in life.

One year ago thirty-five commissioned men went forth to their assignments. Four of these changed their fields before the time of

the autumn. Mahlon H. Krauss, supply at Third Church, Richmond, "joined the birds" in June, and went to the Presbyterians to do home missionary work in the vicinity of Chicago. The Rev. Sylvester Billheimer, "retired," assumed charge, and has the Church in the best condition within its history. July 15th, Ernest R. Ryder, supply at Center-ville, was released to return with his wife to their native Adirondacks. Charles A. Mitchell has very acceptably completed the work of the year at that place. About September 15th, Guy W. Holmes, supply at Deerfield, went to Pittsburgh, Pa., and was there married to an estimable bride, but the momentum of his return carried him on through to a charge in the Logansport District,

whence some form of released energy bore him to that larger field of the State of Texas. Clyde S. Miller, who assumed the work at Deerfield, has wrought well. Rev. Reuben T. Laslie failed in health and was released from the Kennard Charge, where he was much esteemed. Sorrowfully he went to his former home in Kentucky to rest and await the result of the disease which was depleting his vigor. J. N. Simmons has completed the year with good results.

The death of Bishop Bowman, March 3d, left Dr. Milton Mahin as the senior member of the Conference. He is cheerful and happy in his home at Newcastle, though he is in pain from wasting disease. Our brethren of the district visited him in a body December 2d, and stood in his presence to hear his words as if before an oracle. George H. Hill, D. D., at Indianapolis, continues to live a life like the gentleness of the summer eventide. Frank G. Browne, Ph. D., now lives at Newcastle. Arthurian in character, but holden like the Man of the Withered Hand, he awaits the final result of his malady in submission. Hugh J. Norris resides at Winchester, where he continues to labor as his strength warrants.

The health of the members of our pastors' families has in the main been excellent. A bright son gladdens the home of Brother and Sister Cates at Grace Church, Richmond. He is called Carleton Marshall Cates. It is hoped that he will be true to his names, and honor letters, laws, and religion. Brother and Sister Sweeney, at Modoc, have welcomed to their home the mascot of the district and named him Richmond. May this Lilliputian be an incarnation of all our virtues! April 27th, Orange S. Harrison went out from the earthly circle of friends to be with his co-laborers of former years, our honored departed ones, of whose bequest of righteousness we are unworthy. He had been a member of our Conference forty-five years. Mrs. Bertha Bunner, grievously mourned by her husband, and sorely missed by many friends, unexpectedly slipped away from earthly home at Spice-land to her first of the "many mansions" on the 19th of November.

It is slowly dawning upon the minds of some of our brethren that there is really such a thing as district solidarity. The man who ignores district meetings, district enterprises, the district program has great difficulty in understanding why the district does not do more for him. While he is disloyal to his benevolences, to pastoral oversight, and to his District Superintendent, it seemed unjust that his own interests are not made paramount. But though he prate about rank injustice and sweat like a behemoth, he will deceive no one but himself. Verily, his obtuseness is great! It is a source of great satisfaction to me personally that so many of our men are out to make our district show a commendable progress. All of our concerted movements have been reasonably successful except the Preachers' Aid Endowment Campaign. The religious bodies around us publish statistics like the following: Number of ministers who receive \$400 or more, 43; number who receive less than \$400 each, 25; number who have no stated compensation, 16; total, 84. Our own ministers of the district receive an average of \$916 and house rent. They are therefore looked upon as sons of Croesus, who do not need any aid. Our laymen were not sympathetic. The Epworth League held its district convention June 16th to 18th at Middletown. It was well attended, and the district officers are much encouraged at the outlook. Sub-district missionary conventions in every charge but four were held. We generously published reports of the work of our preachers, that the other District Superintendents might know who were loyal to the plan. Veterans say that they never attended such successful meetings before. I was very ably assisted by Rev. Charles H. Smith, our District Missionary Secretary. An efficiency congress was convened at Economy, September 30th. Its sessions continued for two days. The practical effects of the able discussions were marked. We were out for business for the King. But the high order of the program was not the most impressive factor. There was a feeling that there must be a larger loyalty to the district, to the Church, to the Galilean whose message we speak. I have never seen any meeting which impressed me that we are learning our task so much as this one indicated.

Numerous laymen attended the National convention of Methodist Men at Indianapolis, October 28th to 31st. They were impressed with the importance of better financial work in our Churches. Some good results are already apparent.

Our debt-paying record shows that \$3,000 has been paid on the church at Cambridge City; \$2,650 paid at Lewisville on the parsonage, and \$100 on the Dublin church; \$2,200 on the Union City church; \$358 at Dunkirk; \$200 at Wilkinson; \$137 at Ridgeville; \$100 at Centerville, and smaller sums at other places. Improvements on our property have been made at the following places: Dunkirk, \$1,020; Redkey, \$800; Lynn, \$860; Newcastle, \$714; Knightstown, \$600; Modoc, \$458; Philadelphia, \$475; Richmond, First Church, \$350; Farmland, \$300; Deerfield, \$330; Union City, \$220; Centerville, \$250; Maxwell, \$378; Parker, \$200; Spartanburg, \$190; and lesser sums at nearly every other place in the district.

On the Salamonica Charge, Rev. T. S. Haddock, pastor, the old parsonage was sold and a new one purchased for the sum of \$1,500. It is a much better house than that price would indicate, and I am glad to report that every dollar of the purchase price is paid. At Kennard a house was purchased for parsonage purposes. It will be improved so that it will be a good home for a pastor there; \$300 has been paid, and more is in sight. The Cleveland church, Charlottes-ville Charge, was in a poor state of repair. Situated across the street from the camp-ground, where so many attend from a distance, it

was thought to be of little credit to Methodism. Led by Rev. R. I. Black, who is a master in such enterprises, the people rebuilt the structure in modern style. It is beautiful and well worth \$5,000 in its present form. The dedication occurred January 4th. Dr. Parr pledged in good subscriptions enough to pay the bills. The expenditure was \$3,500. At Maxville, on the Farmland Charge, one of the most beautiful and one of the best equipped rural churches in the entire Conference is in process of building. John W. Clayton, a respected citizen of the community, not a member of a Church, had left a bequest of \$1,000, which had increased until it was worth \$1,200, for the Trustees of the Church. Mrs. L. N. Davis, widow of a much-esteemed physician, gave \$5,000. The pastor, W. J. Huffman, assisted by members, raised enough more from the members and friends of the Church to build a structure to cost at least \$10,000. It will be dedicated in June. The corner-stone bears the name, "Maxville Methodist Episcopal Church, L. N. Davis Memorial."

Salaries were increased at the first of the year from \$50 to \$500 at each of the following places: Economy, Kennard, Millgrove, Modoc, Parker, Richmond—First Church, Richmond—Third Church, Salamonia, Shirley, Union City, and Williamsburg. There is a reasonable assurance that ten of our charges at the least will make further advances for next year. Grace and Fifth Street Churches have been so well served by Rev. Arthur Cates that they will enter into a closer union and keep house together at the classic stand on the corner of Tenth and North A, in the city of Richmond. They will be at home to all callers after April 6th. The salary will be at least \$1,500. Union city sustains its increase of \$500 and pays a fine increase to the benevolences.

Advance reports from the pastors concerning the benevolences indicate an advance in almost every cause. The gain in Foreign Missions is about 10 per cent. Home Missions will be about 6 or 7 per cent. The remaining Disciplinary benevolences have been increased by faithful work in nearly every case. Unless final revisions reduce our reports, the relative increases will be fairly satisfactory. If we can finance our new members received this year for benevolences, the increase should continue. In almost every case where the pastor did his work early in the year he succeeded; wherever he delayed, he failed.

The work of evangelism has been given its very important place. Revivals began early and have continued until the opening of the Conference session. Our men have held their own meetings in the main; in a few instances pastors of adjoining charges have aided one another, to their mutual profit. They have spent about 245 weeks in their campaigns, or an average of seven weeks each. The old question, "What becomes of the pin?" is now changed to "What becomes of the convert?" The waste at this point is appalling, yet our gains in membership indicate that pastors have been faithful in enrolling the converts as well as the transfers. Of the special meetings, those on the Williamsburg Charge are notable. In an unpromising field Rev. J. W. Zerbe has had 180 conversions. The converts are people of character and influence; many of them are men. Rev. E. C. Hallman has reported 141 at Lewisville, where he held a meeting of great power. On the Deerfield work, Rev. Clyde S. Miller, assisted by Brother and Sister Mount, of Richmond, has reported 66, and also 35 at another appointment. Charlottesville reports 90; Millgrove, 87; Parker, 74; Spartanburg, 74; Greenfield, 55. Those which number from twenty-five to fifty are as follows: Maxwell, Redkey, Lynn, New-castle, Kennard, Fountain City, Union City, and Shirley. Eight others number from ten to twenty, and the remainder almost without ex-

ception have a few to swell the total to 1,800. This report would not be complete without a mention of the great tabernacle meeting in Richmond. Rev. I. E. Honeywell came to us at the first of the year to lead the people of seventeen Churches. The opposition was similar to that of the devils who besought Jesus to let them alone. The conflict was fierce, but the Spirit of God found men in their sins. Perhaps the staid old city never had such an awakening. For five weeks the battle raged, and when the returns came in there were seventeen hundred confessions. The Churches in Richmond have since received into their membership about 250 persons. The local-option election which followed, much to our humiliation, went "wet," though the majority of the former election was reduced five hundred.

Within the year I have been able to meet all Quarterly Conferences to the number of 140. I have preached 147 times and made about 130 briefer addresses. The work has been hard, and the burdens heavy; but results have justified the efforts of myself and of my coadjutors. Our quest has had all the romance of that knighthood to which the Christian hero is devoted. It may not put us into print alongside of Thor and Hercules, but the record is written on high. With fiery hearts we have followed the gleam. The sweet surprise of Divine approval has greeted us; gently has He spoken unto us along the winding ways. The glory of some of our prosaic toil He writes so high up in the skies that it is beyond the angels' grasp. So may our lives be drawn:

"As the dissolving warmth of dawn may fold
A half unfrozen dew-globe, green, and gold,
And crystalline, till it becomes a wingéd mist,
And wanders up the vault of the blue day,
Outlives the noon, and on the sun's last ray
Hangs o'er the sea, a fleece of fire and amethyst."

WABASH DISTRICT.

M. S. Marble, District Superintendent.

Mr. President and Brethren: This report includes a few principles of administration and excludes interesting statistics, most of which will appear elsewhere. Our Year-Book should not be burdened with a duplication of facts.

A Word Personal.—The many courtesies extended by pastors, their families, and by the laymen are highly appreciated and, as far as possible, reciprocated.

Necrology.—Rev. Almon Greenman, who in the zenith of his power was like one of the cedars of Lebanon, "passed from the feebleness of age on earth to the eternal youth of the heavenly life" on February 28, 1914.

Rev. E. B. Brown, pastor of Warren Circuit, after a brief illness was received into the ranks of the Church triumphant on August 29, 1913.

Pastoral Changes.—J. F. Cottingham, a missionary returning from the Philippine Islands, was appointed to Sweetser. Upon his arrival Dr. Oldham informed me that on account of impaired health Brother Cottingham would be given a furlough. On May 27th, John F. Blocker was transferred from the Indiana Conference and appointed to Sweetser.

Dr. J. K. Cecil, of First Church, Wabash, requested an exchange with Earle F. Naftzger, of Spokane, Wash. This request was granted, taking effect July 1, 1913.

On September 17, 1913, F. J. Robins was employed to take the place of E. D. Inler, at Highland Avenue, who was excused to attend school at Drew Theological Seminary. On September 19, 1913, Leslie O. Winslow was appointed to Warren Circuit. Bishop Burt transferred Sanford McDonald from the Michigan Conference and appointed him to Roanoke, made vacant by the release of C. R. Booth to attend school at Garrett Biblical Institute.

On September 20th, A. D. Buck, pastor at Mount Etna, announced to his Quarterly Conference that his pastoral relation with the charge was closed. On October 17th he placed in my hands a signed request for a Certificate of Location. The next day he was transferred to the Holston Conference, where his request was granted.

At the meeting of laymen at Indianapolis, last October, Bishop Smith informed me that he had transferred W. E. Shafer from the Liberty Mills Circuit to the Missouri Conference, and had appointed him to Lathrop. Learning that a young minister in another Church desired to join the itineracy of the Meth-

odist Episcopal Church, I informed him of the vacancy at Liberty Mills. He visited me, and I tendered him the charge on condition that he unite with the Methodist Episcopal Church before taking charge of the work. About two months later I found him in possession without having complied with the condition. For sufficient reason I permitted him to remain, but the work was difficult, and he left the charge without my knowledge of his intentions when it was too late to secure another supply. Liberty Mills has suffered much this year, but I am sure that this work will respond to able leadership and soon rank among our best circuits.

Detached Service.—J. W. Cain and E. L. Jones are doing good work in their respective fields assigned them by Bishop McDowell upon the request of this Conference.

Special Mention.—The Woman's Foreign and Woman's Home Missionary Societies, the Epworth League, the Ministerial Lyceum, each held interesting and profitable conventions.

Some old debts have been paid, valuable improvements have been made in many places, subscriptions aggregating \$55,000 for a new church at Huntington taken. A magnificent new church has been completed in Columbia City and will be dedicated in May.

Sunday schools, educational institutions, various philanthropies and reforms have all received the fostering care of pastors and people. Brotherhoods and Ladies' Aid Societies have contributed largely to the success of our work.

The year has been unusually fruitful in evangelistic endeavor. Nearly every pastor reports a splendid revival, with conversions aggregating more than 2,000. While many have been gathered into the Church, the total membership will not be greatly in excess of last year. Pastors have labored hard to reach the standard, which is a net gain of 10 per cent. Some report to me that they could not find the number reported last year. Making a correct report this year prevents them from exhibiting the real gain. When asked for advice

in this regard, I have invariably emphasized the law concerning non-resident and resident members and the duty of the Committee on Church Records. Our gain in membership promises to be more than one thousand.

Ministerial Support.—The Church is the expression of the life of God in laying upon itself a tremendous task, from which it can not shrink except by the forfeiture of its own life. Leading men to God through Christ, and building Christ-like character, demands peculiar leadership possessed of clear conceptions of the principles of spiritual architecture applied in human life. Such leadership costs the price of severe thinking and living up to the standards of enlightened conscience which is consecration. To be efficient it must have an adequate financial support. If this is withheld at any point, a feeble, deteriorating Church life is inevitable. In superintending Wabash District we have emphasized (1) the supreme task of the Church, (2) the type of leadership which the task demands, (3) the financial support necessary for the highest efficiency in the leadership of said task. The law of the Church classifies ministerial support as follows: (1) Bishops, (2) District Superintendents, (3) Pastors, (4) Conference Claimants. In addition to this, special provision is made for some effective preachers doing detached service. The law places the responsibility for providing for the four above named items of ministerial support upon the Stewards in the local Church. The District Superintendent has found it difficult to secure proper respect for this law, particularly in circuits, and stations numerically weak. The people as a rule respond liberally with their support for the ministry, but many Quarterly Conferences are unwilling to place the full amount for ministerial support in the budget for the local Church expense. In many instances the pastor must collect the Bishop's claim, in a few cases the District Superintendent's claim, and in a majority of charges he must collect the apportionment for Conference Claimants. Thus unwisely an unlawful burden is placed upon the pastor, which greatly impairs his efficiency as a shepherd. In this respect we should make our work and the bookkeeping square with the law of the Church.

While the law prorating the receipts for ministerial support has served the most salutary purpose of increasing the amounts for Conference Claimants, it is nevertheless unsatisfactory. It operates automatically when there is a deficit, requiring the same to be shared by Bishops, Superintendents, Pastors, and Conference Claimants. The law touches no one in detached service. Bishops may feel it slightly, Superintendents a little more, pastors much more, while in our Conference, where claimants receive only about 62 per cent of their legal allowance, they suffer a great deal more. The first step in freeing our claimants from this burden is for our Conference to ask for the full legal allowance. The second step is a wise and equitable adjustment of all claims at the beginning of the year. The third step is pastoral efficiency. Not all deficits are traceable to pastoral delinquency, but some are, and a law compelling innocent parties to suffer on this account can never be satisfactory. The fourth step is loyalty to the Church on the part of the claimant. He should regard his support as a compensation not only for past service, but also for such service as he is still able to render. Being left without an appointment is not necessarily being left without something to do.

I regret to say that while in some charges the campaign for the Preachers' Aid Society was ably conducted, with good results, in most charges it failed to meet expectations. I recommend that the General Secretary report what has been done in each charge, and that the campaign be renewed with vigor, and let no preacher be satisfied till

the full amount, which is an average of one dollar per member, is paid to the Treasurer of the Society.

Settlement Day was observed early in December, with gratifying results. At that time March 16th was fixed as the day for a simultaneous every-member canvass. Very encouraging reports have come from many Churches. Several Quarterly Conferences have fixed the pastor's support for next year, in some cases increasing the same.

Maintaining the Itinerancy.—No argument is here intended, either for or against the time limit in the pastorate. Its removal increased the responsibility of the Bishop, and those whom he has appointed to assist him, for the preservation of the itinerancy more than any other equal number of men in the Church. The itinerancy can not be destroyed, or even impaired, without great loss to the Church. The law makes no vacancies, which necessitates a thorough knowledge of every Church and pastor in his district if the Superintendent is to be of value to the Bishop who changes preachers from one pastoral charge to another. This is clearly seen when a necessary change involves the interests of charges where the necessity does not exist and is not desired. To overcome the difficulties thus arising, the wise District Superintendent will use his best endeavors to increase the usefulness of the pastor where a change is desired, thus making it easier for the Bishop to place him where a change is not desired, and, because of his increased efficiency, will be more likely to succeed in his new field. Meanwhile he is constantly reminding the Churches that the interest of all is the interest of each, and the interest of each is the interest of all, that sacrifice and burden-bearing is essential to growth and strength, that co-operation and not competition is the ruling idea here, as it should be everywhere. Thus does he increase confidence in and preserve the integrity of the itinerancy, which is one of the chief factors in the unequalled achievements of Methodism.

Foremost Principles in Administration.—In administering the affairs of Wabash District I have endeavored to keep two things ever before me. First, the protection of the good name and influence of each Church against its foes, both within and without. These Churches have been builded into the confidence of the people and are wielding tremendous influence for righteousness through the toil and sacrifice of constructive personalities for many years. I have resolutely set myself against irresponsible, reckless, bungling, superficial, sacrilegious forces that would wantonly destroy the achievements of skilled workmen, and permanently destroy the usefulness of the local Church. Second, the preservation of the reputation of the pastor as a preacher and shepherd of the flock of God. It may be said that these are trite sayings, easily uttered, which may be true; but let it also be said that, as principles to be practiced in administration, they are transcendent in importance, and their difficulties are equaled only by their importance. It is a pleasure to say that among the many laymen who have freely counseled with me concerning their pastors, the unkind word is exceedingly rare. Two things are manifest: the people respect the ministry, and the character of the preachers commands confidence. Nevertheless we are to-day precisely where the seventy were, "Lambs among wolves." The spirit of the world to-day is illustrated by the snap, snarl, howl, and exposed tooth of the wolf. Some faithful sentinel must exercise everlasting vigilance in protecting the good name of our preachers. Meanwhile each preacher must exemplify the apostolic conviction that he is commissioned of God and bring his personality under the dominion of the apostolic injunction, "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

Grose, of DePauw, and President Monroe Vayhinger, of Taylor, to preserve the evangelistic note in our institutions of learning, inspires hope that a day of sweeping revivals of religion is about to dawn upon us, and we rejoice that already in many localities all over the country great awakenings have already occurred, leading us to believe that the faithful preaching of our ministers will soon bring the Methodist Episcopal Church into her own.

ARMY AND NAVY.

Twenty years ago a widespread and active interest was created within the Churches in behalf of those in the army and navy that are under the flag of our great country for better conditions spiritually, asking for more chaplains and for chapels, libraries, and other necessary equipment. This met with a ready response and made quite an impression on Congress and the army, and appropriations were made by Congress to the amount of \$3,500,000 for the establishment of reading rooms, chapels, and gymnasia, and by so doing drunkenness and gambling ceased to be so general among the many that march under the flag, and whose lives we should be more interested than we would in that flag we love.

It is felt by the chaplains of the army, navy, and the National Guard that the men under arms are not on the heart of the Christian public as they should be. We must not forget that most of them are young men—250,000 in number.

Prayers are seldom heard in public assemblies in their behalf, and they are seldom referred to in any religious press, and with exceptional temptation and soul-peril to which they are subject, they surely need our sympathy and prayers.

We believe that the attention of the public should be called to the service these men are rendering, and that they should be given to feel that in this Christian Republic there is a profound sympathy and interest in their behalf.

In order to promote that interest, the first Sunday before the 4th of July has been designated to be observed in the Churches as Army and Navy Day, when with appropriate services the men under the flag may receive special consideration. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the North Indiana Conference endorse the program of the chaplains, and that the day designated be set apart as *Army and Navy Day* in all of our Churches, and that a strong committee be appointed to co-operate with like committees from other Churches to promote the welfare of the men under the flag.

And that the committee be requested to report to the field secretary, Rev. Orville J. Nave, U. S. Army Chaplain, Los Angeles, Cal., the work done.

AUDITING COMMITTEE.

Your committee on auditing the various accounts of the Conference submit the following report:

CONFERENCE SECRETARY.—We have carefully checked up the accounts of the Conference Secretary, and find that there is a balance in his hand of \$33.60. We therefore recommend that this amount be turned over to him.

CONFERENCE TREASURER.—We have carefully audited the Treasurer's accounts, and find them correct, both in cash and vouchers, as will be shown on his balance sheet.

BOARD OF STEWARDS.—We have carefully checked up the accounts of the Treasurer of the Board of Stewards for last year, and find the same correct, with a balance of \$127.52 in his hands.

PRO-RATING CLAIMS.—In the pro-rating of claims for ministerial support the statistical record shows that there are only a few who have not actually and carefully carried out the instructions of the Discipline.

CONFERENCE CORPORATION.—The accounts of the Treasurer of the Conference Corporation were not in the hands of the Auditing Committee, but the books will be audited when turned over to the new Treasurer of the Corporation.

SUSTENTATION FUND.—The receipts and disbursements of the Sustentation Fund in the hands of the District Superintendents for the past Conference year have been carefully audited and found correct.

FLOOD FUND.—We have also carefully checked up the accounts of the Treasurer of the Flood Fund, and found them correct, with a balance on hand of \$216.87.

In order, that there may be a systematic keeping of all the accounts of the Conference:

We recommend that in the Treasurer's balance sheet there be shown the receipts in cash and vouchers and the disbursements in the same manner to the various causes.

We recommend that the Board of Stewards secure a permanent disbursement record for their use, in which all apportionments, claims, and disbursements to the various claims may be kept.

We recommend that the District Superintendents secure pocket ledgers in which they may keep a permanent record of the receipts and disbursements of the Sustentation Funds of their districts.

BOARD OF CONTROL OF DEACONESS WORK.

The Deaconess Work in the Methodist Episcopal Church has prospered during the year. In the field of hospitals there has been a most marked material development. In new building enterprises nearly \$400,000 has been expended. Plans have been made and some building begun for the expenditure of at least an equal amount during 1914. Two new training-school buildings, costing about \$200,000, have been erected. Besides these, Deaconess Homes, a Home for Aged Women, and Children's Homes have either been completed or are in course of construction. In

1913 the movement was twenty-five years officially old. There is now under deaconess management property to the value of nearly \$6,000,000. Deaconesses and probationers are reported to the number of 1,023. In the training schools there are 452 pupils. The Pension Funds now in hand amount to about \$200,000.

There has been an increase of interest on the part of young women. It is a pleasure to report that larger numbers are looking toward the deaconess movement as a life vocation. We call the attention of pastors to the opportunity this field offers, and urge that they exert their influence in turning promising young women toward this growing work in our Church.

We note with hopefulness the organization of the General Deaconess Board. We will welcome the Corresponding Secretary to our Churches.

Miss Blanche Brackney has been transferred to the Indiana Conference during the year, and Miss Abigail Sechrist has been transferred from the Rock River Conference to the North Indiana Conference and her license renewed. Miss Carrie B. Plasterer, of Huntington, Ind., has received an honorable discharge, which was endorsed by this Conference Board.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

(1) A properly authenticated certificate showing that a student has already pursued and passed a satisfactory examination in a prescribed course of study as a regular attendant on the class room instruction in any of our regular theological seminaries, universities, and colleges, approved by our University Senate, will be received in lieu of Conference examination.

(2) Similar certificates may also be received in all studies not Biblical or theological from other than Methodist schools, if of equal grade with those approved by our University Senate. The Board of Examiners in each particular case will determine as to whether the work done is a fair equivalent or not.

(3) Certificates presented for credit must show the amount of work done, text-books used, year in which the work was done, and the grade given by the Examiner. If no grade is furnished in a certificate presented for credit, the only minimum passing grade (70) will be allowed.

(4) All examinations must be taken at the Mid-year Institute, or the seat of the Annual Conference. Exception to this rule will be made in the case of students in the mission field or in school outside of territory covered by the Conference. In the exception stated above, the student will be required to pass on questions prepared by this Board and in the presence of some one designated by the Chairman of the Board.

(5) All reports of books read, essays and sermons must be in the hands of the Registrar not later than Tuesday night preceding the opening session of the Conference.

(6) "Biblical Hermeneutics" of the Second Year is to be taken by the Third Year men instead of "System of Christian Doctrine."

(7) Fourth Year men are to take "Decisive Hour of Christian Missions" in the Second Year instead of "System of Christian Doctrine."

(8) Students of the Third Year may substitute "Jesus and the Gospels" of the First Year for "Christian Doctrine" of the Third Year.

(9) "Biblical Hermeneutics" or "Jesus and the Gospels" may be substituted for "Christian Doctrine" in the Third Year, as the Examiner may require.

(10) The Mid-year Institute will be held at Waterloo, October 12-16, 1914.

(11) Themes for sermons and essays for the year 1914-15 are as follows: First Year Sermon, "Redemption." Essay for Second Year, "An Efficient Sunday School." Third Year Sermon, choice between "The Atonement" and "Christian Assurance." All sermons and essays must bear the date when written, and are requested to be sent in thirty days prior to the Annual Conference.

(12) The post-graduate work for the ensuing year will be in charge of J. E. Williams and B. Earle Parker, who will gladly give information by mail concerning its details. The field of study will be social service.

BOARD OF STEWARDS—RECOMMENDATIONS.

Believing that a due regard for the law of the Church and the rights of the Conference claimants requires that, as rapidly as discretion will allow, we approach the time when the amounts apportioned to the pastoral charges, plus the other funds, shall meet in full the claims of all claimants upon the Conference funds; and believing that there is in the Conference, both among the ministers and the laymen, an increasing interest in and loyalty to the claims of the retired ministers, the widows of deceased ministers, and their dependent children, as manifest in increased collections, both for immediate distribution among the claimants and endowment for the Preachers' Aid Society;

We recommend, First, That there be apportioned to the several districts for the support of Conference Claimants for the ensuing year an amount equal to twenty-five cents per member in full connection, and that for the succeeding years there be added to this amount each year a sum equal to five cents per member in full connection, until the amount thus apportioned, together with other funds for annual distribution in the hands of the Conference Board of Stewards and the Preachers' Aid Society, shall meet the full claims of all claimants upon the Conference funds.

We recommend that for next year the funds for division into Annuity and Special be divided in the ratio of eighty per cent Annuity and twenty per cent Special.

Second, That we endorse the action of the representative body of Annual Conference organizations in behalf of Conference Claimants, gathered at Chicago, February 27, 1914, which recommended the inauguration of an intensive campaign, that the full amount of five million dollars asked of the Church for endowment of the various Annual Conference organizations and the Board of Conference Claimants may be raised during this quadrennium.

We also endorse the proposition of the Board of Conference Claimants to hold two large mass-meetings of representatives of Annual Conference organizations in behalf of Conference Claimants; and other persons interested in Conference Claimants, for the purpose of perfecting plans for a great co-operative campaign, which will unite the Connectional Board and the Annual Conferences in one cause.

We recommend that L. M. Krider and A. B. Kline be delegates, and A. G. Neal and D. O. Skillen, alternates to represent the Board of Stewards and Preachers' Aid Society of this Conference at the aforesaid meetings.

Third, That while we believe that the distribution of this fund to the charges ought to be left to the districts, yet to secure uniformity we would advise that the Equitable Apportionment Plan, which is applied in the distribution of the benevolences, be applied to the distribution of the Conference Claimants' Fund to the charges.

Resolved, First, That we recommend that the pastors shall insist on the appointment of efficient leaders, and exhort them to qualify by taking the prescribed course of study.

Second, That while we do not ask that less zeal be given to our Sunday school program, we do urgently plead that the same careful administration and zealous activity be applied to quicken the class meetings, suggesting as helps: Class competition for attendance and program; less pastor and more class leader administration; co-operation between Sunday school and class meeting; make your Sunday school teachers class leaders of their respective classes; popularizing the class meetings by brevity, good program, and deep spiritual fellowship.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE JOURNALS.

We, your Committee on District Conference Journals, submit the following report:

We have carefully examined the journals of the Muncie, Ft. Wayne, and Goshen Districts, and find the reports carefully kept.

The journal of the Goshen District deserves special mention for the way in which the reports are classified, *i. e.*, the reports of each charge being filed together and thus appearing in the records.

Inasmuch as these journals are to be historical records of work done and kept on file, the committee commends the District Superintendents and Secretaries for the care and preservation of these records.

EDUCATION.

We can not emphasize too strongly the work of our Board of Education and Church Schools in developing the highest intellectual life of our young people and setting before them the noblest ideals of Christian character and service. We commend the efforts of the University Senate to standardize our schools and bring them to a higher state of efficiency.

THEOLOGICAL SCHOOLS.—We are entering upon an age that calls for a leadership in Christian work that is the equal of the leadership in all the great organized movements of our day. Our Lord's work is first in importance in the life of the world. If it comes to its own and holds it in the midst of the great competing interests of the day, we must have men not only of religious piety and spiritual zeal, but of mental culture and breadth of vision second to none. We would therefore urge that young men coming to our Conference for admission would seriously consider this requirement of the day and that they take advantage of the great opportunities open to them in our splendidly equipped theological schools. Three of these readily accessible to the members of our Conference are Garrett Biblical Institute, of Evanston, Ill.; Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N. J., and Boston School of Theology. These institutions are constantly adding to their already strong Faculties new

men who are experts in the new activities of the Church. Sociological study and evangelistic work at first hand in organized missions are being instituted. Boston School of Theology has recently put in a chair of Social Service, under the leadership of Prof. Harry F. Ward. Garrett Biblical Institute has Dr. Lynn Harold Hough in its chair in Church History. Drew Theological Seminary has recently added to the department of Homiletics Dr. Wallace MacMullen, and Dr. F. Watson Hannan to the chair of Pastoral Theology. The opportunities afforded by these institutions for special preparation should be appreciated and embraced to the fullest extent by our young men.

WOMEN'S COLLEGES.—The Woman's College at Jacksonville, Ill., and Goucher College, Baltimore, Md., have the unqualified endorsement of the committee. Their splendid equipment and high teaching standards, right environment and control, together with their large and increasing attendance, attest their worth to the Church and deserved popularity.

TAYLOR UNIVERSITY.—This school is constantly developing under the wise leadership of Prof. Monroe Vayhinger. Under the Endowment Secretary it has made progress in the raising of funds for improvement and endowment purposes. We congratulate the Trustees on securing the services of Rev. C. J. Everson to direct this part of its work. The emphasis of Taylor upon the deep religious life is recognized, while the low cost of living at the school makes it possible for many to obtain an education. We recommend the appointment of Rev. R. A. Morrison and Rev. T. M. Hill as Trustees of Taylor University.

AMERICAN UNIVERSITY.—After many years of earnest effort, a period of unusual success and rejoicing is near at hand. It is most gratifying to us that May 27, 1914, has been fixed as opening day, when it is announced that President Woodrow Wilson will be the principal speaker. We are pleased with the report that the active endowment has been enlarged to \$500,000, and will soon be increased to \$1,500,000. We have been greatly favored with the visit of Chancellor Franklin Hamilton and the Rev. F. M. Stone, D. D., of our own Conference, at this session, and we have been encouraged by the messages of assurance and hope which they bring us. Dr. Stone is to be congratulated upon the fact that in the last six years he has raised more than \$300,000 for this university.

DEPAUW UNIVERSITY.—DePauw University, under the efficient and inspiring leadership of Pres. George R. Grose, D. D., is enjoying great prosperity. About \$190,000 were added to the endowment within the year, and \$30,000 have been pledged with which to start a fund for a new gymnasium. The generous collections taken in the Churches of the Conference for the university, and the prompt payment of the endowment subscriptions have been greatly appreciated by the Trustees. We are especially gratified to note the splendid services rendered to the Church by this school. Last year about thirty of her graduates entered some one of our schools of theology, the active pastorate, or some other definite form of Christian service. The Mendenhall Lectures were delivered by Bishop Hughes on the themes, "The Bible" and "Life." These lectures were heard by great audiences in Meharry Hall, and will soon be given to a large public in book form. The Beamer Lectures on Christian missions will be delivered by Dr. Wm. Brewster. We recommend that Hardin Roads, W. H. Charles, and E. G. Eberhard be elected as Trustees for a period of three years.

COLLEGE EVANGELISM.—Christian education must not stop short of the Lordship of Christ, personally recognized and experienced by the individual instructor and student. If this is not secured, Christian education fails of its highest goal. A loyal Methodist people are laying large sums of money upon the altars of Christian learning in the hope that our Methodist schools shall be free to maintain the ideals and to spread and foster the spirit of our holy Christianity. We therefore recommend

that the plans of the Commission on Evangelism as outlined by Bishop T. S. Henderson, both as to time and method, be employed as far as possible in the effort to place the same spirit in our colleges which we seek to foster in our Churches.

LOCAL EDUCATIONAL COLLECTION.—We recommend that twenty cents per member be continued as the apportionment for local education, and that one-fourth of the amount collected be paid to Taylor University and three-fourths to DePauw University. We call the attention of the pastors to the importance of forwarding promptly all money for this fund to the Conference Treasurer, who is instructed that when \$500 is collected to make the pro-rata division between these schools.

CHILDREN'S DAY.—The Children's Day Fund last year aided 2,066 young people to pursue their studies, fitting them for greater usefulness. Since the founding of this fund, it has so aided 21,650 students. This is a great and most worthy work, and repays the Church many fold in the larger ideals and added usefulness it brings to her people. We therefore urge upon every pastor to make much of Children's Day and to give it the place of emphasis to which it is entitled.

COMMISSIONS AND VISITORS.—We wish to express our appreciation of the work of the Commission on Education and in the study of the needs of our educational institutions of the State. We recommend the Rev. C. E. Line, D. D., as Conference Visitor to DePauw University, to succeed himself for the term expiring September 1, 1917; to Drew Theological Seminary, H. S. Nickerson; to Garrett Biblical Institute, Rev. C. C. Travis; to Boston School of Theology, Rev. J. A. Sumwalt; to Taylor University, Rev. J. F. Porter; Woman's College, Jacksonville, Ill., D. H. Guild.

We recommend that the Visitors appointed by this Conference submit a written report to the Chairman of the Committee on Education one month prior to the session of the Conference. We recommend the following special appointments: G. R. Grose, President of DePauw University; F. M. Stone, Endowment Secretary of American University; H. B. Gough, Professor in DePauw, W. W. Sweet, in DePauw; C. U. Wade, Endowment Secretary DePauw University; A. H. Hirsch, Professor in Ursinus College, Collegeville, Pa.; G. H. Myers, Endowment Secretary Illinois Wesleyan College; C. J. Everson, Endowment Secretary Taylor University.

FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

We, your Committee on Freedmen's Aid, are pleased to make the following report: The work of the society has gone forward with leaps and bounds during the last year. Students are coming to our schools in such large numbers that we are unable to accommodate them all.

The Commission appointed by the Church to visit these schools report the magnificent work done with very limited resources, and the tremendous need of more buildings, better equipment, and larger pay for better teachers.

Resolved, First, That we heartily approve of the change of the name "university" from all the schools except the one at Atlanta, Ga., and calling them "colleges," "institutes," or "academies," according to the work they are doing.

Resolved, Second, That we appreciate the heroic effort of the colored people of the South in pledging \$100,000, their share of the \$500,000 of the Jubilee Fund authorized by the General Conference, and the payment of \$40,000 of the same. We therefore, in view of the urgent needs of these schools, pledge ourselves to raise the amount apportioned to our respective charges for the coming Conference year, and also take an offering for the Jubilee Fund, to be given to New Orleans College and Flint Medical College, assigned to this Conference.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL HOSPITAL AND DEACONESS HOME OF THE STATE OF INDIANA.

We, your Committee, rejoice in the continued prosperity that our hospital is enjoying. Notwithstanding the completion and opening of the new pavilion, the hospital has been full to its utmost capacity for months.

We congratulate the institution that while our free work is constantly increasing, that so far no one has been refused admission because of their inability to pay for it. We are also pleased to note the fact that for the past few months the income of the hospital from patients, together with the ten cents per member from the Conferences and the donations of fruits and supplies from those interested, has equaled the expenses.

With the completion of the north pavilion, which is now in process of erection, the capacity will still further be increased and the income enlarged, and a house for our nurses provided, which will greatly add to the efficiency of our work.

We express our appreciation of the successful work of our brother, the Rev. Sherman Powell, as a Field Secretary, and commend him and his work to the favorable consideration of all our Churches and urge them to give him a hearing and assist him as far as possible in his financial work.

We commend the faithful work of Albert B. Cline as a Trustee of the institution, and hereby nominate him to succeed himself as a Trustee. his term to expire in 1917.

On account of the removal from the bounds of the Conference and from membership in our Church of Albert L. New, we hereby nominate the Hon. William T. Durbin as a Trustee for the unexpired term of Albert L. New—namely, until 1915.

We have greatly appreciated the presence and address of the Hon. Chas. F. Coffin at this session of our Conference, and hereby express our gratitude for his constant interest in looking after the legal matters involved in our work, as well as for his efficient services as a member of the Executive Committee.

We recommend that the District Superintendents apportion to the charges in the Conference an amount equal to ten cents per member for the Sustaining Fund, which was never needed more than now, that we may do our proportionate share toward caring for those who need our benefactions.

We recommend that the necessary steps be at once taken to amend the Articles of Incorporation so that the following may be sent to the Northwest Indiana and the Indiana Conferences for their approval and adoption, that they may as rapidly as possible become operative:

First—That the number of Trustees be increased so that each Conference shall elect six Trustees, three of whom shall be ministers and three laymen, all of whom shall be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Two others shall be elected by the Woman's Home Missionary Society of each Conference, making a representation from each Conference of eight—five laymen and three ministers.

Second—That Trustees thus elected may in their annual meeting elect nine Trustees-at-large, three from within the territory of each Conference, six of whom may be chosen from among the friends of the hospital who may not be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Third—That the Trustees shall elect from among their number nine members, three from each Conference, who, with the President of the Board of Trustees and the General Secretary, shall constitute the Executive Committee, the last two named being ex-officio members of said Committee.

Fourth—We recommend the discontinuance of the Associate Trustees, and that the District Superintendents of the several Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Indiana shall be ex-officio members of and constitute an Advisory Council.

INDIANA CENTENNIAL.

WHEREAS, The year nineteen hundred and sixteen is the one hundredth anniversary of the admission of Indiana into our great National Union, of which she has been an honorable and influential member for nearly a hundred years; and

WHEREAS, Preliminary arrangements have already been made by our State authorities for a suitable observance of this centennial by having an "Historical and Educational Celebration representing all phases of the State's activities;" and

WHEREAS, No celebration of the real success of our beloved State during these hundred years would be complete without a proper recognition of the work done by the various religious denominations within our borders; and

WHEREAS, The Methodist Episcopal Church in Indiana has been no small factor in the development of the educational, philanthropic, moral,

and religious life and achievement of the citizenship of this, our prosperous Commonwealth; therefore,

Resolved, First, That we hereby request our presiding Bishop to appoint a committee of seven ministers and seven laymen from our Conference, to be known as the North Indiana Conference Commission for the Indiana Centennial of Nineteen Hundred and Sixteen.

Resolved, Second, That we request the other Annual Conferences in our State to appoint like commissions, in order that the united Methodism of these three Conferences may co-operate in planning such an exhibit of the work done by the Methodist Episcopal Church as in their judgment may seem wise and for the glory of God.

Resolved, Third, That we hereby elect as ex-officio members of these commissions the General Superintendents who have residential supervision over the Conferences in our State, viz., Bishop William F. McDowell, D. D., LL. D., and Bishop William F. Anderson, D. D., LL. D., and also our honored retired General Superintendent, who resides within the borders of our State, viz., Bishop David H. Moore, D. D., LL. D., and that we request the other Conferences of the State to join with us in electing these Bishops to membership-at-large on the commissions named.

Resolved, Fourth, That our Conference Secretary send the other Conferences in the State copies of these resolutions in ample time before their next annual session.

By concurrent resolutions of the three Indiana Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, a Joint Commission was appointed to study the educational situation in Indiana Methodism, and to make such recommendations concerning the future relation of its institutions as they deemed best.

This Commission met for organization October 27, 1913, in the Central Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church, Indianapolis. A. B. Storms, of the Indiana Conference, was elected President; L. M. Edwards, of the North Indiana Conference, was elected Secretary. A sub-committee consisting of one from each Conference was appointed to study in detail the three Methodist educational institutions in the State, viz., Taylor University, Moores Hill College, and DePauw University. This sub-committee consisted of A. B. Storms, K. W. Robbins, and L. M. Edwards. The sub-committee, after investigation, submitted its report to the Joint Commission at a meeting held in Central Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church, Indianapolis, March 9, 1914. From their report and subsequent general discussion, the Commission adopted the following statement of

facts, beliefs, and recommendations, to be submitted to the three Conferences for action.

I. STATEMENT OF FACTS.—In the case of Taylor University we find the following: This institution is owned by the National Local Preachers' Association, and is managed by a Board of twenty-one Trustees, elected by said association, and the President ex-officio.

The North Indiana Conference nominates six of the twenty-one Trustees. Two Visitors also are appointed annually by the North Indiana Conference, who have voice but not vote in the business sessions of the Board of Trustees.

This institution is located at the southern limits of the city of Upland, Indiana, and possesses the following property: A campus of ten acres, upon which are situated: The Main Building (1), Music Hall, Chapel, and Gymnasium (1), Sickler Dormitory for Boys (1), Central Heating Plant (1), and the Clippinger Observatory (1), a small frame building. The Main Building is in fair repair, as is the Dormitory; the Heating Plant and Music Hall and Chapel are practically new. The appraised valuation of this plant, including ground and the buildings, is \$86,650.

The institution owns also, off the campus and in the city of Upland, the following properties: Ten vacant lots, three frame buildings used as dormitories, and one frame building used as a dining hall and dormitory, with an appraised valuation of \$11,750.

Improvement and endowment notes are in hand to the amount of \$23,000. Personal property is valued at \$1,280. A will has been probated bequeathing to the school \$10,000, making an estimated total of \$132,690 assets.

In the case of Moores Hill College, we find that it was organized in 1854, opened in 1856, since which time it has been doing both preparatory and collegiate work.

Organization and Equipment.—Moores Hill College is under the management of a Board of Trustees, consisting of the President of the College, ex-officio, and twenty-seven members elected by the Indiana Conference for a period of three years. In addition, the Conference appoints six Conference Visitors and two Alumni Visitors, who meet with the Board and take part in its deliberations.

The Board of Trustees has full power to receive and administer all funds, to appoint Faculties, to confer degrees, and to make all laws for the government of the institution.

Buildings.—Moore Hall, a three-story brick building; the Stevens Gymnasium, a building 70 x 40 feet, and Carnegie Hall, a building costing \$60,000.

Academy.—The Greencastle Academy, affiliated with DePauw University, is "under the control of the Board of Trustees of DePauw University, who annually make appropriations for its support, and elect members of its Faculty." It has no specific claim upon endowment for its support, and is sustained at an annual deficit, so far as student fees go, of about \$3,000.

The departments are under the supervision of the Faculty of the College of Liberal Arts, but in direct charge of teachers who do not teach in the college. However, there are some academy students who pursue work in the college classes under instruction of members of the college Faculty.

The School of Music of DePauw is "under the particular supervision of the Dean of Music and the Faculty of the School of Music, and under the same general supervision as the other departments of DePauw University." It has no other resources than the fees paid by the pupils. The Music School balance rendered last year to DePauw University was \$785.65.

II. STATEMENT OF BELIEFS.—We believe that it is of grave importance in determining the Methodist educational program to recognize the significant place which higher education has held in the Methodist Church from its organization in this territory, and the vital part which Methodist educational institutions have played in the development of Indiana.

We recognize also the fact that the public school system, including the State institutions of higher learning, has had a remarkable growth in the Middle West, including Indiana. It is our conviction that the high schools are rapidly becoming entirely adequate for all secondary education, covering all preparatory grades for college courses. With high schools within easy reach, practically all our people are able to send their sons and daughters to these institutions for preparatory education, and, except for emergent reasons, should do so. It may seem advisable to continue some measure of preparatory or academy work under our Church supervision, but such work should be continued as a temporary expedient and not as a permanent program.

We believe it to be necessary that our Church colleges shall have much more ample endowments and resources, buildings, equipment, laboratories, and Faculties, and be much better salaried than they have been able to afford in the past. While it has been true that Church colleges have maintained able Faculties on very meager compensations, through the loyalty of their teachers to the Church, we do not believe that the Church should or can expect this to continue indefinitely in the future. In view of the millions of dollars that are being poured annually into the treasuries of our great State institutions, such enlarged equipment and resources become imperative.

We believe that the Church College of Liberal Arts has a distinct place in the educational program of to-day, but that they should be strictly limited in the scope of their work, holding to the main departments of Literature, Science, and the Arts.

We believe also in the standards fixed by the Methodist University Senate for our Church colleges, which are as follows:

An endowment of \$200,000, buildings and campus "sufficient to do their work reasonably and creditably," with scientific laboratory equipment of at least \$5,000, with departmental libraries of at least 3,000 volumes, with at least eight professors in the College of Liberal Arts only, that all academic work be strictly separate in teaching force and organization from the collegiate work, and that the minimum salary for the college professor be \$1,100 per year.

III. STATEMENT OF RECOMMENDATIONS.—In the case of Taylor University:

We recommend that a communication of inquiry be sent to the National Local Preachers' Association in respect of its willingness to surrender the charter of Taylor University to the North Indiana Conference.

That in the event of such surrender of such charter, the institution be managed by a Board of Trustees appointed by the North Indiana Conference, and therefore entitled to support from Conference educational collections, and representation in the pulpits of the Conference.

That in the event of such surrender and Conference management, the school be accepted upon the basis of the educational standards as set forth for all institutions of the Church by the University Senate.

In the case of Moores Hill College:

We recommend the most cordial endorsements of its present campaign for an endowment of \$200,000.

That it continue to give the Bachelor of Arts course as at present.

That it take the place to which it will be entitled in 1916 under the rules and requirements of the University Senate.

In the case of DePauw University:

We recommend that, in view of the widespread development of the high schools of the State, and in view of an annual deficit of \$3,000 in the maintenance of the Greencastle Academy, that this academy be discontinued at the earliest practicable date.

We recommend that the manifest need of more buildings, more teachers, larger equipments, more ample endowments for DePauw University be brought to the attention of the Trustees, alumni, and friends of the institution in such a way as to provide in the very near future for equipment and resources of at least \$5,000,000.

We recommend further a suitable pension be allowed to all retiring professors.

We recommend in general that no college under Methodist control undertake any elaboration or specialization other than that usually given in the standard departments in Science, Literature, and the Arts until its endowment shall have exceeded \$1,000,000.

We recommend that it be the policy of any college having less than \$1,000,000 endowment to advise its students who desire technical courses, or other special lines of work not offered in the regular college departments, and who can not reasonably complete their Bachelor's course before entering on such special work, to go to universities where such special work can be taken with advantage.

METHODIST STUDENTS IN STATE SCHOOLS.—In response to a resolution from the Northwest Indiana Conference, at its session in 1913, concerning Methodist students in State schools, and after due consideration of such request, the Joint Commission on Educational Institutions of Methodism in Indiana adopted the following resolution:

"1. That we recognize both the opportunity and the obligation existing at our State educational institutions for the distinctive and positive spiritual message and influence of our Church.

"2. That the local Churches in these communities should not be expected, single-handed and unaided, to meet this obligation, but that the entire Church of the State should assist.

"3. That we cordially approve the appointment of assistant pastors for our Churches at educational centers.

"4. That where the local Churches are not favorably located for reaching the students, we approve the establishment of Churches that will be favorably located.

"5. That we approve the local Church organization as the center of influence and activity for students rather than organizations outside, or merely adjunct to the local Church.

"6. That we recommend the appointment of a standing Joint Commission, to consist of three members of each of the Conferences of Indiana, and two representatives from each of the Methodist institutions of the State, to formulate plans for co-operation with our local Churches at State educational centers, and to provide ways and means for carrying such plans into effect.

"7. That we ask the Conferences to approve the appointment of such a standing Joint Commission, and that the Bishops presiding be asked to make appointments to this Joint Commission from year to year."

Further, as a Joint Commission, we earnestly urge on our Board of Education and on our Home Missionary Board joint consideration of the State educational field, and provision for meeting adequately the opportunity there presented.

We further recommend for adoption by the three Indiana Conferences that the permanent Joint Commission be charged with the responsibility of developing plans for co-operation in assisting our State Church colleges to secure endowment and other funds; and also that this Commission be directed to report fully to the Annual Conferences concerning the scope of the collegiate work of the colleges, their resources, their departments, the degrees conferred, or any other features of their activity; and also that the Commission be directed to make definite recommendations of approval, or otherwise, of the plans of the Church schools for their work, or for the raising of endowment or other funds.

METHODIST MEMORIAL HOME FOR THE AGED.

April 20, 1911, to March 1, 1914.

To read to the listening ears of the Methodists of the North Indiana Conference a record of the work done in the years 1911 to March 1, 1914, is a simple task. But the principal object of this report is to lead you into a closer touch with one of the noblest charities that has ever been established; to point you to a group of men and women, God's children, old yet ever young, with hoary heads, bent forms, many with frail and suffering bodies, who have been committed to our care to await the summons to the home above.

We are thankful to say that there are many to whom God has vouchsafed a reasonable degree of health and vigor during these declining years, for we have eight members in our family that are beyond eighty years of age. Longfellow says that "Age is opportunity no less than youth itself, though in another dress, and as the evening twilight fades the sky is filled with stars invisible by day."

We have many saints among these in whose heart is the song of the faithful, and in whose faces shine the glory of the life beyond. On April 20th we found a family of nine full members and five probationers, all of whom were admitted into full membership, and four more were admitted to membership during the year.

In the month of October, Mrs. Mary C. Williams departed for the home beyond; this was the first break in our family circle, and she was followed by Mrs. Justina Klein, who answered the call of the Father to come up higher on the 29th of February, 1912; so we closed the year with sixteen members of the family circle.

During the year 1912 we enlarged our family circle by the admission of eight more members; others knocked at the door. Would that we had the means to enlarge our ministrations, for we are so often obliged to refuse some pathetic appeal—to write "ineligible" to one in such pitiful need of the shelter and comfort of this home!

During the present year we have been enabled to enlarge our family circle by the admission of six into full membership and six on probation. Our family ties were again broken; in the mid-year the spirits of Mrs. Matilda C. Cain and Miss Della Cully returned to God who gave them, and age became youth as they began with joy the journey of the life eternal.

After careful consideration and investigation, the Board of Trustees deemed it wise to raise the minimum admission fee from three to five hundred dollars, to conform with the other institutions that have similar requirements for the admission of members to the family, and our institution would be at a serious disadvantage if we must admit persons at a less fee than the other similar institutions.

We hope that every pastor in the Conference will thoroughly acquaint himself with the requirements for the admission of members to the Methodist Memorial Home for the Aged, so that they may not make any promises to prospective applicants that would embarrass the Board of Trustees in handling any case on its individual merit.

Much has been done in the improvement of the grounds in the way of building of roads and walks; however, much remains to be done before they shall have a finished appearance, but it is already very attractive.

We have also put a great amount of improvement on the land given by Mr. Chopson to the Endowment Fund of the Home, and in a few more years we will have some modern farms that will aid in the maintenance of our family.

In the meantime we have endeavored to build up the Permanent Fund of the institution, and while it has been a year of serious concern in the business world, a time of great financial stress, and other things given the right of way in the Conference, yet we look back with gratitude toward our friends and with thanksgiving to God for the support given to the work. While we have not accomplished all that we had hoped, we have not failed to do our best.

There has been added to the Endowment Fund \$16,000, not including the \$8,500 in after-death bonds and the remembrances in wills to the amount of more than \$50,000.

God has richly honored us in the Board of Trustees, who have so unselfishly labored for the success of the Home and the care of the family. We want to acknowledge our gratitude thus publicly, and pray that God's richest blessing may rest upon them and that they may be spared to the work of the Master for many years.

Of the work of the matron we are glad to speak. For her energy, cheerfulness, ability, and good judgment we are grateful; as she ministers to the sick and feeble, her bright smile and cheery word helps many a weary moment to fly by. "They serve God best who serve His creatures best."

And now our report is finished. If in these few words we have shown you a little of the inner meaning of it all; if we have shown you that it is a work of loving service; that we are trying to deserve the "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, My brethren, ye have done it unto Me," and if we have inspired any who have heard or who may read this report to come into closer touch with the Home, to feel the responsibility which God has placed upon us, our object will have been accomplished.

Every Methodist home in the North Indiana Conference, as it gathers its members about its own hearthstone, sheltered and happy in its wealth of love, should from its family altar, while sending up a prayer for its own blessings, ask also that it may see the need of those around them and feel the obligation resting upon them to help in the care of God's worthy aged.

We feel an exhilaration in the air as the new year comes in giving us the hope of being more fruitful of good works than the year just closed has been. There will undoubtedly be failures and discouragements, as in the past, but the new year promises many good things.

We recommend that, whereas, in these days of our growing Methodism it is often necessary to divide certain charges with parsonage property in common; wherever this is required we believe that each society shall have their vested interests properly guarded in fairness to all.

SOCIAL AND MORAL QUESTIONS.

The Christian Church is committed to the task of saving society through the redemption of the individual, therefore we, your Committee on Social and Moral Questions, recommend that our ministers and laymen become intensely interested in the social life of our people.

1. We believe that the Lord's day should be used sacredly for purposes of rest and the worship of Almighty God, and we deplore the desecration of this day by unnecessary travel and many games of sport, which in themselves are harmless and may be beneficial if used during week-days.

2. We recommend to our people only such amusements as can be taken in harmony with the development of Christian character.

3. We pledge ourselves anew to stand upon the law of our Church and the teachings of the Holy Scriptures in regard to the question of divorce, and recommend that our ministers shall, wherever possible, use the excellent Ritual of our Church so that the marriage contract may be consummated under the most sacred and hallowed influences.

4. We deplore the desecration of our National holidays, which are set apart for the sacred purposes of patriotism in memory of our soldiers, living and dead, and for the purposes of thanksgiving to Almighty God. We urge our Christian colleges to commemorate Thanksgiving Day with suitable religious services.

5. We heartily endorse "The Social Creed of the Churches" as adopted by the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, December 9, 1912. We recommend that our preachers present this social creed to their congregations so that the world may know the attitude of the Methodist Episcopal Church toward the social problems of the day.

We are in hearty accord with any and all movements working for the entire suppression of polygamy as practiced by Mormonism in violation of law.

6. We recognize the good work done by the Sunday League of America, and are gratified to learn that Dr. Thomson, its National Secretary, will make a tour of our Conference the coming year, holding inter-denominational meetings in the interest of this cause, and we hereby welcome him and pledge him our co-operation in this great work.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Committee rejoices to report to Conference the prosperous condition and aggressiveness of the Sunday schools in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

We highly commend the work done by our Board of Sunday Schools in organizing 338 new schools, with an enrollment of 11,857, out of which have come 89 Church organizations, with a membership of 2,772. This is demonstrative of the evangelistic spirit which has characterized their work throughout the connection.

The Board deserves the earnest co-operation and support of every pastor, Church, and Sunday school in Methodism.

We are glad to note that that which has characterized the work of the Board in general has been true in our own Conference. We now have 86,376 members reported in this Conference, which is an increase over last year of 11,240; of this number, 6,151 have been converted during the year, showing an increase in conversions of 1,669.

We are also glad for the missionary spirit as shown in the offering of approximately \$10,000 for missions.

We recommend that each school adopt the Board's program of a "standardized" school. We recommend the "Home Department," Cradle Roll, and the use of our literature in all our schools.

We would call especial attention to "Children's Day, Rally Day, and Decision Day," and urge their observance.

We lay special emphasis on "Teacher's Training, Missionary Instruction, and Evangelism."

TEMPERANCE AND PROHIBITION.

After years of prayer and effort for the overthrow of the liquor traffic, our hearts are gladdened to-day with the brightening outlook for State and National prohibition. The passage of the Webb-Kenyon bill by Congress has revealed the breakdown of the political power of the drink traffic throughout the country. We are encouraged to believe that if the bill now pending looking to an amendment of the Federal Constitution, prohibiting the manufacture and sale, the importation, exportation, and transportation of alcoholic liquors as a beverage, were to be placed before the National Congress on its merits at this time it would carry by a large majority.

We therefore urge upon our people the importance of asking our representatives to press the matter to an early vote. The battle is on in every State in the Union, and our hearts rejoice over the dry victories on every hand.

We most heartily commend the non-partisan position and activities of the Anti-Saloon League, and the statesmanlike and masterful service rendered by the Rev. Madison Swadener, D. D., of our Conference, in the promotion of the already conserved energies of the temperance forces, and his very able Conference address, so full of inspiration and information.

We commend the Administration for its stand on the temperance question.

We commend the Temperance Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church for its great activity in the circulation of literature; the dissemination of facts through the secular and religious press; the promotion of total abstinence by pledge-signing in Sunday schools and street meetings, and its hearty co-operation in the movement for National Constitutional prohibition. We urge our pastors to make a larger use of its literature and men, and to raise its apportionment in full.

WHEREAS, About three-fourths of the territory and one-half the people in the United States are under some sort of prohibition law; and,

WHEREAS, The liquor interests (mail-order liquor sellers) have made a practice of soliciting orders for liquor in "dry" territory, thus bringing prohibition laws into disrepute and thwarting the will of a majority of the people in such territory; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, representing 68,266 members and 200,000 constituents, That we call upon the Postoffice Department of this Administration and upon our representatives in Congress to exclude from the mails liquor advertising, just as lottery tickets and lottery solicitations have been barred as contrary to the public welfare. The use of the mails by the brewers and distillers and wholesale dealers in liquors to insult citizens in dry territory, and to promote the consumption of their poisonous beverages, is not a right, but is an outrage upon the rights of the fifty million citizens.

We commend the Woman's Christian Temperance Union for the work it is doing, and for its devotion to total abstinence and prohibition.

The increasing interest shown in temperance and prohibition throughout the Nation plainly indicates that the final struggle for the ultimate overthrow of the American saloon is now upon us, and we hereby emphasize the words expressed by the last General Conference that the liquor traffic can never be licensed without sin.

We condemn the license policy. It is vicious in principle, utterly inconsistent with the principles of the enlightened Government, in practice a protection to a traffic which is inherently criminal in its nature.

We greatly rejoice in the good news that by the order of Secretary Daniels, intoxicating liquors have been prohibited throughout the entire navy of the United States.

As officers of the Conference Temperance Society we recommend for President, Rev. J. O. Bills; Vice-President, Rev. F. P. Morris; Secretary, Rev. Herbert Boase.

SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT.

We earnestly urge all our ministers and people to vote in the election of 1914 in favor of the calling of a Constitutional Convention in the State of Indiana in order that there may be opportunity to write into the Constitution of the State the complete legal prohibition of the manufacture, sale, and transportation intra-State of all alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes.

WOMAN'S HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Again the seasons have rolled round and we find ourselves in the glad springtime of hope and rejoicing—rejoicing in that we have been permitted to lend aid and comfort in the name of Him who taketh away the sins of the world, and hoping to accomplish more another year.

Our last quarterly reports show a membership in seventy-nine auxiliaries of 3,420, a gain of 374 over last year.

In our fifty-seven Young People's Circles we have 1,231 members, a gain of forty-eight. Home Guards and Mothers' Jewels number 692, a loss of 121. New organizations are located at Benton, Valentine, Saratoga, and Union City. Although there is a decrease in Children's Bands, the work among the young people is steadily increasing, and we are glad to report new Queen Esther Circles at Union City; Grace Church, Richmond; Middletown, and Noble Street, Anderson. Let us look well to the youth of our dear homeland, for herein lies the hope and strength of our future.

The six district conventions were held at Noblesville, (First Church) Richmond, Bristol, Galveston, Auburn, and South Whitley.

The work has been greatly benefited during the year by the presence and helpful addresses of Dr. B. S. Haywood, Field Secretary for Sibley Hospital, Washington, D. C.; Miss Josephine Corbin, Field Secretary for the Woman's Home Missionary Society; Mrs. Jacob Bernheim, Assistant Superintendent of Marcy Center, Chicago, and Miss Carrie Barge, another favorite Field Worker and Co-ordinate Secretary with our own Mrs. Delia Williams.

One thousand, two hundred and eighty-two of our members subscribe for *Woman's Home Missions*, and 281 copies of *Children's Home Missions* are in circulation throughout our boundary.

Our Conference was represented at the National meeting in Washington, D. C., last October, by Mrs. L. H. Bunyan, Bureau Secretary for Florida; Mrs. A. B. Cline, Conference Corresponding Secretary and Bureau Secretary for White Work in the Carolinas; Mrs. J. C. White, newly elected Conference President, and Miss Laura Bertsch, Young People's Delegate. Among the other good things they had to tell us was the assurance that we were once more—or for the sixth consecutive year—Banner Mite-box Conference in the Nation.

In November we gathered our forces in Wayne Street Church, Fort Wayne, for a season of planning and sifting of methods. One of the most blessed new features coming our way is the adoption of Miss Elizabeth Wilson, of Hartford City, as our Conference Deaconess. She will come to us next year, at the close of her studies in the National Training School, Washington, D. C., and her time will be equally divided between the six districts. Great good is expected to be the fruit of her labor. We also have another girl in training, Miss Winnifred Brown, of Anderson, who will complete her work in Fisk Training School, Kansas City, this spring. Her work will be assigned her by the General Deaconess Board.

Supplies amounting to \$1,717.68 were sent, \$802.44 of which went to ministers and \$915.24 to our Homes.

Material advances were made on the pledges in each of the districts last year, and by their prompt payment we are enabled to show the Christ-like spirit to Chinese, Japanese, Italians, Negroes, mountain whites, Esquimaux, Spaniards, Mexicans, Porto Ricans, Hawaiians, Jews, and Americans, all living under the folds of Old Glory, for these foreign people are being poured into our country as ore into the melting-pot, and we have been charged to keep the fire of God's love burning brightly that the dross alone may be consumed and the pure metal remain for the assimilation which builds our American manhood and womanhood.

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

To Bishop McDowell and Members of the North Indiana Conference, assembled in Mishawaka, April 1, 1914, Greetings:

We herewith present the annual report of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, and to "God who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ," we give praise and thanksgiving.

Divine love has deepened our consecration, knowledge broadened our vision, and service enriched our lives. As an organization we are growing in system and power, becoming better fitted and qualified to fill the respective offices in auxiliary and district. We have over 3,700 members in auxiliaries, 1,160 young people, over 1,700 King's Heralds and Little

Light Bearers, in 195 organizations. This army of over six regiments is becoming established by knowledge in reading the 1,260 copies of the *Woman's Friend*, the *890 Junior Friends*, and scores of the books, "The Work for the World" and "The King's Business," in circulation. Our aim is to enlist the "other eight women" in our Church, as well as our sister without Christ. There have been held during the year approximately 2,700 meetings, besides the six sub and annual district meetings. At the latter Miss Alice Linam, from China on furlough, gave comprehensive and timely addresses. Miss Linam went to China twenty-three years ago from Lessburg, Indiana. Forty life-members have been enrolled, bringing into the treasury over \$400. The children have given into the treasury over \$700 the past year.

The young people are supporting Miss Ethel Jackson in Singapore, besides other special work, contributing \$1,386. The sum total from all sources being over \$14,000. Our Conference Treasurer is especially qualified to handle this money, and has her books audited by two expert accountants in Fort Wayne, her residence.

The Northwestern Branch is incorporated and legally responsible for all funds intrusted to its care. No corporation in the world handles as much money with as little expense. See its reports. Forms of bequest for money or personal property, or devise of land or devise of residuary estate, or any part thereof, and rates of annuities assuring protection to donors as well as to the society, will be furnished on application.

We pledge our loyalty to the pastors in our Churches, not only as an educative force, but as spiritual helpers, and thank them for their splendid co-operation.

SPECIAL WORK.

We are glad to submit the following report of the special work which is being supported by the auxiliaries, young people, Standard Bearers, King's Heralds, and Little Light Bearers of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of North Indiana Conference. We are doing some work in ten different countries. This work consists of eight regular missionaries, forty-two Bible women, one assistant Bible woman, three

Bible women in training, medical work, six hospital beds, three day schools, two kindergarten workers, one Zenana worker, and ninety-four scholarships. Besides, we have had special contributions for naming rooms in some of our new schools and hospitals, and for relief of the Balkan sufferers.

Almost all of the societies have sent in Christmas and Thank-offerings and mite-box money. Many of the auxiliaries have filled coin cards, contributed to the Retirement Fund, and observed Self-Denial Week.

Several Christmas boxes have been sent to the foreign field and brought cheer and happiness to the hearts of our missionaries, as well as of the little ones under their care, valued at \$200.

Each month a number of papers and magazines are sent to missionaries. The aim of the Secretary in charge of this branch of the work is that at least one paper or magazine may be sent to every one of the foreign stations each month. We at the home base can scarcely realize what it means to our workers across the seas to have the Christmas boxes, the papers and magazines, or even an occasional post-card from the dear homeland, or we would attend more carefully to this line of our work. Not only would we help and cheer the workers, but we would receive blessings ourselves by thus coming in personal touch with the missionaries.

Repeated and urgent calls are coming from the foreign fields for new or enlarged buildings; for repairs, for equipment, for furnishings, and for scholarships either in the day or boarding schools; for support of teachers, and for Bible women and nurses in training. Day schools are one of our greatest needs, and are far-reaching in results.

Each individual member of our great society may enter the open door of opportunity and do much for the advancement of the Kingdom.

Lay Association.

The report of the Secretary and Treasurer for the year ending April 2, 1914, was read.

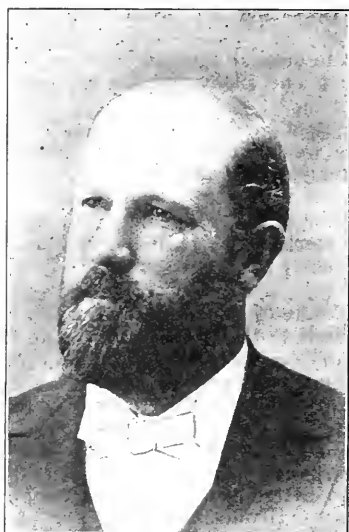

Memoirs.

ORANGE S. HARRISON.

Rev. Orange S. Harrison was born in West Elkton, Ohio, June 1, 1848, and died at his home in Richmond, Indiana, April 27th, in the sixty-fifth year of his age. He was of true Wesleyan stock. His father, Rev. John Harrison, was a local preacher in the Wesleyan Church, and

after his removal to this country, served first as a supply preacher in the Cincinnati Conference, and later united with the North Indiana Conference. Brother Harrison was converted in a meeting conducted by his father when he was but a lad of eight years, and his first work in the ministry was as junior preacher on the Middletown Circuit, of which his father had charge. He was educated in the Richmond public schools, and attended Moores Hill College some time. He was a clear, forceful, fearless preacher of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Within the forty years of his active work he rendered efficient service on the following charges: Middletown, Westfield and Carmel, Logansport Mission, New Waverly, Tipton, New Haven, Cambridge City (twice), Ridgeville, Lima, Middlebury, Albion, Goshen (Fifth Street), Greentown, Markle, Monroeville, Williamsburg, and Third Church, Richmond, from which charge he was placed on the retired list on account of failing health.

In 1870 he was married to Miss Effie Kerr, of Henry County, Indiana. To this union three children were born: Mrs. Olive Coats, of Albion, Indiana, and Mrs. Anna Cluggish and Merrill Harrison, of New Castle. His second marriage occurred July 25, 1894, to Mrs. Flora C. Andrews, of Dayton, Ohio, who remains to mourn her loss. The funeral services were conducted by Dr. Freeland, Superintendent of the Richmond District, assisted by Arthur Cates, George Martin, and B. E. Parker. The burial was in the beautiful cemetery at Cambridge City.

The trials through which our brother passed during the latter years of his life brought out the granitic strength and rugged beauty of his character. Forced to earn his living after his retirement from the ministry, he took up the study of law with the enthusiasm of a young man. He soon became sufficiently acquainted with the principles and practice of law to enable him to enter the courts and contend successfully with men who had enjoyed a much wider experience. One of the prominent lawyers of Richmond said, "The sight of this fatally afflicted man successfully taking up the study of law at his age was as fine an example

of puissant courage as I have ever witnessed." He maintained his interest in the Church to the last, and was always a faithful friend and safe counselor to his pastor. As the silver-crowned heroes of our Methodist itinerancy, who in prayer and faith and heroic effort laid the foundations on which the younger men of the Conference are now building, are promoted to the Church triumphant, we cry out:

"O God, let not that race of giants die!
Give us more men like these: old-fashioned, brave,
True to the truth; men that have made the Church
Mighty and glad and songful in the past."

LEWIS D. REHL.

Rev. Lewis D. Rehl was born in Monroe Township, Henry County, Ohio, April 12, 1874, and died July 2, 1913, at Napoleon, Ohio, at the age of thirty-nine years, two months, and twenty days.

About twenty years ago he took up his residence in Angola, Indiana, where he followed harness-making seven years, at the same time giving attention to study preparatory to the work of the gospel ministry. Brother Rehl was a member of the Evangelical Church until just a while before he was licensed to preach in the Methodist Episcopal Church, which was in 1899. After entering the itinerancy he served the following charges: Pleasant Lake, Geneva Circuit, Ft. Wayne Circuit, (St. Paul) Ft. Wayne, Lynn, Monroeville, and Ossian. In all these places the work of the Church prospered, for Brother Rehl was not a specialist, but an all-round preacher and favorite pastor. He was especially happy in his work with young people of the Epworth League, having been a district officer in that society before entering the pastorate. As a preacher he was fearless, loving, evangelistic. As a pastor he carefully looked after all the financial interests of the Church and faithfully supervised the work of all the societies of the Church. As a brother minister he was loyal and charitable in conversation, given to saying only kind things of his brethren in the ministry. He was a man whom the people loved. He entered into marriage with Miss Clara R. Stull, daughter of Rev. J. O. Stull, July 24, 1901. To them were born three children, two having preceded their father to the King's country, and only Lois Germaine remains to comfort her bereaved mother.

The account of Brother Rehl's tragic death by falling from the top of the cherry tree in his father's yard, changing so suddenly the day's planned-for rest and fellowship of the old home ties to days of mourning, can not be forgotten nor their warning and lesson go unheeded,—“In the midst of life we are in death.”

Funeral services were held at Napoleon, Ohio, July 5, 1913, conducted by his District Superintendent, and participated in by Revs. D. H. Guild, T. M. Hill, F. H. Cremean, J. O. Bills, C. M. Hollopeter, C. A. Hile, Dr. Stull, and the pastor of our Church at Napoleon, Ohio, after which his body was laid to rest in Greenlawn Cemetery at that place.

Sunday, July 20th, a very fitting memorial service was held in the Methodist Episcopal Church at Ossian, Indiana, by Dr. Beatty, and A. B. Cline, of Bluffton; T. A. Doane and A. S. Elzy, of Ossian; W. A. Griest, W. T. Arnold, and C. A. Hile paid tribute to the memory of this splendid man of God. The pastors of the local United Brethren Church and the Presbyterian Church also paid tribute to his worth.

HANSON CONRAD SMITH.

Hanson Conrad Smith was born near Santa Fe, Miami County, Indiana, June 5, 1849, and died near his childhood home July 27, 1913. When just a lad he was converted and at once joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. For a few years he taught in the public schools, and then answered an unmistakable call to enter the ministry. He was a

licensed local preacher for several years. In early life he was married to Miss Clara Clayton, who lived but a few months after their marriage. In 1877 he married Miss Maggie De Wyland, who shared all his ministerial life and labors, and who now mourns her great and sudden loss.

Brother Smith was appointed in 1877 as junior preacher with Rev. F. A. Robinson, on the Mexico Circuit. Then he served the following charges: New Corner, Alexandria, Montpelier, Fishersburg, Waterloo, Pierceton, Bristol, Montpelier (a second term of three years), Albany, Fairmount, Pendleton, Butler, Nappanee, Middle Street, Wabash. Since retiring from the active work he had lived at Warsaw, where he had many friends. Throughout his long and effective ministry the Lord blessed his work with many gracious revivals, and there are several beautiful churches and parsonages which

stand as monuments of his labors and sacrifice. He was a very energetic man whose spirit was all brotherliness. He accepted frequent calls to preach in special services, and greatly enjoyed the gospel ministry. In the home Church he was attentive, a sympathetic listener, and a reverent worshiper. Several of his last Sundays were spent in the interests of the great campaign for the Preachers' Aid Fund.

He had gone for a few days' visit to his early home, and was not privileged to return to his wife and home and friends in Warsaw. On Sunday night he preached in the church at Santa Fe and then, seemingly in usual health, he retired, and in the morning "He was not, for God had taken him."

Funeral services were held at the home of his nephew, Harlan Plotner, the place of his death. The rites were conducted by his pastor, A. G. Neal, assisted by H. W. Bennett, E. F. Hasty, O. A. Trabue, B. S. Hollopeter, and the pastor at Santa Fe, E. E. Wright.

Several brothers of the Conference were present and, with a goodly number of friends from former charges, paid loving tribute to this faithful man of God. The burial was in the family lot in the cemetery at

Santa Fe. We close this brief tribute by quoting a verse of Brother Smith's favorite hymn:

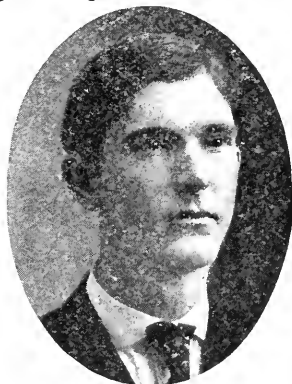
"Well, the delightful day will come

ERVIN BYRON BROWN.

Ervin Byron Brown, son of Thomas M. and Ella Brown, of Ossian, Indiana, was born in Redkey, Indiana, April 28, 1883. He grew to manhood in the vicinity of Redkey and Albany. He graduated from the public schools of Jay County at the age of fourteen. At the age of eighteen he began teaching in the common schools, which profession he followed for six years in Randolph and Jay Counties. During his vacations he took a course of study in the Marion Normal. He also graduated from a teachers' school in Scranton, Pennsylvania. He was married to Miss Ura Edith Cartwright, of Pennville, Indiana, November 1, 1911. One son, Thomas Cartwright, was born to this union.

His health had not been good since last winter. Three weeks before his death he went to the home of his father-in-law, T. J. Cartwright, in Pennville, to rest. He was not considered seriously ill until a few days before his death, when he began to fail rapidly, until death came Thursday, August 28th, at 11.10 P. M. His age was thirty years and four months. He leaves to mourn his early death a wife and son (aged six months), father, mother, three brothers and two sisters, and many other relatives and friends. Brother Brown was converted to God, December 30, 1906, in a meeting conducted by Rev. L. A. Sevits at Sugar Grove Church, on the Albany Circuit. He never had any doubts about the genuineness of his conversion or of the reality of real, heartfelt religion. Within a few days of his conversion he heard the call of God to the ministry, and after due consideration he resolved to make this his life-work. He was licensed to preach by the Muncie District Conference in March, 1908, and in April following he was appointed as a supply to Fort Wayne Circuit, where he preached with great acceptability and success for one year. In the spring of 1909 he was admitted on trial in the North Indiana Conference and appointed to Bluffton Circuit, where he remained two years. In April, 1911, he was ordained deacon by Bishop Hughes, and appointed to Churubusco Circuit, and in 1912 he was appointed to Warren Circuit, where he remained until the summons came. He was ordained elder by Bishop McDowell at our last session of the Conference. In all his ministry he was successful. His deep piety and abiding faith impressed all with whom he was associated. He preached a pure gospel from a sincere, loving heart, and many on the charges he served will cherish his memory for years to come. He was planning to go to a theological school in a year. His funeral was conducted in the Pennville Methodist Episcopal Church

on Monday afternoon, September 1st, at two o'clock. Rev. L. A. Sevits, his former pastor and very close friend, had charge of the service and preached the sermon. He was assisted in the service by the following ministers: J. E. Coffin, M. S. Marble, G. B. Work, and W. H. Hickman. Other ministers present, some of whom acted as pallbearers, were: J. O. Bills, E. L. Jones, D. A. J. Brown, C. E. DeWitt, J. C. Valentine, D. E. Cruca, W. A. Griest, and Geo. W. Bird, pastor of the Friends' Church of Pennville. A large delegation of his parishioners and former parishioners came to offer their tribute of respect and affection. After the tender services in the church, his remains were borne to the Twin Hill Cemetery, where they were laid to rest. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

BERTHA A. BUNNER.

Bertha A. Bunner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Dargitz, was born in Williams County, Ohio, April 12, 1881, and died in Spiceland, Indiana, November 19, 1913, at the age of thirty-two years, seven months, and seven days.

She was a child of Christian parents, who were formerly Methodists, but, moving near Eagle Creek Presbyterian Church, they cast their lot

with them. Here Sister Bunner as a little girl united with the Church at the age of fourteen, and remained a member of this Church till the autumn of 1912, when she transferred her membership to the Methodist Episcopal Church. She became a great worker in the Sabbath school, both in the local Church and in the township and county organizations, in both of which she held offices and labored zealously in the prosecution of the work. She took a great interest in the music of the Sunday school and Church, was organist, and assisted in the vocal music.

In her new field of work she used her voice in working for the Master. The Sunday before she took sick she sang a temperance song at Spiceland and Ogden.

After completing the district schools she attended high school in Montpelier, Ohio, and Tri-State Normal, in Angola, Indiana. For four years she taught school, and thus had to do with the foundation of character of those committed to her care. She was attentive and faithful to the duties of the home life in her country home, but her heart continually turned to the work of the Church, for which the experiences of the years and added study of the Bible fitted her.

On June 20, 1905, she was married to Rev. H. E. Michael, of Williams County, Ohio, who in September became the pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Gettysburg, Ohio. This union, so happily begun and so full of promises, was destined to be broken by the early death of the husband, which occurred March 17, 1906.

Our sister, sorely bereaved, returned to the home of her youth and assumed her activities in the Church at home, where she labored for six years, until December 12, 1912, when she was united in marriage to Rev. E. A. Bunner, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Huntertown,

Indiana. Uniting heart and soul in the work of her husband, she brought added blessings to the charge they served.

In April, 1913, they were appointed to the Spiceland Charge. Here she accompanied her husband in his visitation and, by the Christian spirit and words of wisdom, greatly endeared herself to the people. Her illness covered a period of about four days, when death closed a life so full of promise, but she knew the Lord, and we are comforted in the thought that she was ready to meet Him, and in the example of unselfish devotion and living faith which she has bequeathed to us.

She leaves a devoted husband, a father and a mother, two sisters and one brother.

“What though the arms of conquering death
Does God's own house invade?
That though the prophet and the priest
Be numbered with the dead?”

“The Eternal Shepherd still survives,
New comfort to impart;
His eye shall guide us, and His voice
Shall animate our heart.

“‘Lo! I am with you,’ saith the Lord,

The funeral services, conducted by Rev. W. B. Freeland, D. D., were held at an early hour Friday morning, at Spiceland Methodist Episcopal Church, before starting on a long journey to the home of her parents in Montpelier, Ohio. Many pastors from the district and a large concourse of people were present to witness their esteem of love and devotion of Sister Bunner, and their sympathy for the stricken husband. On arriving at Fort Wayne, on the Lake Shore, at 3 P. M., a number of relatives and friends were present, and arrangements had been made by ministers and members from the Huntertown work to convey relatives and friends to Melchin's beautiful funeral chapel, where a very fitting funeral was held. EMMA WILLIAMS.

Emma, daughter of William and Catharine McFarland, was born near Herman, Illinois, May 3, 1854.

Her parents, who were among the early settlers in that part of the State, were people of sound piety and brought up their children in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord." In that kind of home atmosphere Emma found it comparatively easy to enter into the Christian life.

Indeed, she has said many times that she could not remember the time when she did not love the Lord. As a girl she found comfort in prayer, and the measure of such comfort increased with the years. Always accustomed to Church activities in her youth, it was easy for her to become an effective Church and Sunday school worker in her adult life.

Her education was acquired in the public schools of her native place and in Hedding College, where she planned to complete the course; this, however, she did not do on account of her mother's death, which seemed to make it advisable for her to assume the duties of house-keeper in her father's house; this she did with high efficiency until his death, in 1879.

On the 15th of the following July she was married to Joseph E. Williams, who a little more than a year later was admitted into the Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church on trial, and was appointed pastor at Maquon, Illinois.

From that hour her heart was in the work of the ministry. She sought most earnestly to increase her efficiency and to so toil with her husband as to double his efficiency in the Master's service.

Her influence was felt in the Sunday school and in the Epworth League, as well as in the women's auxiliaries of the Church. She never complained of the fields where duty called her; no road was too long for her to travel if service lay at its end, and no task was too hard for her to undertake if duty pointed it out to her. Yet she loved her home with an intense devotion, and had few superiors in the art of making home attractive.

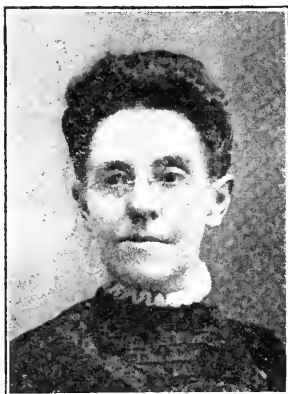
She had been a sufferer for years. Her nervous system suffered a severe shock when she was thrown from a street-car in Tacoma, Washington, in 1907. This was intensified a year later when she was the victim of a serious automobile accident. The disease which took her life began to manifest itself while she was living in Hartford City, about four and a half years ago. She had been under medical care ever since, though until her general health gave way, about six months ago, few even of her intimate friends suspected that so grievous an affliction was upon her. From the first she bore her trouble with resignation and courage. She wanted to live here on the earth a while longer with her husband and friends, but she was not afraid to die, and talked as calmly about it as people ordinarily do about going from one city to another. One day she thought there must be a good many people in heaven whom she knew, and tried to make a list of her personal friends who have gone there; the task was, of course, too great for her, but she became quite happy when she discovered that a very large company would recognize her on the other side, and that heaven would not be a strange place to her. The summons came to her on December 27th, at the parsonage home in Pendleton, Indiana, and she went without a murmur.

She leaves, besides her husband, one sister, Mrs. Jennie Doney, of Rock Island, Illinois, and one brother, Samuel McFarland, of Cripple Creek, Colorado.

Age at time of death, fifty-nine years, seven months, and twenty-four days.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Episcopal Church in Pendleton, Indiana, in charge of Rev. C. E. Line, Superintendent of Muncie District, assisted by Revs. M. S. Marble, L. J. Naftzger, and P. J. Albright. Twenty members of the Conference were present, four wives of ministers, a large company of friends from Pendleton, a number from Hartford City and Union City, former charges, who came to pay special tribute to the nobleness of her character and express sympathy for the sorrowing. The body was laid to rest in the Grove Lawn Cemetery at Pendleton, Indiana, December 29, 1913.—P. J. ALBRIGHT.

WALTER A. FOUTS.

Walter A. Fouts, son of George L. and Della Fouts, was born August 24, 1886, near Chili, Miami County, Indiana. He died in Union Hospital, Terre Haute, Indiana, February 7, 1914, aged twenty-seven years, five months, and thirteen days. Brother Fouts' parents were of the Dunkard persuasion, and his early childhood training was in that faith. But in his boyhood he attended Sunday school and religious services at the Methodist Episcopal Church at Chili, Indiana, and during the pastorate of Rev. J. M. Baker he was converted and united with our

Church. This was an event worthy of special note in the local Church. Brother Fouts was a rare young man of fine presence, high ideals, tireless energy, often going to the full limit of his physical strength. He had a clear vision of the needs of the Church and of the age, and prepared himself thoroughly for the work of the ministry. He graduated from the Peru high school in 1904. He then taught two years in the common schools and one year in high school. He graduated from DePauw University in 1910 with the honors of his class. He then entered Garrett Theological Seminary, and graduated May 28, 1913. (During his student days at Garrett he served as pastor at Wanatah and Creston, Northwest Indiana Conference.) Brother Fouts entered the North Indiana Conference, April 10, 1911, at Kokomo, Indiana, Bishop Hughes presiding. He served the following charges:

Hobbs and Florida, and West Middleton. He was a brilliant and impressive preacher, a faithful pastor, and a wise administrator. He was a beloved brother, making friends wherever he went. His brethren in the ministry held him in the highest esteem and looked upon him as a man who would be sure to reach a high place in his calling. He had an intense, burning desire to extend the work of the Kingdom. It was one of the greatest trials of his life when he had to cease work to battle for life. He preached his last sermon while sitting, being too weak to stand. And it is said he made a profound impression upon those who heard him. Soon after entering upon his work at West Middleton he was married to Bessie Levering, May 27, 1913. She was a graduate of DePauw, and well equipped by education and temperament to make him a superb companion. Everything last spring seemed favorable to our brother. The May spirit tarried with them through the summer and autumn months—filled with happiness, flowers, and music. But in the late fall a change came over the household. Symptoms of typhoid fever appeared. The most skillful physician and vigilant nurse could not save our brother's life. The chariot of the King waited to convey him to the city of our God. Has he ceased his work? No. His mission has only widened. The great Master shall be his Teacher, and the infinite years are his. The reason he was called from earth has been revealed to him. It is a mystery no longer. But it is sweet to think that though we see him not, he has carried to the skies precious memories of earth. The affections of earth shall never fade away in the heart—even in heaven.

"The kindred tie that bound us here,
Though rent apart with many a tear,
Is still renewed in heaven."

The funeral services were held in the Methodist Episcopal Church at Chili, under the direction of the District Superintendent, B. S. Hollopeter. A large number of ministerial brethren attended. Rev. H. N. Herrick, W. C. Asay, and J. B. Cook assisted in the services, voicing in tender and appreciative words the high esteem in which our brother was held by all who knew him. His tired body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Chili, Indiana.

ALMON GREENMAN.

Almon Greenman, the eldest son of Anson and Olive Cunningham-Greenman, was born in Summitt County, Ohio, December 12, 1826. At ten years of age the family moved to where Kendallville, Indiana, now stands, and was the third to settle in the then almost unbroken wilderness, uninhabited save by the Indians and wild game; and they experienced during those early years the hardships and privations of pioneer life. His educational opportunities were limited to the district school, to a part of a year in the old Ontario Collegiate Institute, and to a part of a year in Asbury, now DePauw University. But in this latter he came into close contact with its greatest president, Bishop Matthew Simpson, and attributed high value to his advice and influence during that formative period of his life. Later he followed the four studies required of candidates for the ministry of our Church, and then, with his natural studious habits and the demands of his work, read the best literature in his own and other lines until he became a well-read and widely informed man, and built up a fine library for his time.

He joined the Methodist Episcopal Church at Wolcottville, Indiana, at the invitation of Rev. George M. Boyde, August 17, 1844, and was converted at a class-meeting eight days later, and was baptized the 8th day of August of the following year by Rev. W. J. Forbes, and the 19th day of December, that same year, he was appointed a class leader by the Rev. E. S. Blue. Then he went to Asbury University, expecting to complete the course, but was called home early in 1847 by the death of his father, which left him, as the eldest of nine children, and his own mother also deceased, with a heavy burden of responsibility.

He seems to have been given authority to exhort by Rev. G. M. Boyd, of the LaGrange Circuit, in the early part of 1847, which was confirmed by the formal act of the Quarterly Meeting, August 23d of that same year; and this was succeeded by the formal license to preach, given by the same Quarterly Conference on the 29th of July, 1848, and signed by Samuel Brenton, Presiding Elder, and from June on to September he did his first itinerant work, under the Rev. L. W. Monson, pastor of that circuit. Then for two years he seems to have been fighting the call to the ministry and engaged in other occupations, including teaching;

but he was recommended and received on trial into the North Indiana Conference in August, 1850, and appointed by Bishop Waugh as assistant to the Rev. Jesse Sparks on Allen Circuit, comprising fifteen preaching places; and so, he said, "After two years, like Jonah, I went back to the work to which God had called me." He was ordained deacon by Bishop Baker, and elder by Bishop Simpson, and his record since is a part of the history of Methodism in this part of the State, where, with the exception of two years in the located relation, passed in Marion, and two years as pastor of the First Church in Springfield, Missouri, he filled a number of the most important charges; was Presiding Elder of the Goshen District for a full term. In 1880 he was a delegate to the General Conference. He retired in the year 1889, but even after that he supplied charges and did not give up the work entirely until 1892. Since his retirement he has lived in Marion, Indiana, where he was three times pastor in charge.

He was married to Emily A. Witter, at Dunbar, Pennsylvania, May 31, 1852, and they journeyed in an open buggy from their old to their new home (requiring some three weeks of travel) near Indianapolis, on the Allisonville Circuit. To them were born seven children, two of whom died in infancy, and the surviving children are Almon Witter Greenman, of Naples, Italy; Emily A., of Marion, Indiana; Olive L. Rerick, of Marion, and Alfred L., of Huntington. There are a number of grandchildren and several great-grandchildren. His wife, Emily A., died in Marion in 1892. In 1893 he married Mrs. Mary A. Hansley, who, however, died in December of that same year. Since that time he has been making his home with his son at Huntington and his son-in-law at Marion. Increasing feebleness incident to advancing years has confined him to the house for most of the time for several years, until Saturday morning, February 28, 1914,

"The weary wheels of life stood still."

His children rejoice in the privilege of the affection and life of such a father.

The funeral services occurred at the First Methodist Episcopal Church, Marion, March 3d. Dr. M. S. Marble, Dr. H. N. Herrick, and G. B. Work delivered addresses, and J. F. Porter, J. W. Cain, T. C. Neal, P. J. Albright, and Earle Naftzger had part on the program. The pallbearers were Revs. J. J. Fred, L. M. Krider, E. E. Lutes, D. Wells, J. W. Walters, and W. H. Harrison. Interment was made in the cemetery at Marion.

SARAH J. WILLIAMS.

Human life is a gift incomparable. Time is opportunity for but a brief disclosure of its nature, essence, potentiality. The achievements of a few brief years are a faint suggestion of the scope of its endeavors in the beautiful life beyond. "We know not what we shall be." The one life—the life perfect—is what every life should aspire to now and here. When this obtains, "We know that when He shall appear we shall be like Him." This is the soul's supreme satisfaction now and for evermore. Under the dominion of these great principles the following brief memoir is written.

Sarah J., only daughter of John and Nancy Roby, was born four miles south of Wabash, Indiana, March 26, 1862, and received her spiritual coronation on March 14, 1914, at 9.35 o'clock in the morning, in the parsonage of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Alexandria, Indiana. She is survived by her mother, her husband, the Rev. Dorie V. Williams, and daughter Grace.

When three years of age, with her parents, she moved to Miami County, Indiana, and settled on a farm three miles south of Paw Paw. An adjoining farm was owned by Mr. J. D. Williams, father of a son, Dorie V., who became her playmate, classmate, friend, protector, lover, husband, provider, counselor, comforter in sickness and in health, sharer of her joys and afflictions in life, and now, beneath the burden of a great sorrow, by faith shares her triumph among the celestials, who, having turned many to righteousness, shine as the stars for ever and ever.

Her marriage with the Rev. Dorie V. Williams occurred at her home on December 18, 1881. To them were born two children, the second a

son, who tarried but a short time and then slipped into the embrace of Jesus the Good Shepherd; the first, a daughter, Grace, whose life was a solace to her mother, always a benediction in the home, and now in the mutual comfort of father and daughter, exemplifies the highest standards of Christian fortitude.

After a brief residence with her husband on her father's estate, they moved to Bourbon, Indiana, where they resided until her husband was employed to supply the Valentine Charge in the North Indiana Conference, to which place they moved in September, 1887. In the year 1888 he was received into the North Indiana Conference, since which time they have served the following charges: Valentine, Inwood, Selma, (Markland Ave.) Kokomo, Eaton, Garrett, (First Church) Noblesville, and Alexandria.

Her religious life began on February 18, 1880, when, under the ministry of Rev. L. W. Monson and Rev. Daniel Markley, she was led to receive Christ as her Friend, Companion, and Savior from all sin. From that time the life of God found constant expression in her personality, making an appeal to all for closer relationship to the Father, and through her influence many were led into vital touch with Christ. She adorned the gospel preached by her husband with such outstanding characteristics as simplicity, consistency, patience, devotion, faithfulness, and self-sacrifice for the welfare of others.

While no department of Church work, from the most intense spirit of evangelism to all the avenues of religious experience leading to the most perfect refinements of life, escaped her interest and attention, probably she left the impression of her life more deeply upon the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society than upon any other organization. From childhood this field of religious endeavor made a powerful appeal to her. As Corresponding Secretary of various auxiliaries she mastered this work in all its details and became one of the best informed women on the subject in the Conference.

In her departure society sustains the loss of one who cheerfully made the offering of life for others; the Church in its ministry, one who was true and trustworthy; the home, one whose precious memory will be an abiding comfort and a never-failing inspiration to faithfully perform the constantly increasing tasks of earthly existence.

In perfect harmony with her literary tastes, the following lines present a beautiful interpretation of the spirit of her life as we knew her:

"Sunset and evening star,
And one clear call for me!
And may there be no moaning of the bar
When I put out to sea.

“For tho’ from out the bourne of Time and Place
The flood may bear me far,
I hope to see my Pilot face to face
When I have crossed the bar.”

On March 17, 1914, in the Methodist Episcopal Church in Alexandria, her funeral service was conducted by the Rev. C. E. Line, D. D., District Superintendent, assisted by Rev. J. O. Bills, Rev. J. E. Williams, D. D., Rev. L. J. Naftzger, D. D., Rev. M. S. Marble, D. D., and the Rev. Wm. McKinney, pastor of the Presbyterian Church. The high esteem in which Sister Williams and her family are held was witnessed by the large attendance of sympathetic friends, including many preachers of the Conference. Interment was made in Park View Cemetery, Alexandria, Ind.
