



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ACT OF INCORPORATION.

No. 5397.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

The Mt known, That whereas William F. Draper, Abijah Thompson, Walter Kendall Watkins, Walter Gilman Page, Francis Ellingwood Abbot, Arthur Wellington Clark, James Atkins Noyes, Edward Tobey Barker, Walter Holbrook Draper, and Samuel Swett Green, have associated themselves with the intention of forming a corporation under the name of the Society of Colonial Wars in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, for the purpose of patriotic, antiquarian, and historical purposes, and have complied with the provisions of the Statutes of this Commonwealth in such case made and provided, as appears from the certificate of the Governor, Treasurer, Secretary, and Council of said corporation, duly approved by the Commissioner of Corporations, and recorded in this office:

Mow Cherefore, I, William M. Olin, Secretary of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, To Hereby Certify, that the said William F. Draper, Abijah Thompson, Walter Kendall Watkins, Walter Gilman Page, Francis Ellingwood Abbot, Arthur Wellington Clark, James Atkins Noyes, Edward Tobey Barker, Walter Holbrook Draper, and Samuel Swett Green, their associates and successors, are legally organized and established as and are hereby made an existing corporation under the name of the Society of Colonial Wars in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, with the powers, rights, and privileges, and subject to the limitations, duties, and restrictions which by law appertain thereto.

CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL SOCIETY.

PREAMBLE.

HEREAS, it is desirable that there should be adequate celebrations commemorative of the events of Colonial history happening from the settlement of Jamestown, Va., May 13, 1607, to the battle of Lexington, April 19, 1775,

THEREFORE, The Society of Colonial Wars has been instituted to perpetuate the memory of those events, and of the men who in military, naval, and civil positions of high trust and responsibility, by their acts or counsel, assisted in the establishment, defence, and preservation of the American Colonies, and were in truth the founders of this nation. With this end in view, it seeks to collect and preserve manuscripts, rolls, relics, and records; to provide suitable commemorations or memorials relating to the American Colonial period; and to inspire in its members the fraternal and patriotic spirit of their forefathers, and in the community respect and reverence for those whose public services made our freedom and unity possible.

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

The Society shall be known by the name and title of the "GENERAL SOCIETY OF COLONIAL WARS."

ARTICLE II.

MEMBERSHIP.

Any male person above the age of twenty-one years, of good moral character and reputation, shall be eligible to membership in the Society of Colonial Wars, who is lineally descended in the male or female line from an ancestor:

- (1) Who served as a military or naval officer, or as a soldier, sailor, or marine, or as a privateersman, under the authority of the Colonies which afterwards formed the United States, or in the forces of Great Britain which participated with those of the said Colonies in any wars in which the said Colonies were engaged, or in which they enrolled men, from the settlement of Jamestown, May 13, 1607, to the battle of Lexington, April 19, 1775; or
- (2) Who held office in any of the Colonies between the dates above mentioned, either as
- (a) Director-General, Vice-Director-General, or a member of the Council or legislative body in the Colony of New Netherlands;
- (b) Governor, Lieutenant or Deputy Governor, Lord Proprietor, member of the King's or Governor's Council or legislative body in the Colonies of New York, New Jersey, Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Delaware;
- (c) Lord Proprietor, Governor, Deputy-Governor, or member of the Council or of the legislative body in Maryland and the Carolinas;
 - (d) Governor, Deputy-Governor, Governor's Assist-

ant, or Commissioner to the United Colonies of New England, or member of the Council, body of Assistants, or legislative body in any of the New England Colonies.

One collateral representative of an ancestor such as above specified shall be eligible to membership, providing there be no existing lineal descendant, and provided that such person be the oldest collateral representative in the male line of such ancestor, or has filed with the Secretary-General of the Society written renunciation from all other persons having nearer claims to representation.

No State Society shall adopt any rule of eligibility for membership in the General Society which shall admit any person not eligible for membership in the General Society.

But any State Society may, except as to members transferred from another State Society, further restrict, at its discretion, the basis of eligibility for membership in its own Society.

ARTICLE III. GENERAL SOCIETY.

The General Society of Colonial Wars shall consist of the Societies now existing in the States of New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and District of Columbia, and such other Societies as may from time to time be duly organized and authorized by the General Society.

Whenever the word "State" occurs in this Constitution it shall be held to include within its meaning the territories of the United States, and the District of Columbia.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

The officers of the General Society of Colonial Wars shall be - a Governor-General, a Deputy Governor-General, from each State Society, a Secretary-General. a Deputy Secretary-General, a Treasurer-General, a Deputy Treasurer-General, a Registrar-General, a Historian-General, a Chaplain-General, a Chancellor-General, and a Surgeon-General. With the exception of the Deputy Governor-Generals the above officers shall be elected by a plurality vote of the delegates present at a General Assembly of the Society. Vacancies occurring by death or resignation may be filled by the General Council for the unexpired term. Each Deputy Governor-General shall be elected by a plurality vote of the delegates present in the General Assembly from the State from which said Deputy Governor is chosen. above officers shall serve until the next regular meeting of the General Assembly, or until their successors are duly chosen.

ARTICLE V.

MEETINGS.

The regular meetings of the General Society shall be termed "General Assemblies," and shall be held once every three years at such time and place as the preceding General Assembly may elect. Special General Assemblies may be held upon the order of the Governor-General, or upon the order of the Governors of three of the State Societies.

General Assemblies shall consist of the General Officers and five delegates from each State Society. Delegates or General Officers representing a majority of the State Societies shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and proceedings shall be in accordance

with parliamentary law. The order of business shall be:

First. The calling of the General Assembly to order by the Governor-General, or in his absence by the Secretary-General.

Second. Prayer by the Chaplain-General.

Third. The reading of minutes of the last General Assembly.

Fourth. Report from the Secretary-General.

Fifth. Report from the Treasurer-General.

Sixth. Reports from committees and officers.

Seventh. Unfinished business.

Eighth. New business.

Ninth. Reports from State Societies.

Tenth. Election of officers.

Eleventh. Benediction by the Chaplain-General.

The minutes of each Assembly shall be read before the final adjournment.

ARTICLE VI.

STATE SOCIETIES.

Each State Society shall annually transmit to the Secretary-General a circular letter stating the number of its members, general matters of interest, and any suggestions which may be deemed of advantage to the Society. Each State Society shall in the month of January in each year pay to the Treasurer-General the sum of twenty-five dollars.

ARTICLE VII.

POWERS OF THE GENERAL SOCIETY.

The General Society shall have sole power of action in the national as distinct from the State affairs of the organization. It shall have jurisdiction to pass upon all questions of eligibility referred to it by the RegistrarGeneral; but shall not otherwise interfere in the regulations or government of any State Society, unless by a plurality vote of the General Assembly, when the surrender of a State charter may be demanded, should an investigation show that such action is necessary for the welfare of the Societies at large. It shall have power to grant charters to States other than those in which the Society is already organized, provided that at least nine persons, duly qualified to be members, make such application. It shall issue the insignia, and the diploma of membership. It shall publish the year-book, with the coöperation of the several State Societies; and the cost shall be defrayed by the latter in proportion to their membership.

The General Council, which shall be composed of all the General Officers, shall exercise the powers of the General Society (except those of demanding State charters and of amending the Constitution) between meetings of the General Assembly, to which latter body it shall regularly report all its transactions.

ARTICLE VIII.

GOVERNOR-GENERAL.

The Governor-General, or in his absence a duly elected temporary presiding officer, shall preside at all General Assemblies and meetings of the General Council of the Society.

ARTICLE IX.

SECRETARY-GENERAL.

The Secretary-General shall be keeper of the Great Seal of the Society, and of the General Society flag, and of the diploma. He shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society and keep a record thereof. He shall have charge of the printing and publications of the Society. He shall give due notice of the time and place of the holding of all meetings of the General Assembly and of the General Council; and shall keep full record of their proceedings.

ARTICLE X.

TREASURER-GENERAL.

The Treasurer-General shall collect and keep the funds and securities of the Society, and deposit and invest them subject to the direction of the General Council. Out of these funds he shall pay such sums as may be ordered by the General Council. He shall keep a full account of his receipts and payments, and at each General Assembly, or when required by the General Council, shall render an account of the same. He shall be custodian of the die of the insignia, and may issue the insignia and rosettes.

For the faithful performance of his duty he may be required to give such security as the General Council may deem proper.

ARTICLE XI.

REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

It shall be the duty of each State Society to file with the Registrar-General a duplicate of the application of each member. The Registrar-General shall receive and file all duplicate applications upon which membership has been granted, with a list of all diplomas signed by him, and all documents which the Society may acquire. It shall also be his duty to submit to the General Council any application for membership which in his opinion does not fulfil the requirements of Article II. of this Constitution.

ARTICLE XII.

HISTORIAN-GENERAL.

The Historian-General shall keep a detailed record of all historical and commemorative celebrations of the General Society, and shall edit and prepare for publication such historical addresses, papers, and other documents as the Society may decide to publish.

ARTICLE XIII.

CHAPLAIN-GENERAL.

The Chaplain-General shall be an ordained minister of a Christian church, and it shall be his duty to officiate when called upon by the proper officers.

ARTICLE XIV.

CHANCELLOR-GENERAL.

The Chancellor-General shall be a lawyer duly admitted to the bar, and it shall be his duty to give legal opinion on matters affecting the Society when called upon by the proper officers.

ARTICLE XV.

SURGEON-GENERAL.

The Surgeon-General shall be a practising physician.

ARTICLE XVI.

GREAT SEAL.

The Great Seal of the General Society shall be: Within a beaded annulet, a title scroll, "1607, General Society of Colonial Wars, 1775;" and in base the motto, "Fortiter Pro Patria," surrounding diaper charged with nine mullets. Over all a shield, surmounted of the crown, bearing American Colonial seals quarterly of

nine: I. Virginia: Argent, a cross gules between four escutcheons each regally crowned proper; the first and fourth escutcheons France and England quarterly: second escutcheon, Scotland; third, Ireland, II. New York: Argent, a beaver bendways proper, on a bordure tenny, a belt of wampum of the first. III. Massachusetts: Azure, on a mount between two pine trees vert, an Indian, affronté or, belted with leaves of the second, holding in his dexter hand an arrow paleways, point downwards, and in his sinister hand a bow paleways, of the third; upon a scroll proper, issuing from his mouth, the legend "Come over and help us." IV. New Hampshire: Quarterly; first and fourth Grand Quarter of France and England; second, Scotland; third, Ireland; over all an escutcheon of pretence; azure billetee or. a lion rampant of the second, for Nassau. V. Connecticut: Argent, a dexter hand issuing out of clouds in dexter chief, holding a double scroll proper, fesseways, bearing the legend, "Sustinet qui transtulit;" in base, fifteen grape-vines, six, five, four, leaved and fructed proper. VI. Maryland: Quarterly; first and fourth, paly of six or and sable, a bend counterchanged, for Calvert; second and third, per fesse and per pale argent and gules, a cross bottony counterchanged, for Crossland (seal of Lord Baltimore). VII. Rhode Island: Azure, an anchor in pale or. VIII. New Jersey: Quarterly, first, England impaling Scotland; second, France; third, Ireland; fourth, per pale and per chevron; first, gules, two lions passant guardant in pale or, for Brunswick; second, or, semée of hearts, a lion rampant, azure, for Lunenburgh; third, gules, a horse courant, argent, for Westphalia; over all an inescutcheon gules, charged with the crown of Charlemagne. IX. Pennsylvania: Argent, on a fesse sable, three plates (arms of Penn.).

ARTICLE XVII.

INSIGNIA.

The insignia of the Society shall consist of a badge, pendant by a gold crown and ring, from a watered silk ribbon, one inch and a half wide of red, bordered with white and edged with red. The badge shall be surrounded by a laurel wreath in gold and shall consist of:

Obverse — A white enameled star of nine points, bordered with red enamel, having between each star-point a shield displaying an emblem of one of the nine original Colonies; and within a blue enameled garter, bearing the motto, "Fortiter Pro Patria," an Indian's head in gold relievo.

Reverse — The star above described, but with gold edge, each shield between the points displaying a mullet, and in the centre, within an annulet of blue, bearing the title, "Society of Colonial Wars, 1607–1775," the figure of a colonial soldier in gold relievo. The reverse of the crown of each insignia shall bear an engraved number, corresponding to that of the registered number of the member to whom such insignia has been issued.

The insignia shall be worn by the members on all occasions when they assemble as such, for any stated purpose or celebration, and may be worn on any occasion of ceremony. It shall be worn conspicuously on the left-breast; but members who are or have been Gentlemen of the Council of a State Society may place a rosette of regulation pattern upon the silk ribbon from which it is pendant. Members who are or have been General Officers, or officers of a State Society, may wear the insignia with three jewels in a crown, and suspended from a regulation ribbon around the neck. Members who are or have been Governors, Deputy-Governors, or Lieutenant-Governors of State Societies, or officers of the General Society, may, in addition to the insignia so suspended,

wear a ribbon of the Society's colors, three and one-half inches in width, extending from the right shoulder to the left hip. The insignia shall be worn only as above described.

ARTICLE XVIII.

DIPLOMA.

The diploma of this Society shall bear the following words:

GENERAL SOCIETY OF COLONIAL WARS.

To all whom it may concern:

Greeting. Know ye, this is to certify, that on the —— day of ——, in the year of our Lord ——, and in the year of this Society the ——, ————, Gentleman, was duly elected an Hereditary Member of the Society of Colonial Wars in the State of ——, by right of his descent from ————.

In witness whereof: We have hereunto signed our names and affixed the Great Seal of the General Society.

(Officers of the General Society.)

— Governor-General.

— Secretary-General.

— Registrar-General.

And countersigned by the Governor, Secretary, and Registrar of the State Society.

Bordering the top and left side of the diploma is an ornamental scroll-work, containing within the initial letter "G," of "General Society," a representation of Capt. Myles Standish and a band of colonial soldiery; the initial surmounted by the imperial crown of the British Empire, and having below it the motto of the Society. Ranged along the scroll are the shields bearing the arms of the original nine Colonies as emblazoned in the great

seal of the Society; and around these are emblems of Colonial warfare, with the flags of Sweden and New Netherlands and the rose, thistle, shamrock, and cornflower, — badges respectively of England, Scotland, Ireland, and Germany. At the centre, at top, is a cluster of Indian weapons and the head of a Sachem charged upon the fleur-de-lis of France.

ARTICLE XIX.

FLAG.

The flag of this Society shall consist of the red cross of Saint George on a white field, bearing in the centre the escutcheon of the General Society surmounted by the crown and surrounded by nine stars.

ARTICLE XX.

STATE-SECRETARIES.

It shall be competent for the General Council to appoint State Secretaries in States where no State Societies exist, with a view to represent the interest of this Society, and, if authorized to do so, to prepare for the organization of new State Societies. Such State Secretaries shall be subject to the direction and regulation of the General Council. Their appointment shall be for a limited time, not to exceed one year, but may be renewed. They may be removed for cause, and their office shall terminate upon the organization of, and grant of a charter to, a Society in their State. They shall communicate with and receive communications from the Society through the Secretary-General.

ARTICLE XXI.

MEMBERS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

The General Council shall elect to membership only charter members of new State Societies, whose member-

ship shall be *ipso facto* transferred to their own State Society with the grant of its charter. No State Society shall elect to membership persons resident within the territory of another State Society, except upon written consent given in advance by the Council of the latter Society. But members changing residence from one State to another, on coming within the jurisdiction of a new State Society, may at their option retain membership in the State Society in which they were originally admitted.

A member of any State Society may be admitted to membership by action of the Council of another State Society, within the bounds of which he is resident, upon satisfactory proof of his membership in good standing in the Society from which he comes, and subject to the rules and regulations of the Society he enters.

An initiation fee shall not be twice required.

ARTICLE XXII.

ALTERATIONS AND AMENDMENTS.

No alterations of, or amendments to, this Constitution shall be made unless proposed by the Council of a State Society in writing. The Secretary-General shall send a printed copy of the proposed amendment to each State Society, naming the time when and the place where it will be voted upon, and the voting shall take place in the General Assembly. Six months' notice shall be given to each Society. No amendment shall be made unless adopted by a two-thirds vote of the State Societies through their delegates in the General Assembly.

SOCIETY OF COLONIAL WARS

IN THE

Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

BY-LAWS.

SECTION I.

NAME OF THE SOCIETY.

The Society shall be known by the name, style, and title of "SOCIETY OF COLONIAL WARS IN THE COM-MONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS."

SECTION II.

OFFICERS.

The officers of the Society shall be a Governor, a Deputy-Governor, a Lieutenant-Governor, a Secretary, a Deputy-Secretary, a Treasurer, a Registrar, a Historian, a Genealogist, a Chaplain, a Chancellor, and a Surgeon; these shall be *ex-officio* members and constitute the Council, with nine other members elected for that purpose and chosen annually.

The Deputy Governor-General, the Society's representative in the General Society, shall also be *ex-officio* a member of the Council.

SECTION III.

INITIATION FEES AND DUES.

The initiation fee shall be five (5) dollars; the annual dues shall be five (5) dollars, both of which shall accompany the application of each intending member as a prerequisite to its consideration; ¹ provided, that any member who shall have been elected during the last three months of the fiscal year shall not be required to pay the annual dues for the current fiscal year. The payment at one time of fifty (50) dollars shall constitute a life membership, and exempt the member so paying from initiation fee and annual dues.

Any member, at his election to membership or subsequently, who may contribute one hundred dollars to the "permanent fund" of the Society shall be exempt from the payment of annual dues; and this exemption shall extend in perpetuity to his lineal successors in membership from the same propositus, one at a time, who may be selected for such exemption by the Society, said perpetual membership to be transmitted by the holder, subject to the approval of the Society.

The fiscal year shall begin on the sixteenth day of December, and close on the fifteenth day of December in each calendar year.

Prompt payment of the annual assessment is expected and will be required, and any member who shall be in arrears in payment of said dues for the space of three months, shall be liable to expulsion. If, at the end of six months, after proper notice, the dues shall yet remain unpaid, his membership shall, unless the delay be occasioned by absence abroad or valid reason, be forfeited without further notice.

SECTION IV.

GOVERNOR.

The Governor, or in his absence the Deputy-Governor, or Lieutenant-Governor or Chairman pro tempore, shall

preside at all Courts of the Society, and shall exercise the duties of a presiding officer under parliamentary rules, subject to an appeal to the Society. The Governor shall be a member *ex-officio* of all committees except the Nominating Committee and Committee on Membership.

He shall have power to convene the Council at his discretion, or upon the written request of two members of the Council, or upon the like request of five members of the Society.

SECTION V.

SECRETARY.

The Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society, and keep a record thereof. shall notify all elected candidates of their admission, and perform such other duties as the Society or his office may require. He shall have charge of the seal, certificates of incorporation, by-laws, historical and other documents and records of the Society other than those required to be deposited with the Registrar, and shall affix the seal to all properly authenticated certificates of membership and transmit the same to the members to whom they may be issued. He shall notify the Registrar of all admissions to membership. He shall certify all acts of the Society, and when required authenticate them under seal. He shall have charge of printing and publications issued by the Society. He shall give due notice of the time and place of the holding of all Courts of the Society and of the Council, and shall incorporate in said notice the names of all applicants for membership, to be voted on at said Council, and shall be present at the same. He shall keep fair and accurate records of all the proceedings and orders of the Society and of the Council, and shall give notice to each officer who may be

affected by them of all votes, resolutions, and proceedings of the Society or of the Council, and at the General Court or oftener shall report the names of those candidates who have been admitted to membership and those whose resignations have been accepted, and of those members who have been expelled for cause or for failure to substantiate claim of descent. In his absence from any meeting the Deputy-Secretary shall act, or a Secretary pro tempore may be designated therefor.

SECTION VI.

TREASURER.

The Treasurer shall collect and keep the funds and securities of the Society, and as often as those funds shall amount to one hundred dollars they shall be deposited in some bank in the city of Boston, which shall be designated by the Council, to the credit of the Society of Colonial Wars in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and such funds shall be drawn thence on the checks of the Treasurer for the purpose of the Society only. Out of these funds he shall pay such sums only as may be ordered by the Society or Council or his office may require. He shall keep a true account of his receipts and payments, and at each annual meeting render the same to the Society. For the faithful performance of his duty he may be required to give such security as the Society may deem proper.

SECTION VII.

REGISTRAR.

The Registrar shall receive from the Secretary and file all the proofs upon which membership has been granted, with a list of all diplomas countersigned by him, and all documents which the Society may obtain; and he, under the direction of the Council, shall make copies of such papers as the owners may not be willing to leave in the keeping of the Society.

SECTION VIII.

HISTORIAN.

The Historian shall keep a detailed record of all historical and commemorative celebrations of the Society, and he shall edit and prepare for publication such historical addresses, papers, and other documents as the Society may see fit to publish; also a necrological list for each year, with biographies of deceased members.

SECTION IX.

GENEALOGIST.

The Genealogist shall investigate all applications for membership, and shall pass upon all claims for supplementals, and shall report the result of his investigations to the Committee on Membership. He shall be a member of this committee and of the Council. He may receive such salary or compensation as the Council shall determine, and shall be exempt from annual assessment.

SECTION X.

CHANCELLOR.

The Chancellor shall be a lawyer duly admitted to the bar, and it shall be his duty to give legal opinion on matters affecting the Society when called upon by the proper officers.

SECTION XI.

SURGEON.

The Surgeon shall be a practising physician.

SECTION XII.

CHAPLAIN.

The Chaplain shall be an ordained minister of a Christian church, and it shall be his duty to officiate when called upon by the proper officers.

SECTION XIII.

THE COUNCIL.

The Council shall have power to call special Courts of the Society and arrange for celebrations by the Society. They shall have control and management of the affairs and funds of the Society. They shall perform such duties as shall be prescribed by the Constitution and By-Laws, but they shall at no time be required to take any action or contract any debt for which they shall be liable. They may accept the resignation of any member of the Society. They may meet as often as required, or at the call of the Governor. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; at the General Court they shall submit to the Society a report of their proceedings during the past year. The Council shall have the power to drop from the roll the name of any member of the Society who shall be in arrears at least three months in payment of annual dues. If, at the end of six months, after proper notice, the dues shall yet remain unpaid, the Council, unless the delay be occasioned by absence abroad, or valid reason, shall proceed to drop such delinquent member, or members, without further notice. He may be restored to membership at any time by the Council upon his written application and the payment of all such arrears from the date when he was dropped to the date of his restoration. The Council may suspend any officer for cause, which must be reported to the Society, and action taken on the same within thirty days.

BY-LAWS.

SECTION XIV.

VACANCIES AND TERMS OF OFFICE.

Whenever an officer of this Society shall die, resign, or neglect to serve, or be suspended, or be unable to perform his duties by reason of absence, sickness, or other cause, and whenever an office shall be vacant which the Society shall not have filled by an election, the Council shall have power to appoint a member to such office pro tempore, who shall act in such capacity until the Society shall elect a member to the vacant office, or until the inability due to said cause shall cease; provided, however, that the office of Governor or Secretary shall not be filled by the Council when there shall be a Deputy or Lieutenant-Governor, or Deputy-Secretary, to enter on the duties.

The Council may supply vacancies among its members under the same conditions, and should any member other than an officer be absent from three consecutive Councils of the same, his place may be declared vacant by the Council and filled by appointment until an election of a successor.

Subject to these provisions, all officers and gentlemen of the Council shall from the time of election continue in their respective offices until the next General Court, or until their successors are chosen.

SECTION XV.

RESIGNATION.

No resignation of any member shall become effective unless consented to by the Council.

SECTION XVI.

DISQUALIFICATIONS.

No person who may be enrolled as a member of this Society shall be permitted to continue in membership

when his proofs of descent or eligibility shall be found to be defective. The Council, after thirty days' notice to such person to substantiate his claim, and upon his failure satisfactorily to do so, may require the Secretary to erase his name from the membership list. The said person shall have a right to appeal to the Society at its next Court, or at the General Court. If the said appeal be sustained by a two-thirds vote of the members present at such Court, the said person's name shall be restored to said membership list.

SECTION XVII.

MEMBERSHIP.

Any male person above the age of twenty-one years, of good moral character and reputation, shall be eligible to membership in the Society of Colonial Wars who is lineally descended in the male or female line from an ancestor:

- (1) Who served as a military or naval officer, or as a soldier, sailor, or marine, or as a privateersman, under authority of the Colonies which afterwards formed the United States, or in the forces of Great Britain which participated with those of the said Colonies in any wars in which the said Colonies were engaged, or in which they enrolled men, from the settlement of Jamestown, May 13, 1607, to the battle of Lexington, April 19, 1775; or
- (2) Who held office in any of the Colonies between the dates above mentioned, either as
- (a) Director-General, Vice Director-General, or member of the Council or legislative body in the Colony of New Netherlands;
- (b) Governor, Lieutenant or Deputy Governor, Lord Proprietor, member of the King's or Governor's Council

or legislative body in the Colonies of New York, New Jersey, Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Delaware;

- (c) Lord Proprietor, Governor, Deputy-Governor, or member of the Council or of the legislative body in Maryland and the Carolinas;
- (d) Governor, Deputy-Governor, Governor's Assistant, or Commissioner to the United Colonies of New England, or member of the Council, body of Assistants, or legislative body in any of the New England Colonies.

Every application for membership shall be made in writing on blanks furnished by the Secretary, subscribed by the applicant, and approved by two members of the Society over their signatures.

Applications shall be accompanied by proofs of eligibility, and such applications and proofs shall be referred to the Committee on Membership, who shall carefully investigate the same and report at the next meeting their recommendation thereon. Members shall be elected by ballot at a meeting of the Council after report by the Committee on Membership, but a negative vote of one in five of the ballots cast shall cause the rejection of such candidate. Payment of the initiation fee and dues, and subscription to the declaration contained in the By-Laws of the Society, shall be a prerequisite of membership.

Every applicant for membership shall declare upon honor that he has not failed of admission in any other State Society, and that he will use his best efforts to promote the purposes of the Society and will observe the Constitution and By-Laws of the same.

SECTION XVIII.

COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP.

The Committee on Membership shall consist of five members. They shall be chosen by ballot at the General

Court of the Society, and shall be elected for the period of one year. Three members shall constitute a quorum, and a negative vote of two members shall cause an adverse report to the Council on the candidate's application. The proceedings of the Committee shall be secret and confidential; and a candidate who has been rejected by the Council shall be ineligible for membership for a space of one year from date of rejection, except upon the unanimous vote of the Committee.

The Committee shall have power to make By-Laws for its government, and for other purposes not inconsistent with the Constitution or By-Laws of the Society.

SECTION XIX.

EXPULSION OR SUSPENSION.

Any member for cause or conduct detrimental or antagonistic to the interest or purposes of the Society, or for just cause, may be suspended or expelled from the Society. But no member shall be expelled or suspended unless written charges be presented against such member to the Council.

The Council shall give reasonable notice of such charges, and afford such member reasonable opportunity to be heard and refute the same. The Council, after hearing such charges, may recommend to the Society the expulsion or suspension of such member, and if the recommendation of the Council be adopted by a majority vote of the members of the Society present at such Court, he shall be so expelled or suspended, and the insignia of said member shall thereupon be returned to the Treasurer of the Society, and his rights therein shall be extinguished or suspended. The Treasurer shall refund to the said member the amount paid for the said insignia.

SECTION XX.

COURTS.

The General Court of the Society shall be held on the anniversary of the Landing of the Pilgrims, December 21, 1620. Business Courts shall be held monthly, except during the months of June, July, August, and September.

Special Courts may be called by the Governor at such times as in his opinion the interests of the Society may demand, and must be called by the Secretary on the written request of three members. All notice of meetings shall be sent out at least six days before the date of the meeting.

At all meetings fifteen members shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

At each Court of the Society, General or Special, immediately after the presiding officer shall have taken the chair, the minutes of the previous meeting shall be read by the Secretary, and passed upon by the Society; the next business in order shall be reports of officers and committees; then new business.

SECTION XXI.

SERVICE OF NOTICE.

It shall be the duty of every member to inform the Secretary by written communication of his place of residence and of any change thereof, and of his post-office address. Service of any notice, under the Constitution or By-Laws, on any member, addressed to his last residence or post-office address, forwarded by mail, shall be efficient service of notice.

SECTION XXII.

CERTIFICATE OF MEMBERSHIP.

Members may receive a certificate of membership, which shall be signed by the Governor, Secretary, and Registrar.

SECTION XXIII.

ALTERATION OR AMENDMENT.

No alteration or amendment of the By-Laws shall be made unless notice shall have been duly given in writing, signed by the member proposing the same, at a Court of the Society.

The Secretary shall send a printed copy of the proposed amendment to the members of the Society, and state the Court at which the same will be voted upon. No amendment or alteration shall be made unless adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members present at the Court voting upon the same.

SECTION XXIV.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE.

The Society shall, at a meeting held in the month of November in each year, elect by ballot a Nominating Committee of five members, none of whom shall be officers or members of the Council. It shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to select the name of a candidate for each office to be filled at the ensuing annual meeting, and to notify the Secretary of the Society of the names selected at least fifteen days before the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to mail to each member of the Society, at least ten days before the annual meeting, a copy of the report of the Nominating Committee.

SECTION XXV.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The officers, members of the Council, and Committee on Membership, shall be elected at the General Court by ballot. A plurality of the votes cast for each officer shall determine a choice thereof, and said officers, members of the Council, and Committee on Membership, shall hold office for the period of one year, or until their successors shall be duly elected and qualified.

SECTION XXVI.

FLAG.

The flag shall consist of the red cross of Saint George on a white field, bearing in the centre the seal of Massachusetts Bay Colony — Azure, on a mount between two pine trees vert, an Indian, affronté or, belted with leaves of the second, holding in his dexter hand an arrow paleways, point downwards, and in his sinister hand a bow paleways, of the third; upon a scroll proper, issuing from his mouth, the legend, "Come over and help us"—surrounded by a title scroll, "Sigillum: Gub: et: Societ: de: Mattachusets: Bay: in: Nova: Anglia:"—surmounted by the crown.

SECTION XXVII.

DELEGATES TO THE GENERAL SOCIETY.

There shall be chosen at every annual meeting five delegates and five alternates to the General Society.

SECTION XXVIII.

FORMATION OF LOCAL SOCIETIES.

When ten or more members of the Society shall be resident of a city or town of the Commonwealth of

Massachusetts, one of their number may be appointed Local Secretary. Subject to the regulation and direction of the Council, a Local Secretary may, in conjunction with the members locally resident, arrange local commemorations of men and events of Colonial History, and attend to such other matters as by the Council may be expressly committed to him from time to time. He shall communicate with and receive communications from the Council through the Secretary.

SECTION XXIX.

SEAL.

The seal shall be: In the centre the seal of Massachusetts Bay Colony — Azure, on a mount between two pine trees vert, an Indian, affronté or, belted with leaves of the second, holding in his dexter hand an arrow paleways, point downwards, and in his sinister hand a bow paleways of the third; upon a scroll proper, issuing from his mouth, the legend, "Come over and help us:"—surrounded by a title scroll, "Society . of . Colonial . Wars . of . Massachusetts: 1620 . 1775 . 1893:"—surmounted by the crown.



The General Society requires a registration fee of one (1) dollar for each original application for membership, and a similar fee of fifty (50) cents for each supplemental claim. These fees must accompany the application in each case.

EVENTS IN THE HISTORY OF THE SOCIETY.

1899.



ANUARY 25. At a special court held at Young's Hotel, Mr. Walter Kendall Watkins, Genealogist of the Society, read a paper on "The Expedition to the Spanish West Indies under Admiral Vernon, in

1740-41." Capt. Albert A. Folsom, of the Council, read a copy of a letter from Maj. Alexander Monypenny to Maj.-Gen. Sir Jefferey Amherst, commander-in-chief of the forces at the time. Dr. James Brown Thornton, of the Society, presented it with an engraving of Samuel Sewall, at the age of 77, in 1728.

FEBRUARY 22. A service commemorative of Washington was held in Saint Paul's Church, in Boston. As the service was unusually interesting and impressive, and there was a desire to see the address of Bishop Lawrence in print, it was thought best to include an account of the service, with the address, in the year-book of 1899, rather than to defer it for its chronological place in this year-book. It is, therefore, to be found there.

MARCH 30. At a special court held at Young's Hotel, Rev. Eugene J. V. Huiginn, of Beverly, read a paper on Roger Conant. APRIL 28. At a special court held at Young's Hotel, Edmund M. Wheelwright, Esq., read a paper on Col. John Wheelwright, of Wells, Me.

MAY 31. At a special court held at Young's Hotel, Rev. George Hodges, D.D., of the Society, read a paper on Capt. Miles Standish.

JUNE 17. A field-day for members only was enjoyed at the Sweetwater Hotel, Bedford Springs. Dinner was served at two o'clock, and was wholly informal, there being no addresses.

NOVEMBER 21. At a special court held at Young's Hotel, Moses Greeley Parker, M.D., of the Society, read a paper on "American Physicians and Surgeons in the Revolutionary War and after, 1776–1899." Dr. Charles M. Green spoke upon the subject and upon Dr. John Brooks, of Reading, afterward Governor, known as "Honest John." Mr. Walter Kendall Watkins exhibited bills rendered by Dr. Clark to Paul Revere for medical services.


DECEMBER 21. The Seventh Annual Court for the election of officers and transaction of business was held at Young's Hotel at 3 o'clock. The Governor presented the invitation of the American Historical Association to such as felt interested to join the Association, and to all to attend the meetings to be held during the coming week in Boston on the occasion of the annual meeting of the Association. At 7 o'clock the members to the number of nearly two hundred assembled at Pierce Hall, Copley Square, where the annual dinner was held.

Governor Sowdon presided and, after an introductory address, presented as the speakers of the evening His

Excellency Roger Wolcott, Governor of the Commonwealth and a member of the Society; Rt. Rev. William Lawrence, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese and Chaplain of the Society; Rev. George A. Gordon, D.D., Pastor of the Old South Church; Hon. Charles S. Hamlin, Lieutenant-Governor of the Society; Thornton K. Lothrop, Esq., Vice-President of the Society of the Cincinnati; Capt. N. M. Dyer, U. S. N., of the "Baltimore," and Capt. Joseph G. Eaton, U. S. N., of the "Resolute" and a member of the Society.

The Governor has during the year represented the Society upon the following occasions: At the opening of the new building of the Massachusetts Historical Society; at the Triennial Meeting of the Society of Colonial Wars, at Baltimore; at the unveiling of a soldiers' monument at Pepperell, Mass.; at the meeting and dinner of the General Council in New York; at the commemoration, by the Sons of the American Revolution, of the Centennial of the death of Washington; and at the reception, by the Society of the Daughters of the Revolution in the Hancock Tavern, to commemorate the one hundred and twenty-sixth anniversary of the throwing overboard of the tea in Boston Harbor. He was also invited to serve upon the Honorary Reception Committee for the annual meeting in Boston of the American Historical Association.









MASSACHUSETTS IN THE INTENDED EX-PEDITION TO CANADA IN 1746.

HE success of the capture of Louisburg, in 1745, stimulated Governor Shirley's ambition, and he proposed to George II. a new attempt upon Canada, a conquest of all New France.

The expedition was to be composed of twenty-

five hundred troops from Pennsylvania, twenty-one hundred each from Virginia and Connecticut, forty-five hundred each from Massachusetts and New York. This proposal was favorably received at court, and the Duke of Newcastle sent instructions to the governors of all the English colonies north of Carolina to make a levy of troops. The colonies voted to raise eighty-two hundred men, of which Massachusetts was to furnish thirty-five hundred. A fleet and force of regular soldiers were to be sent from England. The New England troops were to make their way to Quebec by the St. Lawrence, and those from the southern colonies by Lake Champlain and Montreal.

On the 26th May, 1746, His Majesty's Sloop, "Hicking-brook," Captain Townley commander, arrived in Boston Harbor from England with letters dated Whitehall, April 9, 1746, and June 2, 1746. Governor Shirley issued the proclamation, which is printed in fac-simile.

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New Hampshire voted to raise 1,000 men, Connecticut 600, Rhode Island 400 (300 land forces and 100 for sloop of war).

Connecticut increased her levy to 1;000, and within the past year there has been discovered in the Public Record Office in London a volume of muster rolls of the regiment, officered as follows: Elisha Williams, colonel; Samuel Talcott, lieutenant-colonel; Israel Hewitt, major; John Darling, adjutant; Normand Morrison, quartermaster, and Rev. Ashbel Woodbridge, chaplain.

The ten companies were under Col. Elisha Williams, of Wethersfield; Lieut.-Col. Samuel Talcott, of Hartford; Maj. Israel Hewitt, of New London; Capt. James Church, of Hartford; Capt. Josiah Starr, of Fairfield; Capt. Benjamin Lee, of Plainfield; Capt. Robert Denison, of New London; Capt. William Whiting, of Lebanon; Capt. Elihu Hall, of Wallingford, and Capt. Joseph Wooster, of Stratford.

Of the rolls of the Massachusetts troops there are no copies in the archives of the State. That the originals or copies were forwarded to England to be paid by the home government is doubtful.

Of the expedition of the previous year to Louisburg, but a single roll was forwarded, that of Captain Baker's company. The reimbursement for the expenses of this expedition by Parliament was not accomplished till Sept. 18, 1749, when there arrived in Boston 653,000 ounces of silver and 10 tons of copper in coin. The four years' delay was partially accounted for by the non-receipt of other than the one roll mentioned above; when others were requested the fire of Dec. 9, 1747, had destroyed the courthouse, with all the books of the General Court, Governor and Council, House of Representatives, and all books of commissions and other instruments from the Crown, with most of the original papers. (Letter, received April 26, 1748, Public Record Office, London.) A more particular account of the fire, taken from contemporary newspapers, follows:

Yesterday morning between 6 & 7 o'clock we were exceedingly surprised by a most terrible Fire, which broke out at the Court House in this Town, whereby that spacious and beautiful Building except the bare outside Walls, was entirely destroyed. As the Fire began in the middle or second

Story, the Records, Books, Papers, Furniture, Pictures of the Kings and Queens, &c., which were in the Council Chamber, the Chamber of the House of Representatives and the Apartments thereof, in that Story, were consumed; as were also the Books and Papers in the Offices of the upper Story: Those in the Offices below were mostly saved. In the Cellars which were hired by several persons, a great quantity of Wines and others Liquors were lost. The publick Damage sustain'd by this sad Disaster is inexpressibly great and the loss to some particular Persons, 'tis said will amount to several Thousand Pounds. The Vehemence of the Flames occasion'd such a great Heat as to set the Roofs of some of the opposite houses on Fire notwith-standing they had been covered with snow, and it was extinguished with much Difficulty. How the Fire was occasion'd, whether by Defects in the Chimney or Hearth as some think, is uncertain. — "Boston Weekly News Letter," Thursday, Dec. 10, 1747.

The account in the "Boston Evening Post," for the fourteenth of December, adds:

The fine Pictures and other Furniture in the Council Chamber were destroyed as were also the Books, Papers and Records in both the Lobbies, and those in the Offices kept in the upper Story; but the County Records and Papers belonging to the Inferiour Court, being deposited in an Office upon the lower Floor, were most of them preserved.

From the papers of Col. Joseph Dwight 1 we have obtained the names of a greater part of the men composing the regiment raised by Colonel Dwight.

The original of this list is a manuscript of forty pages, and it is evidently a schedule of forty-one vouchers delivered by Colonel

¹ Brigadier-General Joseph Dwight was born in Dedham, Mass., Oct. 16, 1703, and was the son of Henry and Lydia Dwight. He graduated at Harvard College in 1722, and married, Aug. 11, 1726, Mary, daughter of Col. John and Bathua (Taylor) Pynchon, of Enfield. He resided from 1723 to 1731 in Cambridge and then removed to Brookfield, where he practised law for twenty-two years, and represented the town as a representative to the General Court in 1731, '3, '4-'6, '8, '9, '48, '9, '51, '7, and also as councillor from 1742 to 1746. He was speaker of the house in 1749; Oct. 5, 1730, was made judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas of Worcester County; Jan. 4, 1753 of Hampshire County, and June 24, 1761, of Berkshire County, till his decease, June 19, 1765. In 1752 he removed to Stockbridge as trustee of the Indian schools; in 1758 he resided at Upper Sheffield, or Great Barrington, and issued the call for the meeting which resulted in the formation of that town. Mary, his wife, died March 29, 1751, and he married in August, 1752, Abigail, widow of Rev. John Seargeant, missionary to the Indians. Joseph Dwight became a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company in 1734, and was its captain in 1743. He was commissioned Feb. 20, 1744/5, colonel of the train of artillery from Massachusetts at Louisburg, and also brigadier-general. In 1756 he led a brigade of Massachusetts militia to Lake Champlain.

Dwight to Governor Shirley, April 28, 1749, which cannot now be found in the Massachusetts archives, and which have been forwarded to England in anticipation of the money expected. The amounts and a few items have been omitted from the copy which follows.

¹Col. William Williams, of Deerfield and Pittsfield, was born 1713, and was grandson of the Rev. William and Elizabeth (Cotton) Williams, of Hatfield, and son of Rev. William and Hannah (Stoddard) Williams, of Weston.

He graduated at Harvard in 1729 and went into business in Boston, but failed. While in Boston he served in one or two of the minor town offices, and was a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co., 1733, and held the position of fourth sergeant in 1736.

An ensign under General Oglethorpe at St. Augustine, he was also with Admiral Vernon's expedition in 1740. He came to Deerfield about 1743 and became lieutenantcolonel of the Northern Hampshire Regiment in 1745. He raised a company for the Louisburg expedition of that year, but did not arrive until after the reduction, and became part of the garrison which held it until spring. He was in charge of the detachment which rebuilt Fort Massachusetts, but refused command and was made commissary for supplying the line of forts; this he resigned in 1748. He held the office of selectman of Deerfield, 1751, and removed to Pittsfield about 1754, where he built a house which became Fort Anson. He served from 1755 to 1758 as captain in Sir William Pepperrell's regiment, and in the latter year was colonel under Abercrombie and at the end of the campaign retired on half pay. He was justice of the peace 1748, judge of common pleas 1761, and judge of probate 1765. In Pittsfield he held almost continually some town office, until the Revolution, when he became a Tory. He married (1) Miriam, daughter of Andrew and Miriam (Pepperell) Tyler, Boston; (2) Sarah, daughter of Thomas and Sarah (Hawks) Wells, of Deerfield; (3) Hannah, daughter of Samuel and Hannah (Field) Dickinson, of Deerfield. Colonel Williams died April 5, 1784, leaving five children.

¹ Col. Ephraim Williams, born in Newton Aug. 21, 1691, was the son of Capt. Isaac and Judith (Hunt) Williams. He was a justice of the peace 1735 and selectman of Newton for seven years. In 1739 he removed to Stockbridge. His appointment as major is referred to in the letter written by Governor Shirley, Aug. 2, 1746 (page 73).

He married (1) Elizabeth, daughter of Abraham and Elizabeth (Biscoe) Jackson, of Newton; (2) Abigail, daughter of Capt. Josiah and Abigail (Barnes) Jones, of Watertown. By his first wife he had Major Ephraim Williams, the founder of Williams College, who fell on the "Bloody Morning Scout" near Lake George, Sept. S, 1755; and Lieut. Col. Thomas Williams, a prominent surgeon and judge. Major Williams was appointed judge of the common pleas July 21, 1741, and resigned in 1749. His homestead was on the "Hill" in Stockbridge, where he resided until his bitter opposition to Rev. Jonathan Edwards led to his sale of all his Stockbridge property and removal to Deerfield, where he died Aug. 11, 1754.

1 Capt. Elijah Williams, born Nov. 13, 1712, was son of Rev. John and Abigail (Allen) Williams, of Deerfield. The father was the "Redeemed Captive," the author of a work which has passed through a dozen editions, in which he gives a narrative of his own capture and redemption from the French and Indians. The father served the town of Deerfield for forty-three years as its minister, and the son was no less faithful in serving twenty-five years as town clerk and also as selectman, while for seventeen years he represented the town in the General Court and was judge of common pleas 1761-3. He graduated from Harvard in 1732, and was a civil engineer, though he also kept a store, which stood on the site of the Dickinson Academy. He also was in trade and town clerk 1749-1751 at Enfield, Conn. He was prominent and active in military affairs, and was major and assistant commissary in the last French war. He died July 10, 1771. May 25, 1735, he married Lydia, daughter of Capt. Henry Dwight, of Hatfield, who died at Enfield, Jan. 25, 1749. On Jan. 1, 1750, he married Margaret, daughter of Col. William and Catherine (Brown) Pynchon, who died April 15, 1772, aged forty-five. His son Elijah (Harvard College, 1764) was a Tory and settled in Nova Scotia, but returned to Massachusetts. His son John was also a Tory, but held office as Register of Deeds for Hampshire in 1787.

¹ Gen. Seth Pomeroy, born May 20, 1706, was the son of Ebenezer and Mary (King) Pomeroy, of Northampton, a captain in 1744, he was commissioned Feb. 24, 1744/5, a major, and was captain in the Third Company in Col. Samuel Willard's regiment (Fourth Massachusetts) at the siege of Louisburg that year. As lieutenant-colonel of Ephraim Williams' regiment, he succeeded him on his death at the battle, with Dieskau, at Lake George, in September, 1755.

At the breaking out of the Revolution he was a delegate of the Provincial Congress of October, 1774, from Northampton, and was a member of several important committees of that session, and on Oct. 27, 1774, was chosen third in command of the Massachusetts forces. He was also a member of the Second Congress of February, 1775, and was chosen a brigadier-general. He served at the battle of Bunker Hill as a private soldier, and was appointed a few days later by Congress senior brigadier, but there being discussion as to relative rank he retired to his home. In 1776, when the British were in New Jersey, he headed the militia of his neighborhood and marched to the Hudson river. He died in this campaign at Peekskill, N.Y., Feb. 19, 1777. He was an ingenious mechanic and manufacturer of arms. He married, Dec. 14, 1732, Mary, daughter of Jonathan and Martha (Williams) Hunt.

She survived him and died Sept. 11, 1777, in her 72d year. They had nine children; among the sons were Rev. Seth, of Greenfield Hill, Conn.; Dr. Medad, of Warwick; and Lemuel, who was forty years in the Massachusetts Legislature.

"A State of the Pay of the Non-Commission Officers & Private Men of Capt. Seth Pomroy's Company in the Regiment of Foot of which the Honbe. Brigr. Gent. On this roll appear the names of Benjamin Bartlett, Partridge Bull, Elisha Hackley, Ebenezer Kellogg, Harmon Peters and Benoni Strong, that do not appear in Colonel Dwight's list.

The date of enlistment is given for each man, the earliest being June 18 and the latest August 21, the majority being in July.

He settled in Dudley and was commissioned captain of the Eighth Massachusetts Regiment at Louisburg, June 20, 1745. He was representative to the Provincial Congress Sept. 19, 1774, and Jan. 2, 1775. He died April 30, 1777. He married Sarah, daughter of John and Sarah (Squiers) Fessenden.

² Capt. William Brintnall, of Rutland, was the son of Thomas and Hannah (Willard) Brintnall, of Framingham. He was a graduate of Yale College in 1721, and Dec. 19, 1729, he married Zerviah, daughter of Col. Joseph and Martha (Sharp) Buckminster. He taught school in Sudbury and also in Rutland. In August, 1725, he was ordered to the command of some troops to protect Rutland. He also resided at Saybrook and Middletown, Conn. BOSTON August 2, 1746

SIR, I have [recd. your Letter of the 29th. of the last month, and am glad to hear that the Levies go on so well in your Parts. As you observe I have ordered by publick Advertisement that the Soldiers forthwith march to Boston, that so they may there get ready as soon as may be for Embarkation; But I think it proper to alter my Measures with respect to those that are raised in the Counties of Hampshire and Worcester, in part for the Reason you mention, vizt. That if finally they should proceed by Land their coming to Boston will be both unnecessary & inconvenient; and therefore I shall send you up a Commission for viewing & mustering the Soldiers raised in the County of Worcester, & another to Colo. Stoddard for mustering those in the County of Hampshire. I should be glad you would undertake the Business yourself; but if you find it inconvenient, fill up the Commission to some able & sufficient Person: & let the Lists taken of such as pass the Muster be sent down to me as soon as may be, & the Troops in the mean time be in readiness to march to Boston at an Hour's Warning if I should send for 'em. If the Troops should be delayed a little longer, I am afraid the Season will be over for going by Sea, unless it be in Expectation of continuing at Canada over the Winter, weh. I cannot at present determine upon. I have stated the allowance for Cloathing at thirty Pounds old Tenor; Those that cannot or incline not to furnish themselves will be supplied with what I have ordered to be provided here: As to Blankets & Arms I have not yet determined what is proper to be given as an Equivalent to those that find themselves. I would have it certified in the Lists of Musters who are sufficiently furnished with warm Cloathing, Blankets & Arms, & expect to be paid in Bills for them; and they shall be paid before they march upon Service. As to the Appointment of a Major for your Regiment, thô I believe Cpt. Williams is a Gentleman very capable of that Post, yet Major Pomroy's having served in the late Expedition, & behaved well (by all that ever I could hear) it would have added considerable weight to his Pretensions, but if the Officers & Soldiers are like to be uneasy with his being put in that Station (as you suggest) I shall grant the Commⁿ. to Cpt Williams.

I must press you in the strongest manner to proceed to muster the men without a moments Loss of time, & to take particular Care that they should be ready to proceed to Boston within an hours warning or at the shortest notice that is possible.

I had ordered Col^o. Chandlers Brother who was a Lieut^t. Colonel at Louisbourg, to march the Men that he shall have raised, the beginning of next Week for Boston: But you will take Care to let him know that the Men are to be muster'd in the Country, & stop him 'till further Orders.

¹Col. John Chandler was born Oct. 18, 1693, in New London, Conn., and was the son of Hon. John and Mary Chandler, of Woodstock, Conn. He married (1) Hannah, daughter of John Gardiner; she died Jan. 5, 1738/9; (2) Jan. 28, 1739/40, Sarah, daughter of Timothy Clarke, of Boston. At an early age he was employed in the office of the province treasurer of Massachusetts and in the office of the secretary of Connecticut. He was representative from Worcester from 1725–1736, 738 to 740, and 1742, a councillor 1743–62, judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas for Worcester 1754–62, its chief justice 1757–62, judge of probate 1757–62, commissioner to Albany in 1754, and colonel in the Crown Point expedition in 1756. He was early employed as a surveyor, and in 1714 was one of the surveyors to run the boundary line between Massachusetts and Connecticut. 



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SUTTON.

Sept. 24th—On Monday night we had an alarm of the French invading Boston. My thoughts were that I would freely have gone with those that went down—I thought I should not be daunted by the most dangerous attendants of a Campaign. went ye next day four miles with them.—Dr. David Hall's Diary.

While preparations were being made intelligence came from Nova Scotia of hostile movements there of the French (who numbered not less than twenty thousand), and of their Indian allies, and what was more serious, information was received of the approach of a French fleet far more formidable than had ever appeared in Western waters. A great expedition had been gotten up by the French court.

An alarm was sounded and the militia of the Province called to a rendezvous at Boston. Of their numbers we may judge by the following list extracted from the accounts of the Treasurer of the Province, showing the amounts paid each company. The disappearance of the rolls of names must be laid to the fire which also destroyed the rolls of the Louisburg expedition of the previous year. A few rolls have been preserved in the archives of the Commonwealth, and some have been found in private hands, and there are doubtless others in existence.

Phineas married in 1734 a cousin Elizabeth Stevens, of Petersham. He was an early settler of Charlestown, N.H. He was commissioned lieutenant in 1743, and captain 1745. He was sent twice to Canada to negotiate release of captives, and after an active military life he died of a fever at Chenecto, April 6, 1756. His journal of an expedition in 1749 is in N.H. Hist. Coll., v., 199.

Estes Hatch was a resident of Dorchester, held the different military offices, and was a captain of the 10th Co., 3d Mass. Regt., at Louisburg, 1745, and later colonel of the Suffolk Regiment. He was chosen a councillor in 1741, but was negatived by the governor. He became a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co. in 1711.

She died in 1747, at Medford. Robert Oliver owned 120 acres at Nonsuch, St. Philip's Parish, Antigua, and inherited So acres more from an uncle Robert. He was member of the Assembly from Nonsuch in 1725. He removed to Dorchester, Mass., about 1738. Robert Oliver was captain of the Independent Company of Dorchester. Col. Robert Oliver died in Dorchester, Dec. 16, 1762. His son Thomas Oliver, born Jan. 5, 1733/4, at Antigua, and not in Dorchester as stated in the history of Dorchester, and by Drake and other authorities, was a graduate of Harvard in 1753, and was published for marriage, May 17, 1760, to Elizabeth, daughter of Col. John Vassal, and by her had several children. About 1766 he moved from Dorchester to Cambridge, and erected the mansion afterward occupied by Gov. Gerry and James Russell Lowell. He was the last royal lieutenant-governor, and left Boston on its evacuation in 1776, and went to England, where he died at Bristol, Nov. 20, 1815, and is buried in St. Paul, Bristol.

¹Capt. Jonathan Peck was born in Bristol, Sept. 12, 169S, and was a son of Jonathan and Elizabeth (Throop) Peck, of Bristol. He married (1) Hannah Wood, of Little Compton; (2) Hannah Lain. He died Feb. 25, 1757. He was chosen the first deputy from Bristol after the town became a part of Rhode Island.

² John Hawks, b. Dec. 5, 1707, at Deerfield, was a son of Eliezer and Judith (Smead) Hawks. He married Dec. 10, 1730, Elizabeth, daughter of John Nims. He was stationed at Fort Massachusetts under Capt. Ephraim Williams, where he was wounded May 9, 1746. As sergeant he was in command of the fort, with a garrison of twenty-two men, when it was assaulted by 700 French and Indians under Vandreuil, and after a defence of twenty-eight hours surrendered for lack of ammunition. He afterward rose to be lieutenant-colonel, and died in 1784.

The accounts presented in the previous pages go to show the expense to the province of the intended expedition, and the attempt at defence of its seaboard. The mother country was called upon to reimburse her colony. It was not, however, till after the arrival of the specie at Boston, to pay for the expense of the capture and maintenance of Louisburg, that progress with the government on certain claims was pushed with vigor.

² George Montagu Dunk, Earl of Hallifax, Viscount Sundbury and Baron of Hallifax, was the son of George Montagu, Earl of Hallifax by his second wife, Mary, daughter of the Earl of Scarborough. He succeeded his father on his death May 9, 1739. In 1745 he was master of the Buck hounds, and on the breaking out of the Rebellion of that year raised a regiment of foot. Nov. 1, 1748, he was appointed first Lord Commissioner of Trade and the Plantations; Jan. 11, 1748-49, sworn of the Privy Council. July 16, 1749, he was made Lord Lieutenant of the County of Northampton, and in 1761 Governor of Ireland. The next year he was First Lord of the Admiralty and then principal Secretary of State. He was son of Wriothesley, second duke, by his wife Elizabeth Howland. The fourth duke succeeded this brother, the third duke, in 1732, was commissioned first Lord Commissioner of the Admiralty in December, 1744, and on the 27th of the same month was sworn as one of the Privy Council. In the following May he was made Lord Lieutenant of Bedfordshire and raised a regiment against the rebellion of that year. He was Lord Lieutenant of Devon in 1751, and in 1755 appointed a major general, and in 1759 a lieutenant general. In 1756 was Governor General of Ireland, in 1761 Vice-Admiral of Devon and acted as Lord High Constable on the coronation of George III. Mr. Waldo, late Colonel of one of the Regiments raised in the Province of the Massachusetts Bay for the Service of the said Expedition attending, presented to the Board a Memorial addressed to the Lords Commissrs: of His Majesty's Treasury, which he acquainted their Lordships he was directed by the Lords of the Treasury to attend upon the Board with, which said Memorial set forth his Service as Brigadier General and Colonel of a Regiment on the Expedition against Louisbourg and since as Brigadier Gen!. & Colonel of a Regiment in the intended Expedition against Canada, and as Comm!: in Chief of the Forces intended for the Reduction of Crown Point, praying that he may be ordered Pay as Brigadier General & Colonel from his first Entrance into the Louisbourg Expedition to its final Conclusion, and also the Pay of Brigadier General and Commander in Chief from the time of his entring upon that Commission on the Canada Expedition till the final Dismission of the Troops and that in making up the Accounts he may not be deprived of such advantages as are customary by an unprecedented adjustment being made without his knowledge.

Mr. Waldo likewise laid before their Lordships several vouchers of Facts set forth in the said Memorial.

Their Lordships there upon acquainted him that with respect to his Demand of Pay for his Services on the Louisbourg Expedition, it was not within the Reference of these Accounts to the Board & therefore desired to know what were his particular Demands & Claims for Service relative to the Canada Expedition.

Whereupon he acquainted their Lordships, that as M^r. Shirley had thought proper to appoint him Commander in Chief by Commission, he demanded 4^l per Day as such including 30^{sh}: per Day allowed him by M^r. Shirley & M^r. Knowles as Brigadier Gen^l. alleging that altho' the Expedition did not take Place he had been at great Expence in preparation for it.

That as to the particular advantages his Regiment he apprehended them to be — Deserters Pay, Dead Mens Pay, and the Cloathing the Regiment, also the respited Men usually allowed in established Regiments, or at least the one usually allowed to the Colo. — That he might also receive such advantages as should arise in paying off the Men on account of the Pay not being demanded or dead men not administered to — all which he alleged he apprehended he was entitled to from the Time of Mr. Shirley's Proclamation for encouraging Persons to engage in this Service.

Whereupon their Lordships acquainted him that with respect to his Demand of Pay as Commander in Chief they should state this Case in their Report to the Lords of the Treasury upon their Reference, as also his other Demands, but that they were of opinion Mr. Shirley had made up his Accts: of the Regiment conformable to his Majesty's orders and the Proclamation published by him for raising the said Regiments—and then Mr. Waldo withdrew.

Tuesday, Decr. 12th 1749

Mr. Samuel de Lucena whose Memorial praying for some allowance for his Services on the Canada Expedition had been referred to the Board by his Grace the Duke of Bedford as will appear from the minutes of the 27th

of Nov^r. last, attending, represented to the Board that he had received Orders from M^r Shirley his Majesty's Governor of the Massachusetts Bay to raise Men for the Canada Expedition, promising him if he could raise any considerable Number that he should have a Commission, That in Consequence of those orders, a Copy whereof he produced, he did raise Eighteen Men on Condition of their serving under none but him, but that the said Men did not receive the Province Bounty nor were inrolled in His Majesty's Service, — wherefore he only desired some Consideration for his Trouble on this Occasion.

Having nothing further to offer he was ordered to withdraw and it was agreed further to consider his mem¹. at another opportunity.

Their Lordships then took into Consideration the Petition of Joseph Dwight Colo. of one of the Regiments raised in the Province of the Massachusetts Bay for the Service of the intended Expedition mentioned in the Minutes of the 5th instant, praying payment of Bills drawn for the Pay of the said Regiment.

Whereupon Mr. Shirley Governor of the said Province attending represented to their Lordships that Colonel Dwight's method of disposing of the Bills delivered to him, was this — He filled up most of them to, the Value of about £6000 Sterls. with his own name, and sold them to Mr. Quincy a Merchant in Boston, who raised New England Currency upon 'em in the following Manner; Colo. Boston at the Rate of £1100 old Tenor for £100 Sterling, transmitting to Mr. Bethel the £6000 in Bills drawn by Mr. Shirley upon the Paymaster General as a Fund in Case they Should be paid by the Government before the private Bills became due, (as it was hoped they possibly might) for the Payment of the private Bills, in which Case a considerable advantage would have been gained by the Difference between the Price, at which the Bills drawn upon the Paymaster General were sold in New England, and that of private Bills for which Mr. Dwight's own Bills were sold — As it had happened that the publick Bills were not paid, that may have occasioned the private Bills to be protested, and Damages to be sustained on that account; But be that as it will, this transaction of Colonel Dwight's raising New England Currency to pay the Soldiers by his private Bills founded on the Credit, which the publick Bills gave 'em was done without the Privity of Mr. Shirley, who had he been advised with upon it, would not have consented to it; and as it appear'd to Mr. Shirley that this Scheme was enter'd into after the merchants had begun to buy the publick Bills sold for the Payment of Colo. Waldo's Regiment, it seemed to have been unnecessary, and gone into for the Sake of making an advantage from it; That indeed it seem'd observable that Colo. Dwight does not alledge in his Petition, that he has yet suffered Damages, but only that he is exposed to Ruin by his own Bills standing out against him, and prays for no more than that for his Indemnification, the publick Bills may be soon paid off by the Government, which seem'd very reasonable.

Ordered that a State of what appears upon the two aforementioned Memorials of Colonel Dwight and Col^o. Waldo be added to the State of the Demands for the Service of the Canada Expedition.

Mr. Samuel Stork acquainted the Board that he together with two other Gentlemen not present, were authorized at a General Meeting of the Possessors of Bills drawn on account of the intended Expedition to Canada, to make it a Request that five & Cent Interest might be allowed to the Proprietors of said Bills from the Time they became due, as many of the said Proprietors have been reduced to great Distress by the Delay of Payment and many mortgaged their real Estates as a Security until Provision was made by Parliament for the Payment of them.

That there was a Precedent for this in the Case of the Possessors of Bills drawn by Gen¹. Oglethorpe on account of Georgia who demanded re-Exchange, but were allowed 5 p Cent

That he M^r. Stork was Possessor of Bills to the amount of £6000 Sterls. drawn by the Governors Shirley & Clinton.

Mr. Shirley his Majesty's Gov'. of the Province of the Massachusetts Bay attending, acquainted their Lordships upon this Occasion that the Bills drawn by him for the publick Service were after the Rate of 9001 in Bills of Credit of his Province for 1001 Sterling when the Price of private Exchange was 11001 in said Bills of Credit for 100 Sterling, whereby he observed, that the Possession of such publick Bills obtained an advantage of 18 \$\frac{1}{2}\$? Cent.

The said Merchants not having any thing further to offer were ordered to withdraw.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES OF ANCESTORS.

HUMPHREY BARRETT, JR. - JOSEPH BARRETT.

Humphrey Barrett, Jr., of Concord, was born in England in 1630, and came to Concord with his parents, who settled there in 1639, probably from the county of Kent. His father's farm was of three hundred acres or more, and his house stood on what is now Monument street. Humphrey Barrett, Jr., was a deacon of the church; deputy to the General Court in 1691; ensign of the Concord foot company in 1685, being appointed by Major-General Gookin, on application made to him to use his best endeavors to appoint and settle the train-band of Concord with commissioned officers. "Humphrey Barrett being a freeman and of ye church and as I aphrend a sargent of ye Company" was proposed to the General Court and approved Oct. 21, 1685. His commission, signed in 1686 by Governor Andros, is owned by the New England Historic Genealogical Society; and another, as ensign of Capt. James Minott's company, signed by Governor Bradstreet, Feb. 6, 1689-90, after the fall of Andros, is in possession of George R. Barrett, Esq., of Boston. The return of Lemuel Jones, clerk, of the election of James Minott, captain, and Humphrey Barrett, ensign, July 2, 1689, is quoted by Walcott from the archives.

Joseph Barrett, son of Humphrey, Jr. (1679–1763), was captain of the Concord foot company in 1732; his commission as captain-lieutenant of the company, signed by Governor Belcher on March 22 of that year, is in possession of the New England Historic Genealogical Society. Captain Barrett was one of

the original grantees of Grafton, Mass., receiving one hundred twenty-one and one-half acres of land in 1728. He was a farmer, as well as largely engaged in the business enterprises of the day. He was treasurer of Concord from 1734 to 1739.

THOMAS AND JOSHUA BROOKS.

Thomas Brooks (Brooke), born in Suffolk County, England, embarked at London, May 9, 1635, in the "Susan and Ellen," in company with the Rev. Peter Bulkley and William Buttrick. The statement that he had been a preacher of the gospel at St. Margaret's, Fire Street Hill, London, is not supported by printed histories nor by the documentary records of the family. Thomas Brooks settled in Watertown, of which he was made freeman in 1636, having previously received the grant of the Beaver Brook plough lands. He removed to Concord, where he owned large In 1660 he with his son-in-law, Timothy Wheeler, bought a large farm in Medford, which was probably a part of the great Cradock estate. The deed was signed by two Indians' marks. He was a constable in 1638; captain of the foot company in 1642; appointed "to End Smale causes" in 1652; licensed to sell wine and strong liquors to the Indians in 1654; all others being prohibited under a fine of twenty shillings. He was a deputy to the General Court from 1642 to 1645, in 1654, from 1659 to 1662. He was the emigrant ancestor of Gov. John Brooks and Bishop Phillips Brooks.

A grandson of Thomas Brooks, Noah Brooks, married Dorothy Potter, a daughter of Deacon Luke Potter, of Concord, and sister of Humphrey Barrett, Jr.'s, second wife, Mary. As Noah Brooks was born in 1666, fifteen years after Dorothy Potter, and as such marriages were unknown in colonial times, it has been thought Noah Brooks must have married another person, and Savage states that his wife was Dorothy Wright, daughter of Capt.

Edward Wright, of Sudbury. But she married Benjamin Moore, as is shown by a conveyance on record in the Middlesex County Registry, whereby Dorothy, wife of Benjamin Moore, conveyed real estate belonging to Edward Wright, of Sudbury, deceased, intestate. The wife of Luke Potter mentions last among his children "my daughter, Dorothy Brooks." It has been suggested that the first Dorothy Potter, born in 1650, died young, and that a later born daughter, also named Dorothy, married Noah Brooks. Supposing that the birth of Noah is correctly given as in 1666, this explanation would remove the apparent discrepancy in the ages of himself and his wife.

Joshua Brooks, a tanner of Concord (1688–1768), was one of the incorporators of Lincoln. He was lieutenant of a company which marched from Concord to Boston, Sept. 23, 1746, on the alarm of an expected attack by a French fleet. After the fall of Louisburg constant alarms were received in Boston, the one here spoken of being occasioned by the Duc d'Anville's Brest squadron, which it was feared would attack the town. "In answer to the alarm," says Douglas, who was an eye-witness, "6,400 men from the country, well armed, appeared on Boston Common, some of them having travelled seventy miles in two days, each with a pack, in which was provision for fourteen days, of about a bushel of corn weight." The alarm, however, soon died away; the French armament was destroyed by tempests, and the commander, D'Anville, is said to have perished by his own sword. The company returned in ten days.

LIEUT. THOMAS BURNHAM, SR.

On June 4, 1635, the ship "Angel Gabriel," Robert Andrews, master, the leader of a little fleet of five vessels, set sail from Bristol, England, for the Massachusetts Bay. The master, reputed to have been as well the owner of the vessel, had with

him his two nephews, John and Thomas Burnham, sons of Robert Burnham and Mary Andrews, of Norwich, County Norfolk. The voyage was made with safety until August 15, when one of the great historic gales of New England struck the ship off Pemmaquid; and, in the words of the Rev. Richard Mather. who was on board the "James," another vessel of the same fleet, "ve Angel Gabriel, beeing vn at ancre at Pemmaguid, was burst in pieces and cast away in ye storme, & most of ye cattell and other goodes with one seaman & 3 or 4 passengers did also perish therein ye rest having yr lives given ym for a prey." Among those washed ashore were the ship's master, and his wards, the two Burnham youths. Captain Andrews, with his nephews, made his way evidently without delay to Ipswich, Mass., as we find him appearing in the Town Records this same year, 1635, the first after the incorporation of the town. At this, the date of his settlement in New England, Thomas Burnham was twelve years old.

He appears first by name in the Ipswich Records in 1643, when he is in the list of those inhabitants to whom the town voted pay "for service to the Indians." This service, connected by Savage with one of the Pequot expeditions, was probably against. not the Pequots, but the Pennacooks to the northward. In 1646 he was chosen surveyor, which position he afterward frequently filled. The same year a grant of land was made by the town to Thomas and his brother John. In 1653 he was chosen one of "the seven men," or selectmen, to which position he was afterwards elected almost continuously throughout his life. And this year "Thomas Burnham subscribed to pay Major Denison to be the military leader." In 1660 Thomas Burnham with three others was "appoynted to meet with Manchester men to run out our bounds, and state the line between us." 1664 "Thomas Burnam has 11 doubble shares in Plum Island, Castle Neck, & Hog Island." In 1667 "Granted unto Thomas Burnam liberty to sett up a saw mill upon Chebacco River neare the falls." And "Ordered that Thomas Burnam," with one other, "run out the line betweene Gloster and this Towne." Which grants, along with various others not here repeated, show

that Thomas Burnham was one of the largest landholders in Ipswich; and which appointments, especially in the most important possible matter of determining the town boundaries, that he was one of its leading and trusted citizens.

In 1664 his name begins to appear in the Colony Records, where we read that "The ffoote company of Ipswich having chosen . . . Thomas Burnam . . . sergeants . . . this Court judgeth it meete to allow & confirme the sayd chojce respectively." And in these Records for 1675 "It is ordered that Thomas Burnam be ensign to the ffote company in Ipswich vnder the conduct of Major Generall Denisson Esq. their capt." This is the rank under which he appears in the roster of the Essex regiment during King Philip's war.

In the Military Archives of Massachusetts, under the year 1683, William Torrey, clericus, signs the record that in the first company in Ipswich "Thomas Burnam formerly ensigne is now appointed Leiftenant," and that "the Deputes consent wth. o^r. honor^d. magist⁸. in approuing the above s^d. officers." The Court Lists of "the names of the Deputjes returned to serve for y^e severall towns" include that of "Leift. Thō. Burnham, Ipswich," for the years 1683, '84, '85.

On April 2, 1635, embarked on the ship "Planter," bound for New England, John Tuttell, a wealthy mercer, from St. Albans, Hertfordshire, whose immediate family included his wife, Joan (Antrobuss) (Lawrence) Tuttell; three children by her first husband, John, William, and Marie Lawrence, the last aged nine years; her mother Joan Antrobuss; and four younger children bearing the name of Tuttell. Debarking at Plymouth, John Tuttell proceeded with his family at once to Ipswich; where, although their parents returned later to the old country, his children and step-children grew up. John and William Lawrence when grown migrated to Long Island, where they came to be among the most distinguished colonials of their Marie Lawrence, like a good Massachusetts woman, or like a good lover, declined to follow mother or brothers, stood by Ipswich, and married Thomas Burnham. The husband died in 1604, the wife in 1715.

To them were born twelve children. John, the second son, settled in the precinct called then Chebacco, and since incorporated as the town of Essex, where his has been the most prolific of the Burnham lines in Massachusetts. The descendants of Thomas, the younger of the two immigrant brothers, seem to have been hereditarily inclined to be soldiers, as have those of John, the older brother, to be deacons. During the Civil War the little town of Essex from among her own citizens sent to the front one hundred and forty-one fighting men, of whom thirty-three, nearly one-fourth the entire number, were Burnhams,—an incident of family history not paralleled probably in the country. Of these it is safe to say that nearly every man was a descendant of Lieut. Thomas Burnham, Sr.

COLONEL SAMUEL CHECKLEY.

Born Oct. 14, 1653, at Preston, Northamptonshire, England. Died at Boston, Dec. 27, 1738. Half-brother to Captain Anthony Checkley.

BY THOMAS LAWRENCE MOTLEY.

He arrived in Boston Aug. 3, 1670; was a physician and surgeon in Boston, also proprietor of an apothecary's store, in which business his son Richard succeeded. He married, in 1680, Mary, daughter of Joshua Scottow. They had eleven children, only two of whom survived their father, viz., Richard and Samuel. An obituary notice of Samuel Checkley is given in the "News Letter," Jan. 4, 1739.

He was for many years active in the military of Boston, being appointed ensign of Captain Wing's company, February, 1685-6, and after the usual promotions became major of the

Boston regiment in 1702, lieutenant-colonel 1706, and colonel 1710 to 1712. He is called colonel, however, in the Boston Records as early as 1706. He received twelve different commissions, from ensign, given by Governor Bradstreet, to colonel, given by Lieutenant-Governor Tailler.

He was a member of the Old South Church, was elected deacon Oct. 15, 1693, which honor he declined; selectman from 1693 to 1696 inclusive, representative in 1702-7, and town clerk from 1720 to 1733.

After the Revolution, which overturned Andros's government, he was actively engaged in reviving the artillery company, and was fourth sergeant in 1685, third sergeant in 1690, lieutenant in 1694, and captain in 1700. He was also one of his majesty's justices of the peace from 1714 to 1727, inclusive.

He died Dec. 27, 1738.

Rev. Samuel Checkley, son of Col. Samuel Checkley, delivered the sermon before the artillery company in 1725, and Rev. Samuel, grandson of Colonel Samuel, delivered the sermon in 1757.

His tomb is in the Granary Burying Ground, next the sidewalk, a few rods south of the Tremont Building. On a horizontal blue slate are beautifully engraved the arms of the family, a circle surrounding the shield.

JOHN FOULSHAM.

Foulsham, Norfolk, England, is a parish and market town on the East Norfolk branch of the Great Eastern Railway. The parish church of the Holy Innocents, a large flint structure, was built about 1489, burnt in 1770, and afterward rebuilt. Its earliest register dates from 1708. This parish and manor gave its name to the Folsom family, or Foulsham, as it was first spelt in New England.

Members of this family were found in other parts of England, in the earlier times. Benedictus de Folsham was summoned to the Parliament that met at Lincoln, Sept. 15, 1327, and again to Westminster, Sept. 26, 1337, to represent the city


of London. Walter de Berney, an ecclesiastic of Norwich, in his will in 1370 gives John de Folsham and two others forty pounds to prosecute their studies at Oxford. Sir Robert Fulsham. clerk of Alholowen, Chichester, Sussex, died in 1502. Richard Folsham, citizen and salter, of the parish of St. Mathew's in Friday street, London, died in 1575. Foulsham was often con-John Foulsham, of Hingham, Mass., founded with Foliambe. and Exeter, N.H., was of a branch of the family that remained in Norfolk. In a deed in Vol. II. of the Old Norfolk County Records, which covered a part of Essex County, Mass., and the adjoining territory in New Hampshire, John Foulsham granted his son Peter "40 or 50 acres of land in Hingam in ye county of Norfolk near Norrald Common and formerly cald by ve name of Fulsham, at ye Box bushes, bounded West with Norrald Common, East with great Langhams and little Langhams, North with Hardingham common, South east with land of John Buck formerly and Edward Flower (Flowerdew) formerly." This is dated April 10, 1673, and relates to land in Old England.

Hingham, Norfolk, is three miles southwest of Hardingham Station of the Dereham Branch Railway. East of Hingham are Great and Little Langham, now known as the parish of Langham Bishops, formerly Langham Magna and Langham Parva.

Norrald Common has lost its name, and must be identified in one of the commons still existing. It was perhaps named after the Norwold family of Hingham, who were there at least as early as 1469.

The parish of Hingham contains 3,645 acres, and Hingham Hall stands in a demesne of fifty acres. In 1600 John Buck was vicar of Langham Magna, and his land joined that of John Foulsham. Robert Peck became rector of Hingham in 1605, at which time there were about 500 communicants at the parish church. He was a zealous non-conformist of church ceremonies, and was persecuted by Bishop Harsnet for keeping a conventicle at night, in his own house, where he was taken prisoner in 1622, with twenty-two neighbors. Mr. Peck suffered similar treatment from Bishop Wren, and was driven away and deprived for non-residence. He fled to New England with many of his

parishioners, among them John Foulsham, with his wife and two servants, and settled at Hingham, Mass. In this company was also Edward Gilman, his wife, three sons and a daughter, and three servants; his eldest daughter, Mary, married John Foul-The Gilman family had been located at Caston, near Hingham, Norfolk, John Foulsham became an inhabitant of Hingham, Mass., in the autumn of 1638, and received a grant of land which abutted on the "Playne," eastward, and the "Common," westward. With Capt. Joshua Hobart he had liberty to utilize certain streams for mills. In 1645 he was a selectman, one of those chosen to order the town affairs, and in this year was implicated in the Anthony Eames affair. Eames having been appointed captain of the military company, by the government, was rejected by the townspeople, who elected Bozoan This result caused John Foulsham to be fined £20, with others.

July 9, 1659, he sold for £12 10s, to Daniel Cushing, who married his wife's sister, his house and land near the training field, some salt marsh at Cohasset, and his rights in common and meadows. Of the house it was said in the Sprague Genealogy, in 1828, "that it was built, before Daniel Cushing became town clerk in 1669, by John Foulsham, the author's grandfather having bought it in 1744," and it was taken down in 1875. An oak armchair, made from its timbers, is owned by Capt. A. A. Folsom, a descendant. This house, with later alterations, is shown on the opposite page, reproduced from an old engraving on metal of a century ago, belonging to Captain Folsom, preserved in a frame made from wood of the house demolished. John Foulsham removed from Hingham to Exeter, where he appears as selectman in 1659, and resided till his death on He was about sixty-six years old, and born Dec. 27, 1681. about 1615. His father is thought to have been Adam Foulsham, of Hingham, England. In 1672 he conveyed land to his daughter, Mary, who was intending marriage to George March. of Newbury. In this deed he calls himself John Foulsham, alias Smith, of Exeter. In the early part of the sixteenth century -William, son of Roger Foulsham, of Necton, Norfolk, married

Agnes Smith, of Besthorpe. Their son, Adam, was of Besthorpe, and may have, as heir of his mother, assumed the name of Smith, and also it may have been adopted by his son and grandson, as is frequently the custom in England. This same Adam being seized at his death, in 1565, with lands in Besthorpe, Wymondham, Bunwell, Hingham, and Hackford.

LIEUT. JOSEPH JUDSON.

BY JOHN GRAHAM MOSELEY.

Lieut. Joseph Judson was the son of William Judson, who with his wife Grace and sons (Joseph, Jeremiah, and Joshua) emigrated from Yorkshire, England, to New England in 1634, and in 1635 was one of the first settlers of Concord, Mass., his residence being on the hill near where the first meeting-house was built. He remained there four years till 1639, when he removed to Hartford, Conn., thence the same year to Stratford, Conn., being one of the first settlers of that town. Previous to 1647 he became an owner in the iron works in East Haven, and with his wife removed to New Haven, his name first appearing on the New Haven Colonial Records, March 7, 1647, when he took the oath of fidelity and signed the fundamental agreement. His wife Grace died there, Sept. 29, 1659. He died July 29, 1662.

Lieut. Joseph Judson, the eldest son of William and Grace Judson, was born in Yorkshire, England, in 1619, and came, with his father, in 1634, to New England, finally settling in Stratford, Conn., with the first settlers of that town, in about 1639. In 1644 he married Sarah, daughter of John and Rose Porter of Windsor, Conn., who were also the ancestors of Admiral D. D. Porter. She was born in 1622, in Kenilworth, Warwickshire, England.

He was a leading man in the early days of the Colony of Connecticut and for over thirty years was active and influential in the affairs of the Colony, and of the towns of Stratford and Woodbury, being many times elected and appointed to offices of importance and trust. He was in his time one of the most active and well-known business men in Fairfield County.

He was made a freeman of Stratford, May 20, 1658; and October, 1650, represented that town in the General Court. May 11, 1665, he was again elected deputy to the General Court from Stratford.

Feb. 22, 1665, England declared war against the Dutch, news of which reached the Colonies in June, and also that the Dutch Admiral De Ruyter, with considerable force, had orders to visit New York.

The Northern Colonies were alarmed at the anticipated approach of so formidable an enemy, and commenced preparations for defence. July 6, 1665, the General Court of Connecticut assembled and appointed a Committee of Defence against the Dutch, of which Ensign Joseph Judson was a member, and he was assigned, with others, the duty of looking after the defence of the sea-coast, from Stratford to Rve, but "the admiral was diverted from his enterprise, — probably by the urgent need of his services nearer home, — and New York remained in the peaceable possession of the English until the treaty of Breda put an end to the war in 1667."

June 26, 1672, he was confirmed Lieutenant of the Stratford Train Band, and under Capt. William Curtiss was in service through King Philip's War in 1675 and 1676. May 11, 1676, was appointed by the General Court captain for Fairfield County, if Captain Sellich is disenabled.

Savage says he was a militia officer much trusted in for King Philip's War. Orcutt says, of those who distinguished themselves, as officers from Stratford, in this Indian war (King Philip's) was Lieut. Joseph Judson, mentioned especially as a capable field officer. Nov. 1, 1675, was chosen by the town one of committee respecting fortifications.

In 1665 difference of opinion in relation to the practice of the half-way covenant in the First Church of Stratford, under the ministry of the Rev. Israel Chauncy, resulted in the withdrawal from the church of a number of its influential members, and the formation of the Second Church, and the founding of a new settlement.

May 9, 1672, the General Court granted liberty to Ensign

Joseph Judson, who was one of the leaders of the dissenters from the First Church, and three others to erect a plantation at "Pomperang," which in May, 1674, was given by the Court of Election the name of Woodbury, and appointed a committee, of which he was one, to formulate a fundamental agreement for the government of the new settlement. The agreement was formulated in February and March, 1672-3, and signed. In April or May of that year the settlement was made in that beautiful and fertile valley of the Pomperang, which, after the Narragansett war, grew rapidly and became one of the most prosperous towns in Fairfield County.

Lieutenant Judson was very active in the work of building up the town, establishing ferries and other communications with the neighboring settlements. May 8, 1684, was appointed by the General Court Lieutenant of the Woodbury Train Band, and the same year was one of Woodbury's first deputies to the General Court. After that, was elected deputy for five sessions to and including 1686. The salary allowed by the General Court to Woodbury's deputy was fifty shillings for each session. He was appointed by the General Court commissioner for Woodbury five years, and also on many important committees. He had a first-class accommodation, but it is not certain that he lived in Woodbury till the close of his life, as a part of his land was afterward sold to pay a ministerial rate. He died Oct. 9, 1690, and was buried in Stratford.

His widow died March 16, 1696. They had twelve children (five sons and seven daughters), all born in Stratford. His descendants were numerous, and many of them distinguished. His son John was one of the original signers of the fundamental agreement, and one of the first settlers and founders of Woodbury. Was a prominent individual in the town and Colony, and ancestor of most of those bearing the name of Judson in Woodbury, many of whom became distinguished professional men.

Cothren's History names nine that were clergymen, one of them being the Rev. Adoniram Judson, the well-known missionary to Burmah; another, Rev. Ephraim Judson, was a chaplain in the Revolutionary army. It also names seventeen who served in the Revolutionary war; one a captain in the Continental army, two captains and two ensigns in the Connecticut militia, and twelve in the ranks.

EDMOND LITTLEFIELD.

BY GEORGE EMERY LITTLEFIELD.

On the 12th of July, 1637, Edmond Littlefield and his son Anthony arrived in Boston, accompanied by a brother of the famous Mrs. Anne Hutchinson and some others of Rev. John Wheelwright's friends. Having been found guilty of "sedition and contempt of the civil authority" by the General Court, Rev. Mr. Wheelwright was awaiting sentence, which was to be passed in November.

A law had recently been passed forbidding new-comers to live in the Colony for a longer time than three weeks, without the written permission of one member of the council, or of two other magistrates. Wheelwright's friends obtained leave from Governor Winthrop to remain four months, but no longer.

In November, notwithstanding his protestations of innocence, the Court passed sentence upon Wheelwright, as follows: "Mr John Wheelwright being formerly convicted of contempt and sedition, and now justifiing himselfe and his former practise, being to the disturbance of the civill peace, hee is by the Court disfranchized and banished." He was allowed fourteen days in which to arrange his affairs, and at the expiration of that favor he had left, as he supposed, the soil of Massachusetts.

He went from Boston to Strawberry-bank, now Portsmouth, by vessel, remaining there until spring, as the country round about from the fourth of November until the fifth of the succeeding March was covered with snow three feet deep. He then proceeded by land to the falls of the Squamscot, the site of the present town of Exeter. He soon gathered around him the nucleus of a plantation, and buying land of the Indians, certain lots were apportioned to the prospective settlers. The names of more than thirty men appear in the first assignment of shares of land, among which are the names of Edmond and Francis Littlefield. As Wheelwright when banished had received and declined a call from the people of Rhode Island to settle among them as their minister, but proceeded directly to New Hampshire, it is very probable that some of his friends, among them the Littlefields, anticipating the sentence of the Court, had found a place which was acceptable to him and yet beyond the reach of the government of the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

As the population of Exeter increased in numbers some form of civil constitution became necessary, and the famous Exeter combination was drawn up by Wheelwright and signed by himself and thirty-four members of the church and other inhabitants on July 4, 1639. Among the signers was Edmond Little-field. Thus one hundred and thirty-seven years before the auspicious Fourth of July, on which our national independence was proclaimed, the little colony of Exeter assumed a republican form of government, made choice of its own rulers, and enacted a code of laws characterized by good sense, forecast, and equity.

The Massachusetts Bay Colony, however, soon claimed that Exeter lay within the bounds of her patent, and some of Wheelwright's friends made application to Thomas Gorges, superintendent of the affairs of Sir Ferdinando Gorges, for permission to take a tract of land in the province of Mayne, lying between the Ogunquit and Kennebunk rivers, now Wells. This was granted on the 27th of September, 1641. Edmond Littlefield, Edward Rishworth, Henry Boade, and others of Wheelwright's friends immediately entered on the land and began to improve it. Wheelwright himself did not come until 1643. The grant of this land to John Wheelwright, Henry Boade, and Edward Rishworth, by Thomas Gorges, is dated July 14, 1643, and is

confirmed by a Court holden at Saco, Richard Vines, Deputy Governor, Aug. 14, 1644.

When Edmond Littlefield had made his final arrangements for settling at Exeter, he sent for the remainder of his family, and in May, 1638, his wife Agnes and six children took passage at Southampton for Boston in the ship "Bevis," Capt. Tounes, master. Upon arrival they proceeded immediately to Exeter, but in 1641 went to Wells.

When in England Edmond Littlefield married Agnes Austin, and all his children were born previous to his coming to New England. They were:

- i. Francis, baptized June 17, 1619; died 1712.
- ii. Anthony, " Oct. 7, 1621; " 1662
- iii. Elizabeth,
- iv. John, "Feb. 19, 1697.
- v. Thomas, " before 1718.
- vi. Mary,
- vii. Hannah,
- viii. Francis, Jr., born 1631; died 1674.

In England Edmond Littlefield was a manufacturer and employed many people in making cloth. He was a man of means and was much respected in the community in which he lived. In Wells he engaged in milling and is said to have built the first house in Wells. In the same year, 1641, he built the first sawmill and the first grist-mill on the Webhannet river and also owned mill privileges on the Ogunquit river.

He was a man of respectable standing, of fearless enterprise, and sound moral principle; on account of his firm moral character he was appointed by the governor of Massachusetts agent for the sale of liquor in Wells, it being then of the utmost importance that great discretion should be used in the sale of liquor to the Indians. He was also one of the committee for settling the boundary between Wells and Cape Porpoise, and it was owing to his shrewdness that the town of Wells was not curtailed of its fair proportions.

In 1653 Wells submitted to the jurisdiction of Massachusetts, and twenty of her citizens took the oath of allegiance, among whom were Edmond Littlefield and three of his sons, viz.: Francis, Sr., Thomas, and Francis, Jr.

Edmond Littlefield and his family were Episcopalians and had been strongly opposed to the claims of the government of Massachusetts. The General Court of Massachusetts had undertaken to legislate very freely in regard to the religious belief and action of the people. In Massachusetts only members of the church had the right of suffrage. In Maine such membership had not been necessary. Although the people of Maine who signed the submission were made freemen with the right of voting, yet the laws of Massachusetts were so repugnant to their religious sentiments that this modification of law, in its application to Maine, did not go far in quelling the dissensions previously existing.

Although signing the submission, yet opposition to the government of Massachusetts was kept up. An appeal was made to Parliament, and in 1661 a committee of the Parliament reported adversely to the claim of Massachusetts. The opponents of Massachusetts, among whom the Littlefields took a prominent part, were greatly encouraged, and in 1662 the town sent no representative to the General Court.

Although a strong opponent of Massachusetts, yet Edmond Littlefield from 1654 to 1661 had been appointed commissioner to try small causes, and was agent of Gorges to give possession of lots to settlers.

He died in the midst of the controversy in December, 1661, leaving a large estate.

Bourne, in his "History of Wells," says of him: "Probably the work done by Edmond Littlefield, introductory to clearing the wilderness and subjecting the territory to the uses of civilization, and the aid which his mills would give in providing for families, did much toward inducing the emigration to this place, and on this account we think he is entitled to be regarded as the father of Wells. With the aid of his large family he here prepared the way for the habitation of man."

FRANCIS LITTLEFIELD, SR.

Francis Littlefield, Sr., was born in England in 1619. From some unknown cause he left home at an early age, and his father named his youngest son, born in 1631, Francis. Where he went or what happened to him from 1630 to 1639 is not known, but in some way he came to New England and joined his father at Exeter, where in the allotment of lands in 1639 he had four acres granted to him. From Exeter, instead of proceeding to Wells, he went to Woburn, Mass., where he married Jane Hill, daughter of Ralph Hill, who had removed to Woburn from Plymouth, Mass., about 1645. His wife died Dec. 20, 1646, and disposing of his property in Woburn he went to Dover, N.H., which he represented in the Legislature in 1648. The same year he married Rebecca ——, a lady eleven years younger than himself, and in 1650 removed to Wells. Here he acquired a large estate and took a prominent part in town affairs.

In the controversy with Massachusetts he followed the lead of his father, and after his father's death in 1661 was one of the leaders in the opposition. Notwithstanding his opposition he was recognized as a fair-dealing man, and the sessions of the Court were held at his house. Massachusetts, however, would not relinquish her claim, and after making a stubborn contest, and finding that a prolongation of the contest would only retard the settlement and destroy the peace of the inhabitants, Francis Littlefield and the larger portion of the opposition reluctantly ceased contending and submitted to the government of Massachusetts. The petition to be "taken under the tuition and government of the General Court of Massachusetts," dated April 30, 1668, was signed by twenty-two citizens of Wells, among whom were four of the sons of Edmond Littlefield, viz., Francis, Sr., Thomas, John, and Francis, Jr., and the husbands of two of his daughters, viz., Peter Cloves and John Barrett.

From the nature of his business Francis Littlefield had an extensive acquaintance. He was a large dealer in real estate, was proprietor of a public house, and was licensed to sell liquor. He was elected as a representative from Wells in 1665 and

1676, and representative from York in 1668. Owing to the prominent part taken by him in bringing about a satisfactory ending of the opposition to the claims of Massachusetts, he is characterized by Savage as a leader in that contest.

Besides his home farm he owned several other farms, and the Registry of Deeds contains many records of the transfers of property to and by him. In 1683 he bought of John Cross, one of the wealthiest men in the town, his house and one hundred and fifty acres of land. This house contained the only looking-glass and carpet in the town.

He died in 1712, aged ninety-three, and from the inventory of his estate we find that he possessed many of what at that time were considered the luxuries of life, viz., bedstead, chairs, looking-glass, candlesticks, chests, tables, and two books.

FRANCIS LITTLEFIELD, JR.

Francis Littlefield, Jr., born in 1631, came to New England with his mother in 1638. Proceeding first to Exeter, and then to Wells, he there received what education it was possible to obtain at that early period, and in 1653 signed the Act of Submission acknowledging himself subject to the government of Massachusetts. He, however, stood by his father and brothers in the subsequent opposition to the claims of Massachusetts, and finally joined with them in the petition of 1668.

In 1668 he was appointed ensign in the military company of which his brother John was lieutenant, and took a prominent part in the Indian wars.

He married, about 1658, Meribah Wardell, daughter of William and Alice Wardell, of Wells, who was baptized at the First Church in Boston, 25th day, 4th month, 1637.

He was a large land-owner, was prominent in civil and church affairs, and respected by the community. He died Feb. 6, 1675, leaving his property to be divided by will among his ten children.

BURGESS, GENERAL WILLIAM, 1619-1686, --- , Md. Member of Lord Baltimore's Council of State, --- . Deputy Governor of Maryland, ---. Colonel of the Regiment of Train Bands, -. General-in-Chief of the Provincial forces, ---- .

Gaither, Charles P.

CHECKLEY, COLONEL SAMUEL, 1653-1738, Boston. Appointed Ensign of Captain Wing's Company, February, 1685-6; Major of the Boston Regiment, 1702: Lieutenant-Colonel, 1706; Colonel, 1710-12. He received twelve different Commissions, from that of Ensign, given by Governor Bradstreet, to that of Colonel, given by Lieutenant-Governor Tailler. Fourth Sergeant of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, 1685; Third Sergeant, 1686; Lieutenant, 1694; Captain, 1700. Representative to the General Court, 1702, '07. Motley, Thomas L.

Deputy to the General Court from Barnstable, 1639, '41; from Scituate, 1649-52, '54-56. Assistant, 1656-58, '74-80. Commissioner of the United Colonies, 1657. Deputy-Governor, 1681.

Sheldon, Ned L.

EAMES, CAPTAIN ANTHONY, ----, Hingham, Mass. Deputy to the General Court, 1637-38. Captain of the Hingham Military Company, 1644-45.

Ames, Adelbert.

EELLS, MAJOR SAMUEL, 1639-1709, Hingham, Mass. Sergeant, -1669; Lieutenant, 1676. Commanded a Garrison in King Philip's War at Dartmouth, 1676. Captain at Milford, Conn., 1683. Major ----.

Eells, Samuel.

FREEMAN, EDMUND, 1590-1682, Sandwich, Plymouth Colony. Assistant, 1640-46. Member of the Council of War, 1642. Deputy to the General Court, 1646. Nickerson, Philip T.

Nickerson, Stephen W.

HOWARD, LIEUTENANT JOHN, -1700, Bridgewater, Mass. Ensign of the Bridgewater Military Company, 1664; Lieutenant, 1689. Deputy to the General Court, 1678, '83, —

Howard, Harry M.

HOWLAND, ZOETH, --- 1676, Dartmouth, Plymouth Colony. Killed at Pocasset, R.I., by the Indians, March 21, 1675/6, King Philip's War.

JORDAN, CAPTAIN SAMUEL, 1684-1732, Saco, Me. Captain of the Saco Company, -

Littlefield, George E.

Lane, Sergeant James, —— 1688, North Yarmouth, Me. Sergeant of the Military Company at Westuckqua, ---. Killed by the Indians at Falmouth, September 13, 1688.

Rowe, Arthur E.

Marsh, Captain John, 1668-1744, Hartford and Litchfield, Conn. Lieutenant in the Hartford Train Band, 1717. Captain in the Litchfield Train Band, 1722. Commanded an Expedition against the Indians, 1726.

Marsh, Oliver A.

Parsons, Cornet Joseph, 1618-1683, Springfield, Mass. Cornet in Captain John Pynchon's Hampshire County Troop, 1672– 78. Member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, 1679.

Keegan, Vincent E.

PUTNAM, COLONEL ISRAEL, 1718-1790, Brooklyn, Conn. Cap-tain and Major in the French War, 1755. Lieutenant-Colonel at the Siege of Montreal, 1760, and at the Capture of Havana, 1762. Colonel in Bradstreet's Expedition against the Indians, 1764.

Osgood, Edward L.

STANDISH, CAPTAIN MYLES, 1584- . 1656, Plymouth. Military Commander (Captain) at Plymouth (the first military commission given in New England), February 27, 1621, and until his death. "General-in-Assistant. ——. Chief" of all the Plymouth Colony Companies, 1649.

Reed, James H.

STRONG, THOMAS, 163 — 1689, Windsor, Conn. Trooper under Captain John Mason at Windsor, 1658.

Strong, Thomas M.

TORREY, CAPTAIN WILLIAM, 1608-1691, Weymouth, Mass. Deputy to the General Court, 1642-44, '48-49, '80, '83. Clerk of the House, 1650-55, '57, '61, '66, '84. Lieutenant of the Train Band, 1645; Captain, 1657. Torrey, Benjamin B.

WADE, COLONEL THOMAS, 1651-1696, Ipswich, Mass. Appointed Cornet of the Ipswich Troop under Captain J—
Appleton, October, 1683; Captain, July, 1689. As Colonel of the Middle Essex Regiment received orders from Lieutenant-Governor Stoughton, April 5, 1696, to call out his men against the French and Indians as occasion demanded.
