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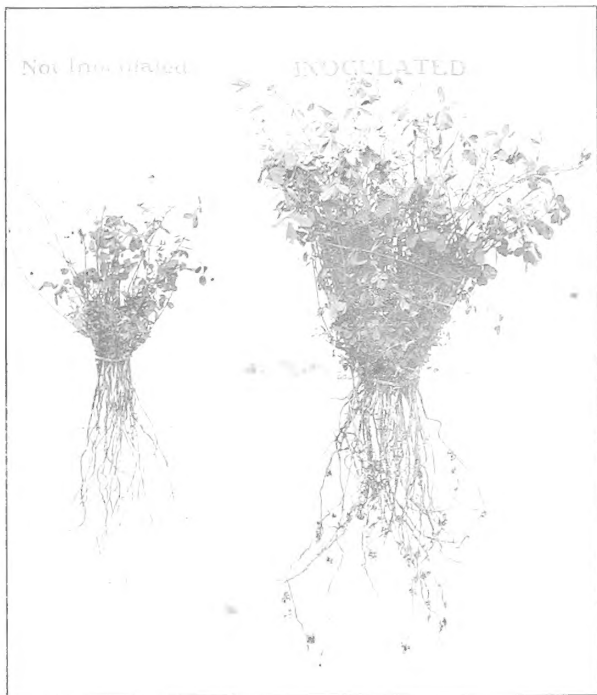
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Alfalfa Plants.

The young plants are liable to various accidents, cold or dry air may check their growth or destroy them. Insects above and below the ground may attack them, and a great many other contingencies may arise to prevent the best seeds from giving satisfaction, and for all these reasons it is impracticable to guarantee seeds. 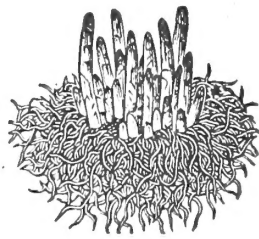

SOME USEFUL HINTS WHAT AND WHEN TO PLANT

To grow good vegetables it is, of course, necessary to have good seeds, and have them properly planted, good soil, a thorough preparation and judicious cultivation.

JANUARY.

In the Garden—Get the hotbeds ready and sow Cabbage, Tomatoes, Lettuce, Cauliflower, Egg Plants, Beets, Onions and Kohl Rabi. Sow Spring Turnips, Mustard, Spinach and Extra Early Peas.

FEBRUARY.

In the Garden—Plant Extra Early and Marrowfat Peas. Plant Potatoes for a general crop. Sow Radishes, Turnips, Mustard, Spinach and Onion Seed in open ground. Sow in hotbeds Pepper, Egg Plant and Tomato Seeds. Plant Onion Sets. Plant your Sweet Peas in the flower garden now.

In the Field—Lawns should be looked after. Give a top dressing of bone meal. Sow Emerald Lawn Grass, Red Rust Proof and Burt Oats, and Grass Seeds; Canada Field Peas.

In the Orchard—Set out all kinds of Fruit Trees and other Nursery Stock.

MARCH.

In the Garden—This is an active month in this section. Sow English Peas—the wrinkled varieties can now be planted. Sow outdoors Carrots, Parsley, Cabbage, Beets, Lettuce, Salsify, Parsnips, Leek and Onion Seeds. Early Corn can be planted about the 15th. Onion sets can yet be planted. This is also a good month for planting Potatoes. Put out Asparagus, Rhubarb and Horse Radish roots. Sow hardy kind of Flower Seeds, also Sweet Peas.

In the Field—Sow all sorts of Clover Seeds, Grasses and Oats; Lawn Grass Seed, Sorghum, Field Corn and Artichokes.

In the Orchard—Continue to set out Fruit Trees, Raspberry, Blackberry, Strawberry Plants.

APRIL.

In the Garden—Sow Beets, Carrots, Lettuce, Parsley, Endive, Parsnips, Salsify, Radishes, Leek, Mustard, Turnips, Cress, Celery, Tomatoes, Cucumbers, Squash, Sweet Corn; in fact, almost everything can now be planted. Plant Bush Snap Beans. Potatoes can be planted. Do not fail to plant our Early Surprise Corn for roasting ears; it will please you. Plant Tuberose, Dahlia, Gladiolus and Canna Bulbs; Flower Seeds.

In the Field—Sow Mangel Wurzel and Sugar Beets for stock, Corn, Sorghum, Kaffir Corn, German Millet, Grass Seeds, Clovers and Artichokes.

MAY.

In the Garden—Seeds of all kinds can now be planted. Bush Beans, Pole Beans, Lima Beans, Sugar Corn, Beets, Salsify, Parsnip, Squash, Cucumber, Okra, Cantaloupes, Watermelons, Pumpkins, Egg Plant, Peppers, Cress, Carrots, Lettuce, Endive and Kohl Rabi; Herbs of all sorts.

In the Field—Sow German and Hungarian Millet. Stock Peas, Sorghum, Chufas, Cotton, Corn, Peanuts, Pearl or Cat Tail Millet and Bermuda Grass. Put some Land Plaster on young Clover.

JUNE.

In the Garden—Plant Sugar and other Early Corns, Cucumbers, Melons, Squash, Pumpkins; set out Sweet Potatoes, Egg and Pepper Plants. Sow Radishes, Endive, Collards and Cabbage for late use. Bunch Beans, Pole Beans. Tomato Seed for late use, Okra.

In the Field—Continue planting Field Corn, Soja Beans, Pearl Millet, Bermuda Grass, Stock Peas of all sorts, German and Hungarian Millet.

JULY.

In the Garden—Plant Cucumbers, Tomatoes and Cabbage Seed for late crop, also Pole and Bush Beans, Corn for roasting ears. Commence sowing Ruta Bagas and a few Turnips. Plant Okra, Squash, Lettuce and Summer Radishes.

In the Field—Cow Peas, Millet, Hungarian; Sorghum and Field Corn can be planted. Sow Buckwheat for bees. Plant Potatoes for raising the second crop.

AUGUST.

In the Garden—Now is the time to start for a fall garden. Sow Kale, Lettuce, Early and Winter Radishes, Turnips and

Ruta Bagas, Mustard, Beets, Parsley, Cucumbers, Squash, Collards and late Cabbages. Plant Potatoes for a second crop.

In the Field—German Millet can be sown as late as the 15th of the month. Sow some Crimson and Burr Clover, Dwarf Essex Rape for winter pasture.

SEPTEMBER.

In the Garden—Sow Radishes, Corn Salad, Lettuce, Mustard, Kale, Spinach, Endive, Turnips of all sorts; Onion Seed for transplanting. Set out Shallots and Onion Sets.

In the Field—This should be an active month on the farm. Sow Crimson Clover as early as you can this month; all kinds Grass Seeds and Red Clover, Alfalfa and Burr Clover now. Sow Oregon Vetch, Rye, Barley and Winter Turf Oats.

OCTOBER.

In the Garden—Sow Kale, Spinach, Corn Salad and Winter Radishes. Sow outside Cabbage for transplanting into cold frames next month. Lettuce in beds for winter use. Set out Shallots and Onion Sets.

In the Field—Continue to sow Rye, Barley, Winter Turf Oats and Wheat. Sow some Winter Hairy Vetches with Rye, all kinds of Grass Seeds for lawn and field. Timothy, Alfalfa, Burr and Red Clover and Oregon Vetch.

NOVEMBER.

In the Garden—Shallots and Onions can be planted, and cover the rows with some fresh manure. Spinach and Corn Salad.

In the Field—The season is now drawing to a close. Sow as early in the month as possible Rye, Barley, Turf Oats, Wheat, Grass Seeds, Timothy and Clovers.

In the Orchard—This will be an active month, as November is the best month for planting all sorts of Nursery Stock. Apple, Pear, Peach, Cherry, Plum, Quince and all kinds of shade trees are now ready to set out.

DECEMBER.

In the Garden—Very little can be done this month. Sow Cauliflower and Cabbage for spring use. Sow in frames some early forcing Radish, also Lettuce.

In the Orchard—Set out Fruit, Shade and Ornamental Trees of all kinds and Strawberry Plants.

HOTBEDS.

The hotbed is made by forming a pile of horse manure with the straw used for bedding or leaves some 3 feet in height, and about 12' or 18 inches larger all around than the size of the frame to be used. Shake all together, so that the straw and manure will be equally mixed. It may be sunk in the ground a foot or 18 inches, or made on the surface. Place the frame on as soon as the bed is made, and fill in with about 5 or 6 inches of good mellow soil, keeping the frame closed for a few days until fermentation takes place and the soil is quite warm. It is better to wait a day or two after this and then sow the seeds. The frame can be constructed by any handy man at very small expense. It consists of a wooden frame, from 3 to 6 feet wide, and from 6 to 16 feet long, according to the supply of vegetables or flowers required. The back side should be at least 6 inches higher than the front—the frame subdivided by cross-bars and each division covered by a glazed sash. The frame should face the south or south-east. From the time the seed is sown, attention to airing and shading during the hot part of the day, and covering up at night, is essential, and also that the soil be never allowed to get dry. The watering should be done with a very fine rose watering pot, and with tepid water. The temperature at night may range from 55 to 65 degrees, and during the day from 70 to 80.

COLD FRAMES.

A cold frame is so easy in construction and management as to be available to all. This is simply a hotbed frame with glazed sash, placed upon a bed of fine mellow earth, in some sheltered place in the garden. After the frame is secured in its place, a couple of inches of fine earth should be placed inside, and the frame closed up a day or two before the seeds are planted. As the cold frame depends upon the sun for its warmth, it must not be started as soon as the hotbed, and in this latitude the latter part of February is soon enough. Watering occasionally will be necessary, and air must be given in bright, warm days. Shade is also necessary.

How to Make a Vegetable Garden

When laying out the garden have it sloping toward the south if possible, as such a location permits of earlier planting and will produce the earliest vegetables. Have the soil well enriched by applying a liberal dressing of well rotted manure, which should be applied the previous fall if possible. When sowing small seeds make the soil fine and level. With a hoe or pointed stick mark out rows 15 inches apart, making the furrow or drill from $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 inch in depth, varying in proportion to the size of the seed to be sown. Sow the seeds thinly in these drills, covering them with fine soil to a depth of about five times the diameter of the seed sown. When the soil is dry it should be well packed over the seed by using a small roller or by laying a board on the finished row and walking over it; this greatly assists the germination of most varieties of seed.

Making Hills—In making hills for vines or pole beans the soil should be removed to a depth of 5 inches and 12 inches in diameter.

Place a large shovelful of well rotted manure in the hole and cover with the soil removed from the hill. Plant the seeds to top of these hills and cover $\frac{1}{2}$ inch deep.

Cultivation—To obtain the earliest and finest vegetables the soil must be kept fine and loose by frequent hoeings throughout the season, never allowing the soil to become hard or baked. Vines should not be disturbed after they begin to run, as the leaves act as a mulch to the soil.

Any weeds not destroyed by former cultivations should be removed by hand pulling. To have vegetables of the finest quality they should be gathered as soon as they reach sufficient size. The freshest and finest flavor of many vegetables is obtained by gathering early in the morning before they become wilted by the hot summer sun.

CULTURAL INSTRUCTIONS

Beans—Bush Beans may be planted when danger of frost is past in rows 18 inches apart, either having single plants 6 inches apart or in hills 1 foot apart. For Bush Limas the hills should be at least 2 feet apart each way. Beans delight in warm, well enriched soil.

Plant every 2 weeks until the middle of July for a constant supply of tender young pods.

Pole Beans—When the trees are well out in leaf set stout poles 3 or 4 feet apart each way. Prepare the hills as directed in a preceding chapter, plant 6 to 8 beans around the base of each pole, covering 1 inch deep, and when well started thin out to the three best plants.

If the young plants do not cling to the poles they should be tied up with soft twine until well started. Lima Beans grow more readily if pushed into the soil edgewise with the eye down. Keeping the pods of all Beans picked as fast as they are formed will greatly prolong the bearing season.

Peas—Peas will do well in any good garden soil. It is quite possible by frequent sowing and by planting varieties which mature in succession to have peas throughout the season. Sow in drills 15 inches apart for dwarf varieties and 20 inches apart for tall sorts.

Keep the soil deeply and thoroughly cultivated during the whole growing period. The small round seed of the extra earlies may be sown as early in the spring as the soil can be prepared, but the wrinkled seed of the later varieties is more tender and should not be planted until the nights are quite warm. Peas should not be planted two years in succession on the same land.

Sweet and Garden Corn—Sweet Corn varies greatly in hardness, earliness, size and sweetness. The early sorts grow only 3 to 5 feet high and may be planted when the trees are starting out in leaf in rows 3 feet apart, making the hills about 1 foot apart. The later and sweeter varieties are more tender and should not be planted until the trees are in full leaf or the seed will rot in the ground. Plant in rows 3 to 4 feet apart, making the hills $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 feet apart in the row.

The ears should be gathered for use before the grains become hard.

Make plantings every two weeks to insure a continuous supply of tender, fresh ears.

Beets, Carrots—Sow the seed thinly in shallow drills, $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 inch deep, pressing the covering of fine soil firmly over the seed. When well started thin out to stand 6 inches apart

CULTURAL INSTRUCTIONS—Continued

in the row. Give frequent cultivations to encourage the forming of smooth regular roots. Beets and carrots should be sown every two weeks until July to insure a constant supply of fresh, tender roots, as they are apt to become woody or coarse if old or large. Beets may be transplanted to other rows if the soil is moist.

Cabbage, Cauliflower and Brussels Sprouts—For early use the seed should be started in the house or hotbed. When the young plants are well started transplant so as to stand 3 inches apart each way. About the end of April they may be transplanted into the garden in rows 3 feet apart, setting the plants 18 inches apart each way. For late use sow the seed about the middle of May, in a finely prepared seed bed, later transplanting to rows 3 feet apart, setting the plants 2½ feet apart. The soil should be well enriched with manure, and the plants should be kept in strong growth by frequent cultivations. When the cauliflower begins to head, bend or tie the leaves over the head to protect them from the sun.

Celery—Sow the seed (which is slow to germinate), in shallow boxes indoors or in a finely prepared seed bed out of doors early in the spring. Do not cover the seed too deep and keep the soil moist, almost wet, until the seed germinates. When the young plants are well started transplant in shallow trenches 3 feet apart and 6 inches apart in the trench. Keep the plants well banked as soon as they are large enough and throughout the balance of the season. To insure crisp, well-blanching stalks bank up only when the soil is dry enough to crumble.

Cucumbers, Cantaloupes and Bush Squashes—Plant in hills from 4 to 6 feet apart each way. Prepare the hills as directed on a preceding page, planting from 10 to 20 seeds in each hill when danger from frost is over. Guard against the ravages of insects by dusting the young plants with fine Bug Death or Slug Shot early in the morning while the leaves are still wet with dew. When the young plants are well started thin out, leaving only the three strongest plants. Gather the fruit early in the morning as soon as they are ready for use to keep the vines bearing and to have them in the finest condition.

Egg Plants and Peppers—Start the seeds in a warm sunny window or hotbed early in March. When the nights are warm and danger from frost is over transplant in hills of well rotted manure 2 feet apart each way, and keep rapidly growing by frequent hoeings. These plants require rich soil and warm weather to make a strong quick growth.

Kale—Sow either in spring or fall broadcast at rate of 2 pounds per acre. Rake in seed after planting, then firm the soil well.

Lettuce and Endive—Fresh, tender Lettuce is one of the greatest delicacies of the garden and may be had throughout the season by making frequent sowings. Beginning early in the spring, small sowings should be made every two weeks. Sow in shallow drills 15 inches apart.

When the plants are well started thin out to stand 8 to 10 inches apart in the row. Keep the soil fine and loose so that the growth may be quick and the leaves crisp and mild in flavor.

Onions—Sow the seed thinly in drills 15 inches apart as early in the spring as the soil can be dug in loose condition. Keep free from weeds and when well started thin out to stand 3 inches apart in the rows. When the tops begin to die down, pull all the bulbs and let them dry in the sun several days to thoroughly ripen them, then cut off the tops and store them in open boxes or baskets in a cool dry place.

Leeks—These are grown and cultivated the same as directed for Onions except that the plants should stand from 4 to 6 inches apart in the row. In the fall when the plants are well grown fine soil should be drawn about each stalk to blanch them. The stalks are sliced for salads or cooked like onions; they are highly esteemed for their sweet flavor.

Onion Sets—For green onions plant sets in rows, dropping them every 2 inches and cover slightly. Do not put them in very deep. To grow large onions drop sets 4 inches apart in rows. Keep the ground well stirred. This is a very easy crop to grow.

Okra—Plant in rows first week in April, weather permitting, thin plants and let them stand 2 to 3 feet apart in the row. Cover seeds 2 inches.

Mustard—Plant in early spring and every 4 weeks for succession, also sow in fall, August and September; makes fine greens. Prepare the soil well and sow broadcast, covering the seeds only lightly.

Parsnip—Sow early in spring in drills 2 to 2½ feet apart, cover ½ inch deep and press the soil firmly over the seeds; cultivate often and thin plants to 4 or 5 to the foot.

Parsley—Sow in early spring or fall in drills 1 foot apart. Thin out or transplant 6 inches apart in the row. Parsley seed should be soaked for several hours in warm water; it will germinate better.

Radishes—These thrive best in light, rich, mellow soil, and to have mild radishes they must make a quick growth, that is, the soil should be kept loose and fine as deeply as possible by frequent hoeings. Make first sowings as early in the spring as the soil can be properly prepared.

Make successional plantings every week or ten days. Sow in drills 15 inches apart, thinning to stand 2 inches apart in the row. For the early sowing use the small extra early varieties. Later in the season the summer varieties should be sown, and in July sowings of the winter varieties may be made. Gather while young and tender and just before needed for the table.

Salsify—Sow seed in light deep soil early in spring, or it can be planted any time during the summer if you get seasonable rains, in drills 12 inches apart and 1 inch deep. Thin out the young plants to 6 inches. Salsify will stand all winters in this climate.

Spinach—For spring or summer use plant either broadcast or in drills as soon as the ground can be worked, and every two weeks for succession. Sow in drills and thin out; cover seeds 1 inch in planting. For winter or early spring use, sow as soon as we get seasonable rains in well manured ground. Fall plantings are generally made broadcast. Cover with straw on the approach of cold weather.

Squashes and Pumpkins—Plant the seed in well manured hills 10 feet apart each way when danger of frost is over, usually about the middle of May. Protect against insects as directed for cucumbers. Give frequent cultivations and keep free from weeds until there is danger of injuring the vines. Pumpkins do quite well when planted in every fourth hill in every fourth row of corn.

Gather on approach of frost and store in a warm dry place.

Tomatoes—For early use start the seed in hotbeds or in a warm sunny window in March. When the plants are getting the second pair of leaves they should be transplanted to stand 2 inches apart each way.

When the trees are well out in leaf set out in rich soil in the garden 3 to 4 feet apart each way. Hoe frequently to keep them growing rapidly.

The fruits will ripen earlier and be finest flavored if the vines are supported on a trellis.

Turnips and Ruta Bagas—For fall use sow seed of turnips in July in drills ½ inch deep and 16 inches apart. When the young plants are well started thin out to stand 6 to 8 inches apart. Cultivate frequently until the tops become too large. Ruta Bagas may be grown in the same manner, but requiring a longer growing season, they should be sown in June.

Turnips may also be sown broadcast in corn at the last cultivation. For spring use sow in February and March broadcast, covering seeds lightly. Good well manured ground will make quick greens and turnips.

Watermelons—Watermelons delight in a light sandy soil. Plant when danger from frost is over in hills 8 to 10 feet apart each way. Put from 10 to 15 seeds in each hill and when well started thin out to the three best plants. Guard against insects as directed for Cucumbers, cultivate frequently and keep free from weeds. After the vines start to run be careful not to injure or bruise them in any way, as they are quite tender. If very large fruits are desired remove all but one from each vine.

Flower Seeds—Most flower seeds germinate well in a rather light sandy loam, exposed to the sun, while a few are benefited by partial shade, and some do best with an element of clay finely mixed with the soil. Nearly all the hardy seeds germinate better when planted in early spring, as soon as the soil can be worked fairly easily, March and April.

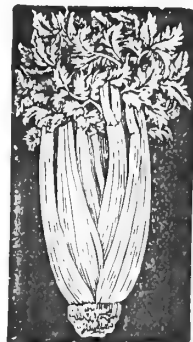

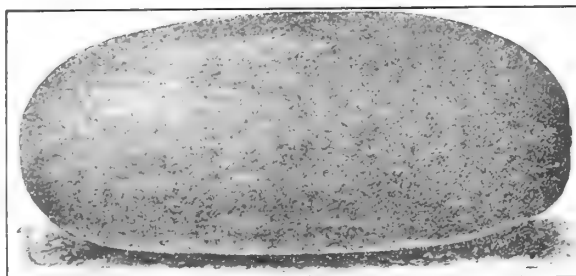

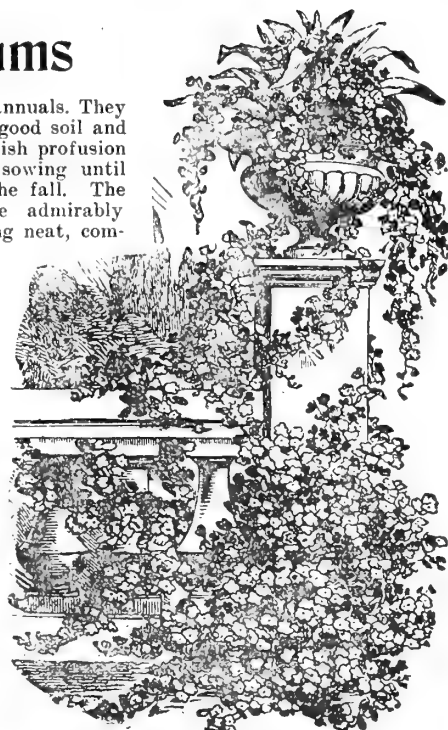

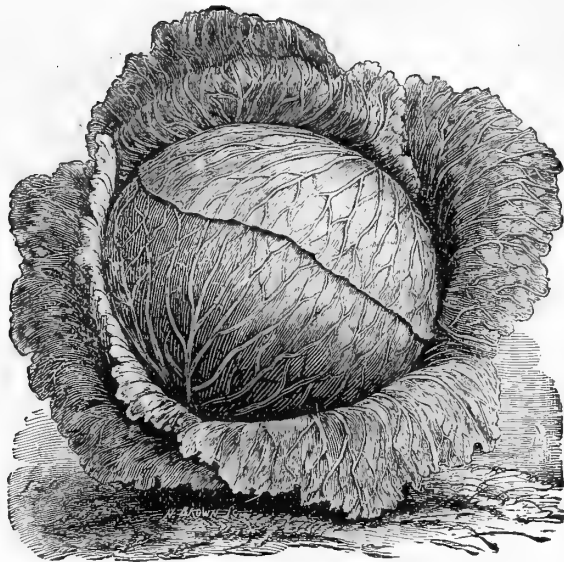

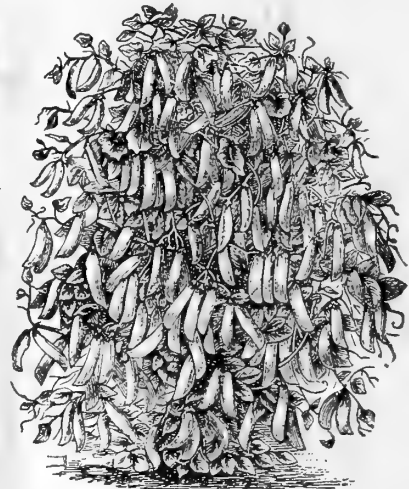

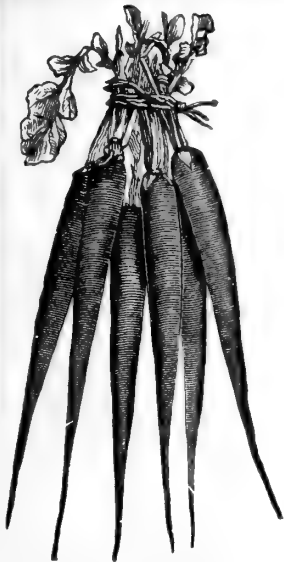

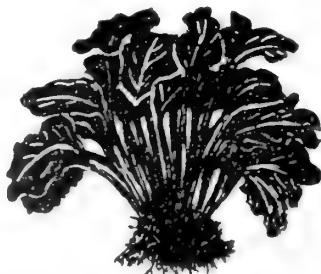

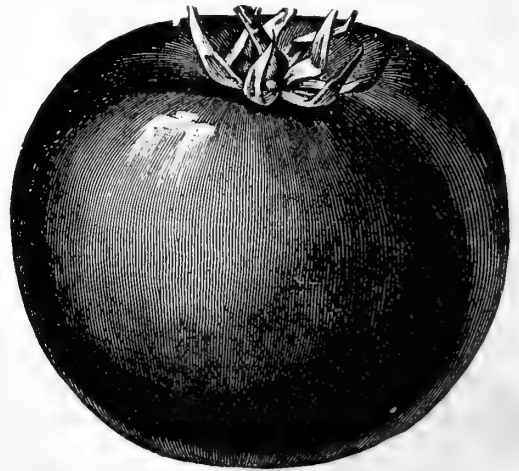

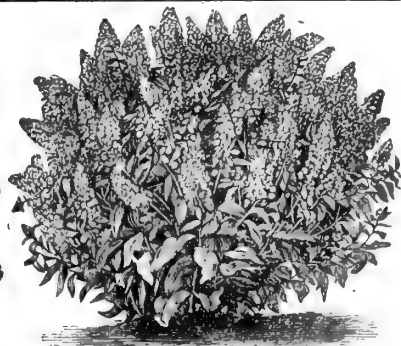

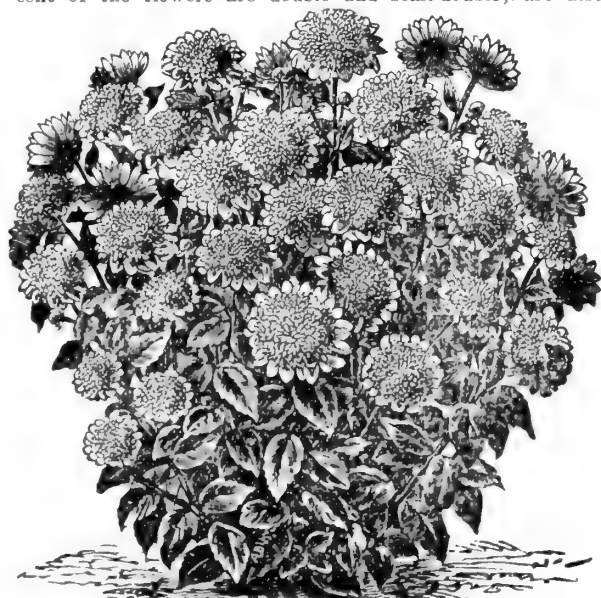

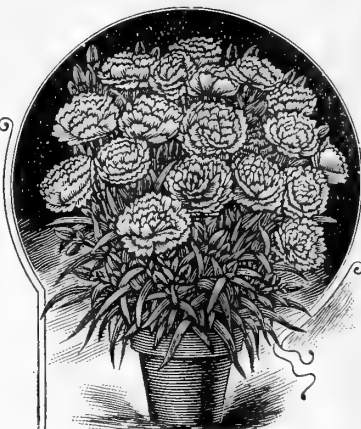

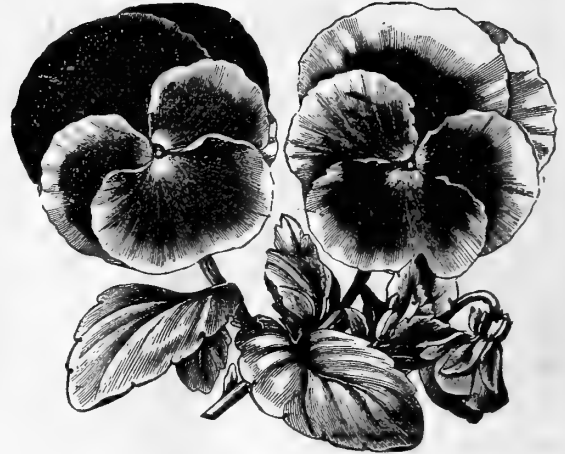

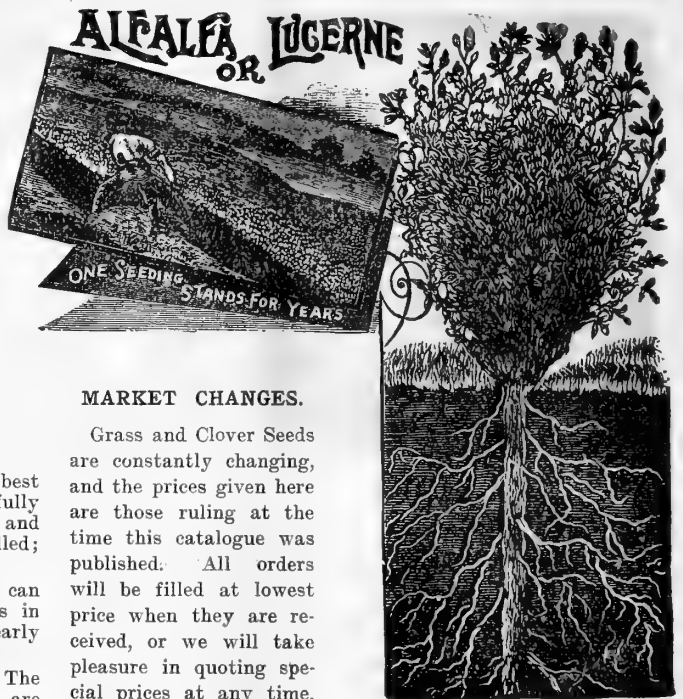
Alfalfa will grow on soils having a good under drainage, or where the subsoil is porous. A good crop of Alfalfa is most easily established when following such crops as soja beans, cow peas or clover. But it will do very well when following all crops except kaffir corn or cane. A crop of crimson or burr clover plowed under will put soil in an ideal condition for Alfalfa.

The land must be deeply plowed and well settled before seeding, only the surface being kept loose. Sow in March and April or in the latter half of August or September, at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds to the acre. Don't make the mistake of sowing too thinly. It does not stool and it is very important that a good stand be secured at the first seeding.

Cut young Alfalfa the first year every 20 or 30 days, setting the sickle bar 5 or 6 inches high. The second year cut from 3 to 5 times when in full bloom.

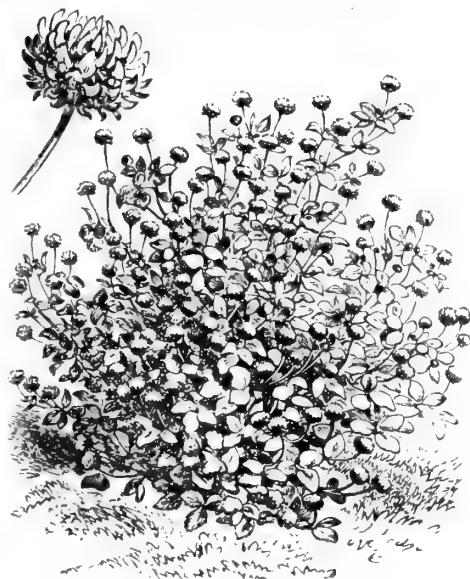

SPECIAL DIRECTIONS ABOUT SOWING GRASS SEED.

Nearly all grass seed are very small, and will not come up or grow satisfactorily unless they are put in properly. And again most planters will not use sufficient seed to an acre. The soil should be thoroughly prepared by deep breaking and thorough harrowing until a smooth seed bed is made. After sowing the seed, very light covering should be given with a brush or harrow that will not cover too deep. If weather is likely to be dry the ground should be pressed over the seed or rolled so as to bring the seed in close contact with the soil to hold moisture until the seed gets a start.

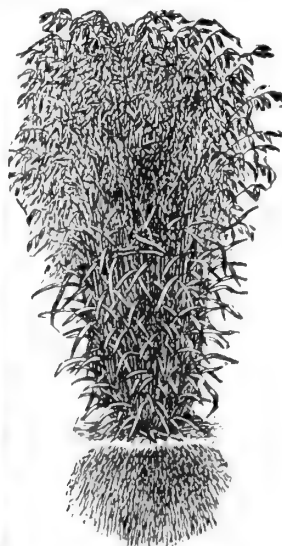

COW OR SOUTHERN PEAS.

There is no surer or cheaper means of improving and increasing the productiveness of our soils than by sowing the Cow Pea. It makes enormous growth, enabling the farmer to put plenty of nitrogenous vegetable matter into the soil at a small cost, and so very largely enables him to dispense with the use of nitrogenous commercial fertilizers, and has the power to extract the costly nitrogen from the atmosphere and to store the same in the vines and roots, so that if the crop is cut off, the land is still enriched and the condition improved. 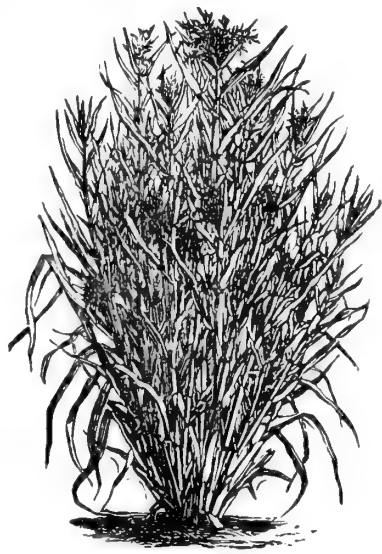

Oregon Vetch (*Vicia Sativa*)—A new species of Vetch from Oregon; claimed to be pure, vigorous and easier started than the Sand Vetch. In Oregon and the west, it is building up old wheat land. Sowing down Vetch for 2 years makes land that would only produce 12 to 15 bushels of wheat yield 40 to 45 bushels. Let it lay a half day, then cock up; let it stand in cock 10 days, then put in barn. It makes good pasture for hogs, cows and sheep through the winter. 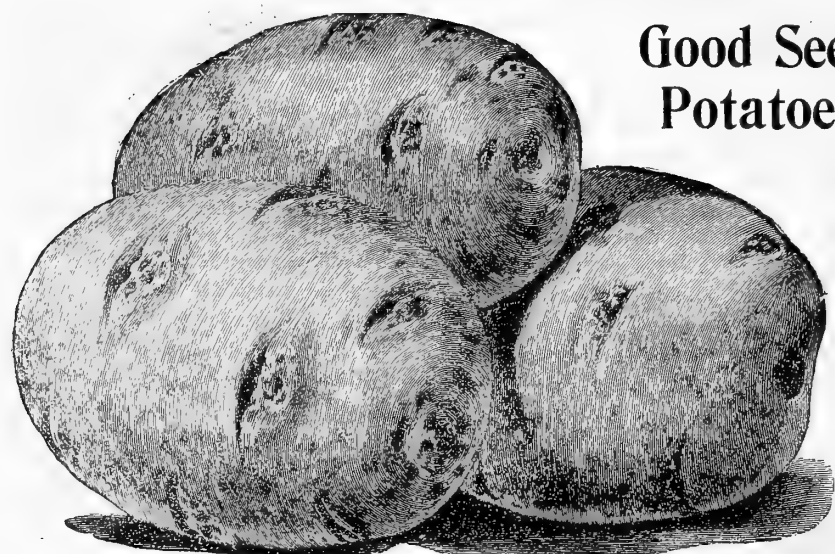

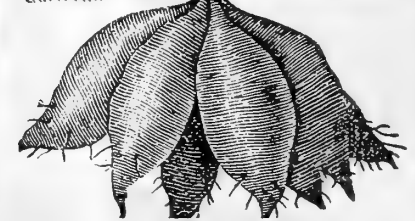


Red River Valley Early Ohio Potato.

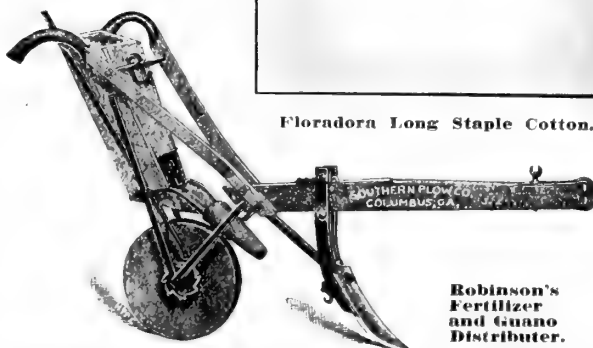

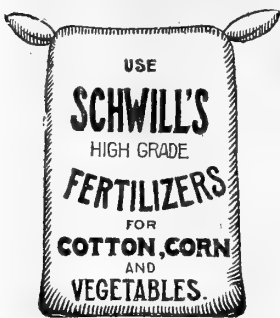


Illustration showing untreated and Bonora treated plant. Notice the wonderful improvement in the plant on the left, the result of just two applications of Bonora.

Planting—Fill up the hole with surface soil, so that the tree will stand about as it did in the nursery after the earth is settled. Work the soil thoroughly among the roots, and, when well covered, tramp firmly. Set the tree firm as a post, but leave the surface filling (or poorer soil) light or loose. No staking will be required, except for very tall trees.

Spraying—We cannot be too emphatic in impressing on the horticulturist to spray his fruit trees and grape-vines if he desires good fruit. Follow directions carefully. Experiments frequently result disastrously. Careless spraying will result in loss of fruit, and sometimes the trees. Every fruit grower should purchase a spraying apparatus; they can now be had for a small sum. Be careful in keeping your solution continually stirred. The best time for spraying is late in the afternoon or during cloudy weather, except with kerosene emulsion; this should be used on bright, sunny days. (Write us for prices; we can save you money.)

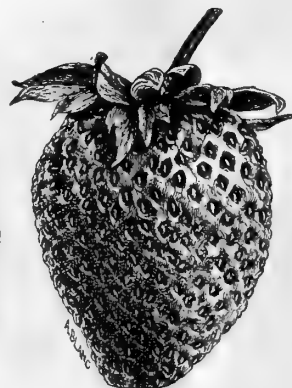

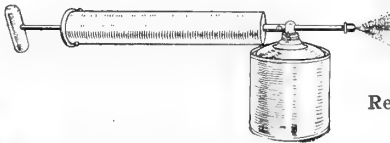

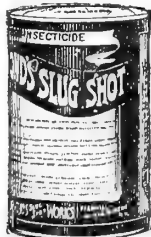

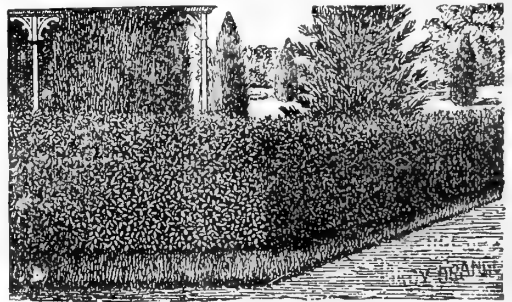

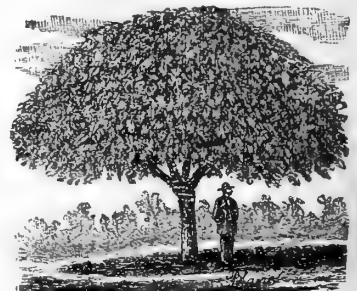

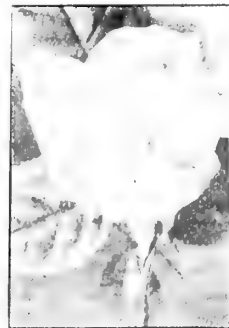

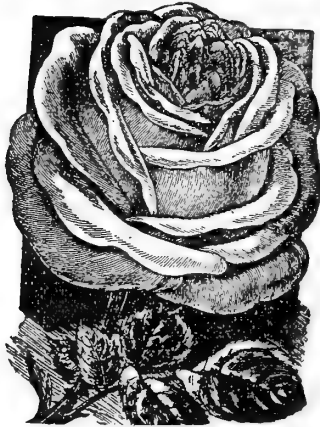

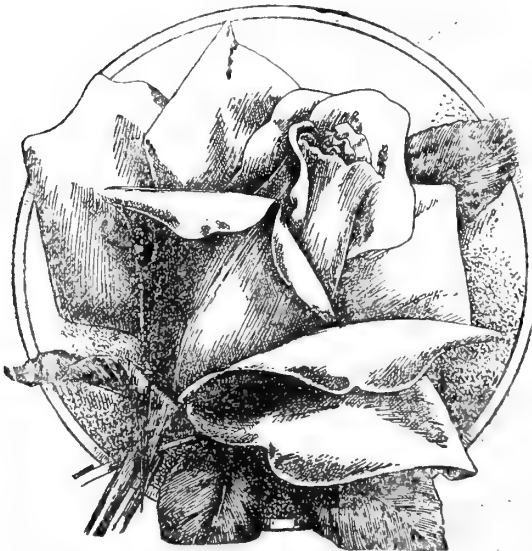

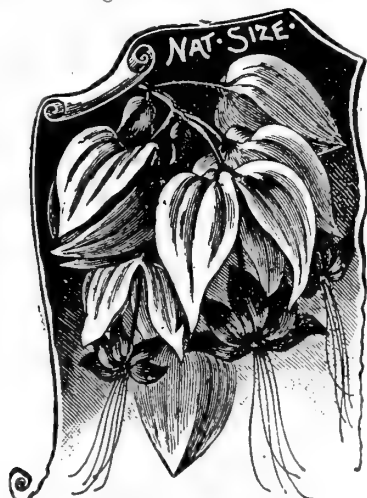

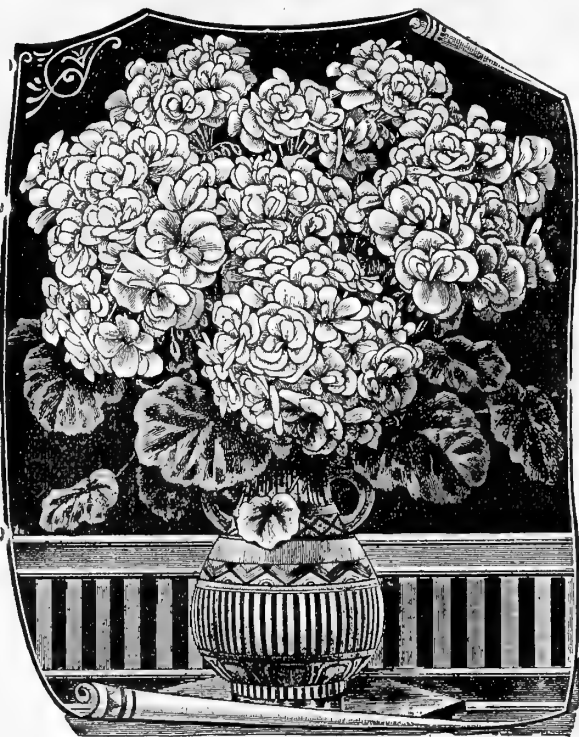

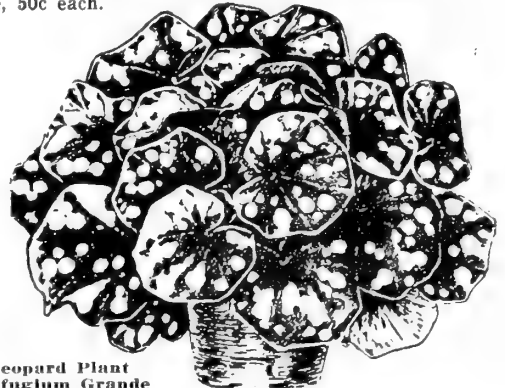
